Up, Up and Away Radio-control airplanes allow everyone to become a stunt pilot.

HAZELTON • Berry Spaulding piloted his AeroWorks Extra 300 airplane straight up into the blue sky with white smoke billowing behind.

Suddenly it stopped, hovered in place for several seconds, and then climbed even higher before leveling out.

Spaulding wasn't in the cockpit. The Burley resident maneuvered the red and white craft via radio controls, coaxing every spin and turn from it that a regular plane can perform and more.

With a wingspan of 106 inches, the AeroWorks 300 is 35 percent as big as a fullsized plane. It was among several models that roared across the sky adjacent to the Hazelton airport Saturday during an exhibition sponsored by the Snake River Flyers as part of Hazelton Days.

Dennis Johnson of Hazelton, wearing a "Top Gun" baseball cap, stood a few yards away watching Spaulding at play. He was

Translators Hold Critical Role in Court

TWIN FALLS • Erica De La Rosa is in court nearly every day, but she never speaks for herself.

"We're not supposed to exist," she said. De La Rosa is a court certified Spanish interpreter for Twin Falls County 5th District Court. Interpreters are not lawyers or advocates and don't give legal advice or even explain to defendants possible outcomes in their case.

"You say what they say," she said, no matter how shocking or strange it might be.

Idaho law requires that courts ensure access to all people, including those with limited English proficiency or those who are deaf or hardof-hearing. The courts meet these requirements by developing programs that improve the quality of interpretation and increase the number of qualified interpreters in the courts, according to the Idaho Supreme Court website.

Interpreters are under oath to completely and accurately translate what is said in court to the best of their ability, said Mary Jo Palma, the coordinator for translators in Twin Falls County, and a certified Spanish interpreter.

"If an interpreter becomes aware they've made a mistake they're under obligation to correct it," Palma said. "If an interpreter is challenged, the judge will rule accordingly."

One case where an interpreter was questioned is currently making its way through court in Twin Falls County.

Valentin Calvillo was sentenced to serve 15 to 30 years in state prison in November 2011 after being convicted by a jury of eight counts of lewd conduct and sexual abuse of a minor in November 2010. His sentence was delayed for a year because Calvillo, 50, skipped his trial after showing up for the first few days.

When he returned, Calvillo petitioned for a new trial, arguing he misunderstood instructions from his defense counsel when he was told to leave and seek medical treatment. With

Video Shows **Success of** Idaho Wildlife Underpass

To reduce collisions between wildlife and vehicles, officials created a passage under Idaho 21 — Idaho's first wildlife underpass.

BOISE • An average of 2,600 vehicles travel to and from the Boise area on Idaho 21 each day.

An estimated 90 percent of a herd of 5,000 to 8,000 mule deer and a herd of 300 to 1,800 elk cross the highway each fall, when they come down from the mountains to the Boise Front and the Lucky Peak area.

Some deer dart across the highway, dodging traffic. Others linger on and near the road.

Ed Bottum, a wildlife habitat biologist who has worked for Idaho Fish and Game for 25 years, recalled seeing a huge amount of blood on the highway after a crash a couple of years ago. It was the result of a motorcycle colliding with a deer — the pregnant doe was split in half. The motorcyclist spent the night at a Boise hospital but didn't suffer any life-threatening injuries.

"I found little pieces of that motorcycle 100 feet away," said Bottum, who urges motorists to slow down and drive cautiously when the deer are migrating, generally October through April.

To reduce such collisions, Fish and Game biologists worked with Idaho Transportation Department officials to create a safe passage under the

The judge speaks in English, the interpreter translates to Spanish and the defendant must translate in their head to their own language and then the process starts again.

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Pocatello Fire Victim: 'My Home Just Seemed to Vaporize'

POCATELLO • Twisted remains of a metal roof now lay where Suzanne Bielinski's home once stood off West

Cinnamon Ridge. Reduced to a pile of light gray powder, the home's frame was just one of 66 that disappeared into the air along with the smoke seen rising from the Charlotte Fire, which blackened 1,040 acres of brush and caused an estimated \$7.2 million of damage in the southern foothills that overlook Pocatello.

"I'm still in shock from what happened," Bielinski said. "My home just seemed to vaporize."

Firefighters in eastern Idaho had the fire 80 percent contained Sunday but remained cautious with a forecast of high winds and hot temperatures that could put hundreds of homes at risk.

Local and state police pleaded with community members to stay off the Bannock Highway from Johnny Creek up to the top of Cahina.

Traffic on these streets had clogged lanes, making it hard for an ambulance carrying an injured person to pass through the area, police said.

'Vicious' Wildfire Still a Threat in E. Idaho

BOISE • To city and county planners in eastern Idaho, it's called the wildland urban interface. To the people who live in the idyllic setting where Pocatello and the forest meet, it's called home.

On Thursday, pilots of wildfire retardant bombers called it the target zone as they fought a blaze that eventually destroyed 66

"The retardant bombers saved our house," said 59year-old Doug Hofeldt, who with his wife was evacuated ahead of the Charlotte fire first to a church and then farther away to a local high school where they watched the bombers making runs.

"You could hear tires exploding on cars and propane tanks going up," he said. "It was like a war zone. The (retardant bombers) put down a strip of retardant, one strip after another. I've never seen a fire move that fast in my life. It was absolutely vicious."

In some areas the red retardant strips had on one side a blackened landscape and charred homes, and on the other side homes still standing and undamaged amid the tinder-dry vegetation. Some homes even had a coating of red.

"They dumped directly on people's houses and in many cases it saved their house from being destroyed," said Pocatello Police Lt. Paul Manning, who said his own house was

saved by a big water truck.

"That was my challenge on Thursday," he said. "I was trying to run the traffic command and evacuate my house at the same time."

The 1,038-acre, humancaused fire started near the intersection of Mink Creek Road and Charlotte Drive on a windy day about five miles south of the city. It quickly spread north through grass, sagebrush and juniper trees, destroying the 66 homes, as well as 29 other structures.

Many of the buildings destroyed were in the Mink Creek area, but some survived, including Hofeldt's home. Damage has been estimated at \$8 million.

Hofeldt and his wife were allowed back briefly Friday. He had conflicting emotions when he found his house still standing.

"I guess relief that it was still there, but sadness because I know so many of my friends lost theirs," he said by phone on Sunday from a Pocatello hotel as the evacuation order remained in effect for his neighborhood. "They don't have a home to come back to?"

The fire was 80 percent contained Sunday but firefighters remained cautious with a forecast of high winds and hot temperatures that could put hundreds more homes at risk.

Manning said 160 firefighters and some 40 pieces of firefighting equipment are mopping up and guarding against an escaped ember that could produce a repeat of Thursday. The fire is surrounded by paved roads or bulldozed fire lines, but a wind-whipped ember crossing a fire line could quickly cause problems in the highly populated area.

'The juniper trees just basically explode when the fire gets to them," Manning said. He said four agencies and 17 investigators are working to figure out how the fire started. No details of the investigation have been released.

Meanwhile, he said, authorities have investigated 19 fireworks violation complaints in the last 24 hours in Bannock County.

"All fireworks complaints will be aggressively investigated with zero tolerance,"

highway — Idaho's first wildlife underpass.

With \$800,000 in federal stimulus money, the underpass was completed in October 2010. ITD also installed an 8-foot-tall fence with galvanized steel posts and wire along the highway to help keep the deer off the

Fish and Game biologists have installed additional fencing on the eastern slopes above the highway to guide deer to the underpass, but more is needed to make the underpass work best. They need to raise about \$140,000 to finish the last half of the roughly 1.5 miles of fencing.

The location – past the Mores Creek Bridge, or High Bridge, at milepost 18.2 - isa collision "hot spot" where a large number of deer have been hit through the years.

From 1979 to 2001, cars killed 159 deer in the area of the wildlife underpass about seven per year.

The number killed in that area this migration season:

The biologists say other factors, including migration numbers, also likely contributed to the drop in collisions this year.

Counting how many deer are hit by vehicles along Idaho 21 northeast of Boise each year is relatively easy.

The annual tally ranges from 50 to more than 200 for the 33-mile stretch of road from the highway's intersection with Warm Springs Avenue to Robie Creek.

But it's difficult to determine how many deer (and humans) have been saved from violent deaths since the underpass was installed.

There is ample evidence that deer and other animals are using the underpass. Cameras have captured deer, elk and other wildlife passing safely under the highway, often in groups.

"There's tracks all the time," Bottum said. "It works. We know it works.

"I'm confident saying \" there are hundreds of ani- ■ mals that use it."

ings in lives, injuries and damaged vehicles can't be quantified.

"We believe the crossing to be a great success to date and expect that when the rest of the wildlife fence is up, it will only increase its effectiveness," said Greg Vitley, ITD Southwest Idaho environmental planner.

He said it has generated enthusiasm for partnerships and other "vehicle/wildlife mitigation" elsewhere in Idaho.

The underpasses have been successfully used in Wyoming, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and Banff National Park in Alberta, Canada, Bottum said.

Fish and Game wildlife biologists spend two or three days each December assessing the migrating mule deer throughout the 36,000-acre Boise River Wildlife Management Area. They're looking for male-tofemale ratios and fawn-todoe ratios.

Those ratios provide an

indication of the biological health of the deer herd, said Michelle Commons Kemner, a regional wildlife biologist for Fish and Game.

For every 100 females, there are about 60 to 80 fawns (the more the better, for a stable to increasing herd). The number of bucks varies; an ideal ratio is 25 bucks per 100 does, but 15 bucks per 100 is more typical.

This winter, the count found just about one-third of the deer typically found in the lower elevations of the Boise River area.

The mule deer that did migrate came in November, about a month later than usual. There's usually a four- or five-day period between Oct. 15 and Nov. 15 when they migrate in large numbers, usually in family groups of 12 to 20.

With mild winter conditions, many didn't migrate as close to Boise as in years past. The animals' survival strategy is to pack on as

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much fat as they can during summer and fall, and then try to conserve their energy

resources. If the snow is deep in the mountains and they can't forage for food, they migrate to lower elevations.

"They're not going to come down and stand near us if they don't have to," Bottum said.

Each year for at least the past decade, Fish and Game biologists have caught and put radio collars and ear tags on about 25 fawns and five to 10 does.

They're weighed, measured and checked for body fat. "The fatter, the bigger the

Krista Muller, a senior wildlife technician, said in winters past she has spent a good two hours a day retrieving carcasses from the road. She uses a winch to load them into a Fish and Game pickup.

"It was really hard for me. I had to put a couple animals down that were hit," she said.

A map on the wall of the Idaho 21 Fish and Game office shows how many deer and elk have been killed every tenth of a mile on Warm Springs and Idaho 21 in Boise out to Robie Creek for the past 33 years.

The numbers represent a minimum count, because sometimes carcasses are removed by animals or passing motorists. A law passed earlier this year makes it legal for people to pick up road kill along Idaho highways; those who do so are required to notify Fish and Game.

Wildlife biologists examine the dead animals to determine age, sex, species, disease, parasites and more.

For example, they can tell how many offspring a doe has produced. Examination of the animal's bone marrow indicates how healthy the animal was before it died.

"You can gather a lot of biological data from a carcass," Bottum said.

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Idaho Near Bottom of List in Education Spending in 2009-10

BOISE (AP) • Idaho ranks second-worst in the nation for the amount of money it spends per pupil, the U.S. Census Bureau said.

Information from the 2009-2010 school year shows the state ranked only ahead of Utah. It's the second consecutive year the state ranked second worst.

"Funding is a factor in education but it's not the most important factor," Idaho State Department of Education spokeswoman Melissa McGrath told *The* Spokesman-Review.

"And it is not the factor that determines the quality of an education system."

The U.S. Department of Education's National Assessment of Educational Progress said Idaho eighthgraders scored above average in reading, math and science in 2011.

"In Idaho, our state spends less per student compared to most other states, but our students continually outperform students across the United States in reading, math and in science," McGrath said. "It's clear that Idaho is doing well spending its resources effectively and efficiently to benefit Idaho students?

States are also ranked for school spending per \$1,000 in per-capita income for each state, with Idaho improving slightly from 41st

Idaho peaked in 2001 at

Mike Ferguson, Idaho's former chief state economist who served under five Idaho governors and now is the head of the Idaho Center for Fiscal Policy, said the numbers parallel a report he released in April that found the amount of Idaho's personal income that goes to schools dropped 23 percent between 2000 to 2013.

"The fact is that we've been essentially disinvesting in children," Ferguson said, noting Idaho has very low personal income compared to other states to begin with.

"We've always been on the low end of the scale" in per-pupil spending, he said. "It's just that we're basically, in these relative terms, getting even worse compared to what we have been able to muster previ-

The Census numbers also show that Idaho in 2009-2010 received 20.4 percent of its school funding from the federal government, the third highest of the states.

"That's the first year we did receive (federal) stimulus funding - that could definitely be the cause of it," McGrath said. "School districts this year are struggling because that onetime money is going away?"

BLM Wild-horse Roundup to Resume

RENO, Nev. • The U.S. Bureau of Land Management resumed the roundup of wild horses about 150 miles northeast of Reno on Sunday, nearly two weeks after a federal judge temporarily halted it due to foaling season.

With the end of foaling season Saturday, BLM officials said, they began removing about 200 horses from the northern portion of the Jackson Mountains Herd Management Area.

U.S. District Judge Howard McKibben on June 20 granted part of a temporary restraining order sought by horse protection advocates who say the BLM's own rules prohibit helicopter roundups during foaling season.

He allowed the roundup to continue in the southern portion of the Jackson Mountains because BLM had proven an emergency due to drought. An emergency roundup there began June 8 and ended June 22 with the removal of 424 horses.

But he said that emergency didn't stretch to the northern half of the target area covering a total of more than 400 square miles east of the Black Rock Desert. He said no helicopters could be used there at least until foaling season ended Saturday.

The rest of the roundup in the southern portion of the Jackson Mountains is expected to last about two weeks.

The roundup, which will involve the use of a helicopter to drive horses for miles to corrals, is needed because of a lack of forage and water on the range due to the drought, BLM officials said.

"Gathering the remainder of the excess animals in the northern portion will greatly assist the rangelands from a forage and water standpoint and will reduce the competition among the wild horses, permitted livestock and wildlife," said Gene Seidlitz, **BLM Winnemucca District** manager.

Horses removed from the range are taken to the BLM's Palomino Valley center north of Reno, where they're put up for adoption or sent to longterm pastures in the Midwest.

The roundup in the southern portion of the Jackson Mountains resulted in the "gather-related" death of only one horse and the "nongather-related" deaths of six horses due to pre-existing health conditions, BLM spokeswoman Heather Jasinski said.

"We put them down in the field at the trap site or temporary holding corrals," she said, adding another three horses died after being transported to the Palomino Valley facility.

Anne Novak, executive director of California-based Protect Mustangs, said the animals probably would be alive today had they not been rounded up.

"Curiously, these wild horses were surviving on the range and only died at the hands of the BLM after being captured," she said. "We want transparency and request that all deaths be counted as roundup-related when they die or are euthanized within 30 days of the roundup?"

Fremont Indian Structure

Utah Dig Unearths Large

GOSHEN, Utah (AP) • Archaeologists have struck gold at a dig near the town of Goshen about 35 miles south of Provo: the largest Fremont Indian structure ever

Jim Allison, anthropology professor at Brigham Young University, said the 850square-foot structure is unique because it served as a communal area that brought the entire village together.

It's several times larger than typical Fremont structures, which average between 80 and 90 square

"It was really almost by chance we found this and excavated it, and it's in fact the largest Fremont Indian pit structure ever excavated;" he told the Deseret News.

Allison, who oversees students' work at the site, said radiocarbon dating shows it probably was occupied between 1025 and 1100.

The sheer volume of artifacts found on top of the burned-out structure is interesting, he said, and they show how the Fremont Indians lived.

"There was actually a layer of prehistoric trash that was really rich in artifacts that we found," Allison said. "We have probably a couple of hundred arrowheads. There's animal bones from meals, residue of meals they were eating. We've got corn and beans out of it, lots of broken pottery."

He said he thinks it was used as a communal building for "a fairly long time before it burned. But then I think they kept using the space for communal purposes but without the building?"

The Fremont Indians inhabited sites in what are now Utah, Nevada, Idaho and Colorado between 700 and 1300. They were known for their pottery, figurines, moccasins and use of farming.

The communal structure was found in an old Fremont Indian village where a total of nine buildings have been excavated mostly by students over the last four years. Allison believes there are many more structures nearby.

"Figuring out how large this village was is difficult because the hills are active and dirt is shifting," he told Provo's Daily Herald. "This central part was completely buried and it isn't easy to tell where structures may be. There could easily be dozens more?

The site, located at the mouth of Goshen Canyon near Current Creek, now is part of the ranch property of Richard Wolf.

"It's been really a surprise to see what's been uncovered here — the artifacts, the bowls, the game pieces, the figurines they've found. It's just amazing," Wolf said.

Residents Tour Blaze Devastation

COLORADO SPRINGS, **Colo.** • Melted bowling balls

in the front yard were among the strange sights that met C.J. Moore upon her return Sunday to her two-story home, now reduced to ashes by the worst wildfire in Colorado history.

"You wouldn't think bowling balls would melt," she told The Associated Press by phone from the scene in her Mountain Shadows neighborhood, where she was among residents who were allowed temporary visits to ar-

eas most affected by the fire. More than a week after it sparked on June 23, the Waldo Canyon fire was still being attacked by some 1,500 personnel. But crews working grueling shifts through the hot weekend made progress against the 26-square-mile fire, and authorities said they

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were confident they finally had built good fire lines in many areas to stop the spread of the flames.

So far, the blaze, now 45 percent contained, has damaged or destroyed nearly 350

It was just one of several still burning in the West, where parched conditions and searing heat contributed to the woes facing crews on hundreds of square miles across Utah, Montana, Wyoming and Idaho.

In Colorado Springs, a line of cars a mile long queued up at a middle school checkpoint, where police checked the identification of returning residents and handed them water bottles.

While searching for her great-grandmother's castiron skillets, Moore marveled at the juxtaposition of what burned and what hadn't. The bowling balls had been garden decorations.

"To find my mail in my mailbox, unscathed. It's just unreal. Unreal," she said. "Bird baths are fine. Some of the foliage is fine?" Three neighbors' homes

were unscathed. Only concrete remained of other homes, including hers. Cars were burned to nothing but charred metal.

"Good Lord! I've never seen anything like this. And thank God there was nobody there. Thank God there were no people here. There would have been no hope," Moore said.

According to police, the victim was stabbed in the neck while Estrada stood behind him in a booth. The victim tried to take cover under the booth, but the suspect continued to stab him until fleeing the

Utah Officer Falls to Death During Rescue

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • A Utah Highway Patrol trooper has fallen to his death in a search and rescue mission near Salt Lake City.

Sheriff Jim Winder of the Unified Police says Aaron Beesley fell from a 90-foot cliff Saturday during the rescue of two stranded teenage hikers on Mount Olympus.

No one saw the fall that killed the 13-year Patrol veteran.

Winder says a rescue helicopter located the hikers and carried them to safety, while the 34year-old Beesley was left behind on the ground.

The helicopter returned but was unable to locate the trooper. Winder told reporters at a news conference late Saturday night that searchers found him a short while later at the

bottom of the cliff. Officials say Beesley apparently was trying to retrieve his backpack when he lost his footing

and plunged to his death. Winder says the married father of three children "died in the line of duty while engaged in a heroic effort?"



Video Shows Horses Being Shocked

RENO, Nev. (AP) • A national animal rights group has released video footage that it says shows Reno Rodeo horses getting shocked just before they leave chutes for competition in violation of the rodeo's policy.

Representatives of Showing Animals Respect and Kindness, or SHARK, say the video shows someone clandestinely giving electric shocks to horses as they're released at the rodeo that was staged from June 14-23.

"Literally, these animals have to be tortured to get them to perform, and that is animal cruelty pure and simple;" said SHARK spokesman Stuart Chaifetz.

After watching the video, rodeo spokesman Steve Schroeder acknowledged to the Reno Gazette-Journal that bucking horses were shocked.

"It is true, that guy is shocking horses, and we're not OK with that," he said.

Cowboys were found to be "messing" with overhead cameras the rodeo installed after SHARK released similar video in 2011, Schroeder added, and the man who administered the shocks worked "really hard to stay out of camera view?

GOP: Voters Will Have Final Say on Health Care Law

WASHINGTON • Republican congressional leaders said Sunday that voters — not the Supreme Court — will have the final word on President Barack Obama's health care law come November. And they are betting that the law's unpopularity will be enough to drive Democrats from power.

The White House's response? Bring it on.

"We've got one last chance here to beat Obamacare, and we can do that in the November election," said Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, calling the law the "single worst piece of legislation" passed in modern times.

White House chief of staff Jack Lew countered that he believes most Americans want to put the health care debate to rest.

"I actually think the American people want us to focus on the economy, on creating jobs and moving forward," said Lew.

Republicans and Democrats have been wrangling for the upper hand in the health care debate since last week's Supreme Court ruling upholding the law's mandate that individuals buy health insurance or face a penalty. Chief Justice John Roberts, a conservative, provided the pivotal vote in that decision by ruling that the penalty was legal under the government's taxing authority.

While technically handing a political victory to Obama, Roberts' ruling invigorated Republicans eager to cast the law as a new tax.

"The American people do not want to go down this path," said House Majority Leader John Boehner, R-Ohio. "They do not want the government telling them what kind of insurance policy they have to buy, and how much they have to pay for it, and if you don't like it we're going to tax you."

Democrats refute the characterization of the law. Lew said the mandate would impact only 1 percent of Americans — those who can afford health insurance but refuse to buy it.

"This is a penalty on free riders," said Sen. Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y.

"We've got one last chance here to beat Obamacare, and we can do that in the November election."

Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell

Yet public opposition to the health care law remains high. Forty-seven percent of respondents in a recent Associated Press-GfK poll said they oppose the law while 33 percent said they support it.

However, much of the polling does find strong support for individual elements, like allowing young adults to remain on their parents' plan to age 26. Some Democrats see that as an opening to reframe the debate.

Republicans say they believe last week's ruling by the high court gives them fresh ammunition to attack Obama — and the Democrats who support him — in the upcoming election because of the health care bill's connection to jobs. The GOP says the law puts onerous mandates on industry that could stifle job creation.

"I think it's intertwined

with the economy, and I think it's an example where Washington doesn't get it,' said Sen. Tom Coburn, R-Okla., of the health care bill.

House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi said Sunday that Republicans, including Mitt Romney, are "being the mouthpiece of the health care industry" and that the bill will actually improve the economy.

"The costs were unsustainable," she said of the current health care system. "It's a competitiveness issue for business and for our economy. So we had to (come) to a place where we lowered costs to all concerned, and that we again take it down a path where we continue to lower costs."

If given control of the Senate next year, Mc-Connell said he would support using budget reconciliation rules to repeal the health care law. Doing so would prohibit Senate filibusters and require only 51 votes to succeed. In 2010, Republicans lambasted Democrats for relying on these rules to pass the health care bill, calling their tactics unusual and hyperpartisan.

McConnell said he'll do whatever it takes to repeal the law.

"I'm confident they're going to give us the votes to repeal it," he said of the American public.

The House is scheduled to vote to overturn the law on July 9. The vote will largely be symbolic since the Democrats control the Senate. But it will put lawmakers on record for the upcoming political campaign.

McConnell and Lew spoke on "Fox News Sunday." Boehner, Schumer and Coburn spoke on CBS' "Face the Nation." Pelosi spoke on NBC's "Meet the Press."

Fort Bragg Soldier Who Shot Commander Dies

Lt. Col. Roy Tisdale of Alvin, Texas, was fatally wounded Thursday during a safety briefing. A third soldier, 22-year-old Spc. Michael E. Latham of Vacaville, Calif., also was wounded and has been released from the hospital.

Elder enlisted in the Army in 2004. He deployed to Iraq from October 2006 to November 2007 and to Afghanistan from September 2010 to July 2011.

Conn. Inmate Saw Oysters as Way Out from Death Row

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) •

A Connecticut man on death row for the killings of a mother and her two daughters in a 2007 home invasion says he came up with a bizarre plan to end his own life by lying about killing others in a spree of violence.

In an interview with *The* Hartford Courant, Steven Hayes said he fabricated claims in letters last year that he killed 17 people and committed dozens of drugged date rapes. He had hoped prison authorities would notify police and that he could trade information for food, including oysters to which he is deathly allergic.

"I planned to eat them and have them find me dead in my cell the next morning;"he said.

Hayes' desire to die has been a theme of his defense since the July 23, 2007, killings.

He raped and strangled Jennifer Hawke-Petit. Her daughters, Hayley, 17, and Michaela, 11, died of smoke inhalation after they were doused with gasoline and the house was set on fire.

Joshua Komisarjevsky also was convicted and sentenced to death for the killings. In an interview with The Associated Press in May, Komisarjevsky declined an opportunity to ex-

press remorse.

Hayes said he would not follow the example set by serial killer Michael Ross, a Connecticut death row inmate who waived his appeals and was executed in 2005. Hayes said he promised his lawyer he would not end his appeals to hasten his own execution.

His public defender, Thomas Ullmann, confirmed his client's promise.

"He has made a commitment to me that he will not pull a Michael Ross," he said.

Hayes said he expected to die as he and Komisarjevsky fled the burning house. He expected Cheshire police officers to shoot him when they saw the fake but authentic-looking gun he was carrying or when Komisarjevsky rammed their getaway vehicle into a police cruiser.

As his trial was getting underway, Hayes was found unconscious in his prison cell after overdosing on prescription medication. In testimony at the trial, Hayes said he slashed his wrists, slammed his mother's car into a rock and tied a sock around his neck.

He also said he fantasized about putting his head in a prison cell toilet and doing a back flip, but didn't because he feared he would be paralyzed rather than die.

Prosecutor Who Led Historic Case Dies

Veterans Respond to Court Overturning Lying Law

FAYETTEVILLE, N.C. • Jack Jacobs can proudly - and truthfully – say he was awarded the Medal of Honor for his valor in Vietnam. After a recent Supreme Court ruling, anyone else is free under the First Amendment to make the same claim, whether it's

true or not. Some military veterans say they consider the ruling a slap in the face. For Jacobs, though, it was the right decision. He said he wore the uniform to protect people's rights — even if he doesn't agree with how they exercise those rights.

"There are lots of things people do that revolt me, but I'm happy that I fought for this country not to give them the right to do something stupid, but for the majority of the people to do the right thing," said Jacobs, 66, who earned the Medal of Honor in 1969 for carrying several of his buddies to safety from a shelled rice field despite the shrapnel wounds in his head, the streaming blood clouding his

"I'm a free speech guy," he

The high court ruled 6-3 on Thursday to toss out the conviction of Xavier Alvarez, a former California politician who lied about being a decorated military veteran. He had been charged under the 2006 Stolen Valor Act, which made it a crime to lie about receiving the Medal of Honor and other prestigious military recognitions. The decision invalidated the law, as the justices ruled Alvarez's fabricated story was constitutionally protected speech.

For 87-year-old Murel Winans, lies about service can cause real harm and lead people to doubt the veracity of claims made by people who served during actually wartime. He said he didn't buy the free speech argument.

"You feel like you never earned it, because when you tell someone what you've done, they'll say, 'you're lying just like those other guys," said Winans, 87, who described himself as a "fresh young hillbilly from West Virginia" when he landed on Normandy's Omaha Beach on June 6, 1944 - his 19th birthday.

The law was inspired by the 1998 book "Stolen Valor" by B.G. "Jug" Burkett, a Vietnam veteran. The government had argued the law was a needed tool to protect the integrity of military medals.

The ruling was issued the same day as the high court's landmark decision upholding President Barack Obama's signature health care overhaul. While much of the nation watched with rapt focus on what would become of the law that requires every American to have health insurance, many people in military communities were more focused on the ruling on the Stolen Valor Act.

Emotions ran high in Fayetteville, home to the 251square-mile Fort Bragg. About 38 percent of North Carolina's population is either currently in the service, a veteran or a dependent of one, according to the N.C. Department of Administration. The state is also home to the sprawling Camp Lejeune, known for its training in amphibious assaults like the one at Normandy.

"My boys are out there giving their heart and soul," said Rose Moore, whose son is stationed in Afghanistan. "To have someone say they did it and they didn't do anything it's a lie, it's dishonest?"

Army Capt. Albert Bryant acknowledged that he was disappointed, saying the lies can detract from people who earn something like the Medal of Honor. However, his disappointment was somewhat

"I know it's the First Amendment, but maybe you need to have an amendment to the amendment to protect enlisted men and women," Bryant said. "Very few things in life are black and white so you have to take certain things in context, but there has to be some kind of

common sense applied."

The decision doesn't give anyone carte blanche to lie about their service record in an effort to get free perks, however. Anyone who fabricates any honors can still face fraud charges, which is what happened to former Marine Sgt. David Budwah in 2009. He was demoted to private and dishonorably discharged after pretending to be a wounded war hero to get free seats at rock concerts and sports events.

Twenty-year Army veteran Raymond Hunt said the justices made the right move in protecting free speech. He said it's enough that Alvarez has been publicly shamed.

"For the rest of his life he

has to walk around with that look on his face and know that he was the biggest liar in the country on something that is so sensitive to our country," Hunt said.

Retired Army Lt. Hal Fritz said the court treated those medals as something abstract. But for him, it's a memory.

Fritz was leading a sevenvehicle armored column down a Vietnam highway in 1969 when enemy combatants launched a surprise attack from all sides. Fritz was seriously wounded in the crossfire, but ran through the machine gun blasts to rally his troops. After his platoon survived the first wave, Fritz charged into a second enemy advancement armed with only a pistol and a bayonet. He was seriously wounded, but refused medical attention until all of his men had been cared for. He was awarded the Medal of Honor in 1971.

"We would disagree with the majority saying lying about receiving the medals doesn't devalue them," said Fritz, 68, who now lives in Illinois. "I would say go back with me to Vietnam dragging the dead and dying off the battlefield?'

The Medal of Honor is among the rarest of honors: Only 81 of the 3,457 recipients since the Civil War are still living. Of those, only three are younger than 35, according to the Congressional Medal of Honor Society.



U.S. Judge Temporarily Blocks Miss. Abortion Law

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) • A federal judge on Sunday temporarily blocked enforcement of a Mississippi law that could shut down the only abortion clinic in the state.

U.S. District Judge Daniel P. Jordan in Jackson issued a temporary restraining order the day the new law took effect.

He set a July 11 hearing to determine whether to block the law for a longer time.

"Though the debate over abortion continues, there exists legal precedent the

court must follow," Jordan

The law requires anyone performing abortions at the state's only clinic to be an OB-GYN with privileges to admit patients to a local hospital. Such privileges can be difficult to obtain, and the clinic contends the mandate is designed to put it out of business. A clinic spokeswoman, Thompson, has said the two physicians who do abortions there are OB-

GYNs who travel from oth-

er states.





Mexican Old Guard Leads, Ruling Party Concedes

MEXICO CITY (AP) • Mexico's voters appeared poised to bring the old guard back to power on Sunday in a mostly quiet and orderly vote that was marked by a heavy police and troop presence in violence-plagued parts of the country.

The former ruling Institutional Revolutionary Party, known as the PRI, led by telegenic former Mexico State Gov. Enrique Pena Nieto, has held a strong lead throughout the campaign. The party, voted out of the presidency in 2000 after 71 years in power, also appeared likely to retake at least a plurality in the two houses of Congress and some governorship.

The party has been bolstered by voter fatigue with a sluggish economy and the sharp escalation of a drug war that has killed roughly 50,000 Mexicans over the past six years. The desire for change suddenly works to benefit the PRI, which ran Mexico from 1929 to 2000, and many see their victory as inevitable.

Syrian Opposition Rejects New **International Plan**

BEIRUT (AP) • Syria's main opposition groups rejected on Sunday a new international plan that calls for a transitional government because the compromise agreement did not bar Presi-

dent Bashar Assad from participating. Their reaction held out little hope for an end to more than 15 months of carnage on a day when the main opposition group said 800 people were killed in violence in the past week alone.

Opposition activists groups say more than 14,000 people have been killed since the uprising against President Bashar Assad's authoritarian rule began in March 2011, or on average about 900 a month. That would make last week's toll alone almost as high as the monthly average as government forces furiously pounded rebellious towns and cities with helicopters, tanks and artillery in an offensive aimed at recovering rebelheld territories.

Mid-Atlantic Power **Outages Could Last Days**

FRANCONIA, Va. • A day after seeking refuge at shopping malls and movie theaters, hoping the lights would be back on when they returned, 3 million residents faced a grim reality Sunday: stifling homes, spoiled food and a looming commute filled with

knocked-out stoplights. Two days after storms tore across the eastern U.S., power outages were forcing people to get creative to stay cool in dangerously hot weather. Temperatures approached 100 degrees in many storm-stricken areas, and utility officials said the power will likely be out for

several more days. "If we don't get power tonight, we'll have to throw everything away," Susan Fritz, a mother of three, said grimly of her refrigerator and freezer. Fritz came to a library in Bethesda, Md., so her son could do school work. She charged her phone and

iPad at her local gym. On Sunday night, federal and state officials in the mid-Atlantic region gave

many workers the option of staying home Monday to ease congestion on the roads. Federal agencies will be open in Washington, but non-emergency employees have the option of taking leave or working from home. Maryland's governor also gave state workers wide leeway for staying out of the office.

The storm was blamed for 14 deaths, most from trees falling on homes and cars. Meanwhile, Coast Guard officials say they have suspended the search for a man who went missing early Saturday while boating during the storm off Maryland.

The bulk of the damage was in West Virginia, Washington and the capital's Virginia and Maryland suburbs. At least six of the dead were killed in Virginia, including a 90year-old woman asleep in her bed when a tree slammed into her home. Two young cousins in New Jersey were killed when a tree fell on their tent while camping. Two were killed in Maryland, one in Ohio, one in Kenone in tucky and Washington.

see family. The parents had to take two extra days off from their jobs to make the Wednesday-Saturday trip work.

"It's not ideal because normally we would tack on one day to a long weekend," Hutton said.

AAA, one of the nation's largest travel agencies, projects 42.3 million Americans will journey 50 miles or more from home between July 3 and July 8. That's roughly the same amount that traveled in 2007, the last time July Fourth fell on a Wednesday. Last year, when the holiday fell on a Monday, 40.3 million people traveled. But before you think it's a big increase, note that AAA's economists changed how they estimated the number of travelers: They used a six-day period this year compared to five last year.

"In general, we think that travel from last year is pretty flat," said Shane Norton, a director at IHS Global Insight, which provides economic forecasting and research for AAA.

The economy weighs heavily on families' travel plans. Consumer confidence has fallen for four straight months as Americans continue to worry about their jobs and retirement funds. The June reader of a widely followed confidence index was 62. A reading of 90 indicates a healthy economy.

That helps explain why families don't seem prepared yet to splurge on vacation. Many want to get away but are opting for lower-priced hotels and are looking specifically for properties with free breakfast and Internet. Or they're choosing instead to stay with friends or relatives.

The typical traveler will spend \$749 over six days, down from \$807 over five days last year, according to an online survey of 344 people conducted for AAA. Another look at the holiday, by Visa Inc., shows that all Americans - whether traveling or not - will spend an average of \$191 on July 4th activities, down from \$216 last year. Visa surveyed 1,012 people by telephone.

Iran Feels Pinch of New EU Oil Sanctions

TEHRAN, Iran • As new European Union sanctions targeting Iran's vital oil industry took effect Sunday, Tehran acknowledged the measures aimed at reining in its disputed nuclear program were taking a toll. The vice president said authorities had stockpiled imported goods and hard currency to help cushion the blow to the economy.

The ban by the 27-member EU on the purchase of Iranian oil dealt the Islamic Republic its second economic setback in days, following fresh U.S. sanctions that prohibit the world's banks from completing oil transactions with Iranian banks. Combined, the measures significantly ratchet up the pressure on an Iranian econ-

omy already squeezed by previous rounds of sanctions. 'Today, we are facing the heaviest of sanctions, and we ask people to help officials in this battle;" Vice President Mohammad Reza Rahimi was quoted as saying on state television's

He said the "dastardly sanctions" might cause "occasional confusion" in the domestic market. Iran reacted furiously when the U.S. and EU sanctions were announced, threatening to block the strategic Strait of Hormuz, a vital waterway used to ship about one-fifth of the world's oil. On Sunday Iranian officials appeared to be backing away from that threat, which roiled international oil markets at the time

Get Ready for Battle on Obamacare

robably no state in the union than Idaho has been officially more aligned against the Affordable Care Act. Now it is going to have to decide what it will do about its terms.

The court challenge, turned aside (in general) by the U.S. Supreme Court on Thursday, likely means the law's provisions mostly will stand. The one major unpopular part of the law, the insurance mandate, will be defended to the death by the insurance lobby. And most of the the other pieces, such as such as the ban on pre-existing condition denials, payments in the donut hole and extensions of parental policies to twenty-something children, among others, separately will be be politically hard to reverse.

Thursday's decision, widely unexpected (the online in Trade site ran at 73 percent predicting a mandate overturn minutes before the decision was announced), is a real headsnapper in Idaho, where officials like Governor C.L. "Butch" Otter, the congressional delegation and legislative leaders have routinely described it and the whole law as unconstitutional. Otter's official website even has a whole page with numerous links headlined "Fighting Obamacare," wherein labeled "unconstitutional." (Will that be edited?) Idaho is in a category distinct from many other states, including Washington and Oregon, where officials have moved to establish health insurance exchanges and take other actions.

Idaho may even lead its pack. In 2010, the Idaho Legislature was first in the nation to vote for a lawsuit to overturn the Affordable Care Act. Soon after, legislators gave serious consideration to what amounted to nullification (Idaho was among about a dozen states where that idea was pursued seriously) - an effort blocked by a narrow vote of a Senate committee (one of whose opposition Republicans, John McGee, won't be back). Legislators held off partly on the theory that the law would be thrown out by the Supreme



Court. In April 2010 Otter issued an executive order which, his news release said, "directs State agencies not to establish new programs, promulgate rules or accept federal funding to implement Obamacare. It also bars State agencies from assisting federal agencies in implementing the law."

And now? Get ready for battle. The two top state Senate Republican leaders, President pro tem Brent Hill and Majority Leader Bart Davis, were among the critics of the nullification legislation; don't be surprised if both are challenged. Nullification legislation will be back, whoever is in the White House next January.

While the Supreme Court said that states can opt out of the law's Medicaid expansion without costing them all Medicaid payments, it still allowed substantial penalty in new funds. Will the Idaho Legislature write it off?

There is an aspect to the law Otter did support (in a different fashion) putting in place: The exchange of private health insurance plans. That was derailed by the legislature; now, budget committee Co-chairman Dean Cameron said after the decision, "Unfortunately, if (Republicans) do not win the presidential election or are able to take over Congress - both the House and Senate - it leaves Idaho completely behind the eight-ball."

One of the biggest questions remaining: Will the 19 percent of Idahoans, about 294,000 of the state's citizens, along with the many hundreds of thousands of others left behind in the health care system America has had, be forgotten in the battle over ideology?



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Hunter's Book an Insensitive Fantasy

ith the publication of "What Really Happened: John Edwards, Our Daughter, and Me," Rielle Hunter enters the company of Gennifer Flowers (movies), Donna Rice (jeans) and Monica Lewinsky (handbags) who try to get something other than the obvious out of their brush with political fame.

In Hunter's book, moxie, ambition, and self-delusion ooze from every pore. Just as Flowers insists she wasn't just a lounge singer, Hunter maintains that she was more than a videographer. She had studied Eastern philosophy in California and came to New York to be a spiritual adviser.

Maybe that's why she stood at the door of the Regency Hotel in Manhattan in 2006 and whispered "You're so hot" in Edwards's ear. Frances Quinn Hunter, the result of subsequent encounters, is now 4 years old.

And that gives Hunter her excuse for giving up her career in spirituality for writing: She wants her daughter, and Edwards' children, to have an accurate record of her place in their father's life.



While most of us would look for a quiet moment and a private venue for such a delicate conversation, Hunter decided the better venue is a book, a prime-time ABC News special and multiple talk shows. The book supplements earlier documentary evidence provided by Hunter in April 2010 in the form of a spread in GQ magazine in which she tells her story posing, legs spread and in a man's shirt, with a bevy of stuffed animals.

We already lived through Edwards' dalliance with Hunter. Is there any reason to relive it? There is — if only to see how so many were fooled by such a shallow man. Selected as the vice-presidential candidate of a major party in 2004! Serious candidate for president in 2008! Father of the Year in 2007! Hunter accidentally reveals someone who didn't deserve to be a senator, much less a president.

Edwards is self-absorbed, vain, lazy and remarkably comfortable with a lie. He spent as much time on the phone (four hours a night) as in briefings. Of course, it showed in the endless primping waiting to go on TV, the empty emoting over the two Americas, the mushy reasons for running.

The only surprise in this book is Hunter giving full vent to her hatred for Elizabeth Edwards, John's deceased wife, who had to cope with both the return of deadly cancer and Edwards' affair, which she discovered little by little.

In Hunter's telling, Elizabeth should have been fine with all this. Instead she is a "witch on wheels" who is crazy, venomous and unreasonable. Feeling bad that his wife's cancer had returned in 2007, Edwards broke up with Hunter and held a press conference saying he would be with Elizabeth every step of the way. Less than 24 hours later, he called Hunter.

What makes this tell-all more noxious is that Edwards is complicit in the further humiliation of his children and his parents. He didn't write the

book, obviously, though some parts detailing Elizabeth's reaction to Hunter had to come from him. But he has helped to promote it. After Edwards's trial (at which he was acquitted on one count that he used campaign funds to keep his mistress), he announced from the courthouse steps his devotion to "my precious Quinn, whom I love more than any of

you can imagine."

There was no such fulsome affection for his father, stricken beside him, or his daughter Cate, who lent him dignity every day walking into the courthouse. A couple of weeks later, just before publicity for the book begins, Edwards takes Hunter and his daughter to a beach house in North Carolina to flirt, kiss, and play in the sand. Turns out, lying low was for trial. Frolicking on the beach on Father's Day weekend while his motherless children celebrated alone — that's for the

Gun Group Takes 'Junk' **Guns to Chicago** for Trade-in

CHICAGO • Last weekend, members of a downstate Illinois pro-gun group drove to Chicago, handed in about 60 weapons to the city's trade-in program and walked out with more than \$6,200 in gift cards.

While the city program is meant to reduce the number of deadly weapons in Chicago, the guns traded in were rusted, damaged and, according to the group, pretty much useless.


Police said the group is taking advantage of a program intended to take firearms off the street. Members of Guns Save Life, in Champaign County, countered that they are putting the money to good use - to purchase ammunition and firearms for a youth program that teaches gun safety and marksmanship. The group also traded in BB guns and starter pistols.

"We just took advantage of Chicago's induced, artificial market on rusty junk," said John Boch, the group's president. The city collected 5,500

weapons at city churches June 23. Police handed out out a \$100 gift card per firearm and a \$10 gift card for a BB gun or replica.

Guns Save Life has done the same thing twice before, and most of the weapons are of little value and are collecting dust in the closet of members or relatives. Boch said the guns were so beaten and worn that one of them, a shotgun, broke while being inspected by a police officer. The group did not get a gift card for that gun.

"Some of them are about 100 years old," he said. "They are rusty. Some have been in fires. It's just junk."

Sci-fi Policing: Predicting Crime before It Occurs

Police officials say they are having success with a computer algorithm model that helps determine where to send officers to prevent or possibily interrupt a crime, which may serve as a model for other cash-strapped law enforcement agencies.

LOS ANGELES • Los Angeles police are aiming to beat suspects to the scene of a crime by using computers to predict where trouble might

The Los Angeles Police Department is the largest agency to embrace an experiment known as "predictive policing," which crunches data to determine where to send officers to thwart would-be thieves and burglars. Time Magazine called it one of the best inventions

Early successes could serve as a model for other cash-strapped law enforcement agencies, but some legal observers are concerned it could lead to unlawful stops and searches that violate Fourth Amendment protections.

In the San Fernando Valley, where the program was launched late last year, officers are seeing double-digit drops in burglaries and other property crimes. The program has turned enough inhouse skeptics into believers that there are plans to roll it out citywide by next sum-

"We have prevented hundreds and hundreds of people coming home and seeing their homes robbed," said police Capt. Sean Malinows-

Crime mapping has long been a tool used to determine where the bad guys lurk. The idea has evolved from colored pins placed on a map to identifying "hot spots" via a computer database based on past crimes and possible patterns.

Over the past decade, many large police departments, including Los Angeles and New York City, have used CompStat, a system that tracks crime figures and enables police to send extra officers to trouble spots.

The new program used by LAPD and police in the Northern California city of Santa Cruz is more timely and precise, proponents said. Built on the same model for predicting aftershocks following an earthquake, the software promises to show officers what might be coming based on simple, constantly calibrated data — location, time and type of

The software generates prediction boxes - as small as 500 square feet — on a patrol map. When officers have spare time, they are told to 'go in the box."

The goal is not to boost the number of arrests, a common police benchmark to reflect crime reduction. Officers want to either intercept a crime in progress or deter would-be criminals.

"I want to disrupt an activity before an arrest is made," Malinowski said. "You can't arrest your way out of some of these prob-

Jeff Brantingham, an anthropology professor at the University of California, Los Angeles, said the data also is derived from criminal behaviors - repeat victimization and the notion that criminals tend not to stray too far from areas they know

"If you are victimized today the risk that you'll be a victim again goes way up," said Brantingham, who co-founded a software company tapped by LAPD for its program.

So far, the program has been implemented in five LAPD divisions that cover 130 square miles and roughly 1.3 million people. In the valley's Foothill Division, where more than half of the crimes committed are property-related, about 170 patrol officers are spending a total of about 70 hours a week working in the

In one instance, a police captain questioned sending officers into a box that was on the edge of his coverage area. Officers went out and didn't find anything, but returned several nights later and found a guy breaking a window. The division leads the de-

partment in crime reduction, Malinowski said. Crimes were down in the area 13 percent following the rollout compared to a slight uptick across the rest of the city where the program wasn't being used.

"If you had told us a few years ago you could get an algorithm to perform as the same as a crime analyst, we would think you were crazy," Malinowski said. "Even the most skeptical people are now coming up to me and saying, 'I think this is working?"

Other police departments across the nation are using similar approaches. Tech titan IBM has teamed up with police in Memphis and Charleston, S.C., to provide analysis; Minneapolis police are breaking down crime statistics and factoring in geographic locations to determine future crimes.

Andrew Guthrie Ferguson, an assistant law professor at the University of the District of Columbia, has written about predictive policing and how it may impact Fourth Amendment protections from unlawful searches and seizures.

Ferguson said the trend is "a seductive idea" for law enforcement agencies that carry a lot of power. He believes the LAPD has done a good job with the data but he's concerned that other departments could abuse the process with racial profiling or stereotyping a neighborhood or an area.

"There are real pressures to expand this nationally and see it succeed," Ferguson said. "I think it's an important innovation. But like any innovation, it's not foolproof, and looking closely at the data is important to ensure it doesn't harm the civil liberties of the people living in those areas."

Ferguson said he envisions a legal challenge at some point. He used an example of an officer patrolling a predicted area of burglary and who sees a man carrying a bag and detains the man because he looks suspicious.

"Alone, a man carrying a bag is not reasonable suspicion," Ferguson explained. "But in court, the officer will say, 'The computer told me to go there? For the lawyer or the court, what are you going to do with this information? You can't cross-examine a computer."

Some States Trim Use of Planes in Speed Traps

NEW YORK • Highway signs throughout New York warn that when it comes to catching speeders, the long arm of the law extends even into the sky. "State Police aircraft used in speed enforcement," they say.

lead-footed Actually, drivers hitting the interstates for the Independence Day holiday can keep their eyes on the road. The New York State Police, who once routinely used planes to clock motorists, haven't written a single ticket in that manner since at least 2005.

"It hasn't been entirely eliminated," Sgt. Kern Swoboda, a state police spokesman, said of the signs. "We still have the airplanes."

But in these budget-conscious times, he said, launching aircraft to catch speeders just isn't fiscally prudent.

New York is one of several states to scale back the use of aircraft for traffic enforcement in recent years because of budget cuts or concerns about cost-effectiveness.

Typically, aerial enforcement programs involve a plane, a pilot, a spotter to time vehicles as they travel between lines painted on the road and several cruisers to pull people over and issue

"That ain't cheap," Swoboda said. He added that updated laser technology now allows a trooper on the ground to get speed readings over long distances and in heavy traffic - two situations where aircraft used to be superior.

"So what better way to do it than have three guys at a U-turn?" Swoboda said. "We found that it was far more efficient, and a lot less expensive."

A full accounting of which law enforcement agencies have curtailed the use of aircraft for speed enforcement was unavailable, but the list

includes some states that had previously made robust use of the tactic.

The California Highway Patrol still has 15 planes used to catch speeders, but spokeswoman Fran Clader said that as the department's annual air operations budget has dropped from about \$12 million to \$8 million, aircraft became more focused on supporting searches and pursuits.

"We still enforce speed with the fixed-wing aircraft but in a much-reduced capacity," she said.

The Virginia State Police launched an aggressive aerial speed enforcement program in 2000 but largely abandoned regular patrols after 2007. Last year, it flew only one such mission, which resulted in tickets being given to 20 drivers, the department said. It flew four missions the year before, none in 2009 and only one


"Due to economic conditions and mandated budget cuts ... we've had to look at cost savings," said department spokeswoman Corinne Geller.

She said it cost about \$150 per hour to operate the planes - a figure that includes fuel and maintenance but not manpower. In the past, she said, the speed enforcement flights were paid for with federal grants. But with less federal money coming in lately, resources have been focused on keeping troopers on the road.

The Washington State Patrol's aviation section, which had been participating in roughly 13,500 traffic stops per year, had to scale back after suffering a \$1.4 million budget cut over a two-year period that began in 2009, according to unit commander Lt. Jim Nobach. It lost three pilots, who had to return to road duties. Flight hours were slashed by 39 percent. As a result, aircraft are now stopping 5,000 fewer drivers per year.


Uhh, make that the first female. She's still a girl, a 17-year-old who'll be a high school senior in the fall. But first, she's got some important business this summer: the Olympics.

Spain Wins Again, Beating Italy 4-0 at Euro 2012

KIEV, Ukraine • Just like clockwork, Spain's "tiki taka'' passing game tore Italy apart.

The World Cup champions controlled the play Sunday in the European Championship final, as they usually do. They moved the ball up the field with short pass after short pass, as they usually do.

But, incredibly, they also managed to score a whopping four goals, something they don't usually do.

It all added up to a 4-0 win over Italy and a third straight major soccer title for Spain.

"We won being true to our playing style, and by moving the ball the we way we moved it we knew how to take charge of the match," said Spain goalkeeper Iker Casillas, the team's captain. "What we do is difficult but we make it look easy?"

Casillas and Spain striker Fernando Torres also made their own histories. Torres became the first man to score in two European Championship finals, and Casillas played in his record 100th victory in internation-

Spain's other goals on Sunday at the Olympic Stadium came from David Silva,

Jordi Alba and Juan Mata.

"We were superior to Italy," said midfielder Xavi Hernandez, perhaps Spain's most influential player over the last four years. "We played a complete game and perhaps the best of the entire European Championship. We made history?

Four years ago at Euro 2008, Spain ended a 44-year drought of major titles, beating Germany 1-0 in the final to start a run that has been unmatched by any other team in history.

Although they lost to the United States in the semifinals of the Confederations Cup in 2009, snapping a record 15-game winning streak, the Spanish have been nearly impossible to beat in competitive matches.

A year after that game against the Americans, Spain opened the 2010 World Cup with a loss to Switzerland. But they then went on a tear, winning their next six games to finally

claim a World Cup title and undoubtedly shed for good the "underachiever" tag.

In all that time since Euro 2008, Spain has won with flair, using its short passing game - dubbed "tiki taka" by the Spanish media and adopted by the team - to dazzle scrambling opponents.

"Tonight, there was no contest," Italy goalkeeper Gianluigi Buffon said. "They were too superior, so the bitterness at losing this final is only relative?"

Spearmon Cruises in 200 with No Controversy

EUGENE, Ore. • With a Monday runoff in the women's 100 meters still looming over the U.S. track trials, Wallace Spearmon kept the men's 200 controversy-free with an easy vic-

Spearmon got off to a slow start, but recovered in time to win in 19.82 seconds Sunday at Hayward Field.

His victory – and his chance for redemption at the London Games after losing the bronze medal to disqualification in Beijing - was an expected finish to what should have been the conclusion to the trials.

Instead, Allyson Felix and Jeneba Tarmoh will run Monday afternoon to settle a third-place tie in the 100 for the final spot on the U.S. Olympic team.

Felix and Tarmoh finished in a dead heat for third in the 100 more than a week ago behind winner Carmelita Jeter and Tianna Madison, putting the team for the event in limbo. Track officials had no policy in place to resolve it but the next day devised a tiebreaker that included the options of a runoff or a coin flip.

The decision was put off eight days to allow Felix and Tarmoh to focus on the 200, which Felix handily won Saturday night. Tarmoh finished

On Sunday morning the athletes got together with

track officials and decided on the Monday runoff.

USA Track and Field was criticized because there was no tiebreaking policy in the first place and because the matter lingered for so long. It certainly got most of the attention on Sunday as the trials wound to a close.

Wearing his sunglasses, Spearmon overcame his shaky start and finished the 200 well in front of runnerup Maurice Mitchell and Isiah Young.

Spearmon is anxious to erase the bad memories from Beijing, when he was disqualified for a lane violation.

"That's definitely something that's been on my mind since 2008. It's hard to make one Olympic team, go and make the final, step on the line when you thought you had a medal, do about 300

meters of the victory lap and have to live with that," he said. "If I didn't make the team this year, that would've been on my mind the rest of my life - the chance I could've had. Being able to go back and make my second Olympic team and have a chance at redemption, I don't take my second chances lightly. I'm going to go out there and leave it all on the track."

Spearmon was the obvious favorite in the field, which was somewhat diluted when sprinters Justin Gatlin and Tyson Gay decided to pass after securing spots on the Olympic team in the 100. And reigning Olympic 200 bronze medalist Walter Dix didn't run because of a lingering hamstring injury that was apparent in the 100.

Dix's only option for mak-

ing it to London will be as a member of the 400 relay Shortly after Spearmon

claimed his third U.S. title in the event, his good friend Usain Bolt ran the 200 at the Jamaican Trials, finishing second to Yohan Blake. The trio of Blake, Bolt and Spearmon instantly became the favorites going into London.

In other events on Sunday, defending outdoor champion Lashinda Demus won the women's 400 hurdles in 53.98, joining runner-up Georganne Moline and thirdplace finisher T'Erea Brown on the Olympic team.

On the men's side, Michael Tinsley won the 400 hurdles in 48.33, besting reigning Olympic champion Angelo Taylor and defending Olympic silver medalist Kerron Clement.

Bershawn Jackson, the defending Olympic bronze medalist, fell into the finish but finished fourth.

London will be Taylor's fourth Olympics.

"Not many people make it to their fourth Olympic team, so this is something that I really wanted to do," Taylor said. "I knew the competition I was facing. My main goal was just to stay healthy, and goal No. 2 was just to make the team."

Leo Manzano won the men's 1,500 in 3:35.75, followed by former Oregon **Ducks teammates Matthew** Centrowitz and Andrew Wheating.

Jonathan Horton Makes 2nd Olympic Gymnastics Team

SAN JOSE, Calif. • Sam Mikulak heard the names rattled off. Jake Dalton. Jonathan Horton.

Each announcement followed by 10 seconds of clapping and a brief wave from the latest members of the U.S. men's Olympic gymnastics team.

"It seemed like an eternity that's for sure," Mikulak

More than enough time for the 19-year-old to wonder if he made the wrong decision on Saturday when he rested his sprained left ankle rather than compete in the final day of Olympic tri-

"The whole time I was in the meeting, it was panic," Mikulak said.

Relax kid, you're good. Mikulak was the final name called by U.S. men's program director Dennis McIntyre on Sunday, though it took a moment for it so sink through his perfectly spiked hairdo.

"It hilarious because they said Sam and Sam was just like 'What? What?" 'Horton said. "Sam was just like so pumped, it was awesome."

Reaching a goal more than a decade in the making has a tendency to do that to somebody.

Mikulak, Dalton and Horton will join trials winner Danell Leyva and national champion John Orozco in London on a team expected to challenge longtime powers Japan and China for team gold.

Chris Brooks, Steven Legendre and Alex Naddour are the alternates.

Horton gives a veteran presence to the deepest U.S. Olympic team in recent memory. The 26-year-old

helped the U.S. win a team bronze in Beijing four years ago, then added a silver medal on high bar. None of the other four members are over 20.

"It shows that the future, we're going to be tough," Mikulak said with a laugh.

And, the U.S. hopes, in the present too. U.S. men's team coordinator Kevin Mazeika is confident Mikulak will be ready when men's qualifying starts at the O2 Arena on July 28.

Mikulak will undergo intense rehab and likely won't be able to do full routines on floor or vault for two weeks. He will join the rest of the team at training camp in Colorado Springs, Colo., from July 8-11 and coach Kurt Golder believes the first University of Michigan male gymnast to make an Olympic team will be close to 100 percent.

Dalton, the reigning NCAA champion, gives the U.S. someone who can put up eye-popping numbers on floor and vault. The 20year-old won both events during trials easily, his explosiveness on the floor leaving Brooks to joke he was "disgusted" watching Dalton's powerful tumbling The junior at Oklahoma

called the moment "bittersweet" because it means the tight-knit group of 15 national team members will be split up. The alternates will stay in Birmingham – about two hours northwest — during the games. Brooks will try to stay focused, pointing out the U.S. used two alternates in Beijing four years ago.

"That's something you notice," he said. "At the same time, you know you want the guys in front of you to stay healthy."

SERAING, Belgium • Peter Sagan blushed, giggled and eventually brushed off comparisons to Lance Armstrong on Sunday after becoming the youngest rider to win a Tour de France stage since the Texan nearly a generation ago.

The 22-year-old Slovak gave a command performance in his debut in a full Tour stage by outsprinting Swiss rider Fabian Cancellara, who mounted a spirited and successful defense of his yellow jersey over a hilly ride in eastern Belgium in Stage 1.

The standings among the top contenders to win the three-week race didn't change much after the 123mile loop from Liege to suburban Seraing featuring five low-grade climbs. Bradley Wiggins of Britain and defending champion Cadel

Overall, Wiggins is second behind Cancellara, seven seconds back, and Evans is another 10 seconds slower in eighth.

Sagan, who won five of eight stages in this year's Tour of California among the 13 stage victories he has this year, placed his hands on his shoulders after edging out Cancellara and Norway's Edvald Boasson Hagen. It was the culmination of a tricky uphill patch with cobblestones right before the finish.

The promising Slovak becomes the youngest rider to capture a Tour stage since Armstrong won his first of his 22 career Tour stage victories at age 21 - in Stage 8 in 1993. The youngest of all time is Italy's Fabio Battesini, who was 19 when he won one in the 1931 Tour.

Woods won for the third time this year, the most of anyone on the PGA Tour, and it was the 74th win of his career. That moved him past Jack Nicklaus into second place on the tour list, eight short of Sam Snead.







A few years ago I wrote her a letter. In it I included pictures of my children, saying I would like her to know her grandchildren. She ripped the photos into pieces and sent them back with a note telling me to leave her alone and that I had "made my choice in life."

Last month, I received a letter from her saying she regretted destroying the pictures and would now like me to send more and she could meet us all. She also asked me for \$6,000. She claims I "know" she never abused me and that she isn't mentally ill.

It has taken a long time for me to overcome the things she did to me. Even now, when I drive through the old neighborhoods where we lived - a different one for every grade I went to school - I break down in tears from the memories of her abuse.

Should I write my mother back or just let it go?

- ON AN EMOTIONAL ROLLER COASTER INILLINOIS DEAR ON AN EMO-

TIONAL ROLLER COAST-**ER:** Let it go. Until your mother is well enough to admit what she did to you and she ISN'T - do not expose your children to her. And as to the \$6,000, if you can afford to spend that kind of money, spend it on therapy to overcome the sadness that still lingers from your abusive childhood. If you give it to your mother, she will only ask you for more and more.

DEAR ABBY: My wife, "Diane," and her youngest sister, "Jenny," have grown closer in recent years. Jenny and her husband have been married as long as Diane and I have. Our children are close in age, and none of us is wealthv.

We live in different states. In her attempt to stay connected to Diane, Jenny sends gifts on every conceivable occasion and non-occasion. She sends hoxes of chean items she picks up at her local dollar store – household knickknacks, toys, kitchen gadgets, plastic trinkets and costume jewelry. It's always things we neither need nor use, and the postage probably costs more than the items in

those boxes. Abby, I don't like it. Our home is already jammed with too much stuff. I have told my wife I want her sister to stop sending all that junk. Against Gothe's contract of three no-trump, Wlodzimierz Ilnicki led the club three, and partner Stefan Cabaj smoothly

When Gothe took the trick, the contract could no longer be made. Declarer had six diamonds, one club and one heart, but when South crossed to the diamond 10 Cabaj went up with the ace and

In the other room, three notrump made nine tricks on a spade lead. But note that if East wins the club ace at the first trick and continues with the jack, declarer can duck and needs simply to guess the spades to make his

Of course, in a perfect world, South would have ducked the club jack at the first trick — far easier with all four hands on view!
