Jerome Bar Owner Gets 15 Years in Federal Prison

BOISE • The owner of a Jerome bar has been sentenced to spend 15 years and six months in federal prison for conspiracy to distribute methamphetamine, U.S. Attorney Wendy Olsen announced Friday.

Jesus Manuel Fontes, 52, of Jerome, owned the Durango Club at 250 West Main St., across from the Jerome County Judicial Annex.

U.S. District Judge Edward J. Lodge also ordered Fontes to serve five years of supervised release once his prison term is up and pay a \$1,000 fine. Fontes must also forfeit cash proceeds of \$25,000 and the Durango Club itself.

Fontes pleaded guilty in U.S. District Court in Boise on March 5.

Olsen says Fontes was the owner and operator of the bar while he managed and supervised a drug trafficking organization that distributed pounds of high-purity meth through the Magic Valley.

ROAD TO CONFLICT

The Filer Highway District and a company providing gravel to Chobani disagree on whether that project damaged roads near Filer.

The road's shoulders are crumbling, and there are occasional potholes. But whether the damage is the result of recent months' in-

creased traffic from Gordon Paving, or years of cumulative use from farm and industrial vehicles is up for debate.

No matter the reason, Filer Highway District is concerned that repairing recent damage will consume its budget and delay needed maintenance on other roads.

Gordon Paving's Crystal Springs gravel pit

has operated for decades. But because of a contract to supply gravel to Chobani and a request to the county for a special-use permit, the operation has received more attention in recent weeks.

The gravel trucks use 2200 East to get to the pit. Filer Highway District Commissioner Clark Kauffman said the road was built for farm-to-market traffic, not industrial trucks like what the company uses.

Court Rules for News Groups in Execution Case

BOISE • A federal appeals court ruled Friday that witnesses should have full viewing access to Idaho's upcoming execution, siding with The Associated Press and 16 other news organizations, including the *Times-News*

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals issued the decision a day after hearing arguments in a lawsuit from the news groups seeking to change Idaho's protocol, saying it's unconstitutionally restrictive.

The case aims to strike down a portion of Idaho's regulations that prevent witnesses — including reporters acting as representatives of the public — from watching executions until after catheters have been inserted into the veins of death row inmates.

The lawsuit comes as lethal injections have drawn greater scrutiny, from whether the drugs are effective to whether the execution personnel are properly trained.


It's unclear how the ruling will affect the scheduled execution next week of Idaho death row inmate Richard Leavitt, who was convicted of the 1984 murder of a Blackfoot woman.

"We, of course, respect the court's decision. We will take the necessary measures to assure that the execution continues as scheduled," said Idaho Department of Correction

spokesman Jeff Ray.

A federal judge Tuesday denied a request from the news groups seeking to prevent Leavitt's execution without the changes. The news organizations appealed that ruling to the 9th Circuit.

The appellate judges, during arguments Thursday, noted that the federal court had already ruled in a 2002 California case that every aspect of an execution should be open to witnesses, from the moment the condemned enters the death chamber to the final heartbeat.

"We're left scratching our heads about why we weren't selected," he said.

cause the district has been on the forefront of using technology in classrooms.

Under Students Come First, the state will distribute a mobile device — likely a laptop — to one-third of public high school students at a time beginning during the 2013-14 school year.

Dobbs said he'd like to work to influence state lawmakers to appropriate more money so all the school districts

7-year-old Injured Thursday after Falling from ATV

BURLEY • A 7-year-old girl was taken to the hospital Thursday after she fell off an all-terrain vehicle and the ATV ran over her.

According to a Cassia County sheriff's report, emergency personnel were called to 200 S. 400 E. at 9:45 p.m. after the child, who was a passenger on the 1998 Yamaha Timberwolf, fell off the vehicle and struck her head on the paved road. The vehicle's rear tire then ran over the child.

She was taken by ambulance to Cassia Regional Medical Center. The condition of the child was unknown on Friday.

The vehicle was driven by Cecilia Rodriguez, 27, of Burley. Two other children were also passengers: a male, age 8, and a female, age 7, both of Burley.

According to the sheriff's report, the girl who was injured and the boy sat on the front of the ATV, while the other girl sat on the back.

Rodriguez told police the two children on the front "were horsing around" and she yelled at them to stop and hold on. About that time, according to the report, she hit a bump in the road and the girl fell off the ATV and the rear tire crossed over her.

Rodriguez and the children were not wearing helmets.

According to the report, Rodriguez was cited for having children on the vehicle with no helmet.

But because the company has been using more trucks to keep up with Chobani's demand, the road has suffered.

"It served that purpose well, but it's not made for heavy, multiple-truck traffic that way," Kauffman said.

At a May 24 Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission meeting, Gordon Paving co-owner Brian Hansen said the Chobani-related traffic will soon clear up, as that project is almost done.

But the damage is already visible, both on 2200 East and 2000 East, which the company used before the latter road was closed to repair a bridge.

Kauffman said the Filer Highway District had asked Gordon Paving if it would be willing to help repair the road, but those talks didn't go anywhere. That leaves the highway district — and taxpayers - with the bill, he said.

"The benefits of the commerce that Chobani brings doesn't come back to Filer Highway District in the form of taxes or whatever," he said, adding that the district will apply for emergency funds to pay for repairs.

Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, provides administrative assistance with the project for Gordon Paving. Heider said much of the crumbling shoul-

ders is from everyday use, from both farm and industrial trucks.

On a May 25 tour of the area, Heider pointed out that other nearby roads have similar problems, even without traffic from Gordon Paving.

"You can see how thin this asphalt coating is," Heider said, holding up a piece of the road that had broken off. Some of the crumbles looked fresh, while others dated from months-old damage.

Kauffman said the situation wouldn't be as bad without the increased traffic from the gravel pit.

"These roads aren't built for that kind of volume and

weight," he said.

that are ready for mobile devices can receive them earlier.

"Our district is ready and should be given the opportunity to move forward," he said.

Earlier this week, the Idaho State Department of Education announced the 31 school districts and charter schools that will be included in the first round of mobile devices for students.

Three south-central Idaho districts were chosen: Kimberly, Cassia County and Minidoka County.

But the Cassia and Minidoka school districts are still waiting to hear about which schools will receive the de-

During the first round, the state set a cap of 1,124 devices per south-central Idaho district. High school enrollment surpasses that mark in Cassia County and Minidoka County.

In Cassia County, administrators submitted applications for Burley and Cassia high schools. In Minidoka County, Minico and Mount Harrison Junior/Senior high schools were selected for the application.

That's not a problem in Kimberly, where there's only

one high school. Superintendent Kathleen Noh said the high school al-

books, but she's looking forward to having a device for every student.

"We're glad to be selected and anxious to make it possible for all students at all times to have the access," she said.

The state hasn't decided on the type of mobile device yet, but districts expect to hear back in July. Noh said it's hard to plan for the 2013-14 school year without that information.

But more immediately on the horizon, all Idaho high school teachers will receive a mobile device this fall.

The ISDE plans to upgrade wireless Internet in school buildings and provide training for teachers on how to use the devices.

In Minidoka County, plans are already in the works to provide additional training using \$10,000 in grant fund-

Sandra Miller, student achievement and school improvement director, said the plan is to offer monthly training sessions for teachers.

And then, students at some schools will have the mobile devices the following school

"We're just extremely excited to get technology into the hands of students," Miller said.

The district's technology committee is working on new mobile device policies, which will be different for teachers and students. The district already has a

few sets of mobile devices such as iPads. Many schools also let students use their smartphones during class. In Cassia County, Gaylen

Smyer said having mobile devices for high school students will "create incredible opportunities for instruction." A decision will have to be

made, though, about whether students can take devices home. "We're not sure how that's

going to shake out," he said.

School districts that weren't selected for the first round of mobile devices will have to wait until at least 2014.

In Wendell, Superintendent Greg Lowe said he hopes the district will be in the second round.

"We're kind of disappointed, of course," he said about not being selected for 2013.

But Lowe said he's looking at the situation as an opportunity to learn from firstround schools in the area

No Dogs, Roosters Allowed

Wendell changes animal ordinance for special events.

WENDELL • When Wendell celebrates Dairy Days next weekend, the parade and Cow Patty Bingo will be the same but something will be missing from the festivities - dogs in City Park.

The Wendell City Council recently updated its animal ordinance and leaders want to make sure residents and visitors alike know to keep their fourlegged friends at home.

"So OK for when there is a big family picnic and when they're running around now?" asked resident Pat Jacketta during Thursday's meeting.

"No, (dogs) are supposed to be on leashes," said Councilman Jason Houser, adding the City Park dog ban only applied during Wendell's Dairy Days (June 14-16) and on July 4.

The new ordinance was passed during the council's May 17 meeting and also sets limits on the number of animals residents can have

"The largest complaint we had were dogs at large and roosters," said Deputy Clerk Shelly Harral. "So there is a \$50 fine for a dog at large, a city citation. And roosters are no longer allowed."

For residents with at least three-quarters of an acre 10 chickens are allowed, unless a resident already had the animals at the time of the ordinance's passage. As long as the animals aren't a nuisance for neighbors they can keep them.

Residents are also allowed 10 rabbits, two cows, 2 horses or ponies and four goats or sheep.

Under the new ordinance commercial kennels are no longer allowed.

"Dog owners need to come into City Hall and license them. There is a small, \$5 fee and that helps if your dog gets out, the police officer can check the registration number and make sure your animal gets back home," Harral said.

The fee is payable annually.

The decade-old decision established what was expected of the nine Western states within the court's jurisdiction. A decade later, four of the states have kept part of each execution away from public view, according to death penalty experts and an Associated Press review.

"Nearly a decade ago, we held in the clearest possible terms that 'the public enjoys a First Amendment right to view executions from the moment the condemned is escorted into the execution chamber," the judges said in their ruling Friday. "The State of Idaho has had ample opportunity for the past decade to adopt an execution procedure that reflects this settled law."

Idaho, Arizona, Washington

and Montana have conducted 14 lethal injections since the 9th Circuit ruling in 2002, and half of each procedure has been behind closed doors.

Chuck Brown, an attorney for the news organizations, predicted that the 9th Circuit ruling over Idaho's execution process will prompt those remaining states to change their policies to allow for a full viewing of the execution process.

TWIN FALLS • Idaho State Police say a man who was pulled over for speeding Thursday was found with 23 vacuum-sealed bags of marijuana in his vehicle.

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Ketchum School's Pet Tortoise Outgrows Home

KETCHUM (AP) • A 20pound African tortoise, named Bolt, seems to be living the good life at the Big Wood School in Ketchum, playing with the children and munching the occasional dandelion in the school's backyard.

He's currently part of a kindergarten menagerie that includes eight chicks and a Russian dwarf turtle, though he presides over his classroom from a private raised enclosure - the equivalent of a turtle suite.

However, while his suite seems spacious enough for the moment, kindergarten teacher Julie Swenke said the tortoise's days there are numbered, as he will likely double in size in the next few years and become too much for the classroom to

"We cannot keep him," she said. "This cage is too small for him, and I built an enclosure for him out in the yard, but on a day like today'' – with a high of 50 degrees - "we can't leave him outside for too long?"

Bolt - properly named Lightning Bolt by the students because of his surprising speed - is an African Sulcata tortoise, a member of the third-largest species of tortoise in the world. The tortoise, also known as an African spurred tortoise for the unique formations on its legs, needs temperatures above 60 degrees Fahrenheit to remain comfortable and a diet full of fiber and protein.

Bolt is about the size of a

small dog now, but Swenke said he will likely reach 200 pounds.

"Most people raise them until they can't lift them anymore," she said.

Already, Bolt must be moved to his outdoor enclosure using a cart, and he is only one-tenth of his eventual size.

Swenke said she got the tortoise from a friend who bought him at a fair in Washington four years ago. The tortoise was purchased with another, but they eventually became unable to live together.

"When the males reach a certain maturity, they can't exist together and try to kill each other," Swenke said. "This one was flipping his little friend over while she was gone at

The friend brought Bolt to the Big Wood School and begged a reluctant Swenke to take him in.

"I said, 'No, I have another turtle already;"' Swenke said. "But I watched him around the kids, and they were feeding him. He walked around and they made tunnels with their legs. They just love him?"

So Swenke gave in. Bolt is great with the kids, she said, and despite his size, is not a danger to any of her diminutive students. Sulcatas are known for their pleasant demeanor, and Swenke said the tortoise is not easily frightened.

"The girl who got him, was trying really hard to get him in his shell, spook him, and it was really hard," she said. "He wouldn't even go in. The only reason he would ever bite the kids would be if they put their finger up there and he'd think it was

Swenke said that Bolt is fun for her to have around,

"Sometimes, I'll be at my desk and hear 'Wsssht, wsssht," she said with a laugh. "I'll come over, and there is dirt blowing all over the place?"

Although Swenke and her students wish they could keep him, Swenke is hoping to find Bolt a new home sooner rather than later – preferably by the end of summer. But his options are somewhat limited, as collectors and zoos may not be interested.

"People usually don't buy them when they are this big already," she said. "A lot of zoos won't even take him because if they have another giant tortoise, they can't put them together."

Also complicating the matter is Bolt's long lifespan - roughly 30 to 50 years, though they can live longer if properly taken care of.

"He'll live longer than whoever can take care of him," Swenke said. "If you take care of it, it's a lifelong pet?"

But until a new home can be found, Bolt will remain at the school, chomping dandelions and scooting around the classroom as fast as his spurred legs can take him.

'Occupy Boise' Must Temporarily Vacate Ada County Courthouse

BOISE • A federal judge in Boise was the protector of free speech in February, when he allowed Occupy Boise's tents to remain on state land.

With a ruling Friday foreing them to leave temporarily, U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill has become the protector of lawns.

Winmill ordered Occupy Boise protesters to vacate the old Ada County Courthouse lawn by Wednesday for up to eight weeks, to allow state officials to assess damage to grass where tents have been erected since November.

The order came at the request of the Idaho Department of Administration, which oversees the old courthouse grounds. It gives the department until mid-August to assess damage to the state-owned property near the Idaho Capitol, and launch a rehabilitation plan.

After that, Occupy Boise can return, but its adherents must allow unobstructed access for workers to water and mow, as well as perform routine maintenance like aeration and fertilization.

"The Court expects that the Department of Administration will complete the rehabilitation process as quickly as possible, and give counsel suitable advance notice of when the rehabilitation will be completed so that Occupy Boise may re-erect their symbolic tent city," Winmill wrote.

With his order, Winmill modified an earlier ruling that allowed tents to stay on the

In February, the judge concluded a law signed by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter could ban people from camping at the courthouse, but he rejected the state's efforts to forcibly remove symbolic tents on grounds it violated the group's constitutionally protected, freespeech rights.

Department of Administration Director Teresa Luna hadn't read Friday's decision and declined to comment on how it would affect her agency.

"The purpose of our request to modify the injunction was to start repairing the damage that's been done, and ultimately have access to the grounds so we can maintain them properly," Luna said. "There are several large bare spots, and some areas where the grass has been ground to hard-packed dirt. Just getting in there and watering hasn't been enough?

Landscapers have estimated the cost of repairing the damage at between \$5,000 and \$15,000, Luna said.

Bryan Walker, a lawyer for Occupy Boise, said Friday the group was discussing Winmill's ruling and how to respond. But he thinks Luna is exaggerating repair costs.

"I don't believe anything coming out of the Department of Administration," Walker said. "A lot of that lawn is rehabilitating itself fairly rapidly."

Occupy Boise protesters arrived at the courthouse seven months ago, to protest what they viewed as greedy corporations and banks in cahoots with a corrupt U.S. government looking out for the interests of the richest

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At spirited hearings during the 2012 Legislature, lawmakers passed a law seeking to oust them.

That's when Winmill intervened, ruling overnight camping and cooking could be banned but that the state couldn't just kick out the tents.

The matter at hand Friday was more mundane: Should state workers be able to take care of the grass?

"Every year the Capitol mall grounds are aerated, fertilized, mowed, and watered," Winmill wrote. "The same mowing schedule has been in place for the last five years. This latter request of Occupy Boise to vacate the grounds temporarily therefore presents a much different question than the issue presented during the February hearing."

Even before this ruling, Occupy Boise's vigil site had shrunk to a fraction of its former size. Tents are currently erected on a small patch of ground near the courthouse's west entrance.

Walker said the group wanted to allow the grass around the Idaho Fallen Soldier Memorial to rejuvenate ahead of Memorial Day, at the request of a veteran's motorcycle group. And with the tents spread out, Walker said, protesters were becoming the victims of crime on weekend nights as the weather

"We were getting drunks, substance abusers, filtering into the camp and causing problems, making threats to vigil keepers," he said. "We restricted it to more effectively manage challenges."

Police say a witness reported seeing one child running naked outside earlier in the day.

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Owners of Mines in Mont., Idaho Propose Merger

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) • Two companies that own gold and silver mines in Montana and Idaho announced Friday that they intend to merge to form a company called U.S. Silver

and Gold Inc.
RX Gold owns the
Drumlummon gold and
silver mine northwest of
Helena. U.S. Silver, which
owns the Galena mine in
northern Idaho, has announced plans to bring its
Coeur d'Alene mine back
into production.

RX Gold spokesman Darryl James said that the merger is undergoing regulatory review and the companies hope that it will be finalized in July. Under the agreement, U.S. Silver shareholders will own 70 percent of the new company, while RX shareholders will own the remaining 30 percent.

RX Gold has a market value of about \$44 million. The market value of U.S. Silver was not available

Darren Blasuti, president and chief executive of RX Gold, will assume the same role for the combined company. U.S. Silver interim chief executive will assume the role of chairman of the new company's board of directors.

"It's a business deal that made sense for both their long-range plans," James said. "The way to grow these smaller mining companies is to acquire these smaller assets It's not really more production, it's acquiring additional assets."

After the Coeur mine is brought back into production, production from the three mines combined could exceed 5.3 million ounces of silver annually, the companies said.

Civil Lawsuit against Cd'A Mayor Dismissed

COEUR d'ALENE • A civil lawsuit filed last year against the mayor of Coeur d'Alene has been dismissed after the bank re-wrote the small business loan.

The Coeur d'Alene Press reports the breach of guarantee claim seeking \$80,000 plus attorney's fees from Mayor Sandi Bloem was dismissed in March.

Bloem said in November that the parties had tried to re-negotiate the federal small business loan, but were unable to before the \$75,000 loan, with interest, was supposed to be paid off in July 2011. Bloem owns a jewelry store in Coeur d'Alene.

On Thursday, Bloem said the small business loan was re-written.

Attorneys for Panhandle State Bank declined comment.

Idaho Revenue Gets Help from Mortgage Settlement

Bison Back in Yellowstone after Prolonged Roundup

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) • Montana livestock officials have finished hazing several hundred bison back into Yellowstone National Park to keep the wild animals from transmitting disease to cattle

Many of the park's bison carry brucellosis, which can cause pregnant livestock to miscarry.

The drive took several weeks. Christian Mackay with the Department of Livestock says the effort was slowed by a federal court order banning the use of a helicopter to haze the animals.

Environmentalists said the helicopter had been scaring federally-protected grizzly bears, and the Alliance for the Wild Rockies successfully sued to stop the practice.

As a result, workers on the ground could not drive the bison as far as the helicopter in any given day, Mackay said. That allowed some animals to repeatedly return to Montana.

Wildlife advocates say hazing would not be needed if the bison could linger longer in Montana. The animals exit the park annually in search of winter range at lower elevations in Montana.

A temporary restraining order prohibiting the use of the helicopter expired in late May before the hazing was completed.

Voice Recorder Recovered in Utah Air Tanker Crash

SALT LAKE CITY • Federal investigators have recovered a cockpit voice recorder from the air tanker that crashed in Utah and killed two pilots fighting a wildfire.

The recorder survived the crash intact and was sent for analysis to a Washington, D.C., lab, National Transportation Safety Board supervisor Debra Eckrote said Friday.

NTSB investigator Van McKenny also recovered a black box that monitors engine performance, but Eckrote said that box was damaged and may not yield useful data.

The tanker was reduced by Sunday's crash on a mountain slope to fragments that revealed few clues about the crash, she said.

That makes the cockpit voice recorder all the more important in determining a

"It looked to be in good condition. Cockpit voice

severe forces," said Eckrote, a deputy regional NTSB chief in Seattle.

In Washington, D.C., NTSB spokesman Nicholas Worrell said Friday that the voice recorder had arrived at the lab. He said he didn't have any information about its contents.

U.S. Forest Service contractor Neptune Aviation Services of Missoula, Mont., has said the voice recorder could have captured conversation with the pilot of a smaller aircraft that was guiding the Lockheed P2V tanker on drop runs.

The lead pilot didn't witness the accident, however, because he was flying ahead

of the tanker. The tanker crash killed

two pilots: Todd Neal Tompkins and Ronnie Edwin Chambless, both of Boise,

Eckrote said the NTSB wants to recover the tanker's wreckage for a closer inspection, but the White Rock wildfire has kept a salvage company from going to work.

The salvagers were dispatched by Neptune Aviation's insurer.

U.S. Bureau of Land Management spokesman Chris Hanefeld, who is tracking the White Rock fire, said the tanker crashed into a mountain slope a quarter mile inside Utah from the Nevada-Utah border, on the fire's southern edge.

The lightning-sparked has scorched 10 square miles and was 90 percent contained on Friday, officials said.

About 215 people, including support staff, are mopping up the fire and holding fire lines with help from a helicopter, six fire engines, a bulldozer and two water tenders.

COUNTING WOLVES

LEWISTON • Wildlife managers saw a doublewhammy wolf-counting problem heading their way several years ago.

At the time, most of the wolf packs in Idaho had at least one member wearing a radio collar that allowed biologists to track its movements. It made monitoring the size of the state's wolf population relatively easy.

But as wolf numbers continued to climb, it became both logistically and financially more difficult to ensure each pack was tracked by the devices.

"As the population grew, the funding did not grow and our efforts to count wolves remained static," said Curt Mack of the Nez Perce Tribe's wildlife divi-

It was then wolf managers and wildlife researchers from the tribe, Idaho Department of Fish and Game and University of Montana realized it was only going to get worse. They also realized they had a short window of time to come up with new and cheaper wolf-monitoring techniques.

"We anticipated several years ago - while we still had substantial radio collars on the landscape would be able to use radiocollar data to test other methods," Mack said. "We can go into an area and we can test a different method and as long as we still had radio collars out in that area and we know how many wolves are in that area, we can use that known population to test how effective the new techniques are."

With that in mind, they

started developing a portfolio of new methods, hoping one would rise to the top. They randomly surveyed elk hunters and asked them if they saw wolves while pursuing elk.

They developed a method to predict areas that might be favored by wolves for spring rendezvous sites and then took genetic samples from hair and scat at occupied sites.

They used a portable electronic call box to simulate a howling wolf and record the answers. The device, known as a howl box, has the ability to discern individual howls and whether they were made by a pup or an adult. It can also be left at remote locations for weeks at a time,

"We had to develop a suite of techniques that we could apply where appropriate and developed them in such a way we could marry them and combine all the data from different techniques and put them in one data base," Mack said. "If we have some specific questions about wolves in a particular area, we can go to these different techniques designed for different areas, but if we are interested in a statewide estimate we can plug these different methods into one big

model." It was Mike Mitchell and Dave Ausband of the University of Montana Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit who came up with that

calling and recording.

They also used hair rubs scented sticky pads designed to entice wolves to roll on them much like a dog would do to a dead animal, and capture a few strands of hair for genetic testing.

Each technique was tested against known wolf populations based on radio collar data. Some of the techniques worked well, but only in specific geographic areas. For example, collecting genetic material from rendezvous sites provided a wealth of material, but would require an intense and expensive effort to duplicate on a statewide scale.

Since none of the techniques would work on a large scale, they tried to figure out how information from the different methods could be combined.

model. As Mack describes it, they divided the state into a grid based on the home-range size for a wolf pack, and altered the size of each box in the grid based on things that might alter home-range size, such as topography and vegetation.

Then, using data collected from all the different wolf-survey techniques, they determined if each area represented by the grid was occupied or unoccupied wolf habitat. They were then able to come up with a detection probability for each box in the grid. "If you have 150 cells that

are predicted to be occupied, and since each cell represents one home range, than you have 150 wolf packs on the landscape," he Mitchell said the method,

known as Patch Occupancy Model, has been tested against known population information on a small geographic scale and performed admirably.

"The model predicts reasonably well," he said. "They match favorably with the sort of minimum number of wolves that is estimated by Idaho to be out there. It is sort of what you would expect; you know you are missing some wolves but you don't know how many."

Mitchell, Ausband, Mack and Pete Zager at the Idaho Department of Fish and Game are working to publish their method and expose it to the rigors of scientific criticism. But Mack said he is eager to begin using the Patch Occupancy Model.

Idaho, Montana and the Nez Perce Tribe are required to monitor wolf populations for five years following their removal from threatened status under the Endangered Species Act. Once that five-year period is over, the federal government isn't expected to fund monitor-

"Right now, us managers are putting a lot of pressure on researchers to wrap this up," Mack said. "The transition between research and management is key."

Both he and Zager said it will be important to continue to monitor wolf populations after the five-year period is up. Doing so will help prevent the animals from being relisted under the ESA and track the relationship between predators and prey species like elk.

"We need to be able to monitor wolf populations like we monitor any other population," Zager said.

BOISE • Idaho Power crews have finished the repairs to restore electricity to thousands of residents of Boise and Valley counties who had been without power since a violent summer storm blew through Southwest Idaho Monday night.

Monday's storm brought winds in excess of 60 mph through southwest and central Idaho. Hundreds of power poles and transmission lines were knocked down by falling trees — and Boise County was the area hardest hit. In the immediate aftermath of the storm, more than 50,000 people in the Treasure Valley were without power.

Most of those customers got their power back by the next day, but that wasn't the case for much of Boise County — including Garden Valley,?Idaho City, Placerville, and Centerville - and some areas of Valley County. The massive amount of damage to electrical lines from fallen trees and steep topography made repairs difficult, and crews had to take mandatory rest time over the past several days.

As of Thursday afternoon, there were still at least 1,300 customers without power. By Friday morning, that number was whittled down to about 200 customers in the Cascade area, and crews had that power restored by lunch, Idaho Power officials say.

Jobless Payments Cut As Idaho Economy Continues to Improve

BOISE • Extended unemployment payments, which once stretched up to 99 weeks at the height of the recession, are being curtailed again as Idaho's economy improves.

Six weeks of extended benefits have already ended. Another seven weeks are ending this week, bringing the maximum possible time someone can receive jobless benefits down to 86 weeks. The Idaho Department of Labor says several hundred Idahoans will be affected immediately, whether they've used all of those seven weeks or not.

The basic Idaho unemployment benefit program, in place since before the recession began, pays jobless workers for 10 to 26 weeks. For most of the past three years, jobless Idahoans who had exhausted their state benefits could receive up to 73 weeks of additional pay, mostly at federal taxpayer

By September, another 47 weeks of extended benefits are expected to be cut if the unemployment rate continues to drop. Unless Congress changes the law, all of the remaining supplemental benefits will end nationwide by Dec. 31, leaving Idaho only with its employer-funded basic program.

The latest cut comes because the state's average unemployment rate for the past three months was below 8 percent, the Department of Labor said. The April rate was 7.7 percent.

About 12,000 Idaho workers are receiving regular state benefits. Another 10,000 are receiving extended unemployment pay. That compares with nearly 16,000 on regular benefits and another 16,000 on extended benefits a year ago.

U.S. Attorney: Mexican Man Pleads Guilty To Conspiracy To Distribute Meth In Treasure Valley

BOISE • Fabian Nunez-Garcia will find out in August how long he will have to go prison after admitting Friday to being part of an drug ring which sold several pounds of methamphetamine in the Treasure Valley between 2009 and 2011.

The 51-year-old Nunez-Garcia, who is from Mexico and in the United States illegally, pleaded guilty Friday to a charge of conspiracy to distribute meth, a crime that has a mandatory minimum 10-year prison sentence.

U.S. District Judge Edward J. Lodge is set to sentence Nunez-Garcia Aug. 20.

By then, seven other men arrested in connection with the same case should already be in prison.

These men have already pleaded guilty to conspiracy and other drug trafficking charges in connection with the case: Jose Ramon Escobedo-Gonzalez, Jorge Cardoza-Sobrino, Luis Ronald Garcia, Juventino Lara-Plancarte, Antony Alegria Zedeno, Randi Leann Atkisson, and Lourdes Muro-Garcia. All are

scheduled to be sentenced by the end of July.

A jury trial for the two other men arrested in connection with the case, Victor Chavez-Garcia and Benjamin Prieto, is set to begin July 10 in front of Lodge.

Federal prosecutors say the group of 10 brought several pounds of meth into the Treasure Valley and helped sell it between September 2009 and January 2011. Law enforcement officers working on the case eventually seized five pounds of meth, several guns, and more than \$30,000 during the investigation, according to U.S. Department of Justice reports.

The indictment was the result of a year-long Organized Crime/Drug Enforcement Task Force (OCDETF) investigation, named "Operation Flame Thrower."

Participating agencies included the Nampa and Caldwell police Departments, The Federal Drug Enforcement Administration, the Canyon County sheriff's and prosecutor's offices, and the U.S. Attorney.

CHEERS to the Twin Falls City Council for making a decision on the Canyon Park development. The council on Monday approved the final plat for the Canyon Park development, but not before the developers and a group of nearby property owners met for mediation. The mediation still didn't fully satisfy concerns, but this time the voices of the few didn't stop the council from voting to move forward.

JEERS to Jerome County. Give it a rest. A bond for a new Jerome County jail has gone before voters four times and been rejected four times. Voters shot down a \$10.7 million construction proposal last month. That followed the first veto in 2009 and two more in 2010.

Proponents argue that they didn't reject it by that much, that more than 50 percent wanted the jail, but the total didn't meet the 66.7 percent supermajority required to pass the bond.

Earlier this week, Jerome County commissioners indicated they will probably place another funding measure on the May 2013 ballot. Not only do they risk voter fatigue, but voter anger by placing something on the ballot for a fifth time. It's time to give this issue (and the Jerome County voters) some time to breathe.

CHEERS to the businesses that did their part on Tuesday as Twin Falls water reserves dropped to crisis levels. On Tuesday morning, the city asked industry and restaurants not to open. Not everyone listened. Montana Steak House was one of the few restaurants within city limits that remained closed until the early afternoon. Glanbia Foods' Twin Falls plant delayed production for four hours while the city dealt with the water emergency and rerouted hundreds of pounds of milk to its Gooding plant.

Ed Rendell: Obama Can Be a Wuss, and So Can I

irst Ed Rendell called the president a wuss. Then he wondered if Mitt Romney might not just win Pennsylvania.

Rendell visited the Bloomberg View offices Wednesday to promote his new book, "A Nation of Wuss-

es: How America's Leaders Lost the Guts to Make Us Great." One of the ways he is promoting it, apparently, is to compete with Bill Clinton over which of them can be more off-message.

Rendell, a former mayor of Philadelphia and governor of Pennsylvania, labels himself a wuss for not stopping the Republican state legislature from awarding itself a pay raise. In the non-wuss column he puts the tax hike he signed in his first term, which he used to pare the deficit and establish full-day kindergarten programs in the state. He went on to win a second term by 21 points - proof, he says, that if you treat your citizens like adults, they can accept sacrifice.

Like Clinton, Rendell goes rogue at pretty much the first sound bite. He famously told Democrats in 2000 to drop their fight over the Florida recount right after the Supreme Court ruled and before Al Gore had had a chance to respond. He also told of the time Gore "reamed" him for telling the vice president he had to use Clinton in his 2000 presidential campaign even if he was mad at him about Monica Lewinsky.

Now Rendell is turning his attention to Obama. The president, who is as chilly (Rendell calls him "shy") as Rendell is hot, should embrace the essence of the Simpson-Bowles deficit-reduction plan (although it's a little late, he notes). Obama should also acknowledge that, with life expectancy at 80 instead of 65, Social Security and Medicare have to fundamentally change. Oh, and Obama has done a lousy job explaining health care reform, too.

Appeals Court Rejects Waste Storage at **Nuclear Plants**

WASHINGTON • A federal appeals court on Friday threw out a rule that allows nuclear power plants to store radioactive waste at reactor sites for up to 60 years after a plant shuts down.

In a unanimous ruling, a three-judge panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia said the Nuclear Regulatory Commission did not fully evaluate the risks associated with long-term storage of nuclear waste. The court said on-site storage has been "optimistically labeled" as temporary, but has stretched on for decades.

The decision puts the Obama administration in a bind, since the White House directed the Energy Department to rescind its application to build a final resting place for the nation's nuclear waste at Nevada's Yucca Mountain and cut off funding two years ago. An alternative site has not yet been identified.

The ruling also adds a new wrinkle to an ongoing dispute that has confounded federal officials for more than 30 years: What to do with the radioactive waste produced by nuclear power plants?

Congress designated Yucca Mountain for a nuclear waste dump, but the plan has been opposed by Nevada elected officials, most notably Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev.

In the meantime, the waste actually spent nuclear fuel is stored on site at the nation's 104 nuclear reactors in pools or in dry casks.

The search for a solution to the country's nuclear waste problem took on a new urgency after the March 2011 disaster at the Fukushima Dai-ichi nuclear station in Japan. Three-quarters of the 72,000 tons of spent nuclear fuel scattered across 35 U.S. states is packed into spent fuel pools similar to the ones thought to have overheated and released radioactive material into the air and water around the stricken Japanese

A presidential commission recommended in January that the U.S. immediately start looking for an alternative to the failed Yucca Mountain site, which cost an estimated \$15 billion but was never completed. The panel recommended a "consent-based" approach to siting future nuclear waste facilities, noting that attempts to force such facilities on unwilling states, tribes and communities have failed spectacularly.

New York Attorney General Eric Schneiderman called Friday's ruling a landmark victory for New Yorkers and people across the country who live near nuclear power plants. New York and three other Northeastern states -New Jersey, Connecticut and Vermont – sued the NRC last year, claiming that the agency had not shown that on-site storage was safe.

Schneiderman said the ruling means the NRC cannot license or re-license any nuclear plant, including the Indian Point nuclear plant near New York City, until it reviews the risks of on-site storage.

A spokesman for the NRC said the agency was reviewing the ruling and had no immediate comment.

Geoffrey Fettus, a lawyer for the Natural Resources Defense Council, an environmental group that joined the state lawsuit, said the NRC would now be forced to do an environmental review of onsite storage that it has long resisted.

"This is an important step in recognizing the long-term environmental impacts of nuclear waste;" Fettus said.

The Nuclear Energy Institute, an industry group, called the ruling a disappointment. The industry has agreed with the NRC that on-site storage is safe.

In a statement, the group urged the NRC to complete the additional environmental analysis and reissue the rule as soon as possible.

The appeals court ruling was written by Chief Judge David Sentelle and supported by Judges Thomas Griffith and David Tatel. Sentelle and Griffith were appointed by Republican presidents, while Tatel is a Democratic appointee.

At issue were a series of resolutions to transfer nearly \$900,000 from various funds into the courthouse renovation fund.

Idaho Employment: St. Luke's Passes 10K

BOISE • Mega-employer St. Luke's Health System has been Idaho's largest private employer for at least two years. It has hit a new peak, with exactly 10,297 people working for the system as of Thursday. Those included 370 doctors systemwide. About 7,500 people in the Treasure Valley work for St. Luke's.

Crossing the state: Based in Boise, St. Luke's has spread across Southwest Idaho by buying physician practices and hospitals, such as St. Benedict's hospital in Jerome, which became St. Luke's Jerome last fall. St. Luke's also has been in talks to buy Saltzer Nampa-based Medical Group.

Expansion plans: Some St. Luke's operations are slowly being moved into a strip mall at 111 S. Broadway Ave. - home, for now, to Boise Fry Co. and former home to Ali Baba restaurant. The system is essentially the landlord for the strip mall, said spokesman Ken Dev. It isn't renewing leases as they expire. That's because St. Luke's plans to move nonmedical operations, like billing and human resources, into the spaces as it expands into blocks around its Boise campus.

Another downtown tower: The hospital eventually plans to build another hospital tower near its main building. That will "require a significant displacement" of offices that are in the proposed tower location, Dey said. "We'll continue looking for space" in the surrounding downtown area to lease and buy, he said.

Judge Rebukes Judicial Candidate in Montana

BILLINGS, Mont. • An attorney suing a Montana judge for assault even as she seeks to replace him on the bench has been sharply rebuked in another case and ordered to pay more than \$15,000 in attorney

In a Thursday ruling, state District Judge Kathy Seeley of Helena disparaged what she called the "neglect," "paranoia," and "erratic" behavior of Lewistown attorney Britt Long in a lawsuit Long filed against a state agency.

Long said Friday in response that Seeley appeared to be trying to influence the outcome of Long's bid to become a state judge in Lewistown.

Thursday's order came after Seeley sanctioned Long over a series of missed depositions in a 2009 lawsuit against her former employers at the state Department of Natural Resources and Conservation. Long alleged she was wrongfully discharged.

Seeley rejected the claim and in her order dismissed Long's motion for relief from fees racked up by state attorneys defending the case.

"It would be charitable to characterize Long's behavior in this lawsuit as erratic," Seeley wrote. "She apparently believes she is competent enough to run for judge. Yet she failed to read her legal mail for months, initiated no contact with opposing counsel and filed nothing with the court to timely address concerns or objections."

Group Alleges Political Meddling in New Mexico Wolf Program

The wolf restoration effort has been hampered over the past 14 years by illegal shootings, courtroom battles and complaints by environmentalists and ranchers about the way the program is managed.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. • The effort to return the Mexican gray wolf to the American Southwest has been fraught with legal disputes, illegal shootings, livestock deaths and emotion. Now a watchdog group is questioning the integrity of key scientific findings related to the endangered animal's recovery.

Public Employees of Environmental Responsibility filed a complaint this week with the U.S. Department of Interior, alleging that political meddling has threatened to lower the number of wolves required for recovery.

The group also contends the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service suspended recovery planning in May in response to political pressure that followed the release of confidential documents to politicians and advocacy groups and concerns voiced by officials in Utah and Colorado about expanding the wolf recovery area to their states.

Jeff Ruch, executive director of the Washington, D.C.-based group, called the science behind Mexican gray wolf recovery a "political football."

"The time for political negotiation comes after the scientific work is done," Ruch said. "In this instance, Obama officials are attempting to improperly pre-negotiate the science to accommodate political partners."

Regional Fish and Wildlife Service officials declined to comment and referred all questions to the Interior Department.

Interior spokesman Adam Fetcher said Friday the department will review the allegations per the standard procedures outlined by its scientific integrity policy. He declined to com-

The accusations do not help President Barack Obama, who has taken steps to paint himself as a pro-science president after his predecessor was accused of having put politics over evidence.

In 2008, the Interior Department's inspector general found that Julie MacDonald, a former deputy assistant secretary who oversaw the Fish and Wildlife Service for the Bush administration, improperly interfered with at least 20 decisions on endangered species. A report by the inspector general said the integrity of the Endangered Species Act was harmed as a result and hundreds of thousands of federal dollars were wasted.

In the case of the Mexican gray wolf, critics have lambasted the Fish and Wildlife Service for spending more than \$12 million on the

predator over the past decade and having little to show in return.

Surveys done at the beginning of the year put the wolf population in New Mexico and Arizona at about 58. Biologists had expected more than double that by now.

Through rallies and letters to Interior Secretary Ken Salazar, environmentalists have unsuccessfully pushed for the release of more captive-bred wolves to bolster a population that's scattered across millions of forested acres in the two states. Their argument: More wolves would alleviate problems with inbreeding and help offset illegal killings.

Environmentalists and even some scientists who work with the program have often blamed politics for the lack of releases.

"Certainly the frustration has been building," Ruch said.

According to the complaint filed Thursday by Public Employees of Environmental Responsibility, the Fish and Wildlife Service and its state partners have developed draft policies, informal agreements and other documents to "limit the input of the best available science regarding wolf recovery in future actions?"

INL Officials Pleased with Amount of Funding in U.S. House Bill

IDAHO FALLS • Idaho National Laboratory officials are relieved that a key congressional bill leaves the lab's core funding source unscathed.

After President Barack Obama requested a \$90 million cut next fiscal year to the U.S. Department of Energy's Office of Nuclear Energy, the U.S. House of Representatives' Energy and Water Development subcommittee produced a bill that called for level funding.

Energy's appropriations over the past two years. Simpson has served on the Energy and Water subcommittee since 2003, a posting he has consistently wielded in INL's favor.


"He's very engaged in what we're doing," Lientz said. "He understands the importance (of INL) and

the role that we play? The next step for the Office of Nuclear Energy's budget is a Senate version of the Energy and Water bill. Traditionally, both the House and Senate would pass bills and negotiate a final version in conference. The resulting bill would then go before both chambers for a vote.


But Congress has struggled in recent years to come to terms on subcommittee appropriations bills, resorting instead to unified omnibus bills that incorporate funding levels for all spending lines.

Brad Hoaglun, spokesman for U.S. Sen. Jim Risch, R-Idaho, said that scenario could play out again this year.

"It is likely 2013 spending bills will be dealt with after the election and lumped into one large omnibus bill," Hoaglun said in an email. "Regardless, Senator Risch would like to see funding at the levels approved by the House subcommittee earlier this week. Whether or not that can be achieved, it is too early to tell."

NEW YORK • Bummer.

Belmont Park was prepping for a big ol' party Saturday, some 100,000 people ready to roll in by the trainloads for a shot at cheering on the first Triple Crown winner since 1978. 

Dullahan Is New Belmont Stakes favorite

NEW YORK • All along, Dale Romans said he had the horse to beat in the Belmont

Now he does.

Dullahan was made the 9-5 favorite for Saturday's Belmont after I'll Have Another was retired with a tendon injury a day before his attempt to become the first Triple Crown winner in 34

"I thought it was going to be one of the greatest races in history, and I was wanting to be part of it," Romans said. "This gives us a better opportunity but this was going to be bigger than that."

I'll Have Another would have been the odds-on favorite to join the likes of Secretariat, Citation and Affirmed as a Triple Crown champion. But a tendon injury to his left front foot flared up Thursday. After it was treated, the colt went out for a light gallop early Friday morning, but when he returned the tendon was swollen. After an ultrasound, trainer Doug O'Neill announced the horse was not only out of the Belmont, but had been retired.

Dullahan comes into the 1 1/2-mile Belmont well rested. After winning the Blue Grass in April, the chestnut colt finished third in the Kentucky Derby, beaten just 13/4 lengths by I'll Have Another even after he bumped Union Rags at the start and ended up seven wide before closing with a rush. Romans

thought about the Preakness, but decided to skip it and prepare for the Belmont, also known as the "Test of the Champion."

"Before this happened," Romans said of I'll Have Another's injury, "I thought we had a great chance."

O'Neill thinks Dullahan is now the horse to beat as well, and plans to bet a couple of bucks on him Saturday. He'll also be around to watch I'll Have Another and jockey Mario Gutierrez lead the field of 11 3-year-olds in the post parade onto the track. The injury is not considered serious, and Belmont Stakes on-call veterinarian Larry Bramlage cleared the colt to make an appearance.

"I'm going be bummed we're not in it, but I'll be studying the (Racing) Form a little differently tonight," O'Neill said.

Dullahan, who was the second choice behind I'll Have Another, leaves from the No. 5 post with Javier Castellano aboard.

Union Rags moves up to the 3-1 second choice. The colt trained by Michael Matz ran a disappointing seventh in the Derby under Julien Leparoux, but will have a new rider in John Velazquez, who won the 2007 Belmont with the filly Rags to Riches. Union Rags has a win over Belmont Park, taking the Champagne last year. He also won the Fountain of Youth Stakes before finishing third in the Florida Derby.

The horse galloped as though everything was OK. But, back at the barn, the swelling

returned.

An ultrasound machine was brought in.

"That's never a good sign," Romans said.

There was some fraying to the tendon, the telltale sign of impending tendinitis. While Bramlage said the injury was unlikely to cause a catastrophic breakdown in the race, there was little chance of I'll Have Another coming up with the kick he would need to beat the rest of the field over the grueling 1½-mile event, the longest test in the Triple Crown.

I'll Have Another will make one final trip to the track today, leading the post parade with his jockey, Mario Gutierrez, in the saddle. It will be a sad occasion on so many levels, a solemn reminder of yet another missed opportunity in a sport that just can't seem to catch a break.

Pacquiao Changed Man As He Prepares for Bradley

LAS VEGAS • Manny Pacquiao barely escaped to fight another day, and would need 28 stitches to close the cut over his right eye. Juan Manuel Marquez had nearly ended his remarkable run, but that didn't stop Pacquiao from singing at his post-fight concert and partying the night away with his huge entourage.

He returns to the ring tonight, determined to show his last outing was nothing more than a fluke. Little known Timothy Bradley will

be his opponent in a fight that could either end Pacquiao's lucrative career or revitalize it.

This time, though, there will be no concert, and no party. Win or lose, the only thing on Pacquiao's postfight agenda is a Bible study session and some time with his wife.

He claims to be a changed man, and the people around him say he really is. What no one really knows, though, is how it will affect him in the ring, something that makes this fight a bit more intriguing than most.

"It's 100 percent good," in-

sists Pacquiao trainer Freddie Roach. "He's much more focused now. From all the distractions he had, the tradeoff is unbelievable."

Oddsmakers aren't so sure, making Pacquiao a relatively short 4-1 favorite against the unbeaten Bradley. He was a 7-1 pick against Marquez, but was lucky to come away with a majority decision in a fight that could have gone either way.

Pacquiao said afterward that he just had problems with the style of Marquez. Those close to him, though, said personal problems and

marital discord troubled him through training camp all the way into the dressing room before the fight, when he was still so consumed by them that he failed to warm up

There will be no excuses this time out. Pacquiao knows he not only needs to win but to win impressively if he is to retain his spot alongside currently jailed Floyd Mayweather Jr. as one of the two best fighters in the world.

"I want to prove that I'm still young and I can still fight," Pacquiao said. "Ifeel I'm still hungry, I'm still OK."

Men's French Final Is Historic Matchup

PARIS • Here comes the French Open final everyone expected and, except for other players, wanted:

No. 1 Novak Djokovic, one victory from becoming the first man in 43 years to win four consecutive major championships, against No. 2 Rafael Nadal, one victory from becoming the only man to win seven titles at Roland Garros.

How's that for high stakes?

Djokovic is undefeated in his past 27 Grand Slam matches, which includes beating Nadal in the finals at Wimbledon in July, the U.S. Open in September, and the Australian Open in January. Nadal has won 51 of 52 career matches at the French Open; only he and Bjorn Borg have won the clay-court tournament six times.

Never before have the same two men met in four Grand Slam finals in a row, so it's apt that no matter who wins Sunday, his achievement will be monumental.

"I have this golden opportunity to make history. This motivates me. It really inspires me. I'm really grateful to be in this position, obviously," said the 25-year-old Djokovic, who owns five Grand Slam titles to Nadal's 10. "And look, I'll try to prepare for that match and get my hands on that trophy, if I can?

breezed through their semifinals Friday. If this stage of a Grand Slam tournament is supposed to provide a challenge, it did not – which probably isn't all that stunning in Nadal's case, but was rather striking when you consider Djokovic faced 16time major champion Roger Federer and won 6-4, 7-5, 6-3 in a match that wasn't really that close.

"His mental state and preparation for this match excellent," Djokovic's coach, Marian Vadja, "and this has to happen against Rafa."

Nadal found himself flying by the seat of his pants - OK, white shorts — on one point against No. 6 David Ferrer, somehow winning the exchange despite falling on his rump. Otherwise, he was completely in control en route to 6-2, 6-2, 6-1 victory. "I'm surprised," said Toni

Nadal, Rafael's uncle and coach, "because we were expecting a very difficult match against one of the best players in the world."

Make no mistake: Ferrer is a formidable opponent, not someone who got hot for a few weeks to sneak into the

semifinals.

He was playing in his third Grand Slam semifinal. He already won two clay-court titles this year. And it was Ferrer who upset Nadal in the 2011 Australian Open quarterfinals, stopping his bid for a fourth consecutive Grand Slam title - the milestone Djokovic now seeks.

Nadal won all 15 sets he's played this year at Roland Garros, losing only 35 games, the lowest total for anyone reaching a major final since Borg lost 31 on his way to winning the 1980 French Open.

Zei couldn't play highlevel organized sports because of a genetic heart defect. Zei's resume isn't as decorated as any of the other five Great Basin Conference coaches. But he's developed a knack for communication and strategy, and he's been a gym rat by every definition except putting on the uniform.

"He always from a very young age had a real interest in basketball, almost to a fault," said Bill Zei, Billy's dad. "He spent a lot of time around the game, studying the game, and I think that's why he's had some of the early success he's had (as a coach). 



WASHINGTON • Europe's economic crisis could send shock waves roaring across the Atlantic that would drag down the fragile U.S. economy and threaten President Barack Obama's hopes for a second term. The president demonstrated Friday just how deeply he's worried about that - and how little he can do to prevent it.

Obama used an impromptu news conference to prod European leaders to quickly and vigorously deal with their crisis. Along with that rare cross-Atlantic jawboning, he accused congressional Republicans at home of holding back a U.S. rebound.

The president held forth, unprompted, on what European leaders could and should do to fix their economic woes, though he insisted he was not "scolding them or telling them what to do?"

He never mentioned his election opponent, Republican Mitt Romney. But the campaign seemed to be an important factor in the day's events.

Powerless to take on the economic mess overseas by himself, Obama tried to show Americans he was nonetheless engaged in trying to help by offering ideas and advice. At the same time, he was sending a message to his European peers to be resolute and move firmly.

"Now, the good news is there is a path out of this challenge," Obama said. "These decisions are fundamentally in the hands of Europe's leaders, and, fortunately, they understand the seriousness of the situation and the urgent need to act."

Demonstrating his limited direct influence in Europe at

the same time he's being thwarted at home by Republicans on his domestic agenda could reinforce a sense of presidential powerlessness not an image an incumbent seeking re-election wants to project.

But Obama tried to tie the two issues together to his advantage.

Along with a specific recommendation that Europe inject much-needed money into its banking system, he said European leaders must focus on economic growth and job creation, not just "cutting and cutting and cutting" spending to deal with debt problems. That's the same point he's trying to make to Congress - and to voters — back home.

Obama did not go as far as to say Republican lawmakers were rooting for economic failure to undermine him, as his aides have suggested. But he did suggest they may be stalling on his jobs proposals simply because it's an election year.

American voters will de-

cide whether Obama or Romney will be the next president for the next four years. But they're not the only ones. German Chancellor Angela

Merkel, who leads Europe's strongest economy and needs to be part of any major rescue effort; will be a factor, too. And, here at home, so will Republican House Speaker John Boehner of Ohio.

Boehner has presided over a GOP majority which time after time has torpedoed Obama's economic and jobs legislation, even bills that have garnered some bipartisan support in the Senate. Obama says one reason more jobs haven't been produced in this country is because of this GOP roadblock.

Boehner sees it differently. He says, "What's going on in Greece, and the effect it's having in Spain ... it's quite likely that this contagion is going to continue." He contends those problems overseas are because European countries "waited too long to deal with their debt problem and their spending problem," a notion that Romney embraces on the campaign trail.

That runs directly counter to arguments by Obama and many European leaders that the austerity programs forced in place in countries like Greece only made matters worse, adding to joblessness, further suppressing growth and arousing voter anger.

It all mirrors the split in the United States between Republicans who want deep spending cuts and Democrats including Obama who want to promote more growth even if it temporarily means more government spending - until the economy recovers enough to move to serious deficit-reduction.

Flexible Dates

Looking to go to Paris for a week but don't care when in the next few months? ITA Software's airfare search (matrix.itasoftware.com) provides a calendar of the lowest fares.

Just enter the departure and destination city — nearby airports can even be added – and then how many nights to spend there. It will find the cheapest prices for a month out from a given date. The length of the trip can even be a range, say five to seven days.

Chase the Fare, Not the Destination

Want to know the cheapest fares from a departure city to anywhere? Check out Kayak's explore tool (kayak.com/explore). It allows travelers to search multiple airlines at once this way. A map pops up with all the destinations under a set budget point.

Searches can be done for a particular month or for all of summer. The query can be narrowed by activity – beach, golf, gambling, skiing – or by continent.

Odd Connections

Fares to Hawaii might be steep. But connecting though another city with a sale to Hawaii could save a lot of money. Use AirfareWatchdog's "fares to a city search" (airfarewatchdog.com/cheapflights/to-a-city) to see if there are any less expensive indirect routes to your destination. Instead of flying from, say, Boston to Honolulu, it could be a lot cheaper to book two separate tickets the first between Boston and Houston and the second from there to Hawaii.

"If you can save \$1,000 per couple and get two cities for less than the price of one, it's a no brainer," says George Hobica, founder of AirfareWatchdog.

'll never forget the first sermon I preached as a pastor. I had just moved my family to Fairfield, Idaho, to serve as pastor of Foothills Baptist Church in 1993. Within the first 10 minutes of that sermon, nearly half of the congregation got up and left. I later learned that they were Search and Rescue volunteers who were responding to a call for help. It is likely the remaining seven or eight people were wishing they had volunteered, too.

In 2001, I was invited by a small band of faithful followers of Christ, known as Eastside Baptist Church, in Twin Falls, to consider becoming their pastor.

My family and I arrived in June of that year and haven't looked back since. Twin Falls has been a good place for us. My wife, Renee, and I have two sons David and Silas. Both have graduated from Twin Falls High School and are now married. David and Emily live in Springfield, Mo. Silas and Bianca live in Twin Falls. Renee now commutes to Gooding, where she teaches art at Gooding High School.

As for me, I'm embarking on another chapter of my pastoral career: this column, which you'll see about

every month or so. I am grateful to the Times-News for the opportunity to write this column. I'll remember this "first" for a long time, I'm sure. It feels a lot like my first time behind the steering wheel of an 84 passenger school bus. I was told at



the time to not let them know you're nervous. It's a good thing you can't see my knees shaking now.

In these columns I hope to share with you gospel messages that are important to me.

The first time I recall being impacted by the message of the cross, I was spiritually dead. For that reason Christ, very God of very God, died on that cross because I was found guilty of sins against the Creator and Ruler of all things. I was already condemned to face the wrath of God when I realized that this ugly moment on the cross in history was God doing for me what I would never be able to do for myself. While I was still helpless, Christ died for me. I am now justified by His blood, saved from the wrath of God through Christ. (Ro-

mans 5:1-11.) I am persuaded that the Holy Bible is sufficient for all things in life and I write from that vantage point. There is one God, one mediator between God and men who gave Himself as a ransom for all. For this, I preach. (1 Timothy 2:5-7.)

Building a Bit of Heaven on Earth

A Twin Falls congregation moves into its new meeting house after getting a temporary permit from the city. Still plenty of work to do, pastor says.

TWIN FALLS • Some dreams take a while to come to pass. But the wait is worth it when those dreams are fulfilled, debt free.

After more than three years, Eastside Baptist Church has received from the city of Twin Falls a temporary occupancy permit for its new meeting house. The congregation moved into the incomplete 6,000-square-foot structure on June 3.

It's a dream in the making for the church that started on the project in fall 2008, when it burned down an annex building to make room for the new facility. The reason it's taken so long and that completion is still a few years out — is that the church refuses to go into debt over it, said the Rev. Paul Thompson.

Original estimates placed the facility's cost around \$600,000, he said. By doing the work itself, with help from volunteers both within the area and outside the state, the church has cut that in half.

"That's why we're doing it like this," Thompson said. "We don't want the debt." Please see THOMPSON, S7

• The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is remodeling its Family History Center at 421 Maurice St., Twin Falls. It's costing the church around \$250,000 to upgrade the facility where people use 20 or so computers and other tools for genealogical

• The LDS church also owns Twin Falls property near Xavier Charter School where it eventually plans to build a Ward house. That, however, is determined by church growth in the area, not economics, said area church spokesman Del Traveller. The church recently renewed its building permit with the city, he said, but has announced no plans for building on the lot.

· New Life Church wants to build a worship hall near Albertson's in Hailey, according to Blaine County zoning specialist Nancy Cooley. The county granted the church a conditional use permit, she said, but was still waiting for the church to apply for a building permit.

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

Volunteers from mission groups in Louisiana, Texas and South Carolina have helped in construction.

The city granted the church a temporary permit, giving it a three-year delay to complete the project with the condition that two things happen in that time: The church must have its water retention in place by October 2013, and it must pave the parking lot and install curbing by June 2015. Thompson said the church also plans to

landscape the grounds. The parking lot alone is estimated at around \$80,000, he said.

Eastside will use the meeting house -a name, Thompson said, that fits its intended community purpose - mainly as a worship hall, though others are invited to use it too. "That's what we'd like. We want the community to use it."

The building includes a worship hall, a kitchen, a nursery and restrooms.

Thompson said the congregation of about 80 isn't sure what to do with the existing structure, which was built in 1972 and holds 125 people, but it has at least three years to think about it. He plans to use it for church offices until the 400person meeting house is finished.

congregation's The sentiment?

Flashlight Bombs Puzzle Ariz. Police

PHOENIX • Flick the switch on these flashlights and they don't light up. They

Three of these bombs have exploded within the last month in the Phoenix area, causing minor injuries to five people and raising fears of more serious

Police still have no idea who is behind them and have taken the unusual step of putting up 22 billboards across the sprawling metro area to warn residents about discarded flashlights.

"The nature of the bombings are so random," said Tom Mangan, a special agent at the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives in Phoenix.

Mangan said the agency has ruled out any connection to terrorism because the targets have been random and there have

been no messages or demands.

The ATF said the bombs appear to have been made by the same person or people because their design was identi-

An explosive was placed inside the

flashlights with a smaller battery and rigged so that turning it on would send an electrical current that triggered the blast, Mangan said. He declined to iden-

tify the explosive material. The first bomb was spotted by a passerby on May 13 in a suburb just west of Phoenix. It was sitting behind a palm tree in a strip mall and blew up when it was clicked on.

The next day, about 10 miles away, a landscaper found a flashlight in an irrigation ditch. It, too, exploded when he flicked the switch, authorities said.

The third bomb exploded on May 24 at a Salvation Army distribution center near downtown Phoenix and about 11 miles from the first one.

An employee detonated the device while sorting through donations, forcing 120 people in the store to evacuate. Jon Bierd, production manager at the facility, said the worker suffered a small abrasion to his forehead.

Mob Attacks Women at Egypt Anti-sex Assault Rally

CAIRO • A mob of hundreds of men assaulted women holding a march demanding an end to sexual harassment Friday, with the attackers overwhelming the male guardians and groping and molesting several of the female marchers

in Cairo's Tahrir Square. From the ferocity of the assault, some of the victims said it appeared to have been an organized attempt to drive women out of demonstrations and trample on the pro-democracy

protest movement. The attack follows smaller scale assaults on women this week in Tahrir, the epicenter of the uprising that forced Hosni Mubarak to step down last year. Thousands have been gathering in the square this week in protests over a variety of issues – mainly over worries that presidential elections this month will secure the continued rule by elements of Mubarak's regime backed by the ruling military.

Earlier in the week, an Associated Press reporter witnessed around 200 men assault a

woman who eventually fainted before men trying to help could reach her.

Friday's march was called to demand an end to sexual assaults. Around 50 women participated, surrounded by a larger group of male supporters who joined to hands to form a protective ring around them. The protesters carried posters saying, "The people want to cut the hand of the sexual harasser," and chanted, "The Egyptian girl says it loudly, harassment is barbaric?

After the marchers entered a crowded corner of the square, a group of men waded into the women, heckling them and groping them. The male supporters tried to fend them off, and it turned into a melee involving a mob of hun-

The marchers tried to flee while the attackers chased them and male supporters tried to protect them. But the attackers persisted, cornering several women against a metal sidewalk railing, including an Associated Press reporter, shoving their hands down their clothes and trying to grab their bags. The male supporters fought back, swinging belts and fists and throwing water.

Eventually, the women were able to reach refuge in a nearby building with the mob still outside until they finally got out to safety.

"After what I saw and heard today. I am furious at so many things. Why beat a girl and strip her off? Why?" wrote Sally Zohney, one of the organizers of the event on Twitter.

The persistence of the attack raised the belief of many that it was intentional, though who orchestrated it was unclear.

Mariam Abdel-Shahid, a 25 year-old cinema student who took part in the march, said "sexual harassment will only take us backward."

"This is pressure on the woman to return home," she said.

Ahmed Mansour, a 22 year-old male medical student who took part in the march, said there are "people here trying to abuse the large number of women protesters who feel safe and secure. Some people think it is targeted to make women hate coming here."

"I am here to take a position and to object to this obscene act in society," he said.

Court Denies Dismissal of WikiLeaks Charges

FORT MEADE, Md. • A military judge refused on Friday to dismiss any of the 22 counts against an private Army charged in the biggest leak of government secrets in U.S. history.

Col. Denise Lind also indicated she will postpone Pfc. Bradley Manning's trial, currently set to start Sept. 21, to November or January because of procedural delays.

Manning is charged with knowingly aiding al-Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula by causing the online publication of hundreds of thousands of classified State Department diplomatic cables and Iraq and Afghanistan war logs, along with some battlefield video clips. Authorities say the 24-year-old Crescent, Okla., native downloaded the files from a Defense Department network and sent them to the secret-sharing website WikiLeaks while working as an intelligence analyst in Baghdad in 2009 and 2010.

He hasn't entered a plea to the charges.

On Friday, the third day of a pretrial hearing, Lind rejected a defense argument that the government used unconstitutionally vague language in charging Manning with eight counts of unauthorized possession and disclosure of classified information. The defense targeted the phrases, "relating to the national defense" and "to the injury of the United States or to the advantage of any foreign nation."

Lind disagreed with a defense argument that the phrases are too broad to provide fair warning of what conduct is prohibited.

U.S. Gen Sorry for Afghan Deaths in Coalition Airstrike

PATROL BASE PUL-I-ALAM, Afghanistan • The top commander of U.S. and NATO troops in Afghanistan offered a somber apology on Friday in an eastern province where offi-



cials say 18 civilians - half of them children – were killed in a coalition airstrike this week.

U.S. Marine Gen. John Allen spent several hours with local Afghans to express his regrets about Wednesday's pre-dawn raid to capture a Taliban operative in Baraki Barak district of Logar province.

"We take these deaths very seriously and I grieve with their families," Allen told the provincial governor, an elderly man with a long, white beard and gray turban. "I have children of my own, and I feel the pain of

NIGERIA PLANE CRASH HIT ALL SOCIAL CLASSES

LAGOS, Nigeria • Engines out, the pilot of the doomed Nigerian commercial airliner looked for somewhere to put down the aircraft, desperate for open space but finding only a sea of tin roofs and narrow dirt roads. Down below, people quietly rejoiced in their homes that erratic state-run electrical service had returned to their crowded neighborhood on the edge of the megacity of Lagos on a hot Sunday afternoon.

The crash on Sunday of the Dana Air flight killed 153 people on board the MD-83 jetliner and an undetermined number of people on the ground. The tragedy struck all of Nigeria's economic classes, from the state-run oil company

executive riding on the plane to the working poor on the ground in the country's largest city. As investigators continue to probe what caused the crash, many fear another could happen in a country with a long history of aviation disasters that remains completely unprepared for large-scale emergencies.

It's not just those aboard aircraft who face danger, noted Ezekiel Adekunle, the son of a landlord whose apartment building was damaged in the crash.

"What about those people at home who didn't board any plane, but the plane came and crashed on them," he said.

It was the worst air disaster in nearly two decades for Nigeria, a nation where carriers have longed used aging aircraft and often operate under little government scrutiny. Some passengers clutch Mus-

lim prayer beads or Bibles, softly praying or loudly calling out "Blood of Jesus" as airplanes hit turbulence. Applause and more prayers punctuate landings.

But flying is the quickest and safest way to move around a nation about twice the size of California with a crumbling network of roads that drivers in rickety buses and trucks speed along and where robbers lay in wait in the night.

Among diplomats and expatriate workers in the oil-rich nation, air travel often becomes a macabre cocktail party discussion, as people swear by one airline or whisper about rumored pending bankruptcies of others. Some of the smaller carriers rely on just one or two aircraft while the largest, Arik Air

Dana Air, owned by a wealthy family whose conglomerate sells

everything from fruit juice to cars, had a fair reputation for on-time departures and safety. Politicians and government workers shuttling between Nigeria's central capital of Abuja to its seaside commercial capital of Lagos in the southwest were frequent passengers. Dana's fleet of five planes, all of them U.S.-made MD-83s, stood out among other airlines that rely on Boeing 737s. Passengers got Danabranded drinks and sausage rolls

Pentagon Halts Free **Guns for** Police

The Defense Department stopped issuing weapons to thousands of law enforcement agencies until it is satisfied that state officials can account for all the surplus guns, aircraft, Humvees and armored personnel carriers it has given police under a \$2.6 billion program, The Associated Press has learned.

The department's Defense Logistics Agency ordered state-appointed coordinators in 49 states to certify the whereabouts of that equipment that has already been distributed through the long-running arrangement overseen by the agency's Law Enforcement Support Office. The temporary halt on transferring weapons applies to all states, agency officials said Thursday.

The program provides police departments and other law enforcement agencies with military equipment ranging from guns and helicopters to computers and air conditioners and even toilet paper. The equipment is cheap or free for law enforcement agencies to acquire, but much of it comes with strict rules that prohibit it from being sold and dictate how it must be tracked.

The military decided to conduct a "one-time, clean sweep" of all state inventories instead of reviewing them piecemeal, said Kenneth MacNevin, a spokesman for the federal agency. While some gear, including guns, has been stolen or otherwise gone missing over the years, MacNevin said the reporting requirements themselves aren't new and that the review wasn't prompted by anything specific.

"Leadership decided to make sure we have a good, full accounting for all of this," he said. "We're not doing this based on any thought there's problem. We're doing it because accountability is accountability."

WWII Marine Finally Laid to Rest in Mich.

NORTHFIELD TOWN-**SHIP, Mich.** • The funeral and burial of Marine Pfc. John Albert Donovan had all the pomp and circumstance of services held across the U.S. for military members killed overseas during the Iraq and Afghanistan wars.

The 21-year-old's flagdraped casket was solemnly carried in and out of the church by a Marine honor guard, and the flag was meticulously folded and presented to his sister at a graveside cere-

The difference, however, was that Donovan wasn't being laid to rest days or weeks after his death.

His passing came almost 70 years ago.

Donovan, who was declared dead in April 1945, was mourned Friday mostly by family members who never knew him. The only exception was

his lone surviving sibling, 82-year-old Josephine "Dody" Demianenko, who flew from Florida to Michigan to attend the funeral and burial in a rural area of southeastern Michigan, not far from Ann Arbor and Donovan's hometown of Plymouth.

Obama: Claims of Deliberate Leaks 'Offensive'

WASHINGTON • President Barack Obama denied Friday that the White House has deliberately leaked classified national security information that is flattering to him in this election year, calling such allegations "offensive" and "wrong." He promised investigations into the source of leaks about U.S. involvement in cyber-attacks on Iran and drone strikes on suspected

"The notion that my White House would purposely release classified national security information is offensive," Obama said during a White House news conference. "It's wrong."

A few hours after Obama's comments, Attorney General Eric Holder appointed two U.S. attorneys to lead a pair of criminal investigations into possible unauthorized disclosures of classified information.

Recent news articles have contained details of U.S. involvement in a partially successful computer virus attack on Iran's nuclear program and on the selection of targets for counterterrorism assassination plots. The leaked information generally paints Obama as a decisive and hands-on commander in "They're intentionally leaking information to enhance President Obama's image as a tough guy for the elections. That is unconscionable."

Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz. chief, and Republican critics suggested

Obama said his critics "need to have a better sense of how I approach this office and how the people around me here approach this office."

the leaks were orchestrated to boost

Obama's re-election chances.

"We're dealing with issues that can touch on the safety and security of the American people, our families or our military personnel or our allies, and so we don't play with that," he said.

Obama said his administration has "zero tolerance" for such leaks and that there would be an internal administration probe. In his statement, Holder said he had appointed Ronald Machen, the U.S. attorney for the District of Columbia, and Rod Rosenstein, the U.S. attorney for the District of Maryland, to direct separate probes being conducted by the FBI.

We have mechanisms in place where if we can root out folks who have leaked, they will suffer consequences," Obama said. "In some cases, it's criminal. These are criminal

acts when they release information like this. And we will conduct thorough investigations, as we have in the

Leaders of the Senate and House intelligence committees said Thursday they were drafting legislation to further limit access to highly classified information and possibly impose new penalties for revealing it. The chairman of the House Intelligence Committee said he will investigate recent

Lawmakers have pointed to recent stories by The New York Times, The Associated Press and other news organizations that contain previously secret information and cite anonymous

The strongest claims came from Obama's 2008 election opponent, Republican Sen. John McCain of Arizona.

"They're intentionally leaking information to enhance President Obama's image as a tough guy for the elections;" McCain said Tuesday, after taking to the Senate floor to list some of the alleged breaches. "That is uncon-

McCain called on the administration to appoint an outside special

counsel to investigate. The House Intelligence Committee chairman, Rep. Mike Rogers, R-Mich., said his committee would formally investigate the leaks, but said he was concerned about the level of cooperation he would get from two government agencies.

"Just today, the CIA informed the (committee) that it cannot respond to our request for information regarding the leaks, a very troubling event indeed," Rogers said.

The CIA has come under fire for allegedly sharing with Hollywood filmmakers classified details of last year's U.S. raid into Pakistan that killed Osama bin Laden.

A Justice Department official, who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss sensitive information, said some officials in the department's national security division recused themselves from one of the leak probes but that the department overall was inves-

Grenada Trying to Find Remains of Slain Marxist PM

ST. GEORGE'S, Grenada • A haunting Cold War mystery is getting a fresh look on the Caribbean island of Grenada, where officials are trying to locate the missing remains of a Marxist prime minister executed nearly 30 years ago during a coup that sparked a U.S. invasion.

Maurice Bishop was machine-gunned by a firing squad on Oct. 19, 1983, along with three members of his Cabinet and four others during the bloody upheaval, and no one seems to know where the bodies ended up. Rumors have swirled for decades that U.S. forces later hid the remains to prevent the grave from becoming a rallying point for the slain leader's supporters or that a political rival dynamited the bodies.

Grenada's government wants the mystery solved as a way of healing the national psyche of this now-tranquil country of nutmeg-scented forests known as "the spice island," which became a flashpoint in the last days of the Cold War. Forensic anthropologists recently failed to find the remains in a stretch of hillside cemetery in the capital of St. George's, but further searches are planned.

"It's important for all concerned to bring some closure to this chapter in Grenada's history," Finance Minister Nazim Burke said in his office, just down a winding road from the 17th century fort where the 39-year-old Bishop and the others, including his pregnant mistress, were executed by Grenadian soldiers following a coup by a radical faction of Bishop's Cuba-backed par-

This much is known about the remains: After the execution, one gunman slit Bishop's throat after he was dead and cut off a finger to steal a ring. The bodies were transported to a military camp six miles outside of town and partially burned in

Six days after Bishop's execution, about 7,000 U.S. Marines and paratroopers, along with a few hundred security forces from neighboring islands, invaded Grenada, toppling the postcoup military government.

Witnesses say the burned, decomposing remains were transported to the island's medical school and the body bags were later brought to funeral director Leslie Bailey, who was tasked by the U.S. military with burying casualties from the conflict. Bailey died without ever pinpointing where the body bags believed to contain the remains of the political leaders were buried.

Bailey's son, funeral director Clinton Bailey, said he wants to find the remains because people "still point fingers" at his family every

time the island celebrates the anniversary of the U.S. invasion, which was almost universally welcomed by Grenadians and is observed each Oct. 25 as a holiday known as Thanksgiving.

"I will clear my father's name," said Clinton Bailey, who has carried out his own unsuccessful efforts to find Bishop's remains.

Experts suspect the remains of Bishop and the others lie in unmarked graves in St. George's sprawling cemetery, where his supporters erected a rough, unmarked bust of the slain revolutionary leader among a tangle of white mausoleums and grave-

An international forensic team led by Marcella Sorg of the University of Maine was brought in by Grenada's Conference of Churches, the government and the island's medical school to find the remains.

The team spent almost two weeks in May excavating a roughly 25-foot stretch of the cemetery, first using a backhoe and then switching to small hand trowels. They scraped at the soil as bones began to emerge from an unmarked grave yards from where a gravedigger discovered three U.S. military body bags a decade ago.

Forensic experts say the scattered bones found are apparently not those of Bishop or the others, according to the Rev. Sean Doggett, a Roman Catholic priest who acts

spokesman for the Conference of Churches. But Doggett said he is hopeful that future digs could provide answers. "They might be just out-

side the area searched," Doggett said in an email from his native Ireland, where is vacationing. He did not say when the

next search will take place, but officials say they will proceed once more money is available.

Previous searches in the same cemetery, including a forensic excavation organized by Bishop's daughter Nadia, failed as well.

At the cemetery, burly gravedigger Michael MacIntosh said he's confident a sustained search of the area will eventually turn up the

"After all, the bodies have to be somewhere," said Mac-Intosh, standing by the excavated area, in the shadow of the National Stadium. "They couldn't have just disappeared into the air."

Some Grenadians believe that U.S. troops calculatingly obscured Bishop's burial.

"I think the sentiment was too overwhelming for Bishop at the time and the U.S. wanted to avoid a shrine, said Dr. Terry Marryshow, a Cuban-trained medical doctor who once worked as a bodyguard for Bishop and leads a foundation that was instrumental in getting the island's international airport renamed after the slain leader in 2009. "There must be someone who knows what happened and we just want to finally hear about it from an official source, Grenadian or U.S."

In an email, the U.S. Embassy to Barbados and the Eastern Caribbean said "the United States does not have any information about the location of the bodies of Prime Minister Maurice Bishop and members of his cabinet who were killed on October 19, 1983."

The political rival who ordered Bishop's execution, then-Deputy Prime Minister Bernard Coard, has long accused the U.S. of hiding Bishop's body. However, others say imperfect evidence suggests that Coard, who is widely reviled in Grenada and settled in Jamaica after being released from prison in 2009, had the remains dynamited before he was captured by U.S.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"The Kings go by with jewelled crowns;

Their horses gleam, their banners shake, their spears are many." — John Masefield

J. David King, who notched his 10,000th masterpoint in 1993 at the Fall National Tournament, brought home a very difficult contract against Alan and Ellen Siebert here. King's partner was Marguerite Holley.

Declaring five spades, King ruffed the second round of clubs and led the spade queen. With this type of layout, it is imperative to lead high from the hand with one honor to protect against the very situation that existed here, namely all four trumps with East. (West could not hold four spades after his unusual no-trump.) King continued with the spade 10, covered by the jack and won with the king.

It is not too common to finesse in a suit where you have no natural loser, but King knew that he was going to have to find a way to dispose of all of his diamonds. The chances were that he was going to run into a 5-0 break. So he took a heart finesse, and next picked up trumps by leading to the eight and then cashing the ace.

Now came the diamond queen, covered by the king and won with the ace — and sure enough, West had all the diamonds. King cashed the heart ace, pitching a diamond, and ruffed a heart, drawing the last nondiamond card from West. Finally, he led a diamond toward dummy's seven, and West was helpless. She won with the nine, but then had to lead away from the 10-6 into the J-8.


