

Man Wanted for Questioning in Jerome Shooting Arrested

TWIN FALLS • A 21-year-old man wanted for questioning about a weekend shooting was arrested in Twin Falls Wednesday, said Lori Stewart, spokeswoman for the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office.

Victor Emmanuel Garcia, of Jerome, was picked up on a warrant for driving without privileges, Stewart said. A report also showed new charges added today for possession of prescription drugs, she said.

"He just came in at 12:30 p.m.," she said.

Jerome police say Garcia was riding in the back passenger seat of a vehicle behind Kendra Adams, 21, of Jerome, at about 1:30 a.m. Sunday in Jerome's west downtown area.

According to police, Garcia had a gun that discharged through the back

seat, shooting Adams in the back. The driver of the vehicle took Adams to St. Luke's Jerome. Police arrived after being alerted of the incident by medical staff.

Adams was later transported to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center where she was in good condition Monday, hospital spokeswoman Laura Stewart said.

On Wednesday, Kendra's father Kevin Adams said his daughter was still in the hospital.

Garcia allegedly fled from the scene and Jerome Police Chief Dan Hall said police are interested in speaking with him about the shooting.

County: Company Doesn't Need New Gravel Permit

TWIN FALLS • After a contentious hearing in late May over whether Twin Falls County should grant a special-use permit to Gordon Paving for a Filer gravel pit, the county's legal department determined that Gordon Paving doesn't require the new permit to operate, said Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Director Bill Crafton.

When co-owners Brian and Brandon Hansen acquired the company about five years ago, they assumed the special-use permit associated with the gravel pit would transfer with the property. When that assumption came into question earlier this year, the Hansens applied for new permits.

But the county's legal department has determined that's not necessary. "It's an existing non-conforming use," Crafton said.

The county Planning and Zoning Commission announced the legal department's decision at a Tuesday meeting.

Residents who live close to the Crystal Springs gravel pit, located outside Filer, had previously issued complaints with the county over deteriorating roads and high volumes of traffic from the company's trucks.

Less Funding, More Volunteers

Operation Facelift uses manpower to make up for dramatic donation drop.

TWIN FALLS • Sherri Miles has a small army of volunteers, armed with gardening gloves and paint brushes, ready to combat urban decay in Rupert.

They may not have the money to match

their enthusiasm, but they hope to make a difference in their community.

Miles, Community and Economic Development Director for the City of Rupert, is one of the local coordinators for Operation Facelift, a two-week, valley-wide effort to freshen up facades in ten downtowns across south-central Idaho. The event has generated excitement among business owners and community leaders, but compared to its 2011 inaugural event, Operation Facelift has much less money with which to work.

In 2011, Operation Facelift received a total of \$17,000 in donations to spruce up neglected buildings throughout the Magic Valley, according to Larry Hall, coordinator for Southern Idaho Rural Development.

This year, that amount dropped to \$1,000. "So what we've had to do is go out and be creative," Hall said.

Local Firefighters Assist in Western Fires

TWIN FALLS • With 15 wildfires burning throughout nine western states, the National Interagency Fire Center is sending Idaho firefighters to help control the flames.

So far, the agency sent firefighters and equipment from the Twin Falls District Bureau of Land Management, Sawtooth National Forest, and local city fire departments.

Twin Falls BLM sent three engines to assist with fires in Utah and an individual to provide public information assistance. The BLM also sent crews to Little Bear in New Mexico – currently the nation's third largest wildfire – to conduct operations on the 36,000 fire.

The BLM sent Helitack support to Alaska and Colorado to assist with Single Engine Air Tanker operations.

The Sawtooth National Forest has seven firefighters and four engines spread out in Nevada, Utah and Colorado. A Hot Shot Crew was sent in Please see FIRE, A2

Police: Woman Wrote Fake Checks for Big Ticket Items

TWIN FALLS • A Rupert woman went on a shopping spree in March 2011, spending more than \$2,000 in 10 days in stores around the Magic Valley.

The problem – police say Elisa De Hoyos, 28, was using fake checks with bogus account numbers to make her purchases.

De Hoyos was arraigned Monday on nine counts of forgery and one count of burglary in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

According to a police report by Twin Falls Police Detective CSO Erin Ash, on March 1, 2011, De Hoyos went to Sportsman's Warehouse at 1940 Bridgeview Blvd., and wrote a check for \$114.29 for a pair of slippers and a knife.

According to the report, the cashier showed the check to loss prevention manager Chris Koons.

"Koons stated that once he saw the check, he felt that it was bogus," the report said.

The next day De Hoyos wrote a \$112.58 check at Kings, 1303 Filer Ave., in Twin Falls, the report said. On March 4 and again on March 5, De Hoyos allegedly wrote fake checks totalling \$284.19 at Swenmart at 115 Addison Ave. in Twin Falls.

In the next few days, De Hoyos allegedly wrote fake checks at several more stores in Twin Falls, including \$500 for a keyboard, stand and case at Welch Music, a speaker and instrument cable worth more than \$300 at



Music, and a BMX bike worth more than \$400 Epic Ride Cyclery,

the report said. She also visited Select Source in Kimberly twice, writing two checks totaling about \$446.

Although police couldn't track De Hoyos down, they spoke to a woman named Elaine Bernal-Ruiz, who was seen by employees with De Hoyos when she wrote the checks. Bernal-Ruiz told police she believed De Hoyos traveled back to Utah, where she was from.

Capt. Matt Hicks at the Twin Falls Police Department, said De Hoyos was picked up in Cassia County and later transferred to the Twin Falls County Jail.

Capt. Dean Larsen at the Jerome Police Department said detectives in Jerome were also working on a case involving De Hoyos writing two checks, one at the Jerome Ridley's Market and one at China Village.

"It's an inactivated case," Larsen said. "We haven't been able to interview her."

According to online court records, the Jerome County incidents occurred on Feb. 28, 2011.

De Hoyos also has an inactive forgery case in Gooding County dated March 9, 2011, online records show.

A preliminary hearing for the Twin Falls case is scheduled for June 22.

Jerome Hires Three New School Administrators

JEROME • There will be a lot of change this coming school year at Jerome High School, as three new administrators were hired for next year.

"Obviously, that's a pretty big change for the administration over there," Superintendent Dale Layne said, but he's glad the district found good candidates.

The school district announced the hiring decisions Wednesday.

Ryan Bowman - principal at Raft River High School in Malta – will be the new Jerome High School principal.

He'll take over for current Jerome principal Eric Anderson, who will lead Jerome's alternative school - Northside Junior/Senior High School – next year.

Lavne said a goal is to build up the district's alternative programs. Anderson, he said, will still be available to answer questions and help out the new administrators if needed.

In addition to Bowman, two current Jerome High employees will transition into new roles next year.

Des Case - a math teacher and wrestling coach - will be the new part-time athletic director, as noted in Wednesday's Times-News.

Math teacher Melissa Rice was hired

as a part-time vice principal.

Both will teach math part-time next year in addition to their administrative duties.

They'll replace assistant principal and athletic director Ty Jones, who will be superintendent of the Hagerman School District starting July 1.

Jerome's school board is scheduled to consider approving one-year contracts for Bowman, Case and Rice during its June 26 meeting.

Layne said the contracts will begin Aug. 13, but the new administrators will be involved in some work going on this summer.

Driver drops can, then strikes unattended car on shoulder.

JEROME • A 2002 Freightliner semi cab that burned to the ground Tuesday evening was driven by an Oregon man who struck an abandoned vehicle while trying to pick up a soda can in his cab, Idaho State Police say.

William Moriarty, 53, of Ashland, Ore., was eastbound on Interstate 84 at about 7 p.m. when he noticed an unoccupied silver 2002 Audi TT Coupe on the right shoulder at milepost 168, near Jerome.

According to ISP, Moriarty - hauling a single trailer – was preparing to move into the left lane when he dropped the can he was holding. He attempted to pick the can up, which caused him to drift onto the right shoulder and strike the Audi.

Though Moriarty wasn't injured in the crash, ISP reports his semi burned to the ground. He was wearing his seatbelt. The crash blocked all eastbound

traffic for an hour and a half before one lane opened up.

ISP continues to investigate the crash with help from the Jerome Police Department.

Blaine County Debates Elder Care Facility Options

HAILEY • Supporters of Croy Canyon Ranch on Tuesday urged Blaine County commissioners to let county residents decide whether they would prefer a proposed tiered care facility over a private care facility.

Supporters urged the commissioners to let voters decide on a \$29.2 million, 35-year general obligation bond to build a tiered program that would offer skilled nursing care, assisted living and independent apartments in Hailey.

Hospital administrator Al Stevenson pointed out that the county has allowed citizens to vote on health care in the valley starting in the 1960s with Moritz Hospital and continuing through the construction of St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center.

Ketchum Attorney Jan Wygle said that the average homeowner would pay only

"have a really high quality facility." And St. Luke's and other projects received "a massive amount of donations" after they were given the green light, she said.

"The potential for sustainability with a 501(c)3 entity is far greater than for a small private facility," she said. "The idea that (a private facility) could provide positive cash flow for Blaine County as they suggest is a dream."

Blaine County Commissioners are trying to figure out how to ensure senior care continues in the valley after county subsidies for Blaine Manor end in September 2013. They looked at 79 potential care providers and asked 40 to respond to a Request for Information.

Three responded: Croy Canyon Ranch, a nonprofit that just started fundraising when the recession hit; the private forprofit, Pocatello-based TanaBell Health Services,

cilities in Pocatello and McCall; and the private, for-profit Safe Haven, which specializes in assisted living and in-home care but also has a skilled nursing facility in Pocatello.

Commissioners Tom Bowman and Larry Schoen indicated that the perfect solution lies with a private entity that would build the facility and consider managing Blaine Manor during construction.

Commissioner Angenie McCleary cautioned that the profits the private companies tout are not guaranteed and don't address the role of the county if there are shortfalls. Safe Haven initially said it didn't want anything from the county but it's become apparent they want a public private partnership, she said.

McCleary said she's concerned that Medicaid readings at one of the respondent's facilities are "quite a bit lower" than those of sistently get high marks.

"I believe we have a very caring community who wants to care for seniors, as exhibited by the Croy Canyon Ranch Foundation," she added. "I would not be opposed to continued public funding if it came from a vote of the people. I don't feel a management approach is our only and best option."

Croy Canyon Ranch has updated its plan since the discussions with commissioners began in February.

The new plans include two new living options eight memory-support assisted living suites and six independent, rental catered-living apartments that require no entry fee. Entry fees for other units have been reduced to reflect current market conditions.

Schoen said time is of the essence: "We need to get going. We've waited far too long to get to where we are now. We don't have time to

County Seeks Hospital Bids

 $\textbf{TWIN FALLS} \bullet \textbf{What does it}$ take to flip a hospital into an office building?

Twin Falls County is soliciting bids for a contractor to remodel the old St. Luke's hospital on Addison Avenue in preparation for consolidating the county's operations in the building.

Currently, county offices are spread throughout Twin Falls in several different buildings, with planning and zoning on 3rd Avenue East, the Department of Motor Vehicles on 4th Avenue North, the clerk and commissioners in the court house, and the assessor's office on Shoshone Street.

That's going to change, said Twin Falls County Commissioner Terry Kramer. Most of the county's offices will move into the old hospital, redubbed County West, by early spring.

But before they move, the building needs a few adjust ments, Kramer said. The county is hiring a contractor to change former examination rooms into offices for county

staff, put in new carpeting and take out hospital-specific amenities.

"We don't need a helicopter pad in front of the emergency room anymore," Kramer said.

The hospital also required more electricity than the county will, so officials are looking at potentially removing one of three transformers, Kramer said.

On June 5, county commissioners took prospective contractors on a tour of County West. Bids for the project are due Tuesday at 2 p.m.

Not everyone at the county is making the move. The prosecutor will stay in the courthouse, and the county coroner will stay with his 4th Avenue North morgue.

The county has already hired Hummel Architects for the new building plans. The DMV and assessor will be on the first floor, and the county clerk will be on the second. The Mustard Tree Wellness Clinic is moving into the former emergency room.

The county won't take up the entire building, said **County Commissioner Leon** Mills. Of the approximately 270,000 square feet in County West, about 150,000 will remain vacant, he said. The county is only paying to remodel the space its offices will occupy and find tenants for the remaining area. Officials also hope to sell or transfer the county buildings they currently occupy.

Mills is excited about the move.

"We're going to do a lot of different things," he said.

Idaho Soldier Loses Legs in Afghanistan Explosion

POCATELLO • The family of a 20-year-old Idaho soldier says he lost both of his legs and suffered other injuries when an improvised explosive device detonated while he was on foot patrol in Afghanistan.

Dennis Krumwiede of Pocatello tells the Idaho State Journal that his son, Matthew, also suffered a fractured pelvis, a broken left arm, internal injuries and lost a couple of fingers in Sunday's explosion.

Matthew Krumwiede is receiving treatment at a U.S. military hospital in Afghanistan and once stabilized, is expected to be airlifted to a hospital in the U.S. or Germany.

Matthew has an identicaltwin brother who's also in the U.S. Army. Their father said Mark Krumwiede recently returned from a tour of duty in Iraq and Kuwait and is currently at Fort Hood, Texas.

Idaho Pilot Makes Emergency Landing

Washington State Patrol Trooper Rob Aucutt told the Lewiston Tribune that 65vear-old Carmine Petracca was headed to Spokane Monday when his aircraft began losing power. Aucutt said the pilot tried to make it an airport, but realized he wouldn't make it and so landed on U.S. Highway 195 near Colfax.

The plane struck a power

line and sustained some tail damage.

Aucutt says the Washington Department of Transportation is coordinating with the Federal Aviation Administration to determine if Petracca will be able to use the highway for takeoff once the plane is repaired.

hy is an international firefight ers' union suing the City of



Ketchum? I wish I knew. What I know, however, is that the union's accusa-

tions are preposterous, and the city has a duty to its citizens to set the record straight.

The major issue appears to be the city's employment "at-will" policy, which the union says it cannot accept. The dismissal "for cause" provision the union demands is the sort of policy that has contributed to putting many cities throughout the country on the verge of bankruptcy.

Ketchum's "at-will" provision is not only in the city's financial best interest but also is clearly the city's right under the Idaho constitution. I feel obligated to treat all city employees equally. It is unfair to give benefits to one department that cannot be given to all.

The city's eight full-time firefighters and 39 volunteers are dedicated individuals who make great personal and family sacrifices to protect and serve our community. I know, I spent five years as a member of this department. We owe them our respect and the best working conditions possible.

So why, rather than to come to us in 2009 with their concerns did the eight full-time firefighters choose to unionize?

I remain convinced that had they spoken to us first, their issues would have been resolved long ago without lawyers and tens of thousands of taxpayer dollars.

Why, too, are out - of town union officials making inflammatory and false statements that cloud the issues?

For example, the union has asked that the city be held in contempt of court for refusing to meet. This makes no sense. Although we do not believe the city is legally required to meet again at this point, we have sent the union two letters offering to meet on six different dates. The union so far has not responded - except with the contempt motion.

The union questions changes to the city employment handbook. This also makes no sense. The City Council resolution specifically exempted the firefighters when it approved the changes.

Union officials have grossly overstated the city's legal costs, giving a figure almost four times higher than the actual costs. They also neglected to note that the union requested many of the procedures that have increased city costs.

Other actions create doubt and suspicion. For example, the union was responsible for recording the contract negotiations and fact-finding commission meetings. All the tapes from the fact-finding commission are missing and many statements from the contract negotiations that support the city's position have been transcribed as "inaudible."

Also disturbing are the anonymous letters sent to my family and the family of the fire chief. These letters were printed from within the fire station. This harassment is reprehensible and contributes to an atmosphere of distrust.

So what's next? The city believes that employment must be "at-will," but the union says it will not accept such a provision. The city believes this constitutes an

The county's population of almost 1 million includes many political staffers and consultants, lawyers, lobbyists and others whose common profession is to cause political power to flow to Washington. Montgomery County also is - this could be just a coincidence - a laboratory of liberalism.

Cross Western Avenue on Wisconsin Avenue, leaving Washington and entering Montgomery County, and you immediately pass Ralph Lauren, Cartier, Bulgari, Christian Dior, Gucci, Jimmy Choo, Tiffany and Saks Fifth Avenue. For those who toil in the ambit of the federal government, virtue may be its own reward, but Louis Vuitton luggage is not to be sneezed at. Washington and its environs are doing well by doing good for – or at any rate to - the rest of America. Four of America's five wealthiest counties, and nine of the richest 15, are in the D.C. area. Joel Kotkin, the demographer, notes that median household income in the nine is more than \$100,000, twice the national average. Washington, Kotkin notes, is not a center of real commerce, "where people



make things or risk their livelihoods on ideas," but it thrives on rent-seeking transactions between economic factions and "the collusional capitalist state." This area is notable not only for its opulence but also – this could be just a coincidence - for industrious regulating to bring everyone into compliance with the right rules.

Which brings us to the reign of virtue at Bethesda Elementary School. There, campaign-finance reform reached an apogee in recent student elections to pick officers for the next school year. The Washington Post reported this with overflowing approval under the headline "These elections stayed classy": "Candidates at the affluent, 500-student school, where many parents have political connections of one sort or another, can't give out buttons. They can't wear Tshirts bearing their names. They can't talk about their competition. And they can't make promises. Not even about school lunches." A 9-year-old candidate for vice president told the Post, "We can't say certain things because the kids would get too excit-

ed." Of course politics should be purged of excitement. But lest you get the wrong idea – the idea that liberalism would, if it could, so firmly restrict political speech that elective offices might as well be allocated by lotteries the school authorities do permit candidates to post signs. Just six per candidate, however, and only as long as the signs say nothing about promises or rivals - or perhaps anything else.

The Post says the "constraints" were first imposed "in the 2008 election cycle to keep campaign expenditures from spiraling out of control." Something uncontrolled? Can't have that. Otherwise corruption or the appearance thereof - the rationale for adult speech "constraints" emanating from Washington - might become the serpent in the garden that is Bethesda Elementary. The next thing you know the wee candidates would be competing for votes the way George Washington did. He offered whiskey. At Bethesda Elementary, the prophylactic rules keep size 4 sneakers off the slippery slope to perdition, understood as candidates dispensing Tootsie Rolls. But even in Montgomery Country, where liberal high-mindedness is the established religion, it is not easy engineering a pristine politics of ab-

solutely equal capacities and perfect manners. The *Post* reports that during his speech a 9-year-old candidate for treasurer used a prop — two bricks made of shredded \$100 bills - that his mother, a former Treasury official, got from the Federal Reserve. It hardly seems fair to allow such parental interventions - mom as super PAC - to interfere with the creation of a level playing field.

And it gets worse. A 9year-old candidate for secretary has a mother who is a congressional staffer but says she got more help with her speech from her father, a pollster. A 10-year-old running for president on an anti-bullying platform included in the first draft of her speech the confession "sometimes, I can be mean" but "my mother said, 'Take that out immediately." Surely Bethesda Elementary should do something about unequal political advantages resulting from unregulated political talk between child candidates and their parents. Bethesda Elementary is, however, diligently preparing its pupils for the world Montgomery County hopes is coming. It will be a world in which politics, cleansed of promises and criticism and too much talk, will be perfectly equal and ever so nice.



Kimberly Hires City Administrator

KIMBERLY • Nicholas Camberlango, currently city manager for Nauvoo, Ill., will be Kimberly's new city clerk/administrator.

Kimberly Mayor Tracy Armstrong announced the hire at Tuesday's City Council meeting.

Camberlango was one of 18 applicants for the job. Originally from Boise, he and his wife should be in Kimberly in time for next month's council meeting, Armstrong said.

"He's sharp and we look forward to working with him," Armstrong said.

Camberlango couldn't be reached for comment for this report.

Camberlango replaces former city administrator Polly Hulsey, who resigned April 2 after a debate over the need for her job at a council meeting. Hulsey has since been hired as the city administrator of Jerome.

Armstrong said interviews narrowed the pool of applicants down to five, then two, before Camberlango was offered the job. The council conducted interviews in person and over Skype.

The city's police department will soon add an officer to its ranks as well, reported Chief Pat Bermingham. The officer recently gradu-

ated from the College of Southern Idaho's law enforcement training and has been interviewed by the department.

Bermingham said following a successful, routine, psychological evaluation, the officer will be given an offer of employment, then introduced to city staff and the council.

In other business, Tracy Ahrens with J-U-B Engineers of Twin Falls gave an update on a feasibility study of city's the wastewater infrastructure.

Kimberly doesn't have a wastewater facility and its effluent is piped to Twin Falls for treatment. J-U-B is studying whether Kimberly building a pretreatment plant or building a new wastewater facility with Hansen would be economically feasible.

Ahrens asked the City Council for direction in completing the study - specifically, what level of projected growth to factor into the plans for the treatment plant.

The city's rate of growth has varied over the last decade, reaching as high as 4.5 percent but declining with the recession, Ahrens said, citing U.S. census records.

The city plans a workshop to discuss the issue.

Armstrong said he expects a feasibility study by Forsgren Associates of Boise on Kimberly building a wastewater treatment plant with Hansen to be completed within the next six weeks.

Judge: Sheep Can't Graze on Disputed Idaho Ground

BOISE • A federal judge ruled Wednesday that ranchers won't be able to turn out domestic sheep on disputed grazing ground in western Idaho's Payette National Forest.

U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill's preliminary injunction, delivered swiftly in his Boise courtroom, is a victory for environmentalists aiming to protect bighorn sheep from diseases transmitted by their

domestic cousins.

At issue was the U.S. Forest Service's decision to keep open three grazing allotments totaling 7,700 acres that had originally been due to be shuttered in 2012.

In March, the Forest Service cited 2011 congressional legislation by Idaho U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson aiming to keep the allotments open for at least another year.

But environmentalists including The Wilderness Society and Western Watersheds Project successfully argued the Forest Service had misinterpreted Simpson's measure, a rider in the agency's budget, to the peril of wild sheep.

Report: McGee to **Plead Guilty** in August

BOISE (AP) • Former Republican state Sen. John McGee will plead guilty to misdemeanor charges linked to sexual harassment allegations that resulted in his February departure from the Idaho Legislature, according to a newspaper report.

McGee is due in 4th District Court in Boise on Aug. 21.

The Idaho Statesman Wednesday cited on court documents indicating McGee will plead guilty to disturbing the peace and a probation violation.

According to the documents, a prosecutor told Magistrate Judge James Cawthon that McGee made "sexually provocative" comments to a Senate aide, resulting in her being "unhappy, tearful and crying often?

Before he quit on Feb. 22 under the threat of a Senate Ethics Committee investigation, McGee was the fourth-ranking state senator as the GOP majority caucus chairman.

McGee, from Caldwell, was arrested on Father's Day 2011 after driving drunk in a stranger's car.

Car theft charges were dropped, but according to the terms of a plea deal, he had to avoid renewed problems with the law until July 1, a provision that resulted in the probation violation charge Tuesday.

Deputy Ada County prosecutor Jean Fisher Cawthon's said in courtroom Tuesday that McGee had become "sexually provocative" toward a female employee.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • An air tanker dropping retardant on a southern Utah wildfire earlier this month veered off its flight path while following a lead plane moments before crashing into mountainous terrain, killing both pilots aboard, according to a preliminary federal report on the accident.

The National Transportation Safety Board found the Lockheed P2V-7 was on its second flight of the day dropping retardant when it followed another plane into a shallow valley less than a half-mile wide and 350 feet deep.

"The lead airplane flew a shallow right-hand turn on to final, and dropped to an altitude of 150 feet above the valley floor over the intended drop area," the report released this week stated.

The P2V-7 then crashed into the mountains about 700 feet off the lead plane's flight path, the report noted.

NTSB spokesman Keith Holloway said Wednesday the agency is still investigat ing the cause of the June 3 crash, including potential mechanical failure, pilot error and a probe into whether the plane's deviation from the lead aircraft's flight path may have been a contributing factor.

Complete findings likely won't come for months. The preliminary report did not cite any causes.

Experts say a lead plane is typically used to guide the larger tanker into the drop zone above a blaze.

Tanker pilots are supposed to always keep the lead plane in sight, but that can be difficult in smoky conditions close the ground where wind can push the plane around, said Thomas Eversole, executive director of the American Helicopter Services & Aerial Firefighting Association.

"Generally, you won't find anyone who deviates from that flight path unless they lose sight" of the lead plane, Eversole said. "If he loses sight of him, he could very well get himself into a position where he could be in a lot of danger.

"The wind from those fires does really crazy things," Eversole added. "It could have pushed him sideways just enough to get him off course, and if he lost sight of his lead plane, that could have been it?"

Firefighters were battling a lightning-sparked wildfire that jumped the Nevada border about 150 miles northeast of Las Vegas when the crash occurred. Investigators said the plane was reduced to fragments upon impact. Two pilots from Boise, Idaho, were killed.

The crash renewed concerns about the nation's aging firefighting aircraft fleet, along with the dwindling number of available planes just as the West enters what is expected to be a brutal season, and massive blazes burned in Colorado and New Mexico.

The U.S. Forest Service doesn't own any of the firefighting aircraft, but instead contracts with private companies that have limited stocks. The service announced recently it would increase the national fleet to 17 available aircraft, and on Wednesday said it had awarded contracts to four companies to provide seven next generation air tankers to help replace the nation's aging fleet.

Shortly before the Forest Service announcement, President Barack Obama signed a bill aimed at speeding those efforts to award the contracts.

FEDERAL PROSECUTORS DROP CASE AGAINST EDWARDS

GREENSBORO, N.C. • Federal prosecutors dropped all charges Wednesday against John Edwards after his corruption trial ended last month in a deadlocked ju-

ry.

Jurors in North Carolina acquitted the former presidential candidate on one count of accepting illegal campaign contributions and deadlocked on five other felony counts. The judge declared a mistrial.

Prosecutors will not seek to retry Edwards on the five unresolved counts, according to a U.S. Justice Department statement.

Assistant Attorney General Lanny A. Breuer, who oversees the agency's criminal division, said prosecutors knew the case, like all campaign finance cases, would be challenging. But he said it is "our duty to bring hard cases" when warranted.

"Last month, the government put forward its best case against Mr. Edwards, and I am proud of the skilled and professional way in which our prosecutors.... conducted this trial," he said.

Edwards was accused of masterminding a scheme to use about \$1 million in secret payments from two wealthy political donors to hide his pregnant mistress as he sought the White House in 2008. He would have faced up to 30 years in prison and \$1.5

Syria Overruns Rebellious Village, Violence Spikes in 'Civil War'

BEIRUT • Syrian forces overran a mountain enclave near the Mediterranean coast Wednesday, seizing the territory back from rebels as a serious escalation in violence signaled both sides are using more powerful weapons.

With the bloodshed ramping up, France joined the U.N. peacekeeping chief in declaring Syria was in a state of civil war.

"When many groups belonging to the same people tear each other apart and kill each other, if you can't call it a civil war, then there are no words to describe it," French Foreign Minister Laurent Fabius told a news conference in Paris.

The battle for Haffa, in the mountains

of Latakia province, raged for eight days as regime forces shelled the village to drive out rebels. The operation apparently was part of a larger offensive to retake areas that had fallen into rebel hands.

State television said regime forces had "cleansed" Haffa of "armed terrorist groups" and the Foreign Ministry urged U.N. observers to immediately head there "to check what the terrorist groups have done."

It wasn't immediately clear whether the U.N. observers would be able to reach Haffa. On Tuesday, an angry crowd hurled rocks and sticks at the U.N. mission's vehicles, forcing them to turn back. None of the observers was hurt.

Sausan Ghosheh, a spokeswoman for the observers, said they have been trying to reach Haffa since June 7. Hundreds of rebel fighters believed to have been holed up in Haffa and nearby villages pulled out overnight, said Rami Abdul-Rahman, director of the Britishbased Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, citing a network of activists on the ground.

On another front, fireballs of orange flames exploded over the central city of Homs, where Syrian forces fired a continuous rain of shells that slammed into the rebel-held neighborhoods of Khaldiyeh, Jouret al-Shayyah and the old city.

Recovering Haffa was particularly significant to the regime because the town is about 20 miles from President Bashar Assad's hometown. Latakia province is the heartland of the Alawite minority to which Assad and the ruling elite belong.

At trial, the case against Edwards rested largely on the testimony of his former right-hand man, Andrew Young, who initially claimed paternity of his boss's baby and deposited most of the money at issue in the case into his family's personal accounts. But upon cross examination, Edwards' lawyers used inconsistencies from Young's past statements to undermine his credibility and showed the aide and his wife siphoned off much of the money to help build their \$1.6 million dream home.

A former trial lawyer, Edwards elected not to testify at his six-week trial. His mistress, Rielle Hunter, also didn't take the stand.

After deliberating for nine days, jurors acquitted Edwards on a charge of accepting illegal campaign contributions, involving \$375,000 from elderly heiress Rachel "Bunny" Mellon in 2008. He had also been charged with illegally accepting \$350,000 from Mellon in 2007, other donations from wealthy Texas attorney Fred Baron, filing a false campaign finance report and conspiracy.

Edwards' lawyers — Abbe Lowell, Allison Van Laningham and Alan W. Duncan — said in a joint statement that they are pleased with the government's decision not to seek a second trial that they believe would have had the same outcome.

"While John has repeatedly admitted to his sins, he has also consistently asserted, as we demonstrated at the trial, that he did not violate any campaign law nor even imagined that any campaign laws could apply," they said. "We are very glad that, after living under this cloud for over three years, John and his family can have their lives back and enjoy the peace they deserve."

Edwards, who lives in Chapel Hill, has not yet issued a statement. His eldest daughter, Cate Edwards, reacted using her Twitter account moments after prosecutors announced their decision. She sat behind her father in the courtroom nearly every day of his six week trial.

"Big sigh of relief," Cate Edwards, 30, tweeted. "Ready to move forward with life."

BAGHDAD • Car bombs ripped through Shiite and Kurdish targets in Baghdad and other cities Wednesday, killing at least 66 people, wounding more than 200 and feeding growing doubts that Iraq will emerge as a stable democracy after decades The latest bloodshed comes against a backdrop of sharpening political divisions that show Iraq has made little progress in healing the breach among its religious and ethnic communities that once pushed the country to the brink of civil war. The coordination, sophistication and targets of the attack bore the hallSunni militant allies seeking to exploit these tensions.

Iraqi authorities played down any suggestion that the devastating attacks that have taken place every few weeks or so since the U.S. military withdrew in mid-December portend a return to the all-out, tit-for-tat violence that tore the nation apart in 2006-2007.

U.S. Wildfires Duel Urgency for Forest Restoration

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. • A combination of decades of vigorous fire suppression and the waning of the timber industry over environmental concerns has left many forests a tangled, overgrown mess, subject to the

kind of super-fires that are now regularly consuming hundreds of homes and millions of acres.

As firefighters continue to battle massive blazes in New Mexico and Colorado, U.S. Forest Service Chief Tom Tidwell is renewing his call to restore forests to a more natural state, in which fire was a part of the landscape and in many instances was far less destructive.

The Forest Service is on a mission to set the clock back to zero and the urgency couldn't be greater, Tidwell said. The plan calls for accelerating restoration programs – every-thing from prescribed fire and

Accusers: Sandusky Used Threats and Gifts

BELLEFONTE, Pa. (AP) • One, a foster child, said he was threatened, warned he would never see his family again if he ever told anyone what happened. Another said he stayed quiet because he didn't want to stop getting tickets to the hottest game in town – Penn State football.

That was how two of Jerry Sandusky's alleged victims explained the former Penn State assistant coach's hold over them.

"He told me that if I ever told anyone that I'd never see my family again," the former foster child testified Wednesday on Day 3 of Sandusky's child sexual abuse trial.

He said Sandusky uttered the threat after the coach pinned him while wrestling in the basement of the Sandusky home and performed oral sex on him.

Sandusky, 68, is charged with sexually abusing 10 boys over a 15-year period — accusations he has denied. His arrest last fall rocked Penn State and led to the firing of football coach Joe Paterno for not taking stronger action against Sandusky a decade ago.

As the violence spiked, both sides in the conflict appeared to be using heavier weapons.

U.N. observers reported Syrian helicopters were firing on Haffa and other restive areas, and amateur videos posted online by activists suggest the opposition is using powerful anti-tank missiles.

"There are arms being delivered, and on both sides," Fabius said.

Although the Syrian rebels are outgunned by the well-armed Syrian army, weapons have been flowing across the country's borders from neighboring Turkey, Iraq and Lebanon. The rebels also say they buy weapons from Syrian soldiers looking to make a profit.


Tensions over the issue flared Wednesday between the U.S. and Russia as they traded blame for the violence in Syria.

U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton held to her explosive accusation that the "latest information" in U.S. hands is that Russia is sending attack helicopters to Assad's regime. Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov fired back by alleging the U.S. has sent military support to the region.

"We have repeatedly urged the Russian government to cut these military ties completely and to suspend all further support and deliveries," Clinton told reporters in Washington. "We know, because they confirm, that they continue to deliver and we believe that the situation is spiraling toward civil war. It is now time for everyone in the international community, including Russia ... to speak to Assad in unified voice and insist that the violence stop?

Lavrov rejected the charge, saying his government was completing earlier weapons contracts with Syria for air defense systems to be used exclusively for self defense against "an armed attack from the outside?"

"We are not supplying either to Syria or anywhere else things that are used in fighting with peaceful demonstrators, in contrast to the United States, which regularly supplies such

NASA Launches Telescope to Seek Out Black Holes

LOS ANGELES • NASA on Wednesday launched its newest X-ray space telescope on a mission to shine a light on black holes and other hard-to-see objects lurking in the Milky Way and other galaxies.

Mission controllers clapped after receiving a signal from the telescope that it had reached orbit 350 miles above Earth.

"It's a terrific day," assistant launch director Tim Dunn said.

NASA decided to airlaunch the \$170 million mission, instead of rocketing off from a launch pad, because it was cheaper. The telescope was boosted into orbit by a Pegasus rocket released from a carrier aircraft that took off from the remote Kwajalein Atoll, a horseshoe-shaped Pacific island halfway between Hawaii and Australia.

After free-falling for several seconds, the rocket ignited its engines and climbed to space. Minutes later, the telescope separated from the rocket and unfurled its solar panels as it circled 350 miles above the Earth.

The Nuclear Spectroscopic Telescope Array, or NuStar for short, focuses high-energy X-rays to peer through gas and dust in search of supermassive black holes in the center of galaxies, remnants of exploded stars and other exotic celestial objects.

Lake Detected near Equator of Saturn's Titan

LOS ANGELES (AP) • In a surprise find, scientists say they have spotted hints of a methane-rich lake and several ponds near the equator of Saturn's biggest moon.

Lakes were previously spied near Titan's polar regions. It was long thought that bodies of liquid could not exist at Titan's midsection because energy from the sun at those latitudes would cause methane pools to evaporate.

"This discovery was completely unexpected because lakes are not stable at tropical latitudes," said planetary scientist Caitlin Griffith of the University of Arizona, who led the discovery team.

By measuring reflected sunlight from Titan's surface and atmosphere, the international Cassini spacecraft detected a dark region near the landing site of Huygens, a companion probe that parachuted to Titan's equator in 2005.

Scientists said further analysis of the dark feature suggests the presence of a 927-square-mile hydrocarbon lake - twice as big as Lake Champlain, a freshwater lake that borders upstate New York and Vermont. Near the equatorial lake were hints of four shallow ponds similar in size and depth to marshes on Earth.

The findings were detailed in Thursday's issue of the journal Nature.

Titan is among the few bodies in the solar system with a dense atmosphere, but scientists have wrestled over the source of the thick blanket of nitrogen and methane. Methane gas in the atmosphere is constantly broken up by sunlight and falls to the surface where it is transported back to the poles, condensing to form lakes.

While black holes are invisible, the region around them gives off telltale Xrays. NuStar will observe previously known black holes and map hidden ones. By zeroing in on never-before-seen parts of the universe, scientists hope to better understand how galaxies form and evolve.

"We can view black holes

and galaxies even if they're enshrouded with dust and gas. If you had high-energy X-ray eyes and you stared up out of the galaxy, what you would see is the glow of all the massive black holes sprinkled throughout the cosmos," chief scientist Fiona Harrison of the California Institute of Technolo-

gy said earlier this week.

mechanical thinning - by 20 percent each year in key areas that are facing the greatest danger of a catastrophic fire.

This year's target: 4 million acres. The budget: About \$1 billion.

"We need to understand the conditions we're facing today;" Tidwell told The Associated Press in an interview. "They're different than what we used to deal with. We're seeing erratic fire behavior, more erratic weather?"

In southern New Mexico, a lightning-sparked fire raced across more than 34,000 acres in a matter of three days, damaging or destroying at least 224 homes and other structures in the mountains outside of the resort community of Ruidoso. Hundreds of residents remained out of their homes Wednesday.

The Little Bear blaze has scorched 58 square miles in the Sierra Blanca range and containment stood at 35 percent after crews used a two-day break in the hot, windy weather to build miles of fire lines and conduct burnout operations.

To the north, smoke from a fire burning in Colorado was blowing into southeastern Wyoming and smudging the skies above Cheyenne on Wednesday. That blaze, about 15 miles west of Fort Collins, has burned 73 square miles, destroyed more than 100 structures and forced hundreds of people from their homes.

More than 600 firefight ers labored to build containment lines as air tankers and helicopters focused on protecting buildings from the High Park fire.

The accelerated restoration effort is focused on several landscape-scale projects, the largest of which is a 20-year plan that calls for restoring 2.4 million acres across four forests in northern Arizona. The Forest Service recently awarded a contract to start thinning the first 300,000 acres.

planned in the Jemez Mountains of northern New Mexico, where a historic fire ripped through 244 square miles and threatened one of the national's premier nuclear laboratories just last summer.

Another concern is the 8.6 million acres of standing trees killed by beetle infestations. Restoration projects from Oregon and South Dakota to Colorado are aimed at tackling that problem. One of those, the White River National Forest collaborative project, is expected to result in more than 190,000 tons of biomass through thinning.

Forest officials estimate the cost of fire suppression in some of the areas targeted for restoration could be reduced by up to 50 percent because of the work.

The directive doesn't stop at the landscape level, however. Each forest in the Southwest is part of a pilot project that pools regular watershed and wildlife program funds for restoration. Regional forester Corbin Newman said that amounts to millions of dollars.

In an era of tight budgets and taxed resources, forest officials acknowledged that restoration will be a challenge. They said part of the solution is setting priorities and forming more partnerships with states, municipalities and even water utilities given the impacts catastrophic fires can have on watersheds. Some 66 million Americans rely on drinking water that flows from the nation's forests.

Still, there are millions of acres - wilderness and roadless, rugged areas where mechanical thinning won't be an option. In those areas, fire will have to take its natural course.

"Everybody has to keep in mind that fire will play a huge significant role in our landscape for the rest of time," Newman said. "Sometimes people think through either restoration or suppression we can just make fires go away. We have to remind folks we're just trying put fire back into its natural processes and cycles as opposed to what we're seeing in today's world."

Altogether, 17 explosions struck Baghdad and six other cities and towns some 300 miles (500 kilometers) apart, from Mosul in the vast deserts of the north to Hillah in the fertile plains of the south. Hours after the bombing in Hillah, puddles of blood and shards of metal still clogged a drainage ditch. Soldiers and dazed onlookers wandered near the charred remains of the car that exploded, gazing at the gaping holes in nearby shops.

Wednesday's blasts were the third this week targeting the annual pilgrimage to observe the eighth-century death of Imam Moussa al-Kadhim, a revered saint who was the Prophet Muhammad's great-grandson. The processions of the faithful, many waving green banners, will converge on a golden-domed shrine in Baghdad's northern neighborhood of Kazimiya. The commemoration culminates on Saturday.

LONDON • Diesel fumes cause cancer, the World Health Organization's cancer agency declared Tuesday, a ruling it said could make exhaust as important a public health threat as secondhand smoke.

The risk of getting cancer from diesel fumes is small, but since so many people breathe in the fumes in some way, the science panel said raising the status of diesel exhaust to carcinogen from "probable carcinogen" was an important shift.

"It's on the same order of magnitude as passive smoking," said Kurt Straif, director of the IARC department that evaluates cancer risks. "This could be another big push for countries to clean up exhaust from diesel engines."

Since so many people are exposed to exhaust, Straif said there could be many cases of lung cancer connected to the contaminant. He said the fumes affected groups including pedestrians on the street, ship passengers and crew, railroad workers, truck drivers, mechanics, miners and people operating heavy machinery.

The new classification followed a weeklong discussion in Lyon, France, by an expert panel organized by the International Agency for Research on Cancer. The panel's decision stands as the ruling for the IARC, the cancer arm of the World Health Organization.



10,000 Germ Species Live in and on Healthy People

WASHINGTON • They live on your skin, up your nose, in your gut – enough bacteria, fungi and other microbes that collected together could weigh, amazingly, a few pounds.

Now scientists have mapped just which critters normally live in or on us and where, calculating that healthy people can share their bodies with more than 10,000 species of microbes.

Don't say "eeew" just yet. Many of these organisms work to keep humans healthy, and results reported Wednesday from the government's Human Microbiome Project define what's normal in this mysterious netherworld.

One surprise: It turns out that nearly everybody harbors low levels of some harmful types of bacteria, pathogens that are known for causing specific infections. But when a person is healthy — like the 242 U.S. adults who volunteered to be tested for the project those bugs simply quietly coexist with benign or helpful microbes, perhaps kept in check by them.

The next step is to ex- o

plore what doctors really want to know: Why do the bad bugs harm some people and not others? What changes a person's microbial zoo that puts them at risk for diseases ranging from infections to irritable bowel syndrome to

psoriasis? Already the findings are reshaping scientists' views of how people stay healthy, or not.

"This is a whole new way of looking at human biology and human disease, and it's awe-inspiring," said Dr. Phillip Tarr of Washington University at St. Louis, one of the lead researchers in the \$173 million project, funded by the National Institutes of Health.

"These bacteria are not passengers," Tarr stressed. "They are metabolically active. As a community, we now have to reckon with them like we have to reckon with the ecosystem in a forest or a body of water."

And like environmental ecosystems, your microbial makeup varies widely by body part. Your skin could be like a rainforest, your intestines teeming with different species like an ocean.

Tsunami Dock: Should It Stay or Should It Go?

Thousands of people are flocking to see a Japanese dock that was torn loose by last year's tsunami and ended up on an Oregon beach. But it won't stay a tourist attraction for long.

Some local residents and callers to the Oregon Department of Parks and Recreation are suggesting that state officials leave the 165-ton, 66-foot-long dock as a memorial.

Chris Havel, a state parks spokesman, said the state is obligated to protect the integrity of the beach, which means keeping it clean.

"It's not an automatic decision that everything must go," he said from Salem, Ore. "We do sit back and say, 'Is there any reason to change the way Oregon manages the beach with this object?' The answer here, as it has been in the past, is to protect the beach. That is more important than anything more temporary."

Other residents say the dock, made of reinforced concrete and plastic foam, is an eyesore on Agate Beach, a popular recreational area north of Newport.

"It's cluttering up my beach," said Judy Wright, a front desk clerk at the near-

by Sylvia Beach Hotel.

The dock has become a draw, with tens of thousands of visitors since it washed up early last week. The parks department has counted 12,791 cars in the parking lot since the dock washed up June 5. The same week in 2011 saw just 2,077 cars.

"I think they should just pull it farther up on the beach and make a memorial out of it, myself," said Judy Kuhl, general manager of the Best Western Plus Agate Beach Inn, where guests staying on some top floors can see the barge from balconies. "It would bring people here. It's also something for us to remember. It's part of history.'

At least one newspaper also backed leaving the dock on the beach, using as an example the stern of a huge freighter that was left on another Oregon beach for nearly a decade. An editorial in *The World* newspaper in Coos Bay said the state shouldn't hurry to remove it and might consider leaving it permanently. "It could become a mag-

net for Japanese tourists," the newspaper wrote.

The state has similar attractions elsewhere, such as the wreckage of the ship Peter Iredale at Fort Stevens State Park near Astoria. Havel said had officials in 1906 been able to remove the iron skeleton, they would have done so.

The issue of how the state could remove the dock remains a mystery — for now. On Wednesday, the department opened bids on proposals to either dismantle the dock and haul it to a landfill, or tow it off the beach and take it to a port where it could be put back to use.

Preliminary cost estimates appeared to favor dismantling the dock. Havel said the state could give some pieces to artists to create a memorial elsewhere. A decision would be made in days.

Havel said the state was preparing for more beach trash as debris from the 2011 tsunami continues to show up on northern Oregon beaches. The bulk of that debris was expected to arrive in the winter.

As for the dock, retired oil tanker chief mate Dick Clarey said he hoped there wouldn't be a repeat of an exploding whale that has become Oregon beach lore.

A 1970 video shows the Oregon Highway Division using dynamite to dispose of a rotting whale carcass, which then rained down on bystanders and crushed the roof of a car.

Republicans, Democrats at Odds on Energy Issues

WASHINGTON • Republicans and Democrats seem to be living on different planets when it comes to how to meet U.S. energy needs.

Republicans overwhelmingly push for more oil drilling. Democrats back conservation and new energy sources such as wind and solar power.

A survey by The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research shows that the polarized positions on energy that have divided Congress and emerged in the presidential campaign also run deep among the public.

While majorities in both parties say energy is an important issue, the poll shows that partisan identification is closely tied to people's perceptions of the causes of the country's energy problems and possible solutions. No other demographic factor not race, age, gender or income level - is as consistently associated with opinions on energy as political party identification.

For example:

• Three of four Democrats surveyed report that a major reason for the county's energy problems is that industry does not do enough to support clean energy. By comparison 43 percent of the Republicans questioned believe that.

• Three of four Republicans in the poll cite government limits on drilling as a major reason for energy problems, compared with 34 percent of Democrats.

Also, 85 percent say it is a serious problem that the United States needs to buy energy from other countries, but there's disagreement about why. Among Republicans in the poll, 65 percent say the U.S. does not produce enough domestic energy to meet demand. Yet just over

half the Democrats say people use too much energy.

Even on areas where there's majority agreement, a partisan gap remains. For instance, there is broad backing for programs to help consumers learn to make more energy-efficient choices, but the support is 81 percent among Democrats and 57 percent among Republicans.

Paul Bledsoe, a senior advisor with the Bipartisan Policy Center and a former Clinton White House aide, said the results provide an unsettling snapshot of a partisan rift that affects every aspect of policy and politics. He said the big question is whether parties and candidates will acknowledge that they agree on a range of energy solutions and try to make progress, or keep up attacks intended to appeal to their political bases.



TWIN FALLS • A day trip to the Snake River wasn't only for recreation; it was to test out a cabin boat that Tim Ford recently purchased.

"There's definitely three basic navigation rules," Twin Falls County Sheriff's Deputy Steve Vaughn said. "Practice good seamanship, keep a proper lookout, and maintain a safe speed."

Going Afield with Man's Best Friend

Hunters and animal rights groups face off over ban to use dogs to hunt bears and bobcats.

SAN JOSE, Calif. • For a thousand years, dogs and hunting have gone together like bows and arrows, guns and bullets, predators and prey.

In medieval Europe, people tracked boars and stags with packs of hounds. Founding Fathers Thomas Jefferson and George Washington owned hunting dogs.

But simply because something is an old tradition doesn't mean it should continue, say animal-rights groups, whose efforts to ban the use of dogs to hunt bears and bobcats is gaining momentum in the California Legislature.

The issue, this year's most heated environmental battle in Sacramento, is drawing intense passions. Critics say hunters with packs of yapping dogs fitted with radio collars chase exhausted wild animals for miles, cornering them in branches and shooting them point blank.

"It's not only unethical and inhumane, it's unnecessary," said Jennifer Fearing, California director of the Humane Society of the United States. "We don't do it for public safety or population management. We do it for recreation. It's out of step with California's values."

But hunters say their opponents are barking up the wrong tree.

They see the bill, SB 1221, by state Sen. Ted Lieu, D-Redondo Beach, as the latest assault by mostly urban environmentalists and voters against mostly rural hunters.

"First they banned mountain lion hunting, then trapping," said Dan Tichenor, a retired Castro Valley engi-

neer who hunts bears with his six Plott hounds, a breed with supremely sensitive sniffing abilities that looks a bit like a bloodhound, without the loose skin.

"Now they're going after bear and bobcat hunting with dogs," he said. "I think the plan is to ban it species by species, state by state. Their goal is to eventually ban all hunting?

At a key hearing in April, 600 hunters and 200 animal-rights supporters turned out at the state Capitol.

Tichenor, who worked on nuclear weapons components and combustion research for 33 years at Sandia National Laboratory in Livermore, began hunting with dogs as a 7-year-old in rural Missouri, pursuing squirrels and raccoons with his father.

If bear hunting is going to be legal in California, he said, using dogs is the most compassionate way to do it because the animals die immediately with a direct shot.

"Climbing trees is a natural behavior for a bear," he said. "Yes, you are shooting a bear at close range. But it is humane. When most animals in the wild die, they do not die that quickly."

California wouldn't be the first state to ban the use of dogs for hunting bears. Fourteen states, including Oregon, Washington, Wyoming and Montana, now ban the practice. Thirteen states ban using dogs to hunt bobcats.

"I want California to be as humane as Montana was in 1921 when that pro-hunting state banned the use of dogs for bear hunting," Lieu said.

Lieu is not a hunter. He was a captain in the Air Force, however, and won two

Mars around the turn of the 20th century were nothing more than a combination of atmospheric distortion and the tendency of the human eye to see patterns in indistinct shapes (like ink blots and clouds). But such blunders are hardly unique in astronomical history.

In 1672, Italian astronomer Giovanni Cassini (discoverer of Jupiter's Great Red Spot, four of Saturn's moons, and the largest of the gaps in the planet's rings) spotted a previouslyundiscovered moon orbiting Venus. When he saw it a second time 14 years later, he announced its existence to the world. The discovery was bolstered by 30 independent observations of the moon by wellrespected astronomers over the subsequent eight decades, including one sighting of its silhouette during Venus's transit across the sun's face in 1761.

Yet many other astronomers failed to see the moon, prompting Belgian



astronomer John-Charles Houzeau to speculate that it was actually a planet orbiting just outside Venus's orbit, causing it to only occasionally appear near the planet. Houzeau named the phantom planet/moon "Neith," after an Egyptian goddess of war and weaving. Some even attempted to estimate its orbital period about Venus.

Despite its many apparitions, by the late 19th century Neith was seen no more. The fact that its disappearance coincided with the birth of astrophotography (immune to the idiosyncrasies of the human visual system) is telling; most of its sightings have subsequently been shown to be misidentified stars or optical illusions.

The space age sealed Neith's fate: Despite over two dozen visits to the second planet by space

Big Carp the Target of Night Bowfishing Outing

ON BIG MARINE LAKE, Minn. • Revealing itself against our advancing flood lamps, the shallow water seemed an endless aquarium alive with bluegills, small northerns, bass and the odd beaver. We were hunting carp, and here and there some of these fish also showed up, the lot of them laboring heavily against their thick scales, mouths puckered grotesquely.

This was the other night, warm and dark, and the moon peeked through a small partition in an otherwise overcast sky. We were on Big Marine Lake not far north of St. Paul, and in addition to carp, we were targeting other finned bad boys among the state's long list of watery untouchables, including bullheads and suckers — the whole reprobate enchilada.

"Right there," Pat Kirschbaum said, nodding to starboard and drawing the attention of my son, Trevor, who stood in the bow with Pat, arrow nocked.

This was a carp Pat spotted, weighing perhaps 15 pounds and leaving the scene like a bank robber. Perhaps the fish had been alerted by our boat's bright lights. Perhaps the whrrrr of the electric trolling motor that pulled us ahead sent him yonder. Or perhaps he skedaddled into the vague margins separating light from dark for no good reason.

A tough shot, anyway, and Trevor loosed an arrow that angled away against long odds.

Watching from astern, I sat alongside Brian Petschl, a frequent bowfishing partner of Pat's. A onetime ar-

dent angler — that is, with hook and line — Brian no longer casts plugs into lily pads for bass, or back-trolls for walleyes.

"All I do now is bowfish," he said. "Ever since the first time I picked up a bow and took a shot at a carp, it's what I've wanted to do. Bowfishing combines two of my favorite things: being on the water, and hunting."

A fast-growing sport, bowfishing gained steam in Minnesota beginning in 2009, when the Legislature finally lifted the state's ban on night fishing. Theoretically, the prohibition was intended to preserve the serenity of Minnesota lakes, the concern being that a bowfisherman's bright lights and the generators needed to power them might disturb campers, cabin dwellers and homeowners.

"When we got the night ban lifted, it brought us in line with every other state in the country," Brian said. "I think we were the last, or one of the last, states to allow night bowfishing."


Seductive in the manner of nighttime's more familiar temptresses, bowfishing is a visual thing. What you see is what you get. Also, the challenge of understanding how water refracts light is a brain teaser that requires the angler — archer — to aim his arrow not where his eyes tell him a fish is but instead, thanks to the trickery of refraction, below that point.

out, attach a 7- to 8-foot galvanized chain to the anchor; be sure the line is strong and long enough (seven to 10 times longer than maximum water depth) to anchor your craft. Store it in an easily accessible area.

• **Casting off:** Good boating begins early. Before casting off, keep your boat tied to the dock while warming



F & G Recognizes Sportsmanship With Coins

"I saw a metal coin that read, 'Caught in the Act of Doing Good' and it was minted by the department and given to a buddy of mine. It was really cool. What's that program about?"

I n Idaho there exists a group of sportsmen that exhibit poor behavior and ethics, casting the sporting public in a poor light and degrading the opportunities available to them.

Landowners are locking gates and prohibiting access throughout the state, in part, because this group has left gates open, left refuse behind, damaged property or have otherwise been inconsiderate of the land and/or landowner.

Public support of hunting struggles because of things like the gross display of harvested animals, abuse of motorized vehicles, road hunting, etc. Urban fishing opportunities are eagerly sought, but the garbage left behind by many anglers makes it difficult to gather broad support for these projects. These are not new problems, and a variety of programs have been developed throughout the years to help address this issue. However, the problem persists and any effort to improve sportsmen behavior and ethics is likely to benefit all sportsmen.

What you saw was a metal coin the Magic Valley Region of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game had produced to recognize and reward sportsmen and women on the spot for demonstrating good sportsmanship, ethics, extraordinary habitat improvement and demonstration of land stewardship, assist youth hunting/angling or wildlife conservation. The program is called "Caught in the Act of Doing Good." Your buddy obviously did something in the above categories to earn presentation of a coin. I suggest you ask him.

No distinct definition is possible to describe what is expected in order to receive a coin. However, the act



motes good sportsmanship and reflects behavior or ethics that exemplify the model sportsmen. Seldom would someone think it was a positive thing to be "caught in the act" by a conservation officer, but in this case it's a great thing.

On one side of the coin is a reproduction of a pen and ink drawing called the "Cowboy and the Baby Bird." The drawing is of a cowboy feeding an insect to a baby bird in the palm of his hand. The original pen and ink drawing was produced by Senior Conservation Officer Bill Pogue. Some may remember Pogue was killed by Claude Dallas while protecting Idaho's wildlife resources.

Pogue's image on the "Caught in the Act of Doing Good" coin is a fitting symbol of the Doing Good sportsmen recognition program. The other side of the coin is imprinted with the Fish and Game logo.

All Magic Valley regional staff will be provided with coins that can be carried and presented to individuals they observe conducting themselves in a commendable manner. The recipient's name, address and a description of the act committed will be collected and forwarded to a regional conservation officer who'll track those awarded coins. At the end of the year a committee will select the "Best of the Best Acts of Doing Good" for a special recognition ceremony.

As conservation officers and employees of Fish and Game, we seldom get a chance to recognize or reward someone for truly selfless acts that promote good sportsmanship and wildlife stewardship. This is now that opportunity.

up the engine; make sure everyone on board is seated and wearing a life jacket; and check to see that the engine is running properly and the departure area is clear of traffic.

• Safe docking: There is a right way to dock a boat and a wrong way, Vaughn said. Good docking starts before you actually hit the dock. Determine wind and current direction; reduce speed to a minimum and approach the dock slowly; have bow and stern lines ready; and watch for other watercraft as you approach.

A good place to practice your docking skills is Murtaugh Lake, which has floating docks, Vaughn said. "If you have a new boat or one that you're not good at, go out to one of these docks and try it."

• Know your boat: An easy way to remember which side is port and which is starboard: "The word port is shorter than the word starboard. The word left is shorter than the word right," Donoho said. "Port, left. Starboard, right.

"In my own wee little brain, this has helped me to keep track of red light, green light, port and starboard."

There also is "bow" (front of the boat) and "stern" (back of the boat) – and a whole alphabet of other nautical terms. (For a listing see discoverboating.com.)

• Sound device: Have a good sound device with you whenever you're on the water, Vaughn said. Every seaman should carry a whistle as a means to call for help if he's in trouble.

Places to Boat

The boating season unofficially kicks off July 4 weekend, said Bill Swan, manager of Century Boatland.

A popular local destination is Centennial Waterfront Park in Twin Falls, he said, though there are a couple of drawbacks to motorized boating there: It often becomes crowded with other boaters, kayakers and canoeists, and there's no waterskiing or wakeboarding.

Ford prefers the area above Shoshone Falls — it usually isn't as crowded and there's more to do, such as waterskiing and wakeboarding, without interfering with fishermen or other recreationists.

He also likes Salmon Dam Reservoir because he never feels crowded on the 19mile-long reservoir. There's plenty of room for waterskiing and wakeboarding, and lots of places to drop anchor at your own fishing hole.

Magic Reservoir and Murtaugh Lake also are good places to bring your boat. Those who visit these waters, however, come mainly for one reason: fishing. Lake Walcott also is a favorite destination for both motorized boating and sailing.

Gordon Hansen, owner of Idaho Water Sports in Burley, gave a few other suggestions:

"We often have folks visit from out of town who not only bring their boats to Burley because of the nice facilities but because the waterskiing and wakeboarding is fantastic," Hansen said. "The soft banks, many islands and curves of the river greatly reduce wind and boat chop, which makes for a better experience on your ski or board. However, the river does have some sandbars. So if you are unsure on the depth, you best patrol the area with a depth gauge at idle speed."

He called Wilson Lake near Hazelton "a hidden gem that now has updated facilities including a new boat ramp."

"Another fun boating destination is the river above the Bliss dam," Hansen said. "This location is a little out of the way and is rarely crowded.

"The Hagerman area is the best location if you want warmer air temperatures. We have had a very comfortable day on the boat in mid-October near Thousand Springs." should be one that pro-



Gas prices Not Enough to Lift Economy

WASHINGTON • Cheaper gas has yet to cause consumers to spend enough on other goods to boost the slumping economy.

Americans barely increased their spending at retail businesses this spring, leading economists to predict slower economic growth in the April-June quarter.

But the news from a spate of government data Thursday wasn't all bad. Consumers spent more in May on cars, appliances and furniture - big purchases that help drive growth. Businesses continued to restock this spring at a healthy pace. And wholesale prices outside of gasoline costs remain sta-

ble, which means consumers can expect inflation to stay mild. If gas prices stay low, Americans are likely to spend

more freely this summer on other goods, from autos and furniture to electronics and vacations, that fuel economic growth.

Dell Planning Huge Cuts over Three Years • Computer maker Dell Inc. is planning to trim its expenses by more than \$2 billion during the next three years as it tries into move into the more lucrative fields of technology. Dell outlined its costcutting plans Wednesday, a day after the company committed to paying the first quarterly dividend in its 28-year history. The quarterly divi-dend of 8 cents per share will cost Dell more than \$560 million annually. The bulk of the projected savings will come from Dell's sales group, where the company plans to wring out about \$800 million in expenses.

Businesses Dominate Bids for Internet Suffixes

NEW YORK • Amazon.com wants ".joy," Google wants ".love" and L'Oreal wants ".beauty."

Big brands are behind hundreds of proposals for new Internet addresses, including scores for generic terms such as "cruise," ".kids" and ".tires."

If approved, Amazon could use ".author" in an attempt to dominate online bookselling.

Amazon and Google also are vying for ".app" and ".music," while the wine company Gallo Vineyards Inc. wants ".barefoot?"

It's all part of the largest expansion of the Internet address system since its creation in the 1980s, a process likely to cause headaches for some companies while creating vast opportunities for others.

The organization in charge of Internet addresses, the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers, announced the proposals for Internet suffixes Wednesday. A suffix is the ".com" part in a domain name.

The bids now go through a review that could take months or years. Up to 1,000 suffixes could be added each year.

There were 1,930 proposals for 1,409 different suffixes. The bulk of proposals that met the May 30 deadline came from North America and Europe. About 100 were for suffixes in non-English characters, including Chinese, Arabic and Thai.

From a technical standpoint, the names let Internet-connected computers know where to send email and locate websites. But they've come to mean much more. For Amazon.com Inc., for instance, the domain name is the heart of the company, not just an address.

A new suffix could be used to identify sites that have a certain level of security protection. It could be used to create online neighborhoods of businesses affiliated with a geographic area or an industry. French cosmetics giant L'Oreal, for instance, proposed ".beauty" as a home for beauty products and general information on personal beauty.

"The Internet is about to change forever," ICANN CEO Rod Beckstrom declared. "We're standing at the cusp of a new era of online innovation, innovation that means new businesses, new marketing tools, new jobs, new ways to link communities and share information."

Farm Bill Divides Nation's Farmers

WASHINGTON • Senate passage of a half-trillion dollar farm and food bill depends in part on resolving a dispute over subsidies between Southern rice and peanut growers and Northern corn and soybean producers. But that regional divide was less in evidence Wednesday, as senators narrowly voted to maintain price supports and quotas for sugar producers ranging from Florida to Montana.

Senators traditionally put their partisanship aside on farm bills, and this year is no different. But the five-year farm policy bill also makes dramatic changes in how farmers are protected from financial and natural disasters and, as in all major changes, some see themselves as losers. In this case, it's the Southerners.

The bill ends \$5 billion a year in direct payments to farmers whether or not they actually plant a crop and programs that reward farmers when prices fall below a targeted level.

Instead, the government would offer a new "shallow loss" program to aid farmers when revenues fall between 11 percent and 21 percent below five-year moving averages and would put greater emphasis on subsidized crop insurance. Farmers' regular crop insurance would pay for losses above 21 percent.

Corn and soybean growers, which are more subject to natural disasters and rely on crop insurance, welcome the change. Rice and peanut growers,

more affected by price fluctuations, say that for them the new safety net is inadequate.

Senate Agriculture Committee chairman Debbie Stabenow, D-Mich., said she is talking to the Southern growers and was "confident that by the end of this process, we will come to the middle." But she said that might not come until the House and Senate meet to iron out differences on their bills.

The Congressional Budget Office estimates this new shallow loss program could save taxpayers some \$8.5 billion over the next five years compared with the current subsidy system. The entire bill, which also covers conservation and research programs, would reduce spending by \$23.6 billion over the coming decade.

JPMorgan CEO Says Execs **May Have Pay Taken Back**

WASHINGTON • JPMorgan Chase CEO Jamie Dimon told Congress on Wednesday that senior bank executives responsible for a \$2 billion trading loss will probably have some of their pay taken back by the company.

Under bank policy, stock and bonuses can be recovered from executives, even for exercising bad judgment, Dimon told the Senate Banking Commitee. The policy has never been invoked, he said, but he strongly suggested that it will be.

Dimon, questioned about his own role in setting up the investment division, declared: "We made a mistake. I'm absolutely responsible. The buck stops with me."

Small Manufacturers Buy Big Machines

An uptick in orders is coming from oil and gas producers supplying energy to growing economies in countries such as China and India. And then some are getting a pop in sales from aerospace manufacturers that are busy building fuel-efficient aircraft and engines and need special parts to get the job done.

Former 'Goodfellas' **Gangster Hill Dies in LA**

LOS ANGELES (AP) . Henry Hill spent much of his life as a "goodfella," believing his last moment would come with a bullet to the back of his head. In the end he died at a hospital after a long illness, going out like all the average nobodies he once pitied.

Hill, who went from small-time gangster to bigtime celebrity when his life as a mobster-turned-FBI informant became the basis for the Martin Scorsese film "Goodfellas," died Tuesday at age 69, longtime girlfriend Lisa Caserta told The Associated Press on Wednesday.

Hill had open heart surgery last year and died of complications from longtime heart problems related to smoking, she said.

"He was a good soul towards the end ... he started feeling remorseful," she said.

An associate in New York's Lucchese crime family, Hill told detailed, disturbing and often hilarious tales of life in the mob that first appeared in the 1986 book "Wiseguy: Life in a Mafia Family," by Nicholas Pileggi, a journalist Hill sought out shortly after becoming an informant.

The expectations that have followed Tiger Woods this year are a lot like the fairways at The Olympic Club - up, down, often sideways.

He couldn't close out tournaments the way he once did. He lost his putting stroke. His left Achilles tendon might be more of a problem than he was letting on. He had his worst finish ever at the Masters. He missed a cut.

And in the midst of such a gloomy outlook, Woods won by

five shots at Bay Hill and delivered an uppercut fist pump at Memorial when he chipped in for birdie to complete a stunning rally for his second win of the year.

So when the question came up Tuesday at the U.S. Open whether Woods had to win a major to end such prognosticating - he all but rolled his eyes.

Hossler's Rare Feat **Takes Backseat**

SAN FRANCISCO • At 17, Beau Hossler is almost old news at the U.S. Open.

That's what happens when a 14-year-old gets in the field at The Olympic Club and all Hossler has done is qualify two straight years as a high school amateur.

Even Hossler's dad said all the media attention on Andy Zhang this week was warranted.

"I understand the crowds around a 14-yearold getting in. That is incredible," Beau Hossler Sr. said Wednesday. "He deserves that attention."

While Zhang will be battling the nerves of a firsttime competitor, Hossler is feeling right at home.

He and fellow amateur Alberto Sanchez took money off Phil Mickelson and Mark McCormick on Tuesday in a little old-vs.young match-play competition.

And Wednesday, Hossler was playing a relaxed practice round with Steve Stricker, Jim Furyk and Zach Johnson - who have a combined 41 previous U.S. Opens under their belts.

"It's pretty cool," said Hossler, who birdied two of his final three holes at the nearby Daly City sectional to qualify this year. "I feel like I'm a little more experienced this year. I feel comfortable out here."

That has changed his goals – even if he shares the same braces-filled smile as Zhang.

"I want to be low amateur, and play the entire tournament," Hossler said about making the cut, which he failed to do last year in shooting rounds of 76-77 at Congressional.

That would mean faring better than Walker Cup players Patrick Cantlay and Jordan Spieth - the latter a big reason Hossler committed to play at Texas in 2013.

"I think (Olympic) suits my game better in that it's very difficult off the tee and plays hard and fast," Hossler said.

Of course, just a few years ago getting off the tee was hardly Hossler's strong suit.

"I'm going to say he was 5-3, 130 pounds, and that might be pushing it," his father said about his son competing as a 14-year-old in his first U.S. Amateur. "It was impossible. He had to lay up at seven of the par 4s."

The kid from Rancho Santa Margarita in Orange County finally shot up at age 16, which left him feeling less-than-coordinated at last year's U.S. Open.

Small Ball Powered Thunder to 1-0 Lead

OKLAHOMA CITY • The NBA's advertising campaign this season was built around one word: BIG. Oversized heads on the league's star players filled some of the commercials. Other promotional ads had giant words superimposed on highlights of game action.

But this year's NBA Finals could be decided by who's better at playing small.

The Oklahoma City Thunder countered the Miami Heat's undersized lineup by benching their starting frontcourt players, Kendrick Perkins and Serge Ibaka, for the final 14 minutes and were able to rally and win Game 1 105-94.

Now, the tinkering begins as the teams prepare for Game 2 on Thursday night.

The smaller quintet is nothing new for Oklahoma City, particularly since the signing of Derek Fisher in March, but it has paid dividends in the Western Conference finals and then in Game 1.

"We've played that way a lot this year," said Nick Collison, the only true power forward or center to play down the stretch for the Thunder. "We're very fortunate to have a 7-footer like Kevin (Durant) who can do it. That's an advantage we have."

Durant came into the league as a supersized shooting guard, moving over to small forward after Scott Brooks was promoted to head coach around Thanksgiving in 2008. Since then, he has played more frequently as a perimeter-oriented power forward.

That creates room for All-Star point guard Russell Westbrook and NBA Sixth Man of the Year James Harden to team with another guard - most often Fisher, defensive ace Thabo Sefolosha or 3point specialist Daequan Cook - in the backcourt.

but the weather has helped us out."

Through the end of May, Blue Lakes had tallied 1,300 more rounds of golf over last year at that point, Hamblin said.

"Membership sales are up. All of our programs, especially women's and junior programs are flourishing," said Hamblin, adding that a tournament hosted at Blue Lakes doubled its field from last year.

Burley Golf Course head pro Mike Williams said he's seen an 8-percent increase in sales over the past two years, on everything from greens fees and range balls to pro shop merchandise and food.

"The last few years were definitely down. Sales were down, golf had been down.

It's so weather-driven," said Williams. "From Boise to Idaho Falls, I've talked to a number of golf pros and because of the weather everybody is up in golf."

Brian Dey, owner of Pebble Ponds Golf Course and Filer High's golf coach, agrees that a milder-thannormal southern Idaho spring helped boost golf in the region.

"In high school golf this year, we only had one tour nament where you had to wear a jacket," Dey said.

But he adds that the window for golf courses to capitalize closes quickly.

"With golf, people are excited to get out in the spring. You need April and May to really have a good start. About August 15th, your season to speak of is done, once you get time for people to go back to school and those activities."

Pebble Ponds caught an

unlucky break when it opened three years ago. For its first two years it faced an economic downturn, foul weather and construction on Pole Line Road.

But with those three problems seemingly behind it, Dey estimates Pebble Ponds' revenue is up 25 percent this vear so far.

"There are a lot of positives this year," said Dey. "Does that mean all the golf courses are out of the woods? No, not by a stretch... The only thing that hasn't changed is power is up, fertilizer is up. Costs to operate the course are more."

Dey and Hamblin agree that short-term cost-cutting solutions - such as applying less water or fertilizer have long-term negative effects because they diminish the customer's experience, and he or she may not return.

"It's the weather and the economy, but we're also taking care of our members better," Hamblin said. "We made a nice addition at Bass Lake that has brought value to everybody's membership."

Williams said he is seeing a mix in clientele – young, old, male and female - as people return to the golf course.

"It does seem to be a husband and wife decision, if you're going to pay \$400, \$800 or \$1,000 on a set of clubs. It's a big purchase," Williams said. "But it's so important for people to recreate. If you don't recreate you get cranky. People need a chance to relax and have some fun. People may be putting aside for \$4,000 vacations, but they're saying, 'Well honey, let's buy some golf clubs and stay here and save money in the long run?"

Jurors Ask for List of Clemens Exhibits

WASHINGTON • Jurors asked for a master list of exhibits – a list that extends well into triple digits – and lawyers laughed about a juror who appeared to doze off during closing arguments as deliberations continued Wednesday in the perjury trial of Roger Clemens.

The eight women and four men met for about 3 1/2 hours in the afternoon, an abbreviated day because one of them had a scheduling conflict. They then recessed until Monday, taking a four-day break while U.S. District Judge Reggie Walton travels to New Orleans for a speaking engagement – a trip that didn't appear to be an issue when the trial began April 16.

While the jury caucused in a separate room, the judge summoned the lawyers to his courtroom for a brief hearing to address several juror-related issues, including the request for the list of exhibits. Clemens lawyer Rusty Hardin said the defense had its list handy, but prosecutor Steven Durham said the government would need about an hour to produce its list because some items were not introduced during the trial.

Clemens is charged with perjury, making false statements and obstructing Congress. The charges center on his assertion made at both a hearing and a sworn deposition in 2008 that he never used steroids and human growth hormone during his stellar baseball career.

Presidents to Get Playoff Options

CHICAGO • The conference commissioners who have been working on a four-team playoff to determine college football's national champion plan to present the BCS presidential oversight committee multiple formats from which to choose.

Pac-12 Commissioner Larry Scott said the university presidents will "have options – plural" to consider when they meet in two weeks. Scott spoke before leaving Wednesday's meeting with conference commissioners and Notre Dame's athletic director.

What those options are is not clear. This is.

"Status quo is not on the table," BCS executive director Bill Hancock said.

The commissioners have since January been working on ways to hold a four-team major college football playoff, starting in the 2014 season. Among the details that need to be worked out are when and where to play the games, how to incorporate

We also value the bowl tradition and recognize the many benefits it brings to student-athletes. We have more work to do and more discussions to have with our presidents who are the parties that will make the final decision about the future structure of college football's postseason."

The commissioners are

scheduled to meet again next week in Chicago and the presidential oversight committee is set to meet June 26 in Washington.

Scott would not say if the so-called "plus-one," which sets the No. 1 vs. No. 2 title game after the bowls have been played instead of before, is still on the table – as he has suggested previously.

"I think there's a focus on a four-team playoff and trying to find a consensus as to the best way that could work, that our conferences can be comfortable with, that our presidents can consider," Atlantic Coast Conference Commissioner John Swofford said. "But I don't think you cut off all conversation of the (other) models that can be in play. I think the presidents certainly have every right and opportunity to talk about what they need to talk about."

ORDINANCE NO 234

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF RICHFIELD, IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR THE CONTROL OF BACKFLOW AND CROSS CONNECTIONS TO THE CITY POTABLE WATER SUPPLY. REPEALING ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT WITH THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING SEVERABILITY AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RICHFIELD, IDAHO:

SECTION 1: The purpose of this ordinance is to protect the public potable water supply of Richfield, Idaho from the possibility of contamination or pollution, by isolating within the customer's internal distribution system(s) or the customer's private water system(s) such contaminates or pollution that could backflow into the public water system.

Futhermore, to promote the elimination or control of existing cross connections, actual or potential between the customer's in-plant potable water system(s) and non-potable water systems, plumbing fixtures and industrial piping systems; and,

To provide for the maintenance of a continuing program of cross connection control that will systematically and effectively prevent the contamination or pollution of all potable water systems.

The City Superintendent shall be responsible for the protection of the public potable water distribution system from contamination or pollution due to the backflow of contaminants or pollutants through water service connections. If, in the judgment of said official, or any other agency of the City of Richfield, an approved backflow-prevention assembly is required, at the customer's water service connection or within the customer's private water system, for the safety of the water system, such official, or his or her designated agent shall give notice in writing to said customer to install such an approved backflow prevention assembly at specific locations on his or her premises. SECTION 2: The City Superintendent, or his or her agent, in charge of the water department of the City of Richfield is invested with the authority and responsibility for the implementation of an effective cross-connection control program and for the enforcement of the provisions of this ordinance and any other laws, rules, or regulations approved by the Department of Environmental Quality regarding crossconnections. SECTION 3: No water service connection to any premises shall be installed or maintained by the water user unless the water supply is protected as required by state, federal, or local laws and regulations. Service of water to any premises shall be discontinued by the City of Richfield if a backflow prevention assembly required by any state, federal, or local, law, rule, or regulation is not installed, tested and maintained, or if it is found that a backflow prevention assembly has been removed, bypassed, or if an unprotected cross connection exists on the premises. Service will not be restored until such conditions or defects are corrected. The customer's system should be open for inspection at all reasonable times to authorized representatives of the City of Richfield to determine whether cross connections or other structural or sanitary hazards, including violations of DEQ regulations exist. When such a condition becomes known, the City of Richfield shall deny or immediately discontinue service to the premises by providing for a physical break in the service line until the customer has corrected the condition in conformance with federal, state, and city rules and regulations relating to plumbing and water supplies and regulations adopted pursuant thereto. SECTION 4: All presently installed backflow prevention assemblies that do not meet the requirements of current regulations, but were approved assemblies for the purpose described herein, at the time of installation and that have been properly maintained, shall, except for the inspection and maintenance requirements under this ordinance, be excluded from the requirements of such rules and ordinances, so long as the City of Richfield is assured they will satisfactorily protect the utility system. Whenever the existing assembly is moved from its present location, requires more than minimal maintenance, or when the City Superintendent, or his or her agent, finds that the maintenance constitutes a hazard to health, the unit shall be replaced by an approved backflow prevention assembly meeting the requirements of this section. SECTION 5: This ordinance is hereby declared to be severable. Should any portion of this ordinance be declared invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect, and shall be read to carry out the purposes of this ordinance before the declaration of partial invalidity SECTION 6: All provisions of the current Municipal Code or ordinances of the City of Richfield which conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the City of Richfield, Idaho, in conflict with this ordinance or any part hereof are especially repealed hereby.






