Machete Road Rage Hits Walmart **Parking Lot**

TWIN FALLS • A Shoshone man is behind bars after allegedly threatening another man with a machete in the Twin Falls Walmart parking lot late Wednesday night.

Police say the victim called 911 after leaving the scene. According to a police report, the victim said he accidentally cut off another man, later identified as Richard Stromberg, 43, while driving south on North Washington Street while turning into the Walmart parking lot at about 11:30 p.m., Wednesday.

Stromberg began honking his horn while the two drove into the parking lot, the report states.

"(The victim) stated that this subject approached his vehicle with the machete in his hand, pointed it at him, and told him, 'You don't know who are you (explicative) with," the report states.

According to the report, the victim then drove away, watched Stromberg put the machete in the trailer he was hauling, and called police.

Beer Fest Tickets Now on Sale

TWIN FALLS • With a little more than one month to go before the Magic Valley Beer Festival, tickets for the Aug. 18 event are now on sale.

Organizer Shayne Carpenter said tickets can be bought at O'Dunken's Draught House, Anchor Bistro and Bar, Barry Rental - Twin Falls, Brizee Heat ing and Air Conditioning or the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce. They're also available online at http://magicvalleybeer-fest.com or can be bought from any Blue Lakes Rotarian.

The festival, planned for noon -5 p.m. in Twin Falls City Park, is a spiritual successor to beer-centric events local Rotary clubs put on about 15 years ago. Organizers currently list 20 breweries that will have beer present – at least 10 will have brewers actually attend, Carpenter said. Locally, the list includes Twin Falls' Von Scheidt Brewing and Ketchum's Sawtooth Brewery. A number of other Idaho breweries will appear, and a few prominent regional brands - Colorado's Odell and Washington's Elysian, for example - will also have beer available. Advance tickets are \$25 (a discount on the \$30 day-of price at the gate) or \$10 for designated drivers, who will receive unlimited Coca-Cola products during the festival. The festival will use the token system: Each ticket comes with 20 tokens, which can be exchanged for 2-ounce pours. The money supports Blue Lakes Rotary – primarily the club's efforts to finish a new public park in south Twin Falls – and the Twin Falls Senior Citizens Center.

By the end of the month, the Idaho Transportation Department will release its High Accident Locations report, which ranks the severity and frequency of accidents on highway intersections.

The Times-News looked at the last report, which examined accident locations from 2008-2010. In District 4, which covers south-central Idaho, six intersections make the top 100 High Accident Location list.

Will those rankings change in the upcoming report? That depends, said Idaho Transportation Department District 4

Nathan Jerke, Idaho Transportation Department District 4 spokesman spokesman Nathan Jerke. Since

That's another ranking Jerke predicts may change, thanks to compiling the 2008-2010 list, the ITD made corrective imimproved lighting, flashing beaprovements on some of those cons and a lowered speed limit.

At No. 10, Burley's 5th Street and Overland Avenue is the highest ranked District 4 intersection, but it hasn't vet seen improvements, Jerke said.

"We're in conversations with Burley" about improvements, he said. Those fixes likely will come in the form of updated signal technology and changing cidents happen, Jerke said.

"It's based on multiple factors: the type of corrective action that would be needed, whether it be a signal, turn lane, something major," Jerke said. The department also looks at funding sources.

The Five Points intersection at Addison Avenue and Blue Lakes Boulevard in Twin Falls comes in at No. 17 statewide and is the second highest ranked District 4 intersection. The crossroads of 3500 East and US 30 near Kimberly and Burley's Albion Avenue and Main Street also make the list.

According to the Idaho Transportation Department's Intersection District Summary Report, south-central Idaho has 21 intersections that are especially accidentprone. The compilation takes into account frequency and accidents, plus traffic flow at the intersection.

Twin Falls and Cassia counties each have seven intersections on the list, with the bulk of those being in or around Twin Falls and Burley. Of the 21 on the list, 11 had traffic signals in 2008-2010 when the data were compiled.

By the end of the process the URA will have approximately \$50,000 left, which will be redistributed to taxing districts in the area. Urban renewal agencies fund themselves through tax-increment financing, taking a

slice of increased property taxes in the areas they target.

Jerome Mayor John Shine commended the URA for achieving its economic development goals 12 years before its deadline.

"I'm so proud of the work you've been able to do and the resolution that got passed today," Shine said.

Filer High School to **Replace the Fuzzy Paw**

FILER • Students returning in the fall may notice the gymnasium floor at Filer High School has a whole new look.

Boys basketball coach Kody Ketterling proposed to the Filer School Board Wednesday that the court's current logo be replaced with a more intense example of the district's Wildcat school spirit.

"I've always referred to what's on the floor right now as the fuzzy paw, and it's been that way since '96," Ketterling said. "The new design you see here would be a red cat that looks like it's tearing up through the floorboards."

Board members agreed that a fresh logo would inspire students but declined to give full approval for the change until they could see a digital copy of the final product. The design could be installed later this month when maintenance crews reseal the floor

"I like this because it pops out at you, is more age-appropriate and donors are making it so this won't cost the district anything," Trustee Bruce Banks said. "But I still would like to see a finished version."

The school board also earmarked \$2,000 to continue funding drug testing for high school athletes and other student organizations where participation requires members sign the pride code. Each test costs the district about \$15.

"I drug-test a select number of students every week, and I think it's a great deterrent," said Filer Athletic Director LaRell Patterson. "Last year, I think we expanded the program to include the student cheerleading council, squad, the speech team, pep band and rodeo."

In other action, school board officers were selected for the 2012-2013 school year. Fred Jaynes, the district's Zone 4 representative, will serve as school board chairman. Zone 1 representative Banks accepted the position of vice chairman.

Public school board meetings were moved to the first Thursday of each month at 7 p.m. in the Filer Intermediate School conference room.



California Man Glides into Idaho

ROGERSON • Christian Mackin and his sailplane almost made it to Twin Falls on Sunday.

"I had it in the bag, I just needed one more thermal," he said.

Instead, Mackin, who left his home in Orange County, Calif., about seven hours earlier that day, had to make the decision to land in a pivoted field near Rogerson.

"I was approaching the Jarbidge Mountains from the southwest, hoping to find a thermal to take me back up to 17,500 feet, which would have given me a safe glide for Twin Falls," Mackin said. "Unfortunately, I did not find the thermal I needed."

Makin said he takes his engine-less plane out nearly every weekend during the summer. The typical goal for a sailplane flight is 1,000 kilometers, or about 620 miles, he said.

"Typically we go out and return, so we'll go out 500 kilometers and back 500 kilometers or go in a triangle shape that distance," Mackin said.

This time, Mackin found himself headed straight out as changing weather patterns altered his original flight plan.

On Sunday afternoon, Mackin found himself over the Jarbidge Mountains, at about 11,000 feet. With another patch of warm air to about 20 feet above the ground he realized the terrain was covered in soccer ball-sized rocks and had to pull back up. He soon found a safe spot to land, he said, but still didn't know if he would be able to find someone to help him.

"I wasn't concerned about having enough water or food. I was just focused on making a good landing," he said. "After I landed I was concerned about the possibility the field or property owner might not be there."

After walking for a bit, Mackin found the home of Gus and Kimberly Brackett.

"From a distance I saw a beautiful ranch house with sprinklers watering the lawn," he said. "I knew then there was somebody home."

After explaining his predicament, Gus Bracket agreed to drive Mackin to Jackpot, Nev. There, the pilot waited for his wife and kids to arrive with a trailer "Twin Falls would have been pretty spectacular. It's always been a goal for us to make it to Idaho. to haul the plane back to Southern California, Mackin said.

With the help of the Bracketts' four children, the families took the airplane apart and loaded it into the trailer.

"My wife was definitely very nice to come out and get me," he said. "All my friends think I must be very lucky to have somebody like that who will come out and get me."

Project to Fill Boise's Downtown Hole Under Way

BOISE, Idaho (AP) • The public got a closer look at Boise's infamous downtown hole as officials broke ground on an 18-story building slated to fill the long-vacant space.

Some construction barriers were temporarily removed Thursday for a groundbreaking ceremony at the property on the corner of 8th and Main streets, which has been empty for the past quarter century. Locals jok-ingly refer to the site as "The Hole."

Several developers have

proposed projects for the property over the years, but those efforts failed. The latest plans by the Gardner Co. call for a building designed to be the tallest in Idaho. It will be anchored by Zions Bank and house other tenants.



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Top House Republicans Urge Idaho to Nix Exchanges

BOISE (AP) • The top two House Republicans are in lockstep in urging Idaho to reject the federal health care overhaul, despite the Supreme Court decision upholding its legality.

House Speaker Lawerence Denney and Majority Leader Mike Moyle released a guest editorial on Wednesday.

In it, they contend insurance companies are putting pressure on lawmakers and Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter to adopt an insurance exchange - because they'll benefit the most from it.

If Idaho doesn't establish an exchange, an online marketplace for individuals to shop for coverage, then it will get a federal version.

That's something Idaho insurers including Blue Cross hope to avoid.

Denney and Moyle also urged Idaho to reject expanding Medicaid eligibility rules.

On Tuesday, Otter announced he'd study Idaho's choices before deciding what to do sometime this fall.

New Charge for Former Prosecutor

NAMPA (AP) • An indicted former Canyon County prosecutor is facing a new charge of felony tampering with evidence.

It is the third criminal charge filed against John Bujak, who resigned in 2010. He also is accused of misusing public funds over his management of a prosecution contract with the city of Nampa and of grand theft for his representation of an estate as a private attorney.

Military Firefighting Planes Moved to Utah, Idaho

CHEYENNE, Wyo. • Six military cargo planes that are employed to drop fire retardant around wildfires have been moved to air tanker bases in Utah and Idaho to put them closer to the most active fires in the West.

Four of the C-130s were staged at the Boise Air Terminal and two were at Hill Air Force Base near Salt Lake City on Thursday. In recent weeks, the planes were staged in Cheyenne and Colorado Springs, Colo., to fight fires in Colorado, Wyoming, Montana and South Dakota.

Last weekend, a cold front brought rainy weather to the eastern Rocky Mountains. On Wednesday, firefighters succeeded in fully containing the Waldo Canyon Fire that killed two people and burned 350 homes in Colorado Springs, making it the most destructive fire in Colorado history.

Massive fires that prompted evacuations in Wyoming also cooled off somewhat.

"With all the recent rain in the Rocky Mountains, they just don't need us down there right now," Col. Jerry Champlin, commander of the Wyoming Air National Guard 153rd

Air Expeditionary Group, said in a release. On Thursday, the most

active fires were in Idaho. There, 10 fires had burned some 445 square miles of mostly grass and brush, according to the National Interagency Fire Center in Boise, Idaho.

The six C-130s were al-

ready flying some missions into Idaho before the U.S. Forest Service asked the military to move them closer to the more active fires.

Military cargo planes used to drop slurry on wildfires are now based in Utah and Idaho.

A total of eight C-130s outfitted to drop fire retardant were operated by four military units: two each by the 153rd in Wyoming, the California Air National Guard 146th Airlift Wing, the North Carolina Air National Guard 145th Airlift Wing, and the 301st Airlift Wing, a Colorado Air Force Reserve unit.

One of the North Carolina planes crashed in the Black Hills on July 1, reducing the fleet to seven. The other North Carolina plane is not presently fighting wildfires. Forest Service officials said they only needed the use of six C-130s.

The crash killed four crew members and injured two others, and remains under investigation by the military.

Each plane is fitted with a bus-sized device called a Modular Airborne Firefighting System that is specially designed to be rolled on and off a C-130. The MAFFS devices owned by the Forest Service carry up to 3,000 gallons of slurry that can be sprayed in less than 5 seconds.

A sheriff's deputy rescued Marksworth from the bottom and he was taken to a Spokane, Wash., hospital, where he was in critical condition.

Thiers was treated and released at Kootenai Medical Center.

Fans of k.d. lang Left Craving, Idaho Concert Canceled

BOISE (AP) • Fans of singer k.d. lang were left with a "constant craving" for her music after she canceled an Idaho concert, citing poor air quality caused by wildfires.

The state Department of Environmental Quality issued an alert Thursday saying air quality had worsened in southwestern Idaho, where lang was scheduled to perform at the Eagle River Pavilion west of Boise.

The DEQ posted an orange alert, which means the air is unhealthy for those with breathing issues. The agency also advised that any strenuous outside activities be postponed until the air quality improves.

The Idaho Statesman reported lang, who wrote the song "Constant Craving," made the decision to cancel her performance.

Anyone who purchased tickets for the concert through the service Ticketfly will automatically be refunded.

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JUDGE REJECTS EASTERN IDAHO MAN'S APPEAL IN 1996 MURDER

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • A judge denied the latest appeal from an eastern Idaho man serving life in prison for the 1996 rape and murder of an Idaho Falls woman.

Christopher Tapp, 36, has long argued he did not kill Angie Dodge, and his most recent appeal focused on interviews he had with police in January 1997. Tapp detailed his involvement in Dodge's murder during one those interviews, police said.

Seventh District Judge Joel E. Tingey rejected Tapp's appeal Wednesday.

"We're satisfied with the judge's ruling," said Bonneville County Prosecutor Bruce Pickett. "We hope this is able to close a chapter for the people affected by this tragedy?

Tapp failed to prove that he believed he was in police custody during the interview on Jan. 29, 1997, when he incriminated himself in the Dodge homicide, the judge found. Tapp plans to appeal, his attorney said.

"Of course it is incredibly disappointing," attorney John Thomas said. "But we'll push forward with the appeal?

Tapp was convicted in 1998 of the rape and first-degree murder of Dodge, who was 18 when she was found slain June 13, 1996, at her Idaho Falls apartment. Tapp was arrested after telling investigators he held Dodge down while Benjamin Hobbs and a man named "Mike" raped her.

Tapp said Hobbs forced him to stab Dodge before Hobbs slit her throat.

DNA evidence never linked Hobbs or Tapp to the crime, and "Mike" has never been identified.

Hobbs was never charged in Dodge's slaving but is serving a prison sentence in Nevada for an unrelated crime.

BOISE • Crews battling a wildfire in the forest northeast of Idaho's capital city have nearly half the blaze contained and are hoping to finish the job Thursday.

The Avelene Fire, burning in a section of the Boise National Forest about 25 miles northeast of Boise, has scorched 210 acres so far and is responsible for the evacuation of nearby homes.

The fire is one of a handful of fires in southwestern Idaho and eastern Oregon responsible for the thin veil of smoke hovering above the Boise area, prompting state health officials Thursday to downgrade the air quality rating for the Treasure Valley.

"There is another hot day ahead of us, and we need to get through the main burning period, but that being said, crews have made excellent progress," Boise National Forest Spokesman Dave Olson said of the Avelene Fire.

The voluntary evacuation order issued Wednesday remains in effect. Officials say residents from fewer than 10 homes within a mile of the fire perimeter stayed away from their home Wednesday night. Fire managers are hoping to have the fire contained by Friday night.

For the second consecutive week, fire crews and air tanker pilots have been busy battling blazes across southern Idaho. Weeks of high temperatures and sparse rain have dried up rangeland and lower elevation

mountain forests faster than normal.

Despite abundant winter snow and a moist spring, Olson said conditions in the forests ranging between 2,500 feet and 6,500 feet are dryer than the 20-year aver-

"If you're walking through the woods at those altitudes, you'll notice the pine needles are starting to crunch and the branches cracking more than bending," Olson said. "Higher up, it's still reasonably wet and green because the snow held for so long. But more high heat and dry days could change that pretty quickly."

State and federal forest managers are also considering imposing tougher restrictions on campfires in state and national forests across the state.

Massive Landslide Sweeps Over Glacier

ANCHORAGE, Alaska • Even by Alaska standards, the rock slide in Glacier Bay National Park was a huge event.

It was a monumental geophysical event that was almost overlooked until a pilot happened to fly over where the cliff collapsed and snapped some photographs nearly a month later.

When the cliff collapsed in the national park in southeast Alaska, it sent rock and ice coursing down a valley and over a lovely white glacier in what perhaps was the largest landslide recorded in North America.

The rumbling was enough so that it showed up as a 3.4magnitude earthquake in Alaska. The seismic event also was recorded in Canada. The massive landslide occurred in a remote valley beneath the 11,750-foot Lituya Mountain in the Fairweather Range about six miles from the border with British Columbia.

"I don't know of any that are bigger," Marten Geertsema, a research geomorphologist for the provincial Forest Service in British Columbia, said Thursday, when comparing the landslide to others in North America.

If someone were standing in front of the slide, the air blast alone would have flattened that person, said Geertsema, who studies natural hazards resulting from geophysical processes on the earth's surface.

"I think they would be blown over by the air blast," he said.

Despite the extraordinary size of the landslide, which was estimated at a half-mile wide and 5 ¹/₂ miles long, it went virtually unnoticed until air taxi pilot Drake Olson flew over it on July 2. The landslide, which rolled over the glacier, is not noticeable to the thousands of cruise ship passengers that visit Glacier Bay National Park near Juneau each summer. That is because it is about 12 to 15 miles up the glacier from the bay.

While this one was huge by North American standards, bigger ones have occurred, including a September 2002 landslide in Russia that extended for 20 miles, Geertsema said.

Lituya Mountain has been the scene of extraordinary geophysical events before. In 1958, a landslide on the other side of the mountain produced a wave estimated at 1,700 feet.

a blessing." Cheatgrass, he writes, came to Idaho in the 1890s as weed seeds inside contaminated grain from southwestern Asia. It was perfectly adapted for this climate and found a comfortable home in the overgrazed landscape that would become the Magic Valley. Cheatgrass is a drought-tolerant, prolific seed producer and naturally won the competition for space with native grass.

After a history of over-grazing, the pendulum swung the other way. In an effort to protect sage grouse, we limited grazing and shortened the time between the cheatgrass-wildfire cycle. This summer alone, we've seen two wildfires in the Castleford area near Balanced Rock.

"They call this a 100-year fire, but we've had five of them in the last six years in this area," rancher Jared Brackett told the Capital Press this week.

Ranchers responded by blaming tighter grazing restrictions for fueling the fires.

Wyatt Prescott, executive vice president of the Idaho Cattle Association, told Capital Press that if Bureau of Land Management federal grazing restrictions hadn't prevented ranchers from grazing more cattle in the area, there would have been less fuel to burn and firefighters could have gained control of the fire quicker.

If we don't manage sage grouse habitat now, it will lead to tougher grazing restrictions handed down from the federal government. And no amount of kicking and screaming is going to stop that train.

The Kinyon Road Fire this past week was started by lightning. High winds, dry conditions and record temperatures fueled the fire – ideal conditions for a blaze, even on the most ecologically balanced rangeland.

This is why, when candidate Obama in 2008 told of being grumbled at by auto executives for his position on auto emissions, he left out the part about how they gave him a standing ovation at the end of the speech.

The boos are particularly helpful in building ties with conservatives who prize constancy in the face of opposition among all political attributes and who have specific concerns about Romney's commitment to repealing the president's health care plan.

It should be noted that the appearance of bravery is distinct from actual bravery. This was not a Sister Soulja moment, named for Bill Clinton's comments at a conference sponsored by the Rainbow Coalition criticizing a popular rap artist for contributing to the coarsening of the culture. In this case, Romney was telling leaders of a community disproportionately lacking quality health care that legislation expanding the system is a bad thing. Romney asked the audience to see his heart, but after so quickly dismissing this policy that has deep consequences for the African-American community, he offered no alternative health care vision or hint that he understood the depth of the need that Obamacare – as flawed as it may be - was trying to meet. (When Romney later suggested those who booed simply wanted more "free stuff," that probably made it harder to see his heart.)

President Obama is also willing to take his own hits to keep the argument on his turf. His campaign is running a variety of ads charging Romney with outsourcing jobs while the head of Bain Capital. A variety of fact-checking organizations called the president on it, giving him the most negative ratings possible, challenging his assertions and saying his campaign can't back up its claims. Yet, the ads are still running. The Obama campaign is convinced the TV attacks are working because any conversation about outsourcing is one Democrats think they are going to win. The idea is unpopular and voters are likely to believe that the candidate who sells himself as a business guy and whose firm sometimes shuttered factories was the one involved in outsourcing. This is further confirmation of an essential truth both campaigns have embraced about fact checking: The upside from a strong distortion is better than the downside from the hall monitors. If you're not getting four Pinocchios or a pants-on-fire, you're not doing it right. Let them boo - as long as the message gets through.

If we choose to grow the urban / wildland interface making a living off of rangeland, building our homes next to public lands - to let nature take its course is no longer an option. Rangeland must be managed for wildlife habitat, for safety from wildfires and for the grazing upon which so many base their livelihoods.

Belfast Catholics Riot in Ireland Girl Allegedly Gets Cooped up by Parents

BUTLER, Ga. (AP) • A Georgia girl told investigators she spent days at a time locked inside a small outhouse and a chicken coop, and had to wear a shock collar because she didn't do her school work, authorities said Thursday.

The 15-year-old girl's parents, Samuel and Diana Franklin, were arrested earlier this week on multiple counts of child cruelty and false imprisonment.

They were released on bond, and declined to comment as they left the courthouse Thursday for what appeared to be a custody hearing.

"I've never seen anything like this personally," said Special Agent Wayne Smith of the Georgia Bureau of Investigation. "If the allegations prove to be true, it's a very severe case?

The girl was adopted around 2007 and homeschooled in a house outside the small town of Butler, about 85 miles south of Atlanta, according to Smith.

The Franklins live on a rural stretch of road sprinkled with a few homes and cow pastures.

The house is surrounded by a split-rail fence with prominent "no trespassing" signs at the entrance of the driveway.

The girl told investigators she spent up to six days at a time in the small buildings in the back of the property as punishment for such things as failing to complete her school assignments, Smith said.

She said she had been put in the buildings for at least the past two years.

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) • Irish Catholic militants attacked riot police Thursday in a divided corner of Belfast as the most polarizing day on Northern Ireland's calendar reached a typically ugly end - and yet managed, amid the smoke and chaos, to take a few tentative steps toward compromise.

Activists: Massacre Kills More than 100

A string of high-profile defections from the Syrian regime has stirred hopes in the West that Bashar Assad's inner circle will abandon him in greater numbers.

BEIRUT • Syrian activists reported a new massacre late Thursday in the central Homs province, saying regime forces killed more than 100 people in shelling and other attacks.

There were few details on the attack, which was reported by the Local Coordination Committees activist group and the Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights.

The Observatory said it was aware of up to 100 killed from sources on the ground, but the group had only confirmed the names of 30 people so far.



Death tolls are nearly impossible to independently verify in Syria, where the government restricts journalists and where more than a year of violence has convulsed much of the country.

There were few details of the violence in Hama's Tremseh area.

Activists say more than 17,000 people have been killed since the uprising against President Bashar Assad began in March 2011, and he is coming under growing international pressure to stop the violence. But as the bloodshed continues and the conflict morphs into an armed insurgency, hopes for a peaceful transition are dimming.

The latest report of violence came in the wake of the highest-level defector yet from President Bashar Assad's regime — his ambassador to Iraq. Defections from the Syrian regime have stirred hopes in the West Assad's inner circle will start abandoning him in greater numbers, hastening his downfall.

But the tightly protected regime has largely held together over the course of the 16-month-old uprising, driven by a mixture of fear and loyalty.

The latest official to flee, Ambassador Nawaf Fares, announced he was joining the revolution, asserting Thursday only force will drive Assad from power.

"There is no road map ever with Bashar Assad, because any plan, any statement that is agreed on internationally he delays on and ignores," Fares told the Al-Jazeera satellite channel. "There is no way that he can be pushed from power without force, and the Syrian people realize this."

Guantanamo Drug Probe Raises New Questions

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico • A newly released Pentagon report says there is no evidence that officials at Guan-tanamo Bay used mind-altering drugs to interrogate prisoners, but lawyers for men held at the U.S. base in Cuba said Thursday the findings still raise troubling questions.

The report by the Department of Defense Inspector General found some detainees were interrogated while they were also being treated by doctors at the prison for diagnosed mental conditions and receiving prescribed psychoactive medications.

Lawyers for prisoners say that raises the possibility that incriminating statements could have been made under the influence of medication, potentially raising questions about evidence used to justify detaining or charging men held at the base.

"If the government relied on statements by doped up detainees, regardless of why they were doped up, the government has kept men locked up for more than a decade on the basis of evidence that can't be trusted," said David Remes, a Washingtonbased human rights lawyer who rep-

TULTITLAN, Mexico • Deported from the United States after years working construction in New Jersey, Hector Augusto Lopez decided to rebuild his life in his hometown in eastern Honduras.

He found a steady job in a shoe store in Catacamas. Then, in March, he watched horrified as robbers shot three customers to death before his eyes. Soon after, he decided to make the hard and dangerous journey north again.

Half a block away, dozens more U.S.-bound Central American migrants waited outside an overflowing one-story, crammed shelter, napping on pieces of cardboard, wrapping themselves in garbage bags against the cold and trading stories about their journeys north. While the number of Mexicans heading to the U.S. has dropped dramatically, a surge of Central American migrants is making the 1,000-mile northbound journey this year, fueled in large part by the rising violence brought by the spread of Mexican drug cartels. Other factors, experts say, are an easing in migration enforcement by Mexican authorities and a false perception that Mexican criminal gangs are not preying on migrants as much as they had been.

Central American migration remains small compared to the numbers of Mexicans still headed north, but their steeply rising numbers *Please see* **MIGRANTS, N2** resents 16 prisoners at Guantanamo.

MADISON, Wis. • As much as President Barack Obama wants your vote, he's not actually offering to pay your monthly bills.

But thousands of Americans were persuaded otherwise, falling victim to a fastmoving scam that claims to be part of an Obama administration program to help pay utility bills in the midst of a scorching summer.

The scheme spread quickly across the nation in recent weeks with help from victims who unwittingly shared it on social media sites before realizing they had been conned out of personal information such as Social Security, credit card and checking account numbers.

Paramedics Forced to Turn to Expired Drugs

SALEM, Ore. • When paramedics ran out of a critical drug used to treat irregular heartbeats, the Bend Fire Department in central Oregon dug into its stash of expired medications, loaded up the trucks and kept treating patients.

Paramedics reported asking some of those facing medical emergencies: "Is it OK if we use this expired drug?"

Emergency responders in various jurisdictions have reported turning to last resort practices as they struggle to deal with a shortage of drug supplies created by manufacturing delays and industry changes. Some are injecting expired medications or substituting alternatives. Others are simply going without.

As the drug crisis mounted for the Bend Fire Department earlier this year, the agency had 11 medications in drug kits that were expired, despite risks the pharmaceuticals might not work as intended in life-or-death situations. The crisis has eased a bit, but the agency still carries expired doses of two drugs in serving a city of 80,000 people.

"We've never (before) had to go diving back into the bin to try to retrieve expired boxes of drugs," said Tom Wright, emergency medical services coordinator for the Bend Fire Department, which has been administering outdated medicines

for about a year. "We had the backing of our insurance company that giving expired drugs is better than giving no drugs at all?"

He said medics have not reported any adverse reactions.

Medications are only guaranteed to work as intended until their expiration

date. When stored properly, most expired drugs won't be harmful to patients but will become less effective with time, according to medical professionals. However, EMS officials said it's often difficult to get information from manufacturers or regulators about how long specific medications will work.

Research Murky on Danger of Asian Carp Invasion

HAVANA, Ill. • As scientists aboard a research boat activate an electric current, the calm Illinois River transforms into a roiling, silvery mass. Asian carp by the dozen hurtle from the water as if shot from a gun, soaring in graceful arcs before plunging beneath the surface with splashes resembling tiny geysers.

Water quality specialist Thad Cook grunts as a whopper belts him in the gut. His colleagues duck and dodge to avoid the missile-like fish that plop onto the deck, writhing madly until someone can grasp the slimy, slithering critters and heave them over the side.

It's like a scene from a Hitchcock movie - and indeed the flying carp have played villainous roles in many a YouTube video. Biologists, however, fear a different kind of horror story may be taking shape underwater: a war for survival between the aggressive Asian carp newcomers and native species important to people who catch fish for a living or fun.

"We suspect at some point there will be a real crash in the populations of some of these native fishes," said John Chick, an aquatic ecologist with the National Great Rivers Research and Education Center on the Mississippi River near St. Louis.

While years of study have turned up ominous signs that the carp are capable of crowding out other species and changing ecosystems, the worst-case scenario scientists expect to unfold hasn't yet been realized. Some scientists say dire predictions about the damage carp can do may be premature. That makes the research Chick and his colleagues are conducting critical: It likely will influence how the debate over managing waterways made vulnerable by carp plays out in Congress and the courts.

evidence that Asian carp will devastate other fish. Even in places such as the Illinois and Mississippi, where carp are rampant, changes have been incremental.

For example, while indigenous

bigmouth buffalo and gizzard shad both have gotten skinnier since the carp arrived, the buffalo's population has declined only moderately while the shad have fluctuated. Commercially harvested buffalo are found on grocery shelves from Alabama to Minnesota. The shad are crucial prey for bass and other sport fish.

"When you get a species invasion ... typically you see some native species decline or go extinct locally," said biologist Jim Garvey of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale. "We haven't seen that yet. We're kind of wondering what the heck's going on."

Chick and others have found that silver and bighead carp, the most menacing of several Asian varieties in the U.S., eat the same food as the bigmouth buffalo and gizzard shad. A separate study detected weight declines among buffalo and shad in the Illinois River, believed to have the largest concentrations of Asian carp.

Researchers are looking for proof that Asian carp are at least partially to blame for the drop-offs. "It's just a correlation at this point," Chick said.

Other research supports the potential that the newcomers could take over the neighborhood. Garvey and associates reported this year that Asian carp account for more than 60 percent of the biomass the combined weight - of all fish species along the lower 150-mile stretch of the Illinois River. They also make up virtually all fish longer than 16 inches.

Such findings stir unease in the Great Lakes region, which could become the Asian carp's next frontier. Ravenous and prolific, the carp typically weigh 30 to 40 pounds but can exceed a hefty 100 pounds. They gorge up to one-fifth of their body weight daily on plankton tiny plants and animals that nearly all fish eat.

It was prompted by an April 2008 story in The Washington Post in which a prisoner alleged he had been drugged and questioned in apparent violation of U.S. law and other detainees said they were forcibly medicated. The Inspector General's report was not publicly available until this week, when it was published by the website Truthout, which obtained it through the Freedom of Information Act. Names of detainees are redacted in the report. But it is clear from a quote cited in the report that investigators looked into the case of Adel al-Nusairi, a former Saudi police officer cited in the *Post* story who told his lawyer of being injected with an unknown drug while undergoing lengthy interrogations. The prisoner said he gave a made-up confession to get a break from one session. The Inspector General found the prisoner had been diagnosed as schizophrenic and psychotic with a borderline personality disorder and was treated at Guantanamo with Haldol, a drug that can make people lethargic. The report said there was no evidence shots were administered during his interrogation. Al-Nusairi was sent back to Saudi Arabia in 2006 and was not interviewed for the report, nor was his lawyer, Anant Raut. The lawyer told The Associated Press he could not comment on the prisoner's case but said the report appears to validate complaints by a number of detainees that they were given mind-altering drugs at Guantanamo, calling into doubt the validity of their statements to authorities. "I commend the investigators for uncovering that," he said.

"I know that there is some closeness between the opposition and the general. ... Contact has been made,'' Fabius told journalists in Paris.

Assad's regime has suffered a steady stream of low-level army defectors, who joined a group of dissidents known as the Free Syrian Army, now numbering in the tens of thousands. There were several high-level defections in the past – including a Syrian fighter pilot who flew his plane to neighboring Jordan during a training mission in June in a brazen move.

Although the defections are notable, Assad's regime has remained remarkably airtight, particularly compared with the hemorrhaging of Moammar Gadhafi's inner circle in Libya in 2011.

Within weeks of the Libyan revolt, a number of Libyan ambassadors and other high-ranking officials quit the government, and many joined the opposition leadership. The early defection of huge sections of the army in eastern Libya gave the rebel movement a safe zone where they could freely organize their political and military strategies.



Protesters rally to save more than 450 homes in Haiti

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (**AP**) • About 100 people marched in Haiti's capital Thursday to protest a government plan that threatens to demolish their homes.

The protesters said they won't let authorities destroy their houses even though they sit on the edge of a ravine looming over Port-au-Prince and sometimes crash down the hillside during heavy rains and leave people dead.

"I built my own house, and I'm not going to let anyone come and destroy it," said Jony Juichelle, a 26-year-old protester. "If the government thinks that it's going to destroy my house, they will have to kill me first." The demonstration was the second in as many weeks since Haitian officials announced the plan to demolish up to 450 homes in the shantytown to make way for a flood-protection project in the ravine.

U.S. to Iraq: Review Case of Militant

BAGHDAD • The White House has asked Iraq to review the case of a Hezbollah commander who was accused of masterminding a 2007 attack that killed five American soldiers or hand him over to the United States, a senior Obama administration official said Thursday, though two Iraqi courts declared him not guilty.

The case is a tricky aftermath of the long U.S. military campaign in Iraq that ended last year and has elements of both Iraqi and U.S. internal politics.

Ali Mussa Daqduq was released from prison but is being held under house arrest in Baghdad's heavilyfortified Green Zone as Washington considers bringing U.S. charges against him. Daqduq, a Lebanese citizen, is considered a top threat to Americans in the Middle East and was detained for more than four years by the U.S. military before it left Iraq last December.

In an interview with The Associated Press, Antony J. Blinken, the national security adviser to Vice President Joe Biden, said the U.S. wants to keep Ali Mussa Daqduq locked up for as long as legally possible.

Blinken said the Obama administration also will file a request on behalf of the victims' families for Iraq's highest appeals court to review and correct its June 25 order to free Daqduq. But he said the U.S. asked to extradite Daqduq even before the final court ruling declaring him not guilty.


2. Mulch like mad. The use of organic mulch can block sunlight, and thus kill

FDA Plans Database for Identifying Foodborne Germs

WASHINGTON (AP) • The Food and Drug Administration plans to create a database of 100,000 foodborne germs in an effort to speed up the government's response to outbreaks of salmonella, E. coli and other food-related diseases.

The five-year effort aims to sequence the genetic code of the most common foodborne germs. With this information, FDA says scientists may be able to create tests that can identify foodborne germs in a matter of days, rather than weeks. Every year about 48 million people in the U.S. get sick from foodborne bacteria.

The agency will partner with scientists at the University of California, Davis, The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and Agilent Technologies Inc., a company that specializes in testing equipment.

FEWER AUTO CLOSINGS REDUCE U.S. UNEMPLOYMENT CLAIMS

WASHINGTON • The number of people seeking U.S. unemployment benefits plunged last week. But a big reason is that automakers skipped some of their usual summer shutdowns to keep up with demand, causing fewer temporary auto layoffs.

U.S. auto sales in the first half of the year jumped 15 percent over the same period a year ago. Sales of new vehicles surged in June. Automakers also began Independence Day promotions early, lifting sales at the end of the month.

The Labor Department adjusts the number of applications for unemployment aid to account for seasonal factors. But it underestimat ed this summer's drop in temporary shutdowns of auunemployment aid tumbled 26,000 last week to a seasonally adjusted 350,000 the fewest since March 2008.

"Take July with a grain of salt," Jill Brown, an economist at Credit Suisse, said in a note to clients. The auto shutdowns "often cause extreme volatility."

Automakers traditionally close their plants in the first two weeks in July to prepare them to build new models, and their employees often Chrysler canceled the normal two-week shutdowns at three factories.

Applications for unemployment benefits measure the pace of layoffs. When they consistently fall below 375,000, it generally suggests that hiring is strong enough to reduce the unemployment rate. The number has fluctuated at or above that level since April.

At the same time, hiring has slowed sharply compared with the first three months of

Yahoo confirms theft of 450,000 passwords

LONDON (AP) • Some 450,000 Yahoo users' email addresses and passwords were leaked because of a security breach, the company confirmed Thursday, adding that just a small fraction of the stolen passwords were valid.

The company said in a statement that an "old file" from the Yahoo Contributor Network was compromised Wednesday. Among the stolen emails and passwords were many from Yahoo's own email service along with those of other companies. The Yahoo Contributor Network is a content-sharing platform.

Yahoo said it is fixing the vulnerability that led to the disclosure, changing the passwords of affected Yahoo users, and notifying other companies whose users' accounts may have been compromised.

"We apologize to all affected users," the company statement said.

Technology news websites including CNET, Ars Technica and Mashable identified the hackers behind the attack as a little-known outfit calling itself the D33D Company. The group was quoted as saying it stole the unencrypted passwords using an SQL injection – the name given to a commonly used attack in which hackers use rogue commands to extract data from vulnerable websites.

"We hope that the parties responsible for managing the security of this subdomain will take this as a wake-up call," the group was quoted as saying.

Data Firm: Global Spending on Drugs Slows to 2016

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) • Growth in global spending on medications will slow markedly over the next four years due to a slew of new low-cost generic drugs coming to pharmacies in the U.S. and other developed countries, along with slower increases in what those countries spend on brand-name drugs, according to a new forecast.

That's good news for patients and the employers, labor unions and taxpayer-funded government health programs that help pay for drugs.

During a same period, from 2012 through 2016, the pharmaceutical industry will sharply boost its sales in emerging markets including China, India and Russia, according to the report from data firm IMS Health, which collects and analyzes data on pharmaceutical sales around the world.

The company's latest forecast on global medicine sales and trends predicts total spending will rise from about \$956 billion in 2011 to just under \$1.2 trillion in 2016, based on reported wholesale drug prices. However, IMS estimates the undisclosed rebates and discounts drug companies give

This year alone, patent expirations will bring new generic competition in the U.S. for nearly 10 blockbusters with \$1 billion or more in global annual sales. Those include Singulair for asthma and allergies, Plavix for stroke prevention, high blood pressure drug Diovan, Lexapro for depression and anxiety, osteoporosis treatment Boniva and two medicines for schizophrenia and other serious psychiatric disorders, Seroquel and Geodon.

Where History Sounds Like a Fiddle and Looks Like a Quilt

SHOSHONE • Where can you spend this weekend enjoying fiddlers, fiber arts and artists' wares? At Shoshone Arts in the Park.

The event, begun in 1987, has grown from an arts festival to include a quilt show and fiber fair, the Idaho State Old-Time Fiddlers Championship, the Mannie Shaw Jamboree and more.

Festivities run Saturday and Sunday, with vendors selling handcrafted jewelry, paintings and other artwork on the Lincoln County Courthouse lawn.

Two years ago the Shoshone Chamber of Commerce took over management of the event, and last year it drew some of its largest crowds, chamber President Payson Reese said. "Vendors said it was their best show with 1,500

people walking through the park." Free fun includes a sidewalk art

competition, a petting zoo and other children's activities as well as the Idaho Operation Lifesaver Trolley.

"The trolley will be giving rides for free with an emphasis on safety around trains and the train track," Reese said. "Other activities include historical buggy rides and a walking tour, although those do have a small charge."

The fiddle contest is Saturday, and the Mannie Shaw Jamboree is Sunday.

"The jamboree and fiddle contest is huge because it attracts renowned musicians and it's free," Reese said. "The jamboree is pretty neat because Mannie Shaw originally started it in his front lawn in Fairfield and brought it to Shoshone years ago and it's become an annual tradition."

Music at the jamboree runs the

gamut - bluegrass, swing, waltz.

"Of course, it's a fiddle jamboree because Mannie was a fiddle player," said Jenni Jacobson of Twin Falls, a participant and organizer.

"We have about 20 musicians coming to play in the jamboree. A lot of the music will be old-time fiddle music from the late 1880s," Jacobson said. "Some of the traditional tunes include 'Arkansas Traveler' and 'Liberty.'" Another big Please see ARTS, E2

Tonight, Hear Jazz Campers' New Rhythms

TWIN FALLS • One message sent to the eight saxophone players huddled in a combo session: Playing a rhythm correctly is more important than getting all the notes right.

"We all react to rhythm first," said instructor David Deacon-Joyner, during Tuesday rehearsal at the Great Basin Jazz Camp at College of Southern Idaho. He's a professor of music and director of jazz studies at Pacific Lutheran University at Tacoma, Wash.

The saxophonists - five alto players and three wielding bright golden tenors - stood at rapt attention as Deacon-Joyner explained that when playing in jazz groups they might need to listen for the bass line, instead of a driving drum, for percussive cues.

"This camp meets students where they are. Some are already playing at much higher levels while others don't have much experience with jazz, but all will leave better musicians," Deacon-Joyner told a reporter.

Now in its sixth year, the camp has grown from just a handful of students

to more than 50, with teen musicians coming from across the country and from Australia. The camp started Monday and ends today.

Deacon-Joyner said the camp has become top-tier through the use of faculty such as trumpeter Carl Saunders of Los Angeles.

"He's like having the Pope at your prayer convention," Deacon-Joyner said. "If you're at all familiar with the world of jazz you know who he is."

Learning improvisation is one skill that sets a jazz camp apart from other music or vocal camps.

Bass player Beck Perrine, 15, of Middleton said: "I'm having an awesome time learning a lot of chords and how to assemble chords, coming up different arpeggios ... a lot of music theory."

This is Perrine's first time attending the camp but he fits right into the mix of serious students, who each paid about \$500 to attend.

"Everyone's a nerd here, so it's awesome," he said.

Campers stay in campus dormitories, eat in the Student Union and hang out with fellow jazz students.

"I've made a lot of new friends,"



As he passed a fellow rider in the late stages of his event in USA Cycling's mountain bike cross-county national championships in Sun Valley on July 5, the Twin Falls resident asked the rider how far ahead the leader was.

No reply. A second query was greeted only with a grunt.

Price had no idea he'd just passed the leader

and was going to win the race.

"I heard my name riding up and they announced me as going to win the national championship. I thought, 'They'd better check their scoring,'" said Price, the winner of the Category 3 race for men ages 40-49. "After we finished, the guy I passed said, 'You had no idea I was the leader, did you?' I really thought I was second place, didn't think I'd won at any point on the course.

"They staged the 40-49 year olds and the 50-54 year olds at the same time. Going down the bike path at the start there were a couple

guys who screamed right into the lead. ... Turned out the guy that smoked the whole field was in the other division."

Unflappable Wiggins Cements Tour Lead

LA TOUSSUIRE, France • Try as they might, rivals of Bradley Wiggins can't take his yellow jersey.

The three-time Olympic track champion, looking to become Britain's first Tour de France winner, beat back repeated attacks Thursday in a crucial Alpine stage won by ace French climber Pierre Rolland.

As Stage 11 began, Wiggins' main challengers were planning to unsettle him in the 92-mile ride along three big climbs from the 1992 Winter Olympics town of Albertville to the ski station at La Toussuire.

First, defending champion Cadel Evans took a shot at Wiggins on the longest climb - a tactic some questioned. On the way to the uphill finish, Belgium's Jurgen Van Den Broeck tried, too. Then Vincenzo Nibali did, twice.

Each time, Wiggins steadily, meticulously reeled them in.

Evans petered out early. The 35-year-old Australian was dropped by Wiggins and others who finished nearly a minute behind Rolland. Evans began the day in second place, but finished 1 minute, 26 seconds behind

Wiggins and fell to fourth overall. He's now 3:19 back.

The Briton also dispensed with Russia's Denis Menchov, who won the Spanish Vuelta twice and the Italian Giro once. He began the day 3:02 back in fifth place but lost more than 13 minutes to Wiggins.

Overall, Wiggins leads Sky teammate Christophe Froome, who rose to second, by 2:05. Nibali is third, 2:23 back. Van Den Broeck is fifth, 4:48 behind.

Wiggins also patched things up with Nibali, who a day earlier hadn't taken kindly to a seeming glare from the Sky leader. As they

finished together Thursday, Wiggins gave him a peacemaking pat on the back.

The Alpine stage shaped up as a pivotal moment because mountains and time trials tend to determine who

wins the Tour. Wiggins' rivals saw it as their chance to strike. He looks unstoppable in the time trials: He won one Monday and another one comes the day before the July 22 finish in Paris. Their last opportunity could await in yet another uphill finish in the Pyrenees next Thursday.

Rolland, a 25-year old Europcar rider, gave his team its second straight stage victory. It was his second in two years following his victory on the fabled Alpe d'Huez in 2011.

The joy of victory contrasted with his "immense pain" weeks earlier. Two days before the Tour start, a French sports daily revealed a previously unknown investigation of his team over allegations of improper use of a controlled substance in the 2011 Tour. The team denies the claim.

But fans in Belgium where the race began June 30 - jeered at some Europcar riders, and Rolland said he was spit on.

"The evening after the prologue I was really down," he said. "I told myself: 'If that's what the Tour is all about, I'd rather go home."" He said the fans' reaction at home in France has been more charitable.



PASADENA, Calif. • Another storied Southern California university has joined the USC Trojans under the hammer of NCAA sanctions.

The UCLA Bruins? Nope. Would you believe the Caltech Beavers?

The California Institute of Technology has been given a reprimand and penalties for fielding players who were academically ineligible, the NCAA announced Thursday, putting a school whose losing streaks can run into the decades in the company of athletic powerhouses like USC and Oklahoma.

Caltech allowed 30 ineligible players in 12 sports, including baseball, basketball, tennis and swimming, to practice or compete over four academic years, the NCAA said.

The problems came from the school's system of "shopping" for courses, where students attend classes for three weeks at the beginning of a term before registration. That meant that under NCAA rules, some athletes were not considered full-time students when they took the field.

the problems themselves. The school said in a statement that the violations were inadvertent, and promptly disclosed to the NCAA.

"We very much regret that the high standards we expect of ourselves were not met," the statement said. "We acknowledge our responsibility and have taken all necessary steps to remedy this situation and ensure it does not happen again."

The penalties, many of them self-imposed by the university, include three years of probation, one year of no campus recruit ing and the vacating of wins and records.

The Beavers, who compete in NCAA Division III, have taken futility to new heights. The baseball team has lost 237 straight games. The water polo team last year snapped a losing streak that had lasted nine vears.

But nothing can match the school's basketball team's epic losing streak for glorious failure.

The basketball Beavers went 310 conference games without a win, a 26-year streak that began in the mid-1980s and finally ended on Feb. 22, 2011.

Bad News Day For London Olympics

LONDON • With the Olympics just two weeks away, embarrassing logistical problems about security, staff, phones and traffic made the mood Thursday in London as gloomy as the weather.

British lawmakers clamored for an explanation of why the armed forces need to field more troops to protect the games, eclipsing the day that U.S. track star Michael Johnson held the Olympic flame aloft at sunrise at the ancient monument at Stonehenge.

London's aging infrastructure kept offering up unpleasant surprises as the main road near Heathrow Airport remained closed following emergency repairs. The British mobile phone

North Korean Recalls 'Ping Pong Diplomacy'

PYONGYANG, North Korea • Her eyes well up when Li Pun Hui recalls her role in a historic example of "ping pong diplomacy."

In 1991, the North Korean table tennis star paired with her archrival, South Korea's Hyun Jung-hwa, as part of the first "unified Korea" team to march into international competition wearing the blue flag of the Korean Peninsula. With relations between the foes at a low point, the episode is not about to be repeated at the London Olympics. But Li and Hyun fondly recall how they met as enemies and parted as friends, and champions.

"For 50 days, 24 hours a day, we lived together as one, trained together, slept in the same room and ate all our meals together," Litold The Associated Press at an interview in Pyongyang. "We shared the same food - and our feelings."

As separate squads, neither of the Koreas had been able to beat the team they called the "Great Wall" of table tennis: China, winner of eight consecutive women's world team titles leading up to that year's championships in Chiba, Japan. But Hyun, a 20-yearold from the southern port city of Busan, and the babyfaced 22-year-old Li teamed to help the Koreas finally break China's streak and clinch the gold medal.

The recent South Korean film "As One" reconstructs the complex bid to field a united team of players from both sides of the world's most heavily militarized border. It was just four years after North Korean agents blew up a South Korean airliner, killing all 115 people on board.

At first, the players regarded one another suspiciously. Their countries had fought against one another for three years in the 1950s, and the Korean Peninsula has remained in a state of war since a truce was signed in 1953. In the film, trash talking at a team banquet leads to a brawl.

"Did you see their faces?" one South Korean athlete says in the film. "So morbid."

In a telephone interview with AP, Hyun recalled her dismay when she learned she would be playing doubles with Li, whom she considered a notch lower in skill.

"I was too young to understand how symbolic it was," she said.

Both players were fiercely competitive. Getting past their rivalry, as well the cultural clashes, took time. The film contrasts the rigid or-

derliness of the North Koreans with the constant horseplay among the southerners.

Then, one day, Li missed practice, debilitated by hepatitis.

"My heart ached," Hyun said. "Aside from the rivalry between us and between our countries, I started hoping Li would get better and do well for her country."

Against all odds, friendships blossomed. The once-reluctant teammates together sang ballads that predated the peninsula's division. Their coaches bonded in a marathon drinking session. Stiff handshakes became high fives.

Li and Hyun developed a profound respect and affection for one another. They became confidantes as well as teammates, and their performances were crucial in helping the unified team win the women's title.

Saudis to Send Two Women to Olympics

LONDON • Every country competing at the London Games will include female athletes for the first time in Olympic history after Saudi Arabia agreed Thursday to send two women to compete in judo and track and field.

The move by the ultraconservative Muslim kingdom to break with its practice of fielding male-only teams followed decisions by Qatar and Brunei to send women athletes to the Olympics for the first time.

"With Saudi Arabian female athletes now joining their fellow female competitors from Qatar and Brunei, it means that by London 2012 every national Olympic committee will have sent women to the Olympic Games," IOC President Jacques Rogge said.

Saudi Arabia had been under intense pressure from the International Olympic Committee and humanrights groups to include female athletes. The announcement Thursday followed months of IOC negotiations with the Saudis to bring women to London.

The two female Saudi competitors are Wodjan Ali Seraj Abdulrahim Shahrkhani in judo and 800-meter runner Sarah Attar.

"A big inspiration for participating in the Olympic Games is being one of the first women for Saudi Arabia to be going," the 17-year-old Attar said in an IOC video from her U.S. training base in San Diego. "It's such a huge honor and I hope that it can really make some big strides

for women over there to get more involved in sport."

Attar, who has spent most of her life outside of Saudi Arabia, said she hopes her inclusion will encourage women in the conservative kingdom that does not allow women to vote, drive or participate in sports.

"To any woman who wants to participate, I say 'go for it,' and don't let anybody hold you back," Attar said in the video after running a lap on the track wearing pants and a headscarf.

BRING ON THE **TROOPS:** British Home Secretary Theresa May confirmed that the government will deploy an additional 3,500 servicemen at the London Olympics amid concerns that a private security contractor had failed to recruit enough staff. The firm G4S had been enlisted to provide the bulk of the 13,200 private security guards across 100 Olympic venues.

British lawmakers questioned why the apparent gap in security had surfaced so late.

"G4S have let the country down and we have literally had to send in the troops," said opposition Labour Party lawmaker Keith Vaz, demanding to know when the issue was first identified and if G4S which has millions in contracts from the British government - will suffer any financial penalties.

The move brings the total number of armed forces staff at the games to 17,000, dwarfing the 9,500 troops Britain has in Afghanistan

"We're proud of our partnership with Ralph Lauren, an iconic American company, and excited to watch America's finest athletes compete at the upcoming Games in London."

Riley Keeps Getting Talent on the Cheap

MIAMI • Upon hearing the news that Ray Allen had decided to take less money and join the Miami Heat, reigning NBA MVP LeBron James sounded less than surprised.

He knew who closed the deal.

"Pat done it again," James said that night.

Sure enough, Pat Riley had done it again – gotten someone the Heat coveted at a discount price.

Whether it's the lure of no state taxes, the South Florida weather, the chance to play alongside a trio of stars like James, Dwyane Wade and Chris Bosh or some combination thereof, Riley and the Heat have figured out a way to get who they want and fit them into some pretty stringent salary parameters. The plan delivered the 2012 NBA title, and now with a sharpshooter like Allen taking essentially a

half-price offer, the Heat could be heavy favorites to repeat next season.

"I just mention LeBron and Chris and Dwyane," Riley said, addressing his recruiting style. "And then we take it from there."

It's a bit more detailed than that.

The Hall of Fame coach is showing he's a master executive as well.

"He understands players and he's a winner," Heat guard James Jones said. "And the guys he targets are winners"

James, Wade, Bosh, Udonis Haslem and Mike Miller signed deals worth roughly \$70 million less than they could have gotten elsewhere two summers ago. Shane Battier took a discount last year, and now Allen has done the same – taking \$3 million from Miami for next season as opposed to \$6 million to stay in Boston. Allen's previous contracts added up to

about \$175 million in salary anyway, which surely cushioned his choice to leave \$3 million on the table now.

By now, Riley getting deals like this done has almost become expected.

"Enthusiasm is contagious, and Coach Riley (is) a carrier," agent Arn Tellem wrote on his blog in 2010, when Miller - his client sacrificed some dollars to have a chance to be part of Miami's championship chase. "Had he not become coach of the Heat, he could have made millions by opening a chain of tanning salons in the Sunshine State. He's that good. Pat had a vision for the team, a vision that he laid out with evangelical fervor. We left the room converted."

Riley doesn't have one sales pitch.

There was the infamous story from 2010, when Riley put his seven championship rings in a bag and dropped it





CHARLOTTE, N.C. • Michael Jordan said there's no way Kobe Bryant and this year's USA Olympic basketball team could've beaten the 1992 Dream Team.

Jordan told The Associated Press Thursday that he laughed - "I absolutely laughed" – when hearing Bryant's comments that the squad training in Las Vegas could take Jordan and company.

Jordan said there's "no comparison" which team is better.

"For him to compare those two teams is not one of the smarter things he ever could have done," Jordan said prior playing in a celebrity golf tournament in Charlotte.

Jordan said the 1992 team, which included 11 future Hall of Famers and won its six Olympic games by an average of more than 43 points en route to capturing the gold medal, was a better overall team largely because of the experience it put on the floor.

"I heard Kobe say we were not athletic," said a smiling Jordan as he sat in a golf cart puffing on his cigar while waiting to tee off. "But we were smart. He said we were too old, but I was 29 and in the prime of my career. Pip (Scottie Pippen) was 26 or 27, (Charles) Barkley was 29, Patrick (Ewing) was 29 and Chris Mullin was 29. Almost everybody was still in their twenties?

Jordan's response came after Bryant told reporters in Las Vegas that this year's team could pull out a win against the Dream Team if

they faced each other in their primes. Bryant said this year's team has a bunch of racehorses, players who are incredibly athletic while the Dream Team consisted mainly of players at the tail end of their careers.

Bryant's comments received immediate and sharp rebuttal from some members of the Dream Team, including Barkley.

Jordan joined in on Thursday.

"Most of us were in the prime of our careers, at a point where athleticism doesn't really matter," said Jordan, the owner of the Charlotte Bobcats. "You have to know how to play the game."

Jordan shook his head when asked why he thinks Bryant made the comments.

"I imagine he's trying to say it to legitimize his own Dream Team," Jordan said. "But to me it's not even a question what team is better."

PIRATES RIDING POWER OF 'Z' TO FIRST PLACE

PITTSBURGH • Forget about Andrew McCutchen's MVP-caliber season. Or the emergence of ace-in-training James McDonald. Or the calming presence of playofftested veterans A.J. Burnett and Rod Barajas.

Want to know the Pittsburgh Pirates' secret behind their rise to first in the National League Central?

It's all about the Zoltan.

It started the way most of these things start, in a bored clubhouse in the meandering hours before first pitch. A group of players were watching the 2000 movie "Dude, Where's My Car?" considered the "Citizen Kane" of "pair of slackers lose car/hi-jinks ensue" comedies – before a game in Atlanta in April when second baseman Neil Walker started goofing off by making a "Z" symbol.

The sign – left hand facing out, thumb down, right hand facing in, thumb up is a tribute to the character Zoltan, an alien whose followers wear bubble wrap jump suits.

No, seriously.

Walker started flashing it whenever the Pirates made an impact play. It really took off, however, when Barajas smacked a two-run, walkoff homer against Washington in May. When Barajas crossed home plate, the entire team made the "Z" sign in tribute.

Over the last two months, it's taken on a life of its own. Zoltant-shirts have become a fixture at PNC Park (where the Pirates have put together the best home record in baseball) and people have taken to flashing the "Z" to manager Clint Hurdle when he's out on a grocery run.

"We Are Family" - the disco anthem the Pirates turned into a touchstone while winning the 1979 World Series – is it not. Though Hurdle hardly cares.

"I think that's just the men taking ownership of what they're doing and having some fun with it," he said.

No wonder some fans are saying "Dude, Where's My Pirates?"

The same franchise that carries an ignominious streak of 19 consecutive losing seasons is 11 games over .500 (48-37) for the first time since the Pirates last made the playoffs in 1992. Mc-Cutchen is greeted by chants of "MVP! MVP!" every time he steps to the plate at the suddenly packed home ballpark and the pitching staff has been lights out.

The Pirates flirted with first place last July before crumbling under the weight of heightened expectations and a series of injuries that gutted a fragile offense. It was a painful lesson to learn, but one Hurdle believes will pay off during the dog days to come as Pittsburgh tries to make an extended run atop a watered-down NL Central.

"I think the confidence level is a lot higher than it was last year," pitcher Kevin Correia said. "I think last year we were in it, but I don't think people were taking it seriously, even ourselves a little bit, not knowing how long this thing was going to last. Now, we feel we're as good or better than the teams we're playing right now."

And the Pirates are playing like it. Pittsburgh has the NL's best record over the last two months as an offense that slogged through the spring has awakened behind McCutchen. The All-Star center fielder didn't hit his first homer of the season until May 8. Now he's got 18, fourth-best in the NL.

Hunter-Reay Carrying the American Flag in IndyCar

When Ryan Hunter-Reay picked up his third consecutive win last week, it pushed him into the lead of the IndyCar points standings for the first time in his career.

It also marked the first time an American has led the points since Sam Hornish Jr. in 2006, and many believe drivers draped in red, white and blue is what IndyCar needs to flourish

"It certainly does need successful Americans because it's an American series that competes mostly in the U.S.," said Hornish, who left IndyCar after the 2007 season for NASCAR. "I like watching IndyCar races, the racing has been really good this year, and it's great that Ryan has been

able to do what he's done. It's nice to see American drivers succeed."

It was league founder Tony George's intent to create a series for American drivers when he broke away from CART in 1996. Americans dominated through 2002, but since then Hornish's 2006 championship is the last title for a U.S.-born driver.

The other championships went to Scott Dixon (2003, 2008) of New Zealand, Tony Kanaan of Brazil (2004), the late Dan Wheldon of England (2005) and Scotland's Dario Franchitti (2007, 2009-11).

Why? Hunter-Reay has a theory.

"For a little while, there was a lack of American talent," he said. "There was far less American talent than there is

now. You had myself, Graham (Rahal) and Marco (Andretti). Certainly we have more numbers this year, and more Americans a little farther along in their careers."

The series boasts seven fulltime American drivers this season, the most since 2007. Among them are Andretti and Rahal, the sons of racing royalty, and youngsters JR Hildebrand and Charlie Kimball, who both deferred college to pursue IndyCar careers. Josef Newgarden, a 21-year-old rookie from Nashville, Tenn., has shown flashes of promise this season, and Ed Carpenter of Indiana is the only owner/driver in the series.

Hunter-Reay is the veteran, and he is finally hitting his stride in his ninth season at open-wheel's highest level.

His three wins this year are a career best, and it has doubled his win total in IndyCar. He has also led a 1-2 American finish in the last two races, leading teammate Andretti across the finish line at Iowa, and beating Kimball on Sunday at Toronto.

Prior to the Iowa race, Americans hadn't finished 1-2 in the series since the 2006 Indy 500 when Hornish defeated Andretti.

Michael Andretti, owner of the Andretti Autosport organization that fields cars for Hunter-Reay, Marco Andretti and Canadian James Hinchcliffe, believes the lack of proper development has slowed American drivers.

Michael Andretti fields teams in all three IndyCar ladder systems.

"The farm system, frankly, hasn't been great," he said. "We haven't had a real good one for a long time, and now we are finally starting to see more Americans coming along and see the fruits of that labor."

Paterno's Legacy Likely Damaged Beyond Repair

For decades Penn State was considered special, immune from the corruption of college athletics by virtue of Joe Paterno's high ideals, long list of victories and even longer list of graduates.

Now, to many people outside Penn State and even some insiders, that's been exposed as an illusion.


A blistering report released Thursday found Paterno helped hush up allegations of child sex abuse against a former assistant that went back more than a decade, sacrificing the ideals he preached to protect his football program. Paterno, former FBI Director Louis Freeh said, was "an integral part of this active decision to conceal."

"I doubt anybody could have imagined this. In eight months, he's gone from St. Joe to something approaching the devil," said Frank Fitzpatrick, a Philadelphia Inquirer columnist and author of two books on Paterno and Penn State, including a biography last year, "Pride of the Lions."

"The contrast between the ethical standards we always associated with Joe and the complete lack of them in how this was handled — if what the Freeh Report says is true, and I have no reason to doubt it is, to sacrifice kids for the reputation of a football program, that's pretty despicable. I can't imagine anything more shocking than that."

clamor online to remove Paterno's statue outside Beaver Stadium, and USA Today columnist Christine Brennan called on Penn State to drop football for at least a year until the university has addressed the failings that led to the scandal.

There could still be more fallout from court cases criminal charges against two administrators, civil suits from victims of Jerry Sandusky — and the NCAA has yet to decide whether it will weigh in on the scandal or not.

"reasonable" conclusions. Some people, beginning with Paterno's family, have argued with conviction that such a standard sets the bar too low. Sad to say — especially from those of us who pleaded against a rush to judgment — but in a story from which the word "reasonable" has largely been absent, nearly every one of those conclusions rings true.

The most important of those arrives on page 48. It's the one that puts the lie to so much of what he would say after the scope of the scandal spilled into the public.

Contrary to Paterno's claims - including his testimony before a grand jury it becomes clear that he was aware of a 1998 investigation of Sandusky by law-enforcement authorities that failed to result in charges. In an e-mail titled "Joe Paterno," athletic director Tim Curley wrote the following to Gary Schultz, the university's vice president of business and finance, and Penn State president Graham Spanier:

Spanier, Schultz, Paterno and Curley "repeatedly concealed critical facts" about Sandusky's abuse from authorities and others "in order to avoid the consequences of bad publicity…."

"I have touched base with the coach," Curley informed his colleagues. "Keep us posted. Thanks."

The next three pages contain several more e-mail requests from Curley for an update: "Coach is anxious to know where it stands," he wrote.

It takes another 120 pages or so to complete Paterno's transformation from interested observer to willful, out-of-touch tyrant. That moment, too, is revealed in another of Curley's e-mails, this one in 2001, after assistant coach Mike McQueary witnessed Sandusky and a boy naked in a shower at the football complex and told Paterno at his home the following morning.

The coach listens to the report and did as he was required, eventually notifying his superior. Paterno passed the immediate legal test, but not the ethical one. Worse, he would maintain until his

death that his involvement ended there. In truth, it only deepened.

Soon after the incident, Curley, Schultz and Spanier decided to go ahead and report Sandusky to the state Department of Child Welfare, then abruptly abandoned the plan. Curley said in an e-mail that his change of heart came about "after giving it more thought and talking it over with Joe."

Paterno could be as persuasive as he wanted whenever he wanted to be. Signs of Paterno's influence at Penn State well beyond the football program bubble up repeatedly in the rest of the report as well as all over the campus, and just as importantly, anytime you ask

those who were around him for any length of time. They talk about learning lessons in accountability that were taught by example instead of slogans scribbled on a blackboard.

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
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

ANAHEIM, Calif. • Teemu Selanne says he's far from finished with hockey, and the Anaheim Ducks are grateful he's still not feeling his age.

The 42-year-old Selanne agreed Thursday to a one-year, \$4.5 million deal with the Ducks to return for the 20th NHL season of his remarkable career.

Selanne could end up being the NHL's oldest active player next season, yet he shows no signs of slowing expected after he played all 82 games — the oldest player in NHL history to do that without injuries.

"It was a little bit easier than last year," said Selanne, who needed offseason knee surgery a year ago. "Last year, I had my knee and wasn't sure if I was able to play again. I just enjoy the game so much."

He's in the middle of a long summer break after Anaheim missed the playoffs, but the Ducks surged in the second half of the year under new coach Bruce Boudreau. Selanne was impressed by Boudreau's energy and management technique, and he believes the Ducks are ready for a rebound after winning just one postseason round in the past five seasons since their championship. "Our team, we want to win again, so that was a part of my decision, too," Selanne said. "I truly believe we have all the pieces. We obviously have some unfinished business from last year, and I can't wait to start the season again." Selanne could be the NHL's senior player this winter if goalie Dwayne Roloson – nine months older than Selanne - remains unsigned, although 47-year-old Czech goalie Dominik Hasek is entertaining the prospect of an NHL comeback. Yet Selanne's production, enthusiasm and fitness have remained incredibly steady as he advances into his 40s. He has scored at least 25 goals in six of his last seven seasons with Anaheim, and Selanne was the NHL's eighth-leading scorer in 2010-11 with 80 points.

"For me right now the only thing I'm worried about is myself and preparing myself to go out and represent my country and step up and wear the stars and stripes and try to swim as fast as I can," Phelps said Thursday at media day for the U.S. Olympic swim-

Bob Bowman, Phelps' long-time coach, laughed when asked if he put Clary up to making those comments. The coach said there wasn't much reaction with Phelps just focusing on what he's doing. A year ago, Clary won silver in the 400 individual medley at the world championships in Shanghai. Phelps and Ryan Lochte are the two Americans in that event in London, part of a showdown Lochte compared to Michael Jordan versus Magic Johnson.

The Finnish Flash's real numbers are much more impressive: Selanne is the 19th-leading scorer in NHL history with 1,406 points in two decades spent mostly in Anaheim, his home for parts of 13 seasons. "I just enjoy the game so much," Selanne said. "I still feel I have something to give."

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"One can relish the varied idiocy of human action during a panic to the full, for, while it is a time of great tragedy, nothing is being lost but money.²

— J.K. Galbraith

We have all seen hands where you are declarer in three notrump and you need to hold up your ace for at least one round to cut the defenders' communications

Then there are some moreadvanced hands where you have K-J-x and the lead is a small card to the queen. You may have to duck to sever opponents' communications (when the suit breaks 5-2 and you need to lose the lead to your right-hand opponent). Today's deal takes that principle a step further.

Against three no-trump doubled, West led the heart four to the jack and queen. When declarer discovered the bad diamond break, he played a club, but East rose with the ace and played a second heart for one down.

Declarer felt that he had been unlucky, not only because of the diamond break, but also because West had not led spades, and because East had a second heart to play. However, a careful look at the spot-card led at trick one would have told him East had two hearts. If the heart jack was singleton, then West's initial holding would have been A-K-9-7-4-3, from which he would have led the seven.

So hearts are 5-2, East must have the club ace, and diamonds strongly rate to be breaking badly, given the final double. Declarer should have ducked the heart at trick one. Now nothing can beat him if he leads a club to the jack after finding the bad diamond break.

Today is Friday, July 13, the 195th day of 2012. There are 171 days left in the year. Today's Highlight:

On July 13, 1787, the Congress of the Confederation adopted the Northwest Ordinance, which established a government in the Northwest Territory, an area corresponding to the present-day Midwest and Upper Midwest.



On this date:

In 1793, French revolutionary writer Jean-Paul Marat was stabbed to death in his bath by Charlotte Corday, who was executed four days later.

In 1812, New York became the first U.S. city to adopt regulations on how pawnbrokers could conduct business

In 1863, deadly rioting against the Civil War military draft erupted in New York City. (The insurrection was put down three days later.)

In 1923, a sign consisting 50-foot-tall letters of spelling out "HOLLY-WOODLAND" was dedicated in the Hollywood Hills to promote a subdivision (the last four letters were removed in 1949).

In 1939, Frank Sinatra made his first commercial recording, "From the Bottom of My Heart" and "Melan-choly Mood," with Harry James and his Orchestra for the Brunswick label.

In 1960, John F. Kennedy won the Democratic presidential nomination on the first ballot at his party's convention in Los Angeles.

In 1965, President Lyndon B. Johnson appointed Thurgood Marshall to be U.S. solicitor general.

In 1972, George McGovern received the Democratic presidential nomination at the party's convention in Miami Beach.

In 1977, a blackout lasting 25 hours hit the New York City area.

In 1978, Lee Iacocca was fired as president of Ford Motor Co. by chairman Henry Ford II.

In 1985, "Live Aid," an international rock concert in London, Philadelphia, Moscow and Sydney, took place to raise money for Africa's starving people.

In 1999, Angel Maturino Resendiz, suspected of being the "Railroad Killer," surren-

dered in El Paso, Texas. (Resendiz was executed in 2006.)

Ten years ago: The nation's governors opened their summer meeting in Boise, Idaho, with high health care costs the main topic. Photographer Yousuf Karsh died in Boston at age 93

Five years ago: Former media mogul Conrad Black was convicted in Chicago of swindling the Hollinger International newspaper empire out of millions of dollars. (Black was sentenced to 6¹/₂ years in federal prison, but had his sentence reduced to three years; he was freed in May 2012.) Family prayer services and a huge public outpouring in Austin, Texas, ushered in three days of memorial ceremonies honoring the late Lady Bird Johnson.

One year ago: California became the first state in the nation to add lessons about gays and lesbians to social studies classes in public schools under a measure signed by Gov. Jerry Brown. Three coordinated bombings in India's busy financial capital killed 26 people in the worst terror attack in the country since the 2008 Mumbai siege. Abby Wambach broke a tense tie with a thunderous header in the 79th minute, and the United States earned its first trip to the Women's World Cup final since winning it in 1999 with a 3-1 victory over France. (Japan, which went on to win the Cup, upset Sweden 3-1 in the other semifinal.)





DEAR ABBY: My son is 24 and was honorably discharged as a corporal after a four-year enlistment in the U.S. Marine Corps. He was deployed twice to Iraq. Since his return he has been attending community college, but he lacks the focus and is bored. He has recently announced that he would like to return to the military.



When he approached the Marine recruiter to re-enlist, he was told he's ineligible due to tattoos on his arms. After four years of honorable and devoted service, this rejection is insulting. He has announced to family that he will pursue enlistment in the French Foreign Legion next year.

This is very distressing to me, and I'm sick with worry about his well-being. I do not want him to go off to fight in a foreign military. Can you offer any words of wisdom?

- WORRIED MOM IN GAINESVILLE, FLA. **DEAR WORRIED MOM:**

Encourage your son to explore enlistment opportunities with other branches of the U.S. military regarding their tattoo policies. However, while you and I might consider his desire to join the French Foreign Legion to be an extreme overreaction to his rejection by the Marines. as an adult he has a right to make that choice. If he goes through with his plan, he may see less action than he would as a member of the U.S. military.

While I can't make this easier for you as a parent, I do have this advice to offer. Tell your son it would be in his best interest to learn some basic French before he goes.

DEAR ABBY: My twin sister and I have lived across the country from each other for many years, but have remained close through phone calls. Two years ago she began talking politics, and we realized we differ on the topic. I asked her if we could not talk so much about the subject and just "agree to disagree."

I have never argued with them. but feel they are making me an outsider. How can I get them back without compromising my own views? Twenty years ago, my sister and I differed on some religious points, and she wanted nothing to do with me for the next two years. It took our mother's death to get us back together. Help! - LOVES MY TWIN **DEAR LOVES:** While you and your twin were wombmates, nowhere is it written that because of your twinship you must think in unison. For the time being, my advice is to calm down. This being an election year, feelings are running high. Keep the lines of communication open as far as your sister and brother will allow. After the election is over, your relationship may normalize. However, if it doesn't, then it's important you remember that the experiences we have as we travel life's path can turn even twins into very different people. Accept that, and your heart will be less fragile.



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



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


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
