Grouse Group Leaves Last Meeting with Work Still to Do

IDAHO FALLS • Flipping their thumbs up to show their votes of approval, a group of state, industry and conservation representatives waited in anxious silence.

"Alright," said Tom Perry, nodding his head as a signal when he finished counting. "Class dismissed."

With that, Idaho's Sage Grouse Task Force finished approving a series of frameworks Thursday on how to better protect sage grouse populations and habitats.

Federal officials declared the bird a candidate for endangered species protection in 2010. A year later, a federal judge approved a settlement requiring a final listing decision for the bird by 2015.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter originally gave the task force a June 1 deadline to submit its draft recommendations. But by midday on Thursday, Perry — the group's co-facilitator and legal adviser to the governor - decided the task force's subcommittees need more time to tie up the remaining loose ends.

There was little disagreement on recommendations pertaining to suppressing wildfires and control invasive species. Members agreed to propose halting new development including wind, transmission and oil and gas projects - in habitat identified as a priority for

Members are also suggesting that the state should continue to involve local working groups in its sage grouse management. LWGs are volunteer groups spread throughout the state tasked with developing site-specific Please see SAGE GROUSE, A2

In small towns like Murtaugh, high-school graduates share close bonds.

MURTAUGH • As the sound of "Pomp & Circumstance" filled the school gym, it didn't take long for Murtaugh's graduating seniors to practice entering the room.

That's because there are only 10.

It was the morning before their Wednesday night graduation ceremony. Like graduation rehearsals at larger schools, the students practiced going on stage, getting their diplomas and making speeches.

The difference: There weren't any unfamiliar faces in the room.

"I like it," Fatima Miranda said about being in a small graduating class.

Many of Murtaugh's graduates went to school together for years. Others - like senior Vanesa Cabral moved away, but ended up coming

Senior Humberto Pacheco said graduating classes at other schools describe themselves as a "family," but they don't compare with Murtaugh.

That family-like feel, though, sometimes means classmates know too much about each other.

"In our Murtaugh school, everyone knows about everything," Pacheco

Murtaugh is one of the smallest south-central Idaho school districts, with about 200 total students. School buildings sit in a sparsely populated area surrounded by agricultural fields.

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Kimberly Slates Downtown Revitalization Meeting

KIMBERLY • Kimberly residents will get an opportunity next week to learn all about the city's proposed downtown revitalization project.

A town hall meeting is slated for 6:30 p.m. Tuesday at the Middle School Commons

Phase one of the project will involve the renovation of a three-block stretch of Main Street, including sidewalks, curb, on-street angle parking and landscaping. The improvements would bring the city into compliance with new American Disability Act requirements.

Kimberly has applied for a \$500,000 block grant from the Idaho Department of Commerce that would pay for most of the project. Total costs are estimated to be nearly \$800,000.

The resignation of City Administrator Polly Hulsey in early April hurt the city's chances of receiving the grant because she was the city's point of contact with the Department of Commerce. The city has begun interviewing candidates to replace her and is expected to hire someone

Kimberly officials still believe the city has a good chance of landing the grant. They're hopeful the town hall meeting will give them a chance to answer questions and reaffirm their commitment to the project.

"Our goal is to continue to bring the public up to speed, answer questions and try to dispel some concerns," Mayor Tracy Armstrong said Tuesday during a City Council meeting. "We'd like to move forward on the project."

Kimberly lost points on its grant application after Hulsey resigned, but the city has since submitted a letter for reconsideration.

J-U-B Engineers Inc. is handling the design and engineering work.

"The grant is not dead. There is still a good chance we can get it," J-U-B project manager Ivan McCracken told the council.

Parking is likely to be a major issue. Preliminary design plans include "bulb outs," or rounded sidewalk extensions, at the end of each block.

The bulb outs are intended to improve pedestrian safety, but they also reduce the total number of on-street parking spaces, a major concern for downtown shop owners.

A minimum of two handicapped parking spaces will also be required on each block to meet federal guidelines, further reducing the total number of parking spaces.

"We do have a parking issue," McCracken said. "There may be times when you can't park on the same block as your intended destination."

Library Expansion

Also on Tuesday, the council

directed city attorney William Hollifield to draw up a resolution that would designate the old train depot and one-time city hall building at 120 Madison St. W. as a city library. The council also agreed to a transfer of \$25,000 in city general funds to establish a dedicated building fund for the library. The library board wants to renovate and possibly expand the building.

Council members discussed at length whether the library board should be able to determine on its own how the funds are spent. Most agreed that the city should hold the purse strings.

If the library board had full discretion over the building funds, it might be less inclined to take advantage of available city resources, Councilman Brandon Hoobler suggested.

"I agree that the money needs to go to library renovations," he said. "However, I believe that there needs to be a little bit more (city) control."

They're Training Now for the Wildfires Ahead

JEROME • Its diesel engine straining, a U.S. Bureau of Land Management fire truck climbed a steep dirt road on Thursday.

It's fire-training season again, and BLM firefighters from around the state are in the Magic Valley honing their skills and learning new ones.

A total 15 wildfire engines carried 27 students and 15 teachers Thursday during the training in the Devil's Corral area of Jerome County. After three days of classroom work, the firefighters are in the field Thursday and

Seven stations made up the training course on Thursday. Firefighters ran through various scenarios including mobile attack exercises, hosing down an area with water, changing a flat tire and negotiating their vehicles over rough terrain.

"The training helps the crews fight fires more efficiently and safely" said BLM firefighter Mitch Silvester.

They may have a busy fire season ahead of them, as officials say south-central Idaho desert plants are already drying out. Moisture levels in plants considered potential wildfire fuel are low compared to 10-year averages.

"I'm a little nervous about this fire season," Silvester

Fire officials ask the public to do its part to prevent fires by being cautious with campfires and making sure vehicles are maintained before heading to outdoors.

Idaho Town Seeks to Lure Gun and Ammo Makers

POTLATCH • This small community in the forested, western foothills of the Rocky Mountains was created as a company town to house workers for the nation's largest white pine sawmill, and its tidy homes and straight, tree-lined streets are a testament to its planners.

But the town has slumbered since the Potlatch Lumber Co. mill closed in 1981, and was searching for an economic future when an ammunition maker decided last year to move its operations from the liberal Seattle area to this more conservative region.

The move by PNW Arms was like a signal flare to business and political leaders in the town of 800 people, who were in the process of trying to determine what industry would be best to pursue.

"We were in the middle of doing our marketing plan at the time and decided that firearms is the niche we would recommend," said Gary White of Kennewick, Wash., a business marketing consultant who is helping develop the town's pitch to gun makers.

Potlatch, they decided, would go from timber town to gun town. It would try to lure firearms and ammunition makers, and plans also called for hunting-themed housing and retail development.

"It will help draw some out-of-towners and out-ofstaters," Mayor David Brown said

Potlatch's efforts piggyback on a national trend in which firearms-friendly states are trying to pry gun and ammo makers out of the Midwest and Northeast, where some states have more restrictive gun laws.

The Idaho Department of Commerce is making firearms manufacturers a recruiting priority. The state recently passed a law that protects firearms makers from liability lawsuits or excessive

regulation, White said.

"Lots of states are antifirearms states," White said. "That is what Idaho is playing against, positioning itself as a firearms friendly state."

Firearms are a \$3.8 billion industry that employs 90,000 people in the United States. The industry includes household names like Remington, Winchester, Smith & Wesson and Colt, but also more than 1,000 smaller companies.

"There are a number of states in the South and out West that have pitched to have companies relocate or start businesses in their states," said Lawrence Keane, spokesman for the National Shooting Sports Foundation, the industry trade group.

South Dakota has had some success in luring companies, and states like Alabama, Montana, Idaho and Arizona have also rolled out the welcome mat, Keane said.

Many firearms companies have long been headquartered in states like Massachusetts and Connecticut, where the political climate has turned more hostile to firearms. Massachusetts, for example,

has passed laws limiting the number of guns people can buy. Several states have passed or proposed laws calling for their gun makers to "micro-stamp" handguns with a mark on the firing pin that would allow bullet casings to be identifiable by gun owner.

No such fears in Idaho, a conservative state where firearms are a daily part of many people's lives. "The regulatory environment in Idaho is friendly to guns and ammunition and we thought we could take this and run with it," said B.J. Swanson, head of economic development for Latah Coun-

Potlatch went public in April with its come-hither pitch to gun makers.

"We've had two nibbles already and we haven't even tried," Swanson said.

MEDIATION ORDERED IN IDAHO EXECUTION POLICY SUIT

BOISE • A federal judge has ordered mediation talks between Idaho prison officials and more than a dozen news organizations that are challenging a policy that limits public access to lethal injection executions

U.S. District Judge Edward J. Lodge handed down the order Thursday, two days after The Associated Press, the *Times-News* and 15 other news organizations filed a lawsuit seeking to force the Idaho Department of Correction to let witnesses view the execution process from start to finish.

The lawsuit is not intended to obstruct the state's June 12 scheduled execution of convicted murderer Richard Leavitt. Instead, it focuses on a narrow section of the agency's execution protocol.

Like most states with lethal injection, Idaho's policy bars witnesses from watching as a condemned inmate is brought into the chamber, execution strapped to the table and has IVs inserted into his or her arms. The news organizations say reporters must be able to view executions from start to finish so they can accurately report the events — and any complications that may emerge - to the public.

Lodge's order requires the parties to quickly begin nonbinding mediation on or before June 1 under the supervision of Magistrate Judge Candy Dale.

"Any opportunity to mediate a case is a positive development for both parties," said Chuck Brown, the Lewiston attorney representing the news groups. "It avoids some of the uncertainty of how a third party, in this case a judge, might rule in the future."

An IDOC spokesman says agency officials are still waiting to be served with the initial complaint filed Tuesday.

"When we are, we will take appropriate action," said spokesman Jeff Ray. The agency has defended its policy on grounds that keeping the first few steps private is essential to protecting the anonymity of the execution team. The agency also denied multiple requests by the news organizations to modify its protocol before the media turned to the federal courts.

Other plaintiffs joining the suit include the *Idaho Statesman*, *Lewiston Tribune*, *Moscow-Pullman Daily News*, *Spokesman-Review*, *Boise Weekly*, The Idaho Press Club and Idahoans for Openness in Government. The plaintiffs also include newspapers with Pioneer Newspapers, including the *Idaho State Journal* and *Idaho Press Tribune*.

The lawsuit relies heavily on a 2002 San Franciscobased federal appeals court ruling that found that witnesses should be allowed to view executions from the moment the condemned enters the death chamber until their final heartbeat.

Since the ruling, only two states under the court's nine-state jurisdiction are following it: California, where the case arose, and Nevada, which changed its policy after media challenged rules barring witnesses from viewing the entire process. Idaho, Arizona, Washington and Montana have all barred witnesses from the first portion of lethal injection executions.

Most states nationwide do the same. Of the 27 states that have lethal injection outside of the circuit's jurisdiction, only Ohio and Georgia allow witnesses to see the entire process.

The lawsuit comes at a time when questions have been raised about whether the lethal cocktail of drugs used in the procedure is effective and whether the execution staff is properly trained. Some death row inmates have challenged the constitutionality of lethal injection executions in court, contending that the insertion of the IVs can be easily botched, causing severe pain for the condemned.

Girl with Cancer Can't Walk at Graduation

BOISE • A Boise girl who has battled illness through high school and is four electives shy of graduating is being denied the opportunity to walk across the stage with her Timberline High School classmates at graduation.

KTVB-TV reports Haylee Winters plans to finish her credits over the summer, but school officials won't make an exception to its policy of not letting anyone short on credits to participate in the graduation ceremony.

Winters recently finished a year of intense chemotherapy for a cancerous brain tumor. Her mother, Jackee Winters, says the treatment shrunk the tumor but also made classwork difficult.

Boise School District spokesman Dan Hollar says the district notified the family in February of a plan to make sure Winters could graduate on time.

Graduation is May 30.

Thacker did not provide

any specifics on the impact to the Boise facility. The company is one of the biggest employers in the Treasure Valley, with nearly 4,000 workers. Executives said they plan

to cut jobs in reaction to the growing popularity of smartphones, the IPad and other mobile devices make it tougher on the personal computer market.

The streamlining represents HP's largest payroll purge in its 73-year history. The reductions will affect about 8 percent of HP's nearly 350,000 employees by the time the overhaul is completed in October 2014.

They have to complete 15 hours of volunteer work to be allowed to walk at their commencement ceremonies. The students also have been asked to pay for nearly \$1,000 in damages. No criminal charges have been filed.

Idaho National Laboratory Chief **Suggested Revising Nuke Deal**

BOISE • Two former Idaho governors are telling Gov. Butch Otter to stick to a 1995 agreement that requires the federal government to remove all nuclear waste from the Idaho National Laboratory in

the next 23 years. Otter responded Wednesday that he has always stood by the agreement.

In separate guest opinions for the Idaho Statesman, Democrat Cecil Andrus and Republican Phil Batt wrote that the agreement, upheld by voters in 1996 by more than 62 percent, should not be renegotiated.

Andrus said Sunday that INL and state government officials were "hatching a secret scheme" to push for a new agreement.

"I have no knowledge of (any scheme), but I can state that we would be foolish, indeed, to renegotiate the agreement and accept commercial spent fuel," Batt

INL is the nation's lead federal laboratory on nuclear en-

In February, Gov. Butch Otter created the Leadership In Nuclear Energy Commission to examine how the INL can continue its role in state and national economic growth and energy security.

The 13-member panel is chaired by Otter Commerce Department Director Jeff Sayer. When it met April 7, briefing papers by INL officials included a proposal to begin negotiations to revise the settlement to accept additional nuclear waste and to extend the deadline for all waste to leave

Andrus' guest opinion was based on that 2010 document, since obtained by the Idaho Statesman.

Document Now Obsolete

INL Director John Grossenbacher said it was an internal document he shared with staff to outline his thinking at the time and is now outdated.

It was never a formal proposal, he said, and was mistakenly included in the commission's papers this spring.

But the INL chief said he did present the idea of revising the settlement to Otter in 2010.

"He was appropriately skeptical and serious about this. He didn't stand up and cheer and say, 'Let's go do this;" Grossenbacher said

"Very mindful of the settlement agreement, he didn't decide anything or promise anything."

In a guest opinion he submitted Wednesday, Otter was clear that he isn't budg-

ing.
"I'll say this as plainly and as unequivocally as I can: Idaho will NOT be a repository for nuclear waste," Otter wrote. "There is no scheme - secret or otherwise - and I have stated repeatedly and publicly that Idaho will not be the nation's nuclear dumping ground."

Grossenbacher took issue with Andrus' characterization of his discussion as a "scheme" or conspiracy.

"The thoughts and ideas and proposals of the INL lab director do not constitute a scheme," Grossenbacher

More Waste?

In 2011, Otter ignored Andrus' opposition to a Department of Energy plan to trade about 880 pounds of federal waste with an equal amount of commercial waste that is used for research at the INL. But Batt backed up Otter and the DOE's interpretation that the 1995 agreement did allow such trades.

Grossenbacher's 2010 proposal called for Idaho to accept interim storage of 3,000 tons of "orphan" spent fuel from commercial reactors that have been shut down, such as the Trojan Nuclear Reactor west of Portland. But Grossenbacher said New Mexico already has expressed an interest in the spent fuel.

He said Idaho could create jobs and help solve the nuclear waste storage problems that arose when President Barack Obama decided not to place 70,000 tons of spent fuel in the Yucca Mountain facility in Nevada - and could do that without revising the Batt agreement. But it also could do more if Idahoans chose to make revisions.

"The people of the state of Idaho sustained my nuclear waste agreement by a wide margin," Batt wrote in Thursday's Statesman. "Any substantive changes should not be accepted without a similar percentage of Idahoans demanding it?

Broken **Promises?**

Former Atomic Energy Commission Chairwoman Dixie Lee Ray first promised to then-Gov. Andrus in 1972 that the federal government would remove buried radioactive waste from Idaho. The feds missed the first deadline in the late 1970s and the second one in 1988.

"We've been lied to and we've been cheated," Andrus told members of the Idaho Conservation League at a conference Saturday at Redfish Lake Lodge near Stanley.

Andrus closed Idaho to further waste shipments in 1988, sending the Idaho State Patrol to the border to enforce the ban. Batt allowed several shipments shortly after taking office in early

But amid a public outcry, he stopped the shipments until the DOE signed the landmark agreement, which included timetables for removing buried waste and spent fuel.

That deal meant commercial spent fuel was specifically banned from storage at the INL, with a few exceptions. If the federal government doesn't remove all of the waste from Idaho by 2035, it is required to pay the state \$60,000 a day.

Jamie Dimon's Deja Vu Debacle

ometimes it's hard to explain why we need strong financial regulation – especially in an era saturated with probusiness, pro-market propaganda. So we should always be grateful when someone makes the case for regulation more compelling and easier to understand. And this week, that means offering a special shout-out to two men: Jamie Dimon and Mitt Romney.

I'll come back shortly to the troubles at JPMorgan Chase, the bank Dimon runs. First, however, let me talk about Romney, whose remarks about those troubles were so off-point that they constitute a teachable moment.

Here's what the presumptive Republican presidential nominee said about JPMorgan's \$2 billion loss (which may actually have been \$3 billion, or \$5 billion, or more, but who's counting?): "This was a loss to shareholders and owners of JPMorgan and that's the way America works. Some people experienced a loss in this case because of a bad decision. By the way, there was someone who made a gain." What's wrong with this statement? Well, suppose that someone - say, Jimmy Stewart, in the movie "It's a Wonderful Life" - runs a bank that takes in deposits and invests the money in various ways. And suppose that one of those investments is a risky bet on some complex financial instrument, with Mr. Potter, the evil pluto crat, on the other side.

If Jimmy Stewart's bet pays off, we're in Romneyworld: He's made money, Mr. Potter has lost money, and that's that. But suppose Jimmy Stewart loses his bet. If the bet was big enough, he no longer has enough assets to pay off his depositors. His bank collapses, probably in a chaotic bank run that takes down the whole town's economy as collateral damage. Mr. Potter makes money on the deal, but so what?

The point is that it's not OK for banks to take the kinds of risks that are acceptable for individuals, because when banks take on $too\, much\, risk\, they\, put\, the$ whole economy in jeopardy unless they can count on being bailed out. And the prospect of such bailouts, of course, only strengthens the case that banks shouldn't be allowed to run wild, since they are in effect gambling with taxpayers' money. Incidentally, how is it possible that Romney doesn't understand all of this? His whole candidacy is based on the claim that his experience at extracting money from troubled businesses means that he'll know how to run the economy - yet whenever he talks about economic policy, he comes across as



completely clueless. Anyway, it goes without saying that Jamie Dimon is no Jimmy Stewart. But he has, in a way, been playing Jimmy Stewart on TV, posing as a responsible banker who knows how to manage risk and therefore the point man in Wall Street's fight to block any tightening of regulations despite the immense damage deregulated banks have already inflicted on our economy. Trust us, Dimon has in effect been saying, we've got this covered and it won't happen again. Now the truth is coming out. That multibillion-dollar loss wasn't an isolated event; it was an accident waiting to happen. For even as Dimon was giving speeches about responsible banking, his own institution was heaping on the risk.

"The unit at the center of JPMorgan's \$2 billion trading loss," reports The Financial Times, "has built up positions totaling more than \$100 billion in asset-backed securities and structured products - the complex, risky bonds at the center of the financial crisis in 2008. These holdings are in addition to those in credit derivatives which led to the losses."And what was going on as these positions were being accumulated? According to a fascinating report in Sunday's Times, the reality behind JPMorgan's facade of competence was a scene all too reminiscent of the behavior that brought down firms like AIG in 2008: arrogant executives shouting down anyone who tried to question their activities, top management that didn't ask questions as long as the money kept rolling in. It really is deja vu all over again.

The point, again, is that an institution like JPMorgan – a too-big-to-fail bank, not to mention a bank whose deposits are already guaranteed by U.S. taxpayers – shouldn't be engaged in this kind of speculative investment at all. And that's why we need a return to much stronger financial regulation, stronger even than the Dodd-Frank regulations passed back in 2010.

Will we get that kind of regulation? Not if Romney wins, obviously; he wants to repeal Dodd-Frank, and in general he has made it clear that he would do everything in his power to set us up for another financial crisis. Even if President Barack Obama is re-elected, getting the kind of regulation we need will be an uphill struggle. But as Dimon's debacle has just demonstrated, that struggle remains as necessary as ever.



2 Killed in Separate Wyo. Crashes

Council to **Assist Native American Farmers**

WASHINGTON • Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack has named the members of a council created in a 2010 settlement to ensure Native American farmers and ranchers have access to Department of Agriculture programs.

The Council for Native American Farming and Ranching is part of the \$680 million Keepseagle lawsuit settlement. The 1999 lawsuit was named after George and Marilyn Keepseagle of Fort Yates, N.D. It contended Indian farmers and ranchers were denied USDA loans over several decades.

The council will suggest changes to Farm Service Agency regulations and make proposals to improve Native American participation in the loan program and other USDA programs. The 16-member council reports to the secretary and is made up of Native Americans and four USDA officials. Its first meeting is this summer.

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Closed Idaho Silver Mine to Start Rehiring in July

WALLACE • A northern Idaho silver mine that was shut down after a series of accidents last year, including the deaths of two workers, will start rehiring in July and should have a full workforce by the end of the year, Hecla Mining Co. Chief Executive Officer Phil Baker said Thursday.

The underground Lucky Friday Mine – one of the nation's deepest - was ordered closed in January for safety improvements.

Baker said the work should be finished by year's end, allowing the mine to resume production. More than 110 of the mine's 250 workers were laid off when it closed.

"We expect all of our positions to be filled by the end of the year," Baker said.

Baker also said at Hecla's annual shareholders meeting that the company is studying the reopening of the closed Star Morning Mine in Idaho's Silver Valley, which would greatly increase employment and silver production.

Hecla is the nation's largest primary silver producer.

Federal safety inspectors ordered the Lucky Friday Mine closed after they determined sand and concrete material that had leaked from a pipe into a mine shaft over the years needed to be

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The material is in the mile-deep Silver Shaft, the mine's main access shaft, and workers are essentially power washing the material from its walls.

The closure prompted Hecla to reduce its estimated silver production for 2012 from more than 9 million ounces to about 7 million ounces, all from its remaining Green's Creek mine in Alaska.

Lucky Friday miners average about \$100,000 per year in pay and benefits in a depressed region where there are few other job options.

The mine had been shuttered since mid-December, when a rock burst injured seven miners. The burst was the latest in a string of accidents at the mine, which is

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about 50 miles east of Coeur d'Alene, where the company is based.

Miner Brandon Lloyd Gray, 26, was buried in rubble while trying to dislodge jammed rock on Nov. 17, and died two days later. On April 15, miner Larry "Pete" Marek was crushed when his work area collapsed. Federal inspectors found company safety failures led to his

Before last year, the mine had gone 25 years without a fatality.

The two dead miners were

remembered before Thursday's meeting.

"This has hit Hecla very hard," Baker said. "We are determined not to let it happen again?'



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


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
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Senate Committee Cuts Pakistan Aid over Conviction

WASHINGTON • A Senate panel expressed its outrage Thursday over Pakistan's conviction of a doctor who helped the United States track down Osama bin Laden, voting to cut aid to Islamabad by 33 million - 1 million forevery year of the physician's 33-year sentence for high treason.

The punitive move came on top of deep reductions the **Appropriations Committee** already had made to President Barack Obama's budget request for Pakistan, a reflection of the growing congressional anger over its cooperation in combatting terrorism. The overall foreign aid budget for next year had slashed more than half of the pro-

posed assistance and threatened further reductions if Islamabad failed to open overland supply routes to U.S.-led NATO forces in Afghanistan.

Pushing aside any diplomatic talk, Republicans and Democrats criticized Pakistan a day after the conviction in Pakistan of Shakil Afridi. The doctor ran a vaccination program for the CIA to collect DNA and verify bin Laden's presence at the compound in Abbottabad where U.S. commandos found and killed the al-Qaida leader in May 2011.

"We need Pakistan, Pakistan needs us, but we don't need Pakistan double-dealing and not seeing the justice in bringing Osama bin Laden to an end," said Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., who pushed for the additional cut in aid.

He called Pakistan "a

schizophrenic ally," helping the United States at one turn, but then aiding the Haqqani network which has claimed responsibility for several attacks on Americans. The group also has ties to al-Qaida and the Taliban.

"It's Alice in Wonderland at best," said Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt. "If this is cooperation, I'd hate like hell to see opposition."

One of the most forceful statements came from Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., who also serves as the chairwoman of the Senate Intelligence Committee. She pointed out that Pakistan has suffered at the hands of terrorists yet misconstrued what is treason in convicting Afridi. She also insisted that Afridi was not a spy.

"This conviction says to me

that al-Qaida is viewed by the court to be Pakistan," said Feinstein, who said it made her rethink U.S. assistance.

The Appropriations Committee approved Graham's amendment to cut the assistance by \$33 million on a 30-0 vote. The full Senate will vote on the overall bill, possibly this summer.

At the State Department, Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton said the United States believes Afridi should be released.

"His help was instrumental in taking down one of the world's most notorious murderers that was clearly in Pakistan's interest as well as ours and the rest of the world," Clinton told reporters, adding that the United States will continue to press the issue with Islamabad.

Man Arrested in 1979 Disappearance of NYC Boy Patz

NEW YORK • A former convenience store worker confessed to luring 6year-old Etan Patz from his school bus stop in 1979 and choking him to death in a basement, police said Thursday, ending a three-decades long investigation into one of the nation's most baffling missing-children

Pedro Hernandez, 51, of Maple Shade, N.J., was arrested on a murder charge after he told police he promised the boy a soda, took him to his store – just blocks from Etan's lower Manhattan home - and killed him there, Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly said.

Hernandez told police he put Etan's body in some trash about a block from the store, Kelly said, where it's possible it was picked up by sanitation

No body has been recovered, and Kelly said it's possible the remains would never be found.

Hernandez was questioned by police for more than three hours after he was picked up in New Jersey Wednesday, and gave police a signed confession, Kelly said. His motive was not

yet clear. It's not clear if he had an attorney; an arraignment was expected sometime Friday. No one answered the door at Hernandez' New Jersey home Thursday night.

"He was remorseful, and I think the detectives thought that it was a feeling of relief on his part'' to confess, Kelly said. "We believe that this is the individual responsible for the crime."

The arrest is the first ever in the decades-old case that gave rise to the missing-children's movement and ushered in an era of anxiety about leaving children unsupervised. Etan's photo was one of the first of a missing child to appear on a milk carton. The anniversary of Etan's disappearance, which is Friday, was named National Missing Children's Day by presidential proclamation in 1983.

Nuclear Talks with Iran Set to Resume Next Month

BAGHDAD • Iran and six world powers wrapped up talks Thursday still far apart over how to oversee Tehran's atomic program, but with resolve to keep dialogue going as an alternative to possible military action.

Envoys said they will meet again next month in Moscow after negotiations stretched out for extra hours and a sandstorm shut the airport in Iraq's capital. But the two sides agreed on little else during two dramatic days of discussions that underscored the serious challenges of reaching accords between Iran and the West.

"It is clear that we both want to make progress, and that there is some common ground," European Union foreign policy chief Catherine Ashton, who is formally leading the talks, told reporters.

"However, significant differences remain. Nonetheless, we do agree on the need for further discussion to expand that common ground?'

Saeed Jalili, Iran's top nuclear negotiator, offered a lukewarm assessment of what the negotiations achieved, in light of European and American refusal to lift tough sanctions as Tehran had hoped.

"The result of the talks was that we were able to get more familiar with the views of each other," Jalili said at a press conference after Ashton

The Baghdad discussions began with hopes for progress before each side accused the other of failing to offer meaningful, realistic proposals. More tellingly, they also showed that U.S. diplomats and others are pressing neither for quick deals nor for ultimatums that could derail the sensitive

Doctors Say Kids **Eating** Detergent **Packs**

DALLAS • Miniature laundry detergent packets arrived on store shelves in recent months as an alternative to bulky bottles and messy spills. But doctors across the country say children are confusing the tiny, brightly colored packets with candy and swallowing them.

Nearly 250 cases have been reported this year to poison control centers. Though they remain a tiny fraction of the thousands of poisoning calls received every year, doctors are concerned. The symptoms they see in connection with ingesting the packets – such as nausea and breathing problems - are more severe than typical detergent poisoning. No deaths have been reported.

As his campaign evaluates potential running mates, Republicans with a possible shot at the No. 2 spot on the presidential ticket are starting to engage in unofficial public tryouts for the traditional vice presidential role of attack dog.

Democratic President Barack Obama is "the most ill-prepared person to assume the presidency in my lifetime," New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie declared in a speech in Kentucky this week. Florida Sen. Marco Rubio told South Carolina Republicans that there hasn't been such a "divisive figure in modern American history" as Obama.

Wisconsin Rep. Paul Ryan, speaking Tuesday at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library — it's a favorite venue for Republicans seeking more attention – said Obama "wants to take us further in the wrong direction." In an Alabama appearance this month, Louisiana Gov. Bobby Jindal called Obama "the most incompetent president

since Jimmy Carter."

Not that any of them - or any of the others who may have landed a spot on Romney's list — are talking about becoming vice president. Nor are any of them acknowledging that they're trying out for the role or saying the Romney campaign has asked them to do so. Top Romney aides are sworn to secrecy, as are potential running mates and their staffs – an example of the Romney campaign's closely controlled, no-leaks culture.

But their high-profile appearances come more than a month after Romney assumed, for all practical purposes, leadership of the Republican Party. His vice presidential search is well under way, with his Boston headquarters engaged in a secretive process of weighing the pros and cons of each poten-

With three months to go until Republican National Convention, his campaign has little time to waste as it meticulously prepares the presumptive Republican nominee to make one of his most important decisions. With it will come implications not just for whether he'll win the White House but how he

would govern. Knowledge of the process is limited to a few of Romney's highest-level aides. Information is on a "need-to-know" basis – and as far as those aides are concerned, there are few people inside the Boston headquarters at 585 Commercial St. who need to know, let alone reporters and other outsiders. The Republicans who discussed the vice presidential selection process did so on the condition of anonymity because the campaign has barred staff from talking about the selection in

public. The process is so secret because it's so sensitive. A vice presidential vetting is possibly the most intense background check in politics. Everything is fair game: voting records and the political past, to be sure, but also personal issues.

"You're sitting down with someone and asked if they've ever had a marital problem, if their spouse has ever cheated on them, if they've ever sought mental health counseling — that's just the beginning," said Sara Fagen, who worked for President George W. Bush and for Romney's 2008 presidential campaign.

U.S. Poised to Vet Possible Arms for Syrian Rebels

WASHINGTON • As one diplomatic effort after another fails to end more than a year of brutal violence in Syria, the Obama administration is preparing a plan that would essentially give U.S. nods of approval to arms transfers from Arab nations to some Syrian opposition fighters.

The effort, U.S. officials told The Associated Press, would vet members of the Free Syrian Army and other groups to determine whether they are suitable recipients of munitions to fight the Assad government and to ensure that weapons don't wind up in the hands of al-Qaida-linked terrorists or other extremist groups such as Hezbollah that could target Israel.

The plan, which has not yet been finalized, reflects U.S. frustration that none of the previous efforts including diplomatic rhetoric from the United Nations and the multinational Friends of Syria group, and special envoy Kofi Annan's plan for a cease-fire – has even begun to nudge President Bashar al-Assad from power. The vetting would be the first tiny step the U.S. has made toward ensuring that the Syrian opposition uses the weapons to fight Assad and not to turn it into a full sectarian conflict. While some intelligence

analysts worry that there may be no suitable recipients of lethal aid in the Syria conflict, the vetting plan has arisen as the least objectionable idea in a complicated situation. U.S. officials, most of

whom spoke on condition of anonymity because of the sensitive nature of the subject, stressed that the United States, which is already providing non-lethal aid to Syria's political opposition, is not supplying military assistance to Assad's foes.

The change means New Orleans would become the largest metro area in the nation without a daily newspaper in the digital

changes announced Thursday were combined with similar moves at three major Alabama daily newspapers also owned by the Newhouse family group's Advance Publications. The Birmingham News, the Press-Register in Mobile and The Huntsville Times will switch to publishing three days a week as part of a new focus on online news. At all four papers, there will be unspecified staff cuts. All four papers will continue to publish continuously on their websites, and online access will remain

Newspapers struggled in recent years as consumers increasingly get their news online. Print advertising declined as the economy went into recession, and newspapers have yet to learn how to make online advertising as profitable as its printed counterpart.

"For us, this isn't about print versus digital, this is about creating a very successful multi-platform media company that addresses the everchanging needs of our readers, our online users and our advertisers," said Advance Publications' president of local digital strategy, Randy Siegel, in an interview with The Associated Press. "This change is not easy, but it's essential for us to remain relevant."

AUCTION OF VIAL THAT HELD REAGAN'S BLOOD IS CALLED OFF

The controversial auction of a vial that contained President Ronald Reagan's blood has been halted, and the valuable glass tube is being donated to former president's foundation.

In a statement issued Thursday morning, the executive director of the Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation said he was pleased by the outcome. "We are grateful to the current custodian of the vial for this generous donation to the Foundation, ensuring President Reagan's blood remains out of public hands," said John Heubusch, the foundation's director.

The vial in question contained residue of blood drawn from Reagan while he recovered from a near-fatal gunshot wound in 1981. It was being sold by an online auction house based on the island of Guernsey, an autonomous British protectorate, in the English Channel. With only hours left in the auction, the vial had garnered bids exceeding \$30,000.

The provenance of the vial can be traced back to just days after Reagan was shot as he left the Washington Hilton Hotel on March 30, 1981, and was taken to George Washington University Hospital, where he underwent life-saving surgery.

The president was treated there for 13 days. During that stay, a vial of blood was drawn to test for lead and sent to a laboratory in Columbia, Md. A laboratory worker was given permission to keep the old vial and its paperwork, according to a statement by PFC Auctions, which was selling the items. When she died, her son sold the vial at a U.S. auction in February for \$3,550 to a collector of presidential memorabilia, the auction site said in a statement.

Private Supply Ship Flies by Space Station in Test

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. •

The world's first private supply ship flew tantalizingly close to the International Space Station on Thursday, acing a critical test in advance of the actual docking.

The unmanned SpaceX Dragon capsule flew within 11/2 miles of the orbiting lab as it performed a practice lap and checkout of its communication and navigation sys-

Officials at NASA and the SpaceX company declared the rendezvous a success and said the historic linkup is on track for Friday.

It is the first U.S. vessel to visit the space station since NASA's shuttles retired last summer - and the first private spacecraft to ever attempt a delivery. The Dragon is carrying 1,000 pounds of provisions.

Thursday's accomplish-

ment "is a big confidence boost. Everyone's very excited," said SpaceX mission director John Couluris. After working all night and into the wee hours, he urged his team to go home and rest up for Friday. "It's exciting to be an American and part of putting American spacecraft into orbit, and we're very proud right now."

NASA flight director Holly Ridings said the mood is upbeat on her side as well, but noted "there's still a lot of really new things that the teams need to perform and the vehicles, frankly, need to perform" on Friday.

"This is still definitely a demonstration flight," she said at a news briefing.

As the pre-dawn hours of Thursday unfolded, the space station astronauts struggled with bad computer monitors and camera trouble as the Dragon zoomed toward them, but the problem did not hold up the operation. Indeed, all of the tests appeared to go well.

The astronauts successfully turned on Dragon's strobe light by remote control, but could not see it because of the sun glare and distance of several miles. The Dragon finally popped into camera view about 10 minutes later, appearing as a bright speck of light against the blackness of space, near the Earth's blue horizon. The two solar wings were clearly visible as the Dragon drew

"Can nicely see the vehicle," Dutch spaceman Andre Kuipers said.

SpaceX's near-term objective is to help stockpile the space station, joining Russia, Europe and Japan in resupply duties. In three or four more years, however, the company run by the billionaire who co-founded PayPal, Elon Musk, hopes to be launching station astronauts.

Israel Steps Up Security Ties with China

JERUSALEM • After a prolonged chill, security ties between Israel and China are warming up.

With Israel offering much-needed technical expertise and China representing a huge new market and influential voice in the international debate over Iran's nuclear program, the two nations have stepped up military cooperation as they patch up a rift caused by a pair of failed arms deals scuttled by the U.S.

The improved ties have been highlighted by this week's visit to Beijing by Israel's military chief and a training mission to Israel by the Chinese paramilitary force that, among other things, polices the restive Tibetan and Muslim Uighur regions. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu is expected to travel to China in the coming weeks.

After their meeting Monday, both China's chief of staff, Gen. Chen Bingde, and his Israeli counterpart, Lt. Gen. Benny Gantz, hailed the growing ties and held out possibility of military even closer cooperation.

Brotherhood Claims Lead as Egypt Vote Count Begins

CAIRO • The Muslim Brotherhood quickly staked a claim Thursday for its candidate to advance to a runoff vote, saying its exit polls showed him leading in Egypt's landmark presidential election to succeed ousted leader Hosni Mubarak.

As vote-counting began, exit polls by several Arab television stations also suggested the Brotherhood's Mohammed Morsi was ahead of the pack of 13 candidates. The reliability of the various exit surveys was not known, and a few hours after the end of two days of voting, only a tiny percentage of ballots had been counted

But the swiftness of the Brotherhood's claim showed its eagerness to plant its flag and establish in the public eye that Morsi had at least won entry into a second round vote. There are five prominent candidates, but none is expected to win outright in the first round. A run-off between the two leading contenders would be held June 16-17.

The first truly competitive presidential election in Egypt's history turned into a heated battle between Islamist candidates and secufigures rooted in Mubarak's old regime. The most polarizing figures in the race were Morsi and former air force commander and former prime minister Ahmed Shafiq, a veteran of Mubarak's rule.

The Brotherhood is hoping for a presidential victory to seal its political domination of Egypt, which would be a dramatic turnaround from the decades it was repressed under Mubarak. It already holds nearly half of parliament after victories in elections late last year. The group has promised a

"renaissance" of Egypt, not only reforming Mubarakera corruption and reviving decrepit infrastructure, but also bringing a greater degree of rule by Islamic law. That prospect has alarmed more moderate Muslims, secular Egyptians and the Christian minority, who all fear restrictions on civil rights and worry that the Brotherhood shows similar domineering tendencies as





Ex-Red Sox Pitcher's R.I. Gaming Firm Lays Off Staff

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) • Former Boston Red Sox pitcher Curt Schilling's faltering Rhode Island video game company laid off its entire staff Thursday.

An email sent by the 38 Studios company to workers and obtained by The Associated Press says they were notified of the "non-voluntary and non-disciplinary" layoffs on Thursday.

38 Studios moved from Massachusetts in 2010 after Rhode Island offered a \$75 million loan guarantee officials said would bring hundreds of jobs and millions of dollars of tax revenue. The company was more than two weeks late this month on a \$1.1 million payment to the state economic development agency. State officials said the company wasn't able to make its payroll.

Weekly U.S. Jobless Aid Applications Dip to 370,000

WASHINGTON • The number of people seeking unemployment benefits changed little last week, signaling modest job growth.

The Labor Department said Thursday that weekly applications for benefits dipped by 2,000 to a seasonally adjusted 370,000.

Applications have leveled off this month after declining from April's fivemonth high of 392,000. The four-week average, a less volatile measure, has also dropped - it was 370,000 last week.

The lower level indicates hiring could pick up in May from April's sluggish pace. When applications drop below 375,000 a week, it typically suggests hiring is strong enough to lower the unemployment rate.

Ian Shepherdson, an economist at High Frequency Economics, said applications should fall soon given that some recent data indicate the economy is improving.

"We think it is just a matter of time .. before claims start to drop back down again," he said in a note to clients.

Economists forecast employers have added 160,000 jobs this month. That's above April's gains but below the pace set this winter. The government will report next Friday on May job growth.

Some companies are launching mass layoffs. Hewlett-Packard Co.'s chief executive, Meg Whitman, said Wednesday that the company will cut 27,000 jobs, or 8 percent of its work force, over the next two years.

The unemployment rate has fallen from 9.1 percent in August to 8.1 percent last month.

Part of the reason for the drop is that employers have added a million jobs over the past five months. But it has also declined because some people gave up looking for work. The government only counts people as unemployed if they are actively looking for a job.

U.S. Durable Goods Orders Up 0.2 Percent in April

WASHINGTON • Orders for longlasting factory goods edged up slightly in April. But a measure of tracks business investment spending fell for a second straight month.

Durable goods orders increased 0.2 percent last month after a 3.7 percent decline in March, the Commerce Department said Thursday. Gains in volatile commercial aircraft orders and more demand for autos and parts drove the modest increase.

So-called core capital goods orders, which are considered a proxy for business investment plans, fell 1.9 percent in April after a 2.2 percent decline in March. Demand for computers and electronics products and heavy machinery fell.

Durable goods are items expected to last at least three years. Orders rose in April to \$215.5 billion, up 52.5 percent from their recession low hit in the spring of 2009. Orders are still 11.6 percent below their peak in December 2007.

The decline in core capital goods could suggest that second-quarter growth is off to a slow start. Still, orders tend to fluctuate sharply from month to month.

Many economists approached Thursday's report cautiously. They noted that the findings conflicted with two other reports that suggest factory activity and production grew last month.

The Institute for Supply Management said factory activity grew in April at the fastest pace in 10 months. The group's closely watched manufacturing index showed strength in new orders, production and hiring.

And the Federal Reserve reported that U.S. factory output rose 0.6 percent in April. Half of that increase reflected a big jump in production of motor vehicles and parts.

Ian Shepherdson, chief U.S. economist at High Frequency Economics, said that the weakness could be the result of lingering effect of the expiration of favorable business investment tax breaks at the end of last year.

"This is disappointing, but given the volatility of the data and the strength of the ISM new orders in manufacturing, not disastrous," Shepherdson said.

Manufacturing has been a leading source of growth and jobs since the recession ended. Economists believe that trend will continue.

For April, orders for transportation goods rose 2.1 percent, led by a 7.2 percent increase in demand for commercial aircraft. This volatile category had plunged 46.6 percent in March.

Orders for autos and auto parts rose 5.6 percent, reflecting the continued strong demand automakers are seeing.

U.S. 30-year Mortgage Rate Falls to Record 3.78 Percent

WASHINGTON • The average U.S. rate for the 30-year fixed mortgage fell to a record low for a fourth straight week. Cheap mortgages have helped boost home sales modestly this

Mortgage buyer Freddie Mac said Thursday that the rate on the 30-year loan dipped to 3.78 percent. That's down from 3.79 percent last week and the lowest since long-term mortgages

began in the 1950s. The average rate on 15-year fixed mortgage, a popular option for refinancing, held steady at 3.04, matching the record low hit last week.

The average rate on the 30-year loan has been below 4 percent since early December. Lower rates are a key reason the housing industry is flashing signs of a recovery five years after the bubble burst.

The focus on Hernandez came after other leads arose and stalled, at one point taking investigators as far as Israel tracking reported sightings of the

For most of the past decade, the investigation focused on Jose Ramos, a convicted child molester now in prison in Pennsylvania. He had been dating Etan's baby sitter. In 2000, authorities dug up Ramos' former basement in lower Manhattan, but nothing turned up.



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

Both low-growing perennials and perennial shrubs do just as well, if not better, planted in the shade of a building or taller growing, sun-loving plants. Every gardener contends with different levels of sunlight, and there is no reason why the shade areas have to be less spectacular than those with the brightest sun.

producing evergreen leaves that grow up to 2 inches long. The violet-blue flowers measure about 1 inch across and grow on stems from 4 to 8 inches tall from spring through summer. Plant common periwinkle in full shade in USDA Hardiness Zones 8 and 9 and in shade or sun in other areas. The plant will grow fastest in a moist soil and is hardy in Zones 4 through 9.

Common Periwinkle

Common periwinkle (Vinca minor) is also known as creeping myrtle and lesser periwinkle and is a member of the dogbane family. The plant is a fast growing vine that grows along the ground



Lenten Rose

Lenten rose (Helleborus orientalis) is a member of the buttercup family. The plant is an evergreen in Zones 6 to 9, and deciduous further north, that grows from 16 to 20 inches tall and produces dark green leaves that grow up to 18 inches long and 16 inches wide. The white, green-white, pink, rose or purple flowers resemble a single rose, measure 2 to 3 inches across, grow in clusters and bloom in the winter or very early spring. Plant lenten rose in full or light shade and a soil that is moist and well drained. The plant is hardy in Zones 4 through 9.

When students join drama classes they expect it will be all about acting, Haycock said.



But that doesn't preclude ARTprojectA.com from joining in on the social aspects of Ketchum's Gallery Walk. Founders Barbi Reed and Claudia Aulum are showing some of the art they have for sale by local artists in a pop-up gallery established just for Saturday night's free Gallery Walk.

Art lovers who stroll the streets of Ketchum that evening will be able to meet Kirk Anderson, Kathryn Mc-Neal, Kary Kjesbo, Lisa Holley and Kim Howard and see their art from 5 to 8:30 p.m. at Starbucks, at Sun Valley Road and East Avenue.

"This is a way for us to advertise our business for all the people who will be in town that weekend," said website spokesman Carter Hedberg. "And Starbucks will have a wine tasting and hors d'oeuvres to show that it's much more than just coffee."

The art website offers consumers the confidence that they're getting good art that has been curated at affordable prices, Hedberg said. Barbi Reed has more than 30 years in the art business - and access to art that others wouldn't be able to

The website currently offers more than 500 pieces from artists all over the world, including a photographer it just landed from the Philippines and a printmaker from England.

"The website gives Magic Valley residents the chance to shop from their home for art that might not be available in the Magic Valley," Hedberg said. "We also offer education about buying art. And every time someone makes a purchase they have a choice of donating part of our proceeds to nonprofit organizations dealing with such causes as the environment, education, literacy and

One exhibit that Magic Valley residents will find of particular interest during Saturday's Gallery Walk is "Shoshone Falls: 3 Perspectives" at the Sun Valley Center for the Arts, Fifth and Washington streets.

Peter deLory - a former director of the center's pho-

tography program who has photographed waterfalls in national parks, in cities and along interstates - will talk at 6 p.m. about what motivated him to photograph the Northwest's iconic waterfalls, including Shoshone

The Sun Valley Center's artistic director, Kristin Poole, was inspired to create the exhibition by one The Smithsonian had on Tim O'-Sullivan, who took an iconic photograph of Shoshone Falls in 1874. The center's exhibit includes photos of the falls in its different seasons and in 2002, when almost no water was flowing over it.

"My favorite part is the paper installation by Wade Kavanaugh and Stephen Nguyen. Even though it's not a literal representation, it enables you to feel as if you're enclosed in this very textural environment with light coming through at different angles," the center's Courtnev Gilbert said. "We saw the falls in April when it was really fantastic. Even though it has been built up and dammed, it remains beautiful."

Twin Falls native John Horejs, who now lives near Kimberly, will have new paintings at the Kneeland Gallery, 271 First Ave. N. in Ketchum, for Saturday's Gallery Walk, along with other local painters such as Burley artist Robert Moore, Ketchum artist Lori McNee and Hailey painter Debbie Edgers-Sturges.

Horejs paints his big, splotchy wildflowers and his landscapes on signature 40by-50-inch and larger handmade box canvases with no frames.

"To me, simplicity is elegance," said Horejs, who uses just two brushes and seven colors.

It's a formula that works, said Kneeland Gallery director Carey Molter: "From these basic hues he creates a rich kaleidoscope of color on his canvas that has become his trademark over the years."





Swilling a 6-2 guard from the College of Southern Idaho



Recipe to Make IndyCar Relevant Beyond 500

INDIANAPOLIS • James Hinchcliffe can't understand it.

In this sports-crazed nation, there are skilled athletes who willingly get behind the wheel of exoticlooking race cars and risk their lives at more than 200 mph, yet the interest level in what they're doing 364 days out of the year can be measured on a scale that starts at Zero, goes up to Negligible and roughly peaks out at Where's Danica.

"IndyCar is the best-kept secret in sports," Hinchcliffe moaned Thursday from the infield at Indianapolis Motor Speedway. "It's infuriating."

For a few hours Sunday, he and 32 other drivers will get a sense of what it's like to be part of an actual, big-time sport. The stands will be (mostly) filled with real, live people, hundreds of thousands of them, in fact. The television ratings will be measured in whole numbers instead of fractions. And the one who crosses the line first at the Indy 500 will get a bit of the Kardashian treatment — or at least hear his or her name uttered on SportsCenter.

Then comes Monday, when IndyCar racing slinks back to a not-so-appealing club, the one it shares with other fading sports genres. The America's Cup. Baseball's All-Star game. The Penn Relays. Heavyweight title fights. The Cotton Bowl. You know, games and events that fans once paid attention to, but are now on a path carved out by the dodo bird.

"If people would just come to a race," pleaded Hinchcliffe, who might very well be on his way to stardom if only he could dribble a basketball or throw a football as well as he drives a high-powered machine. "It's such a cool product."

To be truly cool, there's got to be some people who care. (Sit down, gearheads, we're not talking to you.) For IndyCar to regain anything resembling the gravitas it had during that glorious era when icons such as A.J. Foyt and Mario Andretti reigned over the Brickyard, there must be some serious changes.

So, we went to the ones who have more of a vested interest than anyone else – the drivers themselves. All 33 of them were available for a couple of hours Thursday,

the perfect time to get their take on curing the ills of IndyCar before the sport flatlines altogether.

The ideas ranged from pie-in-the-sky (several suggested putting all the races on national TV, which Indy-Car would surely agree to if

slightly slower speeds than the clunky relics they replaced. While NASCAR has always been about rubbin3 and racin', Indy was built on going faster than ever before.



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

Today's deal contains points of interest both for defenders and for declarer

Look at all four hands. Can South make six hearts on the lead of the spade jack?

If South ruffs the opening lead and plays ace and another club, East must ruff his partner's winner and play a trump, restricting South to 11 tricks. If East hoards his trump, not ruffing his partner's winner, then the 4-0 break comes to declarer's rescue. He can simply arrange to ruff his two club losers in dummy and come to 12 tricks painlessly.

Of course, declarer does not know in advance about the bad trump break, but he must plan to counter this line of defense. What he must do at trick two is play the diamond king, then cash the diamond ace, and ruff a diamond

He has now established the diamonds as a threat against East. When he now plays ace and another club, East again must ruff and play a trump, or South reverts to the crossruff line. The difference is that when South wins the trump in dummy and finds the bad break, East is left with only two trumps instead of

South simply plays a winning diamond from the dummy. East must ruff again, but now a second heart to dummy draws East's last trump and provides access to dummy for the last time. So both of declarer's club losers can be discarded on dummy's two remaining diamond winners.

Today's Highlight: On May 25, 1787, the Constitutional Convention began at the Pennsylvania State House (Independence Hall) in Philadelphia after enough delegates had shown up for a quorum. (The Convention ended four months later with the delegates adopting the Constitution of the United

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

In 1895, playwright Oscar Wilde was convicted of a morals charge in London; he was sentenced to two years in prison.

In 1916, the Chicago Tribune published an interview with Henry Ford in which the automobile industrialist was quoted as saying, "History is more or less bunk. It's tradition. We don't want tradition. We want to live in the present and the only history that is worth a tinker's dam is the history we make today."

In 1935, Babe Ruth hit the 714th and final homerun of his career, for the Boston Braves, in a game against the Pittsburgh Pirates.

In 1942, U.S. Army Lt. Gen. Joseph Stilwell, frustrated over being driven out of Burma by Japanese troops during World War II, bluntly told reporters in Delhi, India: "I claim we got a

hell of a beating." In 1946, Transjordan (now Jordan) became a kingdom as it proclaimed its new

monarch, Abdullah I. In 1961, President John F. Kennedy told Congress: "Ibelieve that this nation should commit itself to achieving the goal, before this decade is out, of landing a man on the moon and returning him safely to the

earth." In 1968, the Gateway Arch in St. Louis was dedicated by President Hubert Humphrey and Interior Secre-

tary Stewart Udall.

In 1981, daredevil Dan Goodwin, wearing a Spiderman costume, scaled the outside of Chicago's Sears Tower in $7^{1/2}$ hours.

In 1986, an estimated 7 million Americans participated in "Hands Across America" to raise money for the nation's hungry and homeless.

In 1992, Jay Leno made his ebut as host of NRC's "Tonight Show," succeeding Johnny Carson.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush, during a visit to St. Petersburg, joined Russian President Vladimir Putin in pressuring Pakistan's president to curb cross-border violence in Kashmir and ease tensions with neighboring India.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush signed a bill to pay for military operations in Iraq that did not contain a timetable for troop withdrawals. Radical Shiite cleric Muqtada al-Sadr resurfaced after nearly four months in hiding and demanded U.S. troops leave Iraq. Atlanta attorney Andrew Speaker, infected with drug-resistant tuberculosis, was quarantined by the federal government after returning from his European wedding and honeymoon. (It turned out Speaker had a form of TB less severe than what authorities had feared.) Tony Award-winning actor Charles Nelson Reilly died in Los Angeles at age 76.

One year ago: President Obama and British Prime Minister David Cameron confronted complex security debates over Afghanistan, Libya and economic growth during Obama's state visit to London. A judge in Salt Lake City sentenced street preacher Brian David Mitchell to life in prison for kidnapping and raping Elizabeth Smart, who was 14 at the time of her abduction in 2002. A judge in Tucson, Ariz., ruled that Jared Lee Loughner, the man accused of wounding U.S. Rep. Gabrielle Giffords and killing six in a shooting rampage, was mentally incompetent to stand trial. Scotty Mc-Creery, a 17-year-old high school student from Garner, N.C., won "American Idol" on Fox. After a 25-year run, "The Oprah Winfrey Show" aired its final broadcast.

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


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
