GOP Digs into Party Platform

TWIN FALLS • Small phrases can have big impacts.

That was the recurring theme surrounding platform discussions on the first day of the Idaho Republican Party's state convention, which runs through Saturday in Twin Falls. The debates were a warm-up to today's

onslaught of meetings, where convention participants will consider adopting proposed platform changes and resolutions.



Thursday, the first day of the convention, offered a light

schedule, with campaign lessons and a Platform Committee meeting where participants broke into subcommittees to discuss proposed changes.

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Platform planks are party positions on major topics, but don't necessarily result in state policy changes.

The Idaho GOP's platform has received attention in recent years for changes including abolishing the 17th Amendment, which allows citizens to elect their United States senators, and support for a closed primary system.

Though the Thursday subcommittees took votes on changes, nothing will be finalized until Saturday, when all the convention delegates vote on the document.

Still, Thursday's discussion provided debate on hot topics, including eliminating support for "sound currency," which supports backing up all U.S. currency with gold or silver. After a long debate, the committee voted to keep the plank. Participants also voted *Please see* **CONVENTION, A4**

Jogger Hit by Car in Jerome

JEROME • An 18-year-old male jogger struck by a vehicle Wednesday is recovering in a Boise hospital, according to the Jerome County Sheriff's Office.

The man was jogging west on the frontage road off Interstate 84 exit 168, when he was hit by a vehicle traveling the same direction. The jogger was taken to Boise by air ambulance and is being treated for his injuries, according to the sheriff's office.

The driver of the vehicle reported the accident, according to the sheriff's office.

Jerome County Sheriff's Office Chief Deputy Jack Johnson said the incident is still under investigation. Deputies haven't been able to interview the victim to determine if they should press charges on the driver, Johnson said.

The names of the driver and jogger have not been released, and deputies were still working to notify the man's family of his injuries on Thursday, Johnson said.

The man didn't have identification on him and it took some time to identify him, Johnson said.

Many Hands to Build a Dam

Eighteen miles northeast of Rupert, the new Minidoka Dam spillway is taking shape.

RUPERT • Construction on the new gated spillway at Minidoka Dam appeared a choreographed marvel Thursday as crews finished a 12-hour placement of concrete, then built forms or set rebar for the next batch.

Building a concrete spillway is all about the concrete, and the new spillway and head works will require 26,000 cubic yards of it.

But whether concrete is placed on any given day is up to the contractor – and the weather.

"Our first concern was water

TWIN FALLS • Cars from across the state flooded the parking lot at the College of Southern Idaho Thursday with bumper stickers touting Mitt Romney, Ron Paul, Republican women and gun rights.

Lathen Sonnenberg traveled from Latah County for his first convention experience. Sonnenberg said he helped count votes in the May caucus and caught the politics bug.

"For the first time in my life, I felt like I had an active part in politics," he said.

In the past, Sonnenberg said he paid attention to politics and voted for both Republican and Democratic candidates in the past.

"You want to support the candidate with your ideals," he said.

Now, he's hoping participation in the convention will broaden his political knowledge. 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WENDELL • An Idaho State Police trooper was cited for inattentive driving after being involved in a crash in Wendell just after 6 p.m. Wednesday, Gooding County Sheriff Shaun Gough said Thursday morning.

Trooper Leslie Nye of Heyburn was driving a 2000 Dodge Charger patrol car, heading north on North Idaho Street near the intersection of West Main Street near the Maverik Country Store. That's when he rear-ended a Dodge pickup driven by Dave Fisher of Wendell, Gough said.

Fisher had stopped to make a left turn into the Maverik when he was rear-ended, Gough said. Fisher is a former Wendell police chief.

Gough said there was extensive damage to the patrol car, but no one was injured in the crash.

BUHL MAN CHARGED WITH AGGRAVATEDFire Crews Respond toDUI IN CRASH THAT INJURED FRIENDSmall Kimberly Fire

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BUHL • A game of chicken on the highway landed one man in the hospital and another in court.

Rodney James Paulson, 29, and Shaun Craig Cramer, 33, are childhood friends and began swerving into each other's lanes on U.S. Highway 30, northwest of Buhl, at about 5 p.m. on April 14, according to a report from Idaho State Police.

According to the report, Cramer said he was traveling

westbound and noticed a red Dodge traveling eastbound with Paulson driving. Cramer saw Paulson cross into his lane then return to the eastbound lane, the report stated. Then, according to the report, when he was about a quarter mile from Paulson, Cramer crossed into the eastbound lane and then returned to his lane. Paulson then crossed completely into Cramer's lane and when Cramer tried to avoid Paulson by changing lanes the two collided.

"Paulson crossed back into

the eastbound lane in front of Cramer's Ford causing Cramer to crash into the driver's side of Paulson's Dodge," a trooper wrote in the report.

According to the report, Cramer received a seven- to eight-inch-long, and oneinch-wide gash on his scalp that exposed his skull in some places. A passenger in the car had bruising on her lower back.

When troopers arrived on the scene, emergency responders told them they smelled alcohol on Paulson's breath, but his injuries prevented him from performing any field sobriety tests, according to the report. Paulson was given a blood test that was returned to the Idaho State Patrol on May 11 with a result of 0.155, nearly twice the legal limit for driving.

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CSI to Hire New Welding Instructors For Next Year

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TWIN FALLS • Two College of Southern Idaho welding instructors were placed on paid leave in April, and they won't return next year.

CSI spokesman Doug Maughan said last week that Juan Martinez's contract wasn't renewed and Kent Parish resigned May 31. They were put on leave due to a personnel issue.

Parish told the *Times*-*News* he was cleared at the conclusion of the investigation. The claim brought against him, he said, was unfounded and he didn't do anything wrong.

Parish said he's disappointed with the way administrators handled the investigation – and that played a large role in his resignation.

CSI's Executive Vice President Jeff Fox said he can't comment on the investigation because it's a personnel issue. Parish said CSI administrators asked him to come back next year, but he didn't agree with the terms. "Some of the stipulations were not to my liking," he said. Parish was informed

Police Report Shows Jones Lost Control of Vehicle

BOISE (AP) • Idaho State Police investigators say the single-vehicle crash involving State Controller Donna Jones was caused when she veered off the roadway then lost control as she tried to correct course.

The 73-year-old elected official suffered severe injuries in the May 25 accident and is still recovering in a Boise hospital rehabilitation unit.

Details of the crash and causes are contained in an Idaho State Police report obtained by The Associated Press Thursday.

Investigators confirm Jones was wearing a seatbelt

as she lost control, ultimately causing her Cadillac Escalade to roll once before stopping in the I-84 median near Heyburn.

The report details the ex-



dozens of people working around the clock, coordinating government entities, and farmers bent on getting water - not to mention ensuring all the materials and work meet exacting standards.

But one of the biggest hurdles to overcome may be the weather. It can halt work, ground cranes and wreak havoc with concrete, which must have its core and surface temperatures maintained within a 36degree range.

Too hot or too cold always mean extra work for the crews.

"That's why we started night placements of concrete because it was getting too hot in the afternoon," Lopez-Owsley said. "When it gets hot the concrete starts setting up quicker and is harder to work with." Too cold and it has to be heated.

Large Trucks, Long Nights

The project at the dam, which lies about 18 miles northeast of Rupert, includes demolishing the existing 2,237-foot-long pier and stop log structure and replacing it with a rollercompacted concrete gated spillway. The structure will include control gates for the Burley and Minidoka irrigation districts.

Construction began in November and could last until March 2015. Money for the \$21.3 million project comes from both irrigation districts, which passed bond issues, and from federal dollars.

Each section of the spillway will have 12 gates and requires nearly 2 million pounds of concrete. Three sections receive concrete every two weeks, with crews working continuously for 12-15 hours until each placement is complete. The work usually begins at midnight and ends at noon.

The concrete is delivered to the site by ready-mix trucks, with the sand and aggregate coming from a local quarry and the concrete from Oregon. Each truckload carries eight cubic yards and a new truck arrives every 20 minutes.

Workers spend the long days placing the concrete, vibrating it for consolidation and to make sure it reaches the form, then testing to make sure the concrete is within specifications.

Samples are also tested for another 56 days as the concrete hardens. Temperature sensors are placed at the core and surface of the concrete, and cylinder samples are periodically tested for hardness.

If the concrete doesn't meet standards, it could spell disaster.

"It could be complete demolition of structure, it could be that radical," Lopez-Owsley said.

'Always **Preparing'**

At the foundation of the spillway other crews, who

work four 10-hour shifts, meticulously clean the loose soil and basalt rock to prevent leakage under the spillway. They also install a rebar grid to secure the foundation, pull forms away from hardened concrete or build new forms.

The gated section of spillway is slated for completion by July. Then, the control gate operating hardware will be installed in the fall.

Once the irrigation season is over, two gates will be installed on the completed BID head works. The head gates will then be installed for MID.

"We are always preparing for the next concrete placement or working on the previous one pulling forms off," Lopez-Owsley said. "Sometimes there are little deficiencies that need to be patched but these guys are getting so good that it's minimal.

"Their workmanship is the best. They are an experienced crew and they are very proud of their work."

Not every discussion on Thursday was a fight over what the platforms should be. Sometimes, delegates struggled over wording, repetition and where in the platform the article could go.

And while there was rarely a consensus on contentious is-

Falls, Benewah, Gooding and Ada counties.

Resolutions give guidance to Idaho's elected officials, and the committee will hear 16 today. Among the proposals: Dissolving the Environmental Protection Agency and the Department of Education, eliminating the closed primary system and support for establishing new missions at Mountain Home Air Force Base.

Later this evening, convention attendees will gather at Canyon Crest Dining and Event Center to hear speeches from Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and Todd Cranney, deputy political firector of Mitt Romney's presidential campaign. Romney's son, Josh Romney, had originally been scheduled to speak, but canceled on Wednesday.

21 Idaho Districts Impose Teacher Contracts

BOISE • At least 21 Idaho school districts are unilaterally imposing contract terms on teachers after failing to reach agreement with local unions.

Local districts that imposed contracts include Kimberly and Cassia County. The Times-News was unable to confirm other districts' status Thursday.

The districts' ability to impose contracts without negotiating with unions comes under Idaho's new school reform laws, which rolled back most collective bargaining rights for teachers and limited contracts to one-year terms. It also limited contract negotiations to salary and benefits only and shifted budget money from salaries to merit bonuses.

State Schools Superintendent Tom Luna said it was good news that just 21 out of 130 school districts and charter schools weren't able to reach agreement by the deadline.

"They said there would be strikes, there would be walkouts, there would be lawsuits none of that has happened," Luna told The Spokesman-Review. "If you measure this against the doomsday scenario that they painted, I think this is very positive news?

Carrie Scozzaro, a high school art teacher and outgoing president of the Lakeland Education Association in Kootenai County, said teachers feel like they're no longer being listened to as professionals.

"There's that sort of hopelessness of not being part of the process and being accused of being part of the problem, which is frustrating," she said.

In the Lakeland School District, 96 percent of the union members rejected the district's last offer on salaries and benefits for the coming years. That offer, like the past four years, included no base salary increase but some small thaws in the multivear pay freeze.

Other districts that unilaterally imposed contract terms include Kellogg, Mullan and Wallace in northern Idaho and Middleton, Cascade, Idaho Falls, Nampa and Caldwell in southern Idaho.

In 2011 -the first year the new laws were in effect - a couple of Idaho school districts unilaterally imposed contract terms. That hadn't happened in the previous four decades that districts had met with local teachers associations for collective bargaining.

Luna said the laws give local school boards the authority to resolve labor and management disputes, which was in keeping with the concept of local control.

Penni Cyr, president of the Idaho Education Association, said members across the state are frustrated that the new talks are limited to salaries and benefits, preventing teachers from addressing issues like overcrowded classrooms and learning environments.

"That's devaluing them as professionals who know what children need to succeed," Cyr said.

Idaho voters will decide in November whether to keep the new law or repeal it through a referendum.

A Possible Chance to Protect Open Space in Twin Falls

Months ago, a woman stood up in the Twin Falls City Planning and Zoning Commission meeting and again in the Twin Falls City Council meeting asking each board to reconsider decisions to approve a large shopping center on the canyon rim. Though the council went as far as to order mediation among the developers and those who had concerns about the shopping plaza, there was little else that could be done.

The land was purchased decades ago and zoned for commercial development. Though economic hard times put brakes on the development for the past few years, there was really no stopping it. Plans were drawn and tentative agreements were made with retail giants to lease space in the new development.

Neighbors on the rim wrote up petitions, sent in letters to the editor and protested in interviews with every media outlet who could listen. But, as we said in an editorial at the time, it was too late. If the residents of Twin Falls wanted to preserve open space on the rim, they should have done so in the '70s when the land was on the real estate market. That's when decisions about the future are really made.

On June 19, the Twin Falls City Parks and Recreation Commission toured a beautiful stretch of property along Rock Creek.

The 21-acre former Day Dream Ranch property on Addison Avenue West was offered to the city of Twin Falls for \$675,000.

The commission toured the land with the purpose of deciding whether it could be purchased by the city and preserved as open space and park land for the future.

"Any time there is canyon rim property or canyon bottom property for sale, we look at it," said Dennis Bowyer, Twin Falls Parks and Recreation director.

After the tour, the Parks and Rec commission submitted a recommendation to the City Council, asking the city to consider purchasing the property for community park land. The issue has not been discussed by the full city staff or council yet and a decision has not been made about when it will appear on the council agenda. The soonest it would appear on the agenda is July, if it makes it that far.

The property, sitting on the south side of Addison next to the former hospital (now called County West), is ideally located to get the city closer to its goal of connecting with the county's Rock Creek Park, Bowyer said. "That's been our goal for decades."

The Parks and Rec department envisions extending its trail system into the park, and setting up a fishing

hat if we told you there's a way to make the U.S. tax system fairer, get corporations out of politics, improve our global competitiveness, bring home more than \$1 trillion in offshore earnings, increase wages, end the double taxation of company profits and improve returns for many shareholders?

You'd say we were dreaming. But all this could be achieved if Congress would agree to a simple deal: Lower marginal rates, tax long-term capital gains and dividends at the same rate as regular income, and eliminate the corporate-income tax. Under current law, longterm capital gains and dividends are taxed at a preferential top rate of 15 percent, as opposed to the top rate on labor income of 35 percent. This is quite favorable to the wealthy, who earn more of their income from investment. It leads to such famous distortions as Warren Buffett having a lower tax rate than his secretary. It also leads to herculean tax-avoidance efforts, as the rich hire armies of accountants to manipulate their incomes to get the preferential rate. And then there's the matter of inheritance: When the wealthy die, any gain in

their investments passes untaxed to their heirs.

Further, the current system often amounts to double taxation, since income earned by a business is subjected to the 35 percent corporate rate, then taxed again when it's paid out as a dividend.

Although taxing capital has long been anathema to many economists - on the theory that it discourages investment and thus economic growth - recent studies are casting doubt on their assumptions. The Congressional Research Service found in 2010 that reductions in the capital-gains tax are "unlikely to have much effect" on long-term growth and "would mostly benefit very high income taxpayers." Leonard E. Burman, a public administration professor at Syracuse University, has found that capital-gains rates "display no contemporaneous correlation with real GDP growth during the last 50 years." In a recent working paper published by the National Bureau of Economic Research, economists Thomas Piketty and Emmanuel Saez argue that the old consensus that taxing capital is always and everywhere a bad thing fails to fully account for the effects of inheritance and tax avoidance. In the real world, with inequality widening, they suspect the optimal tax

on capital isn't necessarily zero: It could even be higher than the optimal tax on labor.

On the other side of the bargain, the corporate-income tax has been subjected to so many distortions that it's no longer effective. As a share of gross domestic product, the amount it brings in has been declining since the 1950s. This is partly because loopholes and preferences keep proliferating, which means most companies now pay a much lower effective rate.

The tax prompts executives to take outsized pay, because their salaries are a deductible expense. It reduces wages, meaning that its burdens fall heavily on labor. It makes attracting investment in a world of mobile capital more difficult. And then there's the double-taxation problem - which encourages companies to pass along their tax expense to consumers and employees, and discourages dividend payments. Eliminating the corporate-income tax in exchange for a higher capitalgains rate would make the tax system fairer, simpler and more rational. It would eliminate inducements to tax avoidance and yield further benefits for investors such as pension funds and 401(k) accounts that already pay no capitalgains taxes and would see

better dividends.

Ending the tax breaks for specific industries would also help get the government out of the dread practice of "picking winners and losers" and providing corporate welfare.

Much of the vast corporate lobbying apparatus would be rendered moot, and companies could finally repatriate the more than \$1 trillion in overseas earnings they're holding to avoid taxation.


Most crucial, there's a revenue mismatch: Total savings to taxpayers of preferential treatment for capital gains and dividends in 2011 was about \$158 billion, according to the Joint Committee on Taxation. How much of that would go to the Treasury under this reform would depend on investor behavior, but it probably wouldn't make up for what the corporate-income tax brings in. That's why this deal must be a first step toward a more aggressive overhaul. As we've argued before, tax reform should simplify the code, lower marginal rates and prudently phase out all or most tax expenditures. Taxes on capital should be treated as a unified system rates should be low and simple, and fair in the way they are applied to similar kinds of economic activity. Perhaps that's a lesson we need to relearn every 25 years or so.

Including Auger Falls, the Twin Falls Parks and Recreation Department now oversees 1,300 acres of land, according to its website.

Day Dream Ranch is a truly unique property sitting inside the city limits.

Bowyer was right when he said, "If we don't buy it, we may never have a chance again."

There are few cities in the United States that have this kind of property within their city limits — Rock Creek in our backyard and the Snake River Canyon in our front yard. It would be a shame to see 21-acres of creek-side open space go to development when it could have become a natural community asset.

Yes, the asking price of \$675,000 is a lot of money and there is no money set aside for purchase of park land.

But when we ask ourselves if we can afford it, we must also ask if we can afford not to buy it?

NAMPA • Ricardo Ozuna Jr., 35, of Nampa will spend 20 years to life in prison for lewd conduct with a 15-year-old girl, 3rd District Judge Bradley Ford ruled Thursday.

Ozuna, a registered sex offender, also must pay a \$5,000 fine, and the sentence will run consecutive to

a 2002 lewd conduct sentence out of Ada County, Canyon County Prosecutor Bryan Taylor said. Ozuna was on parole when he met the Canyon girl online on May 28, 2010, according to court records.

Ozuna picked the victim and her underage friend up, took them to his house and gave them alcohol, Taylor said.

According to court records, the victim got drunk and passed out, then awoke to find Ozuna having sex with her.

Ozuna has continuously denied committing the crime. "This is not me or who I am," he said at sentencing. "I am just a sacrificial lamb."

But Judge Ford disagreed, calling Ozuna a predator who exploited a young girl who was impaired by alcohol. Taylor said this crime was

"eerily similar" to Ozuna's Ada County case, which also involved a young girl he met online and provided with alcohol.

"The defendant violated parole three times and is a tremendous danger to the community," Taylor said.

Two Sentenced for Bank Fraud, Identity Theft

BOISE (AP) • A federal judge has sentenced two people convicted for running a bank fraud and identity theft scheme in northern Idaho.

The sentences were handed down this week 27-year-old against Michelle Mason of Sandpoint and 32-year-old Charles Baker, of Tucson, Ariz.

Mason was ordered to serve 48 months in federal prison for conspiracy to commit bank fraud and one count of identity

theft. Baker was sentenced to eight months in prison.

They pleaded guilty earlier this year to stealing mail near Old Town, then directing others to open bank accounts to obtain cash from a variety of banks. Their scheme involved forging checks stolen in the mail then withdrawing money from cash machines.

The judge also ordered Mason to repay more than \$37,700, and that Baker should pay \$22,600 in restitution.

Court Throws out FCC Penalties for Cursing, Nudity

WASHINGTON • Broadcasters anticipating a major constitutional ruling on the government's authority to regulate what can be shown and said on the air-waves instead won only the smallest of Supreme Court victories Thursday.

The justices unanimously threw out fines and other penalties against Fox and ABC television stations that violated the Federal Communications Commission policy regulating curse words and nudity on television airwaves.

Forgoing a broader constitutional ruling, however, the court concluded only that broadcasters could not have known in advance that obscenities uttered during awards show programs on Fox stations and a brief display of nudity on an episode of ABC's "NYPD Blue" could give rise to penalties. ABC and 45 affiliates had been hit with proposed fines totaling nearly \$1.24 million.

Broadcasters had argued that the revolution in technology that has brought the Internet, satellite television and cable has made the rules themselves obsolete. The regulations apply only to broadcast channels.

The justices said the FCC is free to revise its indecency policy, which is intended to keep the airwaves free of objectionable material during the hours when children are likely to be watching.

Sandusky's son says his father abused him

BELLEFONTE, Pa. • Lawyers for one of Jerry Sandusky's adopted sons said the man has told authorities the former Penn State assistant football coach abused him.

The lawyers issued a statement Thursday naming Matt Sandusky, one of Jerry Sandusky's six adopted children, and saying that the 33-year-old had been prepared to testify on behalf of prosecutors at his father's sex abuse trial.

"During the trial, Matt Sandusky contacted us and requested our advice and "This has been an extremely painful experience for Matt and he has asked us to convey his request that the media respect his privacy. There will be no further comment."

The statement was issued after jurors in the excoach's child sex abuse trial began deliberating 48 charges against him. The jurors are sequestered during deliberations.

Lawyers for Matt and Jerry Sandusky and prosecutors did not immediately respond to requests for comment.

Matt Sandusky went to live with Sandusky and his wife, Dottie, as a foster child and was adopted by

SWEDEN ON ALERT, EXPLOSIVES FOUND NEAR NUKE PLANT

STOCKHOLM • Sweden ramped up security at its three nuclear power plants Thursday after a small amount of explosives without a triggering device was found on a forklift on the grounds of the country's largest atomic power station, authorities said. Police were investigating possible sabotage, but insisted that even if there had been a blast it would not have posed any great danger.

Bomb-sniffing dogs detected the explosives in a routine check Wednesday afternoon by security staff in the power plant's industrial area near its high-security enclosure. Police declined to describe the amount or type of explosive.

Bomb technicians said the material lacked a detonating device, meaning there was no danger of an imminent explosion.



"But even if it would have been equipped with a detonator, a potential blast would have had pretty limited effects — the truck would have received some damage and perhaps some passers-by would have been injured, but it wouldn't have harmed the plant in any way," police spokesman Tommy Nyman said.

With police providing little information, a terror expert speculated it might have been an attempt to test the security system of the Ringhals power plant with a later attack in mind. The evidence was released

Ira Lowe, 88, Dies; Lawyer Was Champion of Artists, Poets, Activists

Ira Lowe, an iconoclastic lawyer who represented eminent painters and sculptors, the foremost Beatnik poet and a Watergate felon, and whose estate work helped set an influential legal precedent for artists, died June 11 at his home in Washington. He was 88.

He died of kidney disease, said Rebecca Lockwood, a lawyer who worked with Lowe for the past eight years.

A specialist in art litigation, Lowe operated his law practice from his Georgetown residence since 1949 and immersed himself in the city's cultural milieu.

At embassy soirees and cocktail parties, he cut an unusual figure. He fashioned himself a bon vivant, but

death in 1965, the Internal Revenue Service challenged the estate's \$714,000 valuation of 425 unsold Smith works. The tax agency assessed a fair market value of \$5.4 million, which would have slapped an exorbitant charge on the estate.

Along with art critic Clement Greenberg and artist Robert Motherwell, Lowe was an executor of the Smith estate. He argued for what is known as a blockage discount, noting that the hypothetical sale of all the works at one time would flood the market and thereby drastically reduce their retail value.

In 1972, the U.S. Tax Court made what it labeled a "Solomon-like pronouncement" and placed a \$2.7 valuation on the Smith works. The court did not elaborate on its decision, which set an important precedent affect ing later cases by the estates of Georgia O'Keeffe and other artists. Ira Melvin Lowe was born in Boston on March 5, 1924. His father, Isadore – born in Russia and educated at Harvard Law School - moved the family to Washington in 1934 and spent his legal career at the Agriculture Department. The younger Lowe was a 1941 graduate of Woodrow Wilson High School. After Navy service in the South Pacific during World War II, he graduated from George Washington University law school in 1949.

The group traveled around to golf tournaments all over southern Idaho. Harry and Jo enjoyed playing bridge and met monthly either in Twin Falls or Boise for playing golf. Jo and Harry were inseparable after they retired. She had some difficult times after she lost Harry in 1993 after 52 years of marriage, but she traveled with friends and was able to play golf and cards for several years.

Jo is survived by her son, Rob and his wife, Lynn from Emmett; her two grandsons, Scott and Casey (wife Deborah); and her greatgranddaughters, Zoe and Althea. Casey and Deborah lived with Jo and helped to take care of her for the last two years, which was greatly appreciated.

with his full black beard he resembled the hirsute counterculture figures of the 1960s and '70s who had once been among his clientele, including the poet Allen Ginsberg.

Lowe owned a Jaguar, but he rode his Harley-Davidson motorcycle to court. Using Freedom of Information Act requests, he helped Ginsberg, Jane Fonda, Joan Baez, Tom Hayden and other activists obtain their FBI, CIA and State Department records. In 1967, he persuaded prosecutors to drop a charge of marijuana possession against the son of author John Steinbeck.

Lowe's work for those clients was linked closely to his own left-wing sympathies and organizing activities, which included years spent agitating for prison reform and on behalf of political prisoners abroad.

He developed friendships with prominent artists and arts patrons, including the financier and museum benefactor Joseph Hirshhorn and his widow, Olga. From unestablished artists too poor to pay for his services, Lowe accepted paintings, sculptures and sketches as compensation and displayed the works in his office.

Over the years, Lowe represented the painters Tom Downing and Kenneth Noland and sculptors David Smith, Louise Bourgeois, Hilda Thorpe and Ella Tulin, the last of whom was once his companion. Lowe's work for Smith proved important in the field of art law. Four years after Smith's

An early marriage, to Ora Becker, ended in divorce. Survivors include a sister, Tena Rips of Silver Spring, Md.

In 1959, Lowe served as an American Bar Association representative in Havana at the invitation of the new Fidel Castro government. He and others witnessed the trials of former supporters of dictator Fulgencio Batista. Many of the accused were subsequently executed.

Lowe was among a group of prominent lawyers who traveled to Chile in 1974 as international observers of the trials of more than 60 Chilean air force officers accused of treason by the new Pinochet regime. The other lawyers included Attorney General Ramsey Clark and Martin Garbus, a human rights activist and First Amendment specialist.



Treasurys Rise on Worries of Economic Slowdown

NEW YORK (AP) • Treasurys are regaining their appeal to investors after economic reports from the U.S. and China signaled a global economic slowdown.

A report said manufacturing fell in China this month, and the Federal Reserve's Philadelphia branch reported a sharp contraction in manufacturing in the Northeast.

The reports sent prices of oil and stocks sharply lower. Traders rushed to safe investments such as U.S. government bonds. The Dow Jones industrial average fell 251 points, while crude oil fell 3.5 percent.

The price of the benchmark 10-year Treasury note on Thursday rose 40.6 cents for every \$100 invested. The yield, which moves in the opposite direction, fell to 1.62 percent from 1.63 percent late Wednesday.

Insurance Rebates to Idaho Total \$1.1M

TWIN FALLS • Close to 32,600 Idahoans will receive health insurance rebates because insurers didn't spend enough on medical care, the Obama administration announced Thursday.

Under a provision in the Affordable Care Act, insurance companies are required to spend 80 percent of premium dollars on medical expenses and quality improvement. The remaining 20 percent can be spent on administrative costs like salaries or advertising.

If insurers fail to meet the required 80 percent, they must rebate their customers for the difference. A little more than \$1.1 million will be distributed to 16,000 Idaho families covered by a policy. The state's average rebate amount is \$70.

Consumers will receive a notice from the insurance company explaining the 80/20 rule and whether their company met the new standard. If they didn't, insurers must disclose how much of the difference they did or didn't spend on medical care.

Nationally, the federal law will provide Americans with more than \$1 billion in rebates, according to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

Insurance companies must provide the rebates by Aug. 1 unless the U.S. Supreme Court strikes down the health care reform law.

Senate Passes Farm Bil

WASHINGTON • The Senate on Thursday completed a five-year, halftrillion-dollar farm bill that cuts farm subsidies and land conservation spending by about \$2 billion a year but largely protects sugar growers and some 46 million food stamp beneficiaries.

The 64-35 vote for passage defied political odds. Many inside and outside of Congress had predicted that legislation so expensive and so complicated would have little chance of advancing in an election year.

Senate Republican leader Mitch Mc-Connell called it "one of the finest moments in the Senate in recent times in terms of how you pass a bill?"

The bipartisanship seen in the Senate may be less evident in the House, where conservatives are certain to resist the How Idaho Senators Voted

bill's costs, particularly for food stamps. Food stamp spending has doubled in the past five years, and beneficiaries have grown from by about 20 million to 46 million. The program's budget is now about \$80 billion a year, comprising 80 percent of the spending in the farm bill.

While overall spending on programs covered by the bill has climbed because more people are receiving food stamps, the committee head, Sen. Debbie Stabenow, D-Mich., and the top Republican, Sen. Pat Roberts of Kansas, said the bill would save \$23 billion over the next 10 years compared with spending under the current farm bill.

That comes from replacing four farm commodity subsidy programs with one, consolidating 23 conservation programs into 13, and ending several sources of abuse in food stamps.

The biggest change comes from eliminating direct payments to farmers whether they plant crops or not. The program, which costs about \$5 billion a year, has lost much of its support at a time of \$1 trillion federal deficits and when farmers in general are prospering.

More Americans than Forecast File for Jobless Benefits

WASHINGTON • More Americans than forecast filed applications for unemployment benefits last week, indicating the labor market continues to struggle.

The level of dismissals may raise concern the slowdown in payrolls reported in the past few months will be prolonged, limiting consumer spending. Federal Reserve policy makers Wednesday expanded a program to replace short-term bonds with longer-term debt in a bid to spur growth and trim a jobless rate that's exceeded 8 percent for 40 consecutive months.

"Momentum is slowing," said Ryan Wang, an economist at HSBC Securities USA in New York, the only economist in the Bloomberg survey to correctly forecast the level of claims. "Companies have curtailed demand for labor. This means less income growth. That's a restraint on consumer spending."

Estimates in the Bloomberg survey ranged from 371,000 to 390,000. The Labor Department revised the previous week's figure up to 389,000 from an initially reported 386,000.

Poll Finds Public Wants Health-Law Revisions Rather than Repeal

WASHINGTON • Republicans have pledged to "repeal and replace" President Barack Obama's health-care overhaul. If the Supreme Court strikes down the law, they may struggle to deliver on the second part of their vow.

A plurality of Americans, 43 percent, say they want to retain the 2010 law with only small modifications, while 15 percent say the measure should be left alone, a Bloomberg National Poll shows. One-third say it should be repealed.

The court will rule in the next week on the constitutionality of the law, the centerpiece of which is the mandate that most Americans buy insurance or pay a fine.

A rejection of all or part of the Affordable Care Act would be a setback for Obama, undercutting his biggest legislative victory. It would also present a challenge to Republicans. With elections approaching, House Republicans are signaling they have no immediate replacement to offer.

"If you're out to get more votes in six months, coming forward with a detailed program is not the optimal strategy," said Henry Aaron, health-policy scholar at the Brookings Institution in Washington. Republicans have little to gain in pro-

posing a comprehensive plan since it may draw criticism from healthcare providers or consumers, he said.

House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, said on Tuesday that the House would take a "step-by-step approach" to revamping health care.

A number of the law's features are popular. Laetitia Adam, a 33year-old independent voter from Miami, said she supports the in-

surance mandate as well as the provision allowing children up to age 26 to stay on their parents' health plans.

"For the most part, I agree with the law as it is," Adam, a respondent to the June 15-18 poll, said in a follow-up interview. "You can't afford to get sick without insurance," said the graphic artist. The law just "needs to be made more simple."

Hailey Artist Revives Old Techniques for Stunning Surfaces

HAILEY • Katharine Sheldon deftly lays a sliver of gold leaf onto her painting of a woman's head, forming a halo. She lays another atop a robe made by mixing egg yolk with natural pigments.

Sheldon is finding that she digs this ancient art form centuries after fresco was the art du jour.

"What I like about it is that it's very organic," she said. "It's earth. It's green. I'm not exposing myself to chemicals like oil paints that are going to make me sick. And I like the look of pigments imprinted into plaster. That's what made fresco so interesting in the Renaissance?

Sheldon, who lives in Hailey, incorporated fresco into her repertoire this spring when the College of Southern Idaho-affiliated Sawtooth Institute needed someone to demonstrate the egg tempera and fresco techniques used during the 13th and 14th centuries for an "Art of Siena" symposium.

Sheldon was only too happy to include it in her quiver of tools for her Creative Paint Finishes business, which couples Old World techniques with modern materials and technology.

The artist creates custom surface treatments for walls and ceilings. She does trompe l'oeil, an art technique by which she fools the eye into thinking a painting is an actual flower vase in an alcove or a window opening onto a French garden.

She's done murals turning children's walls into aquariums and imprinted leaves

into the surfaces of walk-in closets. She's made wooden bookshelves look like marble, painted what resembles fabrics on walls, and painted mosaics and floor canvases on cement floors.

She's endowed countertops with crackled, aged finishes and applied decoupage to walls. And she's treated ceilings so that it seems as if you're looking into the sky.

Sheldon typically charges \$60 an hour for faux art. Her starting price for jobs measured by the square foot is \$2.50 per square foot.

Dixie Grant, who has a condo in Ketchum and a home in the Wood River Valley, said there are not enough adjectives to describe Sheldon's work. "She transformed my house and condo with wall finishes, and amazing finishes. She's always learning new techniques - she put a combination of shredded cotton and silk mixed with gold mica and specks of silver on my 12-foot ceiling. Not only does it twinkle at night, but

it dampens the noise you get when you get a crowd in the house.

"She also made my soapstone countertops, which I couldn't stand, look like granite. I love to take people in and pull back the shower curtain to show them old contrasted with the new. Everybody is like 'Wow!'"

Sheldon began her exercise in creativity one winter when she bought a book on faux finishes and decided to try her hand at each.

"Now I go wherever my

mind can take me," said Sheldon, who studied art at Bethel College and the University of Minnesota. "This has been an amazing journey that has taken me from being a house painter to a creator able to use my art background. I love the fact that creative options seem endless. Every time I turn around I get led down a different road."

A construction worker who saw a wooden bookshelf she had painted to resemble marble told several interior designers about it, and soon they were calling Sheldon for stenciling and glazing.

"My clients say, 'See this picture out of this magazine? We want our wall to look like that? I've even put a ski map of Bald Mountain on an 8by-8-foot magnetic wall so the client could put magnets on the ski runs he'd skied," she said.

Another client wanted the look of wooden beams but didn't want to spend the money to take the roof off. Sheldon painted wood grains on his concrete beams at less than 1 percent of what the real deal would have cost.

Most recently she restored tabletops for GLOW Live Food Cafe in Ketchum, covering the original scratches and leaving them looking like high-end tables with textured stone. She also painted a mural on the wall touting the cafe's penchant for using raw foods.

"She's an amazing artist. I like her sense of colors and the organic quality to her work," owner Molly Peppo Brown said. "She suggested refurbishing the tables when I remarked how they were looking so battered, and it saved me a lot of money because the tables I'd been considering are super expensive."

Sheldon said her work has taught her respect for ancient craftsmen.


"You look at the old trompe l'oeils that have weathered the years. There's a depth to them that can't be compared," she said. "They have an amazing attention to detail. The amount of time the artists put into them blows me away."





But unless you're a boat race junkie,

chances are you don't know the difference between a K-Boat and a Crackerbox. Relax, we're here to help.

While you kick back, work on that suntan and enjoy the races, here's a rundown of the 12 classes you'll be watching.

K Racing Runabouts (K-Boats) – The granddaddy of them all, these boats run supercharged engines where anything goes. They have 1,200 horsepower and hit 140 mph in the straightaways.

Super Stocks – Probably the

best racing you'll see all weekend because this class has so much parity. It's a driver's class, since the boats are well-matched (100+ mph). Powered by 427 cubic inch big block Chevrolet engines.

Pro Stocks – Similar to Super Stocks, and the same hull may be used for both classes. Reaching speeds up to 120 mph, Pros use non-supercharged, 500 cubic inch engines. Fun to watch.

Crackerboxes – Wild and wacky, Crackerboxes are always a crowd favorite. One of the oldest

runabout classes, Crackerboxes feature two-person teams of a driver and a passenger sitting sideby-side, and the engine sits in front of the crew. It's a shorter boat that skips and jumps across the water.


Grand Nationals – It's not a sprint, it's a marathon with these V-drive boats. Powered by U.S. – made automotive or light truck Chevrolet or Chrysler engines, Grand Nationals is an endurance race, leaving the crowd in suspense to see who can hold on for 20 laps. **Comp Jets** – Similar to Grand Nationals in hull design, but instead of a V-drive propeller, Comp Jets use a jet drive. Idaho Regatta reps expect 16 boats in this class this weekend.

Sportsman Entry – New to the Idaho Regatta this year, this entrylevel runabout class uses small block engines. Max speeds of 85 mph. Witness history as this weekend's Regatta hosts this class's first-ever national championship.

MIAMI • LeBron James looked at the crowd, knowing he had just a few moments left on the court for the season.

He waved his arms to them. They roared back. Moments later, he was atop the stage at center court, wearing a champions' hat and T-shirt, and waving a champions' towel. He smiled. He danced.

For the first time in nine years, he enjoyed the ultimate relief. Maligned for so long, by so many, it brought him to this moment. On Thursday night with a triple-double, no less, 26 points, 13 assists and 11 rebounds - LeBron James got his NBA title.


"You can't win," Heat coach Erik Spoelstra said, speaking about James, "unless you win."

That's no longer an issue. The man who was called heartless, callous, narcissistic, cowardly and selfish and that was just in one scorned, angry letter from Dan Gilbert, the man who used to pay him to play for the Cleveland Cavaliers - will forever be called something else.

He's a champion.

"When he gets involved in something, business, basketball, he puts everything he has into it," longtime associate Maverick Carter said. "And this year, during the playoffs, he took it up another notch. He dedicated himself even more. I don't think he's any more dedicated than he was last year, but he found ways this year to channel it better, to limit his distractions and it raised his focus."

It raised the city of Miami, and raised the Heat back to

the mountaintop as well. And next fall, James will be there when they raise a second championship banner.

one of the world's most polarizing and best-paid athletes, with his annual income recently estimated by Forbes to be \$53 million.

But apparently, when it comes to James, enormous money and fame is not enough to satisfy everyone. A guy who is already a lock for the Hall of Fame - and might only be halfway or so through his career - needed a championship as validation.

Fairly or unfairly, that was the deal. And that title is now his.

Durant added 11 rebounds for the Thunder, who made a remarkably early trip to the NBA Finals just three years after starting 3-29. With Durant, Russell Westbrook, Serge Ibaka and James Harden all 23 or younger, the Thunder have the pieces in place for a lengthy stay atop the Western Conference.

The 5 Litre Hydros reach 115 mph using a V-8 engine. The 2.5 Litre Hydroplanes are much the same, only smaller, racing about 100 mph using 4-cylinder 145horsepower Ford engines like you would find in a Pinto. Typically a stepping stone class to bigger and more high-powered boats, 2.5 and 1 Litre Hydroplanes offer exciting side-by-side racing as driving skill is the key to victory. They're small, light and lighting quick.

GPS 95 – This is the "speed limit" class. Racers use any engine combination they choose. The catch is, every boat is equipped with a GPS unit and anyone caught running over 95 mph is penalized. Makes for great racing because everyone is going the same speed.

Nostalgia Jet – A class of amateur flatbottom boats, it's open to new upand-coming racers to try out the racing experience.

Ronaldo, Portugal Top Czechs in Quarters

WARSAW, Poland • Cristiano Ronaldo scored on a powerful header in the 79th minute, sending Portugal to the European Championship semifinals with a 1-0 victory over the Czech Republic on Thursday.

Ronaldo hit the post twice, then finally delivered. He headed a cross by Joao Moutinho straight at the ground and up past the flailing hands of Czech goalkeeper Petr Cech.

This was Ronaldo's third

goal in two games and it rewarded the Portuguese for the relentless pressure they applied all match.

"We had a lot of chances," said Ronaldo. "We had a great unity on the pitch and that is why we have reached our goal."

Portugal will play Spain or France in the semifinals in Donetsk, Ukraine, on Wednesday. It is one victory from its second European Championship final in eight years.

Ronaldo already provided some leadership and two goals to get past the Nether-

lands in group play, and his encore Thursday was huge.

His goal finally punished the tactics of the Czechs, who had parked most of their players in front of Cech for much of the game.

"The Czechs didn't have a single chance," Ronaldo said.

The strategy worked for a while. In first-half injury time, Ronaldo deadened a cross from Raul Meireles on his chest, turned and with two touches set up a rightfoot shot that had Cech beaten before it crashed against the near post.

In the 49th, Ronaldo again clipped the post on a free kick from 25 yards out.

By then, Ronaldo had hit the post four times in two games. When he finally scored and was mobbed by teammates, he went over to the TV camera with a beaming smile and offered a victory kiss.

"We have suffered," Portugal forward Nani said. "But we always wanted to win and that's what we showed. We were superior, then we scored and we really deserved this result."

I Was The Girl on The Real-life 'Bad News Bears'

The note atop the stack of blank baseball league applications was clear - "Boys Only."

I wasn't happy about that. It just didn't seem fair. Mrs. Johnson, my elementary school's secretary, must have agreed.

When I asked for one of the applications, she looked to see if anyone was around and quietly slipped one to me - a tiny act of rebellion that would change my summer and, in some ways, the person I would become.

I took the paper home and, with my parents' blessing, completed and returned it.

This was back in 1976, just four years after the passage of Title IX, the federal amendment that opened up sports opportunities to girls and women.

At the time, though, I had absolutely no clue what that was, or how it might helpme.

I was 11. I just wanted to play baseball. And because, at the time, the sports association in my small, northern Michigan hometown had no offerings for girls my age, they let me.

Three years earlier, a girl in Ypsilanti, Mich., had broken the barrier in Little League. And now it was my turn.

There was only one problem: While I had little doubt I should be allowed to play, I really didn't know how to. My only experience was a few pickup games with my brother and his friends in the field next to our house. They used a bat and tennis ball and usually hit it so far nobody really fielded the ball anyway. I was usually just their stand-in runner. So panic quickly set in when I realized that I'd potentially signed myself up for weeks of teasing and humiliation. My dad and brother didn't let that happen. Before the season started, they spent evenings and weekends in the backyard, teaching me how to throw. field and bat. If I had anything to say about it, no one was going to accuse me of "throwing like a girl" - something you heard all the time on playgrounds back then. When I showed up for my first practice, my stomach was jittery. A few of my teammates' eyes widened. There was a bit of grumbling, but it didn't last long. The tone was set by my coach, an easygoing sort named Bruce Baker who often wore a floppy fishing hat instead of a baseball cap. I was always trying to prove that I belonged. He was always reminding me to relax and have fun. And good thing, because we were northern Michigan's version of the "Bad News Bears," the team in the movie that had just come out that spring.

pressure in the game and asked to go back to my second base post.

People in the stands laughed. It was proof, they said, that I shouldn't be on the field.

Later, when a hard grounder took an awkward bounce and hit me in the shoulder, they laughed some more.

Mostly, it was parents, not kids.

It got so that when it was my turn to bat, my dad or my brother would stand guard behind the fence next to the on-deck circle to fend them off and keep my mind in the game.

"Go get 'em, slugger," my brother would calmly say.

I smiled. I liked being called slugger, though I was no Tatum O'Neal out there. I was a shy, string bean of a kid with long braids - not very tough at all, and more likely to be out on the field praying I wouldn't make a mistake.

Even so, I was determined to stick it out, though I also was secretly thankful when a second girl joined the league, taking some of the heat off me.

Another thing made it easier. The boys on my team decided I was OK. Maybe, just maybe, they even liked having me around.

Little by little, as the weeks passed, they shouted their own words of encouragement. They had my back and I had theirs - and for the first time, I realized what it was like to be part of a team. We might've been in last place - but we gave it our all. And when that first win finally did come, we ran together to the concession stand to claim our paper cups full of celebratory soda pop and enjoy a brief, sweet moment of triumph. For me, it wasn't so much the win that mattered. I was just one of them. I finally, truly belonged - and I was having fun, just as coach had wanted. The next year, girls softball for my age group was added to the summertime sports roster. Many considered it a victory though, honestly, I didn't really see it that way at the time. I liked baseball. I missed my team. Looking back now, though, I think about how getting the chance to play changed me, as I'm sure it did many girls after Title IX came along. The law forced people to rethink their attitudes. It was lucky timing for me - and with the supportof my family, Mrs. Johnson, Coach Baker and my teammates – gave me the chance to test what my parents always preached. They'd told me to stand up for what you believed. And that summer, they let me do it. There is a confidence that comes from that, an inner strength. It made me a better ballplayer, too.




practice "great" and told his fans he'd see them in Mankato, where the Vikings report to training camp July 26.
