WASHINGTON (AP) • Emails a soldier from Hailey reportedly sent to his parents before he was captured by the Taliban three years ago suggest he was disillusioned and considering deserting.

Bowe Bergdahl told his parents he was "ashamed to even be American" and was disgusted with the U.S. mission in Afghanistan and with the Army,

according to The military has never detailed emails quoted in Rolling Stone magazine. Bergdahl, a 26-year-old Army sergeant, was taken pris-

circumstances of his disappearance or capture, and he is not classified as a deserter. He was initially listed as "duty status unknown" and is now considered "missing-captured." He is the only U.S. prisoner of war from the Afghanistan conflict, and U.S. officials say they are actively trying to free him.

The White House declined comment on the emails or Bergdahl's possible motivation for leaving his base in eastern Afghanistan in 2009.

Bergdahl is the subject of a proposed prisoner swap in which he would be traded for five Taliban adherents imprisoned by the United States at the military

A New Way to Do Business

One year in, Idaho's education reforms have changed annual talks on teacher contracts.

Twin Falls.

TWIN FALLS • Talking over teacher salaries and benefits is a different conversation than two years

Twin Falls Education Association president David Gibson said the state's Students Come First laws have left a mark on negotiations between teachers unions and school districts.

"It has changed the process dramatically," he said.

Students Come First - a package of reform laws passed by legislators last year — limited the scope of negotiations. Now, teacher salaries and benefits are the main items included in collective bargaining agreements. And the negotiations are held in public.

Speaking Monday during this year's last Twin Falls negotiations meeting, Gibson said the process over the past two years has been arduous

Both sides are getting legal opinions more of-

ten, he said, and opinions differ on what falls under the state's definition of "compensation" and

"Really, it gets back to trying to navigate the laws," he said.

Twin Falls Superintendent Wiley Dobbs said a decision to add a teacher workday back to next school year's calendar, for instance, is related to the topic of salaries.

"Those are the gray areas and we work through them," he said.

With about 20 school districts in south-central Idaho, collective bargaining agreements affect hundreds of teachers' pay and sick leave.

But unlike years past, agreements only last one year before they expire. Melissa McGrath, spokeswoman for the Idaho State Department of Education, said districts used to be able to negotiate contracts for multiple years.

Agreement Takes Time

McGrath said limiting the scope of negotiations has sped up the process of reaching an agreement for some school districts.

In Blaine County, that's held true. An agreement

When a teacher signs an employment contract, it's a fairly simple

The Idaho State Department of Education's one-page document includes a teacher's salary and length of contract.

Under Students Come First, new teachers are no longer able to get onto a "continuing contract" - otherwise known as tenure. Those who already have that type of contract, though, can keep it.

School districts can offer a twoyear contract after a teacher has been employed for three years. But districts can also opt for one-year contracts.

John Blackman, assistant superintendent of the Blaine County School District, said changes to teacher contracts have led to a "sense of insecurity in the profession."

Study: Fence-marking Reduces Sage Grouse Collisions, Deaths

But it's only one tool of many needed to reverse the bird's decline.

TWIN FALLS • Marking fences may not prevent all sage grouse collisions, but it certainly helps.

That's the conclusion of a new University of Idaho study, which found that by making a fence more visible to sage grouse, collisions can be reduced by almost 85 percent.

Researchers placed 3inch pieces of reflective vinyl on fences throughout southern Idaho to study the effectiveness of preventing collisions.

If a sage grouse flies into a fence, the result is often severe injury or death. Currently, federal officials plan in 2015 to make a final decision on whether to list the bird as endangered. In the meantime, state and local officials are seeking ways to improve the bird's populations, including minimizing fence collision

However, not all fences need to be marked, said Jack Connelly, one of the study's researchers and principal wildlife research biologist with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

The highest chance of a collision was near sage grouse mating grounds called leks, Connelly said.

After monitoring fence collisions for close to a year, he said the amount of grouse collisions the research team saw was sur-

and not as something that would pose as a problem," Connelly said. "When we started this research, we were seeing dead and dying birds from fence collisions. But the beauty of it was we were able to find a solution."

Sage grouse struggle to avoid fences because evolution hasn't taught them to be wary of them, Connelly said.

"What we're doing is modifying the habitat that is difficult for the grouse to deal with it," he said.

Fence markers shouldn't be viewed as the ultimate resolution though, since sage grouse deaths still occur, said Katie Fite, biodiversity director of the Hailey-based Western Watersheds Project.

"The impact is greater than sticking some glitter on some fences," Fite said. "Oftentimes there's eroding and depending on the fence, predators can perch on the posts. So they can reduce some mortalities but that's only part of the impact that fences have in those areas."

Fence markers are quickly gaining popularity. The Jarbidge Local Working Group put up close to 14 miles of fence markers last year and plans to install the same amount this summer, said Brad Lowe, a regional biologist for Fish and Game.

The North Magic Valley LWG also plans to place fence markers near the Ketchum area, said Walt Locke, one of the group's members.

"We've been talking about it for about two years," Locke said. "And now our group is getting ready to put markers on about 40 miles of fence."

Man in Custody Swallowed Pills, Collapsed, Police Say

TWIN FALLS • A Buhl man suspected of drug use collapsed while being escorted to booking in the Twin Falls County Jail late Wednesday night, police say.

According to a police report, Robert Joseph Ferreira, 23, fell to the floor as detention deputies escorted him and became unresponsive shortly after informing a Buhl police officer that he swallowed an unknown number of Xanex pills.

Officers Benny Torres and Sheena Bingham responded to the Siesta Motel at 629 Broadway Ave. S. in Buhl at about 11:10 p.m. Wednesday to attempt to make contact with Ferreira, whom police say had three active warrants out for his arrest.

According to police reports, Ferreira attempted to climb out his motel room's bathroom window before taking off running.

"I pursued Robert on foot north in the 600 block of Broadway Avenue South. Robert then ran east crossing Broadway Avenue South," Torres wrote in a report. "Robert then continued running until he was in front of Broadway Java located at 500 Broadway Avenue South where he stopped and I ordered him to the ground."

When Torres asked Ferreira why he ran, Ferreira allegedly replied he heard Torres was fast and wanted to see if it was true, the report

After Ferreira was in custody, he asked Bingham to get some of his personal items from the room. When Bingham entered the room, she noticed a knife with white crystal residue on it, the police report stated.

In a search of the room, Bingham allegedly found 19.2 grams of methamphetamine, 2.3 grams of marijuana, prescription pain medicine, antidepressants, antiseizure and anti-anxiety medication. She also found numerous plastic baggies and a small digital scale, the report stated.

While Bingham searched the room, Torres transported Ferreira to the Twin Falls County Jail. En route, Ferreira allegedly said he swallowed Xanex pills, the police report said.

Upon arrival at the jail, Ferreira collapsed and became unresponsive, according to the report. He was transported to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center where Ferreira allegedly told medical personnel he swallowed two grams of meth, the report said.

According to the report, Ferreira tested positive for methamphetamine and marijuana but negative for Xanex.

Ferreira was cleared by medical staff and booked into the jail on warrants for failing to appear, a no-contact order violation, resisting and obstructing police, possession of marijuana, possession without a prescription and possession with intent to deliver. He was held on a total bond of \$105,100. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for June 15.

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Police: Woman Brought Daughters on Shoplifting Trip

TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls woman is in jail in lieu of \$25,000 bond after Twin Falls Police say she and her teen daughters shoplifted from Sportsman's Warehouse at 1940 Bridgeview Blvd. on Tuesday.

Police responded at about 7:15 p.m. and spoke with the store's loss prevention officer, Christopher Koons, who said he saw the woman, identified as Christina Boyer, 35, and her daughters stealing merchandise, court records said.

"Koons stated he watched Boyer select clothing merchandise and hand it to her daughters," the police report $\,$ said. "The girls entered the dressing room, concealed the merchandise in their large camouflage purses, and left the store without paying."

One girl had \$177.93 worth of clothing in her purse, while the other had a sweater worth \$34.99, the records

Koons told officers it wasn't the first time the girls and their mother stole things, the records said.

"Koons said the girls had entered the store on Feb. 3, April 5 and on April 23, stealing approximately \$361.88 worth of merchandise," the police report said.

Police said Koons told them he interviewed Boyer who admitted she knew her daughters were stealing from the store, records said.

In an interview with police, Boyer allegedly said she told her daughters they could pick out some shirts and she would purchase the shirts on another day because she "couldn't afford it," the report said.

"She witnessed them enter the dressing room and knew that they had concealed the merchandise and exited the dressing room," the report said.

According to the report, Boyer left the store and came back to discover her daughters had been detained for shoplifting.

One of the girls allegedly told police she stole some of the items for a cousin's birthday present, but that she knew stealing was wrong.

All three were arrested. The two girls were taken to the Snake River Detention Center on burglary charges, while Boyer was taken to the Twin Falls County Jail.

The girls had previously been arrested for shoplifting at Walmart, the police report said. The girls allegedly told police "they selected high price items that did not contain security devices to steal to make money," the report

Boyer is scheduled for a June 15 preliminary hearing.



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

prison at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. The Taliban have walked away from the deal and larger negotiations with the United States, but the Obama administration is still pushing a negotiated settlement between the Taliban and the U.S.-backed government in Afghanistan.

The Rolling Stone article, to be published today, also quotes other soldiers and associates of Bergdahl's as saying that he had talked about walking to Pakistan if his deployment was "lame" and that shortly before his disappearance he had asked whether he should take his weapon if he left the base. Friends and other soldiers describe a survivalist mentality, and Bergdahl's father, Bob, told the magazine that his son was "living in a nov-

"The future is too good to waste on lies," one email reads. "And life is way too short to care for the damnation of others, as well as to spend it helping fools with their ideas that are wrong?"

The emails were provided to the magazine by Bergdahl's family in Idaho, which has gone public with its own discontent with U.S. efforts to free their son. There is no way to authenticate the emails.

Some of Bergdahl's reported words read like a suicide note.

"I am sorry for everything," he wrote. "The horror that is America is disgusting."

He mailed home boxes containing his uniform and

Cassia County Appoints New Jury Commissioner

BURLEY • A new jury commissioner was appointed Thursday for the Cassia County courts after a judge declared a mistrial Wednesday based on comments made to a jury panel by the previous commissioner.

Cassia County Clerk Joe Larsen said he received an administrative order from 5th District Administrative Judge G. Richard Bevan to appoint Cassia County employee Theresa Forthun as jury commissioner.

Larsen said Forthun has previously served as jury commissioner.

"She is well-attuned with that job and actually started with some of those duties today," he said.

Forthun is the chief elections clerk for the county and will be attending to the duties of both jobs.

The shift in personnel stems from a mistrial in the Alvin Andrew child sex crimes case. Cassia County 5th District Judge Michael Crabtree declared a mistrial in the case at the state's request, after the former jury commissioner made comments to a jury panel regarding the defendant's presumption of innocence and that it was an important day for the defendant.

Larsen said the previous commissioner, whose name has not been released, has not been placed on administrative leave and that the matter is under review. He declined to comment further due to the matter being a personnel issue.

"We are following due process," he said. "We are trying to be very judicious in the review and I'm comfortable with the direction we're heading."

was reached in May after two full-day meetings.

Next year, teachers will receive a 1 percent raise to their base salary and a

one-time 1 percent bonus. Assistant Superintendent John Blackman said Students Come First has impacted negotiations.

"It has definitely shortened the process," he said. But for other south-central Idaho school districts,

that hasn't been the case. Jerome Superintendent Dale Layne said an agreement was reached in May after just two negotiations sessions. But the length of the process isn't much different than years ago.

"It hasn't been a big change for us in our district," he said.

Next school year, Jerome teachers will have five furlough days — fewer than the 8 1/2 this year. Negotiation teams also agreed to try to bring back a few job positions.

Jolene Dockstader, president of the Jerome Education Association, said the process went well this year and she's glad some furlough days were restored.

"When the funds aren't really there, it makes it much more difficult to say, you know, we need to put more days back," she said.

School districts and teachers unions have a Sunday deadline to reach an agreement. If they

don't, the school board is left to "impose" teacher salaries and benefits itself.

That's what could happen in the Cassia County School District for the second year in a row.

Superintendent Gaylen Smyer said after two negotiations meetings, he doubts an agreement will be reached by deadline.

"We're kind of at an impasse," he said.

Smyer said Students Come First is only one piece of a larger picture. The laws, he said, are coming into play at the same time the district is addressing financial struggles and can't offer employees as much.

In Kimberly, an agreement also hasn't been reached. Superintendent Kathleen Noh said that will leave the school board to impose, but members will keep talking with the teachers union about what they'd like to see.

Just Salaries and Benefits

Under Students Come First, negotiations are limited to salaries and benefits. That typically makes up about 80 percent of a school district's budget, McGrath said.

Teachers unions used to be able to bargain over working conditions such as the school calendar, bell schedule and how teachers are evaluated. Now, it's up to school

boards to come up with policies to address those topics. During negotiating ses-

sions, what falls under the category of "compensation" or "benefits" can also be a bit vague.

Under Idaho Code, compensation is defined as "salary and benefits for the professional employee," while benefits are limited to "employee insurance, leave time and sick leave

"A lot of discussion is spent on what each group thinks it should include," said Twin Falls School District spokeswoman Beth Pendergrass.

For the past two years, negotiations meetings have been open to the public. Before Students Come First, discussions happened behind closed doors.

McGrath said negotiations should happen in a forum where parents, teachers and the general public can know what's happening. Plus, having an open session can sometimes change participants' behav-

"In the past, we heard stories on both sides that it would get pretty heated behind closed doors," she said.

Federal Judge Halts Eastern Idaho Logging Project

BOISE • A federal judge has halted a 7,000-acre eastern Idahologging project in potential lynx habitat near Yellowstone National Park after finding the U.S. Forest Service failed to follow federal laws intended to safeguard the environment.

U.S. District Magistrate Judge Candy Dale's decision Wednesday following a lawsuit by environmental groups over the Split Creek timber harvest also affects about 390,000 additional acres in the Caribou-Targhee National Forest.

"We're thrilled," said Mike Garrity, executive director of the Alliance for the Wild Rockies. "This is going to protect a lot of habitat that is very important to the recovery of lynx."

The Native Ecosystems Council also took part in the lawsuit filed in May 2011 in U.S. District Court in Idaho challenging a decision by federal forest managers to cut lodgepole pines in the 7,000-acre tract the groups said includes important habitat for threatened lynx.

Those 7,000 acres were part of nearly 400,000 acres designated as lynx habitat in 2001. But the Forest Service in 2005 created a new map that removed that land as lynx habitat, opening it to logging.

Dale ruled the agency's failure to conduct an environmental impact statement as required by the National Environmental Policy Act when creating the 2005 map meant decisions based on the map are invalid.

She also said the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in 2009 erred when agreeing with the Forest Service in a biological assessment that logging the areas wouldn't jeopardize the lynx or its habitat. She said the biological assessment was based on the invalid 2005 map, making the decision a violation of the Endangered Species Act.

"The Court finds that the Forest Service's failure to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement for a decision that ultimately opened approximately 400,000 acres of previously protected land to precommercial thinning violated NEPA," Dale wrote. "Moreover, like a house of cards built on an unsound foundation, because the 2005 map was not analyzed under NEPA, the agency's analysis under the ESA which is based upon the validity of the 2005 map cannot withstand judicial review."

In her 50-page decision she ordered both federal agencies to reconsider their decisions based on her findings.

"We're still processing the ruling and what it might mean," said Miel Corbett, spokeswoman for Fish and Wildlife. "We'll be able to comment at a later time."

Idaho State Announces Pay Raises for Employees

POCATELLO (AP) • Idaho State University will match state funds with school money to give employees pay hikes that average 4.5 percent, school officials said.

The raises will begin July 1, the *Idaho State Journal* reported.

"The ISU compensation plan, which will contribute nearly \$4 million to the local economy, is critically important for several reasons," said Idaho State President Arthur Vailas in a statement. "Great universities only become that way because of their most important resource - their people. Idaho State University's rise in academic prominence as a destination university is directly related to the hard work and sacrifice our faculty and staff have made."

School officials said the raises will cost about \$3.9 million and are being paid for with money from the state matched with money from the university. The school has about \$12 million in reserve, compared to about \$500,000 when Vailas became president in 2005.

Pay raises will be based on merit for faculty and range from 2 percent to 26.3 percent. The 600-member faculty on average will see a 3.9 percent increase in pay, the school said.

Dog Park an Investment in Twin Falls' Future

ne letter to the editor about dog poop on a softball field and the words started flying on Magicvalley.com. There was more than a little name-calling, a whole lot of finger-pointing and people eager to highlight their neighbors' personal and grammatical flaws. The emotion didn't add much to the debate, but one thing was clear — people are passionate about their pets. When cooler heads prevailed the discussion turned to the real topic at hand: Twin Falls needs a dog park — a place where pets can run off-leash and pet owners can socialize on the sidelines.

While a majority of those participating in the conversation were excited about the prospect of a city dog park, a handful of commenters and letter writers wondered why tax dollars should go to fund a frivolous thing as a park for dogs.

The answer is simple — building a dog park is not frivolous. Building amenities, especially the kind that help create community, is a linchpin in economic development.

And the city's approach to building a dog park for area pet owners has been measured and fiscally conservative. (Too measured, impatient dog owners say.)

Last week, the Twin Falls City Council approved a land swap between the city and the county that transferred ownership of three acres on the corner of Shoup Avenue West and Blake Street North. The Twin Falls Parks and Recreation Department plans to turn the acreage into a dog park and community garden. The city wants to install grass, a sprinkler system and a parking area before it lets dogs have the run of the place.

Dog owners are putting money where their mouth is by pledging thousands in donations and volunteer time. (Twin Falls County Commissioner Leon Mills volunteered his time to build the fence.)

Decisions on where people decide to relocate now involve more than just good jobs and good schools. Americans are more mobile than ever, and younger people decide where they want to live by looking for lifestyle amenities — including dog parks. In his book, "The Rise of the Creative Class," Richard Florida writes that off-leash areas for dogs can be a crucial factor to people looking to relocate. It's that big a deal.

These days, not having a park for dogs is almost as strange as not having a playground for children. According to a USA Today report, there are now more households with dogs (43 million) than with children (38 million).

As Twin Falls continues to attract business, the city will also need to attract quality workers that these growing large-scale businesses need to succeed. We want to make sure that our most-talented young people have a reason to stay after they graduate from high school or come back after they graduate from college.

Transforming a weed-filled vacant lot on Shoup Avenue is a great step in that community mission. Although appearing frivolous to some, laying down some grass and erecting a fence for our pets is a great investment for the future.

News Organizations Appeal Idaho Execution Case

PASADENA, Calif. • A federal appeals court asked Idaho prosecutors on Thursday to inquire whether a prison warden would allow full viewing access to an upcoming execution in a case filed by The Associated Press and 16 other news outlets, including the *Times-News*.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals heard arguments in a lawsuit that seeks to strike a portion of Idaho's regulations that prevent witnesses including reporters acting as representatives of the public - from watching executions until after catheters have been inserted into the veins of death row inmates.

No ruling was issued, but the three-judge panel noted the federal court had already ruled in a 2002 California case that every aspect of an execution should be open to witnesses, from the moment the condemned enters the death chamber to the final heartbeat. The decade-old decision established what was expected of the nine Western states within the court's juris-

The news organizations filed their case last month after talks were unsuccessful with prison officials, who took the position that the 2002 ruling was based on facts unique to California, said Chuck Brown, an attorney for the news organizations, who cited letters from Idaho correction director Brent Reinke.

Outside of court, Idaho Deputy Attorney General

Michael Gilmore said he will try to reach the warden to see if a policy change could be made in time for next week's execution of Richard Leavitt, who was convicted of the 1984 murder of Blackfoot resident Danette Elg.

The lawsuit comes as lethal injections have drawn greater scrutiny, from whether the drugs are effective to whether the execution personnel are properly trained.

The news organizations also asked a federal judge in Idaho to prevent Leavitt's execution from moving forward without the changes, but that request was denied Tuesday.

In his decision, U.S. District Judge Edward J. Lodge said that while the news organizations had presented a strong case in arguing that the execution limits run afoul of freedom of the press provisions, the timing of the claim fell too close to Leavitt's execution date and could cause a delay.

Lodge didn't rule on the

merits of the lawsuit, only denying the request for a preliminary injunction.

The media outlets want the 9th Circuit to reverse Lodge's decision, arguing the process is unconstitutionally restrictive.

Gilmore said one of the concerns leveled by Idaho prison officials was that the identities of the five-member execution team might be made public if the execution is viewed by witnesses from start to finish.

Case Turns Spotlight on Idaho's Execution History

BOISE • As Idaho's news media spar with the state in federal court over limits on access to executions, the case has turned a spotlight on Idaho's long and consistent history of media witnesses attending its state executions to serve as the eyes and ears of the public.

Media witnesses have been present for all but one Idaho execution since 1901 and published detailed accounts

Prior to 1901, executions were conducted at the county level in Idaho, and most were public, with hundreds attend-

Idaho's news media, including the Associated Press, the Spokesman-Review, the Times-News and more than a dozen other news outlets and organizations, are suing in federal court over Idaho's current execution procedures, which bar witnesses from the first portion of the lethal injection procedure, when the condemned prisoner is strapped down to a gurney and IVs are inserted.

The media have been in discussions with the state over the issue since before Paul Ezra Rhoades was executed in November, but the state has refused to change its procedure. Now, another Idaho execution is scheduled: Richard Leavitt is scheduled to die by lethal injection on June 12.

The lawsuit cites a 2002 9th Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals decision that held it was a violation of the 1st Amendment to the U.S. Constitution to exclude media witnesses, and by extension the public, from the full procedure, from the moment the condemned person enters the execution chamber

to the time of death. That case was brought by the news media in California. However, only two states in the 9th Circuit — California and Nevada have been complying with the 2002 decision.

The state of Idaho has argued that allowing witnesses to view the first portion of the procedure would violate the condemned prisoner's privacy, could impact other death row inmates, would cause suffering for the prisoner's family and friends, and could identify members of the execution team. However, the team is masked and wears surgical garb.

"Few of us know with any certainty when or how we will die," the state's attorneys wrote in legal filings. "If we did, would we want our full gamut of emotion, or our contemplation of eternity or cessation of existence, or our regret or defiance, on display? Or would we prefer some final, private moments during the arrangements for the execution before the curtain is opened?"

The media, in legal papers filed Monday, argued that 1st Amendment concerns outweigh those issues, and that inmates' privacy rights are

limited. "Witness attendance at an

execution assures public involvement in the process, and transparency fuels informed public debate, which is the main purpose behind granting a right of access to governmental proceedings," wrote the news media's attorney, Charles Brown of Lewiston.

No such questions were raised in the early days of Idaho executions, when news reporters had full access to the entire execution process.

In 1901, the Idaho Daily Statesman reporter, Fred Flood, wrote that he and other newsmen were ushered into Rice's cell, to hear the death warrant read to the condemned man, after the warden "stated that only those present in a religious, official or reportical capacity could enter the cell, on account of its

They then followed the prisoner to the gallows where he would be hanged, and reported in detail on the entire procedure, up to when guards placed the body in a coffin and "carried it to one of the small houses on the (prison) grounds."

Similar detailed, firsthand accounts were published in the newspapers of the day of executions carried out at the Idaho State Penitentiary in 1904, 1906, 1909, 1924 and 1926.

In 1909, the *Idaho Daily* Statesman published a photograph of a hand-written, elaborately lettered invitation/ticket the newspaper had received the day before from Warden John W. Snook, stating, "Admit Reporter Boise Statesman, To the execution of Fred Seward, May 7th, at 8 o'clock a.m." The warden signed his name at the bottom with a flourish.

The only state execution at which members of the Idaho news media weren't present was a hurry-up double hanging in the middle of the night in 1951, when a frightened prison warden who feared inmate riots refused all requests from outside witnesses, had the gallows erected starting at 5 p.m. for the midnight execution, and had all traces of them removed by morning. The hanging of the two men, ages 20 and 21, was highly controversial due to their age; they had murdered a local grocer.

At Idaho's last hanging in 1957, several newspaper reporters were present but declined, at the final moment, to enter the observation room at the new indoor gallows. There, a dozen witnesses saw the condemned man, Ray-Allen Snowden, mond strapped to a full-length backboard, fall awkwardly through the trap door and take

15 minutes to die. Prison guard Mark Maxwell, who attended the execution, told an Idaho Oral History Center interviewer in 1981, "There was two or three newspaper guys here. They didn't want in - they all waited out here?"

Idaho has conducted two executions since 1957, both by lethal injection. At each of those, media witnesses were admitted to the execution chamber and documented what they saw.

Associated Press reporter Bob Fick was among the witnesses at the execution of Keith Eugene Wells in 1994. In a 2011 National Public Radio interview, he remembered the lethal injection procedure as "sterile and antiseptic;" in contrast to Wells' crime, in which Wells beat his two victims to death with a baseball bat at a Boise bar.

In November of 2011, Idaho executed triple murderer Paul Ezra Rhoades. Four media witnesses attended and shared their observations with other reporters and the public in a pooled arrangement. Idaho Press-Tribune reporter Nate Green said the procedure was "very quiet and somber?' He also reported that once Rhoades was dead, a friend of one of Rhoades' victims muttered, "The devil has gone home."

Distillery Wants 'Five Wives' Vodka on ID Shelves

SALT LAKE CITY • A Utah distillery is happy Idaho will sell its cheeky Five Wives vodka by special order.

However, Ogden's Own Distillery lawyer Jonathan Turley said Thursday the company also wants Idaho regulators to stock Five Wives on shelves at state liquor stores.

Regulators are considering the request.

Idaho regulators initially refused to allow any sales of the product — with its not-so-subtle reference to polygamy – after branding it offensive to Mormons who make up a quarter of Idaho's population. The church dropped the practice of polygamy in 1890.

Those regulators reversed course on Wednesday and agreed to take special warehouse orders for the product. But that hasn't satisfied the distillery.

"We still remain deeply concerned about Idaho's original claim of authority that they can ban any product deemed offensive to a part of its population," said Turley, a George Washington University professor.

Turley said making Five Wives available only by special order is a halfmeasure and "an enormous hassle" for consumers and taverns that

LAWMAKER JOINS OTTER FIGHT TO KEEP **EDUCATION LAWS**

BOISE • A retiring state lawmaker has joined Re-Gov. publican "Butch" Otter's campaign to retain new education laws that limit collective bargaining while phasing laptops into the classroom and making online learning a requirement.

State Rep. Mack Shirley of Rexburg has been named treasurer of the governor's political action committee, YES! For Idaho Education. The campaign's paperwork was filed with the Idaho Secretary of State's office late Wednesday.

Shirley supported the reforms in the Idaho Legislature and approached Otter to offer his help after it became apparent that critics of the education changes had gathered enough signatures to get a repeal initiative on the November ballot, said Ken Burgess, who is managing the campaign.

Shirley "was a really good, natural choice for us," Burgess said.

The campaign will be spearheaded by Otter and co-chaired by state Board of Education member Milford Terrell and Wendy Horman, who serves on the Idaho Falls School Board. Their work will be targeted at beating back the repeal efforts.

The three laws championed by public schools chief Tom Luna and backed by Otter were approved during the 2011 session amid outcry from the teachers union, parents and some students. More than 74,000 signatures were collected on each of three petitions last spring to put the new Idaho laws to referendum votes.

The changes included polarizing provisions that eliminated bonuses for educators who retire early; phased out tenure; and made student achievement half of a teacher's job evaluation. Idaho also ditched the "last hired, first fired" policy used in most districts for laying off educators, which means those with the most seniority could be in jeopardy. High school students will get laptops starting next year, but teachers are getting the devices first this fall.

Idaho also introduced a plan to award teachers merit bonuses, put more money into professional development and is paying for paying for students to take college credits while they're still in high school, under the changes.

A political group working to overturn Luna's Students Come First plan has hired an out-of-state consultant who last November helped repeal a hotly debated Ohio law that limited collective bargaining. David Williams has been working on the Idaho campaign since April.

Otter picked Burgess, a lobbyist and veteran campaigner, to help plot his strategy for rallying behind the new education laws.

Burgess contends the Ohio defeat won't prove a harbinger of things to come in Idaho. Meanwhile, Idaho Republican Party Chairman Norm Semanko has cited Wisconsin, issuing a statement several hours before Republican Gov. Scott Walker's recall victory saying the outcome of the election was critical to Idaho's future.



Suicides Are Surging among US Troops

WASHINGTON (AP) • Suicides are surging among America's troops, averaging nearly one a day this year — the fastest pace in the nation's decade of war.

The 154 suicides for active-duty troops in the first 155 days of the year far out-distance the U.S. forces killed in action in Afghanistan — about 50 percent more — according to Pentagon statistics obtained by The Associated

The numbers reflect a military burdened with wartime demands from Iraq and Afghanistan that have taken a greater toll than foreseen a decade ago. The military also is struggling with increased sexual assaults, alcohol abuse, domestic violence and other misbehavior.

Because suicides had leveled off in 2010 and 2011, this year's upswing has caught some officials by surprise.

The reasons for the increase are not fully understood. Among explanations, studies have pointed to combat exposure, posttraumatic stress, misuse of prescription medications and personal financial problems. Army data suggest soldiers with multiple combat tours are at greater risk of committing suicide, although a substantial proportion of Army suicides are committed by soldiers who never deployed.

The unpopular war in

Afghanistan is winding down with the last combat troops scheduled to leave at the end of 2014. But this year has seen record numbers of soldiers being killed by Afghan troops, and there also have been several scandals involving U.S. troop misconduct.

The 2012 active-duty suicide total of 154 through June 3 compares to 130 in the same period last year, an 18 percent increase. And it's more than the 136.2 suicides that the Pentagon had projected for this period based on the trend from 2001-2011. This year's January-May total is up 25 percent from two years ago, and it is 16 percent ahead of the pace for 2009, which ended with the highest yearly total thus far.

Suicide totals have exceeded U.S. combat deaths in Afghanistan in earlier periods, including for the full years 2008 and 2009.

The suicide pattern varies over the course of a year, but in each of the past five years the trend through May was a reliable predictor for the full year, according to a chart based on figures provided by the Armed Forces Medical Examiner.

The numbers are rising among the 1.4 million active-duty military personnel despite years of effort to encourage troops to seek help with mental health problems. Many in the military believe that going for help is seen as a sign of weakness and thus a potential threat to advancement.

Nevada Means Pitfalls, Promise for White House Candidates

LAS VEGAS • President Barack Obama and Republican rival Mitt Romney are battling more than just each other in diverse and politically divided Nevada.

The president also is fighting against Nevada's dismal economy while Romney faces a better-organized and better-funded state Democratic Party machine with a victorious track record.

Those factors are leveling the playing field here, and Obama and Romney head into the summer seemingly locked in a close race in a state that both sides expect will be fiercely contested — and a true toss-up — throughout the fall.

Both are making Nevada and its six Electoral College votes a priority in their state-by-state strategies as they look to amass the 270 votes needed to win the White House.

Obama was making his second trip to the state in less than a month on Thursday, with a Las Vegas event aimed at wooing young, college-aged voters. Romney was just in the city a week ago for a fundraiser with Donald Trump. So far, at least \$5.6 million in TV ads has been spent in the state, with Obama and his Democratic allies spending roughly \$1.2 million more than Republican outside groups. Romney, himself, has yet to go on the air.

Nevada's outcome is all but certain to come down to a huge swath of independent and undecided voters here, many of whom say they'll choose the candidate with the right economic prescriptions. "This state is so troubled, we need someone committed to fixing it, and I don't see that," says Robert Aguirre, an in-dependent voter who said he had backed Republican John McCain and Democrat Bill Clinton. Aguirre said he is con-fident Obama won't soon return jobs to Nevada, but he isn't convinced Romney is up for the task, either, saying: "I haven't really seen him here, I haven't heard him talk about Nevada."

Lisa Smith, a 23-year-old Democrat, has hesitations about Obama this time around.

"He has done a lot of good — the health care law, student loans," Smith said. "But we still don't have enough jobs for everyone in Nevada who is hurting,"

Indeed, here, perhaps more than in any other state, the race is shaped by the

Accusers to Be Unmasked at Penn State trial

The young men who accuse former Penn State assistant football coach Jerry Sandusky of molesting them have been allowed to remain anonymous through months of intense news coverage and water-cooler conversation about the

scandal.
That's about to change.

When they take the witness stand in a packed Pennsylvania courtroom as early as next week, the alleged victims will be forced to state their names for the record — traumatizing them all over again, their lawyers and victims' advocates argue, especially given the very real possibility their identities will become common knowledge via social media and the wider Internat

Most traditional media organizations, including The Associated Press, have long-standing policies against using the names of alleged victims of sexual assault, viewing the crime as so intensely personal and the potential effect of public disclosure so

traumatic for the accuser that withholding the identity outweighs the public's right to know.

But in this anything-goes age of social media and citizen journalists, when anyone with a smartphone can tweet or blog, old media standards may no longer make much difference.

Anyone lucky enough to grab one of the 85 courtroom seats reserved for the public could sit in for the day, jot down some of the accusers' names, leave and disseminate them to the world.

"Most of us want to have some control over who we share intimate details of our lives with," said Karen Baker, director of the National Sexual Violence Resource Center. "To have that out there on the Internet, you've totally lost control, and it's a scary thing."

Sandusky, 68, faces 52 counts accusing him of sexually abusing 10 boys over a span of 15 years. Prosecutors say the retired coach befriended boys he met through The Second Mile, the charity he founded for youngsters in 1977, then attacked them, in some cases

in his home or inside university athletic facilities. He has denied the allegations.

Most of the accusers are now in their 20s. Up to now, they have been identified in court papers only as "Victim 1," "Victim 2" and so on.

Five of the eight alleged victims who could be called to the stand asked Judge John Cleland for permission to testify under pseudonyms, saying through their

lawyers that exposing their names would subject them to shame, ridicule and harassment.

An attorney for the accuser known as Victim 4 submitted an affidavit from his psychologist that said public disclosure could trigger symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder and interfere with the young man's treatment and recovery.

UN Monitors Shot at near Site of Syrian Killings

BEIRUT (AP) • U.N. observers came under fire Thursday as they tried to reach the site of the latest reported mass killing in Syria — about 80 people, including women and children who were shot or stabbed. The deaths added urgency to diplomatic efforts to end the

As reports emerged of what would be the fourth such mass slaying of civilians in Syria in the last two weeks, the United States condemned President Bashar Assad, saying he has "doubled down on his brutality and duplicity"

International envoy Kofi Annan, whose peace plan brokered in April has not been implemented, warned against allowing "mass killings to become part of

everyday reality in Syria."


"If things do not change, the future is likely to be one of brutal repression, massacres, sectarian violence, and even all-out civil war,"

Annan told the U.N. General Assembly in New York. "All Syrians will lose."

U.N. diplomats said Annan is expected to propose that world powers and key regional players, including Iran, come up with a new strategy to end the 15-month conflict at a closed meeting of the Security Council later Thursday.

Annan will present a plan for creating a "contact group" whose final proposal must be acceptable to Russia and China, which have protected ally from past U.N. sanctions, as well as the U.S. and its European allies, they said, speaking on condition of anonymity because consultations have been private.

The latest violence centered on Mazraat al-Qubair, a small farming community of 160 people, mostly Bedouins, in central Hama province. Activists said the Sunni village is surrounded by Alawite villages. Alawites are an offshoot of Shiite Islam and Assad is a member of the sect, while the opposition is dominated by Sunnis.

CDC: Older Teens Often Text while Behind the Wheel

ATLANTA • Think your teen would never text while driving? More than half of high school seniors admitted in a government survey that they've done just that.

It's the first time the question was asked in a teen poll on risky behavior, and the finding comes amid a renewed federal crackdown on distracted driving.


Texting and cellphone use behind the wheel is "a national epidemic,'' Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood said Thursday.

In the survey, about 58 percent of high school seniors said they had texted or emailed while driving during the previous month. About 43 percent of high school juniors acknowledged they did the same

"I'm not surprised at all," said Vicki Rimasse, a New Jersey woman whose son caused a fender bender earlier this year after texting in traffic. She made him take a safe-driving class after the mishap.

"I felt like an idiot;" said her 18-year-old son, Dylan Young. The episode taught him "to be a lot more cautious," although he conceded that he sometimes still texts beMany teens text while driving

hind the wheel.

The findings released Thursday are the first federal statistics on how common the dangerous habit is in teens. Distracted driving deaths are most common in teens, blamed for about 16 percent of teen motor vehicle deaths.

Focusing on a cellphone instead of the road leads to delayed reaction times, lane swerves and other lapses with sometimes fatal consequences, experts say.

Gov't Steps up Effort to Combat **Distracted Driving**

WASHINGTON • Calling texting and cellphone use "a national epidemic," Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood laid out a blueprint Thursday for stepped-up federal efforts and pressure on states to crack down on distracted driving.

Studies show the problem is particularly acute among teenage and young adult drivers, LaHood

"We need to teach kids, who are the most vulnerable drivers, that texting and driving don't mix," LaHood said at a news conference. He pointed to a recent case in which a texting teen driver involved in a fatal accident was ordered jailed for a

The Transportation Department is also awarding \$2.4 million to Delaware and California for pilot projects to combine more police enforcement with publicity campaigns against distracted driving. Similar pilot projects in Syracuse, N.Y., and Hartford, Conn., were shown to successfully reduce distracted driving, LaHood said.

LaHood called on automakers to support voluntary government guidelines to ensure dashboard technologies increasingly being added to cars won't distract drivers. But he rejected making the guidelines mandatory.

LaHood has made his opposition to distracted driving a signature issue for the Obama administration. When he was appointed transportation secretary three years ago, 18 states had anti-texting laws and seven had bans on both texting and hand-held cellphone use. Today, 39 states ban texting, and 10 ban both texting and hand-held cellphone use.

Report: Automatic Defense Cuts Undercut Obama Plan

WASHINGTON • Automatic defense cuts looming in January would be more devastating than previously feared and make it impossible for President Barack Obama to refocus his national security strategy, a bipartisan group of former lawmakers and retired military officers said Thursday.

Members of the Bipartisan Policy Center painted a dire picture for the nation's economy, the military and large and small defense contractors if the automatic reductions occur on Jan. 2, 2013. Based on a special task force's calculations, the group said the cuts would mean an indiscriminate, across-the-board 15 percent reduction in programs and activities within the military, not the 10 percent that had been estimated.

The gross domestic product also would be reduced by roughly half a percentage point, a blow to a struggling economy. About 1 million defense and nondefense jobs would be lost over two years, causing a spike in unemployment.

"An absolute fiasco," said former Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., who served as chairman of the Senate Budget Committee.

Unless Obama, congressional Republicans and Democrats can agree on a plan to stave off the cuts, the military will face a reduction of \$492 billion over a decade, with a \$55 billion cut beginning in January, three months into the fiscal year. Domestic programs also would be reduced by \$492 billion over a decade.

The automatic cuts, known as "sequestration," are the result of the failure last year of a bipartisan congressional panel to come up with a plan to cut the deficit by \$1.2 trillion over 10 years. The panel had been created in the hard-fought budget law passed last summer that reduced government spending while raising the nation's borrowing authority.

Defense Secretary Leon Panetta unveiled a new military strategy earlier this year that reflected the drawdown of two wars in Iraq and Afghanistan and shifted the focus to future challenges in Asia, the Mideast and in cyberspace. The strategy also was driven by pressure to reduce the nation's deficit. The budget law that Obama and congressional Republicans backed last year called for reducing projected defense spending by \$487 billion over 10 years.

Retired Marine Gen. James Jones, who headed the U.S. European Command, said if the Pentagon faces automatic cuts on top of the already planned reductions, "it makes the president's strategic guidance" impossible to execute.

Domenici, former Rep. Dan Glickman, D-Kan., Jones and the other retired military leaders implored Congress to act now to avert the cuts and not wait until after the election by producing broad legislation that deals with programs such as Medicare and Social Security as well as taxes. The report from the respected group is certain to add to the clamor for Congress to address the issue in the near term.

Panetta: Patience with Pakistan 'Reaching Limits'

KABUL, Afghanistan • The United States stepped up pressure on Pakistan Thursday as Defense Secretary Leon Panetta said "we are reaching the limits of our patience" with a nominal ally that continues to provide a safe haven to al-Qaida-linked militants.

It was the latest sign that the U.S. is now getting tougher with Pakistan after years of muting criticism and looking the other way on the premise that an uneasy friendship was better than making the nuclear-armed country an outright enemy. As U.S. forces draw down in neighboring Afghanistan, the Americans appear to be pushing Pakistan harder than ever before to squeeze insurgents who find sanctuary within its borders.

Panetta, in the Afghan capital, told reporters he was visiting Kabul to take stock of progress in the war and discuss plans for the troop drawdown. But he used a press conference to strike across the border instead, saying the Pakistani government needs to do more - and soon - to root out the al-Qaida-linked Haggani terrorist network.

Panetta repeatedly emphasized U.S. frustration with attackers crossing the border from Pakistan. It is essential that Pakistan stop "allowing terrorists to use their country as a safety net in order to conduct their attacks on our

forces," he said alongside Afghan Defense Minister Abdul Rahim Wardak.

"We have made that very clear time and time again and we will continue to do that, but as I said, we are reaching the limits of our patience," Panetta said.

The U.S. clearly wants Pakistan to take on the Haqqanis before the bulk of U.S. troops have left the region by the end of 2014. After that, the Afghans would have more trouble contending with the militants, who carry out large-scale attacks in Kabul and elsewhere.

In Washington, Gen. Martin Dempsey, chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, told a Pentagon news conference that the U.S. needs to continue working with Pakistan, despite frustrations.

"It's our view that those Haggani, notably, the Haqqani network, is as big a threat to Pakistan as it is to Afghanistan and to us, but we haven't been able to find common ground on that point. So that's been very frustrating," he said.

He added that the U.S. is "extraordinarily dissatisfied with the effect that Pakistan has had on the Haqqanis," but also mindful that Pakistan has taken on other insurgent groups at great cost to their own troops.

"There may be an increasing realization within the U.S. government that we have a few more years to really go after this problem and time is running out," said Jeffrey Dressler, an analyst at the Institute for the Study of War in Washington.

Panetta's remarks capped a week of some of the boldest language and actions by the administration against its stated ally. Just a day before, he stood in the capital of Pakistan's arch rival, India, and declared that drone strikes against terror suspects would continue, dismissing Pakistan's claims of sovereignty by noting that U.S. sovereignty was jeopardized by terrorists as well.



Former Fleetwood Mac Member Bob Welch Dead

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) • Bob Welch, a former member of Fleetwood Mac who went on to write songs and record several hits during a solo career, died Thursday of a selfinflicted gunshot wound, police said. He was 65.

Police spokesman Don Aaron said Welch's wife found him with a chest wound at their south Nashville home around 12:15

Welch was a guitarist and vocalist for Fleetwood Mac from 1971 to 1974. He formed the British rock group Paris in 1976, and had hits including "Sentimental Lady" in 1977 and "Ebony Eyes" in 1978. Fleetwood Mac's Christine McVie and Lindsey Buckingham did backup vocals on

"Sentimental Lady?" Aaron said Welch apparently had had health issues recently. He said a suicide note was left.

Fleetwood Mac's career took off in the mid-1970s after Welch left the band. "Dreams" was a No. 1 hit in 1977 and "Don't Stop" the same year. It later became the anthem for Bill Clinton's 2002 presidential campaign. "Hold Me" was a hit in 1982 and "Little Lies" in 1987.

Welch, a native of Los Angeles, scored his biggest hit with "Sentimental Lady," which reached No. 8 on the Billboard chart. His other singles included "Precious Love" in 1979 and "Hot Love, Cold World" in 1978.

When Fleetwood Mac was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1998, Welch was not included in the group.

"It basically comes down to the fact that they don't like me anymore," he told The Plain Dealer of Cleveland at the time. "I guess they can do what they want. I could understand it if I had been a sideman for a year. But I was an integral part of that band ... I put more of myself into

Feds Consider Regional Challenges in Fire Planning

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. • Federal officials on Thursday released the latest iteration of their national wildfire management strategy as they deal with limited resources and an active fire season that already has blackened hundreds of square miles in states from New Mexico to Michigan.

The U.S Department of Agriculture and the Interior Department have been working for more than a year to develop the strategy. The latest phase covers assessments done for the West, the Northeast and the Southeast that identify population trends, climate changes and different priorities that will help with the creation of action plans due next spring.

With the increase in larger, more catastrophic wildfires over the past decade, USDA Under Secretary Harris Sherman told The Associated Press in a phone interview Thursday that setting priorities will be key.

"It's not going away;" Sherman said of the threat of wildfire. "We're going to have to be more comprehensive and smarter in how we deal with these issues in the

He noted the need for government agencies to be proactive in their efforts to protect not only property but vital resources such as watersheds that provide drinking water.

Development of the strategy comes as firefighters grapple with overgrown forests and another consecutive year of dry, windy conditions. Currently, they are battling 20 large fires across the country. They range from a few hundred acres in South Dakota to more than 263,500 acres in New Mexico.

The New Mexico blaze has finally stalled at about 412 square miles in the Gila National Forest after burning for weeks. Nearly 1,000 firefighters continue to patrol the lines and watch for flare-ups on the fire, the largest in the state's recorded history.

A dozen cabins were destroyed by the lightningsparked fire, and surrounding communities are concerned about flooding that could result from summer rains washing ash, soil and charred debris down steep, denuded mountainsides.

In northern New Mexico, crews were making progress against a pair of fires burning in the Santa Fe National Forest. The blazes were threatening no communities, but they sent up plumes of smoke that sparked memories of last year's record-setting sea-

Bill Speeds Delivery of Firefighting Planes

WASHINGTON (AP) •

The Senate has passed legislation to speed government contracts to modernize the aging fleet of Forest Service tanker planes that dump suppressants on Western wildfires.

The legislation would waive a 30-day waiting period that's required before the Forest Service can award contracts for seven new tankers. The agency has told Congress that it's made the decision to award the contracts but has to wait until late June to officially award the contracts. The House has yet to act on the measure.

Oregon Democratic Rep. Ron Wyden says the tankers wouldn't go into service for months but that it's important to move as quickly as possible following accidents last weekend that caused the loss of one of the 11 available air tankers and the grounding of another for repairs.

Thursday, while extreme weather caused problems for crews trying to corral a 6,000-acre blaze in Wyoming's Medicine Bow National Forest.

In Michigan, firefighters continued to secure lines and protect structures from a blaze that burned about 33 square miles. Nearly 50 homes, a motel, a store and dozens of sheds and garages were destroyed.

Besides property, Sherman said there's much at stake when it comes to how federal, state and local agencies prepare for and manage fire. He pointed to the need to protect watersheds, saying more than half of the drinking water in the U.S. comes from public and private forests.

Sherman used the 2002 Hayman fire near Denver as an example. The largest fire in that state's recorded history, the blaze sent significant amounts of sediment into one of the city's main storage reservoirs, and tens of millions of dollars were spent dredging it.

"The cost of dealing with the aftermath of this fire far exceeded what proactive steps might have been taken at the outset to prevent those types of things from happening," he said.

Federal officials said the wildland fire management strategy is aimed at giving local agencies and community leaders a voice in setting priorities and developing solutions in light of the different challenges in the three regions.

(AP) • Attempting a turnaround in North America after losing most of its smartphone market share, Nokia plans to expand on its initial deals with carriers AT&T Inc. and T-Mobile USA, the Finnish company's regional executive

Nokia, which decided to abandon its Symbian software last year in favor of Microsoft Corp.'s Windows Phone operating system, is selling its Lumia lineup in the United States through AT&T and T-Mobile.

"But that's just a start," Chris Weber, president of Nokia's North America unit, said in an interview. "We're back in the U.S., we're back in Canada — it's exciting, but there's more work to do," he said, without elaborating on the plan.

Fed proposes stricter capital rules for banks • The Federal Reserve wants U.S. banks to set aside more money to cushion against unexpected losses, a key step in preventing another financial cri-

The Fed on Thursday proposed rules requiring the nation's largest banks hold at least 6 percent of their assets in capital reserves. That's up from a minimum of 4 percent currently required and in line with international standards.

The banks have lobbied vigorously against the proposals. They say setting aside so much money in reserve could limit what they could lend.

Farm Bill Clears First Hurdle in Senate

WASHINGTON • A five-year farm and food bill that would revamp the federal safety net for farmers and eliminate di-

fields took its first step toward passage Thursday in the Senate.

A 90-8 vote to officially begin debate opens the way for what could be several weeks of attempts to amend proposed legislation that spends some \$100 billion a year on crop insurance, conservation and nutrition programs.

would be replaced by a new plan that places greater stress on subsidized crop insurance and a new program that compensates farmers when revenues from planted fields fall below levels as determined by a five-year average.

Roberts said the bill cuts or streamlines more than 100 programs, including combining four commodity protection plans into one and reducing conservation programs from 23 to 13.

The White House on Thursday issued a statement in support of the legislation, saying it would eliminate direct payments, tighten eligibility requirements and strengthen access to healthy, affordable foods. The Obama administration also said the bill would protect emergency food aid and increase flexibility in the delivery of international food aid.

"It is critical that the Congress pass legislation that provides certainty for rural America and includes needed reforms and savings;" the White House note said.

The farm bill, which differs from many bills in not splitting Congress among party lines, could become one of the few major measures to reach the president's desk before the November elections. But it won't be easy.

Senators are likely to use the bill as a vehicle to take up unrelated issues, such as looming automatic cuts in the defense budget set off by the failed negotiations in Congress last year to reduce spending. Southern senators are also expected to seek changes in the new revenue protection program, which they say discriminates against southern crops such as rice and peanuts.

Other legislators are seeking reductions in the crop insurance program under which the government shoulders more than 60 percent of farmers' insurance premiums and protest the bill's cuts of more than \$4 billion over 10 years in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or food stamps.

U.S. CONSUMER CUT BACK ON CREDIT CARD USE IN APRIL

 $\textbf{WASHINGTON} \bullet \text{Americans cut back}$ sharply on their credit card purchases in April, a sign that some may be worried about the slowdown in hiring.

The Federal Reserve said Thursday that consumers increased borrowing by \$6.5 billion in April, just half of the March gain.

The gain was driven by a \$9.96 billion rise in a category that includes auto and student loans. That offset a \$3.4 billion drop in credit card debt, the first decline since January.

Total borrowing rose to a seasonally adjusted \$2.55 trillion. That was slightly below the all-time high of \$2.58 trillion reached in July 2008, eight months after the Great Recession began.

Consumers had begun to use credit cards more often at the start of the year, which coincided with solid job gains

this winter. But hiring slowed sharply in April and May, which may have forced some to cut back on using their plastic.

Employers added just 69,000 jobs in May, the fewest in a year, and just 77,000 jobs in April.

The economy added 252,000 jobs a month from December through February. Since then, job growth has slowed to a lackluster 96,000 a month.

More borrowing is generally viewed as a healthy sign for the economy. It suggests consumers are gaining confidence and growing more comfortable taking on debt.

But if consumers are cutting back on credit card debt, it may suggest they are worried about the economy.

Consumer spending grew in the first three months of the year at the fastest pace since late 2010. Consumer spending accounts for 70 percent of economic activity.

Initial Jobless Claims in U.S. Fell Last Week to 377,000

WASHINGTON • Fewer Americans applied for unemployment insurance payments last week, indicating limited progress in the labor market after a two-month slowdown in hiring.

First-time claims for jobless benefits fell by 12,000 to 377,000 in the week ended June 2 from a revised 389,000 the prior week that was higher than initially estimated, the Labor Department said Thursday. The median estimate of 49 economists surveyed by Bloomberg News called for 378,000 claims. The number of people receiving extended payments plunged.

The claims figures may ease concern of further labor market weakness after a report last week showed employers in May added the fewest

workers in a year. While sustained demand is encouraging companies to maintain headcounts, stronger sales may be required to prompt a pickup in hiring.

"It reinforces the slowing momentum in the job market," said Sean Incremona, senior economist at 4Cast Inc. in New York. "We're still in a moderate recovery and a lot of the employment data we saw earlier in the year

might have overstated conditions. We might be coming back down to Earth."

Estimates ranged from 367,000 to 390,000 after an initially reported 383,000 in the previous week, according to the Bloomberg survey.

The four-week moving average of claims, a less-volatile measure, climbed to 377,750, the highest in a month, from 376,000.

The number of people con-

tinuing to collect jobless benefits increased 34,000 in the week ended May 26 to 3.29 million. The continuing claims figure does not include the number of workers receiving extended benefits under

federal programs.

Those who've used up their traditional benefits and are now collecting emergency and extended payments slumped by almost 105,000 in the week ended

May 19 to 2.83 million.

California, Florida, Illinois and Texas were among eight states that no longer qualified for emergency benefits as of May 12, according to a National Employment Law Project study. From April 7 through May 12, about 370,000 Americans in 23 states stopped getting the assistance, which provide payments for as long as 99 weeks, the study said.



Overview

Growing fruits and vegetables in a container garden on a patio is possible and relatively easy to do for the average gardener. The plant selections are the most important choice. Choosing fruit and vegetable seeds or starts that are specific for container gardening will provide the best results. A patio is a great place to create a viable fruit and vegetable container garden

Step 1

Choose a container that has drainage holes and that is made out of either wood or plastic. Drainage at the bottom of the pot will inhibit








mold growth, root rot and fungal diseases. Choose the containers first for functionality and then for aesthetics; the health of the plant is the main concern. Generally, vegetable plants will require pots at least six to eight inches in diameter for successful growth, while a dwarf fruit tree will require a planter from 18 to 24 inches in diameter.

Step 2

Purchase vegetable seeds that are specific to container gardening. These are engineered for container gardening. Types of vegetables naturally suitable for container gardening include tomatoes, bush beans, lettuce, beets, cabbage, broccoli, onions and peppers of all varieties. These plants are naturally compact and easy to care for in a container garden. Less compact but equally successful plants available in seed form are cucumbers, zucchini, peas and eggplant. These plant seeds are available in form specifically for a patio container garden.





Step 3

Prepare the soil in the planters by filling up the container to one inch from the top of the planter. Using a packaged soil specific for container gardening is a vital step; the soil is designed specifically to retain water and hold its shape more so than traditional soil. Amend the soil with a 5-20-10 fertilizer blend before placing the seedlings or seeds into the soil. Follow the planting directions specific to the plant you are placing in the container. The needs of each plant including depth and compaction of the seeds will vary.

Step 4

Place a mulch blend on the top of the soil or around the base of the seedlings, mulch will slow evaporation and hold the water necessary for the plants.

Step 5

Water each container thoroughly after planting the seeds or seedlings. Water will activate the fertilizer and feed the plants. Watering generously will also fill the mulch with moisture that will inhibit the soil from drying out in between waterings.

Tips and Warnings

If the patio receives full sun, watch for signs of excessive heat on the plants. If the plants are too hot and watering doesn't relieve the drying up of the leaves or fruit, move the plant to a cooler location.

what's supposed to be a Big Three, carrying the Heat in the first half while Wade made only 1 of 6 shots.

The Celtics were hoping to complete a comeback from a 2-0 deficit, as Oklahoma City did, and advance to face the Thunder in the NBA finals. But they missed 13 of 14 3-point attempts and will have to win a second straight game in Miami to play for the title.

James' season was twice ended in Boston while playing for Cleveland, the Celtics emerging as the winner in a Pierce-James duel in Game 7 of the 2008 East semifinals, then beating the Cavs in Game 6 of the second round two years later.

That was James' last game with Cleveland, leaving that summer for Miami and the All-Star help that Wade and Chris Bosh could provide.

He needed none of it Thursday.

He had 30 points by halftime and spent the night silencing the Celtics crowd and perhaps some of the doubters he somehow still has. He set the tone for the game by making 6 of 7 shots and scoring 14 points in the first quarter, and he made sure the Heat were never challenged from there.

Meanwhile, Pierce, whose 3-pointer over James was the biggest basket of Boston's Game 5 victory, missed 13 of 16 shots through three quarters, including all six 3-point attempts.

The Heat obviously weren't deflated by that loss and came to fight, scoring 10 straight points to build a 10-point lead shortly after Mario Chalmers was called for a technical foul after getting mixed up with Ray Allen. They extended it to 12 points later in the period, taking a 26-16 lead into the second after shooting 58 percent in the period.

Wade finally got on the board with a jumper to open the second, but he seemed strangely passive even with Miami trying to save its season.

No matter. James didn't need the help.

He had consecutive baskets for a 15-point lead and

came up with a basket every time the Celtics tried to get any rhythm. He soared high above the rim – and any other player – for a follow dunk after the Celtics had crept within eight in the final 2 minutes of the half. Miami led 55-42 at the break.

James made 12 of his first 13 shots before missing from the perimeter on his final attempt of the half.

Only Rondo kept it from being a blowout, scoring 19 points and adding five assists in the half. Relishing the challenge, he even emulated Garnett by doing a couple of knuckle pushups after being knocked to the court while drawing a foul, but he couldn't keep up with James and needed some help that never arrived.

The Celtics, trying desperately for one last championship before the expected breakup of their Big Three, hope this one doesn't get added to recent series losses against Orlando in 2009 and the Lakers in the NBA finals in 2010, when they lost Game 6s with chances to win series and then fell in Game 7.

James' first basket of the third quarter increased the lead to 17 points, and from there it was just a matter of coming up with another score any time the Celtics tried to make a run.

Boston never came close, and when a 3-pointer by Shane Battier made it 81-63 with 10:19 to play, Celtics coach Doc Rivers spent part of a timeout standing alone on the court with his arms folded, leaving it to the players to try to come up with an answer that wasn't there.

Bosh entered with 5 1/2 minutes left in the first quarter of his second game back after missing nine with a lower abdominal strain, finishing with seven points and six rebounds.

Banks Offered Minicamp Tryout with Seahawks

RENTON, Wash. • Walking into the massive indoor practice facility, looking up at the championship banners hanging from the ceiling and feeling the turf under his feet, Brian Banks allowed himself a moment to reflect on whether the reality matched the dream that helped get him through five years of wrongful incarcera-

"This is by far the secondbest day of my life – May 24, my day of exoneration, and today," Banks said Thursday after getting a tryout with the Seattle Seahawks. "Just being out here on the field and work out with the Seahawks and to be given an opportunity to have a tryout, I don't really have words for it. It's a dream come true. I know a lot of people work hard to get to this point. I've worked hard myself and I'm just thankful for this oppor-

And it may continue beyond just a one-day visit to the rainy Pacific Northwest. Banks, 26, impressed Seattle coach Pete Carroll enough that he received an invitation to participate in a formal tryout next week during Seattle's mandatory offseason minicamp.

All Banks needs to do is accept and he can turn another page on his remarkable feel-good story.

"This is a great illustration for us why people deserve a second chance," Carroll said. "Because of what he has overcome and because of what lies ahead for him in his life. This is just one step but it's a step he's been dreaming about for a long time. And it's just such a great illustration about not giving up and competing for what you want and not let your circumstances or surroundings dictate what is going to happen in your life."

When he was 17 and a star high school linebacker in California, a teenage girl Banks had known since childhood claimed he had raped her. He was arrested and, on advice of counsel, pleaded no contest to rape and an enhancement of kidnapping 10 years ago in order to avoid a possible life sentence if tried by a jury.

Banks served five years

and two months in prison, but in a strange turn of events, the woman later recanted her claim and offered to help Banks clear his name after he was out of prison. Banks was on probation and wearing an electronic monitoring bracelet at the hearing late last month where he was completely exonerated.

Gone were the restrictions and the stigma, replaced by a clear record.

"He is a living testament to if you keep hanging and you're tough and you don't give up in what you believe in and your dreams, that you can make those come to life," Carroll said.

The little things most of society takes for granted, Banks has come to appreciate in his short period since his case was resolved. When he walked into the airport on Wednesday night to make the late flight to Seattle and endured the hassle of airport security, Banks didn't blink at emptying his pockets or removing his shoes.

"I know a lot of people complain about that, but I was thrilled about it," he

It was just the second time he'd ever been on a commercial airplane and his first flight in more than 15 years. Oh, and it came after an appearance on "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno."

In just 14 days, Banks has become a spokesman and a celebrity.

"I served five years in prison. The last two weeks feels like a breeze," Banks

From a football perspective, there is still plenty left for Banks to prove. He first must decide whether to accept the Seahawks' minicamp offer. Banks' agent, Bruce Tollner, said Thursday afternoon that he had yet to speak with Banks about the offer, but that Banks tentatively has visits scheduled with five other

"An invitation back to Seattle is a very positive thing that he'll want to consider, we just need to check his schedule," Tollner said.

This was the first step in four-round, three-week test of nerves. The scores from this weekend will be combined with the scores at the Olympic trials at the end of the month, with the gymnast earning the top overall total locking up an automatic Olympic spot.

Barring injury, Leyva is considered a near certainty to head to London but he cemented his status as the front-runner by delivering a consistent performance on a night in which the top five competitors were separated by a narrow 1.550.

Leyva had the top scores on high bar, parallel bars and was second on pommel horse, allowing him to overcome so-so efforts on still runs and vault.

The 20-year-old saved his best for last. He entered the final rotation 15.750 behind Orozco but roared back in front with a smooth 45-second routine on the bars. He nailed the landing, his stepfather and coach Yin Alvarez exploding off the floor in celebration.

The score easily topped the 15.633 Leyva posted while winning the world title in the event last fall, capping two hours in which a handful of familiar faces showed they will be considered a legitimate threat to reach the podium in London next month.

Five of the top six scorers made the world team last fall, the only exception being Mikulak, though had a pretty good excuse.

The sophomore from Michigan missed this event a year ago after breaking both of his ankles during a freak accident at an international event. He bounced back to finish second in the all-around at this year's NCAA championships and put together the kind of steady performance that showed he's ready to compete at the sport's highest

Mikulak scored in the top 10 in five of the six events, his only wobble coming on floor when he gingerly stepped out of bounds leading to a hefty deduction that took him out of the running for first.

It's a spot Orozco appeared to have locked up for much of the evening. He finished in the top 11 in all six rotations, getting a reprieve from the judges on pommel horse, who raised his initial score from 13.75 to 14.650 after a review.

Though he was nipped at the end by Leyva, Orozco continued to build on his promising spring and break up the expected duel between Leyva and Horton.

Leyva edged Horton at nationals last year and Leyva jokingly asked Horton on Wednesday if he was ready to finish second again.

Horton's not quite there yet but appeared to be all the way back in his first full competition since breaking his left foot at worlds. He struggled on pommel horse - as usual — but overcame it by putting together a dazzling high bar routine. The 26-year-old joked "I'm tired" as he trudged toward vault, his final rotation, but drilled a solid 15.700 to cement his return to form.

He hovered in the top five throughout and was joined by former Oklahoma teammate and best friend Brooks, who soared up the leaderboard with a thrilling vault. Brooks exploded off the table with a front handspring, before flipping twice in the air. He landed on the pad with a thud and didn't move before clapping his hands and following it up with a fist pump. The competition contin-

ues Saturday.

PARIS • Wind blew in her face, kicking up flecks of clay, and Maria Sharapova stood at the baseline, knowing she needed one more point to reach her first French Open final and return to No. 1 in the rankings.

She rotated her right shoulder, the one surgically repaired 31/2 years ago, and served a fault.

Gulp.

Her next try found the mark: a second-serve ace at 104 mph that landed in a corner. It was a fitting way to close out a 6-3, 6-3 victory over No. 4-seeded Petra Kvitova of the Czech Republic in the semifinals at Roland Garros on Thursday, a fitting way to announce that Sharapova is once again at the height of her pow-

ers and at the top of her sport. "It's a long road back; it's a a moment like that for you again," Sharapova said at her news conference, the WTA's glass vase signifying her No. 1 status sitting inches away. "So there's definitely a lot of tough things you have to go

through to get to this point. But when you get here, and you look back at the things that you did, and the work that you put in, and the toughest days that you can remember, it's all really worth it."

On Saturday, the secondseeded Russian will face 21stseeded Sara Errani of Italy for the French Open title. It's the only major tournament Sharapova hasn't won; she can become the 10th woman to complete a career Grand Slam.

"I was in a position a few years ago where I didn't quite know if I would ever be here again on this stage, playing professionally. And not just at that, but at a level to get to No. 1 in the world and a first Roland Garros final for me," Sharapova said. "So a very special day, no doubt."

Errani felt the same way. Playing in her first Grand Slam semifinal, she beat reigning U.S. Open champion Sam Stosur of Australia 7-5, 1-

"Players like Sharapova, Serena Williams — they're accustomed to making it this far," said Errani's coach, Pablo Lozano, who held his 10month-old son while cheering in the stands. "For us,

every day brings a new surprise."

Only Cup Counts for Oft-Second Dutch

KRAKOW, Poland • Second-best just isn't good enough for the Netherlands anymore.

After losing to Spain two years ago in the World Cup final, the city of Amsterdam has let it be known that the Dutch players shouldn't count on an official celebration unless they come home with the European Championship trophy.

"Losing that final is now the motivation to win Euro 2012," Netherlands captain Mark van Bommel said, recalling the bittersweet taste of the big homecoming party two years ago along the canals of his nation's capital.

Now, even officials in the grandest Dutch city say being runnerup is nothing to celebrate. Been there, done that - too often.

"Last time we set up festivities when they came in second," Sara Gradstein, a spokeswoman for the mayor, said Thursday. "(This time) they'll only get one if they come in

The pain of losing stretches back to 1974, when the golden generation of Johan Cruifff lost to West Germany 2-1 in the World Cup final despite dominating the tournament with their revolutionary brand of free-flowing Total Foot-

Four years later, the same thing: The Dutch felt sure they had won the World Cup when Rob Rensenbrink shot past Argentina goalkeeper Ubaldo Fillol in the dying seconds of regular time — only

to see the ball hit the post. The hosts won it 3-1 in extra time.

Eventually, the Dutch did win a major title, the Euros in 1988, behind the future AC Milan trio of Marco van Basten, Ruud Gullit and Frank Rijkaard. It was a great achievement for a nation with a population far smaller than powers like Germany, Italy, France and Spain, the Dutch might as well be considered overachievers.

Yet two dozen years with a cup makes the Dutch feel like underachievers.

Almost without fail, they produce a great crop of players. In recent years, the team has been built around creative talents like Robin van Persie, Wesley Sneijder and Arjen Robben, with a bruising organizer like Van Bommel thrown

At Euro 2012, this generation is looking for redemption.

"We realize this is perhaps our last chance to win a tournament," said Netherlands forward Dirk Kuyt, one of the core of players that reached the 2010 final and will start against Denmark on Saturday.

If their skills are beyond doubt, the Dutch have to live with a legacy of failing in the clutch. They lost penalty shootouts at the 1992, 1996 and 2000 European Championships and in the semifinals of the 1998 World Cup against Brazil.

This time around, that fear centers on Robben. He missed a penalty kick in the Champions League final against Chelsea and another in a vital late Bundesliga match for Bayern Munich against Borussia Dortmund.

"You have to turn the page," Robben said. "I have a new goal and that is the European Championship?

Usain Bolt Wins 100 in 9.79 Seconds at Bislett Games

OSLO • Usain Bolt recovered from a poor start to win the 100 meters in 9.79 seconds Thursday in the Bislett Games, beating Asafa Powell by 0.06 seconds in the Diamond League meet.

Bolt, the three-time Olympic champion, overtook Powell in the closing strides to remain undefeated this year. The Jamaican star hasn't lost since failing to defend his title in the 2011 world championships in South Korea after being disqualified in the final for a false start.

Lerone Clarke was third in 10.10, completing a Jamaican sweep.

"When I came out from the blocks, I reacted good. But the execution, because I wasn't as comfortable as I wanted to be, wasn't that good during the first 30 meters," Bolt said. "Asafa got into his running form way quicker than me and got the top speed, while I had to work a little harder to get into my stride. But the good thing is I still got it -Iran past him, so I'm happy.

"I have run world records where my coach has said the race wasn't perfect."

Bolt improved his headto-head record against Powell to 11-1. It was Bolt's third-fastest time of the season, behind the 9.76 he ran to win in Rome last week and a 9.82 in Jamaica.

Powell, whose only win over Bolt came in 2008 in Stockholm, took plenty of positives from the race.

"Tonight, I proved that I have it in me," Powell said. "I did my own thing. Normally, people say I can't perform under pressure. I think I performed under pressure tonight. I knew if I ran like I was supposed to, that it was going to be close. I was either going to win or it was going to be close. I am satisfied. I still have a long way to go (to the Olympics) ... You never know. You might see another result at the Olympics."

World champion Sally Pearson won the 100 hurdles, finishing in a seasonbest 12.49. The Australian was making her European debut this year.

Kristi Castlin of the United States followed in 12.56, and Tiffani Porter of Britain was third in 12.70. Americans Lolo Jones was fifth, followed by teammate Danielle Carruthers. In the

men's 400 hurdles, Javier Culson of Puerto Rico won in 47.92. Trinidad & Tobago's Jehue Gordon followed in 48.78, and American

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

Associated Press photographer Nick Ut captured the image of a screaming 9-year-old girl, Phan Thi Kim Phuc, as she ran naked and severely burned from the scene of the explosion along with other victims.

TODAY IN **HISTORY**

On this date:

In 1845, Andrew Jackson, seventh president of the United States, died in Nashville,

In 1915, Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan resigned in a disagreement with President Woodrow Wilson over U.S. handling of the sinking of the Lusitania.

In 1942, Bing Crosby recorded "Adeste Fideles" and "Silent Night" in Los Angeles for Decca Records.

In 1953, the Supreme Court ruled that restaurants in the District of Columbia could not refuse to serve blacks.

In 1962, 20th Century Fox fired actress Marilyn Monroe from its production "Something's Got to Give," saying she was unreliable. (Fox later changed its mind, but Monroe died before filming could resume, and the movie was abandoned.)

In 1967, 34 U.S. servicemen were killed when Israel attacked the USS Liberty, a Navy intelligence-gathering ship in the Mediterranean. (Israel later said the Liberty had been mistaken for an Egyptian vessel.)

In 1978, a jury in Clark County, Nev., ruled the socalled "Mormon will," purportedly written by the late billionaire Howard Hughes, was a forgery.

In 1982, President Ronald Reagan became the first American chief executive to address a joint session of the British Parliament.

In 1987, Fawn Hall began testifying at the Iran-Contra hearings, describing how, as secretary to National Security aide Oliver L. North, she helped to shred some documents and spirit away others.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush ended talks at Camp David with Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak; Bush sidestepped Arab pleas to impose a deadline for Palestinian statehood while Mubarak defended Yasser Arafat and urged, "Give this man a chance." Serena Williams won the French Open, defeating her older sister, Venus, 7-5, 6-3. Sarava, a 70-1 shot, captured the Belmont Stakes; Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner War Emblem finished eighth. Lennox Lewis kept his heavyweight titles by stopping Mike Tyson in the eighth round of their fight in Memphis, Tenn.

Five years ago: Defense Secretary Robert Gates announced the Bush administration was replacing Gen. Peter Pace as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and recommending Adm. Mike Mullen for the job. Mary Winkler, who'd killed her preacher husband with a shotgun blast to the back as he lay in bed, was sentenced in Selmer, Tenn., to three years in prison (she ended up serving 67 days in custody, 12 in jail and the rest in a mental health facility). Paris Hilton was sent screaming and crying back to jail after a judge in Los Angeles ruled she had to serve out her sentence for a probation violation behind bars rather than under house arrest. The space shuttle Atlantis blasted off on a mission to the international space station.

One year ago: Rep. Allyson Schwartz of Pennsylvania became the first Democratic House colleague to call for Rep. Anthony Weiner of New York to resign after he admitted sending a lewd photo of himself to a woman via Twitter and lying about it. OPEC unexpectedly left its production levels unchanged, causing oil prices to jump as senior officials reported their meeting in Vienna had ended in disarray. Meredith Vieira ended her five-year run as co-anchor of NBC's "Today" show, telling viewers her decision to go was "right, but it's hard."

The U.S. Senior Trials were held last summer to select the two American teams to go to Veldhoven, Netherlands, in October. Since West had a fistful of black-suit winners and was known to have begun with a singleton heart, what distribution should declarer play for? A singleton heart honor would have been useless to him, so declarer played a low heart from dummy, and when Bart Bramley correctly played low, Weichsel put in the 10! That was his ninth trick, and it kept his side in the hunt.

Ever since, I have been petrified of losing him. Every time Chris rides I worry, pray and often cry until he returns or calls to say he's OK.

I have begged him to get rid of the bike. The stress is taking a toll on me physically and emotionally and creating tension between us. I'm afraid it would be selfish to insist he get rid of something he loves; on the other hand, I feel Chris is selfish for not taking my feelings into consideration. I'm torn between wanting him safe and wanting him to be happy. What should I do?

- STRESSED OUT INPHILLY

DEAR STRESSED OUT: If his close call wasn't enough to convince your husband to rethink his motorcycle riding, and your begging and obvious distress haven't dissuaded him, accept that short of hog-tying Chris, you can't stop him from riding.

You can, however, protect yourself from some of the fallout that might result from another accident. Tell Chris that if his heart is set on riding, you want him to buy a life insurance policy and sign an organ donor card, because healthy young men on motorcycles are the most desired organ donors a fact shared with me by a former executive director of an organ donation registry. That way you will be provided for in case of a tragedy and it will ensure that part of him lives on when he is removed from life support.

It's also important that you find ways to lessen your stress. So start making time for activities you can enjoy while you're on your own. It'll give you less time to worry and something else on which to concentrate.

DEAR ABBY: I am a woman who last year discovered I was gay. I was married with children. When I told my husband I was gay, he embraced and supported me with a great deal of love. We told our children in an open and honest way, and they, too, have supported me. I have also told a select group of friends whom I felt I could trust.

One of these friends is the mother of one of my son's classmates. Her daughter asked her mom why I was always with a woman and her response was, "It's her girlfriend." 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
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


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












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
