T.F. Man Accused of Firing Into Home

TWIN FALLS • One minute a Twin Falls man was talking on his phone in his own home. The next, he was diving for cover from two bullets fired his way, Twin Falls police detectives wrote in a report Friday. James Scott Christensen, 50, was arraigned Friday on charges

of aggravated assault and discharging a firearm into an occupied dwelling. He was arrested Thursday night after police say he allegedly fired shots into a house at 719 3rd Ave. N. early that morning. Twin Falls police responded to the shots fired call at 12:10 a.m. According to the police report, the resident of the home was standing in his living room talking

on his cellphone with the front door open when he saw another man, later identified as Christensen, approaching him and holding a handgun. The man said Christensen fired two bullets that missed him, passed through the front door and became lodged in the living room wall. According to police, there were two bullets lodged in the east wall of the living room, and another lodged in the door frame that appeared to have been fired from the

living room. It was unclear who fired the bullet from the living room. According to the report, a friend of Christensen told police Christensen called him and said he was headed to the victim's residence to confront him. The friend told police Christensen called him back later and said he was shot in the shoulder and bleeding, the report stated. In the search for Christensen,

Rosie went missing Tuesday evening after the 53-year-old Oregon truck driver crashed his semi while trying to catch a falling soda. Moriarty's truck ran into a parked car on the side of the Interstate near the Twin Falls exit in Jerome County, and the semi was soon engulfed in flames. According to Moriarty, he and Rosie were able to jump out of the cab right as the roof was collapsing. His second dog, a 1-year-old

TWIN FALLS • A lot of sleeping and a lot of eating: That's what Chad Green has been up to for the past two days. Just a few days ago, the 20-year-old found himself in trouble. While attempting to shoot up meth, Green missed the vein. His arm swelled and Green knew it was bad. "I knew I needed help," he said. "I came straight here." Green's story isn't unusual among his peers at the Victory Home, at 450 Third Ave. W. in Twin Falls. "We love them, accept them, minister to their hurt," Pastor Tony Lopez said. People arrive at the Victory Home, a Bible-based rehabilitation center, for a variety of reasons, many related to drugs, alcohol and gangs. The home has several programs, ranging from 90

A year ago, shortly after Green arrived in Twin Falls from Alabama with a traveling magazine sales company, he was fired. Then, he said, he jointed a gang for protection. Drugs and gangs are 100 percent meshed together, Green said. Members do drugs together, and get further and further into debt, he said. "I didn't have anywhere else to go," he said. Getting someone to change

their mindset from a gang lifestyle to a clean, sober one takes time and discipline, Lopez said. "We do a lot of mothering and fathering," he said. "The reason someone gets into something like a gang is they're looking for love, acceptance and family." Along with rigorous Bible

study, residents learn how to cook, maintain a household and eventually do things most people take for granted, like opening a checking account. "We teach love and forgiveness," he said. "A lot of them harbor hate and anger. There's

COUNTIES WORRY ABOUT TAX PROGRAM'S FUTURE

TWIN FALLS • Federal officials announced this week that it will distribute more than \$25 million of compensation to Idaho's rural counties, but the program's pending budget cuts remain a concern for county officials. The payments are part of the Payment in Lieu of Taxes program designed to offer funding to counties and local governments for non-taxable federal lands within their jurisdictions. The U.S. Department of Interior boasts that it distributed a record total of \$393 million to rural counties across the country. However, this is the last year the program will receive funding under the Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008. Secretary of Interior Ken Salazar has proposed that Congress extend the program by one year instead of an additional five. If it doesn't pass, counties could see PILT funds drying up as soon as next year. Twin Falls County received almost \$1.5 million of PILT funds. It's a grant that has always worried the commissioners, said Commissioner Terry

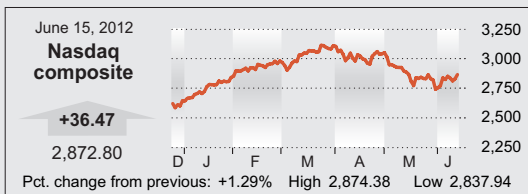
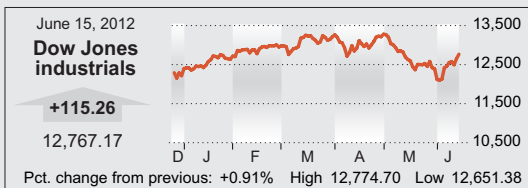

Knowing When to Call Hospice

My mom has been receiving home care for the past year, but has taken a turn for the worse. How do I know if she is ready for hospice services or if she qualifies?

Your mother's physician will be following your mother through the hospice care process.

Hospice care is a resource for the end-of-life stage, enabling you and your family to let your mom live her remaining days to their fullest.

This team includes nurses, therapists, social services, nutritionists, chaplain services and volunteers. Hospice care offers emotional and other supports for the patient, but sometimes more importantly, the family. It's a time where families can get the emotional support they may need from a team of professionals who are educated in

all aspects of the death and dying process.

Even after the passing, hospice also comes to your home every other week to ensure that you and your family get the emotional support you need, especially those first few months after a loss. There is also the opportunity to get involved in a support group through hospice care.

Ultimately, talk to your mother and respect her wishes, if she able to communicate them. Talking to her physician is also the best way to begin navigating the hospice process.

bitterness in their hearts." Russ Baker, 27, from Parma, got his third DUI charge and was headed to jail. At a bond reduction hearing, Baker said a Canyon County judge released him into the Victory Home, with the promise he would complete the year-long program. Now at about seven months in, Baker said he feels stronger, but in his heart knows he's not ready to leave.

Pastor Josh Perez runs a program like the Twin Falls Victory Home in Pampa, Texas. Perez is happily married with seven children now, but his life wasn't always that way.

About 10 years ago, he entered a similar program in Seguin, Texas, hooked on heroin and weighing just 95 pounds.

Perez heard the testimony of others and, for the first time, saw hope.

"It brought me peace and joy I thought I would never have," he said.

Rather than distancing himself from gangs, Perez said once he started preaching about Jesus to his gang-member friends they distanced themselves

from him.

"Literally some of my old friends would run away when they saw me on the street," he said.

Perez was visiting Twin Falls this week to help Lopez spread the word and brought several members of his rehab home along.

Johnny Oriz, who came to Twin Falls with Perez, said he was addicted to heroin for 16 years before he got out of prison in 2005. Then,

he too entered the Seguin, Texas program. Now he preaches about Jesus and getting sober to gang members.

"They hear me out," he said. "A lot say they're not ready. I tell them I used to be like that; I wasn't used."

Yvonne Marvin has lived at the Victory Home's women's home since August 2011. She moved to Twin Falls from Houston, Texas in April 2011 to start a

new life, but found her troubles followed her.

"I got caught up in problems again," she said.

Now, Marvin said she doesn't think about drugs anymore, despite her 40-year habit. The 58-year-old left her children and grandchildren back in Texas, but found God in Idaho, she said.

"Beans and rice and Jesus Christ," filled her up, she said. "I came here empty."

detectives contacted his cellphone company and began "pinging" his cellphone, the report said.

The company told police the phone was in the 700 block of Blue Lakes Boulevard.

According to the report, Christensen lives at 740 Blue Lakes Blvd. Police found a woman at the house who said Christensen lived there. While she was being interviewed by police, she got a call from Christensen, the report stated.

During the call he told the

woman he was sorry for getting her involved, the report said.

"He stated it had gone too far at this point," the report said.

It's not entirely clear how officers found Christensen after the visit to his home. But at 7:20 p.m. Thursday, he was found and arrested without incident in the 1200 block of Eighth Avenue East, according to a press release - about a block from his home.

No injuries were reported in the shooting. Christensen was booked into the Twin Falls County Jail on \$50,000 bond.

Chihuahua, died in the fire, Moriarty said.

Though Rosie escaped the fire, the flames scared her and she ran off.

"The last time I saw her, she was running down the freeway toward Twin Falls," he said.

Idaho State Police cited Moriarty for inattentive driving, and he was fired from his truck driving job on Friday, he said.

Moriarty is still mourn-

ing the loss of his chihuahua, whom he described as Rosie's best friend.

"They were that close," he said.

Rosie is a mixed breed brown dog with a black muzzle. She weighs about 35 pounds and is about knee height. She's skittish, Moriarty said, and may need to come coaxed out of hiding with food or other dogs.

"She's never been without me," he said.

Kramer.

"We have been fairly cautious with that money," he said. "You can't do a long-term program with short-term funding."

Blaine County received close to \$1.8 million this year, said County Commissioner Larry Schoen. With a roughly \$28 million budget, the public would see an immediate impact if the PILT funds were taken away.

"Public safety and health will always remain a top priority but some of the other services may be severely impacted," Schoen said. "Already we have trimmed staff and expenses and deferred maintenance in some areas." With close to 80 percent

of Blaine County owned by the federal government, Schoen believes that federal agencies should be treated as property owners and contribute some sort of revenue to local governments.

Jerome County Commissioner Cathy Roemer said the problem could be solved with the federal government owning fewer federal lands.

Jerome County will receive a little more than \$233,000 this year in PILT funds. With a \$10 million budget, the impacts of not having those funds would be significant, Roemer said.

"Perhaps the federal government should return those acres back into state ownership or private land, that way the counties wouldn't be at the mercy of federal funds," she said.

Probation for Sewer Manager

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • The former manager of an eastern Idaho sewer district has been sentenced to five years of probation for mishandling the district's money.

The Post Register reports Dorothy McCarty was sentenced Thursday in Bonneville County for failing to deposit nearly \$1,100 of Iona-Bonneville Sewer District money.

She was originally

charged with 13 felony counts of misusing public money after prosecutors said she failed to deposit more than \$17,000, but a prosecutor for the Idaho Attorney General's Office dismissed all but one charge in exchange for her modified guilty plea. McCarty entered an Alford plea, refusing to admit guilt but acknowledging that there was enough evidence to convict her.

Idaho WIC Changes Eligibility Rules

TWIN FALLS • Idaho's Women, Infants and Children program will implement new income eligibility guidelines starting July 1.

Due to an increase in cost-of-living expenses, the supplemental nutritional program is raising its household income eligibility.

For a family of one, the new guidelines set the upper income limit at a little more than \$20,600. Under the old guidelines, the limit was set closer to \$20,100. On the other hand, a family of four can now meet the new guidelines with an income around \$42,600. Previously, it was set at a little more than \$41,300.

"This will affect the people who were right on the cusp of being eligible," said Tom Shanahan, spokesman for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare. "We're not expecting a huge number of people to be eligible who weren't already in the program."

The Idaho WIC program has 44,000 people receiving assistance each month. On average, WIC participants in Idaho receive close to \$55 per month.

The program provides families with foods like

milk, eggs, cheese, cereal, juice, beans and peanut butter. Services include health screenings, nutritional counseling, breast feeding information and support, help from regis-

tered dietitians and referrals to other services.

Montana Authorities Say Hitchhiker Shot Himself

BILLINGS, Mont. • A West Virginia man who claimed to be the victim of a drive-by shooting along a rural Montana highway while working on a memoir called "Kindness in America" has confessed to shooting himself, authorities said Friday.

Valley County sheriff's officials said they believe 39-year-old Ray Dolin shot himself as a desperate act of self-promotion, but they offered no further details.

Dolin, of Julian, W.Va., acknowledged he concocted the tale about the random shooting after he was confronted by investigators at a Veterans Affairs hospital in Miles City where he is recovering, said Sheriff Glen Meier.

Charges were pending, and the case remains under investigation. Dolin has not been arrested, but the weapon he allegedly used to carry out the scheme has been recovered, the sheriff said.

Dolin had claimed he was hitchhiking along U.S. Highway 2 west of Glasgow on Saturday when the driver of a maroon pickup pulled to a stop and shot him in the upper arm with no provocation.

Authorities later arrested Lloyd Christopher Danielson III, 52, and charged him with felony assault. That charge was dropped Thursday, although Danielson remained in custody, accused of being under the influence of drugs or alcohol when he was arrested.

Meier indicated that Danielson denied any role in shooting after he was put into custody.

"I had the worst feeling

he was telling me the absolute truth," Meier said. "I kept telling him that we are seekers of the truth and we are going to work very hard to find out the truth of this incident. ... It was a great moment when I sent someone up to the jail to tell him he had nothing to do with it."

Dolin runs a photography business called OneShot Impressions, which has as its logo the cross-hairs of a rifle scope.

He could not be reached for comment Friday. But Dolin said in an interview Thursday with The Associated Press — before his alleged confession — that he recently had taken a bus from West Virginia to Sidney, Mont., and then began traveling across the state working on his memoir about people's kindness.

Asked about Danielson being cleared, Dolin said in the interview that he was reluctant to comment because of the ongoing investigation and quickly changed the subject.

He talked at length about his planned photographic memoir, offering several supposed instances in which strangers had gone out of their way to help him along his journey. And just hours before his alleged confession, he repeated the claim that he was shot as he was stopped on the side of the road preparing a meal.

Dolin said no words were exchanged with the supposed gunman and that he never got a good look at the perpetrator.

"He came up, pulls up at a normal speed, stops, points, shoots and drives off. It's as simple as that," Dolin said. "I did not get a good description."

Man Arrested after Mom's Kitchen Set on Fire

BLACKFOOT • Officials in Bingham County say a 22-year-old Blackfoot man facing an arson charge told them he was trying to get back at his mother and sister for things he thought they had done wrong when he poured gasoline on the kitchen floor and lighted a match.

Sheriff Dave Johnson tells the *Post Register* that Dillon Klair McCandless was arrested Tuesday.

McCandless' mother and 16-year-old sister told investigators they saw him light the fire. Neither was injured. The house had minor smoke damage.

Johnson says McCandless told investigators he had watered down the gasoline and didn't intend to hurt anyone, but wanted to scare them.

He was taken to the Behavioral Health Center for evaluation before being jailed on \$100,000 bail.

His next court appearance is set for June 28.

Four Fishermen in Drift Boat Swept through Headgates

IDAHO FALLS • Officials in Jefferson County say four

anglers are recovering after their drift boat was pulled through the headgates of an irrigation dam on the South Fork of the Snake River.

The accident happened at the Great Feeder headgates about 7 p.m. Thursday.

All four were helped out of the water by other fishermen just below the headgates. Twenty-one-year-old Devin Bergman suffered compound fracture to her leg and was airlifted to Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center.

Officials say the drift boat was totaled. None of the four was wearing a life jacket.

Ex-Idaho Sen. McGee Quits Job after Latest Charges

BOISE • Former Republican state Sen. John McGee quit his Idaho hospital job after being charged with misdemeanor crimes linked to sexual harassment allegations.

West Valley Medical Center in Caldwell said Friday that McGee had resigned as marketing director.

McGee, who grew up in Caldwell and represented the southwestern Idaho town for four terms, is set to appear in 4th District Court on Aug. 21 on charges of disturbing the peace and a probation violation.

An aide accused him of inappropriate sexual behavior in his Capitol office, resulting in his Feb. 22 Senate resignation and an Idaho State Police investigation.

McGee, who didn't return a call, was previously arrested Father's Day 2011 after driving drunk in a stranger's car and damaging a trailer.

He was convicted of DUI and remains on probation.

Boise Police: Driver Was Racing in Fatal Crash

BOISE • A police report on a car crash that killed two teens suggests the driver was intoxicated and racing another car at the time.

The *Idaho Statesman* reports that the Idaho Vehicle Collision report filed this week says results of a blood test showed 18-year-old Cody Olson was under the influence of marijuana and had a .07 blood alcohol content when his Lexus sedan collided with a concrete wall on March 3.

Boise police say witnesses reported Olson was driving between 80 and 100 miles per hour and racing a BMW when

he crashed. Eighteen-year-old Scott Hyde and 17-year-old Kelsey Belcher died of their injuries; Olson, Jasmine Ondrick and Nick Hendrickson were badly injured.

No charges have been filed in connection with the crash.

A Crisis in 3 Acts: Following the Impact of a Greek Exit from the Euro to the U.S.

NEW YORK • The unthinkable suddenly looks possible. Bankers, governments and investors are starting to prepare for Greece to stop using the euro as its currency, a move that could spread turmoil throughout the global financial system. The worst-case scenario envisions governments defaulting on their debts, a run on European banks and a worldwide credit crunch reminiscent of the financial crisis in the fall of 2008. A Greek election on Sunday will go a long way toward determining whether it happens. Syriza, a party opposed to the restrictions placed on Greece in exchange for a bailout from European neighbors, could do well. In the meantime, banks and investors have sketched out the ripple effects if Greek were to leave the euro.

Missing Utah woman's father-in-law sentenced to 2 1/2 years for spying on naked neighbor girls. The father-in-law of missing Utah woman Susan Powell was sentenced Friday to 2 1/2 years in prison for recording images of two neighbor girls in their bathroom in Washington state. The mother of Steven Powell's victims was trembling and tearful in court as she stood with her back to him and said she's still waiting for an apology. "You've sat there smugly and acted as though it's perfectly normal to have committed your crimes," she said. "I'm so angry. I'm angry for the hurt you caused my children. You caused them embarrassment and heartache."

Romney faces Democratic criticism on bus tour, says Obama denying middle class a 'fair shot'. Republican presidential contender Mitt Romney launched a multistate bus tour through small-town America on Friday, charging that President Barack Obama hasn't given the middle class "a fair shot." The tour, unusual for Romney, marked an attempt to upend Obama's core argument against his challenger: that the Republican is disconnected from the ordinary folks he aims to lead. The five-day, six-day excursion by bus — as well as airplane — comes after Romney spent the past few weeks courting wealthy donors and raising millions of dollars to fund his presidential ambitions. "If there's ever been a president who has not given a fair shot to the middle-income Americans of this great nation, it is Barack Obama," Romney declared from a makeshift podium during an "ice cream social" in Milford's town square. "I understand what it takes to get people to work again. I will do that to help the American

people from the richest to the poorest and everybody in between."

Catholic hospitals say Obama compromise on birth control for women employees is unworkable. Sharpening an election-year confrontation over religious freedom and government health insurance rules, the nation's Catholic hospitals on Friday rejected President Barack Obama's compromise for providing birth control coverage to their women employees. The Catholic Health Association was a key ally in Obama's health care overhaul, defying opposition from church bishops to help the president win approval in Congress. But the group said Friday it does not believe church-affiliated employers should have to provide birth control as a free preventive service, as the law now requires. The hospital group's decision calls into question a compromise offered by the president himself only months ago, under which the cost of providing birth control would be covered by insurance companies and not religious employers. While churches and other places of worship are exempt from the birth control mandate, nonprofits affiliated with a religion, such as hospitals, are not.

Texas teacher orders students to hit 6-year-old accused of being classroom bully. A Texas teacher will lose her job after ordering more than 20 kindergartners to line up and hit a classmate accused of being a bully, a district spokesman said Friday. The teacher at a suburban San Antonio school is accused of orchestrating the scufflest after a younger teaching colleague went to her last month seeking suggestions on how to discipline the 6-year-old, according to a police report from the Judson Independent School District.

Obama Policy to Spare Many Youths from Deportation

President Barack Obama eased enforcement of immigration laws Friday, offering a chance for hundreds of thousands of younger illegal immigrants to stay in the country and work.

WASHINGTON • President Barack Obama eased enforcement of immigration laws Friday, offering a chance for hundreds of thousands of illegal immigrants to stay in the country and work. Immediately embraced by Hispanics, the extraordinary step touched off an election-year confrontation with congressional Republicans.

"Let's be clear, this is not amnesty, this is not immunity, this is not a path to citizenship, this is not a permanent fix," Obama said from the White House Rose Garden. "This is the right thing to do."

The policy change will affect as many as 800,000 immigrants who have lived in fear of deportation. It bypasses Congress and partially achieves the goals of the "DREAM Act," congressional legislation that would establish a path toward citizenship for young people who came to the United States illegally but who attend college or join the military.

Under the administration plan, illegal immigrants will be immune from deportation if they were brought to the United States before they turned 16 and are younger than 30, have been in the country for at least five continuous years, have no criminal history, graduated from a U.S. high school or earned a GED or served in the military. They also can apply for a work permit that will be good for two years with no limits on how

many times it can be renewed. Obama said the change would become effective immediately to "lift the shadow of deportation from these young people." The move comes in an

election year in which the Hispanic vote could be critical in swing states like Colorado, Nevada and Florida. While Obama enjoys support from a majority of Hispanic voters, Latino enthusiasm for the president

has been tempered by the slow economic recovery, his inability to win congressional support for a broad overhaul of immigration laws and by his administration's aggressive deportation policy.

Syria Observer Chief Says Violence Derails Mission

BEIRUT • The head of the U.N. observers in Syria said Friday a spike in bloodshed is derailing the mission to monitor and defuse more than a year of violence, raising questions about how effective the unarmed force can be in a conflict that every day looks more like a civil war. The troubles facing the observer mission are the latest sign that an international peace plan for Syria is disintegrating. Western powers have pinned their hopes on the plan, brokered two months ago by special envoy Kofi Annan, in part because there are no other options on the table. There is little support for military intervention, and several rounds of sanctions have failed to stop the bloodshed.

"Violence over the past 10 days has been intensifying willingly by the both parties, with losses on both sides and significant risks to our observers," Maj. Gen. Robert Mood told reporters in Damascus, the Syrian capital. Mood also said there was a concern among the states providing observers that the risk is approaching an unac-

ceptable level — suggesting the violence could prompt the nearly 300 observers to pull out of the country at some point. He did not provide further details.

Mood's comments were the clearest sign yet that Annan's peace plan is falling apart. The regime and the opposition have ignored a cease-fire that was supposed to go into effect April 12.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights called on the observers to "either work on stopping the killings or leave." The group said the observers' role has become to "witness the killing in Syria" rather than implement Annan's six-point plan.

It was the harshest criticism of the observers by an activist group since they started their work in April.

Some analysts say that even if the number of observers increased by tenfold, it still would be very difficult for them to report and investigate acts of violence throughout the country.

"Even 3,000 observers will not be enough," said Hisham Jaber, a former Lebanese army general who heads the Beirut-based Middle East Center for Studies and Public Relations.

U.S. Reveals Accusations against Secret Service

WASHINGTON • Secret Service agents and officers have been accused of involvement with prostitutes, leaking sensitive information, publishing pornography, sexual assault, illegal wiretaps, improper use of weapons and drunken behavior, according to internal government reports reviewed by The Associated Press on Friday. It wasn't immediately clear how many of the accusations turned out to be true.

The new disclosures of so many serious accusations since 2004 lend weight to concerns expressed by Congress that the Secret Service prostitution scandal in April in Colombia exposed a culture of misconduct within the agency. Secret Service Director Mark Sullivan apologized for the incident during a hearing in May but insisted that what happened in Colombia was an isolated case.

A leading senator who has been investigating the Colombia scandal, Susan Collins, R-Maine, said some of the accusations appeared legitimate and that "adds to my concern about apparent misconduct by some of the personnel of this vital law enforcement agency."

"The key question is whether these incidents indicate a larger cultural problem," Collins said Friday.

Sen. Joseph Lieberman, I-Conn., said Friday an investigation by the Secret Service's inspector general is continuing and the public should withhold judgment until that review is complete.

The heavily censored list, which runs 229 pages, was quietly released under the U.S. Freedom of Information Act to The Associated Press and other news organizations following the prostitution scandal. It describes accusations filed against Secret Service employees with the Homeland Security Department's inspector general.

CHEERS to the Operation Facelift program — a two-week, Magic Valleywide effort to do facade improvements in 10 downtowns. This is the second year for the event. This year's effort says a lot about the people of this valley. Last year, the program had \$17,000 in donations. This year, the program only raised \$1,000. Instead of being discouraged, the organizers of Operation Facelift stretched every penny and reached out to the community for volunteers.

Volunteers have been out this week and will be out again next week pulling weeds, picking up trash, painting walls and generally doing with elbow grease, creativity and enthusiasm what they can with limited funds. It feels like an old-fashioned barn raising out there.

JEERS to Idaho, which daily proves to the teachers, administrators and students of this state that education is not a priority. On Wednesday, the *Times-News* ran yet another story about schools making do with shrinking budgets. Area school districts have been dipping into reserve funds — set aside for emergencies — to pay operating costs.

"We continue to consume what I call our safety net," Twin Falls School District Fiscal Affairs Director Bob Seaman said. The district started with \$2.3 million in reserves at the beginning of the school year. That has dwindled to an estimated \$1.15 million that will be available at the start of next school year. And by the end of next year, district officials predict there will be just \$532,000 in reserves.

In Jerome, the school district plans to use \$700,000 in reserve funds next year. That's up from about \$100,000 over the past couple of years.

In Minidoka County, the district laid off 11 teachers, but it still must use reserve funding to balance next year's budget.

As we watch our schools struggle, "Students Come First" is sounding more and more like an empty slogan and more like a call to arms.

JEERS to the Heyburn City Council who rushed to a decision earlier this year on a trash contractor for commercial accounts, ignoring protests from residents and threats of a potential lawsuit. This week, in what seemed like another panicked decision, the council backtracked.

The Heyburn council voted Wednesday to terminate a contract with PSI Environmental Systems to provide exclusive commercial garbage service in the city in response to a recent lawsuit filed by Total Waste Management.

Previously, Heyburn businesses could choose from any garbage collection services. Looks like they are back where they started.

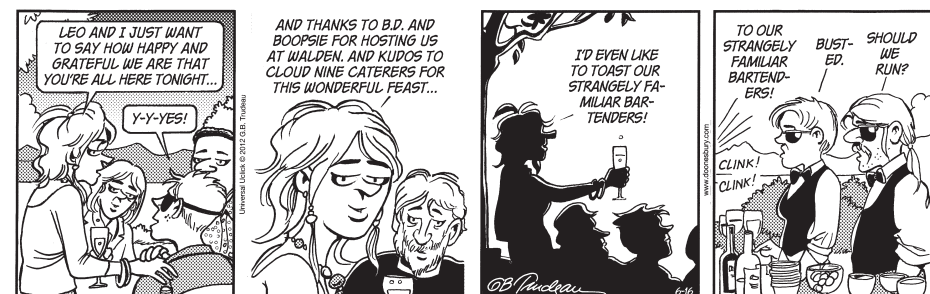

tars to play, and he recognized that they were exceptional."

Mayer was intrigued with the 1953 Goya classical guitar.

Sevy said this particular guitar is unique because it was made by Hagstom, a renowned guitar manufacturer in Sweden. In general, most classical guitars of note are made in Spain.

During what Sevy calls their "geek fest," Mayer held up the guitar and said, "I deem that there are songs awaited to be discovered in this instrument."

Sevy described Mayer as

an exceptional musician who recognized and appreciated the authenticity of the shop.

Now, since the visit from the Grammy-award winning artist, and the April release of the video "Shadow Days," the lead single from his newest album "Born and Raised," more people are making a connection with the music shop.

"People are picking up on the fact that (the video) is filmed in Idaho Falls immediately," Sevy said.

The Tuesday after filming, two girls and their parents were outside MusiCare waiting for it to open to have

their picture taken in the chair that John Mayer sat in.

Sevy said he get phone calls of people wanting to know if the guitar, the 1953 Goya, that Mayer played is for sale.

The \$3,500 instrument hasn't sold yet, but Sevy said he suspects that when Mayer gets some free time, he may be in to purchase the guitar himself.

"You get attached to instruments like that. We want to find good homes for them," he said.

Senator Repays State for Letter to Voters

BOISE (AP) • An Idaho state senator has paid back the state for the cost of sending out an end-of-session letter to Republican voters touting her record as she seeks re-election.

Sen. Sheryl Nuxoll's post-primary election campaign finance report shows she paid about \$890 to the state senate for a category of expenditures that includes literature, brochures and printing.

The Republican senator from Cottonwood told *The Spokesman-Review*, "I wasn't legally liable, but you see the records."

Senators can send up to \$2,000 worth of taxpayer-funded mailings annually, but the mailings

must avoid campaign messaging. About a third send out an end-of-session letter to constituents about the events and outcome of the legislative session.

Nuxoll said last month that she sent the letter as an "informational" piece that went out both to residents of her current district, District 8, and the new, redistricting-created district in which she's seeking re-election, District 7. The current district includes Clearwater, Idaho, Lewis and Valley counties; the new one

stretches much farther north, taking in all of Shoshone County and part of southeastern Bonner County.

Nuxoll said then that she sent the letter only to Republicans "because I am a Republican and I had to limit the number of letters going out to keep under my limit by the state."

Senate President Pro Tem Brent Hill, Rexburg, said he initially thought the letter only skirted close to the line between campaign material and mere information, but after learning

that it was sent only to Republicans, he called Nuxoll to discuss the matter.

"We just visited about it, and I said I thought it would be best if she reimbursed for all of it," Hill said this week. "It was a mutual agreement. If I hadn't suggested it, she would have by the end of our conversation."

Hill said he'd talked with senators about the rules for taxpayer-funded mailings, but he plans to offer more guidance in the future.

Nuxoll won the GOP primary last month in her bid for a second term in the Senate; she faces independent Jon Cantamessa of Wallace in November.

Twin Falls County Parks and Waterways, partnered with Personal Best Performance, will host the second annual Magic Man Triathlon Saturday.

The kid went 11 holes without making a bogey until he got lost in the thick rough and the trees on the brutal front nine of Olympic and had to settle for a 73.

Idaho's Armstrong Headed to London Olympics

BOISE • Olympic gold medalist Kristin Armstrong was named Friday to the U.S. women's cycling team time trial squad for the London Games, despite having suffered a broken collarbone just weeks ago.

USA Cycling selected Armstrong of Boise and Amber Neben of Lake Forest, Calif., as the team's picks to ride the 18-mile time trial on Aug. 1.

They'll also ride the women's road race on July 29, along with Evelyn Stevens of Boulder, Colo.,

and Shelley Olds of Groton, Mass.

Armstrong was undefeated in 2012 time trials until May 24, when a fall during the Exergy Tour stage race in Boise left her with a broken clavicle. Stevens won the Idaho race, with Neben placing second overall.

The fall, however inopportune, forced Armstrong to double down on her resolve not to take anything for granted, she said.

"Sometimes, as athletes, we become complacent in what we do," Armstrong told The Associated Press on Friday. "This breaking of the

collarbone, I think what it's done is, it made me say, 'Hey, you can be in good form, and you won lots of time trials this year, but it's not going to come that easy to you.' It's pushed me to refocus."

After her crash, Armstrong insisted the break was just a minor setback in her hopes of repeating her gold medal performance from the Beijing Olympics in 2008.

USA Cycling agreed, saying the 38-year-old's performances earlier in the season put her among the athletes with the best chance of standing on the podium in London.

Taxing Year Ends With Title Shot for Fisher

OKLAHOMA CITY • A long, taxing year is coming to a familiar finish for Oklahoma City Thunder guard Derek Fisher.

It all started with him being front and center during the NBA lockout as the president of the players' union. It grew more complicated when the Los Angeles Lakers traded him away after he'd won five championships with the franchise.

Fisher signed on with Oklahoma City, and he's three wins away from achieving his ultimate goal of winning a sixth title. Only 13 players in NBA history have been a part of that many championship teams.

"What it would mean to win a championship means enough by itself without adding what has happened before now," Fisher said. "I think for this particular team and group of guys, this particular organization,

Fisher was heavily involved in the league's labor dispute, engaging in the conference room discussions that eventually were able to save a season that was in peril. His season took an unsettling turn when the Lakers unexpectedly traded him to Houston and he decided not to go.

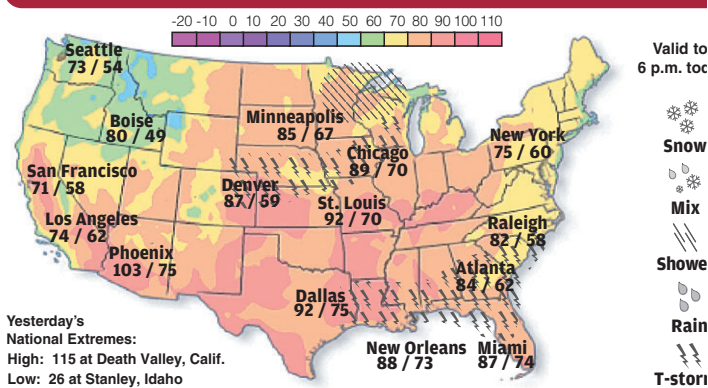

'Too Much Time on This'

Magic Valley politicians speak out about how they view national media coverage of Mitt Romney's faith.

TWIN FALLS • House Assistant Majority Leader Scott Bedke of Oakley has a test.

When reading articles on Mitt Romney's faith, replace the word "Mormon" with "Jewish."

"If it's appropriate and it doesn't make you cringe, then it's OK," said Bedke, who also is a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

As the presidential campaign heats up, the topic of Romney's faith keeps coming up in the national media, drawing a mixed reaction from Magic Valley church members.

In the last six months, articles in the *Washington Post* and *New York Times*

have explored how Romney's faith may affect certain types of voters: white evangelicals; black Mormons who must choose between the first black president and the first Mormon candidate; even ancestors of victims from the 1857 Mountain Meadows Massacre when a Mormon militia attacked a wagon train and killed more than 100 people.

Those articles elicit bemusement, eye-rolling and wincing from some of Idaho's LDS politicians — especially when the topics seem arbitrary. The article on the Mountain Meadows Massacre, for example, didn't show that the 155-year-old event would affect voters in the area.

Local church spokesman Del Traveller said he has no

problem with the national media discussing Romney's faith. "As long as they treat everybody fairly, I don't think there's a problem with it," Traveller said.

But there is a problem with generalizations and assumptions, said Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert.

Cameron and Bedke both endorsed Romney earlier this year, but Cameron said religion has nothing to do with it.

"I think the assertion that just because he's LDS and I'm LDS... is probably not fair to either side, either one of us," he said, adding that he takes issue with the idea that the church dictates how members vote.

There are prominent Mormon Democrats, both in Idaho and across the nation. Gov. John V. Evans, who served from 1977 to 1987, is a Democrat and the only LDS governor in the state's history. Keith Allred, who challenged Gov. C.L. "Butch"

Otter in 2010, and Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid of Nevada are also LDS.

Bedke pointed out that religion often comes up with presidential candidates — President John F. Kennedy's Catholic faith brought on criticism, and Obama's beliefs have drawn scrutiny and skepticism.

But ultimately, Bedke and Cameron said, it's a distraction from major issues like the economy and deficit.

"I think people are spending too much time on all this," Bedke said.

'The Mormon Question' Not New to Idaho Politics

TWIN FALLS • Mormons have a complicated political history in Idaho.

Though members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints were among the first permanent white settlers in the territory, they couldn't vote, hold office or serve on juries.

According to "Idaho's Constitution:

The Tie That Binds" by Dennis C. Colson, voters in Idaho Territory had to take a test oath to swear that they were "not a member of any order, organization or association which teaches, advises, counsels or encourages its members.... to commit the crime of bigamy or polygamy."

Even Mormons who didn't practice plural marriage — the vast majority of the those living in Idaho at the time —

and were willing to take the oath were often excluded.

That law was repealed, and since then, LDS politicians have come a long way. Three of Idaho's current congressional delegation are members of the LDS church: Sen. Mike Crapo, Congressman Raul Labrador and Congressman Mike Simpson. The state has had only had one LDS governor: Democrat John V. Evans.

Police: Breakup Led N.Y. Doctor to Kill Lover, Self

his ex-girlfriend killed himself with a gunshot to the head, quelling the risk of more bloodshed and silencing perhaps the only voice that might have answered the central question: Was a break-up enough to cause a gifted trauma surgeon widely beloved as a lifesaver to end two lives in a spasm of violence?

After a two-day nationwide manhunt, police found Dr. Timothy Jorden's body in thick brush a half-mile from his Lake Erie shoreline home. A neighbor had reported hearing a gunshot from the area on Wednesday morning, and police with dogs found the body, dressed in surgical scrubs, on Friday morning.

Authorities had been searching for Jorden since Wednesday morning, when 33-year-old Jacqueline Wisniewski was found shot to death in a stairwell at the Erie County Medical Center. Friends said Wisniewski was afraid of the 49-year-old Jorden and had broken off their relationship some time ago.

Police Commissioner Daniel Derenda said Jorden went to the hospital with a shotgun and a .357 Magnum pistol intending to kill Wisniewski because of their breakup. Jorden lured her to the hospital basement, where he shot her five times at point-blank range. He then ran from the hospital and drove home, where surveillance video showed him arriving about 30 minutes later.

Just four minutes later, Jorden is seen leaving the house, down a path to a ravine and disappearing into the woods.

Derenda said Jorden killed himself with one shot to the head from the .357 Magnum and didn't leave a suicide note. He had withdrawn large sums of money recently and had given friends gifts.

1950s Locker Room Prank behind South Dakota Slaying

MADISON, S.D. • From the moment 73-year-old Carl Ericsson rang his old high school classmate's doorbell in January, verified the man's identity and then shot him dead, the question had been what prompted him to confront a man he hadn't even spoken to in years.

The startling answer, a prosecutor said Friday, was a 1950s locker room humiliation that festered in Ericsson's mind for a half-century.

"He said that a jockstrap was put on his head," Kenneth Meyer said. "It's the only thing he's ever mentioned in talking to law enforcement."

Ericsson, who a psychiatrist said suffered from anxiety and depression for years, last month pleaded guilty but mentally ill to second-degree murder in the death of Norman Johnson.

"I guess it was from something that happened over 50 years ago," Ericsson told a judge then. "It was apparently in my subconscious."

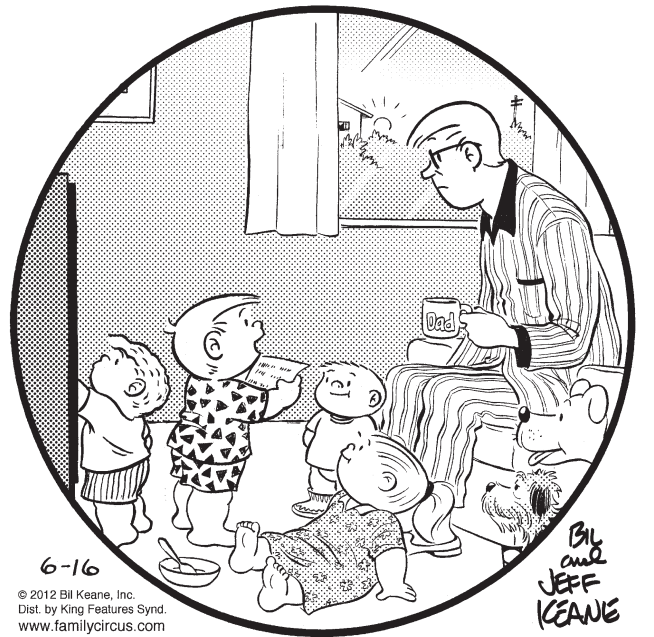

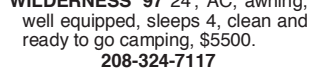

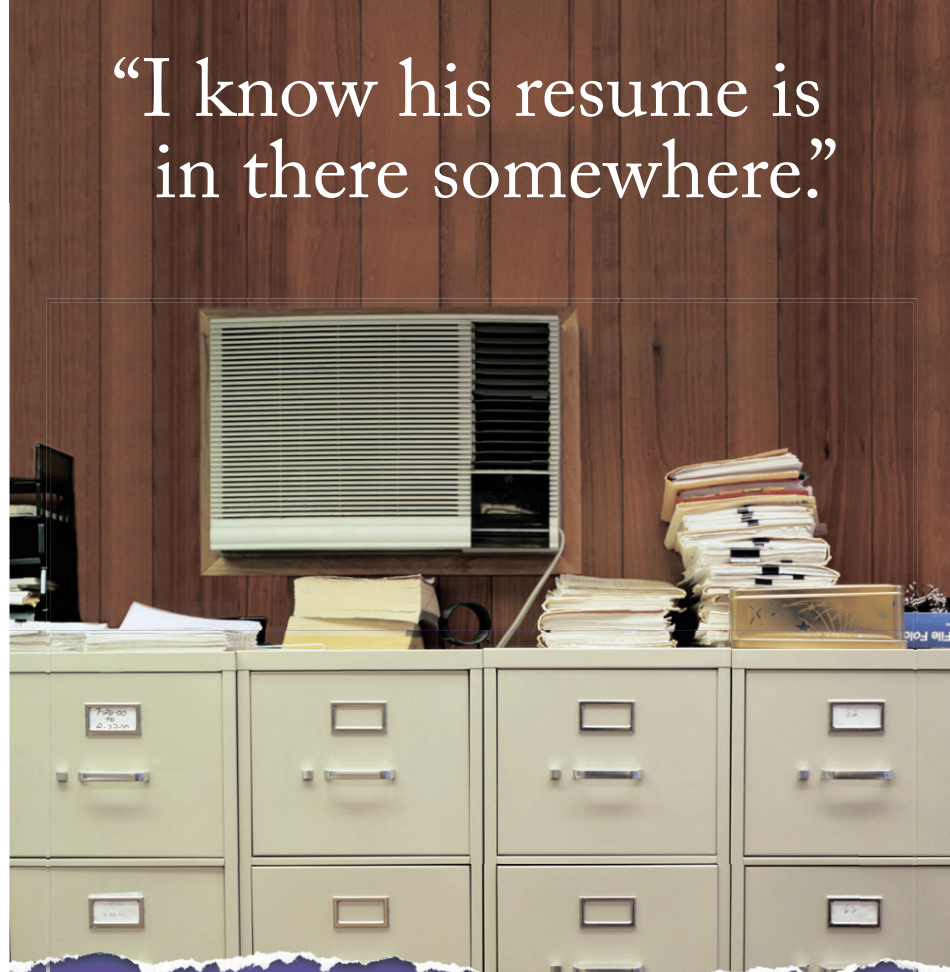

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1567, Mary, Queen of Scots, was imprisoned in Lochleven Castle in Scotland. (She escaped almost a year later but ended up imprisoned again.)

In 1858, accepting the Illinois Republican Party's nomination for the U.S. Senate, Abraham Lincoln said the slavery issue had to be resolved, declaring, "A house divided against itself cannot stand."

In 1903, Ford Motor Co. was incorporated.

In 1911, IBM had its beginnings as the Computing-Tabulating-Recording Co. was incorporated in New York State.

In 1932, President Herbert Hoover and Vice President Charles Curtis were renominated at the Republican national convention in Chicago.

In 1933, the National Industrial Recovery Act became law. (It was later struck down by the Supreme Court.)

In 1941, National Airport (now Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport) opened for business with a ceremony attended by President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

In 1952, "Anne Frank: The Diary of a Young Girl" was published in the United States for the first time by Doubleday & Co.

In 1962, The New Yorker published the first of a three-part serialization of "Silent Spring" by Rachel Carson.

In 1963, the world's first female space traveler, Valentina Tereshkova, was launched into orbit by the Soviet Union aboard Vostok 6.

In 1978, President Jimmy Carter and Panamanian leader Omar Torrijos (toh-REE'-ohs) exchanged the instruments of ratification for the Panama Canal treaties.

In 1987, a jury in New York acquitted Bernhard Goetz of attempted murder in the subway shooting of four youths he said were going to rob him; however, Goetz was convicted of illegal weapons possession. (In 1996, a civil jury ordered Goetz to pay \$43 million to one of the persons he'd shot.)

Ten years ago: French conservatives won a landslide victory in legislative elections. A runaway winner again in the U.S. Open following his victory at the Masters, Tiger Woods became the first player since Jack Nicklaus in 1972 to capture the first two major championships of the year.

Five years ago: A North Carolina State Bar disciplinary committee said disgraced prosecutor Mike Nifong would be disbarred for his disastrous prosecution of three Duke University lacrosse players falsely accused of rape. Six people were killed, 22 injured, when a car driven by Australian-born professional drag racer Troy Critchley plowed into a parade crowd in Selmer, Tenn. U.S. astronaut Sunita "Sunni" Williams set a record aboard the international space station for the longest single spaceflight by any woman, surpassing the record of 188 days set by astronaut Shannon Lucid at the Mir space station in 1996.

One year ago: U.S. Rep. Anthony Weiner, D-N.Y., announced his resignation from Congress, bowing to the furor caused by his sexually charged online dalliances with a former porn actress and other women. Osama bin Laden's longtime second-in-command, Ayman al-Zawahiri, took control of al-Qaida.

I took the first chance I had to leave home and refuse to have contact with my brother. The problem is, I have a younger sister who I'm worried may now be in the same position.

I need to talk to her, but I'm not sure how. What do I say? Should I tell her what happened to me so she knows she is not alone and to stay away from him?

DEAR WORRIED: Talk to your sister about this as quickly as possible. Do it in person, and a way to start the conversation would be to ask if he has ever touched her inappropriately. Explain that it happened to you, because it may make it easier for her to tell you if she, too, has been molested. Since you are reluctant to talk to your parents about this, contact your local police department and ask to speak to an officer in the sex crimes division. It may set the wheels in motion to prevent your brother from continuing to prey on young women.

If you haven't had counseling to help you deal with what you have suffered, I hope you will consider it. There is also a group, Survivors of Incest Anonymous, a 12-step program that is open to individuals 18 and older who want to go from being victims to survivors. Its website is www.siaawso.org. You might find talking with others who have experienced what you have to be both comforting and helpful.

DEAR ABBY: I feel lost. I'll be 18 soon and for the past two years I have felt like my life is going nowhere and won't change. I haven't decided what I want to be, and I don't want to grow up. I'm afraid of the future and what it will be like to be on my own.

I don't know if anyone else has felt like this, or if it's just a part of growing up. When I was 12, I couldn't wait until I was 18 and on my own. Now I feel pressured and like I need to hurry and choose what I want to be. Please help me.

DEAR LOST: Do you know where this pressure is coming from? It's coming from yourself. Years ago, high school students had to decide what they wanted to do for the rest of their lives because the workplace was different. People trained for jobs they would perform until they retired. That is no longer true. Workers today must remain flexible and willing to learn new skills because they may change jobs several times during their working lives.

Not all people have the same interests and aptitudes, so start thinking about subjects that you like. Visit the library and research how they can be applied. Your future isn't something to be afraid of — it's something to be explored and enjoyed. You do not have to make any hasty decisions now.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE Bobby Wolff

"Yet half I seemed to recognize some trick Of mischief happened to me."
— Robert Browning

Michael Gromoeller and Andreas Kirmse, a pair who play on Germany's Open team, have established a formidable reputation. A double duck demonstrated their prowess in today's deal at the 1st World Mind Sports Games.

Against three spades West led the club ace, then switched to the diamond deuce, which showed an odd number. On winning with the queen and noting the fall of the 10 from South, Kirmse played back the club nine — his lowest club because he expected to win his diamond ace and give his partner a second ruff. However, West ruffed, then returned the trump queen instead of playing a second diamond. He knew that if South did hold a second diamond, the contract would fail, so there was no urgency in that department.

Declarer drew the rest of the trumps, then advanced dummy's diamond king, on which Kirmse impassively played low (realizing declarer had to be void now). Deciding that it was West who held the diamond ace, declarer ruffed, then crossed to dummy in clubs to play a heart to the king, which, in turn, Gromoeller also ducked. Being devoid of further entries to dummy, and knowing the distribution — and the location of the red aces — South continued with the heart seven, expecting that East would be forced to win with the ace. But East's singleton honor was the jack, and his club return meant that South's contract had to fail.

ANSWER: In this auction, a rebid of two no-trump suggests a quasi-balanced hand with 12-14 points and is probably the least lie. Even if you play two-over-one game-forcing, I draw the line at bidding three clubs with a minimum hand and a poor four-card minor. I feel that that call should show either extras or a fifth club. Repeating spades on a poor five-carder is also unattractive.
