BRUSH FIRE EVACUATES HIDDEN LAKES IN T.F.

But no homes in the subdivision fell to Wednesday's flames.

TWIN FALLS • Fire Chief Stacey Wilson of the Rock Creek Rural Fire Protection District has one simple request: Be smart about controlled burns.

Since Tuesday, Rock Creek has responded to two wildfires that began from controlled burns, including one Wednesday afternoon that threatened about a dozen homes and prompted a voluntary evacuation of the Hidden Lakes subdivision near Dierkes Lake.

The blaze started about 3 p.m. and quickly spread through the brush within the subdivision, consuming between 60 and 80 acres, Wilson said.

Crews from Rock Creek, the Twin Falls Fire Department and the Salmon Tract Rural Fire Protection District responded to the blaze. Excavators dug outside of the perimeter to create barriers and eliminate fuel sources.

Though crews acted quickly, shifting winds flared the flames and brought them dangerously close to houses. Ultimately, none were damaged, though the fire claimed a corral and a service pole.

While firefighters worked to save homes on the front line of the fire, neighbors pitched in with shovels and garden hoses.

Jody Johnson came to her friend Dr. Mark McKain's home, where she watered down the dry brush on the edge of the lawn.

"I just couldn't let his house burn," Johnson

To the west, gawkers hoping to see the fire and residents trying to get back to their homes tied up roads, stalling emergency vehicles.

But some of the bystanders offered their help. Near the north side of the fire, Ashley Brackett and Amber White had originally come to get a closer Please see FIRE, A2

TWIN FALLS • It's a little different, but it's going to work out.

That's the consensus among organizers of next month's jazz festival, Jazz on the Canyon Rim. Jazz lovers around Twin Falls

Teacher Gets 45 Days for Planting

MOSCOW • A Buhl man and former Castleford High School teacher was sentenced to 45 days in jail and five years of supervised probation Monday for attempting to videotape high school girls showering in his hotel bathroom during an FFA convention in Moscow last June.

Roger L. Wells, 34, was charged in December with video voyeurism and destruction, alteration or concealment of evidence, both felonies, in Latah County 2nd District Court following an investigation started when the boyfriend of a Castleford High School student came forward to Twin Falls law enforcement with a video camera he claimed Wells used to record the girl showering.

According to a probable cause affidavit, Wells, a former agriculture teacher and girls' junior varsity basketball coach at Castleford High School, was a chaperone for the school group staying at the University of Idaho dormitories during the convention on June 7-10, 2011. He allowed several girls to use his hotel bathroom to shower because they claimed the UI facilities were not clean enough, according to the affidavit.

Kimberly Rejects Recycling Proposal

KIMBERLY • The city of Kimberly has turned down another proposal by Western Waste Services to provide the city with a single-

stream recycling bin. Company representatives approached the City Council on Tuesday with a proposal to provide a roll-off container for six months at no charge.

The city would have been required to pay a \$25-permonth fee after six months, but would receive 60 percent of the market value of all recycled materials.

The container would have allowed residents to dispose of plastic, aluminum, newspaper, magazines, phone books and other recyclables without any need to separate materials.

Company representative Dave Abrahamson told the council that the container would need to be kept in a secure area that could be monitored and locked at night to ensure that people didn't use it as a garbage bin. The city would be charged a disposal fee if the container was contaminated, he said.

Twin Falls County already provides Kimberly with a large recycling bin for newspaper, cardboard and aluminum cans without cost. Council members said they saw no reason to make any changes, and the WWS proposal died for lack of a mo-

A recycling container placed inside a fenced lot would likely be "out of sight, out of mind," Council President Brandon Hoobler said.

"I just question how much it would be used if it's behind the city (maintenance) yard," he said.

Council members balked at the monthly fee and other conditions.

"I see this as putting us at risk of paying higher fees than we currently are," Councilman Jim Eisenhower said. "I see no need to change what we currently

Kimberly voters rejected a referendum on the November ballot that would have authorized residential curbside recycling at a cost per resident of \$3 per month.

January, the City Council approved a proposal by Western Waste Services to place a large singlestream recycling container at the city maintenance yard as a six-month pilot project. The council reversed the decision a few weeks later after city officials learned that Twin Falls County would no longer provide a recycling bin if the WWS pilot project moved forward

Market Makes a Return

In other action, the council approved plans to close one block of Main Street to traffic for a downtown market one evening each month this summer.

The city has provided barricades for the event in the past, but Public Works Director Rob Wright said there was no guarantee that barricades would be available. He also had concerns about emergency vehicle access during the event, held the first Thursday of each month.

Event organizer Jennifer Stephenson agreed to provide barricades this year and to work with the police and fire departments for emergency vehicle access.

The council approved the proposal on a 3-1 vote, with Connie Sowka casting the lone "no" vote.

"I think it's a great event, but I think it should be moved to a different location," Sowka said.

Mayor Tracy Armstrong said there are other locations that could be used, including the city park or the Wells Fargo parking lot.

Bike Lanes and Public Art

The council also approved an agreement with the Idaho Transportation Department that will allow the city to move forward on a Safe Routes to School project. The grant-funded project includes paved lanes for pedestrians and bicycles on South Main Street from Center Street to Gem Drive and non-infrastructure spending to educate and encourage participation.

And, the panel heard a proposal to erect a "fork in the road" landmark at the intersection of North Main Street and U.S. Highway 30 — the main entrance to the city.

The 12-foot tall fork, with its steel tines pointed upward, would get people talking, said Gary Foster.

"I just think it would be a draw for Kimberly," he told the council. "It would put us on the map."

He got the idea after seeing a similar landmark in Pasadena, Calif., on cable television.

Foster, a retired jet engine mechanic, is also a substitute shop instructor at Kimberly High School. He said it would be a great experience for students in welding and metal fabrication classes to make the fork.

The council took no action, but took the idea under advisement.

"That's what homeowners need to keep in mind," Clark said.

who had been staying in Wells' room due to a disciplinary matter, told Twin Falls law enforcement he'd found a small video camera inside a coffee packet on the bathroom counter. When he approached Wells about the camera, he said Wells stomped on it and began to break it apart with a pocket

Wells, 34, took a plea agreement in April dismissing the destruction charge and requiring him to be placed on five years of probation and complete sex offender treatment.

Steve Hill, the father of one of the girls Wells attempted to record showering, made a statement prior to sentencing.

"You have betrayed our trust and respect," he said, adding Wells had been put in a position of helping youth and being a mentor. "It seems all too clear now what your true motivation was. How dare you put my family and yours through this."

Wells also made a statement: "I'm truly very sorry for all the hurt, pain and confusion this has caused."

Wells' attorney Brian Thie argued against a request from Evans that his client be jailed for 90 days, stating the former high school teacher has no criminal record and 14 letters from community members supporting him. The results of a psychosexual evaluation, he said, showed Wells was not a physical threat to the public.

deputy prosecutor Michelle

Evans said Wells' statements differed between his presentencing and evaluation, adding he had admitted to secretly videotaping an adult woman in the past and shows a reluctance toward treatment. She said he appears to have been trying to minimize what he did and his

responsibility for his crime. "It has divided this com-

munity," she said of the Castleford-Buhl area. "Those who don't think he did anything and those who know he did."

Stegner also sentenced Wells on Monday to 100 hours of community service and stated the 45 days in the Latah County Jail should be used to reflect on his actions.

"I don't think I've ever sentenced anyone who was both a salutatorian and an Eagle Scout," Stegner said. "I can't help but think about the valuable faith that has been shattered and nothing and no one can put it back together."

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Luna Defends **Students Comes First**

TWIN FALLS Even though 92 percent of Idaho's high school students

graduate, many don't continue their education.

Only about 46 percent end up going to college, Idaho public schools chief Tom Luna said Wednesday. And some students need remediation once they get

"The understanding is something needed to change," he said.

During Luna's presentation at a Twin Falls Rotary Club meeting, he said both academic and fiscal reasons played a role in the state's education reform laws known as Students Come First.

In 2011, the Gem State was among about 30 states that passed education reform. And about six states passed laws in 2012.

Idaho's reform laws include changes such as merit pay for educators, ending teacher tenure, incorporating more technology into classrooms and changes to school districts' collective bargaining process with teachers unions.

Students Come First, Luna said, allows for higher academic standards for students in the midst of fewer financial resources.

Not everyone agrees. Opponents of the laws gathered enough signatures to get Students Come First on the November ballot for possible repeal.

Luna told Rotary Club members that the reform was necessary to prepare students to compete on a more global scale once they graduate from high school.

One push, he said, is to make sure students - particularly those in rural areas - have the same access to resources as students at larger schools.

Luna said every Idaho high school is connected to the Idaho Education Network, an effort that took three years and cost \$42 million.

The IEN allows students to communicate with other high school teachers, Luna said, as well as instructors from Idaho's colleges and universities. It also allows teachers to use virtual content in their classrooms.

Starting in 2013, onethird of high school students at a time will also have access to a mobile device - likely, a laptop computer. And high school teachers and principals will receive devices this fall.

Local school boards will each come up with policies for how students use the devices and whether they can take them home.

Even though there's a push toward more technology, Luna said more money under Students Come First will go toward merit pay for teachers.

It's critical, he said, for students to have effective teachers every year.

Luna said the state's old system of education didn't provide good opportunities to reward quality teachers or deal with those who were ineffective.

The state will distribute \$40 million in bonuses for teachers and school administrators in the fall.

"Teachers are the solution to the challenges we face in education, not the problem," Luna said.

"I got up hollering and rejoicing and praising God."

Michigan prison inmate **Henry Hill,** who spent the past 32 years in prison for his connection to a killing when he was 16 years old, reacts to a Supreme Court ruling that bans states from imposing mandatory life sentences on juveniles. The decision offers an unexpected chance at edom to more than 2,000 inmates, such as Hill, who had almost no hope they would ever get out

Robed Politicians

n the eve of the Supreme Court's much anticipated ruling on Obamacare, here is a simple test for detecting the politics behind a decision: When reading the rulings, look for the double standards and answers to questions not posed by the cases themselves.

By those measures, the Supreme Court's record in the past week fairly reeks of the justices' politics.

Exhibit A is Justice Samuel Alito's majority opinion in Knox v. Service **Employees International** Union, Local 1000, in which nonunion California state employees whose wages and benefits were nonetheless set through the collective bargaining process of SEIU - the state's largest union sued the local to get back a special dues assessment it levied in 2005 to fight two ballot measures. The union's normal practice was to allow nonmembers to opt out of paying the roughly 44 percent of dues that went to matters not directly related to collective bargaining, such as election campaigns. In this instance, however, no such opt-out was allowed.

The issue before the court was whether mandating the collection of the special assessment from nonmembers violated their constitutional rights to free speech. Alito and the four other conservative justices ruled that it did, and liberal Justices Sonia Sotomayor and Ruth Bader Ginsburg agreed in a concurring opinion. But Alito's opinion didn't stop there. It also changed the long-standing practice of allowing nonmembers to opt out of paying dues toward union functions outside collective bargaining, mandating instead that the unions "may not exact any funds from nonmembers without their affirmative consent." In other words, unions would have to ask for nonmembers' permission to collect political assessments and, possibly, any dues at all. "Individuals should not be compelled to subsidize private groups or private speech," Alito wrote.

Alito's ruling struck at the heart of American unionism. By laying the groundwork for creating a right for nonmembers to avoid dues payments, he came close to nationalizing the right-to-work laws that 23 states have adopted (though 27 have not). As Sotomayor noted in a somewhat astonished dissent (Ginsburg and Justices Stephen Breyer and Elena Kagan dissented on this point as well), this wasn't the question before the court. Neither side had argued that issue in their briefs or oral presentations. "The majority announces its novel rule,"



Sotomayor wrote, "without any analysis of potential countervailing arguments." And it did so in defiance of the court's own Rule 14, which states that "only the questions set out in the petition or fairly included therein will be considered by the Court."

Taken in context with the conservative majority's other recent rulings, Alito's opinion also revealed the most class-based double standard the court has exhibited since before the New Deal. In the 2010 case Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission rendered by the same five justices who signed onto Alito's ruling in Knox the court ruled that corporations could directly spend their resources on political campaigns. These two decisions mean that a person who goes to work for the unionized Acme Widget Company can refuse to pay for the union's intervention in political campaigns but has no recourse to reclaim the value of his labor that Acme reaps and opts to spend on political campaigns. Citizens United created a legal parity between companies and unions - both are free to dip into their treasuries for political activities but Knox creates a legal disparity between them: a worker's free-speech right entitles him to withhold funds from union campaign and lobbying activities, but not the value of his work from the company's similar endeavors.

double standards, however, is not Alito but Antonin Scalia. Dissenting from this week's decision striking down major provisions in Arizona's anti-immigrant law, he argued that Arizona has the sovereign rights of a nation in protecting its borders – a right he gleans through such a bizarre reading of the Constitution that not one of his fellow conservatives signed on to his dissent. Yet the same day, Scalia signed on to a Gang of Five decision declining to hear Montana's case that its century-old law banning corporate contributions to political campaigns should take precedence over Citizens United. In the world according to Nino, Arizona has the rights of a nation-state, but Montana must submit to the Gang of Five. You're sovereign when Scalia agrees with you; you're nothing when he doesn't.

Our Evolving Social Thoughts

"Even if it could be demonstrated unequivocally that [public flogging and hand branding] were not cruel and unusual measures in 1791 ... I doubt whether any federal judge - even among the many who consider themselves originalists - would sustain them against an Eighth Amendment challenge."

— Justice Antonin Scalia

n the 1790s, a Tennessee man convicted of horse theft got off easy. Instead of being hanged, as horse thieves often were, he was sentenced to "stand in the pillory one hour, receive thirty-nine lashes upon his bareback well laid on, have his ears nailed to the pillory and cut off, and that he should be branded upon one cheek with the letter H and on the other with the letter T, in a plain and visible manner." Tennessee could not do that today because of what the Supreme Court has called "the evolving standards of decency that mark the progress of a maturing society."

The Eighth Amendment, ratified in 1791, forbids "cruel and unusual punishments." Originalism holds that the Constitution's language should be construed to mean what the words meant at the time to those who wrote and ratified the Constitution. On Monday, a



Supreme Court ruling about punishment vexed the four justices (John Roberts, Scalia, Clarence Thomas and Sam Alito) most sympathetic to originalism, who dissented. The majority held that sentencing laws that mandate life imprisonment

without possibility of parole for juvenile homicide offenders violate the Eighth Amendment. In 1999, Kuntrell Jackson, 14, and two others, 14 and 15,

robbed a video store in Blytheville, Ark. The 15year-old fatally shot the store clerk. Jackson, who had a juvenile arrest record, was tried as an adult for aggravated robbery and felony capital murder. He was sentenced to life without a possibility of parole.

By 2002, Evan Miller, 14, a victim of serious domestic abuse, had tried to kill himself five times. He and another youth, after drinking and smoking marijuana with a 52-year-old man whose trailer was next door to the Millers' in Lawrence County, Ala., tried to rob him while he slept. He awoke, they beat him with a baseball bat, set fire to his trailer and he burned to death. Miller was sentenced to life without a

possibility of parole.

Because of their offenses, both Jackson and Miller were automatically tried as adults. Both were sentenced under mandatory sentencing laws.

On Monday, Justice Elena Kagan, joined by Anthony Kennedy, Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Stephen Breyer and Sonia Sotomayor, held that the Eighth Amendment prohibits such sentences when they are mandatory. Previously, the court had held that, regarding children, such sentences are akin to the death penalty, which the court said requires individuation - consideration by sentencing authorities of each defendant's characteristics and crime.

This ruling extends two others, one holding that the Eighth Amendment bars capital punishment for children under 18, the other that it bars life without parole for a juvenile convicted of a non-homicide offense. These decisions held that regarding culpability, and hence sentencing, children are constitutionally unlike adults. The decisions came in the context of accumulating scientific evidence about increased impulsivity and diminished responsibility because of adolescent brain development.

Joined by Scalia, Thomas and Alito, Roberts noted that the majority conceded that almost 2,500 persons are serving life sentences with-

out parole for murders committed before age 18, and that more than 2,000 of these sentences were mandated by law. Therefore such sentences are not unusual. Hence they are not cruel and unusual. Furthermore, the court discerns society's standards - evolving or not - largely in its laws and practices, and the sentences the court overturned Monday are mandated in a majority (29) of states.

Alito wrote: "Is it true that our society is inexorably evolving in the direction of greater and greater decency? Who says so, and how did this particular philosophy of history find its way into our fundamental law?" Besides, he said, aren't elected representatives better than judges at gauging society's standards?

The dissenters were right that a practice can be both constitutional and reprehensible. Even if sentencing 14-year-olds to die in prison is the latter - and it is whether it is the former depends largely on the infrequency of such sentences. It is, however, to be hoped that the case the court decided Monday might prompt changes in social thinking that will give other cruel punishments, such as protracted solitary confinement, the infrequency requisite for making them sufficiently unusual as to be unconstitutional.

North Idaho Residents Deal with Record Rain, Flooding

BONNER'S FERRY (AP) • A month of record rain across northern Idaho is starting to take a toll, with soggy roads washing out and rising rivers that in some stretches are posing flooding challenges for residents.

In the Panhandle town of Bonner's Ferry, steady rains and high flows in the Kootenai River have created a deep pool in the front yard of at least one resident's home. This week, an aluminum fishing boat provided by friends and neighbors allowed Alicia Tatum to get from the front door of her mobile home to the driveway where her car is parked.

So far in June, Coeur d'Alene has received 5.5 inches of rain, topping the previous mark of 5.09 inches set in 1947. Normal June rainfall in and around the city is 1.9 inches.

About 75 miles north, in Bonner's Ferry, rainfall for June is reported at 4.93 inches, surpassing the mark of 3.96 set in June 1981.

The Kootenai River, which flows from Montana across northern Idaho, has yet to

Another storm Tuesday dumped more than an inch of rain in the Kootenai River basin, pushing the river slightly above flood stage.

Operations at Libby Dam upstream have been aimed at reducing the flood risk for both the U.S. and Canadian portions of the Kootenai basin, according to officials from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

However, officials said they were continuing to release some water through the dam to maintain space in the reservoir behind it. The reservoir has been rising by as much as 18 inches per day over the past week. By Saturday, it could be within I foot of full pool.

Judge Says U.S. Wrongly Held Idaho Man

BOISE • A federal magistrate says the United States falsely imprisoned a former Idaho man under a law designed to ensure that key witnesses show up for trial, and a jury should decide if the government has misused that law in the wake of the 9/11 terrorist attacks.

The ruling from U.S. Magistrate Mikel Williams in Boise still must be signed by U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge before it may go into effect, and it's possible that attorneys with the Department of Justice will appeal, ask Lodge not to sign or simply reach a settlement with Abdullah al-Kidd.

The Wichita, Kansas resident and former University of Idaho football star sued the government in 2003 after he was arrested and held as a material witness in a terrorism-related criminal case against another man.

"This case marks the first ruling against the government on the merits in a post 9-11 material witness case," al-Kidd's attorney, Lee Gelernt with the ACLU, said Wednesday. "The stakes are now very high because a jury will be asked to decide if the government engaged in preventative detention — a practice that Congress has never authorized in the history of this country."

Al-Kidd, a U.S. citizen, sued former Attorney General John Ashcroft and other federal officials in 2005, contending that his arrest two years earlier was just a ruse to give the government time to investigate him for any potential wrongdoing. He said he was imprisoned for 16 days, repeatedly strip searched and at times left naked in a jail cell. He was never actually called to testify in the trial against fellow University of Idaho student Sami

Omar al-Hussayen.
Al-Kidd, who changed his name from Lavoni T. Kidd after he converted to Islam as an adult, said he had always cooperated with investigators who questioned him about al-Hussayen. Al-Kidd also contended that he was never told he must remain in the country, nor was he told that he might be asked to testify at al-Hussayen's trial.

He was in the Dulles Airport in Virginia about to fly to Saudi Arabia to study when federal agents arrested him on March 16, 2003.

Former FBI agent Mike Gneckow and agent Scott Mace had obtained an arrest warrant from Williams after telling the magistrate judge that al-Kidd had a one-way, first-class ticket to Saudi Arabia, had received more than \$20,000 in payments from al-Hussayen, and that he was needed to testify about information that was crucial in the trial against al-Hussayen. The affidavit prepared by Gneckow to justify the arrest warrant didn't include the fact that al-Kidd was a U.S. citizen, that he had a wife, son and extended family members living in the United States and that he had always cooperated with FBI agents in the past.

In fact, al-Kidd's plane ticket was coach and was roundtrip, though the return date had not yet been set, and the "payments" were a salary for work al-Kidd had done for al-Hussayen's company.

Williams said Gneckow's failure to check the facts and decision not to include the information about al-Kidd's citizenship and family ties were reckless, and that the affidavit essentially duped the court into

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issuing the warrant. Williams said Gneckow could be held personally liable for his actions.

U.S. Department of Justice spokesman Charles Miller said the agency had no comment on the case.

Last year, the U.S. Supreme Court threw out al-Kidd's claims against former Attorney General John Ashcroft, finding that Ashcroft couldn't be personally sued over his role in the arrest. But four justices said the case raised serious questions about post-9/11 detentions under the material witness statute.

Williams echoed that sentiment in his ruling, citing the facts surrounding al-Kidd's arrest and the fact that shortly after, FBI Director Robert Mueller testified before Congress that al-Kidd's arrest was a "major success" in the government's anti-terrorism efforts.

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

Wildfire Victims Crowd Shelters as Fight Continues

COLORADO SPRINGS, **Colo.** • Fire crews fought to save the U.S. Air Force Academy and residents begged for information on the fate of their homes Wednesday after a night of terror sent thousands of people fleeing a raging Colorado

Springs wildfire.

More than 30,000 people frantically packed up belongings Tuesday night after the Waldo Canyon Fire barreled into neighborhoods in the foothills west and north of Colorado's second-largest city. With flames looming overhead, they clogged roads shrouded in smoke and flying embers, their fear punc-

tuated by explosions of bright orange flame that signaled yet another house had been claimed.

"The sky was red, the wind was blowing really fast and there were embers falling from the sky;' said Simone Covey, a 26-year-old mother of three who fled an apartment near Garden of the Gods park and was staying at a shelter. "I didn't really have time to think about it. I was just trying to keep my kids calm?"

Wilma Juachon sat under a tree at an evacuation center, wearing a mask to block the smoke. A tourist from California, she was evacuated from a fire near Rocky Mountain National Park last

FDA Clears First New Weight-loss Pill in 13 Years

The Food and Drug Administration has approved Belviq, the first new prescription drug for long-term weight loss to enter the U.S. market in over a decade.

WASHINGTON • The Food and Drug Administration has approved Arena Pharmaceutical's anti-obesity pill Belviq, the first new prescription drug for long-term weight loss to enter the U.S. market

in over a decade. Despite only achieving modest weight loss in clinical studies, the drug appeared safe enough to win the FDA's endorsement, amid calls from doctors for new weightloss treatments.

The agency cleared the pill Wednesday for adults who are obese or are overweight with at least one medical complication, such as diabetes or high cholesterol. The drug should be used in combination with a healthy diet and exercise.

Obesity Society President Patrick O'Neil said he's encouraged by the drug's approval because it underscores the notion that lifestyle changes alone are not enough to treat obesity.

"This is good news because it tells us that the FDA is indeed treating obesity seriously," said O'Neil, who teaches at Medical University of South Carolina and was the lead researcher on several studies of Belviq. "On the other hand, it's not the answer to the problem - or even a big part of the answer."

Even if the effects of Belviq are subtle, experts say it could be an important first step in developing new treatments that attack the underlying causes of obesity.

"The way these things tend to work is you have some people who do extremely well and other people don't lose any weight at all. But if we had 10 medicines that were all different and worked like this, we would have a real field," said Dr. Louis Aronne, director of the weight loss program at Weill-Cornell Medical College.

Lawmakers Reach Compromise on Roads, Student Loans

WASHINGTON (AP) • Facing weekend deadlines for action, congressional leaders have agreed to deals overhauling the nation's transportation programs without a Republican provision forcing approval of the proposed Keystone XL oil pipeline, and avoiding a doubling of interest rates for new student loans, congressional officials said Wednesday.

The agreements underscored the pressures both parties face to avoid angering voters and facing embarrassing headlines in the run-up to this November's presidential and congressional elections. Letting road-building programs grind to a halt during an economic downturn would be a blow to the image of lawmakers, while Democrats and Republicans alike seemed eager to avoid enraging millions of students and their parents by boosting the costs of

college loans. In contrast, enactment of the transportation measure would create or save 3 million jobs, said Sen. Barbara Boxer, D-Calif., chief sponsor of the Senate version of the bill. And the student loan measure would spare an estimated 7.4 million students who get subsidized Stafford loans beginning July 1 - this Sunday - from facing \$1,000 in higher interest costs over the lives of their loans, which typically take over a decade to repay.

House Moving ahead with **Plans for Contempt Vote**

WASHINGTON • The Obama administration and House Republicans refused to find a middle ground in a dispute over documents related to a botched gun-tracking operation, and the GOP plunged ahead with plans for precedent-setting votes Thursday to hold Attorney General Eric Holder in civil and criminal contempt of Congress.

The votes are expected hours after the Supreme Court will capture the nation's attention with its ruling on the legality of President Barack Obama's health care law. Even without that diversion, the contempt issue throws both parties temporarily offtrack in their efforts to focus on the economy in an election year.

There's little question that Republicans will get the votes they need, not only from their own majority but from Democrats aligned with the National Rifle Association - which has said it's keeping score. The NRA has said it believes the administration was using the flawed Operation Fast and Furious to make the case for more gun control.

Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., the longest serving House member and normally an NRA supporter, said Wednesday he would not back the contempt resolutions but instead wants the Oversight and Government Reform Committee to conduct a more thorough investigation.

The criminal contempt resolution would send the matter to the U.S. attorney for the District of Columbia, who is under Holder. The civil contempt resolution would allow the House to go to court in an effort to force Holder to turn over documents the Oversight committee wants. In past cases, courts have been reluctant to settle disputes between the executive and legislative branches of government.

The House is unlikely to get the documents anytime soon, because President Barack Obama has invoked a broad form of executive privilege, which protects from disclosure internal documents in executive branch agencies.

Syria Violence Escalates as **U.S. Seeks Turning Point**

Gunmen raided the headquarters of a pro-government Syrian TV station early Wednesday, demolishing the building and killing several employees, the state media reported.

BEIRUT • Gunmen attacked a progovernment TV station Wednesday

near the Syrian capital, killing seven employees in the latest barrage of violence as world powers prepared for a high-level meeting that the U.S. hopes will be a turning point in the crisis.

Invitations to Saturday's gathering in Geneva were sent by special envoy

Kofi Annan to the five permanent members of the U.N. Security Council · including Syrian allies Russia and China – but not to major regional players Iran and Saudi Arabia. The absence of those two countries,

as well as the lack of any appetite for international military intervention, could make it difficult for the group to find the leverage to end the bloodshed in Syria. An effort by Annan to broker Please see SYRIA, N2

week and, now, from her Colorado Springs hotel.

"I said I hope it never happens again, and guess what?" Juachon said.

Meanwhile, the White House said President Barack Obama will tour the firestricken area on Friday and thank firefighters battling some of the worst fires to hit the American West in decades.

The full scope of the 24square-mile fire, which doubled in size overnight, remained unknown. So intense were the flames and so thick the smoke that rescue workers weren't able to tell residents which structures were destroyed and which ones were still standing. Steve Cox, a spokesman for Mayor Steve Bach, reported that at least dozens of homes had been consumed, though he had no more precise figure.

Indeed, authorities were too busy Wednesday struggling to save homes in nearzero visibility to count how many had been destroyed in what is the latest test for a drought-parched and tinder-dry state. Crews also were battling a deadly and destructive wildfire in northern Colorado and another that flared Tuesday night near Boulder.

Colorado Springs Fire Chief Rich Brown insisted his personnel heroically saved many homes in the midst of the firestorm. The strategy: protecting houses adjacent to those in flames to prevent a domino effect and then racing to the next suburban hot spot, a technique he called "triage?"

"The radiant heat from home to home, or infra-

structure, or trees, is unbelievable. You add in 60 mph gusts of wind — it's unbelievable conditions," Brown told The Associated Press. Firefighters, he said, "responded exactly like they're trained – as professionals, safely, yet aggressively."

The Waldo Canyon Fire burned about 10 acres along the southwest boundary of the Air Force Academy campus. No injuries or damage to structures — including the iconic Cadet Chapel - were reported. With 90 firefighters battling the flames, Academy Superintendent Lt. Gen. Michael Gould insisted that 1,500 cadets taking summer classes and more than 1,000 freshmen arriving Thursday will be safe - with campus ceremonies or housing to be moved away from the firehit area or off-campus if needed.

The Red Cross struggled to accommodate victims at its shelters, with space enough for perhaps 2,500 people. Most evacuees were staying with family and

Expected thunderstorms could produce the blessing of much-needed rain — but more curses as well, such as high, gusty winds and lightning strikes that have triggered several blazes this year

Colorado wasn't the only state affected by fire, as several burned throughout the parched West.

Tom Harbour, director of fire and aviation management for the U.S. Forest Service, said that with several fires burning, there is competition for firefighting resources, but "we're still at a point where we've got lots of available assets to mix and match on individual incidents."

Texas Man Gets 40 Years in Stand-your-ground Case

HOUSTON (AP) • A man who claimed Texas' version of a stand-your-ground law allowed him to fatally shoot a neighbor after an argument about a noisy party was sentenced Wednesday to 40 years for murder.

Raul Rodriguez, 46, had faced up to life in prison for the 2010 killing of Kelly Danaher.

Rodriguez, a retired Houston-area firefighter, was angry about the noise coming from a birthday party at his neighbor's home. He went over and got into an argument with 36-year-old elementary school teacher Danaher and two other men at the party.

In a 22-minute video he recorded on the night of the shooting, Rodriguez can be heard telling a police dispatcher "my life is in danger now" and "these people are going to go try and kill me." He then said, "I'm standing my ground here," and fatally shot Danaher and wounded the other two men.

Rodriguez's reference to standing his ground is similar

to the claim made by George Zimmerman, a neighborhood watch volunteer who is citing Florida's stand-your-ground law in his defense in the fatal February shooting of an unarmed teenager, Trayvon Martin. Rodriguez's case, however, was decided under a different kind of self-defense doctrine.

Praying for the Fallen

Rare Stolen Swedish Atlas Recovered at NYC Gallery

NEW YORK (AP) • A rare atlas stolen a decade ago from the Royal Library of Sweden by one of its chief librarians was recovered in New York and given back to its rightful owner.

Swedish and U.S. authorities showed off the 415-yearold Wytfliet Atlas at a news conference Wednesday. The book, created by Cornelius van Wytfliet and containing the earliest maps of the Americas, had been in the Royal Library collection for more than 300 years before it was stolen. There are only eight other copies worldwide, according to the library.

The atlas was one of 56 rare books stolen by Anders Burius, the chief of the Royal Library's manuscript department, and the first of his haul to be located.

Burius stole the books between 1995 and 2004, nearly the entire time of his employment there, and later committed suicide, said Steven Feldman of the New York firm of Herrick, Feinstein LLP, representing the library.

Burius confessed after learning that the library was undertaking an inventory due to suspicions of theft. He was arrested in 2004 and during temporary release from custody, he slit his wrists and cut a gas line to his kitchen stove, sparking an explosion in his Stockholm neighborhood that resulted in about a dozen injuries.

The 1597 book "has been available to the kings and queens of Sweden," said Greger Bergvall, the library's map librarian. "It's important because it's the only copy of

the Wytfliet Atlas in Sweden." The atlas contains 19 maps, including the first printed map of what was then considered California, correctly depicting a peninsula, Bergvall said. Other ancient maps, he said, portrayed California as an island.

Stowaways Suspected in **Container Ship** Docked in N.J.

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) • Dock workers rushed to unload stacked containers from a cargo ship that arrived in New Jersey from the Middle East on Wednesday after a Coast Guard inspection team heard knocking for about two hours that suggested stowaways might be inside one of the boxes.

More than a dozen ambulances and law enforcement officials met the 850foot Ville D'Aquarius when it docked early Wednesday at Port Newark, one of the nation's busiest ports. Large mechanical cranes began unloading containers from the ship.

By midday Wednesday, all but one ambulance had quietly left the pier. Coast Guard spokesman Charles Rowe said officials have inspected 80 of the 200 containers authorities believe could be carrying people. The ship has 2,000 containers altogether.

The Coast Guard team had boarded the ship outside New York Harbor early Wednesday as the ship prepared to dock, Rowe

Contempt

In nearly three hours of arguments before the House Committee on Rules Wednesday, Republicans and Democrats squared off with oft-repeated arguments that have turned a major constitutional issue into a political food fight.

Rep. Darrell Issa, R-Calif., and chairman of the Oversight panel, told the Rules Committee that the documents sought were essential to learn who in the administration produced a February, 2011 letter denying that Operation Fast and Furious allowed guns to "walk" from Arizona to Mexico. a peace plan failed earlier this year.

Diplomatic hopes have rested on Russia — Syria's most important ally and protector – agreeing on a transition plan that would end the Assad family dynasty, which has ruled Syria for more than four decades. But Moscow has rejected efforts by outside forces to end the conflict or any plan to force regime change in Damascus.

The United Nations said Wednesday that the conflict, which began in March 2011 as part of the Arab Spring that swept aside entrenched leaders across the region, is descending into sectarian warfare.

President Bashar Assad has so far appeared largely impervious to world pressure and he has warned the international community from meddling in the crisis, which has seen a sharp escalation in violence in recent months. He said this week that his country is in "a genuine state of war," an increasingly common refrain from the Syrian leader.

Assad denies there is any popular will behind the uprising, which is in its 16th month, saying terrorists are driving a foreign conspiracy to destroy the country. Activists say more than 14,000 people have been killed in the violence.



NATIVE PLANT **PARADISE**

Isolated by lava fields, Carey Kipuka's vegetation gives a valuable benchmark to scientists — and a hiking destination to plant lovers.

CAREY • It's an Idaho

ecologist's heaven. Standing still, Steven Bekedam pointed out five native grasses thriving near his feet: bluebunch wheatgrass, Sandberg bluegrass, Junegrass, Idaho fescue and

Great Basin wildrye, the big clumps that send up flowering stalks 5 or 6 feet high. "It's so out of the ordinary to

see all of these grasses growing in the same place," said Danelle Nance, a natural resource specialist from the Bureau of Land Management's Shoshone Field Office.

But this place is extraordinary for good reason.

The 180-acre Carey Kipuka, largely overlooked by the public but fascinating to scientists, is a low island of volcanic soil and vegetation within a sea of much younger lava inside Craters of the Moon National Monument and Preserve. That rough, black landscape isolates the kipuka from some wildlife, most casual explorers and all domestic livestock grazing.

The result: a minimally disturbed sagebrush community where native plants thrive. It's not completely pristine, Nance said, but "a snapshot of what it could have been back in the day."

Yes, it's a subtle pleasure -

one best appreciated by those who've spent their springs cataloguing native bloom sightings, or bemoaned the West's cheatgrass invasion, or rejoiced at discovering littleknown features of the Idaho wilderness.

And you'll have to get there on foot, across almost a mile of jagged rock.

A Benchmark for Science

Even with a map, Carey Kipuka isn't easy to find.

Nance and Bekedam, a National Park Service vegetation ecologist at Craters of the Moon, led two other public employees and two journalists across the lava June 11, pointing out brave syringa or fernbush plants that grow among the hot rocks.

"The state flower finds the lava flows particularly appealing, finds the little cracks," Bekedam said, while sipped water and stretched tired ankles beside a syringa.

Craters of the Moon lavas surround 550 known kipukas, ranging from a tenth of an acre to the 90,000-acre Laidlaw Park. That count grew dramatically recent years as aerial imagery improved, Bekedam said. Perhaps a third of the kipukas — the smallest and most remote - have never been visited.

So why single out Carey Kipuka?

Lava

Not lava

It's large enough to be a base for ecological comparisons by scientists trying to determine what "intact" means. It's relatively accessible. And its size allows significant variability within its

plant communities. Scientists' use of Carey Kipuka stretches back to the 1950s - when University of Idaho researchers found a faint Indian trail over the lava - and a 1962 presidential order added the kipuka and adjacent lavas to the Craters monument, putting the kipuka under National Park Service management. Carey Kipuka was designated as wilderness in the 1960s and as a "research natural area" in 1992. In 2000, President Bill Clinton's proclamation enlarging the national monument's boundaries cited the value of its kipukas.

"... these kipukas represent some of the last nearly pristine and undisturbed vegetation in the Snake River Plain, including 700-yearold juniper trees and relict stands of sagebrush that are essential habitat for sensitive sage grouse populations," Proclamation 7373 says.

"These tracts of relict vegetation are remarkable benchmarks that aid in the scientific study of changes to vegetative communities from recent human activity as well as the role of natural fire in the sagebrush steppe ecosystem."

But change arrives even on Carey Kipuka.

Cheatgrass, perhaps seeded by the wind, is getting a foothold. And scientists are investigating whether climate change and the deposition of airborne nitrogen have a role, Bekedam said. A

preliminary explanation: The area's native plants are adapted to a low-nitrogen environment and may be less able to compete when agricultural production and other factors add nitrogen.

Three Island Crossing State Park

GLENNS FERRY • Have a hankering to escape city life for a day? Glenns Ferry has the answer: Three Island Crossing State Park.

About an hour's drive northwest of Twin Falls, the park is a great place to fish the Snake River, relax under thick trees or learn something about Oregon Trail and Native American history.

The park is open all year but is most popular in summer, said Katherine Pruett, office manager of the park's Oregon Trail History and Education Center. The park is popular for couples and families, because there's plenty to keep them busy on day

trips or overnight campouts. "It's one of my favorite

parks," said Boise resident Dara Mosca, at the park June 21. She enjoys the fishing and said it's a

posts mark a 100-meter transect where the National Park Service counts and measures the vegetation at every meter every four years.

"The idea there is getting a sense of long-term vegetation change," Bekedam said.

The 2012 travel map for Craters of the Moon shows and names Carey Kipuka.

"So I'm sure it will get more attention than it used to," said Holly Hampton, acting field manager for the BLM in Shoshone.

But hikers and scientists will always have to tackle that rough lava to reach Carey Kipuka.

"We're never going to develop this," Bekedam said as we perched on the kipuka's rocks or crouched in the scanty shade of sagebrush to eat our lunches. That difficulty of access is, after all, exactly the point.

A Delight for Plant Lovers

Somehow, however, a rush skeletonweed made the trip. The aggressively invasive plant, designated by the state as a noxious weed, brought Bekedam up short.

"This plant is probably the worst plant in southern Idaho right now," he said, marking the location in his

Flower Guide

To make the most of your hike to Carey Kipuka, spend a little time first learning about some of the native plants you might spot. Here's a good way to get started online: On Craters of the Moon's park website (www.nps.gov/crmo), find the "what's blooming" section in the lower right corner and click the "read more" link. That leads to a printable 20-page photo guide with about 65 of the area's most common wildflowers and trees.

"We are in the process of developing a wildflower app for the park but don't expect that to be available for free download until sometime in 2013," said Steven Bekedam, vegetation ecologist at Craters of the Moon.

GPS unit while Nance dug out the

Rush skeletonweed is mostly stems. It's hard to kill because it has almost no leaves for a spray to adhere to, Nance said.

And its discovery on Carey Kipuka — a high-priority spot for the National Park Service's weed crew - will trigger return trips to scour the area for more rush skeletonweed.

But the rest of our hike on the

kipuka was filled with rewards like the blooms of penstemon and edible wild onion; the impressive basin big sagebrush, here reaching 6 or 7 feet tall; or the currant, surprisingly ubiquitous here because it finds enough moisture in the

"It's pretty amazing what can hold on in these rocks," Nance said. Carrying along a field guide to native plants can make a hike to Carey Kipuka particularly fascinating. And here, 10 steps can take a hiker into another vegetation gra-

"Gosh," Nance said, "everything's happy out here."

Carey Kipuka is a short but challenging destination for hikers. The reward: Thriving native vegetation on an island protected from most disturbance by the sea of lava around it.

What You'll Need

A high-clearance vehicle. Strong hiking shoes. Plenty of water to carry on the hike. Sun protection. And extreme caution: You'll be in a remote area where your cell phone probably won't work and rescuers would have difficulty reaching you.

Finding the Trailhead

From Carey, drive 4.4 miles east on U.S. Highway 20. Turn right on the gravel Laidlaw Park Road. After 1.9 miles, the road will fork at a kiosk; turn right. Soon after, the road will enter lava fields, later broken by two large kipukas dubbed Paddelford Flat and Little Park.

Twelve miles from the kiosk, you'll leave the lava again to enter a third - and much larger kipuka named Laidlaw Park. After another 1.9 miles, turn left at a sign directing drivers toward Snowdrift Crater.

But you're not going to the crater; instead, immediately turn left again at the sign for the poetically named Piss Ant Butte. The road will immediately fork again; this time, turn right onto a dirt track and continue north. You'll pass Big Blowout Butte on your right. At 3.8 miles past the Snowdrift Crater sign (or 24 miles from Carey), you'll arrive at a "road closed" sign posted in the middle of the dirt track. Park there, without

driving off the track.

Driving Cautions

The gravel Laidlaw Park Road is in good condition. But the dirt track to the Carey Kipuka trailhead is not suitable for low-clearance vehicles. Even if you have four-wheel drive, take precautions to prevent starting a fire: Stay on the track, check periodically to see whether the vehicle's undercarriage is collecting vegetation, and carry a shovel and fire extinguisher.

Cross-country travel is not allowed in this area.

The Hike

Beyond the "road closed" sign where you'll park, the former road has been reclaimed (roughened) to discourage illegal driving and speed vegetation recovery. But it's still a fine trail for beginning your hike. That trail will lead you to a rail fence bearing a "Carey Kipuka trailhead" sign; climb over (it's easy) or through the fence. Don't worry: The fence isn't meant to keep you out.

Watch carefully along the left side of the dirt trail for a big cairn that alone marks the beginning of a trail through the lava. The cairn is 0.65 miles from your parked vehicle, so GPS will come in handy here.

The 0.85-mile foot trail over the lava consists of black rocks slightly smaller than their black neighbors, and it's marked by periodic cairns. But the trail can be hard to spot and easy to lose as it zigzags. So stay alert as you navigate; hiking across extremely rough, black lava without a trail is dangerous and disorienting.

Carey Kipuka

You'll hike toward a low rise of soil and plants — an island surrounded by lava. Where the trail arrives at the east-southeast side of Carev Kipuka, take particular note of the cairn there. When it's time to head back, you'll need to find the same spot again, to reconnect with that easy-to-miss trail over the lava.

Venus and Jupiter, Together Again

his spring was memorable for sky watchers thanks to the two brightest planets (Venus and Jupiter) in the evening sky, culminating when they passed within three degrees of one another on March 14.

Since then both planets have passed the sun and are now rising before dawn. Jupiter's apparent passage behind the sun on May 13 resulted from the swifter Earth moving to a point in its orbit opposite slow-moving Jupiter. Faster Venus didn't zip between Earth and the sun until June 5, and is now closing the gap with Jupiter. But a morning repeat of March's conjunction isn't in the cards.

Like the tortoise, Jupiter will win the race, plodding steadily westward at about



three quarters of a degree daily. Late-starting "hare" Venus was moving westward at twice that rate at the start of the month, but has been slowing ever since. It's not really stopping, of course: It's just an illusion as Venus turns to head toward the far side of the sun.

Since Venus won't overtake Jupiter, their rendezvous on July 1 doesn't qualify as a planetary conjunction. The general term for their near-miss (within less than five degrees of one another - the width of three fingers at arm's

length) is an "appulse." Making this celestial meet-up more attractive is the fact that it's happening in Taurus, directly above the Bull's brightest star, its red eye Aldebaran, and directly below the "Seven Sisters" star cluster, the Pleiades, in the Bull's shoulder. There will, no doubt, be some beautiful photos of the "non-conjunction" appearing on the Internet in about a week. What's at the education center?

The Oregon Trail History and Education Center is a museum and gift shop with a focus on Oregon Trail and Native American history. Life-size replicas of Indians, wigwams, cowboys and wagons are part of the exhibit. Your walk through the museum will trigger displays, and voices tell their

You can watch a short film about the Oregon Trail, Indian tribes and the important role that Three Island Crossing played in the 1800s journey.

"I think it's a nice exhibit," said John VanPeenen of Eugene, Ore., passing through Idaho on a road trip with his wife. They were drawn to the park because of its history.

"Of course," he said with a laugh, "I can't understand what some of them (voices imitating the exhibit's Indians) are saying because they're speaking Shoshone."

What's the history here?

Three Island Crossing, named for three islands in the Snake River at a point along the Oregon Trail, is best known for the famous river crossings. Emigrants on the Oregon Trail at first wondered how they'd cross the river. Local Indians showed them the shallowest route, basically island-hopping across the Snake.

Emigrants used the crossing until 1869, when Gus Glenn constructed a ferry about two miles upstream hence the name Glenns Ferry.

Something neat to see and use - in the museum: a telescope near a picture window overlooking the fields that lead to the Snake. Look through the scope to catch a better view of the park's three islands and the trail that led emigrants into the river.

How's the hiking?

The park offers more than two miles of family-friendly trails. Nothing strenuous

Pick up a map at the visitor center, and be sure to stay on the worn dirt trails. Walks along the Snake River offer views of the namesake islands.

Can I stay overnight?

Yes, you can. Bring your tent or camper, or rent one of the park's eight cabins.

Campground amenities include water, electricity, showers and restrooms. Cost to camp starts at \$22 a night. Reserve campsites at 888-922-6743.

Cabins, which fit up to five people, cost \$53 a night. "That includes tax," Pruett said.

If you haven't stayed in one, give a cabin a try. Nestled in the shade of thick trees, there's nothing quite like going to sleep to the sounds of leaves being pushed by the cool evening breezes. Then wake up to waterfowl on the Snake River, right outside your door. Cabins also have their own barbecue grills.

Fish and Game Officers Prepare for Wildlife Attacks

"While talking with a regional staff person recently at the regional office I overheard a discussion about something called WHART training. This sounds suspicious. What kind of training is this?"

WHART stands for Wildlife Human Attack Response Team.

You are correct, we sent two members of our region to a specialized training program in Montana, where they learned how to develop a team to aid local authorities investigate attacks on humans by wild animals.

In Idaho we have had only a couple of confrontations between humans and wild animals. To date, those involved a fatal grizzly bear attack along the Idaho/Montana border and a grizzly bear mauling in the Island Park area.

People in other parts of North America have not fared so well. We've all perhaps read about or watched reports on television about attacks by mountain lions, black bears and grizzly

As humans encroach in-



to wild areas the probability of encountering a large carnivore increases. In some areas, the attacks have resulted in injury or death. British Columbia, Canada, last year had 13 attacks on humans; two were

Many of the attacks can be traced back to inappropriate behavior by humans that cause large carnivores such as bears to become habituated to humans. Activities such as feeding, or lack of secure refuse containers, attract bears and put them into close proximity to humans. Bears with cubs that feel threatened or need to defend their food often will attack.

Once they have been habituated to people, bears searching for food become a threat to people and property. What used to be an occasional issue in backcountry campgrounds is now occurring frequently in residential areas. A

cow moose with a young calf along the Big Wood River, for instance, poses a serious threat to any hiker or angler.

In our opinion, it's not a question of if we have a wildlife attack on humans, but when. The species involved could vary from a grizzly or black bear to a mountain lion or moose.

The sheriff and coroner in the county where the incident occurs has statutory jurisdiction. In most cases, however, they have very little experience handling wildlife attacks. These situations are as variable as any other homicide except the wild animal often is still at large in the area where the attack occurred.

The WHART training our staff attended was taught by agency professionals from the U.S. and Canada that have experience investigating attacks on humans. Their experience includes investigative and forensic techniques such as evidence collection, crime scene photography, relationship building with non-wildlife staff such as coroners and traditional law enforcement.

Media relations also are a critical part of informing the public without creating hysteria.

The protocols include education of EMS professionals that may be called upon including paramedics, physicians and nursing staff from local hospitals.

Like many committees or groups working inside and outside of government, many are referred to by an acronym made up of the letters of the group.

WHART training certainly sounds suspicious, as you said, but I assure you a time will come when our wildlife professionals will be called upon to assist county officials in investigating an attack. It will be time and energy well spent to prepare our staff and conservation officers to assist local officials take the proper steps to resolve the

Google Sells Small Tablet, Challenges Kindle Fire

SAN FRANCISCO Google unveiled its attempt to catch up to Apple and Amazon in the growing market for tablet computers. It also provided a titillating glimpse at its vision of a digital future through the mind-boggling lens of In-

ternet-connected glasses. The debut of a long-anticipated tablet computer bearing Google's brand and equipped with its latest operating software kicked off an annual conference for about 6,000 computer program-

Although the tablet drew plenty of applause, the biggest crowd-pleasing moment came near the end of a nearly two-hour performance Wednesday when Google conjured a scene worthy of a "Mission Impossible" movie.

After Google co-founder Sergey Brin trotted on stage during the middle of a presentation, he cut away to a live video feed showing a group of skydivers the company hired to jump out of a blimp hovering about 7,000 feet above downtown San Francisco.

The skydivers were wearing a pair of Internet-connected glasses. That allowed the audience inside to see what the skydivers were seeing as they parachuted on to the roof of the building where the conference was being held.

The glasses are still a work in progress, although Google gave U.S. programmers attending the conference a chance to order a \$1,500 prototype that they can start experimenting with early next year.

Google-branded The tablet, called the Nexus 7,

will start shipping next month in a direct challenge to Amazon.com Inc.'s Kindle Fire. The tablet also could appeal to consumers looking for a less expensive, less sophisticated alternative to

Apple Inc.'s iPad. The Nexus 7 is designed specifically for Google Play, an online store that sells movies, music, books, apps and other content. That mirrors Amazon's strategy

with the Kindle Fire, although Amazon's strength in online retailing has seeded its store with a more extensive selection than Google Play. Amazon declined comment.

Facebook Stock Slides as **Underwriters Give Mixed Ratings**

NEW YORK • The Wall Street analysts who know Facebook best are giving the company's stock a mixed review. Think: like, not love.

A flood of analyst reports from 33 banks gave Facebook's stock a mix of "Neutral" and "Buy" ratings on Wednesday. And there was at least one review that equated to a "Sell" rating. It marked the end of the 40-day quiet

period following Facebook's initial pub-

lic offering. Analysts at banks that led the IPO were finally allowed to give public opinions on the stock, offering the first glimpse of what the IPO's underwriters really think about Facebook.

Facebook's much-ballyhooed IPO landed with a thud on May 18, with the stock closing just 23 cents above its \$38 IPO price. It hasn't fared much better since. On Wednesday, the stock fell 87 cents, or 2.6 percent, to close at \$32.23. That's 15 percent below the IPO price.

E.U.'s Changing Faces Raise **Doubts for Future**

BRUSSELS (AP) • Often these days, the first order of business at European Union summits isn't the continent's dreadful financial crisis.

It's getting to know the people around the table.

The group of leaders that will meet this week in Brussels is a much different crew from the one that met in October 2009, when the crisis in Europe first erupted with the news that Greece was in deep trouble.

Gone is the colorful and sometimes embarrassing Italian premier Silvio Berlusconi, replaced by the technocratic Mario Monti. Europe has said "au revoir" to hyperkinetic French President Nicolas Sarkozy and "bonjour" to the altogether more sedate Francois Hollande. The glower of Britain's Gordon Brown has given way the youthful countenance of David Cameron.

At this summit, leaders had been preparing to shake hands with new Greek Prime Minister Antonis Samaras - until emergency eye surgery forced him to send regrets.

The revolving door of European leaders raises the question of how Europe can implement bold and swift decisions when it's not even clear who'll be in charge a few months from now.

Barry Becher, of Ginsu Knives Fame, Dies at 71

LA CROSSE, Wyo. • Barry Becher, a marketing mastermind and infomercial pioneer best known for bringing Ginsu knives to the American public, has died. He was 71.

Becher had been suffering from kidney cancer and died Friday at a hospital of complications from surgery, his stepdaughter Stacy Paradise said Wednesday. He had lived in Parkland.

Though Becher brought many campaigns to the airwaves with his business partner Ed Valenti, they are forever linked with Ginsu, the ubiquitous knives shown slicing through tin cans and chipping a wood block.

Millions were sold from the commercial's debut in 1978 into the early 1980s, with audiences mesmerized by images of an exoticsounding knife that seemed able to cut through anything. The infomercial promised a 50-year guarantee and "much, much more."

Becher was born in Brooklyn. His father was a chemical engineer; his mother an opera singer. He left for Rhode Island after high school, passing broken-down cars on the highway. He figured he might be able to make a living in the auto business.

Becher was running two AAMCO franchises near Warwick, R.I., when he met Valenti, an account executive for a local television station who was handling the auto shops' advertising. They drove the same Datsun 240Z, had wives who were schoolmates, shared a passion for sales and became fast friends. They decided they wanted to find a product they could market through an extended TV commercial, the way some records were sold.

Becher found a mohair-bristled paint pad that prevented splatter and cut work times.

They were roundly rejected when they pitched the product to Madison Avenue firms and ultimately produced it themselves through a joint company initially run out of Becher's garage.

Their first two-minute commercial was on the air, and the Miracle Painter was born.

They sold more than a million units and repeated their winning formula with products others created, but the duo rechristened and popularized: Armourcote Cookware, the Miracle Slicer, Lusterware Silverware and Royal DuraSteel mixing bowls.

"We tried to find the most unique products in the world," Valenti said.

In the course of a decade, the men said they amassed more than \$500 million in sales. Armourcote was the most profitable, but Ginsu remains the most widely known, a household name across the U.S., and fodder for countless comedians.

Sam Craig, a marketing professor at New York University's Stern School of Business, said Ginsu stands apart from most other infomercial products because it was popular for so long and it had common sales methods that are used to this day.

Heat Wave: 1,000+ Records Fall in U.S. in a Week

Feeling hot? It's not a mirage. Across the United States, hundreds of heat records have fallen in the past week.

From the wildfire-consumed Rocky Mountains to the bacon-fried sidewalks of Oklahoma, the temperatures are creating consequences ranging from catastrophic to comical.

In the past week, 1,011 records have been broken around the country, including 251 new daily high temperature records on Tuesday.

Those numbers might seem big, but they're hard to put into context—the National Climatic Data Center has only been tracking the daily numbers broken for a little more than a year, said Derek Arndt, head of climate monitoring at the center.

Still, it's impressive, given that records usually aren't broken until the scorching months of July and August.

"Any time you're breaking all-time records in mid- to late-June, that's a healthy heat wave," Arndt said.

If forecasts hold, more records could fall in the coming days in the central and western parts of the country, places accustomed to sweating out the summer.

The current U.S. heat wave "is bad now by our current definition of bad," said University of Victoria climate scientist Andrew Weaver, but "our definition of bad changes. What we see now will be far more common in the years ahead."

No matter where you are, the objective is the same: stay cool.

Wildfires pack intense heat, but soaring temperatures and whipping winds are piling on the men and women battling the blazes raging across the Rocky Mountains.

U.S. Forest Service firefighter Owen Johnson had to work overnight to avoid the piping-hot daytime temperatures in the region, which toppled records in Colorado, Wyoming and Montana. On Tuesday, Colorado Springs reached 101 degrees, and Miles City in eastern Montana soared to 111 degrees, the highest ever recorded in that area.

A call came in after Johnson's regular shift Monday in the Helena National Forest in Montana. A wildfire was racing through the Scratchgravel Hills, threatening at least 200 homes. But firefighters had to wait to attack it until midnight, as the fire was too intense and the weather too hot and too dry.

On Tuesday morning, Johnson figured he had worked more than 24 hours, and probably wouldn't quit until the sun went down.

His sweaty hands gripping a banana and a cup of coffee, he gave a tired shrug when asked to compare this fire to others in his 13-year career.

"Every fire's different," he said. "They all pose their own risks and challenges."

It was 10:30 a.m., prime time for mule-drawn carriages to cart tourists through New Orleans' historic French Quarter.

But nary a carriage rumbled

down the streets — where it was already 97 degrees — because of a city ordinance.
"We have to take the mules in when it hits 95," tour guide

Robert Rotherham said

Wednesday, trying to coax his mule, Miss Pierre, to drink from a trough.

Stabling the carriages meant a glacial-paced day for drivers in a city where, absent special events, summer

tourism is traditionally slow.
Tim O'Brien and Lacy
Shanks of Kalispell, Mont,
were grateful they had caught
one of the early tours and glad
they didn't have to hoof it.
Their visit dovetailed with
record-setting temperatures:
Tuesday's 102 degrees toppled
a more than century-old

"It's killing me," O'Brien said.

mark, 99 in 1893.

On the treeless, windswept Kansas prairie, the searing mix of sun and triple-digit heat is a recipe for agricultural disaster.

Some residents have taken to praying for rain and cooler temperatures in this sparsely populated western part of the state. Menlo farmer Brian Baalman can testify to that.

"Everybody is just sick of it. They just wish we would get a good rain," he said. "It has become a point to pray for it at church on Sunday, for sure." Temperatures in the area

have hovered around 111 degrees or higher for the past four days, and nine cities in western Kansas broke records on Tuesday.

Only in the earliest morning hours do hardy farmers dart out to ensure their livestock's water troughs are filled and their irrigation wells are quenching parched crops. They quickly return to cooler locales.

Much of the fortunes in the

Much of the fortunes in the Menlo area are tied to corn crops, whose yields contribute not only to foodstuffs but also to ethanol-blended gasoline. But day after unyielding day of blazing sun and high heat have baked the top six inches of soil, and plant roots can break through to the moister soil below.

"It is getting to look ugly, the longer this keeps going on without a drink," Baalman said.



Playoff Dollars Could Spark Calls to Pay Players

NEW YORK • The new playoff system means big money for major college football, as much as a halfbillion dollars per year just in television rights alone.

That has Texas coach Mack Brown — among others — wondering if some of that windfall should be heading the players way.

"In my opinion, with the amount of money the playoff will generate, I hope we can revisit the studentathlete stipend," Brown tweeted

soon after the new, semifinal format was approved by university presidents Tuesday in Washington. "It will be a very lucrative event

and those young people are the ones that make it all possible," he

Even before the plan had a presi-

dential seal of approval, a group of former and current athletes was pushing for some of the newfound wealth to be spent on player safety and health — an issue that becomes more important as the season expands.

The current Bowl Championship Series television deal with ESPN, plus the Rose Bowl's separate agreement with ABC, pay the major college football schools about \$155 million per year. That money is distributed unevenly throughout college football, with power conferences such as the Big Ten and Big 12 getting more for their members than others such as the Mountain

West and Conference USA. The commissioners working on the playoff system have been reluctant to speculate on exactly how much the TV rights for it will be

WIMBLEDON, England • Roger Federer gave Prince Charles a bow, then gave Fabio Fognini a royal thumping.

With the Prince of Wales visiting Wimbledon for the first time since 1970, Federer was at his best Wednesday and beat Fognini 6-1, 6-3, 6-2.

Federer, a six-time winner at the All England Club, won 37 of 41 points on his first serve and 21 of 23 points at the net against Fognini, an Italian ranked 68th.

Prince Charles and the Duchess of Cornwall sat in the first row of the Royal Box as Federer walked onto Centre Court for the day's first match. He and Fognini stood side by side as they bowed awkwardly toward the royals, and Charles responded with a wave and grin.

"They do brief you beforehand," Federer said. "I guess you don't do anything stupid. You behave. Obviously we were asked to bow, which is obviously no problem to do. We're thrilled for the tennis family that they came to watch Wimbledon today?"

Shortly after Federer's victory, rain interrupted play, and the retractable roof on Centre Court was closed for the first time in the tournament. Defending champion Novak Diokovic won under the lights, beating American Ryan Harrison 6-4, 6-4, 6-4 in the final match of the day, which finished at 9:52 p.m. local time.

Michael Phelps Clips Lochte in 200 Free

OMAHA, Neb. • Round 2 goes to Michael Phelps.

Getting back at rival Ryan Lochte, Phelps stretched out to win a thrilling 200-meter freestyle at the U.S. Olympic trials Wednesday night, setting up a duel in London that just gets more tantalizing with every race between the world's two greatest swimmers.

Lochte won the 400 individual medley on the opening night of the games, his third straight major victory the winningest Olympian ever. But Phelps isn't going down that easily.

He got off to a stronger start that usual, leading at the first turn and holding the advantage through all four laps. Both swimmers got a big boost off the final turn, cutting through the water like missiles, and Lochte went stroke for stroke down the stretch. But Phelps stretched out his right arm at the wall, touching just ahead of Lochte. The winning time was 1 minute, 45.70 seconds - five-hundredths of a second ahead of Lochte.

"Obviously it's been a while, so it felt better" to beat

Lochte, Phelps said. "But there's still some things I can improve on."

Phelps' victory was even more impressive given his busy night. He didn't even have time to celebrate, hustling back to the warmdown pool to get ready for the semifinals of the 200 butterfly. He came back 40 minutes later to post the third-fastest qualifying time, moving on to Thursday night's final looking to lock up a chance to defend the gold he won at the last two Olympics.

Speaking of busy, Missy Franklin left no doubt that she is swimming's next big star with a stunning performance in the 100 backstroke, signaling a changing of the guard in an event Natalie Coughlin captured at the last two Olympics.

Coming back to the pool just 20 minutes after qualifying for the final of the 200 freestyle, the 17-year-old "Missile" chased down Coughlin on the return lap to win with an American record of 58.85.

"I have dreamed of this moment, but I never thought it would come true at 17 years old," Franklin said. "Dreams do come true."

With Jose Calderon battling injuries in recent years and headed for a long summer with Spain's national team, it seems time to look for another point guard.


9. DETROIT (25-41) JEREMY LAMB, F, CONNECTICUT

The Pistons won a title in 2004 with Richard Hamilton, and now they could grab another swingman from Connecticut with a similar game.



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
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

Also, the new national title game will go to the highest-bidding city, which will pour millions more into the coffers of FBS schools. Officials in Arlington, Texas, home of the Cotton Bowl, and Atlanta, where the Chick-fil-A Bowl is played, are already lining up to make a pitch.

West Virginia Athletic Director Oliver Luck said that, to those who want the players to receive more money, all that playoff cash "is at least one more arrow in their quiver."

While NCAA President Mark Emmert has argued strongly against paying football players like professionals, in a manner that

South Carolina coach Steve Spurrier has been pushing the past two years, the fight over raising student compensation already has started.

Last year, new legislation was approved that would have allowed schools to offer a \$2,000 stipend, in addition to their scholarship, toward what the NCAA calls the full cost-of-attendance.

But the measure was tossed into limbo after more than 100

schools asked for an override vote. Critics were concerned about whether all schools would be able to afford it, especially with so many facing budget crunches in the economic downturn. Also, there is concern that the schools which can afford to pay the extra stipend will gain an advantage in recruiting.

Still, Emmert has said he would still like it passed, and he praised

the approval of a new postseason format to replace the BCS.

"I commend the BCS Presidential Oversight Committee on its leadership to move to a playoff model," he said. "I remain confident that as the details of the new format are determined in the coming weeks, presidents will continue to keep student-athlete well-being, both in the classroom and on the field, front of mind."



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





In 1778, the Revolutionary War Battle of Monmouth took place in New Jersey; it was from this battle that the legend of "Molly Pitcher"

In 1836, the fourth president of the United States, Tames Madison, died in Montpelier, Va.

In 1914, Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria and his wife, Sophie, were assassinated in Sarajevo by Serb nationalist Gavrilo Princip the event which sparked World War I.

In 1919, the Treaty of Versailles was signed in France, ending the First World War. In Independence, Mo., future president Harry S. Truman married Elizabeth Virginia Wallace.

In 1922, the Irish Civil War began between rival nationalists over the Anglo-Irish Treaty establishing the Irish Free State. (The conflict lasted nearly a year, resulting in defeat for anti-treaty forces.)

In 1939, Pan American Airways began regular trans-Atlantic air service with a flight that departed New York for Marseilles, France.

In 1944, the Republican national convention in Chicago nominated New York Gov. Thomas E. Dewey for president and Ohio Gov. John W. Bricker for vice president.

In 1950, North Korean forces captured Seoul, the capital of South Korea.

In 1962, a jury in New York awarded \$3.5 million to former radio-TV personality John Henry Faulk in his libel suit against the group AWARE Inc. and two individuals who'd accused him of Communist sympathies and gotten him blacklisted. (The judgment was reduced to \$550,000 by an appeals





Todav's deal comes from the women's event in last year's Scandinavian bridge championships. Against three no-trump, Cecilia Rimstedt led her heart queen, ignoring her partner's suit and focusing on her own — a very good decision today. When her partner had the king and unblocked it under declarer's ace the suit was already set up for the defenders. At trick two, Trine Dahl tried to steal the club trick she needed by running the club

down one. That was 10 IMPs to Sweden when the Swedish pair at the other table scored 10 tricks in three no-trump after a spade lead.

and quickly took her tricks for

Of course, declarer should duck the first heart, but let's come back to the deal and compare the line followed by Pekka Viitasalo of Finland. Against him, when the heart queen was led, he ducked the trick. East unblocked the king to win the trick and continue the attack on hearts. Pekka won the second heart with the ace, played a diamond to his ace, and led a low club toward dummy, intending to finesse if West followed low. When West inserted the jack. Pekka called for the ace from dummy, then cashed his diamonds and the spade ace. Now he exited with a small heart to West, who could cash his two heart winners but then had to lead into declarer's club tenace and concede the ninth trick.





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
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
