Lightning, Fireworks Create Big Fire Concerns

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TWIN FALLS • As kayakers and swimmers enjoyed their holiday at Dierkes Lake on Wednesday, U.S. Bureau of Land Management crews mopped up a fire among the rocks overlooking the water. Crews quickly contained the small fire, but the inci-

dent was a reminder of what kept them on edge all day: The potential for damaging blazes across the Magic Valley, caused by either careless actions or severe weather like the thunderstorms expected today and tomorrow.

The National Weather Service has much of southern Idaho under a fire weather watch either today or Fri-

day. Today's forecast calls for thunderstorms with little to no precipitation in parts of southern Idaho, including eastern Cassia County.

Friday's forecast doesn't treat the state any more kindly, with wind gusts of up to 40 miles per hour and abundant lightning strikes expected in western Twin Falls County.

Potato Disease Found in T.F. County

Officials say zebra chip pathogen has potential to cripple Idaho's production.

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TWIN FALLS • A bacterium that agriculture officials say could devastate Idaho's potato crop has been found in a Twin Falls County farmer's field.

Tests at the University of Idaho showed positive results for Liberibacter, the bacterium that causes zebra chip, said Erik Wenninger, assistant professor of entomology for the University of Idaho's Kimberly Research and Extension Center.

The substance was found on adult psyllids adhering to a sticky card put in a commercial plot as part of testing for potential diseases in 14 south-central Idaho fields. Wenninger posted a warning to farmers and others Monday on the Pacific Northwest Pest Alert Network.

"The presence of zebra chip in the region has the potential to be economically devastating," Wenninger and colleague Nora Olsen wrote in a report published by the Oregon State University Extension Service.

Wenninger emphasized that the positive test is a "tentative confirmation." Another test is being conducted this week to see if similar results are found.

"It would be awfully surprising to have it come back negative," Wenninger said, adding that officials are proceeding cautiously at this point.

"I don't want to get people panicked, but I also don't want to withhold information," he said.

Wenninger suggests that farmers intensify their monitoring programs for the zebra chip pathogen. Samples can be taken to the Research and Extension Center in Kimberly for confirmation.

Zebra chip causes flecking in potatoes' flesh. When affected potatoes

Certification Offers Another Route to Teaching

Self-paced, online program helps those with bachelor's degrees join the education field.

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TWIN FALLS • There isn't just one route to earning a teaching credential.

Instead of enrolling at a traditional four-year college or university, some Idaho residents pursue a teaching career by going through the American Board for Certification of Teacher Excellence.

The nonprofit organization's program is geared toward people

who already have a bachelor's degree in any area and want to change careers.

"People are looking for something new in their life and something new to pursue," said Michael Burke, Idaho teacher certification specialist.

On Tuesday night, he led two information sessions at the Red Lion Hotel Canyon Springs in Twin Falls. Burke travels around the state leading sessions and attendance fluctuates.

Sometimes, just a few people show up. But 22 people came to a Twin Falls session nearly two months ago.

Tuesday, 14 people attended — a turnout Burke was pleased with.

"That's actually really good," he said.

Melissa McGrath, spokeswoman for the Idaho State Department of Education, said about 500 of Idaho's 15,000 teachers are working under a certificate from the organization.

Self-help Housing Grads Celebrate New Homes

KIMBERLY • Four local families celebrated new homes of their own Saturday in Kimberly as the most recent graduates of South Central Community Action Partnership's self-help housing program.

Under the program, qualified participants build 65 percent of their home themselves, working for a minimum of 35 hours a week with friends and family volunteers. The sweat equity generally equates to about \$20,000-\$25,000 put into each home, and replaces the need for participants to

make a down payment on the house.

USDA Rural Development acts as the lender on each project, offering loans with interest as low as 1 percent. On Saturday, a Rural Development representative gave each family a flag for their home for the Fourth of July.

Community Action is now taking applications for a minimum of six more participants for future homes in Kimberly. Construction would begin this fall. For an application, visit 550 Washington St. S. in Twin Falls, www.sccap-id.org or call Shande Kestie at 733-9351, ext. 1015.

But on the Fourth of July, the biggest concern was people with fireworks. A Tuesday night fireworks show at Magic Valley Speedway sparked a small fire. Late Wednesday Twin Falls city firefighters were responding to a number of calls, including a tree and a yard on fire — most of which homeowners helped extinguish. The city marked at least 21 calls throughout the day from people saying their neighbors were lighting illegal fireworks.

At Dierkes Lake on Wednesday afternoon, Hidden Lakes Fire Incident Commander Steve Loucks said the human-caused fire was under investigation. While nearby kayakers watched, BLM firefighters sprayed the smoldering rocks with water. The incident and response disrupted little near the lake, and required no evacuations or trail closures.

It was a blessedly calm event, compared to what crews across the valley had feared. A dry spring combined with an overgrowth of grass from last year's calm fire season have turned south-central Idaho into a tinderbox, said Capt. Stacey Thomas of the Rock Creek Rural Fire Protection District. Add fireworks and controlled burns to the mix, and you have

the potential for disaster.

At the Rock Creek fire station in Kimberly, Thomas took advantage of a slow day to clean up the station Wednesday afternoon.

"It's been quiet," Thomas said. "It's still early."

Last week, his team responded to 18 calls in four days. Most were small incidents, but two large fires on Tuesday and Wednesday and back-to-back fires on Thursday wore out the crew.

"It's been nuts," he said.

"They believe that it was juveniles setting off bottle rockets that started it," Stewart said, adding that she had no information on charges.

While normally paramedics advise waiting for them to pick up an injured patient, Mencl noted how frightening the situation would be. The important thing, he said, is the child received medical attention.

David Shirley Becomes Burley's New Legal Counsel

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BURLEY • Attorney David Shirley will take the helm as legal counsel for the city of Burley.

The Burley City Council appointed Shirley, attorney with Parsons, Smith, Stone, Loveland & Shirley, by a unanimous vote with Councilman Russ Mallory absent during its meeting Tuesday.

The annual cost for Shirley's legal services is \$136,510, including city prosecution and insurance benefits.

Shirley will replace Kelly Anthon on Aug. 1. Anthon was hired as the city administrator for the city of Rupert. Anthon will work with Shirley until August to ensure a smooth transition.

"I want to thank Anthon for his willingness to serve and wish him well," said Councilman Steve McGill.

Also Tuesday: McGill asked that an agreement between the city and the Oregon Trail Recreation District and a contract with the city of

Heyburn regarding utility territory in an industrial park be tabled until the next meeting so the council members could read them.

The recreation district agreement outlines maintenance issues on the city's greenbelt trails and at the ball fields near the airport. The contract with Heyburn would ensure new customers at the park that trigger the Bonneville Power Administration's Tier II power costs would not be singled out for higher rates and that the costs would be spread among the users of the rate class.

The council heard a first reading changing the zoning from R1 and R2 to commercial from 27th Street on Idaho Highway 27 south to 200 S. Road. The new zoning would extend east and west one-quarter of a mile. A public hearing was held earlier this month that garnered no public comment. The area is in Cassia County but in the city's area of impact.

are fried, there is severe darkening of the chip or fry, according to the OSU article. The defect is severe enough that there's concern for fresh and process potatoes, it said.

"The disease has been very costly to manage in potato crops and has caused millions of dollars in losses in the southwest U.S., particularly Texas," according to the article.

The solution in areas where zebra chip is a problem involves season-long, weekly insecticide applications.

Weninger noted that psyllids have been in Idaho

for decades. However, it wasn't until late in the 2011 growing season that the bacterium for zebra chip was found in low levels in Idaho, Oregon and Washington.

The bacterium was present in Twin Falls and Jerome counties and the Treasure Valley, but not in eastern Idaho, Weninger said.

"If concentrations are heavy enough, you can definitely see damage during the (growing) season on the above-ground portion of the plants," he said.

This week's follow-up tests of Magic Valley psyllids are being conducted by Alex Karasev in his University of Idaho lab. Weninger said results could be available by Friday.

Although it's "not a vast majority," McGrath said, there has been an increase in the number of people pursuing the alternate route in order to teach.

"It's an exciting program and an exciting way to attract and retain more teachers in the field," she said.

ABCTE was established in 2001 through a grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The Idaho State Board of Education approved the organization as an option for those pursuing a teaching certificate.

Students have up to one year to complete the self-

paced online program through ABCTE.

"One of the nice things is that it gives all of our candidates the ability to study from anywhere with Internet access," Burke said.

The program is designed to prepare students to take two exams to earn a teaching credential and to prove themselves as a competent teacher, he said.

It's not unusual for south-central Idaho school districts to hire ABCTE.

Laurie Lancaster, personnel clerk for the Wendell School District, said she knows one teacher in the district who earned a certificate through the organization. But there could be more, she said.

The Twin Falls School District also has a few teachers with ABCTE certification.

Human resources specialist Sonia DeLeon wrote in an email to the *Times-News* that most have a lot of knowledge and a bachelor's degree related to the subject they're teaching. But for those who haven't had hands-on experience, managing a classroom can be challenging.

"It has been our experience that teachers with an ABCTE certification are most successful if they have had prior experience with

students in some capacity," DeLeon said.

Idaho requires those with an ABCTE certificate to apply for an interim three-year Idaho teaching credential. That's different than other teachers who receive a regular, five-year teaching credential.

During a three-year period, ABCTE graduates have to complete a mentoring program.

"The mentoring program is really for them to work with a mentor teacher," McGrath said.

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Local Cities, Legislators Honored at Conference

BOISE • Two local cities and two local legislators were recognized with various awards at the 65th Association of Idaho Cities Conference June 20-22 in Boise.

Formed in 1947, AIC is a nonpartisan, nonprofit corporation that influences policies and provides education, training and technical assistance for Idaho's 200 incorporated cities.

Award recipients honored at the conference include the following:

- The city of Twin Falls received five Achievement Awards for projects that dealt with economic, social and environmental challenges in creative ways, contributing to the city's economic growth and development and quality of life. The five awards were for improving water quality, the city's recycling program, its five-year budget forecasting model, the Chobani project and the arsenic-reduction project.

- The city of Ketchum received three Achievement Awards — in its case, for downtown partnerships and re-investment, a focus on special events, and "City of Ketchum: Leaner, Sharper, Effective."

- Retiring Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo, received a Legislative Leadership Award for his service in the Senate. He has served 15 terms in the Senate, last chairing its Judiciary & Rules Committee. Darrington also serves on the Idaho Criminal Justice Commission and chairs the Permanent Building Fund Advisory Council. AIC noted him as "the recognized authority on law enforcement, juvenile corrections, prisons and judicial issues."

- Retiring Rep. Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum, received the Boyd A. Martin Award, which recognizes exceptional contributions benefiting the city governments of Idaho. The award is named after the founder of AIC, first known as the Idaho Municipal League. Jaquet has served nine terms in the House and was the minority leader for 10 years, among other accomplishments. AIC lauded her for passing enabling legislation for transfer of development rights — helping to preserve rural land and open space — and co-sponsoring legislation with Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, to create a tax deduction for the purchase of long-term care insurance. Jaquet was also part of the interim committee that launched the Idaho Reading Initiative.

M.V. Firefighters Battle Blazes Near and Far

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POCATELLO • Several local firefighters were on the front lines this week helping other fire agencies from around the state battle the 1,038-acre Charlotte fire in Pocatello that destroyed 66 homes.

"Two went down last Friday and they got back last night," said Sun Valley Fire Chief Ray Franco.

Franco said one engine boss and one firefighter traveled to help control the fire.

"They did a little bit of

everything," he said. "Protecting homes, a little containment, mopping up hot spots, whatever was needed."

Last year, Sun Valley firefighters traveled all over the state, Franco said. For now, they'll stay close to home.

Over the weekend, the area experienced a few small fires, and Franco said he'll keep his firefighters close until fireworks celebrating the Fourth of July die down.

Members of the Hagerman Rural Fire Department are still helping mop up the

Pocatello fire, said Kyli Gough, the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's fire information officer. Firefighters from the Minidoka County Fire Protection District also helped fight the blaze, she said.

Meanwhile, firefighters from southern Idaho are in five other states helping to fight fires, Gough said.

According to Gough, 20-person crews from the Twin Falls District BLM and the Sawtooth National Forest were in Wyoming and Utah this week. Those crews perform on-the-ground tasks like digging

lines as well as actively fighting fires, Gough said.

Also in Wyoming are eight other BLM staff along with a dozer. Six more staff members are in Utah along with four dozers, she said.

Local BLM fire staff are also currently in Colorado, Nevada and Alaska, she said. The jobs of those in positions spread throughout the West are varied. Some work in driver operations, dispatch, incident command, work base camp management and public information. There are also task force leaders, helicopter crew members,

crew bosses, strike team leaders, archeologists and division group supervisors, Gough said.

Community Mixed on Fireworks Fundraising

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TWIN FALLS • Neil Christensen spent his Wednesday setting up the fireworks display that dazzled crowds at the College of Southern Idaho that night.

His labor came after the Magic Valley Citizens' Fourth of July group spent weeks striving to raise enough money for the show.

As Christensen pointed out, that struggle is nothing new, and there aren't easy solutions.

"It's been the same story every year," Christensen said Wednesday. The problem with putting on a fireworks display? Everyone else expects others to pay for it, he said.

The Magic Valley Citizens' Fourth of July group took over organizing the show two years ago when the Fourth of July fell on a Sunday. Southern Idaho Fireworks, the organizer at the time, tried to move the show to a Monday, sparking a protest

in the community.

This year, the group raised about \$20,000. Though the group fell short of its original goal of \$40,000, Christensen said crowds wouldn't notice a difference in quality. The 21-minute show wasn't much shorter than the 25-minute show in 2011, and Christensen

said this year's show had a better finale.

Still, Peggy Kidd, who helped with fundraising, had hoped to raise more. She said she planned to be more aggressive in finding sponsors for next year's show.

On the CSI campus Wednesday night, spectators

had different ideas on the fundraising quandary.

Wenguang Zhao of Twin Falls said that organizers should go for corporate donors first. Failing that, he said he had no problem with taxpayer dollars going to keep the show alive. (The city of Twin Falls gives \$8,000 to the show.)

"I think it's an opportunity for everybody to get together," Zhao said. "It's also patriotic." Without the fireworks display, people might take freedom for granted, he said.

"They shot themselves in the foot two years ago when they wouldn't have it on Monday," said Randy Hansen — quick to note he's not the same Randy Hansen who owns the Twin Falls car dealership.

Corey Mason of Twin Falls said she comes to the show every year. She said while she probably wouldn't donate to the show, organizers should stick with relying on contributions.

"It's getting them some money," she said.

Keeping Fire in Mind

As organizers set up the Twin Falls fireworks display on Wednesday, they took precautions to prevent falling embers from causing fires.

A fireworks show by the same organizers sparked a late-night Tuesday fire at the Magic Valley Speedway. Organizer Neil Christensen said while fires are always a risk with fireworks shows, workers do what they can to minimize the danger.

At the launch site near the College of Southern Idaho Health Sciences and Human Services Building, organizers watered a nearby pile of dry needles and grass clippings for nearly two days before the show, Christensen said.

The hope, he said, is that revelers could enjoy the fireworks without the fire.

Helping the spouses of those who serve

Shelly Snell is a registered nurse. She's been married to Navy Commander Ben Snell for 16 years. They have two boys. And as a Navy family, the Snells have moved nine times.

It's a fact of life for military spouses when the country calls, they step up to answer. When their loved ones are sent overseas for months on end, they're holding everything together back home. When the PTA, the parish council, the Little League or the Girl Scouts need a volunteer, they're the first ones to raise their hands.



And when they're asked to pack up their family and begin a new life in a new hometown, they're proud to do it.

But for so many military spouses like Shelly, each move to a new state also means a return to a familiar headache: renewing a professional license. Shelly has renewed her license as a nurse seven times and she's not alone. More than 100,000 military spouses throughout America serve in a profession that requires a license or certification to work; that's more than one-third of military spouses in the labor force. So for teachers, nurses, real estate agents, accountants, physical therapists and dozens of other kinds of professionals, a move can mean gathering old transcripts, paying new fees, filling out a pile of paperwork, and sometimes even taking entry-level classes no matter how many years of experience they have.

It's a process that can take months. And during that time, these military spouses can't practice their profession, even though there are jobs open in their new communities and companies desperate to hire them. That means their skills go unused while their families try to get by without the income they need. It means they are unable to advance in the careers they trained for often for years. And sometimes, the hassle is simply too much, and these spouses choose to quit the careers they love and choose new ones that are more friendly to a military lifestyle. So it's no wonder that military spouses bring this issue up to me more than any other.

Luckily, this is an eminently solvable problem. Each state has the power to act on behalf of our nation's military families. We simply need the will to do it. That's why, in February, Jill Biden and I issued a nationwide call through our Joining Forces initiative, asking all 50 states to pass legislation by 2014 to help make it easier for military spouses to obtain new professional licenses when they move. Since then, the number of states that have enacted measures to solve this problem has grown from 11 to 23.

Governors and legislators in these states have worked together across the aisle, because supporting our military families is something we can all agree on. They're coming up with solutions that work for their states. They're helping military spouses get to work while they complete any remaining state-specific requirements. And they're doing it all without lowering their professional standards one bit they're simply finding ways to account for the realities of military life.

So we've come a long way. But we're not finished yet. There are still 27 states that have not yet enacted measures to address this issue. So I want to ask for your help. Talk to leaders in your community. Make your voice heard. Do your part to make this issue a priority.

That's what it's going to take to get this done. And make no mistake we must get this done. We owe it to our troops and military families. They have done so much for all of us. Whenever our country has called, they've answered.

So on this issue and so many others we can show them how much we appreciate their service and their sacrifice. We can give back in real, meaningful ways. And together, we can serve our men and women in uniform and their families as well as they have served us.

Chicago-sized Test of Wills

The title of the nation's largest labor union — the National Education Association — seems calculated to blur the fact that it is a teachers union. In this blunt city, however, the teachers union candidly calls itself the Chicago Teachers Union. Its office is in the Merchandise Mart, a gigantic architectural Stonehenge, which resembles a fortress located on the Chicago River, which resembles a moat. Which is appropriate.

Unions are besieged, especially public-sector unions, particularly teachers unions, and nowhere more than here. Teachers unions have been bombarded with bad publicity, much of it earned, including the movie "Waiting for 'Superman,'" and have courted trouble by cashing in on sentimentality, cloaking every acquisitive demand in gauzy rhetoric about how everything is "for the children."

Still, have sympathy for Karen Lewis, 58, a Dartmouth graduate who is a daughter of two African-American teachers. She taught chemistry for 22 years until becoming president of the 26,502-member CTU. Her job is to make life better for her members, not to make life easier for Mayor Rahm Emanuel, with his roughneck's reputation and stevedore's profanity, whose ideas are as admirable as his manners are deplorable.



He thinks that improved schools, including more charter schools, might arrest the exodus to the suburbs of parents whose children are ready for high school, so he wants a longer school year and school day. America's school year (about 180 days) is one of the shortest in the industrial world, and while middle-class children may leave their summers with strolls through the Louvre, less privileged children experience "summer learning loss." Remediation requires the first few weeks of the fall term, which effectively further shortens the school year. And Chicago's school day is the shortest of any large American district.

The CTU wants a pay raise — 30 percent — proportional to Emanuel's 90-minute increase in the school day and 10-day increase in the school year. He has canceled a 4 percent raise and offers only 2 percent. He says benefits the CTU has won — e.g., many teachers pay nothing toward generous pensions they can collect at age 60 — could in just three years force property taxes up 150 percent and require classes with 55 students.

Even discounting Emanuele hyperbole, whose fault is this? Just as foggy rhetoric about corporations' "social responsibilities" obscures the fact that a corporation's responsibility is to maximize shareholder value, blaming unions for improvident contracts ignores the fact that a union's principal task is to enhance members' well-being — wages, benefits, working conditions. Unions can wound themselves by injuring their industries (e.g., steel and autos), but primary blame for improvident contracts with public employees belongs to the elected public officials who grant them.

Anyway, money — salaries and pensions — may not be the most problematic point of contention. It might be teacher "accountability," including merit pay, and identifying failing schools and teachers. Lewis says, "We can't choose the children that come into our classrooms." Chicago schools are 86 percent black and Hispanic, and low pupil performances strongly correlate with household incomes.

Teachers unions, however, have painted themselves into a corner by insisting that spending is the best predictor of educational performance — increase financial inputs and cognitive outputs will rise. In the last 50 years, real per pupil

spending nationwide has tripled and the number of pupils per teacher has declined by a third, yet educational attainments have fallen. Abundant data demonstrate that the vast majority of differences in schools' performances can be explained by qualities of the families from which the children come to school: The amount of homework done at home, the quantity and quality of reading material in the home, the amount of television watched in the home and, much the most important variable, the number of parents in the home. In Chicago, 84 percent of African-American children and 57 percent of Hispanic children are born to unmarried women.

The city is experiencing an epidemic of youth violence — a 38 percent surge in the homicide rate, 53 people shot on a recent weekend, random attacks by roving youth mobs. Social regression, driven by family disintegration, means schools where teaching is necessarily subordinated to the arduous task of maintaining minimal order.

Emanuel got state law changed to require unions to get 75 percent of the entire membership rather than a simple majority to authorize a strike. Some people thought this would make strikes impossible. The CTU got 90 percent to authorize. Lewis' members are annoyed, and are not all wrong.

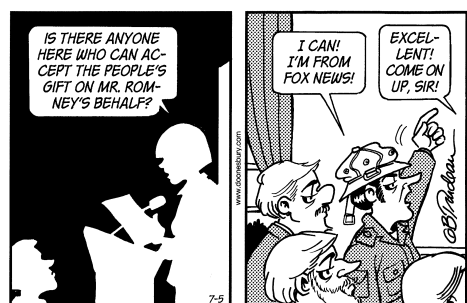
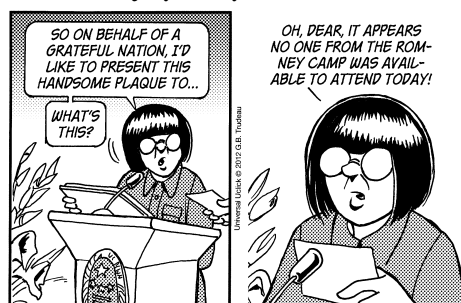

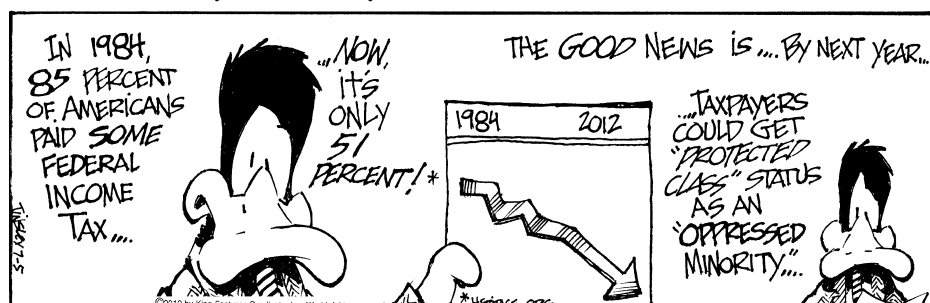

IDAHO SOLDIER, 24, DIES IN AFGHAN FIREFIGHT

BOISE • A 24-year-old soldier from southeastern Idaho died Tuesday in Afghanistan when enemy forces attacked his unit with small arms fire.

Private First Class Cody O. Moosman of Preston died in Gayan Alwara Mandi, the U.S. Army said in a statement.

An active-duty soldier, Moosman had been assigned to a U.S. Army Unit out of Fort Riley, Kan. He was with the 1st Battalion, 28th Infantry Regiment, 4th Infantry Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division.

Moosman's family issued a statement saying their son told them starting in the third grade that he had wanted to be in the Army.

He joined in 2010, at age 22, and loved the idea of protecting his fellow citizens, they wrote, describing him as an avid hunter and fisherman who had completed his Eagle Scout badge in the Boy Scouts.

"Our family enjoyed watching him stand up for America," they wrote, asking for privacy as they grieved. "He leaves behind his mother and father, two brothers and two sisters, his grandparents and his nieces and nephews who all very much adored him. We loved him, and we will miss him very much."

Moosman's unit was deployed in a restive region near the border with Pakistan.

Otter Says He'll Seek Fed Aid after Pocatello Fire

POCATELLO • Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's office is seeking federal assistance for victims of a southeastern Idaho range fire that destroyed 66 homes and 29 outbuildings.

Otter on Tuesday toured ground charred by the now-notorious Charlotte Fire, which left a moonscape of concrete foundations and torched houses when it roared into life near Pocatello June 28.

Otter says state, county and city officials are busy exploring options for financial help from Washington, D.C.

The Republican governor, who normally eschews too much gratitude to the federal government, promised locals affected by the fire that he'd exhaust every opportunity to secure aid to help the community rebuild.

Otter was particularly struck by the 1,040-acre fire's hit-or-miss nature, seemingly to destroy one house at whim while leaving another nearby standing and intact, with no damage.

CenturyLink Gets New Phone Outage Rules from IPUC

BOISE • Idaho's regulated phone companies are getting more time to respond to outages and won't face financial penalties for taking too long to get the lines back up and running.

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission voted 2-1 Tuesday to accept new rules, with commissioners Paul Kjellander and Mack Redford voting for a settlement that benefits CenturyLink Inc., the main regulated provider of landline phone and Internet service in Idaho. Commissioner Marsha Smith opposed the deal, arguing it gutted protections for rural Idaho residents, among others.

Under rules dating back to 1993, regulated phone companies had just 24 hours to restore weekend outages. Those that missed the deadline had to credit affected customers with a month of basic local service.

Under the settlement, companies will have 48 hours to respond to weekend outages, more time for credit customers for missed deadlines.

CenturyLink originally asked to be exempted entirely, arguing it wasn't fair to hold it to this standard, while allowing unregulated wireless phone companies to skirt such provisions.

The rules might have been OK 20 years ago, in an era of landline-dominated service, but the Monroe, La.-based company contended they had become outdated in an environment

when landlines had myriad competition from cellphone and cable companies.

"While there is now fierce competition for these customers among the multiple providers of these various forms of communication, only one competitor — CenturyLink — is regulated" under this rule, the company told the commissioners. "The rule is neither technologically nor competitively neutral, and its application to CenturyLink places it at a competitive disadvantage."

The regulatory panel's majority decided easing requirements, while still holding regulated companies to some standards, struck the right balance between proper regulation and allowing competition to play out between telecom providers.

"Other customer service rules still in place require prompt response to outages and the presence of competitive alternatives is adequate in those areas to likely compel reasonable response to reports of outages," Kjell-

lander and Redford wrote in a statement.

Service rules still in place to protect Idaho customers include requirements that regulated companies "adopt and pursue a maintenance program aimed at achieving efficient operation of its systems to render safe, adequate and uninterrupted service."

CenturyLink was joined in its bid to soften the rules by Frontier Communications Northwest, Citizens Telecommunications Company of Idaho, TDS Telecommunications Corp and the Idaho Telecom Alliance.

Smith voted against the settlement, arguing that while most customers in Idaho had competitive choices, people in rural, out-of-the-way places were often relegated to using land lines, such as broadband Internet service and cellphones weren't available everywhere.

"We should not ignore their very important concerns and the vital nature of landline telephone service

in their lives," Smith wrote in her dissent.

She cited comments opposing the rule change that came largely from these areas.

The commission received about two dozen comments from citizens opposed to exempting CenturyLink as well as AARP Idaho. A weekly newspaper publisher in southeastern Idaho also weighed in, arguing a prolonged outage could do real damage to his business.

"My concern is if the service threshold is doubled to 48 hours, it becomes a critical issue to my newspaper business for production deadlines via the Internet which the utility provides," wrote Mark Steele, publisher of the *Caribou County Sun*. "Equally as important is my elderly mother, still able to live alone in a rural setting. Part of her security blanket is the hardline telephone service in which she can ... reach me by phone at any time."

Those opposed to the pact still have until July 24 to ask the panel for reconsideration.

Burn Barrel Fire Spreads, Destroys Idaho Garage


NAMPA • A person burning household garbage on a windy day in southwestern Idaho ignited a grass fire that spread to a mobile home's garage.

The fire on Tuesday afternoon was extinguished by Nampa Fire Department personnel, but not before it destroyed the garage.

The agency says the occupants of the mobile home were lucky.

The blaze was put out before the fire could destroy their home and belongings, thanks to firefighters who entered the structure and forced back the flames.

There's a burn ban in effect, which prohibits fires in areas covered by the Nampa Fire Department.

Government Snares Bear Hair to Study Grizzlies

BONNERS FERRY (AP) • Scientists are hoping a mixture of fish guts and cow blood sprinkled liberally along the mountainous Idaho-Montana border will help them count grizzly bears, an effort pushed by local government officials who suspect there may be more of these big predators in the region than their status as a threatened species may suggest.

The *Spokesman-Review* reports U.S. Geological Survey scientists are gathering bear hair to document grizzlies in a 2.4-million-acre study area stretching from the Canadian border to Sandpoint in Idaho and Thompson Falls in Montana.

Grizzly bears have an excellent sense of smell, using their noses to find far-off love and food. The attractant is sprinkled on logs surrounded by wire, which snares bear hair in its barbs.

There's a team of 70 field workers checking these so-called "scent corrals," with geneticists later examining the resulting DNA to help glean more information about the grizzly bears here believed to number about 45 animals.

Two of the workers, U.S.

Geological Survey field technicians Regan Plumb and Libby Davis, recently approached an area they'd baited two weeks earlier in Idaho's Moyie River drainage, calling out to announce their arrival — and to avoid surprising a potentially dangerous mother with cubs.

"Hello, bears!" Plumb called out as she neared the forest clearing. "Good morning, bears!"

Disappointment followed: The curly gray fibers caught on the barbed wire in their scent corral were lichens, not the furry overcoat of some mama griz. Plumb and Davis say it's par for the course: Sometimes, the two women come home with envelopes bulging with wads of hair.

Other days, it's hard to scare up their quarry.

Similar studies have been done before.

Kate Kendall, a scientist at U.S. Geological Survey at Glacier National Park, used identical methods several years ago to count grizzlies in Montana's Northern Divide ecosystem. The 34,000 hair samples led to a revised estimate of 765 grizzlies — more than twice the bears previously estimated.

Her latest effort is being

paid for by Lincoln County in Montana, as well as federal agencies including the U.S. Forest Service, as officials want to know more about the local bear population.

The Cabinet-Yaak's grizzly population was listed as "threatened" under the Endangered Species Act in 1975, but it's unclear from official estimates whether the population is trending up or down, said Tony Berget, a Lincoln County commissioner, explaining the foundation for the study.

"It seems like a lot more of our friends and neighbors are seeing grizzly bears," Berget said. "People here just want to know what the number is,"

Though Berget thinks residents of this rural region of trees and mountains have grown more accepting of bears in their midst, hostility toward grizzlies still exists.

A slaying in May of a grizzly and her nursing cub at Hall Mountain in Idaho's Boundary County was probably "a hate crime," said Doug Zimmer, a U.S. Fish and Wildlife spokesman.

A \$10,000 reward is being offered for information leading to an arrest in the shooting.

AP Survey: Next President Faces High Unemployment

WASHINGTON • A majority of economists in the latest Associated Press Economy Survey expect the national unemployment rate to stay above 6 percent — the upper bounds of what's considered healthy — for at least four more years.

If the economists are correct, the job market will still be unhealthy seven years after the Great Recession officially ended in June 2009. That would be the longest stretch of high unemployment since the end of World War II.

And it means the job market and the economy — President Barack Obama's main political threats — would remain big challenges in either a second Obama term or President Mitt Romney's first term.

"The election isn't going

to be a miracle cure for the unemployment rate — that's for sure," says Sean Snaith, an economics professor at the University of Central Florida. He thinks unemployment, which is 8.2 percent now, won't drop back to 6 percent until after 2016.

Economists consider a "normal" level to be between 5 percent and 6 percent.

The economists surveyed by the AP foresee an unemployment rate of 8 percent on Election Day. That would be the highest rate any postwar president running for re-election has faced.

The survey results come before the government reports Friday on hiring during June. Fears about the economy escalated after U.S. employers added just 69,000 jobs in May, the fewest in a year and the third straight month of weak job growth.

New Tests Revive Debate Over Arafat Death

JERUSALEM (AP) • The discovery of traces of a radioactive agent on clothing reportedly worn by Yasser Arafat in his final days reignited a cauldron of conspiracy theories Wednesday about the mysterious death of the longtime Palestinian leader.

Arafat's widow, who ordered the tests by a Swiss lab, called for her husband's body to be exhumed, and Arafat's successor gave tentative approval for an autopsy. But experts warned that even after the detection of polonium-210, getting answers on the cause of death will be tough.

Arafat was 75 when he died Nov. 11, 2004, in a French military hospital. He had been airlifted to the facility just weeks earlier with a mysterious illness, after

being confined by Israel for three years to his West Bank headquarters.

Eureka! Physicists Celebrate Evidence of Particle

GENEVA • Scientists at the world's biggest atom smasher hailed the discovery of "the missing cornerstone of physics" Wednesday, cheering the apparent end of a decades-long quest for a new subatomic particle called the Higgs boson, or "God particle," which could help explain why all matter has mass and crack open a new realm of physics.

First proposed as a theory in the 1960s, the maddeningly elusive Higgs had been hunted by at least two generations of physicists who believed it would help shape our understanding of how the universe began and how its most elemental pieces fit together.

As the highly technical findings were announced by two independent teams involving more than 5,000 researchers, the usually sedate corridors of the

Many Americans Have Throwback Fourth

People celebrate Independence Day like George Washington: without power.

MOUNT VERNON, Va. • George Washington never had air conditioning, but he knew how to keep cool: a mansion with lots of windows elevated on the banks of a wide, rolling river and lots of ice cream, maybe with a little brandy.

It was a little like the old days without electricity Wednesday, as the nation's capital region celebrated Independence Day the better part of a week into a widespread blackout that left millions of residents sweltering in 90-plus degree heat without air conditioning. Utilities have slowly been restoring service knocked out by a freak storm Friday from the Midwest to the Mid-Atlantic, and at least 26 people have died in the storm or its aftermath.

At George Washington's Mount Vernon estate, one of the most popular Fourth of July attractions was a demonstration of 18th-century ice cream making, one of Washington's favorite desserts. Historical interpreters Gail Cassidy and Anette Ahrens showed the crowds how cocoa beans were roasted and ground into a paste for chocolate ice cream, made using ice hauled up in massive blocks from the Potomac River and stored underground to last as long into the summer as possible.

As for beverages, Washington was no stranger to alcohol, enjoying imported Madeira wine from Spain, distilling his own whiskey and enjoying a fruity brandy cocktail called Cherry Bounce.

Washington was his own architect at Mount Vernon,

"and he was very good at it," said Dennis Pogue, associate director for preservation at Mount Vernon. The piazza, which runs the length of the mansion, is "kind of California living in the 18th century," Pogue said.

The location, atop a sloping hill along the Potomac, catches cool breezes. Lots of

windows and shutters allow for the regulation of sun and wind. And the distinctive cupola on the mansion roof serves as the mansion's air conditioning unit, funneling hot air out the top and drawing cooler air in at the ground level.

Visitors on Wednesday

Didn't Send Your Child to War? Maybe You Can Send Money

WASHINGTON • If you have military-age children who have not served in this decade's wars, then you owe a debt — meaning money — to those who did. That's the premise of a new fundraising effort by three wealthy American families who want to help U.S. veterans of the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Every non-military family should

give something, they said. The affluent should give large sums. No one should think of it as charity, but rather a moral obligation, an alternative way to serve, perhaps the price of being spared the anxiety that comes with having a loved one in a war zone.

"We have three able-bodied, wonderful, wonderful children, all of whom are devoted to doing very, very good things around social justice; and we could not be more proud of them," said Philip Green, a local businessman who devised

the fundraising idea. "We're also delighted that none of them had to serve in Iraq or Afghanistan."

Green says he and his wife came to look at that as unfair: "I realized that there were parents just like me down the street, down the block ... who did not have that luxury" and were suffering sleepless nights and anxiety, "which I was able to avoid."

Green, president of health care consultancy PDG Consulting, and his wife Dr. Elizabeth Cobbs, head of geriatrics at Veterans Affairs

Medical Center in Washington, teamed with two other couples to start the fund-raising. Together, they donated a total of \$1.1 million. Contributing with Green and Cobbs were Glenn Garland, head of Texas-based CLEAResult energy consultancy, and wife, Laurie, and Jim Stimmel, CLEAResult's executive vice president, and wife, Patty.

They hope to raise \$30 million for five organizations they say are among the best at providing medical, financial and other help to vet-

erans, active duty troops and their families. With the Fourth of July celebration approaching, they held a news conference with one of the five organizations, the Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans of America (IAVA).

"Millions of Americans and their families have sacrificed so much in the conflicts and they have such needs," Stimmel said. "By contrast, so many affluent Americans have not made a commensurate sacrifice; and they should."

Obama Climbs Back on the Campaign Bus in Ohio, Pa.

WASHINGTON • It's the kind of trip President Barack Obama relishes — one that plays to his natural political abilities by taking him outside of Washington to mix it up with Americans in small towns and casual settings.

Obama embarks today on his first bus tour of the 2012 campaign as he seeks to pointedly stir up more questions about rival Mitt Romney's business record and subtly contrast himself with a Republican opponent who has struggled to connect

with voters. Dubbed the "Bet-ting on America" tour, the two-day swing will take him through several northern Ohio communities that were critical to his 2008 win in the state and then to Pennsylvania for an event in Pittsburgh. Obama won both states four years ago but Romney and Republicans are competing hard to win them. The president will campaign in the both states as the nation's latest monthly job-creation assessment is released. Each state had an unemployment rate of 7.3 percent in May, be-

low the national average of 8.2 percent. Four months before the election, polls show Obama slightly leading Romney nationally and in several states that are critical in the hunt to reach the 270 electoral votes needed to win the Nov. 6 election. The race is close despite a topsy-turvy June that included the Supreme Court's decision to uphold Obama's health care law and its split decision on Arizona's 2010 immigration law.

The president's trip kicks off a new phase of his re-election campaign as he ratchets up his retail cam-

paing this summer before the September convention in Charlotte, N.C. Underscoring the stakes, Obama is forgoing his traditional summer vacation to Martha's Vineyard, Mass., to focus on the campaign, though he spent a long weekend at the Camp David presidential retreat.

Romney, in turn, was spending the entire week relaxing with his family at his lakeside estate in Wolfeboro, N.H., where he's been seen taking his grandchildren for ice cream, jet skiing with his wife and playing volleyball with his five sons.

As Gays Serve Openly, Few Problems For Chaplains

WRIGHTSTOWN, N.J. • Col. Timothy Wagoner has been an Air Force chaplain for 20 years, serving a denomination — the Southern Baptists — that rejects same-sex relationships.

Yet here he was at the chapel he oversees, watching supportively as an airman and his male partner celebrated a civil union ceremony.

"I wouldn't miss it," Wagoner said at the McGuire Air Force Base chapel, days later. "I don't feel I'm compromising my beliefs ... I'm supporting the community."

Wagoner didn't officiate at the ceremony — he couldn't go quite that far. But his very presence at the gathering was a marker of how things have changed for active-duty clergy in the nine months since the "don't ask, don't tell" policy was repealed and gays could serve openly.

Prior to repeal, various conservative groups and individuals — including many conservative retired chaplains — warned that repeal would trigger an exodus of chaplains whose faiths con-

sider homosexual activity to be sinful. In fact, there's been no significant exodus — perhaps two or three departures of active-duty chaplains linked to the repeal. Moreover, chaplains or their civilian coordinators from a range of conservative faiths

told The Associated Press they knew of virtually no serious problems thus far involving infringement of chaplains' religious freedom or rights of conscience.

"To say the dust has settled would be premature," said Air Force Col. Gary Lin-

sky, a Roman Catholic priest who oversees 50 fellow chaplains in the Air Mobility Command. "But I've received no complaints from chaplains raising concerns that their ministries were in any way conflicted or constrained."

Police Say Head Belongs to Canada Body Parts Victim

MONTREAL (AP) • Montreal police confirmed Wednesday that a human head found in a park belongs to a Chinese student who they say was dismembered by a Canadian porn actor.

Montreal police spokeswoman Anie Lemieux said the head belonged to Jun Lin,

who was murdered and dismembered in May.

Luka Magnotta is accused of dismembering his lover Lin and mailing the body parts to Canadian political parties and schools. He pleaded not guilty last month.

Lin's head was the only remaining missing body part

until Sunday, when Lemieux said investigators found it in Park Angrignon after the major crimes unit received a tip. The park is a few miles south of Magnotta's apartment.

Montreal police spokesman Robert St-Onge said police now believe that they

have recovered all of Lin's remains. He said the family, which has been seeking closure, has been informed.

The case became known when a package containing a severed foot was found at Canada's ruling Conservative Party headquarters on May 29.

gathered on the mansion's back porch, a piazza overlooking the Potomac where breezes rolled through.

"It feels good out here. It's the same thing we do in Texas," said Chris Moore of Austin, Texas, sitting with his wife, Dina. The two had come to Virginia to see their son graduate from officer training at The Basic School at Quantico Marine Corps Base.

Moore said he opted for

the smaller crowds at Mount Vernon as opposed to the massive Fourth of July Celebration on the National Mall because it afforded a better place to relax and contemplate the founding of the nation, especially since Mount Vernon on Wednesday hosted a naturalization ceremony for 100 new citizens from 47 different countries.

"This place is incredible. It's just the kind of place that people need to see," he said, noting the divided nature of the country's current politics. "We all need to step

back and look at where we started."

Up the river in Washington, President Barack Obama also attended a naturalization ceremony at the White House, this one for active service members from 17 countries. Military families were invited for a barbecue and to watch fireworks on the South Lawn.

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Tunisian Democracy Threatened by Weak Opposition

TUNIS, Tunisia • Tunisia's fledgling democracy is threatened by a weak opposition that isn't offering a viable alternative to the well-organized Islamists in power, and discontent is taking the form of angry riots with extremist overtones instead.

The return to a single, overbearing ruling party has grave implications for Tunisia and the countries across the region watching its journey to democracy after it kicked off the Arab Spring.

Tunisia has had a smoother transition than

its turbulent neighbors. Voters chose between a bewildering array of parties in Tunisia's first free elections in October in what was described at the time as a sign of democracy's exuberance, with the assumption that later elections would feature fewer, more sober choices.

Halfway between those landmark elections and the next round of voting early next year, the political scene in this North African nation of 10 million remains a fractured sea of small parties that share little in common aside from dissatisfaction with the moderate Islamists who dominated the last election.

Islamists Suspected in Egyptian Student's Murder

CAIRO • An Egyptian university student was fatally stabbed as his girlfriend looked on after three suspected Islamic militants confronted the couple in a park and told them they should not be together if they are not married, security officials said Wednesday.

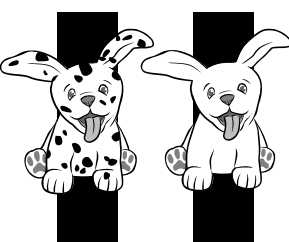
The murder is fueling fears that vigilante groups may be seeking to strictly enforce Islamic mores, emboldened by the election of Islamist President Mohammed Morsi. Moderate Muslims along with liberal and women's groups worry that Morsi's presidency will slowly eradicate Egypt's entrenched secular traditions and change the social fabric of the mainly Muslim nation of 82 million people.

The student, 20-year-old Ahmed Hussein Eid, was attacked on June 25 in the Red Sea city of Suez east of Cairo while he was with his girlfriend in a quiet park that is a favorite spot for romantic rendezvous, according to the officials. It was not immediately clear what the two were doing when challenged by the three men who arrived on a motorbike.

But the officials, citing initial testimony of the

girlfriend, said the men told the couple they should not be together because they were not married and must immediately leave and go their separate ways. An argument followed and one of the three men stabbed Eid in the upper left thigh, near his genitals. He was hospitalized and died of his wounds a week later on Monday, according to the security officials who spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to talk to the media.

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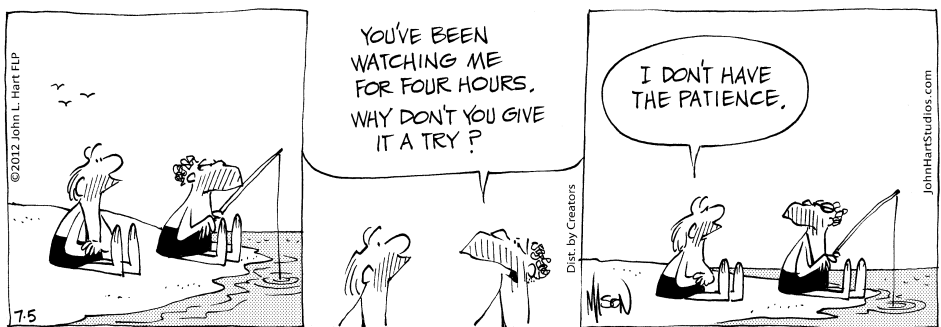
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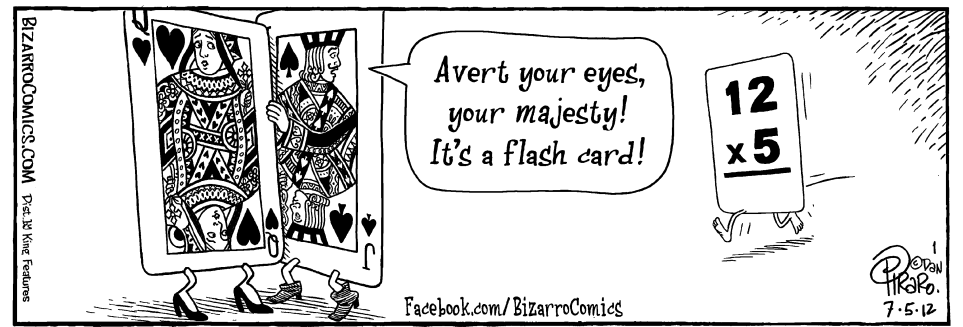
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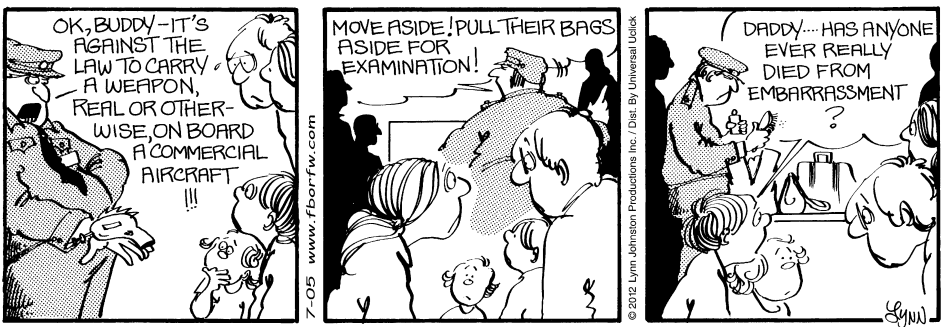
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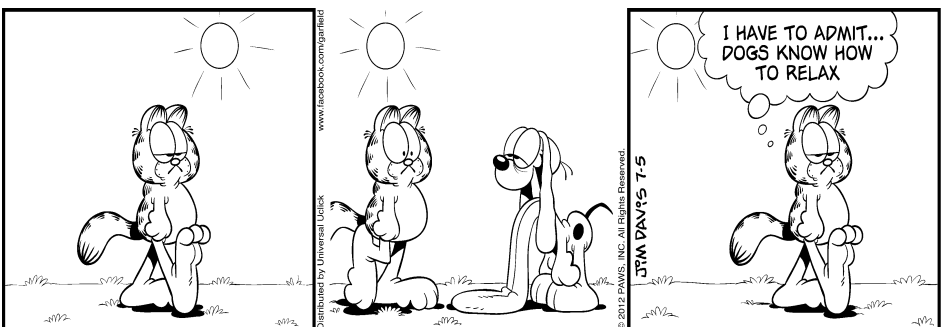
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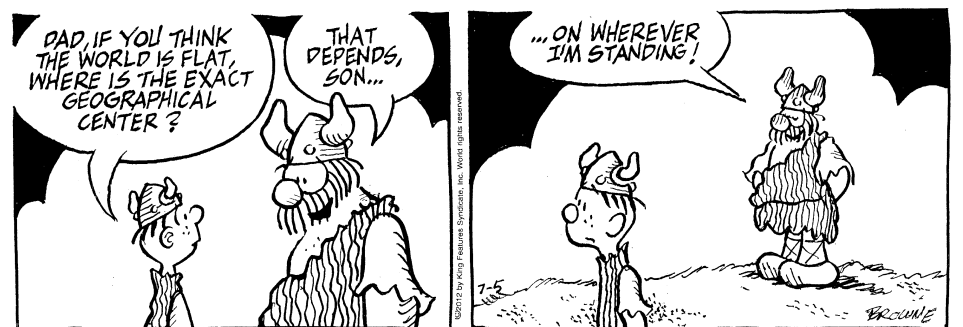
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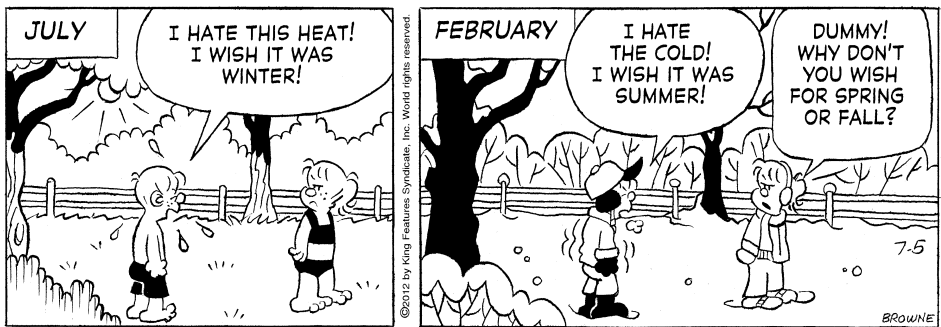
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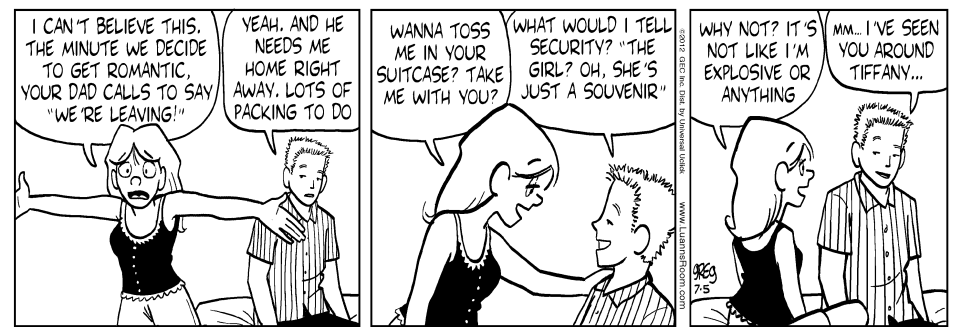

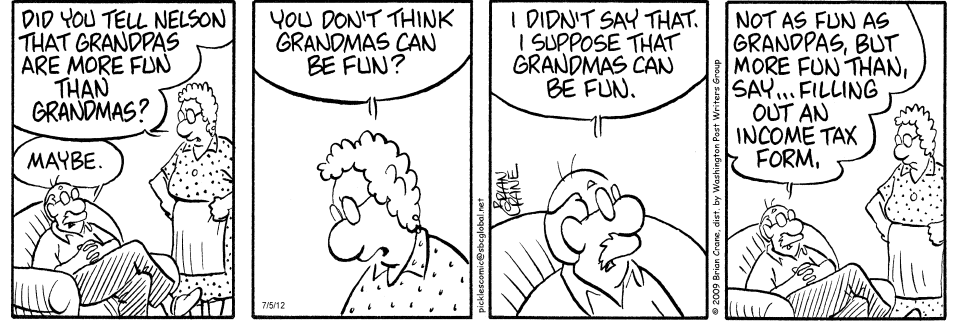
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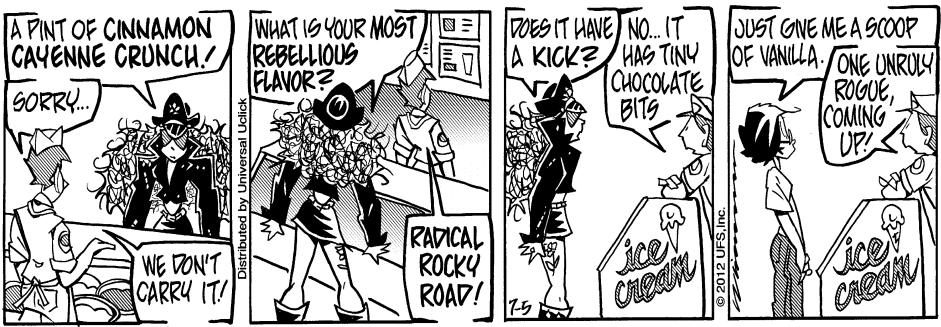
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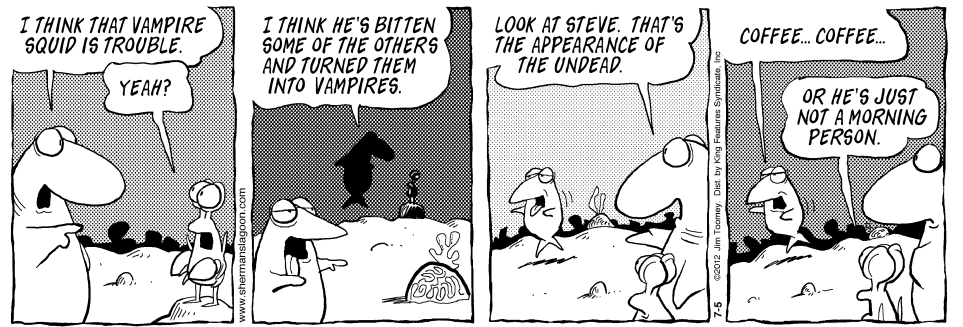
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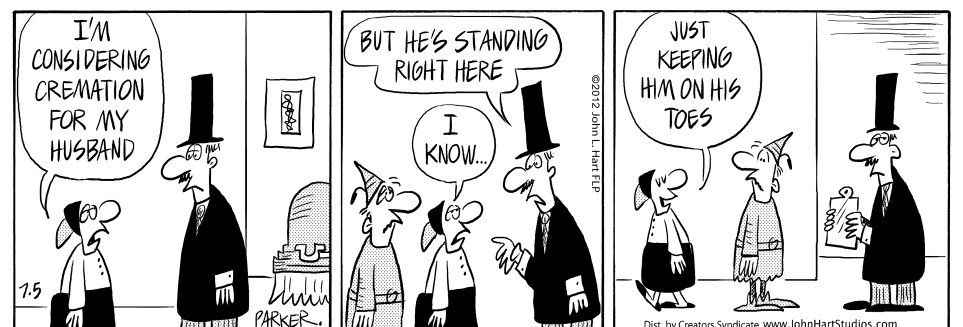
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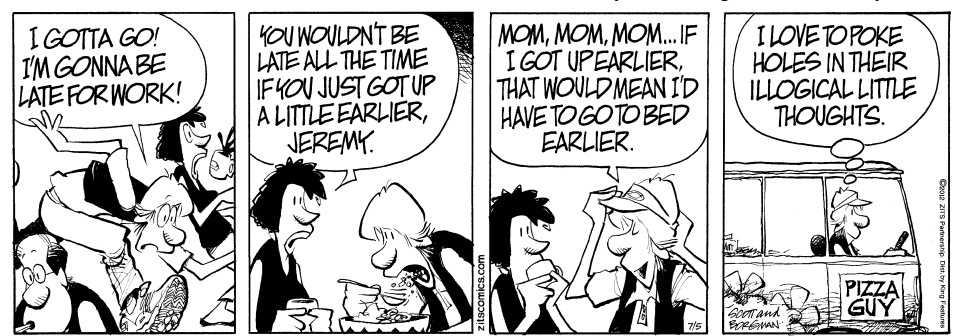
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Jihadists Claim Syria Attacks

BEIRUT • An al-Qaida-inspired group claimed responsibility for dozens of attacks across Syria, the latest evidence that extremists are exploiting the chaos to make inroads in another Middle Eastern country.

The Syrian regime has long blamed terrorists for the 16-month-old revolt, and the presence of al-Qaida groups creates new difficulties for Arab and Western countries trying to help force President Bashar Assad from power.

The opposition and the rebel Free Syrian Army deny having any links to terrorism, and say they do not have the desire or the capabilities to carry out massive suicide bombings and other al-Qaida-style attacks.

On Tuesday, the SITE monitoring group, which

tracks jihadist chatter on the Internet, said the Al-Nusra Front released statements on extremist websites in late June claiming the attacks were to avenge the killings of Syrians by the government.

One of the attacks targeted a pro-regime television station in the town of Drousha, south of the capital, Damascus, on June 27. Seven people were killed in the attack on Al-Ikhbariya TV.

Al-Nusra said the station is an arm of the regime and the attack sought to make the station "taste from the cup of torture" and force every member of the regime to wonder: "When will my turn come?" The statement included photos of 11 men it said were kidnapped in the attack.

Al-Ikhbariya is privately owned but often acts as a regime mouthpiece.

Other attacks in the latest claim of responsibility in-

clude dozens of armed raids and bombings — including suicide bombings — in Syrian cities.

Little is known about Al-Nusra, although Western intelligence officials say it could be a front for a branch of al-Qaida militants from Iraq operating in Syria. The group has claimed responsibility for a string of attacks in Syria, including suicide bombings, in the past.

In February, al-Qaida chief Ayman al-Zawahri called on Muslims to support Syrian rebels.

"Wounded Syria is still bleeding day after day, and the butcher (Bashar Assad) isn't deterred and doesn't stop," al-Zawahri said at the time. He took over al-Qaida after Osama bin Laden was killed by U.S. special forces last May.

Although the Syrian opposition disavows links to terror, the presence of al-

God Particle

European Center for Nuclear Research, or CERN, erupted in frequent applause and standing ovations. Physicists shed tears reflecting on the decades of work that brought them to this momentous occasion.

The new particle appears to share many of the same qualities as the one predicted by Scottish physicist Peter Higgs and others and is perhaps the biggest accomplishment at CERN since its founding in 1954 outside Geneva along the Swiss-French border.

Rolf Heuer, director of CERN, said the newly discovered subatomic particle is a boson, but he stopped just shy of claiming outright that

it is the Higgs boson itself — an extremely fine distinction.

"As a layman, I think we did it," he told the elated crowd. "We have a discovery. We have observed a new particle that is consistent with a Higgs boson."

The Higgs, which until now had been purely theoretical, is regarded as key to understanding why matter has mass, which combines with gravity to give an object weight.

The idea is much like gravity and Isaac Newton's early theories: Gravity was there all the time before Newton explained it. The Higgs boson was believed to be there, too. And now that scientists have actually seen something much like it, they can put that knowledge to further use.

The center's atom smash-

er, the \$10 billion Large Hadron Collider on the Swiss-French border, sends protons whizzing in a circle at nearly the speed of light to create high-energy collisions. The aftermath of those impacts can offer clues about dark matter, antimatter and the creation of the universe, which many theorize occurred in a massive explosion known as the Big Bang.

Most of the particles that result from the collisions exist for only the smallest fractions of a second. But finding a Higgs-like boson was one of the biggest challenges in physics: Out of some 500 trillion collisions, just several dozen produced "events" with significant data, said Joe Incandela, leader of the team known as CMS, with 2,100 scientists.



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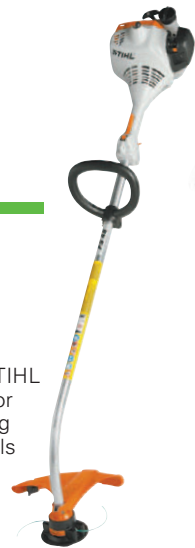

WAKING WAVES

Local wakeboarders share tips, trends and how to break into the sport.

BURLEY • Blake Wasden of Nampa has been skimming the waters of Idaho since the tender age of 3.

He started out by first learning how to water ski and then made the progression to wakeboarding after learning on a skurf board, the predecessor to the wakeboard.

“It actually surprises a lot of people how much water is around here,” Wasden, 23, said. “The season isn’t as long but I put on my wet suit and still go out when it’s cold.”

Wakeboarding is the hybrid of water skiing and surfing and emerged on the water sports scene in the mid-’80s.

If you are interested in waking waves and breaking into the sport, here are some tips from boarders who have been waking for a while:

Start with a Boat

The first and most obvious thing you need to wakeboard is a boat.

There are specialized boats made exclusively for wakeboarding but they are pretty expensive at \$30,000 and up.

Wasden said pretty much any boat that can pull you will work.

For Ben Orton of Burley, wakeboarding is a family activity that started with his dad.

“When my dad was a teenager he used to go down to the boat dock and bum rides from people and give them gas money. You can do that, too,” Orton said with a laugh. “If you have a friend with a boat it’s pretty easy to get into because all you have to do is buy a board and boots and you’re golden.”

If you don’t have friends or family with a boat, Wake Central Park in Caldwell is the

perfect solution.

Riders are pulled by an overhead cable-ski system, so it is ideal for riders without a boat or limited access to one.

But whether you are pulled by a boat or a cable, Wasden said you have to let it do all the work.

“If you pull on the handle it shoves your body underneath the water,” he said.

Next, the Board

Orton said he learned how to wakeboard after watching his dad and brother try to stand up on the knee board, a board that is ridden in a kneeling stance. Eventually the family got a wakeboard and Orton started to experiment with the sport.

If you’re just getting into wakeboarding you don’t need a super expensive board, Orton said, because there are a lot of entry-level wakeboards that are cheaper.

In addition to a wakeboard you’ll need a helmet, life vest, handle and a wake surfer rope. This type of rope is made not to

Bruneau Dunes State Park

MOUNTAIN HOME • If you don’t mind the wind, Bruneau Dunes State Park is a fascinating place for a day trip or overnight camping.

Its dunes aren’t for off-road riding — no motor vehicles are allowed on the sand — but they’re a study in geology and fun to ride on a sled.

Sledding is exactly what David and Caryn Clark’s grandchildren were doing June 21. The Caldwell couple brought their seven grandchildren — from Colorado, Oregon, Texas and Utah — to the dunes because the Clarks had visited before and enjoyed their time.

“We thought the grandchildren might like it,” David said, unloading round plastic sleds from the back of his pickup. The couple had scheduled activities all day at the park, including a night-time astronomy study.

Here’s what you need to know for your own day of adventure.

How Big Are the Dunes?

The tallest sand dune rises 470 feet. Feel free to climb — or slide down — but no vehicles are allowed on the dunes, said Mary Bybee, a seasonal interpreter at the park.

“The scene is dominated by the one big, long dune,” added office specialist Kim Durr. “It has two humps and in the middle is a crater. It’s hard to count the other dunes, because they’re much smaller.”

The dune next to the park’s main roadway is where people bring their sleds, Durr

said. “That dune is maybe 100 feet, I’m guessing.”

What Kinds of Habitat Are at Bruneau?

The state park is a study in contrasts: desert, dune, prairie, lake and marsh habitats. Tired of one scene? Move to a different location inside the park to see another.

While the Clarks’ grandchildren were making the most of their time on the dunes, children splashed near the lake’s shores and teens had just emerged from swimming in the lake, while less adventurous folks sat at campgrounds in the shade of thick trees.

Is the Sand Safe to Walk on?

One thing you should know before you visit: Don’t forget to bring your shoes! The sand can get extremely hot during summer, Bybee said. It’s a good idea to bring along sunscreen, hat, sunglasses and plenty of water.

Can I Camp at the Park?

You sure can. The park has 82 serviced campsites and two cabins. An equestrian area provides facilities for visitors to camp with their horses.

Standard campsites cost \$16 a night; serviced campsites cost \$22 a night. Cabins, which sleep five, are \$55 and offer electricity and bunk beds. Visitors share a water faucet between the two cabins, and restrooms at the adjacent campground, Durr said.

I was going through old newspaper articles recently, reviewing some of the outdoors stories I’ve written over the years.

I wondered: How many miles have I hiked? How many miles have I driven on dirt bikes? How many places have I seen?



Trails and Tales

I don’t know. I haven’t even tried to count.

But as I scanned the headlines, I remembered many of the stories as if I had written them only last week. Some, however, were from three and four years ago. Guess the old saying is true: Time flies when you’re having fun.

While I read, I thought of you: what you should be doing this summer. I even made a list for you.

Because there are so many things to do — and space here is limited — I’ve narrowed the list to three.

• **Kayak the Snake:** The first time I rode the Snake River was on a canoe. The second was in a kayak, which was so much easier than the canoe. You can use your own or rent either — and even paddleboards — at Pryor Paddle Rentals at Centennial Waterfront Park in Twin Falls.

Head to Pillar Falls and portage to reach Shoshone Falls. Going by way of water is definitely a new way of looking at the Snake River Canyon.

• **Visit a Cave:** Lava tubes dot south-central Idaho’s landscape, and one of the more popular is the Shoshone Indian Ice Cave north of

stretch so you can pop off the wake. Wasden estimates that a board, boots and bindings can cost \$300 to \$1,000 or more depending on how much you want to spend and the quality.

Learn Some Tricks

Have questions about tricks? Wasden said there are a lot of wakeboarding videos on YouTube made by professionals and amateurs that can give you guidance. There also are clinics that are held throughout the summer.

Wasden works for Idaho Water Sports at its store in Nampa and on June 26 was on-hand during a wakeboarding clinic taught by wakeboarding professional Gerry Nunn. Wasden said he has also taught people how to wakeboard during private clinics, which are \$70 an hour if customers use their boat or \$100 if they use boats owned by IWS.

"I'll teach them whatever they want from beginner to advance," Wasden said. "A lot of people who purchase boats want to wake board but they don't know how."

Wasden said wakeboarding is a good sport for the family because there is no age limit.

"With some of the younger kids I'll get on the wakeboard with them so they don't feel alone and if they ever fall I'll be right there with them."

A Popular Sport

Though wakeboarding is widely popular in states like Florida, Wasden said there is a big following in Idaho even though the community isn't as connected.

"It's just not that everyone knows everyone," Wasden said.

Orton said he has noticed another sport starting to make waves in Idaho.

"You see a lot of people wake surfing, too; it's like surfing but behind your boat that's become real huge within the last five years," Orton said.

The difference between wakeboarding and wakesurfing is distance and speed. With wakeboarding you are 70 to 80 feet behind the boat, flipping in the air and performing tricks. But with wakesurfing you are 10 feet behind the boat going slow, surfing the waves created by the boat.

"A lot of people like it. You can throw as many people as you want on the boat," Orton said.

Hit the Waves

Looking for the perfect place to wake?

Wasden said he usually frequents Magic Reservoir, the Snake River and Red Fish Lake.

Jake Casperson, 17, of Twin Falls often wakeboards at Shoshone Falls because it's close and well protected from wind. The perfect weather conditions for wakeboarding are when the waters are like a mirror.

Casperson has been wakeboarding for 10 years and learns more about the sport by looking up videos online or taking part in local clinics. He also has the WakeMD wakeboard instruction app by Shaun Murray downloaded. This app takes you step by step through more than 80 wakeboard tricks and tips.

Pinther, 29, a wakeboarder from Rupert took up the water sport in the late '90s.

"Everyone's dream is glassy water, you want smooth water," he said.

Because Idaho can get windy this often makes for rough conditions, so be wary of wakes that double up in size or completely disappear.

And all the wakeboarders agree that you only improve as long as your board is in the water.

"It's like anything, if you spend enough time on a boat," Pinther said.

Pinther also noted how wakeboarding technology and equipment has improved since the '90s, which makes for a better experience.

"For me wakeboarding ... it's different than any other sport that involves aerial or tricks," Orton said. "With wakeboarding all the tricks are engineered for the rope and you can learn tricks really fast if you know where to put the rope. There's no other sport like that."

Interested in becoming a missionary for the cause, just follow the admonition of Jim Scoutin, genial host of the Outdoor Channel's hit show, Shooting USA. His advice, "Shoot safely, shoot often, and introduce a young person to our sport."

In keeping with this wise council, my brother Dave invited a young neighborhood lad, Scott, to join his brood and myself for our annual July prairie dog and ground squirrel shoot on rancher Bloom's place outside of Great Falls, Mont. Scott is a novice shooter that has already earned enough money

doing chores to purchase his own Remington semi-auto .22 and a World War II vintage 7.62-by-54 Russian Mosin-Nagant.

Although the shooting couldn't quite be described as "fast and furious," we did have ground squirrels popping out of their dens and running from burrow to burrow to provide lots of quick challenging shots.

After the day's shoot in the sparse shade of some skinny cattle-abused trees, we gathered together and compared our impressions of the effectiveness of the .22 LR's, .17 HMR, and .22 WMR (Winchester Magnum) we carried.

The day's experiences mirrored our earlier impressions: the hands-down lethality champ at all ranges was the .22 WMR, particularly when firing Remington's Premier 33gr. poly-tipped V-Max loads. Much less impressive were Rem-

ington's superbly accurate and flat shooting Premier 17 Accu-tip boat tails. The fly-weight projectiles seemed inclined to pencil through the rodents without delivering much shock effect. Often a second shot was needed to dispatch the flip-flopping stricken vermin. The inexpensive bulk pack high velocity .22 LR hollow points, as always, were very effective at lesser ranges.

So during this glorious Fourth of July holiday, why don't you gather up the kiddies, case the rimfire rifles and handguns, and head for the hills to celebrate being a citizen of the greatest country on the planet and celebrate our precious God-given, sacrifice-sustained rights.

As Ted Nugent says, "You can't do this in France!"

There also is a nine-mile equestrian riding trail around the park. During the heat of the day, you'll find plenty of shade near your campsite for your horses.

Can I Bring My Dog?

Yes, dogs are welcome at the park — if they are leashed. But owners have to be responsible in another way: Clean up after your dogs and do not leave them unattended.

Dogs are not allowed in the cabins.

What about Hiking?

The park has a six-mile, circular trail for self-guided walks. Get maps at the visitor center, where the trail begins.

Want to cut your hike short? Watch for 15 white markers along the way, which will give you alternate, shorter routes back to the center.

Children can hike the trail with their parents, but depending on their age it might become a little difficult for them at some parts. The dirt-and-sand trail is described as "moderately strenuous," especially as you near the top of a dune.

Along the way, keep an eye out for some of these critters: cottontail and jackrabbits, lizards and gopher snakes. And near the marshes — you'll hike near both of the park's lakes — watch for frogs.

You'll notice that the brown fields are dotted with colorful wildflowers. Enjoy them, but leave them alone. Picking the wildflowers is prohibited.

What Other Critters Might I Spot?

Bruneau is home to a variety of wildlife including coyote, sage grouse and birds of prey. The lakes are filled with bass, bluegill and catfish, which anglers can catch. The park also is habitat for a number of beetles, rattlesnakes and scorpions.

Something fun for the family is going on night hikes with flashlights; shine the lights on the scorpions,

Park Basics

Bruneau Dunes State Park, about 18 miles south of Mountain Home, is open for day use from dawn to dusk with a \$5-per-vehicle entrance fee. The visitor center and museum is open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily; the observatory is open Friday and Saturday nights from March through mid-October.

Attractions: Camping, fishing, hiking, horseback riding, swimming and night sky viewing using the observatory's telescopes. Campgrounds offer water, restrooms, barbecue grills and shade trees.

Get there: From Twin Falls, take Interstate 84 to Exit 112. From the freeway, drive about 15 miles west on Idaho Highway 78. Watch for the signs.

which are venomous but usually not fatal to humans, and you'll see them appear green in the light, Bybee said. Another excellent reason to keep your shoes on.

What's in the Museum?

The museum, near the park's entrance, is a fun place to learn all about Bruneau's insects, reptiles and wildlife as well as a little about the geology of the area.

Did you know, for instance, that the dunes were created by the Bonneville Flood about 15,000 years ago? An exhibit inside the museum will tell you about that upheaval and much more.

Another exhibit shows the many insect species that can be found at the park; one even displays a few scorpions. There are no flashlight beams shining on these behind-the-glass critters, so they're not green like you'd see during a nighttime flashlight hunt. But they look just as intimidating with their curly tails

and stingers.

The museum also includes a gift shop, where you can purchase a souvenir or two — and that sunscreen you forgot.

Can I See the Stars?

Bruneau Dunes, a desert landscape several miles from city lights, is a great place to see the stars. To enhance your vision, the park offers nighttime viewing of the stars through telescopes at its observatory.

Visitors watch a short program, then survey the heavens. The observatory is open to the public Friday and Saturday from March through mid-October, Bybee said.

This is a must when visiting the dunes, especially if you come here with children. Cost is \$3 per person, but children 6 and younger get in free.

Want a private viewing? No problem. That's exactly what the Clarks had scheduled for their grandchildren. Find information and schedule a private viewing at the visitor center and museum, 366-7919.

What's the Weather Like?

It sometimes gets hot and windy, Bybee said, but other times the park enjoys mild summer days. Wind gusts often kick up quickly in the area, blowing sand into the air. Other times, the park is as quiet as a mouse.

To keep an eye on the park's weather conditions, contact the observatory or visit cleardarksky.com/c/BrnDnsSPObkey.html

What Other Fun Is There?

Activities at Bruneau are many, including bird watching, camping, fishing, hiking and swimming — the latter is a favorite among young people.

And of course, there's sledding on the dunes — but only with plastic sleds, Bybee said, adding that round ones work best.

Bring your own, and leave the metal sleds at home. They heat up quickly on the hot sand.

Kansas Lake Provides a Lifetime of Fun for Guide

WICHITA, Kan. • Nearly all she passes on the shore have a friendly wave or words for Carolyn Parker.

Few seem surprised her visiting anglers enjoyed good fishing on what most considered “one of those days” on Lake Taneycomo one Tuesday morning.

But as well as one of Taneycomo’s best-known anglers and successful guides, Parker is also one of the water’s longest-running fans.

“My dad and I used to come down here to fish for smallmouth and whatever we could catch in about ‘52 or ‘53. I’ve been fishing for trout down here about as long as it’s had trout,” said Parker, a Kansas City native who can add angling entrepreneur, innovator, barrier breaker and educator to her piscine resume.

Parker is quick to note Taneycomo is more of a river than a lake as it flows from beneath Table Rock Lake’s dam, which was closed in the late 1950s to throttle the often-wild White River.

Trout were stocked when the sometimes 40-something degree water was too cold for most Ozark fish. It was in the mid-1960s that she was bitten by the fly-fishing bug.

“It was just so beautiful, I knew I had to do it,” Parker said of the first time she watched others casting flies

at Taneycomo.

The sport has always been about more than catching fish to Parker.

“Fly fishing was my sanity savor when I was working,” said Parker, who worked in business for 25 years.

In 1997, Parker and her husband, Stan, retired and moved to the Branson area to be closer to the water and trout they loved.

Neither were ready for the rocking chair. In 1999, they opened Rivers Run

Outfitters, a fly-fishing shop and guiding operation. Parker became the first female fly-fishing guide in the area.

They’ve done well enough that in 2006, the business received the “Outfitter of the Year” award from a national retailer.

The Parkers were content to stay behind the counter or just wade the shallows.

Having great days casting from drift boats on Rocky Mountain streams, the Parkers imported a few of the high-sided, ultra-stable craft to the Ozarks in 2000. They were the first of their kind on Taneycomo.

As well as making casting easier for standing clients, it allowed Rivers Run guides to access miles of river, stopping to work the best areas.

“It’s also just a cool feeling to be floating down that river,” Parker said. “It’s a lot more of an enjoyable experience.”

On that Tuesday morning, Parker gave two visitors a quick tour of where she likes to fish on the 23-mile river.

Just below the dam, she launched the boat and leaned hard into the oars. With every pull, the boat scooted over trout.

Thanks to regular stockings, natural reproduction and a fertile environment, Taneycomo holds some impressive trout sizes and densities.

This spring, the lake yielded a rainbow trout that was about 31 inches

long and 17.48 pounds.

Parker said 20-inch trout are considered exceptional in the shallow areas where they guide. Clients catch a lot of trout in the 12-14 inch range.

“You can occasionally have 100 fish days here, but I consider 80 fish a really good day,” Parker said of when she’s guiding two anglers a full day. “When you get down around 10 fish that’s bad, unless they’re beginners, then it’s fantastic.”

Though she’s requested by many experienced male fly fishers, Parker relishes working with women. She’s helped start two fly-fishing organizations, including the Midwest-based River Runners Women’s Fly Fishing Club, hoping to draw more females to fly fishing.

Some of her best days have been watching women catch and land their first fly-caught fish.

“I really like working with women. They usually have no pre-conceived notions of what fly fishing is supposed to be,” she said, “and they seem to enjoy it more if they’re learning from me instead of a husband or boyfriend. It’s like learning to drive.”

No matter the gender, working with rank amateurs often means a steady diet of untangling tippets and leaders for Parker.

“Fly fishing has really helped my patience,” she said. “I’m just fortunate to be doing something I love.”

F&G Opens Upper Salmon to Chinook

STANLEY • The Idaho Department of Fish and Game has opened another section of the upper Salmon River to chinook salmon fishing.

The Ellis area is now open from the posted boundary about 100 years upstream of the mouth of the Pahsimeroi River upstream to the Highway 75 Salmon River bridge, about 250 yards upstream of the mouth of the East Fork Salmon River.

The Stanley area of the upper Salmon opened June 23. Both areas remain open until further notice.

Other limits remain in effect.

Fishing hours from 5 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily limit is four chinook, only two of which may be adults and a possession limit of 12 fish, only six of which may be adults. The statewide limit is 20 adult chinook during salmon seasons that occur before Sept. 1.

Adults are 24 or more inches long; jacks are less than 24 inches. Only salmon with a clipped adipose fin, as evidenced by a healed scar, may be kept. All adult chinook that are caught and kept must be recorded on the angler’s salmon permit.

Wading for Largemouth Bass in Minnesota

BRAINERD, Minn. • Absent a boat, some anglers remain couch-bound, thinking more about fishing than doing it. This needn’t be, particularly when the target is largemouth bass, and especially not in late spring and early summer, when these fish inhabit shoreline haunts.

Bill Marchel and I were talking about this the other evening as we pulled on our waders and slapped the odd mosquito. Wade fishing for bass has long been a favorite pastime of Bill’s, and over the years I’ve joined him on a few forays into shoreline sloop — bait-caster in hand, its spool wound with heavy line.

“Wading for bass is about as much fun as you can have fishing,” Bill said.

Of course, many waters that can be fished on foot can also be reached by boat. But not all. Vegetation we waded the other night, for example, was too thick for even the most powerful electric trolling motor.

And too shallow for the shallowest running boat.

Also in their waders, and fishing with Bill and me, were my son, Cole, and his pal, Max Kelley, both 16. The three of us had been bassin’ on the Whitefish Chain last week, and took a break from that action — all undertaken in a boat — to wade with Bill.

“The key to wade fishing for bass, as in all bass fishing, is to make long casts, to get the lure as far from you as possible,” Bill said. “On occasions over the years I’ve waded for bass on the edge of hard-stem bulrushes or lily pads, and have had fishermen in boats come close to me after they see me catching fish.

“But often they don’t catch anything, and it’s because they’re disturbing too much water with their boat. You

have to make long casts.”

In the Brainerd area, and also in and around the Twin Cities, there’s no shortage of lakes and rivers that can be waded for bass. Some scouting is involved. But little effort is needed to find fairly thick stands of shoreline vegetation, combined with waters of wading depth.

“Let’s give it a try,” Bill said. And we waded in.

Experienced bass anglers, Max and Cole were well accustomed to chucking baits great distances, whether plastic worms, buzz baits or — as was the case when we fished with Bill — Scum Frogs.

These last are weedless, a necessary component of lures used to fish vegetative sloop. Also to their advantage, Scum Frogs are heavy enough to cast, and light enough to retrieve while skimming atop lily pads.

Fanning out, the four of us sprayed lures hither and yon, though not so far from one another that we couldn’t share in each other’s excitement when a bucketmouth rose from the depths to hit a bait.

Which after all is the attraction of top-water bass fishing: seeing the water boil below a lure before a mouth explodes topside, its mouth agape, to inhale what Mr. Bass thinks is a frog or other terrestrial.

But instead is a hunk of soft plastic. With hooks.

“Son!” Bill said, as he took

one bass, released it, and soon reefed back on another.

Max and Cole were into fish as well, casting stout wands of graphite and unspooling yard after yard of braided line before finding bass lurking just below the surface.

“It’s getting a little late in June for this type of fishing,” Bill said. “It’s still good. But it’s not as good as when more of the bass were still along the shorelines, in shallow water.”

Over the years, Bill and I also have wade-fished for sunnies. Fly rods can make this sport still more fun, provided they’re cast along the edges of vegetation, not in the middle of it, as we did the other evening.

“A fly rod just can’t pull bass out of the heavy stuff,” Bill said. “Particularly not 3- and 4-pounders. That’s why I use 60- or 80-pound line on my bait caster.”

Brainerd-area lakes are so popular that sometimes multiple boats crowd favorite walleye and bass haunts.

That’s rarely, if ever, the case while wade fishing.

The other night, Bill, Cole, Max and I occasionally heard a personal watercraft whine in the distance, or a vehicle motor atop nearby blacktop.

Otherwise, striding through thick sloop, we were so alone we could have been in the boundary waters.

Casting, and casting again. Son!

Idaho F&G Releases Jaw-tagged Chinook

BOISE • Anglers fishing for chinook salmon in the lower Salmon, Little Salmon and South Fork Salmon rivers may encounter fish with jaw tags in their lower jaw, according to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

Anglers who catch a jaw-tagged fish are not required to report the tags to Idaho Fish and Game or to return the tags.

The jaw tags are applied to adult fish at Lower Granite Dam and are part of a study to assess PIT tag retention rates among returning adult chinook between Lower Granite Dam and their adult trapping destination.

Results from this work help managers make accurate in-season estimates of adult hatchery salmon returns.

Scalia Critics Say Justice too Political Last Term

WASHINGTON (AP) • Justice Antonin Scalia drew unusually critical attention during this past Supreme Court term for comments he made in court and in his writing that seemed to some more political than judicial.

His dissent in the Arizona immigration case contained a harsh assessment of the Obama administration's immigration policy and prompted a public rebuke from a fellow Republican-appointed judge.

Scalia's aggressive demeanor during argument sessions even earned him some gentle teasing from his closest personal friend on the court. Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, speaking at a Washington convention, said the term's high-profile cases may explain why Scalia "called counsel's argument 'extraordinary' no fewer than 10 times."

The 76-year-old Scalia is a gifted writer with a razor wit and willingness to do battle with those on the other side of an issue. Those qualities have made him a powerful voice, an entertaining presence and a magnet for criticism on the court for more than 25 years. Even with that vivid background, some of Scalia's recent remarks stood out in the eyes of court observers.

Ten lawyers who appear

regularly before the Supreme Court, including two former Scalia law clerks, were interviewed for this story and said they too had taken note of Scalia's recent comments. But mindful that they might appear before the high court or be in a position to submit legal briefs, they all declined to be identified by name.

Measured by wins and losses, the court term did not end well for Scalia. He was on the losing end of the court's biggest cases involving health care, immigration, lying about military medals and prison sentences, both for crack cocaine offenders and juvenile killers.

The last words Scalia uttered in court this term dealt with his disagreement with the court's majority in a decision that watered down Arizona's crackdown on illegal immigrants.

Summarizing his views in court, Scalia commented on President Barack Obama's recent announcement changing the deportation rules for some children of illegal immigrants. And in his written opinion, he referenced anti-free-black laws of slave states as a precedent for state action on immigration. Both drew critical notice.

"The president said at a news conference that the new program is 'the right thing to do' in light of Congress' failure to pass the administration's proposed re-

vision of the Immigration Act. Perhaps it is, though Arizona may not think so. But to say, as the court does, that Arizona contradicts federal law by enforcing applications of the Immigration Act that the president declines to enforce boggles the mind," Scalia said.

The outcry over his reference to Obama's announcement was immediate and included a call by liberal Washington Post columnist E.J. Dionne for Scalia to resign. Conservative Judge Richard Posner of the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Chicago, who was appointed by President Ronald Reagan, contributed this passage to *Slate* magazine's annual end-of-term discussion:

"These are fighting words. The nation is in the midst of a hard-fought presidential election campaign; the outcome is in doubt. Illegal immigration is a campaign issue. It wouldn't surprise me if Justice Scalia's opinion were quoted in campaign ads. The program that appalls Justice Scalia was announced almost two months after the oral argument in the Arizona case. It seems rather a belated development to figure in an opinion in the case," wrote Posner, who had taken Scalia to task in the past.

Doug Kmiec, a conservative legal scholar who backed Obama's election in 2008 and served as his ambassador to Malta, said, "To

broadly assert, as Justice Scalia seems to do in his Arizona dissent, that the Obama administration's enforcement priorities are 'too lax,' substitutes the unelected Antonin Scalia for the elected Barack Obama."

Scalia's defenders say the criticism is misplaced. They say the justice was doing something much more familiar and common, attack-

ing the majority opinion by Justice Anthony Kennedy. "He really wasn't criticizing the Obama administration's position. He was just using it as a timely example of why he thought his position was the better one in the Arizona case," said Brian Fitzpatrick, a Vanderbilt University law professor who once served as a law clerk to Scalia.

Separately, in defending

the tough Arizona law, Scalia's written dissent refers to the laws of Southern slave states that excluded freed blacks to support the notion that states had control over immigration in the era before Congress enacted national legislation. Liberal commentators seized on that reference as a particularly bizarre twist in an otherwise angry opinion.

Many Native Americans Live Next to Power Plants

MOAPA, Nev. • Beyond the ancestral hunting fields and the rows of small, sparse homes, the cemetery at the Moapa River Indian Reservation sprawls across a barren hill with the tombstones of tribal members who died young.

Their deaths haunt this small desert community outside Las Vegas. Children play indoors, afraid they might be next. Hoping to keep out the air they believe is killing their people, tribal elders keep their windows shut and avoid growing food on the land where their ancestors once found sustenance.

The Moapa Paiutes need not travel far to stare down their perceived enemy: The coal-powered plant blamed for polluting the southern Nevada reservation's air and water is visible from nearly every home.

"Everybody is sick," said Vicki Simmons, whose

brother worked at the Reid Gardner Generating Station for 10 years before dying at age 31 with heart problems.

Across the country, a disproportionate number of power plants operate near or on tribal lands. NV Energy maintains its plant near the Moapa Paiute reservation is safe and has been upgraded with the required clean

emissions technologies. Meanwhile, local, state and federal health agencies say they cannot conduct accurate health studies to verify the tribe's complaints because the sample size would be too small.

In all, about 10 percent of all power plants operate within 20 miles of reservation land, according to an

Associated Press analysis of data from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Many of those 51 energy production centers are more than a half-century old and affect roughly 48 tribes living on 50 reservations. Fewer than 2 percent of all people in the United States identify as Native American and only a small portion live on tribal land.

In many cases, Native American leaders have long embraced energy development as an economic opportunity for communities battling widespread unemployment.

But a growing backlash has some tribal leaders questioning whether the health and environmental risks associated with energy production has put their people in harm's way. While it's not conclusive that coal operations pose a direct danger to reservation residents, the Moapa Paiutes are one of several tribes demanding the closure of their neighborhood power plants.

RAIN COOLS COLO. FIRES, WHILE OTHER WILDFIRES GROW

DENVER • Rains cooled Colorado wildfires Wednesday, but more than a dozen wildfires elsewhere in the West continued chewing through bone-dry pine and brush as firefighters working through the holiday kept a nervous eye for fireworks and other hazards.

Wildfires in Wyoming, Utah and Colorado sent haze and smoke across Colorado's Front Range, prompting air-quality health advisories as firefighters warned of growing fires in sparsely populated areas.

In Colorado Springs, there was good news in the fight against the most destructive fire in state history.

Light rains that fell overnight helped calm the Waldo Canyon Fire, which has scorched 28 square miles, killed two and destroyed almost 350 homes. Firefighters predicted full containment of the fire by Sunday, with more rain, cooler temperatures and higher humidity predicted through the weekend.

The forecast wasn't as kind in eastern Montana, where a mammoth 380-

square-mile in Custer National Forest was gobbling up pine, juniper and sage with help from gusty winds. The fire has burned 16 homes.

Firefighters gave the blaze "extreme" growth potential, with wind gusts up to 45 mph predicted. Temperatures were expected to reach the 100s.

As firefighting efforts continued, holiday fireworks were canceled across the region. Colorado officials were calling off holiday displays from Fort Collins to Colorado Springs, while law enforcement was warning of hefty fines for people caught violating personal fireworks bans across the region.

Residents in some parched areas were joining police. In one Colorado Springs neighborhood, a homemade sign read, "FAIR WARNING: Anyone using or allowing use of fireworks in this neighborhood will be dealt with harshly! And that doesn't mean just by the police!"

The National Interagency Fire Center in Boise, Idaho, which coordinates wildfire-fighting efforts nationwide, said 45 large fires were burning Wednesday, including 36 fires in nine Western states.

CHESTNUT WINS 6TH STRAIGHT TITLE, DOWNS 68 HOT DOGS

NEW YORK • Joey Chestnut won his sixth straight Fourth of July hot dog-eating contest at Coney Island, downing 68 dogs and buns on Wednesday to tie his personal best in a sweaty, gag-inducing spectacle.

Last year, the 28-year-old San Jose, Calif., man nicknamed "Jaws" won with 62 hot dogs. He bested his main rival this year by 16 dogs, scarfing down all 68 in 10 minutes in the sweltering summer heat to take home \$10,000 and the mustard yellow belt.

"I feel good, it was a great win," Chestnut said after the contest, adding he wished he could have eaten a record number of hot dogs for the audience. "I tried my best. I'm looking forward to next year already."

Second place went to Tim Janus of New York with 52 hot dogs, who received \$5,000. Third place went to Patrick Bertoletti of Chicago with 51, who won \$2,500.

Chestnut was neck-and-neck with competitors during the first half of the contest, but he pulled ahead in the remaining minutes, choking down dog after dog, while other competitors slowed as the clock wound down.

"I'm happy to come out with the win," he said.

Sonya Thomas, of Alexandria, Va., downed 45 hot dogs to win the women's competition. She reached her goal of eating 45 in the time limit — her age — and took home her own pink champion's belt and \$10,000.

Thomas, known as the "Black Widow" of competitive eating, won last year as well, the first time a separate

contest was held for women. Juliet Lee, of Germantown, Md., took second place with 33 and won \$5,000. Lee also won second place last year. Third place went to Michelle Lesco, of Tucson, Ariz., who received \$2,500 for downing 25½.

Thomas said she started to feel sick while eating but kept pushing so she could win the title.

"There is a limit so I have to fight," she said.

Thomas said next year she's going to beat her record again and eat 46.

"Because I'm going to be 46 next year," she said.

The Nathan's Famous Fourth of July International Hot Dog Eating Contest has been a city tradition for 97 years. Tens of thousands of spectators gather to gawk as contestants shimmy, slither and bounce as they dip hot

dogs in water and cram them down their throats.

For some, it's a painful reminder of excess — especially as the U.S. battles a growing obesity problem. The American Medical Association opposes competitive eating, saying it's harmful to the human body. But the competitive eaters are quite trim. Chestnut is more than 6 feet tall and a muscly 210 pounds, and Thomas, who is 5-foot-5, weighed in at barely 100 pounds.

Hot dogs, though, aren't the healthiest of choices. In addition to beef, they include salt and various food additives. Chestnut's total dog count was equal to more than 20,000 calories. This year, the animal rights group Mercy For Animals staged a protest against eating meat, with signs that read "Choose Vegetarian."

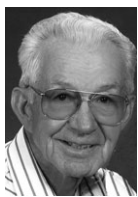

During these years, Jim and Janet raised 5 children, Gary, Jerry, David, Cindy and Kevin. Besides his love of horses, he loved to hunt and fish. He attended the Church of the Nazarene in Twin Falls.

Running Group Takes on Family Tilt

BUHL • McKay Lundgren gave the group of 20-odd children final instructions. Then she watched them give chase to each other as they ran the perimeter fence of Buhl High School's track compound at North Park on Tuesday evening.

This isn't what Lundgren had in mind when he founded Magic Valley Runners in 2008, but the club that started as high school track and cross country's answer to American Legion Baseball or sum-

mer league basketball has taken on a life of its own.

And Lundgren's more than fine with the way it's all turned out.

"I didn't think it would take off in this direction, but where I really see our growth is that we're what I would call family-friendly," Lundgren said. "We want to help these youngsters, teach them that it's kind of like branding. They're runners. Football, baseball, basketball do a great job of getting these kids to believe they're, say, a basketball player at 6 years old."

Lundgren canvassed the participants of Tuesday evening's session, counting out how many he'll have for the cross country program at Buhl High School later this sum-

mer. He almost had enough for a full team, but he still encouraged those who planned to come out for cross country to recruit a few more of their friends — peer pressure of the positive kind.

His rationale is simple: If they're going to be running to stay fit later in life, why not get them now?

"If we had all the people that compete in half-marathons and marathons now out for cross country when I was in school, our team would have been bigger than the football team," Lundgren said, at least partially tongue-in-cheek.

Evolving from the group's original purpose leaves some history in the past. As a high-school-gear club, Magic Valley once won a championship with a core of graduated star runners — Erik Harris (Twin Falls), Dallin Farnsworth (Highland), and Lundgren's son Karl (Twin Falls and Buhl).

But with a group that's 75-strong consistently — Lundgren said 120 runners came out at any point last summer — and primarily made up of children as young as 4 with some parents mixed in, it's hard not to get

Pistorius Set to Run at Olympics After All

JOHANNESBURG • Never count out Oscar Pistorius.

The Blade Runner will be competing in the London Olympics after all, in his favorite event, the 400 meters.

While his selection for the 4x400 relay team was expected, it was a surprise last-minute turnaround by South African sports officials Wednesday that gave Pistorius the chance to run in the 400.

With the decision, the 25-year-old will become the first amputee track athlete to compete at any games.

“Today is truly one of the proudest days of my life,” said Pistorius, a double amputee who spent his entire track career trying to prove he’s good enough to compete with the best.

He now has the chance to do just that.

South Africa’s Olympic committee and national track federation suddenly decided to clear Pistorius for the 400 at the London Games on his carbon fiber blades despite him just missing out on the country’s strict qualifying criteria.

They added his name as the last on their team of 125

track and field athletes.

And now, the big Olympic stage being readied for Jamaican sprint sensation Usain Bolt and American swimmer Michael Phelps just got a little more crowded.

Not bad for a kid who had

both his legs amputated below the knee at 11 months old and originally didn't like track and field when he took it up as a teenager to rehabilitate from a rugby injury.

“To have been selected to represent Team South

Africa at the London 2012 Olympic Games in the individual 400m and the 4x400m relay is a real honor and I am so pleased that years of hard work, determination and sacrifice have all come together,” said Pistorius.

WIMBLEDON MEN'S SEMIS SET

WIMBLEDON, England • After curling in a 102 mph ace to grab a two-set lead a mere 56 minutes into his Wimbledon quarterfinal Wednesday, Roger Federer casually pulled an extra tennis ball from his pocket and strolled to sit in his changeover chair for a sip to drink.

No fist pump. No yell of excitement. No energized jog to the sideline.

There still was work to be done; nothing to be taken for granted. Motivated by the bitter memory of quarterfinal losses at the All England Club the past two years, including a wasted two-set edge in 2011, six-time Wimbledon champion Federer bullied 26th-seeded Mikhail Youzhny of Russia 6-1, 6-2, 6-2 to reach his record 32nd career Grand Slam semifinal.

“Feels great being back in the semis. ... Haven't been here in the last couple years,” the third-seeded Federer said. “So this is nice, to be back to a place where I've been so many times before.”

He's two wins away from a seventh Wimbledon championship, which would equal a mark set by William Renshaw in the 1880s — back when the defending champion received a bye directly into the final — and tied by Pete Sampras in 2000.

Nothing worked for Youzh-

ny, including a kidding plea for help from eight-time major champion Andre Agassi, who was seated next to his wife, Steffi Graf, in the front row of the Royal Box, near Prince William and his wife, Kate.

“I know I'm playing really well,” Federer said. “I am aware things are going to get complicated in the next match.”

Sure are.

That's because he'll face a familiar foe Friday: No. 1 Novak Djokovic, the defending champion, who didn't have too much trouble while beating No. 31 Florian Mayer of Germany 6-4, 6-1, 6-4 in the quarterfinals.

This will be the sixth semifinal in the past eight Grand Slam tournaments, and 27th meeting overall, for Federer and Djokovic, and their first at Wimbledon.

Federer leads 14-12, but Djokovic won six of their last seven matches, including at the French Open a month ago.

“There's no secrets with those guys. They know how to play each other,” said Federer's coach, Paul Annacone. “So it's really going to be who plays the bigger points better.”

The other men's semifinal will be No. 4 Andy Murray of Britain against No. 5 Jo-Wilfried Tsonga of France.

Neither has won a Grand Slam title or been to a Wimbledon final.

Cue “Murray Mania,” as it's known around these parts. He

is trying to become the first British man to earn the trophy at the All England Club since Fred Perry in 1936; the last to even make it to the title match was Bunny Austin in 1938.

“If you think too much about it, and you read the newspapers and you watch the

stuff on TV that's said about you, I think it would become far too much,” Murray said. “But if you kind of shield yourself from it all and kind of just get into your own little bubble, only listen to the people that are around you, then it's something you can deal with.”

Griepel Wins Tour Stage, Cavendish Crashes

ROUEN, France • Britain's Mark Cavendish felt painful scrapes from the hard Tour de France asphalt in Wednesday's fourth stage. He bore no hard feelings toward rival Andre Greipel, who won it.

The German speedster, leading a thinned-out group of sprinters at the finish, got his 14th victory in all competitions this year while Cavendish nursed wounds from a late crash as the race entered Normandy.

Swiss rider Fabian Cancellara got briefly held up by the trouble but didn't go down, and retained the overall lead for a fifth day after the 133-mile trek alongside the English Channel from Abbeville to Rouen.

The top standings didn't change: Bradley Wiggins, the leader of Cavendish's Team Sky hoping to be Britain's first Tour winner, is second, 7 seconds behind the Swiss leader. Defending champion Cadel Evans of Australia is 17 seconds off the pace in seventh.

With less than two miles left, a group spill brought down Cavendish, scraping up his rainbow-colored jersey of world champion. He looked a bit dazed as Sky staff checked him out and helped him get on a bike. He rode gingerly to finish the stage. The squad said he was banged up, but appeared to have no serious injuries and was likely to start today.

With Cavendish out of the picture, Greipel burst out of the depleted group of sprinters, and sped to the straightaway finish, a split-second ahead of Italy's Alessandro Petacchi and Dutch rider Tom Veelers.

The German said he didn't pay much attention to the late crash.

“I heard something behind me ... but at 60 kilometers per hour, you don't worry about what happened behind,” the Lotto-Belisol rider told France-2 TV.

While pro cyclists all run the risk of crashing, Cavendish's spill amounted to a scare — if faint — to his high hopes of winning gold for Britain in the Olympic road race next month.

Cavendish has played second fiddle on Sky over the team's goal for Wiggins to get a victory, and unlike in years past has only one devoted lead-out man to guide and shield him in the frenzied last sprint: Bernard Eisler, an Austrian who also got banged up in the spill.

Cavendish, seen by many as the world's best sprinter and the winner of

Tyler Farrar, a sprint specialist from the United States who won the Tour stage on July 4 last year, also got tangled up and missed out on a chance for a repeat sprint victory on the U.S. Independence Day holiday.

In the pileup, the Garmin-Sharp rider flew off his bike, “somersaulted over his bars, tucked and rolled and ended up on his feet running away from the crash,” tweeted team chiropractor Matt Rabin.

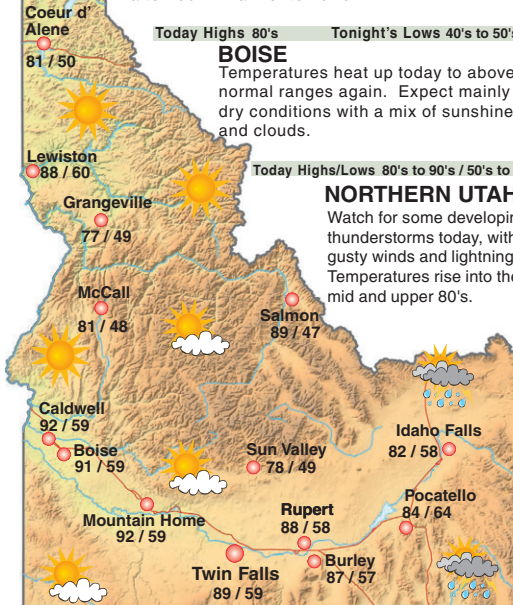

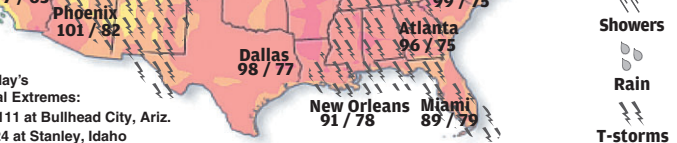

worthy causes such as the Mini-Cassia Women's Shelter, the Soroptimist club and the Rupert Fourth of July celebrations. The final race of the year will be the biggest — July 30 at Minidoka County Fairgrounds. It's the East End Fire Department's annual race, benefiting local families in need. Wanna race? Call Darcy Haux at 436-5994 or Joe Phillips at 436-1563. I wrote a feature on lawn mower racing for the Times-News three summers ago. I even climbed behind the wheel and took a few laps. It's grown since then, in both fan popularity and the number of competitors. Tuesday's race even featured a couple racers visiting from California, although they seemed overdressed in their full-body race suits. Typical lawn-mower racing uniforms consist of jeans and a flannel shirt. "It's a hoot," said Phillips, the Jimmie Johnson of the local circuit. "It's fun taking a lawn mower that was designed to go six miles an hour and making it go 40. They'll dart on you." Phillips' nickname is "Sandbagger." He's 63 years old with an aching back, hip and shoulder. He's had both knees replaced. But Phillips is still the king of lawn mower racing, as evidenced by the dozens of trophies on display in his showroom at Why Not Repair in Rupert. Modifications are relatively inexpensive, Phillips says, and someone can

turn a regular lawn tractor into a racer for about \$200. For a few hundred bucks, you can turn a chore in to a sport. Transform the steady hum of a mower blade into a roaring, revving racer. Instead of grass clippings, churn up dirt around the race-track. Or, as one tractor's custom paint job declares: "Made to cut grass, Modified to haul ass." Classes include three sizes of modified stocks — 8, 12 and 14 horsepower — Factory Experimental (FX) and Drags (equipped with motorcycle or snowmobile engines). Plus, a crowd favorite is the amusing Bermuda Shorts Race, where three-man relay

teams pull on a pair of Bermuda shorts, make a lap, then pull off the shorts and pass them to a team member who puts the shorts on and takes off. For the women, there's a Powder Puff class. "Yeah, it is kind of odd, if you think about it," said Kalysa Edgar of Burley, now in her second year of racing. "I never thought I would do it. But it's definitely a lot of fun." While some married couples join a bowling league or ballroom dance classes, the Edgars instead race mowers. Tucker Edgar raced while dating Kalysa, and now that they're married it gives them something to do to-

gether. Tucker's brother Wade and his wife Arriann also race — and watch out when the competitive sisters-in-law go head-to-head. "I do it because Tucker does it, so it gives us something to do and it's fun," Kalysa Edgar said. "There's nothing really else like this in town, so it gives us something different." Last year, Kalysa Edgar wrecked her lawn mower. Medical personnel, which is always on hand for the drivers' safety, hauled her off in an ambulance. Nothing was hurt, except maybe her pride. "It was embarrassing," she said. On Tuesday night, a few

wrecks occurred. One of his boy even got ran over. His front wheels got caught up on the tractor in front of him coming out of a corner. He flipped off the back and landed in the mud just as another racer came around and — pardon the pun — mowed him over. After a few tense moments, the racer stood up. The crowd cheered as he not only walked away from the wreck, but also climbed back onto his mower and continued racing. Let's see Jeff Gordon do that. By the end of the night, even the city folk were asking how they could sign up to race. That's the addictive nature of mowersports.

Runners

excited about the future. There's a dual program, Lundgren said, with more concrete plans for the adults who do come out — 30 minutes of running on Monday, intervals Tuesday, hills on Saturday, for instance — as opposed to the idea of just keeping the youngsters moving as much as possible. "A lot of them can't run a lap without losing focus, but I run relay races with them for an hour, no problem," Lundgren said. "You can get into a danger zone a lot quicker with kids, because their bodies are still developing. It makes me very nervous when I hear of 10- or 12-year-olds running full marathons. That's not what we try to do here." That approach has paid off in the numbers, as well as in working with many of the local summer races to set up "kid-friendly" races of a mile or so, compared to the 5-10K their parents might run. Magic Valley Runners themselves have three races: the Pie Run in June, the Murtaugh Lake Mud Run in mid-July and then the Chilled Run in October. More than that, though, it's a way for families to stay fit together, and that's Lundgren's ultimate goal — and so far, it's working. "My wife and I did this because of our kids, to get them out and active and have a better summer, rather than sitting around playing video games all the time," said Sam Kelsey, Wendell's new boys basketball coach and an avid runner who's competed in varying distance races the last few years. "For me it wasn't that tough in the beginning, because I've run a lot the last few years, but for the boys it's definitely a big challenge. But it's all about having fun."

AN ORDINANCE OF CITY HEYBURN, MINIDOKA COUNTY, IDAHO, BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEYBURN, IDAHO, AMENDING HEYBURN CODE SECTION 3-4-3 B TO PROVIDE THE PRIVATE SEWER INSPECTION FEES SHALL BE SET BY RESOLUTION; AMENDING HEYBURN CODE SECTION 3-1-1 TO PROVIDE A NEW SUBSECTION D. PROVIDING FOR SETTING THE WATER CONNECTION FEE AMOUNT BY RESOLUTION; AMENDING HEYBURN CODE SECTION 3-4-4 A. PROVIDING FOR PAYMENT OF A SEWER CONNECTION FEE IN AN AMOUNT AS SET BY THE CITY COUNCIL; AMENDING HEYBURN CODE SECTION 3-1-2 C. 8 PROVIDING FOR SETTING THE WATER CONNECTION FEE FOR SERVICE OUTSIDE THE CITY LIMITS IN AN AMOUNT BY RESOLUTION; AMENDING HEYBURN CODE SECTION 3-1-2 D 1. AND 2. BY DELETING REFERENCE OF THREE-QUARTER INCH WATER CONNECTIONS AS THE STANDARD DOMESTIC WATER SIZE AND PROVIDING THAT THE STANDARD SIZE WILL BE ONE INCH; AND PROVIDING FOR SUSPENSION OF RULES AS TO THREE READINGS AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE UPON ONLY ONE READING.

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that certain fees for inspection and connection to the City's water and wastewater system should be set by resolution; and

WHEREAS, the City wishes to designate the standard size of domestic water connection as one inch rather than three-quarter's inch in order to better accommodate more appropriate connections and service.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEYBURN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: Heyburn Code Section 3-4-3 B. shall be amended to read as follows:

B. Before commencement of construction of a private sewage disposal system the owner shall first obtain a written permit signed by the superintendent. The application for such permit shall be made on a form furnished by the city, which the applicant shall supplement by any plans, specifications, and other information as are deemed necessary by the superintendent. ~~A permit and An inspection fee of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) as set by resolution of the City Council~~ shall be paid to the city at the time the application is filed.

Section 2: There shall be a new subsection D. added to Heyburn Code Section 3-1-1, which shall provide as follows:

D. Prior to the issuance of the required connection permit, the applicant shall pay a connection fee in the amount set by resolution of the City Council.

Section 3: Heyburn Code Section 3-4-4 A. shall be amended to read as follows:

A. No unauthorized person shall uncover, make any connections with or opening into, use, alter, or disturb any public sewer or appurtenance thereof without first obtaining a written permit from the superintendent. Prior to the issuance of the required connection permit, the applicant shall pay a connection fee in the amount set by resolution of the City Council.

Section 4: Heyburn Code Section 3-1-2 C. 8. shall be amended to provide as follows:

8. The monthly rate for delivery of water to residences or facilities lying outside the corporate limits of the city shall be ~~one and one-half (1 1/2) times the rate herein set forth in subsection B of this section for each such specified category in the amount set by resolution of the City Council.~~

Section 5: Heyburn Code Section 3-1-2 D. 1. and 2. shall be amended as follows:

1. Each property owner or user who desires meters, metering devices and facilities for connections of greater than the standard ~~three quarter inch (3/4") one inch (1")~~ fittings from the meter to the dwelling or facility to be served by the domestic water system, may declare such intention in writing to the city clerk. At the time of giving such written notice, the applicant shall pay to the city clerk in lawful cash money of the United States of America, the cost of the city of all such oversized meters and necessary facilities less the present cost of the ~~normal three quarter inch (3/4") standard~~ meter and facilities. Upon the clerk's receipt of such written request and payment, the city superintendent or his designated agent shall then order, receive and install such oversized facilities as requested at no further expense to the applicant. The monthly rate for water obtained from such oversized service connections shall be the same as hereinabove stated.

2. Maintenance of such oversized facility shall be the obligation of the city, subject to the other provisions herein. However, when, in the sole discretion of the city superintendent or his designated agent, the oversized meter or any portion of the oversized facilities appurtenant thereto must be replaced, the owner of the premises so served shall be notified in writing of such need being mailed by regular mail, postage prepaid, to his last known address. Should the owner desire that the replacement be of the same size, then, in such event, the same procedure, as nearly practical, shall be followed as stated in subsection D1 of this section, including payment to the clerk in advance of the difference between the cost of the ~~three quarter inch (3/4")~~ standard meter and facilities, such shall be installed at no additional charge to the owner. If the owner fails to respond within thirty (30) days of written notice, the city will reinstall the meter of the same size as was previously located on the site and the charge for same, if any, will become due and payable with the next regular monthly service billing.

Section 6: Severability: The provisions of this ordinance are severable. If any portion of this ordinance is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, such determination shall not affect the validity of the remainder of the ordinance or its application to any other ordinance.

Section 7: The City Council having by authorizing motion and vote waived the rule of requiring three separate readings of this Ordinance, by title and in full, therefore this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its first and only reading, passage, approval and publication.

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THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

"Fish say, they have their stream and pond; But is there anything beyond?"
— Rupert Brooke

In snooker the most valuable balls are the black and pink, analogous in bridge to the ace and king, while the low-value colors, starting with the yellow, are the little fish.

In this deal from the Open Teams in Poznan, Mark Horton compared the play to a snooker game, pointing out that declarer missed a chance to use his less significant assets and make his game.

Where he was watching, West led his singleton diamond against five clubs, and declarer lost a spade and two diamonds. But a closer inspection reveals that declarer had a winning line if he had made use of all the resources at his disposal.

The winning line is to take the lead with dummy's diamond ace and begin eliminating the hearts by cashing the heart ace and ruffing a heart. A trump to dummy enables South to ruff another heart, and he now plays a spade from his hand. West must take the ace and can do no better than return a spade, declarer winning with dummy's king and pitching a diamond from his own hand. Declarer next draws the outstanding trump, then plays the spade eight. When East cannot beat it, South simply discards a diamond, forcing West to win. What can that player do next? All he has left is spades and hearts. Which ever he leads, declarer ruffs in dummy and discards a diamond loser from hand.

This was the line followed by Jean-Christophe Quantin to bring home plus 550 in five clubs doubled.

ANSWER: You have enough values to contest the part-score, but your doubleton club makes this very awkward. You surely don't have a nine-card fit, and the opponents do not have more than eight spades between them. I think you should pass on the grounds that defending two spades may be your best score possible, if not your best possible result.

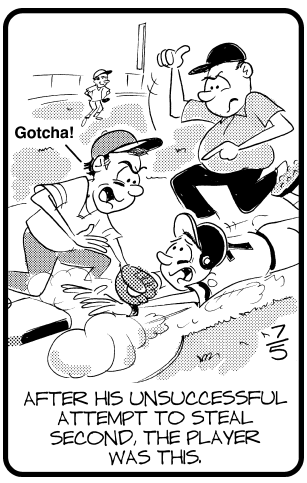
