TWIN FALLS • Fifth District Magistrate Judge Nicole Cannon resigned Friday afternoon, 15 months after she succeeded retiring Judge

Howard Smyser in Twin County during my brief time Falls County and two months after she was cited for driving under the influence in Boise.

Cannon's resignation was announced in a statement released by 5th District Trial Court Administrator Linda Wright. The resignation was effective immediately.

"I have the utmost respect for my colleagues and the people who helped me serve the citizens of Twin Falls as a magistrate," Cannon, 42, said in the statement.

Cannon's resignation announcement made no reference to her DUI citation, which she has pleaded not guilty to in Ada County 4th District Court. More details about her resignation were not available Friday.

Complaint Dismissed against T.F. Republicans

TWIN FALLS • While Twin Falls Republicans prepared to welcome party members from across the state, they had one big concern: That they would be sent home.

Those worries were alleviated on Friday morning when the Republican State Convention Credentials Com-

mittee threw out a complaint and a request to dismiss all Twin Falls County delegates.

Twin Falls County. In the complaint, Martin claimed that the Twin Falls County Republican Central Committee didn't properly notify all committeemen of a post-primary reorganization meeting, and that a slate of delegates had been approved before the official meeting.

Steve Millington, president of the Twin Falls central committee, rejected all the claims, saying that the committee notified participants with announcements, emails and followup phone calls. Notice of the meeting was also posted on the Idaho GOP website. Millington also produced an email proving that one of the complainants not only received notification, but replied to say he wouldn't be able to attend.

Some in the committee questioned the approval of the slate of delegates, but the Twin Falls central committee allows members to vote on a group and object to individuals within that slate.

Car Crashes into T.F. Apartment, Residents Evacuated

TWIN FALLS • Residents of a Twin Falls four-plex were evacuated Friday after a car crashed into a lower apartment in the building.

Twin Falls police and fire department responded to a call at about 10:45 a.m. from the Russell Square apartments at 2140 Elizabeth

Police say a 47-year-old woman was driving a red Mitsubishi when she crashed into the corner of an apartment in Building 4. The woman was wearing a seat belt. She was not apparently injured in the crash, but was transported to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center after telling paramedics she had chest pains.

The woman may have acci-

dentally hit the gas instead of the brakes, said Lt. Craig Stotts of the Twin Falls Police. The woman was visiting

the people who live at the apartment.

A woman holding a 1-year-old child was standing in the doorway of the home when the crash happened but she was unharmed, Stotts said.

Analysts said the downgrades from Moody's Investor Service late Thursday had been expected for months and removed uncertainty that had been weighing on banks.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 67.21 points, or 0.5 percent, to close at 12,640.78.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 9.51 points, or 0.7 percent, to 1,335.02

The Nasdaq composite climbed 33.33 points, or 1.2 percent, to 2,892.42.

Burley Resident's Family Home Receives the Gift of a Facelift

BURLEY • A home in the 1600 block of Schodde Avenue in Burley has taken on a new coat of sunny vellow paint this week as volunteers from Zions Bank stepped up to help out a neighbor.

"I couldn't have begun to take on the cost of this," said Sandra Pyne, 64, of Burley. Pyne is the beneficiary of Zions Bank's 22nd annual Paint-A-Thon. "I'm so excited I can hardly believe it?"

Pyne said a representative from Zions Bank told her she was anonymously nominated and her home was chosen for the project.

Gooding resident George Black, 66, was also chosen to have his home repainted.

"I live on a great block and this will help out the neighborhood as well," Pyne said.

Zions Bank loan officer Seth Christensen, who is captain of the bank's Burley team of volunteers, said this was his first year participating in the project.

Christensen said about 12 volunteers spent the week scraping the old paint from the house and garage and painting.

"She keeps a nice neat place and the yard looks really nice," said Christensen. "She just doesn't have the ability to get up on a ladder and do this. But, she obviously has pride in her house."

More than 3,500 volunteers are painting 50 homes in Idaho and Utah during the service project. The company has painted 837 homes over the past 20

Pyne, who is disabled, lives in the home built by her parents Jesse and Velva Pyne.

"Dad built the house in the 1940s and I moved in five years ago," Pyne said.

Pyne said she lived in the home as a young teenager and her granddaughter now occupies the room she had as a child.

Her father paid \$80 for the land in the 1940s with the stipulation that he would build a home valued at no less than \$1,000.

Pyne said he built the home for about \$1,500 and dug out the basement by himself.

"He was 5 foot 3 inches tall and when people go down there I tell them that's why the ceiling isn't very high," Pyne said. "I think he just got tired of digging?

Pyne said the crew is doing a great job, which should be finished by Friday. Although Pyne can't help much with the painting, she has enjoyed sitting outside and visiting with the volunteers each day.

"I'd be scared to death to get on a ladder," Pyne said. "They've given this little house an incredible facelift. It's a sentimental thing for me."

Platform **Proposals**

The session came after a morning of meetings for the Platform, Rules, Resolutions and Credentials committees. The Platform Committee considered changes to the party platform and voted on a final draft to present on Satur-

Among the proposed platform discussions:

- Eliminating the socalled loyalty oath, which asked Republican candidates to acknowledge in writing that they've read the party platform and either sign off on their agreement or explain their disagreement. The cut was suggested in part because the party rules repeat the same requirement.
- Putting a greater emphasis on adoption in the plank on the party's opposition to abortion. "Our feeling was ... that the best argument against abortion is the argument for adoption," said delegate Brad Christensen.

- Removing the phrase "naturally born" in the definition of marriage as between one man and one woman.
- Keeping the sound money plank, which supports backing up U.S. currency with gold or silver, and support for the repeal of the 17th Amendment, which allows citizens to elect their U.S. senators instead of leaving the decision to the state senate.

The Resolutions Committee also met on Friday to consider 16 resolutions. Among their actions:

- Approving resolutions in support of the Mountain Home Air Force Base and Students Come First, and abolishing the Environmental Protection Agency and Department of Education.
- Voting down resolutions on Social Security reform and opening up the recently closed Republican primary.

Friday's votes aren't the final say. On Saturday, all convention delegates vote on both the proposed platform and the approved resolutions.

Allergies, Stomach Acid Can Cause 'Lump' Feeling in Throat

Over the past few weeks, every time I swallow, it feels like I have a lump in my throat. It is really uncomfortable and seems to be worse at night. What might it be?

- Curtis, Declo

Answered by Dr. Russ Mayes, St. Luke's Clinic, Ear, Nose and Throat:

here are many common causes of the sensation that something is sticking in your throat. The term that is often used is called a "globus" sensation. Frequently people think that it may be related to post-nasal drainage, which can be caused by a number of factors including chronic allergies and sinus problems.

More frequently, it is caused by a condition called Laryngeal-Pharyngeal Reflux, or LPR. The cause of that is acid, which comes up from the stomach through the esophagus and splashes around the voice box, causing localized inflammation to the tissues of your esophagus and voice box. LPR can give people a sensation that it is difficult to swallow, that they have phlegm in their throat that can't be cleared, and can lead to a chronic cough or even a scratchy hoarse voice.

Post-nasal drainage and LPR are probably the most common causes of the sensation something is stuck in your throat, but there is always a risk that it may be cancer. In order to determine what the issue is, it is recommended to go to an ear, nose and throat specialist who can use specialized equipment to look down your throat to determine the cause of the pain and irritation in swallowing. A mirror can be used in this exam, but most frequently a flexible endoscope is used to take a look at the throat. From that exam, a course of treatment can be prescribed. This could be reflux medication, which typically requires two treatments daily.

can also be included in the treatment plan to improve symptoms. After a meal, it is best not to lie down for three hours. Avoiding overeating, caffeine, and dairy products can also help. Tobacco and alcohol can also be a contributing factor to these issues. If allergies are suspected, an antihistamine may be prescribed, along with a nasal spray. If there is a suspicion of cancer after the endoscopic procedure, a biopsy would be done to determine if it is cancerous.

It is most important to make an appointment with your primary care physician first to discuss your issues in order for them to make a proper diagnosis and whether to send you to a specialist who will be able to fully diagnose your problem.

ISP: Bellevue Woman Jumped from **Moving RV**

POCATELLO • Idaho State Police say a Bellevue woman jumped out of a motor home while her husband was driving on Interstate 15 in Pocatello.

David Blomquist noticed Charlene Blomquist reaching for the door and slowed down as she jumped out of the motor home, according to the report.

"David immediately pulled the motor home over to the side of the highway following her exit," the report stated.

Charlene Blomquist was transported to Portneuf Medical Center in Pocatello with serious in-

ISP was assisted at the scene by Pocatello EMS and the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. The incident is still under investigation.

Cannon's successor. The commission met Tuesday in Twin Falls, Wright said, though she couldn't confirm why – its proceedings are kept confidential under state statute and administrative court rules.

Judge Upholds DUI Evidence

Earlier this month, a retired Ada County magistrate judge denied two motions by Cannon to have evidence thrown out in her DUI case.

According to court records, Cannon was cited on April 19 for excessive driving under the influence. According to Idaho statutes, a DUI is considered excessive when the driver's blood-alcohol content measures at least .20 — more than twice the legal limit.

Documents show Cannon's test results were 0.239 and 0.221, nearly three times the legal limit to drive.

In May, Cannon and her attorney, Doug Nelson, tried to have her blood-alcohol test results thrown out and the entire traffic stop deemed unreasonable.

Nelson and Cannon had argued that the traffic stop was illegal, noting that a Boise police officer saw Cannon's vehicle's passenger-side tires cross over the

fog line on the right side of the road twice. They cited a case where a judge chose not to make crossing over the fog line unlawful.

"Accordingly, Nicole violated no clear 'rule of the road' with her driving," they wrote in court documents.

As for the blood-alcohol test, Cannon and Nelson argued the officer didn't follow policy - that Cannon wasn't monitored properly for 15 minutes prior to a breath test and the testing machine was not properly calibrated within 24 hours of the test. To ensure accurate results, the machine's manual advises the person being tested should not be allowed to eat, drink or smoke, and that belching, burping or any sort of regurgitation could introduce contamination.

Judge Darla Williamson denied both requests. In her June 7 order upholding the traffic stop, Williamson cited several cases where officers saw drivers driving in unusual ways, like hugging the fog line, driving 15 mph under the speed limit or crossing the center line.

Even though no traffic laws were actually broken, the officer seeing abnormal driving patterns is reason enough for a stop, Williamson concluded. In Cannon's case, the officer's observation of unusual driving coupled with the time of night – about 11 p.m. made the stop reasonable

and allowed the officer to investigate possible criminal behavior, Williamson wrote.

In a June 13 order regarding the blood-alcohol test, Williamson questioned the officer's process but declined to toss out the evidence for now. She found that Cannon was not properly monitored for the mandatory 15 minutes before the breath test, but that the manual for the particular breath-test machine used doesn't require a 15-minute monitoring period for its results to be admissible in court.

According to court documents, the 15-minute wait before Cannon's breath test was restarted twice because she burped. The officer chose not to restart it a third time when Cannon informed him she "gurgled," assuming it wouldn't affect the results.

Cannon's two breath tests were within 0.02 of each other, the acceptable limit for an accurate result. Williamson

found the machine was properly calibrated.

Cannon's jury trial is set for Aug. 28.

Notable **Appointment**

Cannon, a former Minidoka County prosecutor, became only the second female judge in the history of the 5th Judicial District when she was picked for the job in January 2011.

Her resignation comes shortly after the Magistrate Commission asked for public feedback on her performance to date. All Idaho magistrates are required to complete an 18-month probationary period, which includes at least one appraisal of the judge's performance before the term's end.


As a magistrate judge, Cannon heard misdemeanor cases – among them, charges against Don Garibaldi, a Buhl man who eventually pleaded guilty in connection with starting 2010's Auger Falls Fire. She also handled initial arraignments in larger cases such as that of Damon Azure, accused of shooting and killing his brother earlier this year.

Prior to her appointment as a judge, Cannon spent about 11 years in the Minidoka County Prosecutor's Office, including a year and a half as county prosecutor.

In an interview after she was named to the bench, Cannon said her tenure as judge would emphasize working with "strained resources" — including the use of nontraditional sentences in courts specifically designated to handle mental health, drug and juvenile cases.

In Friday's press statement, Administrative District Judge G. Richard Bevan thanked Cannon for her service, noting her professional dedication.

Wendell City Council delays Wastewater Lagoon Contract

WENDELL • The Wendell City Council is awaiting advice from its city attorney before it moves forward with the latest stage of its city

wastewater overhaul. A lagoon construction project is the second phase of the city's wastewater upgrade, for which residents passed an \$11.2 million bond in 2006.

During a Thursday meeting, the council delayed awarding a bid for lagoon construction due to confusion about whether statecertified plumbers would be needed for work at a pump house. If so, then two of three bids the city received didn't include the necessary information about who would do the work.

The three bids were received from Summit Excavation of Twin Falls for about \$961,000, Waste Management of Boise for \$971,000, and Boise's Sawtooth Construction for roughly \$1.07 million.

Mayor Brad Christopherson said his understanding of Idaho Code requires a state-certified plumber to do wiring at the pump house.

Project Engineer Rex Harding, with J-U-B Engineers of Twin Falls, suggested the council award

the bid to Summit. "The short answer is no," Christopherson said. "The problem that's going to be here is one of these (contractors) are going to challenge."

City Attorney Calvin Campbell is reviewing state law and will draft an opinion on what the council should do in the coming days.

Harding has also reached out to the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality, but said personnel there are waiting for Campbell's opinion before weighing in.

For his part, Harding said that since effluent now directed through the pump house will be diverted around the structure, the project in question doesn't need a certified plumber.

But the council was uncomfortable awarding the bid until all parties had commented on the matter. It decided to table the issue until its July meeting.

Councilman Mike Winmill said he didn't want to move forward "until we get this figured out for certain."

Humane Society Lauds Paul Shelter's Improvements

PAUL • Humane Society officials offered encouragement and advice Friday during a visit to the Minidoka County

Animal Control Facility. Heather Bialy, national director of shelter services for the Humane Society of the United States, and Lisa Kauffman, the organization's Idaho state director, stopped by the shelter to offer tips and resources as part of a tour of several shelters across Idaho - most of them in rural areas. A stop in Twin Falls was also

on the pair's agenda. The Paul facility, which is jointly operated by Minidoka County and the cities of Rupert, Paul, Acequia and Minidoka, bounced back from the brink of closure a little more than a year ago through the efforts of facility staff and community volunteers.

"Shelters in rural areas have different needs and sometimes a lot fewer resources," Bialy said.

She said current research shows that animal control problems can be improved by educating the public about responsible pet ownership, and implementing spaying and neutering programs.

Bialy said the Humane Society has a new "Pets for Life" program that offers a toolkit for shelter volunteers to help educate the public. The program also sets up vaccination clinics and gives out spay and neuter vouchers, collars and

"Those types of things help form trusting relationships and can later lead people to

choose to spay or neuter their pets," Bialy said.

Bialy commended the facility for the work its staff accomplishes with few resources. The facility receives \$60,000 a year from the county and cities, while the rest of its \$86,000 budget comes from fees and dona-

The shelter's policy was originally to euthanize dogs after three days. But it now euthanizes very few dogs due to volunteers who are willing to foster and help transport them to other areas for adoption.

"You are really lucky to have such a dedicated transport system," Kauffman said. "You are saving a lot of lives. No healthy animals should ever

be euthanized."

The facility has about 25 volunteers with five to six coming in every day to help clean, feed and water and walk the dogs.

Volunteer Jackie Hinrichs, of Paul, volunteers at the shelter every day.

"Somebody has to take care of them," Hinrichs said of the shelter's animals. "They had a need and I was willing to fill

Twelve-year-old Phillip Lee is also a volunteer.

"I just like dogs," he said. "I don't want them to get left out on the streets. Here, at least they get fed."

Bialy said "old school" animal control programs that limit the number of animals a person can have or rely on eu-

thanasia simply don't work. Rather, she said, they drive people away from the shelter.

"You lose the public trust," Bialy said. Successful communities

have implemented responsible pet owner ordinances to replace outdated animal-limit policies, she said.

Bialy said Paul's volunteers could form a "friends of the shelter" nonprofit group, opening up many resources for grant funds and donations. Many grants are available for spay and neuter program as well as other shelter necessities.

"We really need to tie into those resources," said county animal control Officer Steve Mani. "As a government entity, many times our hands are tied."

Jerry Sandusky Convicted of Abuse

BELLEFONTE, Pa. • Jerry Sandusky was convicted Friday of sexually assaulting 10 boys over 15 years, accusations that had sent shock waves through the college campus known as Happy Valley and led to the firing of Penn State's beloved Hall of Fame coach, Joe Pa-

Sandusky, a 68-year-old retired defensive coach who was once Paterno's heir apparent, was found guilty of Friday of 48 counts. He faces life in prison at sentencing, which is weeks away.

Sandusky showed little emotion as the verdict was read. The judge ordered him to be taken to the county jail to await sentencing in about three months.

Eight young men testified in a central Pennsylvania courtroom about a range of abuse, from kissing and massages to groping, oral sex and anal rape. For two other alleged victims, prosecutors relied on tes-

timony from a university janitor and then-graduate assistant Mike McQueary, whose account of a sexual encounter between Sandusky and a boy of about 10 ultimately led to the Paterno's dismissal and the university president's ouster.

Sandusky did not take the stand in his own defense.

He had repeatedly denied the allegations, and his defense suggested that his accusers had a financial

motive to make up stories, years after the fact. His attorney also painted Sandusky as the victim of overzealous police investigators who coached the alleged victims into giving accusatory statements.

But jurors believed the testimony that, in the words of lead prosecutor Joseph McGettigan III, Sandusky was a "predatory pedophile."

One accuser testified that San-

dusky molested him in the lockerroom showers and in hotels while trying to ensure his silence with gifts and trips to bowl games. He also said Sandusky had sent him "creepy love letters."

Another spoke of forced oral sex and instances of rape in the basement of Sandusky's home, including abuse that left him bleeding. He said he once tried to scream for help, knowing that Sandusky's wife was upstairs, but figured the basement must be soundproof.

Another, a foster child, said Sandusky warned that he would never see his family again if he ever told anyone what happened.

And just hours after the case went to jurors, lawyers for one of Sandusky's six adopted children, Matt, said he had told authorities that his father abused him.

Matt Sandusky had been prepared to testify on behalf of prosecutors, the statement said. The lawyers said they arranged for Matt Sandusky to meet with law enforcement officials but did not explain why he didn't testify.

Downgrades Could Hurt Loans and **Credit Cards**

NEW YORK • When a major bank's credit rating is cut, it deals a psychological blow – to customers, the public and financial markets.

So Thursday's downgrading of 15 of the world's largest banks is almost sure to cause wide concern. Most deposits are perfectly safe, but the downgrades could hurt people in more subtle ways: Banks may jack up fees and might be reluctant to lend, which could affect mortgages, credit cards and even the job market.

"It is normal that the first thing that people worry about is whether their money is safe," said Jim Nadler, chief operating officer at Kroll Bond Ratings Agency. "But the real costs may be hidden?"

Bank deposits up to \$250,000 are guaranteed by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

But the downgrades come at a tenuous time for banks. An avalanche of new regulations adopted after the financial crisis has wiped out many of the fees they charged on credit cards and checking accounts. Banks are also barred from making lucrative bets in the stock and bond markets, eliminating billions of dollars in trading

So banks are now squeezing income from any place they can. Basic services that were once free now cost money. Checking accounts can cost \$8, a bank statement \$3, canceling a check \$2. The list goes on.

In light of the lower ratings, existing fees might climb further and new ones could appear.

Taliban Gunmen Lay Siege to Hotel

KABUL, Afghanistan • Heavily armed Taliban gunmen stormed a lakeside hotel near Kabul, sending terrified guests jumping from windows or into a lake to try to escape the onslaught. Eighteen people were killed in the 12hour rampage, their bullet-riddled bodies strewn on carpets, on the lawn and a bloodsmeared patio.

The attack, which ended at midday Friday, was a gruesome reminder of the Taliban's determination to scare the Afghan people and undermine efforts to stabilize the nation as U.S.-led forces prepare to withdraw by the end of 2014.

The insurgents arrived shortly before midnight at the Spozhmai hotel, situated in a wooded area on the banks of the turquoisecolored Qargha Lake, where Afghan families often go to relax and forget about the war.

The gunmen — toting machine guns, rocket-propelled grenades and vests laden with explosives – first killed the hotel's security guards, then pushed their way inside and began firing at guests who were having latenight meals. Gunfire rang out for hours and black smoke rose from the two-story hotel as NATO helicopters circled overhead.

The attack turned the normally placid hotel into a bloody scene of bodies and half-eaten food. One man with a gunshot wound to his torso was found dead under a tree. The bodies of two other men in blood-stained clothes were slumped over one another in the grass. The body of one of the attackers was lying on a blood-stained stone patio.

Some of the guests escaped while others were held hostage as the attackers battled more than 100 Afghan security forces who

rushed to the scene with support from some coalition troops. The forces helped rescue more than 40 guests from the hotel.

There were differing accounts about the number of attackers. The Afghan police special forces' commander, Brig. Gen. Sayed Mohammad Roshan, said seven gunmen had been shot and killed, while the Taliban claimed only four of their fighters were involved.

Mohammad Qasim, who survived the attack, said he went to the reception desk at the hotel to tell the manager that he suspected

militants had entered the building. "Before I finished talking with the manager,

they fired on us," Qasim said. The manager "hid himself behind his desk, but around three to four other guys who were guards and waiters were killed by the attackers?

Windows were shattered. Wicker chairs and tables were overturned on the lawn. A sugar bowl, chipped by flying bullets was lying on a red carpet next to a teapot and a baby bottle filled with milk. One table still had plates of French fries, salad and glasses half-filled with

"Some of the guests jumped from the window into the hotel yard. They were hiding under trees or any safe place they could find," said Mohammad Zahir, criminal director for Kabul police. "Three of the guests jumped into the lake and hid in the water."

An Associated Press photograph showed the three, who survived the attack, clinging to a stone wall that kept them hidden from the

Afghan President Hamid Karzai, the U.S.led international military coalition and the U.S. Embassy in Kabul all condemned the attack, issuing statements accusing the Taliban of deliberately targeting civilians. Fourteen Afghan civilians, three security guards and an Afghan police officer died in the attack, Afghan police said.

U.S. Marine Gen. John Allen, the top commander of American and NATO forces in Afghanistan, also seized the opportunity to nudge Pakistan into taking stronger measures against insurgents hiding on its side of the Afghan-Pakistan border. He said the attack was likely carried out by fighters loyal to the Haqqani network. The al-Qaida-linked group is based in Pakistan and regularly targets Afghan and coalition forces in Afghanistan, and conducts deadly attacks in Kabul.

Rangers Recovering 1 of Their Own **After Fatal Fall**

SEATTLE • The family of a Mount Rainier National Park ranger who died while helping



rescue four climbers both grieved and celebrated his life Friday, as authorities faced the grim task of recovering the body of one of their own.

Nick Hall, 33, slid more than 3,000feet to his death Thursday as he was helping evacuate climbers from a crevasse by helicopter near the summit of the 14,411-foot mountain.

Hall, a four-year veteran of the park's climbing program, came from a family of EMTs who aided soldiers in Iraq and car crash victims in his small hometown of Patten, Maine. He was not married and had no children.

His father, Carter Hall, recalled his son as a loner when he was a child, but flourished in high school through a shared love of the wilderness.

"For good and bad, it was my influence of the outdoors," Hall told The Associated Press in a call from his Maine home, his voice breaking.

A Chinook helicopter from Joint Base Lewis-McChord removed three of the four climbers from Waco, Texas, and rangers stayed overnight with the fourth person. Poor weather complicated rescue and recovery efforts Friday.

The caregivers also have gone above and beyond the call of duty. I have watched what they do for the residents, and I'm impressed! The activities are always going on with entertainment also.



Alcoa Plant Celebrates 60 Years

The Pacific Northwest aluminum industry supplied roughly 40 percent of the nation's aluminum in its heyday in the 1980s, with 10 plants producing the pliable, lightweight metal for everything from war planes to soda cans.

Today, just two plants remain - but one of them celebrates its 60th anniversary Saturday with an open house and an idle plant in Montana is considering a restart thanks in part to abundant power supplies.

Aluminum smelters were the first major industrial customers of the hydropower dams built on the Columbia River during and after World War II, and at one time, consumed enough power to light three cities the

size of Seattle. In the past decade, though, rising power and labor costs and global market competition forced most plants in the region to

The two that remain: Alcoa's Intalco Works in Ferndale, Wash., north of Bellingham in the northwest corner of the state, and Alcoa's Wenatchee Works in north-central Washington.

Since Wenatchee Works opened in 1952 – the first smelter built in the Pacific Northwest after World War II – it has been one of that area's largest private employers, with a high of 1,000 workers in the 1980s.

Today, the plant employs 450 people, but creates an additional 2.9 jobs in the surrounding area for every job at the plant and contributes \$52 million to the economy directly through wages and benefits, said Alcoa's Sharon Kanareff.

Alcoa is offering free plant tours Saturday to celebrate the 60th anniversary.

"We're honoring a lot of our partners at the event, because really, we wouldn't be able to be here without our business partners - our customers, our suppliers, our community support," Kanareff said.

U.S. primary aluminum production totaled nearly 2 million metric tons in 2011, an increase of 15 percent from the previous year, according to surveys by The Aluminum Association, a promotional group based in Arlington, Va.

Primary aluminum is product that has not yet been recycled.

U.S. producers also have the infrastructure to recycle aluminum, which requires

only 5 percent of the power needed to produce primary aluminum, association President Heidi Block said. And low-cost power availability and future demand for certain products are likely to fuel aluminum production in the coming years.

Demand for aluminum by the automotive sector is expected to double by 2025, along with consumer interest in more fuel-efficient, lightweight vehicles, she said. Companies looking for sustainable packaging and "green" building supplies also are expected to boost demand.

In Columbia Falls, Mont., an idle plant is considering a restart, according to the Bonneville Power Administration, the Portland, Ore. based federal agency that manages much of the Northwest power grid.

Montana Tribes Start Receiving Settlement Money

HELENA, Mont. • Some Indian tribes have started receiving their shares of a \$1 billion settlement with the U.S. government over mismanagement of their money and trust lands, while others are waiting and remain undecided on what to do with their windfall.

The agreement between the government and 44 tribes across the nation was announced in March to settle claims of money lost in mismanaged accounts and royalties from natural resource development.

The tribes sued in an attempt to receive an accounting of the Interior Department's management of the trust funds and to learn how much

Shooting Sparks Fire, Homes Evacuated

SARATOGA SPRINGS, Utah (AP) • Residents of about 400 homes in northern Utah were being evacuated Friday after high winds kicked up a fire started by target shooters.

The roughly 1,400-acre blaze started Thursday near the Saratoga Springs landfill, about 40 miles south of Salt Lake City. High winds then helped fan the flames onto tinder-dry grasslands.

Authorities were initially worried as flames moved toward property owned by an explosives company. But as winds kicked up, the fire began moving toward Saratoga Springs, and crews began focusing on saving the homes of about 1,000 people who were ordered to leave. On Friday, fire officials were calling in additional aircraft and extra ground crews.

Bureau of Land Management officials say they believe the fire was caused when a bullet hit a rock and sparked the fire. This is the 20th target-shooting related fire this

year in Utah, they said. No injuries or structural damage have been reported.



Financially Strapped North Las Vegas Declares Disaster

NORTH LAS VEGAS, Nev. • There are no signs of rioters, wind-damaged homes or flooding. The brand new City Hall features gleaming marble floors and the public recreation centers offer Zumba, karate and Pilates classes.

Despite all of its suburban trimmings, North Las Vegas is officially a disaster area.

After five years of declining property taxes, massive layoffs and questionable spending, leaders of the blue-collar, family-oriented city outside Las Vegas declared a state of emergency, invoking a rarely used state law crafted for unforeseen disasters.

No matter that the statute, which allows municipalities to suspend union contracts and avoid paying scheduled salary increases, doesn't actually include fiscal emergencies among the list of potential disasters.

"It says, in case of 'emergency such as? You can't list how many different types of emergencies there are in the world," City Council member Wade Wagner said of the move, which will save the city \$9 million.

There are many cities

across the nation grappling with declining property values and growing expenses like North Las Vegas, but few, if any, have declared financial emergency.

Stockton, Calif., and Los Angeles explored similar emergency declarations and were met with legal challenges. In Buffalo, N.Y., court officials upheld a wage freeze in 2006 that allowed the city to address its four-year \$127 million deficit and avoid financial disaster.

North Las Vegas is among Nevada's hardest-hit cities, at a time when the state is dealing with the nation's highest unemployment rate and an unrelenting tide of foreclosures and bankruptcies. Every few months, the state threatens to take over the city.

Even so, the financial disaster declaration is unprecedented in Nevada, raising questions about whether North Las Vegas is overreaching at the expense of its employees and reputation.

"It makes it sound like our buildings are all on fire and they don't have water to put it out or something," said Jennifer Meyers, who moved to the city before the housing collapse so her kids could play in the street without worrying about crime.

"It doesn't sound like a place you would want to move to," she said.

Union workers, long among the highest compensated government employ-

ees in southern Nevada, claim the city won't be able to defend the emergency designation in court. The police union filed a lawsuit Friday claiming the city was misusing the law.

"Everybody in the city is basically using all their time and all their effort to try to break the unions," said Sgt. Leonard Cardinale, president of the North Las Vegas Police Supervisors Associa-

Public perception turned against the city's public safety workers after some union leaders put up billboards last year that read: "Warning: Due to recent police layoffs, we can no longer guarantee your safety!"

It isn't hard to make the case that North Las Vegas, Nevada's fourth-largest city, is in trouble.

As its population more than doubled to 223,394 in 2010 from 115,488 in 2000, the city doubled its staff, built a new park each year and, in 2009, started construction on a sparkling \$130 million City Hall.

For nearly two years, the city, where residents have long paid the highest tax rate in southern Nevada, has teetered on the edge of insolvency.

Cleveland Moves on As LeBron Crowned Champ

CLEVELAND • On the same sidewalk where fans torched a LeBron James jersey in protest two summers ago, office workers on their lunch hours passed gamblers headed to the new downtown casino.

Just another summer day. While James was in Miami celebrating his first NBA title, fans in the city he scorned to chase a championship had a much more subdued, internal reaction. There were no angry protests, no public outrage, no threats of harm. Those days have long past.

The king got his ring. And Cleveland, where sports despair's roots have grown for generations, seemed to sigh in accept-

"In a way I'm kind of happy for him," bartender Natalie Hardik said between serving pints of beer at Flannery's, an Irish bar and restaurant across the street from Ouicken Loans Arena, where James once starred.

"But I definitely still feel a lot of bitterness toward him – everyone does."

This city, yearning to celebrate its first pro sport championship since 1964, hasn't forgiven James for leaving as a free agent in 2010. Many can't let it go. There's lingering pain and resentment, but there's also a sense that it's time to move on.

Some Clevelanders already had.

"I hope they have moved on, and I kind of felt many fans had come to accept this would happen during the season," said TV sports anchor Jim Donovan, a longtime Cleveland resident. "Fans felt him winning it all was inevitable, and I think some of them may have given up because it's exhausting to root against the guy. It's better to root for your

Cleveland reveled in seeing James fail in last year's finals.

This time, there was no stopping him.

And the sight of James,

who grew up in nearby Akron and spent seven seasons with the Cavaliers, hugging and and hoisting a championship trophy was tough to stomach.

"I had mixed feelings," said Mike Kubinski, who watched Thursday's Game 5 at home in Cleveland's Tremont district. "It's a lot like when your ex-girlfriend or ex-boyfriend gets married. It's not fun."

As he spoke, Kubinski stood just a few away from an outdoor clothing kiosk at Westlake's Crocker Park, where "Lyin' King" Tshirts were sold after James' departure in 2010. Now, there's hardly a trace of James anywhere to be found in Cleveland, where his No. 23 jersey was once omnipresent and his likeness loomed above the city on a giant downtown billboard.

Instead of dwelling on James, many Cleveland fans are focusing on what appears to be a bright future for the Cavs. The team has the No. 4 overall pick in

next week's draft, four selections in the top 34 and hope to add some quality players to put around guard Kyrie Irving, the reigning rookie of the year.

At last, it's time to look

forward, not back.

"I think people have moved on and are at peace with it," said Chuck Kyle, coach of high school football powerhouse Saint Ignatius. "It's been two years

since LeBron left. It hurt for a while, but now it's time to forget it."

While there are those who will never forgive him, James has a sprinkling of supporters in Cleveland.

Moyle

He hasn't slept much the past few weeks, but there's no chance Mark Moyle will be asleep at the wheel. He's raced inboard comp jet boats for 22 years, won a handful of championships and set four world

Given his personal and family history in racing, it was a natural fit for Moyle to take over as race director five years ago. It's a big job, but Moyle praises his army of volunteers, plus his secretary and "righthand lady" Georgia Goodman.

"Racing and directing is hard for him," said Goodman, who has worked alongside four Idaho Regatta directors since becoming secretary in 1994. "He's so laid back, and that's nice for me. He's never uptight; he's like, 'Oh, we'll just fix it? There's a solution for everything."

Perhaps one of the most notable improvements in Moyle's five years as director, the Regatta Committee has been able to mostly erase a negative public per-

ception of the Idaho Regatta's party image, which stemmed from the carefree Regatta days of the 80s and 90s.

"We've worked hard to make it a familyfriendly event," said Moyle, who doesn't receive compensation for his race director duties. "When I became chairman, my No. 1 goal was to make this a serious, professional motorsports event like NASCAR. I want people to come for the racing, not for the partying."

Moyle was ready to step down after the 2010 Regatta. But after winning the bid to host this year's American Powerboat Association Flatbottom National Championships, he committed to see it through.

But this weekend might be Moyle's last ride - as chairman, at least.

"I'm trying to find someone to train who would like to do it," Moyle said. "It is a very big job, it takes a lot of my time. It's taken a lot of time away from my business and my family. I would like to find someone to take it for a couple years because I do need a break."

Germany Beats Greece, Reaches Euro 2012 Semis

GDANSK, Poland • Germany scored three secondhalf goals to reach the European Championship semifinals for a record seventh time Friday after a 4-2 win over Greece.

German Chancellor Angela Merkel made the trip for the match and stood to cheer every time her team scored.

The match was played amid a political background between the countries. Germany has been a major contributor to economic bailouts for Greece and was instrumental in demanding unpop-

ular spending cuts. dominated Germany nearly the entire match at the Arena Gdansk, but the Greek defense held strong for much of the first half. Lahm finally put his team in front by controlling the ball with his chest and dribbling toward the middle before sending a long-distance shot into the corner off the hand goalkeeper Greece

Michalis Sifakis. The Greeks looked better at the start of the second half, and even equalized when Samaras knocked the ball past Germany goalkeeper Manuel Neuer after a perfect cross from Dimitris Salpigidis.

"When we conceded a second goal we had to open up and that cost us," Salpigidis said. "I hope the Greeks got some encouragement from watching us fighting."

But after that goal, it was back to being all Germany.

Khedira volleyed in a cross from Jerome Boateng in the 61st, and Klose headed in a free kick from Mesut Oezil in the 68th as Sifakis was late to punch the ball away.

Reus made it 4-1 in the 74th, volleying a shot in off the underside of the crossbar after Sifakis had saved a shot from Klose.

According to Title IX, "no person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving federal financial assistance."

Even though the word "athletics" wasn't included, sports programs fall under in the category of an "educa-

tion program." Before Title IX, fewer than 300,000 high school girls one in 27 – played sports. There were fewer than 32,000 female athletes at the

collegiate level. Now, one out of two girls play high school sports.

As a student at Shoshone High School in the late 1970s, Bate saw the impact of the legislation first hand.

He remembers the addition of women's basketball and volleyball at his high school shortly after the Idaho High School Activities Association made changes in 1976 as a result of Title IX.

For Wray, she said it was never an issue for her to participate in athletics as a stu-

But it was for Jan Mittleider, who retired this year from her job as a CSI physical education professor.

Before Title IX existed, she was a competitive tennis player and won a number of tournaments.

Mittleider said her male counterpart got a college scholarship to play tennis,

but she didn't have that opportunity.

In order to fundraise for tournaments, she said girls teams used to sell baked goods. Other programs, she said, took care of paying for tournaments for boys teams.

Her 42-year career with CSI began in 1970 and she was the first women's volleyball coach.

At the time, she said the team was enthusiastic, but many of the players didn't have much experience or the skill set.

Mittleider said it's wonderful to see how things have changed since then. Now, CSI has four women's athletics programs and three men's programs.

Bate – who has been the college's athletic director for nearly six years - said a lot of people don't understand fully understand Title IX.

He said opportunities must be reflective of the student population. At CSI, the student body is about 60 percent women and 40 percent men.

Bate said he's proud of CSI's compliance with Title IX. The addition of the softball program about six years ago brought the college into full compliance.

Mittleider said Title IX was a "very important move," even though there was controversy attached to it.

Kimberly resident Shae Bair described the law as "not the greatest thing in the world." It was meant to help women, she said, "but in retrospect, I think it hurt

men? In September, Bair will be

inducted into Utah State University's athletic hall of fame for pole vaulting. She competed from 1997-2000 and again in 2002.

She's just one of two female track athletes in Utah State history to earn All-American honors three times.

Now, Bair volunteers to coach pole vaulters with Kimberly High School's track and field program. And she and her husband started a track club in Kimberly last year for younger children.

She said even though Title IX may have harmed opportunities for men, it has been beneficial for female athletes.

"It's done a lot of good for the women," she said.

At Canyon Ridge High, Wray just wrapped up her

first year as the school's athletic director. Becoming an administrator wasn't her plan, though. "I never wanted to leave

the coaching world," she

But when the athletic director position opened up, she applied for it and was hired. Wray said it was an opportunity to provide stability for the school's athletic programs after a couple of years of turnover.

Now, part of her job involves monitoring the school's Title IX compliance. That includes a variety of tasks, such as making sure there are an equal number of games for boys and girls teams.

"I want a lot bigger and a lot faster, but I'll go wherever they take me."

Brett Thompson, owner of the No. 61 late model car driven by Newhouse says that when she came on board with the Jerome-based Thompson Motorsports program an outline was in place that they believed would allow her to realize her NASCAR racing aspirations.

"She needs to go through some of the steps – not get above where she needs to be yet," Thompson said. "The short track racing maybe doesn't seem like it gets you ready for the future but it does. It gets your confidence and experience up and anytime you can keep that going, it's a plus."

"You have to master the levels but wins are what they really want to see," he added. "She has already been recognized by some pretty highup people in NASCAR; they're watching her. Obviously she has gotten their attention."

Having already proven her talent in two different classes Newhouse says she recognizes the value of seat time.

"Go-karts are driven on road courses so you're turning both right and left. The trucks, they have a completely different feel than the late model cars; a lot more than people realize. But you do take with you what you learned from both of them about patience and learning to clear each other."

Even with as much success as she has had this season there have been bumps along the way. After an unusually rough night during the last round of racing the car was back at the shop for repairs. But as usual, Newhouse was there eagerly living up to her other end of the bargain.

"The deal is that she has to work here at the shop," Thompson reported. "She does whatever we need her to do clean the cars, the haulers, or even hand people tools. She is learning as much as she can, and that way she also learns to respect her equipment. This is the first time she has ever really brought the car back with damage, but it was from nothing she did wrong."

Newhouse said she is eager to get involved in any aspect of the sport that may prepare her for the future.

"I love working here. I ask all kinds of questions and I am definitely learning a lot," she offered.

Thompson concluded that it's a win-win proposition for both sides.

"She has been a very good representative for Thompson motorsports and her sponsors. This is just what we wanted to do build something for our future so that when she moves on this is a desired ride for the next person wanting to move up."

"She is obviously a fan favorite out there. I have only seen a couple of her races but I was very impressed. She definitely had the fastest car but was very patient and knew what to do. She is an excellent little driver. We're very happy with her."

Racing action tonight at Magic Valley Speedway includes Super Stocks, Hornets, Legends and a double main in Thunderdogs. Also, a mid-season champion will be crowned in the Stingers division.

Choose Hope Over Hopelessness

've always wondered at what point we Christians became better known for our pessimism than our optimism? Study the cultural caricature of a "Christian" and inevitably the caricature includes an acquaintance, family member or friend cynical about the present and pessimistic about the future.

What if we could launch a new revolution of optimism for the future inspired by the faith in The One we claim authors hope, among other things?

Our marching orders for the new revolution would reflect the first phrase of this verse: "But in your hearts set apart Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect." (I Peter 1:15)

I love this verse. The radical assumption is that we can live reasonably and rationally with a hope inspired by Jesus. The obvious by-product would be that we naturally and routinely express in conversation and action that we own a uniquely positive spin on future events. By the way, read that verse again and check out how we're to engage the conversation. Pretty revolutionary stuff, isn't it?

I get the concern for "end of days" conversations. But sometimes I wonder if much of contemporary Christianity isn't an adventure in missing the point(s).



The Bible is clear in expressing its anticipation of the end of days and the return of Jesus. Yes, let's be alert, prepared and live with urgency. But let's be alert and optimistic: prepared and hopeful; urgent without being cynical.

Listen, the first reason for my hope in the future is Jesus. The second reason? I'm a lifelong Chicago Cub fan. Cub fans have to believe that the future will be brighter than the past or present. You have to believe. Yes, you have to believe!

As a pastor, I've observed death-bed optimism (hope). It's profound. It's reassuring. It's the acid test of our hope in Jesus. If that optimism could be expressed with the same passion and consistency in our daily routine, Christians might attain an entirely new level of cultural credibility.

I've got an idea: Since this column is confined to the religion page, why not keep this "Revolution of the Hopeful" our little secret? You never know. We might surprise some folks. Impact a few lives. At least we can always hope!



Violence Follows Removal of Paraguay's President

ASUNCION, Paraguay • Paraguay was plunged into a deepening political crisis late Friday after the Senate voted 39-4 to remove President Fernando Lugo from office in a rapid-fire impeachment procedure.

The Senate ruled that Lugo had failed to carry out his duties. Vice President Federico Franco was to succeed Lugo.

Lugo, 61, a left-wing populist, accepted his dismissal, and called on his supporters to demonstrate their opposition to his dismissal – but peacefully.

"Today it is not Fernando Lugo who has taken a blow," he said. "It is Paraguayan democracy that has been profoundly injured."

Violence erupted out side the Congress building when the results of the vote were announced. Police used tear gas and high pressure water from hydrants to disperse demonstrators outraged at Lugo's dismissal. Several shots were heard, although there were no immediate reports of casualties.

Lugo was believed to be at the government palace in Asuncion. Lugo's Health Minister Esperanza Martinez earlier in the day denounced the pending impeachment as a "parliamentary coup d'etat."

"I subject myself to the decision of Congress," Lugo said minutes after the legislature removed him from office. "Today I say farewell as president of the Republic, but I don't say farewell as Paraguayan citizen."

Breivik Ends Massacre Trial by Defending Attacks

OSLO, Norway • With a rambling monologue depicting Norway's worst peacetime massacre as a necessary evil, confessed mass killer Anders Behring Breivik got the last word as his 10-week trial ended Friday amid conflicting claims about his sanity.

Relatives of his 77 victims said they hope it's the last they hear of him.

"For me this is not about whether he's mentally competent or not," said Unni Espeland, whose 16year-old daughter Andrine was killed in Breivik's shooting massacre on a

political youth camp. "For me this is about him never being let out again."

Since the self-styled anti-Muslim fanatic admitted to the twin attacks on July 22 - a car bomb in downtown Oslo followed by the shooting spree at the governing Labor Party's youth camp - his sanity was the key issue to be resolved in the trial.

Breivik, 33, rejected prosecutors' assertion that he is insane, but it was unclear whether he helped his case with a closing statement that included complaints against the TV show "Sex and the City" and the Eurovision Song

Video of Bus Monitor's Misery Strikes a Nerve

The pebble was tossed when a middle-school student in upstate New York posted a 10-minute video on his Facebook page.

The video, showing four other seventh-grade boys cruelly taunting 68-yearold bus monitor Karen Klein, was quickly uploaded to YouTube.

And the ripples began.

Millions of viewers from around the world watched her humiliation. There were cries of indignation and sympathy, retribution and recompense. Through posts on social media and the user-generated news site Reddit.com, word spread geometrically, leading to a fund drive that began with a modest goal of \$5,000 to help Klein take a nice vacation and scrub the foul memories of the last days of school from her mind.

By Friday afternoon, the drive had sailed past \$550,000, with donations from more than 25,000 people.

Even in an increasingly connected, fast-moving world of information flow and echo, the response to Klein's plight is a stunning example of the power of people in the new, Me-Media era.

"Oh, my God," Klein told The Associated Press in an

interview Thursday, when the total was around \$370,000. She said it was "weird, very weird" to suddenly be an international celebrity and joked she'd have to go out in public disguised by a wig and dark

"I appreciate everything so much," she said. "It's just hard to believe strangers, people I never talked to, never seen, will send me a message saying, 'We love you, we think you're a great person."

Lee Rainie, director of the Pew Interne Project and author of "Networked: The New Social Operating System," said these kinds of moments have occurred before, but he still called the sheer volume of the response to the Klein video

"head-scratching." "It kind of feels like there aren't boundaries to this

stuff," said Rainie.

The formula is pretty simple, Rainie said: A lot of people passionate about what they do keep vigilant eyes on the Web and react instantly when something offends or delights. The speed and reach of the Web do the rest.

"It's clear there are any number of watchdogs, you can call them; cultural or civic observers who scan YouTube or pictures for evidence of bad behavior," he said.

"Once it sort of gets in the line of vision of the people who get mad about these things, they use the Web to sort of, first, exact their version of justice and secondly, to help people who are clear targets or victims. Obviously, there's a cascading networking effect on this?

The verbal abuse was captured in a 10-minute cellphone video recorded Monday by a student of Athena Middle School in the Rochester suburb of Greece. The video shows Klein trying her best to ignore the stream of profanity, insults and outright threats.

One student taunted: "You don't have a family because they all killed themselves because they don't want to be near you." Klein's oldest son killed himself 10 years ago.

Eventually, she appears to break down in tears.

Max Sidorov, the 25vear-old Canadian man who started the fund drive on the site Indiegogo.com started with modest goals. In an interview Friday with The Associated Press, the kinesiologist and nutritionist said he was bullied when he came to Canada from Ukraine, so he empathized with Klein and likened the taunting to "attacking the little guy."

Internet Group Picks Littleknown Executive as CEO

NEW YORK • A businessman with experience in building consensus will be the next CEO of the Internet agency in charge of contentious policies surrounding Internet addresses.

The Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers, which is pushing through a major change in the way Web and email addresses are structured and assigned, announced Fadi Chehade's appointment Friday. He will re-place former U.S. cybersecurity chief Rod Beckstrom as chief executive.

In selecting Chehade, ICANN went with someone who isn't well known and isn't well versed in the organization's core tasks — keeping the Internet address system running smoothly.

Chehade does, however, have a knack for diplomacy. In the early days of e-commerce, he persuaded leading tech companies such as IBM and Hewlett-Packard to col-

ICANN Chairman Steve Crocker said those achievements outweighed the drawbacks.

In an exclusive interview with The Associated Press ahead of the announcement, Chehade, 50, said his work at RosettaNet prepared him for the new role.

"The thrill and the satisfaction of bringing people around some common understanding is tremendous," Chehade said. "I have a personal and deep love of bringing consensus."

He said that when executive recruiters contacted him about the position at ICANN, "I immediately had flashbacks of how much I enjoyed doing a job that everybody told me was impossible and difficult."

As CEO, Chehade will receive a base salary of \$560,000 plus up to \$240,000 in bonuses based on merit. He is tentatively set to start Oct. 1. His tenure lasts until July 1, 2015.

Beckstrom leaves ICANN this July 1. Chief Operating Officer Akram Atallah will serve as CEO in the interim.

One of Chehade's chief tasks will be guiding the largest expansion of the Internet address system since its creation in the 1980s. The change affects how people find Web sites or send email and could lead to more options for businesses as easy-to-remember ".com" names are harder to obtain.

ICANN has received 1,930 proposals for 1,409 different domain name suffixes, including ".love," ".google" and ".music." They would rival ".com" and others now in use. Couple Pleads Not Guilty in Suspected Pimp Killing

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) • A

San Francisco couple accused of shooting and killing a man they suspected of pimping and beating their 17-year-old daughter pleaded not guilty Friday.

Barry Gilton, 38, and his girlfriend, Lupe Mercado, 37, are facing a murder charge in the death of Calvin Sneed.

The 22-year-old Sneed was shot in his car on June 4 near the couple's home.

According to authorities, the couple plotted to kill Sneed after they suspected he was pimping their daughter and were unable to get her back.

They traveled to North Hollywood eight days before the fatal shooting, and one of them fired at Sneed's Toyota Camry, authorities say. Sneed survived that attack with minor injuries.

The couple's attorneys say Sneed had many enemies, and their clients did not shoot him.

"There are many people who had a motive to do harm to him," Tony Tamburello, Mercado's attorney was quoted as saying in the San Francisco Chronicle. "We feel like our clients are being unfairly targeted."

Tamburello said Sneed began beating and pimping the girl after meeting her in Los Angeles six months ago.

The girl refused her parents' pleas to come home, according to Eric Safire, Gilton's attorney. The couple also filed a missing persons and abuse report with San Francisco police, he said.


Gilton, a San Francisco public transit driver who is on disability, and Mercado are each being held in lieu of \$2 million bail. They were ordered to return to court Monday to set a date for their preliminary hearing.







Today's Highlight:

On June 23, 1812, Britain, unaware that America had declared war against it five days earlier, rescinded its policy on neutral shipping, a major issue of contention between the two countries. The same day, the British frigate HMS Belvidera came under attack from the USS President and the USS Congress in the North Atlantic; the Belvidera managed to escape.

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

In 1757, forces of the East India Company led by Robert Clive won the Battle of Plassey, which effectively marked the beginning of British colonial rule in India.

In 1860, a congressional resolution authorized creation of the United States Government Printing Office, which opened the following year.

In 1931, aviators Wiley Post and Harold Gatty took off from New York on a round-the-world flight that lasted eight days and 15

In 1938, the Civil Aeronautics Authority was established.

In 1947, the Senate joined the House in overriding President Harry S. Truman's veto of the Taft-Hartley Act, designed to limit the power of organized labor.

In 1956, Gamal Abdel Nasser was elected president of Egypt.

In 1961, the Antarctic Treaty, intended to ensure that the continent would be used only for peaceful purposes, came into force.

In 1967, President Lyndon B. Johnson and Soviet Premier Alexei Kosygin held the first of two meetings at Glassboro State College in New Jersey.

In 1969, Warren E. Burger was sworn in as chief justice of the United States by the man he was succeeding, Earl Warren.

In 1972, President Richard Nixon and White House chief of staff H.R. Haldeman discussed a plan to use the CIA to obstruct the FBI's Watergate investigation. (Revelation of the tape recording of this conversation sparked Nixon's resignation in 1974.)

In 1985, all 329 people board an Air India Boeing 747 were killed when the plane crashed into the Atlantic Ocean near Ireland because of a bomb believed to have been planted by Sikh separatists.

In 2005, a divided U.S. Supreme Court, in Kelo v. City of New London, ruled that governments may seize property for private development projects.

Ten years ago: Rival groups of Protestants and Catholics clashed on the streets of north Belfast, Northern Ireland, following a weekend of sporadic sectarian violence. Twenty-six North Korean asylum seekers left South Korean and Canadian diplomatic compounds in Beijing bound for South Korea, ending a monthlong diplomatic standoff.

Five years ago: Searchers in Summit County, Ohio, found the body of Jessie Davis, a missing 26-year-old pregnant woman, in a park. (Bobby Cutts Jr., a former Canton police officer who was the father of Davis' unborn child, was later convict ed of murder and aggravated murder and sentenced to 57 years to life in prison.)

One year ago: Republicans pulled out of debt-reduction talks led by Vice President Joe Biden, blaming Democrats for demanding tax increases as part of a deal rather than accepting more than \$1 trillion in cuts to Medicare and other government programs. "Columbo" actor Peter Falk died in Beverly Hills, Calif., at

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"A Foreign Secretary ... is always faced with this cruel dilemma. Nothing he can say can do very much good, and almost anything he may say may do a great deal of harm."

Against six spades, West leads the heart 10, won with your ace, but on the first trump, East discards a club. Can vou recover?

You will have to start by discarding dummy's diamond losers on your two spare heart winners. You play the diamond ace at trick three, cross to your club king, and cash the club queen.

You next play the heart king and queen, throwing dummy's remaining diamonds. When you lead the trump five, West does best to split his honors, preventing you from finessing dummy's eight. You win his trump 10 with the queen and ruff the club four with your remaining trump, the

While dummy's last four cards are the trump K-8-3 and club ace, West still has to play to this trick, holding J-7-6 of trumps and a low card in each red suit. He is now on the horns of a dilemma. If he overruffs with the jack, you will be able to ruff his red-suit return in dummy, draw trump, and claim the balance. If he discards instead, you will lead a red card and score a ruff with dummy's trump three. You can then exit with the club ace, which West ruffs. You will score the K-8 of trumps on his return.

(Incidentally, if East had all five trumps, you would need to find him with exactly 5-3-1-4 pattern. If so, you could cash all the side suits, ruff the fourth club. then exit with the spade nine to East to endplay him in trumps.)

ANSWER: It is easy to get carried away here, but you can imagine partner's hand with six solid diamonds and the spade queen, where you would be struggling even in game. For the time being, look for three no-trump first, facing a spade stop. Bid three clubs, asking partner to support hearts or rebid in no-trump with a spade guard.
