## T.F. Council: Pull Out Parking Meters

**TWIN FALLS** • After 40 years of requesting quarters and dimes from downtown visitors, Twin Falls' antique parking meters are coming down.

During Monday's Twin Falls City Council meeting, members voted 5-2 to permanently remove the parking meters starting today.

The motion was proposed by Councilman Shawn Barigar, who offered several suggestions on Monday night that focused on improving downtown parking.

"The meters we have now are antiquated," Barigar said. "That's the nice way of putting it."

Mayor Greg Lanting and Councilwoman Rebecca Mills Sojka voted against removing the parking meters, but not because they wanted to continue charging for downtown parking.

The city might need to put up the parking meters in the near future to monitor downtown parking, Lanting said. By removing the posts now, it could create an additional cost for the city in the future.

"I have a problem with the finality of it," he said. "I don't think we should be charging for parking but I don't think we should remove the poles."

City officials will begin taking down the meters immediately, said City Manager Travis Rothweiler. The meter poles will take longer to remove but city officials should start on that sometime this week, he said.

Turning to another facet of downtown parking, the council then voted unanimously to continue allowing the leasing of individual parking spaces.

Even though the meters are going away, the public won't receive unlimited parking downtown. Council members agreed that city staff should provide recommendations in 30 days regarding parking time limits, varying based on location.

A task force last year recommended both ending leasing and removing the parking meters. Just six months ago in December, the council voted against adopting the recommendations, deadlocking on a 3-3 vote.

Finally Monday, council members voted to approve a service contract with Region IV Development Association to provide assistance with a grant designed to support the Chobani plant construction on Kimberly Road.

## JEROME SHOOTING LEAVES WOMAN HOSPITALIZED

**JEROME** • A 21-year-old woman was shot in the back this weekend and Jerome police are still unsure exactly what happened.

Kendra

Adams, of Jerome, was shot in the back while riding in the front pas-

senger seat of a vehicle in the west downtown area of Jerome between 1:20 and 1:30 a.m. Sunday, Jerome Police Chief Dan Hall said.

Victor Emmanuel Garcia, 21, of Jerome, was riding in a passenger seat behind Adams.

"At that time a gun was discharged from the back seat, went through the seat where (Adams) was sitting and struck her in the back," Hall said.

Police were called to St. Luke's Jerome, where Adams was transported, after being alerted of the

incident by medical staff.

Adams was later transported to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center where she is in good condition, said hospital spokeswoman Laura Stewart.

Garcia allegedly fled from the scene, and Hall said police are interested in speaking to him.

"We haven't been able to establish exactly what happened at this time, whether it was accidental or not," Hall said. "I really don't want to speculate on what happened because we aren't entirely sure."

Garcia is wanted on a misdemeanor warrant out of Twin Falls. Anyone who knows his whereabouts should call Jerome police at 324-1911 or local law enforcement agency, Hall said.

## COOL WATERS

A project to cool water temperatures is intended to help fish and other aquatic life.

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**TWIN FALLS** • Trout and other aquatic creatures in some Magic Valley streams are about to get better living conditions.

The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality is conducting a program to cool the water in creeks that exceed state temperature standards. Temperature is a key factor in the health of fish and other coldwater organisms, according to the agency.

In many cases, adding vegetation such as willows along stream banks will do the trick. There is federal financing to help private landowners with planting or other methods to make streams cooler, said program coordinator Dave Pisarski of the Boise DEQ office.

Beyond adding vegetation, improvement can come from fencing off stream access to cattle, which will allow natural vegetation to return, he said. Money is available to dig wells so cattle restricted from streams can get water.

There's no mandate for ranchers or farmers to comply. Participation is strictly on a volunteer basis, although Pisarski is optimistic many will take part.

"It's easy to get interest in these projects because they come with funding," he said.

Near Twin Falls, the targeted water bodies are Mud, Cedar, McMullen and Dry creeks in the Rock Creek sub-basin. They were found to violate the federal Clean Water Act after DEQ put temperature monitoring equipment in the water and studied the readings over six to 12 months.

Mark Shumar, a plant ecologist with DEQ in Boise, said irrigation is another contributing factor to the problem. When water is siphoned off for irrigation, the reduced volume of water is more affected by solar heating.

However, DEQ won't be regulating irrigators.

"We don't affect water rights," Shumar said. "Those things still go on and that's why it becomes even more critical to have shade to cool that water."

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## Weatherization Program Faces Deep Budget Cuts

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**TWIN FALLS** • Less than a month ago, if Heidi Dean wanted to close the back door to her home, she had to use a hammer.

"You had to pound it shut and then use a padlock to make sure it stayed close," she said. "We never used it that much."

Dean and her husband, Darrell Pace,

live with their three children in Filer. Even though the two work full-time, they struggled to pay their winter heating bills. A broken furnace forced them to rely on space heaters, which increased their power bill to more than \$400 in just a few months. The two began looking for help, but it wasn't until they became a part of a local weatherization program that their heating problems were resolved.

# Man Accused of Ransacking Kimberly Home, Stealing Car

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**KIMBERLY** • An evening out turned ugly for a Kimberly couple when they returned to find their home in disarray and their car stolen from their locked garage.

The couple, who live in the 300 block of Cayuse Creek Drive, told Kimberly Police Officer Alex Arrington that they went out for the evening on June 1 and arrived home at 1:49 a.m. the next day to find their silver 2008 Ford Focus missing and their master bedroom and bathroom trashed.

The couple said Scott Meade, 30, of Twin Falls, could have been responsible, Arrington wrote in the report. The woman and Meade had an affair in the past and the couple ran into him at Elevation 486 — 195 River Vista Place in Twin Falls — earlier that evening, the report stated.

According to the report, the couple said “words had been exchanged.”

Arrington and Kimberly Police Lt. Stacy Buck walked through the house and observed televisions in the bedroom and living room were broken, a large mirror was taken off the bedroom wall and thrown on the floor, bathroom cabinets were damaged and a hole was punched in

a linen closet door, according to the report. Another officer went to Meade’s house in the 400 block of Jeweler Street in Twin Falls, but no one answered the door and the missing vehicle was nowhere in sight, the report stated.

Later than morning, at about 9:15 a.m., police again responded to the couple’s home for a report of a disturbance.

“Meade was on scene trying to talk to the reporting party about what had happened earlier in the day,” Arrington wrote in the report.

Arrington said he asked Meade what was going on and Meade replied he wanted to talk to the people in the house about what happened earlier in the day. Eventually, Meade told police he broke in using the key code to the garage, trashed the house and stole the car, putting it in his own garage, the report stated.

According to the report, the home suffered \$5,500 in damage and the car was worth \$8,000.

Meade was arrested and charged with burglary, grand theft and malicious injury to property. He was booked into the Twin Falls County Jail and held on a \$15,000 bond. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for Friday.

Similar water improvement projects elsewhere in Idaho have proven successful, he said. Beyond water temperature, DEQ regularly tests streams for nitrogen and sediment levels. It produces a stream quality report card every two years that is sent to the federal Environmental Protection Agency.

“It includes what water bodies are in good condition and which ones are

not,” Shumar said. “They incorporate that into their planning for the next year’s water projects.”

The current warm water situation resulted, in part, from past grazing practices, he added. Historically, there were areas where willows were removed to allow cattle to reach the water.

“We don’t see that happening anymore,” Shumar said. “But it takes these streams a while to recover, and it might take some changes in management to re-grow willows.”



It will be 10 to 20 years before success is realized, according to DEQ’s timetable, although smaller creeks might respond more quickly.

## Hansen Man Arrested after Allegedly Eluding Police on ATV

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**HANSEN** • When Kimberly Police Lt. Stacy Buck turned on his siren, he thought he was just pulling over a speeding ATV rider. Instead, it was the beginning of a chase through an alfalfa field that would end with him pulling his gun.

At about 8:30 p.m. June 1, Buck was using radar to check driving speeds near the intersection of Rock Creek Road and Walnut Avenue West in Hansen. That’s when he saw a red, 4-wheel ATV traveling south on Rock Creek Road at a high rate of speed, according to a police report.

Buck said, according to his radar, the ATV was traveling at 45 mph in a 35 mph zone, so he turned on his emergency lights and followed the ATV.

“I activated my siren for a brief moment,” Buck wrote in the report. “The driver turned and looked at me and showed no signs of slowing.”

At about 3600 North the driver, later identified as 21-year-old Jorge Hoya-Rios of Hansen, turned east and the vehicle was going

fast enough that it came up on two tires, according to the police report.

Hoya-Rios then turned into a cut alfalfa field, but got stuck on a windrow of hay. Instead of stopping, Hoya-Rios got out of his vehicle and took off through the field on foot, the report said.

According to the report, Hoya-Rios continued walking and would not put his hands up or stop until Buck drew his gun.

Twin Falls County Sgt. Ken Mencl was called to the scene to serve as a Spanish translator, the report said.

“Hoya-Rios told Mencl that when I tried to stop him he had become scared and that is why he tried to run,” Buck wrote in the report.

According to the report, no record was found of Hoya-Rios having a driver’s license. He was booked in the Twin Falls County Jail on eluding, resisting and obstructing an officer and failure to purchase a driver’s license. He was held on a \$5,000 bond and a pretrial hearing is scheduled for July 17.

## BOATERS RESCUED, HOME ABLAZE LATE MONDAY

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## BLM SCHEDULES PRESCRIBED FIRE NEAR BELLEVUE

**BELLEVUE** • Firefighters have until July 15 to conduct a prescribed fire in the Martin Canyon area east of Bellevue.

The Twin Falls District Bureau of Land Management expects the project to take two or three days to burn. It will take another three days to monitor and patrol the burn area after the prescribed fire has been completed.

The BLM is burning the area to reduce the risk of additional wildfire in the Martin and Muldoon Canyon areas, according to a news release. The prescribed fire

will also enhance wildlife habitat, promote of aspen restoration and improve watershed function.

By burning late in the spring, the prescribed fire should have reduced lingering smoke due to longer daylight hour. Fire crews will also have enhanced control of the burn since the vegetation will still contain plenty of moisture and prevent it from spreading out of control.

BLM spokeswoman Kyli Gough said the project’s start date is dependent on the weather and how many fire crews are available, but it could start as early as Thursday.

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# Jerome Police Standoff Ends Peacefully

**JEROME** • A Jerome man hid in a house for an hour and a half Monday morning in a standoff with Jerome, Twin Falls and state law enforcement. Police believed he was armed. Jerome Police Chief Dan Hall said police originally

responded to the residence at the Big Trees Trailer Court in the 300 block of 1st Avenue West in Jerome at 12:50 a.m. Sunday for a domestic battery situation. Ethan Christensen, 26, was the suspect and left the scene, Hall said. At 9:27 a.m. Monday, police responded to the residence again.

"We got a call from the female victim that (Christensen) returned," Hall said. The woman and her children fled before officers arrived but police believed Christensen was armed and still inside, Hall said. He also had felony warrants out of Oregon, Hall said.

Jerome County sheriff's deputies, Idaho State Police and a K-9 team from the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office arrived to help after the man refused to come out, Hall said. Law enforcement again challenged Christensen to come out once the other agencies arrived, but he would not, Hall said.

"We deployed the K-9 team, the dog found him and he was taken into custody," he said. Christensen was arrested at 11:04 a.m., Hall said. He was found with a handgun and was charged with domestic battery, resisting and obstructing police, and being a felon in possession of a firearm.

ing to an ISP report. Astle pulled out from a stop sign and was struck on the driver's side by Noriega's truck. Both vehicles came to rest on the southwest side of the intersection. Brody Astle and his passenger, Cooper Astle, 16, were transported to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center. Neither teen was wearing a seatbelt, the report said, though Noriega was. Alcohol does not appear to be a factor in the crash and ISP is still investigating it, the report said.

South Central Community Action Partnership is one of a handful of organizations in Idaho that offers weatherization assistance for Magic Valley residents. The program seeks to improve how a house is heated while also minimizing how much heat is lost within that home by replacing leaky doors or windows. However, the federally funded program is facing potentially severe budget cuts for fiscal year 2013. This would reduce the number of families that could be serviced in the Magic Valley. On Thursday, Ken Robinette, SCCAP's executive director, is flying to Washington D.C. to meet with White House officials and discuss the importance of the weatherization program in Idaho and across the nation. "If we don't get the funding, we'll have to reorganize how we operate the program and probably let some staff go," he said. "It'll have a snowball effect on the whole community." Typically, the Department of Energy allocates \$250 million to fund the program. This year, Congress is considering cutting the budget to \$68 million. Under the American Recovery and Restoration Act, the weatherization program's budget was increased

- to \$5 billion across the nation. Idaho was quick to use stimulus money on the program but more than half of all the states didn't spend all their allotted amount in the three-year time span, Robinette said. As a consequence, Congress proposed cutting the majority of the program's funding. Here in the Magic Valley, there are more than 1,200 interested applicants vying for a spot in the program. Robinette said the waiting list is up to eight years for some qualified applicants. "We try to use local contractors as much as possible when we go in and install new heating systems," he said. "I've had contractors tell me that we helped keep some of their staff employed."

# Truck Crashes into Jerome Home

**JEROME** • A Jerome family awoke with a bang early Sunday morning after a pickup truck slammed into their house at about 1 a.m. Jessica Yost, 35, of Jerome was driving the pickup on North Davis Street, near East Main Street, and failed to yield at a stop sign, Jerome Police Chief Dan Hall said. Yost then struck another vehicle, drove through a fence and struck a house in the 500 block of East Main Street, he said. The homeowner, Carla Anderson, a Times-News

correspondent, wrote in an email that there's now a hole in the wall where her son's bed is. The boy was sleeping in the front room of the home that night, and the truck came to rest about four feet from where he slept, she wrote. Hall said it was unclear from the report exactly what happened and why Yost steered the car toward the house. Yost and her passenger were both transported to a hospital, but Hall said it was unclear which one. Citations in the case are pending, Hall said.

# Idaho Controller Exits Intensive Care, Faces Rehab

**BOISE (AP)** • Idaho Controller Donna Jones left the intensive care unit at a Boise hospital this weekend, but faces a long, difficult rehabilitation following a broken neck suffered in a May 25 car accident. The Idaho Statesman on Monday reported that Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter told business leaders at a meeting in Sun Valley that Jones' condition is improving but she faces a long road to recovery.

Jones, Idaho's chief fiscal officer, has had three vertebrae fused, but has moved her arms and feet. For instance, Otter says she kicked a pillow off a bed when she didn't want it there. Otter told the meeting of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry that he continues to have confidence that Jones' office would maintain its standard of quality even in her absence.

# Inmate Calm, Meeting with Lawyers before Execution

**BOISE** • Convicted killer Richard Leavitt was calm and spending what was expected to be his last full day alive meeting with his team of lawyers and a handful of approved visitors at his cell on Idaho's death row, prison officials said Monday.

Leavitt, 53, is scheduled to be put to death this morning by lethal injection at Idaho Maximum Security Institution, south of Boise. He was convicted in 1985 for the brutal stabbing death of Danette Elg, a 31-year-old woman from Blackfoot.

Leavitt, along with members of his family, insists he didn't commit the crime. But barring any last-minute reprieve from federal judges, Leavitt will be just

the second Idaho inmate put to death in 17 years.

He was calm as he met with visitors and lawyers, state prisons spokesman Jeff Ray said. Leavitt declined to disclose the identity of his approved visitors. Ray said Leavitt will have baked chicken, french fries and milk for his last meal.

Tuesday's execution will be different in two ways from the execution last November of Paul Ezra Rhoades.

The state's execution team will administer a single, lethal dose of pentobarbital, a drug used as a surgical sedative. Last fall, Rhoades was given a lethal injection of three chemicals.

If the execution goes forward, it will mark the first time state and media witnesses will view Idaho's lethal injection process in its entirety. Last fall, witnesses

were barred from seeing the execution team escort Rhoades into the chamber, strap him to a gurney and insert the IV catheters into his arms.

Prison officials had blocked that portion of the execution to protect the identity of the execution team members. But more than a dozen news organizations sued the state, alleging that the Idaho Department of Correction policy limiting access to an execution from start to finish violated the First Amendment and the public's right to know.

The news groups, led by The Associated Press, sought to expand access to bring Idaho policies in line with the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which ruled on a 2002 case that the public has a right to

view executions in their entirety. The portion of the execution process blocked by Idaho prison officials has been subject to legal challenges by death row inmates nationwide, claiming the insertion of the catheters can be botched in a way that causes pain, other medical complications and raises questions about the dignity of the process.

On Friday, a three-judge panel from the San Francisco-based court sided with the news groups and ordered IDOC to modify its policy.

The same federal appeals court on Monday rejected two requests by Leavitt's team of lawyers to rehear appeals in his case.

Late Monday, they U.S. Supreme Court rejected a motion Leavitt filed Sunday seeking a stay of the execution.

## IDAHO GETTING \$790K IN DRUG PRICE SETTLEMENT

**BOISE (AP)** • The Attorney General's office says the state of Idaho will collect \$790,000 as part of a legal settlement with Forest Laboratories Inc. over allegations the company overcharged for its drugs.

The state has recovered more than \$21 million in "average wholesale price" settlements with 29 drug manufacturers. Three lawsuits against seven other drug manufacturers that were filed in 2007 are still pending.

In the Forest Lab case, in-

vestigators found that one Celexa pill had a published average wholesale price of 48 cents in 2003 when the actual average wholesale price was 37.6 cents — a 28 percent markup.

Lawrence Wasden's office says just over \$185,000 of the settlement will be deposited into the state's general fund while \$461,000 will be held as an offset to future Medicaid payments.

Forest Laboratories has acknowledged no liability or wrongdoing.

# FEC SUES EX-SEN. CRAIG OVER USE OF CAMPAIGN CASH

**BOISE** • Former Republican U.S. Sen. Larry Craig of Idaho was sued Monday by federal election regulators who contend he misused some \$217,000 in campaign funds for his legal defense after his arrest in a 2007 airport bathroom sex sting.

Federal Election Commission officials said in their complaint filed in U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C., that Craig should repay the money and pay a fine.

The FEC contends the three-term U.S. senator's campaign account, Craig for U.S. Senate, paid at least \$139,952 to the law firm Sutherland, Asbill and Brennan in Washington, D.C., and \$77,032 to Kelly & Jacobson in Minnesota for legal services related to his guilt.

Craig was accused of soliciting sex in a bathroom at the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport in June 2007. An undercover officer said Craig tapped his feet and signaled under a stall divider that he wanted sex.

Craig pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct three months later.

Regulators said the campaign money was converted to personal use because Craig's defense in Minnesota had no connection to his campaign for federal office.

"Mr. Craig used these funds converted from his campaign committee to pay legal expenses he incurred

in connection with his arrest, guilty plea, and subsequent efforts to withdraw his guilty plea in Minnesota," according to the complaint. "These legal costs were not made in connection with his campaign for federal office or for ordinary and necessary expenses incurred in connection with his duties as a senator."

Regulators added "the expenses ... would have existed irrespective of his duties as senator."

The FEC said it was unable to resolve the matter through "informal methods of conference, conciliation and persuasion" with Craig earlier this year.

The commission, which voted 5-0 last month to pursue the lawsuit, is also seeking penalties of up to \$6,500 from the former senator and his treasurer, Kaye O'Riordan.

A call to Craig's lobbying firm, New West Strategies in Washington, D.C., wasn't returned Monday evening.

O'Riordan also didn't return a phone call to her Boise home.

After Craig's guilty plea, he received a sentence of 10 days of jail time and a \$1,000 fine; the jail time and half of the fine were suspended.

After the arrest became public, Craig publicly maintained his innocence and his homosexuality, insisting he only pleaded guilty to keep the embarrassing situation quiet. He initially told a crowd in Boise that he intended to resign, then opted to serve out his term until

January 2009.

In 2008, the Minnesota Court of Appeals rejected Craig's attempt to withdraw his guilty plea.

In January 2009, the three-term senator from Payette, Idaho, decided against asking the Minnesota Supreme Court to void the conviction, marking an end to that phase of his legal wrangling.

According to the FEC complaint, lawyers for Craig wrote in a September 2007 letter to the Senate Ethics Committee that his arrest and conviction were "purely personal conduct unrelated to the performance of official Senate duties."

On Feb. 13, 2008, the Senate Ethics Committee issued a "Public Letter of Admonition" unanimously concluding that, among other matters, Craig hadn't

complied with Senate rules requiring members to seek approval of any payments for "legal expenses" paid with funds of a principal campaign committee.

In its 11-page filing, the FEC also asked a judge to order Craig to pay the agency's expenses in the latest case.

In addition to the money targeted by the FEC complaint, Craig spent thousands more from his campaign fund related to the arrest.

However, the FEC concluded that using the money to pay for representation during a Senate Ethics Committee inquiry and to pay for a public-relations firm to respond to media inquiries regarding his arrest and misdemeanor conviction were permissible uses of campaign funds.

**Mass. Town OKs \$20 Fine for Swearing in Public**

**MIDDLEBOROUGH, Mass. (AP)** • Residents in Middleborough have voted to make the foul-mouthed pay fines for swearing in public.

At a town meeting Monday night, residents voted 183-50 to approve a proposal from the police chief to impose a \$20 fine on public profanity.

Supporters say the proposal isn't meant to censor casual or private conversations, but instead crack down on loud profanity in downtown areas and public parks.

Middleborough has had a bylaw against public profanity since 1968. But it's rarely, if ever, been enforced, because it essentially makes swearing a crime.

The new proposal would decriminalize profanity, allowing police to write tickets as they would for traffic violations.

# Colo. Wildfire Kills 1, Damages Structures

**LAPORTE, Colo.** • Human remains have been found in the burned home of a person reported missing after the start of a massive wildfire that has now burned about 64 square miles in northern Colorado, Larimer County Sheriff Justin Smith said Monday.

The remains are believed to be those of 62-year-old Linda Steadman, Smith said.

Her family had said they couldn't confirm her whereabouts after the fire started Saturday.

Steadman's home received two emergency notifications that appeared to be taken by an answering machine after the fire started, and a firefighter who tried to get past a locked gate to her home to warn her to leave was chased out by flames, Smith said.

Investigators found human remains at the home Monday. Though they haven't been positively identified yet, her family said Steadman died in the cabin she loved.

The fire also has damaged an esti-

mated 118 structures west of Fort Collins and has prompted hundreds of evacuations. Firefighters haven't been determined how many were homes and how many were sheds or

other buildings.

"It's tough. There's very little you can do when someone has lost everything," said Gov. John Hickenlooper, who visited the area Monday.

**Supreme Court Turns Down New Guantanamo Appeals.** The Supreme Court on Monday declined to take a new look at the rights of foreign prisoners held for the past decade at the Guantanamo Bay naval base in Cuba. Four years after pronouncing that detainees who face no charges have a right to challenge their ongoing confinement, the justices rejected appeals arguing that the federal appeals court in Washington has largely ignored the high court's command. The appeals court has not ordered the release of

any detainee and has reversed several lower court release orders.

**Court Refuses to Hear 'Birther' Argument Again.** The Supreme Court has refused to hear an appeal challenging President Barack Obama's U.S. citizenship and his eligibility to serve as commander in chief. Without comment, the high court on Monday refused to hear an appeal from Alan Keyes, Wiley Drake and Markham Robinson. The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled the challengers did not have legal standing to file the lawsuit.

# PENN STATE TRIAL OPENS WITH GRAPHIC TESTIMONY

**BELLEFONTE, Pa.** • Jerry Sandusky's trial in the Penn State scandal opened in graphic fashion Monday with the first witness testifying that the retired coach molested him in the locker-room showers and in hotels while trying to ensure his silence with gifts and trips to bowl games.

The man, now 28 and dubbed Victim 4 in court papers, left nothing to the imagination as he told the jury about the abuse he said he endured for five years beginning when he was a teenager in the late 1990s.

"I've denied it forever," he testified, looking straight at the prosecutor as Sandusky sat motionless nearby.

Sandusky, 68, faces 52 counts that he sexually abused 10 boys over 15 years. The former assistant football coach has denied the allegations. His arrest last year shamed the university and led to the ouster of beloved Hall of Fame coach Joe Paterno and Penn State's president.

In opening statements, prosecutor Joseph McGettigan III told the jury that Sandusky was a "predatory pedophile" who methodically used his youth charity, The Second Mile, to zero in on fatherless children or those with unstable home lives, plied them with gifts and took advantage of them sexually.

Sandusky lawyer Joe Amendola countered that the case is flimsy and that some of the accusers apparently intend to sue and have a financial stake in the case — a preview of the battle to come as the defense tries to undermine the credibility of the young men upon whom the case rests.

Until Monday, none of them had testified publicly, and their identities were shielded. The Associated Press typically doesn't identify people who say they are victims of sex crimes.

Victim 4 spoke calmly and firmly under questioning.

In the car, Sandusky "would put his hand on my leg, basically like I was his girlfriend. ... It freaked me out extremely bad," the man said, extending his arm and pushing it back and forth. "I pushed it away. ... After a little while, it would come right back. That drove me nuts."

The man said he met Sandusky through The Second Mile and that they began showering together in 1997. What began as "soap battles" quickly progressed to oral sex and other contact, the accuser said, adding that he was 90 or 100 pounds and powerless to resist the advances of the much larger man.

According to the witness, Sandusky tried assaulting him in a hotel bathroom before a bowl banquet in Texas and threatened to send him home when he resisted, warning: "You don't want to go back, do you?" Sandusky stopped only when his wife, Dottie, called out from another room, the witness said.

Over the years, the witness said, he never told Sandusky to stop. "It was never talked about, ever," the man said. "It was basically like whatever happened there never really happened."

# Officials: U.S. Commerce Secretary Suffered Seizure

**SAN GABRIEL, Calif.** • Medical records could determine whether U.S. Commerce Secretary John Bryson will be charged in two weekend fender-benders that led to his hospitalization after police found him slumped behind the wheel of his vehicle in the Los Angeles suburbs.

He suffered a seizure Saturday afternoon, Commerce Department officials said Monday, but it wasn't clear whether the medical episode preceded or followed a hit-and-run collision. Bryson had not had a seizure before, said a department official who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss the secretary's medical history.

Bryson has a "limited recall of the events," the official said.

The crashes drew attention because of possible health concerns involving a

member of President Barack Obama's Cabinet, as well as the challenge investigators face when trying to determine if someone should be held criminally responsible because of adverse health.

Bryson, 68, was driving alone in a Lexus in San Gabriel, a community of about 40,000 northeast of Los Angeles, when he struck the rear of a vehicle that had stopped for a passing train, authorities said.

He spoke briefly with the three occupants and then hit their car again as he departed, investigators said. They followed him while calling police.

He was cited for felony hit-and-run, although he has not been charged.

Bryson then struck a second car in the nearby city of Rosemead, where he was found unconscious in his car, authorities said.

Bryson has returned to Washington, Commerce Department spokeswoman Jennifer Friedman said.

White House press secretary Jay

Carney said the administration was gathering information about the incidents.

"We're obviously concerned about the incident, about the health-related issues that played a role in this incident," Carney said.

Officials said Bryson was not on state business and did not have a security detail at the time of the accidents. He was driving a personal car and was given medication to treat the seizure.

Bryson took a Breathalyzer test that didn't detect any alcohol, but investigators were awaiting the results from a blood test, said Los Angeles County sheriff's Capt. Mike Parker.

Two people in the first collision were treated by paramedics, authorities said. A couple involved in the second crash declined medical aid.

The case was being reviewed by sheriff's investigators and will likely be submitted to prosecutors in the coming days.

# Ahmadinejad Wounded but Wily in Final Year

Iran's president hardly seemed like a fading political force at a security summit in Beijing last week. Leaders from China and Russia carved out time to hold private talks with Mahmoud Ahmadinejad and gave him center stage to unleash his pet theories about the unraveling of Western power.

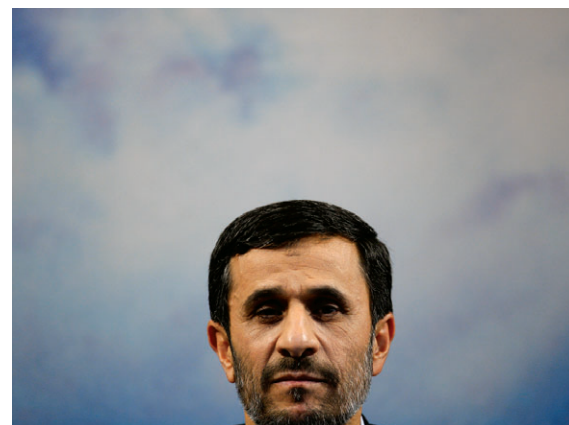
But Ahmadinejad always seems to catch a second wind on the road. It's at home where his political wounds are most visible and his expiration date is already factored into high-stakes calculations.

The one-time favored son of Iran's theocracy — its flame-

throwing populist in a common man's wind breaker or bureaucrat's off-the-rack suit — is now limping into his last year in office sharply weakened and in the unexpected position as an outcast among hard-liners.

"It may be hard to believe for those who just pay attention to the theatrics of Iranian politics, but Ahmadinejad has emerged — somewhat by process of elimination — as something of a moderate in relation to the archconservatives in the ruling system," said Salman Shaikh, director of The Brookings Doha Center in Qatar.

"The reformers and opposition have been crushed or silenced," he added. "That leaves Ahmadinejad and his big political ego."

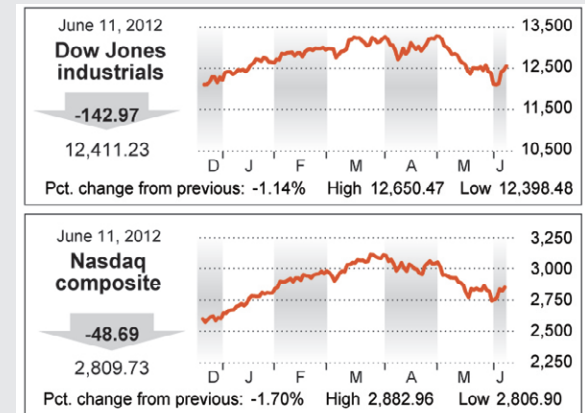

**UnitedHealth Plans to Keep Overhaul Elements**

Insurer UnitedHealth Group Inc. sees some parts of the health care overhaul as sound medicine and plans to keep them even if the law fails to survive an upcoming Supreme Court ruling. The nation's largest health insurer said Monday that it will still cover preventive care like immunizations without charging a co-payment and it will continue other popular, initial provisions of the law.

The overhaul, which aims to provide coverage for millions of uninsured people, started unfolding in 2010 after health insurers fought bitterly to block its passage. Challenges to the law from states and other groups opposed to it wound their way through the court system to the Supreme Court.

**Apple Kicks Google Maps off iPhone, Adds Facebook**

**SAN FRANCISCO** • Steve Jobs' vendetta against Google remains alive, eight months after the Apple co-founder died feeling betrayed by a company he once embraced as an ally.

Apple is escalating the feud between two of the world's most influential companies by dumping Google's mapping service as a built-in feature on most iPhones and iPads. Apple is also making it easier for users of those devices to share their lives on Facebook instead of Google's competing social network.

The snubs are part of an upgraded mobile operating system that Apple previewed Monday to kick off its 23rd annual developers conference in San Francisco.

Google's mapping service will be replaced by an Apple-designed alternative when the new software for mobile devices, iOS 6, is released this fall. Those who want to continue using Google Maps will have to go through additional hurdle, such as finding and installing its app.

It represents a major blow for Google Inc., which stands to lose mobile advertising revenue and valuable insights about people's whereabouts if users of the popular iPhone and iPad devices switch to Apple's mapping service.

Apple and Google are locked in a fight for the attention of hundreds of millions of mobile device users. The battle has been building since Google's 2008 release of its Android operating system to compete against the iPhone.

Android smartphones from companies such as Samsung Electronics Co. and Google's own Motorola division are the chief alternatives to the iPhone. Apple has sued those manufacturers, accusing them of ripping off the iPhone's ground-breaking features.

Google's Maps application has resided on the iPhone since the device's 2007 debut. At that time, the companies were so close that Eric Schmidt, then Google's CEO, appeared on stage with Jobs to hail their kinship.

Android destroyed the relationship. Before he died last October, Jobs told his biographer, Walter Isaacson, that he viewed Android as a form of "grand theft" from Apple and declared "thermonuclear war" against his former ally.

"This is a slap in Google's face," said Tim Bajarin, a Creative Strategies analyst who got to know Jobs well during his 32 years following the company. "I don't think Apple is ever going to be able to bury Android, but this is making it clear that they aren't going to send any more ad revenue Google's way, if at all possible."

Apple updates its iOS software every year, to coincide with the launch of a new iPhone. Google is scheduled to show off the latest developments in Android at a conference that will be held at the same San Francisco venue beginning June 27.

**Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency Agrees to Buy City Parking Lot**

**TWIN FALLS** • The Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency's board unanimously voted Monday to purchase a parking lot at 156 3rd Ave. N. from the city.

The lot, known as the "Brown" parking lot, was declared surplus by the city, said URA Executive Director Melinda Anderson. Out of 36 spots only 14 are leased and only six or seven cars park in the lot each day, she said.

The URA will buy the lot from the city for \$57,800. According to Anderson, the lot was appraised to be worth \$55,000, and the city paid \$2,800 for the appraisal.

Since the purchase was agreed to, URA staff will now look to developers for ideas on how to turn the lot into a more useful component to the downtown area.

An ad will be placed in the Times-News asking developers to contact Anderson. They'll have 30 days to submit proposals, she said.

URA members also voted to approve the sale of the former Kruzer's site at the 100 block of Shoshone Street to Uptown Developers LLC for construction of Glanbia's new three-story office building and cheese innovation center.

All members voted in favor of the sale except Bill Koch, who abstained because of a conflict of interest.

The agreed price for the property was \$100. The URA plans to invest up to \$1.25 million to install necessary public infrastructure and for future development.

The \$1.25 million represents about 10 percent of the expected private investment of \$10 million to \$15 million, Anderson said.

According to a statement released by Anderson, the money will be returned over a 10-year period through tax-increment financing, which collects the increase in assessed property tax value generated by new development such as the Glanbia facilities.

The office building and cheese innovation center will move about 150 professional and research staff into the downtown area, according to the statement.

The meeting marked the last for longtime URA members Tom Frank and Bill Koch. Each was honored with a plaque, thank-you card and a standing ovation by those in attendance.

"They've asked good questions and have done great things," said Chairman Gary Garnand. "They will truly be missed."

**SPAIN BANK RESCUE GLEE MORPHS INTO MARKETS ROUT**

**MADRID** • Euphoria over a lifeline of up to €100 billion (\$125 billion) to rescue Spain's hurting banks morphed into a financial markets rout in a matter of hours Monday, as investors digested the still-undefined plan and became concerned the country may be unable to repay the new loans.

The rate on Spanish 10-year bonds — a measure of market trust in a country's ability to repay

debt — rose to an alarmingly high yield of 6.47 percent at the close of trading after falling to 6 percent in the morning. And the benchmark IBEX-35 stock index closed down 0.5 percent after surging 6 percent in the morning.

Overshadowing Spain's acceptance over the weekend of a bailout for banks burdened with toxic property assets and loans are Greek elections next weekend and concerns that the anti-bailout left-wing party Syriza could become the largest party in parliament.

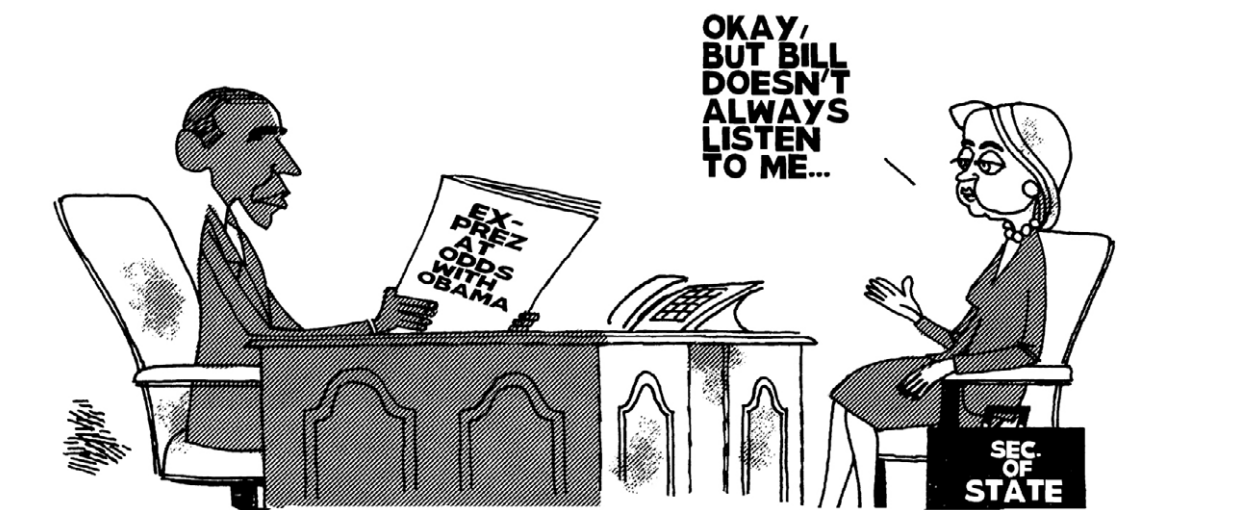
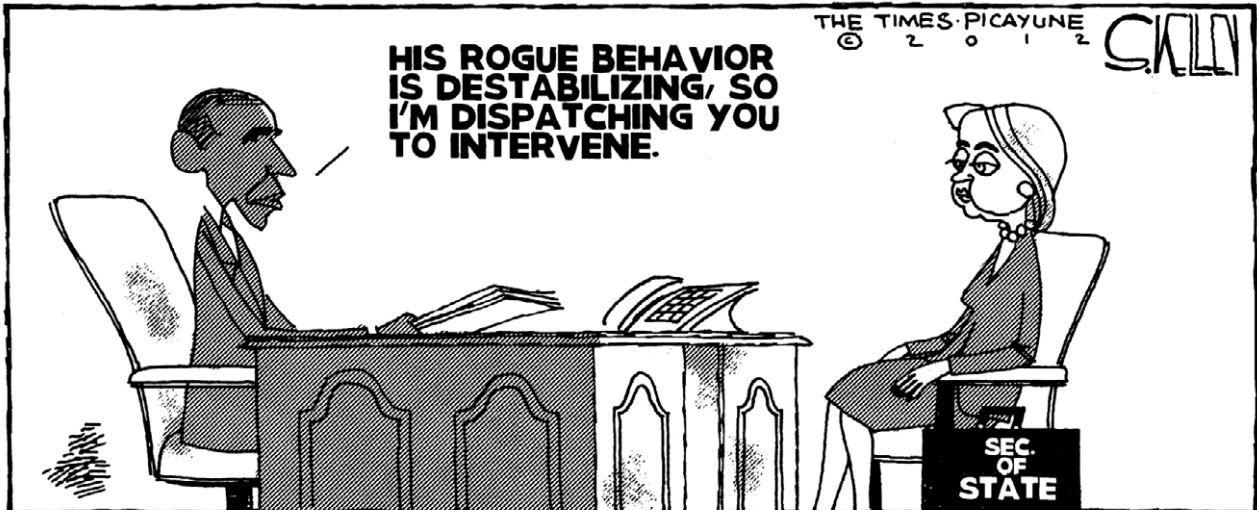

## Facebook Meets Brick-and-Mortar Politics

I had just finished a panel discussion on Turkey and the Arab Spring at a regional conference here, and, as I was leaving, a young Egyptian woman approached me. "Mr. Friedman, could I ask you a question? Who should I vote for?"



I thought: "Why is she asking me about Obama and Romney?" No, no, she explained. It was her Egyptian election next week that she was asking about. Should she vote for Mohamed Morsi, the candidate of the Islamist Muslim Brotherhood, or Ahmed Shafiq, a retired general who served as Hosni Mubarak's last prime minister and was running as a secular law-and-order candidate? My heart went out to her. As Egyptian democracy activists say: It's like having to choose between two diseases. How sad that 18 months after a democratic revolution, Egyptians have been left with a choice between a candidate anchored in 1952, when Egypt's military seized power, and a candidate anchored in 622, when the Prophet Muhammad gave birth to Islam. What happened to the "Facebook Revolution"?

As an Egyptian friend observed, "Facebook really helped people to communicate, but not to collaborate." No doubt Facebook helped a certain educated class of Egyptians to spread the word about the Tahrir Revolution. Ditto Twitter. But, at the end of the day, politics always comes down to two very old things: leadership and the ability to get stuff done. And when it came to those, both the Egyptian Army and the Muslim Brotherhood, two old "brick and mortar" movements, were much more adept than the Facebook generation of secular progressives and moderate Islamists - whose candidates together won more votes than Morsi and Shafiq combined in the first round of voting but failed to make the runoff because they divided their votes among competing candidates who would not align.

many new and compelling voices to light. At their best, they're changing the nature of political communication and news. But, at their worst, they can become addictive substitutes for real action. How often have you heard lately: "Oh, I tweeted about that." Or "I posted that on my Facebook page." Really? In most cases, that's about as impactful as firing a mortar into the Milky Way galaxy. Unless you get out of Facebook and into someone's face, you really have not acted. And, as Syria's vicious regime is also reminding us: "bang-bang" beats "tweet-tweet" every day of the week.

Commenting on Egypt's incredibly brave Facebook generation rebels, the political scientist Frank Fukuyama recently wrote: "They could organize protests and demonstrations, and act with often reckless courage to challenge the old regime. But they could not go on to rally around a single candidate, and then engage in the slow, dull, grinding work of organizing a political party that could contest an election, district by district. ... Facebook, it seems, produces a sharp, blinding flash in the pan, but it does not generate enough heat over an extended period to warm the house."

Actually, Facebook is having a bad week - in the stock market and the ideas market.

To be sure, Facebook, Twitter and blogging are truly revolutionary tools of communication and expression that have brought so

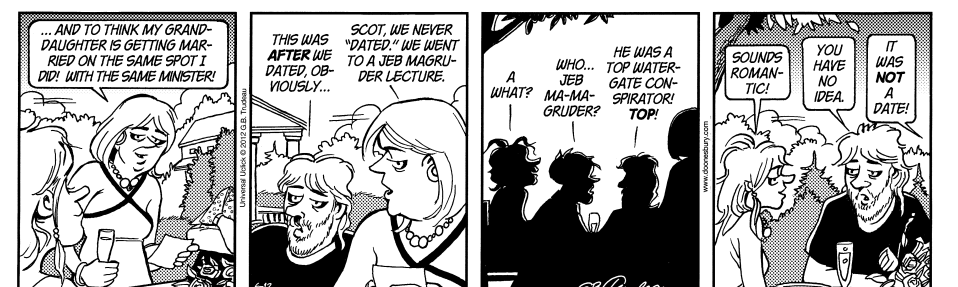

Mother of 19-year-old Killed by Border Patrol Sues

PHOENIX • The mother of a 19-year-old man fatally shot in the back by a U.S. Border Patrol agent has sued the federal government and the agent himself, claiming it was "an appalling use of excessive force" because her son was unarmed, had his back to the agent and posed no threat.

Guadalupe Guerrero said Monday that the Border Patrol had no right to take her son's life, even if he had marijuana in his truck as they say — though she disputed the allegation.

A Border Patrol agent identified by police as Lucas Tidwell shot Carlos La Madrid three times — twice in the back and once in the thigh — as he climbed a ladder on the U.S.-Mexico border fence in southeastern Arizona on March 21, 2011.

The Arizona man, who did not have a weapon, fell to the ground and died about five hours later at a hospital.

"Why did they kill him? Who are they to play God?" Guerrero said in Spanish on what would have been her son's 21st birthday.

The family was spending the day at the cemetery where he is buried in Douglas. He was born there nearly 10 years after his mother came to the U.S. from Agua Prieta in the northeastern Mexican state of Sonora.

"I say he didn't have drugs, but let's suppose he did," Guerrero said. "Let's suppose he had 40 pounds of marijuana. You think that's dangerous enough to kill a young boy, an American citizen? Why not send him to jail?"

Border Patrol spokesman Mario Escalante declined to talk about the case, citing the pending litigation. A message left for Tidwell in Las Cruces, N.M., was not immediately returned Monday.

It's unclear whether Tidwell still is a Border Patrol agent.

Although the amount of money that Guerrero is seeking was not listed in two lawsuits against the government and the agent, both filed last month, Guerrero said she wants to use the money to start a nonprofit to help poor children.

"That's the only thing the United States government cares about — money," she said.

She said that La Madrid's two younger siblings, his grandmother and the rest of the family have been devastated by his death. She said he was studying agriculture in college in hopes of having his own farm.

A police report obtained by the AP in November from the Cochise County Sheriff's Office shows that Douglas police officers were responding to a tip about a car loading drugs when they tried to stop La Madrid and another teen, 17-year-old Jesus Manuel Chino Lino.

# Fight Over Sheep Continues in Idaho Federal Court

**BOISE** • With domestic sheep due to be released on rangeland near Idaho's Hell's Canyon next month, the U.S. Forest Service and environmentalists are back in federal court this week to argue over whether the grazing plan is legal.

Wednesday's hearing before U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill in Boise is the latest theater in the fight over how best to protect wild bighorn sheep from deadly lung disease that scientists say is transmitted by their domestic cousins. Ranchers view grazing closures as a threat to their livelihood.

Last year, the Payette National Forest closed 54,000 acres to grazing, to separate the species.

Earlier this year, however, Regional Forester Harv Forsgren in Ogden, Utah, delayed shuttering another 7,700 acres in 2012, citing a congressional edict pushed through in December by U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Idaho, on behalf of sheep ranchers to halt closures for at least a year.

Craig Gehrke, the Wilderness Society's Idaho director, contends Forsgren ignored the Payette National Forest's own recommendations to continue closures and instead caved in to Simpson, the powerful leader of a House budget panel that oversees the Forest Service's annual spending.

"Somebody in the regional office or Washington, D.C., threw the Payette National Forest under the bus because they didn't want to anger the Appropriations subcommittee chairman," Gehrke said Monday.

Winmill is expected to rule soon on environmentalists' demands to continue

closures, with sheep due to be turned out next month.

Under a 2010 Payette National Forest plan, grazing allotments were to be reduced 70 percent by 2013, or some 70,000 acres, near Hell's Canyon. Once complete, it would protect some 94 percent of bighorn habitat in the forest.

Ranchers including the Soulen Livestock Co., owned by relatives of Lt. Gov. Brad Little whose grazing allotments were set to be impacted in 2012, fear these burgeoning restrictions will cripple their industry.

Last December, Simpson, on behalf of the Idaho Wool Growers' Association, inserted a provision, or "rider," into the Forest Service's 2012 budget forbidding the agency from spending money on grazing reductions beyond those already in place on July 1, 2011.

Via a Freedom of Information Act request, however, Gehrke uncovered documents showing how Payette National Forest leaders argued the closures should continue as planned, despite Simpson's measure.

In a memo dated Jan. 6, Payette National Forest Supervisor Keith Lannom described to Forsgren how his employees had begun implementing the grazing restrictions long before Simpson's deadline.

"Permittees were notified of the decision to reduce grazing prior to July 1, 2011. ... All of the permit modifications were issued prior to July 1, 2011," Lannom wrote. "The Forest recommends continued implementation?"

**Rafael Nadal Rolls Lucky Seven in Paris**

**PARIS** • Rafael Nadal was worried.

A guy so unflinching, so nearly unbeatable, while sliding and grinding and pounding his way past opponent after opponent at the French Open, got a real case of nerves during the 18 hours he and Novak Djokovic waited for the restart of their rain-interrupted final at Roland Garros.

Instead of focusing on how close he was to winning a record seventh French Open championship, Nadal grew increasingly wary of the other possible outcome: a loss in a fourth consecutive Grand Slam final against Djokovic, who was trying to become the first man since 1969 to collect four straight major titles.

When play was halted by showers on Sunday, Nadal was clinging to an ever-shrinking lead. It wasn't until a few minutes before setting foot back on Court Philippe Chatrier, his favorite arena at his favorite tournament on his favorite surface, that Nadal set aside his anxiety. Oh, did he. The King of Clay overwhelmed the No.1-ranked Djokovic for the 50 minutes and nine

games they played Monday, wrapping up a 6-4, 6-3, 2-6, 7-5 victory that allowed Nadal to earn French Open trophy No. 7, breaking a tie with Bjorn Borg.

"You never know if you're going to win another one," said the second-ranked Nadal, who now owns 11 Grand Slam titles.

"I don't know if I am the best or not," he added. "I am not the right one to say that."

Djokovic, for his part, had zero doubts. He worked his way back into the match with an eight-game run when it was pouring Sunday, but otherwise was outplayed, at the start and the finish.

"He's definitely (the) best player in history ... on this surface," said Djokovic, whose 27-match Grand Slam winning streak ended, "and results are showing that he's one of the best ever."

Can't argue with that. Since his French Open debut at age 18 in May 2005, Nadal is 52-1 for his career at the tournament, the only loss coming to Robin Soderling in the fourth round in 2009. He's just as good elsewhere on clay, too: Nadal's won eight titles at Monte Carlo, seven at Barcelona, six at Rome.

with four RBIs, while Trel Dowd had three hits and three RBIs. Casey Merritt and Zayne Slotten had multi-RBI games.

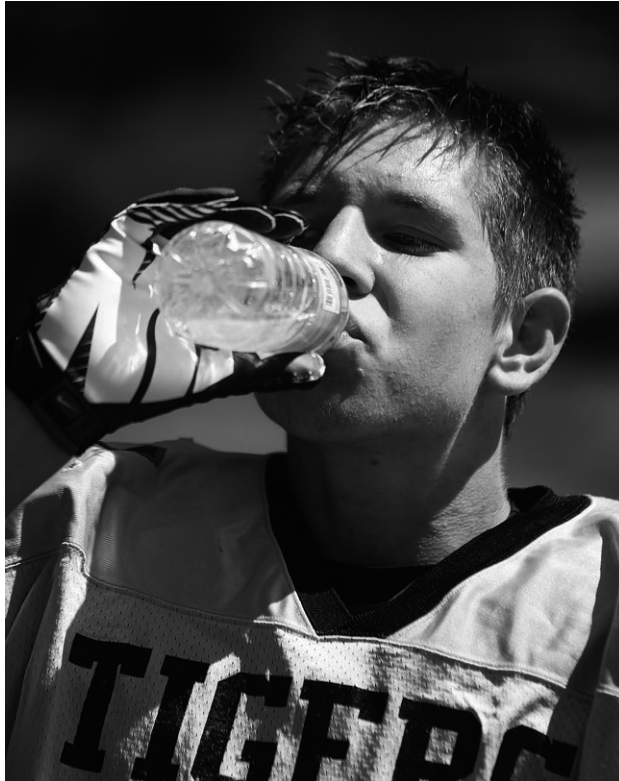

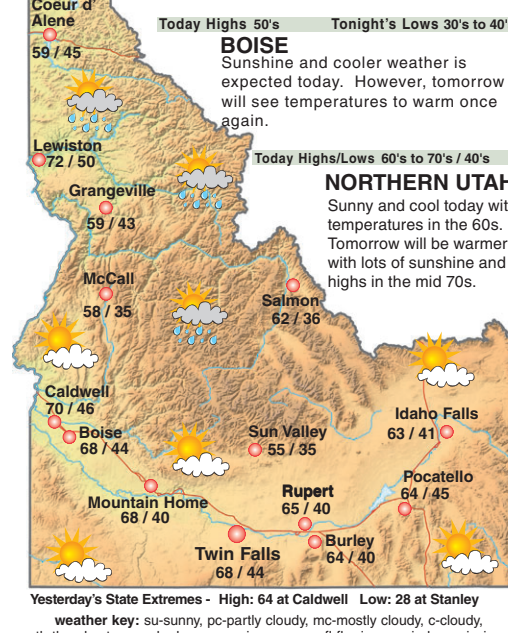

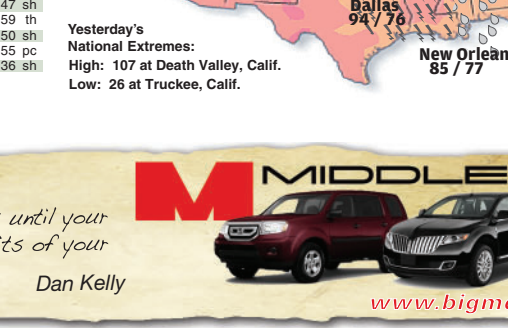

### On this date:

In 1665, England installed a municipal government in New York, formerly the Dutch settlement of New Amsterdam.

In 1776, Virginia's colonial legislature became the first to adopt a Bill of Rights.

In 1898, Philippine nationalists declared independence from Spain.

In 1920, the Republican national convention, meeting in Chicago, nominated Warren G. Harding for president on the tenth ballot; Calvin Coolidge was nominated for vice president.

In 1939, the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum was dedicated in Cooperstown, N.Y.

In 1956, the Flag of the United States Army was officially adopted under an executive order signed by President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

In 1963, civil rights leader Medgar Evers, 37, was shot and killed outside his home in Jackson, Miss. (In 1994, Byron De La Beckwith was convicted of murdering Evers and sentenced to life in prison; he died in 2001.)

In 1967, the Supreme Court, in Loving v. Virginia, struck down state laws prohibiting interracial marriages.

In 1972, the notorious porn film "Deep Throat," starring Linda Lovelace, opened in New York. (The title would become the nickname of a deep background source for The Washington Post during the Watergate scandal, later revealed to be then-FBI Associate Director Mark Felt.) Death claimed literary critic Edmund Wilson at age 77 and community organizer Saul Alinsky at age 63.

In 1982, a crowd estimated at up to 1 million people gathered in New York's Central Park to demand a super-power freeze on nuclear weapons.

In 1987, President Ronald Reagan, during a visit to the divided German city of Berlin, publicly challenged Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev to "tear down this wall."

In 1991, Russians went to the polls to elect Boris N. Yeltsin president of their republic.

Ten years ago: The Los Angeles Lakers finished off the New Jersey Nets in four games, winning their third straight NBA title with a 113-107 victory. Fashion designer Bill Blass died at his Connecticut home at age 79.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush went to Capitol Hill, where he prodded rebellious Senate Republicans to help resurrect legislation that could provide eventual citizenship for millions of illegal immigrants. Afghan police mistook U.S. troops for Taliban fighters and opened fire, prompting U.S. forces to return fire, killing seven Afghan police officers. Justin Verlander pitched a no-hitter to lead the Detroit Tigers over the Milwaukee Brewers 4-0. Don Herbert, television's "Mr. Wizard," died in Bell Canyon, Calif., at age 89.

One year ago: The Dallas Mavericks won their first NBA title by winning Game 6 of the finals against the Miami Heat, 105-95. "The Book of Mormon" took home nine Tony Awards, including the prize for best musical; "War Horse" won five Tonys, including the best play award.

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

The 1st World Mind Sports Games included three youth categories: Under 28, Under 26 and Under 21. The International Mind Sports Association was the brainchild of former World Bridge Federation President Jose Damiani. The hope is that Mind Sports will form a separate Olympic category.

In the Under-28 category Steven de Donder of Belgium had to deal with a tiresome trump break in his contract of four spades. West led a diamond to East's ace. Back came a heart, taken in hand. Given a reasonable trump break, 11 tricks seem like plain sailing. Even if one defender holds four spades to the jack, 10 tricks would still be there with the minimum of inconvenience.

But when de Donder cashed the spade ace, the 5-0 break meant that even game was in danger. However, he handled it like a veteran: He played a second diamond, won the heart return, then took the club king and ace, and cashed the diamond queen, discarding his heart nine from hand. On the diamond jack, which followed, East chose to ruff — and South overruffed. (It doesn't help if East discards his last non-trump — a club — because then declarer pitches his last heart.) In the three-card ending, declarer has a high and low spade and the heart queen, dummy holds the spade 10-5 and a heart, and East has the spade J-9-8. De Donder exited with his heart, and East was forced to ruff, thus leaving himself endplayed in trumps.

It takes an initial heart lead to defeat four spades.

ANSWER: It is a little tempting to bid more than two spades here, but your partner's double, while not in the balancing seat, does not necessarily promise a great hand. With a doubleton heart and an opening hand, he should double here, in what has been referred to as the "pre-balancing" seat. In other words, he assumes that his LHO will pass two hearts, and balances in expectation of that.



# Inmate Calm, Meeting with Lawyers before Execution

**BOISE** • Convicted killer Richard Leavitt was calm and spending what was expected to be his last full day alive meeting with his team of lawyers and a handful of approved visitors at his cell on Idaho's death row, prison officials said Monday.

Leavitt, 53, is scheduled to be put to death this morning by lethal injection at Idaho Maximum Security Institution, south of Boise. He was convicted in 1985 for the brutal stabbing death of Danette Elg, a 31-year-old woman from Blackfoot.

Leavitt, along with members of his family, insists he didn't commit the crime. But barring any last-minute reprieve from federal judges, Leavitt will be just the sec-

ond Idaho inmate put to death in 17 years.

He was calm as he met with visitors and lawyers, state prisons spokesman Jeff Ray said. Leavitt declined to disclose the identity of his approved visitors. Ray said Leavitt will have baked chicken, french fries and milk for his last meal.

Tuesday's execution will be different in two ways from the execution last November of Paul Ezra Rhoades.

The state's execution team will administer a single, lethal dose of pentobarbital, a drug used as a surgical sedative. Last fall, Rhoades was given a lethal injection of three chemicals.

If the execution goes forward, it will mark the first time state and media witnesses will view Idaho's lethal injection process in its entire-

ty. Last fall, witnesses were barred from seeing the execution team escort Rhoades into the chamber, strap him to a gurney and insert the IV catheters into his arms.

Prison officials had blocked that portion of the execution to protect the identity of the execution team members. But more than a dozen news organizations sued the state, alleging that the Idaho Department of Correction policy limiting access to an execution from start to finish violated the First Amendment and the public's right to know.

The news groups, led by The Associated Press, sought to expand access to bring Idaho policies in line with the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which ruled on a 2002 case that the public has a right to view executions in

their entirety. The portion of the execution process blocked by Idaho prison officials has been subject to legal challenges by death row inmates nationwide, claiming the insertion of the catheters can be botched in a way that causes pain, other medical complications and raises questions about the dignity of the process.

On Friday, a three-judge panel from the San Francisco-based court sided with the news groups and ordered IDOC to modify its policy.

The same federal appeals court on Monday rejected two requests by Leavitt's team of lawyers to rehear appeals in his case.

Late Monday, they U.S. Supreme Court rejected a motion Leavitt filed Sunday seeking a stay of the execution.

# FEC SUES EX-SEN. CRAIG OVER USE OF CAMPAIGN CASH

**BOISE** • Former Republican U.S. Sen. Larry Craig of Idaho was sued Monday by federal election regulators who contend he misused some \$217,000 in campaign funds for his legal defense after his arrest in a 2007 airport bathroom sex sting.

Federal Election Commission officials said in their complaint filed in U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C., that Craig should repay the money and pay a fine.

The FEC contends the three-term U.S. senator's campaign account, Craig for U.S. Senate, paid at least \$139,952 to the law firm Sutherland, Asbill and Brennan in Washington, D.C., and \$77,032 to Kelly & Jacobson in Minnesota for legal services related to his guilt.

Craig was accused of soliciting sex in a bathroom at the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport in June 2007. An undercover officer said Craig tapped his feet and signaled under a stall divider that he wanted sex.

Craig pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct three months later.

Regulators said the campaign money was converted to personal use because

Craig's defense in Minnesota had no connection to his campaign for federal office.

"Mr. Craig used these funds converted from his campaign committee to pay legal expenses he incurred in connection with his arrest, guilty plea, and subsequent efforts to withdraw his guilty plea in Minnesota," according to the complaint. "These legal costs were not made in connection with his campaign for federal office or for ordinary and necessary expenses incurred in connection with his duties as a senator."

Regulators added "the expenses ... would have existed irrespective of his duties as senator."

The FEC said it was unable to resolve the matter through "informal methods of conference, conciliation and persuasion" with Craig earlier this year.

The commission, which voted 5-0 last month to pursue the lawsuit, is also seeking penalties of up to \$6,500 from the former senator and his treasurer, Kaye O'Riordan.

A call to Craig's lobbying firm, New West Strategies in Washington, D.C., wasn't returned Monday evening.

O'Riordan also didn't return a phone call to her Boise home.

After Craig's guilty plea, he received a sentence of 10 days of jail time and a \$1,000 fine; the jail time and half of the fine were suspended.

After the arrest became public, Craig publicly maintained his innocence and his heterosexuality, insisting he only pleaded guilty to keep the embarrassing situation quiet. He initially told a crowd in Boise that he intended to resign, then opted to serve out his term until January 2009.

In 2008, the Minnesota Court of Appeals rejected Craig's attempt to withdraw his guilty plea.

In January 2009, the three-term senator from Payette, Idaho, decided against asking the Minnesota Supreme Court to void the conviction, marking an end to that phase of his legal wrangling.

According to the FEC

complaint, lawyers for Craig wrote in a September 2007 letter to the Senate Ethics Committee that his arrest and conviction were "purely personal conduct unrelated to the performance of official Senate duties."

On Feb. 13, 2008, the Senate Ethics Committee issued a "Public Letter of Admonition" unanimously concluding that, among other matters, Craig hadn't complied with Senate rules requiring members to seek approval of any payments for "legal expenses" paid with funds of a principal campaign committee.

In its 11-page filing, the FEC also asked a judge to order Craig to pay the agency's expenses in the latest case.

In addition to the money targeted by the FEC complaint, Craig spent thousands more from his campaign fund related to the arrest.

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
