WASHINGTON • The father of a U.S. soldier who was taken prisoner in Afghanistan thanked the motorcycle riders of Rolling Thunder on Sunday for raising awareness of missing-in-action troops and prisoners of war.

At the annual Rolling Thunder rally on the National Mall, Bob Bergdahl promised his son: "You will come home. We will not leave you behind?"

Army Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl, 26, of Hailey, was taken Bowe Bergdahl prisoner in

Afghanistan nearly three years ago. He is the subject of a proposed prisoner swap in which the Obama administration would allow the transfer of five Taliban prisoners long held at the U.S. military prison at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. Bergdahl said

he couldn't be happier with the government's efforts to

\$62K Grant to Help Jerome County's ADA Compliance

JEROME • Jerome County will receive a federal grant of almost \$62,000 to help the courthouse and airport comply with Americans with Disabilities Act requirements.

County commission chairman Charlie Howell announced the grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Grant writer Carleen Herring, vice president of community and economic development for the Region IV Development Association, said the money has been awarded and construction should begin this summer following an environmental assessment now under way.

The courthouse ramp to an entrance on the building's east side will

get a larger door to accommodate wheelchairs. Also, the entry will get an electronic button to open the door

The \$61,824 grant, which requires a 50 percent county match, also will pay for upgrades in courthouse restrooms to allow greater wheelchair turning radius, grab bars, and lowerlevel water fountains with push-button controls.

"(The county has) been chipping away at this for a number of years and the block grant will help defray the cost," Herring said of ADA upgrades.

SOUTH HILLS • The replica Sioux Indian teepee was a welcome sanctuary Saturday afternoon when snow began falling.

Jay Edmons, of Buhl, opened the flap and stepped inside to enjoy the warmth of a small wood stove tended by Shoshone resident Leigh Kelley and Jared Crider, of Twin Falls. The latter two men had a comfortable home for the threeday Southern Idaho Muzzleloaders Association rendezvous that concludes today.

Kelley's teepee included buffalo robes and elk hides to keep them warm at night, as well as a candle in a glass holder.

"This is the place to be," Kelley said as he greet ed Edmons.

Smoke from the fire escaped through an opening in the teepee's top, and only a few snowflakes filtered down from outside. Fifteen wooden poles kept the canvas structure taut.

Kelley, who goes by the rendezvous nickname of Mangy Moose, was asked how long it takes to erect the teepee.



Commissioner Cathy Roemer said the county's portion of funding will be spread over a two-year period through its capital building fund. She said some of the grant money will be used for an entrance ramp at the county's airport to bring it into ADA compliance.

Another federal grant will provide \$46,000 to pay for nearly all improvements planned at the Silver and Gold Senior Center in Eden. Herring said that will include new vinyl flooring, lighting upgrades, repair downspouts and of drains, new kitchen shelving, and a new kitchen stove, convection oven and commercial dishwasher.

The entire project at the senior center is projected to cost \$50,000. Herring said the U.S. **Commerce** Department requires considerably less matching funding for senior center improvements than it does for other projects because senior centers traditionally operate on narrow financial margins. Jerome County also has received a \$70,000 waterways grant from Idaho Department of State Parks and Recreation for use at Wilson Lake, Commissioner Roger Morley said. The grant, which requires a \$10,000 match from Jerome County, will pay for new docks, restrooms and cement retention barriers along the banks to keep sand and gravel from washing into the water, he said. It follows a \$50,000 waterways grant from the state department last year.

"A good squaw can set it up in 30 minutes, but it takes us fat old men about an hour," he said with a laugh.

Humorous banter was plentiful throughout the camp Saturday despite the cold temperature and snow, which began piling up on the ground at 6,000 feet elevation in the Sawtooth National Forest.

It wasn't how the association members hoped to kick off their summer, but no one complained. They saw worse during the 2006 Memorial Day weekend when 4 to 6 inches of snow accumulated.

Edmons, also known as Jaybird, had been at the shooting range testing his black powder rifle a few minutes earlier. He rang a metal target 60 yards away before snowfall became too heavy to continue.

"We figure the mountain men had to hunt in this," he said, taking aim. "I'll do one more (shot) before I freeze up. When black powder gets wet it turns to cement."

Shooting is the centerpiece of the rendezvous, with almost three-fourths of the 40 people on hand Saturday having signed up to

last time Tuesday.

For Pickens, it meant late nights spent packing, but she said having a new building is exciting and thrilling.

"It will be so worth it," she said.

The Wendell elementary school is currently spread out in nine buildings - six portables and three made of brick. The oldest was constructed in the early 1960s, while the modular classrooms were added about 25 years ago.

Rogers said the new school will bring everyone under one roof and improve security

"I'm looking forward to a safe campus," said Wendell Elementary principal Kevin Rogers.

Wendell superintendent Greg Lowe said construction crews are installing furniture in the new building. On Friday, the school district's maintenance staff started the twoweek process of moving teacher supplies.

The New Building

Crews broke ground last summer on the approximately 60,000-square-foot elementary school building, which will replace the current facility.

Phase I of the project - all but six of the 27 classrooms - is scheduled for completion next month.

Wendell Elementary principal Kevin Rogers said he's thankful residents passed a \$9.8 million bond in 2010 to construct the facility.

"This has been needed for a long time,"

he said.

This August, most students will start the new school year in the new building. But two fourth-grade classes will remain in an old modular building until December when Phase II of the construction project ends.

The reason: Six more classrooms in the last phase of the project can't be constructed until all the old buildings are out of the way.

Saying Goodbye

In Pickens' classroom, a few miscellaneous items - like paper clips and scraps of paper - covered the floor. File cabinets were all pushed to one corner of the room.

Pickens spent 15 years teaching in the classroom and has many memories of her time in the space. She pointed out a hook on a wall and remembered that it held a piñata a parent brought in years ago.

In a different building, music teacher Lana Lamm described packing as a "work in progress." A pile of items in the middle of her classroom included xylophones and bongo drums.

One part of the packing process included paring down the number of costumes from previous school musicals.

Teacher Debbie Lancaster is retiring and was packing up her classroom for the last time. She spent 25 years teaching at Wendell Elementary and said she'll miss working with students.

Lancaster said she was feeling sentimental while going through items, especially those that bring back good memories of past students

Bankruptcy Trustee Seeks Money from Canyon County

The Idaho Statesman reports that trustee Jeremy Gugino filed the motion Thursday contending he's entitled to recover transfers from Bujak to the county so that the money can be distributed among all creditors.

Gugino filed a lawsuit against the county in July last year in U.S. Bankruptcy Court seeking the money. His request for summary judgment, if granted, would mean the issue wouldn't be decided in a trial.

He said Bujak paid the county \$171,000 in the two months before he resigned and that is more than the county would receive through the bankruptcy. The document lists a \$598,000 contract Bujak lows trustees to pursue debt payments a person makes within 90 days of filing.

Canyon County officials contend Bujak still owes the county more than \$230,000, and they will fight efforts to make the county repay the \$171,000 received from Bujak.

"We are not surprised by the trustee's filing of his motion for summary judgment on one of the claims he asserted in his complaint," attorneys for the county told the newspaper in a statement. "The county will be filing its own crossmotion for summary judgment on those same issues and opposing the Trustee's motion?"

A hearing in the bankruptcy case is set for June 25.

In a criminal case related to the bankruptcy, Bujak in March pleaded not guilty in 3rd District Court to misusing public funds. Prosecutors said he mishandled

say more than \$734,000 was put into a trust account to cover 15 months of prosecution work and Bujak took \$236,000 for his own personal expenses. Bujak resigned over the contract in September 2010. Shortly after his resignation he filed for bankruptcy.

The mediation session in the criminal case is set for Wednesday.

Also in March, U.S. Bankruptcy Court Judge Jim Pappas rejected a proposed settlement between Canyon County officials and Bujak's bankruptcy estate. Pappas said litigation would be in the best interest of creditors owed money in the bankruptcy.

Bujak declined to comment.

Three Rescued from Plane Crash Site in Remote S.W. Idaho

BOISE • Idaho National Guard rescuers plucked a California fireman, his wife and their adult daughter from a snowcovered mountain-side Sunday afternoon, more than 15 hours after the trio survived a nighttime plane crash onto a steep, forested slope in a remote part of the state.

Authorities said the group was flying in a Cessna 172 from California to Mountain Home, Idaho, when the plane went down at about 9 p.m. MDT Saturday. One of the three used a cellphone just after midnight to report that they had survived the crash but had suffered head and back injuries.

A medical helicopter was the first to spot the wreckage Sunday morning, but white-out conditions didn't allow for an immediate rescue, said Col. Tim Marsano of the Idaho National Guard.

Officials said ground rescuers traveling through 6-foot snow drifts and on 60 degree slopes reached the crash site first. They wrapped the family members in blankets and built a fire until a military helicopter could lift them out Owvhee County. The first person came

out about noon and the last at about 2 p.m., and each was transferred to a medical helicopter and flown to Saint Alphonsus **Regional Medical Center** in Boise where they were listed in stable condition.

It's unclear what caused the Cessna to go down. Photos taken by rescuers showed significant damage, including a broken front windshield.

Authorities identified the three as Brian Brown of Wilton, Calif., his wife Jayann Brown, and their daughter. Her name was not immediately available.

Brian Brown is a captain at the Cosumnes Community Services District Fire Department in Elk Grove, Calif. He is also Deputy Chief of Operation and Training with the nearby volunteer Wilton Fire Protection District.

Wilton Fire Chief Tom Dark said the couple was flying with their youngest daughter to Mountain Home to visit their oldest daughter. He was relieved they were in stable condition.

"That was our first concern, how he and the family were doing," said Dark. "Knowing what a good pilot he is, something had to have happened." Dark said it was probably an unusual experience for Brown, a firefighter for more than two decades, to be on the other end of a rescue. "When the shoe is on the other foot it's kind of strange," he said.

Outed Idaho Dem Seeks New Title: Youngest Lawmaker

BOISE • Nate Murphy knocked on 8,000 doors and spent just \$10 on his successful 2011 campaign for Pocatello's school board, but the 22year-old's current bid to become Idaho's youngest-ever legislator is exacting a higher price.

He's running for Pocatello's District 29 House seat as a Democrat in a Republicandominated state. He also has a misdemeanor marijuana conviction from 2008 he knew he'd likely have to explain to voters before November.

And in March, he was accidentally outed as gay after Idaho's only openly gay lawmaker told The New York Times that Murphy would be taking up her legacy.

That's how his father and grandmother found out about his bisexuality.

Given those distractions, Murphy is working hard to refocus voter attention on the topics that matter to him, not diversionary issues he says distract from his core message of improving Idaho education, a theme that won him his School District 25 trustee seat last year.

"At the end of the line, I think the election is going to be my record in public service and the issues important to my district," he said.

Until now, the youngest Idaho lawmaker was former Rep. Branden Durst, D-Boise, 26 when elected in 2006.

Murphy, still a junior at Idaho State University after taking semesters off to run Democratic campaigns in southwestern Idaho, aims to claim that title by telling voters he'll fight Idaho public schools chief Tom Luna's education reforms, passed by the 2011 Legislature to require online classes and student laptops.

Sticking to his message, however, has not been easy.

Earlier this year, Sen. Nicole LeFavour told The Times she

was excited to think of Murphy becoming Idaho's second-ever openly gay lawmaker. LeFavour, D-Boise, is the first, and the newspaper was profiling her retirement.

said last week, he wasn't out.

"I didn't solicit that at all," Murphy told The Associated Press in an interview. LeFavour has since apologized to Murphy for breaking the gay community's cardinal

rule: Letting people come out on their own.

"I didn't know he wasn't out," she said. "I felt horrible." Murphy has since made

peace with his outing, accepting the endorsement of the Washington, D.C.-based Gay & Lesbian Victory Fund. The group encourages gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender candidates to address questions about their sexuality frankly - before quickly shifting to matters more important to voters. "If a candidate spends too

much time talking about their sexual orientation, they're likely going to alienate voters," said Denis Dison, а spokesman.

Murphy said he's following that advice to win voters in a district where Idaho State University and his school district are the biggest employers.

"The social issues are not going to keep people in my

district employed or not," he said.

Catalina Steckbauer, the Bannock County Democratic Party's chairwoman, doesn't think Murphy's bisexuality is going to matter in Pocatello, an old railroad town with a painting of its namesake Indian chief in the vacant train depot downtown.

"I really believe that is a non-issue," Steckbauer said. "In other parts of the state, it could be, but not here?"

Syria Denies Houla Killings; U.N. Condemns Attack

BEIRUT (AP) • Syria on Sunday strongly denied allegations that its forces killed scores of people – including women and children – in one of the deadliest days of the country's uprising, but the U.N. Security Council after an emergency session condemned government forces for shelling residential areas.

The killing of more than 100

people in the west-central area of Houla on Friday brought widespread international criticism of the regime of President Bashar Assad, although differences emerged from world powers over whether his forces were exclusively to blame.

The Security Council issued a press statement Sunday that "condemned in the strongest possible terms" the killings in Houla. It blamed Syrian forces for artillery and tank shelling of residential areas. It also condemned the killings of civilians "by shooting at close range and by severe physical abuse," but avoided saying who was responsible for these attacks.

The council's statement said the "outrageous use of force" against

civilians violated international law and Syrian government commitments under previous U.N. resolutions to stop all violence, including the use of heavy weapons in populated areas. It said "those responsible for acts of violence must be held accountable," and asked the U.N. observer mission in Syria and Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon to investigate the attacks and report back to the council.

Britain and France had proposed issuing a press statement condemning the attack on civilians and pointing the finger at the Syrian government for Friday's massacre. But Russia called for an emergency council meeting saying it first wanted a briefing by Gen. Robert Mood, the head of the unarmed U.N. observer mission.

NATO Disputes Report of Casualties in Airstrike

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) • The U.S. -led coalition on Sunday disputed reports that eight civilians, including children, were killed in a NA-TO airstrike in a remote part of eastern Afghanistan.

Afghan officials said an airstrike Saturday night killed eight members of a family, but a senior NATO official said that so far, there is no evidence of any civilian casualties. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to disclose the information.

Separately, NATO reported that three coalition service members were killed Sunday in eastern Afghanistan – two during an insurgent attack and one from a roadside bombing.

Four others, including a British soldier, were killed in the south on Saturday, bringing to 169 the number of NATO deaths in Afghanistan so far this year. The British Ministry of Defense said the soldier was killed in an explosion in the Nahr-e Saraj region of southern Helmand province. The nationalities of the other three have not been disclosed.

Tropical Storm Beryl Strengthens, Nears U.S. Coast

Tropical Storm Beryl was wrecking some Memorial Day weekend plans on Sunday, causing shoreline campers to pack up and head inland and leading to the cancellation of some events as the storm approached the southeastern U.S.

Beryl was still well offshore, but officials in Georgia and Florida were bracing for drenching rains and driving winds.

The National Hurricane Center in Miami said Sunday evening that Beryl was approaching hurricane strength and was expected to make landfall late Sunday or early Monday.

As of 8 p.m., Beryl had maximum sustained winds of 70 mph (113 kph), just below hurricane-strength, which is 75 mph. It was not expected to strengthen much more, and should weaken after making landfall. The hurricane center said the Jacksonville pier was already reporting winds of 50 mph (80 kph). Beryl was moving westward at 10 mph (16 kph).

Florida Gov. Rick Scott urged Florida residents in the affected areas to "stay alert and aware."

Inmates, Corruption Rule Honduras' Deadly Prisons

SAN PEDRO SULA, Honduras (AP) • Inside one of Honduras' most dangerous and overcrowded prisons, inmates operate a free-market bazaar, selling everything from iPhones to prostitutes.

It's more like a fenced-in town than a conventional prison, where raccoons, chickens and pigs wander freely among food stalls and in troughs of open sewage. But guards do not dare cross the painted, yellow "linea de la muerte" (line of death) into the inner sanctum run by prisoners, and prisoners do not breach the perimeter controlled by guards.

"The prisoners rule," assistant prison director Carlos Polanco told The Associated Press. "We only handle external security. They know if they cross the line, we can shoot."

The unofficial division of power at the San Pedro Sula Central Corrections Facility is mimicked throughout the country, where a Lord-of-the-Flies system allows inmates to run a business behind bars, while officials turn a blind eye in exchange for a cut of the profits they say is spent on prison needs.

Almost Half of New Veterans Seek Disability

America's newest veterans are filing for disability benefits at a historic rate, claiming to be the most medically and mentally troubled generation of former troops the nation has ever seen.

A staggering 45 percent of the 1.6 million veterans from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan are now seeking compensation for injuries they say are service-related. That is more than double the estimate of 21 percent who filed such claims after the Gulf War in the early 1990s, top government officials told The Associated Press.

What's more, these new veterans are claiming eight to nine ailments on average, and the most recent ones over the last year are claiming 11 to 14. By comparison, Vietnam veterans are currently receiving compensation for fewer than four, on average, and those from World War II and Korea, just two.

It's unclear how much worse off these new veterans are than their predecessors. Many factors are driving the dramatic increase in claims – the weak economy, more troops surviving wounds, and more awareness of problems such as concussions and PTSD. Almost one-third have been granted disability so far.

Government officials and some veterans' advocates say that veterans who might have been able to work with certain disabilities may be more inclined to seek benefits now because they lost jobs or can't find any. Aggressive outreach and advocacy efforts also have brought more veterans into the system, which must evaluate each claim to see if it is war-related. Payments range from \$127 a month for a 10 percent disability to \$2,769 for a full one

As the nation commemorates the more than 6,400 troops who died in post-9/11 wars, the problems of those who survived also draw attention. These new veterans are seeking a level of help the government did not anticipate, and for which there is no special fund set aside to pay.

The Department of Veter ans Affairs is mired in backlogged claims, but "our mission is to take care of whatever the population is," said Allison Hickey, the VA's undersecre -

The 21 percent who filed claims in previous wars is Hickey's estimate of an average for Operation Desert Storm and Desert Shield. The VA has details only on the current disability claims being paid to veterans of each war.

The AP spent three months reviewing records and talking with doctors, government officials and former troops to take stock of the new veterans. They are different in many ways from those who fought before them.

More are from the Reserves and National Guard – 28 percent of those filing disability claims – rather than career military. Reserves and National Guard made up a greater percentage of troops in these wars than they did in previous ones. About 31 percent of Guard/Reserve new veterans have filed claims compared to 56 percent of career military ones.

More of the new veterans are women, accounting for 12 percent of those who have sought care through the VA. Women also served in greater numbers in these wars than in the past. Some female veterans are claiming PTSD due to milThe new veterans have different types of injuries than previous veterans did. That's partly because improvised bombs have been the main weapon and because body armor and improved battlefield care allowed many of them to survive wounds that in past wars proved fatal.

"They're being kept alive at unprecedented rates," said Dr. David Cifu, the VA's medical rehabilitation chief. More than 95 percent of troops wounded in Iraq and Afghanistan have survived.

Larry Bailey II is an example. After tripping a rooftop bombin Afghanistan last June, the 26-year-old Marine remembers flying into the air, then fellow troops attending to him.

"I pretty much knew that my legs were gone. My left hand, from what I remember I still had three fingers on it," although they didn't seem right, Bailey said. "I looked a few times but then they told me to stop looking." Bailey, who is from Zion, Ill., north of Chicago, ended up a triple amputee and expects to get a hand transplant this summer.

He is still transitioning from

• Thousands are disfigured, as many as 200 of them so badly that they may need face transplants. One-quarter of battlefield injuries requiring evacuation included wounds to the face or jaw, one study found.

"The numbers are pretty staggering," said Dr. Bohdan Pomahac, a surgeon at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston who has done four face transplants on nonmilitary patients and expects to start doing them soon on veterans.

Others have invisible wounds. More than 400,000 of these new veterans have been treated by the VA for a mental health problem, most commonly, PTSD.

Tens of thousands of veterans suffered traumatic brain injury, or TBI — mostly mild concussions from bomb blasts — and doctors don't know what's in store for them longterm. Cifu, of the VA, said that roughly 20 percent of active duty troops suffered concussions, but only one-third of them have symptoms lasting beyond a few months.

That's still a big number, and "it's very rare that someone has just a single concussion," said David Hovda, director of the UCLA Brain Injury Research Center. Suffering multiple concussions, or one soon after another, raises the risk of long-term problems. A brain injury also makes the brain more susceptible to PTSD, he said.

On a more mundane level, many new veterans have back, shoulder and knee problems, aggravated by carrying heavy packs and wearing the body armor that helped keep them alive. One recent study found that 19 percent required orthopedic surgery consultations and 4 percent needed surgery after returning from combat.

All of this adds up to more disability claims, which for years have been coming in faster than the government can handle them. The average wait to get a new one processed grows longer each month and is now about eight months — time that a frustrated, injured veteran might spend with no income.

More than 560,000 veterans from all wars currently have claims that are backlogged – older than 125 days. The VA's benefits chief,

Hickey, gave these reasons: • Sheer volume. Disability claims from all veterans soared from 888,000 in 2008 to 1.3 million in 2011. Last year's included more than 230,000 new claims from Vietnam veterans and their survivors because of a change in what conditions can be considered related to Agent Orange exposure. Those complex, 50-yearold cases took more than a third of available staff, she said.

• High number of ailments per claim. When a veteran claims 11 to 14 problems, each one requires "due diligence" a medical evaluation and proof that it is service-related, Hickey said.

• A new mandate to handle the oldest cases first. Because these tend to be the most complex, they have monopolized staff and pushed up average processing time on new claims, she said.

• Outmoded systems. The VA is streamlining and going to electronic records, but for now, "We have 4.4 million case files sitting around 56 regional offices that we have to work with; that slows us down significantly," Hickey said.

Barry Jesinoski, executive director of Disabled American Veterans, called Hickey's efforts "commendable," but said: "The VA has a long way to go" to meet veterans' needs. Even before the surge in Agent Orange cases, VA officials "were already at a place that was unacceptable" on backlogged claims, he said.

He and VA officials agree that the economy is motivating some claims. His group helps veterans file them, and he said that sometimes when veterans come in, "We'll say, 'Is your back worse?' and they'll say, 'No, I just lost my job."

Jesinoski does believe these veterans have more mental problems, especially from multiple deployments.

"You just can't keep sending people into war five, six or seven times and expect that they're going to come home just fine," he said.

For taxpayers, the ordeal is just beginning. With any war, the cost of caring for veterans rises for several decades and peaks 30 to 40 years later, when diseases of aging are more common, said Harvard economist Linda Bilmes. She estimates the health care and disability costs of the recent wars at \$600 billion to \$900 billion.

"This is a huge number and there's no money set aside," she said. "Unless we take steps now into some kind of fund that will grow over time, it's very plausible many people will feel we can't afford these benefits we overpromised."

How would that play to these veterans, who all volunteered and now expect the government to keep its end of the bargain?

"The deal was, if you get wounded, we're going to supply this level of support," Bilmes said. Right now, "there's a lot of sympathy and a lot of people want to help. But memories are short and times change."

Panetta: U.S. on Right Track'in Afghanistan

WASHINGTON (AP) • Defense Secretary Leon Panetta on Sunday defended the Obama administration's plans to wind down the more than decade-long war in Afghanistan, saying the U.S. is on "the right track?'

"We still have a fight on our hands," Panetta said Sunday on ABC's "This Week."

"The American people need to know that. The world needs to know that ... but we're on the right track," he added.

Last week, NATO allies affirmed a plan to end combat operations inside Afghanistan by the end of 2014. Republicans, including Mitt Romney, have criticized President Barack Obama's insistence on setting a firm timetable for the war because they say it shows a lack of commitment to the region and encourages enemy fighters to wait out a U.S. departure.

Panetta said critics of the plan should be mindful that the timetable has been embraced by some 50 allied nations.

"That is the plan that has been agreed to. And it's a plan that is working," Panetta said.

"And very frankly, the only way to get this accomplished - in terms of the transition that we have to go through - is to be able to set the kind of timelines that have been set here in order to ensure that we fulfill the mission of an Afghanistan that governs and secures itself," he added.

Panetta also reiterated his criticism of the conviction of a Pakistani doctor who helped the CIA find and kill terrorist leader Osama bin Laden, calling the lengthy prison sentence handed to Dr. Shakil Afridi "disturbing?

"It is so difficult to understand and it's so disturbing that they would sentence this doctor to 33 years for helping in the search for the most notorious terrorist in our

times," Panetta said. "This doctor was not working against Pakistan?'

U.S. officials have urged Pakistan to release the physician, who ran a vaccination program for the CIA to collect DNA and verify the al-Oaida leader's presence at the compound in the town of Abbottabad where U.S. commandos killed him in May 2011.

The capture of bin Laden strained the U.S. relationship with Pakistan, as did U.S. airstrikes that accidentally killed 24 Pakistani soldiers near the border. Pakistan responded to the airstrikes by closing key transit routes into Afghanistan. The chilly U.S.-Pakistan relationship was on public display at last week's NATO meeting, where Obama left Pakistan off a list of nations he thanked for help getting war supplies into Afghanistan.

Panetta called the U.S. relationship with Pakistan "one of the most complicated we've had."

"This is a country that still is critical in that region of the world," he said. "It's an up-anddown relationship. There have been periods where we've had good cooperation and they have worked with us."



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

Precinct Committeemen Latest Chess Piece in Political Game in Idaho

ost years, the job of precinct committee person (each major party has them) flies quietly under the radar. In Idaho (and some other places), not this year.



Across Idaho, battles for precinct committee positions have erupted, reflecting an ideological struggle inside the Republican Party.

One of the problems Idaho Democrats long have had is the lack, in many places, of precinct leaders. These are important, basic, building-block positions for party organization, important for local organizing and choosing local party leaders, and sometime filling vacancies for offices like state legislator. In Idaho, the Republican Party long has outshone the Democrats in getting many more of those spots filled. (Neither party fills them all.)

Ordinarily, only one person runs for nearly all precinct committee spots, but this year Republicans had an unusually large number of contests, in places around the state. They became intense enough that I spotted something I've not seen before, in any year – a campaign website devoted to one precinct, aimed at one political party. It is Kootenai County precinct 61; the Web writers describe it as "A resource for the Republican Party members of Precinct 61."

In Twin Falls County, the Republican Liberty Caucus ran a slew of challenges to often-veteran precinct officers, and won almost a third of the seats. The mainstream party leaders expressed relief that the challengers hadn't won a majority, but they'd better not count on the pressure to ease off soon. Many races were competitive; one was decided by a coin flip.

Another coin flip came in Ada County, home to a large pile of contests, where Roger Brown, a Ron Paul activist, unseated governor's aide Roger Brown. In another race, a party nominee for state legislator lost a precinct office. One of the most prominent Paul backers in the county, former legislative candidate Lucas Baumbach, was defeated. But Paul backers won more than a third of the precinct seats in the Ada County party organization, enough to have impact.

Overall, the Paul forces fell short of the statewide precinct numbers they would have needed for their more ambitious projects, like the attempt to shift Idaho national convention votes to Paul from Mitt Romney. (That one never felt like much of a starter.) In Bannock County, a county meeting projected by one veteran county party official, Jim Johnston, as "a bloodbath," turned out sedate.


But getting even a third of the votes in a county organization has its uses. Here's an indication how.

Kootenai County Republicans earlier this year asked Texas congressional candidate Richard Mack to speak to the party's Lincoln Day dinner. After the invitation was made, 14 precinct committee members sent a letter to the local party leadership objecting to Mack, saying his "support of the Republican Party and Republican Party candidates is inconsistent, intermittent and questionable." The battle raged for a while and went public. Eventually, the Mack invitation held up, he spoke, and the event was held without incident. 

Polls on Gay Marriage Not Yet Reflected in Votes

NEW YORK • Poll after poll shows public support for same-sex marriage steadily increasing, to the point where it's now a majority viewpoint. Yet in all 32 states where gay marriage has been on the ballot, voters have rejected it.

It's possible the streak could end in November, when Maine, Maryland, Minnesota and Washington state are likely to have closely contested gay marriage measures on their ballots.

For now, however, there remains a gap between the national polling results and the way states have voted. It's a paradox with multiple

explanations, from political geography to the likelihood that some conflicted voters tell pollsters one thing and then vote differently.

"It's not that people are lying. It's an intensely emotional issue," said Amy Simon, a pollster based in Oakland, Calif. "People can report to you how they feel at the moment they're answering the polls, but they can change their mind."

California experienced that phenomenon in November 2008, when voters, by a 52-48 margin, approved a ban on same-sex marriage in the state constitution. A statewide Field Poll that September indicated Proposition 8 would lose decisively; an updated poll a week before the vote still showed it trailing by 5 percentage points.

California is an unusual case. It's one of a few reliably Democratic states that have had a statewide vote rebuffing same-sex marriage. The vast majority of the referendums have been in more conservative states, which have a greater predilection for using ballot measures to set social policy. The 32 states that have rejected gay marriage at the polls make up just over 60 percent of the U.S. population.

Voters in liberal states such as Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut and New York, where gay marriage was legalized by judges or legislators, might vote to affirm those decisions but haven't had the opportunity.

Most of the states that voted against gay marriage did so between 2004 and 2008. Since then, only Maine in 2009 and North Carolina on May 8 have rebuffed same-sex marriage in referendums, while legislatures in Washington state, Maryland, New Jersey, Hawaii, New York, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Illinois and Delaware have voted for same-sex marriage or civil unions.

In all, there are now six states with legal same-sex marriage and nine more granting gay and lesbian couples broad marriagestyle rights via civil unions or domestic partnerships. Together, those 15 states account for about 35 percent of the U.S. population.

Work Just Beginning in Case Against Shop Clerk Accused of Killing NYC Boy Who Vanished in 1979

NEW YORK • For prosecutors, the work is just beginning after the astonishing arrest last week of a man who police say confessed to strangling a 6-year-old New York City boy 33 years ago in one of the nation's most bewildering missing children's cases.

Pedro Hernandez, 51, was charged with second-degree murder in the 1979 death of Etan Patz, based largely on a signed confession he gave after he spoke voluntarily to detectives for hours, according to police.

But to convince a jury beyond a reasonable doubt, prosecutors need more than the confession, even though corroboration isn't necessarily required by law, legal experts say. Piecing together that supporting evidence may be difficult: There's no body and no physical evidence, plus a history of famous false confessions in other high-profile cases.

"We live in a day of CSI, fingerprinting, DNA, hand samples, and foot prints and treads on bottoms of shoes and boots. There's going to be none of that here, and that's tough," said Arthur Aidala, a former prosecutor who is now a criminal defense attorney. "You're essentially relying on this guy's own words, and whether he's credible."

False confessions are common and happen for many reasons, said James Cohen, a law professor at Fordham University, "whether it's that someone is coerced, scared, or is just a wacko looking for 15 minutes of fame."

Michael Haneke's 'Amour' Wins Cannes Film Festival Palme d'Or

CANNES, France • The Cannes Film Festival rewarded one of its favorite directors Sunday, as Michael Haneke won the top prize for a second time with his stark film about love and death, "Amour."

The Austrian director's powerful and understated film stars two French acting icons - 85-year-old Emmanuelle Riva and 81-year-old Jean-Louis Trintignant - as an elderly couple coping with the wife's worsening health.

Cannes jury member Jean Paul Gaultier praised the performances of the two actors and the "incredible connection" they established in the movie.

Haneke said he made the film because "I experienced something in my family that touched me." He thanked his wife and - in a rare personal comment - said he had promised her "we would never leave each other, like in the film."

Some viewers were surprised by the movie's frank humanity, coming from a master of tightly controlled cinema whose movies often contain sudden bursts of violence.

China Boom: Outsourcing Surveillance to Co-workers, Neighbors Shows Expanding Police Power

BEIJING • Every workday at 7,20 a.m., colleagues pick up Yao Lifa from his second-floor apartment and drive him to the elementary school where he taught for years.

This is no car pool. Yao is a prisoner, part of a China boom in outsourced police control.

By day, Yao is kept in a room, not allowed to work and watched by fit, young gym teachers and other school staff. At dinner time or later, he is sent back to the apartment that he shares with his wife and 3-year-old daughter. A surveillance camera monitors the building entrance, while police sit in a hut outside.

"At school, if I have to go to the bathroom, someone escorts me. Most of the time, I'm not allowed to speak with others or answer the phone," Yao said in a recent latenight Internet phone interview from his home in Qianjiang city. "When they bring me home, they sign me over to the next shift."

Like the blind activist Chen Guangcheng until his escape from house arrest last month, Yao belongs to an untold number of Chinese activists kept under tight control by authorities, even though in many cases they have broken no law.

Driving Season Begins, as Does Griping about Gas

NEW YORK • It's Memorial Day weekend and our national obsession with the price of gasoline is in focus once again.

We'll spend a little less at the pump than a few weeks ago, but that won't stop us from muttering to ourselves, griping to friends and pointing fingers in many directions.

Our rants about gasoline and the oil industry may not always be based on facts, but one thing is undeniable: Americans are obsessed with the price of gasoline. More than any other good or service we buy.

In the language of economists, the price of gasoline is "salient?" That means it sticks in our brains. Here's why:

We're reminded of the price every time we pass a gas station and see those huge, numbered signs. We buy gas every week, unlike bills we pay monthly or a couple times a year. Milk is \$4 a gallon, but we buy only one. When we fill up with gas, we spend \$50 or more.

And the biggest frustration, which comes into focus as the numbers spin ever higher at the pump: There is no alternative.

"The oil companies have cornered the market and they are squeezing us for everything we have," says Bob Simpson, 62, of Lodi, N.J., who pays close to \$60 to fill up his Ford Escape.

Cheap gas makes the wide open spaces of America seem full of possibility and adventure. When it's expensive, we think twice before setting out.

"Driving is a symbol of freedom in the U.S.," says Shanjun Li, an economist who studies consumer behavior at Cornell University's Dyson School of Applied Economics.

At a nationwide average Friday of \$3.67 per gallon, gasoline is far cheaper in the U.S. than much of the rest of the world, thanks to relatively low taxes. In Japan, gas costs more than \$7 a gallon; in Britain, nearly \$9. Yet Amer-

icans consider cheap gas a birthright, so it's a shock when factors beyond our control drive up the price.

People understand why a big TV costs more than a small one, or why tickets to a playoff game are more expensive than a regular season game. But it's harder to appreciate why a local gas station charges more because of high oil demand in China or a remark by an official in Iran. It must be, we reason, that someone is taking advantage of us.

It's not the case, of course: The market for oil and gasoline is global, so rising demand anywhere can push up prices everywhere. And world oil demand is forecast to rise to a record this year.

Also, oil and gasoline are priced on financial exchanges, not by oil companies. Investors can buy oil and gasoline futures contracts and push up prices - if they fear supplies could be disrupted in the future. But they also can bet that prices will go down.

When President Barack Obama promised stricter oversight of oil markets and a crackdown on "speculators" last month, he stopped short of saying market manipulation was responsible for the current high prices.

Franchitti Wins Third Indy 500

INDIANAPOLIS • Dan Wheldon couldn't win his third Indianapolis 500. Dario Franchitti did it for him.

And if it wasn't going to be Franchitti, then it would be Scott Dixon. Maybe even Tony Kanaan.

No matter what, one of Wheldon's best buddies was going to Victory Lane.

In the end, they celebrated a 1-2-3 sweep that honored D-Dub, their missing friend.

Franchitti stamped his name in the record books by winning his third Indy 500 on Sunday, a day that started and ended as a tribute to Wheldon, who won the race a year ago but was killed in an October crash in the IndyCar season finale. As his three friends lined up with six laps remaining for the final restart – Kanaan out front, Chip Ganassi teammates Franchitti and Dixon second and third - they couldn't help but wonder if Wheldon was at play.

"Kind of like old times, the three of us back and forwards," Franchitti said. "I thought, 'Dan is laughing at us right now going at it."

It was an absolutely fitting finish, even if the elation for Franchitti's win was tempered by the heartbreak for

So the last-lap pass attempt was Sato's for the taking, and he couldn't pull it off as he hugged the inside white line through Turn 1. His wheels appeared to touch Franchitti's, he spun hard into the wall, and Franchitti sailed past for the win - this one, just like the first two, under caution.

Dixon crossed the finish line in second, and Kanaan was third.

"Everybody up there was a friend of Dan's, and that about sums it up. Everybody loved him," Franchitti said as bagpipes played over the public address system.

And the Thunder didn't even need their own Big Three to keep things close.

Durant, Westbrook and Harden at one point through the second quarter were 5 of 21 – a typically ominous stat line for a trio that had been responsible for nearly 70 percent of Oklahoma City's points through the playoffs so far. But for all the talk about San Antonio's superior bench, it was the Thunder's reserves who picked up the slack.

None more so than Derek Fisher, whose famous game-winner for the Lakers on this same court in the 2004 playoffs has made "0.4 seconds" a phrase that needs no further explanation to the Spurs. Eight years later, and the oldest player in this series at 37, Fisher already met his playoff average at halftime and finished with 13 points.

Gary Neal added 12 points and was the only other Spurs player in double figures.

PARIS • Easy to understand why Andy Roddick never enjoyed playing on red clay all that much.

First and foremost, the footing is tricky as can be. The soft courts take his booming serves and forehands down a notch, too. Put simply, his game is built for hard or grass courts. As if that weren't enough, he arrived at this French Open having played only 16 matches in a season interrupted by injuries to his right hamstring and right ankle.

If Roddick was tempted to sit out Roland Garros altogether – or tempted to use his health or rust as an excuse for playing poorly - he did not. The 26th-seeded American, once ranked No.1 and once a Grand Slam champion, gave it a shot and came up short Sunday, exiting in a major tournament's opening round for the first time since 2007, and at the same venue.







East for England, bid one club, and South overcalled one heart. North-South explored further, then settled in three hearts. Sally Brock led her singleton diamond; Smith took her ace and returned the diamond nine, suit preference for spades. Brock ruffed, returned a spade, and received another diamond ruff. Another spade return completed a perfect defense that saw the contract one down from the get-go.

In the other room, the auction went as shown, with Catherine Draper as North sensibly evaluating her diamond fit and aces to be worth a shot at game, once she found her partner with length in both red suits.

West looked no further than the club king for her opening salvo. Anne Rosen won in dummy, drew trump, knocked out the diamond ace, discarded a spade on dummy's fifth diamond, and claimed 10 tricks.

Should West have read more into the accelerated bidding after diamonds were mentioned? West has five points and her partner had opened the bidding. Simple arithmetic reveals that North and South are unlikely to have the normal number of high cards usually associated with a majorsuit game. The inference is that they have found a second fit, and the diamond ruff may therefore be critical to defeat the game.

ANSWER: It is often right to lead a trump when declarer ends up in his second suit. (One can infer that dummy will be short in declarer's first suit.) Here, though, partner should be able to overruff spades, so a trump lead seems unnecessary. I'd lead the unbid suit — and while a good case could be made for a high spot-card, I'd simply lead the two (or the four if playing third-andlow leads).



DEAR DISTURBED SON:

As far as granting a personal last wish, you need to use vour best judgment, particularly if doing so would cause financial hardship. In this case, cremation would be a creative way to make everyone happy. Mildred Wirt Benson, creator of the "Nancy Drew" children's mystery stories, died in Toledo, Ohio, at age 96. Five years ago: The United States and Iran broke a 27-year diplomatic freeze with a four-hour meeting in Baghdad about Iraqi security. President George W. Bush, during a Memorial Day visit to Arlington National Cemetery, honored U.S. troops who had fought and died for freedom and expressed his steely resolve to succeed in the war in Iraq. Miss Japan Rita Mori was crowned Miss Universe 2007 at the pageant in Mexico City. One year ago: President Barack Obama praised Poland's transition to democracy following a meeting in Warsaw with President Bronislaw Komorowski. After a four-year blockade, Egypt permanently opened the Gaza Strip's main gateway to the outside world. North Korea freed Eddie Jun, an American it had held for a half year for reportedly proselytizing.
