Whooping Cough on Rise in M.V.

TWIN FALLS • Recently identified cases of pertussis, or whooping cough, have health officials urging adults to make sure their booster shots are up to date.

On Friday, two cases of pertussis, or whooping cough, were identified in Twin Falls County. With 14 reports already confirmed this year, the Magic Valley currently has the highest amount of whooping cough cases in the state.

"The best present you could give your new granddaughter or grandson is getting a booster shot," said Cheryl Becker, a family and children's health administrator for the South Central Public Health District.

Becker said officials would like to see adults who are around newborns come in for a booster shot, since they are the most likely to infect a baby before it can be vaccinated.

Health officials recommend that adults should receive a booster shot every two to three years.

Parents should check not only to see if their children's pertussis vaccinations are up to date, but also their own booster shots. For adults, whooping cough is easily mistaken for asthma or other types of coughing illnesses.

Symptoms include a persistent cough that follows a cold. Typically, the cough occurs in explosive bursts and ends with a high-pitched whoop as the person catches their breath.

Coin Toss will Break T.F. Co. Precinct Tie

TWIN FALLS • The flip of a coin will decide who wins the Republican precinct committeeman seat in Twin Falls Precinct 8.

At Tuesday's primary election, candidates Thomas Lowther and Don A. Zuck each received 75 votes. Idaho code stipulates that tie votes must be settled by a coin toss.

The coin toss is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Tuesday at the Twin Falls County Courthouse in Twin Falls.

According to the *Idaho Statesman*, two other precinct races will be decided by a coin toss: One in Ada County and one in Bonneville County.

This is the second tie in two years for Twin Falls County. In 2010, the Republican precinct committeeman seat in Buhl was settled by a coin toss.

In 2009, a coin toss broke the tie in the Wendell mayor race.

Body Found at Burley Alpine Garden Inn

Police haven't determined whether it's one of two men who went missing from the motel on May 4.

BURLEY • Police have not released whether the body of an adult male found Friday in a Burley motel's crawl space is that of one of two men reported missing from the motel on May 4.

The body was discovered at about 11:30 a.m. Friday morning at the Alpine Garden Inn, according to Cassia County Sheriff Randy Kidd. Further details re-

garding the man's identity, and the circumstances of how the body ended up hidden in the motel on the corner of Overland Avenue and Fifth Street remain unavailable.

"Identification and notification of the family are pending," Kidd said.

An autopsy will be performed Monday to determine the time and cause of death, but until then no additional information will be released, he added.

Cassia County sheriff's detec-

tives are searching for two employees who were reported missing from the motel on May 4.

James Duane Ambrose, 55, is accused of stealing a vehicle from the motel. He faces a Cassia County felony warrant for grand theft with an associated \$250,000 bond, and was last seen in the Las Vegas area two weeks ago.

Russ Taft, 54, is also missing and feared to be the victim of a violent act, according to a press release issued last week by Kidd's office.

"We are still investigating that, so I can't go into detail."

Hundreds Walk in Hope of Cancer Cure

FILER • Dozens of tents dotted the lawn and white paper bags lined the track of the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds in Filer Friday evening as hundreds of cancer survivors, friends, family and supporters gathered for this year's Relay for Life.

About 730 participants had registered by 7 p.m., including 309 cancer survivors and 67 teams, said Jessica Laraway, the event's co-chairwoman. Laraway estimated about 1,000 people

would attend the event over its 16-hour span, helping with its goal of raising \$220,000.

"We'll raise it," she said. "We're above from last year."

The evening's main events kicked off with the Survivors Lap at about 6:45 p.m., with cancer survivors from toddlers to seniors donning purple T-shirts and medals around their necks. Others in attendance applauded and cheered as the survivors and their families marched around the dirt track in the first lap of the evening. The Idaho Milk Products Team stood

"Three of us are cancer survivors," said team member Lesley Moore.

Filer Man Charged for Rifle Threat

FILER • A Filer man was arrested Thursday for threatening a female relative with a rifle, according to a report filed by Twin Falls County Sheriff's deputies.

Deputies were dispatched to a residence near the intersection of U.S. Highway 30 and 2700 East Road for a call about a woman who said Steven L. Westphal, 56, pointed a rifle at her head.

"She stated there had been an argument between the two of them and when she refused to respond, Mr. Westphal grabbed the gun, pointed it at her head and 'cocked' it," the police report states.

According to the report, deputies interviewed Westphal who said he had been drinking brandy and two or three beers, and apologized for the situation.

Westphal was placed under arrest for aggravated assault and asked for an attorney.

He was booked into the Twin Falls County Jail and held on \$5,000 bond.

A preliminary hearing is scheduled for May 25.

Friends on Display

Annual pet adoption event hopes to help the Minidoka County Animal Control Facility put more dogs in new homes.

BURLEY • Twenty-four soft eyes and a dozen wet noses greeted the Burley C-A-L Ranch Stores' customers Friday as Minidoka County's homeless dogs were displayed in the hope that new masters would adopt them.

"Last year we pretty much cleared out the shelter and adopted all the dogs out," said Mary Jane Mani, longtime volunteer at the Minidoka County Animal Control Facility in Paul. But by Friday afternoon, only one of the dogs had found a new home.

Mani said the animal control facility currently "has a full house" with 30 adoptable dogs ranging in age from 10 months old to 7 years.

Volunteer Janine McManus goes to the shelter weekly to walk dogs and has taken in others as foster pets until homes could be found. One of her foster dogs, Mr. B, drew the attention of Marsha Goodman of Albion.

"I've been looking for another dog," Goodman said as she stroked the mild-mannered pooch. Goodman said she'd think it over before making a final decision.

McManus said pet adoption works well in front of the store because many people are "scared" to go to the shelter.

"It took me several months to go into the shelter because I needed to know I could do it without taking home half the crew," she said.

Deb Mazur, who adopted a dog from the event last year, brings her dozen adopted children to the shelter to walk the dogs. She's concerned the shelter may revert to its old policy of euthanizing animals that

are held for more than three days.

Mani said volunteers are asking visitors to sign a petition to officially make the facility a no-kill shelter. The facility has made strides in the past year by reducing the number of animals euthanized monthly to the single digits.

Mazur said she won't continue to take her children to the shelter if the dogs are going to be euthanized in three days.

"My kids, who are adopted, relate to Lady (the family's adopted dog). She is like

a therapy dog for them," Mazur said. "I've watched my children who sometime struggle with being adopted hug a dog and say 'It's OK, you're going to find your forever home just like me!'"

C-A-L Ranch Stores Manager Wayne Hubbard said he's adopted two dogs from the shelter and loves the pet adoption event.

"Last year went so well," he said. "It brought a lot of people to the store and they adopted out a lot of dogs."

Hubbard said the store wants to host a pet adoption every six months and would

Kidd said. "But some of the evidence leads us to believe that."

It remains unclear whether the body found Friday in the motel is that of Taft.

Taft, who owns the Home Away Motel in Rupert, was purchasing the Alpine Garden Inn, according to employee Karlynn Gonzales.

Gonzales said the Alpine's

newly appointed manager found the body while cleaning.

"She was cleaning because there was a bad smell," Gonzales said. "There is a storage closet in the laundry room and the body was in a compartment under the floor in the closet."

Gonzales and Holly McCuiston manage the Home Away Motel.

"Russ was my boss and my friend," she said. "He was a good man and would help anyone."

About the Case

What we know: Cassia County sheriff's detectives are searching for two men — James Duane Ambrose, 55, and Russ Taft, 54 — reported missing from the Alpine Garden Inn in Burley on May 4. On Friday, the body of an adult male was found in a crawl space at the motel, though it's uncertain if it is that of one of the men.

walk all night, said team member Memori McGuire.

Bennett said her friends said they should form a team to walk this year. She looked to the Depot for support "Because I go there for coffee all the time," she said.

Jeni Kiesig and her husband Dave, also a survivor of eight years, have attended so many Relays she said she's lost count. Most years she marches with a team and gathers sponsors, but this year the family attended by themselves.

Instead of getting sponsors, Jeni planned to buy a quilt in the annual auction and snagged one with Dave's handprint for just more than \$300. Jeni said her goal is to have a quilt with her husband's handprint for her and each of their five children.

"I have two quilts so far," she said. "This is the third, so we need three more."

Although she always bids, Jeni doesn't win a quilt every year. Last year she was out-bid when her quilt topped \$1,000. Another year, she let another woman with a family member on the quilt out-bid her.

"We talked about it and I said, 'you take it,'" she said. "There's a story for every family."

The coughing attacks can continue for four to six weeks and the person can appear well between bursts of coughing.

While they may appear to look well, people with whooping cough are contagious for three weeks if left untreated. They will remain contagious an additional five days after treatment begins.

Over the past five years, reported cases of whooping cough have steadily climbed, according to a report from the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare. In 2007, health officials

identified 45 cases throughout Idaho. By 2010, the number was up to 187 and jumped to 192 the following year.

"We're trying to increase our immunization rate," Becker said. "Our number one concern is the infant."

Cassia Co. Schools Receive Defibrillators from M-C Service Clubs

BURLEY • Cassia County schools recently received nine potentially lifesaving devices from Cassia County service clubs.

The automated external defibrillators, or AEDs, can be used by even untrained adults to deliver a life-saving shock to someone in cardiac arrest. The devices cost up to \$1,000 each, and will be accessible for those attending school events from athletics to the arts.

"I'm so glad these service clubs have stepped forward to help put the AEDs in these schools, because with budget cuts the district doesn't have the money to do it," said district nurse Kyle

Hodges. "This is a gigantic thing they have done."

Hodges said her goal is to get the devices in all county secondary schools and then raise enough money to put them in all the elementary schools.

"Having these in our district is especially important because we have so many rural schools," Hodges said.

Research has shown that a person in cardiac arrest who receives a shock from an AED within three minutes of the incident is more likely to survive.

Hodges has collaborated with her peers across the state and nation during the past several months to draft a district policy outlining who will be allowed to use the devices and where

they'll be placed in schools.

The policy will likely be adopted by the school board during its June business meeting. Once the policy is in place, the devices will be placed in the schools, hopefully before the beginning of the school year, Hodges said.

Hodges said training for AED use is included in CPR training. School administrators will receive CPR training, which will also be offered to all staff, coaches and substitute teachers for a small charge.

Ongoing costs associated with the devices include periodic replacement of the pads and batteries. The devices will be stored on the wall in unlocked cases that have an alarm to alert that the device has been removed.

T.F. Man Accused of Aggravated Assault for Knife Threat

TWIN FALLS • A 26-year-old Twin Falls man is charged with aggravated assault for allegedly threatening a woman with a knife.

Tirzo Manuel Muro was arraigned on the charge Thursday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

At about 11:49 a.m. May 15, Twin Falls Police Officer Dallan Hall was dispatched to the 300 block of Lois Street for a call about a physical domestic fight.

When he arrived, Hall met with a woman who said she was there to visit a friend and saw Muro, who she said was an ex-boyfriend.

According to the woman, Muro became upset while the two spoke and began swinging at her with his fists. The woman put her arms over her head and curled up to avoid being hit.

"Muro hit her in the left arm and then the left side of her head," the report states. "Muro then grabbed a kitchen knife and held it up so the blade of the knife was pointing down. Muro raised the knife as if to stab (the woman) and said 'I should just (expletive) kill you.'"

According to the report, Muro went to close a window when the woman began screaming and she was able to escape and call 911.

Police said a baseball-size bruise was starting to show on the woman's upper left arm. As Hall spoke to the woman, he saw a screen fall from the upstairs window and Muro jump to the ground, the report said.

Hall and another officer were able to find Muro few minutes later in a nearby backyard and he was taken

into custody. He denied threatening or hitting the woman, saying he knocked over some knives but never picked one up.

Muro was held in the Twin Falls County Jail on a \$75,000 bond and a preliminary hearing is scheduled for May 25.

Jury Convicts Buhl Man of Rape

TWIN FALLS • A jury convicted Daniel R. Ghormley, 25, of rape Wednesday evening after a two-day trial.

The Buhl man was charged with the crime after Twin Falls police said forensic test results matched his DNA with samples taken from his accuser the night of the incident.

On May 22, 2011, a Twin Falls police detective responded to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center for a report of a sexual assault.

A woman told police she had been raped after a party, while she slept. The woman said she had gone out to a bar with friends who all later met up with Ghormley at his home. After a few drinks, the woman said, she became tired and was offered a spare bedroom.

The woman said she

awakened a short time later and was being raped by an unknown man. She said she then blacked out, but later woke up to find Ghormley on the bed beside her.

According to court documents the woman had a small bruise on her knee and an abrasion. No tests were done to check for a “date rape” drug.

On Nov. 29, 2011, police say they received test results showing the DNA match, and a warrant was put out for Ghormley's arrest on Dec. 22.

A trial in the case started Tuesday and was scheduled to go through the week, but ended early on Wednesday. The jury began deliberating at about 2:30 p.m. and returned with a guilty verdict at 6:30 p.m.

A sentencing hearing is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. July 16. Before sentencing, a re-sentence report and psychosexual evaluation are to be performed.

Kuna Man Sentenced for Gooding Co. Burglaries

GOODING • A Kuna man has been sentenced for a string of burglaries in Wendell.

Seth Orin Bennett, 19, convicted of four counts of burglary, was sentenced May 8 to serve three to 10 years in prison. But first, he'll have a chance to avoid that full term by completing the correctional alternative placement program under the state's retained jurisdiction program.

Bennett must also pay a \$1,902 fine. Five counts of petit theft, two counts of grand theft and three counts of burglary were dismissed by prosecutors in the case.

At least eight people reported home or car break-ins and property thefts, but more property was recovered than was reported missing, said Sgt. Jeff Lenker of the Wendell Police Department.

“We're trying to match recovered property with the rightful owners, but at this point we don't know who all those are,” Lenker said. “In some instances we believe the break-ins were swift and no real big items of value were taken, so people need to look through their homes, being aware that this spree did take place.”

Lenker said the department started receiving residential and vehicle break-in calls, likely tied to this arrest, between Jan. 25 and Jan. 27. Most of the homes and vehicles hit were on the northeast side of town.

Buhl Man Charged with DUI after Crash

BUHL • A 43-year-old Buhl man was arraigned Friday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on charges of driving under the influence, and failing to purchase or having an invalid driver's license.

On Thursday, Twin Falls County Sheriff's Sgt. Kenneth Mencl responded to the intersection at 3800 N., 1300 E. at about 10:25 p.m. for a call about a vehicle crash requiring extrication.

The Buhl Fire Department and Buhl Quick Response Team were already on the scene when Mencl arrived to see a red sedan on its side

and a man trapped near the back window of the vehicle.

The man later identified himself as Victor Manuel Martinez-Rodriguez. After being rescued from the vehicle and examined by paramedics, Martinez-Rodriguez said he was not in any pain and didn't want to go to a hospital. But Mencl noted he smelled alcohol on Martinez-Rodriguez's breath, his report states.

Mencl wrote that Martinez-Rodriguez needed assistance walking and was unable to complete two field sobriety tests. He was then placed under arrested for suspicion of drunken driving.

Just after midnight Friday

morning, Mencl administered a breath test with the blood alcohol results reading .337 and .319 — about four times the legal limit of .08 for a driver — according to his report.

Martinez-Rodriguez was booked into Twin Falls County Jail and held on \$5,000 bond. A pretrial is scheduled for June 26.

Boys Sentenced for Setting Fire to Police Cars

KETCHUM • Three Blaine County boys who pleaded guilty to setting fire to two police vehicles parked in front of officers' homes in Hailey in December 2010 have been sentenced in Juvenile Court.

The *Idaho Mountain Express* reports Juvenile Court Judge Mark Ingram gave two of the boys 21-day detention sentences while the third received 45 days because of prior misdemeanor convictions. All were placed on probation for three years, ordered to perform 100 hours of community service, pay \$589 in restitution and maintain a B average in school.

Prosecuting attorney Jim Thomas said the crimes could have been considered terrorism and if the suspects had been 18 instead of 16, they would have been prosecuted federally. He said he recommended lighter sentences because the boys had accepted responsibility and changed their attitudes.

Idaho Opts for 1 Drug Only in Execution Policy

BOISE • Idaho's corrections chief says the agency is

switching to a one-drug lethal injection for the execution next month of convicted murderer Richard Leavitt.

Idaho Department of Corrections Director Brent Reinke said Friday execution teams will administer a single, lethal dose of the surgical sedative pentobarbital during Leavitt's scheduled execution on June 12.

That's a change from the execution carried out by the agency last fall, when a three-drug mixture that included pentobarbital was used.

Reinke says the change was driven by difficulties in obtaining the other two chemicals used to kill Paul Ezra Rhoades in November.

The decision makes Idaho the latest death penalty state to switch to using only pentobarbital in its lethal injection.

Reinke says the state's protocol still allows for using the three-drug mixture in future executions.

Duncan Returns to Idaho for Federal Hearing

BOISE • A man convicted of killing children in Idaho and

California has returned to U.S. District Court in Boise to prepare for a review of part of his death penalty case.

Joseph Edward Duncan III was in court Thursday while U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge began the process of selecting an attorney to represent him in a competency hearing. An appellate court ordered the hearing last year after Duncan's former attorneys argued he wasn't competent to waive his appeals.

Duncan was sentenced to death for the 2005 murder of 9-year-old Dylan Groene. Prosecutors said Duncan snatched Dylan and his sister from their Coeur d'Alene home after killing three family members. Duncan also was convicted in California of killing a 10-year-old boy. He confessed, but wasn't charged, to killing two Washington girls.

Burglar's M.O.: Briefs, not Boxers

BOISE • Police in southwest Idaho say a man chose briefs over boxers to wear on his head as he held up a coffee shop and stole a safe.

Coffee shop owner Jason Wilson tells the *Idaho*

Statesman says he believes the man was likely not prepared when he entered Big Star Coffee in Fruitland with an accomplice on Tuesday morning.

Wilson asked: "Who robs something with underwear on their head?"

Investigators say the two burglars made off with about \$500 in cash that was inside the safe. Their actions were captured on surveillance cameras inside and outside the shop.

Jury Indicts Former School Employee

PARMA • A former employee at an alternative school in Wilder has been indicted by a grand jury on charges that she gave prescription pain medication to students.

KBOI-TV reports Roberta Kondo of Nampa has been an educational assistant at the Canyon-Owyhee School Service Agency in Wilder

since October.

Parma Police Chief Albert Erickson said Kondo was arrested on May 2 on suspicion of delivery of a controlled substance. Police were still investigating whether she sold drugs on campus.

CHEERS AND JEERS

CHEERS to Cassia County for setting an example for the rest of us. Though the numbers are still unofficial, it appears Cassia County had a 50 percent voter turnout in this week's primary election. Yes, Cassia County had some pretty exciting races on the ballot — the Cameron vs. Pickett race and the sheriff contest — but a quick look at past elections shows that Cassia County always has some of the highest voter turnout in the state.

CHEERS to the voters of northern Idaho for throwing out Rep. Phil Hart, a four-term, tax-dodging Republican representative. Hart lost his four-way primary race on Tuesday.

For years, Hart has tried to use his position as a legislator to be above the law — most notably in his fight against the state and federal government over hundreds of thousands in unpaid income taxes. Hart wrote a book that challenges the legality of income taxes. According to the Associated Press, Hart has acknowledged taking timber he didn't pay for in the mid-1990s from state land to build his home in Athol.

Hart seems to believe the law does not apply to him because it's the law that is at fault — not him. Idaho does not need a lawbreaker for a lawmaker.

JEERS to the election night behavior of supporters in the Chatterton vs. McFall race for Jerome County sheriff.

Once the polls closed on Tuesday night, the *Times-News* hosted a live blog on Magicvalley.com as a way to post an ongoing feed of election results to interested readers. It was also a place for some lively political discussion. However, it was only the McFall / Chatterton campaign supporters who used the forum to personally attack their opponent, even though the polls had closed. In fact, even after the final numbers were released, a few people continued their personal attacks.

Yes, the people who run for public office have personal flaws. Yes, many of them have things in their past that can be analyzed and used to cast doubt on their leadership abilities or even on their integrity. But there is also a time to move past those accusations. Now is that time.

CHEERS to all the people who stepped up to run for public office this season. We know it's stressful and costly. We know that by putting your name on the ballot, you set yourself up for attacks and unkind words — even from the editorial board of the *Times-News*. But we also know that those who ran this year volunteered their name because they want to contribute to the future of this community. Thank you.

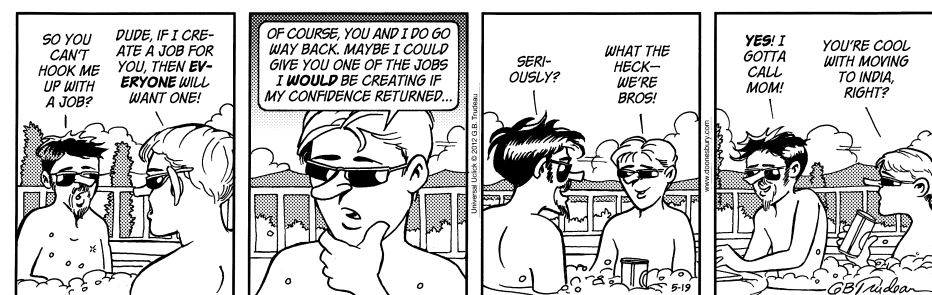

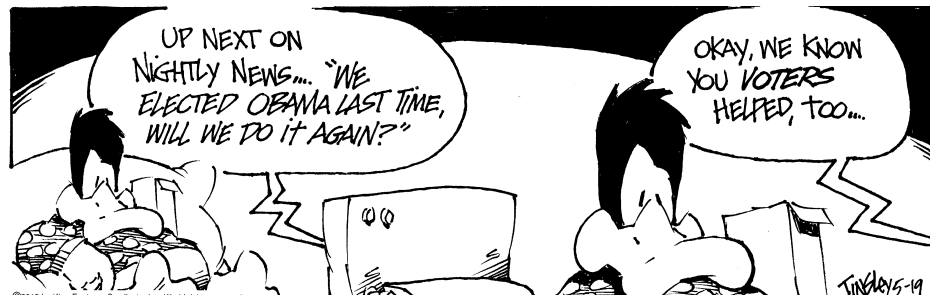

BSU Grad from Hailey Has 60 'Angels' on Her Side

BOISE • Never underestimate the power of a thank-you card.

That's a lesson Jozey Mitcham, 24, who received her diploma from Boise State last Saturday, learned early on.

Her attention to handwritten notes sparked a philanthropic community that formed around her and will continue to help other young women.

Mitcham grew up in Hailey. She's graduating with multiple honors and two degrees, one in applied mathematics with a minor in physics, a second in mechanical engineering. Of 60 engineering students, she is among the top three.

She's taken her Fundamentals of Engineering exam and is confident she'll pass. That means she'll be a licensed engineer in a few months, but not before she spends her summer answering what she calls her true love — interning at the Best Friends Animal Society, the Utah sanctuary for abused and abandoned animals.

She hopes to make a career using her engineering skills helping animals.

When she received her diploma Saturday, celebrators included a group of more than 60 women who have supported her financially and in other ways through her academic career.

That group of Wood River residents, inspired by their affection for Mitcham and the tangible evidence of what can happen when people pool their resources, recently registered as a nonprofit organization.

They've already chosen the next young woman who will receive their support and follow in Mitcham's footsteps.

Mitcham hasn't always had an easy road, despite her academic gifts. Her parents divorced when she was a baby. Her mom died in a car accident and was buried on Mitcham's second birthday.

"My dad wasn't quite ready to be a single parent," said Mitcham.

She lived on her grandmother's farm. When she was old enough to start school, she moved in with her aunt and uncle in Hailey.

When Mitcham was a senior at Wood River High School, six years ago, she was chosen as "Paula's Girl." Paula Proctor, owner of Paula's dress shop in Hailey, started the program a decade ago. It provides a free prom dress for a deserving girl chosen by school counselors. Other business owners provide hair and makeup, a manicure, shoes, etc.

"I don't ask to see SAT scores, or read essays or know the hardship," said Proctor. "I just ask the counselors to give me a girl who needs a lucky break."

Proctor has never forgotten when Mitcham, her grandmother and aunt came to choose her dress.

"Jozey tried on every dress in the shop. And they were in tears. You would have thought I was giving the kid a new car," said Proctor.

Wood River Valley resident Carol Harlig heard about the prom project and wanted to help — but the beauty shop appointments, shoes, flowers, and everything else was paid for. Harlig gave Mitcham \$100 for boots.

Mitcham had learned from her aunt, Rustin Miller, to not let such acts of generosity pass. She hand-wrote 20 thank-you notes to everyone who had given her things, complete with a photo of her in her new dress.

"My aunt taught me right," said Mitcham.

"I kept that note," said Harlig, "because that was the beginning of the whole thing."

Harlig was so touched by Mitcham's gratitude that she started calling around to friends, asking them to donate.

"I thought I'd see if I could raise \$1,000 for a scholarship," Harlig said. She'd aimed too low. Within 10 days, she had raised \$5,500.

Initially, Harlig planned to create a one-year scholarship for a different young woman every year. Someone suggested supporting Mitcham through her entire undergraduate career instead.

Harlig liked the idea. She committed to raising a minimum of \$5,500 annually, as long as Mitcham remained a full-time student, maintained a good GPA and kept in touch with donors.



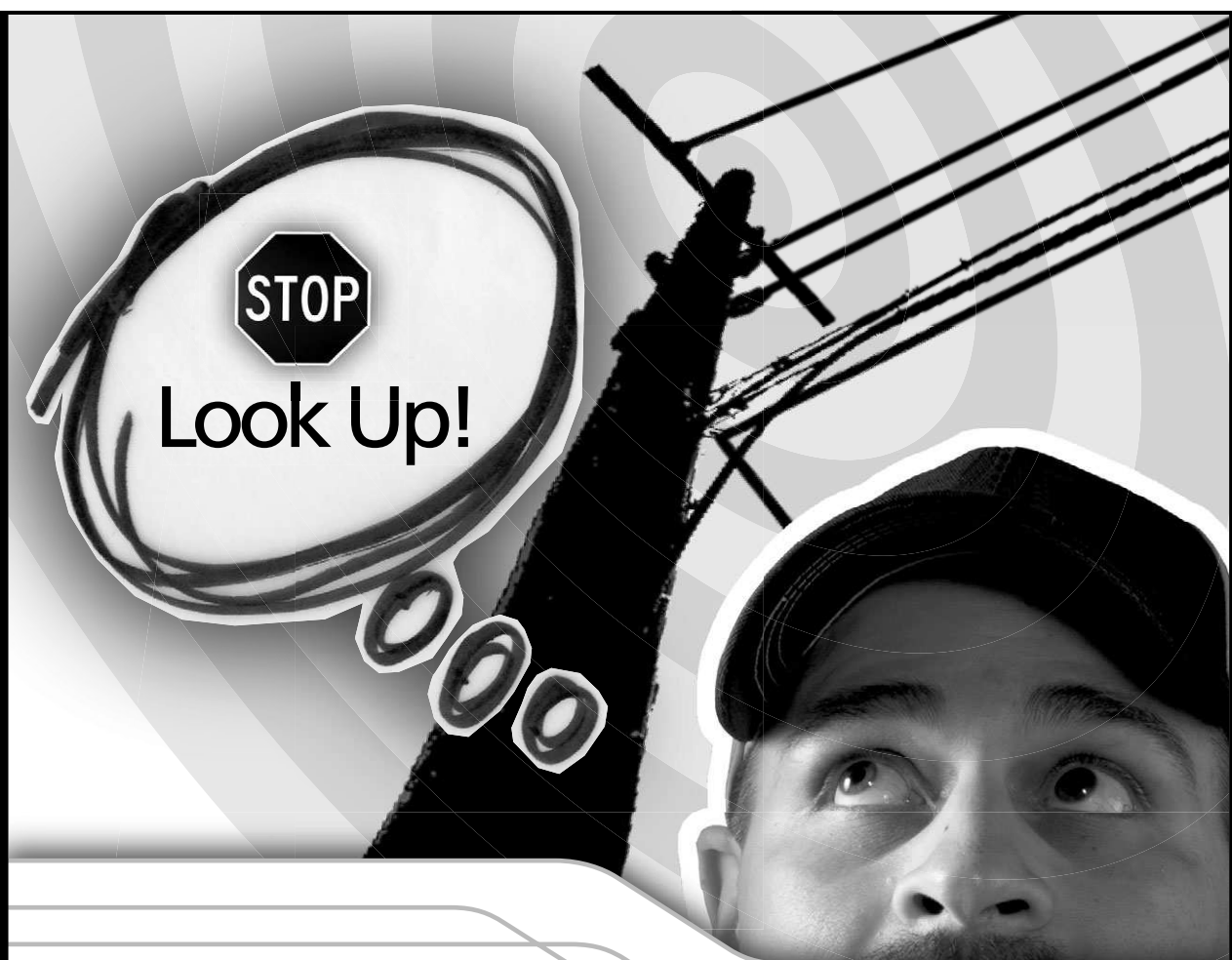

"He makes me a lot better," Evans said of Baker. "Just competing with him, he's one of the better jumpers. Competing with all the good jumpers in our district helped a lot."

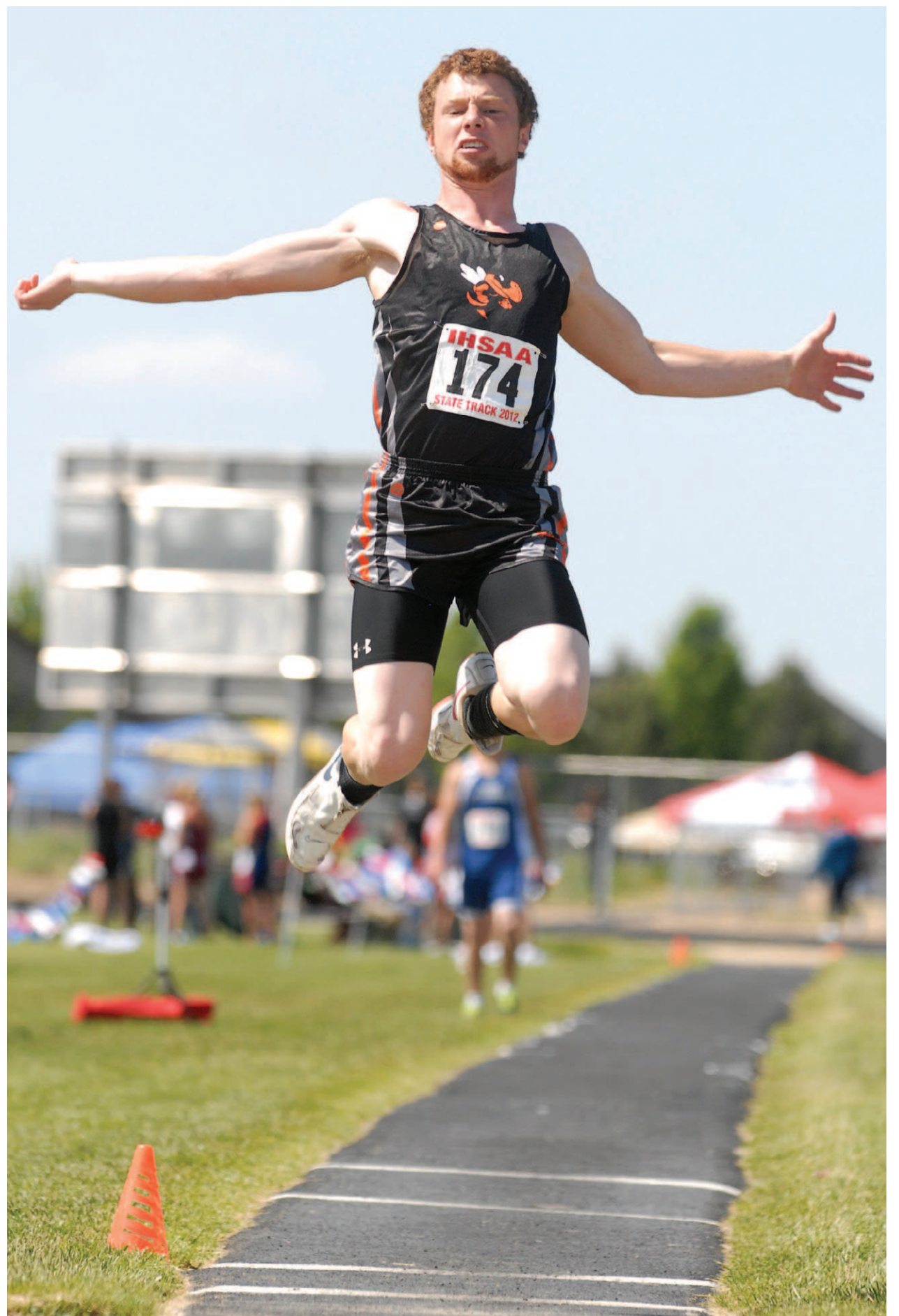
Evans missed his first attempt at 6-foot, and then subsequently cleared the bar after fixing what he called a "mental mistake."

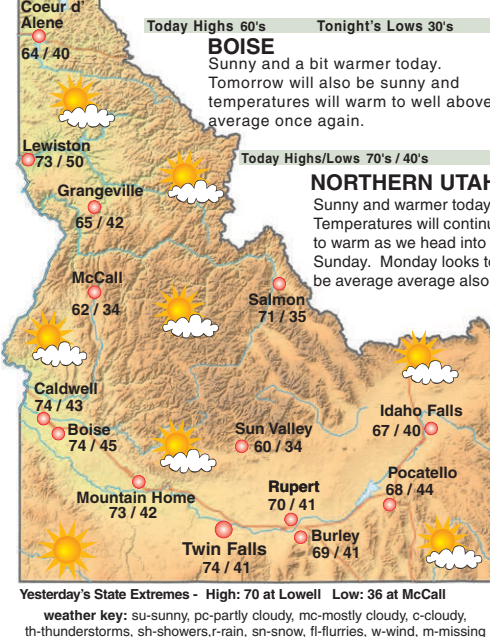

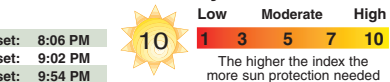

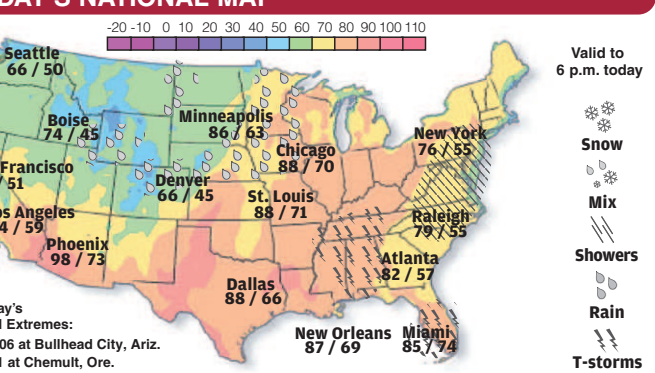

There have been 18 Preakness-Belmont winners, but seven did not run in the Derby, including Man o' War in 1920. Here's a look at a handful of disappointing Derby favorites who came through in the next two legs of the Triple Crown. POINT GIVEN (2001) In Bob Baffert's mind, Point Given was a cinch to give the trainer his third Derby win in five years. But the huge colt bumped with Monarchos early on, was eventually taken to the outside, had nothing left in the stretch and finished fifth as the 9-5 favorite. Monarchos won by 4 3/4 lengths. Point Given was the slight favorite in the Preakness and won by 2 1/4 lengths, with Monarchos finishing sixth. In the Belmont, the colt pulled away in the stretch and won by 12 1/4 lengths. "A man racing against boys," Baffert has said. HANSEL (1991) Hansel went off as the 5-2 Derby favorite, but Strike the Gold rallied from way back and passed almost every horse in the field to win by 1 3/4 lengths. Hansel, who ducked in and brushed another horse in the stretch and finished 10th, made amends by edging Strike the Gold by a head in the Preakness, then won the Belmont by seven lengths over Corporate Report, the horse Hansel brushed in the Derby. DAMASCUS (1967) A strong 8-5 favorite, Damascus (with Bill Shoemaker aboard) was poised to pounce on the far turn, but had nothing left in the stretch as 30-1 long shot Proud Clarion pulled the up-

Iguodala Rallies Sixers From Deep Hole

With Garnett in a funk, so were the Celtics. The Sixers just kept attacking, turning a first half of airballs, botched dunks and

Williams hounded Paul Pierce and forced a turnover, fed the ball to a streaking Turner for a dunk and put the lead at 68-65. It was that kind of hustle that brought the Sixers back.

Obama Stance Adds Fuel in Marriage Battlegrounds

PORTLAND, Maine (AP) • President Barack Obama's support for gay marriage has emboldened activists and politicians on both sides of the issue, setting off a flurry of political activity in a number of states and serving as a rallying point in others where gay marriage votes are being held this fall. Obama's stand has put wind in the sails of gay marriage supporters, while providing political fuel to opponents, said Kamy Akhavan, president of ProCon.org, a nonpartisan California-based nonprofit that researches pros and cons on controversial issues.

The issue is expected to come up in at least four ballot measures this fall, including Maine, Minnesota, Maryland and Washington.

HOUSE BREAKS DEFICIT DEAL WITH OK OF \$642B DEFENSE BILL

Republicans call for missile site the military doesn't want, reaffirm indefinite detention of terrorists in likely short-lived provisions.

WASHINGTON • Ignoring a White House veto threat, the Republican-controlled House approved a \$642 billion defense budget Friday that breaks a deficit-cutting deal with President Barack Obama and restricts his authority in an election-year challenge to the Democratic commander in chief.

The House voted 299-120 for the fiscal 2013 spending blueprint that authorizes money for weapons, aircraft, ships and the war in Afghanistan — \$8 billion more than Obama and congressional Republicans agreed to last summer in the clamor for fiscal austerity.

Insisting they are stronger on defense than the president, Republicans crafted a bill that calls for construction of a missile defense site on the East Coast that the military opposes, bars reductions in the nation's nuclear arsenal and reaffirms the indefinite detention without trial of suspected terrorists, even U.S. citizens captured on American soil.

The divisive GOP provisions will have a short shelf life, as the Democratic-controlled Senate is likely to scrap many of them and stick to the spending level in the deficit-cutting agreement.

Defense Secretary Leon Panetta met privately last week with senators to argue for the president's proposed budget, a blueprint the Pentagon says is based on a new military strategy focused on Asia, the Mideast and cyberspace as the nation emerges from two long wars. The Senate Armed Services Committee crafts its version of the budget next week.

The House bill is not only a political salvo against Obama, who nevertheless gets high marks after the killing of Osama bin Laden and success in the war on terrorism, but a reflection of the stranglehold the defense industry has on Congress. Weapons, aircraft carriers and jet fighters mean jobs back home, and lawmakers are loath to cut funds for the military, the biggest government program outside entitlements like Medicare and Social Security.

In a political shot on the House floor, Rep. Howard "Buck" McKeon, R-Calif., chairman of the Armed Services Committee, accused Democrats of "taking all of the jobs out of the military."

Soldier Charged with Murder

Sgt. John Russell is accused of killing four other soldiers and a Navy officer in May 2009 at a mental health clinic in Iraq, near the end of his third tour and after trying to get help.

SEATTLE (AP) • Murder charges have been filed against a sergeant accused of killing four other soldiers and a Navy officer in May 2009 at a mental health clinic in Iraq, the Army said Friday.

The charges against Sgt. John Russell were referred Wednesday and announced Friday in a statement from Joint Base Lewis-McChord. He faces five charges of premeditated murder, one of aggravated assault and one of attempted murder.

If convicted, he could face the death penalty.

The charges result from an investigation into the shooting at the Camp Liberty Combat Stress Center near Baghdad.

No date for the court-martial has

been set. Russell is being held at the base about 40 miles south of Seattle.

Russell is from Sherman, Texas, and is now about 47 years old, said Lt. Col. Gary Dangerfield. The delay since the incident has been filled with the process of determining whether Russell is fit to stand trial.

Russell has an Army defense attorney but it is standard procedure for them not to comment to the media, Dangerfield said.

The shooting was one of the worst instances of soldier-on-soldier violence in the Iraq war and raised questions about the mental health problems for soldiers caused by repeated tours of duty.

"I don't know of any other worse blue-on-blue in Iraq," Dangerfield said.

A hearing on possible charges was held in August 2009 at Fort Leavenworth, Kan. Two evaluations presented during that hearing said Russell suffered from severe depression with psychotic features and chronic post-traumatic stress disorder. A March 2011 evaluation said the major depression with psychotic features was in partial remission.

Russell was nearing the end of his third tour when his behavior changed, members of his unit testified in 2009. They said he became more distant in the days before the May 11, 2009, attack, and that he seemed paranoid that his unit was trying to end his career.

On May 8, Russell sought help at a combat stress clinic at Camp Stryker, where his unit was located. On May 10 Russell was referred to the Camp Liberty clinic, where he received counseling and prescription medication to treat his symptoms.

Much Still Unclear in Martin Shooting

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) • Prosecutors in the Trayvon Martin case dumped a mountain of evidence on the public this week. In many criminal cases, that would bring clarity, start answering the basic questions.

But no one — not pundits, attorneys or the public — can safely say we're even close to knowing exactly how and why neighborhood watch volunteer George Zimmerman shot and killed the 17-year-old in the black hoodie.

So many aspects of the Feb. 26 altercation and shooting in Sanford remain muddy. Who threw the first punch? Why did Zimmerman leave his car?

This cache of recordings, photos and statements is far from all the evidence. But it suggests there are answers we may never truly get.

"I can't comment on, you know, what George saw or what George was thinking," the suspect's father, Robert, told investigators in a March 19 interview included in Thursday's release. "Or what anybody saw or what they were thinking."

In some states, "discovery" like this isn't released prior to trial — unless it's by a defense team hoping to score points in the court of public opinion. That is what happened during the infamous 2006

Duke University lacrosse rape case, in which North Carolina officials ultimately determined that the local prosecutor rushed to judgment in charging three students with raping a stripper.

In Florida, evidence is generally considered a public record once the prosecution turns it over to the defense. Among the things prosecutors are prohibited from releasing pretrial: Confessions.

Zimmerman gave several interviews to police, including re-enacting at the scene what he says happened that night. But there is no statement from the 28-year-old shooter among the materials made public this week.

UK's Surveillance Could Expose Private Lives

LONDON • British officials have given their word: "We won't read your emails."

But experts say the government's proposed new surveillance program will gather so much data that spooks won't have to read your messages to guess what you're up to.

The U.K. Home Office stresses it won't be reading the content of every Britons' communications, saying the data it seeks "is NOT the content of any communication." It is, however, looking for information about who's sending the message and to whom, where it's sent from and other details, including a message's length and its format.

The proposal, unveiled last week as part of the government's annual legislative program, is just a draft bill, so it could be modified or scrapped. But if passed in its current form, it would put a huge amount of personal data at the government's disposal, which it could use to deduce a startling amount about Britons' private lives — from sleep patterns to driving habits or even infidelity.

"We're really entering a whole new phase of analysis based on the data that we can collect," said Gerald Kane, an information systems expert at Boston College. "There is quite a lot you can learn."

The ocean of information is hard to fathom. Britons generate 4 billion hours of voice calls and 130 billion text messages annually, according to industry figures. In 2008, the BBC put the annual number of U.K.-linked emails at around 1 trillion.

Then there are instant messaging services run by companies such as BlackBerry, Internet telephone services such as Skype, chat rooms, and in-

game services like those used by World of Warcraft.

Communications service providers, who would log all that back-and-forth, believe the government's program would force them to process petabytes (1 quadrillion bytes) of information every day. It's a mind-boggling amount of data, on the scale of every book, movie and piece of music ever released.

Dalai Lama Alleges Poison Plot; China Cries Foul

BEIJING (AP) • China accused the Dalai Lama of being deceitful Monday after he reportedly alleged that Chinese agents trained Tibetan women to assassinate him by planting poison in their hair for him to touch during blessings.

The Chinese Foreign Ministry said the Tibetan spiritual leader's allegations, reported in the London-based Sunday Telegraph newspaper, were not worth refuting, but added that he generally spreads false information.

"The Dalai always wears religious clothes while carrying out anti-China separatist activities in the global community, spreading false information and deceiving the public," spokesman Hong Lei said at a routine daily news briefing.

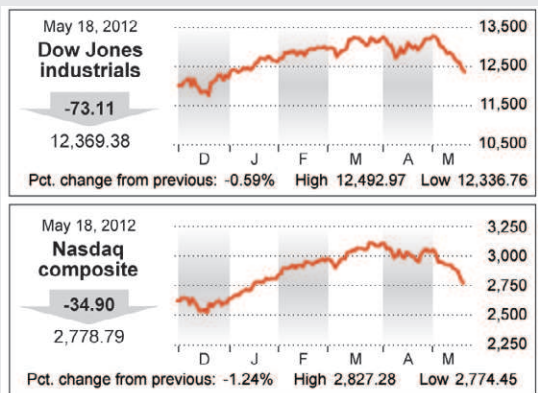

NEW YORK (AP) • Stocks fell Friday as investors set aside any excitement over the Facebook initial public offering and focused on Europe's debt problems. As recently as May 1, the Dow was up 8.7 percent for the year. Now it's up only 1.2 percent. It has fallen 12 of the last 13 trading days.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 73.11 points, or 0.6 percent, to close at 12,369.38. The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 9.64 points, or 0.7 percent, to 1,295.22. The Nasdaq composite fell 34.90 points, or 1.2 percent, to 2,778.79.

Facebook Falls Flat in Debut

NEW YORK • After all the hype, Facebook's first day as a public company ended where it began.

In its much-anticipated debut on the Nasdaq Stock Market, Facebook's stock closed Friday at \$38.23, up 23 cents. It had been priced at \$38 per share on Thursday night.

After an anxiety-filled half-hour delay, its stock began trading on the Nasdaq Stock Market for the first time as investors were finally able to put a dollar value on the company that turned online social networking into a global cultural phenomenon.

The stock opened at 11:32 a.m. at \$42.05, but soon dipped to \$38.01. By noon, it was up again at \$40.40, a 6 percent increase. It fluttered throughout the afternoon, but it never hit the double-digit jump that many Facebook-watchers had expected. By the end of the day, more than 500 million shares had changed hands.

The closing price means Facebook is worth about \$105 billion, more than Amazon.com, McDonalds and sto-

ried Silicon Valley icons Hewlett-Packard and Cisco.

But as many people looked for a big first-day pop in Facebook's share price, the single-digit increase was somewhat of a letdown.

“It wasn't quite as exciting as it could have been,” said Nick Einhorn, an analyst with IPO advisory firm Renaissance Capital.

Indeed, the small jump in price could be seen as an indication that Facebook and the investment banks that arranged the initial public offering priced the stock in an appropriate range. It's also a supply and demand issue. Facebook offered nearly 20 percent of its available stock in the IPO, so there was enough to meet demand. In comparison, Google offered just 7.2 percent of its stock when it went public in 2004 — and rose 18 percent on day one.

To IPOdesktop's Francis Gaskins, it

means mom-and-pop investors are becoming “much more educated and careful” about not buying into hype. And he said that the banks taking Facebook public have learned from the 10 IPOs of social media companies in the past year and are better able to gauge how much stock to make available in an initial offering.

It might not have been possible for the social network to live up to the hype that led up to its IPO. It's Facebook, after all, a place where people are emotionally invested in endless online diversions and rekindled friendships, an endless depository of baby photos, favorite songs and fleeting memories.

“It's probably one of the first times there has been an IPO where everyone sort of has a stake in the outcome,” said Gartner analyst Brian Blau. While most Facebook users won't see a penny from the offering, they are all intimately familiar with the company.

Idaho Figure Drops to 7.7% **Unemployment Rates Fall in Two-thirds of U.S. States**

Counter numbers are expected on Monday.

TWIN FALLS • The ranks of Idaho's jobless decreased for the ninth straight month, as the state's unemployment rate fell to 7.7 percent in April.

Idaho's unemployment rate is the lowest since July 2009, and is 1.2 percentage points below the post-recession high of 8.9 percent in July 2011, according to the Idaho Department of Labor. While the Gem State's labor force held steady at 779,000 members, 1,700 more Idahoans found work in April.

According to Labor statistics, total state employment is now at 719,000 workers — up from 702,000 a year ago.

April hiring reached normal levels in all sectors outside of government and professional business services, according to Labor, with above-average gains seen in construction, retail and trucking.

Job competition, while still tight, also loosened in Idaho. Business think tank the Conference Board estimates there were about three jobless workers for every job posted in April.

April unemployment in the U.S. came in at 8.1 percent.

According to a Labor release, Idaho county employment numbers will be released Monday.

WASHINGTON • Unemployment rates fell in two-thirds of U.S. states last month, evidence that modest economic growth is boosting hiring in most areas of the country.

And in many states, unemployment has fallen well below the national average, which was 8.1 percent last month. Rates were lower than 7 percent in 22 states in April. That compares to only 13 states in April 2011.

The Labor Department said Friday that unemployment rates dropped in 37 states in April, the most in three months. Unemployment rose in 5 states and was unchanged in eight.

Nationally, the unemployment rate has fallen a full percentage point since August. Employers have added a million jobs over the past five months, although the pace of hiring slowed in March and April.

The national rate has also declined because some people gave up looking for work. The government only counts people as unemployed if they are actively looking for a job.

The states with the lowest rates

continue to be in the upper Midwest with small populations. North Dakota's rate was 3 percent in April, the lowest in the country. It was followed by Nebraska at 3.9 percent and South Dakota at 4.3 percent.

Still, unemployment is also relatively low in some large states, such as Minnesota and Virginia. Both had 5.6 percent unemployment rates in April.

The rate has fallen by a full percentage in Minnesota during past 12 months. In Virginia, it has dropped half a point in that timeframe.

Texas — the nation's second-largest state — also has low unemployment. The rate dropped to 6.9 percent last month, down from 8 percent a year ago. Texas has added almost 250,000 jobs in the past year, the most in the nation.

The rate was 5 percent in Oklahoma, 5.2 percent in Iowa, 5 percent in New Hampshire, and 6.3 percent in Massachusetts.

Many of those states have seen job gains. Iowa added 5,800 jobs in April, while Nebraska gained 3,800. Indiana added the most jobs of any state last month, with 17,100.

Overall, 32 states added jobs in April, the department said.

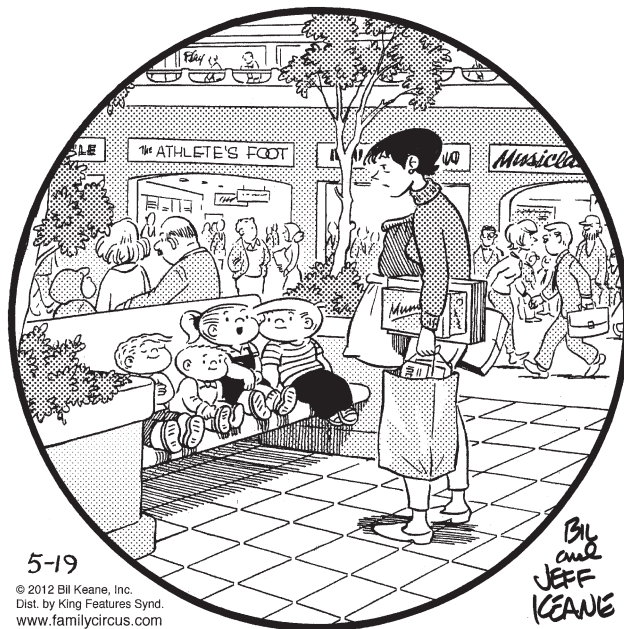

Today's Highlight:
On May 19, 1962, actress Marilyn Monroe sang a sultry rendition of "Happy Birthday to You" to guest-of-honor President John F. Kennedy during a star-studded Democratic fundraiser at New York's Madison Square Garden (the third of four arenas to bear that name).

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1536, Anne Boleyn, the second wife of England's King Henry VIII, was beheaded after being convicted of adultery.

In 1780, a mysterious darkness enveloped much of New England and part of Canada in the early afternoon.

In 1909, the Ballets Russes (Russian Ballets), under the direction of Sergei Diaghilev, debuted in Paris.

In 1921, Congress passed, and President Warren G. Harding signed, the Emergency Quota Act, which established national quotas for immigrants.

In 1935, T.E. Lawrence, also known as "Lawrence of Arabia," died in Dorset, England, six days after being injured in a motorcycle crash.

In 1943, in an address to the U.S. Congress, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill pledged his country's full support in the fight against Japan.

In 1964, the State Department disclosed that 40 hidden microphones had been found in the U.S. embassy in Moscow.

In 1967, the Soviet Union ratified a treaty with the United States and Britain banning nuclear and other weapons from outer space as well as celestial bodies such as the moon. (The treaty entered into force in October 1967.)

In 1971, poet Ogden Nash, known for his humorous light verses, died in Baltimore at age 68.

In 1981, five British soldiers were killed by an Irish Republican Army landmine in County Armagh, Northern Ireland.

In 1992, in a case that drew much notoriety, Mary Jo Buttafuoco of Massapequa, N.Y., was shot and seriously wounded by her husband Joey's teenage lover, Amy Fisher. In 1994, former first lady Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis died in New York at age 64.

(Immediately afterward, Law said Shanley's authorization to serve as a priest was rescinded.) One year ago: President Barack Obama for the first time endorsed the Palestinians' demand that their eventual state be based on borders that existed before the 1967 Middle East war, a position that put him sharply at odds with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu. Former Irish Prime Minister Garret FitzGerald, 85, died in Dublin. Katie Couric, the first regular solo anchorwoman of a network evening newscast, signed off the "CBS Evening News" for the last time after five years.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

Today's deal was provided to me by Alan Sontag. It came up in a practice match in New York, organized by Mark Gordon before the Seattle Nationals in November. Gordon was the hero in a delicate contract of four hearts. Against this contract in the other room, West led a club, and declarer had made the normal play of tackling trumps by leading the suit from the top, going down one.

In the other room, David Berkowitz had quite reasonably elected to lead a diamond rather than a club, which does not appear to make any significant difference, but Gordon was quick to seize on his extra chance. He took the diamond king at the first trick, cashed the heart ace and king, then played the diamond ace, ruffed a diamond, crossed to the club ace, and led the fourth diamond, discarding his club loser.

West was forced to win the trick and exit with a club, letting Gordon ruff and play for his only remaining chance — that of finding West with an embarrassing spade holding. When he exited from hand with a low spade, West won the trick, but whatever he returned allowed declarer to avoid a spade loser and concede just one more trick to the master trump.

The defenders are helpless in the ending because once trumps break badly, declarer's only legitimate chance against excellent defense is to play a low spade as he did, and find West with both spade honors or honor-10 doubleton.
