From Tuskegee to T.F.

What did this 5-year-old get for his birthday? A chance to meet one of his Tuskegee Airmen heroes.

TWIN FALLS • Many boys grow up idolizing athletes.

Quinn Thorne's heroes wear military uniforms. He got the thrill of his life Wednesday when Tuskee Airman Lenard Yates, 88, traveled from his home near Sacramento, Calif., to attend Thorne's birthday party.

The 5-year-old son of U.S. Navy veteran Glen Thorne of Twin Falls was speechless when introduced to Yates during festivities at Idaho Pizza Co. He had no idea the special guest would appear.

Yates' traveling partner, Walter Suggs,

president of a California Tuskegee Airmen chapter, asked the boy if he knew what Yates did in World War II.

"He kept our freedom so we have a place to live," Quinn replied.

Asked what he wants to be when he grows up, Quinn said without hesitating, "I want to be a Red Tail man."

"Thank you, buddy," Yates said as the boy hugged him. "Happy birthday."

Quinn has a bedroom filled with Red Tail memorabilia and can quote many facts gleaned from watching movies on the Tuskegee Airmen. He's been a military supporter since age 3 1/2, when his father urged him to

Grad Looks to Future as Cancer Survivor

JEROME • There's one place where 18-year-old cancer survivor Sabrina Underwood truly feels at home.

The Jerome High School senior was diagnosed with acute leukemia when she was 2 1/2 years old. She went to Camp Rainbow Gold in the Cathedral Pines north of Ketchum ever year from age 5 to 17.

"It's a whole different world there," she said.

Underwood said even though friends say they understand what she's going through, "They have no idea."

But at the camp for Idaho children with cancer and their families, she found a sense of belonging. Now, she's reaching out to younger children with cancer.

Jerome High teacher Pat Pacheco who leads the motorcycle escort for Camp Rainbow Gold - said Underwood doesn't want any child with cancer to be overlooked.

He described the graduate as "pleasant and passionate."

Underwood will join her 193 classmates at Jerome High's graduation ceremony tonight. Next year, she plans to attend the College of Southern Idaho and is interested in becoming a veterinarian.

Underwood also wants to spend time next year raising money for River Discovery, an organization that provides wilderness rafting trips for teen and adult cancer survivors on the Salmon River.

It won't be the first time she has done outreach to help others who have battled cancer.

On the road's western side, the sagebrush was scarce for the first few hundred feet out from the road. Green grasses filled the gap. The arrangement is a designed effort to deter the spread of wildfires, and one that's quickly gaining attention from state and wildlife officials.

As a fire ecologist for the U.S. Bureau of Land Management, Russell usually spends his time trying to repair the damage made by a wildfire on public lands. However, his job also includes finding ways to suppress wildfires.

FAA Begins Investigation into Buhl Plane Crash

BUHL • The investigation into the plane crash that injured one man at the Buhl Municipal Airport Tuesday could take from two days to two weeks to complete, depending on the Federal Aviation Administration's workload, said Mike Fergus, the FAA's regional spokesman.

"We've got sketchy information. It's preliminary and is subject to change," he said.

Dispatchers got the call about the crash at about 4:20 p.m. Tuesday. First-responders arrived to find the plane upside down in a field near the landing strip at the Buhl airport with the pilot slumping out of the door.

The aircraft is an experimental or kit airplane called an Excalibur, Fergus said.

"I think it's a bit of a misnomer," Fergus said of the experimental plane category. "Experimentals are usually kit airplanes that are put together by the owner. Except for a lack of a better category, they put in experimen-

With a kit plane, the builder must complete 51 percent of the work and an airframe and propulsion FAA certified mechanic completes the rest, along with inspecting the plane and overseeing the work. Last, it must undergo a test for airworthiness by an FAA flight certifier.

The plane that crashed in Buhl is a 2010 model and was certified for airworthiness in that year, Fergus said. The type of kit the plane was built from was certified in 2008 by the

Fergus said the plane had a completed inspection, but he didn't know if it was intended for flight.

Preliminary reports from the FAA said the plane crashed after taxiing, but multiple witnesses reported seeing the plane tilt back and forth in the air in mid-flight before crashing.

"Our investigators will interview witnesses to determine what happened," Fergus said.

Fergus described the pilot's injuries as "serious" but said the FAA does not release crash victim's

Fergus said the plane's tail number has been used multiple times in the past. The FAA's website had not been updated with the latest owner information.

Michelle Jones, a nurse who responded to the crash, said the man had a head wound among other injuries. The man was taken to a Boise hospital by Air St. Luke's. Fergus did not know what hospital.

The Buhl Fire Department, Buhl Police Department, Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office, Air St. Luke's and local paramedics all responded to the crash; dispatchers received the call at about 4:20 p.m.

Buhl Police Chief Eric Foster was not available for comment Tuesday.

Benson Did Not Cause Crash with Hassani

Articles in the May 15 and 18 edition of the Times-News about Twin Falls County sheriff candidate Kelly Hassani being dismissed from his job as a senior investigator in the department described the 2010 on-duty car crash Hassani was injured in.

Initial reports by the Idaho State Police described Kyle Benson as hitting Hassani's vehicle. While the final report says Benson hit Hassani's vehicle, it also says Hassani was cited for failing to operate an emergency vehicle safely.

On Sept. 14 2010, ISP trooper Troy DeBie met with Hassani at the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office and issued him the citation. Sheriff Tom Carter and other department staff were also present at the meeting.

DeBie completed the crash report and wrote: "Hassani was southbound on 3300 E at the intersection with US 30, responding to an emergency call with emergency lights activated, entered the intersection and did not stop at the

stop sign, which is not required under Idaho Code 49-623, but Hassani failed to yield to Benson who was already traveling on US 30 and did not see Hassani until the final moment."

According to the report Benson wrote in a statement: "I was traveling east on Kimberly Road and in the process of changing lanes. I had just checked my blind spot to the passenger side of the car when I looked back to the front of the car there was a patrol car crossing the intersection. There was no time to react in any way. I had not seen his car until immediately before impact."

Hassani also wrote that he did not see Benson's vehicle and did not realize a crash was imminent.

"When I read that email I said, 'Dang it, somebody better step up for that little kid;" Suggs said.

Glen Thorne thanked the men for coming, saying his son will never forget the evening. He hopes people remember the Airmen as well.

"The Red Tails weren't just fighting the Germans, they were fighting racism, too," he said.

Yates acknowledged the Airmen faced discrimination, even from Army members. But he holds no ill will, and is proud of what he and his cohorts accomplished — in the air and for the march toward civil rights.

"Nothing beats the good old U.S.A.," Yates said. "It's got faults, but it's home."

Who Were the Tuskegee Airmen?

The African-American pilots were trained at Tuskegee, Ala., and fought in World War II as the 332nd Fighter Group and the 477th Bombardment Group of he U.S. Army Air Corps.

The 332nd Fighter Group saw successful action in Sicily and Italy as part of Operation Torch before being deployed as escorts for bombers in Europe. They faced racial discrimination outside of the military and within the ranks, which were still segregated during the 1940s.

Pilots of the 332nd Fighter Group painted the tails of their P-47s and P-51s red. The nickname "Red Tails" resulted.

Starting in the early 1990s, the BLM began working on a "green stripping" program to help suppress wildfires in its Shoshone Field Office. Workers planted a certain mixture of perennials that don't easily ignite on strips of land along roads on public lands.

It was a proactive solution that has helped keep wildfires from spreading into the Craters of the Moon National Monument and Preserve or heading south to Kimama.

Now the agency is looking to increase its fire fuel break efforts for up to 60 miles in the Jarbidge area, and possibly into the Burley area as well.

grow straight up to the road's edge. The projects require ripping out the native brush and putting in species like forage kochia, which are typically considered invasive if they don't have competition from other shrubs and grasses. A strong enough wind can

easily jump across 200 feet of fuel break perennials, Russell said. Also, fuel break projects can cost up to \$150 to \$200 per acre to cover the cost of seed and labor. The BLM still has to com-

plete its permitting process before it can begin its Jarbidge fuel projects, but Russell expects the agency to begin by next year. "There's a rub though,

Russell said. "At what point do you just leave the area alone and focus on rehab? It's just a matter of time that all this will burn again."

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Joint Jail for Jerome City, County Discussed

JEROME • A proposal to build a combined Jerome police and county sheriff's office, including a jail, is being considered by the Jerome County commissioners.

The idea arose at Monday's commission meeting during a discussion of options for housing inmates following the recent defeat of a proposed county jail bond — the fourth time voters have turned down the request to fund a new jail.

Jerome County Sheriff Doug McFall suggested the city and county work together for a joint solution to the county jail problem and inadequate office facilities for city police.

"There seems to be some support in the community for that," Commissioner Cathy Roemer said during an interview Wednesday.

She and McFall noted that the idea is feasible because there is a good working relationship between Jerome city and county law enforcement personnel. However, they both emphasized that the concept is in a preliminary stage and no decisions have been made.

Roemer posed another question: "Do we need to consider closing the jail to reduce our liability?"

The aging jail has maintenance problems and other issues that would be costly to fix. The lack of space also means that some inmates are sent to jails in other counties at a higher per-day cost than if they stayed in Jerome County.

McFall said he and Jerome Police Chief Dan Hall have talked about a cooperative approach in the past. He added that Jerome Mayor John Shine and Commissioner Charlie Howell also revisited the idea recently.

"There is a lot of duplication" between the police and sheriff's office, McFall said.

Sharing resources, such as an evidence technician or office receptionist, could save money for both departments, he said.

There is precedent in Idaho for a city police department and county sheriff's office to share facilities. McFall said Bonneville County and the city of Idaho Falls have done that since 1978.

"It is doable," he said. However, McFall cautioned that more legal research would have to be done before any decisions were made.

"These are just concepts that are being discussed," he said.

Grouse Task Force Begins to Refine Its Priorities

The task force has until June 1 to submit recommendations to Gov. Otter of ways to improve sage grouse populations and avoid an endangered-species listing.

IDAHO FALLS • For 16 members of a state advisory group, passing the "Brian Test" is no laughing matter.

Idaho's Sage Grouse Task Force has been tasked by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter to come up with recommendations on how to better protect sage grouse habitat. Behind every possible rule change and regulation modification will be a touch of Brian Kelly's guiding force.

"Figure out what you want and then figure out how you're going to do that," he said more than once throughout the day.

once throughout the day.
As the U.S. Fish and
Wildlife Service state supervisor for Idaho, Kelly
represents the federal
agency that will make a final

decision on whether to list the sage grouse as an endangered species. He isn't allowed to tell the group what to do, but offers insight on how the agency may or may not react to possible regulation changes.

Currently, sage grouse are a candidate for the endangered species list. Federal officials have to make a final listing decision by 2015, but state officials are working to improve their management plans now in order to prevent a possible listing.

The Idaho task force's draft plan must be submitted to Otter by June 1.

On Wednesday, the group gathered for the last time in Idaho Falls for a two-day marathon of meetings and discussions on what to include in that draft.

By the end of the first day,

the group had come to an agreement on a handful of suggestions — focusing primarily on how much infrastructure should be allowed in grouse habitat.

For habitat seen as a priority for the species, the group proposes halting all new projects except for those done by individuals or groups who already have an existing right. This would include all future wind, transmission, and oil and gas projects.

Grazing proved more tricky to discuss. Federal officials have listed grazing as a secondary threat to sage grouse habitat. However, when the group began tackling grazing issues Wednesday, concerns were raised that best-practice "objectives" would quickly turn into "standards."

The group may agree on the best grazing practices but translating that understanding to the outside world isn't easy, said Wally Butler, a range and livestock specialist for the Idaho Farm Bureau Association.

State Rep. Scott Bedke, R-Oakley, also raised his concerns over changing the grazing management practices.

"If it seems like we're sensitive, it's because we're survivors," Bedke said. "It's up to a group like this to make sure we're not paranoid."

The group meets for the final time today at the Idaho Department of Fish and Game's regional office in Idaho Falls.

The Diversity of Elizabeth Warren

lond, blue-eyed Elizabeth Warren, the Senate candidate and Harvard professor who cites "family lore" that she is 1/32nd Cherokee, was inducted into Oklahoma's Hall of Fame last year. Her biography on oklahomaheritage.com says she "can track both sides of her family in Oklahoma long before statehood" (1907) and "she proudly tells everyone she encounters that she is 'an Okie to my toes:" It does not mention any Cherokee greatgreat-grandmother. ADVD of the induction ceremony shows that neither Warren nor anyone else mentioned this.

The kerfuffle that has earned Warren such sobriquets as "Spouting Bull" and "Fauxcahontas" began with reports that Harvard Law School, in routine academic preening about diversity (in everything but thought), listed her as a minority faculty member, as did the University of Pennsylvania when she taught there. She said some in her family had "high cheekbones like all of the Indians do." The New England Historic Genealogical Society said a document confirmed the family lore of Warren's Cherokee ancestry, but later backtracked. She has said she did not know Harvard was listing her as a minority in the 1990s, but Harvard was echoing her: From 1986 through 1995, starting before she came to Harvard, a directory published by the Association of American Law Schools listed her as a minority and says its listings are based on professors claiming minority status.

So, although no evidence has been found that Warren is part Indian, for years two universities listed her as such. She has identified herself as a minority, as when, signing her name as "Elizabeth Warren - Cherokee," she submitted a crab recipe (Oklahoma crabs?) to a supposedly Indian cookbook. This is a political problem.

A poll taken before this controversy found her Republican opponent Scott Brown trouncing her on "likability," 57 percent to 23 percent. Even Democrats broke for Brown 40-38. Now she is a comic figure associated with laughable racial preferences. She who wants Wall Street "held accountable" is accountable for two elite law schools advertising her minority status. She who accuses Wall Street of gaming the financial system at least collaborated with, and perhaps benefited from, the often absurd obsession with "diversity."

How absurd? Warren says that for almost a decade she listed herself in the AALS directory as a Native American because she hoped to "meet others like me." This well-educated, highly paid,



much-honored (she was a consumer protection adviser to President Obama) member of America's upper 1 percent went looking for people "who are like I am" among Native Americans?

This makes perfect sense to a liberal subscriber to the central superstition of the diversity industry, which is the premise of identity politics: Personhood is distilled not to the content of character but only to race, ethnicity, gender or sexual preference.


This controversy has discombobulated liberalism's crusade to restore Democratic possession of the Senate seat the party won in 1952 with John Kennedy and held until 2010, when Brown captured it after Ted Kennedy's death. Lofty thinkers and exasperated liberals consider the focus on Warren's fanciful ancestry a distraction from serious stuff. (Such as The Washington Post's nearly 5,500-word wallow in teenage Mitt Romney's prep school comportment?) But Warren's adult dabbling in identity politics is pertinent because it is, in all its silliness, applied liberalism.


The New York Times Magazine's headline on its profile of her — "Heaven Is a Place Called Elizabeth Warren" – suggests the chord she strikes with liberals. They resonate to identity politics of the sort Warren's campaign tried when, on the defensive, it resorted, of course, to claiming victimhood. Playing the gender card, it insinuated that criticism of her adventures as a minority amounts to a sexist attack on an accomplished woman. But an accomplished woman, Susan Collins of Maine, the only Republican senator rated more liberal than Brown (who last year voted with his party only 54 percent of the time on partisan issues), called this insinuation

"patently absurd." Barack Obama, who in 2008 carried Massachusetts by almost 800,000 votes, will win here again, and a senior official of Brown's campaign thinks that in order to win Brown must run between 250,000 and 500,000 votes ahead of Romney. In the special election in January 2010, Brown defeated a female opponent (women are 53 percent of Massachusetts voters) by 107,317 votes. He won independents 2-1.

The turnout this November, with Obama on the ballot, probably will be larger, less white and more Democratic. But just 0.3 percent of Massachusetts residents are Native Americans, even counting Warren.

Pre-funding Put USPS in the Red

The U.S. Postal Service is not broke.

A congressional mandate created back in 2006 to prefund future retirees' health benefits at the rate of \$5.5 billion a year for 10 years is the main financial problem. Since this mandate was imposed, the postal service must either borrow money from the U.S. Treasury or cut the workforce and services, which are both negative solutions. The recent U.S. Senate's decision to reduce the pre-funding payments (S. 1789) has good intentions but simply just doesn't go far enough. The pre-funding has already been unnecessarily overpaid by \$42 billion.

Congress must act and act quickly with positive solutions that will completely deal with the financial crisis. The money is available; we just need to have access to it without using a dime of taxpayer money. If this can be accomplished, six-day delivery of mail can be maintained and post offices/mail processing plants around the country can remain open.

We can still provide quality service. In the last fiscal quarter, the postal service, without the pre-funding mandate, would have made a profit of \$200 million. Do

away with the pre-funding and the problem is solved.



4 Western US States Shielding Part of Executions

BOISE • A San Franciscobased federal appeals court ruled in 2002 that every aspect of an execution should be open to witnesses, from the moment the condemned enters the death chamber to his or her final heartbeat.

The ruling established what was expected of the nine Western states within the court's jurisdiction. A decade later, four of the states have kept part of each execution away from public view, according to an Associated Press review and death penalty experts.

Idaho, Arizona, Washington and Montana have conducted 14 lethal injections since the ruling, and half of each procedure has been behind closed doors. That means that a small group of witnesses, including members of news organizations who act as representatives of the public, do not see, for instance, the insertion of the IVs that deliver the fatal drug mixture.

The practice comes at a time when the method itself has drawn greater scrutiny, from whether the drugs are effective to whether the execution personnel are properly trained.

The states that limit access say they do so to protect the anonymity of the execution team, which may include emergency medical technicians, military medics or others trained to insert IVs. Open government and journalism groups argue that witnessing all aspects of an execution is the only way to determine if it is being properly carried out.

Times-News on Tuesday sued the state of Idaho to force officials to open the entirety of their executions, arguing that the news media, and by extension the public, has a First Amendment right to view all steps

of lethal injections. "This lawsuit is really all about obtaining access to the entire execution process for viewing purposes," said Chuck Brown, the attorney representing the news organizations. "It's very important in a society such as ours to have full transparency in regards to the exercise of government authority."

Idaho Department of Correction spokesman Jeff Ray said late Tuesday the department had not yet had a chance to review the lawsuit, and that the state's attorneys would respond to the claims in court.

When made aware of the 2002 court ruling, state officials said previously that the decision did not apply to their procedures. "The circumstances of the case are unique to California," said Idaho deputy attorney general for prisons, Mark Kubinski.

Kubinski said the protocol balances the public's right to witness executions with the state's obligation to carry it out "in a safe and professional manner, while maintaining respect and dignity for all parties."

Several high-profile cases since 2006 have raised questions about the way states conduct lethal injections.

In two instances in Ohio, one of the few states that almate remains on death row. With news organizations present, the experiences of the inmate, Romell Broom, were widely reported.

In another case, in Florida in 2006, which does not allow viewing of the IV insertions, executioners pushed the needles through Angel Nieves Diaz's target veins and into the soft tissue beneath. He had to be given a second dose and took 34 minutes to die – more than

twice the normal time. Historically, the public was able to watch executions from start to finish, said Trina Seitz, a death penalty expert at Appalachian State University.

Over time, executions became more private as technology advanced. Electrocutions, for example, can't be done in a rainy prison vard for safety reasons, so they were moved inside, said Stuart Banner, a legal historian at UCLA's School of

Still, journalists have always been reserved a spot among the witnesses, Seitz said, so they could report the death back to the public.

In the 1990s, several news organizations attempted to get on the witness list for the lethal injection of William Bonin in California. Bonin was dubbed the "Freeway Killer" for the serial murders of 14 young men and boys.

Those who did witness the execution were unsure about what they saw.

Bonin was already strapped to a gurney with IV tubes attached when the death chamber's curtains IDAHO BRIEFS

Farm Bureau Embezzlement Plea Withdrawn

KETCHUM • A former secretary for the Blaine-Camas Farm Bureau office in Bellevue has withdrawn her guilty plea to embezzling more than \$35,000 from the organization after the judge said he would not agree to the sentencing recommendation in her plea agreement.

The Idaho Mountain Express reports 60-year-old Judith Shurtz withdrew her plea Monday after 5th District Judge Robert J. Elgee said he intended to sentence her to two years in prison.

Her binding plea agreement called for a sentence of up to one year in jail.

The judge scheduled a jury trial for Oct. 16.

Shurtz was charged with taking the money from 2006 to 2010 by writing checks to herself without permission and hiding the thefts by falsifying Farm Bureau records and bank statements.

Simpson Pledges Not to Give up on Wilderness

KETCHUM • Republican U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson pledged to stick by efforts to designate 330,000 acres in central Idaho as wilderness, but said he has no idea when his longtime dream will be realized.

The Idaho Mountain Express reported Wednesday that Simpson was speaking this week to a group of environmentalists in Stanley.

At the event, the seventerm lawmaker renewed his commitment to the Boulder and White Cloud Mountains wilderness proposal.

Simpsons has been working on the plan for a decade.

But he's always faltered in getting a bill through Congress, in part because his fellow congressmen from Idaho don't support the plan and because Idaho Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter has also refused to back it.

Simpson acknowledges the uphill nature of his battle, citing a "hatred" of the word wilderness.

Man Commits Suicide, Bullet Hits Friend

KELLOGG • Police in Kellogg say a man committed suicide in a car, and the bullet passed through his body and struck the driver of the vehicle.

Officers were called to the scene near Interstate 90 early Wednesday morning, and found the passenger of the vehicle dead and the driver severely injured.

Police say the passenger shot himself with a 40-caliber handgun, and the bullet exited his body and struck the driver of the vehicle, Bryan Septer. Police say

Septer had to be airlifted to a hospital after complaining he couldn't feel his legs.

Police say the identity of the dead man is being withheld until family is notified.

Kootenai Co. **Voter May Have Voted Twice**

COEUR D'ALENE northern Idaho county is investigating possible election-night fraud after one voter may have voted twice in the May 15 primary.

Kootenai County told the Coeur d'Alene Press a precinct poll worker didn't notice a voter had already voted absentee before showing up to a polling place and voting in person,

The voter's name may be referred to the prosecuting attorney's office.

Kootenai County Commissioner Dan Green wants to consult with the county's elections office further, to explore the facts and determine if the voter really intended to commit a crime.

There have been isolated instances of voter-fraud in the past.

In 2009, a southern Idaho man was also accused of having voted absentee and in person. Walter Coiner of Ketchum was convicted and received a suspended 30day jail sentence.

Idaho Power Warns of Phone Scam

TWIN FALLS • Magic Valley residents are being warned of a telephone scam targeting the region's Hispanic popula-

Those involved identify themselves as power company representatives without specifying the exact utility, said Idaho spokeswoman Power Anne Alenskis. The phone scammers speak in Spanish and demand customers make a payment within 24 to 48 hours by providing personal information over the phone.

Calls to Idaho residents are coming from a phone number with a 302 area code, Alenskis said, and also have been reported by residents in the Phoenix, Ariz., area.

"They are definitely being intimidated," she said. Scammers "could be going through a phone book looking at last names."

Alenskis emphasized that Idaho Power does not release customers' phone numbers or any other personal informa-

Maggie Brilz, Idaho Power's customer service manager, urged anyone who receives a call to avoid giving any information or making a pay-

About a dozen customers in Canyon County contacted the company earlier this month to report the scam. Calls were reported in the Twin Falls area last week.

UTAH AUTHORITIES STEP UP SEARCH FOR MOUNTAIN MAN

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • With the summer tourist season fast approaching, authorities are stepping up the search for a mountain man considered armed and dangerous who has spent more than five years breaking into dozens of cabins across remote southern Utah, stealing guns and supplies before re-

treating into the forest. Investigators believe the suspect is still roaming the mountains around Zion National Park based on recent cabin break-ins where food and clothing were taken, Kane County Sheriff's Detective Dathan Chamberlain, who has been assigned full-time to the case, told The Associated Press on

Wednesday. Detectives have alerted Zion rangers and are distributing wanted posters and warning cabin owners to be on the lookout for the man, identified in February as Troy James Knapp based on fingerprints lifted from one cabin and surveillance photos taken outside another.

Authorities say Knapp

could be traversing the national park, following rivers, using pay phones, or even riding the park's shuttle buses to stock up on food in a nearby town, said Cindy Purcell, the park's chief ranger.

Knapp's father, Bruce, had little to say when reached by telephone Wednesday at his Moscow, Idaho home.

"If he's doing something criminal, he should turn himself in," Bruce Knapp told the AP.

Authorities say Knapp's family hasn't been helpful in their investigation, and in February they obtained a court order to track phone calls made to his parents.

An arrest warrant issued by Kane County in January charges Knapp with three burglaries and a weapons charge.

While there have been no violent confrontations, authorities fear Knapp is a ticking time bomb. He has left some cabins riddled with bullet holes, defaced religious icons and wrote taunting notes for cabin owners and lawmen.

EPA Proposes New Rules for Muddy Logging Roads

The Obama administration wants to change the rules applying to stormwater running off logging roads, blunting a landmark court ruling that found the muddy water running into salmon streams and drinking water reservoirs should be regulated like industrial pollution.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency filed notice Wednesday in the Federal Register proposing to revise stormwater regulations to say hundreds of thousands of miles of logging roads on private and public lands nationwide don't need the same kinds of permits that factories must get. Some of the roads are paved, but most are graveled, and some are bare dirt.

Instead, they would be regulated under a less strin-

gent system known as "Best Management Practices," where authorities set up guidelines for the design and maintenance of logging roads to minimize erosion that sends mud into rivers. EPA is reviewing how states and tribes handle the issue, and plans to issue the new rules by Sept. 30, when an exemption for the timber industry enacted by Congress expires.

Inquiry Hears of Wider Secret Service Misbehavior

WASHINGTON • Senators investigating the Secret Service prostitution scandal said Wednesday that dozens of reported episodes of misconduct by agents point to a culture of carousing in the agency and urged Director Mark Sullivan to get past his insistence that the romp in Cartagena was a one-time mistake.

The disconnect between the senators and Sullivan reappeared again and again throughout the two-hour hearing, even as the Secret Service chief for the first time apologized for the incident that tarnished the elite presidential protection force. By the end, Sullivan's job appeared secure even as new details emerged that left little doubt, senators said, that a pattern of sexual misbehavior had taken root in the agency.

"He kept saying over and over again that he basically does think this was an isolated incident and I don't think he has any basis for that conclusion," said Sen. Susan Collins of Maine, the senior Republican on the Homeland Security panel that heard Sullivan's first public accounting of the episode.

"For the good of the Secret Service," added Sen. Joe Lieberman of Connecticut, the panel chairman, "he's got to assume that what happened in

Two ousted Secret Service employees implicated in an embarrassing prostitution scandal are fighting to keep their

Pakistan Convicts Doctor Who Helped Find Bin Laden

PESHAWAR, Pakistan • A doctor who helped the CIA hunt down Osama bin Laden was convicted Wednesday of conspiring against the state and sentenced to 33 years in prison, adding new strains to an already deeply troubled relationship between the U.S. and Pakistan.

U.S. officials had urged Pakistan to release the doctor, who ran a vaccination program for the CIA to collect DNA and verify the al-Qaida leader's presence at the compound in the town of Abbottabad where U.S. commandos

killed him in May 2011 in a unilateral raid.

The lengthy sentence for Dr. Shakil Afridi will be taken as another sign of Pakistan's defiance of American wishes. It could give more fuel to critics in the United States that Pakistan – which has yet to arrest anyone for helping shelter bin Laden - should no

longer be treated as an ally.

The verdict came days after a NATO summit in Chicago that was overshadowed by tensions between the two countries that are threatening American hopes of an orderly end to the war in Afghanistan and withdrawal of its combat troops by 2014.

Rep. King: CIA, Pentagon Too Close to Bin Laden Filmmakers

WASHINGTON • A House committee chairman charged Wednesday that the CIA and Defense Department jeopardized national security by cooperating too closely with filmmakers producing a movie on the raid that killed Osama bin Laden.

Homeland Security Committee Chairman Peter King R-N.Y., first raised questions about the bin Laden movie last summer, but said newly released documents confirm his suspicions.

The filmmakers are director Kathryn Bigelow and screenwriter Mark Boal, who won Academy Awards for the motion picture "The Hurt Locker."

King referred to documents obtained by Judicial Watch in a Freedom of Information Act request. He said the filmmakers received "extremely close, unprecedented and potentially dangerous collaboration"

from the Obama administra-

Judicial Watch said the documents show that the Defense Department granted Bigelow and Boal access to a "planner, operator and commander of SEAL Team 6" the unit that killed bin Laden in Pakistan.

Other documents, Judicial Watch said, show that the filmmakers met with White House officials on at least two occasions about the film. A CIA email indicates that

Bigelow and Boal were granted access to "the vault," which is described as the CIA building where some of the tactical planning for the raid took place, Judicial Watch said..

Pentagon press secretary George Little disputed some of the allegations. He said that while a planner was suggested as a possible point of contact for information on the bin Laden raid, a meeting between that planner and the filmmakers never occurred.

Egyptians Vote in First Free Presidential Election

CAIRO • After a lifetime of being told who will rule them, Egyptians dove enthusiastically into the uncertainty of the Arab world's first competitive presidential election Wednesday. Up to the last minute, voters wrestled with a polarizing choice between secularists rooted in Hosni Mubarak's old autocracy and Islamists hoping to enfuse the state with religion.

The choices in the race raised worries among many whether real democracy will emerge in Egypt. And the final result, likely to come only after a runoff next month, will only open a new chapter of political struggle.

But in the lines at the polls, voters were palpably excited at the chance to decide their country's path in the vote, which is the fruit of last year's stunning popular revolt that overthew Mubarak after 29 years in power. For the past 60 years, Egypt's presidents running unchallenged have largely been re-affirmed in yes-or-no referendums that few bothered to vote in.

Mohammed Salah, 26, emerged grinning from a poll station, fresh from casting his ballot. "Before, they used to take care of that for me," he said. "Today, I am choosing for myself."

Medhat Ibrahim, 58, who suffers from cancer, had tears in his eyes. "I might die in a matter of months, so I came for my children, so they can live," he said, waiting to vote in a poor Cairo district. "We want to live better, like human beings."

Adding to the drama, this election is up in the air. The reliability of polls is unsure, and four of the 13 candidates candidates have bounced around the top

spots, leaving no clear single front-runner. None is likely to win outright in Wednesday and Thursday's balloting, so the top two vote-getters enter a run-off June 16-17, with the victor

announced June 21. The two secular frontrunners are both veterans of Mubarak's regime – former prime minister Ahmed Shafiq and former foreign minister Amr Moussa.

The main Islamist contenders are Mohammed Morsi of the powerful Muslim Brotherhood and Abdel-Moneim Abolfotoh, a moderate Islamist whose inclusive platform has won him the support of some liberals, leftists and minority Christians.

ROMNEY PROMOTES EDUCATION AGENDA, DEFENDS BAIN

WASHINGTON • Originally planning to focus on education, Mitt Romney instead reignited the debate over his business credentials on Wednesday, welcoming scrutiny of the private equity firm he co-founded and declaring he's a far more qualified steward of the economy than President Barack Obama.

At the same time, Romney said that if he wins the White House, he wants Congress to delay addressing looming tax increases and spending cuts until after

he takes office.

"Right now we have an economy in trouble, and someone who spent their career in the economy is more suited to help fix the economy than someone who spent his life in politics and as a community organizer," Romney told Time magazine.

The comments - the first since Obama personally questioned Romney's experience at Bain Capital largely overshadowed a Washington speech that offered the presumptive Republican presidential nominee's first extensive plans for the nation's education system. Romney, who has been reluctant to stray far from the economic issues at the core of the presidential campaign, charged that Millions of American children are getting a "third-world education" under Obama.

"And America's minority children suffer the most," Romney declared. "This is the civil-rights issue of our era. And it's the great challenge of our time?"

He continued: "President Obama has made his choice, and I have made mine. As president, I will be a champion of real education re-

form in America." Five months before Election Day, Romney is working to add meat to his prescriptions for some of the nation's most pressing problems. He has offered few details so far on foreign policy, health care and education, following a playbook that heaps criticism on the Democratic president's policies but offers only a vague road map for what he would do differently.

Romney told *Time* magazine that if he wins the presidency, he wants Congress to wait until he takes office to deal with the so-called fiscal "cliff" on Jan. 1, 2013, when two rounds of tax cuts expire and automatic spending cuts to defense and domestic programs kick in. In the interview, Romney suggested that he was open to a temporary measure to keep the economy going until he had a chance to shape a "permanent" solution.

Romney also said that heading off the looming tax hikes and spending cuts could be done in a piecemeal way. House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, has suggested he wants a fiscal "grand bargain" to address the country's ills.

Government analysts say that current fiscal policies, if unchanged, would likely cause a recession.

The former Massachusetts governor defended his work in the private sector in the interview, but he initially struggled to identify specific skills or policies he learned at Bain that would help him create an environment in which jobs would be created. He later identified trade, labor and energy policies.

"I happen to believe that having been in the private sector for 25 years gives me a perspective on how jobs are created – that someone who's never spent a day in the private sector, like President Obama, simply doesn't understand," he said.

Clinton, Military Leaders Plead for Sea Treaty

WASHINGTON • Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton and military leaders implored conservative Republicans on Wednesday to approve a long-spurned high seas treaty, saying it would create jobs, open a new path to oil, gas and other resources and bolster national security.

Clinton, Defense Secre-

tary Leon Panetta and Gen. Martin Dempsey, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, made a rare joint appearance before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to make the case for the U.N. Convention on the Law of the Sea. The United States is the only major nation that has refused to sign the treaty, which was concluded in 1982 and been in force since 1994.

IRANIAN NAVY HELPS U.S. SHIP ATTACKED BY PIRATES

LONDON • Iran's navy helped a U.S.-flagged cargo ship that was attacked by pirates off the United Arab Emirates, according to the vessel's owner, Maersk Line Ltd.

The Iranian navy was the first to respond to the initial distress call from the Maersk Texas, Kevin Speers, senior director of marketing at Maersk Line, said by phone Wednesday. The vessel was attacked by several skiffs and armed guards on board returned fire, the company said in an earlier statement.

The incident happened at about noon northeast of Fujairah, the biggest port in the Middle East for refueling oil tankers, Maersk said. Iran's navy provided guidance to the crew of the Maersk Texas by radio, Speers said, declining to comment further pending a debriefing.

U.S., U.K., Chinese, French, German and Russian negotiators — the socalled P5+1 group—met with Iranian officials in Baghdad Wednesday over the Persian Gulf country's nuclear program. The West suspects Iran's goal is to develop a weapon, while Iran contends it is for civilian

purposes.

The European Union's counter-piracy force said it had reviewed the incident and determined there was "no case of piracy and it's a false alarm," Timo Lange, a spokesman for Northwood, England-based EU Navfor, said by phone Wednesday. EU Navfor operates nine warships and five maritime patrol aircraft as part of an operation combating piracy in the region, according to data on its website.

Maersk got its information from the captain of the Maersk Texas and will investigate EU Navfor's assertion, Speers said.

The Australian frigate HMAS Melbourne was dispatched to help the Maersk Texas, Lt. Cmdr. Mark Hankey at Combined Maritime Forces in Bahrain said by phone. The command is headed by Vice Adm. Mark Fox, leader of the U.S. Navy's Fifth Fleet.

The warship launched a helicopter that proceeded to the merchant vessel, which had exchanged gunfire with a skiff located within a group of about 20 boats, according to Hankey. The task force has yet to assess whether pirates were in any of the skiffs, he said. The Gulf of Oman, which Fujairah faces, is noted for fishing and smuggling activity, Hankey said.

Pressure on EU Leaders to Solve Greek Crisis

BRUSSELS • Europe's leaders gather in Brussels under mounting pressure to soften their tough-love approach to the weaker economies among them. With Greece locked in political chaos, much bigger Spain warns it can't keep afloat without help, as stock markets around the world tank over fears the leaders won't have the political will to act.

The summit will have to fight multiple fires: political uncertainty in Greece that could see it renege on commitments made to secure rescue loans; rising borrowing costs in Spain and Italy that could force them to seek bailouts; and sluggish growth across the region exacerbated by budget cuts meant to reassure markets about high debt levels.

"What we need is a decisive plan for Greece, and we need decisive plans to help get the European economies moving," British Prime Minister David Cameron said as he headed into the summit of leaders of the 27 countries that make up the EU, which includes the 17-member eurozone.

"But if we're not going to

keep coming back and back to meetings like this we also need to deal with some of the longer-term issues at the heart of running successful single currency, having a bank that gets behind that single currency, having coherent long-term plans to make sure that single currency is coherent," he said.

Leaders have said that everything will be on the table, including a discussion about whether the countries that use the euro should spread the risk and borrow money jointly — issuing so-called "eurobonds." This would mean every country could borrow funds at the same rate, substantially lower-

ing the costs for the more indebted countries.

But expectations were low for agreement on concrete measures to boost growth and stability in the eurozone. Europe's main stock indexes plunged more than 2 percent. The euro fell 0.8 percent to \$1.2561, its lowest in nearly two years.

On Tuesday, the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development became the latest body to warn that the eurozone is at risk of falling into a "severe recession" and suggest that it slow the pace of austerity, or cost-cutting measures, in some countries.

Rio Issues Land Titles to Slum Residents

RIO DE JANEIRO • The home Jose Nazare Braga built in the Rocinha shantytown is his life's work, an investment that grew from a shack to a three-story building over 30 years. A restaurant and a paper-goods store on the ground floor provide income, and his children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren live above.

The red-brick building is Braga's nest egg, his retirement home and an inheritance for his large family. But for decades, the property wasn't formally his, and he lived in fear of losing it all.

Now local officials and human rights groups are working to give legal title to tens of thousands of people like Braga, a process that increases their wealth and gives them greater access to credit, as well as peace of mind.

"I did this for my family, for my children," said the 70year-old. For years he relied on a piece of paper given by the residents' association as his proof of ownership, and worried it wouldn't hold up in court if he was challenged.

"Now this is safe, secure," Braga said, sitting in his tiny, neat living room decorated

with pictures of his family. "No one takes it away from us."

The programs so far are just beginning to tackle a wide-spread problem: A third of the people in Rio state, nearly 5 million people, don't have title to their homes, an uncertainty shared by most of the approximately 1 billion people who living in slums globally. Similar efforts are under way in many nations, where for-

malizing land tenure can give millions a secure hold on what is often a family's most valuable asset.

Homeowners have quickly discovered that their land can be used as collateral for loans and that property with a title fetches a higher price in the formal real estate market.

But there's also a downside. As the value of land goes up, it undermines the role of slums as the only well-located affordable housing available to low-income families in a city of booming real estate prices.

Land titling is one of an array of programs that have brought utilities, sewage connections and other benefits to Rio's slums in recent years. A push to control violence before the 2016 Olympics has seen permanent police posts installed in some of the favelas once controlled by the drug trade.

DAMASCUS, Syria • Syria's oil minister blamed international sanctions Wednesday for shortages of cooking gas and other basic goods, saying the measures have bled \$4 billion from the nation's ailing economy.

President Bashar Assad's regime must strike a delicate balance toward the U.S. and EU sanctions as it confronts a 15-month-old uprising against its rule, acknowledging their heavy toll while denying the regime's grip on power is in any way shaken.

Sufian Allaw said the punitive measures were to blame for the shortages that have left Syrians across the country standing in long lines to pay inflated prices for cooking gas, fuel, sugar and other staples.

The U.S. ambassador to Damascus denied that the international sanctions are to blame for the shortages fac-

ing Syrians.

"Our sanctions purposefully do not target oil and diesel imports, because we know that the Syrian people need both for their day-today lives," Ambassador Robert Ford wrote on the embassy's Facebook page.

Ford said the government is using fuel imports for its tanks.

"If the Assad regime decided to cut its military expenditures, more diesel and oil would be available for the Syrian people to use," he said.

Before the Syrian uprising began in March 2011, the oil sector was a pillar of Syria's economy, with oil exports — mostly to Europe — bringing in \$7-8 million per day. This income was key to maintaining the \$17 billion in foreign reserves that the government had at the start of the uprising.

Speaking to reporters in Damascus Wednesday, Allaw said sanctions had cost Syria's oil sector about \$4 billion.

Mystery Deer Growth Pitting Hunters against Hawaii

HONOLULU • Deer can swim, but not very far. When they showed up for the first time on the Big Island of Hawaii, mystified residents wondered how they got

The island is some 30 miles southeast of Maui, where deer are plentiful.

Hawaii wildlife authorities think someone dropped a few from a helicopter on the northern tip of the island. And tracks along the southern coast indicate deer were pushed into the ocean from a boat and forced to paddle ashore.

Whether they arrived by air or sea, wildlife managers want to eradicate them to avoid a repeat of the destruction seen on other islands where they ate through vineyards, avocado farms and forests where endangered species live.

Officials estimate that there are 100 deer on the northern and southern ends of the Big Island. A government-funded group is leading efforts to get rid of them before they breed.

"They didn't get here by themselves, so the people who brought them over did so and have done it many times," said Jan Schipper, the group's project manager.

People have reported seeing deer on the Big Island for a while, but it wasn't until a motion-sensor camera captured a photo of one last year that their presence was confirmed.

Axis deer, called chital in their native India, are similar in size to whitetail deer found in the continental U.S. Tigers and leopards keep axis deer numbers reasonable in India, but the deer population is growing 20 percent to 30 percent per year in Hawaii because there aren't any natural predators — except for

The deer first came to Hawaii in the 1860s as a gift from Hong Kong to the monarch who ruled at the time, King Kamehameha V. They were first taken to Molokai Island.

In the 1950s, some deer were taken to Maui as part of post-World War II efforts to introduce mammals to different places and increase hunting opportunities for veterans, said Steven Hess, wildlife biologist with the U.S. Geological Survey. Biologists believed they could improve the environment by introducing species that didn't naturally exist, he said.

The experiment has had devastating, unforeseen consequences in Hawaii, where plants and animals evolved in isolation over millions of years and lack natural defenses against introduced species.

In Maui, deer have caused \$1 million in damage during the past two years for farmers, ranchers and resorts, according to a county survey. They spent half that amount during the same time trying to eradicate the animals. On Lanai, deer that eat everything from Hawaii's native ebony tree, the lama, to a native olive tree and a now-extinct mint helped turn a rich native forest into a desertlike landscape so desolate people compare it to the moon.

There are no native land mammals in Hawaii except for a bat. Big Island hunters, who hunt to supplement their diet, say the deer should stay because the gift to the former king was for all of Hawaii.

Sylvester suspects other hunters brought the deer from nearby islands to retaliate against government agencies and conservationists for converting vast tracts of hunting ground to forest restoration. He said he understands the concern for the environment and the need to protect the forest, but he said the deer can coexist if managed properly.

"Before you know it, everywhere is a pristine area and it's more and it's more and it's more," he said. "And our culture is slowly getting pushed away and pushed

Officials have fenced off forests and killed sheep, goats and pigs inside the area to help save a multitude of species inside, such as the slow-growing mamane tree and the palila songbirds that eat its seeds.

The Pele Defense Fund, a group that led a successful legal fight in the 1990s to win Native Hawaiians access to private land for hunting, is now rallying hunters together for a class action lawsuit against the state to stop its efforts to eradicate game animals and fence off land.

"They go in and kill all the pigs and everything else. Then you eliminated the hunter," said Palikapu Dedman, the fund's president. "I think the hunter has been ignored and it's the state's responsibility to look out for them, too."

Jimmy Gomes, operations manager at Ulupalakua Ranch spanning 18,000 acres on the slopes of Haleakala volcano in Maui, said deer have been jumping over rock walls and through wire fences to eat ranch grass set aside for cattle. Gomes said he's seen a thousand at a time, and has had to wait several minutes for a herd of deer to pass before he can ride through them on horseback.

"Sometimes you're driving cattle, you're moving cattle across, and all of the sudden you see this - like the mountains moving - this deer coming down," he said.

Gun club members and ranch employees have killed more than 1,000 deer on the ranch this year, but Gomes said it hasn't made a dent in their numbers.

Sam Ohu Gon III, senior scientist and cultural adviser at the Nature Conservancy of Hawaii, said the deer could threaten Big Island plants that are important for the environment and Hawaiian culture. Among those are the $\,$ uhiuhi tree, which has a hard wood ancient Hawaiians favored for making weapons and tools, and the ohelo berry, which is used to make jam and is sacred to Pele, the goddess of volcanoes.

The threat to the Big Island's native ecosystems is particularly serious as half the island still has native vegetation - a high ratio compared with other Hawaiian islands.

BAND MATES SAY FAMU VICTIM VOLUNTEERED TO BE HAZED

ORLANDO, Fla. • A Florida A&M drum major who died after being hazed on a bus was known for his opposition to hazing but agreed to go through a brutal initiation ritual because it was seen as an honor, according to interviews with band mates released Wednesday.

Robert Champion, 26, had asked all season to go through the hazing ritual known as "crossing over," defendant Jonathan Boyce said. Multiple witnesses say the ordeal involved the participant going from the front to the back of the bus while others beat the person.

"It's a respect thing, you know," Boyce told detectives. "Well, he was wanting to do it all ... all season."

Champion died last November after enduring hazing by other band members outside a hotel in Orlando where FAMU had played its

archrival in football. His death revealed a culture of hazing in the famed band, which has performed at Super Bowls and presidential inauguration parades. An autopsy concluded Champion suffered blunt trauma blows to his body and died from shock caused by severe bleeding. Champion's parents said

at a news conference Wednesday that they are having a hard time believing that their son volunteered to be hazed. "He was murdered on

that bus, and no one signs up for that," Pam Champion

Prosecutors in Orlando have more than 1,500 pages of evidence against the 13 people charged in Champion's death last year. Eleven defendants are charged with a third-degree felony and two are charged with misdemeanors.

Drum major Keon Hollis told detectives he went through the same hazing ritual as Champion the night he died. He said there were at least 15 people on the bus.

He said Champion was the next person to be hazed after him. He said Champion seemed fine immediately afterward, but said he was thirsty. Hollis said he gave Champion some water.

Champion soon collapsed and later died.

Another hazing ritual called "the hot seat" involved getting kicked and beaten with drumsticks and bass drum mallets while covered with a blanket on a band bus called, "Bus C," band member Marc Baron told investigators. Baron isn't charged and wasn't on the bus the weekend Champion died.

Depositions offered clues to the defenses the defendants will use.

Boyce and another defendant, Shawn Turner, claimed they tried to help Champion get off the bus by pulling him through the gauntlet of band members.

Fla. Student Pleads Guilty to Online Obama Threat

MIAMI • A 20-year-old college student who told investigators he was merely trying to get a reaction from President Barack Obama's supporters pleaded guilty Wednesday to posting threatening messages against the president on Facebook.

Joaquin Amador Serrapio Jr. could get up to five years in federal prison for pleading guilty to a single count of threatening to kill or harm the president, but likely will get less time, said his attorney Alan Ross. Sentencing is set for Aug. 22 before U.S. District Judge Marcia Cooke.

There's no evidence that Serrapio intended to carry out any threat against the president and Obama was never in any danger, investi- around the time Obama vis-

to Afghanistan it has blocked for nearly six months to protest U.S. airstrikes that killed 24 Pakistani troops on the Afghan border. But it did not reopen the routes, and instead repeated demands for an apology from Washington for the airstrikes.

Pakistan's treatment of Afridi since his arrest following the bin Laden raid has in many ways symbolized the gulf between Washington and Islamabad.

In the United States and other Western nations, Afridi was viewed as a hero who had helped eliminate the world's most-wanted man. But Pakistan army and spy chiefs were outraged by the raid, which led to international suspicion that they had been harboring the al-Qaida chief. In their eyes, Afridi was a traitor who had collaborated with a foreign spy agency in an illegal operation on its soil.

Afridi, in his 50s, was detained sometime after the raid, but the start of his trial was never publicized.

He was tried under the Frontier Crimes Regulations, or FCR — the set of laws that govern Pakistan's semiautonomous tribal region. Human rights organizations have criticized the FCR for not providing suspects the right to legal representation, to present material evidence, or to cross-examine witnesses. Verdicts are handled by a government official in consultation with a council of elders.

Afridi was tried in the Khyber tribal region, where he was raised. In addition to the prison term, he was ordered to pay a fine of about \$3,500 and is subject to an additional 31/2 years in prison if he does not, according to

Nasir Khan, a government official in Khyber.

Afridi can appeal the verdict within two months, said Iqbal Khan, another Khyber government official.

An official with Pakistan's main Inter-Services Intelligence agency said the decision was in Pakistan's "national interest," and he dismissed earlier appeals by U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton and other American officials that Afridi should be released. The official did not give his name because the ISI doesn't allow its operatives to be identified in the media.

Asked in Washington to comment, Pentagon press secretary George Little declined to talk about the specific case, but added: "Anyone who supported the United States in finding Osama bin Laden was not working against Pakistan. They were working against al-Qaida."

Afridi was working for local health authorities in northwest Pakistan when he began working for the CIA. Nurses working for him reportedly knocked on the door of the compound in Abbottabad, but were not successful in obtaining a sample from the house to confirm bin Laden was living there.

After the raid, the Pakistan army kicked out U.S. military trainers and limited counterterrorism cooperation with the CIA. But relations got even worse in November when the U.S. killed the Pakistani border guards, an attack that Washington said was an accident but the Pakistani army insisted was deliberate.

Pakistan retaliated by closing the NATO supply routes and kicking the U.S. out of a base used by American drones. Before the attack, the U.S and other NA-TO countries fighting in Afghanistan shipped about 30 percent of their nonlethal supplies through Pakistan. Since then, the coalition has used far more expensive routes through Russia and Central Asia.

Chasing Turkeys

Mother Nature messes up spring turkey season, hunters say.

OAKLEY • Blame Mother Nature. She didn't provide southern Idaho turkey hunters with a memorable spring season.

Temperatures already were too warm at the beginning of the season to make it successful, said John Howard, president of the South Hills Strutters.

Idaho's spring controlled turkey hunt officially ends Friday. Hunters hope the fall hunt will be better.

Howard took his son out for the opening day of the youth hunt on April 15 to find Rio Grandes in the South Hills, and although snow blanketed the foothills the toms and hens had already paired up for breeding.

"When it starts to warm up the turkey's biological clock begins to tick," Howard said. "Typically you can call in and get the birds to respond pretty easily during their breeding season, but when they've already paired up they have no reason to and it makes the hunting more difficult."

Howard didn't have any luck in southern Idaho but bagged a few birds on a South Dakota hunt and said reports from northern Idaho indicate "a population explosion."

Those, however, are different species of turkey, said Randy Smith, regional wildlife manager for Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

Northern Idaho has both Eastern wild and Merriam turkeys, while southern Idaho has Rio Grande turkevs.

From 1988 to 2001, 152 Rio Grande turkeys were brought into the Big Cottonwood Wildlife Management Area near Oakley, although 106 "nuisance" birds were trapped and relocated to the Goose Creek and Green Creek drainages

An additional fee is charged for telephone and Internet applications. Hunters must have a 2012 Idaho hunting license to apply.

I first heard about beaver dams and lodges in the South Hills from Kimberly resident Carol Sherman, who encountered them on an outing to Wahlstrom Hollow a few years back.

"But," Davis said, looking at my car on Friday, "you probably won't make it through the Hollow."

Instead, he said, try driving Rogerson Road toward Shoshone Basin. It would probably be my best bet to see the beaver lodges, especially as I was driving a low-clearance vehicle and Rogerson Road, near Magic Mountain Ski Resort, was without a lot of holes and hills. My car could make that trip, he said. And I wouldn't even need to go as far as the basin to see the dams.

"About four or five miles in, you'll see the mounds," he said. "They're pretty obvious."

Busy Beavers

It was just about four miles when I saw the first pond, off to the left. The calm water reflected tall pines, and near its center was a lone beaver lodge.

I waited a few minutes, trying not to make any sounds, hoping to see movement in the water. When my patience tired, I scanned the surroundings: Wood chips were scattered in many places, and in the forest were half-

chewed logs and tree stumps. Beavers, it appeared, had been busy - much busier than it seemed necessary to build the one lodge sitting serenely in the glassy pond.

"Beavers have been known to eat themselves out of house and home - if they eat too fast and vegetation doesn't keep up with their needs," said Tom Bandolin, wildlife

biologist for the Sawtooth National Forest, in a separate interview. "Beaver populations can be dynamic, depending on what's going on with the vegetation and how we manage it. I've seen places where beavers have lived for years, and then all of a sudden they're gone. We can speculate what happened to them, but we really don't know."

That hasn't happened in the South Hills, he said. Beavers, the world's largest rodent, are native to the area.

Water for Wildlife

The Shoshone Wildlife Ponds, managed by the Sawtooth National Forest, not only are home to beavers, Bandolin said, but provide habitat and water for a variety of wildlife.

The ponds were enhanced about 20 years ago, he said, and draw the attention of antelope, elk and moose.

It was obvious that various animals visit the ponds which, on my visit, looked green because of reflected trees — because of the tracks imprinted in mud near the banks.

Hummingbirds also live in the area, not only at a nearby, man-made hummingbird retreat but at the ponds them-

"Sit quietly and you'll start to see them land in the willows and vegetation," Ban-

dolin said. What might be a surprise is actually seeing a beaver, es-

pecially one hard at work.

Beavers do great rehabilitation work, Bandolin said. "They are a really fascinating creature and can do a lot of good," he said. "In a place where there's been a natural disaster, for instance, which caused a lot of damage to

banks. A beaver can go in

there and dam it up, catch the

sediment and stop the deteri-

oration process."



'Reclusive Animals'

I drove on, and for the next two miles came upon several small ponds dotted with beaver lodges and dams that enhance the scenery in this rugged backcountry. Yellow wildflowers were beginning to bloom on the hillsides, and here and there a smattering of purple flowers.

The largest of the ponds, and to me the most scenic, was about five miles from the point that Rogerson Road left Rock Creek Road. A large lodge sat close to shore on the west end. I was hoping to see a beaver or two, at work or play. But again, besides small waves from a stream that trickled into the pond, the water was calm.

Birds chirped in the trees, but other than that all was qui-

Sherman said she'd seen beavers at Wahlstrom Hollow, but I had no such luck at Shoshone Ponds.

I decided that the beavers, though I could not see them, likely could see me. They probably were peering at me through their lodges, I thought, and all of a sudden I felt like the pun of a wildlife

Then I remembered what Davis said: "They are very reclusive animals."

Wisconsin Musky Reintroduction **Program Spawns** Success

DE PERE, Wis. • Hallmarks of the Wisconsin spring were on vibrant display last week on the Fox River.

Red-winged blackbirds flared their epaulets and jousted for territories in cattails along the shore.

Lilacs were heavy with purple blossoms.

And beneath the river's placid surface, fish congregated in a spawning ritual.

Not to diminish bright blossoms or colorful, native birds, but the spectacle beneath the waves was especially captivating.

Maybe it's because 25 years ago the fish weren't here. Or because it took the help of anglers and fisheries biologists to bring them back. Or simply due to the impressive sight of the long, toothy fish.

For a few fortunate visitors and half-dozen state fisheries personnel, there was no looking away from a net full of Great Lakes spotted muskellunge.

"We're happy we increased the size of this gear," said Steve Hogler, fisheries biologist with the Department of Natural Resources.

The fyke net was set one Monday near the eastern shore of the Fox. In less than 24 hours, 18 adult muskies traveling upstream had been funneled into the underwater trap.

Hogler and crew began the process of transferring the muskies with a dip net from the river to a 45-gallon holding tank on a jon

The muskies ranged from 34 to 54 inches in length. As they were removed, a pair of 28-inch walleye and dozens of smaller panfish also trapped in the net seemed to breathe a sigh of relief.

The muskies were moved in several shifts to a processing area at a nearby public boat launch. There the fish were measured, weighed, inspected and tagged. Eggs and milt also were taken from several

It's all part of the state's management program for the Great Lakes spotted

Though native to Green Bay and other Lake Michigan waters, the species was effectively eliminated through the mid-1900s by a variety of factors, including habitat degradation and water pollution.

In the 1980s, the DNR launched a reintroduction program for the native strain.

The first fish were obtained from Michigan and stocked in 1989.

Stocking levels rose from about 4,000 fish per year in the early 1990s to about 30,000 fish per year in the early 2000s.

The program gave rise to one of the best musky fisheries in the Midwest.

"By 2006, we had people coming here from Illinois, Minnesota and throughout Wisconsin," said Mike Wichmann of Green Bay, president of Titletown Muskies Inc., a sportfishing and conservation organization based in Green Bay. "There was no place that offered a better chance to

Whatever You Do, Don't Miss Venus' Solar Silhouette

ith Johannes Kepler's discovery of the elliptical nature of planets' orbits in the opening decades of the 17th century came the ability to predict their motions with unprecedented accuracy. With this newfound power, Kepler began to calculate when celestial bodies would draw near one another in the sky, motivated by the perceived astrological significance of such conjunctions.

In 1629, Kepler found that in November and December, two years hence, Mercury and Venus, respectively, would pass directly between the Earth and sun, known as a transit. Unfortunately, Kepler's death in 1630 prevented him from verifying his predictions (although he would have missed the Venus transit in any case, since it occurred during the nighttime hours in Europe).

Mercury transits are relatively common, averaging 13

per century (the last was in 2006). Venus transits are much rarer, occurring just four times every 243 years. Since the ability to predict transits, as well as the technology to observe them (i.e. the telescope) didn't exist before Kepler's time, only six transits of Venus have been observed in all of human history.

On June 5, southern Idaho will see most of the next transit, which commences just after 4 p.m., its end truncated by sunset after 9 p.m.

Observing the transit safely requires the same precautions as viewing a partial solar eclipse. Sharpeyed viewers, with proper filters, should see Venus as a tiny speck slowly traversing the sun's upper right quad-

As his boat rocked in the waves, Witt began cutting large shad into sections. Then he and his fishing partner, Josh Carlson, started baiting the hooks and letting the lines stream out of the reels.

Two wind socks were lowered to slow the speed of the drift and Witt used the trolling motor to straighten the course every once in a

Before long, Witt saw what he was waiting for. One of the rods slowly bent in the holder, and Witt quickly grabbed it and set the hook.

Then the fight was on.

"These big blues don't mess around when they take a bait," he said as he fought the fish. "You can usually tell that it's a blue by the way it

The fish fought hard in the rough water, but eventually surrendered. And Carlson reached over to pull the 10pound catfish into the boat.

"I was a little worried about today," Witt said.

"They hadn't been biting. "But this wind will get them stirred up."

Witt paused and admired his fat catch for a second before releasing it.

"That's a nice fish," he said, "but there are bigger ones in

"Milford is getting to the point where it's known for its trophy catfish. It's not a secret anymore."

A few minutes later, Witt proved why. As the rod again slowly bent, Witt set the hook and felt the weight of one of those trophy fish he was talking about. He held his fishing rod high and watched as the giant creature at the other end put a sharp bend in it.

From there, it was an extended tug of war. The big cat would strip out line for a few seconds, then Witt would regain ground by reeling. That lasted for a few minutes until the giant finally tired and floated to the surface.

Carlson used an oversized pair of pliers to grab the fish Witt was able to exhale.

It wasn't long before the blues were spawning, building a sizeable population and showing impressive growth rates. Now they have a population that has earned national attention.

Between Facebook and JPMorgan, Wall St. Woes Mount

NEW YORK • Almost four years after the financial crisis, Wall Street still

can't get it right. Investor anger mounted Wednesday over the initial public offering of Facebook stock last week, which was fumbled by the banks that managed the deal and complicated by technical problems at the Nasdaq stock ex-

Shareholders filed at least two lawsuits against Facebook and Morgan Stanley, the bank that shepherded the IPO, over reports that it withheld negative analyst reports about Facebook from some clients before the company

went public. It was the second stumble this month by a major Wall Street firm. JP-Morgan Chase, usually revered for taming risk, has yet to contain a growing \$2 billion loss in one of its trading

units. The missteps are further eroding the confidence of Main Street, or what was left of it after the financial meltdown of 2008, and reinforcing the sense that the game is rigged.

Judson Gee, a financial adviser in Charlotte, N.C., placed a call Wednesday morning to a client who had plowed \$50,000 into Facebook stock on Friday, the day of the IPO.

Gee said he called to tell the client, a restaurateur, about reports that Morgan Stanley had told only select customers about an analyst's reduction of revenue estimates for Facebook just before the IPO.

"I could see his jaw dropping on the other side," Gee said. "A lot of expletives came out." He said his client had asked: "How can they give that information to the big boys and not give it to the public?"

In the final planning of the IPO, Facebook, working with Morgan Stanley, raised the total number of shares being offered for sale by 25 percent, to 421 million. They expected extraordi-

nary demand for the stock by investors. That appears to have been a miscalculation. Facebook stock jumped from \$38 to as high as \$45 in the opening

minutes, but quickly sank toward \$38 again. It dropped to about \$34 on Monday and \$31 on Tuesday. The stock recovered somewhat on Wednesday and climbed \$1.

Dayna Steele, a motivational speaker in Houston, said she planned to wait and buy the stock "when everybody finishes suing each other."

The shareholder lawsuit, filed in federal court in Manhattan, accuses Morgan Stanley of withholding the negative analyst report from some clients while it prepared to take the stock public.

One of the investors suing, Dennis Palkon, a professor at Florida Atlantic University, said that IPOs are tricky, but "this one had a lot of glamour, had a lot of interest. It has a lot of users. I thought it'd be a pretty good investment."

He bought 1,800 shares of Facebook at \$38 through his ETrade account, meaning that after Tuesday, he was down more than \$12,000 on paper.

"I think there were problems all over the place," he said. "It was totally poor planning to raise the price as high as they did and then to add all those extra shares."

Morgan Stanley declined comment on the suit, but it said on Tuesday that it had complied with regulations in how it handled analyst reports before the IPO. Facebook called the lawsuit "without merit?"

The Senate Banking Committee, the Securities and Exchange Commission and other regulators also plan to look into the IPO.

Regulators will probably want to comb over Facebook's prospectus, the information it provided to potential investors, to make sure the company's disclosures were accurate and complete.

State securities laws and industry rules, mostly broader in scope than SEC rules, give state and industry regulators a wider berth to sanction investment firms that they accuse of failing to act in investors' best interest.

The first trading in Facebook stock, originally set for 11 a.m. Friday, was delayed half an hour by technical glitches at the Nasdaq Stock Market, and brokerages are still sorting through problems with orders.

HP to Cut 27,000 Jobs to Save Up to \$3.5B Annually

SAN FRANCISCO • Hewlett-Packard Co. plans to cut 27,000 jobs as the growing popularity of smartphones, the iPad and other mobile devices makes it tougher for the company to sell personal computers.

The cuts announced Wednesday represent HP's largest payroll purge in its 73-year history. The reductions will affect about 8 percent of HP's nearly 350,000 employees by the time the overhaul is completed in October 2014.

Word of the mass layoff had leaked out in media reports late last week, so the news didn't come as a surprise.

HP hopes to avoid as many layoffs as possible by offering early retirement packages.

The company, which is based in Palo Alto, Calif., expects to save as much as \$3.5 billion annually from the job cuts and other austerity

HP CEO Meg Whitman plans to funnel most of the savings into developing more products and services that could help the company adapt to technological shifts. Those changes are driving demand for more mobile computing and for software that is provided over highspeed Internet connections, rather than installed on individual computers.

Investors seemed to be delighted with the shake-up. HP's shares surged \$2.42, or more than 11 percent, to \$23.50 in extended trading Wednesday after the announcement.

"Work force reductions are never easy," Whitman said in a conference call Wednesday with analysts. "They adversely impact people's lives, but in this case, they are absolutely critical to the long-term health of the company. Our goal is simple: a better outcome for the customers at reduced cost for HP."

Whitman's crackdown will immediately change the leaders within HP's recently acquired Autonomy division, which makes software for searching for information within companies and government agencies.

Bill Veghte, HP's chief strategy officer, is replacing Autonomy founder Mike Lynch in an effort to boost the division's financial performance. The shake-up is likely to amplify investor questions about whether HP blundered last year when it paid \$11 billion to buy Autonomy. That deal was announced in August by Whitman's predecessor, Leo Apotheker, just a month before he was fired.

News of the cutbacks overshadowed the release of HP's latest quarterly results.

The company earned \$1.6 billion, or 80 cent per share, during the three months ending in April, its fiscal second quarter. That represent ed a 31 percent decline from \$2.3 billion, or \$1.05 per share, at the same time last year.

If not for several items unrelated to HP's ongoing business, the company said it would have earned 98 cents per share. That figure topped the average estimate of 91 cents per share among analysts surveyed by FactSet.

Revenue for HP's fiscal second quarter fell 3 percent from last year to \$30.7 billion. That was about \$800 million above analyst projections.

"I wouldn't say we have turned the corner, but we are making progress," Whitman told analysts.

To pay for severance and other restructuring costs, HP expects to take a pre-tax charge of about \$1.7 billion in the current fiscal year, which ends in October. It expects to take charges of an additional \$1.8 billion through fiscal 2014.



Three Women, Two Olympic Spots, One Bike Race

BOISE • Three women are vying for two slots on the U.S. time trial team in the London Olympics. Making the cut might come down to a five-day stage race that starts today in Boise.

Kristin Armstrong Savola, the 2008 Olympic time trial gold medalist, former world champion Amber Neben, and Evelyn Stevens, a Wall Street associate-turned-professional cyclist, will race head-to-head for the first time this season at the Exergy Tour in southwestern Idaho, which offers a \$100,000 prize list.

Armstrong, Neben and Stevens — and dozens of women from around the world, from 16 professional teams — will have one of their final chances to win points for their own Olympic teams.

USA Cycling, the sport's U.S. governing body, will announce its London-bound squad June 15. Though Armstrong, Neben and Stevens each have a good chance to become a member of the U.S. road racing team, the selection committee's assessment of which two have the best shot for the Olympic podium will govern who rides the Aug. 1 time trial.

"It's been a big goal of mine," the 37-year-old Neben said from her home in Lake Forest, Calif., last week. "We have a lot of strong time trialists in the country, it's not something I assume is going to happen, but I'm working very hard to achieve it"

Tonight's tour opener, a 2-mile race against the clock, is followed by a tour through southwestern Idaho's Snake River wine country Friday.

Later stages include a time trial through Idaho's sagebrush sea that Wallace Stegner immortalized in his 1972 Pulitzer Prize-winning novel, "Angle of Repose," as well as a mountain stage through the state's historic gold mining country.

Bikes Briefly Stolen from Racing Team

BOISE (AP) • Boise's mayor said Wednesday that police recovered all 14 racing bicycles stolen by thieves who raided the trailer of a professional cycling team that is trying to get its top rider to the London Olympics.

Mayor Dave Bieter said the bicycles appear to be in good shape. A police department spokesman says the bicycles were found in three spots near the Boise State University campus.

Team TIBCO reported \$120,000 worth of bicycles and more than a dozen carbon racing wheels stolen from an enclosed trailer after thieves cut the lock late Tuesday or early Wednesday morning. The bikes were valued between \$5,000 and \$8,000 each.

The team is in Boise for the Exergy Tour, a five-day stage race with 16 teams and dozens of riders from around the world.

California-based TIBCO is trying to get its top rider, Megan Guarnier, to the London Olympics for the road race and had been counting on a top performance in Idaho before USA Cycling officials name their selections on

"A tough day to start with, but really good news now," Guarnier said, after learning the bikes had been recov-

Getting the bikes back was important, because each of them has been fitted to the riders' individual sizes and needs, team spokesman Jeff Sobul said.

Replacement bikes wouldn't have been the same.

"The next step will be for our team mechanic, Chris Kreidl, to go over every bike with a microscope to make sure all the bikes are in perfect shape for the riders come race time," Sobul said.

Boise police are still trying to figure out who took the bikes, Capt. Pete Ritter said.

Monday's Memorial Day circuit race ends in Boise, a mile from Armstrong's home. Further underscoring her home-road advantage, Armstrong was married in 2007 the Boise train depot—the turnaround point for Today's race.

"I know that course well," said Armstrong, 38, who briefly retired in 2009 to give birth before a 2010 comeback.

The Exergy Tour, sponsored by an alternative energy developer, is a resurrection of women's pro cycling in Idaho.

From 1984 to 2002, the Women's Challenge – sponsored first by a potato processor, then Hewlett-Packard – was among the most important women's

It launched Neben's and Armstrong's careers, and

two former Women's Challenge winners are returning, Canadian Clara Hughes and Germany's Judith Arndt, the 2011 world time trial champ. Hughes and Arndt are expected to be on their countries' Olympic teams in London

Starting today, Armstrong and Neben have some business to settle.

Last year, USA Cycling officials initially named Armstrong to the U.S. team for the 2011 world championships in Copenhagen, Denmark.

Neben appealed, arguing Armstrong raced only in the United States. It was a decision Armstrong made to be close to her son, Lucas, but which left her with insufficient results against the world's best riders, Neben argued.

Armstrong was already in

Denmark when she learned she'd been booted; she flew home, while Neben placed

The two women briefly discussed the messy situation last October, at a race in France, hoping to patch things up.

"It was important to me to make sure she knew it wasn't about any individuals, it was about the procedure," Neben said.

Armstrong said the experience caused her to rethink her 2012 strategy.

"I needed to step it up, I needed to go to Europe, I needed to race against the world best," she said. "I don't want to leave any question in anyone's mind."

Steve Johnson, president of USA Cycling, said the organization modified its selection criteria after Denmark, to help clarify any ambiguity. But with the three women so strong and the competition so fierce, he said, it's impossible to rule out the potential for another appeal before London, regardless of who is chosen.

"It's the Olympics," Johnson told the AP on Wednesday. "There's a lot at stake."

So far, Armstrong has won every 2012 time trial in which she's ridden. That includes three victories over Stevens, in New Zealand, the Netherlands and the U.S.

Stevens, just 29, is a cycling phenomenon who left behind a career at a New York City investment fund in 2009 for professional racing. After winning the U.S. championship last year, with Neben second and Armstrong third, Stevens won a big European race in Belgium this April.

She hopes her Memorial Day weekend performance will be her ticket to London. Stevens bought her first racing bike in 2008, turned pro in 2010 — and once followed Neben and Armstrong on cycling websites.

"Those were the two American women I read about, and who I looked up to," Stevens said.

NFLPA Sues League Over 2010 'Salary Cap'

The players union claimed Wednesday that the NFL imposed a secret salary cap during the uncapped 2010 season that cost the players at least \$1 billion.

The complaint was filed in U.S. District Court in Minneapolis, which oversees the Reggie White settlement covering NFL labor matters. But the league says the union has no grounds for the action and is prohibited from filing it by the collective bargaining agreement.

The complaint claims a "conspiracy" to set a \$123 million salary cap for the 2010 season, when owners did not have the authority to do so. The Cowboys and Redskins have had their future salary caps lowered for overspending in 2010, Dallas by \$10 million over two seasons, Washington by a whopping \$36 million.

Both teams lost a grievance against those reductions on Tuesday.

"When the rules are broken in a way that hurts the game, we have an obligation to act. We cannot stand by when we now know that the owners conspired to collude," union chief DeMaurice Smith said Wednesday.

In response to the reopening of the Reggie White lawsuit, NFL spokesman Greg Aiello said, "There was no collusion. There was no agreement. These claims are totally unfounded."

A league statement said the collective bargaining agreement signed last August to end the 41/2-month lockout prohibited the filing of these claims, and that players' attorneys signed a separate agreement agreeing to the terms.

But NFLPA outside counsel Jeffrey Kessler said that agreement was rejected by the court.

"The document they are referring to was not accepted by the district court in Minnesota," he said Wednesday. "It was rejected and the court entered an order which only dismissed claims under White that were pending."

The NFL also points to a clause in the latest labor contract in which the union gives up the right to sue over "collusion with respect to any League Year prior to 2011."

Thus, the NFL has considered the 2010 uncapped season a closed matter ever since the new labor deal was signed last summer. Clearly, the players do not, and now are seeking compensation for lost wages caused by collusion among the teams.

"Our union recently learned that there was a secret salary cap agreement in an uncapped year," NFL Players Association President Domonique Foxworth said. "The complaint today is our effort to fulfill our duty to every NFL player. They deserve to know, above all, the facts and the truth about this conspiracy."

The 2006 CBA included an uncapped 2010 season as the final year of the deal. It was thought that neither the league nor the union would want the potential chaos of a season with no salary cap, but that proved false as negotiations on a new contract stagnated.

"I did it (on my first jump) and I thought in my head that I wasn't quite happy about it and I didn't know why," Lee said. "I decided that I just didn't want to win state and get the record. I wanted to crush the record."

On her final attempt of the season, the junior ripped off a 38-foot, 3.5inch jump, which beat the record Terissa Sparks of Pocatello set in 2007 by a foot and one inch.

"I jumped my last one and I freaked out. I was jumping around. I went over to my coach (Heck) and

"She is easily the most focused athlete we have. She sets clear goals. She knows what she has to work on," Heck said. "She's the most dedicated athlete we have."

After working as an umpire last summer, Lee ran cross country in the fall, and during the winter, gave up playing basketball so she could train for the track

She spent every day in the weight room, doing plyometrics to help improve her

jumping form.

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



THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

'If we who are in life cannot speak Of profound experiences Why do you marvel that the dead Do not tell you of death?" – Edgar Lee Masters

Years ago, there was an annual BOLS bridge-tip competition, which contained a wealth of material for bridge journalists. Zia Mahmood won 20 years ago with a tip to the effect that defenders generally cover honors if they can.

This tip was used to good effect in the following hand played by Jeremy Dhondy.

In the other room, the inelegant contract of four hearts had come home when East led a spade. Against four spades, though, West led a club. Declarer won this in hand and ruffed a club. Now he had the problem of which red-suit finesse to take. With Mahmood's tip in mind, he led dummy's diamond queen.

As the original reporter of this deal commented, in retrospect it was foolish of East to cover this card. Why would declarer play on this suit in this manner if he did not have the ace and jack? And if that were the case, then covering the diamond queen could only make life easier for him.

Had East resisted the urge to cover, declarer would have played for the red-suit kings to be the other way around. He would surely have risen with his diamond ace, ruffed his last club, and run the heart queen. West would have won his king and the defenders would have had two trump tricks and the diamond king to come. At the table, when the diamond queen was covered, declarer unblocked diamonds, ruffed a club, pitched a heart on the diamonds, and gave up two trumps

ANSWER: It would be nice to play a two-suited defense to one no-trump, allowing you to get both suits off your chest at one go. DONT, Cappelletti and Woolsey work well to achieve this target. But if you do not have any of these methods available, you should bid two hearts rather than pass. You may not have a great hand, but you do have good shape. In balancing seat, that is almost enough on its own.

































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DEAR ABBY Jeanne **Phillips**
