TWIN FALLS • Recently identified cases of pertussis, or whooping cough, have health officials urging
adults to make sure their booster shots are up to date.
On Friday, two cases of pertussis or whooping cough, were identified in Twin Falls County. With 14 reports already confirmed this year, the Magic Valley currently has the highest amount of
in the state.
"The best present you could give your new granddaughter or grandson is getting a booster shot," said Cheryle Becker, a family and children's health administrator for the South Central Public Health District. Becker said officials would like to see adults who are around newborns are the most likely to infect a baby before it can be vaccinated.
Health officials recommend that adults should receive a booster shot every two to three years.
Parents should check not only to
seif their children's pertussis vacciseeit their children's pertussis vacci-

own booster shots. For adults, whooping cough is easily mistaken for asthma or other types of coughing illhesses.

garding the man's identity, and garding the man's identity, and body ended up hidden in the motel on the corner of Overland Avenue and Fifth Street remain unavailable.
"Identification and notification of the family are pending" Kidd said.
An autopsy will be performed Monday to determine the time and cause of death, but until then no additional information will be released, he added.
Cassia County sheriff's detec-
tives are searching for two employees who were reported missing from the motel on May 4. James Duane Ambrose, 55, is from the motel. He faces a Cassia County felony warrant for grand theft with an associated $\$ 250,000$ bond, and was last seen in the Las Vegas area two weeks ago.
Russ Taft, 54 , is also missing and feared to be the victim of a violent act, according to a press release i

Annual pet adoption event hopes to help the Minidoka County Animal Control Facility put more dogs in new homes.

BURLEY - Twenty-four soft eyes and a dozen wet noses greeted the Burley C-

were displayed in the hope that new masters would adopt them.

three-drug mixture that included pentobarbital was used.
Reinke says the change was driven by difficulties in obtaining the other two chemicals used to kill Paul Ezra Rhoades in November.
The decision makes Idaho the latest death penalty state to switch to using only pentobarbital in its lethal injection.
Reinke says the state's protocol still allows for using future executions.

CHEERS to Cassia County for setting an example for the rest of us. Though the numbers are still unofficial, it appears Cassia County had a 50 percent voter turnout in this week's primary election. Yes, Cassia County had some pretty exciting races on the ballot -the Cameron vs. Pickett race and the sheriff contest - but a quick look at past elections shows that Cassia County always has some of the highest voter turnout in the state

CHEERS to the voters of northern Idaho for throwing out Rep. Phil Hart, a four-term, tax-dodging Republican representative. Hart lost his four-way primary race on Tuesday.
For years, Hart has tried to use his position as a legislator to be above the law - most notably in his fight against the state and federal government over hundreds of thousands in unpaid income taxes. Hart wrote a book that challenges the legality of income taxes. According to the Associated Press, Hart has acknowledged taking timber he didn't pay for in the mid-1990s from state land to build his home in Athol.
Hart seems to believe the law does not apply to him because it's the law that is at fault - not him. Idaho does not need a lawbreaker for a lawmaker.

Obama's stand has put wind in the sails of gay marriage supporters, while providing political fuel to opponents, said Kamy Akhavan, president of ProCon.org, a nonpartisan California-based nonprofit that researches pros and cons on controversial issues.
The issue is expected to come up in at least four ballot measures this fall, including Maine, Minnesota, Maryland and Washington.

WASHINGTON • Ignoring a White House veto threat, the Republican-controlled House approved a $\$ 642$ billion defense budget Friday that breaks a deficit-cutting deal with President Barack Obama and restricts his authority in an elect
The House voted 290-120 for the fiscal 2013 spen blueprint that authorizes money for weapons, aircraft, ships and the war in Afghanistan - $\$ 8$ billion more than Obama and congressional Republicans agreed to last summer in the clamor for fiscal austerity
Insisting they are stronger on defense than the president, Republicans crafted a bill that calls for construction of a missile defense site on the East Coast that the military opreaffirms the indefinite detention without trial of suspect ed terrorists, even U.S. citizens captured on American soil. The divisive GOP provisions will have a short shelf life, as the Democratic-controlled Senate is likely to scrap many of them and stick to the spending level in the deficit-cut ting agreement
Defense Secretary Leon Panetta met privately last week a blueprint the Pentag the president's proposed budget, strategy focused on Asia, the Mideast and cyberspace as the nation emerges from two long wars. The Senate Armed Services Committee crafts its version of the budget next week.
