City Officials Discuss Response to Water Crisis

TWIN FALLS • Now that water levels are back to normal, the city of Twin Falls has time to reflect.

After lifting all restrictions on water use, Twin Falls city officials took time on Wednesday to discuss their response to Tuesday's water crisis.

A late-Monday wind-storm knocked out power to the Blue Lakes water station, and water levels dropped to dangerously low levels early Tuesday morning.

While Idaho Power worked to restore power to the water pumps, levels in the Reservoir dropped from more than 20 feet by 5:30 a.m.

At that rate, the city had

enough water for only two more hours, said Public Works Supervisor Jon Caton.

Another concern: Public safety. With the Reservoir loss came a loss of pressure. If pressure drops too low, harmful bacteria could creep into the pumps, requiring a re-chlorination for the city's water supply, said water superintendent Robert

Bohling. That would require a boil order.

So the city acted fast, contacting the top industrial water users, including Con Agra, Independent Meat, AmeriPride Services and Glanbia, and told them to shut down everything involving water use.

That was a difficult step to take, Caton said. But ultimately, the city was most

concerned about public safety.

City officials thanked those business owners for complying. Some of those businesses heard of the outage before the phone calls, and already decided to cease operations, said city manager Travis Rothweiler.

Animal Emergencies

Pet owners say it can be difficult to find after-hours veterinary help in the Magic Valley.

TWIN FALLS • When Melanie Foster's dog needed emergency care in the middle of the night, no local veterinarians were available.

Her regular vet was out of town. A vet from another clinic said he was too tired to help.

Finally, the Buhl resident called Boise's All Valley Animal Care Center, which contacted a Mountain Home vet. Foster and Rocco, a 5-year-old male Catahoula, arrived at Knight Veterinary Clinic in Mountain Home at 1 a.m. — more than three hours after she began her search. Dr. Jeremiah Burnett performed surgery for a twisted stomach and saved Rocco's life.

"I am eternally grateful to him and the kindness he provided," Foster said.

Still, she wonders why more accessible emergency treatment was not available closer to home. An informal survey by the *Times-News* found that representatives of some area clinics say they have provisions for off-hour emergencies while others do not. Among those

Staffing Plays Role in After-hours Care

A survey of local veterinary clinics found a range of policies about emergency pet care. Some with multiple vets on staff provide after-hour care, while others with a single vet say the workload would be too great for one person.

Magic Valley Veterinary Hospital assistant Kim Hogue said one of their three vets is always on call at night. They charge clients \$150 for after-hours service and occasionally take calls from non-clients, although the cost is \$200 to cover extra paperwork involved.

"They (vets) take the on-call seriously and they always have their cell phones with them," Hogue said.

Likewise, Kimberly Veterinary Hospital has three vets who rotate on-call duties when the office is closed. The service is usually for established clients, but occasionally pets of non-clients are seen in emergencies, said office manager Cheryl Lockwood. The hospital charges \$70 for emergencies before midnight and \$160 for those occurring after that.

that offer the service, many limit it to pets of regular clients.

A cat owned by John and Karen Phillips of Twin Falls died last month because they couldn't find help fast enough. When their cat became unable to walk and had labored breathing after 10 p.m., they called their vet's office but found the only emergency number was for a Boise animal hospital.

They began calling clinic after clinic in the Twin Falls area, finally reaching a vet from Eden who would make an exception to the regular-clients-only policy. He met the Phillipses but it was close to midnight and too late to save their pet.

Steve and Anna Vines of Twin Falls recently sent a letter to the *Times-News* describing a similar incident.

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Perrine Bridge Work Delayed, but It Won't Affect Air Show

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TWIN FALLS • Construction on the Perrine Bridge has been delayed until at least Aug. 1 because of scheduling conflicts.

For the project, which involves resurfacing the bridge, the contractor is required to use a special equipment to remove the current surface.

The problem is, according to the Idaho Transportation Department, that equipment isn't widely available in southern Idaho, and contractor Cannon Builders Inc. can't

procure it until late summer.

The rescheduled construction doesn't have a set date, but it won't conflict with the Air Magic Valley Air Show, scheduled for July 28-29, said ITD spokesman Nathan Jerke.

"It won't begin before the end of the air show," Jerke said. "We didn't want to inhibit the air show and the traffic flowing through Twin Falls because of that."

The delay won't increase the cost of the \$2.5 million project, Jerke said.

Construction will reduce traffic to one lane each way for about two weeks.

Preliminary Hearing Waived for Alleged Ringleader in Rash of Jerome Burglaries

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JEROME • On Jan. 21, five families came home to find their homes near the Jerome Country Club burglarized. They were missing jewelry, firearms and electronics. One family was missing a car.

On Wednesday, the man prosecutors call the ringleader of a band of alleged burglars was in court. Eighteen-year-old Nikolas Maria appeared in Jerome County 5th District Magistrate Court Wednesday for a preliminary hearing in the case, which he waived.

In early May, deputies filed a total of 50 charges related to 11 burglaries against Maria, Branden Galbreath, 20, Jorge Banuelos, 19, and two minor boys, ages 16 and 17.

On the night of Jan. 20, Maria allegedly burglarized the five Jerome homes with Banuelos, Galbreath and a 16-year-old boy, according to court documents.

In an interview with Jerome County sheriff's detectives, the 16-year-old said all four went to the golf course area in the 600 block of East Golf Course Road with

plans to burglarize homes, according to records.

The plan was to knock on doors to find empty homes; If someone answered, the plan was to say they were looking for a dog, the teen told detectives.

The group allegedly took turns knocking on doors and removed screens from windows to open them, according to court records.

The four allegedly broke into homes on Prairie Dunes Circle, Eagle Rim Drive, Augusta Drive and Winged Foot Road, taking big-screen televisions and other electronics, along with thousands of dollars in jewelry and firearms, court records said.

According to the report, the 16-year-old told police the others used magnets to go through the jewelry to sort out the gold from other metals.

One victim's vehicle, stolen by the burglars, was found by Twin Falls Police abandoned at the intersection of Grandview Drive and Welch Lane near the Twin Falls Golf Course.

In their investigation, detectives discovered the men allegedly pawned several jewelry items in Twin Falls, which burglary victims identified.

According to the results of the Jerome County Sheriff's Office investigation, January's burglaries were not the first by this group.

In October 2011, burglars entered homes through windows at night while the homeowners were away. Little damage was caused, but jewelry, electronics and personal items were taken, deputies said at the time.

A long investigation managed by Cpl. Kirk Thorpe and assisted by Sgt. Rick Cowen and Deputy Chris McRoberts yielded charges of burglary, grand theft, malicious injury to property, petit theft and destruction of evidence.

A report by the detectives on the case details the alleged burglaries. In the first string, which investigators say happened late at night Oct. 8 and early in the morning of Oct. 9, Maria and a 17-year-old boy allegedly broke into a house on Ridge Loop and three houses on North Ridge Way in Jerome.

Homeowners reported laptops, iPods, camera equipment and other items missing.

In early January, Maria and Banuelos allegedly burglarized a home in the 200 block of 500 South in Jerome County, damaging a \$700 television and taking a child's aluminum bat.

"Maria admitted to being at the residence that day after being confronted with pictures of footprints outside the residence that matched the shoes he was wearing at the time of the interview," court records said.

According to the records, Maria told police he was looking for his dog.

Now, all five are at various stages in the cases against them in both Jerome and Twin Falls.

Maria along with Banuelos, Galbreath, Cesar Granados-Barajas and Taylor Cnossen were all charged in the February robbery of the Jerome Wendy's and Banuelos has been charged with the robbery of the Twin Falls Applebee's. He pleaded not guilty on June 4, but no hearings are set in the case.

Their 9-year-old Lab, Lucy, became ill about 7 p.m. and her owners called their regular vet's office.

However, they said no one answered repeated calls to the emergency phone number on the recording. Like other local residents, they ended up calling an emergency number in Boise but knew Lucy wouldn't live long enough to get there. They left messages on answering machines at several other Twin Falls vet offices.

One local vet responded, but Lucy died by the time her owners got her to the clinic.

The Vineses said they believe a community the size of Twin Falls should have a workable system for providing emergency care for animals.

"If each vet would take a proactive approach, we are sure the logistics could be worked out," they wrote in the letter.

water safety would probably have been compromised, Rothweiler said.

Throughout the crisis, water quality never dropped, he added.

Later in the morning, Rothweiler signed an emergency declaration, putting an injunction on irrigation and restricting all but necessary residential water use. That applied to all businesses that use water, Rothweiler said Wednesday, including restaurants.

Idaho Power restored power

at about 9:30 a.m., but because the supply had been heavily depleted, it took hours.

But thanks largely to compliance from industrial users, the reservoir's water levels reached normal levels on Tuesday afternoon 2:30 p.m. On Wednesday morning, city officials lifted all restrictions on water use.

So what now? It's too early to know what the city's long-term reaction will be, Rothweiler said.

Twin Falls Police Chief Brian Pike said he would like to see a notification system for the city to reach residents in case of emergency, whether

it's another water crisis or a similarly urgent event. That could come in the form of a Reverse 9-1-1 system, in which citizens receive automated phone calls from the city.

Rothweiler praised the unsung heroes of the crisis, including Public Works employees who didn't sleep so they could monitor water levels and Parks and Recreation workers who shut off irrigation system in early morning hours.

"We have people in our organization that are so incredibly dedicated," Rothweiler said.

"That procedure of the jury commissioner making comments is so highly irregular and so far outside the scope of what is authorized by rule or statute. The immediate appearance of impropriety is so overwhelming that I can't find a way at this point to correct that," said Cassia County 5th District Judge Michael Crabtree.

The court will hold a status hearing on a new trial at 9:30 a.m. June 12 and ultimately select a new jury to hear the case.

"Her comments were directed toward the importance of the defendant's presumption of innocence. How important this trial was to him. And that it was an important day for the defendant," said Blaine Cannon, Cassia County deputy prosecutor. "The court reporter was in here and heard those comments being made."

Cannon said the comments were stressed as important and repeated several times.

Due to the type of case, Cannon said, the outcome hinged on the jury's assessment of credibility rather than physical evidence.

The state's prosecution of the case was put at a disadvantage and Cannon said he wonders if similar comments have been made during other trials.

"It's extremely distracting to me. I'm thinking about trying to do an opening statement and suddenly I have to think and be concerned about how this affects the trial, how it affects my ability, does it change my strategy?" Cannon said. "The plaintiff and witnesses are entitled to a fair trial, the people of the state and community are entitled to a fair trial and I can't give that to them; it's impossible. I've never had anything like this happen and I just don't know how to deal with it. And the only way to fix it is to start over and make sure we don't have a jury commissioner who makes those kinds of comments."

Cassia County Clerk Joe Larsen, who oversees the court staff, said he could not comment Wednesday on whether any disciplinary action will be taken against the jury commissioner.

"It is currently under review and will be dealt with in a judicious fashion," Larsen said.

Cannon said comments of this nature coming from a county employee could be construed by jurors to imply that the county employee has knowledge about the case.

"This case is obviously important to both sides. It's a life-changing event. Both sides are entitled to a fair trial," Cannon said.

Andrew's attorney Kent Jensen argued against the mistrial saying he did not find the jury commissioner's comments out of the ordinary.

Crabtree said the county will be liable for picking up the defense's expenses, including bringing in an expert witness who was due to arrive Wednesday.

Andrew taught math and science at Oakley High School. Andrew was charged after he allegedly had sexual contact with a 14-year-old female at the school in May 2007.

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Habitat Sets Out to Build Home for Two Families in One Week

TWIN FALLS • It's not her daughter's hot pink with zebra stripes paint request that has Diane Feagins concerned about moving into a new home.

In less than two days, Feagins will be a first time homeowner. It's a role that has her both concerned and excited.

"I'm a little nervous," she said. "I've never owned a house before."

Feagins is one of two families that Habitat for Humanity of the Magic Valley selected to move into a newly constructed home. Construction crews have been working since Monday to build a townhome in just five days. The project is part of a national "builders blitz" that works to build, repair and renovate more than 200 homes in 24 states.

However, even though the new homes will be up in less than a week, the application process began more than a year ago. Back then, Feagins was in the middle of a divorce and facing a growing pile of bills. Her ex-husband pleaded guilty to sexually abusing her 13-year-old daughter and she needed to find a safe home for her daughter.

"Our new home will be a place for her to heal," Feagins said. "My first priority is to decorate her room. She wants hot pink and zebra stripes. We'll see how that goes?"

Her new neighbor, Carrie Miller said she decided to apply for the housing opportunity after a friend told her about the program.

Schools Prepare to Analyze SAT Day Results

TWIN FALLS • The SAT hasn't traditionally been the test of choice for Magic Valley high school students.

At Twin Falls High School, Principal Ben Allen said there were only five to 10 students each year who took the college entrance test. Many more students - usually about 170 - took the ACT.

But that changed this year. The Idaho State Department of Education picked up the tab for high school juniors to take the SAT in April, and the majority of juniors in Twin Falls participated.

At Canyon Ridge, Principal Brady Dickinson said he's looking forward to having more test results to analyze. In the past, mostly the highest-achieving students took the SAT.

"We're really looking at this as establishing a base-

line," he said.

Schools have copies of individual student scores from the state's first-ever SAT Day, but schoolwide reports won't be released until later this summer.

Once that happens, Dickinson said information about how students did on the SAT can be broken down into different subject areas.

Then, he said, the school's leadership team can come up with a plan for how to raise student scores - particularly, in areas where students struggled.

Dickinson said data will also be a "guide for instruction" in classrooms during the coming school years.

In the meantime, a school secretary is working to input each student's SAT score into a student management system called PowerSchool.

That will allow school employees to calculate the average score on the SAT. Dickinson

said the process should be completed in about one week.

"We're getting there," he said.

At Jerome High, Principal Eric Anderson said he hasn't had a chance to go through SAT Day results. School employees, he said, are still focusing on going through results from the Idaho Standards Achievement Tests.

In order to graduate, every Idaho high school student must take a college entrance test - like the SAT or ACT - by the end of his or her junior year.

State legislators approved increased graduation requirements in 2007, but changes are just now going into effect with this year's junior class.

Legislators appropriated \$963,500 for students in the class of 2013 to take the SAT this year.

ISDE spokeswoman Melissa McGrath said there aren't

any statewide results from SAT Day yet, but expects a report to come in the next week or two.

With more students taking the SAT than past years - including some who aren't planning to go to college - Allen said he expects a drop in the average scores.

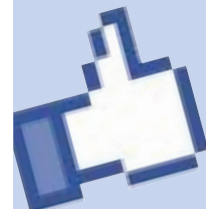
Based on the individual reports for Twin Falls High, Allen said there's a "wide range" of scores.

At Canyon Ridge High, Dickinson said nearly all of the 256 juniors participated in SAT Day. And many of those students also took the ACT this year - paid for through a GEAR UP grant.

"I really want to see how the scores compare," he said.

His Regulations From the Executive in Need of Scrutiny Act (REINS) would redress constitutional imbalance and buttress the rule of law by compelling Congress to take responsibility for the substance that executive rulemaking pours into the sometimes almost empty vessels that Congress calls "laws."

The 165,000 pages of the Code of Federal Regulations contain tens of thousands of rules promulgated by largely unaccountable agencies that churn out more than a thousand new mandates a year. According to the Small Business Administration, regulations cost the economy about \$1.75 trillion, almost twice the sum of income tax receipts. Davis says small businesses are spending \$10,500 per employee on regulatory compliance. REINS would require Congress to vote on a resolution of approval concerning every "major" (\$100 million economic impact) regulation. There are 212 such among the 4,128 regulations currently in the pipeline from unelected executive agencies. If the vote REINS requires did not occur within 70 days, the regulation would die.

John Marini of the University of Nevada - Reno writes in the Claremont Review of Books that the 2,500-page Obamacare legislation exemplifies current lawmaking, which serves principally to expand the administrative state's unfettered discretion. Congress merely established the legal requirements necessary to create a vast executive branch administrative apparatus to formulate rules governing health care's 18 percent of the economy.

The Hudson Institute's Chris DeMuth, in an essay for National Affairs quarterly, notes that Congress often contents itself with enacting "velleities" such as the wish in the 900-page Dodd-Frank financial reform act that "all consumers have access to markets for consumer financial products and services ... (that are) fair, transparent, and competitive." How many legislators voting for the bill even read

this language? And how many who did understand that they were authorizing federal rulemakers to micro-manage overdraft fees? In Dodd-Frank, Obamacare and much else, the essential lawmaking is done off Capitol Hill by unaccountable bureaucratic rulemaking.

Fish gotta swim, birds gotta fly and regulators, too, have a metabolic urge to do what they were created to do. Hence, DeMuth says, they often pursue their missions beyond the point of diminishing marginal returns with health, safety, environmental and other standards "with costs exceeding any plausible measure of their benefits."

Regulatory power is executive power, which can be checked and balanced only by the other two branches.

But, DeMuth notes, although courts can, under the Administrative Procedure Act, block regulations that are "arbitrary, capricious," or "an abuse of discretion," courts are usually deferential to regulators, partly because courts are usually without requisite scientific or other expertise.

What, then, about Congress, which, as DeMuth says, "has been deeply complicit in fostering regulatory power"? One proposal is to defer all new "major" regulations until unemployment falls to 7.7 percent, just below what it was when Barack Obama was inaugurated. But this would leave the regulatory state in place and poised for action on a backlog of major rules.

Another proposal is for a "regulatory budget" limiting the costs each regulatory agency could impose. But cost estimates would come from the executive branch, and therefore not be constraining. This defect also infects the proposal (from Virginia's Democratic Sen. Mark Warner) for "regulatory pay-go," under which agencies could issue new regulations only by rescinding existing rules that impose the same cost, or some fraction of the cost, of new ones. Indeed, any "enforceable" cost-benefit standard will merely empower executive agencies to enforce their preferences.

Hence the importance of Congress and the indispensability of Davis' REINS Act. It passed the House last December. But the Democratic-controlled Senate, which will not even take responsibility for producing (as the law requires) a budget, has no desire to restrain the administrative state or to ratify what it does by approving, with statutes, major regulations.

If Twin Falls County is the one who administers the park, is it the one that takes care of the roads? They have been in bad need of grading for a couple of years.

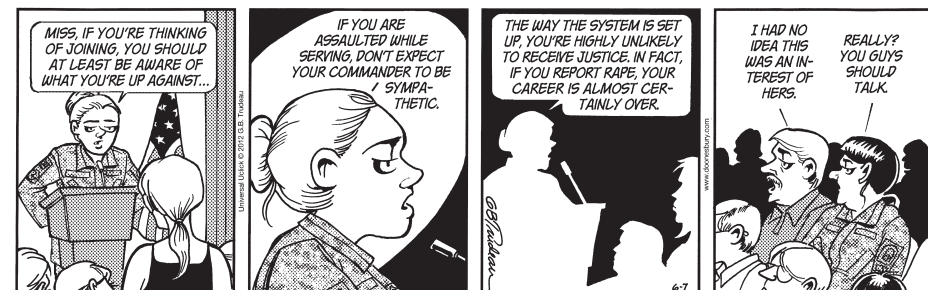

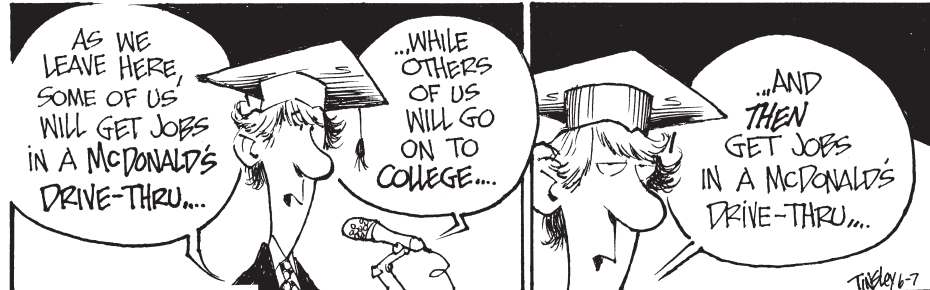

Filer Council Rezones Main Street Property

FILER • The Filer City Council approved the rezoning of property on the southeast end of Main Street from commercial to residential on Tuesday.

Residents Larry and Sheri Underwood came before the council in March requesting approval to tear down their existing Main Street residence and construct a two-story structure. The site's commercial status, however, limits residential construction to rebuilding after a natural disaster or a remodel of the structure within its existing foundation footprint.

"All we want to do is remove a substandard structure and build something that will meet our needs and add to the street's appeal," Larry Underwood said.

An initial proposal to possibly rezone five adjacent lots from commercial to residential was rejected after the council heard neighbor's concerns that rezoning could impact property values.

Filer City Attorney Fritz Wonderlich later suggested the Underwood's two lots, immediately adjacent to the south with residential property, could legally be rezoned as residential.

"The case might be a little unusual but there is residential property situated right behind them," Wonderlich said. "That means it wouldn't be considered spot zoning and is completely compatible with the city's comprehensive plan."

City resident Sandy Wapinski opposed Tuesday evenings move, but her argument wasn't enough to change council's mind.

"I know Mr. Wonderlich disagrees with me," she said, "but I still think it's spot zoning and counterproductive to the city comprehensive plan."

Bond Set at \$250K for Idaho Man in Cliff Death

KETCHUM (AP) • A 19-year-old central Idaho man who police say killed another man by knocking him off a cliff while backing up his Jeep has been jailed on \$250,000 bail and charged with two felonies.

Steven Tyler Jameson of Bellevue is charged with vehicular manslaughter and leaving the scene of an injury accident. Blaine County authorities say 26-year-old Steven Franco of Ketchum was guiding Jameson on Saturday as he backed up near the edge of the cliff at Magic Reservoir.

"Basically what happened was Tyler Jameson was backing his gold 1999 Jeep Grand Cherokee closer to the rocks and being assisted by Mr. Franco," Blaine County Sheriff Gene Ramsey told the *Idaho Mountain Express*. "While he was backing it up, his statement is that he went to hit the brake and hit the gas."

Jameson remained in the Blaine County jail Wednesday. His public defender, Dan Dolan, did not return a call from The Associated Press Wednesday.

Authorities said Jameson and Franco were with a group of about a dozen people near a reservoir cliff. Franco fell about 14 feet and struck his head, Ramsey said, and then fell another 7

feet. Ramsey said friends of Franco climbed down the cliff and were soon joined by two Idaho Department of Fish and Game officers and three off-duty emergency responders with Wood River Fire and Rescue who were fishing in the area.

Fire Chief Bart Lassman said Franco was breathing though unconscious when the ambulance arrived. But he said Franco went into cardiac arrest while being flown to a hospital in Boise and died in the helicopter. He was pronounced dead at 6:45 p.m. at Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center.

Ramsey said after Franco was knocked over the cliff, Jameson left.

"At this point, some people tell him that we're going to call an ambulance and police and you'd better get out of here," Ramsey said.

Jameson was later found at a friend's home in Bellevue and taken into custody. Ramsey said police initially took Jameson into custody on suspicion of DUI, but the charge was later amended by the Blaine County Prosecuting Attorney's Office. At the time of his arrest, Jameson was on probation for a 2011 misdemeanor conviction of resisting or obstructing police officers.

Students Take Advantage of CSI's Grade Appeals Process

TWIN FALLS • Jerome resident Hayley Miller was close to passing her third semester in College of Southern Idaho's registered nursing program. It just wasn't close enough.

Students must hit the 70 percent mark out of 325 test questions throughout the semester in order to move on in the program. That's based on scores from five chapter tests and a final exam.

Miller - who has worked as a Licensed Practical Nurse for about nine years - missed the benchmark by one question.

"Needless to say, I was pretty upset," she said.

Now, Miller is going through the process of appealing her grade. On Monday, she'll reach the final step - presenting her case to a grade appeal committee.

If the appeal is successful, she plans to go into her fourth and final semester of the RN program.

But if her grade appeal is denied, Miller's not sure what will happen next. She said she doesn't know if she wants to repeat the rigorous third semester of the program.

Miller might be going through the college's grade appeal process, but most students don't attempt it.

"It's not terribly common," said Dr. Mark Sugden, Instructional Dean for the Health Sciences and Human Services department. But he expects there will be a few nursing students appealing their spring semester grade. Miller said she was an advocate for another student who went before a committee this week.

Chief Academic Officer Dr. Jeff Fox said he usually hears about just one or two grade appeals each year. It's even rarer for an appeal to make it to the committee level.

"More often, if there's a grade appeal, it's solved much earlier," he said.

During the grade appeal committee meeting, Miller will present her case. A nursing faculty member will also present a case.

After the committee deliberates and comes up with a recommendation, it goes to Fox for a final decision.

"It's a process that's not taken lightly," he said.

What's the Appeals Process?

Here's an overview of the College of Southern Idaho's grade appeals process. If a resolution isn't reached at each step, the student has the option of continuing the process within a set timeframe.

- Student has an informal meeting with his/her instructor within 20 days after the semester ends.
- Meet with department chairperson.
- Meet with instructional dean. During this step in the process, the student fills out a grade appeal form and a one-page appeal letter.
- Notify registrar to convene a Grade Appeal Committee meeting.
- A six-member Grade Appeal Committee meets, which includes both faculty members and students. Afterward, a recommendation is submitted to the college's chief academic officer.

program must hit the 70 percent mark in each of their classes in order to move on - a figure approved by the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission and Idaho Board of Nursing.

One reason for the standards, Sugden said, is that nursing students are at clinical sites during their last semester of the RN program.

"In the nursing program, these aren't job shadowing experiences," he said. "They're out there working with patients."

Sugden said it's frustrating when a student is close to hitting the 70 percent passing mark, but isn't quite there.

"No one feels good about that," he said.

But he said it's important to look at the big picture. If a student hasn't reached the benchmark, there's a "significant amount of content the student hasn't mastered."

"It's not just one point we're talking about here," he said.

Although grading in the nursing program is "very strict," Sugden said he doesn't discourage students from appealing their grade if they feel they've been wronged.

"The appeals process is there for students," he said.

T.F. County Juvenile Court Unveils Remodeled Courtroom

TWIN FALLS • What used to be a recreation room is now a brand new courtroom for Twin Falls County juvenile cases and what were once dorm rooms are now offices.

The new courtroom and offices are in a wing of the Snake River Youth Center at 2469 Wright Ave. in Twin Falls, which used to be occupied by the Competency Development Center. Since that program was discontinued, the wing was empty for more than a year.

A tax windfall from a big lottery win gave Twin Falls

County Commissioners and County Clerk Kristina Glascock the chance to plan the improvements.

The old juvenile courtroom was small, but adequate, Commissioner George Urie said.

The main problem was the waiting area outside the court becoming more and more cramped. Families had to wait in a small hallway with little privacy or room to prepare before a case, he said.

The new space is more user friendly, Glascock said.

Attorney-client meeting rooms are now right next to the public defender's office which is also near where ju-

veniles in custody are held. This makes improves privacy as well as being more efficient, Glascock said.

The courtroom was the first to be designed, Commissioner Terry Kramer said. If a recreation room could work as a courtroom, dorms could become offices and the whole project could be put into motion, Kramer said.

The project took about three months to complete and cost about \$130,000. One of the main goals of the remodel was to make the whole juvenile court system more centralized.

"This works out excellent for them," Kramer said.

Death Row Inmate Denied Clemency Hearing

BOISE • The Idaho Commission of Pardons and Parole says it won't consider a clemency request from condemned inmate Richard Leavitt, who is scheduled to die by lethal injection on June 12.

Leavitt was sentenced to death for the 1984 murder of Blackfoot resident Danette Elg.

Commission director Olivia Craven says the panel decided late Tuesday to deny Leavitt's request for a commutation hearing. Craven says Leavitt was seeking to have his death sentence changed to life in prison.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter received the commission's recommendation without comment.

Under Idaho law, only the governor has the authority to grant clemency on death penalty cases, but in order for the governor to do so, the parole commission must first consider the request and make a recommendation to the governor.

Idaho Soldier Hit by Hostile Fire in Afghanistan

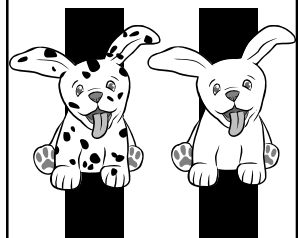
BOISE • A soldier from southwestern Idaho has been injured by hostile fire in Afghanistan.

The Idaho National Guard says 42-year-old Sgt. Albert Vieth, of Star, was flying on a mission Sunday in a Black Hawk helicopter when a shot fired from the ground hit him in the forearm, exited, and then went through his shoulder.

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Man Accused of Trafficking Allegedly Delivered 5 Pounds of Pot

TWIN FALLS • Idaho State Police investigators say a Vancouver, Wash., man delivered five pounds of marijuana to Twin Falls and agreed to sell it to a confidential informant for \$11,000.

Charles William Jonsson, 24, was arraigned on Monday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on a charge of trafficking in marijuana.

According to court documents, the confidential informant agreed to meet a driver known as "Charlie," later identified as Jonsson, on Friday at 1 p.m. in Twin Falls to purchase the marijuana.

Through text messages with another man in Vancouver, the informant agreed to meet Jonsson at the Shilo Inn parking lot at 586 Blue Lakes Blvd.

According to the court

documents, Jonsson left Vancouver at 4 a.m., heading for Twin Falls.

At about 1:15 p.m. on Friday, surveillance units advised police that a vehicle matching the description of the driver's had pulled into the Shilo Inn lot, the court records state. Detectives watched Jonsson hand the informant a large black suitcase.

The informant exited the car and police arrested Jonsson for trafficking in marijuana.

"I immediately made contact with Confidential Informant 566 and subsequently opened the black suitcase, which contained five heat sealed plastic bags of suspected marijuana," the records said.

According to the records,

Jonsson told police he was paid \$500 to deliver the marijuana to Twin Falls.

That afternoon, police said they weighed and tested the marijuana using a field test kit. It totaled 2,300.3 grams, just more than five pounds.

Jonsson was held in the Twin Falls County Jail on \$25,000 bond and is scheduled for a June 15 preliminary hearing.

Scores of Afghans Killed in Violence across Nation

KANDAHAR, Afghanistan • Scores of Afghans were killed Wednesday in Taliban attacks and other violence including a NATO airstrike, highlighting persistent instability as foreign troops begin their drawdown more than a decade after the U.S.-led invasion.

The bloodbath spanned from the insurgents' stronghold in the south to the relatively peaceful north to the volatile eastern border with Pakistan. Two U.S. pilots also were killed when their helicopter crashed in Ghazni province in the east, a senior U.S. defense official said.

The deadliest assault took place in

the southern city of Kandahar, the birthplace of the Taliban, where three suicide bombers turned a dusty marketplace into a gruesome scene of body parts, clothing, glass and other debris.

"I couldn't see anything except for fire and dust," said Islam Zada, who was on the other side of the road having tea near his parked truck when the first bomb went off.

"I found a wounded truck driver on our side of the road and went to help him," Zada said. "We gave him some water and when we were talking to him the other blasts happened."

The Taliban appeared to be targeting companies located at the Kandahar bomb site that provide supplies to a massive military base used by the

U.S.-led coalition about three miles (five kilometers) away. Eight of the 22 killed worked for companies that supply equipment to the base. At least 50 others were wounded.

In the past two years, tens of thousands of U.S.-led coalition troops have flooded Taliban strongholds in the south, and have largely succeeded in boosting security there. But the Taliban have proven resilient, continuing to conduct suicide attacks to create fear among the public, opening up new fronts in the north and west and stepping up attacks in the east.

Afghan President Hamid Karzai condemned the attack in Kandahar, saying it proved the "enemy is getting weaker because they are killing innocent people."

Space Shuttle Enterprise Arrives at Manhattan Home

NEW YORK • New Yorkers lined the West Side waterfront to welcome the space shuttle Enterprise as it sailed up the Hudson River on Wednesday to its new home aboard the Intrepid Sea, Air & Space Museum.

The prototype space shuttle rode a barge from Jersey City, N.J. to the Intrepid, where it was hoisted by crane onto the flight deck.

A flotilla of vessels including a police boat, a Fire Department boat and a yellow taxi boat accompanied the Enterprise as it sailed past the Statue of Liberty, the World Trade Center site and other Manhattan landmarks en route to the Intrepid at midtown.

"I've never seen a space shuttle, and I'm looking at one," said Thomas Hoffer, 69, who described himself as homeless. "I'm just spellbound." Fashion photographer Stewart Shining, 47, said his young nephews in California had emailed him to ask if he could see the Enterprise.

"I just walked over and had a peep and took some pictures," he said.

Multimedia producer Tara Gore also took a break from work to watch the shuttle.

"There's so much going on in New York that you can walk out of your office and see the space shuttle floating by," she said.

The Enterprise's original move-in date was Tuesday. Organizers said Monday that bad weather had delayed preparation work.

The shuttle was towed to New Jersey from Kennedy Airport on Sunday.

A spokeswoman for the Intrepid said the shuttle's wingtip sustained light cosmetic damage during the Sunday trip when a gust of wind caused it to graze a wood piling.

The Enterprise never went on an actual space mission; it was a full-scale test vehicle used for flights in the atmosphere and experiments on the ground.

It comes to New York as part of NASA's decision to end the shuttle program after 30 years. It is scheduled to open to the public in mid-July.

Many who watched the shuttle's passage up the Hudson posted photos on Twitter.

Google Adds Warning of 'State-sponsored Attacks'

BEIJING • Google said Wednesday that it has added a feature to warn users whose accounts it believes are targets of "state-sponsored attacks," but the Internet giant did not cite a specific government.

Google Inc., however, closed its search engine in China in 2010 after saying it no longer wanted to cooperate with Beijing's Internet censorship following hacking attacks traced to China.

A message that says "Warning: We believe state-sponsored attackers may be trying to compromise your account or computer" will appear onscreen if users are targeted, Eric Grosse, a vice president for security engineering, wrote on a company blog.

Google cannot say how it knows activity is state-sponsored without giving

information that would help attackers, Grosse wrote. But detailed analysis and victim reports "strongly suggest the involvement of states or groups that are state-sponsored," he wrote.

A report in November by U.S. intelligence agencies said Chinese and Russian intelligence services and companies with state ties systematically break into American computer systems to steal commercial information.

Western security experts say China's military is a leader in cyberwarfare research.

Beijing has rejected suggestions by Western security experts that its military or government agencies were involved in the Google hacking. But it has not responded publicly to appeals by U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton and other officials to help investigate hacking attacks.

'Band of Brothers' Honored on D-Day Anniversary

SAINTE-MARIE-DU-MONT, France • With World War II-era military planes darting overhead and Normandy's Utah Beach visible in the distance, a bronze statue emerged from beneath a camouflage parachute, in tribute to a man whose quiet leadership was chronicled in the book and television series "Band of Brothers."

The unveiling of the Colorado-made statue of Pennsylvania native Maj. Dick Winters was one of many events marking Wednesday's 68th anniversary of D-Day, the Allied operation that paved the way for the end of the war.

The 12-foot (3.6-meter) tall bronze statue in the Normandy village of Sainte-Marie-du-Mont shows Winters with his weapon at the ready. But Winters — a native of Ephrata, Pennsylvania, who died last year at age 92 — only accepted serving as the

statue's likeness after monument planners agreed to dedicate it to the memory of all junior U.S. military officers who served that day.

"There were many Dick Winters in this war, and all deserve the bronze and glory of a statue," said former Pennsylvania Governor Tom Ridge, present as the bronze statue, draped in a camouflage parachute, was unveiled.

Also attending were four or five D-Day vets, including two who served in Winters' "Easy Company," Al Mampre and Herb Suerth Jr.

Winters "was a humble, simple person thrust into a position of leadership in which he excelled," said Suerth, who heads the association of former Easy Company vets, only 19 of whom survive.

The statue was made in Loveland, Colorado and transported here, to a roadside between the village of Sainte-Marie-du-Mont and Utah Beach, distant but

ALARMING ASSAULTS ON WOMEN AT FAMOUS SQUARE

CAIRO • Her screams were not drowned out by the clamor of the crazed mob of nearly 200 men around her. An endless number of hands reached toward the woman in the red shirt in an assault scene that lasted less than 15 minutes but felt more like an hour.

She was pushed by the sea of men for about a block into a side street from Tahrir Square. Many of the men were trying to break up the frenzy, but it was impossible to tell who was helping and who was assaulting. Pushed against the wall, the unknown woman's head finally disappeared. Her screams grew fainter, then stopped. Her slender tall frame had clearly given way. She apparently had passed out.

The helping hands finally splashed the attackers with bottles of water to chase them away.

The assault late Tuesday was witnessed by an Associated Press reporter who was almost overwhelmed by the crowd herself and had to be pulled to safety by men who ferried her out of the melee in an open Jeep.

Reports of assaults on women in Tahrir, the epicenter of the uprising that forced Hosni Mubarak to step down last year, have been on the rise with a new round of mass protests to denounce a mixed verdict against the ousted leader and his sons in a trial last week.

The late Tuesday assault was the last straw for many. Protesters and activists met Wednesday to organize a campaign to prevent sexual harassment in the square. They recognize it is part of a bigger social problem that has largely gone unpunished in Egypt. But the phenomenon is trampling on their dream of creating in Tahrir a micro-model of a state that respects civil liberties and civic responsibility, which they had hoped would emerge after Mubarak's ouster.

"Enough is enough," said Abdel-Fatah Mahmoud, a 22-year-old engineering student, who met Wednesday with friends to organize patrols of the square.

India Allows US Military to Recover Remains

NEW DELHI • India agreed Wednesday to allow American military teams to search the Himalayan mountains for the remains of hundreds of U.S. service members who went missing during World War II.

"This is a humanitarian gesture by a government, with whom we share so many values," U.S. Defense Secretary Leon E. Panetta said in New Delhi at the end of a two-day visit. "The ability to return heroes to their loved ones is something that America deeply, deeply appreciates."

During World War II, the Himalayas formed part of a major aerial supply route, a mission dubbed "flying over the Hump." The route, which began at the eastern end of the Himalayas, wrapped over Burma and dropped into China, was dangerous because of cloud-knifing mountain peaks and bad weather.

Pilots flew the route to avoid Japanese-occupied Burma, and it was the Allies' only option after the Japanese blocked the Burma Road. Several dozen U.S. planes crashed on those missions.

The families of the servicemen were told that the planes were lost over the Hump, but many did not know what that meant or exactly what had happened to their loved ones.

For more than six decades, the burned wreckage of the planes and human remains were left strewn across the remote

Himalayan ranges. Now, teams from the U.S. Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command (JPAC) can search for the remains in India and bring them back to the United States.

This week, Vietnam also opened three new sites for similar missions.

The renewed energy for the recovery of remains is partly due to the fiscal 2010 National Defense Autho-

ritization Act, which set high annual quotas for JPAC. But some Pentagon officials say such nonconfrontational work also helps extend the influence and reach of the American military in regions that are not historically friendly.

The searches for remains in the region will not be the first. For years, an Arizona-based businessman, Clayton Kuhles, has journeyed up the Himalayas, crossed treacherous rivers and combed through dense jungles to find human remains as well as engine parts, identification plates, wing sections and other pieces of the planes. Kuhles has posted his discoveries on his website, www.MIArecoveries.org.

Mubarak's Health Worsens amid Egypt's Political Crisis

CAIRO • Hosni Mubarak's health sharply deteriorated Wednesday, days after he was sentenced to life in prison, and specialists were evaluating whether to transfer him to a better-equipped hospital outside the penal system, security officials said.

The deposed leader's health scare added to the uncertainty engulfing Egypt, where powerful political groups are seeking to bar Mubarak's former prime minister from the presidential runoff and derail the election.

Officials at Cairo's Torah prison said the 84-year-old Mubarak's condition had

moved to a "dangerous" phase and that doctors administered oxygen five times to help him breathe. He was also suffering from shock, high blood pressure and severe depression, according to the officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak to the media.

Mubarak was being treated in the prison hospital's intensive care unit, which recently underwent a \$1 million renovation to prepare for his arrival, the officials said. He was the only patient in the five-bed ICU ward.

Dr. Hamdi el-Sayyed, who has treated Mubarak over the last decade, said imprisonment in Torah was "inhumane" given his age and poor health.

It was not immediately possible to independently verify the gravity of Mubarak's condition. But the ex-leader's health has been an issue in recent years.

He was treated in 2010 for cancer of the gallbladder and pancreas, and his lawyer said after his arrest in April 2011 that it might have spread to his stomach. Officials denied the claim at the time.

Still, the ousted leader was ordered held in a military hospital after a government-appointed panel of physicians determined in May 2011 that he was too ill to be held in prison while awaiting trial, saying he suffered from heart trouble and had tumors in his pancreas removed. It did not say whether the tumors were malignant.

visible behind the statue.

It was here that Winters and his small band of men dropped out of the sky soon after midnight on June 6, 1944, on a death-defying mission to destroy four German 105mm artillery guns that threatened the Allied invasion force.

During the ceremony, World War II-era military aircraft flew overhead, including a U.S. artillery spotting plane just like those that would have darted through the skies on D-Day.

Master Sergeant Frank Barnett, 37, a paratrooper from Anniston, Alabama, serving at the U.S. Air Force base in Ramstein, Germany, attended the ceremony with other members of the 435th Air Ground Operations Wing. Barnett and 18 colleagues had made the trip to Utah Beach to participate in a parachute jump over the same Normandy fields where Winters and his "Easy Company" landed soon on D-Day.

The paratroopers, dressed in military fatigues, said they've all watched "Band of Brothers" "four or five times."

"It's important for us on

the airborne side to remember everything they did," Barnett said. "They are the Greatest Generation."

The plan to erect the statue began 2½ years ago, said Tim Gray, Chairman of the Rhode Island-based World War II Foundation, which initiated the project and helped raise the \$100,000 it cost.

The statue "is not a monument to one man, it's a monument to many men and the leadership they showed on D-Day," Gray said — "all the divisions that fought on the beaches and hedgerows of Normandy on June 6, 1944."

Tens of thousands of Allied and German forces were killed in the D-Day invasion and ensuing Battle of Normandy.

Frenchman Reny Rossey, 86, recalled accompanying a British unit in the invasion as part of the effort to liberate his country from the Nazi occupation.

"Coming back home, for us, it was enormous. We had to do this job," he said at a ceremony Wednesday at a cemetery in Ranville.

"My youth saved me. I was 17½. I had no fear," he said. "You had to have audacity to join in something like that."

Obstacles Loom for Further Iran Nuclear Talks

TEHRAN, Iran • The most tangible accomplishment from the last meeting between Iran and world powers was simply an agreement to talk again about Tehran's nuclear ambitions. When negotiations resume later this month, both sides will be groping for ways to keep the dialogue alive.

It could be a clear challenge. Iran wants what the West appears unwilling to give: easing sanctions to push the talks forward. Washington and allies are demanding concessions that Iran finds far too lopsided: scaling back its ability to make nuclear fuel in exchange for some modest giveaways such as spare airline parts.

About the only strong force pushing them toward common ground is the likelihood that failure would bring fresh calls from Israel and elsewhere for military action. The chief of staff for Israel's military, Lt. Gen. Benny Gantz, said Tuesday that a "super-ready" military threat is needed in tandem with diplomatic initiatives.

Gantz also hinted at other "disturbances" to Iran's nuclear program, which was certain to raise speculation about cyberwarfare and assassinations of Iranian scientists that Tehran has blamed on Israel's Mossad spy agency.

"This is both a poker game and a chess match on all

sides," said Bruno Tertrais, senior researcher at the Foundation for Strategic Research in Paris. "There's bluffing like with poker. There's the effort to plot several moves ahead like in chess."

"The only real tactic agreement, it seems, is that nobody wants the talks to fall

apart," he added. "They want — they need — to find a way to keep them going."

Iran will likely head to the June 18-19 talks in Moscow with the same general demands that fell flat last month in Baghdad, the first main negotiating session since the effort was revived in April.

LOS ANGELES (AP) • Ray Bradbury imagined the future, and didn't always like what he saw.

In his books, the science fiction-fantasy master conjured a dark, depressing future where the government used fire departments to burn books in order to hold its people in ignorance and where racial hatred was so pervasive that some people left Earth for other planets.

At the same time, his work, just like the author himself, could also be joyful, whimsical and nostalgic, as when he was describing the magic of a Midwestern summer or the innocence and fearlessness of a boy who befriends a houseful of ghosts.

Bradbury, who died Tuesday at age 91, said often that all of his stories, no matter how fantastic or frightening they might be, were

metaphors for everyday life and everything it entailed. And they all came from his childhood.

"The great thing about my life is that everything I've done is a result of what I was when I was 12 or 13," he said in 1982.

For more than 70 years, Bradbury spun tales that appeared in books and magazines, in the movie theater and on the television screen, firing the imaginations of generations of children, college kids and grown-ups across the world. Years later, the sheer volume and quality of his work would surprise even him.

"I sometimes get up at night when I can't sleep and walk down into my library and open one of my books and read a paragraph and say: 'My God, did I write that? Did I write that?' Because it's still a surprise," he said in 2000.

In many ways, he was always that 12-year-old boy who was inspired to become a writer after a chance meeting with a carnival magician called Mr. Electrico who, to Bradbury's delight, tapped

him with his sword and said: "Live forever!"

"I decided that was the greatest idea I had ever heard," Bradbury said later. "I started writing every day. I never stopped!"

TWIN FALLS • When Jerry Duffy bought his Jeep from a Pocatello man in 1999, it broke down on the ride home and was towed from Burley to Twin Falls. "That's what started it," Duffy said.

He tore it apart and remodeled the whole thing, turning it into a high-torque vehicle. Six years later, Duffy and his Jeep won Four Wheeler magazine's annual "Top Truck Challenge," joining a long list of champions.

For the competition's 20th anniversary this month, Duffy and his machine will return to Hollister, Calif., for the magazine's "Top Truck Challenge" for champions, competing against 16 former first-place winners.

How will he fare this time? "I know my machine better than anyone else. So I think I have good odds of winning, yeah," he said on a recent afternoon at Advanced Suspension Design in Twin Falls.

Inside the shop owned by Jeff Trammell, Duffy's 1981 Jeep sat with a front tire off its base and the hood open. Engine parts and tools were scattered in the garage where the shop's crew worked on his and other vehicles.

Duffy pointed out some of the things he's reworking for the competition — and explained that the modified 502 Chevy big-block engine really has about 400 horsepower and 600 pounds of torque.

It's the torque, he said, that he believes will help him win the competition, which includes seven events testing the endurance of man and machine. A

hill climb, an obstacle course and towing a 40,000-ton cement truck are among them. Each event is worth 10 points, he said, but judges are picky and can dock points for any number of reasons.

Duffy's expectations: to have a fun time and put to good use the machine's torque.

"Horsepower is instant," he explained, "while torque is tractable power. By keeping traction I can go over anything I want."

The 44-by-18.5-by-15-inch Super Swamper tires also help, he said. He modified them by cutting additional grooves into their thick rubber.

Perhaps surprisingly, Duffy said his machine is street legal — except for the absence of back fenders. When he isn't competing or tinkering on the Jeep, he often takes it to popular four-wheel spots such as Moab, Utah.

Now, however, he's focused on June 11-15.

He who comes out on top at the competition will not win any money or trophy, Duffy said, but the title "champion of champions." The winner also will be featured in a Four Wheeler anniversary edition.

"I thought it was a blast, plain and simple," said Trammell, who was Duffy's spotter in 2005 and will return as spotter this year. He'll sit in the passenger seat, directing Duffy on his drive over and around obstacles, keeping a sharp eye for things that the driver might not be able to see.

The 2005 competition was an adrenaline rush, Trammell said, but that's not really why they compete.

What's the reason? It's a question the two offroad buffs have asked

themselves. Duffy's answer: "I'm not sure. I guess you have to be a little

crazy." Twenty former champs and one additional com-

petitor originally were to compete, Duffy said, but as of May 24 four of them had

dropped out. "The smart ones aren't coming," he said.

The Archer's Challenge: Selecting Your Bow

Today I begin the archery/bowhunting series with a general discussion of the four different types of bows available to the aspiring archer. In popularity, they are the compound bow, the recurve, the crossbow, and the long-

bow. Beginning with the ancient longbow, each successive bow type was a successful attempt to increase both the speed and range; hence the lethality, of the projectile, be it an arrow or bolt. Interestingly, each of these different types of bows — with their own unique advantages and disadvantages — appeal to and are championed by archers and hunters with equally unique demands and expectations for their sport and equipment.

At this point Clayton Nielsen, hunter education coordinator for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, asked me to make the distinction between archery and bowhunting. "Archery is seeing how far you can get from the target and still hit it, while bowhunting is seeing how close you can get to a game animal before you shoot."

Now let's take a look at the different types of bows available today for shooting targets, game animals

or both.

For shooting arrows at living beasts or down target lanes, today's hands-down favorite is the compound bow. By utilizing the mechanical advantage of cams and cables, the compound bow essentially lets the shooter pull and hold a greater bow weight (poundage) with less effort (let off). Shooters of all sizes and strengths can now get their arrows moving fast enough, flying accurately enough, and sailing flat enough to become, with sufficient practice, very effective marksmen and hunters.

For the first time in human history, a host of sophisticated bows, sights, recoil dampeners, stabilizers, and releases put this accuracy and impressive power literally at your fingertips. In fact, with dedicated practice on paper and especially with 3-D targets, many archers can learn to shoot accurately enough after several weeks to place an arrow into a bull's-eye or an animal's vitals at close range.

This is certainly not the

case with the more difficult to master recurve or traditional bow and absolutely not the case with the medieval-aged long bow. The long bow is just that: from tip to tip, a very long straight bow.

On a recurve, the bow tips are curved away from the shooter. These curves provide the advantage of being able to pull the same draw weight over a shorter distance with a more compact and easy to handle bow. The disadvantage of both of these designs is the fact that what you pull is what you get.

The faster and flatter you want the arrow to fly, the more weight you must pull back and hold. This requires quick aiming and re-

lease. For this reason, longbows require no-sight instinctive shooting; recurves may be shot instinctively or with sights.

Modern crossbows, which are prohibited during Idaho's archery-only hunts, are the easiest to master. The bow itself holds the string tension for you and intricate adjustable sights, even scopes, make these deadly arrow rifles simple to shoot accurately.

I think I paid \$19.99 when I downloaded this app for my iPad about a year ago, and it was a bargain then. You can look up more than 700 species by their shape, family or name and use an advanced search function to add information, including geographic region, color, size and wing shape.

The pictures are fantastic, usually several for each species to help nail down differences among males and females and juveniles, and between summer and winter plumage. There are details about the birds' summer and winter ranges and migration routes, and you can even listen to their songs and calls.

I don't know how long the sale price will last, so if you're even a casual birder, I'd check the Apple app store or Amazon right away.

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Pro Fisherman Perfects Techniques at Truman Lake

WARSAW, Mo. • When Casey Scanlon spotted a brush pile on his bass boat, he made sure that his crankbait reached ramming speed.

He cranked hard until he felt the wobbling bait crash into the brush. It got hung up for a second, but Scanlon was able to pop it loose. When the lure darted free, Scanlon immediately felt the tug of a big Truman Lake bass.

“That will get a lot of reaction strikes,” Scanlon said he lifted the 3-pound bass into the boat. “You bang that crankbait into the brush and let it deflect off, and that erratic motion will trigger strikes.”

“I remember one time, I threw a jig into a brush pile 12 times and never got a strike. I went to a crankbait and got a keeper bass on my first cast.”

Ah, the tricks of the trade.

For pro fishermen such as Scanlon, who lives in Lenexa, Kan., they can be the difference between

cashing a check and going home with nothing but stories about the big ones that got away.

After starting fishing in tournaments when he was 15, Scanlon, now 27, knows all about the challenges of trying to beat not only the bass, but other top fishermen as well.

In his rookie year of competing in bass fishing’s big leagues, Scanlon has been on a wild rollercoaster ride.

He reached the top when he won a Bassmaster Central Open tournament at Table Rock Lake in late April and earned an automatic berth in the Bassmaster Classic, every tournament fisherman’s dream.

He also experienced the thrill of bringing a 9-pound, 11-ounce bass

to the scales during an Elite tournament on the St. John’s River and cashed a check in that tournament.

But he also has been forced to deal with the reality that he is going against the world’s top bass fishermen. Doing well isn’t good enough. You have to excel to make waves at this level.

“It was an eye-opener at Bull Shoals,” he said. “I was catching 30 keepers a day in practice and I really thought I was on something.”

“But once the tournament started, I found out that everyone was doing that. You not only had to catch a lot, you had to have some big ones thrown in.”

Today, Scanlon sits in 78th place in the points standings of the 99 fishermen in the Elite Series. But he isn’t discouraged. He will tell you

that he has taken a crash course in tournament bass fishing this year ... and he’s learning quickly.

“People don’t realize it, but sometimes there’s a real fine line between doing well in one of these tournaments and not even finishing in the money,” he said. “One or two little mistakes and it will cost you.”

“But I feel like I’ve learned a ton. I’m paying attention to what others are doing, and I’m learning.”

Never was that more evident than in the Central Open at Table Rock. Scanlon was coming off a disappointing Elite tournament at nearby Bull Shoals Lake, but he paid attention to what winner Brandon Palaniuk was doing. Scanlon applied that strategy to Table Rock and ended up winning the tournament.

“I used deep-diving crankbaits and started fishing points around spawning pockets,” Scanlon said. “I knew most of the fish were done spawning and that this was the first place they would pull out to.”

“I had some phenomenal practice days. It slowed down by the tournament, but I was still able to catch two

5-pounders each day and that really helped.”

On a recent Thursday, Scanlon was on Truman Lake, perfecting his methods.

Fishing in the Long Shoal area, he set out for points with dropoffs, places where has found success at this time of the year before. He began making long casts with Strike King 5XD crankbaits, getting them to dig into the rocky bottom and deflect off whatever cover he could find. And it wasn’t long before he found success. He caught and released three keepers and many smaller fish on a day when other fishermen were complaining about how tough the fishing was.

No, it wasn’t a great day. But as the pros often do, Scanlon found a way to catch a few keepers.

He gave up a lawn-care business so that he could pursue his dream of becoming a bass pro. The game isn’t always as glamorous as it seems. There are huge expenses, long hours of travel and the times when self-doubt creeps in after poor tournaments.

Hmong Families Gather to Fish Walleyes

ALONG THE ST. LOUIS RIVER, Minn. • Just after the stroke of midnight, they began casting into the dark waters of the St. Louis River. One after another, the anglers tossed out heavy sinkers and minnows or leeches.

Ploop went the sinkers as they landed in the murky current not far near Jay Cooke State Park. Eight anglers had made the trip up from the Twin Cities, hiking at least half a mile down an obscure path to reach the river.

Fishing had just opened on this portion of the river at midnight, May 19, and these anglers, all members of the Hmong community, are always here when fishing opens above the Minnesota Highway 23 bridge.

“This is our sixth year,” said Sou Lak Thao, 28, of Vadnais Heights, Minn. “Fishing is phenomenal. We’ve never struck out yet.”

At the midnight hour, Thao and other members of his extended family were the only ones on the river’s bank. But more would be coming, he said. By dawn, more than 100 anglers, all Hmong and nearly all from the Twin Cities, would line the bank.

It was a warm night on the river. A hatch of small insects hovered in clouds along the water’s edge. An ore train rumbled in the distance. Two lanterns sat on the ground, and the anglers’ headlamps probed the darkness over the river. A small campfire burned nearby, and

woodsmoke drifted down the shore. The men, who ranged in age from 17 to 48, talked and joked softly in their native Hmong language, but all knew English as well.

Touger Moua’s rod, propped on a stick, suddenly began to bow. Moua, 23, of Brooklyn Center, Minn., quickly grabbed it and began reeling. The beams of several headlamps scanned the tannin-stained current like searchlights. The anglers anticipated the first walleye of the night. But when it appeared, it didn’t look anything like a walleye.

“It’s a catfish!” Sou Lak Thao announced.

And sure enough, it was about a 2-pound channel catfish in smooth gray skin,

sharp spines protruding from head and shoulders.

Moua slid the cat onto the bank and deftly removed his floating jig head. The fish wasn’t a walleye, but it was food. The men put it in a shallow creek nearby, which they had dammed with rocks to create a small live well.

Harvesting from Nature

Many members of the Hmong community are avid anglers and hunters, accustomed to living close to the land in the mountains of their homelands in Thailand and Laos.

“We believe in nature and fresh,” explained Duluth’s Cher Pao Vang, 52. He said there are about 15 families in the Twin Ports Hmong com-

munity, some of whom also fish the St. Louis River. “You grow or catch your own, use your own hands or ideas. That’s a big thing for the Hmong culture. The garden, we see it grow and we take it up. Sometimes in the wild, we see something edible. ... We just gather things from the fresh.”

In years past, when Hmong families were beginning to settle in Minnesota, state conservation officers sometimes found Hmong anglers with more fish than their limits permitted.

“Where they come from, they find it, they catch it, they eat it,” said Minnesota Department of Natural Resources conservation officer Randy Hanzal of Duluth. “There are some issues when they’re coming from a country with no regulations.”

But the DNR trained members of the Hmong community as conservation officers, helping to spread the concept of limits. Fishing-regulation signs at landings are sometimes printed in Hmong as well as English. Now, over-limit problems are rare.

“Overall, their compliance is exceptionally high, maybe slightly more compliant than what I see in other anglers,” Hanzal said.

Hmong anglers know how to catch fish, he said.

“My experience is that they’re exceptional anglers,” Hanzal said. “They tend to go fishing as a group or as a family unit. That’s nice to see. They get the young ones involved. They’re very effective and everybody’s participating.”

Color, Size and Depth Decide Success of Lures

Sometimes people fish awhile with a lure with no success, then start catching fish when they change to a lure of a different color. They nearly always attribute the increased catch rate to the color change.

Color can make a difference, but if the new color is on a lure of a different shape and size, then color may have nothing to do with it.

Most of the best bass, walleye and muskellunge anglers I know say that the lure’s action and diving characteristics often are more important.

“We were trolling body baits for walleyes in Lake Erie last year and weren’t doing very well. Then I put on a blue-and-white one I picked up from a bargain bin at Cabela’s,” said Dan Hunt, an avid walleye fisherman from Monroe, Mich.

“I barely had that lure set when it got a fish. We pulled that one in, sent the plug back out, and it got another fish in a couple of minutes. We went through the tackle boxes and put out every blue-and-white bait we had, but the only one that caught fish was the one from the bargain bin.

“I had another one just like it—only it was black and white. We put that out, and it started catching fish, too. When we held those baits in the water near the boat, you could see they had a real tight, fast wiggle.”

Color can make a difference, but the only way to be sure is to use two lures that are identical except color.

Lure size is a factor anglers may overlook. Last spring, four of us were fishing for small-mouth bass on Lake St. Clair, and one guy was outdoing the rest of us by about 4-to-1.

We were all using jerkbaits that had the same pearl-white hue, but the hotshot’s lure was about 30 percent shorter and thinner. It probably was just a much better match to the baitfish bass we were chasing in that area at that time.

Another difference can be the depth at which a lure runs. Several times I’ve seen people start catching fish when they switch to a lure of a different color and not realize the new lure was about 3-5 feet deeper.

So the next time you switch to a different lure that increases the catch rate, take a minute to try to tease out all the possible variables.

Chinook Limits Lowered on Clearwater

BOISE • The bag limits on adult chinook salmon was reduced June 2 for parts of the Clearwater drainage.

The new bag limit is four salmon per day, but only one may be an adult, and 12 in possession, but only three may be adults. Adults are 24 or more inches in length.

The new limits affect the Clearwater River main stem

from the Camas Prairie Railroad Bridge upstream to the South Fork Clearwater, and the Middle Fork Clearwater River from the confluence with the South Fork River upstream to the confluence of the Lochsa and Selway rivers.

To date, about 30 percent of the harvest share for the Clearwater River has been

taken. Anglers in the region have expressed a desire to have fisheries open until early July if possible and have consistently voiced support for management actions that might help extend seasons to meet that goal.

Lower flows and good water clarity in the Clearwater have contributed to rapidly increasing harvest rates and

increasing likelihood that the fishery harvest share will be attained before July unless management action, such as reduced limits, is taken.

All other rules and seasons remain unchanged. For details see the 2012 chinook salmon pamphlet or the Fish and Game website at fishandgame.idaho.gov/public/fish/?getPage=110.

Fishing Slows Because of Cooler Weather

JEROME • Cool and windy weather the last few days has slowed fishing on some waters. Here’s an update on some of the region’s fisheries and how they’ve been doing.

Anglers at Magic Reservoir have consistently been pulling in 3-plus pound trout for the last few weeks. Bait of choice has been worms and marshmallows.

Carey Lake turned back on after slowing down during last weeks cool and wet weather. Folks are catching fish both from the shoreline as well as in small boats and

float tubes. Carey Lake is typically a great spring fishery but becomes harder to fish when vegetation grows in during the summer months.

It’s been reported the kokanee fishing has turned on in Anderson Ranch Reservoir. A few anglers are reporting good catch rates of kokanee in the 10- to 12-inch range. The docks had not been installed as of last week but it’s hoped they will be in soon.

Anglers on the upper end of Salmon Falls Creek Reser-

voir (China Creek and the Gravel Pits) have been catching walleye, smallmouth bass, trout, perch and some crappie. Most walleye are coming in at 6 to 7 pounds. A few anglers have been fly fishing from float tubes for walleye.

Fishing for other species has been good, as well. For smallmouth bass anglers have been using jigs and worms. Perch have been biting at the upper end of the reservoir and trout have been pretty good all around the reservoir.

The Big Wood River has cleared up (not muddy), but flows are still pretty hard. Those willing to fish higher flows are reporting good catch rates of small to medium sized rainbow trout.

Anglers at Roseworth Reservoir are having good success catching trout.

Officers who were present during a recent bass tournament weigh-in at Lake Walcott reported good catch rates with a good sized bass being caught by tournament participants.

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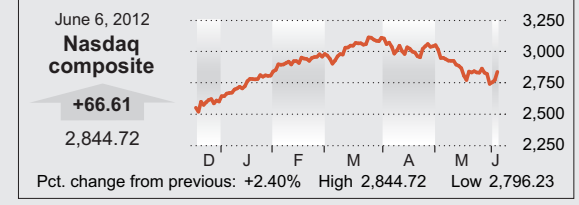
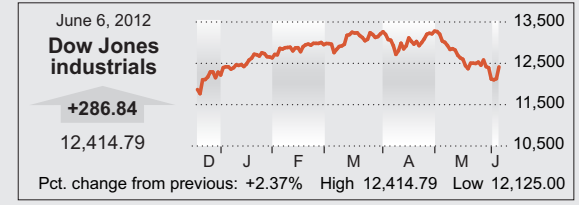

Geithner Said to Ask Bankers for Specific Dodd-Frank Complaints

WASHINGTON • Treasury Secretary Timothy F. Geithner has challenged bankers to give him specifics on their longstanding complaint that the Dodd-Frank Act is imposing costly, confusing and burdensome regulations on them, according to four people familiar with the matter. The Federal Advisory Council, a group of bank executives from each of the 12 Federal Reserve districts, complained to Geithner at a May 10 meeting about overlapping and duplicative rules, according to the people. Geithner urged the bankers to prepare a study with examples of regulatory burden, said the people who are preparing the report. Geithner offered to use his ability to reach across agencies to better coordinate and streamline rules if he found the report convincing.

Honda Electric Car Gets 118 mpg, but Costs Add Up

DETROIT • At 118 miles per gallon, the Honda Fit electric vehicle is the most fuel-efficient in the United States. But getting that mileage isn't cheap — and it isn't always good for the environment. Honda announced the eye-popping figure Wednesday, making the small, four-door hatchback more efficient than electric rivals like the Ford Focus, Nissan Leaf and Mitsubishi i-MiEV. It goes on the market this summer in Oregon and California. The electric Fit has an estimated price tag nearly twice as high as the gasoline-powered version. It would take 11 years before a driver makes up the difference and begins saving on fuel. Honda announced the eye-popping figure Wednesday, making the small, four-door hatchback more efficient than electric rivals like the Ford Focus, Nissan Leaf and Mitsubishi i-MiEV. It goes on the market this summer in Oregon and California.

travel 100 miles. At the national average price of \$3.57 per gallon of gasoline, that's \$11.52. • People drive an average of almost 13,500 miles a year, so a typical driver would spend \$445 on electricity for an electric Fit over a year, and \$1,552 on gasoline for a regular Fit. • Honda has valued the price of an electric Fit at \$29,125 after a \$7,500 federal tax credit. That's \$12,210 more than the gas-powered Fit — a savings of \$1,107 per year to make up the difference between the electric and the gas-powered version. Customers don't want to spend the extra money up front and wait for years for payback, said Geoff Pohanka, who runs 13 auto dealerships in Virginia and Maryland, including three that sell the Nissan Leaf and Chevrolet Volt electric cars. "People are smart. They're looking for the deal," he said. "Is somebody going to fork out \$15,000 more for something that gets them less range than their car now? It's not happening."

With gas prices falling, the high sticker price for electric vehicles is becoming more of a barrier for American buyers, even though the vehicles are far more efficient than their gas-powered counterparts. That's hurting sales of electric. Through May, carmakers sold just over 10,000 electric vehicles, less than 0.2 percent of U.S. car and truck sales. That's because the numbers don't add up for the average consumer. • The electric Fit needs 28.6 kilowatt hours of electricity to go 100 miles. At the national average price of 11.6 cents per kilowatt hour, that costs \$3.30. A gas-powered automatic-transmission Fit, which gets 31 miles per gallon, needs to burn 3.2 gallons to

At first, Honda will only be leasing Fit EVs in Oregon and California, for \$389 per month. The subcompact seats up to five people and can be recharged in three hours with a 240-volt charging station. A fully charged Fit EV can go 82 miles, meaning a daily commute could cost nothing for gasoline. And leases can make sense for consumers. Carmakers can lower rates and subsidize deals in order to make a car — especially one with new, expensive technology — more attractive to buyers.

KMVT Takes over Fox Affiliate in Twin Falls

TWIN FALLS • Neuhoff Communications Inc., which operates KMVT-TV, has announced it will add a FOX affiliate to its Twin Falls lineup. The news comes after KXTF, which offers FOX programming in the Magic Valley as FOX 35, said it would drop the network on July 1 due to a contract dispute. Florida-based Neuhoff has signed an agreement with FOX Broadcasting Co. to begin airing the network's content July 1. The new channel will be known as FOX 14 and broadcast over KTWT-LP, channel 14.

According to a news release, the channel will broadcast in high definition.

"I believe the addition of Fox's first-rate programming will be a huge plus for our company, viewers and advertisers," president and CEO Geoffrey Neuhoff said in the release. Neuhoff also broadcasts CBS, the CW and My Network TV content in Twin Falls.

KXTF announced last month that it will continue to operate, and contract negotiations are under way to bring THIS TV programming to the station. THIS TV offers films and TV programming owned by MGM and subsidiary United Artists.

U.S. Productivity Fall 0.9 Percent in First Quarter as Growth Cools

WASHINGTON • Worker productivity fell more than initially estimated in the first quarter as labor costs climbed, indicating companies may pause before bringing on new employees.

The measure of employee output per hour decreased at a 0.9 percent annual rate, after a 1.2 percent gain in the prior three months, revised figures from the Labor Department showed Wednesday in Washington. Expenses per worker rose at a 1.3 percent rate and output grew 2.4 percent, less than previously estimated. The drop in productivity at the start of the year helps explain why payroll gains in May were the weakest in a year. Slower U.S. growth combined with European economies on the verge of recession shows why companies may cut back worker hours and become more deliberate in their hiring as they seek to protect profit margins. "If demand remains weak, employers will push the existing workforce harder to boost productivity," said Brian Jones, a senior U.S. economist at Societe Generale in New York. "We think you're going to see slower growth, and the breadth of hiring, at least according to purchasing managers, is the weakest it's been since last December." First-quarter productivity was projected to decrease 0.8 percent after a previously reported 0.5 percent decline, according to the median forecast of 59 economists surveyed by Bloomberg News. Estimates ranged from a decline of 1.1 percent to no change. Unit labor costs, which are adjusted for productivity gains, were forecast to rise 2.1 percent in the January to March period, the survey median showed. Employment costs dropped 1.5 percent in the final three months of 2011, previously reported as a 2.7 percent increase.

Australian minister defends comm security in China

CANBERRA, Australia • Australia's defense minister said Wednesday he was protecting the confidentiality of government communications after a newspaper reported he left his delegation's laptop computers and cell phones behind before flying to mainland China. Defense Minister Stephen Smith took precautions against Chinese espionage by leaving computers and phones in Hong Kong before flying to Beijing for a goodwill visit, The Sydney Morning Herald reported. His staff were given fresh phones in China with new numbers. The minister took the step after such devices were "compromised" on previous ministerial visits, the newspaper said. Leaving computers and communications devices outside China is becoming standard operating procedure for the United States and many other Western governments, as well as other Western executives. But the timing of the news reports

could be awkward. Smith is in China to soothe concerns over Australia's decision to deepen its military ties with the United States by hosting up to 2,500 U.S. Marines at a joint training hub. China is Australia's biggest trading partner. Australia also recently banned Chinese telecommunications giant Huawei from working on a national broadband network for security reasons. Beijing's relations with Western governments have been strained by complaints about hacking traced to China and aimed at oil, technology and other types of companies. Smith declined to say whether he had been hacked on any previous visit to China. But he said he had taken such security measures before. "Ministers are entitled to ensure the confidentiality of their communications, so this is nothing unusual, nothing extraordinary," Smith told Australian Broadcasting Corp. television from Beijing. "Governments do it, private corporations do it for industrial reasons, so this is just part of the modern world," he added.

Idaho Throws Out Vodka Ban

BOISE (AP) • Idaho reversed direction in the face of a lawsuit Wednesday and said it will sell Five Wives Vodka, but the liquor producer whose label makes an unmistakable reference to polygamy would not immediately rule out legal action.

The Idaho State Liquor Division rejected as offensive last week the product that features an antiqued sketch of five women hiking up their skirts. Idaho is more than 25 percent Mormon and the church at one time allowed polygamy but abandoned the practice in 1890.

The vodka originates from Ogden's Own Distillery in Utah, where the Mormon church is based. The company said it would sue Idaho on principle if necessary.

Then on Wednesday George Washington University professor Jonathan Turlay in a letter to Idaho officials and posted on his website said he planned to sue on behalf of the producer of Five Wives Vodka. He called the ban unconstitutional and

gave the state 10 days to reverse its position.

The state only took hours: "In a shared desire to avoid unnecessary litigation costs to Ogden's Own Distillery and the people of Idaho, today we have informed the makers of 'Five Wives' vodka that we will immediately begin processing special order requests for both on-premise licensees and retail consumers," Anderson

said in a statement Wednesday afternoon.

Steve Conlin, a partner and marketing chief for Ogden's Own Distillery, said Wednesday the company's attorneys would review Idaho's decision before making a statement, likely today.

But he said selling the vodka as a special order request meant it wouldn't be available on store shelves but only as a special order.

State Eyes Changes to Land-line Rules

BOISE • The Idaho Public Utilities Commission is considering a rule change that would no longer require land-line phone service providers to fix outages within 24 hours or be forced to give customers a billing credit.

Instead outages would have to be fixed within 48 hours, there would no longer be any requirement for a billing credit and weekend outages could be fixed the following Monday or Tuesday. A decision is expected in two to three weeks.

Officials at CenturyLink, the state's largest land-line telephone service provider, say the old rule puts them at a competitive disadvantage to wireless, cable and voice-over-internet providers.

The Idaho AARP is protesting the proposed rule change.

Body of Colo. Rafter Recovered

IDAHO FALLS • Authorities in central Idaho on Wednesday morning retrieved the body of a Colorado Springs, Colo., man who died several days earlier during a rafting trip on the remote Middle Fork of the Salmon River.

The Custer County Sheriff's Office says the body of 34-year-old Jonathan Victor Boling was flown out by airplane and taken to a funeral home in Challis. Arrangements are being made to take the body to Colorado.

Officials tell the *Post Register* a rafting accident happened at Velvet Falls late Sunday morning not long after the 14-member party launched in four rafts and seven pontoon boats.

Doc-lawyer Will Intervene in Idaho Fetal Pain Case

BOISE • In a strategy legal experts say is unheard of, a southeastern Idaho lawyer who is also a physician will be allowed to intervene in a challenge to the state's so-called fetal pain abortion law in a case that could set national precedent.

Rick Hearn is representing a Pocatello woman accused of illegally taking abortion-inducing pills and leaving a stillborn fetus on her porch. And now that Hearn is involved in the case as a plaintiff, in his role as a physician who might want to prescribe abortion drugs in the future, they are mounting the first challenge to the constitutionality of such a law.

Laws banning abortion after 19 weeks of pregnancy, under the premise that a fetus may feel pain around that stage of development, have been enacted in more than a half-dozen states.

Hearn's motion to intervene was granted Wednesday by a federal judge.

"I look forward to resolving the important constitutional questions raised by these laws restricting access to abortion services enacted not only in Idaho but in many other states," Hearn told The Associated Press.

Idaho's attorney general's office declined to comment on the decision Wednesday.

Authorities say Hearn's client, Jennie Linn McCormack, terminated a pregnancy that was more than five months along on Christmas Eve in 2010.

She was charged under

an Idaho law that makes it illegal for anyone other than a health care professional to be involved with ending a pregnancy. Hearn defended McCormack and the case was dismissed.

But it wasn't a total victory, a judge tossed the charges "without prejudice," meaning she could face charges again at any time.

McCormack is challenging the fetal pain law enacted last year in an effort to avoid future prosecution. The suit also says fetal pain abortion bans violate women's constitutional rights to privacy.

Hearn decided to join the lawsuit after U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill ruled the suit wouldn't get class action status and that McCormack didn't have the right to challenge some aspects of the law because she wasn't currently pregnant and seeking an abortion. Hearn's intervention intends to fill those gaps in their filing.

Bill Horton, a legal ethics expert associated with the American Health Lawyers Association and the American Bar Association's health division, said in April the strategy was unique and unusual.

Hearn hasn't practiced medicine for about six years, and has never performed an abortion. He has said the case isn't about him, but McCormack's right to choose.

The scientific research bolstering fetal pain laws has been the subject of heavy debate, but bans have been gaining momentum among conservative legislators.

China's Dilemma: Proceed with Public Trial?

BEIJING • China's leadership faces a knotty choice in how to finish off fallen politician Bo Xilai without further damaging the Communist Party's image: Purge him the old-fashioned way — in secret — or run him through a public trial.

Analysts and a veteran party member say leaders are leaning toward a trial. But either way, the challenge is to prevent lurid al-

legations that Bo abused his power and that his wife was involved in the murder of a British businessman from upsetting a once-a-decade leadership transition just months away.

"Bo's political life is at an end," said Li Datong, a longtime state media editor forced from a senior editing job for broaching sensitive subjects. "But the party will work to ensure that this goes no bigger and harms their image no more than absolutely possible."

After months of investigation and high-level delib-

erations, leaders believe a trial will have more public legitimacy, according to analysts and a veteran party member who has been informed of progress in the talks and who spoke on condition of anonymity because of the sensitivity of discussing the party's inner workings.

The Communist Party's internal investigators are working with prosecutors to whittle down the charges to portray Bo's infractions as individual acts unrelated to the system, the party member said.

Schools Find It Tricky to Draw Line on Senior Pranks

CHICAGO • Well, it's that time of year again. Time to stash a dead fish somewhere to stink up the school hallways. Time to drop tennis balls on the heads of people in the lobby. Time to cover your soon-to-be alma mater with Post-It notes.

For high school seniors, it's prank time — or "structured mayhem" in the words of Mindy Utay, a therapist who works with teens.

It's a rite of passage as graduation looms, mostly harmless fun but sometimes an escalating into vandalism. This spring alone, windows at school have been smashed, walls and sidewalks spray painted, and paint poured down steps. Cars have been

flipped. Property has been damaged from California to Kentucky to Maryland.

As a result, school administrators are rethinking exactly what constitutes a prank and where to draw the line — and finding that's not always easy to do.

This year, the rule at Kenowa Hills High School in Walker, Mich., was clear: No senior pranks allowed.

But organizing themselves on Facebook, a group of graduating seniors there decided to ride bicycles, en masse, on the last day of school. They arranged for a police escort along the 3-mile route. The mayor even brought them doughnuts before they headed out to what was supposed to be a funny surprise for everyone else at school.

The principal was not amused.

She thought the students had put themselves in danger by riding along a busy thoroughfare. Traffic was disrupted. Drivers caught up in it, including some teachers, were late for work. In the principal's mind, the seniors had broken the "no pranks" rule, and she came down hard.

"But we didn't really see it as a prank. We saw it more as a senior send-off," says Sarah Pechumer, one of the 65 graduating students who participated. "It was harmless. It was arranged. It was legal."

And in the rowdy history of senior pranks, it was relatively benign. Recall the letter sent to parents at California's San Dieguito Academy in 2006, informing them that henceforth condoms would be distributed to students at all dances.

Appeals Don't Ask Court to Establish Marriage Right

WASHINGTON • Within a week, two federal appeals courts have delivered major victories to proponents of same-sex marriage and moved the issue closer to Supreme Court review. But neither case would require the justices to decide whether the Constitution provides a right for gays to marry.

Decisions regarding California's Proposition 8 and the federal Defense of Marriage Act relied on Supreme Court precedents that say animus toward gays is not a legitimate reason for government to discriminate, rather than asserting that there is a fundamental right for homosexuals to marry.

Appeals of the two decisions are expected to reach the Supreme Court in the fall. The court typically accepts review of a lower court's decision that declares part of a federal statute, such as the Defense of Marriage Act, unconstitutional.

NTSB: AIR TANKER 'HEAVILY FRAGMENTED' AFTER CRASH

SALT LAKE CITY • An air tanker that crashed and killed two Idaho pilots fighting a wildfire in southern Utah was reduced to fragments that shed few clues about the accident's cause, federal investigators said Wednesday.

The wreckage will be recovered within days for a closer look, said Debra Eckrote, deputy regional chief at the National Transportation Safety Board's Seattle office.

"It's heavily fragmented obviously," Eckrote said

Wednesday. "There was a lot of burn damage to the wreckage."

NTSB investigator Van McKenny found a 600-yard debris path littered with pieces of the 50-year-old air tanker, said Eckrote, the investigator's supervisor. McKenny was out of cell-phone range Wednesday, his second day at the crash site.

Eckrote said the pilots were dropping flame retardant or had just done so when the Lockheed P2V went down Sunday — the same day another tanker of the same vintage was forced to make a crash landing at

Nevada's Minden-Tahoe Airport when its left-side landing gear failed to deploy. No one was injured.

The U.S. Forest Service now has nine large air tankers under contract and announced Wednesday it has made arrangements to make four more available immediately to fight fires. California is staffing two tankers a month earlier than normal with funding from the Forest Service. The other two tankers are being made available through agreements with Alaska and the Canadian Interagency Fire Centre, the Forest Service said.

Penn State-heavy Jury Picked in Sandusky Case

BELLEFONTE, Pa. (AP) • A jury dominated by people with Penn State loyalties was selected Wednesday to decide Jerry Sandusky's fate in the child sexual abuse scandal that rocked the university and led to football coach Joe Paterno's downfall.

The seven women and five men who will hear opening statements on Monday include an engineering administrative assistant at Penn State, a dance teacher in the continuing education program and a professor who has been on the faculty for 24 years.

Also: a Penn State senior, a retired soil sciences professor with 37 years at the university, a man with bachelor's and master's degrees from the school and a woman who has been a season ticketholder since the 1970s.

Sandusky, a 68-year-old former assistant football coach, is charged with sexually abusing 10 boys over a 15-year span.

Picking the jury took less than two days, moving along more swiftly than some had expected, given that the rural area is rich with college employees, alumni and fans.

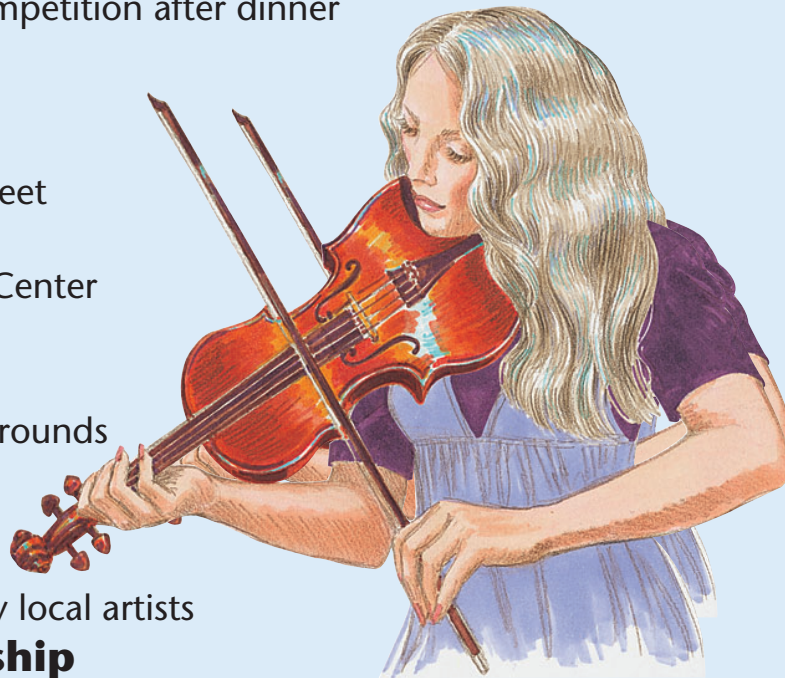

OKC is OK: Thunder Advance to NBA Finals

OKLAHOMA CITY • Kevin Durant had 34 points and 14 rebounds while playing all of regulation for the first time all season, and the Oklahoma City Thunder claimed a spot in the NBA finals by beating the San Antonio Spurs 107-99 on Wednesday night.

Russell Westbrook added 25 points for the Thunder, who trailed Game 6 of the Western Conference finals by 18 in the first half and erased a 15-point halftime deficit before pulling ahead to stay in the fourth.

Durant grabbed the final rebound, dribbled the ball across halfcourt and raised his right fist to celebrate with a sold-out crowd. The franchise will play for the NBA title for the first time since 1996, before relocating from Seattle.

Tony Parker had 29 points and 12 assists for San Antonio, but only eight of the points and two assists came in the second half. Tim Duncan chipped in 25 points and 14 rebounds, and Stephen Jackson scored 23.

Game 1 of the NBA finals will be Tuesday night in Oklahoma City against either Boston or Miami. The Celtics lead that series 3-2 and can earn a trip to the finals with a win at home in Game 6 on Thursday night.

The Thunder took the lead for good early in the fourth quarter, getting nine of their first 13 points on free throws as the fouls started to pile up for San Antonio — six on the defensive end and three on the offensive end in the first 7 minutes.

Derek Fisher and James Harden hit 3-pointers in a

BSU's Felix Leads Decathlon After 1st Day

DES MOINES, Iowa • Boise State's Kurt Felix is halfway to a championship.

Felix leads the decathlon through five events with 4,187 points, just 10 more than Gunnar Nixon of Arkansas after the first day of the NCAA Division I outdoor national championships. The decathlon wraps up today, and unlike in 2011 it should be able to be finished by then.

California's Michael Morrison won the event a day later than scheduled and in an empty stadium because of heavy storms that forced a number of delays. But weather shouldn't

be a problem this year, with temperatures expected to be in the high 80s with no rain in the forecast.

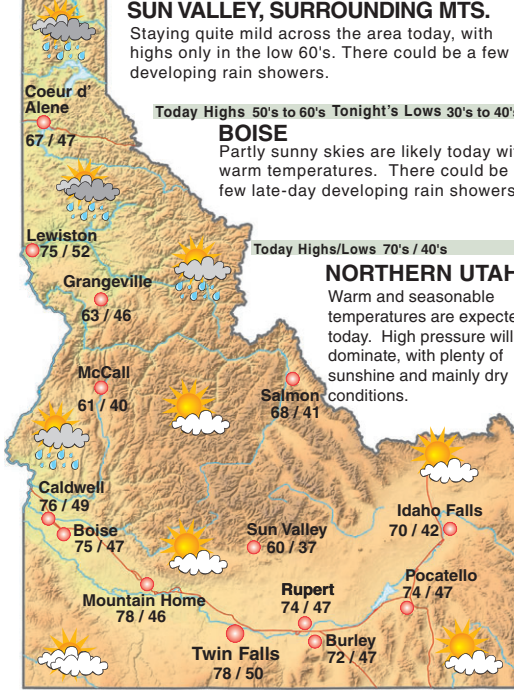

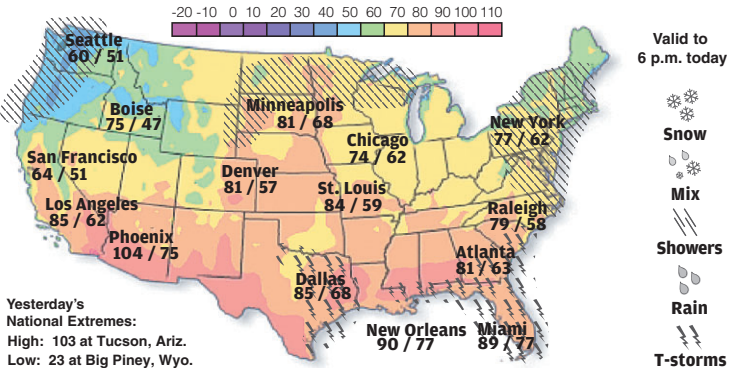

I'll Have Another Is 4-5 Favorite to Win Belmont Stakes

ASSOCIATED PRESS NEW YORK • I'll Have Another went into lockdown on Wednesday, moving into a secured barn shortly after the colt was made the early 4-5 favorite to win the Belmont Stakes in his quest to

become the 12th Triple Crown champion and first in 34 years. The Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner was the last of the 12 Belmont horses to arrive at the detention barn, showing up four minutes past the noon check-in

deadline. The chestnut colt calmly walked a few hundred yards down a dirt path from where he had been stabled since arriving May 20 and stepped into the barn with a horde of media tracking his every move. "No complaints, no hur-

dles," trainer Doug O'Neill said. "He's being good." Whether he's good enough to end the 34-year drought of Triple Crown winners will be decided Saturday, when I'll Have Another breaks from the No. 11 post under Mario Gutierrez.

He'll have to contend with 11 rivals. "We're going to see how the pace sets up," O'Neill said. "If they're crawling, hopefully we'll be leading the crawl and if they're flying, hopefully we'll be sitting in behind the horses flying."

Just two Belmont winners have come out of the No. 11 post since 1905. The last was Sarava, a 70-1 shot who ended War Emblem's Triple Crown bid in 2002. I'll Have Another bucked history in the Derby as the first horse to win from the 19th post.

That Twin Falls City Code §6-2-6(C) is amended as follows:
"6-2-6: INTOXICANTS:

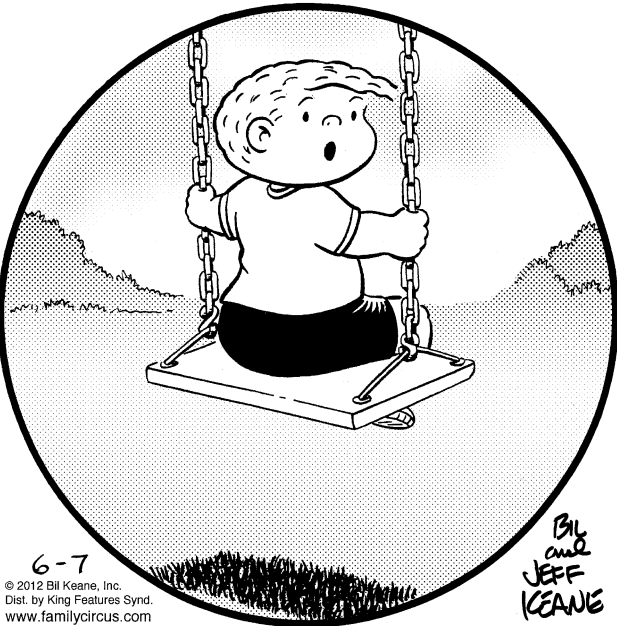

The deals this week all come from the trials that allowed my team to qualify for the Senior Bowl in Veldhoven last fall. We fell behind in the early going, then recovered with the aid of deals like the one presented today.

At our table, the developments were unremarkable after West dealt and passed. With an awkward hand and marginal opening-bid values, I opened my long suit, clubs, and a contested auction saw us play five diamonds. My partner, Dan Morse, was at the helm, and since East had shown long spades, he tackled trumps by playing the diamond ace first, and now had no problem bringing home 11 tricks. That looked like a normal result, one that was likely to be duplicated at the other table if the contract was five of a minor.

However, the auction was as shown, with South declaring three no-trump. Look at how the cards lie for declarer: If West leads a heart, there are nine top winners; and on the lead of a low spade, declarer will come home in his game because of the spade blockage.

However, cometh the hour, cometh the man. Fred Hamilton on lead selected the spade king as his opening salvo! When Arnie Fisher encouraged with the 10, Hamilton played the spade jack to Fisher's ace, and that let the defenders take the first six tricks.

ANSWER: Whenever the opponents come to a stop at a low level and you have unexpressed high cards or shape, you should consider bidding on. Even though West's sequence suggests length in your suits, you should bid two diamonds. I can't guarantee that you do have an eight-card fit, but it just feels right to bid here.

Today's Highlights:
On June 7, 1892, Homer Plessy, a "Creole of color," was arrested and fined for refusing to leave a whites-only car of the East Louisiana Railroad; his case went all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court, which at the time upheld "separate but equal" racial segregation, a concept overturned in 1954 by Brown v. Board of Education.

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1654, King Louis XIV, age 15, was crowned in Rheims, 11 years after the start of his reign.

In 1712, Pennsylvania's colonial assembly voted to ban the further importation of slaves.

In 1769, frontiersman Daniel Boone first began to explore present-day Kentucky.

In 1776, Richard Henry Lee of Virginia proposed to the Continental Congress a resolution stating "That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States, that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown."

In 1862, William Bruce Mumford, a Confederate loyalist, was hanged at the order of Union military authorities for tearing down a U.S. flag that had been flying over the New Orleans mint shortly before the city was occupied by the North.

In 1937, actress Jean Harlow died in Los Angeles at age 26.

In 1942, the World War II Battle of Midway ended in a decisive victory for American forces over the Imperial Japanese.

In 1967, the Haight Ashbury Free Medical Clinic opened in San Francisco.

In 1972, the musical "Grease" opened on Broadway, having already been performed in lower Manhattan.

In 1981, Israeli military planes destroyed a nuclear power plant in Iraq, a facility the Israelis charged could have been used to make nuclear weapons.

In 1998, in a crime that shocked the nation, James Byrd Jr., a 49-year-old black man, was hooked by a chain to a pickup truck and dragged to his death in Jasper, Texas. (Two white men were later sentenced to death for the crime; a third received life with the possibility of parole.)

Ten years ago: A yearlong hostage crisis in the Philippines involving a U.S. missionary couple came to a bloody end as Filipino commandos managed to save only one of three captives, American Gracia Burnham. Kennedy cousin Michael Skakel was convicted in Norwalk, Conn., of beating Greenwich neighbor Martha Moxley to death when they were 15 in 1975. (Skakel, who continues to maintain his innocence, was sentenced to 20 years to life in prison.)

Five years ago: At the G-8 summit in Germany, Russian President Vladimir Putin, bitterly opposed to a U.S. missile shield in Europe, presented President George W. Bush with a surprise counterproposal built around a Soviet-era radar system in Azerbaijan; Bush promised to consider the idea, but ended up essentially rejecting it. After three days in jail for a reckless-driving probation violation, Paris Hilton was released by Los Angeles County sheriff's officials to be sent home under house arrest. (The next day, a judge ordered Hilton back to jail, where she spent 2 1/2 weeks.)

One year ago: Moammar Gadhafi stood defiant in the face of the heaviest and most punishing NATO airstrikes to date, declaring in an audio address carried on Libyan state television, "We will not kneel!" Fazul Abdullah Mohammed, the al-Qaida mas-terminand behind the 1998 bombings of U.S. embassies in Kenya and Tanzania, was killed at a security checkpoint in Mogadishu by Somali forces. NBC retained its hold on U.S. Olympic television rights in a four-game deal through 2020 worth nearly \$4.4 billion, defeating rival bids from ESPN and Fox.
