Council Considers Repealing Texting While Driving Ban

TWIN FALLS • It takes only one law to cite a texting driver.

Tonight, the Twin Falls City Council will consider ditching the city's ban on texting while driving in response to passage of a similar ban by the Idaho Legislature.

The new statewide law bans texting while driving and is similar to a Twin Falls city ordinance. Repealing the law will provide clarity to officers who must enforce the ban, said Capt. Anthony Barnhart in a letter to the council members.

If approved, the ordinance would stay in place until July 1, when the state law goes into effect.

The council will also wrap up loose ends concerning the transfer of a parking lot to the Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency and city-owned land near Rock Creek Park to Twin Falls County. The Rock Creek transfer is part of a swap in which the city gains acreage on Shoup Avenue that officials hope to turn into a dog park and community garden.

The council will also consider accepting a land donation from Twin Falls developer Gerald Martens. Currently, Martens owns about three acres of property along the canal on Filer Avenue West. If Martens were to develop the property, it would require moving the entire canal to a pipe underground, according to the agenda.

Magic Valley Unemployment Numbers on the Rise

The jump mirrors a boost in unemployed workers throughout Idaho during May.

TWIN FALLS • The city of Twin Falls and Twin Falls County each recorded increased unemployment from April to May, according to statistics released by the Idaho Department of Labor.

The city jumped from 8 percent in April to 8.4 percent last month. The county's jobless percentage increased from 7.5 in April to 7.9 in May.

Jerome County's unemployment rate jumped, too. It went from 7 percent in April to 7.7 percent in May.

Lincoln County saw a big increase in the percentage of unemployed residents in May, zooming to 10.2 percent from 8.7 percent the previous month. Gooding County increased from 5.3 percent unemployment to 5.9 percent during the two-month period.

Cassia County also had a large unemployment increase, moving from 5.8 percent in May to 7 percent last month. Minidoka County recorded 7.4 percent unemployment in May after a 6.8 percent rate in April.

Those numbers mirrored a higher seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for the entire state during May. Idaho's 7.8 percent rate last month was up from 7.7 percent in April and broke a string of nine straight monthly declines in the Gem State.

The national unemployment rate also increased a tenth of a percentage point last month, hitting 8.2 percent. Idaho's rate has been below the national percentage for almost 11 years, the Idaho Department of Labor said in a news release.

House Fires: Be Prepared

Most house fires can be avoided if residents know what steps to take.

TWIN FALLS • At least three major house fires have hit the Magic Valley in recent weeks. The fires destroyed possessions and left residents homeless and rattled the peace of mind of neighbors in Twin Falls, Hansen and Castleford.

So far this spring, Twin Falls firefighters aren't seeing more house fire calls than last year, and, fortunately, most house fires can be avoided if homes are maintained and people are aware of the preven-

tion steps they can take, said Brian Cunningham, battalion chief of the Twin Falls Fire Department.

How to Help Prevent a Fire in Your Home

- Unattended candles and barbecues can start house fires but other less obvious things can cause house fires, too, Cunningham said. "The summertime brings out folks staining decks or fences and the rags can be hazardous," he said.
- When wadded up and thrown in a corner the stain-soaked rags can begin to produce their own heat, he said, eventually spontaneously combusting.
- "The best thing is to read the manufacturer directions when working with that stuff."
- Appliances, especially dryers, should be maintained and regularly cleaned, Cunningham said.

T.F. Communities Host Annual Firewise Workday

TWIN FALLS • Having a natural landscape at home adds a beauty all its own. No two are alike.

The beauty, however, can come with a unique destruction: fire. But you can do things to lessen that threat.

Residents of Hidden Lakes and Meadow Ridge subdivisions on Saturday learned how to better protect their homes from wildfires during a Firewise Communities workday in their neighborhoods, removing debris and planting fire resistant plants.

It wasn't until a neighbor's home came close to ruin by a fire that Mickey Burney and other neighbors realized the dangers and risks of living in the rural Hidden Lakes area.

"We didn't think twice about it," she said. "It made people really realize the importance of having green space."

Burney has lived in the subdivision for seven years and has seen three fires in her time. She knows all too well the importance of maintaining green space.

Camas County was one of only two Idaho counties to post lower unemployment figures from April to May. Camas' rate declined from 7.3 percent to 6.9 percent in that period. Meanwhile, Franklin County dropped from 4.7 percent to 4.3 percent.

In Twin Falls County, a total of 36,384 people had jobs in May, according to the Department of Labor, while 3,140 people were searching for jobs during the month. The city of Twin Falls had 20,462 employed workers in May with 1,874 looking for work, state numbers showed. Slightly fewer than 10,000 people — 9,952 — were employed in Jerome

County during May. Another 827 residents were looking for jobs. Among Idaho's largest cities, Coeur d'Alene posted the highest May unemployment rate at 10.2 percent, a jump from 9 percent the previous month. Caldwell's May unemployment rate was next highest at 10.1 percent, an increase of two-tenths of a percent. Boise's unemployment rate in May was 7.4 following a 6.9 rate in April.

"It makes them more efficient and makes it not heat up as much," he said. • General upkeep outside the home is important, Cunningham said. "Especially if you live in a rural area, if there's lots of sage brush around," he said. "Make sure you have lots of defensible space around the home." Green grass helps, he said, as well as keeping plants up against the house to a minimum. • Homeowners should take care where they store flammable chemicals and gasoline. "Just be careful with stores," Cunningham said. "Use common sense with where to store gasoline for

mowers and things. It's pretty common sense to look around and see if you have a problem." • If there is a fire in your home, being alerted as soon as possible can save lives and get the fire department to you sooner. "Certainly checking smoke detectors is really important," Cunningham said.

How to Document Possessions for Insurance Companies

Tamy Perkins at the Farmer's Insurance Group in Twin Falls said the company recommends making a list of possessions, especially things like antiques. At her company, Perkins said they give out household content

- Make sure your records include receipts, what the items are worth and pictures, Perkins said.
- Keep a copy of your records in a safe place outside your home. "Give it to a friend or put it in a safe deposit box," she said. "If your house burns down it could be gone."

What if it Happens to You?

The Greater Idaho Chapter of the American Red Cross and South Central Idaho Community Action Partnership help out victims of disasters who need help with housing, food and other necessary items for a few days after the event. "Those are the agencies we turn to initially," Cunningham said.

wind effects flame and how fire travels. "More and more people are wanting to live in wild lands, but they don't always realize that there's a higher risk," she said. "We give them tools and information for fire prevention and things to keep in mind when landscaping." To help create fire resistant landscaping, the Ag Science departments at Shoshone and Hagerman high schools provided homes with various fire and drought resistant plants like dragon's blood, yarrow and black-eyed Susan. Kyli Gough, BLM fire information officer, said the combined effort is great for helping prevent

fires in the future. "It's all about wildland-urban interface," she said. "It's wonderful to see all the agencies and commu-

nities come together." As the day wore on crews chipped the brush piles that homeowners had collected and hidden

throughout the year. "The chipper is a huge deal," Ann Gouzene, president of Firewise for the Meadow Ridge subdivision. "Everyone really gets into their yards and cleans up." Gouzene said there was always the acknowledgment of fire danger, but it was different when there were a couple of fires close by. "We were amazed at how quickly the fire took off," she said. "To actually see it in person was a real motivation." The result of that motivation may save homes in the future. "If people make an effort to keep their yards lean, green and clean for 200 feet around their home, it's really going to help them," Simonson said.

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Otter: Plan for Cuts in Federal Money to State

BOISE (AP) • Idaho Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter has told agency chiefs to start planning for possible reductions in federal aid and come up with a plan in dealing with having reduced budgets.

Otter in a speech last week to the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry asked agency heads to factor in a 20 percent cut in federal funds.

Federal aid supports more than one-third of state spending.

A possible \$1.2 trillion in automatic budget cuts in domestic and military spending could be triggered under the

Budget Control Act over the next 10 years.

The cuts are due to start in January because a special panel failed to reach a deal last summer to reduce the deficit.

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Dispute Over Seized Indian Artifacts in Talks

BILLINGS, Mont. • The government is entering settlement talks with the director of a Custer-themed Montana museum, trying to resolve who owns a cache of American Indian artifacts seized in raids by federal agents.

The 22 Indian war bonnets, medicine bundles and other items were confiscated in 2005 and 2008 from the Custer Battlefield Museum in Garryowen. The government spent years pursuing artifact fraud charges against museum director Christopher Kortlander, but dropped its investigation three years ago.

Kortlander, who says the items rightfully belong to the museum, will press his case Monday before U.S. Magistrate Judge Keith Strong in a settlement conference in Great Falls.

The U.S. Attorney's Office says most of the items have feathers from protected eagles, making them possible contraband. They have alleged some were stolen from members of the Crow Tribe.

But Kortlander has not been implicated in the thefts. And officials acknowledge one allegedly stolen war bonnet could have been misidentified.

Kortlander says federal officials from the U.S. Attorney's Office and Bureau of Land Management who are holding onto the artifacts are "trying to save face" for the years they spent on a fruitless investigation.

"They need to let it go," Kortlander said in an interview. "They're basically making up stories at this point. They won't concede anything."

In a recent hearing before U.S. District Judge Richard Cebull, Assistant U.S. Attorney Victoria Francis said the government did not have enough evidence to determine how the museum acquired the items. She said Kortlander previously had been unable to tell federal agents where they came from.

"When you say, 'I don't know whose they are,' that would indicate you're not the owner," she said. Francis added that a "museum should be able to say, 'That was donated to me by Mr. and Mrs. Smith.'"

Kortlander has since said he's found tax records or photographic documentation for most of the artifacts. He says any items determined to be stolen would be returned to their rightful owner.

Kortlander's museum is within the Crow Indian Reservation, just a few miles from where Lt. Col. George Armstrong Custer and more than 200 troopers and scouts from the Crow Tribe were killed in June 1876, by up to 1,800 Lakota Sioux and Northern Cheyenne warriors.

Thousands of items were seized during the 2005 and 2008 raids, which came after officials suspected Kortlander was fraudulently dealing in Little Bighorn battlefield artifacts and illegally buying and selling Indian artifacts.

Man Grateful for Help with Dog's Surgery

BILLINGS, Mont. • Mike Mallory walked along the sidewalks surrounding South Park on Wednesday morning, pulling his dog Red in a bright yellow wagon behind him while going through his morning routine of picking up trash and debris — not for a job, but because of the kindness people have shown him over the last few months.

"It's just one of my ways of the paying it forward," he said. "I can't pay it back financially, so I do it this way."

Red is Mallory's 5-year-old red heeler, his constant companion and best friend. Last year, he learned that the pooch needed the anterior cruciate ligament in his left hind leg replaced, but Mallory — who suffered a traumatic brain injury after a car crash in 2001 and lives mostly on limited disability benefits — couldn't afford the surgery.

They were eventually referred to Dr. Ken Brown at the Animal Clinic of Billings by the Caring Hands Veterinary Hospital. That surgery, along with rehabilitation and other post-procedure work, cost more than \$3,000.

"When he came to us he said, 'I don't have any money

but I'll figure something out," said Kay Lynn Allen, a canine physical therapy rehabilitation practitioner at the clinic. "Dr. Brown said, 'We'll get your dog fixed up and then we'll get that taken care of.'"

As his name implies, Red is covered in a soft red coat, flecked with white. The friendly, well-behaved dog has no problem greeting strangers, save the occasional bark, and is quick to respond to Mallory's quiet commands. Mallory, a self-described "tumbleweed that's lived in 15 to 20 states," said he became disillusioned after his accident when several people tried to take advantage of him because of his disability. He planned to live alone in a cabin in the mountains in his home state of Virginia.

But thanks in large part to Red — whom he bought as a puppy with an ex-girlfriend — and his efforts to gather money for the surgery, his outlook has changed.

"I'm a better man because of him," Mallory said. "He's the most loyal friend I have. He's made me more caring,

more loving and more respectful."

Red had the surgery in January, and for most of the year Mallory has been carting him around Billings in the wagon. Walking for Red is the name of a campaign he created to cover the surgery costs and raise awareness of pet emergencies.

Later this summer, Mallory plans to embark on a "walk-about" in which he and Red travel on foot to a yet-to-be-determined city out of the state to continue spreading awareness and raise money for people in similar situations.

"There's a lot of love in this world," he said. "I've seen that, and I want to see more of it and spread more of it. This walk is about awareness; it's about paying it forward."

On Tuesday, Mallory hit the goal for Red's first surgery — thanks in large part to a Facebook page promoting it and donations from people as far away as Germany — but the effort's not done yet.

Dr. Brown warned him that in many cases, another ACL will go out on a dog not long

after the first. Shortly after the first surgery, the ACL in Red's other hind leg did just that.

Once again, the clinic said it would do the surgery and worry about the payments later. Dr. Brown waived his usual surgery fee, Allen said, and it will cost about \$2,500.

"There's just this crazy bond between them and it's so touching," Allen said. "That dog is really what keeps (Mallory) going."

Red is scheduled to go in for the second surgery on Thursday morning. When healed up from the second surgery, Red should be able to walk, run and play like any other dog his age, although Mallory said he still plans to use the wagon at times.

Patty Daponte, who lives in Connecticut, learned of the effort in April and has been helping to gather donations and running the Walking for Red Facebook page ever since.

She said Mallory's love for the dog caught her eye.

"That man would walk across the world for his dog, and I really believe that," she said. "But he wants to help other people, not just his dog, but other people whose pets need help. He's the real deal."

Miners, Conservationists Join to Save River, Trout

BOISE (AP) • Two conservation groups and three phosphate mining companies in eastern Idaho have formed a partnership intended to improve water quality in the Blackfoot River in eastern Idaho.

JR Simplot Company, Monsanto and Agrium/NuWest Industries have joined with the Idaho Conservation League and Trout Unlimited to form the Upper Blackfoot River Initiative for Conservation.

"It is an opportunity for stakeholders of the Blackfoot River to come together and make a positive difference," Jeff Klieve, director of environmental affairs for Monsanto, told the *Idaho Statesman* in a story published Thursday.

The group in February compiled data on fish populations throughout the Upper Blackfoot and completed an assessment of fish passage obstacles and habitat conditions. The Upper Blackfoot is a blue ribbon fishery for native cutthroat trout.

Monsanto, Boise-based J.R. Simplot Co., and Agrium/NuWest Industries have mines in the so-called phosphate patch near the Idaho-Wyoming border. Environmental groups have

been concerned about selenium pollution from phosphate mining that's killed livestock and aquatic life in eastern Idaho waterways.

"Our top priority projects are those that will immediately benefit water quality and fish," said Rob Masonis, vice president for Western Conservation at Trout Unlimited.

The group is also contacting others with interests in the region. Those include ranchers and other land owners, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Caribou-Targhee National Forest, Idaho Department of Fish and Game, Idaho Department of Environmental Quality, Bureau of Land Management, Natural Resources Conservation Service, Shoshone-Bannock Tribe, Caribou Cattle Co. and the Bear Lake Grazing Co.

"In all our projects, we will reach out to other interested parties and work collaboratively with landowners and government agencies," said Alan Prouty, Simplot's vice president for environmental and regulatory affairs.

The group also is looking at non-lethal methods at controlling pelican populations near the Blackfoot Reservoir.

N. Idaho Logging Project Faces Possible Lawsuit

LEWISTON (AP) • Two environmental groups say they will file a lawsuit against the U.S. Forest Service concerning a planned logging project in the Nez Perce-Clearwater National Forests.

Friends of the Clearwater in Moscow, Idaho, and the Alliance of the Wild Rockies in Helena, Mont., have filed a 60-day notice as required under federal law.

The *Lewiston Tribune* reports that the groups

contend the 2,500-acre Little Slate Project in northern Idaho will harm protected species, including Canada lynx, bull trout, steelhead and spring and summer chinook.

The project involves a mix of logging and restoration, with the goal of treating lodgepole pine stands harmed by beetle infestations.

Some all-terrain vehicle trails would be removed and some trails moved to protect fish and wildlife.

Webb Simpson Wins U.S. Open

SAN FRANCISCO • Webb Simpson won the U.S. Open and put two more names into the graveyard of champions.

Overlooked for so much of the week, Simpson emerged on a fog-filled Sunday at The Olympic Club with four birdies around the turn and a tough chip out of a hole to the right of the 18th green that he converted into par for a 2-under 68.

He finished at 1-over 281, and it was enough to outlast former U.S. Open champions Jim Furyk and Graeme McDowell.

Furyk bogeyed two of his last three holes. McDowell had a 25-foot birdie on the 18th to force a playoff, but it never had a chance.

"Oh, wow," Simpson said, watching from the locker room.

Olympic is known as the "graveyard of champions" because proven major winners who were poised to win the U.S. Open have always lost to the underdog. One of those was Arnold Palmer in 1966, when he lost a seven-shot lead on the back nine.

Perhaps it was only fitting that the 25-year-old Simpson went to Wake Forest on an Arnold Palmer scholarship.

"Arnold has been so good to me," Simpson said. "Just the other day, I read that story and thought about it. He's meant so much to me and Wake Forest. Hopefully, I can get a little back for him and make him smile."

No one was beaming like Simpson, who followed a breakthrough year on the PGA Tour with his first major.

No one was more disgusted than Furyk, in control for so much of the final round until he snapped his tee shot on the par-5 16th hole to fall out of the lead for the first time all day, and was unable to get it back. Needing a birdie on the final hole, he hit into the bunker. He crouched and clamped his teeth onto the shaft of his wedge. Furyk made bogey on the final hole and closed with a 74, a final round without a single birdie.

McDowell, who made four bogeys on the front nine, at least gave himself a chance with a 20-foot birdie putt on the 17th and a shot into the 18th that had him sprinting up the hill to see what kind of chance he had. The putt stayed left of the hole the entire way, and he had to settle for a 73.

McDowell shared second place with Michael Thompson, who closed with a 67 and waited two hours to see if it would be good enough.

Tiger Woods, starting five shots behind, played the first six holes in 6-over par and was never a factor. He shot 73 and finished six

strokes back.

Furyk was fuming, mostly at himself, for blowing a chance at his second U.S. Open title. He also was surprised that the USGA moved the tee up 100 yards on the 16th hole to play 569 yards. It was reachable in two shots for some

I'll be honest: Golf isn't my favorite sport. It's not even in my top five. I have a hand-me-down set of clubs from my dad, which I only use a couple of times a year. Needless to say, I'm terrible at the game. I only watch the final round of majors, if that, and usually when someone I like is winning. But as I watched my "favorite golfer" lay waste to Congressional last year, an ad for the 2012 tournament came on. Tickets were already on sale for the Olympic Club in San Francisco, and I immediately thought of my dad - a USGA member with a personalized set of clubs and a handicap in the teens, even though he can order off the senior menu at Denny's.

I might not be particularly fond of this gentleman's game, but my dad is a golf nut. And as the final round always falls on Father's Day, I came to the conclusion this was all about Dad and not me, and I bit the bullet. I immediately put in for Sunday passes, at \$125 a pop. We mused about how golfers had to know about the break on this particular hole, yet all but three – Padraig Harrington, Zach Johnson and Tiger Woods, who all nailed long birdie putts – still failed to read it accurately from distance.

We debated what score we thought would win the tournament. I said even par

Earnhardt Jr. Ends Drought with Win in Michigan

BROOKLYN, Mich. • Dale Earnhardt Jr. raced to his first NASCAR Sprint Cup victory in four years, ending a 143-race winless streak Sunday at Michigan International Speedway.

The victory came almost exactly four years to the day after his last trip to Victory Lane in a Cup race. That also was in Michigan on June 15, 2008. He led for 36 laps last weekend at Pocono but made a late stop for gas instead of trying to stretch the fuel to the end.

On Sunday, it wasn’t even close. He pulled away over the final 25 laps of the 400-mile race, and his black Chevrolet with the green No. 88 finally crossed the finish line 5.393 seconds ahead of Tony Stewart.

“Those last 15 laps were the longest laps ever,” Earnhardt said.

Earnhardt already had 11 top-10 finishes this season and was second in the points standings entering this race. But after another close run at Pocono, the questions kept coming about his dry spell.

That’s now over. “Dale had the fastest car all day,” Stewart said. “It’s not a national holiday, guys. This morning they were celebrating his fourth anniversary of his last win, so I guess we’re all in a state of mourning now, because he’s broke that string now, so I don’t know what we’re all supposed to think.”

Earnhardt remains second to Matt Kenseth in the standings.

Earnhardt’s 143 races between wins was the sixth-

longest streak in Sprint Cup history.

Like his last victory in Michigan, this one came on Father’s Day – fitting for the driver whose father has been so revered around NASCAR circles. Dale Earnhardt Sr. died in a last-lap crash at the Daytona 500 in 2001. “Junior” is now stock-car racing’s most popular driver – a fact not lost on him in the moments after the win.

“To do it for my fans – they stuck behind me for all these years. I know exactly what they’ve been thinking about and how long they’ve been wanting us to get to Victory Lane,” Earnhardt

said. “This was for them. I appreciate their loyalty and their support. We wouldn’t have made it back to Victory Lane without it.”

Earnhardt moved past pole winner Marcos Ambrose on lap 70 to take the lead, and although Stewart would lead for a bit, Earnhardt was in front again not long after the race’s halfway point.

Earnhardt led on lap 171, after a pitting cycle. With 25 laps remaining, he was ahead by 1.978 seconds. With 10 remaining, he had built a 5.468-second cushion.

The end was almost anticlimactic – and it was certainly a relief for Earnhardt.

I got a notepad or two, as well as the expected solicitations for USGA membership. Apparently they aren’t as informed as Times-News readers when it comes to the state of my golf game, though I suppose my money spends just the same as a scratch golfer’s.

When May finally rolled around, the grounds passes weren’t the only thing we got in the mail. Along with it was a tournament guide, as well as a “prohibited item” run-down that makes the TSA’s airport security look like a walk in the park. Among the items: PDAs, camcorders, cell phones of any order, radios, TVs, outside food, and pets. All Eyes on the GOP Convention in Twin Falls

The Idaho Democratic convention may generate a few headlines but the Republican convention this week in Twin Falls may tell a larger story, when it makes decisions on picking a new chairman and approving platform and resolutions.

The chairmanship is opening with the end-of-term departure of Norm Semanko, and there's not only no obvious heir, but also no now-obvious battle lines. The chair fight in 2010 was not about different gradations of "conservative," or even ideology, but more about ins vs. outs. The outs (under Semanko's banner) won. That may have taken a little air out, since winning breeds satisfaction rather than roiling energy. And this year, Governor C.L. "Butch" Otter evidently is (wisely, after losing two years ago) staying out of it. The divisions this year seem not nearly as sharp as two years ago.

string of candidates each without much support each could drag things on; or there could be a squabble over issues. Bringing us to platform and resolutions, subject of much discussion after the 2010 meeting when Tea Party favorites like repeal of popular election of senators, return to the gold standard and other such issues either were embraced or nearly so. There's some discussion this convention might focus more on national issues and on lining up support for presidential nominee-apparent Mitt Romney, which would make for peaceful quiet.

A bunch of names have been floated. Some are not prominent statewide (the county chair of Elmore County, for example). At least one is well known — Dean Sorensen, a former legislator who (fairly or not) for some bears the "moderate" tag, not a good sign for election inside this party. A dark horse could yet emerge.

Or not. The batch of proposed resolutions mailed to convention delegates includes, again, a bunch of hot-button items (one calling for a reversal on the closed Republican primary). Resolutions committee co-chair is Representative Bob Nonini of Coeur d'Alene, who may not shy from the hotter stuff.

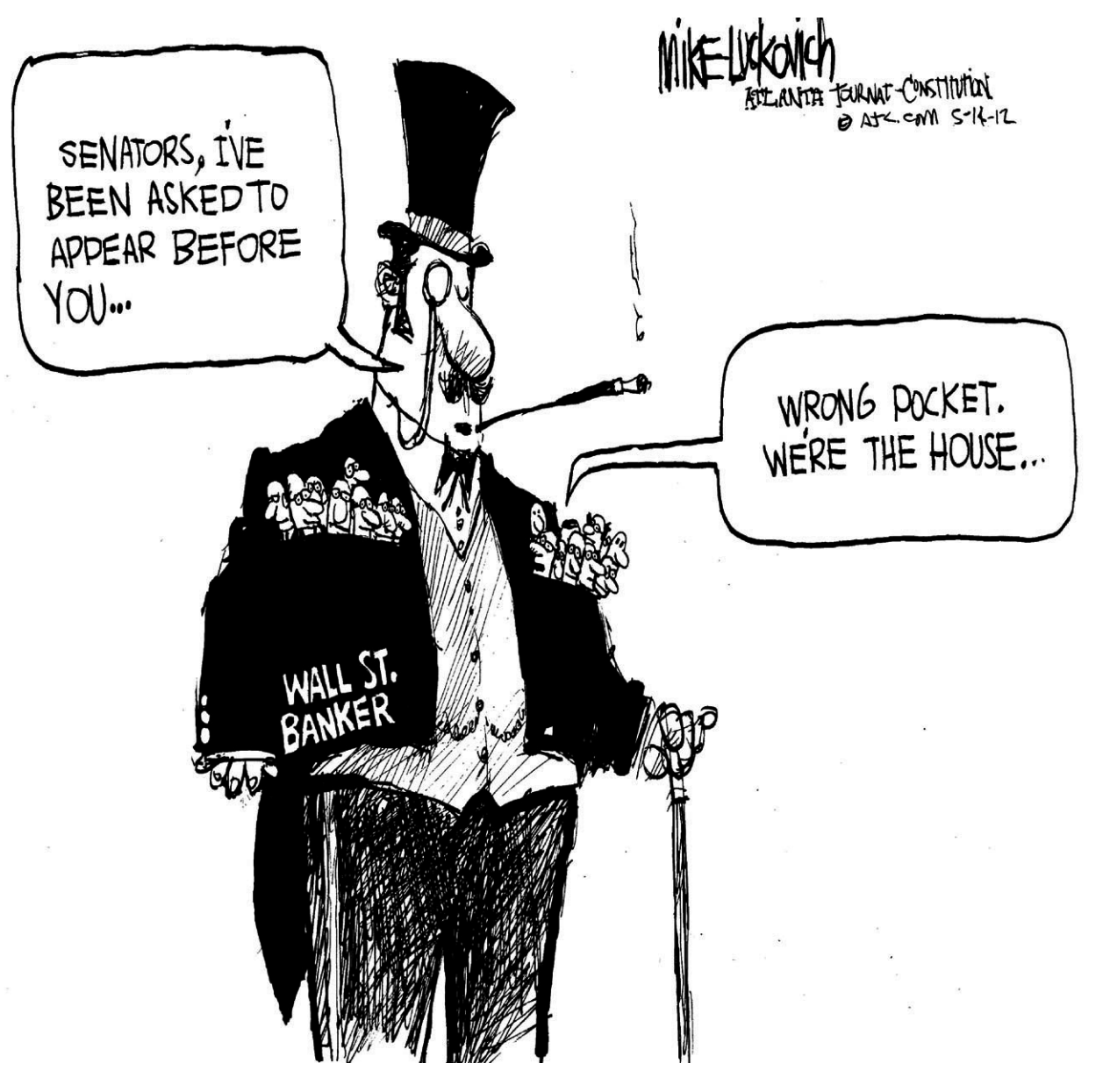
Then there's Lawrence Denney, speaker of the Idaho House, quoted as saying he might be willing to serve as party chair and leave the speakership. This is an eye-catcher, since party chair is not nearly so powerful or influential an office as House speaker — or even, probably, most House committee chairs. Speculation here: It's an indication Denney thinks he may be unseated in the organizational session in December by Representative Scott Bedke, the now-assistant majority leader running for speaker, who seems to have deep and broad support.

The platform could go two ways too. Last time, the party called for sending out to candidates a checkoff form called variously a "survey" or a "loyalty oath," in which they could declare which platform elements they support or not. Those responses apparently will be brought into discussion in the platform committee, which is slated to run about twice as long as usual. Based on that and longer debate, the platform might be softened from 2010, or the delegates might decide to get more creative.

But Denney's candidacy, like others, is uncertain till the convention. It could be a relatively quiet and easy contest; a

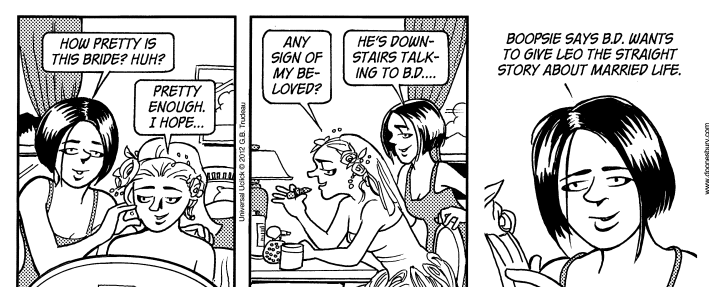

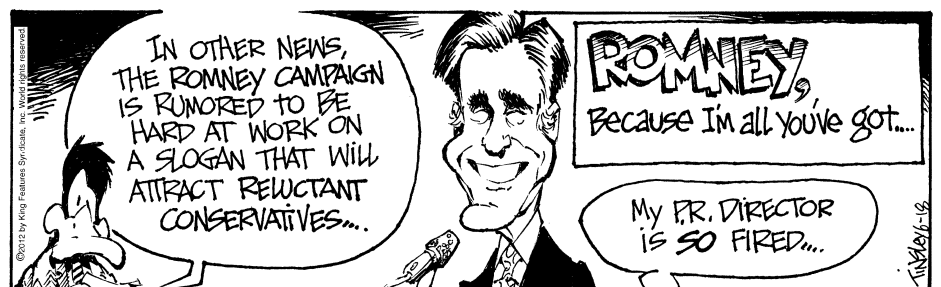

Moms Protest Utah Water Park's Breast-feeding Policy

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A group of about 15 mothers and their babies gathered outside a Salt Lake City water park to protest its policy against breast-feeding.

Saturday's protest was organized by Katie Buhler, a mother of three who said she was told to stop breast-feeding her 7-month-old child by a female lifeguard at Seven Peaks Waterpark.

Buhler said she did not expose her breast, but instead discreetly nursed her child under a blanket.

"I was so caught off guard I didn't even know how to respond to it," she said.

She said a manager later told her that her options were either to leave the park or breast-feed her baby in a restroom.

"She told me that it's their policy and I said 'why,' and she said, 'this is a family-friendly environment and we want to keep it that way,'" Buhler said, adding park bathrooms are unsanitary for the purposes of breast-feeding.

Seven Peaks managers did not immediately return a phone call from the Associated Press on Sunday.

Buhler and her husband, Calvin, took their fight online and received hundreds of supportive responses on their Facebook page, she said. Within a day, they were able to organize a group of women to stage the protest.

The mothers who showed up said they're

outraged over the policy. "If they don't want nursing mothers exposed to the public, then they need to provide a quiet

place for mothers to nurse," said Carol Buffi, a licensed clinical social worker and Buhler family friend.

Pro-Bailout Party Wins Greek Elections

ATHENS, Greece • Greece's conservative New Democracy Party prevailed in elections Sunday, giving it the chance to form a new coalition government that would try to comply with the difficult terms of the country's bailout and secure its spot in the euro zone.

After weeks of uncertainty, the outcome of the parliamentary elections could reassure international leaders and investors, who have nervously watched developments in Greece, fearful that its exit from the euro zone

would rock the global economy.

In a short victory speech, New Democracy leader and likely prime minister Antonis Samaras called the outcome a "victory for all Europe."

"Today the Greek people expressed the will to stay anchored within Europe, honor their commitments and foster growth," Samaras said. He called on the other parties to "join forces to form a stable government. ... There's no time to lose."

New Democracy finished comfortably ahead of the leftist Syriza coalition, whose 37-year-old leader, Alexis Tsipras, had threatened to discard the bailout agreement.

That agreement, which requires the cash-strapped Greek government to adopt a series of deep spending cuts and tax increases, was struck with the International Monetary Fund and other international lenders.

A showdown could have forced Greece out of the currency union, setting off dangerous ripple effects with investors suspecting that other struggling European countries, such as Italy and Spain, also might not be able to meet their obligations. The result could have been a series of domino-like exits from the euro zone, ultimately causing the disbanding of the currency union and economic chaos.

Rodney King, the black motorist whose violent encounter with white Los Angeles police officers after a car chase in 1991 was captured on home video and helped prompt one of the worst race riots in U.S. history, and an abiding controversy about American justice, died June 17. He was 47.

King apparently drowned at his home in Rialto, Calif., according to local police. His fiancée called 911 early Sunday morning, saying that she had discovered King at the bottom of his swimming pool. He was taken to a hospital, where he was pronounced dead. A preliminary investigation showed no signs of foul play.

Two decades ago, King, then 25, found himself at the center of one of the most volatile debates over race and the law since the end of the civil rights movement. To many people, especially in the black community, he became a symbol of the police brutality that had long been inflicted on African

Americans.

"History will record that it was Rodney King's beating and his actions that made America deal with the excessive misconduct of law enforcement," the Rev. Al Sharpton said in a statement after King's death.

King has become known for the words he spoke in an appeal he made during the riots that followed his arrest. "Can we all get along?" he urged. "Can we get along?"

On March 3, 1991, King was driving on a Los Angeles interstate when highway patrol officers attempted to stop him for speeding. During the eight-mile high-speed chase that ensued, members of the Los Angeles police joined it and assumed control when King ultimately pulled over.

Although he got out of the car, King resisted arrest and at one point threw officers off his back.

L.A. police officers testified to their fears that King appeared to be under the influence of the drug PCP, which can unleash aggression in users.

Test results would show, however, that King had been drinking. To subdue him, the officers fired a Taser stun gun and beat him with batons, leaving him bloodied and bruised. His cheekbone, skull bones and ankle were broken.

A nearby resident, George Holliday, was wakened by the noise and began filming the incident from his apartment balcony with a camcorder. Holliday later released the grainy footage to the news media, which played and replayed the incomplete, frequently edited footage, searing the beating into national memory.

The next year, four L.A. officers were tried in connection with the incident. A California jury, with no black members, acquitted three of assault charges, and a mistrial was declared for a fourth.

"Viewed from outside the trial, it was hard to understand how the verdict could possibly square with the video," President George H.W. Bush was quoted at the time.

Parts of Los Angeles erupted in riots, which left more than 50 people dead and more than 2,000

wounded, while hundreds of fires broke out and many businesses were looted. As the violence continued, King emerged from his home to make an appeal:

"People, I just want to say — can we all get along? Can we get along? ... We've got enough smog here in Los Angeles, let alone deal with the setting of these fires and things ... It's not right, and it's not going to change anything. ... We've got to quit."

Those words, particularly the phrase about getting along, have become part of the popular culture and have helped to keep his name, and the events of 20 years ago, alive in American consciousness.

Rodney Glen King was born April 2, 1965, in Sacramento. He grew up in Altadena, Calif., with several brothers and sisters.

In discussing his arrest, King once told the *Los Angeles Times*: "I hate that it was me. I hate that it would be anybody at the center of attention like that. I wouldn't wish that on nobody. I have to turn it around, put it behind me, which is really hard."

What Investigators Found Inside Whitey Bulger's Home

LOS ANGELES • When the FBI arrested Boston mobster James "Whitey" Bulger last June, officials documented the contents of his Santa Monica, Calif., apartment with meticulous detail.

Bulger had fled Boston on the eve of a federal indictment in 1994, with girlfriend Catherine Greig in tow. The couple settled in Santa Monica and assumed the names Charlie and Carol Gasko, officials say.

Now, prosecutors have released hundreds of pages of documentation on the "Gasko" apartment. Photos, photocopies and descriptions of items inside the apartment give a glimpse of how Bulger lived during 16 years in hiding.

Here are some of the items, from the practical to the

ridiculous:

- A mini-library of gangster literature, including "Mob Cops," "The Last Gangster," "Public Enemies," "True Stories of Law & Order" and "Escape from Alcatraz."

- A "60 Minutes" interview with former Bulger colleague John Martorano. In the interview, Martorano said he was furious when he learned Bulger was an FBI informant. "If I could have killed him, I'd have killed him," Martorano said. "That was what I think he deserves."

- Roughly 100 handwritten pages of Bulger's memoir. The manuscript has a foreword of sorts, an investigator noted, in which Bulger explains he began writing because he'd been "driven to this by the lies of (Martorano) and seeing his insane interview on '60 Minutes' was the last straw."

Syrian Rebels Strengthen Control of the Countryside

TALBISEH, Syria • This city is almost completely empty after a week of heavy shelling by the Syrian government. But it is empty of government forces as well.

The shelling, which killed 20 civilians and five rebel fighters, failed to dislodge rebels who had driven the Syrian military out of nearly a dozen bases and checkpoints in the city over a period of two days earlier this month.

Syrian President Bashar Assad has promised a new offensive to drive rebels from their strongholds in the center of Homs, the country's third-largest city, as the civil war in Syria grinds on. Opposition activist groups reported that Syrian troops bombarded Homs on Sunday with mortar rounds and heavy machine guns, killing at least 11 people.

The site of the worst violence in the country since a peaceful uprising against Assad became an armed rebellion last

year, Homs has been preparing for more fighting as Syrian troops massed around rebel-held neighborhoods there over the weekend.

Decree Gives Sweeping Powers to Egypt's Generals

CAIRO • Egypt's military leaders issued a constitutional decree Sunday that gave the armed forces sweeping powers and degraded the presidency to a subservient role, as early counts of ballots in the country's presidential runoff showed the Muslim Brotherhood's candidate in the lead.

The bold assertion of power by the ruling generals followed months in which they had promised to cede authority to a new civilian government by the end of June. Instead, activists and political analysts said, the generals' move marked the start of a military dictatorship, a sharp reversal from the promise of Egypt's popular revolt last year.

The declaration, published in the state gazette, had been expected, but its details indicate that the military has asserted far greater authority than observers had anticipated. Under the order, the president will have no control over the military's budget or leadership and will not be authorized to declare war without the consent of the ruling generals.

The document said the military would soon name a group of Egyptians to draft a new constitution, which will be subject to a public referendum within three months. Once a new charter is in place, a parliamentary election will be held to replace the Islamist-dominated lower house that was dissolved Thursday after the country's high court ruled that one-third of the chamber's members had been elected unlawfully.

"With this document, Egypt has completely left the realm of the Arab Spring and entered the realm of military dictatorship," said Hossam Bahgat, a prominent human rights activist. "This is worse than our worst fears."

Defense Team Prepares to Tell Sandusky's Side of Story

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. • Beginning Monday, the 12 people who will decide former Penn State coach Jerry Sandusky's fate will hear his side of the story.

Last week, the jury listened as witness after witness took the stand for the prosecution and described Sandusky as a man who had charmed them with gifts and attention, only to exploit them sexually.

Sandusky is charged with sexually abusing 10 boys over a 15-year period. He has maintained that he is innocent.

Court is scheduled to resume at 9 a.m. EDT Monday.

Attorneys say the defense has a few options for trying to counter the case prosecutors made last week, including poking holes in the alleged victims' stories and casting doubt on their credibility and motives.

Local attorney Bernard Cantorna said that much as an attorney would call a witness to corroborate a story, the defense could call witnesses to disprove or offset someone else's testimony.

"If you take any of the alleged victims' accounts and you can refute something they said, part of their story, that in itself will lead people to question that if part of it is not accurate, (the testimony) might not be accurate," he said.

CITY OF SHOSHONE ORDINANCE NUMBER 527

AN ORDINANCE REVOKING CITY CODE 9.16.050 (BUSINESSES AND CHILDREN); TO ADOPT A NEW CODE SECTION FOR CURFEW FOR MINORS; TO ALLOW FOR PROTECTED FIRST AMENDMENT ACTIVITIES; TO PROVIDE DEFINITIONS; TO SET CURFEW HOURS; TO DEFINE PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITY; TO PROVIDE FOR EXCEPTIONS, ENFORCEMENT, AND PENALTIES; AND TO PROVIDE FOR A PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Shoshone currently has a curfew ordinance; WHEREAS, the Idaho Supreme Court has recently considered the legality of curfew ordinances; and,

WHEREAS, Shoshone's curfew ordinance needs updating to incorporate constitutionally-protected activities and to reduce curfew times;

BE IT ORDAINED by the mayor and Council of the City of Shoshone that:

- Shoshone City Code 9.16.050; BUSINESSES AND CHILDREN is hereby revoked in its entirety;
- A new Shoshone City Code 9.16.050 is hereby adopted and states:

CURFEW FOR MINORS

Sections:

9.16.050.01 DEFINITIONS

9.16.050.02 REGULATIONS

9.16.050.03 ENFORCEMENT

Section 9.16.050.01 DEFINITIONS

The terms as used in this ordinance shall have the following meanings:

A. **EMERGENCY.** An unforeseen circumstance or combination of circumstances that requires immediate action to safeguard life, limb, or property. Emergencies shall include, but shall not be limited to, fires, natural disasters, automobile crashes, or other similar circumstances.

B. **ESTABLISHMENT.** Any privately owned place of business operated for a profit to which the public is invited, including, but not limited to, places for amusement or entertainment. The operator of an establishment shall include the person(s) authorized with management responsibilities who is on the premises of the establishment at the time in which a minor is located on the premises, the person with over-all authority for managing the establishment, and the person(s) or entity who owns the establishment.

C. **GUARDIAN.** A person who has been judicially appointed as the legal guardian, or a person over the age of eighteen (18) who has been authorized by the legal guardian or parent to assume care, control and responsibility for the minor for a definitive period of time.

D. **MINOR.** Any person under the age of eighteen (18).

E. **PARENT.** A minor's biological, adoptive or step-parent.

F. **PUBLIC PLACE.** Any place to which the public or a substantial group of the public has access, including, but not limited to, streets, highways, thoroughfares, sidewalks, alleys, parking lots, parks, and the common areas of schools, hospitals, apartment complexes, office buildings, transportation facilities, entertainment facilities, and shops.

G. **REMAIN.** To stay or linger at or upon a place; or to fail to depart when requested to do so by a police officer or a person with authority to act in the interest of the establishment or public place at which the minor is located.

Section 9.16.050.02 REGULATIONS**9.16.050.02.1** Regulation of Minors

It shall be unlawful for any minor to remain in or upon any public place, to remain in any motor vehicle operating or parked in or upon a public place or establishment, or to remain in or upon the premises of any establishment, between the hours of 12:00 a.m. (midnight) and 5:00 a.m., unless their presence is explained by one of the enumerated exceptions.

9.16.050.02.2 Exceptions to the Regulation of Minors

- The minor is accompanied by a parent or guardian.
- An emergency situation exists.
- The minor is engaged in an employment activity, or is going to or returning home from such activity without detour or stop, except for purposes of obtaining fuel for transportation.
- The minor is on a sidewalk directly abutting the place in which they reside; or within 300 feet of their residence and the neighboring residents have not issued a complaint about the minor's presence.
- The minor is attending an activity sponsored by a school, religious, or civic organization, by a public organization or entity, or by another similar organization or entity, which activity is supervised by adults; or is going to or returning from such activity without detour or stop, except for purposes of obtaining fuel for transportation.
- The minor is on an errand and has in their possession written parental authorization for the errand to include the destination(s) of the errand, time allotted for the errand, and a contact telephone number to verify parental authorization.
- The minor is involved in interstate travel through or beginning or terminating in, the City of Shoshone.
- The minor is exercising First Amendment rights protected by the United States Constitution, such as the free exercise of religion, freedom of speech, and the right of assembly.

9.16.050.02.3 Parental Responsibility

It is the responsibility of the parent or legal guardian to ensure that a minor complies with this Chapter. It shall be unlawful for a parent or legal guardian to knowingly permit, allow, or encourage a violation of this Chapter.

9.16.050.02.4 Operator of an Establishment

It shall be unlawful for any operator of an establishment, as defined within this Chapter, to knowingly permit, allow or encourage a minor to remain at or upon the premises of the establishment in violation of this Chapter. It shall be a defense to this violation that the operator or an employee of the establishment promptly notified police that a minor was present at the establishment and refused to leave when requested.

9.16.050.02.5 Operator or Owner of a Motor Vehicle

It shall be unlawful for the owner or operator of a motor vehicle to knowingly permit, allow or encourage a violation of this Chapter.

9.16.050.02.6 Required Information

Every person suspected of a curfew violation shall provide their name and age to a police officer upon request. Any person who refuses to provide such information, or who knowingly gives false information regarding their name or age, or another person's name or age to any police officer conducting an investigation under this Chapter shall be in violation of this Chapter.

Section 9.16.050.03 ENFORCEMENT**9.16.050.03.1** Enforcement

Before taking any enforcement action under this Chapter, a police officer shall investigate whether the minor's presence in a public place, motor vehicle, or establishment falls within one of the enumerated exceptions to minor regulations. If the officer cannot reasonably determine the existence of one of the enumerated exceptions, and probable cause otherwise exists, the officer may take appropriate enforcement action.

9.16.050.03.2 Penalties

Any person found to be in violation of any of the provisions of this Chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine no greater than \$300.00 or imprisonment in the county jail for no more than six (6) months or by both such fine and imprisonment.

This ordinance shall become effective upon passage by the City Council of the City of Shoshone and published according to Idaho Code.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

At the top level of bridge, partnership agreement about signals and discards is as important as agreements on bidding.

Today's deal comes from a recent European championship match between Romania and Italy, the eventual winners.

At both tables, West led a low club against three no-trump. When the Italians were defending, the Romanian declarer won the club queen at trick one, cashed the diamond ace, and played a diamond toward dummy's jack. Claudio Nunes (West) discarded the heart six and Fulvio Fantoni wasted no time in switching to the spade nine, ensuring that the defenders took four tricks in that suit.

In my view, it should have been easier for the Romanians at the other table. Here Lorenzo Lauria, declarer for Italy, won the club queen, cashed the diamond ace and then crossed to dummy's heart jack to run the diamond jack.

This told everybody that declarer had four heart tricks, and West could surely tell that declarer had at least three diamond tricks (given his play) and two clubs. So, West should have discarded a club, suggesting to East that he try something else. As it was, West discarded a heart, and East continued clubs when on lead with the diamonds. As far as he was concerned, West could have held both black aces instead of his actual holding. If so, it would have been necessary to clear the clubs before putting West in with the spade ace to cash his club winners.

ANSWER: Although you have a decent club sequence, you must lead a heart if you want to have any chance to beat this game. You must either set up or cash hearts at once, and realistically, a small heart is your best bet to do that. If dummy has the heart king, declarer may duck, and if your partner has that card, you may be able to cash three hearts on the go.

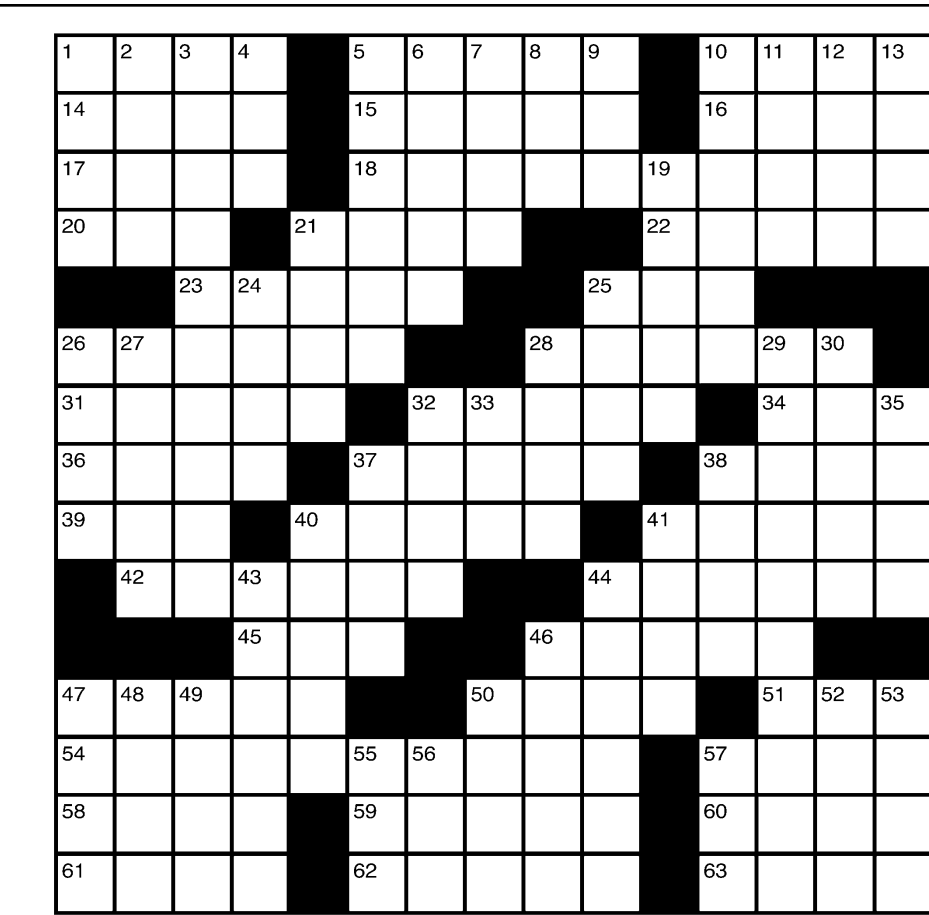

Today's Highlight:
On June 18, 1812, the War of 1812 began as the United States Congress approved, and President James Madison signed, a declaration of war against Britain.

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1778, American forces entered Philadelphia as the British withdrew during the Revolutionary War.

In 1815, Napoleon Bonaparte met his Waterloo as British and Prussian troops defeated the French in Belgium.

In 1873, suffragist Susan B. Anthony was found guilty by a judge in Canandaigua, N.Y., of breaking the law by casting a vote in the 1872 presidential election. (The judge fined Anthony \$100, but she never paid the penalty.)

In 1908, William Howard Taft was nominated for president by the Republican National Convention in Chicago.

In 1912, the Republican National Convention, which would nominate President William Howard Taft for another term of office, opened in Chicago.

In 1940, during World War II, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill urged his countrymen to conduct themselves in a manner that would prompt future generations to say, "This was their finest hour!" Charles de Gaulle delivered a speech on the BBC in which he rallied his countrymen after the fall of France to Nazi Germany.

In 1945, William Joyce, known as "Lord Haw-Haw," was charged in London with high treason for his English-language wartime broadcasts on German radio. (He was hanged in January 1946.)

In 1958, President Dwight D. Eisenhower expressed support for his chief of staff, Sherman Adams, who was accused of improperly accepting gifts from a businessman. (Adams resigned in September 1958.)

In 1972, 118 people were killed in the crash of a Brussels-bound British European Airways Hawker Siddeley Trident 1C shortly after take-off from London Heathrow Airport.

In 1979, President Jimmy Carter and Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev signed the SALT II strategic arms limitation treaty in Vienna.

In 1983, astronaut Sally K. Ride became America's first woman in space as she and four colleagues blasted off aboard the space shuttle Challenger.

In 1992, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Georgia v. McCollum, ruled that criminal defendants could not use race as a basis for excluding potential jurors from their trials. Entertainer Peter Allen died in San Diego County, Calif., at age 48.

Ten years ago: A Palestinian detonated a nail-studded bomb in a Jerusalem bus, killing 19 passengers and himself. President George W. Bush sent to Congress his detailed proposal for creation of a new Homeland Security Department. Minnesota Gov. Jesse Ventura announced he would not seek a second term.

Five years ago: Nine firefighters died in a fire at a furniture store and warehouse in Charleston, S.C. Yahoo Inc. Chairman Terry Semel ended his 6-year tenure as chief executive officer, handing over the reins to co-founder Jerry Yang. Vilma Espin Guillois, wife of acting President Raul Castro and a former rebel fighter, died in Havana, Cuba, at age 77.

One year ago: President Hamid Karzai acknowledged that the U.S. and Afghan governments had held talks with Taliban emissaries in a bid to end the nation's nearly 10-year war. British singer Amy Winehouse was heavily booed for being late and displaying erratic behavior on stage during a concert in Belgrade, Serbia. Yelena Bonner, 88, a Russian rights activist and widow of Nobel Peace Prize winner Andrei Sakharov, died in Boston. Clarence Clemons, the saxophone player for the E Street Band who was one of the key influences in Bruce Springsteen's life and music, died in Florida at age 69.

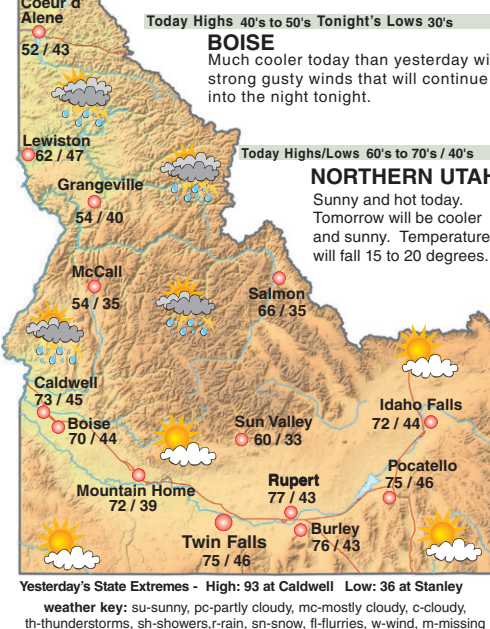

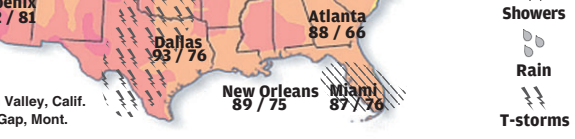
