Weather temperatures will remain around 90 this holiday week, said Joel Tannenholz, a meteorologist for National Weather Service

The weather should peak in the mid-90s on Wednesday but don't worry about sweating when it's time to watch the fireworks.

By 9 p.m., temperatures will fall to 78 degrees, Tannenholz said.

The only downside to the warmer weather is the possibility of dry thunderstorms, raising the chances of starting wildfires, he said. However, those aren't scheduled to hit the Magic Valley until later in the week.

"We don't have that many chances on Wednesday," he said.

For Dilworth, she doesn't know if she'll have time to watch the fireworks but she's not too disappointed.

"It's going to be a busy week but at least I won't be worrying about the weather," she said.

BUHL • When he gets home from working at a family farm in Castleford, 18-year-old Garrett Guinn jumps to work on his own family's

"I do whatever I can to help out," he said.

Guinn graduated from Castleford High School this spring and will start at the College of Southern Idaho in the fall as an animal sci-

He plans to stay put with his family near Buhl for a while. And Guinn - who was involved with FFA in high school — wants to continue working in farming or ranching in the future.

"I will try to stay around here, but if I get an opportunity to run a ranch or something, I'd definitely take that," he said.

Guinn said he encourages his peers to stick around and do what they can to help the agriculture industry. But many of the people he went to high school with have other plans.

"I think most of them want to go and do other sorts of work," he said.

Wyatt Prescott, executive vice president of the Idaho Cattle Association, said there aren't as many family-owned farms and ranches being passed down to the next generation.

"The primary driver in that is how challenging it is to make a living in the agriculture and cattle industries," he said.

1,300 Lose Power during Monday Outage

TWIN FALLS • About 1,300 customers lost electricity after a pole supporting power lines caught fire Monday afternoon.

The outage took place in the north side of town, between Washington Street and Blue Lakes Boulevard. Idaho Power reported that shopping centers, a long-term care facility and golf courses were without power for almost an hour.

Power was cut a little after 2 p.m., said Stephanie McCurdy, an Idaho Power spokeswoman. The cause of the fire is unknown at this

The city's wastewater plant also lost power but backup generators kept capacity at 100 percent, said Josh Palmer, the city's public information officer.

Palmer also said Twin Falls City Police were dispatched to manage traffic at intersections along Pole Line Road and Washington Street.

For young adults, it's a huge challenge and risk, Prescott said. It's hard to gain enough capital needed to carry on a business.

"Even if parents are able or ready to retire and hand (the business) down, the next generation has gone on and started a career in a different direction," he said.

The average age of principal farm operators is climbing, according to the 2007 Census of Agriculture. In Idaho, the average age was 56.5 years old in

"The reality of it though, by and large, is that our industry is growing older and older in age," Prescott said.

Another factor impacting the future

of agricultural production is a statewide population shift from rural areas to Out of the Idaho's 13,883 new resi-

dents between mid-2010 and mid-2011, only 20 moved to rural communities, according to the Idaho Department of In south-central Idaho, regional

economist Jan Roeser said about 38 percent of residents live outside a city area. And that leaves the majority — nearly 62 percent — living within city limits.

Jessica Lancaster - who graduated from Valley High School in Hazelton this spring - works on her family's cattle ranch in Jerome. After growing up learning about agriculture, she sees the value of sticking with it.

"Right now, the agriculture world is faced with the problem of feeding future generations," she said. Lancaster was active with in 4-H as a

lege in Kansas this fall and plans to study agriculture communications and agriculture education. She'll also compete on the livestock judging team. When she graduates from college, Lancaster said she'd like to come back to



TWIN FALLS • The trial of a 20-year-old man accused of causing the death of a 3year-old boy last August has been rescheduled for Oct. 15.

Previous trials were set in February and June. Buddenhagen waived his right to a speedy trial in a Jan. 4 hearing.

The Twin Falls man was indicted by a Twin Falls County grand jury on firstdegree murder on Aug. 24, 2011. If convicted, Buddenhagen could face life in prison or the death penalty.

He is accused of causing severe head trauma to the young boy, whose identity was not disclosed in court documents.

Petition Seeks to Stagger Food Stamp Distribution

NAMPA (AP) • A petition supported by Idaho grocers seeks to stagger the distribution of food stamp benefits.

Grocers complained to state lawmakers earlier this year, saying that they've been swamped by foodstamp recipients on the first day of every month. They said the long lines, sometimes in the wee morning hours, have caused some people to abandon their carts in the aisles, forcing \$1 million in food to go to

waste. However, legislation allowing state officials to stagger the distribution of these federal benefits stalled in the Idaho Legislature earlier this year. The bill passed the Idaho House with a 55-12 vote in March, but didn't get a hearing in the Senate.

A coalition of volunteers with the group, Idaho Interfaith Roundtable Against Hunger, and other community organizations stationed themselves at grocery stores in southwestern Idaho over the weekend and collected signatures.

Rita McDowell, a volun-

teer with the coalition Food Fix Idaho, was among those gathering signatures on the petition that aims to change the current system so that food stamp benefits are staggered throughout the month.

"The lines are way too long," McDowell said.

More than 230,000 Idahoans currently receive food stamps, according to the Department of Health and Welfare. The coalition argues that Idaho is one of a handful of states where recipients receive their benefits at the same time, on the same day each month.

"We're getting a lot of feedback from people who are frustrated with shopping on the first (day of the month)," said McDowell. "They try to avoid the first."

Firefighters Contain 1,400acre Blaze in S.W. Idaho

NAMPA • Firefighters in western Idaho have contained a 1,400-acre blaze that broke out this weekend near Marsing.

Bureau of Land Management spokeswoman Mallory Eils says 120 firefighters and six firefighting aircraft responded to the Jump Creek Canyon fire, which was 100 percent contained as of 2 p.m. on Monday. Crews were expected to remain at the scene until Tuesday.

Eils says investigators have determined the blaze was caused by fireworks.

The fire started about 11 p.m. Saturday and quickly spread through the dry grass and brush. No homes or structures were threatened.

To the east, the 1,038-acre Charlotte fire was also fully contained Monday. The Pocatello Fire Department said crews were mopping up

hot spots and doing rehabilitation work in the aftermath of the blaze, which destroyed 66 houses.

Idaho Dems Want Otter to Energize **Exchange Effort**

BOISE • House Minority Leader John Rusche demanded Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter energize efforts to pass a state health insurance exchange, rather than let the federal government intervene with one

Rusche on Monay urged Otter to pass an executive order or call for a special legislative session, following the Supreme Court's ruling upholding President Obama's health care overhaul.

The revamp requires online marketplaces for people to buy insurance, but Idaho legislators in 2012 refused \$20 million in federal aid to set up an exchange, on optimism the Supreme Court would throw out the law.

Otter said last week he doesn't believe a special session is necessary.

His aides said he's discussing options with advisers, including Attorney General Lawrence Wasden.

Big Idaho insurers like Blue Cross are echoing Rusche's demands.

US Drawdown in Afghanistan Includes Many Training Units

CAMP LEATHERNECK, Afghanistan (AP) • For today's drill, an instructor explains, the Taliban will be played by U.S. Marines, and the "village" will be just down from the driving practice loop.

An Afghan police officer uses a stick to point out targets to his team on a map drawn in the dirt. They grab their weapons and head out, taking cover behind a berm. A pickup truck drives up. The Afghans take aim and mimic the sound of a machine gun. The Marines tumble out of the vehicle, grabbing their chests as they fall to the ground.

That's a successful day at the U.S. Marine-run Joint Sustainment Academy in southwestern Afghanistan, which has been offering supplementary training on weapons, specialized skills and unit leadership to Afghan soldiers and police since 2009. The Afghans who attend the academy say they learn things that were never taught in their official training: how to handle different weapons and how to organize a patrol or an ambush.

But now, even as U.S. officials talk about their commitment to training and advising Afghan security forces well past 2014, the Joint Sustainment Academy is preparing to shut down.

Officials in the U.S. talking about the need to decrease combat operations in Afghanistan have been much more reticent to highlight one aspect of the drawdown: that plenty of U.S. advisers and mentors are also leaving.

Those who stay will be hopping in and out of a number of Afghan units rather than being embedded with one group a move that is being described as a way to get Afghan forces to take more responsibility, but which also follows a string of turncoat attacks this year by Afghan forces against their Western counterparts.

"Someone made the decision, 'OK, I'm going to only have the personnel for this piece;" said Lt. Col. Mike Cromwell, the director of the academy at a U.S. base in Helmand province, as he watched an Afghan police officer brief trainees on the day's mission. "It just means fewer people. It's part of the overall drawdown?'

Cromwell and the 31 other American service members running the academy end their tour at the beginning of 2013, and they have been told they won't be replaced. They say it's an opportunity to pass the torch to the Afghan trainers at the academy. But, Cromwell explains, the academy as it exists on Camp Leatherneck is closing.

Evidence of'God Particle' Found

GENEVA • Scientists believe the "god particle" that might explain the underpinnings of the universe is real, and they are about to present their evidence to the world.

Physicists at the world's biggest atom smasher are expected to announce Wednesday that they have nearly confirmed the primary plank of a theory that could shape the scientific understanding of all matter.

The idea is much like gravity and Isaac Newton's discovery: It was there all the time before Newton explained it. But now scientists know what it is and can put that knowledge to further use.

The focus of the excitement is the Higgs boson, a subatomic particle that, if confirmed, could help explain why matter has mass, which combines with gravity to give an object

Researchers at the European Organization for Nuclear Research, or CERN, say that they have compiled vast amounts of data that show the footprint and shadow of the particle all but proving it exists, even though it has never actually been

glimpsed. But two independent teams of physicists are cautious after decades of work and billions of dollars spent. They don't plan to use the word "discovery." They say they will come as close as possible to a "eureka" announcement without uttering a pronouncement as if from the scientific mountaintop.

The phrase "god particle," coined by Nobel Prize-winning physicist Leon Lederman, is used by laymen, not physicists, more as an explanation for how the subatomic universe works than how it all started.

Rob Roser, who leads the search for the Higgs boson at the Fermilab in Chicago, said: "Particle physicists have a very high standard for what it takes to be a discovery," and he thinks it is a hair's breadth away. Roser compared the results that scientists will announce Wednesday to finding the fossilized imprint of a dinosaur: "You see the footprints and the shadow of the object, but you don't actually see it."

Fatal Crash Grounds Key Part of Firefighting Fleet

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. • The deadly crash of a military cargo plane fighting a South Dakota wildfire forced officials to ground seven other Air Force air tankers, removing critical firefighting aircraft from the skies during one of the busiest and most destructive wildfire seasons ever to hit the West.

The C-130 from an Air National Guard wing based in Charlotte, N.C., was carrying a crew of six and fighting a 6.5-squaremile blaze in the Black Hills of South Dakota when it crashed Sunday, killing at least one crew member and injuring others.

President Barack Obama offered thoughts and prayers to the crew and their families. "The men and women battling these terrible fires across the West put their lives on the line every day for their fellow Americans," he said in a statement.

The crash cut the number of large air tankers fighting this summer's outbreak of wildfires by one-third.

The military put the remaining seven C-130s on an "operational hold," keeping them on the ground indefinitely. That left 14 federally contracted heavy tankers available until investigators gain a better understanding

of what caused the crash. "You've basically lopped off eight air tankers immediately from your inventory, and that's going to make it tougher to fight wildfires," said Mike Archer, who distributes a daily newsletter of wildfire news.

"And who knows how long the planes will be down?" he said, adding that investigators will take time to make their conclusions.

A privately owned civilian version of an older-model C-130 has crashed on firefighting duty before. In 2002, three crew members were killed when their C-130A air tanker crashed in California. The plane broke up in flight and an investigation blamed fatigue cracks in the

wings. The crash, in part, prompted a review of the airworthiness of large U.S. air tankers and led ultimately to a greatly reduced fleet of large civilian tanker planes. The 44 planes in the fleet a decade ago has dwindled to nine being flown on U.S. Forest Service exclusive use contracts right now.

A military spokesman said he did not know when the grounded planes would resume firefighting flights.

U.S. Forest Service officials said they weren't immediately prepared to comment on whether they have enough aerial firefighting assets without the C-130s. The military planes were filling up with fire retardant and flying out of Peterson Air Force Base in Colorado Springs.

They were used to fight fires in Colorado, Wyoming, Montana and South Dakota.

The plane that crashed was fighting a fire about 80 miles southwest of Rapid City, S.D. The terrain of the crash site is "very, very rugged, straight up and straight down cliffs," said Frank Maynard, the Fall River County emergency management director.

Military officials declined to say whether anyone was killed, but they confirmed there were some crew members who were being treated for serious injuries at a hospital in Rapid City.

Mexico's Next **President Faces Uphill Fight**

The party that ruled Mexico with a tight grip for most of the last century has sailed back into power, promising a government that will be modern, responsible and open to criticism.

MEXICO CITY (AP) • The apparent victor of Mexico's presidential race, Enrique Pena Nieto, struggled Monday with the sticky bonds of his party's notorious past, the limitation of his mandate and an opponent who has yet to concede defeat.

His long-ruling and now-returned Institutional Revolutionary Party, the PRI, won only about 38 percent of the vote and is unlikely to get a majority in Congress. In fact, it may lose seats.

He faces an old guard in the PRI that still exercises considerable power, an ongoing war against fierce drug cartels and a still sluggish economy. His closest rival, leftist Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador, who polled a higher-than-expected vote of about 32 percent, has refused to accept the loss, and many of his militant followers are suspicious of the results.

President Barack Obama called Pena Nieto on Monday to congratulate him. The U.S. Embassy in Mexico City said Obama told him the United States "looks forward to advancing common goals, including promoting democracy, economic prosperity, and security in the region and around the globe, in the coming years."

Pena Nieto's account of the talk suggested his party has left behind the touchy nationalism of the past. He expressed interest in cooperation in security, commerce and infrastructure, but didn't bring up the traditional Mexican issue of U.S. immigration reform to help the 12 million Mexicans who live in the United

Pena Nieto said he wanted "a relationship that will allow the productive integration of North America."

In Sunday's elections, Mexicans voted above all for a known quantity, the camera-friendly candidate of the party that ruled Mexico without interruption from 1929 to 2000.

But the PRI returns to power in unknown political terrain, where Mexico is more divided, more violent and less tightly controlled, raising the potential for political disputes on top of the drug war. The battle against drug cartels has already cost more than 47,500 lives and may have contributed to the decline of President Felipe Calderon's conservative National Action Party, whose candidate dropped to third place with about 25 percent of the preliminary vote count.

BOISE (AP) • Memory-chip maker Micron Technology Inc. has agreed to buy Elpida Memory Inc. for approximately \$750 million in cash in a deal that would boost its wafer manufacturing capacity by about 50 percent.

Elpida specializes in dynamic random access memory chips used in mobile phones and computers. It has been developing a plan of reorganization since filing for the largest manufacturing bankruptcy ever in Japan earlier this year.

The companies said Monday that the total value of the deal is about \$2.5 billion. That includes about \$1.75 billion in future annual installment payments that Micron would make through 2019.

Micron Technology shares rose 29 cents, or 4.6 percent, to \$6.60 in premarket trading.

Feds propose penalty for Mich. oil spill • Federal regulators proposed a \$3.7 million civil penalty Monday against the Canadian owner of a pipeline that ruptured in 2010, dumping more than 800,000 gallons of oil into a southwestern Michigan river. The U.S. Department of Transportation's Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration said the penalty against Enbridge Inc. would be the largest it has imposed. In a letter to the company, the agency listed 24 violations of hazardous liquid pipeline regulations, including failure to fix corrosion problems in the damaged pipe joint discovered as far back as 2004.

40 Chobani Managers Get Training at CSI

Hourly employees still to be hired for Twin Falls' Greek yogurt plant.

TWIN FALLS • Forty managers and supervisors who will work at Chobani's new Twin Falls plant went through several days of train-

ing recently at the College of Southern Idaho. John Winnie, Chobani's director of Idaho operations, said the sessions were taught by the company's safety manager, human resources manager, sanitation manager and others with leadership expertise. In addition, the employees completed a 30-hour Occupational Safety and Health Administration program.

The training began June 18 and concluded

"Continuing education studies at CSI are also being outlined for our future leadership employees," Winnie said.

He emphasized that Chobani believes in "succession planning" that allows workers to go on to higher levels in the company. Promotion from within is prized, he said.

Chobani President and CEO Hamdi Ulukaya said last week in Twin Falls that the plant is scheduled to be completed this year, although he didn't give a proposed opening

Winnie said there are still some manage-

ment positions to be filled and Chobani is "just starting in July the hiring process for other positions." Company officials have said non-management jobs will pay about \$14 an hour.

"(Hiring) will be a continual process throughout the year as we continue to ramp up with the needs," Winnie said.

He said 22 of the management positions that are already filled have gone to Magic Valley residents. Winnie added that most of the employees hired for non-management jobs also will be local people, and the rest of management personnel will be hired locally "where possible."

Up to 500 employees are expected to be hired at the 950,000-square-foot plant when it is running at full capacity, company officials have said.

Ulukaya, during his Twin Falls visit, said Chobani wants to maintain a strong relationship with CSI to provide continuing education for employees.

"We need that training to help us," he said. Besides leadership training that has already been conducted, and the OSHA training, Winnie said more courses will be designed as

time goes by. "These courses will be ongoing as our team grows, and the class list and content will expand as we start hiring for our hourly employees," he said.

Manufacturing **Shrinks for First Time in** Three Years

WASHINGTON • U.S. manufacturing shrank in June for the first time in nearly three years, adding to signs that economic growth is weakening.

Production and exports declined, and the number of new orders plunged, according to a monthly report released Monday by the Institute for Supply Management.

The slowdown comes as U.S. employers have scaled back hiring, consumers have turned more cautious, Europe faces a recession and manufacturing has slowed in big countries like China.

"This is not good," said Dan Greenhaus, chief economic strategist at BTIG, an institutional brokerage. Though the report "does not mean recession for the broader economy, it is still a terribly weak number."

The trade group of purchasing managers said its index of manufacturing activity fell to 49.7. That's down from 53.5 in May. And it's the lowest reading since July 2009, a month after the Great Recession officially ended. Readings 50 indicate below contraction.

Economists said the manufacturing figures were consistent with growth at an annual rate of 1.5 percent or less. That would be down from the January-March quarter's already tepid annual pace of 1.9 percent.

"Our forecast that the U.S. will grow by around 2 percent this year is now looking a bit optimistic," said Paul Dales, an economist at Capital Economics.

Microsoft Takes \$6.2B Hitto Account for Ad Woes

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) • Microsoft is absorbing a \$6.2 billion charge to reflect that one of the biggest deals in its 37-year history turned out to be a dud.

The non-cash charge announced Monday could saddle Microsoft Corp. with a loss for its fiscal fourth quarter ended in June. Analysts polled by FactSet had predicted Microsoft would earn about \$5.3 billion for the period. The company hasn't suffered a quarterly loss during the past 20 years, according to its website.

Microsoft, which is based in Redmond, Wash., is scheduled to release its latest quarterly results on July 19.

The world's largest software maker blamed the setback on the disappointing performance aQuantive. That's an online advertising service that Microsoft bought for \$6.3 billion in 2007 to mount a more serious challenge to one of its biggest rivals, Google Inc.

Taking One for the Country

In my mind, there are two lessons from the Supreme

Court's 5-to-4 decision to support President Obama's health care plan: 1) how starved the country is for leadership that puts the nation's interest before partisan politics, which is exactly what Chief

Justice John Roberts Jr. did; and 2) the virtue of audacity in politics and thinking big. Let's look at both.

It was not surprising to hear liberals extolling the legal creativity and courage of Chief Justice Roberts in finding a way to greenlight Obama's Affordable Care Act. But there is something deeper reflected in that praise, and it even touched some conservatives. It's the feeling that it has been so long since a national leader "surprised" us. It's the feeling that it has been so long since a national leader ripped up the polls and not only acted out of political character but did so truly for the good of the country — as Chief Justice Roberts seem-

I know that this was a complex legal decision. But I think it was inspired by a simple noble leadership impulse at a critical juncture in our history — to preserve the legitimacy and integrity of the Supreme Court as being above politics. We can't always describe this kind of leadership, but we know it when we see it and so many Americans appreciate it.

This is still a moderate, center-left/center-right country, and all you have to do is get out of Washington to discover how many people hunger for leaders who will take a risk, put the country's interests before party and come together for rational compromises. Why do we all jump up and applaud at N.B.A. or N.F.L. games when they introduce wounded Iraq or Afghan war veterans in the stands? It's because the U.S. military embodies everything we find missing today in our hyperpartisan public life. The military has become, as the Harvard philosopher Michael Sandel once put it, "the last repository of civic idealism and sacrifice for the sake of the common good."

Indeed, I found myself applauding for Chief Justice Roberts the same way I did for Al Gore when he gracefully bowed to the will of the Supreme Court in the 2000 election and the same way I do for those wounded warriors — and for the same reason: They each, in their own way, took one for the country.

To put it another way, Roberts undertook an act of statesmanship for the national good by being willing to anger his own "constituency" on a very big question. But he also did what judges should do: leave the big political questions to the politicians. The equivalent act of statesmanship on the part of our politicians now would be doing what Roberts deferred to them as their responsibility: decide the big, hard questions, with compromises, for the national good. Otherwise, we're doomed to a tug of war on the deck of the Titanic, no matter what health care plan we have.

I see no sign of Mitt Romney being ready for such a "Roberts moment." I still have hope for Obama. He's entitled to a victory lap for daring to go big — ignoring his advisers — to bring health care to the whole country. It's a huge achievement.

But he needs to go just as big on the economy if he wants the Affordable Care Act to be something we can actually afford. That requires economic growth. Yet Obama's campaign has been all small-ball wedge issues, trying to satisfy enough micro-constituencies to get 50.1 percent of the vote.

Listen to the broad reaction to Roberts. Look at the powerful wave he has unleashed for big, centrist, statesmanlike leadership. That all tells me that people are also hungry for a big plan from the president to fix the economy, one that will bite and challenge both parties at the scale we need, fairly share the burdens and won't just be about "balancing the budget," but about making America great again.

The opportunity for such a plan is hiding in plain sight. America today is poised for a great renewal.

Our newfound natural gas bounty can give us long-term access to cheap, cleaner energy and, combined with advances in robotics and software, is already bringing blue-collar manufacturing back to America. Web-enabled cellphones and tablets are creating vast new possibilities to bring high-quality, low-cost education to every community college and public school so people can afford to acquire the skills to learn 21st-century jobs. Cloud computing is giving anyone with a creative spark cheap, powerful tools to start a company with very little money. And dramatically low interest rates mean we can borrow to build new infrastructure — and make money.

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Syrian Opposition Makes New Push to Unite Summer Special:

CAIRO • The Arab League chief urged exiled Syrian opposition figures to unite at a meeting Monday as a new Western effort to force President Bashar Assad from power faltered. Another 85 soldiers, including a general, fled to Turkey in a growing wave of defections.

Turkey's state-run Andolou news agency said the group of defectors also included 14 other officers, ranging from one colonel to seven captains. It is one of the largest groups of Syrian army defectors to cross into Turkey since the uprising against Assad began.

The stakes are high for calming the crisis in Syria, which NATO Secretary-General Anders Fogh Rasmussen on Monday called "one of the gravest security challenges the world faces today."

the infighting and fractiousness that have prevented the movement from gaining the kind of political traction it needs to present a credible alternative to Assad.

"There is an opportunity before the conference of Syrian opposition today that

any circumstance," Arab League chief Nabil Elaraby told nearly 250 members of the Syrian opposition at the opening of the two-day conference in Cairo.

"The sacrifices of the Syrian people are bigger than us and more valuable

Top-seed Sharapova Upset; Serena, Federer Advance

WIMBLEDON, England • Topseeded Maria Sharapova was knocked out of Wimbledon on Monday, losing 6-4, 6-3 to Sabine Lisicki in the fourth round just a month after completing a career Grand Slam.

Lisicki, a 15th-ranked German, outplayed the 2004 Wimbledon champion in the wind and rain on Court 1 for her first career victory over Sharapova in four matches. She avenged last year's loss to Sharapova in the Wimbledon semifinals.

Also advancing were four-time women's winner Serena Williams, defending champion Petra Kvitova and second-seeded Victoria Azarenka, but four-time Grand Slam champion Kim Clijsters lost in what she says is her final Wimbledon before retirement later this

In men's play, six-time champion Roger Federer was the first to reach the quarters, overcoming an early back problem to beat Xavier Malisse 7-6 (1), 6-1, 4-6, 6-3 and extend his record for most consecutive Grand Slam final-eight appearances to 33.

Federer said his back started hurting in the first few games of the match but he felt much better after taking a medical timeout for treatment.

"I feel way better than a few hours ago," Federer said after the match. "Honestly, I'm not too worried. I've had bad backs over the years. I just have to keep an eye on it now.... I hope I'll be 100 percent on Wednesday."

Sharapova, who won the French Open four weeks ago for her fourth Grand Slam title, is the biggest name knocked out of the tournament since two-time men's champion Rafael Nadal was upset last week by Lukas Rosol.

After smacking a second-serve ace of 108 mph down the middle on her third match point, Lisicki collapsed to her knees on the grass and shook both fists. Among those cheering for Lisicki in the guest box was German NBA star Dirk Nowitzki of the Dallas Mavericks.

TARMOH BACKS OUT OF RUNOFF

EUGENE, Ore. • It will be remembered as the most anticipated race never run. The runoff that turned into a walk away to conclude the U.S. track trials.

Jeneba Tarmoh conceded the final Olympic spot in the 100 meters rather than meet training partner Allyson Felix at the starting line to break a thirdplace tie. She notified USA Track and Field early in the day of her intention to withdraw from the Monday night race, not specifying why she was stepping aside.

In an email sent through her agent to USATF, Tarmoh said: "I understand that with this decision I am no longer

running the 100m dash in the Olympic Games and will be an alternate for the event."

The unique race was scheduled to be shown in prime time on NBC in conjunction with the network's coverage of the swimming trials. It would've been a boon for track. Now, it's another blow for a sport that's taken its fair share of late.

"This could've been something exciting for the sport, something new, something different," said Olympic gold medalist Jackie Joyner-Kersee, whose husband, Bobby, coaches both sprinters. "It would bring people in that don't ordinarily watch. Reality at its best. This is reality. You've got everything — emotion, drama.

"But you don't have a cast."

And without a cast, track's moment in the spotlight fizzled.

"It is very frustrating for me, for someone who would like more people watching sport our sport on a regular basis," NBC sprints analyst Ato Boldon said. "That anytime you hear a track and field story, it's going to have a clumsy, awkward, or cringe-worthy ending."

Tarmoh, who felt all along she had won the race on June 23, did not give any reasons why she was surrendering a chance to possibly run the 100 in London. USATF President Stephanie Hightower said the organization was "disappointed" Tarmoh had a change of heart.

Clijsters, who has been dogged by injuries this year, walked off Court 3 with a brief wave. Third-seeded Agnieszka Radwanska also advanced, beating Italian qualifier Camila Giorgi 6-2, 6-3.

The sixth-seeded Williams won the last three games of the final set to beat 65th-ranked wild card

Yaroslava Shvedova of Kazakhstan 6-1, 2-6, 7-5, in cool and gusty conditions on Court 2.

Williams hopped in joy with both feet in the air after hitting a big forehand that forced an error by Shvedova on the first match point, ending a hard-hitting contest that lasted nearly two hours.

"I didn't want to lose today and I thought, 'Just stay relaxed," Williams said. "I knew the whole match I could play better."

Williams will next face Kvitova, who rallied from a set and a break down to beat former French Open champion Francesca Schiavone 4-6, 7-5, 6-1 in an errorstrewed match on Court 3.



One day, I saw a letter you had printed from a woman who seemed to know what I was feeling. She had gone to a 12-step program and was happy, successful and free from her addictive eating disorder.

Seeing her letter gave me a spark of hope. I sought and found a program called Overeaters Anonymous and began attending meetings. I took a sponsor and am in recovery from the food addiction. I lost more than 300 pounds and have lived in a normal-sized body for eight years. (It took a long time to lose that weight safely and sanely.)

Thanks to that letter in your column, and your continuing support of the 12step programs, I am living a life that I never imagined possible. No words can ever express the gratitude I feel for what you have done for me and many others. At our meetings, speakers often share that they found recovery because of a letter to Dear Abby. Please keep the word going that there is hope for us, no matter how far down we are or how far we have gone.

DEAR JANET: Thank you for a heartwarming letter. It's gratifying to know you were helped because of something you read in my column. I hope your success will inspire others who also suffer from compulsive overeating and are unaware that help is available.

Overeaters Anonymous has more than 6,500 groups in more than 80 countries. There are no requirements for membership except a desire to stop eating compulsively. I have attended some of the meetings. There is no shaming, no weighing and no embarrassment - only a fellowship of compassionate people who share a common problem.



From the final of the mixed teams at the European Open Championships last summer comes today's deal. It occurred in a match between French and Dutch teams.

In one room, playing a system far removed from the standard strong no-trump and fivecard majors, the French East opened a very weak no-trump. One no-trump doubled would not have been much fun, but North ended up in two hearts. Against that contract, Benedicte Cronier (East) cashed two high clubs and gave Pierre Zimmermann a ruff. He exited with a low diamond, which ran to dummy's queen. The heart jack went to Cronier's king, and she played a fourth round of clubs, allowing Zimmermann to ruff. Declarer, Anton Maas, overruffed, later conceding a diamond for plus 110.

Catherine D'Ovidio and Philippe Cronier got to game at the other table on the auction shown. Against that contract, Ton Bakkeren started with a low spade, taken in dummy with the ace. D'Ovidio innocently played a low club from dummy, and Carla Arnolds erred by playing low. Had she won the king and continued with a spade, the timing would have been right to defeat the contract. When she played low, D'Ovidio won and played the heart jack, ducked by Arnolds. Another heart went to the queen and king. D'Ovidio took the spade switch in hand and led a diamond. West ducked, and the diamond king held. D'Ovidio had four hearts, three spades and a trick in each minor for plus 400 and a 7-IMP gain.




