The issue: When Gordon Paving ac-
pany assumed the special-use permits came with the pits, which have operatedfor decades. An Idaho Supreme Court
decision - O'Conner vs. the City of decision - O'Conner vs. the City of
Moscow - backs upthat assumption. But Twin Falls County statutes say the permit stays with the applicant, not the pit. While the Twin Falls County
Prosecutor's Office reviews the code Gordon Paving went through with the special-use permit application.
Residents came to testify for and against the permits. Gordon Paving supporters said the company is re-
sponsible, employs courteous drivers

## FoodSafety in the Summer Heat

to know how to best
keep hot and cold foods
safe for my family.

W$T$ hen enjoying the great out doors this
summer, it is mportant to remember safety. Hot and cold foods need to be handled differently. For cold foods, you should not keep foods out for more than four hours. Make sure cold food stays old, ike potato salads, best to keep these foods in an ice bath, which means your bowl of cold food is surrounded by a bowl or container of ice. Purchasing akitchen
thermometer and using it thermometer and using it to regulate temperature is
the best way to ensure safe food temperatures. It is rec ommended that you keep cold foods at a consistent temperature of less than 40 degrees. Most people think
it is the mayonnaise that goes bad in potato salad goes bad inpotato salad, potatoes are foods that bacterialove.
You canre-use cold foods only if you have maintained the 40-degree temperature ment. If the temperature has gone over 40 degrees at any time, you will want to throw away that food after four hours and notre-use it. Thetemperature danger zone is between 40 and 140 degrees, where bacteria can
grow at a very fast rate and canbeharmful for human consumption.
For hot foods, your best line of defense is to use a kitchen meat thermometer. Totake an accurate temperature reading, put the ther-
mometer into the center or thickest part of the meat. Any hot food itemthat is consistently kept at 140 de-

Whether the chicke is home-made or storesame hot food rule applies - keep it consistently above 140 degrees if you want to re-use it later. When in doubt as to whether your picnic food has been out in the hot sum
for too long , throw it out!

Attorneysfor Condemned Inmate Say He's Innocent

weeks says he has passed a polygraph test that proves he's innocent.
Richard Albert Leavitt was convicted of the 1984 stabbing murder of Blackfoot resident Danette Elg. Proseuctors said he stabbed her repeatedly and then cut out her uled to be put to death by lethal injec-tion on June 12. But Leavitt has long maintained his innocence in the case, and now his attorney David Nevin, is asking the federal court to accept a that claim. Polygraph tests are typically not admissible as evidence in court.
Nevin is also asking for the court to allow DNA testing on some evidence from the crime scene. The judge has request, saying he doubted the "proposed testing would bring favorable results." But Nevin contends that it's not possible to know what, if anything, the DNA testing will reveal until it's third person were found at the scene, that would be exculpatory, Nevin said.
"The state is rushing headlong into executing an innocent man. Surely it is not too much to ask that important evi-dence in tede at no expense and no risk to the state," Nevin wrote to the court

That's because the stock awards are being tied more often to company per ormance. In those instances, CEO They have to meet goals first, like boosting profit to a certain level.
The idea is to motivate CEOs to make sure a company does well and to tie their fortunes to the company's fo the long term. For too long, activists say, CLOs haw beompany has farded "pay for pulse" as some critics call it. To be sure, the companies' motive are pragmatic. The corporate world is under a brighter, more uncomfortable spotlight than it was a few years ago, before the financial crisis struck in th all of 2008.
Last year, a law gave shareholders prove of the CEO's pay. The vote is nonbinding, but companies are keen to avoid an embarrassing "no."
"I think the boards were more easily shamed than we thought they were, says Stephen Davis, a shareholder expert at Yale University, referring to boards of directors, which set execu-
tive pay.
In the past year, he says, "Shareholders found their voice. The typical CEO got stock awards cent from the year before Cash 11 per es fell about 7 percent, to $\$ 2$ million. The value of stock options, as deter mined by the company, climbed 6 percent to a median $\$ 1.7$ million. Options usually give the CEO the right to buy trading at whenthe options are granted, so they're worth something only if the shares go up.
Profit at companies in the Standard \& Poor's 500 stock index rose 16 percent last year, remarkable in an economy that grew more slowly than expected.

EOs managed to sell more, and squeeze more profit from each sale, despite problems ranging from a downgrade of the U.S. credit rating to Europe's neverendown in China and Europe's neverending debt crisis. shift in the GOP's politics on taxes amid spiraling national deficits.
Of the 25 candidates this year promoted by the National Republican Congressional Committee as "Young Guns" and "Contenders" - the top rungs of a program highlighting promising can-
didates challenging Democrats or running in open didates challenging Democrats or running in open plan to sign the Norquist pledge.
Two of the seven candidates promoted by the NRCC as the "Young Gun Vanguard" - candidates competing in open seats that are considered Republican-leaning - have also declined to sign. Authored by anti-tax crusader Grover
Norquist, the pledge compels candides Norquist, the pledge compels candidates to re-
elimination of tax credits and deductions unless they are matched dollar-for-dollar with other tax cuts.
Norquist insists Americans for Tax Reform, the powerful group he founded in 1986, is ahead of schedule in collecting pledge signatures from congressional candidates for the year. But among Republican challengers, there are defections.
