Jury: PSI Discriminated against Employee

A federal jury awarded Ricky Garcia nearly \$888,000 after concluding the waste management company withheld promotions and raises from him.

TWIN FALLS • When Ricky Garcia heard the verdict, he broke down and cried. Five years of stress, depression and anger were gone. "I let it all go," he said.

On June 29, a federal jury of seven people in Boise unanimously found in Garcia's favor in a discrimination case against his former employers, PSI Environmental Systems and Waste Connections Inc. The jury awarded Garcia \$887,621 in punitive damages, lost wages and emotional distress damages.

"I feel relieved and happy," Garcia said Thursday. "Justice has been served."

Garcia's parents were migrant farm workers in Twin Falls in the 1950s. Garcia grew up in the area and later moved to California. In 2005 he came back and got a job with PSI starting at \$13 an hour.

"I was OK with it," he said. "I knew the cost of living was less here and I needed a job."

Garcia said he was told he would get a raise after a 90-day probation period and another raise after he'd been on the job for a year.

"I never got them," he said. Please see **LAWSUIT, A2**

Spike in Mosquitoes **Prompts** Warnings

TWIN FALLS • Defending Twin Falls County against West Nile virus starts with a beat-up plastic scoop-

Once armed with the wooden pole connected to a small plastic container, Ashley Hahn is ready to invade any pond, canal or backyard.

Hahn works as a pest abatement technician for the Twin Falls County Pest Abatement District. A student studying natural resources at the College of Southern Idaho, she's spending her summer surveying certain areas around the county and collecting live samples to test for West Nile virus.

"The first time I actually collected a sample with a ton of mosquitoes I got so excited I took a photo of it," Hahn said, flipping through a gallery of images on her smartphone. "I thought it was amazing."

County officials treat against mosquitoes every spring. However, the chance of mosquito swarms carrying West Nile increases in July and August.

THE DIGITAL RIGHTTOKNOW

Not all local governments in Idaho have adapted to accept public records requests by email — though the state's attorney general says they should.

TWIN FALLS • Idaho has come a long way in improving access to state public records, including making the first 100 pages and two hours of labor free.

But while the code is clear on what is and isn't a public record, Idaho government entities often have their own systems for responding to requests. And sometimes, those policies unintentionally run astray of the law.

Bob Cooper, communications director for the Idaho Attorney General's Office, said record-keepers can require requests be made in writing. They can also require that those requesting information provide their name, email address, telephone number and mailing address.

Twin Falls County has a specific request form. That form can be faxed, emailed or dropped off in person, said County Clerk Kristina Glascock.

Other counties allow requests to simply be written in an email.

Idaho Code 9-338 says requests for public records "may be made by electronic mail." But some entities, like Minidoka County, specifically exclude email as a valid way to request information.

Breaking Down the Form

Interested in making a public records request? If the agency doesn't have a form to fill out, here's a how-to:

In the first paragraph, cite the open records law, Idaho Code sections 9-337 to 9-350, so the public information officer knows where to refer to if they have a question.

In your request, be as specific as possible. The broader your request, the longer it will take to fill — and that may result in extra fees.

If you request the records from the wrong agency, that agency isn't required to forward on your request. You will have to submit a new one to the correct office.

Put the dollar amount of what you are willing to pay without prior approval. That doesn't mean the agency can't charge more — it just means they have to contact you before charging you more than you

Write the date you file the request. The agency is required to respond within three days.

Send your request to the public information officer. If the agency or office doesn't have one, address it to the head of the department.

That exclusion is against the law, Cooper

"If you go back to the definitions of a public record and writing, it includes email," Cooper said. "As a practical matter, if you're a citizen, if the agency says you can't do it by email, that's not what the law says."

Minidoka County Clerk Patty Temple said her county's email rule has been in place since before she took office.

"But that's something that maybe I need to take a look at," she added.

Jerome County also requires public records requests to be faxed, mailed or dropped off in person, though Jerome County Clerk Michelle Emerson has filled at least one email request for the Times-News in the past two months. Emerson was not available for comment Thursday afternoon.

If an Idaho government

entity doesn't comply with the state's public records law, complaining to the attorney general won't help. Through statute, the only avenue to pursue a complaint is by suing the county, Cooper said.

In 2008, resident Lee Halper filed a lawsuit against Jerome County for not filling an emailed records request. Fifth District Judge G. Richard Bevan ordered the county to fill Halper's specific request, but didn't rule on the county's policy.

On Thursday, Halper said Jerome County still requires him to submit physical copies of public records requests.

Lawsuits aren't always necessary. Jerome County Commissioner Charlie Howell said he didn't know about the county's email rule, and was willing to consider pursuing a change.

"If we get a point brought to our attention that's not working for the citizens... We don't have a problem with changing,"

Idaho Public Records 101

What's a public record?

Any document pertaining to government business.

What Idaho agencies are subject to public records

Any public agency, including state departments, counties, municipalities, school districts, and boards.

What are some examples of public records I can re-

Budget documents, email communications, salaries of public employees, voter registration information and

Before making the request, check to see if the information is already available. Often, people make unnecessary formal requests for information already available online, said Joshua Palmer, public information officer for the city of Twin Falls.

What are the exemptions?

There are several, including personnel documents, anything that would jeopardize an investigation or en-danger law enforcement officers, trade secrets and sealed court cases.

There are also new exemptions as of July 1. The big one: Any divorce case involving child custody issues, said Kristina Glascock, Twin Falls County clerk.

If a record contains both exempt and non-exempt information, the public agency must redact the exempt information.

For a full list, read section 9-340 of Idaho Code, available at legislature.idaho.gov.

How much does it cost?

As of April 2011, the first 100 pages and two hours of labor required to fill a request are free. After that, the agency may charge what they deem fit.

Exceptions include recorder's fees and court

Anything else?

Before making the request, ask if the agency has a

form to fill out. Often, those forms are available online. If not, you can find templates for state-specific public records requests online. Try the Student Press Law Center's request generator at splc.org.

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Teenagers Prepare for Year Abroad

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TWIN FALLS • For 18-yearold Desiree Midby, this summer is a flurry of activity as she prepares to study abroad next year.

Midby — who graduated this spring from Wood River High School in Hailey will spend a school year in the Czech Republic through Rotary Youth Exchange.

Through information sessions this year, Rotary Club volunteers helped her prepare for scenarios such as being homesick or getting lost.

They make sure to go through every situation,"

But Midby still has a lot of work left to do this summer. She's saving money, will apply for a visa and has a long list of vaccinations. One of the larger tasks is learning how to speak Czech; Midby spends about one hour each day studying the language.

All of her classes during the coming school year will be taught in Czech and her

host parents only speak that language.

Midby is among five south-central Idaho teenagers preparing to spend a year abroad through Rotary Youth Exchange.

The students will attend high school in a foreign country and live with host families. Leaving dates are staggered, starting at the end of this month and continuing through September.

During the coming school year, local Rotary clubs will also host four students from other countries - France,

Finland, Spain and Belgium. In Rotary District 5400 -

which covers the southern part of the state - a total of 18 students are studying abroad. And an equal number of foreign exchange students will come to the area, representing 18 countries and speaking 13 different languages.

"It is a true exchange program," outbound coordinator Jim Barker said.

Students studying abroad went through a lengthy application process, including an all-day interview in November in Buhl.

Midby heard about Rotary Youth Exchange a few times in high school and met people who were preparing to go abroad.

"I heard such positive feedback for it," she said.

During the interview process in the fall, students were asked to fill out a form with their top six choices of where they'd like to study.

After choosing five countries, Hannah Holman circled Croatia, but she didn't know as much about the country.

"I circled it as, 'Hey, I kind of heard about this country;" she said.

Midby chose all European countries, including the Czech Republic. But students didn't get to choose where to go. Rotary volunteers made the final decisions and let students know in January.

Midby said the club wanted someone mature with a strong academic background for the Czech Republic.

"I was selected because it's a good match for me,"

The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare reports that state mosquito abatement districts say mosquito populations are up. Twin Falls is no exception, said Kirk Tubbs, manager for the TFCPAD.

"We are seeing an increase of the mosquito species that carries West Nile in Twin Falls," Tubbs said. "But none of them have tested for West Nile

Ada County officials are also experiencing higher than normal mosquito numbers, said Desiree Keeney, manager of the Ada County Weed, Pest and Abatement District.

"It's hard to tell if chances of infections are going to be high because it's not predictable," she said. "You usually have high mosquito populations but it's also dependent on the amount of birds and other livestock that get infected. We haven't seen that yet but it's still early."

West Nile virus is usually spread from a bite from an infected mosquito; it's not communicable from person-to-person. Sympinclude toms fever. headache, body aches, nausea, vomiting, and sometimes swollen lymph glands or a skin rash on the chest, stomach or back.

In 2006, Idaho had the most West Nile illnesses in the nation. Close to 1,000 infections were reported, contributing to 23 deaths.

Cases followed a trend seen elsewhere in the nation - spiking early after the disease's arrival in Idaho, then dropping sharply in subsequent years.

"We are hearing of a lot of mosquito activity throughout the state and this is a timely warning for people to take precautions to avoid mosquito bites," Leslie Tengelsen, deputy state epidemiologist, said in a news release. "West Nile virus is part of our ecosystem and can cause serious illness. Infections occur when mosquitoes are active — and they are active now."

Hahn said she hasn't seen that many mosquitoes while out collecting samples, but she is noticing an increase lately.

The last time Twin Falls County tested positive for West Nile virus was in 2010, Tubbs said. The year before, three individuals

were infected with the virus, with one case ending in death.

"We are asking people to take precautions," he

said. "This means emptying water containers around your house or keeping horse troughs dry when you can."

Court records state Garcia finally received a raise nearly 18 months after his hire — an increase of 72 cents.

Eventually, Garcia figured out his non-Hispanic Caucasian co-workers were making more money than him - in the \$18 to \$21 perhour range, he said.

In February 2007, Garcia applied for a maintenance manager position. According to court documents, Garcia was a head mechanic at a previous job, managing the maintenance of all types of heavy machinery, and thought he would be a natu-

During the rest of his time at PSI, the court documents state the maintenance manager position was filled by three other people and offered to a fourth. All four people were non-Hispanic Caucasians, had less experience and had worked for PSI for shorter periods of time than Garcia.

Court documents state comments were made to Garcia or other employees indicating Garcia and any other employees of Hispanic descent would be never promoted and if Garcia quit "plenty of other Mexicans

would be happy to take his place." In December 2007, Garcia

quit and took a maintenance manager position with AAA Rental & Service Co., which since merged with Western Waste Services. There, he was offered a fair wage, he said.

Just days after quitting, Garcia said he saw an ad for his old job — at \$18 to \$21 an hour along with a \$1,000 signing bonus, with many of his skills listed as optional. That's when he contacted the Idaho Department of Labor which referred him to the Idaho Human Rights Commission. In February 2009, the commission found PSI had discriminated against him.

No comment on the case or the jury's verdict was available Thursday from PSI or Waste Connections.

PSI's district manager, Josh Brown, said he couldn't comment on the lawsuit and the company, as a whole, had

A receptionist at Waste Connections' regional office said the regional vice president was on vacation this week and no one else in the office could comment. A message left at the company's corporate office was not immediately returned Thursday.

Not many discrimination cases go to trial, said Erika Birch, one of Garcia's attorneys. In this case, both sides' attorneys could never come to an agreement on a settlement amount, Birch said.

"We had some settlement discussions along the way," she said. "The offers we received from them were well below what we thought the case was worth."

Having Garcia's coworkers testify for him and back up his statements helped, she said. "It's always really hard to

prove discrimination," she said. "It is somewhat of a rarity to have direct comments like that that indicate someone's intent."

After five years, Garcia and Birch said the work was worth it.

"That takes a lot of courage for a little guy from Jerome to stand up to these big corporations," Birch said. "I'm very proud to represent

Idaho Power Rates to Rise 6.8 Percent

TWIN FALLS • Idaho Power Co. will increase its rates by 6.8 percent to pay for a new \$400 million natural gas plant.

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission announced June 29 it would allow the rate increase.

For customers who use 1,020 kilowatt-hours per month, an average monthly bill will increase a little more than \$5.60. Overall, the new rates will increase the utility company's annual revenue by \$58 mil-

In 2009, the PUC determined that Idaho Power would need additional resources to meet customer demand. It granted the utility company a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity to build the 330-megawatt Langley Gulch natural gas plant near New Plymouth. That plant came online Saturday.

To help cover the costs of the new plant, the utility company requested that the PUC allow a rate increase.

The rate increase covers almost all of the plant's \$402.4 million cost. Close to \$7.2 million was already collected through Idaho Power's 2011 general rate

Critics of the rate in-

crease argued Idaho Power's load demand has declined 1.5 percent since the plant was first approved, questioning how much of the cost should be trans-

ferred to ratepayers as a result. The company responded that the plant's availability will help reduce its reliance on purchased power.



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Yellowstone Proposal would Hike Snowmobile Limit

CHEYENNE, Wyo. • The National Park Service proposes to increase the number of snowmobiles and other snow-machines allowed into Yellowstone National Park. Despite the increase, the agency says new pollution and noise control requirements should curtail the environmental effects.

The agency's proposal is drawing praise from snowmobile enthusiasts and a Wyoming state government keen on more tourism dollars. Some conservationists, however, say the agency could do more to protect the nation's first national park.

The default position for national parks is to allow no snowmobiles at all. Officials at Yellowstone have been on a rollercoaster ride of court challenges and environmental appeals for more than a

decade as they have floated a series of proposals aimed at accommodating traditional snowmobile traffic.

The public has 45 days from the June 29 release of the plan to comment. The Park Service also plans to collect comment at a series of meetings in Wyoming and Montana later this month.

Dan Wenk, Yellowstone superintendent, said Thursday that his agency endorses allowing a maximum of 480 snowmobiles plus 60 snow coaches per day into Yellowstone.

The number of snow coaches, meaning passenger vans retrofitted with skis and tracks, could double in the future if they meet noise and pollution standards. The average number of snowmobiles per day couldn't exceed 342 over a winter

The Park Service has set daily limits of 318 snowmobiles and 78 snow coaches in recent years. Wenk said the park's daily average was 190 snowmobiles and about 35 snow coaches last winter.

The agency's new proposal would set lower noise and emissions requirements for snowmobiles starting in the 2017-2017 winter season. Beginning that season, snow coaches also would be required to have gasoline or diesel engines of recent manufacture.

The agency endorses allowing one non-commercially guided group of up to five snowmobiles to enter each of the park's four entrances each day.

Wenk said the alternative his agency endorses, "provides for a cleaner park, it provides for a quieter park. Greater noise-free intervals, less sounds. It does allow for increases in visitation, while reducing associated transportation impacts."

Police: Man Tried to Rob Laundromat With Stick

TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls police say a 63-year-old man demanded money and waved a large stick Wednesday morning at a patron of Rosa's Laundry Station, 875 Shoshone St. S. in Twin Falls.

According to the court documents, Ramirez-Rivas denied all of the allegations but was deceptive about questions that weren't relevant to the incident.

Ramirez-Rivas was arrested, charged with attempted robbery and held on \$25,000 bond. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for July 13.

Playing with Fire on the Fourth of July

y mid-afternoon on the Fourth of July, the temperatures were rising and it felt like the Magic Valley was an ant under a magnifying glass. As the sun bore down, the tops of the dry brown grass curled and American flags hanging from porches were limp in the heat.

People were outside grilling hot dogs and burgers. Children were dancing around with sparklers while parents reached into coolers for another cold drink.

While residents relaxed on a mid-week day off, the atmosphere was tense for anyone in public safety. To firefighters, the sound of bottle rockets in the distance sounded like a match striking near tinder. Every phone call to dispatch could be a call to the big blaze.

Officials across the area sent out press releases and public service announcements asking for caution on the Fourth.

And there was reason to worry.

Fire crews were still exhausted from fighting four back-to-back fires last week — one that came dangerously close to homes. On Tuesday night, fireworks were responsible for a 40-acre fire near the Magic Valley Speedway and on the Fourth, bottle rockets (legal to sell, but illegal to use in Idaho) are possibly to blame for a fire that destroyed a home and burned two or three acres near Buhl.

On Thursday morning, when rain started to fall, Magic Valley residents exhaled a collective sigh of relief. We made it through the holiday without a major wildfire.

But all this tension begs the question, should we really spend a major holiday in fear for our homes and our lives? Should officials have considered a fireworks ban this year?

Fireworks vendors are required to pay a fee of \$100 a booth with a \$50 refundable bond. There's no cap on the number of booths in the city limits. This year, the city issued 15 permits. That's \$1,500, hardly a windfall for the city and definitely not enough revenue to deter the city from banning fireworks in favor of public safety.

Banning fireworks is never a popular decision. Even in Colorado, a state devastated by wildfire, when a statewide fireworks ban was announced some told the Associated Press they felt the ban was unfair. It's a livelihood for some and a tradition for us all.

That doesn't mean that it's worth the risk. We aren't up in arms today because no lives were lost this holiday. All the fires started by fire

were lost this holiday. All the fires started by fireworks are out. We aren't calling in crews from other states to help us save our cities, our homes and our crops from wildfire.

We escaped tragedy this Fourth of July, but not because we didn't play with fire.





Two Sides to the Story of Japanese Internment Camp

I would like to set some records straight about some things that have been quoted and distorted.

In 1941, I was living in Los Angeles and working for Douglas Aircraft at its Santa Monica plant. I had graduated from Anderson Airplane school. On Sunday, Dec. 7, I was at a rodeo in downtown Los Angeles. A paper boy was running around with papers with giant headlines, "U.S. at War." When we were able to get the news about what had happened, naturally we were terrified. We knew the Japanese could take Los Angeles within hours and a Japanese submarine had surfaced off the Santa Monica coast. Another Japanese sub fired on an oil refinery at Santa Bar-

We were scared and mad. Southern California was completely defenseless. Most of the men wanted to go Japanese hunting, including me. There was talk of closing the factories so we could all go Japanese hunting.

We didn't know if the Japanese-Americans were part of the plan or not. They were in the possible position to kill us, sabotage our power plants, dams, bridges and rail-roads or poison our water.

I think a lot of Japanese-Americans would have been killed had not President Roosevelt ordered the evacuation of all the Japanese-Americans away from the coasts where they were safe and cared for. Their living conditions were not the best but probably better than a lot of Americans.

Very quickly, everything was rationed and some things were impossible to buy. Very little gasoline was available unless you were engaged in some war effort. Every American was in this war. You could not buy a lot of things like eggs, butter, ham or sugar. If you could prove a dire need, the ration boards would give you coupons; otherwise, you did without.

It makes me angry to hear some uninformed person talk about the terrible abuses and discrimination of the Japanese-Americans. The Japanese should be very thankful that President Roosevelt kept them

safe and alive.

Call FBI Field Office with Tips on Local Corruption

Public corruption is a breach of trust by federal, state or local officials often with the help of private sector accomplices. It's also the FBI's top criminal investigative priority.

I would like to explain why the bureau takes public corruption so seriously and how the FBI investigates. Corrupt public officials undermine our country's national security, our overall safety, the public trust and confidence in the U.S. government, wasting billions of dollars along the way. This corruption can tarnish virtually every aspect of society.

For example, a corrupt state legislator could cast deciding votes on a bill providing funding or other benefits to a company for the wrong reasons. Or at the local level, a county commissioner might keep his high-paying position by simply not districting the county into three districts, as nearly equal in

population as may be, to be known as county commissioners' districts, thus avoiding having to run against a fellow commissioner in the primary election.

The FBI is in a unique position to investigate allegations of public corruption. They use lawful sophisticated investigative tools and methods — like undercover operations, court-authorized electronic surveillance and informants — often giving them a front-row seat to witness the actual exchange of bribe money or a backroom handshake that seals an illegal deal - and enough evidence to send the culprits to prison. They often work in conjunction with the inspector general offices from various federal agencies, as well as with state and local partners. And they depend greatly on assistance from the public. So let me end by saying, if anyone out there has any information about potential wrongdoing by a county public official, please submit a tip online or contact your local FBI field office. New Idaho Laws Affect Hunters and Anglers

COEUR D'ALENE PRESS

Several new and changed Idaho laws took effect July 1 that will affect the state's hunters and anglers.

The commission will consider new procedure rules for these tags at their July meeting, but they are not expected to issue any of the new Governor's Wildlife Partnership Tags at this meeting

The Legislation

- Adds a wolf tag to the sportsman's pack, increasing the price from \$117.25 to \$124.25.
- Includes nonprofit organizations that are qualified under section 501(c)(19) of the internal revenue code, as

qualified to assist veterans who participate in Fish and Game's special disabled veteran programs.

• Incorporates a nonresident three-day fishing license into the adult nonresident hunting license with no change in the current license fee. This change will enhance the nonresident recreational experience for those who might also desire to fish while hunting in

At the upcoming meeting July 11-13 in Bonners Ferry, the Idaho Fish and Game Commission will consider new rules to put into practice laws that:

Allow parents and grandparents to transfer controlled hunt tags and controlled hunt permits to certain minor children or grandchildren according to rules prescribed by the Fish and Game Commission. This would allow family members to enhance a youth's hunting opportunity and experience. The minor child must either be licensed to hunt or a participant in the Fish Game mentored hunting program. Sale of the desig-

nated control hunt tag is not

• Direct the Idaho Fish and Game Commission to develop rules that would exempt the companion of a disabled hunter from the requirement of having a tag while helping a disabled hunter who has the appropriate tag and a valid disabled combination license. • Allow the Idaho Fish

and Game Commission to issue special big game auction tags referred to as "Governor's Wildlife Partnership Tags." Fish and Game may issue up to three tags per species per year for deer, elk and pronghorn; one tag per year may be issued for moose, and one tag per species per year may be issued for mountain goat and bighorn sheep.

These special auction tags will be taken from the nonresident tag quota, and will be auctioned by nonprofit organizations dedicated to wildlife conservation. The proceeds will come back to Fish and Game for a variety of wildlife programs.

Even Before Holiday, Fireworks Blamed for Fires

BOISE (AP) • The unofficial July 4 fire-starting holiday got an early kick off in

There, crews suspect at least two small fires on Tuesday were the result of eager revelers, small explosives and bad judgment.

In one case, an unexploded bottle rocket was found near a grass fire that burned from late-Tuesday into Wednesday morning above Boise near the Table Rock overlook with its telltale lighted cross.

And in another, Boise firefighters were called to a small graze blaze in a subdivision.

Kids were observed playing with fireworks just before that fire, which damaged some fences before crews had it under control in about 15 minutes.

Boise Fire Department Battalion Chief Dave Cooper told the Idaho Statesman that it's difficult to prove that fireworks caused a fire unless somebody admits it.

Idaho Court Overturns Sex Offender Conviction

BOISE (AP) • The Idaho Supreme Court has overturned a man's conviction on failing to register as a sex offender because the high court found that Idaho's sex offender laws didn't apply to people who moved to foreign countries.

David Leroy Lee was ordered to register as a sex offender in 2001 after he was convicted of lewd conduct with a minor under the age of 16. As part of his parole, he was ordered to register as a sex offender once a year and confirm his residence twice a year. He also was ordered to wear an electronic monitoring device on his

Lee registered as a sex offender early that year, and in March, he confirmed his Boise address, according to the ruling. But in October, he cut off his ankle bracelet and left his home, and a warrant was issued for his

Lee was eventually arrested in Belize in 2009 in connection with an ongoing explosives investigation. He was extradited to Idaho, where he was charged with failing to register as a sex offender. An Ada County jury found him guilty of the

Lee appealed, and on Thursday, the Supreme Court ordered his conviction overturned.

The unanimous high court found that the sex offender registration law, as it existed in 2001, didn't require sex offenders to update their addresses if they left the country, though it did require updates for sex offenders moving to new within addresses

"If the legislature intended the statute to apply to changes of address or actual residences to other countries, it would have been easy for it to do so by simply using the word 'country' in the statute," Justice Jim Jones wrote for the court. "... Lee cannot be convicted based upon an unexpressed intent of the legislature."

Idaho's sex offender registration law has been significantly updated since 2001. Among other changes, it now requires sex offenders to notify the registry if they plan to move to another

Teen Charged with Video Voyeurism

SANDPOINT • An 18year-old Sandpoint man was arrested Monday for allegedly using a mobile phone to capture images of a woman inside a restroom stall and then wielding a skateboard as a weapon when he was confronted.

Josef James Lee Senesac is charged with video voyeurism and aggravated assault. He made an initial court appearance on Tuesday via video feed from the Bonner County Jail.

Judge Barbara Buchanan set Senesac's bail at \$25,000. Senesac declined the appointment of a public defender to represent him, court records indicate.

Sandpoint Police were summoned to the Cedar Street Bridge at about 11 a.m., after a 59-year-old reported that somebody was using a mobile phone to take pictures while she was using the toilet. Sene-

sac allegedly extended his arm under the stall's partition while holding the mobile device, according to a probable cause affidavit.

The woman reported the incident to a business owner on the bridge. The two women, plus another man, confronted Senesac as he was leaving the women's restroom and attempted to detain him, but he escaped out of the east end of the bridge.

During the confrontation, the affidavit said, Senesac swung his skateboard at the 41-year-old businesswoman's head.

Senesac was later apprehended and allegedly confessed to police detectives. When asked why he did it, Senesac reportedly said he did not know, but that he gets urges and "has to act on them," the affidavit said.

It's the first time in Bonner County in six years that a resident has been prosecuted for video voyeurism, a felony.

Idaho Health-care Panel to Meet on Ruling

BOISE (AP) • Idaho lawmakers will meet to discuss last week's Supreme Court ruling upholding President Barack Obama's 2010 health care overhaul.

The July 30 meeting of a Senate-House health care task force was added to the Legislature's calendar this week after the 5-4 decision that Obama's reforms were legal.

Until now, Idaho's Republican-dominated Legislature has spurned the law, including refusing federal cash to help set up an insurance exchange.

Post ruling, there are a couple camps forming on how to respond. U.S. Rep. Raul Labrador

urges Idaho to reject an exchange. Others, including health

insurer Blue Cross, want Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter to spearhead efforts for an exchange.

Empty Cargo Train Derails in Montana

HELENA, Mont. (AP) • A BNSF Railway official says a cargo train has derailed on a main rail line running across the Northwest.

BNSF spokesman Gus Melonas says that there are no injuries and no environmental threat from Thursday morning's derailment near Saco in northeastern Mon-

The rail line was closed as crews worked to repair the track. Melonas says the line was expected to reopen as early as 10 p.m. Thursday.

The train was headed from Minneapolis to Spokane, Wash. Eight empty cars derailed, with seven toppling over an embankment.

Melonas says rail officials don't know what caused the derailment.

Utility Settles with Developers of Biomass Plant

BOISE (AP) • The developers of a failed biomass power project in Emmett have agreed to pay \$200,000 in a proposed settlement with Idaho Power.

Developer Richard Vinson and partners had planned to locate the biomass plant at the Emerald Forest Products timber mill. The new plant was to generate energy from the steam of burned woody material.

The *Idaho Statesma*n reports that Idaho Power agreed to purchase energy from Yellowstone Power in November 2010. The timber mill stopped operations last year.

The proposed settlement calls for Yellowstone Power to pay Idaho Power \$200,000 in

non-performance damages. In return, Idaho Power agreed not to draw on a \$450,000 letter of credit.

The settlement must be approved by the Idaho Public Utilities Commission, which is taking public comment through July 9.

Missing Nampa Teen Considered a Fugitive

NAMPA • An 18-year-old Nampa woman who disappeared early last month is no longer considered a missing person, Sgt. Tim Randall said. Now, she's a fugitive.

Officials believe Joanna Noteboom left the area with a boyfriend on or around June 7, absconding from a juvenile probation program. Since then, Randall said, she contacted her mother from California and said she may soon leave for New York.

That contact is enough to remove her missing person status - but corrections officials still want to bring her

home. IDOC issued a warrant for Noteboom's arrest shortly after her disappearance.

And that, Randall said, will likely make her easier to find. The arrest warrant will show up on any police computer anywhere in the country. It's just a matter of waiting for her to show up on law

enforcement's radar.

Noteboom is 5 foot 3 inches tall, 130 pounds, with brown hair and brown eyes. Those with information regarding her whereabouts are asked to contact the Idaho Department of Corrections at 659-2000.

Firewise Lawn Maintenance

Wildfires are associated with the western U.S., but can be a threat in all areas of the country, especially where houses are built next to forests, woodlands, and open space. According to the Utah State University Forestry Extension, if your home abuts natural areas it is important to understand fire resistant turf care in order to help minimize damage to your home and property in the

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event of a wildfire.

Steps to a Firewise Landscape

1) Create a fire-break around your house. About 75 to 100 feet from the house you should create a fire break, with low mown, well-irrigated grass. This type of turf care may save your house if there is a wildfire raging nearby.





2) Use plants that hold moisture. Replace highly flammable plants such as conifers with low growing succulent plants that will hold a lot of moisture during the fire season, which is typically mid- to late-summer.

3) Break up shrubbery areas with lawn. Rather than solid plantings throughout the yard, try to break up shrubbery areas with well irrigated bands of lawn; isolate those highly flammable evergreen trees and bushes away from the house.

4) Don't let debris accumulate. Be diligent in pruning and following good turf care, keeping your lawn well-watered. Remove all dead branches and leaves from around your house and the base of trees, shrubs, and flower beds. Dispose of all cuttings and debris promptly.

In addition, make sure that you have firefighter access to your yard: place fences, trees, retaining walls in places that don't restrict firefighting equipment access to your house. Land Routes Crucial in U.S. Withdrawal From Afghanistan

Even with the reopening of critical supply routes from Pakistan, the U.S. military confronts a mammoth logistical challenge to wind down the war in Afghanistan, where it must withdraw nearly 90,000 troops and enormous depots of military equipment accumulated over the past decade.

Assuming Pakistan doesn't seal its border again, U.S. and NATO commanders still face the prospect of pulling out at least a third of the cargo from northern Afghanistan on a winding, makeshift network of railways and roads that cross the former Soviet Union.

Those routes carry strategic risks of their own. Access to the transit lines depends on the whims of several authoritarian Central Asian leaders as well as Russian President Vladimir Putin, a longtime nemesis of NATO. Moreover, the cost of shipping goods along the northern routes is about triple that of the much-shorter Pakistani lines.

The only other option for departing landlocked Afghanistan is by air - an even more expensive alternative, costing up to 10 times as much as the Pakistani ground routes.

All told, U.S. military logisticians are preparing to bring home 100,000 shipping containers stuffed with materiel and 50,000 wheeled vehicles by the end of 2014, when U.S. and NATO combat operations are scheduled to cease.

The U.S. military has increasingly relied on the supply lines that cross the former Soviet Union to deliver cargo into Afghanistan since those routes opened in 2009.

After Pakistan sealed its border in November to protest a U.S. airstrike that killed 24 of its soldiers, the U.S. military shifted about 60 percent of its supplies to the northern routes, with the remainder arriving in the war zone by air. Although delivery disruptions were largely avoided, the move resulted in extra expenses of Afghan supply line



about \$100 million a month.

The importance of the northern routes will become even more acute when the traffic is reversed. By the end of September, 23,000 U.S. troops are scheduled to withdraw from Afghanistan, along with a commensurate amount of material.

Zimmerman Bail Set at \$1M

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) • Using words like "false testimony" and "misled," a judge granted \$1 million bail Thursday for neighborhood watch volunteer George Zimmerman, but questioned his honesty and suggested he had plotted to leave the country when he was out of jail the first time.

Circuit Judge Kenneth Lester referred to Zimmerman with words like "conceal" and "flee" more than a dozen times in an eight-page order that lets him out of jail while he awaits his second-degree murder trial in the shooting of Trayvon Martin.

The judge's doubts could hurt a Zimmerman attempt to dismiss the case by claiming he shot Martin in self-defense, a possible motion based on Florida's "stand your ground" law, experts said.

"Mr. Zimmerman is not held in any high esteem by this court," said Karin Moore, a law professor at Florida A&M University College of Law. "I think that could matter if there is a 'stand your ground' hearing ... It's a matter of credibility. There is no one else to testify to support the self-defense claim."

Judge Lifts Cruise Ship Captain's House Arrest

ROME (AP) • An Italian judge lifted the house arrest order for the captain of the shipwrecked Costa Concordia cruiser liner on Thursday, but said he must remain in his hometown near Naples during the criminal investigation regarding the accident off the Tuscan coast that killed

Captain Francesco Schettino is accused of manslaughter, causing a shipwreck and abandoning the liner while many passengers and crew were still aboard. Judge Valeria Montesarchio issued the written decision about his detention.

The ship's hull was severely gashed when the luxury liner rammed into a reef close to tiny Giglio island the night of Jan. 13.

Costa Crociere SpA, the cruise company, contends that Schettino steered the vessel too close to shore. Prosecutors suspect Schettino maneuvered the ship perilously close to the tourist and fishing island in a publicity stunt.

Schettino has insisted that the reef wasn't on the ship's navigational charts, even though the rocky reef jutting from the sea is a landmark in the area. In a written memo to his lawyers, the captain defended his handling of the Concordia after the collision, the Italian news agency ANSA reported, citing a document that will be presented on an Italian TV show later Thursday night.

FIRST NATO SUPPLY TRUCKS CROSS PAKISTAN BORDER

CHAMAN, Pakistan • Trucks carrying NATO supplies rolled into Afghanistan for the first time in more than seven months Thursday, ending a painful chapter in U.S.-Pakistan relations that saw the border closed until Washington apologized for an airstrike that killed 24 Pakistani soldiers.

Thousands of trucks have been waiting at ports in Karachi for the transit ban to be lifted as the diplomatic wrangling dragged on. Drivers are eager to get behind the wheel and start earning a lucrative salary again in what can be a deadly journey because of attacks from the Taliban.

Japan Powered by Nuclear Energy Again, Blamed anew

TOKYO (AP) • Nuclear power returned to Japan's energy mix for the first time in two months Thursday, hours before a parliamentary panel blamed the government's cozy relations with the industry for the meltdowns that prompted the mass shutdown of the na-

tion's reactors. Though the report echoes other investigations into last year's disaster at the Fukushima Dai-ichi plant, it could fuel complaints that Japan is trying to restart nuclear reactors without doing enough to avoid a repeat. Thursday's resumption of operations at a reactor in Ohi, in western Japan, already had been hotly contested.

Government officials and the utility that runs the Ohi plant announced last month that the No. 3 reactor had passed stringent safety

checks and needed to be

brought back online to ward

off blackouts during the high-demand summer months. Another Ohi reactor, No. 4, is set to restart later this month and the government hopes to restart more of Japan's 50 working reactors as soon as possible.

"We have finally taken this first step," said Hideki Toyomatsu, vice president of Kansai Electric Power Co., which operates the Ohi plant.

"But it is just a first step." The reactor is the first to be restarted since last year's devastating tsunami inundated the Fukushima plant, setting off meltdowns in three reactors in the world's worst nuclear crisis since Chernobyl in 1986. All of Japan's reactors were gradually taken offline for maintenance or safety checks, and in early May the last reactor shut down, leaving the country without nucleargenerated electricity for the

first time since 1970.

Thursday's report said the Fukushima disaster was "man-made" because it should have been foreseen and avoided. It said that since at least 2006, Japan's Nuclear and Industrial Safety Agency and plant operator Tokyo Electric Power Co. — or TEP-CO - knew the risk of a total power outage at Fukushima Dai-ichi in case of a major tsunami. The report accused both of "intentionally" postponing safety measures to avoid reactor stoppages.

COLORADO SPRINGS, **Colo.** • When firefighter Eric Morris shows up at wildfires across the West, locals battling the flames sometimes look at him and wonder who

The answer isn't a public agency. It's an insurance company.

Morris is among a group of private firefighters hired in recent years to protect homes with high-end insurance policies. In a wildfire season that is one of the busiest and most destructive ever to hit the region, authorities and residents say their help is welcome.

There's curiosity the first time they work with us," he said. "After a while of explaining and making some calls to the right people, they let us right in?"

Morris and his nine-man crew helped protect 35 homes in Colorado Springs in the most destructive fire in the state's history. It killed two people and destroyed 346 homes.

For insurers, hiring them is worth the cost. They spend thousands on wellequipped, federally rated firefighters, potentially saving hundreds of thousands, if not millions, of dollars to replace a home and its con-

Chubb Personal Insurance, which provides coverage for homes typically valued between \$400,000 and \$3 million, said Kevin Fuhriman, the company's personal lines catastrophe manager.

"It's an added layer of protection for our clients," Fuhriman said. "From a business perspective? It's an extremely advantageous business proposition?

Other companies offer fire protection services, typically for higher-end clients, said Carole Walker, executive director of the Rocky Mountain Insurance Information Association.

"Just because you don't have this type of policy doesn't mean you don't have fire protection," Walker insisted. "That's what people pay taxes for, and (public) firefighters do a wonderful job protecting homes. I mean, they saved hundreds of homes on this fire."

MILWAUKEE • The temperatures in Casimir Brandon's basement bedroom were so stifling that the exhausted 56-year-old Madison man began riding city buses in the morning, from one end of the line to the other, so he could grab a few hours of air-conditioned sleep.

Brandon is among those searching for any kind of relief as oppressive heat slams the middle of the country with record temperatures that aren't going away after the sun goes down. So when the city of Madison transformed a vacant convention center into a 24-hour cooling center, Brandon jumped at the chance to sleep in comfort.

"I had a cot there, but I gave it up to a lady who had a kid," said Brandon. "But it's OK. I just lined up six chairs and slept like a baby. I was just so tired from the previous two days that it wasn't a problem at all."

St. Louis, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, Chicago and several other Midwest cities already have set record highs this week or are on the verge of doing so. And with even low temperatures setting heat records, residents are left searching for any relief.

In the McDonough Homes public housing project in St. Paul, Minn., Chue Yang, his wife, their 8-year-old son and 11- and 12-year-old daughters have taken refuge in the children's bedroom, which has the only air conditioner in their townhome.

"We don't want to cook because it's too hot, so we stay in the bedroom," Yang, 38, said Thursday, as he rested in the air-conditioned lobby at the McDonough Recreation Center. "That's all. We don't have anything to do?"

The National Weather Service issued excessiveheat warnings Thursday for all of Illinois and Indiana, as well as parts of Iowa, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Missouri, Kentucky, Ohio and Michigan. Forecasts called for daytime temperatures from the mid- to high 90s into the low 100s.

St. Louis hit a record high of 105 on Wednesday and a record low of 83. In Wisconsin, the coolest Milwaukee and Madison got was 81 in the early morning, beating previous low records by 2 and 4 degrees respectively.

Columbia River Deal Studied over Ecology Concerns

SPOKANE, Wash. • Regulators are considering changes to the Columbia River Treaty with Canada to account for environmental concerns that weren't addressed a halfcentury ago.

Policymakers on both sides of the border are considering a rewrite to address concerns over endangered salmon and climate change as well as recreation and irrigation uses of the river, The Spokesman-Review reported Thursday.

The 1964 treaty resulted in three dams in British Columbia and the Libby Dam in Montana, boosting hydroelectric power production and reducing the threat of flooding in the river and its tributaries in the Northwest.

"Even though it's not commonly known, the treaty really runs the lives of everyone in the Northwest," said Suzanne Skinner, executive director of the Center for Environmental Law and Policy in Seattle. "It's the fulcrum, or balancing point, for everything we want from

the river?" The treaty doesn't have an expiration date, but either country can cancel most of its provisions after September 2024, with a 10-year minimum notice. If the U.S. or Canada wants changes, treaty talks could begin in 2014.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Bonneville Power Administration are reviewing the 20page treaty in consultation with other federal agencies, the four Northwest states and 15 tribes.

The BPA and corps will make a recommendation to the U.S. State Department by the fall of 2013 that could lead to treaty talks the next year.

Rep. Jackson Treated for 'More Serious' Ailments

CHICAGO (AP) • U.S. Rep. Jesse

Jackson Jr. is being treated at an inpatient medical facility for "physical and emotional ailments" that are

"more serious" than previously believed and will require extended treatment, according to a statement released by his office Thursday.

The Chicago Democrat, who faces a House ethics investigation over his ties to imprisoned former Illinois Gov. Rod Blagojevich, has been on medical leave for three weeks for exhaustion. His office did not announce the news until last week, when it released a threesentence statement. No details about Jackson's whereabouts or condition had been released since then.

A Thursday statement from his office also did not disclose his location or provide details of his medical

condition. Messages left for his spokesmen were not immediately returned.

"Congressman Jackson's medical condition is more serious than we thought and initially believed,"

the statement said. "Recently, we have been made aware that he has grappled with certain physical and emotional ailments privately for a long period of time. At present, he is undergoing further evaluation and treatment at an in-patient medical facility."

The statement said Jackson, 47, who is running for re-election in November, will need "extended in-patient treatment as well as continuing medical treatment thereafter."

Messages left Thursday for his wife, Chicago Alderman Sandi Jackson, and a brother who is a professor in Chicago, were not immediately returned.





Treasury prices rose Thursday as investors worried over disappointing June retail sales.

The yield on the benchmark 10-year Treasury note fell to 1.60 percent Thursday from 1.63 percent late Tuesday. Bond trading was closed Wednesday for the Fourth of July holiday. The price of the 10-year note rose 31 cents for every \$100 invested.

Treasury prices indicate how much investors have to pay for bonds issued by the U.S. government, which are considered some of the safest investments in the world. When investors are nervous about the economy, demand for the bonds goes up and so does the price.

House Bill Would Cut Farm Subsidies

The draft envisions reducing current food stamp spending projections by \$1.6 billion a year.

WASHINGTON • The House Agriculture Committee on Thursday unveiled its approach for a long-term farm and food bill that would reduce spending by \$3.5 billion a year, almost half of that coming from cuts in the federal food stamp program.

The legislative draft envisions reducing current food stamp spending projections by \$1.6 billion a year, four times the amount of cuts incorporated in the five-year, half-trillion-dollar farm bill passed by the Senate last

Food stamps, formally known as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, look to be the most contentious issue when the Agriculture Committee begins voting on the bill Wednesday and when the full House begins debating it in the future.

Conservatives in the Republicanled House are certain to demand greater cuts in the food stamps program, which makes up about 80 percent of the nearly \$100 billion a year in spending under the farm bill. Senate Democrats are equally certain to resist more cuts in a program that now helps feed 46 million people, 1 out of every 7 Americans.

"Underfunding this critically important program when families temporarily rely on it to put food on the table in a tough economy is irresponsible and inhumane," said Rep. Rosa DeLauro, D-Conn., a food stamp advocate in the House. The Agriculture Committee said its bill would strengthen the program's integrity while better targeting assistance to those in need of it.

Consumers Asked to Pay More to Save Farms

MONTPELIER, Vt. • Consumers will pay a little more for coffee and chocolate to ensure the farmers who produce those foods get a fair wage, so why not ask them to pay more for milk?

That is the notion behind a program designed to raise money for struggling New England dairy farms while educating consumers about those family businesses. Keep Local Farms urges colleges, universities and other institutions in New England to charge a little more for milk, with the extra money going to farmers in the region.

It is among a number of nongovernment programs being set up to try to preserve small, family-operated farms as consolidation continues in the dairy industry. While Vermont is best known for its milk and cheese products, dairy farms stretch across New England. But two-thirds have closed in the past 30 years because low milk prices have made it hard for farmers to cover their feed, fuel and labor costs.

Some supporters are trying to help save the rest by borrowing a page from the fair trade movement. Consumers who buy products labeled as fair trade pay a little bit more to provide workers with decent wages and sound environmental practices. Coffee and chocolate are among the most common fair trade items.

Keep Local Farms — set up in 2009, a year of record low milk prices paid to farmers figured the same idea could work in the dairy industry.

Six colleges and universities signed up, including Harvard and the University of Vermont, which contribute 10 cents for every single-serving container of milk sold. Boston Medical Center, Ski Vermont, some Ben & Jerry's scoop shops and others also contribute to the program, while others, such as Roche Brothers and Hannaford supermarkets, have displayed signs about the importance of local dairy farms to local economies, tourism and in providing land for recreation.

repeated alerts, tens of thousands of Americans may still lose their Internet service Monday unless they do a quick check of their computers for malware that could have taken over their machines more than a year ago.

The warnings about the Internet problem have been splashed across Facebook and Google. Internet service providers have sent notices, and the FBI set up a special web-

People whose computers are still infected Monday will lose their ability to go online, and they will have to call their service providers for help deleting the malware.

The problem began when international hackers ran an online advertising scam to take control of more than 570,000 infected computers around the world. When the FBI went in to take down the hackers late last year, agents realized that if they turned off the malicious servers being used to control the computers, all the victims would lose their Internet service.

In a highly unusual move, the FBI set up a safety net. They brought in a private company to install two clean Internet servers to take over for the malicious servers so that people would not suddenly lose their Internet.

The temporary Internet system they set up, however, will be shut down at 12:01 a.m. EDT Monday.

Most victims don't even know their computers have been infected, although the malicious software probably has slowed their online surfing and disabled their antivirus software, making their machines more vulnerable to other problems.

To check whether a computer is infected, users can visit a website run by the group brought in by the FBI: http://www.dewg.org.

The site includes links to respected commercial sites that will run a quick check on the computer, and it also lays out detailed instructions if users want to actually check the computer themselves.

Presbyterians Debate Israel Divestment

The largest Presbyterian group in the United States is considering divesting from three companies over the Israeli military use of their products in the Palestinian territories.

The proposal before the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has outraged many Jewish groups who sent representatives to the church's national assembly in Pittsburgh this week to lobby against the measure. Divestment supporters say the targeted companies Caterpillar Inc., Hewlett-Packard Co. and Motorola – are profiting from Palestinian suffering. The American Jewish Committee, a public policy group, has said the proposal

demonizes Israel and threatens Christian-Jewish relations. Debate and vote were scheduled for late Thursday. Pro-Palestinian Presbyterians have been try-

ing for years to persuade the denomination to divest. But the church has been dissuaded by U.S. Jewish groups and other Christians who argue that withdrawing investments will not contribute to peace in the region. At this year's Presbyterian General Assembly, prodivestment activists believe momentum is on their side.

Pension funds in Norway and Sweden have divested themselves of holdings in some firms involved in building in settlements or helping to erect Israel's contentious West Bank separation barrier.



Heavyweight Boxer Jimmy Bivins Dies at 92

CLEVELAND (AP) • Jimmy Bivins, a heavyweight boxer in the 1940s and 1950s who defeated some of the greatest fighters of his time, has died. He was 92.

Bivins died of complications from pneumonia early Wednesday at an East Cleveland nursing home, according to his family.

The Georgia-born Bivins retired from boxing in 1955 after more than 100 professional fights. He never was able to compete for a world title, but he was once ranked as the No. 1 contender in both the light heavyweight and heavyweight divisions.

Bivins had winning bouts with world champions Archie Moore, Ezzard Charles, Gus Lesnevich, Melio Bettina, Anton Christoforidis and Teddy Yarosz. He also went the distance with Joe Louis and fought Jersey Joe Walcott to a split-decision.

Bivins met seven Hall of Famers, beating four, and 11 world champions, defeating eight, according to the International Boxing Hall of Fame. Bivins, who was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1999, had 86 wins, 25 losses and one draw in his career. He had 31 knockouts.

Bivins, who was born in Dry Branch in 1919, taught kids about boxing in his later years, said Jerry Nelson, who is married to Bivins' nephew.

Gene Glen, secretary of the Ohio State Former Boxers & Associates Inc., said Bivins was an outstanding fighter, who made "outstanding contributions, not only as a boxer, but also as a human being."

The year before Bivins was inducted into the Hall of Fame, police found him in the attic of his daughter's Cleveland house. He was covered with bedsores and weighed only 110 pounds, 70 pounds below his fighting weight. Bivins' son-in-law later pleaded guilty to criminal neglect.

Bivins recovered and lived with a sister for years before moving to the nursing home in 2009, Nelson said.

"He was a kind and gentle man who always had a smile on his face," Nelson said.

She said Bivins is survived by a daughter, five grandchildren and several great grandchildren, great-greatgrandchildren, nieces and nephews.

Funeral arrangements were pending.

Former Iowa SID George Wine Dies at 81

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) • George Wine, a longtime sports information director at Iowa and co-author of an autobiography of Hawkeyes coach Hayden Fry, died Thursday following a heart attack. He was 81.

KETCHUM • Dave LaMure Jr. felt like he was flying high when his lifesized bronze of red-tailed hawks on a rotating pedestal won first place and a \$10,000 award in Art & Soul of the Magic Valley in April. Now the Kimberly artist will take the 800-pound piece, which was constructed to blow in the wind, on the road to the

Ketchum Arts Festival. LaMure will also exhibit his 140pound bronze vessels with bas-relief bison, his lamps and even a few small oil paintings.

At the annual Ketchum Arts Festival - 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. July 13-15 at Festival Meadows on Sun Valley Road in Sun Valley — you can browse the booths of artists' wares while listening to live music. Admission is free, and organizers expect 125 artists, musicians, chefs and brewmeisters. A children's activity tent, open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day, will offer opportunities to create masks, string bracelets, blow bubbles, paint pictures and get faces painted.

In LaMure's booth, nature is the inspiration. The sculptor said the Snake River Canyon is prime real estate for watching red-tailed hawks.

"I love red-tail hawks because they're incredibly tenacious.... I look for their nests in tall cottonwoods -I've been able to get close to a few and watch them," he said.

To diversify, LaMure recently returned to painting oils.

SUN VALLEY • In the beginning, a huge angry monster devoured all the animal people. But Coyote, who had hid, connived his way inside the monster and squeezed its heart. From its blood flowed the Nimiipuu.

Those people became the Nez Perce, the northern Idaho tribe who would save Lewis and Clark from starvation and point the way to

So goes a new choral piece that the Caritas Chorale will present July 14-15 in Sun Valley and Hailey.

The piece, "Nez Perce: Promises," written by Carey sheep rancher Diane Josephy Peavey and Boise composer David Alan Earnest, follows on the heels of a work the chorale commissioned to commemorate Lewis and Clark's expedition through

"I was always curious what happened to the people Lewis and Clark met along the way. And the Nez Perce story was one of the best because they had an opportunity to kill or let the members of the expedition starve to death. Instead, they met them with hospitality and showed them the way to the ocean," said chorale director Dick Brown.

"But what happened after that trip is typical of what happened to Native Americans in the West — one broken treaty after another. One of the worst indignities was that they were forced to plow the land, Mother Earth, essentially turning them into farmers. This went against everything they believed in."

The 65-member chorale, backed by a 40-piece string and percussion orchestra, will present the work at 6 p.m. July 14 at The Community School gymnasium off Dollar Road in Sun Valley. It will present it at 6 p.m. July 15 at the new Performing Arts Theater on the Community Campus in Hailey at 1050 Fox Acres Road.

Both performances are free, and both will be accompanied by a performance by Nez Perce dancers and singers.

Presba was supposed to bark, and Barras whispered to the boy to remind him. Though Presba doesn't have lines, he barks, uses facial expressions and runs from his brother Riley Presba, who plays Monkey Commander Nikko.

The musical will mirror the classic film despite minor changes. In the 1939 movie, the actors who played the Scarecrow, Tin Woodsman and Cowardly Lion in the land of Oz were also the farm hands in Kansas; the actor who played Miss Alma Gultch also portrayed the Wicked Witch of the West; and the Professor Chester Marvel actor was the Wizard of Oz, too. But Robberson cast different actors to play these parts in the Oakley show to utilize more talent and alleviate difficult costume or makeup changes.

But in the Oakley production a few actors will play multiple lead roles. Dave Jones will play the Wizard of Oz and Uncle Henry, while Denny Davis is Marvel and the Emerald City Guard. The three actors who play the farm hands were cast as crows, witches, guards or people of Oz instead.

"It is one less special effect to worry about," Robberson said. "I think the audience will accept it because it's suppose to be a dream."

The fantasy of "The Wizard of Oz" inspired Robberson to bring the story from the screen to the stage.

"I am a big fan of fantasy," Robberson said. "I like the overall positive message behind it all that the grass always seems greener somewhere else ... that good triumphs over bad."

Moscow Massage Therapist Earns Olympic 'Bid'

MOSCOW • Forget the skeletal structure. What really propels an Olympic athlete is muscle. And Paul Weston hopes to help in keeping those muscles pumping.

Weston, a 56-year-old sports massage therapist at Gritman Medical Center in Moscow, will be leaving soon for London, his hometown and venue of the 2012 Summer Olympic Games.

"I grew up in South London. This is huge personally because my family is still there and I'll be staying with my mother," Weston said. "And from the professional point of view, I'll be working with the best of the best."

That is, the best sports massage practitioners in the world, as well as the world's most elite athletes.

"I'm part of the medical team. But as a sports massage practitioner I'm going to be working in the polyclinic, which is the Athletes Village health center."

He'll be part of the physical therapies group, which includes sports medicine physicians, physiotherapists and sports massage practitioners. There's also one chiropractor and one osteopathic physician on the team.

Weston will leave July 22 for the games and return Aug. 4. As a volunteer, he's paying for everything, except a uniform, which he received during a recent orientation trip to London. Please see WESTON, S2

MALTA • For Raft River girls basketball coach Garth Steed, summer basketball tournaments can be more stressful

than the regular high school season. A potato farmer who oversees 800 acres, Steed juggled a busy June in which his Trojans played almost 40 basketball games, including weekend tournaments at Carey, Hagerman and North Gem.

"It was tough to be away that much," Steed said. "It's a little more stressful being in Carey hoping my water is going and things are getting done. My brother helps me here, so when I'm gone I know it's in competent hands."

Crash, Report Mars Tour's Fifth Stage

SAINT-QUENTIN, France •

In yet another crash-marred finish, Andre Greipel of Germany led a frenzied bunch sprint to win the fifth stage of the Tour de France on Thursday for his second straight stage victory.

Fabian Cancellara retained the overall leader's yellow jersey for a sixth straight day after the mostly flat 122-mile trek from Rouen to Saint-Quentin - almost tailormade for sprinters except for a slight uphill near the end.

But the Tour's doping demons returned to cast a shadow. A Dutch newspaper report said former teammates of Lance Armstrong including five involved in this year's race — cut a deal with U.S. anti-doping officials for their testimony in a case against the seven-time Tour champion. As usual, the Tour riders tried to keep their focus on the race.

Citing "well-informed sources," the newspaper said U.S. Anti-Doping Agency has given six-month bans to former Armstrong teammates Jonathan Vaughters, George Hincapie, Levi

Leipheimer, David Zabriskie and Christian Vande Velde.

Vaughters, now a team director at the Garmin-Sharp team, called the report "completely untrue." The four riders all declined to comment, though Hincapie said his thoughts were with Armstrong.

"I'm sad he is going through this," said Hincapie, the only rider to have been on all of Armstrong's Tour-winning teams. "He's done so many things for the sport. His accomplishments are incredible."

Cancellara said the case

wasn't discussed in the pack. "For cycling this is not good, that's for sure," he said. "That makes me sad. But on

the other hand, we have to

deal with that - and I hope

it's not something that is going to take three or four years like ... in other cases.

"That is my biggest concern: that this is going to shut down fast."

The barreling pack Thursday overtook three breakaway riders with barely 110 yards left, and Greipel wheeled out in front a splitsecond ahead of Matt Goss of Australia, who was second, and Juan Jose Haedo of Argentina, who took third. Britain's Mark Cavendish was fifth.

Like in Greipel's sprintfinish victory a day before, a late crash tarnished the stage, and he counted himself "lucky" to avoid a spill two days in a row.

on shutting down that despicable system. But rest assured, it didn't hurt.

Now, it's time to act again, boldly and with purpose, to fully comply with the very next principle of Olympism after the one mentioned above: "Any form of discrimination with regard to a country or a person on grounds of race, religion, politics, gender or otherwise is incompatible with belonging to the Olympic Movement."

Seems pretty clear. If Saudi Arabia insists on remaining the last holdout against allowing females to compete, their invitation to Britain is revoked.

"You've got a single country that's being intransigent," Martha Davis, a law professor at Northeastern University who specializes in women's rights, said Thursday. "Certainly in the past, after years of apartheid, the Olympic bureaucracy was able to take a stand against a racist nation. Here, we've got a country singularly out of step with the rest of the world. It's really time for the IOC to take a bolder stand against that."

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

"Isn't that something?" said Williams' father, Richard, after watching his daughter win on Centre Court. "She was really trying, you know? Maybe she was trying to impress the neighbors back home."

On Saturday, the 30-yearold Williams will try to become the first woman at least that age to win a major tournament since Martina Navratilova, who was 33 when she won Wimbledon in 1990.

"The older I get, the better I serve, I feel," Williams said. "I don't know how it got better. I really don't know. It's not like I go home and I work on baskets and baskets of serves. Maybe it's a natural shot for me."

Her next opponent will be No. 3 Agnieszka Radwanska of Poland, who reached her first Grand Slam final at age 23 by playing steady as can be during a 6-3, 6-4 victory over No. 8 Angelique Kerber of Germany. "After a couple of games, I

just relaxed a little bit," said Radwanska, who made only six unforced errors, one in the second set. "I was really focusing on every point." Williams won 20 of her 24

service points in the first set, including 17 in a row during one stretch. She didn't double-fault once, a real accomplishment, given how often she went for corners and lines. She finished with a 45-14 edge in total winners.

"I honestly didn't feel great on my serve today. I really didn't," said Williams, who went back on court later Thursday with older sister Venus to reach the doubles semifinals. "I thought my serve was off, and apparently - clearly - it wasn't, so maybe I should be off a little more."

And this performance didn't come against a slouch: Azarenka won the Australian Open in January as part of a 26-0 start to this season, was playing in her third semifinal in the past five major tournaments, and would have returned to No. 1 in the rankings if she had managed to beat Williams. That was not about to

happen. Not on this afternoon.

Not the way Williams is

playing, five weeks after a stunning exit at the French Open, her only first-round loss in 48 Grand Slam appearances.

"I've been working so hard," the sixth-seeded American said, "and I really, I really wanted it."

She's now one win away from a fifth Wimbledon championship, adding to those in 2002-03 and 2009-10, and 14th Grand Slam singles trophy overall — but first

in two years. For her, that's a long gap. Less than a week after her 2010 title, Williams cut her feet on glass at a restaurant, leading to a series of health problems, including

being hospitalized for clots in her lungs, then the removal of a pocket of blood under the skin on her stomach.

"Serena is blessed to be here," Dad said.

The hardest part of Radwanska's day probably came during the postmatch news conference, which was cut short after she was overcome

by a coughing fit. She appeared to be OK.


Never before even a semifinalist at any Grand Slam tournament, Radwanska is the first Polish woman to make it to a major title match since Jadwiga Jedrzejowska lost three finals in the 1930s.

"I don't really have anything to lose, so just going to try my best," said Radwanska, the junior champion at Wimbledon in 2005, and the French Open in 2006.


Radwanska, whose younger sister Ursula is ranked 54th, will rise to No. 1 for the first time if she wins Saturday.
