Report: Long-term Care Resource Centers Need Improvement

TWIN FALLS • Idaho's long-term care system might offer plenty of options, but only to those who already understand the system.

That's according to a report from the AARP that ranked Idaho last in how consumers can learn about the state's long-term care services. While the report did commend the state's wide range of options, it calls for a better way for consumers of all disabilities and income levels to learn about the resources that are available to meet their needs.

"Idaho has a 2-1-1 CareLine right now but there's still a lot of fragmentation," said Cathy McDougall, associate state director for AARP.

Specifically, the AARP seeks an improvement to the state's resource centers that offer a central location on how to find information on long-term care services. The state's current version is primarily a website headed by the Idaho Commission on Aging. The site links to local agencies for people to find out more in their own regions but the AARP would like to see more.

"These centers should be branded as the first place for a person to go for local resources to guide you through the federal, state and county programs," McDougall said. "A good one should be able to do that well."

However, a one-stop shop might not be the best approach to take, said Jim Fields, director of the College of Southern Idaho Office on Aging in Twin Falls.

Fields' office is the Magic Valley's local resource center. He coordinates with local agencies to help provide information on long-term care services throughout the area.

"Philosophically, it may make sense but that's just not the way it works," Fields said.

Currently, there are six resource centers in Idaho. Fields said he expects each one to provide more information online in the future, but not until more funding and energy can be devoted to those websites.

"These centers are only a few years old. The first one was set up five years ago," Fields said. "The commission has updated the site quite a bit since it first went up."

Until then, McDougall said policy makers and health care managers should use the AARP report as a tool to understand how Idaho's long-term care system works.

"It's good to know how long-term care functions in this state," she said.

One Killed when Sprayer Hits Sedan

WENDELL • A Wendell woman was killed Thursday when a RoGator sprayer backed over her car.

Idaho State Police are still investigating the incident, which occurred at 7:38 a.m. in Gooding County on 1348 East Road near 3200 South Road,

near Wendell.

Shane Collins, 47, of Wendell was operating the sprayer on 1348 East, according to ISP Trooper Aaron Bingham. Collins missed a turn, put the tractor in reverse and began backing up to make the turn, causing the sprayer to drive over a Dodge Neon driven by Martina Aguilar of Wendell.

Aguilar died from her injuries at the scene of

the crash.

Bingham said it appeared Aguilar was stopped in traffic behind Collins at the scene, but police had not determined for sure if her vehicle was moving. There were no brake marks at the small crash scene, he said.

Alcohol is not believed to be a factor in the crash.

TWIN FALLS • Drooling with anticipation over the proposed dog park? You're not alone.

But dog owners and their charges are going to have to wait. Though the city's acquisition of the future dog park land is nearly a done deal, it could be months before the park is ready for the packs of pups eager to run leash-free.

On Tuesday, the Twin Falls City Council approved a land swap between the city and Twin Falls County to acquire about three acres, currently owned by the county, on the corner of Shoup Avenue West and Blake Street North.

The plan: To turn the land into a community garden and dog park, said Dennis Bowyer, director of the Twin Falls Parks and Recreation Department.

Before the dogs roam, the city must make improvements. And it's not as easy as putting up a fence and calling it a day.

Right now, the lot is mostly dried-up weeds. If the city adds grass, it will be a while before that

Twin Falls Grad Sees School as Key to Better Future

TWIN FALLS • When she was in middle school, Madison McInnes decided the best way to deal with family struggles was to invest her energy into school.

The graduating Twin Falls High School senior said she wanted to prove everyone wrong who claimed she wouldn't be successful.

"I had to start building a future for myself," she said.

McInnes said there were many difficulties and struggles getting to her high school graduation day. But she has motivation for the future.

"I believe strongly that challenges build character," she said.

In December, McInnes moved out of her family's house to live on her own. She works two jobs — at the YMCA doing youth fitness training and selling products for Bella Pierre Idaho — in order to take care of herself and pay bills.

Challenges started for McInnes when she was 12 years old. Over the past five years, family situations led to her moving between Twin Falls, Utah and California.

Moving around frequently, she said, was a huge obstacle. Some classes she took freshman and sophomore year in California

didn't transfer over.

She moved back to Twin Falls when she was 14.

McInnes had to retake some classes online in addition to her regular classes at Twin Falls High and night classes through the College of Southern Idaho.

"I just had to suck it up and make sure I graduated," she said.

As July 4 Nears, Flying Fireworks Return to Valley

A loophole in state law continues to make it easy to procure illegal fireworks — which concerns city and fire officials.

RUPERT • In a couple of weeks, multicolored bursts of light and the tell-tale snaps, sizzles and pops of exploding aerial fireworks will begin filling the skies.

The tradition will stretch well through the first week of July in celebration of the nation's birthday — despite laws prohibiting their use.

Minidoka County Undersheriff Vic Watson said the laws regarding fireworks sales and use are perplexing.

“There is a lot of confusion about what's legal and what isn't,” Watson said.

A loophole in state law allows aerial fireworks to be sold as long as buyers sign a waiver stating they won't light them in Idaho.

Minidoka County Fire Protection District Chief Mike Brown said cities are also able to restrict fireworks sales and use to those deemed “safe and sane,” meaning they do not leave the ground before exploding.

The cities of Burley and Rupert have fireworks ordinances in place. Rupert officials are currently toiling to update their ordinance that has not been revised since the 1960s.

Rupert City Clerk Bayley Fuller said the revisions will be minor, removing some language that no longer applies and extending the sale of fireworks through July 7.

Brown said most of the illegal fireworks are being sold in the rural areas of the county, and sales are definitely on the rise.

more fires,” he said.

Watson said the sheriff's office receives only a few complaints each year about aerial fireworks use. Someone caught with illegal fireworks will have them confiscated and could receive a misdemeanor citation.

“From a law-enforcement perspective we want people to be safe,” Watson said. “If aerial fireworks are being used there is always the potential that they will drift over onto someone else's property and cause a fire.”

Watson said it's “very difficult” to enforce the fireworks law because an officer has to see the person light an illegal firework.

“And it's not just the illegal fireworks that cause injuries and fires,” Watson said. “Every year we have reports of injuries from both legal and illegal fireworks.”

A few years ago, Watson's son had a legal firework explode in his hand, burning him.

“I haven't seen anything more dangerous than a sparkler,” Brown said. “It really boils down to taking personal responsibility. All fireworks are dangerous. They have to be handled correctly.”

grass is hardy enough for dogs, Bowyer said.

A sprinkler system is also a must. Bowyer estimated the cost to be about \$15,000.

Parking might also present a problem. Both Blake Street North and Shoup Avenue West have bike lanes, meaning visitors can't park on the street at the site.

There is room on the lot to put in parking, and if the city provides workers internally, that could save a lot of money, Bowyer said.

If the city decides to build a bathroom at the park, it will fall under development requirements like curbs, gutters and sidewalks, said Community Development Director Mitch Humble at a Tuesday City Council meeting. Those improvements cost about \$42 per linear foot.

While Bowyer wants to eventually put in a bathroom, he said the city could wait a couple of years until they raise enough money.

As far as the eventual cost to taxpayers, that depends

on donations, what amenities the city decides to put in the park and how quickly the city acts. Those plans will come together in the next few months.

And donations for the dog park have already started to come in. One woman has pledged \$10,000, and Twin Falls County Commissioner Leon Mills volunteered his time to build the fence, which saves the city thousands of dollars. The Twin Falls Community Foundation is also collecting donations.

So far, there has been no negative feedback from neighbors or nearby businesses, Bowyer said.

Lori Leary hopes it stays that way. The Magic Valley Canine Social Club member is eager for the park to open, but said not all neighbors were fans of the temporary dog park at the College of Southern Idaho baseball fields.

“I'm hoping there won't be any snags,” she said.

Gary Hawkins lives across the street from the lot. He wasn't concerned about the noise or parking.

“It's better than all that weed patch,” Hawkins said.

Cassia Magistrate Rick Bollar Tabbed as New Minidoka Judge

RUPERT • Cassia County 5th District Magistrate Judge Rick Bollar was selected Thursday to replace retiring Minidoka County Magistrate Judge Larry Duff.

Duff is set to retire June 30. Bollar will take the bench in Minidoka County on July 1.

Bollar said he received the news on Thursday.

“I'm pleased with the appointment,” Bollar said. “I understand they had a selection of capable candidates.”

Bollar said rather than take over the duties of Duff, who handles all the juvenile cases in Mini-Cassia, he will likely keep the same type of caseload as he currently has in Cassia County. The juvenile duties will be shifted.

Fifth Judicial District Trial Court Administrator Linda Wright said Bollar's position in Cassia County will open today.

Fifth District Judge G. Richard Bevan, the administrative judge for the district and chairman of the district's Magistrates Commission, announced the appointment in a press release. Bevan said there were five highly qualified applicants, and that he and the other Magistrates Commission members were confident the people of Minidoka County will be

well-served by Bollar.

Upon appointment, magistrate judges serve an 18-month probationary period. After that, they stand for a retention election in the county in which they are seated and, if retained, serve four-year terms.



Bollar

Bollar has been a magistrate judge in Cassia County since November 2003. He has also presided over a regular caseload of criminal proceedings in Minidoka County during that time, and is the presiding judge of the Mini-Cassia Domestic Violence Court. He currently serves as the president of the Statewide Magistrates Association.

Before becoming a judge, Bollar served as the Minidoka County prosecutor starting in 1997 and was a partner with Goodman & Bollar Law starting in 1993. He also served as city attorney for Rupert for 12 years, for Acequia for 11 years and for Minidoka for 10 years. He also represented the cities of Heyburn and Paul in criminal prosecutions starting in 1990.

Bollar earned his law degree from the University of Idaho in 1986.

In the press release, Bevan wrote that the 5th District is fortunate to keep Bollar within the district.

“I'm really happy to be moving back to Minidoka County,” Bollar said.

Teen Burned in Jerome Grease Fire

JEROME • A 17-year-old boy has second- and third-degree burns on about 12 percent of his body due to a kitchen grease fire Thursday morning, said Jack Krill, deputy chief of the Jerome City Fire Department.

"They were heating some oil to cook tater tots," Krill said.

The 17-year-old was at home in the 400 block of West Avenue G with his 19-year-old brother and another friend, and the three forgot about the oil on the stove until it caught fire, Krill said.

By the time the fire department and Jerome police arrived just before 9 a.m., the fire was out.

"They had taken the pan outside, spilling some of it," Krill said. "It did catch the microwave on fire above the stove."

Krill said the plastic on the microwave created a lot of black smoke and soot, which caused about \$2,000 to \$3,000 in damage to the kitchen.

When authorities arrived they initially only spoke to the 19-year-old man. Only later did Krill find the 17-year-old hiding with a friend in the basement.

"I'm not sure if they thought they were in trouble," he said.

Firefighters immediately started treating the boy, who was later taken to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center and was scheduled to be transported to a Salt Lake City burn center, Krill said.

Police didn't issue any citations or charges connected to the fire, said Jerome City Police Chief Dan Hall.

Snake River Bridge Project to Begin Next Week

BURLEY • Construction on the U.S. Highway 30 Snake River Bridge between Burley and Heyburn will reduce traffic to one lane in each direction starting Monday, according to the Idaho Transportation Department.

The project will begin by repairing concrete portions underneath the bridge, including abutments and pier caps. Crews will work from a barge in the Snake River, which will require almost half of the bridge to be closed while work is done

under the structure.

Afterward, crews will remove the asphalt overlay, repair the deck and apply a deck sealant. Workers will also apply concrete waterproofing, replace the joint seals and install snowplow deflectors.

ITD is asking drivers to watch for changing traffic patterns throughout the summer and to use extra caution near the bridge for the safety of workers and barge operation.

The project is contracted out to Cannon Builders Inc. of Blackfoot for \$549,000. The contractor expects the project will be finished in September.

Feds Running Idaho in Circles on Sage Grouse Issue

Hang on. We’re on the sage grouse merry-go-round. It’s moving fast and it could change direction any minute.

When people talk about the federal government’s “War on the West,” they aren’t talking about actual or intended aggression from Washington D.C. as much as they are talking about the devastation that ignorance has when decisions are made from an office on the East Coast.

For those on the Idaho side of the sage grouse issue, it’s hard not to feel like we’re on the front lines of another “War on the West” battlefield.

Their weapon of choice is a set of sage grouse-related regulations that could destroy our economy. Their marksmanship is sporadic and just when we think we’ve dodged a bullet, another one heads our way from a different direction. The 10 other states with sage grouse habitat — including Utah, Colorado, Nevada and Wyoming — are all scrambling for cover.

It’s hard not to feel sympathy for the 16 members of the Idaho Sage Grouse Task Force who we’ve placed on this crumbling front line.

Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter established the task force in March of this year. They were instructed to provide him with recommendations that would protect the sage grouse and prevent the need for the federal government to protect the bird under the Endangered Species Act. They had an initial deadline of June 1 — today — to submit their recommendations.

In 2010, Interior Secretary Ken Salazar announced the sage grouse would be placed on the list of “candidate species” for future inclusion on Endangered Species List and its status would be reviewed yearly. A recent legal settlement gave the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service until 2015 to decide the bird’s status — threatened, endangered or not in need of federal protection.

The Idaho Sage Grouse Task Force was thrown a lot at once and they didn’t waste any time. They met at locations across the state for the three months they were given.

They agreed on recommendations to put a moratorium on new wind, oil and gas projects in sage grouse habitat and for sage grouse-friendly plans to suppress wildfires and control invasive species.

But they couldn’t agree on grazing management practices that would protect sage grouse without harming ranchers.

When it was obvious they wouldn’t meet today’s deadline, they were granted an extension until June 13. People are grumbling that they won’t make it in time. But the problem isn’t the task force — an informed and dedicated group.

The real problem is that the Idaho Sage Grouse Task Force had to be created at all. Idaho has had a massive, grassroots effort to come up with a sage grouse habitat management plan that goes back, in some cases, 10 to 15 years. The plan, submitted to Otter in 2006, involves local working groups (LWGs) — site-specific groups of private and government agency volunteers that have developed grouse management strategies targeted to their specific locations.

But we’re back at the drawing board because federal officials are now requiring that states cannot rely on volunteers in order to provide sage grouse protection.

How does it make sense to sideline dedicated volunteers with site-specific local knowledge? It doesn’t.

It does not make sense to have a federal agency dictating decisions that should be made by local residents, who have the knowledge to shape something that works for their communities.

Instead, the federal government has us going around in circles.

It feels less like a merry-go-round and more like one of those carnival games where the ducks go around in a circle and someone with poor aim tries to knock them off.

I knew Lacy would not make it and started calling vets in the phone book. I left messages and eventually gave up. I chose to spend the remaining time that she had reassuring and comforting her.

We did receive a call from

veterinary hospital in Twin Falls. The vet on call offered to meet us at the office. By the time we got Lacy to the office, she had died. We are grateful for the respect and dignity that she treated Lacy with upon examining her. We are grateful for the empathy that the hospital showed to us afterward. They understood our loss and treated us with compassion, and that meant a lot.

We agree wholeheartedly that a community the size of Twin Falls should provide 24-hour emergency care for pets. If each vet would take a proactive approach, we are sure the logistics could be worked out. We, too, would encourage pet owners to know their vet’s policy in regard to after-hour care.

Losing Lacy was hard, but the feeling that we failed her by not getting her proper care is unbearable. We applaud the Phillips for speaking out, and we encourage other pet owners to be the voice for their pets when it comes to after emergency care.

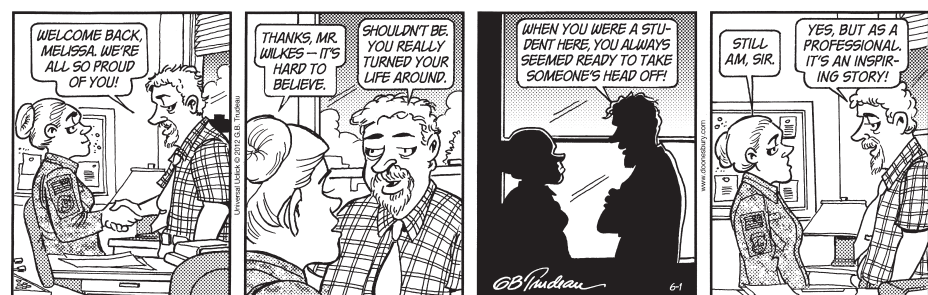

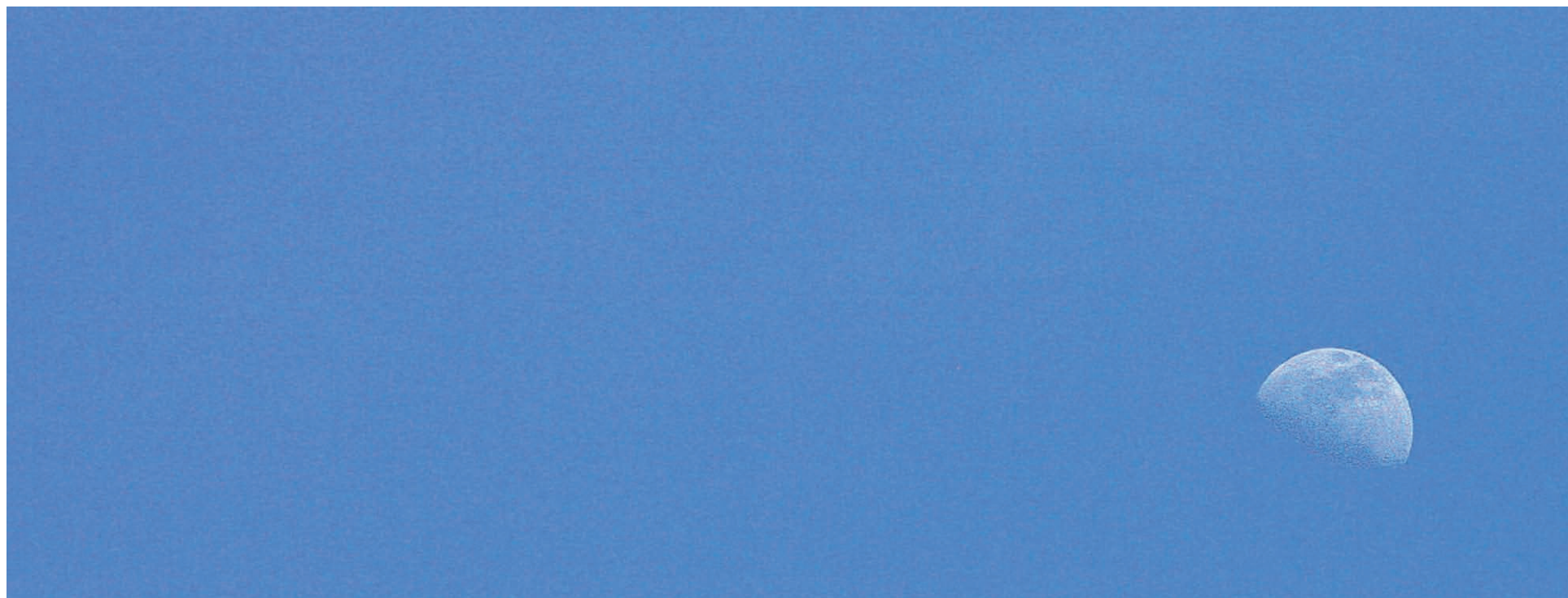

Wolf Killed after Carey Sheep Attack

KETCHUM • The state director of U.S. Wildlife Services says a central Idaho female wolf preying on sheep has been killed.

Todd Grimm tells the *Idaho Mountain Express* the wolf was tracked and killed May 24 after it killed a sheep on the Carey-area Flat Top Ranch owned by John Peavey.

Grimm says the wolf was less than 2 years old and weighed between 70 and 80 pounds.

A kill order was issued earlier this month for two adult wolves after Peavey reported ewes were killed. The kill order for the second wolf remains in effect through mid-July.

Defender of Wildlife spokeswoman Suzanne Stone says Peavey isn't using enough non-lethal deterrents to keep predators away from about 1,200 pregnant ewes spread over federal, state and private grounds.

GOP Director Leaving for Job at Boise Firm

BOISE • The executive director of the Idaho Republican Party is stepping down to take a job with a Boise law firm.

The party issued a statement Thursday saying Jonathan Parker has accepted a position as a lobbyist with the firm Holland & Hart.

Parker was appointed director of the state's dominant political party in January 2009.

In his new role, he will serve as Holland & Hart's director of governmental affairs and public relations. He plans to make the transition following the state party's convention in Twin Falls.

Jury in Boise Murder Trial Starts Its Work

BOISE • Jurors have begun deliberating in the murder trial of a Boise woman accused of fatally injuring a toddler at her day care center in December 2009.

Lawyers delivered closing arguments Thursday and the case has been handed over to the jury of nine women and three men.

Prosecutors say Katherine Stanfield killed 2-year-old Wyatt Fesler, who was the son of her daughter's boyfriend.

In arguing their case, prosecutors say the pronounced bleeding and swelling in the boy's brain, along with other injuries, show that he died as the result of aggravated battery. Stanfield has denied responsibility in the death since her 2010 arrest.

Analysis: Protecting Caribou to Cost \$1.5M

COEUR D'ALENE • The cost over the next two decades to protect old-growth habitat for endangered woodland caribou in northern Idaho and northeast Washington state will be about \$1.5 million, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service said.

"We don't want to dismiss that there are costs associated with protecting caribou or managing caribou," Bryon Holt, a biologist for Fish and Wildlife, told *The Spokesman-Review* in a story published Thursday.

The 87-page draft economic analysis also found the timber industry in rare circumstances could face up to three-year delays for some logging operations.

But Holt said the analysis also confirmed the agency's belief that designating critical caribou habitat will have little change on day-to-day use of public and private forests.

The agency has proposed designating more than 375,500 acres in the Selkirk Mountains as critical habitat for the endangered caribou. Most of the federal land is in Idaho's Bonner and Boundary counties and nearby Washington state's Pend Oreille County.

Bonner County officials want federal protections removed from woodland caribou and have hired the Pacific Legal Foundation, which plans to argue the southern Selkirk caribou

herd isn't a distinct population and isn't eligible to be listed as an endangered species.

Bonner County and the Idaho State Snowmobile Association are working on their own economic analysis for the cost of caribou protection. That report is due Monday.

"We'd like to be able to compare their report with our report," said Mike Nielsen, a Bonner County commissioner.

Public comments on the Fish and Wildlife's draft analysis, done by Industrial Economics Inc., a consultant in Cambridge, Mass., are being taken through July 2.

Commissioners have said the caribou habitat protection plan will result in new restrictions on logging, snowmobiling and forest access, costing the region money in jobs and tourism.

Woodland caribou, rarely seen creatures with antlers that stand as tall as a man, are struggling to survive in the United States, precariously occupying one remote area of the Northwest as a final toehold in the Lower 48. Only four caribou were counted south of the Canadian border during an aerial census last winter.

Federal endangered species law requires that critical habitat be set aside for the caribou, and environmental groups want a court to force the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to comply.

BOND STILL \$250K FOR CARETAKER OF WOMAN FOUND IN SUITCASE

BOISE • Dee R. Lynn, 75, was in her pajamas and not wearing her false teeth when her body was found zipped inside a suitcase buried under boxes and lumber in her garage.

New details emerged Thursday in the case against Carrie Horsman, Lynn's onetime caretaker and boarder.

Horsman is charged with felonies for failure to report a death and grand theft. She was arraigned Thursday in Fourth District Court. Horsman was being held on a \$250,000 bond.

Lynn's badly decomposed

body was found in June 2007. Toxicology tests revealed nothing, and the coroner couldn't pinpoint how Lynn had died.

No arrests had been made in the 75-year-old woman's death. Officials still can't call her death a homicide — the cause is officially listed as "undetermined."

Horsman, 43, of Boise, was charged with felony failure to report because she gave the police misleading statements, officials said.

Horsman also was indicted for allegedly taking \$7,525 in cash from Lynn in 2007, the Ada County prosecutor's office said Wednesday.

Charter School Issued Notice of Defect

CALDWELL (AP) • The state has issued a notice of defect to a public charter school in southwestern Idaho, citing its lack of accreditation and other concerns.

The notice sent Thursday is the first step in a lengthy process that could result in closure of the Heritage Community Charter School in Caldwell.

The Idaho Public Charter School Commission has since highlighted a list of concerns, including Heritage's lack of accreditation for its high school. The charter's failure to follow the accreditation process outlined by the state could harm students' ability to graduate.

No Charges to Be Filed in Utah 'Sister Wives' Case

SALT LAKE CITY • Criminal charges will not be pursued against a polygamous family made famous by the reality TV show "Sister Wives," a Utah prosecutor wrote Thursday in federal court filings.

The case against Kody Brown and his four wives — Meri, Janelle, Christine and Robyn — stars of the TLC show, has been closed, Utah County Attorney Jeff Buhman wrote in a motion seeking to have a lawsuit against his county dismissed.

Brown moved his wives and 16 children from Lehi, about 30 miles south of Salt Lake City, to the Las Vegas area in January 2011 after Utah authorities launched a bigamy investigation.

The Browns then sued Utah County along with Utah's governor and attorney general, claiming the state's bigamy statute violates their constitutional rights to due process, equal protection, free exercise of religion, free speech and freedom of association.

A federal judge later dropped the state from the case but allowed it to continue against the county.

U.S. District Judge Clark Waddoups said he dismissed Gov. Gary Herbert and Utah Attorney General Mark Shurtleff because Shurtleff had assured the Browns they wouldn't be prosecuted

under his policy that consenting adult polygamists won't be charged as long as they're not committing other crimes.

However, Waddoups noted that the Browns had reason to believe they could still face prosecution in Utah County, and agreed it could have a chilling effect on their ability to practice their constitutional rights in the state.

Buhman wrote in his Thursday motion that his county, too, had adopted the same state policy and would not pursue bigamy cases unless there was evidence of a victim or fraud.

"The criminal case against the Browns is closed and no charges will be filed against them for bigamy unless new evidence is discovered which would comport with the office's new policy," Buhman wrote.

The Browns' attorney Jonathan Turley said he was pleased that charges wouldn't be filed but noted the family didn't plan to drop the lawsuit, claiming state law remained "blatantly unconstitutional."

"I want to express our great relief for the Brown family that this long-standing threat has been finally lifted," Turley said in a statement. "The family has spent years being publicly denounced as felons by prosecutors and had to move to Nevada to protect their family and children."

Utah Gov. Orders Fleet Vehicles to Limit Idling

SALT LAKE CITY • Gov. Gary Herbert signed an executive order Thursday to limit idling in government vehicles to no more than 30 seconds — part of his strategy to avoid federal sanctions for Utah's often polluted air.

It wasn't clear how state officials will police idling time in thousands of fleet vehicles, but the Republican governor characterized it as part of an effort he announced in January to encourage people and businesses to voluntarily reduce emissions.

He called on all Utah motorists to follow suit and help the state reduce air pollution.

"Together, we can make a big difference," Herbert said Thursday. "By committing our employees to a common sense idle reduction policy, we hope to meaningfully reduce vehicle emissions across the state."

With 7,300 vehicles in the state fleet, Herbert estimates the idling restriction could save taxpayers up to 60,000 gallons of fuel a year.

The executive order makes exceptions for emergency vehicles or for vehicles stuck in traffic, and for idling necessary to operate heaters, air conditioners, warning lights and elevator lifts.

Salt Lake City adopted an "idle-free" ordinance in April that applies to all motorists. It limits "unnecessary" idling to two minutes, with many of the same exceptions as Utah's.

Fines can range from \$15 to \$125, but city officials have said they are emphasizing education over enforcement.

The city hasn't issued any fines but is realizing the ben-

efits of public awareness, Art Raymond, a spokesman for Mayor Ralph Becker, said Thursday.

"It's pretty difficult to get a fine when you can accumulate three warnings before a fine," he said.

Utah is under pressure to clean up air pollution or face the loss of highway funds or stricter enforcement of emissions. State officials owe the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency a set of comprehensive plans by Dec. 15 for reducing overall air pollution along the heavily populated Wasatch Front, from Brigham City to Provo.

Those counties — Cache, Davis, Salt Lake, Utah and Weber — don't consistently meet EPA air quality standards, especially during winter inversions, when cold air traps pollutants in mountain valleys for days or weeks at a time, making for some of the nation's dirtiest air.

"We applaud the state's effort to address idling. It raises awareness and sets an example," EPA spokesman Richard Mylott said Thursday. "Regional air quality planning is about the cumulative impact of a lot of measures, and this is a good step. Reducing vehicle idling reduces exposure to carbon monoxide and particle pollution as well as air toxins like benzene and formaldehyde. It also saves money and fuel."

Herbert said he's doing everything he can to get people and organizations to voluntarily reduce emissions.

"People are going to say if there isn't a stick to punish people with, it's not going to work," Herbert said in January. "I disagree. I think people will work together because it's in all of our best interests."

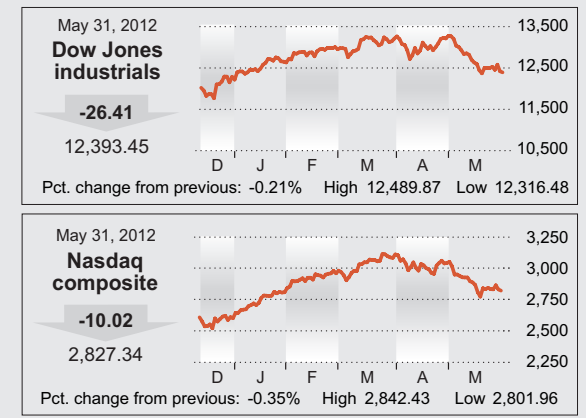

Google Files Patent Claim against Microsoft, Nokia

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) • Google lashed out at Microsoft and Nokia in a regulatory complaint, accusing them of illegally feeding mobile patents to a technology troll scavenging for billions of dollars in licensing fees that threaten to drive up the prices of cellphones and other wireless devices.

The claims were spelled out Thursday in a complaint filed with the European Commission, the chief regulator on that continent. Google Inc. also shared the complaint with the U.S. Justice Department and the Federal Trade Commission.

Microsoft Corp. brushed off Google's accusations as the "desperate tactic" of a company facing regulatory questions about its dominance of online search and digital advertising. Efforts to reach Nokia Corp. representatives at the company's headquarters in Finland late Thursday were unsuccessful.

The amount SunTrust Mortgage will pay to settle fed complaint • SunTrust Mortgage Inc. agreed Thursday to pay \$21 million to settle a federal lawsuit alleging racial discrimination in its lending practices, the second-largest fair lending settlement ever obtained by the U.S. Department of Justice. A complaint filed by the department in U.S. District Court in Richmond said SunTrust Mortgage charged more than 20,000 black and Hispanic borrowers more than similarly qualified non-Hispanic white borrowers between 2005 and 2009. Minority borrowers in 75 geographic markets paid more in loan fees or higher interest rates based solely on race or national origin, according to the complaint.

Hostess Could Lay Off 25 Area Workers

TWIN FALLS • The company that produces Twinkies and Wonder Bread could lay off 25 workers at four south-central Idaho locations by July 7, according to a State of Idaho WARN Act notice.

According to the notice, 19 of the possible layoffs would be at two Hostess locations in Twin Falls: one at 211 Freightway St. and the rest at 548 Washington St. Five would be in Heyburn, and one in Bellevue.

A manager at the Twin Falls Hostess Brands outlet said employees had orders not to talk about the

possible layoffs.

The Irving, Texas-based company filed for bankruptcy protection in January and has been working on a reorganization plan that involves layoffs and plant closings across the nation.

Earlier this month, Hostess mailed notices to all of its 18,500 employees in the U.S.

According to the Idaho Department

of Labor website, layoffs could also happen at Hostess facilities in Boise, Caldwell, Chubbuck, Idaho Falls, Montpelier, Mountain Home, Nampa, Pocatello and Rexburg.

The WARN Act requires most employers to give written notice at least 60 days in advance of plant closings and mass layoffs.

Hostess spokesman Erik Halvorson said that while the company is issuing notices, as required by law, the goal is still to emerge from bankruptcy.

This Spring's Job Slump Not So Bad by Comparison

This year's slowdown in job growth is an improvement on last year's, which was an improvement on the year before's.

WASHINGTON • Two straight months of disappointing job growth have raised fears that the U.S. economy is stalling for the third year in a row.

But don't despair just yet: This year's slowdown is an improvement on last year's, which was an improvement on the year before's.

Consider:
 • Hiring decelerated to an average 135,000 a month in March and April. That was slower than the December-February pace of 252,000 a month, but still a solid six-digit gain each month.

• During last year's slowdown, from May through August, job growth came in below 100,000 for four straight months. The average was 80,000 jobs a month.

• In 2010, the slowdown, from June through September, consisted of four straight months of job losses. The average loss was 76,000.

Each year, the slowdown has been at a significantly higher level than the year before.

"We're forming a base," says economist Joel Naroff of Naroff Economic Advisors. "The level of confidence going in to the spring and summer is definitely higher this year than last year."

Naroff expects the economy to create more than 2.4 million jobs this year, which would be the most since 2005. Last year, 1.8 million jobs were created. In 2010, 1 million. On Friday, the government will issue its employment report for May. The consensus forecast is that employers added 158,000 jobs.

The previous two years, the economy has endured a series of shocks. Europe's debt troubles undermined consumer and business confidence in 2010. Last year, Middle East unrest sent oil prices surging. An earthquake and tsunami in

Japan cut off supplies to many U.S. manufacturers. A political clash in Washington over the federal borrowing limit nearly forced the U.S. government to default and rattled consumers and businesses.

The economy has dodged such blows in 2012. A run-up in gasoline prices has begun to reverse just in time for the summer driving season. More than 1.8 million Americans have been hired over the past year.

Those gains feed on themselves. More people with paychecks means more spending on goods and services, which can lead companies to hire even more.

Many economists think the jobs slowdown the past two months may have occurred because growth surged from December through February — perhaps too much. Warm weather allowed construction firms and other employers to add jobs earlier than usual, effectively swiping jobs from the spring. The weak March and April jobs numbers may have been payback.

Still, the job market is far from strong. Economists expect that the government will report Friday that the economy generated a modest 158,000 jobs in May.

The number of people applying for unemployment benefits rose last week to a five-week high — though it's still hovering near the 375,000-a-week level that typically suggests hiring is strong enough to lower the unemployment rate.

Economists are expecting job growth to reaccelerate as the year grinds on. One good sign: Employers advertised 3.74 million job openings in March, the highest figure since July 2008.

Many of those openings are at U.S. factories. Manufacturers are on pace to add more than 415,000 jobs this year, most since 1984. Some are even complaining of a shortage of qualified applicants. Ehrhardt Tool & Machine Co. in Granite City, Ill., wants to add five skilled workers to its staff of 113. The jobs pay more than \$22 an hour.

"If you want a skilled manufacturing worker right now, you just can't find them," says company president Robert Roseman.

U.S. Economy Appears Weaker ahead of Jobs Report

WASHINGTON • The U.S. economy is looking slightly weaker one day before a critical report on May job growth.

Economic growth was a little slower in the first three months of the year than first estimated, largely because governments and consumers spent less and businesses restocked their supplies more slowly.

The number of people who applied for unemployment benefits rose to a five-week high last week. And a survey of private companies showed only modest hiring gains last month.

Still, a softer job market hasn't caused Americans to scale back spending. Consumers spent more at retail stores in May than the same month last year, buying more clothes and Mother's Day gifts.

The mostly disappointing data kept the Dow Jones Industrial Average on pace to record its first monthly loss since September. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note sank to 1.56 percent, a 66-year low.

Thursday's data showed that:

- The U.S. economy grew at an annual rate of 1.9 percent in the first three months of the year, the Commerce Department said in its second of three estimates of January-March growth. That's lower than its initial estimate of 2.2 percent.

- Weekly applications for unemployment aid rose 10,000 to a seasonally adjusted 383,000, the Labor Department said.

- Private businesses added 133,000 jobs last month, according to a survey by payroll provider ADP. That figure disappointed most economists, who had hoped to see job growth accelerate after ADP's survey found that just 113,000 jobs were added in April.

Peter Newland, an economist at Barclays Research, said he was discouraged by the slowdown in first-quarter growth.

"This report does little to change the perception of an economy ticking along at a moderate pace but failing to break out into a full-on recovery with consistently above-potential growth," Newland said.

When the government issues its report Friday on May employment, economists expect it to say that employers added 158,000 jobs. That would be better than in the past two months but far below the winter's pace of 252,000 jobs per month. They also expect no change in the unemployment rate, which was 8.1 percent in April.

Surveys show the economy is the top issue on voters' minds. Gainer growth and only modest job gains could give momentum to Mitt Romney, the Republican presidential challenger. Romney has made President Barack Obama's handling of the economy the central theme in his campaign.

Record-setting NM Fire Spreads

RESERVE, N.M. (AP) • A massive wildfire in the New Mexico wilderness that already is the largest in state history spread in all directions Thursday, and experts say it's likely a preview of things to come as states across the West contend with a dangerous recipe of wind, low humidity and tinder-dry fuels.

The erratic Gila National Forest blaze grew overnight to more than 190,000 acres, or nearly 300 square miles, as it raced across the area's steep, ponderosa pine-covered hills and through its rugged canyons.

More than 1,200 firefighters are at the massive blaze near the Arizona border, which has destroyed a dozen cabins and eight outbuildings, fire information officer Iris Estes said.

Experts say persistent drought, climate change and shifts in land use and firefighting strategies mean other western states likely will see similar giant fires this season.

"We've been in a long drought cycle for the last 20 years, and conditions now are great for these type of fires," said Steve Pyne, author of "Tending

Fire. Coping with America's Wildland Fires" and a life science professor at Arizona State University. "Everything is in line."

Agencies in New Mexico, Colorado, Arizona and other western states are

bracing for the worst. Many counties have established emergency telephone and email notification systems to warn of wildfires, and most states have enlisted crews from nearby states to be ready when the big ones come.

Edwards Acquitted on 1 Count, Mistrial on Others

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) • John Edwards' campaign finance fraud case ended in a mistrial Thursday when jurors acquitted him on one of six charges but were unable to decide whether he misused money from two wealthy donors to hide his pregnant mistress while he ran for president.

The trial exposed a sordid sex scandal that unfolded while Edwards' wife was dying of cancer, but prosecutors couldn't convince jurors that the ex-U.S. senator and 2004 vice presidential candidate masterminded a \$1 million cover-up of his affair.

"While I do not believe I did anything illegal, or ever thought I was doing anything illegal, I did an awful, awful lot that was wrong and there is no one else responsible for my sins," Edwards said on the courthouse steps.

Edwards would have faced up to 30 years in prison and \$1.5 million in fines if convicted of all charges. He did not testify, along with his mistress Rielle Hunter and the two donors whose money was at issue.

MARRIAGE ACT HEADS TO U.S. SUPREME COURT

BOSTON • A battle over a federal law that defines marriage as a union between a man and a woman appears headed for the Supreme Court after an appeals court ruled Thursday that denying benefits to married gay couples is unconstitutional.

In a unanimous decision, the three-judge panel of the 1st U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Boston said the 1996 law deprives gay couples of the rights and privileges granted to heterosexual couples.

The court didn't rule on the law's more politically combustible provision — that states without same-sex marriage cannot be forced to recognize gay unions performed in states where it's legal. It also wasn't asked to address whether gay couples have a constitutional right to marry.

The law was passed at a time when it appeared Hawaii would legalize gay marriage. Since then, many states have instituted their own bans on gay marriage, while eight states have approved the practice, led by Massachusetts in 2004.

The court, the first federal appeals panel to rule against the benefits section of the law, agreed with a lower court judge who in 2010 concluded that the law interferes with the right of a state to define marriage and denies married gay couples federal benefits given to heterosexual married couples, including the ability to file joint tax returns. The ruling came in two lawsuits, one filed by the Boston-based legal group Gay & Lesbian Advocates & Defenders (GLAD) and the other by state Attorney General Martha Coakley.

"For me, it's more just about having equality and not having a system of first- and second-class marriages," said plaintiff Jonathan Knight, a financial associate at Harvard Medical School who married Marlin Nabors in 2006.

"I think we can do better, as a country, than that," said Knight, a plaintiff in the GLAD lawsuit.

NYC May Ban Large Sodas

NEW YORK • Want to super-size that soda? Sorry, but in New York City you could be out of luck.

In his latest effort to fight obesity in this era of Big Gulps and triple bacon cheeseburgers, Mayor Michael Bloomberg is proposing an unprecedented ban on large servings of soda and other sugary drinks at restaurants, delis, sports arenas and movie theaters.

Drinks would be limited to 16 ounces, which is considered a small serving at many fast-food joints. It is the first time an American city has directly attempted to limit soda portion sizes.

1st Edition Book of Mormon Stolen in Ariz.

MESA, Ariz. • A first-edition copy of the Book of Mormon that draws hundreds of missionaries to a Mesa bookstore is missing.

The *Arizona Republic* reports Mesa police said Wednesday they are investigating the theft, which happened sometime during the Memorial Day weekend.

Helen Schlie, owner of Rare and Out of Print Books and Art, says the last time she saw the book was when she put it away in a fire-proof box Friday night.

"The tour artists will all give their testimony and share their story about being involved in gangs, time spent in prison, peer pressure, teen pregnancies and how they endured and overcame," said spokesman Samuel Johnson, an artist performing as Samuel the Soloist.

Johnson said the tour artists are looking forward to the Twin Falls stop and to uplifting addicts in recovery working with Victory Home.

In addition to taking in the performances, people can get behind the mic for the Boast About God Rap Off. Musicians can bring their mad skills and rap off for a chance to win \$300 cash or a home studio recording session, Lopez said.

"It'll be like 'American Idol,' with a panel of judges and crowd response deciding who gets to continue on in the contest," Lopez said. "The only rule is that it's a rap-off about and for God, but come out and show us what you've got."

Springs, Cactus Petes Resort Casino and Silver City.

"Each year we've had a better turnout and we've had a lot of good help and sponsors," said Judy, who has MS. "Which is great because people don't seem to realize how serious the illness is."

David Elgan of Jerome is an example of how the illness can change the course of a life. Elgan's military career with the National Guard was squashed after his diagnosis in 2010.

"The pain in my feet was so bad I couldn't run," Elgan

said. "I wish more people knew what MS is and what it's all about. This disease takes away your life."

Elgan is trying to assemble a team for the races but said it will be a last-minute feat if it comes together.

"I've never laughed so much in my life," Elgan said of watching last year's races.

The race isn't for wimps, Judy said. Four people run a bed with a passenger halfway down the course, which is roughly a block and a half, and perform a Chinese fire drill before running back.

"They each run all the way around the bed — even the passenger — and the passenger and a runner

change places, nightgown and all, and finish running the rest of the stretch," Judy said.

Bed requirements are simple. It doesn't even need to be a real bed, but it must have the appearance of one by including a headboard and footboard. There must be four wheels, and it must be powered by runners only. Decorating is up to the team's imagination.

The Dick's Pharmacy team has raced each year as leprechauns — green outfits, necklaces, top hats — and decorated the bed in green to match.

"We kind of like the St. Patrick's Day theme," pharmacist Ken Fuchs said. "And

it gives us an excuse to dress up."

To be more competitive this year, Fuchs hopes to upgrade from the scaffolding wheels the team has used. Aside from good wheels, Fuchs gave one piece of advice to other teams: Get in shape.

"It's a lot harder than it looks," he said, chuckling.

Theresa Howsden's husband was diagnosed with MS a couple of years ago, and she came up with an orange-and-white team called Dreamsicles.

"Orange is the color representing MS, and one day at work they had Dreamsicles for a treat, so we did that," she said.

The team wears orange shirts and decorates the bed with gusto: orange and white balloons and orange cow bells. They had a blast competing last year, despite breaking a wheel in the first round.

"One girl just carried the bed and we finished the race," Howsden said, laughing.

The event has a serious side, too.

"After my husband was diagnosed, a couple of my friends were too," she said. "I've dealt with patients that have MS at work, but it didn't really hit home."

Howsden, a certified nurse's assistant, said there had been no support groups

in the Magic Valley.

"You'd have to go to Boise or Utah for any assistance," she said. "People don't know the money it takes to research this disease and the medications. It means a lot to get the word out with this event."

As a spouse, she was grateful to Elgan, who now heads up the Magic Valley Multiple Sclerosis Support Group. The group meets once a month to share information and provide support to those with MS and their families.

"There is a large group of people affected in the area," Elgan said. "One doctor told me that he saw 10 patients in one week."

While none of the shows are vulgar in general, Garcia

said, lyrics will be toned down for the younger spectators.

"We get people asking all the time when we are going to do an all-ages show," he said. "This will be really great for them."

The Twin Falls venue, 360 Main Event Center, also offers a bigger space and opportunities to play with lighting which will create a more visually appealing show.

"We have some cool stuff in store," Garcia said. "The stage presence is going to be great."

Queen hopes this show will steer younger listeners away

from negative influences and give them something to do, motivating them to get off the streets and be the artist they see on stage.

Last year eight artists performed, and the tour not only has grown in performances but also has doubled in profit and proceeds.

"The tour is completely self-funded," Queen said. "We only want serious artists that want to work together, and that's a really great thing to have."

Cooks around the globe grow their own herb gardens in order to have the freshest ingredients in the dishes they prepare. Another way to enhance the cooking experience is to bring the herbs right into the kitchen for even easier access and fresh herbs throughout the year. Annual herbs are the best choice for indoor potted herbs, but some perennials also do well when grown indoors.

Basil, Sweet (*Ocimum basilicum*)

Grow sweet basil in a pot placed in a very warm, sunny spot and harvest often to keep the plant from becoming too large and leggy. Keep fertile soil moist for healthier basil plants. Do not allow the soil to completely dry out between watering. Sweet basil is an annual that grows to 24 inches tall.

Chervil (*Anthriscus cerefolium*)

Add chervil, often called French parsley, to everything from hot soups to medicinal tea. It should be planted in a pot that allows good drainage and set in a window where the sun has been diffused by a shade tree or other similar object. Chervil is an annual that grows to 15 inches tall and can be harvest when it reaches 4 to 5

inches tall. Harvest this herb often for best flavor. Once it begins to flower, the leaves are not as flavorful and the plant will begin to fail. Replace the failing plant with a newly sprouted seedling.

Chives (*Allium schoenoprasum*)

Chives are one of the best herbs to grow indoors because it will grow in a small pot right on the kitchen windowsill. The wonderful thing about growing chives indoors is how easy they are to harvest, just clip them with scissors as needed and the plant will renew itself by growing new leaves very quickly. *Allium schoenoprasum* is a perennial herb that only reaches approximately 8 inches tall. Garlic chives (*Allium tuberosum*) are as easy to grow and harvest as common chives with the extra punch of garlicky flavor. Garlic chives grow a bit larger to approximately 12 inches tall and their leaves are flat and thin when compared to the common chives leaves that are round and hollow.

Lemon Balm (*Melissa officinalis*)

Lemon balm is another flavorful, easy to grow herb that compliments a myriad of foods. Place potted lemon balm where it will receive full sun most of the day. The planting medium should be fertile and kept moist; do not allow it to dry out. Lemon balm is a perennial that grows to 24 inches tall.

Thyme, English (*Thymus vulgaris*)

Considered the all-around perfect herb by many cooks due to its multitude of uses on everything from red meat and poultry to fruit and tea, English thyme is a must-have pot herb. English thyme is a hardy perennial that grows to approximately 12 inches tall. Leaves can be harvest frequently. Harvest before flowering begins for the most flavorful leaves.

Changeup: Minico Modifies Summer Baseball

RUPERT • To keep the Minidoka County School Board happy, Minico has undergone a name change for its summer baseball program.

And unable to appease Idaho's American Legion Baseball chairman Derrick Ater, the team from Rupert is no longer affiliated with American Legion Baseball.

The first change was easy. The school board asked Minico head coach Ben Frank to separate the summer program from the school, which all American Legion teams typically do. The team is keeping its "MS" logo and renaming itself Minidoka Swagger.

The second change is more complicated.

Minico has gone independent and is no longer a member of American Legion Baseball because it refuses to comply with the rule that prohibits teams from keeping more than 18 players on their rosters.

It's not a new rule, just newly enforced.

For more than a decade, Frank has carried about 25 players – mostly young kids who they're trying to develop – on its Double-A squad.

"For the last 20 years we've done it this way and no one has ever said anything," Frank said. "We keep as many kids who want to play Legion and we split them in half; the first game we play older kids and the next game we play young kids. It's not like we were trying to hide it. I've been clearly doing

this in front of every team we've played; they all saw us roll out with 25 kids."

By carrying more kids, Minico hasn't received a competitive advantage in Legion ball, as the team typically finishes well below .500 and rarely wins in the postseason. Frank views the summer season as a time to develop young players into competitors for high school ball, where Minico High is a traditional power.

"I'm not trying to manipulate the system," Frank said. "All I'm trying to do is build my program and get as many kids as possible in the area to play summer baseball. That's it."

So why not split into two teams, maybe form a Single-A squad?

Frank said the program can't afford

BUHL • J.D. Leckenby won't mince words about his expectations when he jets off to Massachusetts later this month to play in the prestigious Cape Cod Baseball League.

"I know it's a great experience to go out there and play against the best players in the whole summer and I was really excited about it," said Leckenby, a 2010 Buhl High School graduate who just finished his sophomore season at Washington State University.

The 6-4 right-handed pitcher will play for the Brewster Whitecaps, along with Washington State teammate, roommate and fishing buddy Jason Monda, an outfielder.

Leckenby said the arrangement process started last summer, when he played in Vermont. The paperwork was done by the end of the fall.

That added more belief to a guy who's already supremely confident in his abilities.

"I'm a real confident guy no matter what, that my stuff is going to be good no matter where I play," he said. "I know when I go over there it's going to polish my game for next year by getting sharp against those guys every day."

The Cape Cod league, generally considered the premier summer collegiate baseball league, has been supported financially by Major League Baseball for four decades. The concentration of college talent in the league gives to a rough translation to what's considered high Class A minor-league baseball. More than 200 former Cape Cod players were on Major League rosters in the 2010 season.

In other words, a good summer against that competition could rocket a player up draft boards. Leckenby will be eligible for the 2013 draft.

"It's always a possibility, but that's just the way I look at it. I'll cross that bridge when we get there," Leckenby said. "I think if I do have a good summer, it could give me a pretty high jump."

Thunder Wallop Spurs, Get Back Into Series

OKLAHOMA CITY • Kevin Durant scored 22 points, Thabo Sefolosha set playoff career-bests with 19 points and six steals, and the Oklahoma City Thunder snapped San Antonio's 20-game winning streak by beating the Spurs 102-82 in Game 3 of the Western Conference finals on Thursday night.

Oklahoma City closed its series deficit to 2-1 and will host Game 4 on Saturday night.

Sefolosha threw a wrench in the Spurs' well-oiled offense at the start, getting four steals in the first 3 minutes. The Spurs ended up committing a postseason-worst 21 turnovers and scoring their least points all season.

Tony Parker and Stephen Jackson led the Spurs with 16 points apiece. Tim Duncan had 11 points on 5-for-15 shooting, taking 11 of San Antonio's first 25 shots as the offense went through the All-Star center instead of Parker.

San Antonio had been averaging 109.4 points during its month-and-a-half winning streak and had been held to double digits only twice.

The Spurs, who already set an NBA record for the longest winning streak

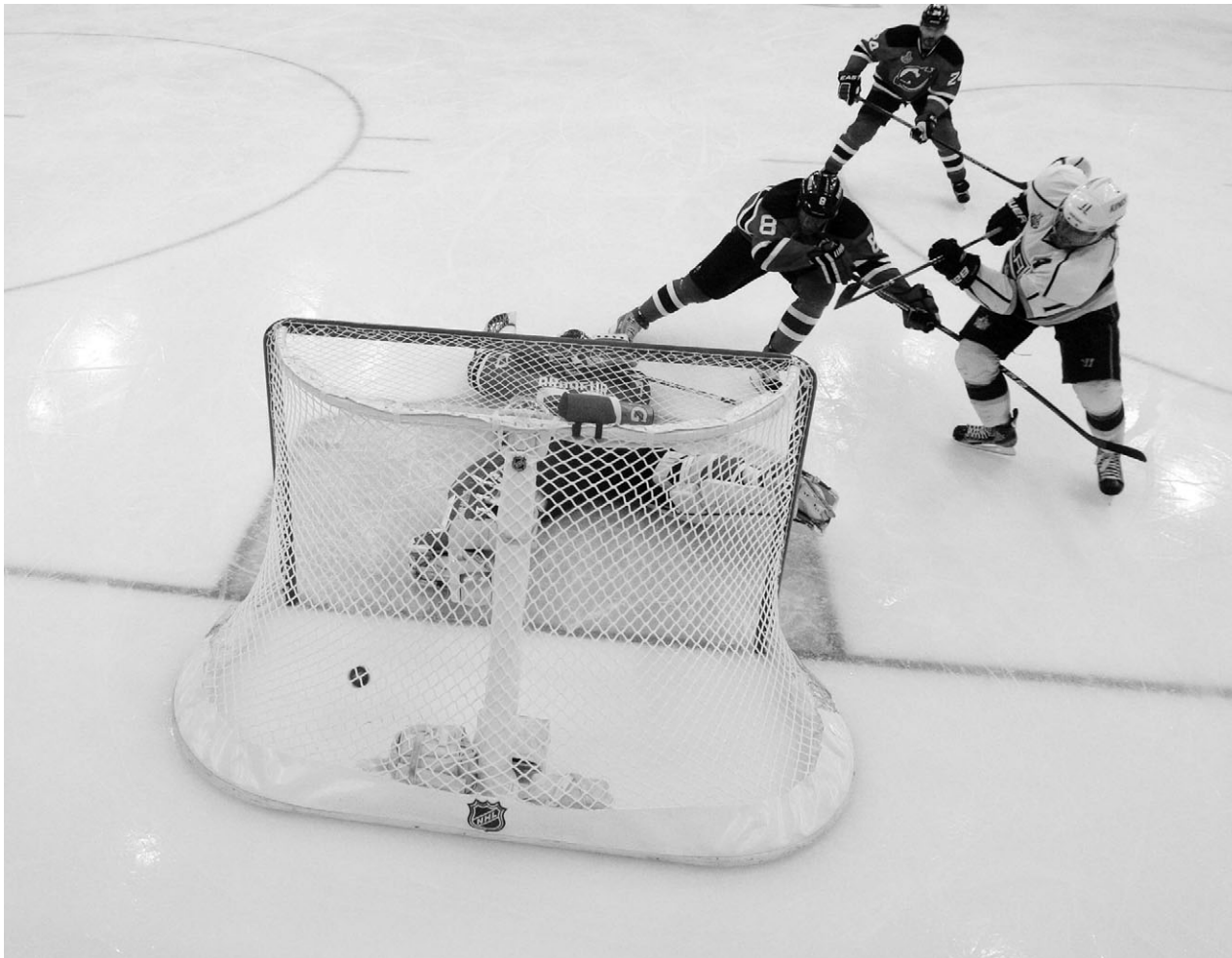
carried over from the regular season into the playoffs, were trying to match the league mark for most wins to start the postseason. The Lakers won 11 straight to start the 1989 and 2001 playoffs, getting swept in the NBA finals the first time and winning it all the second.

The Spurs' last loss was to the Lakers at home on April 11.

Parker and Duncan didn't play in the final 15 minutes, and coach Gregg Popovich pulled the plug after another series of three straight turnovers allowed the deficit to reach 23 points early in the fourth quarter.

Sefolosha had a right-handed dunk off a lob pass from Russell Westbrook, who followed with his own two-handed jam on an alley-oop pass and Sefolosha followed with a reverse layup on another turnover-fueled fast-break chance to push the lead to 86-63 with 9:48 left.

The Thunder put together another 9-0 run coinciding with Manu Ginobili coming out of the game, and featuring Serge Ibaka sticking his tongue out after nailing a jumper from the top of the key. Coach Scott Brooks soon followed suit and pulled his own front-line players with the game well in hand.

The excitement builds outside and inside the raucous buildings, and what should be a pure rush of adrenaline, can sometimes turn into a wave of nerves that can rattle even the best of players.

Whatever the cause, the Kings — the No. 8 seed out of the West — have capitalized on every possible thing they can while playing away from home. They are a record 9-0 on the road in these playoffs,

and are lengthening another record with 11 straight wins in enemy arenas, dating to last season.

The Kings took a 1-0 lead over the Devils in the Stanley Cup finals with a 2-1 overtime win on Wednesday night, spoiling New Jersey's first chance in these playoffs to open a series at home.

"You've just got to come ready to play," Los Angeles defenseman Matt Greene said Thursday, after the Kings held an optional practice. "It's the finals. You're going to be jacked up, you're going to be nervous. You could have this game anywhere in the world and I think guys are going to be nervous going into it just because of what's on the line and where you're at and what's at stake."

The Kings seemed as focused as can be as they roll through the playoffs. They are 13-2 so far, and haven't been stretched past five games in any of their first three series wins over the top three-seeded teams in the Western Conference.

Los Angeles has led 3-0 in each series and shows no signs of letting up. The Kings have managed to get plenty of rest throughout the postseason as they have often been forced to wait for their next opponent to emerge from the previous round.

"Our guys said today they felt sluggish," Kings coach Darryl Sutter said. "If that was nerves, then so it was. Our guys felt they could play better. That's a good thing. I'm sure the other team is saying the same thing, too."

After knocking out the Phoenix Coyotes with an overtime win in Game 5 on May 22, the Kings had a seven-day break before facing off against the Devils. Now after just one game, the series has two off days before Game 2 on Saturday.

"It's a funny setup again," Sutter said. "We only played one game in four days since we got here. That's how it was going to be."

"So now, it's get ready for Saturday. It's not about what happened, who we played last time, anything like that. I think we know our opponent is a lot tougher than anyone we played yet. Going into last night, I think they were 6-2, something like that, in home games. I think we know what the challenge will be on Saturday."

BOSTON • Max Scherzer pitched into the seventh inning, Delmon Young homered and the Detroit Tigers beat the Boston Red Sox 7-3 on Thursday night to avoid a four-game series sweep.

Scherzer (5-3) retired nine consecutive batters before Nick Punto led off the seventh with a walk, forcing the right-hander from the game. He allowed three runs and seven hits in his third consecutive victory, closing out a strong May.

Young hit a solo drive in the eighth to make it 5-3, then added a run-scoring single in

the ninth. Jarrod Saltalamacchia hit his 10th homer for Boston, which was seeking its first four-game sweep against the Tigers since 2004. 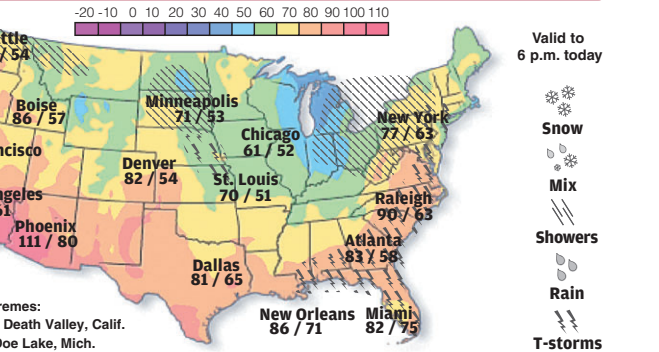

Isner Falls in Marathon 5th Set at French Open

PARIS • This, then, is who John Isner is for now: The Marathon Man of Tennis, the guy who plays and plays and plays, for hours on end, until the last set seems interminable.

At Wimbledon two years ago, he won 70-68 in the fifth, the longest set and match in tennis history. At Roland Garros on Thursday, as afternoon gave way to evening, the 10th-seeded American lost 7-6 (2), 4-6, 4-6, 6-3, 18-16 to Paul-Henri Mathieu of France in the second round, a 5-hour, 41-minute test of stamina and attention span.

This one goes in the books as the second-longest match, by time, in French Open history.

"I just didn't get it done. I felt like I got caught in patterns that weren't ideal for me," said a somber Isner, whose exit means there are no U.S. men in the third round for the first time since 2007. "I wasn't going for my shots at certain points in the match, and that comes from a little bit of a lack of confidence."

If the 6-foot-9 Isner, who led Georgia to an NCAA title, is going to become more than a novelty act, he needs to win encounters like Thursday's, and not because

of the duration but because it was a first-week Grand Slam match against a player ranked 261st who got into the field thanks to a wild-card invitation from the tournament.

After finally converting his seventh match point — Isner never had one — an emotional Mathieu thanked the partisan crowd in the main stadium for willing him to victory. Their sing-song choruses of "Po-lo! Po-lo!" — the French equivalent of "Paulie" — and roars of approval rang out after pretty much every point he won down the stretch.

"I dug deep," said the 30-year-old Mathieu, who hadn't played in a major tournament since the 2010 U.S. Open because of a left knee injury that forced him off tour all of last year. "I was away from the courts for quite a while, and I came back to live moments like this."

He helped provide easily the most intrigue on a day that featured straight-set wins for defending champions Rafael Nadal and Li Na. But it also ended after 9 p.m., forcing organizers to postpone until Friday the match involving Maria Sharapova that was supposed to follow on Court Philippe Chatrier.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"One man who has a mind and knows it can always beat 10 men who haven't and don't."
— G.B. Shaw

Bridge is a strange game. Why on earth would it be easier to make four hearts in today's deal than four spades? If you do fall by accident into four hearts, you would ruff the club lead, cash the heart ace, then run the spades. That way you simply give up the three trump tricks to West. But in the real world, you will play four spades.

You ruff the top club lead, then take the spade ace and king. If trumps split, you will find it easy to make 11 tricks, but when trumps divide 3-1, it would be very easy, but fatal, to draw a third round of trumps.

If you do that, then play ace and another heart, West will win and tap you for a second time with another club, and again when he gets in with the third heart. You are now out of trumps and can never score your fifth heart.

Instead, you must play ace and another heart before playing a third trump. If hearts break, you can ruff the next club and draw the last trump before playing a third heart. But if hearts also break badly, you can ruff the second club, give up a heart, ruff a third club, and ruff the fourth heart in dummy.

East can overruff for the defenders' third trick, but the contract still succeeds, since you have only winners left together with one trump.

ANSWER: There is some temptation to jump to four no-trump as a way to show the minors, but maybe a simple call of four diamonds is enough. And certainly if North has a very strong heart one-suiter, he would prefer to buy the hand at the four-level, rather than go higher unnecessarily.
