News. peals issued the decision a day after hearing arguments in a lawsuit from the news groups seeking to change Idaho's protocol, saying it's uncontitutionally restrictive
The case aims to strike down a prevent witnesses - including reporters acting as representatives of the public - from watching executions until after catheters have been inserted into the veins of death row inmates
The lawsuit comes as lethal injecfrom have drawn greater scrutiny, fom whether the drugs are effective are properly trained.
It's unclear how the ruling will affect the scheduled execution nex week of Idaho death row inmate of the 1984 murder of a Blackfoot woman.
"We, of course, respect the court's decision. We will take the necessary measures to assure that the execu tion continues as scheduled,' said Idaho Department
spokesman Jeff Ray.

A federal judge Tuesday denied a request from the news groups seeking to prevent Leavitt's execution without the changes. The news organizations appealed that ruling to he 9th Circuit.

The road's shoulders are crumbling, and there are occasional potholes. But whether the
damage is the result of recent months' in-
creased traffic from Gordon Paving, or years
of cumulative use from farm and industrial veNo matter the reaso
No matter the reason, Filer Highway District consume its budget and delay needed maintenance on other roads.
Gordon Paving's Crystal Springs gravel pit
has operated for decades. But because of a contract to supply gravel to Chobani and a request to the county for a special-use permit, the operation has received more attention in recent weeks.

The gravel trucks use 2200 East to get to the pit. Filer Highway District Commissioner
Clark Kauffman said the road was built for farm-to-market traffic, not industrial trucks like what the company uses.

The decade-old decision established what was expected of the nine Western states
withinthe court's iurisdiction. A decade later four of the states have kept part of each execution away from public view, according to death penalty experts and an Asso-

After that, Occupy Boise can return, but its adherents must allow unobstructed access for workers to water and mow, as well as perform routine maintenance like ae tion and fertilization. the Department of Adminis tration will complete the rehabilitation process as quickhabiiitation process as quicksel suitable advance notice of when the rehabilitation will be completed so that Occupy Boise may re-erect their

Rendell, a former mayor of Philadelphia and governor of Pennsylvania, labels himself a wuss for not stopping the Republican state legislature from awarding itself a pa raise. In the non-wuss column he puts the tax hike he signed in his first term, which he used to pare the deficit and establish fuil-day kindergarten programs in the state. He
went onto win a second term by 21 points - proof, he says, that if you treat your citizens like adults, they can accept sacrifice.
Like Clinton, Rendell goes rogue at pretty much the first sound bite. He famously told Democrats in 2000 to drop heir fight over the Florida recount right after the Supreme Court ruled and before Al Gore had had a chance to re-
spond. He also told of the time Gore "reamed" him for telling the vice president he had to use Clinton in his 2000 presidential campaign even if he was mad at him about Monica Lewinsky.
Now Rendell is turning his attention to Obama. The president, who is as chilly (Rendell calls him "shy") as Rendell is hot, should embrace the essence of the Simp-son-Bowles deficit-reduction plan (atthough it's alittle with life expectancy at 80 instead of 65 , Social Security and Medicare have to fundamentally change. Oh, and Obama has done a lousy job explaining health care reform, too.

The ruling also adds a new wrinkle to an ongoing dispute that has confounded federal officials for more than 30 years: What to do with the ra dioactive waste produced by nuclear power plants? Seeley rejected the
claim and in her order claim and in her order for relief from fees for relief from fees
racked up by state attorneys defending the case. "It would be charitable to characterize Long's behavior in this lawsuit as erratic," Seeley wrote. "She appar-
ently believes she is competent enough to run for judge. Yet she failed to read her legal mail for months, initiated no contact with opposing counsel and filed timely address concerns or objections."

Regional Fish and Wildlife Service officials declined to comment and referred all questions to the Interior Department.
Interior spokesman Adam Fetcher said Friday the department will review the allegations per the standard procedures outlined by its scientific integrity policy. He declined to comThe accus Barack Obama, who has taken steps to paint himself as a pro-science president after his predecessor was accused of having put politics over evidence.
In 2008, the Interior Department's inspector general found that Julie MacDonald, a former deputy assistant secretary who oversaw ministration, improperly interfered with at least 20 decisions on endangered species. A report by the inspector general said the integrity of the Endangered Species Act was harmed as a result and hundreds of thousands of federal dollars were wasted.

to terms on subcommittee appropriations bills, resorting instead to unified omnibus bills that incorporate fundinglevels for all spending lines.

That runs directly counter to arguments by Obama and many European leaders that many European leaders that in place in countries like Greece only made matters worse, adding to joblessness, further suppressing growth and arousing voter anger. It all mirrors the split in the United States between Republicans who want deep spending cuts and Democrats including Obama who want to promote more growth even if it temporarily means more government spending - until the economy recovers enough to move to serious deficit-reduction.

TWIN FALLS • Some dreams take while to come to pass. But the wait worth it when those dreams are ful filled, debt free.
After more than three years, Eastside Baptist Church has received from the ity of Twin Falls a temporary occu pancy permit for its new meeting the incomplete 6,000-square-foot structure on June 3.
It's a dream in the making for the church that started on the project in fall 2008, when it burned down an annex cility. The reason it's taken so new fa and that completion is still a few years out - is that the church refuses to go into debt over it, said the Rev. Paul Thompson.
Original estimates placed the facili y's cost around $\$ 600,000$, he said. By oing the work itself, with help from outside the state, the church has cut that in half.
"That's why we're doing it like this",
Thompsonsaid. "We don't want the debt."

CAIRO - A mob of hundreds of men assaulted women holding a march demanding an end to sexual harassment Friday, with the attackers overwhelming the male guardians and groping in Cairo's Tahrir Square.
From the ferocity of the assault, some of the victims said it appeared to have been an organ ized attempt to drive women out of demontrations and trample on the pro-democrac protest movement.
The attack follows smaller scale assaults on women this week in Tanrir, the epicenter of the down last year. Thousands have been gathering in the square this week in protests over a variety of issues - mainly over worries that presidential elections this month will secure the continued rule by elements of Mubarak' egime backed by the ruling military.

of the organizers of the event on Twitter The persistence of the attack raised the lief of many that it was intentional, though who orchestrated it was unclear.

J. David King, who notched his 10,000th masterpoint in 1993 at the Fall National Tournament, brought home a very difficult contract against Alan and Ellen Siebert here. King's partner was Marguerite Holley.

Declaring five spades, King ruffed the second round of clubs and led the spade queen. With this type of layout, it is imperative to lead high from the hand with one honor to protect against the one honor to protect against the very situation that existed here, namely all four trumps with East. (West could not hold four spades
after his unusual no-trump.) King continued with the spade 10 , covered by the jack and won with the king.
It is not too common to finesse in a suit where you have no natural loser, but King knew that he was going to have to find a way to dispose of all of his diamonds. The chances were that he was going to run into a 5-0 break. So he took a heart finesse, and next picked up trumps by leading to the eight and then cashing the ace.

Now came the diamond queen, covered by the king and won with the ace - and sure enough, West had all the diamonds. King cashed the heart ace, pitching a diamond, and ruffed a heart, drawing the last nondiamond card from West. Finally, he led a diamond toward dummy's seven, and West was helpless. She won with the nine, but then had to lead away from the 10-6 into the J-8.
