# Idaho Executes Inmate for Murder

**BOISE** • The six correctional officers, wearing surgical masks and stationed three to a side like pallbearers, lifted the inmate off the gurney and strapped him to the execution table inside the Idaho state prison on Tuesday.

Others attached intravenous lines to Richard Leavitt's arms and electrodes to the convicted killer's chest and stomach to measure his breathing and heart rate.

A week ago, no one aside from the prison officials would have seen the state's lethal injection process in its entirety. But a federal judge ordered it open, siding with more than a dozen Idaho news groups, including The Associated Press, who sued in federal



Those first steps — including the insertion of the IV lines that  ${\bf r}$ deliver the lethal chemicals have become increasingly controversial in recent years as opponents question the efficacy of the lethal drug cocktail and the training of the execution team.

Proponents counter that lethal injection is a painless and efficient way to put someone to death.

# Interest in Twin Falls Parking Meters Turns Sentimental

TWIN FALLS • After years of being treated like a pain in the neck, Twin Falls' retired parking meters are now in high demand.

Just hours after Twin Falls City Council voted to remove downtown's parking meters, questions began trickling in from Facebook asking how individuals could get one of the parking meters. By Tuesday, city staffers began taking a list of names of people who called in looking to snag a piece of history.

"I didn't know anyone would that be interested in them," said Councilman Shawn Barigar. "But I've had a lot of people ask me how they could get one."

City officials began removing the parking meters Tuesday afternoon. The removal project will

take several weeks as workers must remove the poles and fill in the holes with concrete.

In the meantime, city staff has 30 days to come up with possible recommendations on what to do with parking meters.

One option may be to donate the meters to the Twin Falls Community Foundation, Barigar said. Donating them to the foundation would allow it to auction the meters in a fundraiser.

However, the city may decide to sell the meters itselfe to the

"It's one of those things where we're still waiting to make a decision," Barigar said.

# Martin Accuses Twin Falls Co. of Gerrymandering

TWIN FALLS • Nearly a month after the primary elections, precinct boundary lines in Twin Falls County are getting extra scrutiny.

Rick Martin filed a petition against Twin Falls County alleging that county officials gerrymandered precinct boundaries to keep him out of a Republican precinct committeeman position. In the petition, he asks the county to redraw those boundaries.

Previously, Martin lived in the Deep Creek precinct, located in the northwest corner of Twin Falls County. After commissioners approved new boundaries on Feb. 22, he ended up in the Castleford precinct with incumbent Republican precinct committeeman Terry

In his petition, Martin alleges Twin Falls County Clerk Kristina Glascock and County Prosecutor Grant Loebs influenced the precinct boundaries to move him out of Deep Creek and into Castleford so he would lose his race.

# **DNA Confirms Lost** Pup is a Wild Wolf

KETCHUM • Wildlife officials confirmed that a lost pup picked up outside Ketchum is a wild wolf.

Out-of-town campers found the pup on May 25 and took it to a vet clinic thinking it was a domestic puppy. While officials thought the male puppy looked like a wolf, a DNA test result verified it this week.

Idaho Department of Fish and Game officials have been unable to find the pup's pack. The pup is

now being temporarily held at Zoo Boise until officials can find a suitable home accredited by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums.

The pup's health has improved since it first arrived at the zoo.

As a reminder, Fish and Game asks people to leave young animals alone in the wild. This pup was probably moving with the pack, but a possible traffic disturbance might have split it away from the rest of the pack.

# **IDAHO POWER CREWS** HELP SAVE LIFE

HAGERMAN • Idaho Power work crews came across more than just downed power lines during last week's massive windstorm.

While repairing power line damage caused by the storm, a five-person line crew arrived at a job site near Hagerman during the evening of June 5. While working on the line, Apprentice Lineman Kade Searle spotted a man lying on the ground with several people around him, according to an Idaho Power news release.

When Searle learned that the man wasn't breathing, he grabbed a CPR kit and called to his coworkers. Idaho Power reports that the team immediately started doing chest compressions and provided breath support for the 37-year-old man.

Tim Peterson, Hagerman Rural Fire chief, was one of the emergency responders who arrived on the scene while the Idaho Power crews were waiting for an embulance. While he declined to release the name of the Hagerman resident, Peterson said that the man was transported to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center.

The man should be released by the end of this week, Peterson said.

"It makes us feel good when we respond to these types of incidents and the guy survives, most of the time that doesn't happen,"

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# Buhl Council, Chamber Work on RV Park

**BUHL** • The Buhl Chamber of Commerce hopes accommodations at a proposed RV park will lure sleepy drivers to pull over for the evening instead of simply driving on through town.

The Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation recently awarded the city and chamber an \$80,200 grant to construct a recreational vehicle parking area.

During Monday's City Council meeting, the council held a public hearing and then approved amending its budget for the project, as the funds have to pass through city's accounting records.

Chamber Board President

Rick Stoltenburg told the Times-News the city signed a memorandum of understanding earlier this year giving the chamber permission to build the RV park on property the nonprofit organization leases from the

The RV park will be built to the west of the chamber office and feature four spots with water and electricity. It will be available for yearround use, depending on weather. The chamber plans on volunteers and donations of in-kind labor and materials to complete the project within budget.

The chamber expects pro-

posed nightly fees of \$20 to \$25 a night will offset ongoing maintenance and administration costs.

In other Monday business, the city is investigating whether it has ordinances pertaining to the cleanliness of sidewalks.

Councilwoman Pam Mc-Clain said "misunderstanding" leads to many business owners believing it is the city's responsibility to clean sidewalks, which are actually private property.

City staff will investigate any standing ordinance and the issue will be further vetted at an upcoming council meeting.

SCPHD is working with the CSI Dental Assisting Program to offer reduced rate dental services for children ages 6-14. The clinic will run from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at the dental clinic at CSI's Health Science and Human Services building, 397 North College Road.

The clinic will charge \$5

per quadrant, with a maximum cost of \$20.

Health officials encourage children to get sealants because they are an effective way to prevent tooth decay in molars. The chewing surfaces of molars have deep grooves where bacteria hide. The plastic coating from a sealant helps protect teeth from the bacteria that don't

get brushed away with a toothbrush.

"Placing sealants is painless and easy for children," said Susie Beem, dental health program coordinator for SCPHD in a news release. "The tooth is cleaned, conditioned, dried, and painted with the plastic sealant."

In his court filing, Martin alleges that the Deep Creek precinct is oddly shaped and doesn't follow recognizable boundaries or school districts.

That's not a coincidence, Martin said. The change puts him in the Castleford precinct, where he didn't have the name recognition that might have helped him win his election.

"Nobody knew me," Martin said. "I'm a Buhl boy."

Martin has had ongoing conflicts with Loebs, including accusing him of illegally holding two elected offices. In addition to being county prosecutor, Loebs is the Republican Legislative District 24 Chairman – a party position, not a county position. In 2010, the Idaho Attorney General's office issued a letter saying Loebs could legally hold both positions.

Martin stressed he isn't contesting election results or trying to be petty.

"The people have spoken. I'm not contesting that," he said. "... I'm just simply asking for justice."


On Tuesday, Loebs said Martin's latest accusations are baseless, and flatly denied involvement in drawing precinct

boundaries. In an affidavit, Loebs wrote





the new Deep Creek precinct or any other precinct boundaries; That I have never known, nor cared where Rick Martin lives or has lived; That there is no political nor other advantage to me which can accrue from Rick Martin living in one precinct or another; that where he lives is truly irrelevant to me in every respect."



"Nothing that Rick Martin is alleging in his complaint is based in any way on truth," Loebs said Tuesday. "I expect

the judge will conclude that." Idaho counties redrew their precinct boundaries following the 2010 census. Twin Falls County contracted with Riedesel Engineering for its new map, which was then approved by the county commissioners.

education job funding and reserve funding to keep districts whole or to minimize cuts," Willits wrote in an email to the Times-News.

In Jerome, the school district plans to use \$700,000 in reserve funds next year. That's up from about \$100,000 over the past couple of years.

Business Manager Brian Bridwell said the district will have to make some decisions in the future – such as whether to keep using reserve funding, cut jobs or restructure programs.

In Kimberly, Superintendent Kathleen Noh said next year's budget will be "very tight," but the district hasn't used reserve funds yet.

"It's certainly possible,"

# Bankrupt Nampa Broker Sentenced to Prison

CALDWELL (AP) • A former Nampa real estate broker who pleaded guilty to grand theft rather than face trial on allegations he took more than \$400,000 from business clients has been sentenced to 14 years in

Jerry Gunstream, 62, was sentenced Monday in 3rd District Court and must serve a minimum of at least two years. He had sought probation based on his having no previous felony convictions and did not pose a risk to the community.

"The factors that favor prison outweigh the factors that favor probation," Judge Thomas Ryan said. "A penitentiary sentence is appropriate in this case, Mr. Gunstream. That's now your debt to society."

He was credited with 137 days he's served in the Canyon County Jail. His attorney called that self-punishment because Gunstream could have met the \$10,000

"There hasn't been a day that I haven't thought, and cried, and wondered how I could have done what I did," Gunstream said. "How I could have turned my back on everything I stood for, how I could have disgraced my family and ruined my reputation."

Gunstream pleaded guilty

to grand theft in April. He told investigators he transferred money out of tenants' accounts when he needed it to cover his own expenses because his income from real estate sales had declined. He reported \$2.1 million in debt when filing for bank-

His attorney, Alan Coffel, said Gunstream's motive wasn't greed but an "almost biblical" pride.

ruptcy.

"Mr. Gunstream is here before this court facing jail time because he couldn't face the ruination of his business," Coffel said.

Gunstream apologized for his actions.

"I'm sorry, your honor,

and I'm sorry to everyone in this courtroom," he said. "'Sorry' is shallow when you've got money to return, and I know that. I want to be an example of a man who really screwed up, but didn't give up, because I have so much to live for."

One of the victims, Tom Schuveiller, said the money is probably gone for good, though Gunstream said he hoped to make things right eventually.

"Most likely we're never going to see any money out of this," Schuveiller said. "But if this will deter others from doing things like this, then I guess that's the best we can do."

# Arrest Warrants Issued for Ex-Idaho Senator

**BOISE** • A judge issued arrest warrants Tuesday for former Idaho Republican state Sen. John McGee after he was charged with disturbing the peace and violating probation terms from a 2011 DUI conviction.

The Caldwell Republican resigned from the Idaho Senate in February amid allegations that he sexually harassed an employee. McGee was the Senate majority caucus chairman.

McGee was charged with disturbing the peace, after he was accused of using profane and offensive language and/or offensive conduct in the presence of an unidentified person on Feb. 7.

"The new charge is based on criminal conduct that occurred in the former senator's office during the 2012 legislative session," County Prosecutor Greg Bower said in a release.

McGee also was accused of violating probation for his misdemeanor DUI.

He was convicted last year after a Father's Day incident in which he drove a car that didn't belong to him. His unsupervised supervision was due to expire July 1.

Magistrate Judge James Cawthon, who oversaw McGee's legal proceedings last year when felony cartheft charges were dropped in exchange for a guilty plea in the DUI, is handling the

Deputy prosecuting attor-

ney Roger Bourne said McGee's attorney, Scott McKay, has been in contact with the prosecutor's office on efforts to resolve the case. McKay didn't return a call Tuesday.

Following McGee's resignation on Feb. 22, the Idaho State Police conducted a lengthy investigation into McGee's conduct before forwarding their findings to Bower's office in April. McGee, who had survived a confidence vote of senators following the DUI conviction, quit after he was given the choice of facing a Senate Ethics Committee hearing or stepping down.

Prosecutors have asked Cawthon to consolidate the new criminal charge and probation violation charge for plea and sentencing. A court date hasn't been set.

A \$1,000 bond was set on each of McGee's charges.

Senators who served with McGee during his four terms were just learning of the criminal charge on Tuesday.

Senate President Pro Tem Brent Hill, who in February suggested involving police in the matter after learning of the unidentified victim's complaint, said he was interviewed by investigators in recent weeks. Hill declined to describe the nature of the allegations against McGee, saying he'd been cautioned by the Idaho attorney general not to discuss the case until it was completed.

"I know some of the accusations that were made, but I really don't know what was substantiated," said Hill, R-Rexburg.

# Idaho Supreme Court Won't Reconsider Hart's Appeal

**BOISE** • Tax-protesting Rep. Phil Hart suffered another setback when Idaho Supreme Court justices dismissed his last-ditch plea for them to reconsider his state income tax appeal.

Hart lost his May 15 primary election.

And on Monday, the Spokesman-Review reported the northern Idaho Republican found out he won't get another shot at convincing the state's high court to deliberate further on the merits of his Idaho State Tax Commission dispute.

In April, justices rejected Hart's contention that he shouldn't have been held to a 91-day deadline to appeal his \$53,000 income tax bill.

In this latest decision, justices tersely declined to take up Hart's case again. Hart, who also faces a big

federal tax bill where the Internal Revenue Service aims to seize his home south of Sandpoint, has sought bankruptcy protection.

# **Boise Man** Convicted of 14th DUI

BOISE • A 55-year-old Boise man who was convicted of driving under the influence for the 14th time could be sentenced to life in prison on Aug. 22.

Terry Lee Ash was convicted by an Ada County jury Tuesday. His conviction for being a persistent violator of the law makes him eligible for a life sentence. He is jailed without bond.

Prosecutors say Ash was arrested on Sept. 4 after a single-vehicle crash near Kuna. Court records say his blood-alcohol level was 0.13 percent four hours after the crash. A person is considered legally intoxicated with a BAC of 0.08 percent.

Ash was last convicted of DUI in Canyon County in 2005. His sentence was discharged in October 2010.

Prosecutors say Ash's DUI convictions date back to 1980.

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# Utah Man Who had Knife **Aboard Plane Gets Probation**

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • A Utah man received three years of probation Tuesday for boarding an airplane with a 3 ½-inch folding knife in his briefcase.

David Alan Anderson, 60, pleaded guilty in January in U.S. District Court in Salt Lake City to possessing a dangerous weapon.

Prosecutors dropped a second charge that accused Anderson of threatening police and FBI agents who arrested him.

Anderson was removed Sept. 18 from a Delta Air Lines flight to Las Vegas.

Authorities said he threatened to slit his seatmate's throat in a dispute over a shared armrest.

Anderson was held in jail for a month and then re-

On Tuesday, Judge Dale Kimball ordered Anderson to continue mental health treatment and take medication for what his lawyer says is bipolar disorder.

Trouble started when a seatmate said Anderson elbowed him for an armrest and then put a foot on his leg.

The other passenger politely asked Anderson to "move over."

"If I had a knife, I would slit your throat right now," Anderson replied, according to a federal complaint.

Police said they searched Anderson's bag and found a Gerber knife. They made an arrest as Anderson utprofanity-laced threats to "cut out your eyeballs and kill you."

He made similar threats to FBI agents, court records say.

"I got a good look at both of you," Anderson reportedly said as two agents took him to jail. "You'll remember this day for the rest of your lives. Your short lives."

# Arizona Man Set for Competency Hearing

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz. • Experts who testified in the case of an Arizona man accused of killing a Utah sheriff's deputy agree that the defendant is mentally ill, but they're at odds over whether he can rationally and sufficiently help his lawyers prepare a defense.

Scott Curley is facing a premeditated first-degree murder charge in the 2010 shooting death of Kane County, Utah, Deputy Brian Harris. Curley has described the shooting consistently, saying he hid under a tree and intently fired an assault rifle at someone who didn't listen to his demands to freeze.

Witnesses for the prosecution testified Tuesday at a competency hearing that Curley can be redirected from delusional beliefs and auditory hallucinations to focus on the case and aid in his defense, which could include a claim of insanity.

But Curley's attorney, Brad Bransky, said his client is intent on revealing his own truth about the shooting, which includes talk of video games, dragons, the cosmos, a triforce and a test of human-

"What if your story is totally psychotic, and you're insisting it's true, and that's your defense?" Bransky asked.

The hearing resumes

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Wednesday with final arguments.

Barry Morenz, a mental health expert for the defense, characterized Curley as a paranoid schizophrenic. Although he's highly intelligent, Morenz said Curley is guided by beliefs and hallucinations that he doesn't realize are out of touch with reality.

"I don't think you will be able to successfully dissuade him from his preoccupations and wanting to describe them to court," Morenz said.

But with changes to medication, Morenz said Curley could be restored to competency.

Morenz did not come to the same conclusion, nor administer the same tests, as the experts for the prosecution.

Prosecutors challenged Morenz's methodology and research, and said he provided no factual basis for his conclusion that Curley is incompetent. Curley's consistency in interviews over 14 months show that he's capable of assisting his lawyers, the prosecution's witnesses

"Despite what might happen in Mr. Curley's world, in the jail, in this case, he remains competent to proceed," said James Sullivan, a forensic neuropsychologist who evaluated Curley in

Curley had little trouble in a videotaped interview

While he's formally pleaded not guilty in court to the murder charge, as well as charges of aggravated assault on a police officer and a citizen, and burglary and theft, Curley has told authorities and mental health experts that he's guilty.

Harris, 41, was tracking

Curley, who was wanted for burglary when he was ambushed in August 2010, authorities said. Following the shooting, Curley fled

on foot into the wilderness along the Arizona-Utah border. He was captured four days later near Kanab, Utah.



# One-Two Punch Good for Business

e've been critical of the Twin Falls City
Council for indecisiveness and a
propensity to solicit citizen input and
then ignore it.

We questioned what we considered to be waffling on the Canyon Park approval. And we've written editorials for years at each point that the council spent money or requested additional input on downtown parking (studies, parking officers and more than one citizen task force) and then ignored what had been so neatly placed in the proverbial suggestion box.

Remarkably, the council resolved both issues in just eight days. Amazing.

Last week's approval of the final plat for the Canyon Park development paves the way for the next wave of retail growth in Twin Falls. And this week's decision — finally — to dismantle downtown parking meters provides tangible proof that the council is interested in retail economic growth in all parts of the city.

Sure, the Canyon Park approval is more real and the parking meter removal more symbolic, but both are necessary to show that Twin Falls can be an increasingly more robust regional retail hub for shoppers in south-central Idaho and northern Nevada. The City Council's actions infuse a shot of retail adrenaline into a local economy that had already been psychologically bolstered by last year's Chobani announcement and the subsequent decision by Glambia to build a new corporate headquarters and innovation center in downtown Twin Falls.

The Canyon Park and downtown actions occurring in such close chronological proximity to one another should serve as a reminder to all retailers that they will win together or lose together.

It's not smart to pit "the mall area" against the "Blue Lakes corridor" against "downtown." Encouraging shoppers to come downtown accomplishes the very same thing that a new Kohl's store will; It keeps retail dollars in town and keeps them from seeping to Boise, or Salt Lake City, or some further removed vacation/shopping destination. Local retailers will accomplish the most by striving to do so together.

We applaud the City Council's actions on these two issues. They've dealt city retailers present and future a pretty good hand. Now is the time for those merchants to skillfully play, market and promote that winning hand.

# Death-penalty Debate Needs a Reality Check

he debate over the death penalty offers a vivid illustration of a tragic flaw in the market of ideas: Strong beliefs attract a lot more attention, and can have a lot more influence, than the truth.

In recent years, five states have eliminated capital punishment, and several others are currently reconsidering their policies. Advocates of the death penalty insist the moves will lead to more murders. They point to a number of studies conducted over the past couple of decades that purport to find clear evidence supporting their view. Experts happily serve up unequivocal

congressional testimony, and feed their analyses to lobby groups.

The reality, unsatisfying and inconvenient as it may be, is that we simply don't know how capital punishment affects the homicide rate. That's the conclusion of the National Academy of Sciences, which typically plays the role of impartial arbiter in these social-science debates. Their expert panel recently concluded that existing research "is not

informative about whether capital punishment decreases, increases, or has no effect on homicide rates," and that such studies "should not influence policy judgments about capital punishment."

The panel's conclusions largely echo those from research conducted by one of us (Justin Wolfers) jointly with Stanford University law professor John Donohue. That research replicated and probed the leading studies, finding that even minor changes in how the analyses were conducted dramatically altered the conclusions. As a result, there's "not just 'reasonable doubt' about whether there is any deterrent effect

of the death penalty, but profound uncertainty," the authors wrote. Indeed, "we remain unsure even of whether" the effects "are positive or negative."

As big a deal as capital punishment may seem, it's actually quite rare. Since the death penalty was reinstated in the United States in 1976, there have been about 670,000 homicides and only 1,296 executions, a rate of about one execution per 500 murders.

per 500 murders.

To complicate things further, the homicide rate fluctuates enormously for reasons unrelated to capital punishment. So the correlation between capital punishment and homicide rates can be positive or negative, depending on the specific sample of states or countries ana-

lyzed, the sample period chosen, and which other determinants are accounted for.

It's not even clear how to determine whether a state has an active death penalty. Is Connecticut's recent decision to eliminate its death penalty consequential, given that the state executed only one person in the past 50 years? California has issued 951 death sentences since 1976, but executed only 13 prisoners, suggesting that the courts have slowed down the system enough to effectively transform a nominal death sentence into life without parole.

Finally, we have no evidence at all on how would-be murderers perceive the risk of execution if they are caught, which is what really matters for deterrence.



# Smoke From Wildfire Blankets Denver

LOVELAND, Colo. • A northern Colorado wildfire 60 miles away wrapped Denver in a pungent cloud of smoke for several hours Tuesday and complicated the aerial offensive against the spreading mountain blaze, which has killed one person and destroyed more than 100 structures.

In southern New Mexico, a 56-square-mile wildfire threatening the village of Ruidoso damaged or destroyed at least 224 homes and cabins, and that number was expected to increase. Lincoln County workers found only heaps of burned metal and other debris on home sites hit hardest by the Little Bear fire.

"It's truly heartbreaking to see the damage done to this beautiful part of the country," New Mexico Gov. Susana Martinez said after touring the area.

With at least 19 large fires burning in nine states, President Barack Obama called Colorado Gov. John Hickenlooper to assure him that the federal government stood ready to provide personnel, equipment and emergency grants for Colorado and other states battling fire. Obama also tried to reach Martinez, but her office said poor reception in the fire zone kept the two from connecting.

The 68-square-mile High Park Fire in Colorado shrouded downtown Denver, some 60 miles south, in a smoky haze early Tuesday. The smoke temporarily grounded the air attack on the fire, but helicopters and tanker planes took to the skies by midday. The fire was 10 percent contained Tues-

Larimer County authorities allowed some residents to return home but issued 25 more evacuation notices in

The wildfires in the drought-stricken West have tested federal resources.

U.S. Forest Service Chief Tom Tidwell announced late Monday the agency was contracting eight heavy air tankers to increase the aging national fleet to 17.

Still, Colo. U.S. Sen. Michael Bennet urged President Barack Obama to sign a bill that would allow the Forest Service to buy as many as seven large air tankers outright. The U.S. House and Senate passed the bill last

In Colorado's Larimer County, authorities and family said Linda Steadman, 62, perished inside her mountain cabin. Her home received two evacuation warnings that weren't answered, and a firefighter tried to reach the cabin before fire overtook the site, Sheriff Justin Smith said.

LAS VEGAS • State safety regulators in southern Nevada on Tuesday began investigating a fatal construction accident in a water supply tunnel being built at Lake Mead, the latest in a series of mishaps and setbacks at the multi-million dollar project that began in

A Nevada Occupational Safety and Health Administration investigator visited the 3-foot-diameter tunnel where one man was killed and another injured about 4:30 p.m. Monday approximately 600 feet below ground near the Lake Mead National Recreation Area.

"State OSHA is investigating;" Carrie Foley, executive assistant to the state agency's director, said Tuesday. "I can't answer any other questions right now because it is an open investigation."

Thomas Albert Turner, 44, of Henderson, and another worker were alone in a segment of the tunnel when they were hit by exploding grout material after some material became loose, officials for the Southern Nevada Water Authority said.

Turner was killed, while the second man sustained minor injuries, authority spokesman Bronson Mack said. An update on his condition was not available



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

# Tens of Thousands Protest Putin Despite Crackdown

MOSCOW • Undeterred by a sudden escalation in the Kremlin's crackdown on the opposition, tens of thousands thronged Moscow's treelined boulevards Tuesday in the first mass protest against Vladimir Putin since he returned to the presidency in

The crowd was even larger than at a demonstration on the eve of Putin's inauguration, which disintegrated into violent clashes and ushered in the crackdown. Tuesday's rally ended peacefully, as both protesters and riot police took pains to prevent a confrontation as tensions were already running high.

Putin himself spoke of the need "to strive for mutual understanding and to find compromise." Although in his address on Russia Day, a national

# Activists Say Mortars Hit Syria Protest, 10 Dead

**BEIRUT** • Syrian forces pelted the eastern city of Deir el-Zour with mortars as anti-government protesters were dispersing before dawn Tuesday, killing at least 10 people as government troops kept up an offensive in a coastal province where Washington says regime forces may be preparing another massacre,

The offensives were part of an escalation of violence in recent weeks that has brought more international pressure on President Bashar Assad's regime faces over its brutal tactics against the opposition. The U.N. accused the government of using children as human shields in a new report. It said children have been victims of detention, torture and sexual

Both sides of the 15-month-old revolt to oust Assad have ignored an internationally brokered cease-fire that was supposed to go into effect April 12 but never took hold. The U.S. and its allies also have shown little appetite for getting

involved in another Arab nation in turmoil. Syria is veering ever closer to an all-out civil war as the conflict turns increasingly militarized. Already more than 13,000 have died since March 2011, according to activist groups.

The U.N. special envoy for Syria Kofi Annan has asked governments with influence to "twist arms" to halt the escalating violence in the country, his spokesman Ahmad Fawzi said. Annan is also working to convene a diplomatic meeting soon to discuss the situation in Syria amid worsening fighting between government troops and opposition forces. Earlier this year, he put forward a six-point peace plan, including the cease-fire, to try end the violence.

"It is totally unacceptable and it must stop, and that is why Annan has invited governments with influence to raise the bar to another level, to the highest level possible, and twist arms if necessary, to get the parties to implement the plan," Fawzi told reporters in Geneva. He didn't specify the countries that might be able to pressure Assad into halting its onslaught against the opposition, but Russia, China and Iran are considered Syria's closest and strongest allies.

The two main activist groups reported clashes in areas including the central province of Homs, the northern regions of Idlib and Aleppo and areas around the capital Damascus and the southern province of Daraa.

# George Zimmerman's Wife Charged with Perjury

ORLANDO, Fla. • The wife of the Trayvon Martin's shooter was charged with perjury Tuesday, accused of lying when she told a judge that the couple had limited funds during a hearing that resulted in her husband being released on \$150,000 bond.

Shellie Zimmerman, 25, was released on \$1,000 bond. George Zimmerman has pleaded not guilty to second-degree murder in the teen's slaying and had been out on the bond after the April hearing. However, Circuit Judge Kenneth Lester on June 1 revoked the bond and ordered Zimmerman returned to the Seminole County Jail. Lester in a strongly worded ruling said the Zimmermans lied about how much money they had.

Shellie Zimmerman said that records show in April she transferred more than \$85,500 from her bank account into her husband's account. The affidavit also said that jail call records show that George Zimmerman instructed her to "pay off all the bills," including an American Express and Sam's Club card.

Mark O'Mara has said the Zimmermans were confused and fearful when they misled court officials about how much money they had.

Elsewhere Tuesday, Virginia, Maine, Nevada, Arkansas and South Carolina held primary elections - with most of those states choosing Senate nominees - as did North Dakota, where voters decided to let the University of North Dakota scrap its controversial nickname, the Fighting Sioux.

In Virginia, George Allen brushed aside three conservative Republican rivals in the Virginia primary. Allen's victory set up a November clash with another former Virginia governor, Democrat Tim Kaine, in a campaign closely tied to the presidential race in a state both parties consider vital for victory.

In North Dakota, Rep. Rick Berg defeated businessman Duane Sand in the state's Republican primary. Berg now faces Democrat Heitkamp in the November race to replace retiring Sen. Kent Conrad. The election is expected to play a critical role in determining which party controls the Senate next

In Nevada, Republican Sen. Dean Heller and Democratic Rep. Shelley Berkley easily defeated a slate of political unknowns in their respective primaries. Their fall race also will be one of the most competitive in the country.

In Maine, six Republicans and four Democrats were running to fill the Senate seat being vacated Republican Olympia Snowe. The front-runner, former Gov. Angus King, wasn't on the ballot because he's running as an inde-pendent.

Of all the races Tuesday, the Arizona House race was the most closely watched, partly because of Giffords' absorbing story and partly because holding onto the seat was important for Democrats if they want to regain control of the House.

The party needs big gains in November to grab the majority from Republicans, who now hold a 240-192 advantage with three vacancies, including Giffords' seat.

Republicans, riding high after a decisive victory in Wisconsin's gubernatorial election last Tuesday, set their sights on Arizona. A victory would give party leaders a chance to claim momentum five months before November and fine-tune their plan to link Democratic candidates to Obama, the incumbent at the top of the ticket.

Giffords, 42, resigned in January to concentrate on her recovery from a gunshot wound to her head. Giffords and Barber were injured in the January 2011 shooting rampage outside a Tucson grocery store that killed six people, including a 9-year-old girl and a federal judge. Giffords largely has shunned public appearances in the race, but in the closing days was stepping out to help Barber.

Outside groups have spent more than \$2 million on the race.

Barber, 66, had a sizable fundraising lead in late May, but spending from conservative groups helped reduce the Democratic financial edge.

The Arizona 8th is a rare district that is competitive virtually every election. Giffords defeated Kelly by about 4,000 votes in 2010 when the election focused on immigration and when tea partyers rallied to the tough-talking former Marine.

# Penn State Witness Says He Saw Shower Assault

BELLEFONTE, Pa. • A former Penn State assistant coach whose account led to Joe Paterno's downfall testified Tuesday that he heard a "skin-on-skin smacking sound" in a campus locker room one night in 2001 and saw something that was "more than my brain could handle."

There was Jerry Sandusky standing naked in the showers behind a boy, slowly moving his hips, Mike McQueary told the jury. He said he had no doubt he was witnessing anal sex.

McQueary, one of the star witnesses in the child sexual abuse case against Sandusky, testified that he slammed his locker shut loudly as if to say, "Someone's here! Break it up!"

Then, he said, he went upstairs to his office to try to make sense of what he had seen.

Sandusky, 68, is on trial on charges he molested 10 boys over a 15-year period. Authorities say he abused them in hotels, at his home and inside the football team's quarters. The former assistant coach founder of an acclaimed youth charity has denied the allegations.

Paterno was fired last fall, shortly after Sandusky's arrest, after it became known that Mc-Queary had told the head football coach about the shower episode a decade ago. Two months after his dismissal, Paterno died of lung cancer at 85.

McQueary was composed during his testimony, and when was asked if he knew Sandusky, he looked right at him with a sharp glance that Sandusky returned.

McQueary's account differed little from the one he gave in December at a preliminary hearing for two Penn State administrators charged with failing to report the alleged episode to authorities. The one difference: He said it took place in 2001 instead of 2002.

Testifying on Day 2 of

Sandusky's trial, McQueary said that he was at home, in bed, watching the movie "Rudy," when he decided to go to the football team building. He said he walked into the support staff locker room to put away a pair of new sneakers and, as he opened the door, heard a noise.

"Very much skin-onskin smacking sound," he said. "I immediately became alert and was kind of embarrassed that I was walking in on something."

He said that he glanced over his shoulder at a mirror at a 45-degree angle and saw Sandusky "standing behind a boy who was propped up against a wall." He estimated the boy to be 10 to 12 years old. He said that the boy's hands were up on the wall and "the defendant's midsection was moving" subtly.

"The glance would have taken only one or two seconds. I immediately turned back to my locker to make sure I saw what I saw," he said.


He said he wasn't sure whether Sandusky saw him. After slamming his locker to make some noise, he left.

"It was more than my brain could handle," he said. "I was making decisions on the fly. I picked up the phone and called my father to get advice from the person I trusted most in my life, because I just saw something ridiculous."

He said he was extremely vague with his father, who told him to leave immediately.

McQueary said he went to Paterno's house the next morning and relayed what he had seen, but did not describe the act explicitly out of respect for the coach and his own embarrassment.

He said Penn State administrator Tim Curley called him a week later, and McQueary met with him and another school official, Gary Schultz. They "just listened to what I had said," McQueary testified. A week or two later, he said, Curley called him to say they had looked into it.

# Ex-Indian Officer Who Shot Family was in U.S. Illegally

FRESNO, Calif. • The former Indian army officer who was wanted for murder in his homeland and killed his family in California last weekend had been living illegally in the U.S. for at least five years, federal immigration officials said Tuesday.

Avtar Singh, who killed his wife, two children and himself in their Selma, Calif. home on Saturday, had been arrested by investigators for unlawful presence in July 2007, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement spokeswoman Lori Haley told The Associated Press.

He was "subsequently placed in removal proceedings. At the time of his death, ICE Homeland Security Investigations was continuing to investigate his case," Haley said in a written statement.

Haley did not say where or why Singh first came to the attention of U.S. authorities, why ICE released him, or whether ICE officials knew of his alleged crimes in India.

Singh was sought with an

Interpol notice for the 1996 killing of Jalil Andrabi, a lawyer and prominent human rights advocate, in the disputed region of Indiancontrolled Kashmir.

Andrabi disappeared at the height of protests in the region, where nearly a dozen rebel groups have fought Indian security forces for independence or merger with Pakistan since 1989. More than 68,000 people, mostly civilian, have been killed in the uprising and subsequent crackdown. A police investigation

said Andrabi had been picked up in Kashmir's main city, Srinagar, by Indian troops and killed in their custody. His body was recovered in a local river - he had been shot in the head and his eyes were gouged

The probe blamed Singh and his soldiers for that killing and accused Singh of involvement in the killings of six other Kashmiri men.

Singh lived freely in India for years after the charges against him were filed. India did not request Interpol to issue a so-called "red notice" on him until 2009. He is believed to have fled to Canada before moving to California after the Canadian Center for International Justice pressured the Canadian government to locate him, said Hafizullah Mir, Andrabi's lawyer.

Singh, who owned a trucking company in Selma, had been arrested in Selma in February 2011, after his wife said he choked

Police then discovered that he was being sought in India on a murder charge, Selma Police Chief Myron Dyck said shortly after that arrest. Dyck said at the time, that he could not keep Singh in custody on the murder charge, so Singh bailed out of jail.

Dyck hasn't responded to calls seeking comment about the 2011 arrest.

Singh was charged with felony domestic violence, pleaded no contest to a misdemeanor of false imprisonment, and was sentenced to three years of probation and a 52-week batterer's treatment program, said Sonia De La Rosa, spokeswoman for the Fresno County District Attorney's

holiday, he also warned of the dangers posed by attempts to split society.

Putin has taken a tougher stance on the opposition since beginning his third term on May 7, but in recent days the pressure has risen markedly. Some of the most charismatic protest leaders were called in for questioning Tuesday, a day after investigators raided their apartments, carting away computers, cell phones and in at least one case envelopes stuffed with cash. The interrogations are to continue throughout the week. Fines for taking part in unauthorized rallies were stiffened under a new repressive law hastily passed by parliament last week and signed by Putin on Friday.

The Kremlin appeared to be betting that the tougher measures would frighten away the well-educated, citified protesters, many of them young, white-collar professionals. But those who came out on Tuesday said they were determined

to make their voices heard. "I came just so that I can show this enormous, expansive Russia that there are people who aren't afraid of the laws that the government passes," said Tatyana

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Fedorenko, a retired teacher. Fedorenko, who said her father had spent 20 years in a labor camp as a political prisoner under Soviet dictator Josef Stalin, said the new fines have silenced people in the village where she has a country house. "The people in that village

all hate Putin, but they are terrified of losing what they have," Fedorenko said. "They can't pay that 300,000 rubles (more than \$9,000)" fine.

The number of protesters

has declined since the anti-Putin demonstrations in the months ahead of the March presidential election, which drew as many as 100,000 onto the streets in the dead of a Moscow winter. But a turnout of tens of thousands on May 6 - and again on Tuesday - was still impressive in a country where such political protests attracted no more than a few hundred people only several months ago.

Some of Tuesday's protesters marched under the banners of liberal, leftist or nationalist groups. Others came with groups of friends or co-workers. Young couples pushed baby carriages, and gray-haired men and women supported themselves with canes. "You can't scare all of us,

and if you take away one of us, dozens will come in our place," liberal activist Ilya Yashin told the crowd. Yashin was among the



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

# Nurses Set to Strike at 9 SF Bay Area Hospitals

OAKLAND, Calif. • Hundreds of nurses at nine Northern California hospitals are set to strike to protest stalled contract negotiations.

The San Francisco Chronicle reports that as many as 4,400 registered nurses at Bay Area hospitals operated by Sutter Health could walk off the job.

Wednesday's walkout will be the fourth strike organized by the California Nurses Association since September.

Nurses and managers at Sutter Health have been negotiating for a new contract for more than a year, but the two sides have clashed over sick pay and cuts in employee benefits.

New Orleans paper cuts half of staff • The Times-Picayune said Tuesday 200 employees will lose their jobs when one of the nation's oldest daily newspapers shifts its focus to online news and publishes just three days a week beginning this fall.

The paper said 84 of the newsroom's 173 employees were cut at the 175-year-old paper. The change means New Orleans will become the largest metro area in the nation without a daily newspaper in the digital age. In Alabama, three major daily newspapers laid off about 400 employees, many of them in the newsrooms at The Birmingham News, the Press-Register in Mobile and The Huntsville Times.

# More Than Seven in 10 U.S. Teens Jobless in Summer

**WASHINGTON** • Once a rite of passage to adulthood, summer jobs for teens are disappearing.

Fewer than three in 10 American teenagers now hold jobs such as running cash registers, mowing lawns or busing restaurant tables from June to August. The decline has been particularly sharp since 2000, with employment for 16-to-19-year olds falling to the lowest level since World War II.

And teen employment may never return to pre-recession levels, suggests a projection by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The drop in teen employment, steeper than for other age groups, is partly a cultural shift. More youths are spending summer months in school, at music or learning camps or in other activities geared for college. But the decline is especially troubling for teens for whom college may be out of reach, leaving them increasingly idle and with few options to earn wages and job experience.

Older workers, immigrants and debt-laden college graduates are taking away lower-skill work as they struggle to find their own jobs in the weak economy. Upper-income white teens are three times as likely to have summer jobs as poor black teens, sometimes capitalizing on their parents' social networks for help.

Overall, more than 44 percent of teens who want summer jobs don't get them or work fewer hours than they prefer.

"It's really frustrating," said Colleen Knaggs, describing her fruitless efforts to find work for the past two years. The 18-year-old graduated from high school last week in Flagstaff, Ariz., the state that ranks highest in the share of U.S. teens who are unable to get the summer work they desire, at 58 per-

Wanting to be better prepared to live on her own and to save for college, Knaggs says she submitted a dozen applications for summer cashier positions. She was turned down for what she believes was her lack of connections and work experience. Instead of working this summer, she'll now be babysitting her 10-year-old brother, which has been the extent of her work so far, aside from volunteering at concession stands.

"I feel like sometimes they don't want to go through the training," said Knaggs, who is now bracing for a heavier debt load when she attends college in the fall.

Economists say teens who aren't getting jobs are often those who could use them the most. Many are not moving on to more education.

# ID 5 RISKY

**NEW YORK •** Lawyers for Wal-Mart Stores Inc. have identified Brazil, India, China and South Africa along with Mexico as areas having the biggest risk for corruption, according to a letter from two congressmen who are doing their own investigation into the allegations of bribery in

its Mexico operations. The letter, dated Monday, shed light on a May 21 briefing with outside lawyers from Wal-Mart, who said they had been retained to do a global anti-corruption compliance

review of its operations in 2011. The attorneys from the law firms Greenberg Traurig and Akin Gump said the review focused on Brazil, China and Mexico because they represent the highest corruption risk. Based on the review, they recommended that Wal-Mart also evaluate its operations in India and South Africa

Dave Tovar, a Wal-Mart spokesman, said the review of its anti-corruption program was worldwide.

"We are taking a deep look at our policies and procedures in every country we operate," he said.

In the letter to Wal-Mart CEO Mike Duke, Democratic congressmen Elijah Cummings of Maryland and Henry Waxman of California wrote that the world's largest retailer hasn't provided any documents regarding the potential violations of the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act, which forbids U.S. companies from bribing foreign officials.

The two lawmakers also said Wal-Mart hasn't allowed them to interview any of its employees. "Wal-Mart's actions to date significantly inhibit our ability to investigate these allegations," stated the letter. A copy of the letter was sent to The Associated Press

# Average Price of 4-year University Up 15 Percent

When those college tuition bills come in, be prepared for sticker shock.

The average tuition at a four-year public university climbed 15 percent between 2008 and 2010, fueled by state budget cuts for higher education and increases of 40 percent and more at universities in states like Georgia, Arizona and California.

The U.S. Department of Education's annual look at college affordability also found significant price increases at the nation's private universities, including at for-profit institutions, where the net price for some schools is

now twice as high as Harvard. At Full Sail University, a film and art school in central Florida, the average price of tuition, fees, books, and other expenses totals \$43,990, even when grants and scholarships are factored in. The average net price for an incoming Harvard student: \$18,277, according to the department. Net price is cost of attendance minus grant and scholarship aid.

**Education Secretary Arne Duncan** said students need to be smart consumers and states needs to do their part by making higher education a priority in their budgets. Forty percent of states cut higher education spending last year, the most important factor in tuition increases.

"As a nation, we need more college graduates in order to stay competitive in the global economy," Duncan said. "But if the costs keep on rising, especially at a time when family incomes are hurting, college will become increasingly unaffordable for the middle

# A Burger for Dad So Good It Seems Bad for Him

Dads love grilling. Dads love burgers. Trouble is, good burgers don't always love Dad back.

That's because great burgers often start with fatty ground beef. All that fat keeps the burgers juicy and flavorful as they grill. And then of course there is the temptation to pile on toppings and condiments, like heaps of melting cheese and thick spreads of mayon-

We decided to show our love this Father's Day by offering up a delicious burger that also happens to be healthy.

To keep our burger lean, we went with a 95 percent lean ground beef. You also could go for ground turkey, chicken or pork, but read the packages carefully; many ground meats aren't as lean as you might think they are.

Since we removed most of the fat from our burger's meat, we needed to add moisture. We did this by incorporating vegetables. I know, groan! Vegetables don't belong in burgers.

But really, this is a vegetable you would have put on the burger anyway caramelized onions. They add tons of flavor, moisture and virtually no calories. You also can make the onions well in advance so they're all ready to go when you want to make burgers. They even freeze well if you want to make a giant batch.

To top off the burger, we skipped the cheese and went with a quick homemade barbecue sauce. Best of all, you can make the



sauce right on the grill; just bring a little saucepan out with you and do all the cooking in the same spot. You'll want to make the sauce first so that you know it's ready to go when the burgers are.

# Caramelized Onion Barbecue Burgers

Start to finish: 30 minutes. Servings: 4 regular burgers or 8 sliders.

- 1 tablespoon olive oil 4 large sweet onions, sliced
- 1 tablespoon balsamic

vinegar 1 pound 96 percent lean ground beef

1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon ground black

1/2 teaspoon cumin 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper

1 teaspoon smoked paprika 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder 1 tablespoon honey 1 tablespoon tomato paste 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard 3 tablespoons apple cider

vinegar 1 tablespoon soy sauce 4 standard or 8 slider whole-grain burger buns

In a large skillet over medium, heat the olive oil.

Add the onions and saute until deep brown, about 20 to 25 minutes. If the skillet gets too dry, add 1 to 2 teaspoons of water as needed. Stir in the balsamic vinegar and allow to

Heat the grill to medium-

In a medium bowl, gently stir together the cooled onions, ground beef, salt and black pepper. Form the mixture into 4 or 8 patties, pressing a slight indent into the center of

In a small saucepan, combine the cumin, cayenne and smoked paprika. In a small bowl, stir together the garlic powder, honey, tomato paste, mustard, cider vinegar and soy sauce. Bring everything out to the grill.

Place the saucepan with the spices directly on the grill. Stir until fragrant and toasted, about 1 minute. Add the tomatohoney mixture to the spices and stir until simmering, about 5 minutes. Use caution, the handle of the saucepan will get very hot. Move the saucepan to the back of the grill or off to the side.

Add the burgers to the grill and cook for 4 to 6 minutes per side for medium-well. Spoon the sauce over the burgers and serve on multigrain or wholewheat buns.

# A Bite at a Time, **Aasif Mandvi** Earning Foodie Cred

He's played a charming chef in a feature film that he also co-wrote, and had his breakthrough role in an off-Broadway play about a restaurant. Yet actor-comedian Aasif Mandvi still can barely tell dosas from Devil

"I enjoy eating Indian food, but I'm not an aficionado," says Mandvi, best known as "Senior Correspondent" for South Asia (or the Middle East, or anywhere else Muslims may live) on Comedy Central's "The Daily Show." He admits to cooking only when it strategically suits him.

"I usually cook when I'm in a relationship," he says. Yes, he can turn out a basic curry, "but ultimately, I just go to my mom and say 'This is what I did. It doesn't taste right. What did I do wrong?"

But his lack of skill hasn't stopped him from tackling food topics. Through mid-June, Mandvi, 46, is cruising the South Asian restaurants of New York with Madhur Jaffrey, the grande dame of the cuisine, sampling tandoori chicken and sticky sweet jalebis from Midtown to the boroughs in a special on the Cooking Channel.

"It's as he says, he is not a foodie, he doesn't cook, he doesn't know too much about Indian food," Jaffrey said in a telephone interview. "And that is why he's the perfect person to be on the show. He asks the questions that anyone might want to know, and I give the an-

But just because he works a takeout menu as easily as

an audience doesn't mean he lacks an appreciation for great food. For Mandvi, food and especially the food of South Asia – can be a metaphor for personal transformation. In his 2009 movie "Today's Special" he cast himself as an Indian-American chef who only connects to his roots and culture when he takes over his parents' restaurant.

"Food represents so many things," he says, "family, love, in some movies it even represents desire, passion, sexuality."

The movie was based on Mandvi's 1999 award-winning one-man show, "Sakina's Restaurant," which he wrote and starred in. He chose the restaurant setting, he says, because he was looking for an Indian venue that all Americans would connect with.

"The film is as much about a restaurant as 'It's a Wonderful Life' is about a savings and loan," he says. "It was just a place."

Question: Can I make a creme anglais that I can

pipe on a dessert? **Answer:** There are a number of classic pastry creams used in baking. If you've ever had an eclair, you've had creme pattiserie – AKA pastry cream. Creme anglais is usually so soft that's more of a custard sauce, usually served over fruit.

In its classic form, it would be too soft to pipe. But you can make a sort of hybrid cake icing with it. You simply chill it, then beat heavy cream until it holds soft peaks and fold that into the cold custard. That would make something thick enough to hold its shape when you pipe it out.

Which is lower in salt: a handful of potato chips or a whole-wheat English muffin? If you guessed the English muffin, you are incorrect. A whole-wheat muffin (without butter) contains 240 milligrams of sodium; one ounce (about 15) potato chips contains 149 milligrams of sodium.

The muffin does pack a more nutritious punch and will keep you full longer, but if

you are on a low-sodium diet, the chips are the better choice, at least in the short run.

In a quiz on Goodhousekeeping.com, you can also compare the amount of sodium in common foods such as tomato soup, a hot dog and bun, cottage cheese, saltines, American cheese and spaghetti sauce. A related story offers tips on reducing your sodium intake, such as choosing alternate flavor enhancers: pepper and lemon juice, for example.



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# Mirin: What It Is and How to Use It

Mirin is all about getting sauced.

Because that's where Japanese cooking wine really shines - in sauces.

But first, a misconception. The wretched American product known as "cooking wine" probably has you reluctant to try anything similar. Relax and prepare for a delicious discovery. Mirin is nothing like that.

Though once sipped similar to sake, today mirin is exclusively a cooking wine. The clear, viscous liquid has a clean, yet intensely sweetsalty flavor. And while it packs a solid 12 to 14 percent alcohol, it's really the sugar that counts. Mirin often is as much as 45 percent sugar.

That sugar explains why mirin works so wonderfully in marinades, glazes and sauces. It tenderizes meats, thickens sauces and creates a wonderful glaze.

And chances are you've tried it before, though you probably didn't realize it. Mirin is a key ingredient in traditional teriyaki sauce and often is used as a finishing touch for Japanese soups.

Though often inaccurately called rice wine, mirin is made in part from rice. Rice, koji (think good bacteria in yogurt) and a distilled version of sake are combined and held for two months. During this time, the koji converts the starch in the rice into sugar. A lot of it. The solids then are strained and the resulting liquid is the mirin.

Mirin is widely available in the Asian or international aisle of just about any grocer. Some mass produced versions are made from grain alcohol and sugar, so check labels before buying.

# Mirin-marinated Short Ribs with Shiitakes and Egg Noodles

Start to finish: 20 minutes active (plus 1 hour marinating). Servings: 4.

1 1/2 pounds boneless

short ribs, thinly sliced 1 cup mirin

2 cloves garlic, minced Salt and ground black pepper

1 pound wide egg noodles 2 tablespoons toasted sesame oil, divided

Transfer the meat to a plate and set aside. Return the skillet to the heat and add the mushrooms, onion and peppers, then saute until starting to

In a small glass, mix the cornstarch and water, then add it and the soy sauce to the skillet. Stir well and simmer for 2 minutes, or until thickened. Season with salt and pepper. Spoon the steak and

sauce over the noodles. Drizzle each serving with a bit of the remaining tablespoon of sesame oil. Question: I have a small bag of basmati rice but don't know what kinds of dishes to use it in.

Answer: Like jasmine rice, basmati rice is valued for its lovely fragrance. In the Himalayas, the name translates to "queen of fragrance."

It's used in India and the Middle East, particularly for dishes such as biranyi or pilaf. Unlike Thai jasmine rice, it's not a sticky rice. It's stays separate and firm when it cooked.

Still, it is also a long-grain rice, similar to the domestic white rice you might know better. So you can use it the same way you would use any other long-grain rice.

skier. "If I go off it, I get a stuffy feeling or a heavy feeling in my stomach like you get from overeating - it just sits there.

"I've also noticed a difference in other people, too. I see them doing things in the gym that they couldn't do before."

Morgridge is so sold on the Paleo diet that she researched and tweaked recipes, eventually introducing a line of Paleo bakery items at her Hailey Coffee Co. She sells some of those items at Starbucks and Main Street Market in Ketchum, as well.

Morgridge's lineup includes Paleo brownies, carrot cake, fig rolls, chocolate chip cookies, date cookies, apricot bars, banana bread, banana coconut muffins, blueberry muffins and chia seed bars.

"We sweeten them with natural sugar from dates, bananas or sweet potatoes," Morgridge said. "We use almond milk instead of dairy milk, coconut flour instead of wheat flour.

"I never expected to be selling this much Paleo, but there is a demand for it. And it's not just CrossFitters. Other people who are interested in eating healthy are buying them because they're sugar free, dairy free and gluten free."

Heidi Watanabe of Hailey is among those who have bought into the Paleo diet concept. She says she follows it about 80 percent of the time.

"I would just as soon eat a big bowl of yogurt, rather than all the meats. But I've found I sleep so well since I've been on it," she said.

Breakfast for Paleo eaters like Morgridge and Watanabe might consist of eggs with spinach and salsa or spaghetti squash accented with nuts and avocado. Lunch might be a big salad with chicken and grapes. Dinner might feature beef

stir-fry.

Samway cautions against blending foods like spinach and carrots into smoothies because, he says, it changes the glycemic index of the foods, prompting the eater to get hungry quicker.

"Chew as much as possible," he said. "Cave man didn't have a Cuisinart. And stay away from processed foods — they mess with our hormone level, spiking our insulin level."

Lizzie LeFevre, a dietitian with St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center in Twin Falls, said there's something to be said for eating natural foods. But she worries that the Paleo diet leaves out some good foods.

Kathryn Guylay, who teaches nutrition classes in the Wood River Valley, con-

curred: "It works for some people — a lot of people lose weight on it. But it's an ex-

pensive diet with all the fresh fruits and vegetables and meats they eat."

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After years of working in other people's restaurants, Kastner decided to open his own. CK's Real Food opened in 2003.

As a result of Kastner's background, his teaching style is approachable.

"I don't like to make things that other people can't do. The point is to go home and make this for yourself or your family," Kastner said.

Kastner started with the Coq au Vin - a casserole of chicken in red wine because it takes the longest of the three dishes to create.

Though the recipe called for the chicken to be dusted in flour and browned, Kastner omitted the flour to keep it gluten free and seasoned it with salt and pep-

"I don't like the texture of the flour," he said. "We'll pretend we're making it in the old time and we are out of wheat and there is no flour."

When trying to get a good sear on protein, he advised, don't crowd it or move it around. If you do it might dump out the liquid before caramelizing starts and will start to steam instead.

When cooking a French dish, he said, make sure you have fresh, quality ingredients and herbs.

"Their culture and cuisine was highly rooted in herbs such as rosemary, thyme, sage and parsley," Kastner said. "In France, it all grows wild, it's pretty cool. Here you're walking through sagebrush, and there you are walking through wild rosemary and

substituted Kastner cabernet sauvignon for the recipe's more expensive burgundy, and he opted out of the chicken livers because he didn't know how many in the class would eat them. His audience was introduced to the bouquet garni, a bundle of herbs used to prepare stock, soup or stew. In the Coq au Vin, Kastner used a bundle of celery stalk, carrot, thyme sprigs and parsley sprigs that he removed after all the ingreand dients simmered braised.

Tossed with noodles, parsley and butter, Kastner said, Coq au Vin is even better the next day.

Though Salad Frisee is more of a winter and fall dish, Kastner said, it is one of the great salads of all

time even during summer. Frisee resembles lettuce but has a feathered appearance and is known for its bitter flavor. The salad is non-complex with a poached egg on top, with lardons (bacon cut in rectangles 1/4-inch by 1inch), Dijon mustard vinaigrette and croutons.

"When the egg breaks in the salad that's really

Recipe courtesy of Hailey chef Chris Kastner; 6-8 salads. Interested in making the classic Coq au Vin and Creme Caramel to accompany the salad? Start with recipes from any French cookbook, such as Patricia Wells' "Bistro Cooking," then take note of Kastner's tips in this story.

The vinaigrette, Kastner said, emulsifies easily by hand without the need of a blender because of the amount of mustard.

Traditionally quail eggs poached in shell are better for a small salad, but Kastner poached chicken eggs a day before. They waited in a bowl of water, ready to be reheated and placed atop the salad. If you are hosting a large dinner with many guests, Kastner said, this can cut back on time spent in the kitchen. Even hardboiled eggs work fine on this salad.

Kastner tried Salad Frisee for the first time in a Paris restaurant on the east side of Notre Dame.

"I almost wanted to have another one. I was like, 'Oh my God, how do they do that?" he said.

For Creme Caramel, slow is better. Kastner pre-prepared the dessert for the class, but quickly showed the steps in class. The dessert that was cooked faster and at a higher temperature in a hot water bath was a more eggy version of the buttery and light dessert slowly

"This is really fun," Gardner said. "The custard was amazing. The second one was like mine – mine are always egg soup — but

The class combated the misconception that French cuisine is complex and made with heavy ingredients.

"I always envisioned (French cuisine) as very rich," said Desiree Glassinger of Jerome. "It's very simple and light."

One word to sum up French techniques? Reduction, Kastner said.

"It's about intensifying flavors," he said. "It's not a fast cuisine at all ... you take time to touch it and smell it."



# Salmon With an Exotic Spiced Carrot Sauce

4 servings.

### For the sauce:

- 1 1/2 cups (12 ounces) carrot juice, preferably freshly pressed
- 1-inch piece peeled ginger root, sliced crosswise
- 1 stalk lemon grass, outer leaves discarded, the remaining core thinly sliced
- Finely grated zest and juice of 1 orange, preferably organic 1 medium clove garlic,
- sliced Juice of 1 medium lime (1 to 2 tablespoons)
- 1 teaspoon light muscovado sugar (may substitute light brown sugar)
- 1/2 cup coconut milk (may use low-fat coconut milk)

Dash cayenne pepper Sea salt

# For assembly:

- 16 to 18 medium stalks asparagus, tough ends trimmed off 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 1/2 pounds skinless salmon fillet, cut into 1

Strain into a medium saucepan through a fine-mesh strainer, using a spoon to press the solids in the strainer to extract as much liquid as possible; discard the solids. A crisp meringue made richer with almond butter makes a fine platform for berries and cream. If strawberries aren't available, use raspberries or blackberries. If almonds aren't your thing, you can replace the almond butter and chopped almonds with hazelnut, cashew or peanut butter and chopped nuts of the same type.

Whatever nut butter you choose, it should contain only roasted nuts and maybe a little salt - no sugar, other sweeteners or emulsifiers. The nut oil will separate in the jar, so thorough stirring is essential.

The baked meringue can be stored in an airtight container for at least 2 weeks. From "Sinfully Easy Delicious Desserts," by Alice Medrich (Artisan, 2012).

# Crunchy Almond Butter Meringue With Berries and Cream

8 to 10 servings.

1/3 cup well-stirred smooth or chunky natural almond butter, at room temperature Salt (optional)

3 large egg whites, at room temperature 1/8 teaspoon cream of

tartar 2/3 cup sugar, plus more for the cream and strawberries

1/4 cup roasted almonds, salted or unsalted, coarsely chopped

1 1/2 pints strawberries (may substitute raspberries or blackberries) 1 cup chilled heavy cream

Position a rack in the lower third of the oven and preheat the oven to 225 degrees. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. If the nut butter is not salt-

ed, add a pinch of salt and

stir to combine.

Combine the egg whites and cream of tartar in the large bowl of a stand mixer or hand-held electric mixer. Beat at medium speed (for a stand mixer) or high speed (for a hand-held mixer) until the egg whites are creamy white and hold a soft shape when the beaters are lifted. Gradually add the sugar a heaping teaspoonful at a time, taking 1 1/2 to 2 minutes in all. The meringue should be very stiff. Scatter small spoonfuls of the almond butter over the meringue and use a large flexible spatula to fold the almond butter not quite completely into the meringue; some streaks of almond butter should remain.

Scrape the meringue into the center of the parchment paper and use the back of a spoon to spread it into a shallow shell roughly 9 inches in diameter and with a slightly raised rim. Sprinkle the almonds over the rim.

Bake for 2 hours. Turn the oven off and leave the meringue in the oven to cool. Once it has cooled completely, the meringue can be stored in an airtight container for at least 2

the activity or mood. If I am feeling down-homey, I add a little pimento cheese to my basic deviled egg mixture. If I want to spice it up, I add pureed chipotle and substitute lime for the lemon. For the right occasion I'll even get a little fancy and top deviled eggs with caviar, either the traditional variety or the newer wasabi-infused

flying fish roe. Still, no matter how good embellished deviled eggs are, my favorite remains what I call "straight-up deviled eggs." They are as advertised classic and simple. You can use them as a base for any and all flavor mix-ins, or serve them like I do, straight

up, simple and sublime. One of the beauties of deviled eggs is how well they travel. That's why I call them party eggs. But there are a few tricks to making certain they are sensational.

First, you have to cook the eggs properly. Freshly boiled eggs are key to great flavor and texture. Don't buy precooked hard-boiled eggs.

The best method is to place the eggs in a saucepan and add enough cold water to generously cover them. Bring the water to a boil. As soon as the water is boiling, turn off the heat, put a lid on the pan and wait 15 minutes. This method really is more

like poaching than boiling, and will guarantee a yellow, creamy, well-cooked egg.

After 15 minutes, plunge the eggs into a bowl of cold water. This prevents them from overcooking (and from

turning green at the center). I like to make the deviled mixture right away. This helps the flavors of the ingredients fully meld with the yolk. I am a fan of cutting the eggs in half vertically because I think it is easier to keep all the goodness of the deviled egg mixture in the white. However, for esthetic purposes, you should follow the shape of your deviled egg

The eggs taste better after the mixture has had a chance to sit so the flavors can marry. For that reason, I always make my deviled eggs the day before and refrigerate the mixture in a closed pastry bag. I pipe (squirt) the filling into the whites just

before serving or leaving the house. A light hand with the garnish, then you are done.

# Straight-Up Deviled Eggs

Start to finish: 30 minutes (plus overnight chilling). Makes 24 halves.

1 dozen large eggs 1/3 cup mayonnaise (I prefer Hellmann's)

4 tablespoons unsalted butter, softened 1/4 cup strong Dijon

mustard (such as Amora or Maille) Zest of 1/2 lemon 1 teaspoon fresh lemon

juice Pinch garlic powder 2 to 4 shakes hot sauce Salt

Smoked paprika or minced fresh chives

Fill a large bowl with cold

Place the eggs in a large saucepan or stockpot and cover with cold water. Bring to a boil, cover, then turn off the heat. Let the eggs sit for 15 minutes. Drain the eggs, then transfer them to the bowl of cold water. Let them sit for about 10 minutes, or until cool to the touch. Carefully peel the eggs,

Cut in half across the middle or lengthwise, depending on your desired final presentation. Use your fingers or a small spoon to gently scoop out the yolks into a medium bowl. Set the whites aside on a platter or deviled egg plate, then cover and refrigerate. Use a fork to mash the yolks until all large pieces are broken up and smooth. Add the mayonnaise, butter, mustard, lemon zest and juice, garlic powder and hot sauce. Stir well. Taste and season with salt. Transfer the mixture to a pastry bag or plastic zip-close bag and refrigerate overnight.

Just before serving or leaving for a summer event, snip off the tip of the piping bag (or one of the bottom corners of a zipclose bag) and squeeze the deviled egg mixture into the egg whites. Alternatively, you can use a small spoon to fill the egg white "boats" with the yolk mixture, but the presentation is less attractive.

Sprinkle the eggs with smoked paprika for classic eggs, or chives for a fancier version. Serve chilled. Per half egg: 70 calories; 45 calories from fat (64 percent of total calories); 5 g fat (2 g saturated; 0 g trans fats); 95 mg cholesterol; 2 g carbohydrate; 3 g protein; 0 g fiber; 80 mg sodium.

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


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

# DRILL SERGEANTS AT CSI

Football's 7-on-7 drills give teams chance to improve passing game, but there are benefits to building the stop unit as well.

TWIN FALLS • In basketball, it would

be a 3-on-3 half-court game. In baseball, it's pre-game batting

And in football, a condensed form of the sport comes in the form of 7-on-7

Just like the other sports, where there are skills to be polished and talents to be enhanced, 7-on-7 drills like the ones being run Tuesday at the Southern Idaho Football Camp at the College of Southern Idaho campus provide the same opportunity.

There are also some major differences. There are no interior linemen, meaning no blocking or rushing the passer. Snapping the ball is optional, meaning the QB can "take" his own snap from the line of scrimmage, or have a teammate snap it to him in the shotgun formation. And since football rules call for only five eligible receivers, it's really six offensive players against seven defenders on every play.

For offenses that rely heavily on the run game, such a drill, at first glance might appear to be counter-intuitive to building an offense. But even at Minico, there are several benefits to the drills.

"That's why we do it," Minico defensive coordinator Steve Haugeberg joked when asked about the purpose of 7-on-7 drills. "It's good for the defense."

Turning serious, Haugeberg explained further.

"It's an absolutely great drill," he said. "The offense has all of the advantages, with no pass rush for them, so you really got to work hard on defense. It's a great drill for that. And we do throw once in a while."

For teams that do throw more, like Jerome, it's an opportunity to improve on timing between quarterback and receiver, among other things.

# Durant Powers Thunder Past LeBron's Heat

**OKLAHOMA CITY** • Kevin Durant showed LeBron James how to play the fourth quarter in the NBA Finals.

Durant scored 17 of his 36 points in another nightmarish final period for James and his team, leading a Thunder storm that overwhelmed the Heat and gave Oklahoma City a 105-94 victory over Miami in Game 1 on Tuesday night.

Teaming with Russell Westbrook to outscore the Heat in the second half by themselves, Durant struck first in his head-to-head matchup with James, who had seven points in the final quarter and was helpless to stop the league's three-time scoring champion.

Westbrook turned around a poor shooting start to finish with 27 points, 11 assists and eight rebounds for the Thunder, keying a strong finish to the third period that gave the Thunder the lead for good.

Durant took over from there. Scoring in nearly every way

possible, Durant finished 12 of 20 from the field and added eight rebounds. He and Westbrook outscored the Heat 41-40 over the final two periods, showing that maybe this time it will be offense that wins championships.

James finished with 30 points, his most in any of his 11 finals games, but had only one basket over the first 8:15 of the fourth, when the Thunder seized control of a game they trailed for all but the final few seconds of the first three quarters.

James averaged just three points in the fourth quarters of the Heat's six-game loss to Dallas last year, taking almost all the heat for Miami's finals failure. He was good in this one, Durant was just better.

And when fans chanted "MVP! MVP!" late in the game, they weren't talking about James, the guy who won the regular-season award.

They meant Durant, who is in a race with James for his first ring — and maybe the title of best player in the

Marco Pappa scored on a free kick in the 83rd minute, giving Guatemala a 1-1 tie with the United States in a World Cup qualifier on Tuesday night.

Clint Dempsey put the United States ahead in the 40th minute, but Fabian Johnson pulled down Carlos Ruiz just outside the penalty area to set up the late free kick in a dangerous position. Pappa, a Chicago Fire midfielder, put a 24yard shot just under the crossbar that froze goalkeeper Tim Howard.

It was a disappointing result for the 28th-ranked Americans, who failed for long stretches to impose their will against 85thranked Guatemala, a team that has never qualified for the World Cup.

Seeking its straight appearance in soccer's showcase, the U.S. (1-0-1) tops Group A of North and Central America and the Caribbean on goal difference over Jamaica (1-0-1), which tied 0-0 tie at Antigua and Barbuda. Guatemala (0-1-1) is last with one point.

The top two teams ad-

vance to next year's six-nation regional finals, which will produce three qualifiers for the 2014 tournament in

The Americans extended their unbeaten streak against Guatemala to 18 games (12-0-6) since 1988 and improved to 6-0-5 against the Guatemalans in World Cup qualifying.

Dempsey scored his 27th international goal off a play that started with a short pass from Johnson on the left. Dempsey cut across to his right, talking touches as he sidestepped Carlos Gallardo and Erwin Morales, then wrong-footed Ricardo Jerez Jr. with a right-footed shot from 16 yards to the goalkeeper's right.

It was Dempsey's 28th goal of the season for club and country, including 23 for England's Fulham.

Just before the goal, Howard made a diving save on Carlos Figueroa's open 10-yard shot from an angle. Ruiz nearly tied the score in first-half injury time, hooking just wide on a leftfooted shot from the top of the arc. When the second half started, Guatemala just missed with a header that went narrowly over the crossbar following a corner kick.

Johnson returned to left back after missing Friday's game because of a strained calf muscle.

U.S. coach Jurgen Klinsmann gave Geoff Cameron his World Cup qualifying debut, bringing him in to start the second half in place of Clarence Goodson, who had gotten a yellow card in the 23rd.

Guatemala coach Ever Hugo Almeida used all three substitutes to start the second half, just as he did Friday. Pappa, Manuel Leon and Dwight Pezzarossi replaced Figueroa, Jose Contreras and Mario Rodriguez.

Guatemala argued unsuccessfully for a penalty kick early in the second half after American defender Carlos Bocanegra kicked a clearance up off his own hand. Jozy Altidore entered at forward for Herculez Gomez in the 64th minute.

Howard made a diving stop on Rodriguez's 5-yard in shot in the 69th after a corner kick was headed in front of the goal. Then, with the net wide open, Ruiz skied the rebound over the crossbar.

# 'Final Umpires' to Decide Clemens' Fate

**WASHINGTON** • The dozen Washingtonians who will decide Roger Clemens' fate heard a day of closing arguments stuffed with attentiongetting sound bites. The eight women and four men who mostly care little about baseball then began deliberations Tuesday that will impact one of the most successful pitchers of his generation – and, in a way, the criminal pursuit of athletes accused of illegal dop-


"You," prosecutor Gil Guerrero told the jurors, "are the final umpires here."

They heard a clever line about Clemens being "a Cy Young baseball player" but not "a Cy Young witness." They heard the key witness called "a flawed man" who produced evidence from a "magic beer can." There were asked to debate whether it's "outrageous" that Clemens was charged in the first place, or whether it's a byproduct from Congress' "authority to protect the nation's youth."

Having digested the competing spins on 26 days of testimony by 46 witnesses, the jury met for some 15 minutes before being excused for the day at 5 p.m. They will reconvene Wednesday afternoon, then unless they reach a quick verdict, take off until Monday because of a long-scheduled outof-town business trip by the judge.

Clemens is charged with perjury, making false statements and obstructing Congress when he testified at a deposition and at a nationally-televised hearing in February 2008. The heart of the charges center on his repeated denials that he used steroids and human growth hormone.

Clemens' chief accuser was his longtime strength coach, Brian McNamee, who spent more than a week on the stand and testified that he injected Clemens with both substances. But also essentially on trial was Congress' right to hold the hearings in the first place, and Clemens lawyer Rusty Hardin spent part of his closing statement appealing to the notion that the U.S. government was way out of line.



# L.A. Kings Savor First Stanley Cup Triumph

LOS ANGELES • The Stanley Cup barely had the Los Angeles Kings' fingerprints on it before Darryl Sutter suggested they should start prepar-

ing to win it again.

"The first thing you think about as a coach, these guys are all young enough, they've got to try it again," the coach said Monday night, mere moments after raising the Cup

for the first time himself. That's just how a pragmatic farmer from Alberta thinks about everything, and Sutter didn't allow his mental preparations for a sequel to stop him from celebrating this irreplaceable moment with his players.

The Kings partied until well after midnight at a restaurant overlooking the Staples Center ice, where Los Angeles completed its 16-4 rampage through the postseason to the franchise's first NHL title.

After nearly 45 years without a Cup, after 41/2 decades with one division title and one conference crown to show for their existence, and after eight straight years from 2002-10 without making the playoffs, Los Angeles and its Kings had earned every minute of it.

Music boomed and drinks flowed for a few hundred friends, family members and Kings employees hanging with the players. Everybody seemingly got a chance to raise the Cup above their heads for triumphant photos, and a few unhappy toddlers were forced to sit in the bowl. The Conn Smythe Trophy also attended, and plenty of people borrowed Jonathan Quick's hardware long enough to chant "M-V-P!" for themselves.

# U.S. Open: Five Best Without

**SAN FRANCISCO •** One of the most popular labels in golf is the best to have never won a major.

Here's another one — best to never win a U.S. Open.

Sam Snead might have won his national open if he had only known the score. Greg Norman is the only player to lose all four strokeplay majors in a playoff, and it started with the U.S. Open at Winged Foot. Phil Mickelson has more silver medals than he wants.

All of them are major champions. All of them are in the Hall of Fame.

Here are the five best players to never have won golf's second-oldest championship:

# 5. Harry 'Lighthorse' Cooper

No player won more PGA Tour titles without capturing major than Harry "Lighthorse" Cooper, who won 29 times. The U.S. Open is the major that haunted him more than the others.

Cooper was a two-time runner-up in the U.S. Open, and both times he had the lead going into the final round.

In 1927 at Oakmont, he was one shot ahead of Tommy Armour, closed with a 77 and lost to Armour by three shots in an 18-hole playoff. Nine years later at Baltusrol, Cooper had a two-shot lead over Vic Ghezzi. Tony Manero came out of nowhere with a 67 on the final day to win by one shot over Cooper, who shot 73.

# 4. Nick Faldo

Always a thinker, Nick Faldo was looking for the secret to winning when he met with Ben Hogan and asked him what it takes to win the U.S. Open.

"Shoot the lowest score," Hogan replied.

Faldo, a three-time Masters and British Open champion, never quite figured that out. Even during his 10-year run in the majors, and despite having U.S. Open qualities of accuracy off the tee and grinding away at pars, his best chance came in 1988 at The Country Club. Faldo fell into a tie with Curtis Strange with three holes to play when he took bogey from a bunker. Still tied after

Strange three-putted the

17th, Faldo had a 25-foot putt from the fringe to win and settled for par. Strange made a superb bunker save on the 18th for par to force a playoff.

# 3. Greg Norman

Greg Norman was lucky to get into a playoff at Winged Foot in 1984 when he holed a 40-foot par putt. Back in the fairway, Fuzzy Zoeller assumed it was for birdie and twirled a white towel. Norman's putt allowed him to get into an 18-hole playoff Monday, and while the Shark was favored, Zoeller put on a clinic. This time, it was Norman waving the white flag in mock surrender. He was runner-up that day, though surely there would be more chances in his bright future.

There were. But he never won a U.S. Open.

Norman was atop the leaderboard going into the final round at Shinnecock Hills in 1986 and in 2005, both times watching someone else (Raymond Floyd, Corey Pavin) hit the shots and hole the putts required of a U.S. Open champion.

Norman only won two majors in his Hall of Fame career, both in the British Open. He won more than 70 tournaments around the world, was No. 1 longer than any other player until Tiger Woods came along and was a dominant figure in golf for a decade.

# 2. Phil Mickelson

Phil Mickelson has been playing the U.S. Open for 20 years, and all he has to show for it is a silver medal. But only because the U.S.

Open doesn't award the purple heart.

Mickelson might have won at Shinnecock Hills in 1995 if not for playing the par-516th

in 6 over for the week. He nearly got into a playoff at Pinehurst No. 2 in 1999 until Payne Stewart made a 15footer for par on the last hole. Five shots behind going into the last day at Bethpage Black, he made Tiger Woods sweat until Woods delivered a key birdie. Mickelson also was runner-up at Bethpage Black in 2009, missing a 3foot putt on the 15th hole to kill his momentum.

Nothing was more memorable than Winged Foot in 2006, when he had a oneshot lead playing the 18th. After a tee shot into the merchandise tents left him a decent lie, he tried to carve a 3-iron around the tree, didn't pull it off and made double bogey to finish one shot behind.

# 1. Sam Snead

Phil Mickelson has more heartache at his national open than Snead, but when it comes to the best without a U.S. Open, none was better than the Slammer. Sneadowns the PGA Tour record with 82 wins. He wona British Openat St. Andrews. He won the Masters and PGA Championship three times each. All that keeps him from joining the other greats to win the Grand Slam was the U.S. Open.

Snead was runner-up four times, but the one U.S. Open that lives in infamy was in 1939 at Philadelphia Country Club. Snead only needed a par on the 18th hole to win, but not knowing the score (there were no scoreboards posted on the 18th back then) and under the impression he needed birdie, he played aggressively off the tee and went into the rough. By the time he chopped his way through the hole, he made a triple bogey and tied for fifth.



**♠** K Q J 8 5 3 When the opponents pre-empt and you end up in an awkward contract, you've got to fight back somehow. In this deal from a 1993 pairs game, Chuck Said (playing with Kathy Ford) found the solu-

cards practically double-dummy. At matchpoints, West's choice to pre-empt at the three-level on a six-card suit may seem wild, but the extra playing strength from the five-card minor makes the choice a reasonable one. Now Said opted for the heart game after his partner doubled three spades for takeout. And yes, a bid of three no-trump by North would probably have been a better al-

tion to his problem by playing the

ternative. Declarer found himself in a precarious spot, but he made the most of what he was dealt. When West led the spade king, Said won the ace in dummy. He cashed the heart ace and queen, noting the fall of the nine from West. Said suspected trumps were 4-2, so he turned his attention to clubs. and his suspicion was confirmed when he cashed the club king and West pitched a spade. Said now played a club to the nine, cashed the club ace and ruffed a club with dummy's heart two.

Next came a spade ruff, stripping East of that suit. Said cashed the heart king and threw East in with a club. The hapless defender had the long trump, so he could cash the trump jack, but then was forced to play away from his diamond king into dummy's A-Q. Said's fine dummy play resulted in plus 450 and a matchpoint tie
