Scattered rain showers are expected to hit the Magic Valley today and Sunday, said George Skari, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Boise.

Temperatures will drop to the mid-50s tonight and remain in the low:60s on Sun-

"We've got this huge weather system over the area right now," he said. "It's going to be in the region for the next two days."

The weather isn't expected to warm up for those looking to get away and head to the mountains.

Areas higher than 5,000 feet − like Sun Valley or Stanley - are expected to receive cooler temperatures and even a light amount of snow throughout the weekend.

pany assumed the special-use permits came with the pits, which have operated for decades. An Idaho Supreme Court decision - O'Conner vs. the City of Moscow – backs up that assumption.

But Twin Falls County statutes say the permit stays with the applicant, not the pit. While the Twin Falls County Prosecutor's Office reviews the code, Gordon Paving went through with the special-use permit application.

Residents came to testify for and against the permits. Gordon Paving supporters said the company is responsible, employs courteous drivers

and supplies high-quality gravel that fits local regulations. And, some said, the government shouldn't make it harder for companies to operate.

"(If) we eliminate Gordon Paving, make it difficult for them to survive, then we're going to be hiring out-ofstate, out-of-area companies to build these roads with out-of-state employ-

ees," said Dan Haymore of Twin Falls. Those opposed to the permit raised concerns about the gravel pits hitting the water table, potential water contamination, road damage, hours of operation

Jones, 73, of Payette, was in the Boise hospital's intensive care unit. Saint Alphonsus spokeswoman Elizabeth Duncan confirmed Friday evening that Jones was in critical condition.

According to Idaho State Police, Jones was traveling west on Interstate 84 when for unknown reasons, her Cadillac Escalade went off the side of the road shortly before 1 p.m. Jones overcorrected and the vehicle rolled.

An ambulance took her to Minidoka Memorial Hospital in Rupert, and an air ambulance later transported her to Saint Alphonsus.

Jones was wearing a seatbelt at the time of the crash, and alcohol is not believed to be a factor.

Jones' chief of staff Brandon Woolf told the Associated Press she was on a personal trip and returning from eastern Idaho when the crash occurred.

Iones was elected state controller in 2006, after serving 12 years in the Idaho House of Representatives.

In a release late Friday, Jones' staff said her family "appreciates the outpouring of concern and community support for their mother."

The state controller is the chief fiscal officer of the state of Idaho, responsible for maintaining its financial records and paying its bills.

ASK ST. LUKE'S

Summer is almost here, which means lots of outdoor picnics and family gatherings. I would like to know how to best keep hot and cold foods safe for my family.

— Sherry, Rupert

Answered by Trina Lewis, General Manager, St. Luke's Food & Nutrition Services:

hen enjoying the great outdoors this summer, it is important to remember some key factors in food safety. Hot and cold foods need to be handled differently. For cold foods, you should not keep foods out for more than four hours. Make sure cold food stays cold, like potato salads, pasta salads or fruit. It's best to keep these foods in an ice bath, which means your bowl of cold food is surrounded by a bowl or container of ice.

Purchasing a kitchen thermometer and using it to regulate temperature is the best way to ensure safe food temperatures. It is recommended that you keep cold foods at a consistent temperature of less than 40 degrees. Most people think it is the mayonnaise that goes bad in potato salad, but actually the eggs and potatoes are foods that bacteria love.

You can re-use cold foods only if you have maintained the 40-degree temperature while in an outside environment. If the temperature has gone over 40 degrees at any time, you will want to throw away that food after four hours and not re-use it. The temperature danger zone is between 40 and 140 degrees, where bacteria can grow at a very fast rate and can be harmful for human consumption.

For hot foods, your best line of defense is to use a kitchen meat thermometer. To take an accurate temperature reading, put the thermometer into the center or thickest part of the meat. Any hot food item that is consistently kept at 140 de-

grees or higher can be reused at a later date. If hot foods fall below the 140 degree temperature, you have up to four hours to serve that food. Do not re-serve the hot food at a later time. As a general rule for consumers, you can re-serve hot food that has been cooled correctly, meaning the temperature has gone from 140 degrees to 40 degrees in 2 hours or less.

One of the most bacteria-prone picnic foods is fried chicken, as people think it is safe to refrigerate unused chicken for a later time. Whether the chicken is home-made or storebought does not matter, the same hot food rule applies keep it consistently above 140 degrees if you want to re-use it later.

When in doubt as to whether your picnic food has been out in the hot sun for too long, throw it out!

NOXIOUS WEEDS

While recreating, the Idaho Weed Awareness Campaign urges residents to take steps to avoid spreading noxious weeds throughout Idaho's great outdoors. Officials advise:

- Learn to identify plants common to your favorite recreation areas, so you can recognize and report potential invaders.
- Avoid traveling through weed-infested areas with ATVs and other off-road vehicles. Similarly, only set up camp in weedfree areas.
- Don't pick or transport "pretty wildflowers" you can't identify — not only is it illegal, but these pretty plants might be noxious weeds whose seeds then spread to new locations.
- Check boats, trailers, and watercraft carefully after they are pulled from the water for signs of aquatic weeds such as Eurasian watermilfoil or Hydrilla.

and mosquito abatement from standing pools near the pits.

Dave Burgess of the Twin Falls Highway District said the high volume of trucks from Gordon Paving's contract with Chobani has damaged the roads and shoulders near the pits.

He hoped Gordon Paving owners Brian and Brandon Hansen would agree to a highway bond - an agreement they have worked out with other companies in the past – to take care of that damage. That didn't come through.


Brian Hansen said he had no problem fixing the damage he knew his trucks caused, like crumbling shoulders caused by trucks making wide right turns. But said he didn't want to take responsibility for all damage, which other drivers contribute to.

And, he pointed out, the Chobani project will be done within 45 days.

There were also concerns about road stability near the Filer pit and water contamination near the Hansen pit. But Gordon Paving hired Twin Falls-based Enviro-Mont to study the environmental impact of the pits. Dr. Saiid Dabestani, principal scientist at the company,

found no adverse effects. The company may keep operating until the commission makes its decision, said Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Director Bill Crafton.

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

Buhl to be their new chairman, replacing Gretchen Clelland.

Millington takes over during a tumultuous period for the Twin Falls County Republicans, who have seen vocal challenges at meetings from a group calling themselves the Republican Liberty Caucus.

Millington is mindful of the rift.

"You cannot come into that position without being very very concerned, cognizant of the fact that there is a definite division that has occurred over the last couple of years," Millington said, adding he wants to work with upset members rather than drive them away.

The Twin Falls County Democrats also reorganized, said Deborah Silver, who remained Twin Falls County

Democratic chairwoman. But the meeting wasn't as anxiety-inducing for local

Democrats. "We don't have the contention that the Republicans do," she said.

Both Silver and Millington are keeping their eyes on coming elections, and not just the ones in November. Redistricting shifted the Magic Valley's legislative boundaries, and while the city of Twin Falls was previously split into two districts, the new District 24 encompasses the whole city something Silver sees as an advantage.

"We have tremendous opportunity with the new district," she said.

She also predicted that the attempt to overturn the Students Come First reform laws, which will be on the November ballot, will draw out voters sympathetic to the public education system. Idaho Democrats have championed strengthening public education funding, and Silver believes Magic Valley voters will take notice.

Silver hopes the party will pick up at least one Twin Falls seat this year. But even if that doesn't happen, those candidates and the party will have name recognition and rapport with voters for 2014, she said.

Millington said he hopes to recruit quality Republican candidates for future elections, not just for state races but for city offices and school boards.

"Even though (those offices) are nonpartisan, we still should have the highest quality people," he said.


Though the press release said the fire occurred Friday, dispatchers with the Southern Idaho Regional Communications Center said it happened Thursday.

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URA Plans Special Tuesday Meeting on Chobani Funds

TWIN FALLS • The Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency will hold a special meeting at 3 p.m. Tuesday to discuss extending and increasing its line of credit with Chobani by nearly \$6 million.

URA Executive Director Melinda Anderson said the URA and Chobani signed a line of credit agreement last year for \$17.3 million. The reason: Neither the city nor the URA had the money to make required infrastructure improvements, including water system work, for Chobani to move in.

So the URA borrowed the money from Chobani at a 3

percent interest rate. But because the bond money is taking longer to come in than expected, the agency hopes to extend the maturity date on the loan from June 1 to July 30 to give it extra time.

Some of the water proj-

ects ran into unforeseen expenses, Anderson said, so the agency is also trying to increase the credit line to about \$23 million.

WOMAN GETS TO AT LEAST 30 YEARS IN UNCLE'S MURDER

ST. MARIES (AP) • A mentally ill woman who shot and beat her uncle last year and burned his body in a fire pit has been sentenced to 30 years to life for his murder.

Melisa R. Bates was sentenced Thursday by 5th District Court Judge Fred Gibler.

Last month, following court-ordered mediation, the 28-year-old Bates entered an Alford plea to second-degree murder in the May 15, 2011 death of 43-year-old Robert R. Marek of St. Maries. In an Alford plea, the defendant doesn't admit

guilt, but acknowledges prosecutors have enough evidence to gain a conviction.

Gibler cited a recent mental-health evaluation of Bates, which "strongly recommended" that she be held in a secure facility because she poses a significant risk to the community.

Defense attorney Will Butler says Bates' mental illness began showing up in her early teens.



Attorneys for Condemned Inmate Say He's Innocent

BOISE • The attorney representing a death row inmate scheduled to die in two weeks says he has passed a polygraph test that proves he's innocent.

Richard Albert Leavitt was convicted of the 1984 stabbing murder of Blackfoot resident Danette Elg. Proseuctors said he stabbed her repeatedly and then cut out her sexual organs. He is scheduled to be put to death by lethal injection on June 12.

But Leavitt has long maintained his innocence in the case, and now his attorney, David Nevin, is asking the federal court to accept a polygraph test as proof of that claim. Polygraph tests are typically not admissible as evidence in court.

Nevin is also asking for the court to allow DNA testing on some evidence from the crime scene. The judge has previ-ously turned down the request, saying he doubted the "proposed testing would bring favorable results."

But Nevin contends that it's not possible to know what, if anything, the DNA testing will reveal until it's completed. If the blood of a third person were found at the scene, that would be exculpatory, Nevin said.

"The state is rushing headlong into executing an innocent man. Surely it is not too much to ask that important evi-dence in the case be tested at no expense and no risk to the state," Nevin wrote to the court.

He also said a renowned polygraph expert, Boise State University psychology professor Charles Honts, examined Leavitt and found him to be truthful when he denied involvement in Elg's murder.

Honts asked Leavitt three questions, according to court documents: "Did you stab Danette Elg?", "Did you remove Danette Elg's internal genitals?" and "Were you present when Danette Elg was stabbed?"

Leavitt answered "no" to all three, according to the filing. Honts also found that Leavitt's breathing, heart rate and other physiological signals were consistent with those expected when someone is telling the truth.





Apple CEO Cook Gives Up \$75M in Stock Dividends

NEW YORK (AP) • Apple CEO Tim Cook is giving up \$75 million in dividends on restricted stock that the company is awarding to all of its employees.

In a filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission on Thursday, Apple Inc. said that Cook requested that his restricted stock units not receive dividends. The dividends that Apple workers are getting amount to \$2.65 per quarter for each restricted stock unit held. The shares are not normally eligible to receive dividends, so Apple's decision is a perk for its employees. The decision comes two months after Apple introduced a regular dividend and authorized a \$10 billion stock buyback program to start giving some of its cash hoard back to shareholders.

Icahn bought 7.6 percent of Chesapeake Energy Corp. • Activist investor Carl Icahn has taken a sizable stake in Chesapeake Energy Corp. and is calling for at least four of the company's directors to be replaced. Icahn spent about \$785 million to buy 50.1 million shares of the second-largest U.S. natural gas producer. It comes as Chesapeake has been criticized for allowing CEO Aubrey McClendon to borrow money from a company that it was doing business with, run a hedge fund that bet on oil and gas prices, and for allowing him the perk of buying personal stakes in company wells. Chesapeake has been hit hard by falling natural gas prices.

Typical CEO Made \$9.6M Last Year

NEW YORK • Profits at big U.S. companies broke records last year, and so

did pay for CEOs. The head of a typical public company made \$9.6 million in 2011, according to an analysis by The Associated Press using data from Equilar, an executive pay research firm.

That was up more than 6 percent from the previous year, and is the second year in a row of increases. The figure is also the highest since the AP began tracking executive compensation in 2006.

Companies trimmed cash bonuses but handed out more in stock awards. For shareholder activists who have long decried CEO pay as exorbitant, that was a victory of sorts.

That's because the stock awards are being tied more often to company performance. In those instances, CEOs can't cash in the shares right away: They have to meet goals first, like boosting profit to a certain level.

The idea is to motivate CEOs to make sure a company does well and to tie their fortunes to the company's for the long term. For too long, activists say, CEOs have been richly rewarded no matter how a company has fared – "pay for pulse," as some critics call it.

To be sure, the companies' motives are pragmatic. The corporate world is under a brighter, more uncomfortable spotlight than it was a few years ago, before the financial crisis struck in the fall of 2008.

Last year, a law gave shareholders the right to vote on whether they approve of the CEO's pay. The vote is nonbinding, but companies are keen to avoid an embarrassing "no."

"I think the boards were more easily shamed than we thought they were," says Stephen Davis, a shareholder expert at Yale University, referring to boards of directors, which set execu-

In the past year, he says, "Share-

holders found their voice." The typical CEO got stock awards worth \$3.6 million in 2011, up 11 percent from the year before. Cash bonus-

es fell about 7 percent, to \$2 million. The value of stock options, as determined by the company, climbed 6 percent to a median \$1.7 million. Options usually give the CEO the right to buy shares in the future at the price they're trading at when the options are granted, so they're worth something only if

the shares go up. Profit at companies in the Standard & Poor's 500 stock index rose 16 percent last year, remarkable in an economy that grew more slowly than expected.

CEOs managed to sell more, and squeeze more profit from each sale, despite problems ranging from a downgrade of the U.S. credit rating to an economic slowdown in China and Europe's neverending debt crisis.

Still, there wasn't much immediate benefit for the shareholders. The S&P 500 ended the year unchanged from where it started. Including dividends, the index returned a slender 2 percent.

Shareholder activists, while glad that companies are moving a bigger portion of CEO pay into stock awards, caution that the rearranging isn't a

cure-all. For one thing, companies don't have to tie stock awards to performance. Instead, they can make the awards automatically payable on a certain date — meaning all the CEO has to do is stick around.

TOP CEO PAY EQUALS 3,489 YEARS FOR TYPICAL WORKER

for last year, and the typical CEO took home \$9.6 million, according to an analysis by The Associated Press.

Simon's \$137 million is almost entirely in stock awards that could eventually be worth \$132 million. The company said it wanted to make sure Simon wasn't lured to another company.

How Long it Takes Others to Make That

A minimum wage worker – paid \$7.25 per hour, as some workers at Simon malls are — would have to work one month shy of 9,096 years to make what Simon made last year. A person making the national median salary, \$39,312 by AP calculations, would have to work 3,489 years.

By the hour: Assuming Simon worked a 60-hour week, his pay was \$43,963.64 per hour, or \$732.73 per minute. To put that in perspective, the minimum-wage worker would have to labor for nearly three years to make what Simon earns in an hour. The average U.S. worker makes slightly less in one year than Simon makes in an hour.

Compared with America's CEO

Simon makes about 342 times the \$400,000 annual salary of President Barack Obama.

Yahoo Kills 'Livestand' Just 6 Months after Debut

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) • Yahoo has killed Livestand, a tablet magazine, just six months after its debut on the iPad. The decision announced Friday is

part of the struggling Internet company's latest turnaround effort. Last month, Yahoo Inc. told analysts

it would close or combine about 50 services that haven't been performing up to expectations. That housecleaning plan was drawn

up by Yahoo's former CEO, Scott

Thompson, who lasted at the company

for an even shorter period than Livestand. Thompson's four-month stint at Yahoo ended two weeks ago when he stepped down amid a flap over incorrect information on his bio.

Yahoo interim CEO Ross Levinsohn hasn't said whether the company still plans to dump as many services as Thompson intended. A Friday post on Yahoo's corporate blog made it clear that more services will be closed, with-

out specifying a precise number. "When we discontinue products, it

will be so that we can focus on opportunities where we lead and where we can create the most meaningful experiences for people using our products, and for our partners, developers and advertisers," the post said.

Yahoo began working on Livestand in 2010 after it became clear Apple Inc.'s iPad was going to be popular. But the tablet magazine didn't hit the market until last November, well after a similar iPad application called "Flipboard" had already attracted a large audience.



NJ Man Charged with Murdering NY Boy in 1979

NEW YORK • Thirty-three years to the day after 6-year-old Etan Patz vanished without a trace while walking to catch a school bus, a man accused of strangling him and dumping his body with the trash was arraigned on a murder charge on Friday in a locked hospital ward where he was being held as a suicide risk.

A lawyer for Pedro Hernandez, who was a teenage convenience store stock clerk at the time of the boy's disappearance, told the judge that his client is mentally ill and has a history of hallucinations.

Hernandez, now 51, appeared in court on Friday evening via video camera from a conference room at Bellevue Hospital, where he was admitted earlier in the day after making comments about wanting to kill himself.

The legal proceeding lasted only around 4 minutes. Hernandez didn't speak or enter a plea, but his courtappointed lawyer, Harvey Fishbein, told the judge that his client was bipolar and schizophrenic and has a "history of hallucinations, both visual and auditory."

A judge ordered Hernandez held without bail and authorized a psychological examination to see if he is fit to stand trial.

Hernandez was expressionless during the hearing. He wore an orange jumpsuit and handcuffs. A police officer stood behind him.

The prosecutor who appeared in court, Assistant District Attorney Armand Durastanti, said it was "33 years ago today that 6-year-old Etan Patz left his home on Prince Street to catch his school bus. He has not been seen or heard from since. It's been 33 years, and justice has not been done in this case."

Hernandez, a churchgoing father now living in Maple Shade, N.J., was arrested Thursday after making a surprise confession in a case that has bedeviled investigators and inspired dread in generations of New York City parents for three decades.

Dragon Makes History with Space Station Docking

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. • The private company SpaceX made history Friday with the docking of its Dragon capsule to the International Space Station, the most impressive feat yet in turning routine spaceflight over to the

commercial sector. It marked the first time a business enterprise delivered a supply ship to the space station.

"There's so much that could have gone wrong and it went right," said an elated Elon Musk, the young, driven billionaire behind SpaceX.

"This really is, I think, going to be recognized as a significantly historical step forward in space travel - and hopefully the first of many to come."

SpaceX still has to get its Dragon back next week with a load of science gear;

the retro bell-shaped capsule is designed to splash down into the ocean, in the style of the Mercury, Gemini and Apollo programs. But Friday was the crucial step, Musk noted, and NASA agreed the next SpaceX mission could come as early as September.

After a three-day flight from Cape Canaveral, the Dragon closed in on the space station as two control centers -NASA in Houston and SpaceX in Hawthorne, Calif. - worked in tandem. A problem with the capsule lasertracking system prompted SpaceX controllers to order a temporary retreat, but the problem quickly was resolved.

NASA astronaut Donald Pettit used the space station's 58-foot robot arm to snare the gleaming white Dragon as the two craft soared 250 miles above Australia, a day after a practice fly-by.


"Looks like we've got us a dragon by

the tail," Pettit announced once he locked onto Dragon's docking mechanism.

NASA's dressed-up controllers applauded. In contrast, their SpaceX counterparts - including Musk - lifted their arms in triumph and jumped out of their seats to exchange high fives.

The company's youthful-looking employees - the average age is 30 were still in a frenzy when Musk took part in a televised news conference a couple hours later. They screamed with excitement as if it were a pep rally and chanted, "E-lon, E-lon, E-lon," as the 40-year-old Musk, wearing a black athletic jacket with the SpaceX logo, described the day's events.

Alcohol was banned from the premises during the crucial flight operation, Musk noted, "but now that things are good, I think we'll probably have a bit of champagne and have some fun." The crowd roared in approval.

Egypt Results Point to Deeply Divisive Runoff Race

CAIRO • The Muslim Brotherhood's candidate and a veteran of ousted leader Hosni Mubarak's autocratic regime will face each other in a runoff election for Egypt's president, according to first-round results Friday. The divisive showdown dismayed many Egyptians who fear either one means an end to any democratic gains pro-

duced by last year's uprising. More than a year after protesters demanding democracy toppled Mubarak, scribed Morsi as an "Islamic fascist" the face-off between the Brotherhood's Mohammed Morsi and former air force chief and prime minister Ahmed Shafiq looked like a throwback to the days of his regime – a rivalry between a militaryrooted strongman promising a firm hand to ensure stability and Islamists vowing to implement religious law.

"The worst possible scenario," said Ahmed Khairy, spokesman for the Free Egyptians Party, one of the secular, liberal parties that emerged last year. Speaking to the Al-Ahram daily, he deand Shafiq as a "military fascist."

He said he did know which candidate to endorse in the June 16-17. Many Egyptians face the same dilemma, with no figure representing a middle path of reforming a corrupt police state without lurching onto the divisive path of strict implementation of Islamic law.

The head-to-head match between Morsi and Shafiq will likely be a heated one. Each has die-hard supporters but is also loathed by significant sectors of the population.

AU, Somali Forces Capture Town Outside Mogadishu

MOGADISHU, Somalia • African Union and Somali troops seized a town on the outskirts of Mogadishu on Friday from Islamist militants after three days of fighting, marking the biggest victory over al-Shabab since the progovernment forces took control of the capital last August.

A top United Nations official, meanwhile, announced that a presidential election in Somalia will be held on Aug. 20 — with votes cast by lawmakers instead of by ordinary Somalis because of continued insecurity in the country.

Lt. Col. Paddy Ankunda, the spokesman for African Union forces, said the troops moved into Afgoye on Friday and that most of the town was under the coalition's control.

More than 300,000 internally displaced Somalis live in and around Afgoye, located 30 kilometers (20 miles) north of Mogadishu. Thousands fled the area in overloaded vans and donkey carts the previous two days amid gunfire and explosions.

African Union "and Somali troops are here now, and al-Shabab abandoned the town," resident Aden Muse said by phone. "The fighting has stopped and people are indoors. We

hope no more fighting will happen." Soldiers have taken positions in the

police and district headquarters, resi-

"Tomorrow will be a new beginning for us;" said another resident, Ubah Salad.

The U.N. representative for Somalia, Augustine Mahiga, said Friday at a news conference in neighboring Kenya that the pro-government forces needed to capture Afgoye for military and humanitarian reasons. He said al-Shabab manufactured its bombs in Afgoye and that the town "controls the

exit and the entries to Mogadishu. "And it has been the military concentration and headquarters of the Shabab. Hitting Afgoye would make a significant military breakthrough in the region of Mogadishu," the U.N. official said.

The Afgoye corridor between Mogadishu and Afgoye is home to the largest concentration of internally displaced people in the world, Mahiga added. He said aid agencies plan to begin helping them.

The U.N. recently approved a near doubling of the African Union force to more than 17,00 troops. Mahiga cautioned that the new troops are deploying far from Mogadishu and that, with pro-government forces stretched, insurgents could infiltrate back into areas that have already been seized near the capital.

GOP'S ANTI-TAX PLEDGE LOSES SOME STEAM

WASHINGTON • In GOP activist circles it is known simply as the pledge, and over the past 25 years it has become the essential conservative credential for a whole generation of Republicans seeking elective office in a party defined by its implacable opposition to raising taxes.

Of the 242 Republicans serving in the House of Representatives, all but six have signed the the anti-tax pledge that has emerged as a key enforcement mechanism of the Republican orthodoxy on taxes.

But now, an increasing number of Republicans running for Congress are declining to sign the pledge. It is a small sign that could signal a big shift in the GOP's politics on taxes amid spiraling national deficits.

Of the 25 candidates this year promoted by the National Republican Congressional Committee as "Young Guns" and "Contenders" - the top rungs of a program highlighting promising candidates challenging Democrats or running in open seats — at least a third have indicated they do not plan to sign the Norquist pledge.

Two of the seven candidates promoted by the NRCC as the "Young Gun Vanguard" - candidates competing in open seats that are considered

Norquist insists Americans for Tax Reform, the powerful group he founded in 1986, is ahead of schedule in collecting pledge signatures from congressional candidates for the year.

But among Republican challengers, there are

defections. Republican candidates declining to sign generally indicate that they nevertheless oppose tax hikes. But some are chaffing against the constraint on the eliminating tax loopholes, believing those restrictions limit Republicans' ability to negotiate seriously with Democrats on a deal to tackle the nation's mounting debt.

In Pennsylvania, Republican state Rep. Scott Perry said he was disappointed to see his party's presidential candidates – all but one of whom signed the pledge - uniformly indicate in a debate last year they would reject a deficit reduction deal that paired \$1 in revenue increases for every \$10 in spending cuts.

"I just think it's imprudent to hem yourself in where you can't make a good agreement that overall supports the things you want to do," said Perry, who said he generally opposes tax increases but recently won a Republican primary in a conservative district over candidates who had signed the pledge. "I just don't see what the point of signing would be for me.... I've got a record, and everyone who wants to know where I've been and where I'm at can look to that."



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

On this date:

In 1521, Martin Luther was banned by the Edict of Worms because of his religious beliefs and writings.

In 1868, the impeachment trial of President Andrew Johnson ended with his acquittal on the remaining charges.

In 1938, the House Un-American Activities Committee was established by Congress.

In 1940, the evacuation of more than 338,000 Allied troops from Dunkirk, France, began during World War II.

In 1941, the American Flag House, where Betsy Ross once lived, was donated to the city of Philadelphia.

In 1952, representatives of the United States, Britain, France and West Germany signed the Bonn Convention granting conditional sovereignty to, and ending the Allied occupation of, West Germany.

In 1960, U.N. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge accused the Soviets of hiding a microphone inside a wood carving of the Great Seal of the United States that had been presented to the U.S. Embassy in Moscow.

In 1969, the Apollo 10 astronauts returned to Earth after a successful eight-day dress rehearsal for the first manned moon landing.

In 1972, President Richard M. Nixon and Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev signed the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty in Moscow. (The U.S. withdrew from the treaty in 2002.)

In 1981, 14 people were killed when a Marine jet crashed onto the flight deck of the aircraft carrier USS Nimitz off Florida.

In 1992, Charles Geschke, president and chief operating officer of Adobe Systems Inc., was kidnapped in the company's parking lot in Mountain View, Calif., and held for ransom. (Geschke was rescued four days later; his kidnappers were arrested.)

Ten years ago: Fourteen people were killed when barges being pushed by a towboat crashed into the piers of the Interstate 40 bridge in Oklahoma, causing part of the structure to fall into the Arkansas River. President George W. Bush visited Paris, where he met with French President Jacques Chirac . lvaro Uribe was elected Colombia's president. Helio Castroneves won his second straight Indianapolis 500 despite a protest filed by Paul Tracy. Roman Polanski's film "The Pianist" won the Palme d'Or at the Cannes Film Festival.

Five years ago: Iraqi Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki, U.S. Ambassador Ryan Crocker and American commander Gen. David Petraeus flew to Iraq's blistering western desert in a rare joint outing to highlight gains there in the

fight against insurgents. One year ago: Congress passed a four-year extension of post-Sept. 11 powers contained in the Patriot Act to search records and conduct roving wiretaps in pursuit of terrorists; President Barack Obama, in France, signed the measure using an autopen machine minutes before the provisions were set to expire at midnight. Astronauts Mike Fincke and Gregory Chamitoff made history as the final spacewalkers of NASA's 30year shuttle program, completing construction of the International Space Station with the smooth addition of an extension pole. Ratko Mladic, the brutal Bosnian Serb general suspected of leading the massacre of 8,000 Muslim men and boys, was arrested after a 16-year manhunt.





I was raised to believe that either statement would be acceptable. What say you?


