# DAIRIES WEATHER MILK PRICE UPS AND DOWNS

Farmers say they are used to dealing with volatile market conditions.

TWIN FALLS • Edie Nunes is so tuned in to milk price fluctuations that she can quote the latest figures in seconds by consulting her smartphone.

On Wednesday, she got encouraging news during a random check. The futures price for milk will be \$17.55

per hundred pounds in August, a better rate than Magic Valley dairies have received this

"The first four months were really rough, but this is a good sign," Nunes said. "You have to look ahead and be positive."

The combination of low milk prices and high feed prices has caused some Magic Valley dairies to go out of business, said Rick Naerebout, manager of Independent Milk Produc-

"Typically we've seen dairies selling and other dairies picking up the cows and facilities," Naerebout said. "Today I can think of a half-dozen facilities empty in the valley."

Projections show that dairies will begin seeing "positive margins," or profits, beginning in the fourth quarter, he added. "But there's not a whole lot of optimism for positive margins

until the fourth quarter."

The number of dairies is declining across the state, according to the Idaho Dairymen's Association. The group said there were 800 licensed dairies here in 2008, but that was down to 569 dairies as of September 2011.

Naerebout said south-central Idaho dairies got a dollar less for 100 pounds of milk during the first few months of 2012 compared with a

"Early to mid-summer is never a great time for milk pricing," he said, "but the overall trend in the first five months last year was \$16.70 and the first four months this year was \$15.70."

# **Hailey Marks** 3 Years since Soldier's Capture

**HAILEY** • While much of the country begins decorating itself in red, white and blue, the most common color in the city of Hailey remains yellow.

Yellow ribbons

throughout the community remind residents of their missing native son, U.S. Army Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl, now 26, who was taken captive by the Taliban in eastern Afghanistan June 30,

Today marks three years since Bergdahl's captivity began, and three years of uncertainty and anguish for a family and a community.

Bergdahl is America's only prisoner of war in the Afghanistan and Iraq conflicts.

On Friday, Bergdahl's parents, Bob and Jani Bergdahl, declined interviews but released a statement to mark the date. The parents remain hopeful for the release of their son and vowed to continue to work to bring him home.

"We would like to thank the organizers and participants in a number of events around our nation who have rallied to bring awareness to our cause of bringing Bowe home," the Bergdahls said in the statement. "The

Before getting in, he stood back as family members lifted his twin brother Carter out of a wheelchair and got him settled in the back seat.

The Wishing Star Foundation's Magic Valley chapter granted wishes for the brothers, who have a rare condition called Moyamoya disease. On Wednesday night, they received the first part of their wish: A \$500 shopping spree at ToyTown and Walmart.


# Stocks Soar after European Leaders Brainstorm Plan

**NEW YORK (AP)** • Financial markets around the world stormed higher Friday after European leaders came up with a breakthrough plan to rescue banks, relieve debt-burdened governments and restore investor confidence. The Dow Jones industrial average had its second-biggest gain this year, and stocks advanced even further in Europe.

The Dow Jones industrial average closed up 277.83 points, or 2.2 percent, at 12,880.09.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 33.12, or 2.5 percent, to 1,362.16.

The Nasdaq composite average rose 85.56, or 3 percent, to 2,935.05.

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# Many Options for Bunion Treatments

I think I have a bunion on my foot by my big toe. I've heard that they can be hereditary. How do I know if it is a bunion and what can I do to reduce the pain from it?

Tom, Filer

Answered by Dr. Randal Wraalstad, DPM, St. Luke's Clinic, Orthopedics and Podiatry:

standard bunion is a prominence of the great toe joint. You start feeling a boney prominence on the inside of the foot, just prior to the big toe. With time, it can get larger, painful and red. The big toe can start drifting toward the second toe, which makes the prominence even more apparent. This can be painful in shoes because of

pressure and rubbing. Bunions can be just a bone prominence or they can also develop a bone that becomes out of position. The vast majority of bone and joint problems are inherited from your parents, but bunions can also be caused by traumatic injury to your foot.

Usually, the severity of the bunion is assessed by clinical exam and an X-ray, which can tell how much of an angle between the metatarsal bones is developing. The pain of the bunion can be simply on the bump or if it becomes more severe, it can also be in the joint itself. This is an indicator of arthritis of the great toe joint.

Treatments are based on how painful and large the bunion is, or if the pain is

limiting a person's activities or shoe choices. Conservative treatments can include shoe changes, padding, orthotics or arch supports, anti-inflammatory medication or ice packs to reduce swelling and pain. Some people choose to simply just live with the pain. Surgical treatment is also done in many cases.

If you have tried many of the conservative treatment options and found mediocre results, and your quality of life is comprised because of a bunion, there are surgical procedures that can fix the problem. Your podiatric surgeon will be able to assess your situation and review your options with you.

"Tucker, look at all these trucks," he said, as the 4year-old came running.

Bobango helped him choose his favorite one while D'Ambra showed Carter some glow-in-the-dark ceiling stars.

In addition to the shopping trip, the second part of the boys' wish came on Thursday.

Since Tucker enjoys playing outside, workers installed a custom-made sandbox in the family's backyard. And for Carter, they put in a 10-foot tall swing set that's handicapped-accessible.

The Wishing Star Foundation was established in 1983 and grants wishes to children ages 3 to 21 who have a lifethreatening illness. The nonprofit organization operates in Idaho, as well as eastern and central Washington.

Tucker and Carter are battling Movamova disease, a rare disorder caused by blocked arteries at the base of the brain. The disorder means "puff of smoke" in Japanese, which describes the look of a patient's blood vessels on an X-ray.

After he had a stroke, Tuck-

er was diagnosed with the disease about one year ago. Carter's diagnosis followed.

"It's been a life-changing experience," D'Ambra said.

She said it's been an emotional roller coaster. Before her sons' medical problems surfaced, she'd never heard of a 4-year-old having strokes.

Carter has suffered three massive strokes and a serious brain bleed. Now, he can't walk, talk or eat on his own.

Allie Vargas, Magic Valley chapter president for the Wishing Star Foundation, said someone submitted a referral to the organization on behalf of the boys. A Wishing Star Foundation

representative contacted D'Ambra and asked if she'd like Tucker and Carter to participate. The organization contacted the boys' doctor to verify that

they're dealing with a lifethreatening illness. Then, the children each made a wish of something they truly wanted.

"We try to get it straight from their little mouths," Vargas said.

Typically, the Magic Valley's Wishing Star Foundation chapter grants one wish each year. One of the most common wishes is a trip to the "happiest place on Earth" Disneyland. Vargas said the organization

has also gone across borders to grant wishes for children in surrounding states such as Montana and Nevada. Once a child's wish is

granted, that's not the end of the process. The organization continues to stay in contact with the family.

"We don't just grant the wish and then drop them," Vargas said.

said. "But I know the Department of Defense and other U.S. agencies are doing all they can to safely bring Sgt. Bergdahl home to his family." In the statement, Otter wrote he has met with the

Bergdahl family several times and is impressed with their fortitude throughout the ordeal. "I know that part of their strength comes from the sup-

port they receive in their community, from citizens around our state and our nation," Otter said. "Please continue to keep the Bergdahls in your thoughts and prayers as we look forward to the day Bowe Bergdahl safely returns to Ida-

To mark the third anniversary, Bergdahl was chosen as the honorary grand marshal in Hailey's Fourth of July Parade, City Administrator Heather Dawson said. That takes place Wednesday.

"The community is pretty focused on that," she said.

Today, a fundraiser for Sun Valley Adaptive Sports, Higher Ground and the Bergdahl family is being held in Bowe's honor.

Supporters will gather at Nelson Field at Hailey Elementary School for a CrossFit workout event to raise awareness and funds. According to the event's website, the workout consists of three rounds for each year in captivity. The number of reps in each activity also hold significance, the site says

Bergdahl's parents have generally shied away from the press. But this spring, they granted a few interviews – largely in national media – to raise awareness and express frustration in what they see as a stalled effort to bring their son home.

Bob Bergdahl also spoke in June at the annual Rolling Thunder motorcycle rally in Washington, D.C., where he thanked those present for drawing attention to prisoners of war and troops missing in action.

In June, emails from Bowe quoted in Rolling Stone magazine - reportedly sent to his parents before he was captured by the Taliban three years ago - suggest Bergdahl was disillusioned with the war and considered deserting.

The military has never detailed the circumstances of Bergdahl's disappearance or capture, and he is not classified as a deserter. He was initially listed as "duty status unknown" and is now considered "missing-captured."



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# City to Crack Down on Code Violators

TWIN FALLS • Concerned about fire danger on the Fourth of July holiday, the city of Twin Falls is asking property owners to remove dead or overgrown vegetation on or near their homes.

City code states "Every owner, tenant or occupant of private property within the City shall cut and remove the weeds and grass and clean and remove the rubbish as often as necessary."

The city's Code Enforcement Department is closely properties monitoring within the city that are potential fire hazards because of overgrown and dead weeds or brush, said city spokesman Josh Palmer in a press release.

"The code isn't just for aesthetics, it also helps protect homes from fire hazards during these hot and dry summers," Sean Standley, city code enforcement

officer, said in the release. "I see places with dry weeds growing up to my waist. A lot of it is drying out and that's a problem when you know that people will be lighting off fireworks in a couple of days."

According to the release, the city is required by code to remove weeds, grass or rubbish that pose a hazard to the community. If the property is vacant, the code enforcement officer will hire a contractor to remove weeds and brush from the property.

If the city has to remove the plants, the property owner is billed or a lien can be placed against the property.

The city can also fine property owners up to \$600 if they live on the property and do not maintain weeds, brush and rubbish.

"Most of the time, we never have to go that far because the property owner is just unaware of the issue," Standley said.

"Dairy is awesome," Edie Nunes said. "We are feeding the world. Agriculture is No.1."

Nunes, her husband Steve and his brother Luis own Mid-Valley Dairy south of Buhl. They milk about 1,100 of their 2,000 cows and sell all of the milk - 79,000 pounds a day to Glanbia Foods Inc. It's been that way for 21 years, ever since Glanbia came to Twin Falls.

Nunes says the company has helped them get through tough times with inventive business practices, including allowing Mid-Valley to lock in a futures price for 75 percent of an upcoming month's milk supply.

"Glanbia has really stepped up," Nunes said. "They are in it for the long haul, and they want us to stick around, too. They're huge on family owned

The futures pricing practice, known as hedging, also works for grain prices,

she said. With rising feed prices a big part of the financial scenario, it helps dairymen to know what that expense will be in coming months.

Steve Nunes is a thirdgeneration dairyman who moved his 200-cow operation to the Magic Valley from California in 1991. Edie, who handles all the financial chores along with other jobs, got a crash course in dairy industry issues when they married.

"I've learned," she said with a smile. "It's been baptism by fire."

One of the bedrock truths is that the price Glanbia pays for milk is directly tied to cheese prices, Nunes said. "It's all supply and demand."

The supply of Idaho milk has risen quickly over the past two decades. According to figures from Glanbia CEO Jeff Williams, the state's dairies produced 2.5 billion pounds in 1990. That went up to 6.5 billion pounds in 2000 and hit 12.2 billion pounds in 2009.

Now, almost 2 million of Idaho's 36 million pounds of milk produced daily get pushed out of the local market because of lack of demand, or are sold at a significant discount, said Naerebout.



# Dale E. Budd



# TF Parking **Meter Posts Coming Down Sunday**

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# Gitmo Detainees Could Go to Afghanistan

**WASHINGTON** • The Obama administration is considering a new gambit to restart peace talks with the Taliban in Afghanistan that would send several Taliban detainees from the military prison at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, to a prison in Afghanistan, U.S. and Afghan officials told The Associated Press.

Under the proposal, some Taliban fighters or affiliates captured in the early days of the 2001 U.S. invasion of Afghanistan and later sent to Guan-

tanamo under the label of enemy combatants would be transferred out of full U.S. control but not released. It's a leap of faith on the U.S. side that the men will not become threats to U.S. forces once back

on Afghan soil. But it is meant to show more moderate elements of the Taliban insurgency that the U.S. is still interested in cutting a deal for peace.

Secretary of State Hillary Rodham

Clinton and others have said that while negotiations with the Taliban are distasteful, they are the best way to settle the prolonged war.

The new compromise is intended to boost the credibility of the U.S.-backed Afghan government. President Hamid Karzai and U.S. officials are trying to draw the Taliban back to negotiations toward a peace deal between the national Afghan government and the Pashtun-based insurgency that would end a war U.S. commanders have said cannot be won with military power alone.

# Congress Passes Student Loans, Highway Jobs Bill

Federal timber subsidies worth \$346 million would be distributed for another year to rural counties, while other funds would be steered to rural school districts.

**WASHINGTON** • Congress emphatically approved legislation Friday preserving jobs on transportation projects from coast to coast and avoiding interest rate increases on new loans to millions of college students, giving lawmakers campaignseason bragging rights on what may be their biggest economic achievement before the November elections.

The bill sent for President Barack Obama's signature enables just over \$100 billion to be spent on highway, mass transit and other transportation programs over the next two years, projects that would have expired Saturday without congressional action. It also ends a bare-knuckle political battle over student loans that raged since spring, a proxy fight over which party was best helping voters muddle through the economic downturn.

Under the bill, interest rates of 3.4 percent for subsidized Stafford loans for undergraduates will continue for another year, instead of doubling for new loans beginning on Sunday as scheduled by a law passed five years ago to save money.

The compromise ended up sprinkled with unrelated nuggets dealing with Asian carp, roll-your-own tobacco and federal timber aid.

Federal timber subsidies worth \$346 million would be distributed for another year to rural counties, while other funds would be steered to rural school districts. The bill also eases restrictions that force most American food aid to be shipped abroad on U.S.-flagged vessels.

Had the measure failed, interest rates would have mushroomed to 6.8 percent for 7.4 million students expected to get the loans over the coming year.

The Democratic-led Senate sent the measure to Obama by a 74-19 vote, just minutes after the Republican-run House approved it 373-52. The unusual display of harmony, in a bitterly partisan year, signaled law-makers' eagerness to claim credit for providing transportation jobs, to avert higher costs for students and their families and to avoid being embarrassed had the effort run aground.

This year has seen the two parties mostly drive each other's plans for tax breaks and economic revival into a stalemate, although lawmakers have enacted bills retaining the Social Security payroll tax cut for a year and renewing a government agency that promotes U.S. exports.

# Firefighters Search for Bodies in Blaze

President Barack Obama toured the Colorado Springs area Friday after issuing a disaster declaration for Colorado that frees up federal funds.

**COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo.** • Firefighters went from one smoldering pile to another Friday in search of bodies in the nearly 350 homes burned to the ground by the most destructive wildfire in Colorado history.

As crews on the front lines made slow but steady progress against the flames, Police Chief Pete Carey said fewer than 10 people altogether were unaccounted for. The remains of one person were found Thursday in what was left standing of one home, and a second person who lived there was missing.


The 26-square-mile blaze — one of several wildfires burning out of control across the tinder-dry West — was reported to be 15 percent contained, and authorities began lifting some of the evacuation orders for the more than 30,000 people who fled their homes a few days ago.

President Barack Obama toured the stricken areas Friday after issuing a disaster declaration for Colorado that frees up federal funds. He thanked firefighters and other emergency workers, saying: "The country is grateful for your work. The country's got your back."

After growing explosively earlier in the week, the fire gained no ground overnight, authorities reported Friday. And the weather was clear and mostly calm, a welcome break from the lightning and high wind that drove the flames.

"The focus for today is to hold what we got," extend the fire lines to contain more of the blaze, and bring in more heavy equipment, said Rich Harvey, incident commander for the fire.

Exhausted firefighters fresh off the front lines described the devastation in some neighborhoods

and the challenges of battling such a huge blaze.

"It looks like hell. I would imagine it felt like a nuclear bomb went off. There was fire everywhere. Everything had a square shape to it because it was foundations," said Rich Rexach, who had been working 12-hour days since Tuesday, when flames swept through neighborhoods in this city of more than 400,000 people 60 miles south of Denver.

"Everything you put water on, it was just swallowing it," he said.

As residents waited anxiously to see what was left of their homes, police reported several burglaries in evacuated areas, along with break-ins of cars packed with evacuees' possessions outside hotels.

Community leaders began notifying residents Thursday that their homes were destroyed. Lists of the heavily damaged streets

were posted at a high school, and residents scanned the sheets, but for many, the notification was a formality. They had already recognized their streets on the aerial pictures that appeared in the news.

"The blanket that was on my bed when I grew up, a bunch of things my mother had made," said Rick Spraycar, listing what he lost when his house in the hard-hit Mountain Shadows subdivision burned down. "It's hard to put it into words. Everything I owned. Memories."

Authorities were still trying to figure out what caused the fire. They said conditions were too dangerous to allow them in to start their investigation.

More than 1,000 personnel and six helicopters were fighting the fire. All eight firefighting planes at Colorado Springs' Peterson Air Force Base will be pressed into service today.

# Suicide by Poison Suspected in Court Death

**PHOENIX** • As the word "guilty" filled the silence of a Phoenix courtroom, defendant Michael Marin closed his eyes, put his head in his hands and appeared to put something in his mouth. He then took a swig from a sports bottle.

Minutes later, the 53-year-old Marin was dead.

Now investigators are trying to confirm their suspicion that Marin popped a poisoned pill after the jury found him guilty of arson, a bizarre ending to a case

But earlier in the week, in his dissent on the Arizona immigration law, Scalia trod all over the idea that the Supreme Court is above politics.

In a little-noticed (at first) rejection of the high court's majority opinion that much of the Arizona statute was pre-empted by federal law, the everquotable and occasionally controversial Scalia said that the ruling "boggles the mind" - particularly in light of Obama's recent decision to stop deporting some illegal immigrants under 30 if they were brought here by their parents as children.

"The president has said that the new program is 'the right thing to do' in light of Congress' failure to pass the administration's proposed revision of the immigration laws," Scalia wrote. "Perhaps it is,

though Arizona may not think so." Cue outrage.


Scalia's critics seized on the comment as evidence that the conservative justice had put his politics before the law. E.J. Dionne Jr., a liberal columnist for The Washington Post, went as far as to call for Scalia's resignation, writing: "What boggles the mind is that Scalia thought it proper to jump into this political argument."

Scalia isn't likely to take Dionne's advice - and one week of controversy is likely to be the smallest of ripples when one looks back on the breadth of his career. Also, a bad week can turn into a good week down the line; just ask a past worst week winner, Solicitor General Donald B. Verrilli Jr., who was dinged for his poor performance in arguing the administration's health care case before the court in March. Antonin Scalia, for showing too much partisan political leg, you had the worst week in Washington. Congrats, or something.

# **Congress Extends County Timber Payments**

GRANTS PASS, Ore. (AP) • Members of Congress from timber country came through Friday with a promised one-year extension of federal payments to rural counties dominated by

federal lands. They are now turning their attention to the thornier problem of how to generate a steady stream of federal revenue for rural counties that were rolling in cash during the logging booms of the 1970s, but have fallen on hard times since protections for fish and wildlife in danger of extinction forced sharp cutbacks on logging on national forests in the 1990s.

While voting to approve a compromise version of a national transportation bill, Congress also authorized the one-time distribution of \$346 million to 700 rural counties in 41 states. Oregon gets \$100 million of it, California \$39.3 million, Idaho \$27.4 million, Washington \$21.3 million and Montana \$20.4 million.

A 31 percent reduction from funding levels in 2010, the money is the last anyone expects to see from the Secure Rural Schools Act, which since 2000 has provided \$3 billion to rural counties to make up for their declining shares of federal logging revenues.

'This is obviously a lifeline, but not a solution," said Rep. Greg Walden, R-Ore. "It is getting very, very, very difficult to fund this program, and frankly the local governments are frustrated at the sort of yo-yo effect they have go through depending on direct payments from Congress?"

The issue stems from the longstanding practice of the federal government sharing a portion of the money made from cutting timber to the counties where the timber is located.

Three bills designed to increase logging on federal lands have been floating around the Republicancontrolled House, but none has won the Congressional Budget Office favorable rating required to get a floor vote, and their prospects in the Democratic-controlled Senate appear dim.

One bill focuses on Oregon alone. It would turn over 2.6 million acres from the so-called O&C lands in Western Oregon to a trust, and log them under state forestry rules to provide maximum revenues to Oregon counties. Developed by Rep. Peter De-Fazio, D-Ore., it is also backed by Walden and Rep. Kurt Schrader, D-Ore.

Another from Rep. Raul Labrador, R-Idaho, would extend nationwide the same principal of turning federal forests over to trusts that could log them under lessstringent state forestry laws.

A third from House Resources Chairman Doc Hastings, R-Wash., would require the U.S. Forest Service to sell enough timber to generate \$500 million for timber counties and give the secretary of agriculture the power to ignore environmental laws to do it.

Sen. Ron Wyden, the father of the Secure Rural Schools Act and chairman of the Senate subcommittee on public lands, said he did not know yet what form that long-term solution would take.

# Health Care Challenge Cost Idaho \$18,000

**BOISE** • Idaho's challenge of the 2010 health care reform law, which the Supreme Court upheld almost entirely Thursday, cost the state a total of \$18,337, according to the office of Attorney General Lawrence Wasden.

About \$16,000 was paid to the office of Florida's Attorney General. Florida led the charge by 26 states, including Idaho, that the law was unconstitutional. The remainder, about \$2,000, paid for Wasden to travel to Washington, D.C., for the historic three-daylong oral arguments before the Supreme Court in March.

In joining the lawsuit, Idaho pooled its money with others "to minimize the cost and share the cost among the states," said Bob Cooper, spokesman for the Attorney General's Office.

"It was a significant victory in state's rights and sovereignty issues," Cooper said when asked if the expense was worth it.

The court ruled that the law's mandate to buy health insurance was legal under the federal government's power to tax. But Idaho had argued the law's mandate was an illegal use of the Commerce Clause of the U.S. Constitution.

"The court directly sustained our argument on that point," Wasden told Idaho Statesman Thursday. It also ruled in favor of states arguing that the law wasn't a "necessary and proper" act of Congress to carry out its powers.

Cooper said that "for that fairly modest investment, in a legal sense, the state obtained a pretty important precedent."

The Supreme Court's decision struck down a part of the law that ordered states to expand Medicaid eligibility to everyone close to the poverty line - not just pregnant women, children and other specific groups, like the disabled. The ruling gave states more latitude in making the choice to expand Medicaid.

If the Idaho Legislature doesn't open Medicaid to those with incomes up to 133 percent of the poverty line, "the savings will be orders of magnitude beyond the cost of litigation," Cooper said. But "from the Attorney General's perspective, that [decision about Medicaid] is clearly a matter of legislative discretion."

# Mansion Panel to Meet After Budget Dustup

BOISE (AP) • The fivemember panel that oversees finances of the vacant Idaho governor's mansion will meet next week after one of its Democratic members complained a vote on its 2013 budget violated state law.

The Governor's Housing Committee now plans to meet Tuesday.

Sen. Les Bock of Garden City criticized the email vote earlier this week to approve the house's \$177,400 spending plan, arguing it should have had public notice.

Bock worries the unpublicized vote will take the spotlight off a home he wants to dispose of, because it's quickly draining a fund to maintain it.

The panel's chairman, Republican Sen. Chuck Winder, says he was merely trying to expedite the vote, not keep it out of view.

# Steven Powell May Be Released from Prison in Year

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP) • The father-in-law of missing Utah woman Susan Powell may be released from prison in less than a year, despite being convicted of 14 voyeurism counts.

Steven Powell was sentenced earlier this month to 21/2 years in prison for recording images of two neighbor girls in their bathroom. After factoring for time served, good time and reductions because he is a nonviolent offender, the state has calculated his potential release date as May 23, 2013.

Prosecutors had asked for Powell to be sentenced to 10 years.

Susan Powell disappeared from her Utah home in 2009. Her husband, Josh, was a focus of the investigation until he killed himself and the

couple's two children earlier this year. Steven Powell was arrested last year after authorities investigating her disappearance searched his home in Washington state.

Investigators said they found thousands of images of women and girls who seemed unaware they were being photographed, including images of Susan Powell. They filed charges based on video taken of the neighbor girls, who were about 8 and 10 years old when the images were recorded.

Powell also faces three years of supervised release following the sentence.

In a 25-page decision, the NCAA Division I Infractions Appeals Committee concluded that the scholarship penalty announced last September, in addition to Boise State's self-

imposed sanctions, was "excessive such that it constituted an abuse of Boise State's voluntary measures in-

cluded three fewer scholarships for the 2011-12 school year and fewer presea-

son practices. The NCAA added scholarship reductions from 85 to 82

through the 2013-14 school year and limited contact during spring practice.

The university appealed the additional sanctions for the football program, arguing that the NCAA's history of scholarship reduction penalties was inconsistent with penalties imposed in the case of Boise State. The appeals committee agreed.

"Of the 10 cases that involved the FBS and reductions of football grantsin-aid over the past five years, only two had reductions of grants-in-aid in football as great or greater than those imposed in this case," the panel found.

WIMBLEDON, England • A day after Rafael Nadal's stunning exit at Wimbledon, the only other men who have won the tournament since 2003 - six-time champion Roger Federer and defending champion Novak Djokovic – found themselves trailing far-less-accomplished opponents,

# EVANS OUT TO DEFEND TOUR DE FRANCE TITLE

**LIEGE, Belgium** • Cadel Evans thinks one Tour de France title will make it easier to win another one. And he's ready to add that second championship right now.

Evans opens his title defense when the 99th edition of cycling's marquee race begins today with a quick, 4-mile prologue in Liege, Belgium – an individual time trial expected to be dominated by specialists such as Fabien Cancellara of Switzerland and Tony Martin of Germany, or contender Bradley Wiggins of Britain.

The beginning of the Tour offers the cycling world a welcome return to racing after the sport's doping ghosts returned this month, with charges by the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency that Lance Armstrong used performance-enhancing drugs en route to his seven Tour victories. He denies doping and notes he has never failed a drug test.

For a race covering 2,100 miles over three weeks, the prologue is just the very beginning for the rider who will cycle down Paris' Champs-Elysees in the yellow jersey on July 22 — but it could provide an early indication about who won't be in front at the end. Evans was already playing down expectations about how he might fare in it.

'It starts tomorrow on a stage that isn't so suited to me," the BMC team leader said Friday. "But from here on in, it's all systems go, and I'm looking forward to getting an-

other Tour started." Evans says he has a "similar mentality" to his winning approach last year. But this year's route goes heavier on time trials - with more than 60 miles total in individual races against the clock - and lighter on steep mountain climbs than the most recent Tours.

"Knowing that we have already won one, it makes it quite a little bit easier," Evans said. "When you've won one - in the bag - it's there. ... It makes it a whole lot easier. You don't have this question of doubt: 'Maybe I can win it, maybe I can't?' We know we can."

He acknowledged that race connoisseurs are predicting a two-man showdown between Evans and Wiggins, a three-time Olympic track gold medalist who has converted to road races and worked hard to improve in the mountains that are often crucial to winning the Tour.

"They tell me that Wiggins is the man to beat, so they say, but we'll see it on the roads," Evans said. "Three weeks on the road is a long time, and a lot can happen."

Wiggins is off to a terrific start this season, winning the Criterium du Dauphine, the Tour de Romandie and Paris-Nice stage races this year. Evans, by comparison, admitted he has been off to a "bit of a quiet start" to 2012, with just one

victory in the three-stage Criterium International - but is progressing and hopes to peak for the

Wiggins wants to become the first Briton to reach the Tour podium, and possibly take home yellow and with the London Olympics ahead next month, is doubly motivated.

"I can't wait to get down that ramp and put down into practice all these months of training," he said. "I don't think I've ever been this good: All this stuff we've been doing this week suggests that I am in the form of my life."

Wiggins said he's sensed through social media how many fans back in Britain are behind him.

"In England ... every child's dream is to lift the FA Cup at Wembley or whatever," Wiggins said. "This is my Wembley."

# Dillon Wins Nationwide Race, Fails Inspection

SPARTA, Ky. • Austin Dillon lived up to the legend of the No. 3 car, then had his victory called into question Friday

No one had regularly driven the No. 3 car since Dale Earnhardt's death on the track at the 2001 Daytona 500. On a warm night in the Bluegrass state, Dillon routed the field, only to have the car fail its postrace inspection.

Dillon took the lead early and was on top for 192 of the 200 laps to win the NASCAR Nationwide Series race at Kentucky Speedway.

"I love running the 3," Dillon said. "It pressures me every week to give 110 (percent)."

Roughly an hour after the trip to victory lane, the No. 3 failed the inspection for being too low in the rear. NASCAR announced it would issue a ruling early next week.

Reached at the garage, Dillon's crew chief, Danny Stockman, wiped sweat from his forehead as he left a meeting with officials. "We've had an issue before. We ad-

dressed it in a meeting," Stockman said. "It should have been addressed. That's the only comment I've got."

A similar situation took place earlier this season at Iowa where a car also failed a postrace inspection. The crew chief was fined \$10,000 and six points

were subtracted from the team. The No. 3, of course, was driven to fame by Earnhardt, who raced for the Richard Childress team. Childress is

Dillon's grandfather and also his team owner.

As Dillon was clinching the win, his grandfather said over the radio, "Dale would have been proud of that."

It was the first Nationwide victory for Dillon, a rookie who captured the Truck Series title a year ago. "It takes a little off your back when

you get that first win," Dillon said with a broad smile while wearing a white cowboy hat with his black - what else? driving suit.

Dillon had asked to drive the No. 3 car, which has made it's only appearances since Earnhardt's death with Dillon behind the wheel in the Truck Series – and with Dale Earnhardt Jr. in three other races, including a victory at Daytona in the Nationwide event two years ago.

Boise State has since revamped its NCAA compliance efforts, hiring additional staff and implementing an educational program, the university said. The school has also made changes to its student-athlete handbook, while heightening training and awareness programs, officials said.

"The entire process has deepened our commitment to compliance, resulted in tangible changes to our program and created a greater awareness of the NCAA rules," athletic director Mark Coyle said in a statement.





# Weltz Lands 1-2 Punch to Win 200 Breast

ASSOCIATED PRESS

**OMAHA**, **Neb.** • Brendan Hansen and Eric Shanteau were the favorites.

The race was a different matter.

In another major breaststroke upset, Scott Weltz won the 200 meters at the U.S. Olympic swimming trials Friday night, leaving Hansen and Shanteau with only one individual event at the London Games.

On a night when Ryan Lochte and Michael Phelps were focused on getting through semifinal races, Nathan Adrian won the 100 freestyle and Cullen Jones claimed the second spot for London, while Natalie Coughlin barely survived her last chance to make it back to the Olympics.

The men's 200 breast was just as shocking as the women's 100 breast, which was won by Breeja Larson over Rebecca Soni and Jessica Hardy. At least Soni got second place, still good enough for a do-over in the Olympics.

Neither Hansen nor Shanteau were as fortunate. "My whole body was kind

of tingling and I was like, 'I'm feeling it and something is different, this is the time," Weltz said. "I was smiling behind the blocks, I wasn't nervous. I felt great going into it."

Clark Burckle claimed the second spot on the Olympic team, another big surprise. Shanteau finished third and Hansen faded to fourth, which

means they'll have to settle for only swimming the 100 breast in London after going 1-2 in that event at the trials.

"I think you guys are as surprised as I am," Hansen said. "I can't believe Eric and I are not swimming the 200."

The 25-year-old Weltz moved up on the third lap and surged to the finish to win in 2 minutes, 9.01 seconds. Burckle was next in 2:09.97, edging Shanteau with the touch.

"When I turned at the wall, I saw I wasn't a body length and a half behind, I was like, 'I've only got to make up a maybe a halfbody length. I can do this," Weltz said. "From then on, it was like a freight train going forward."

Shanteau, who competed in the 200 breast at Beijing after being diagnosed with testicular cancer, considers the longer event his better race and thought the 100 was just a bonus. Now, it's his only Olympic race, which is why he was especially distraught when he looked up at the board and saw that Burckle got him by eight-hundredths of a second.

Shanteau took off his cap and goggles and hung on the lane rope, his head dropping back against the wall he did-

n't get to quite fast enough. Hansen finished in 2:10.25. "I didn't think Weltz had it in

him," Hansen said. "He swam

like a big-time swimmer."

Hansen got an ugly reminder of his performance at the 2008 trials, when he went in as the 200 favorite and couldn't hold it together on the final lap. He followed with a disappointing performance in Beijing, which led him to retire from the sport in disgust. He returned after a more than two-year layoff and seemed on course for redemption after winning the 100 breast.

"I'm disappointed by my performance," Hansen said. "The whole time I thought I was right on pace. When I turned it on with 150 to go, I thought, 'Uh oh, been here before?"

He should know. This was the eighth time in Federer's illustrious career that he overcame a two-set hole, including against 2009 U.S. Open champion Juan Martin del Potro in the French Open quarterfinals 3 1/2 weeks ago.

But Federer held there, the crowd roaring with each point he won.

"I appreciate their support for so many years out here," Federer said. "Tonight was special."

Like Federer and Nadal, Djokovic fell behind against someone he was expected to beat easily: The Serb ceded the first set, getting broken at love by No. 28 Radek Stepanek, Rosol's Davis Cup teammate for the Czech Republic. help define how we can encourage others. We don't want to be like a fork that pierces, or a knife that cuts, but we want to be like a spoon that lifts.


I hope that your day is lifted and that you feel free to love others more and make choices that lead to life and blessing as my words give you a spoonful of encouragement each time you get to read this column.

"Will you agree to that?" Steve Cody asked the Wednesday-evening crowd.

"Yes," it said in unison. But, Cody said, you need not lose hope. There's a solution to the country's problems. "Right here," he said, pointing to a worn banner behind the pulpit that read "Jesus is the Answer."

It's become the theme of Cody and his cowboy ministry, which visited First Southern Baptist Church this week in Gooding. His Wednesday sermon: "Love one another."

Cody, an evangelical preacher from Lenapah, Okla., was at the church Sunday-Thursday for an oldfashioned tent revival, drawing 30 to 50 people every evening.

"They used to do these a lot," he said. "You've heard of circuit-riding preachers? We're the modern-day circuit-riding preachers. But instead of horses, we have horsepower that pulls us now."

Cody, who started his ministry in the early 1980s, travels the country about 50

weeks every year - he lives pretty much out of an RV spreading a gospel message of hope.

Often he is joined by Jeff Gore of Abilene, Texas, who was with him this week in Gooding. Gore, who said he always wanted to be a cowboy, ministers through guitar and song.

Their target audience: cowboys, ranchers, smalltown folk.

About 35 people attended Wednesday night's meeting. As Gore opened with a Marty Robbins song, listeners dressed in blue jeans or shorts sitting on folding chairs beneath the colorful canopy seemed to be moved

by the message about a soulfinding Jesus. One person had tears on her cheeks.

"There's a real need for this," Gore said. "A lot of people who need the message don't want to go far from home. We come to them.... I feel this is what God has called me to do."

One of his goals: to help his country remember its Christian heritage.

The United States has gotten away from the principles and virtues that made it a great nation, he said. It has in many ways abandoned the creator and preserver of liberties. He said no matter what some modern historians teach, the Founding Fathers were God-fearing men who believed the country's success would depend upon its reverence to Christ and teachings of the Scriptures.

We're not the country we used to be, he said.

Cody echoed similar sentiments: "People are popping pills, drinking booze, reading self-help books. But the answer is here. It is Jesus. ... We're a people that need to turn back to what God wants us to be."

One way to do that, he said, is to live the commandment Jesus gave to "love one another."

# Siblings Hope to Restore Family's 'Godmobile'

MOSCOW • A brother and sister who grew up as part of a traveling tent revivalist family of preachers hope to make part of their heritage a permanent historical dis-

Nels Reese, 75, a retired architectural professor at the University of Idaho, and Mary Ann Reese, 70, a magazine publisher for the UI's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, are seeking funding to bring the "Godmobile," as they call it, out of mothballs and make it part of a museum display by the

The Godmobile - a handbuilt coach that traveled more than 200,000 miles around the West from the early 1930s to the '60s - has been stored for several decades at the transportation department warehouses in Boise. State historical society officials hope to persuade next year's Legislature to fund a museum where the ho's transportation history.

the highways and byways" and preaching the word of God, said Mary Ann Reese.

"He was on the lookout for something unique that would send out God's word," added Nels Reese. "As it is today, if you want something crazy, beautiful, unique, you go to Los Angeles. You don't go to Omaha."

The Reeses' revivalist history began with their grandfather, Nels Thompson, a Danish immigrant, who had lived a rough-and-tumble life until losing all his money on a horse race bet and finding himself deep in debt.

On the brink of despair, Thompson set out to kill himself.

"He went downtown with 50 cents and was going to buy a gun and blow his brains out," said Mary Ann Reese. "But he thought, 'Well, before I do that I should probably see where I'm going,' because he remembered in Denmark having an old family Bible that shows the great judgment day and he used to look at it.

"So instead of buying a gun he bought a Bible and started reading in the book of Romans, which is sort of the emancipation proclamation (of the Bible), and he thought, 'Oh, my gosh, every one of these terrible things it says in here, I've done! And he did have a major conversion."

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# Students Suspended in NY Bus Monitor Bullying

A fund drive that began with a goal of \$5,000 to help Klein take a nice vacation raised more than \$667,304 as of Friday.

Klein has received national attention through social and news media with interviews such as an appearance earlier this week on NBC's "Today Show." She was honored Thursday in Boston, where she was greeted by a youth cheerleading squad and escorted on a red carpet to receive an honorary Boston school bus monitor certifi-

Klein could not be reached for comment Friday. However, police have said Klein did not want the boys to face criminal charges.

In the AP interview last week, Klein asked people to leave the boys alone.

# Egypt's Morsi Vows to Fight for Authority

CAIRO • President-elect Mohammed Morsi roused the masses in Tahrir Square on Friday, vowing to fight on behalf of the people and defying the ruling generals by reading a symbolic oath of office a day early at the site where Egypt's revolution was born.

The country's first Islamist president also made a pledge likely to complicate relations with the U.S., vowing to seek the release of blind sheik Omar Abdel-Rahman, jailed in the U.S. for plotting to blow up New York City landmarks and assassinate then-President Hosni Mubarak.

"We love you Morsi!" the crowd roared in response as the 60-year-old U.S.trained engineer left the podium to get closer to the cheering crowd.

The promise to seek the release of the Egyptian-born Abdel-Rahman reflected the populist tone of Morsi's speech – his first in the square that was the epicenter of the popular uprising that ousted Mubarak. He also said he would release all detained Egyptian protesters facing military tribunals.

Pointing to protesters holding photos of prisoners

- including Abdel-Rahman, the spiritual leader of men convicted in the 1993 World Trade Center bombing -Morsi declared: "I will make every effort, I will do it, starting tomorrow, to free them all, including Sheik Omar Abdel-Rahman?'

"Everybody is hearing me now. The government ... the military and the police.... No power above this power," he told the tens of thousands of mostly Islamist supporters packing the square. "I reaffirm to you I will not give up any of the president's authorities. I can't afford to do this. I don't have that right?'

Morsi's words were a show of defiance as he gears up for a power struggle with the country's ruling generals, who took over major presidential powers and disbanded the Islamist-controlled parliament in the days before the election results were released.

Still, the Muslim Brotherhood leader also avoided direct confrontation with the military leaders and was set to be officially sworn-in Saturday during a ceremony at the country's high court not parliament, the traditional venue - as dictated by the generals.

At one point, Morsi opened his jacket to show the crowd he was not wearing a bulletproof vest, then declared he "fears no one but

The pledge to free Abdel-Rahman came in response to repeated calls by his ultraconservative supporters for the sheik to be repatriated to Egypt on humanitarian grounds. Abdel-Rahman is

serving a life sentence. While it was unclear what Morsi could do, the issue underscored that his victory could complicate relations with the U.S., although both sides have stated their desire to cooperate.

The U.S. State Department declined comment on Morsi's pledge. "There's zero chance that this happens," said an administration official, speaking on condition of anonymity to discuss security issues.

In his speech, Morsi repeatedly returned to his main themes — the sovereignty of the people, the importance of unity and sticking to the goals of the revolu-

He promised to reject any efforts to take away the power of the people, telling his supporters: "You are the source of legitimacy and whoever is protected by anyone else will lose.

However, the mere fact that Morsi is to follow the generals' instructions by going ahead with the official inauguration at the high court left no doubt who holds the real power.

# Beard Keeps Fort Hood Shooting Suspect Out of Court

A bearded Maj. Nidal Hasan was once again barred from the courtroom Friday after top Army officials rejected his request to grow facial hair for religious reasons and a military appeals court denied a request to let him back in the courtroom.

Hasan's lawyers then tried to get the judge to recuse himself from the case, claiming the judge's reaction over a mess left next to one of Hasan's adult diapers in a courtroom bathroom showed bias against Hasan.

Earlier this month, military judge Col. Gregory Gross ordered Hasan removed for violating Army grooming regulations. Since then, Hasan has watched the court proceedings on closed-circuit television from a trailer outside the courthouse. The Army psychiatrist, who was cleanshaven during more than two years of court appearances before growing a beard, faces the death penalty on 13 counts of premeditated murder in the Nov 5, 2009, shooting spree at Fort Hood that left 13 dead and 32 people wounded.

During Friday's pre-trial hearing, Gross also denied a defense motion for another delay in the court-martial, which was supposed to begin in March. The trial remains scheduled to begin Aug. 20. Defense attorneys had argued that they needed until December to prepare for what is expected to be a sprawling, weeks-long court-martial.

It wasn't clear Friday why the Pentagon rejected Hasan's beard request; since 2009 it has allowed six soldiers to grow beards for religious reasons, including two Muslim doctors.

Gross also denied a defense motion that he step

down from the case following an exchange in court about Hasan's adult diapers and possible feces smeared in a courtroom bathroom.

Hasan, who was paralyzed from the chest down when he was shot after the November 2009 shooting, uses the diapers because he is unable to control his bodily functions, lawyers said. Gross, who often tidies up the Fort Hood courtroom and adjoining rooms, has regularly disposed Hasan's soiled diapers after previous hearings, the judge

hearing, when Hasan first appeared with a beard, showed Gross holds bias against the Army psychiatrist. Gross said that when court adjourned that day, he found what appeared to be feces smeared on the bathroom floor alongside Hasan's diaper, and fired off an email to defense lawyers to clean up the mess. Lead defense attorney Lt. Col. Kris Poppe said Gross assumed the mess was left by Hasan, but was in fact mud tracked in by one of his guards, and that his reaction

showed bias against Hasan. Gross denied that he harbors any bias against Hasan. Before refusing to step down from the case, Gross told Poppe, "We're wasting our time talking about what was in the latrine – feces or mud."

# $\Gamma$ ODAY IN HISTORY

### On this date:

In 1859, French acrobat Charles Blondin walked back and forth on a tightrope above the gorge of Niagara Falls as thousands of spectators watched.

**In 1860,** the famous Oxford University Museum debate on Darwin's theory of evolution took place as Anglican Bishop Samuel Wilberforce led his side in denouncing the concept, while biologist T.H. Huxley defended it.

In 1908, the Tunguska Event took place in Russia as an asteroid exploded above Siberia, leaving 800 square miles of scorched or blowndown trees.

In 1921, President Warren G. Harding nominated former President William Howard Taft to be chief justice of the United States, succeeding the late Edward Douglass White.

In 1934, Adolf Hitler carried out his "blood purge" of political and military rivals in Germany in what came to be known as "The Night of the Long Knives."

 $\mbox{\bf In}\,\mbox{\bf 1936},$  the epic Civil War novel "Gone with the Wind" by Margaret Mitchell was first published by The Macmillan Co. in New York.

In 1952, "The Guiding Light," a popular radio program, began a 57-year television run on CBS.

In 1958, the U.S. Senate passed the Alaska statehood bill by a vote of 64-20.

In 1963, Pope Paul VI was crowned the 262nd head of the Roman Catholic Church.

In 1972, for the first time, a leap-second was added to Coordinated Universal Time to account for the slowing rotation of the Earth. In 1982, the proposed

Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution expired, having failed to receive the required number of ratifications for its adoption, despite having its seven-year deadline extended by three years.

In 1985, 39 American hostages from a hijacked TWA jetliner were freed in Beirut after being held 17

Ten years ago: Leonard Gregg, a part-time firefighter, was charged with starting one of the two wildfires that merged into a monstrous blaze in eastern Arizona. (Gregg later pleaded guilty and was sentenced in 2004 to 10 years in federal prison; he was released in June 2011.) Brazil defeated Germany, 2-0, for the team's record fifth World Cup title.

Five years ago: Two men rammed a jeep loaded with gasoline canisters into the main terminal at Glasgow Airport in Scotland, failing to set off an explosion, but seriously burning one of the suspects; the attack came a day after two cars rigged as bombs were found in Lon-

One year ago: The U.N.backed Special Tribunal for Lebanon issued an indictment naming four suspects in the assassination of Lebanon's former Prime Minister Rafik Hariri, including a high-ranking Hezbollah militant linked to the 1983 truck bombings at the U.S. and French embassies in Kuwait. (Hezbollah is refusing to extradite the suspects.) Conservative TV commentator Glenn Beck said goodbye to Fox News Channel, airing his final show before going into business for himself.

Today we get three variations on a five-diamond contract from the Scandinavian championships. Against Runi Mouritzen and.

in another room, Artur Malinowski, both Wests cashed the club ace and continued the suit. South ruffed, ran the heart jack to East, and got a trump return — best defense. Both declarers ran their seven trumps, and now the de-fense could choose who would guard clubs. Against Mouritzen both defenders did, forcing West to keep the heart 10 guarded (or declarer could overtake the heart queen). So West pitched all his spades, letting Mouritzen overtake the heart jack and finesse in spades successfully. Against Malinowski, West kept

the bare spade queen and the doubleton heart 10, and declarer came down to one spade, one club and the heart ace in dummy. He led a heart to the ace and East was squeezed in the black suits. Well done, both declarers;

but Frederic Wrang had an even tougher task, since he received a low trump lead, won in dummy. Next came a spade to the jack and queen. West now cashed the club ace and continued with a low club (a heart shift would have been fatal).

Wrang ruffed the club return and ran all his trumps, coming down to the spade ace and two heart honors in hand and the 10-9 of spades and the bare heart ace in dummy. East had to bare one of his kings, and Wrang could cash the ace of that suit and cross to the other hand to take tricks 12 and 13 — a true crisscross

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
