JEROME • Jerome County will receive a federal grant of almost airport comply with Americans with Disabilities Act requirements.
County commission chairman Charlie Howell announced the grant from the U.S. Department of Hous ing and Urban Development. Grant writer Carleen Herring, vice president of community and eco-
nomic development for the Region nomic development for the Region the money has been awarded and construction should begin this summer following an environmental assessment now under way.

## BankruptcyTrustee Seeks MoneyfromCanyonCounty

BOISE (AP) • A bankruptcy trustee has filed a motion asking a federal bankruptcy judge to make a summary
judgment and order judgment and order
Canyon County to turn over $\$ 171,000$ the county received from former Prosecutor John Bujak before Bujak resigned and filed for bankruptcy. The Idaho Statesmanre ports that trustee Jeremy Thursday contending he's entitled to recover transfers from Bujak to the county so that the money can be distributed among all creditors
Gugino filed a lawsuit gainst the county in July last year in U.S. Bankruptcy Court seeking the money. His request for summary judgment, if granted, would mean the issue wouldn't be decided in a trial.
He said Bujak paid the county $\$ 171,000$ in the two months before he resigned county would receive through the bankruptcy. The document lists
had with the city of Nampa as one of Bujak's assets, compared to $\$ 1.3$ million in debts. Bankruptcy law allows trustees to pursue debt within 90 days of filing. Canyon County officials contend Bujak still owes the county more than $\$ 230,000$, and they will fight efforts to make the county repay the \$171,0 "We are not surprise the trustee's filing of his motion for summary judgment on one of the claims he asserted in his complaint,' attorneys for the county told the newspaper na statement.  Plane CrashSitein RemoteS.W.IdahoBOISE • Idaho National Guard rescuers plucked California fireman, his wife and their adult daughter from a snowovered mountain-side sunday afternoon, more han 15 hours after the trio survived a nighttime plane crash onto a steep, part of the state. Authorities said the group was flying in a Cessna 172 from Califor nia to Mountain Home, Idaho, when the plane
went down at about 9 w.m. MDT Saturday. One of the three used a cellphone just after midnight oo report that they had survived the crash but had suffered head and back njuries.
A medical helicopter was the first to spot the wreckage Sunday mornions didn't allow for an immediate rescue, said Col. Tim Marsano of the Idaho National Guard. Officials said ground 6 -foot snow drifts and on 60 degree slopes reached the crash site first. They wrapped the family members in blankets and built a fire until a military helicopter could lift them out with a hoist

cluding Mitt Romney, have criticized President Barack Obama's insistence on setting a firm timetable for the war because they say it shows a ack of commitment to ages enemy fighters to ages enemy fighters to
wait out a U.S. departure. Panetta said critics of the plan should be mindful that the timetable has been embraced by some 50 allied nations.
"That is the plan that has been agreed to. And
it's a plan that is working," Panetta said. "And very frankly, the only way to get this ac-
complished - interms of complished - in terms of the transition that we have to go through - is to timelines that have been set here in order to ensure that we fulfill the mission of an Afghanistan that governs and secures itself,' he added. Panetta also reiterated
his criticism of the conhis criticism of the con-
viction of a Pakistani doctor who helped the CIA find and kill terrorist leader Osama bin Laden, calling the lengthy prison sentence handed to Dr. Shakil Afridi "disturb-
ing!"
"It is sodifficulttoun"It is so difficullt to unturbing that they would sentence this doctor to 33 years for helping in the search for the most notorious terrorist in our times," Panetta said. working against Pakistan!"
U.S. officials have urged Pakistan to release the physician, who ran a vaccination program for

Across Idaho, battles for precinct committee positions have erupted, reflecting an ideological struggle inside the Republican Party.
One of the problems Idaho Democrats long have had is the lack, in many places, of precinct leaders. These are important, basic, building-block positions for party organization, important for local organizing and choosing local party leaders, and sometime filling vacancies for offices like state legislator. In Idaho, the Republican Pa more of those spots filled. (Neither party fills them all.) Ordinarily, only one person runs for nearly all precinct committee spots, but this year Republicans had an unusually large number of contests, in places around the state. They became intense enough that I spotted some thing I've not seen before, in any year - a campaign party. It is Kootenai County precinct 61; the Web writers describe it as "A resource for the Republican Party members of Precinct 61."
In Twin Falls County, the Republican Liberty Caucus ran a slew of challenges to often-veteran precinct officers, and won almost a third of the seats. The mainstream party leaders expressed relief that the challengers hadn't won a majority, but they'd better not count on the onessure to ease off soon. Mand
Another coin flip came in Ada County, home to a large pile of contests, where Roger Brown, a Ron Paul activist, unseated governor's aide Roger Brown. In another race, a party nominee for state legislator lost a precinct office. One of the most prominent Paul backers in the county, former legislative candidate Lucas Baumbach, was de-
feated. But Paul backers won more than a third of the precinct seats in the Ada County party organization,
enough to have impact.
Overall, the Paul forces fell short of the statewide precinct numbers they would have needed for their more ambitious projects, like the attempt to shift Idaho national convention votes to Paul from Mitt Romney. That one never felt like much of a starter.) In Bannock county, a county meeting projected by one veteran
turned out sedate
But getting even a third of the votes in a county organization has its uses. Here's an indication how.
Kootenai County Republicans earlier this year asked Texas congressional candidate Richard Mack to speak to the party's Lincoln Day dinner. After the invitation was made, 14 precinct committee members sent a letter to
the local party leadership objecting to Mack, saying his "support of the Republican Party and Republican Party candidates is inconsistent, intermittent and questionable." The battle raged for a while and went public. Eventually, the Mack invitation held up, he spoke, and the event was held without incident. Not without trepidation on Mack's part: He told reporters he had never felt as unwelcome as he had before coming to Coeur d'A
lene. the South.

marriage at the polls make up just over 60 percent of the U.S. population. Voters in liberal states such as Vermont, Massa-
chusetts, chusetts, Connecticut and

West looked no further than the club king for her opening sal vo. Anne Rosen won in dummy drew trump, knocked out the diamond ace, discarded a spade on dummy's fifth diamond, and claimed 10 tricks.
Should West have read more into the accelerated bidding after diamonds were mentioned? West has five points and her partner had opened the bidding. Simple arithmetic reveals that North and South are unlikely to have the normal number of high cards usually associated with a major suey have found a second fit and the diamond ruff may therefore be critical to defeat the game.
