


## Grouse Group Leaves Last Meeting with Work Still to Do

IDAHO FALLS • Flipping their thumbs up to show their votes of approval, a group of state, show their votes of approval, a group of state, waited in anxious silence.
"Alright," said Tom Perry, nodding his head as a signal when he finished counting. "Class dismissed."
With that, Idaho's Sage Grouse Task Force finished approving a series of frameworks
Thursday on how to better protect sage grouse
populations and habitats.
Federal officials declared the bird a candidate for endangered species protection in 2010. A year later, a federal judge approved a settlement requiring a final listing decision for
the bird by 2015 . Gov C.L "Butc ask force a June l deadline to submit its draft recommendations. But by midday on Thursday, Perry - the group's co-facilitator and legal adviser to the governor - decided the task force's subcommittees need more time to tie up the remaining loose ends.

There was little disagreement on recom mendations pertaining to suppressing wildfires and control invasive species. Members agreed to propose halting new development including wind, transmission and oil and gas projects - in ha

KIMBERLY • Kimberly residents will get an opportunity next week to learn all about
the city'sproposed downtown revitalization project. A townhall meeting is slated for 6:30 p.m. Tuesday at the Middle School Commons Room.
Phase
Phase one of the project will involve the renovation of a Street, including sidewalks, curb, on-street angle parking and landscaping. The improvements would bring the city into compliance with new American Disability Act re-
quirements. quirement Kimberly has applied for a
$\$ 500,000$ block grant from the Idaho Department of Commerce that would pay for most of the project. Total costs areestimated to be near-

They're Training Now for the Wildfires Ahead

| JEROME • Its diesel engine straining, a U.S. Bureau of Land Management fire truck climbed a steep dirt road on Thursday. <br> It's fire-training season again, and BLM firefighters from around the state are in the Magic Valley honing their skills and learning new ones. <br> A total 15 wildfire engines carried 27 students and 15 teachers Thursday during the training in the Devil's Corral area of Jerome County. After three days of classroom work, the firefighters are in the field Thursday and today. <br> Seven stations made up the training course on Thursday. Firefighters ran through various scenarios including mobile attack exercises, hosing down an area with water, changing a flat tire and negotiating their vehicles over rough terrain. <br> "The training helps the crews fight fires more efficiently and safely" said BLM firefighter Mitch Silvester. <br> They may have a busy fire season ahead of them, as officials say south-central Idaho desert plants are already drying out. Moisture levels in plants considered potential wildfire fuel are low compared to 10 -year averages. <br> "I'm a little nervous about this fire season," Silvester said. <br> Fire officials ask the public to do its part to prevent fires by being cautious with campfires and making sure vehicles are maintained before heading to the outdoors. |

Lodge handed down the order Thursday, two days after The Associated Press, the TimesNews and 15 other news organizations filed a law-
suit seeking to force the suit seeking to force the
Idaho Department of Correction to let witnesses view the execution process from start to finish.
The lawsuit is not in-
tended to obstruct the tended to obstruct the
state's June 12 scheduled state's June 12 scheduled execution of convicted
murderer Richard Leavitt. Instead, it focuses on a narrow section of the agency's execution protoagency
col.

Like most states with lethal injection, Idaho's policy bars witnesses from
watching as a condemned watching as a condemned execution chamber, strapped to the table and has IVs inserted into his or her arms. The news organizations say reporters must be able to view exe-
cutions from start to finish cutions from start to finish
so they can accurately reso they can accurately re-
port the events - and any complications that may emerge - to the public.
Lodge's order requires the parties to quickly begin nonbinding mediation on or before June 1 under
the supervision of Magistrate Judge Candy Dale. "Any opportunity to mediate a case is a positive development for both parties," said Chuck Brown, the Lewiston attorney representing the news
groups. "It avoids some of groups. "It avoids some of
the uncertainty of how a third party, in this case a judge, might rule in the future."

with two other reports that suggest wactory activity and production grew last month.
The Institute for Supply Management said factory activity grew in April at the fastest pace in 10 months. The group's closely watched manu-

## Flowering Perennials for Shade

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Not all flowering perennials need full sun in order to produce outstanding flowers. Both low-growing perennials and perennial shrubs do just as well, if not better, planted in the shade of a building or taller growing, sun-loving plants. Every gardener contends with different levels of sunlight, and there is no reason why the shade areas have to be less spectacular than those with the brightest sun.

Common Periwinkle
Common periwinkle (Vinca minor) is also known as creeping myrtle and lesser periwinkle and is a member of the dogbane family. The plant is a fast growing vine that grows along the ground

producing evergreen leaves that grow up to 2 inches long. The violet-blue flowers measure about 1 inch across and grow on stems from 4 to 8 inches tall from spring through summer. Plant common periwinkle in full shade in USDA Hardiness Zones 8 and 9 and in shade or sun in other areas. The plant will grow fastest in a moist soil and is hardy in Zones 4 through 9.

## Lenten Rose

Lenten rose (Helleborus orientalis) is a member of the buttercup family. The plant is an evergreen in Zones 6 to 9, and deciduous further north, that grows from 16 to 20 inches tall and produces dark green leaves that grow up to 18 inches long and 16 inches wide. The white, green-white, pink, rose or purple flowers resemble a single rose, measure 2 to 3 inches across, grow in clusters and bloom in the winter or very early spring. Plant lenten rose in full or light shade and a soil that is moist and well drained. The plant is hardy in Zones 4 through 9.
