# Number of Motorcycle Deaths Down Statewide, Stay Low in Magic Valley

TWIN FALLS • While motorcycle deaths have dropped statewide in Idaho in the last year they have remained the same in the Magic

According to a study by the

Governors Highway Safety Association, Idaho is one of the top five states that reduced motorcycle deaths in 2011, with a 48 percent reduction rate.

According to Steve Rich, a research analyst principle at the Idaho Transportation Department, there were 28 motorcycle number dropped to 17 in 2011.

In the Magic Valley, which is known as ITD Region 4, three people died in motorcycle crashes in 2010 and three more in 2011, Rich said.

So far, statewide there have been three through the month of

deaths in Idaho in 2010. That April. Another fatal motorcycle crash was reported by Idaho State Police on Tuesday near Inkom.

In contrast to Idaho's dropping numbers, the report by the Governors Association reveals, nationwide, no progress was made in reducing motorcycle deaths in

# **Idaho Death Row Inmate to Be Executed Tuesday**

**BOISE** • More than a quarter century after Danette Elg's mutilated body was found on a punctured waterbed in her bedroom, her family still declines to publicly talk about her and what happened.

The southeastern Idaho woman was a licensed private pilot who loved the outdoors, fishing and hang-gliding. At the time of her death, she had been the only female to graduate from the Idaho State Aeronautical School, according to her obituary.

Her convicted killer, Richard Leavitt, 53, is scheduled to be put to death by lethal injection June 12, barring any last-minute court intervention.


In the days before the scheduled execution, Elg's family kept their grief private. She was raised by her mother, Thelma, who died in 2006, and her stepfather, Richard Bross, who currently resides in Boise. Bross declined comment and other relatives didn't return phones calls from The Associated Press.

Leavitt's immediate family, including his parents and son, still reside in the small southeastern Idaho town of Blackfoot, where Elg was murdered.

Tim Leavitt, who at 31 is the same age as Elg at the time of her death, told the AP on Friday that he was just

# T.F. Council, URA Both Plan to Discuss Parking

TWIN FALLS • Parking is on the minds of Twin Falls decision makers.

Today, the Urban Renewal Agency considers the future of a former cityowned parking lot, located at Third Street and Gooding Avenue. Later in the evening, the Twin Falls City Council will reconsider adopting proposals from the 2011 parking commission.

The parking commission formed last year to discuss potential solutions to downtown.

One of their recommendations: If the city disposes of any parking lots downtown, they should replace that lost parking.

But when the city council approved sale of the parking lot at Third Street and Gooding to the URA, it made no moves to replace that parking, raising objections from Sarah Taylor, parking commission participant and co-owner of the Historic Ballroom in downtown Twin Falls.

At a May 29 council meeting, Taylor testified that she was "extremely disheartened" to hear about the city's plans to shed more parking spaces, adding that her business had submitted proposals to use the parking lot for their customers.

Taylor may soon have another chance at use of the parking lot. If the URA approves the \$57,800 purchase of the parking lot, URA Executive Director Melinda Anderson will work with the board to develop a request for proposals on utilizing the property.

The agency will look at how applicants plan to use the lot, and weigh the overall picture, like how much the

# **Judge Orders New** Counsel in Sarah

KETCHUM (AP) • A cen- judge had to review the protral Idaho judge has ordered that a new attorney be appointed for a woman who was convicted of killing both her parents when she was a teenager and is now serving two life sentences without possibility of parole.

**Johnson Case** 

The Idaho Mountain Express reports that 5th District Court Judge G. Richard Bevan last week ruled 25year-old Sarah Johnson is entitled to new legal counsel as she attempts to get a new trial.

Johnson was 16 in 2003, when prosecutors say she shot Alan and Diane Johnson with a rifle at the family's Bellevue home. She was found guilty by a jury of two counts of first-degree murder and was sentenced in 2005. The Idaho Innocence

Project contends Johnson hasn't had competent counsel and that new DNA analytical techniques could prove she didn't kill her parents.

"Sarah needs competent counsel to help her, so it is a good first step," said Boise attorney Dennis Benjamin, who has been working without charge on Johnson's case for the past year. "The ceedings and decide there was sufficient meat there?

Benjamin and co-counsel Deborah Whipple filed motions in April, asking Bevan to vacate a decision denying Johnson a new trial that he made more than a year ago.

Bevan's decision doesn't reopen Johnson's post-conviction case. He ordered that Johnson's new attorney be chosen from attorneys with public defender contracts with Blaine County.

"It is extremely rare that a 16-year-old girl, with no history of violence, kills both parents at close range, and the doubts raised at trial could potentially be answered by new DNA testing," said Greg Hampikian, director of the Idaho Innocence Project.

Blaine County has spent about \$1.1 million on Johnson's legal case.

# **Utah Wildfire Where Fatal Crash Occurred Contained**

Crews have contained a 10square-mile wildfire on the Utah-Nevada border where a firefighting air tanker crashed last week, killing both crew members.

Cooler weather helped firefighters in their battle Sunday against two wildfires in southern Utah.

The lightning-caused White Rock Fire in eastern Nevada and western Utah, about 150 miles northeast of Las Vegas, was 100 percent contained Friday night after a weeklong battle, officials said. Most of the fire was in Nevada.

A Lockheed P2V air tanker was dropping retardant on the fire when it crashed June 3 into a mountain slope a quarter mile inside Utah, killing pilots Todd Tompkins and Ronnie Chambless, both of Boise,

Federal investigators have recovered a cockpit voice recorder from the air tanker that may provide clues into the cause of the crash.

In southern Utah, calmer winds and cooler temperatures allowed firefighters to make progress on the 2,018-acre Box Creek Fire near Greenwich and the 2,076-acre Lost Lake Fire near Teasdale. The Box Creek blaze was 40 percent

# Innovative Blues, Jazz **Guitarist Pete** Cosey Dies

CHICAGO (AP) • Pete Cosey, an innovative guitarist who brought his distinctive distorted sound to recordings with Miles Davis, Howlin' Wolf and Muddy Waters, has died, his daughter said. He was 68.

Cosey died May 30 of complications from surgery at Vanguard Weiss Memorial Hospital in Chicago, said his daughter Mariama Cosey.

Pete Cosev's musical journey began early, his daughter said, noting that Cosey's father died when he was 9 years old.

"That's how he dealt with his father's passing... and if I had to pick one instance in his life that just really rocked his world, that was it," she said. "I think he tried to spend his time trying to communicate with my granddaddy:"

In the 1960s, Cosey was a member of the studio band at Chess Records in Chicago, where he played on Waters' "Electric Mud" and Howlin' Wolf's "Howlin' Wolf Album?" Cosey also worked with Etta James and Chuck Berry.

He took a creative approach to stringing and tuning his guitars, and liberally applied the distortion pedal to his licks. He started to develop his unique sound as a teenager in Arizona, where he would play in the mountains near Phoenix, according to a Chicago Tribune article.

His explorations of sound drew the attention of one of jazz's legendary minds, Miles Davis.

In an interview with music writer George Cole, published on Cole's "The Last Miles" website, Cosey said Davis sought him out, wanted him at the front of the band and told him to turn up his guitar's volume.

Cosey ended up playing on many of Davis' boundary-pushing recordings in the 1970s, including "Dark Magus," "Agharta" and "The Complete on the Corner Sessions."


Cosey was also in Martin Scorsese's 2003 blues documentary, "The Blues: A Musical Journey." In recent years, health

problems had slowed Cosey, but he had been playing music in children's hospitals and schools, according to the Chicago Tribune.

Cosey's daughter said that, to her father, music was a language

# Police: Three Killed in Shooting Near Auburn

AUBURN, Ala. • Investigators were searching Sunday for a gunman who killed three people — including two former Auburn University football players — and wounded three others at a pool party near campus after several men got in a fight over a woman, authorities and witnesses said.

One of the wounded was shot in the head and critically hurt. Another was a current player, Eric Mack.

Desmonte Leonard opened fire at the Saturday night party at an apartment complex near the university, Auburn Police Chief Tommy Dawson said. Federal marshals and police were searching for Leonard, who faces three counts of capital murder.

Slain were Edward Christian, who had not been playing because of a back injury, and Ladarious Phillips, who had previously quit playing football. The other person killed was 20year-old Demario Pitts.

# LOGANO WINS AT POCONO RACEWAY FOR 2ND TITLE

LONG POND, Pa. • Joey Logano stood on top of the No. 20 high-fiving everyone he could reach in Victory Lane. Beverages were sprayed, fists were pumped and throaty shouts of celebration could be heard well down the 21/2mile track.

It's what winning a Sprint Cup race is all about.

It's what Logano has waited years to truly experience. Not rain or Mark Martin would deny him this feeling.

Logano gave a crafty Martin a well-timed nudge out of the way in the closing laps Sunday at Pocono Raceway to clinch his first victory since 2009 and become the first Sprint Cup driver this season to win from the pole.

The one-time prodigy and the grizzled veteran pushing hard down the stretch was a duel to remember at Pocono. "I didn't stop screaming until I got to Victory Lane," Logano said. "You work so hard to do this."

This one felt like the first time for Logano after his only other career win in 125 Sprint Cup starts was a rainshortened victory at New Hampshire. Wins count the same in the record book. But they sure do feel different.

"When you cross the line and you've won the race, to me, it's an amazing feeling," Logano said.

Logano had the top car all weekend, posting the fastest practice time Friday and then taking the pole Saturday.

Logano, once a much-hyped phenom when he broke in with Joe Gibbs Racing, was under pressure to produce victories in the final year of his four-year contract.

Logano's win continues a recent uptick of solid results in the Cup series. He has insisted this season his contract status has not added pressure.

# Rain stops Nadal, Djokovic in Final

PARIS • His big lead over Novak Djokovic in Sunday's drenched French Open final slipping away, Rafael Nadal tossed a soaked, clay-smeared tennis ball toward the chair umpire.

A drizzle was now a downpour, making the balls heavy, the clay court slippery and changing the complexion of a match with so much at stake: Djokovic's bid to become the first man in 43 years to win four consecutive Grand Slam titles, and Nadal's attempt to become the first man to win seven titles at the tournament. Moments later, play was

suspended with the No. 2seeded Nadal trying to protect a 6-4, 6-3, 2-6, 1-2 lead over a surging Djokovic, who's seeded No. 1. A tarp was pulled over the court, and after another hour or so, the decision was made to stop for the day and resume Monday.

Yes, this French Open already has made history, but not for a reason that was expected: It's the first time since 1973 that the tournament at Roland Garros didn't conclude on a Sunday.

# On Perry Swisher

ews reports have proffered a shorthand description of Perry Swisher, who died Wednesday, as a legislator, utilities commissioner and newspaperman, which is accurate. But nowhere near explanatory.

The closest anyone has come to describing
Swisher in a single sentence may be this, from a 1979 profile of him in the Lewiston Tribune upon his departure from that paper:

"As a journalist, legislator, gardener, publisher, guru, crusader, advisor to the mighty and the molested, critic, bard, counselor wondrous, administrator, confessor, orator, pundit laureate and consummate pain in the posterior - to place the adjective 'former' in front of those titles is not to know the man - Perry Swisher has been handing down observations and decrees ever since he presided over his Owyhee County birth 55 years ago."

He was 88 when he died, and the description still fit. And still leaves out so much.

Swisher made his mark at Pocatello, as a reporter, political activist and candidate (not mutually exclusive then). He became a businessman, running a bookstore and a weekly newspaper. That paper, the Intermountain, covered regional and state politics, with other subjects, and Swisher wrote nearly all of it for more than a decade. His range was tremendous, from detailed commentary on government to "Madame Fifi," an Ann Landers parody. (Great reading about the time and place even now.) The only business he ran that made money, he once said, was a restaurant - nicely located across the street from a movie theatre, toward which the fans' exhaust was directed.

But his sense of public service was strong enough that he won legislative office regularly as a Republican in Democratic Bannock County. In 1966, after more than two decades of intense political and governmental work, he threw away his livelihood and his stand-



ing in his political party to mount a hopeless run for governor as an Indpendent because, he felt, someone had to be out there supporting the newly-enacted sales tax, which the the voters were about to either sustain or reject. (They voted aye. Swisher is one of the main reasons Idaho has a sales tax.) In the next decade, he returned to the legislature for one term as a Democrat, but this was no usual conversion: He could be as harsh about his new party as his old one.

He was an unpre-

dictable speaker because he never stopped thinking and learning. A cup of coffee with Swisher was a journey on a switchback trail through first one topic (say, low-head hydro), across to another seemingly unrelated (the rate of worker comp insurance) to yet another (maybe a local election in Burley) and on and on - it was to see the connections and causal relationships, different angles of lighting, otherwise not obvious at all. This journalist was always a wonderful interview, partly because of his absolute blunt candor with a twist. He described Lewiston as "caught in a time warp," a place where the mayor should be Rod Serling and all the cars should have tailfins. On appointment to the utilities commission Swisher, who strongly favored utility regulation, said he wasn't a "consumer advocate" because he didn't approve of heedless consumption. He was a font of ideas, and of thinking them through to reach practical conclusions.


Swisher was unique. His legacy in thought and practice that will influence Idaho for a long time.

The Canyon Rim District needs protection and who better to do that than our city council and planning and zoning. Just because a developer

wants to do something, do we give it to him at all costs to our community? Why have a Comprehensive Plan if, at the whim of a developer, all is changed?

The site can be developed commercially in a way that is sensitive to the values of the community as stated in the Comprehensive Plan. The current proposal does not represent those values. If we want people to come to Twin Falls, make it a unique, beautiful place to

#### It's Time to Question City Code Regarding Property Lines

If you own property within the Twin Falls City limits, you may not be aware that the property between the sidewalk and street belongs to the city. This means that the trees on that property are also not yours. However, the city requires you to care for its property (City Codes 8-1-5, 8-4-4).

When is the last time the city thanked you for spraying, watering, mowing, raking or otherwise tending to its property at your own cost? If the city trees adjacent to your property are in need of repair, pruning or altering for the sake of safety, that is also your responsibility (at your cost), but you must follow the city's explicit guidelines (see the City Tree Ordinance)!

These ordinances have been in place for a very long time, and I think it is time they be questioned. The city needs to take responsibility for its own property as we must for ours. I don't know what rights the city is citing in requiring you to care for public property that is adjacent to your private property.

The city has two very large trees in front of my property, both of which drop branches at every strong wind. Three of which have been 4 to 6 feet in diameter and one of which has left a 5-inch diameter hole in my lawn from the impact. Other large branches have landed within inches of my car.

It's time for the city ordinance to be questioned, and it's time for the city to own up and be responsible for its own property.

# Women of INL Reflect on Challenges, Progress

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • Women shouldn't let prejudice hold them back in the male-dominated world of science and engineering, say three who ought to know.

As employees in various stages of their careers at Idaho National Laboratory, Mary Dee Grimm, Kathryn McCarthy and Shannon Bragg-Sitton have navigated that world their entire professional lives.

Instead of being a liability, being a woman can have its advantages, they said. Where some men tend to fade into the background, women's exploits tend to catch attention and be remembered, said McCarthy, director of the lab's technical integration office for the Light Water Reactor Sustainability program.

"If you're different, you stand out, so a lot of times people will remember you; which is good because they'll remember you for other opportunities," Mc-Carthy said. "It can also be bad because if you screw up, they'll remember you then, too."

That's not to say women have an easier path than men.

McCarthy, who's spent 21 years at the lab, said women still face a double standard for behavior, especially in group settings such as meetings and conferences.

"Sometimes, in some situations, a confident, motivated woman is perceived in a negative sense where a man who behaves exactly the same way is not," she said.

In 50 years of working around engineers for the federal government's lab, Mary Dee Grimm has seen women make plenty of strides

When she first arrived, straight out of high school, it was a rarity to see a woman who held a post any higher than administrative support at the lab. That's changed, as McCarthy can attest, but Grimm admits old perceptions die hard.

"It goes back to, maybe, that women are perceived as more dramatic or more sensitive or more reacting — the emotional side of it," Grimm said. "And Kathy's right. You can see a gentleman kind of get upset or raise his voice, where if a female does, it could be perceived as 'Oh, she's just a little bit emotional today."

Bragg-Sitton likes to focus on the benefit of being a woman in a room — or lab space — full of men. She looks at things differently than they do, she said. A fresh point of view can be a contribution in itself when it helps the collective avoid the traps of groupthink, she said.

But ideas aren't enough. "You also have to have the confidence to speak out and say it," said Bragg-Sitton, who's been at the lab for a year and a half.

Grimm recalled one woman who wasn't afraid to speak her mind. The

quit his job to stay home and care for their children.

Grimm's network of family and close friends gave her the space to keep working in a time when both men and women questioned her place in society.

Bosses, too, have become more accommodating, partly due to self-interest, Bragg-Sitton said.

"You're going to tend to stick with a boss that is supportive of your family decisions and recognizes that family is first," she said.

For all the progress that the lab, specifically, and the professional science and engineering world have made, however, women's place in that world seems to have stalled somewhat, Mc-Carthy said. During the past decade, the percentage of women in academic engineering programs around the country has remained stagnant at less than 20 per-

cent, she said, and no one's sure why.

Women make up less than a quarter of INL's 4,000-person staff. Only 14 percent of the lab's technical positions are occupied by women. But Bragg-Sitton, Grimm and McCarthy agreed that while some institutions are resistant to the arrival of women in positions of authority and influence, they generally have felt welcome at INL.

None of the women regretted pursuing a career. Their decisions may have raised some eyebrows with co-workers, friends and society at large, but they've made for happier families, the women said.



# \$42 Million Bear Lake Resort in Utah Planned

# **Appeal Filed** over Elko County Forest Travel Plan

RENO, Nev. • An environmental organization is appealing the Humboldt-Toiyabe National's Forest's travel management plan for Elko County, contending that its adoption "caved to pressure from sagebrush rebel extremists."

The Center for Biological Diversity maintains that the U.S. Forest Service plan would nearly double the road and trail mileage open for motorized use in the Jarbidge, Mountain City and Ruby Mountains ranger districts of northeast Nevada.

"This plan sacrifices our watersheds, streams and habitats for wildlife and endangered species to a vocal minority of noisy, highpowered (off-road vehicle) users," Rob Mrowka, the group's Nevada spokesman, said in a statement.

Humboldt-Toivabe spokeswoman Christie Kalkowski said a "thorough analysis" of all issues raised by the organization's administrative challenge will occur, and Forest Supervisor Jeanne Higgins would reach a decision on the appeal by July 16.

District Rangers Wendy Fuell and Gar Abbas, who oversee national forest land in the rural county, have offered the organization a chance to attend an informal meeting to clarify the issues as part of the appeal process, Kalkowski added.

"(The National Environmental Policy Act) process can be complicated. We do make mistakes and check things," she told The Associated Press.

The vast majority of na-

tional forest roads in the county will remain open to motorized vehicles and only some will be closed under the plan released in April by the Forest Service.

The plan for the first time recognizes more than 900 miles of roads and trails in the county as part of the national forest system. It keeps open another 1,085 miles of existing authorized roads and closes about 225 miles of road.

The decision means nearly 2,000 miles of national forest roads and motorized trails will be open for public use in the county - more than 90 percent of all such mileage on the three ranger districts there.

Mrowka said the vast majority of trails being authorized for motorized use were created by "renegade riders," without the consent of the Forest Service and without consideration for their impacts on natural re-

"This isn't about kicking motorized users off the forest," he said. "It's about reason, common sense and the long view.

"Protecting ecosystem health while still providing for some motorized use should be the goal. Under the current situation, there are still almost 1,100 miles of motorized roads and trails open to the public. It's too bad the Forest Service chose such a destructive and unbalanced plan."

The Forest Service's travel management plans were initiated during the administration of former President George W. Bush amid an explosion of new roads spurred by the growing popularity of off-highway vehicle travel.

LAS VEGAS (AP) • High winds put a damper early Sunday on a desert rave in Las Vegas featuring more than 100 dance music performers.

Electric Daisy Carnival organizers say they were forced to shut down their acts for the night at 2:45 a.m. out of safety concerns for an estimated 90,000

Wind gusts of up to 30 mph prompted a temporary shutdown of the festival around 1 a.m. The acts resumed for a short time, but officials later ordered an end to the night's festival.

Fans were allowed to stay and listen to music from temporary sound systems until 5:30 a.m. from the infield grass of Las Vegas Motor Speedway.

The three-day festival is scheduled to continue as scheduled, with gates opening at 7 p.m. Sunday until 5:30 a.m. today.

# Hundreds Evacuated as Colo., N.M. Fires Spread

LAPORTE, Colo. • Firefighters on Sunday were fighting wildfires that have spread quickly in parched forests in Colorado and New Mexico, forcing hundreds of people from their homes and the evacuation of wolves from a

sanctuary.
The Colorado fire, burning in a mountainous area about 15 miles west of Fort Collins, grew to 22 square miles within about a day of being reported and has destroyed or damaged 18 structures.

Strong winds, meanwhile, grounded aircraft fighting a 40-square-mile wildfire near the mountain community of Ruidoso in southern New Mexico. Crews were working to build a fire line

around the blaze, which started Friday and has damaged or destroyed 36 structures.

It wasn't immediately clear how many of the structures lost were homes. "We're still trying to take a tally," Kerry Gladden, public information officer for Ruidoso, said late Sunday afternoon.

In Colorado, the fire sent up heavy smoke, obscuring the sun and creating an eerie, orange dusk in the middle of the day. The smell of smoke drifted into the Denver area and smoke spread as far away as central Nebraska, western Kansas and Texas.

The latest New Mexico fire is smaller than the Whitewater-Baldy fire — the largest in the state's history — but it's more concerning to authori-

ties because it started closer to homes, said Dan Ware, a spokesman for the New Mexico State Forestry Division. He said the number of Ruidoso evacuees was in the hundreds, but he didn't have an exact figure.

Gladden said preliminary evacuations could be issued for some areas closer to town due to wind shifts.

Karen Takai, a spokeswoman for the Ruidoso fire crews, said smoke is heavily impacting the community of Capitan, about 5 miles to the northeast. She said Capitan and others could also face evacuation.

"Any communities around this fire have the potential of being evacuated," she said. "If I lived in Capitan, I definitely would be prepared. Don't wait until the sheriff's office comes knocking at your door and tells you to evacuate."

Elsewhere Sunday, firefighters were battling a wildfire that blackened 6 square miles in Wyoming's Guernsey State Park and forced the evacuation of between 500 and 1,000 campers and visitors. Cooler weather was helping firefighters in their battle against two other wild-

fires in southern Utah.

In Colorado, authorities sent nearly 1,800 evacuation notices to phone numbers but it wasn't clear how many residents had to leave. About 500 people had checked in at Red Cross shelters. Larimer County Sheriff Justin Smith said there was an unconfirmed report of a person unaccounted for, but he wouldn't elaborate.

Authorities say it's the worst fire seen in Larimer County in about 25 years. It spread as fast as 11/2 miles an hour Saturday, skipping over some areas but burning intensely in trees in others. Flames were coming dangerously close to deputies who were telling some residents to

evacuate, Smith said.

Kathie Walter and her husband helped friends several miles away evacuate from the Colorado fire on Saturday. When they got home, they were surprised to

get a call warning them to be ready to evacuate just in case. But Walter didn't want to wait.

"Smoke was coming in hard. We could not see flames or orange or black smoke. But we didn't need to see anymore. We just said 'Hey, let's get out of here;" she said.

They evacuated with their five cats and two dogs. They had a head start. After a wildfire in the area last year, they had left two suitcases packed in their garage.

McALLEN, Texas • A shotgun that once belonged to Western sharpshooter and entertainer Annie Oakley sold for more than \$143,000 at an auction in Dallas on Sunday.

The trove of about 100 of the icon's items headlining Heritage Auctions' "Legends of the Wild West' event brought in nearly \$520,000, according to the auction house.

The items included several guns, her Stetson hat, photographs and letters. Oakley's great-grandnieces put up the items and had inherited them from their mother, who died in 2009.

One of those descendants, Terrye Holcomb, said, overall, the auction's success left her with a positive feeling, but "there's a little bit of melancholy and sadness that goes with it."

The items had been passed down through generations. Holcomb remembers shooting the guns for target practice on Sunday mornings in California's Santa Monica Mountains and wearing Oakley's Stetson hat — which sold for \$17,925 — for Halloween.

But Holcomb said seeing how excited some of the buyers were with their purchases made her feel good.

One man who flew in from Odessa to bid on one of two Marlin .22 caliber rifles — one sold for \$71,700, the other for \$83,650 — asked Holcomb and her sister, Tommye Tait, to sign his catalog after buying one of the rifles.

"He said his kids couldn't wait to shoot it," Holcomb said.

# Lift for Markets from Spain Rescue Could Be Brief

**WASHINGTON (AP)** • A \$125 billion plan to rescue Spain's banks won't solve Europe's debt crisis or ease the pain of double-digit unemployment across the continent.

But it is likely to calm financial markets and buy time for European policymakers to work with other weak economies threatening the stability of the 17 countries that use the euro.

Europe still has plenty of troubles to address in the three other countries that have already received financial help — Greece, Portugal and Ireland. In Greece, voters could elect a government next week that will refuse to live up to the terms of the country's \$170 billion rescue package. Portugal is combating a toxic combination of high debt and 15 percent unemployment. Ireland is cleaning up a banking mess a lot like Spain's. Then there's Italy, the eurozone's third-largest economy, where government debt is piling up as the economy stagnates.

"We still have some pretty fundamental problems to solve," says Nicolas Veron, senior fellow at the Bruegel think tank in Brusssels. "We need more radical solutions than this one."

# Official: Egypt's Mubarak in Critical Condition

**CAIRO (AP)** • Hosni Mubarak is slipping in and out of consciousness eight days after the ousted Egyptian leader was sent to prison to begin serving a life sentence, a security official said on Sunday.

With rumors of the former president's death spreading rapidly, authorities granted his wife, former first lady Suzanne Mubarak, and the couple's two daughters-in-law special permission to visit him in Cairo's Torah prison early that morning.

Sometimes an easy game suddenly develops unexpected problems. Here you pick up one of your best hands of the decade, but to compensate for that, your partner has one of his worst. His three-club bid showed 0-4 points, and his three-spade call at his third turn suggested no feature he wanted to emphasize.

"Mankind always sets itself

only such problems as it can

Accordingly, you come to a stop in four spades. When West leads the club queen, you ruff, then cash the spade ace, getting news of the 4-0 break.

With three possible diamond losers, you cannot afford to play ace and another diamond or a 4-1 break onside would doom you immediately. So you cross to the spade jack and finesse the diamond queen, the best safety play against a 4-1 diamond break. If the finesse holds, you'd draw trump and play on diamonds for 10 or 11 tricks.

When the finesse loses, you ruff the next club and play the diamond ace, crossing your fingers. When both opponents follow suit, you can play a third diamond. West wins and plays a third club, but now you discard the heart four. If the defenders lead a fourth round of clubs, then dummy's spade six would still be in place to take care of the ruff, and the hearts would provide the entry back to hand to draw the rest of the trumps.

If West exits with a heart, you can simply draw trumps and claim the rest.





#### TODAY IN HISTORY

#### On this date:

In 1770, Captain James Cook, commander of the British ship Endeavour, discovered the Great Barrier Reef off Australia by running onto

In 1776, the Continental Congress formed a committee to draft a Declaration of Independence calling for freedom from Britain.

In 1919, Sir Barton won the Belmont Stakes, becoming horse racing's first Triple Crown winner.

**In 1922,** the groundbreaking documentary feature "Nanook of the North," produced by Robert I. Flaherty. premiered in New York.

**In 1937.** eight members of the Soviet Red Army High Command accused of dislovalty were put on trial, convicted and immediately executed as part of Josef Stalin's Great Purge.

In 1942, the United States and the Soviet Union signed a lend-lease agreement to aid the Soviet war effort in World War II.

**In 1963,** a Buddhist monk (Thich Quang Duc) set himself afire on a Saigon street to protest the government of South Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh Diem.

**In 1971,** the year-and-ahalf-long occupation of Alcatraz Island in San Francisco Bay by American Indian activists ended as federal officers evicted the remaining protesters.

**In 1977,** Seattle Slew won the Belmont Stakes, capturing the Triple Crown.

In 1987, Margaret Thatcher became the first British prime minister in 160 years to win a third consecutive term of office as her Conservatives held onto a reduced majority in Parliament.

Ten years ago: Congressional investigators released a report which said Clinton administration workers had defaced equipment and left behind prank messages as they vacated the White House in Jan. 2001; but the investigators failed to uncover the widespread problems alleged by some Republicans. Rock star Paul McCartney and Heather Mills were married in a remote Irish castle. (The couple divorced in 2008; Mc-Cartney married again in October 2011.) The very first episode of "American Idol" aired on Fox Television with hosts Ryan Seacrest and Brian Dunkleman and judges Simon Cowell, Paula Abdul and Randy Jackson. (The winner of the first season was Kelly Clarkson.)

Five years ago: Republicans blocked a Senate noconfidence vote on Attorney General Alberto Gonzales. A divided panel of the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said the Bush administration could not use new anti-terrorism laws to keep Ali al-Marri, a legal U.S. resident, locked up indefinitely without charging him. (The issue was rendered moot in 2009 when the Obama administration ordered al-Marri turned over to civilian authorities.) Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, was arrested at the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport in a restroom sex sting. (Craig, who denied soliciting an undercover police officer, later pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct and paid a fine.) Actress Mala Powers died in Burbank, Calif., at age 75.
