Man Shot in Chest with Shotgun

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TWIN FALLS • A 27-year-old man is being treated for injuries sustained from a gunshot wound early Monday morning.

Twin Falls police responded to the 1000 block of Hoops Street in Twin Falls at about 4:25 a.m. Monday for a call about a male subject at the door who was refusing to leave, Lt. Craig Stotts said.

The man, identified as Joseph Cossette, was reportedly trying to kick down the door, Stotts said. Soon after the first call, officers received an update that shots were fired and Joseph Cossette was injured.

Earlier in the evening, just before midnight, police responded to a domestic battery call in the 400 block of Ash Street North involving Joseph and Serena Cossette, Stotts said. At that time, Serena Cossette, 32, went to the Hoops Street address along with her children, Stotts said.

Stotts said Joseph Cossette was shot with a 12-gauge shotgun slug round and was transported to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center.

The extent of his injuries and the name of the suspected shooter were not released Monday due to the on-going investigation, Stotts said.

A woman identifying herself as Serena Cossette insisted the details of the incident as reported by police are incorrect in a phone message left at the *Times-News* Monday. Her statement could not be verified; a call back by the *Times-News* was not returned in time for this report.

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TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls Canal Co. shareholders began receiving one-sixth less water

than their usual allocation Monday.

"The snowpack is pretty much gone so we are using heavy storage, although we still have flow from springs," General Manager Brian Olmstead said. "It's a double whammy: 2012

has had a lower snowpack and we've had a hotter summer than normal."

He doesn't believe the cutback will cause problems for any of the company's 4,400 members.

"I think they will do fine," Olmstead said. "We waited until July 16 because we wanted

TWIN FALLS CITY COUNCIL

Parking Management in Downtown Twin Falls to See a Myriad of Changes

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TWIN FALLS • The meters are gone, but downtown parking issues aren't solved just yet.

On Monday, the Twin Falls City Council approved changes to downtown parking management, resolving some unanswered questions that arose after the council eliminated metered parking in June.

Mitch Humble, community development director for the city, presented a management plan to the council that included changing out leased parking for parking passes and eventually changing outdated city code related to parking.

Currently, the city's lots are a mix of free customer parking and leased parking for business owners and employees. Earlier this summer, the council voted to remove parking meters from downtown, creating more free parking in front of businesses.

Through the approved management plan, the city will develop a pay system for parking passes and clearly label parking spaces with both color and text. Free parking

will still be limited to three hours at a time.

The city retained its parking enforcer, giving him new responsibilities in the code enforcement department.

The council also discussed how to dispose of the parking meters, with Councilman Chris Talkington suggesting selling them to another city and Councilwoman Rebecca Mills-Sojka hoping to donate them to civic clubs to help them raise money. Ultimately, the council voted to auction them off at a later date to raise funds for downtown projects. Watch the *Times-News* for details.

Also Monday, the council:

Heard a presentation on the city pool budget.

Approved a resolution allowing the city to purchase items for a radio communications tower, building and generator project on the open market.

Discussed the city budget with city staff and managers. The council made no decisions on the budget, which is scheduled for final approval on Aug. 20.

Idaho Settles Suit with Former Transportation Department Head

BOISE (AP) • Idaho has agreed to settle a discrimination and wrongful termination lawsuit filed by Pam Lowe, the former head of the Transportation Department and the agency's first female chief.

ITD officials and Lowe confirmed the settlement on Monday, but neither party shared financial and other terms of the agreement.

"All I can tell you is this has been resolved, and I'm pleased with the resolution. I can't talk about what's in it. I just can tell you that I'm very pleased to have it resolved," Lowe told the *Spokesman-Review*.

Lowe, who is now working as financial director for the state Department of Transportation in Delaware, was fired by the Transportation Board in May 2009, a little more than two years after being appointed to the post by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter.

Her termination was preceded by criticism from lawmakers during the legislative session as Otter and some lawmakers were considering an increase in the gas tax and other revenue sources to bolster the agency's budget for road and bridge maintenance. Some Republican lawmakers even worked to get support for a bill that would give Otter power to replace Lowe, claiming she didn't do enough to lobby for the initiative.

Air Show Asks for Cash Advance from City

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TWIN FALLS • The Blue Angels are still coming to Twin Falls, but parts of the show could be scaled back.

On Monday, the Twin Falls City Council voted to advance an additional \$40,000 to organizers of the Magic Valley Air Show, to be held July 28-29.

There's a catch: At next week's meeting, organizers must present to the council a plan to reduce \$20,000 from the budget in the last week before the show if ticket sales are not on track.

The amount is less than what air show director Jim O'Donnell requested. At Monday's meeting, O'Donnell asked for the city to pay for expenses that come up between now and the event, "within budget."

When the council asked how much that may be, O'Donnell said he didn't know, as some pledged sponsorships haven't yet been paid.

O'Donnell said the majority of the show's revenue will come from ticket sales, most of which come through in the week before the air show. The show organizers would use the ticket sales to

pay back the city, O'Donnell said.

The total budget for the air show, which is independent from the city's budget, is about \$361,000, said City Manager Travis Rothweiler. That's shaved down from the original \$421,000 budget. Donations and sponsorships have taken care of some of that, but organizers need \$187,000 to pay for other parts of the show, like hotel rooms for performers.

"In a sense, it's like a leap of faith that ticket revenues are going to come in and be generated," Rothweiler said.

The 2008 air show generated a \$21,513 deficit, paid for by Twin Falls County and the city.

While the council commended O'Donnell for his leadership in organizing the event, some expressed concern about issuing a blank check of taxpayer dollars to the show.

"I do not like the idea of an open checkbook," said councilman Jim Munn.

After the meeting, O'Donnell said he was disappointed, but added that he would find cuts to make.

"We can do it. We will do it," he said.

Sunday Crash Victim Still in Critical Condition

BOISE • A 71-year-old woman who was involved in a fatal crash Sunday afternoon is still listed in critical condition at Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise.

Idaho State Police investigated the crash Sunday and said Paula Greene, 71, of Filer, drifted out of her lane while driving on U.S. Highway 30 near the Chobani plant in Twin Falls. Greene collided head-on with a car driven by 65-year-old Raquel Solis.

Solis was pronounced dead on the scene and her passenger, 28-year-old Luke Solis, was transported to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center in fair condition. Monday afternoon, Luke Solis was in stable condition and was transferred to St. Luke's Boise Medical Center, said St. Luke's spokeswoman Laura Stewart.

Lt. Kevin Haight with ISP said the crash was being investigated and charges could be filed once Greene recovered, though he noted her injuries were "extremely critical."

Pay for Xavier Charter School Employees to Be Cut 10 Percent

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TWIN FALLS • With a new school year on the horizon, Xavier Charter School employees will take a 10 percent pay cut.

In past years, the Twin Falls public charter school paid employees more than the Idaho State Department of Education's salary schedule.

"Our budget is so tight this year that we reduced that down," Head of Schools Thad Biggers said.

The decision to cut teacher salaries was spurred by a combination of factors.

Business Manager Justin Lanting wrote in an email to the *Times-News* that Xavier's startup grant funding is gone now. That money was used to bump up teacher salaries.

Biggers said no teachers have left due to the pay cut, but it made it more difficult to attract new teachers.

In June, Xavier's board approved an approximately \$3.6 million budget for the coming year. Rent on the school's North College Road campus will remain a significant expense.

Xavier — which opened in 2007 and has about 650 students — leases a building from

Twin Falls School Development LLC. Rent for the coming school year totals nearly \$810,000.

School board Chairwoman Debbi Burr said the school isn't in an adversarial position with its landlord, but is looking for a more sustainable, long-term solution.

"Our single biggest issue, at least for our current facility, is that it's 25 percent of our operating budget," she said.

Steady Leadership

Going into next year, Biggers will remain in his role as head of schools after being appointed to the position in April.

Biggers — who used to be a lead teacher — manages day-to-day school operations. The part-time position will also allow him to teach for three hours a day next year.

"Honestly, that's one of

the things we like about the model," Burr said. "It really keeps people in the classroom."

Biggers will be paid \$55,000 under an annual contract, while three lead teachers each make \$50,000.

Before Biggers' appointment, consultant Mel Wiseman managed the school's operations for most of the school year. Now, he works with the school in an advisory role.

In January, Xavier transitioned into a European-style approach to school leadership with three different "schools" based on grade level, each with a lead teacher.

The goal is to provide stability after administrative turnover during the school's first few years.

Xavier's co-founder and first principal, Cindy Fulcher, was terminated in spring 2011 over a hiring dispute. And in the fall, new Principal Everett Bomgardner resigned after the school board recommended he should be fired due to policy and procedure violations.

Burr said there was a sense of unrest at the school in the fall.

"Parents didn't know where to go to if they needed help," she said.

Trustees OK Three-year Contract for CSI President

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TWIN FALLS • College of Southern Idaho president Jerry Beck will remain in his position under a new three-year contract.

CSI's board of trustees voted 3-0 Monday night to approve the two-page employment agreement. Trustees Allan Frost and Donna Brizee weren't at the meeting.

Beck's contract runs from

July 1 to June 30, 2015.

His annual salary is listed at \$204,294, and he'll receive a maximum of 30 vacation days per year.

Board Chairman Thad Sc holes said the contract includes a 2 percent increase in compensation — the same increase other CSI employees are getting during this fiscal year.

For permanent CSI employees, it's the first salary increase they've received since 2008.

Blaine Co. Deputy Seriously Injured after Man Fell on Him

KETCHUM • A Blaine County sheriff's detective is recovering at a Boise hospital after a man fell on him during a weekend event.

At about 1:45 a.m. Sunday, Ketchum police and fire personnel responded to two people with injuries just south of Main Street and Sun Valley Road in Ketchum at the Music and Arts Showcase Sun Valley event.

Ketchum Police Chief Steve Harkins said Sgt. Det. Corey Weatherly, with the Blaine County Sheriff's Office, was working a private security shift at the event when Austin B. Cruz, 20, of

Hailey fell from the roof above the deputy and landed on him.

Both men were seriously injured and transported to St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center.

Later, Weatherly was taken by air ambulance to Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise for further medical care. He was still hospitalized, as of this afternoon, Harkins said.

Ketchum police are investigating the incident. Drugs and alcohol are suspected as factors, Harkins said.

Harkins said he will release more information as the investigation continues.

Sealing Project on Blue Lakes Delayed until Next Week

them to finish up wheat and barley crops, and those are done."

He added the reduction still leaves irrigators "a good amount of water."

The reduced supply will continue through the summer so the company can preserve some water for next year, Olmstead said.

He said the reduction isn't unusual. "We've done it lots of times, but not for the last four years."

Lynn Harmon, general manager of Big Wood Canal Co. in Shoshone, said his company cut back earlier this year.

"Then, when the natural flow picked up, we were able to run for some time," he said. "Now we are on normal delivery."

The American Falls delivery was cut about 80 percent from May 18-June 1, Harmon said.

"The timing worked out good because most of them were on the first cutting of hay," he said.

Big Wood Canal Co. used storage early this year because the winter snowpack was light, Harmon added. The company serves between 1,000 and 1,200 shareholders.

Meanwhile, North Side Canal Co. based in Jerome has avoided cutting back water delivery so far this summer. But General Manager Ted Diehl said it might have to do so later this year.

"The worst effect will be next year if we don't get a big winter," he said. "The storage won't be good."

Mike Beus, water operations manager for the U.S.

Bureau of Reclamation in Burley, believes the past winter's snowpack wasn't that far from average.

"But then it suddenly got dry," he said. "We turned dry in the middle of March and snow usually accumulates until mid-April. We had a pretty good forecast into the runoff season and didn't get the rain on the watershed that you normally expect."

That caused irrigation demands to start early, especially in the upper Magic Valley, Beus said.

As part of managing the upper Snake River dam network, Reclamation conducts flood control releases in the spring to ensure enough room remains in the reservoirs for snowmelt. Beus doesn't believe the agency released too much water early this year, emphasizing that American Falls Reservoir "was full early in May, so we nailed that right on."

Any errors can be traced to the Palisades Reservoir flood control operation, Beus added, which runs under formal criteria. But he said flood releases from Palisades only amounted to "a tiny amount of water" compared with what was released during October, November and December 2011.

Reclamation data online shows the reservoir was back near its full 1,200,000-acre-foot capacity last month before starting to decline again.

It wasn't known Monday if Mini-Cassia area irrigation districts have had to cut back. Calls left with the Burley and Minidoka irrigation districts, which divert water at Minidoka Dam, were not returned Monday afternoon.

Twin Falls Man Charged with Solicitation of Rape

Editor's note: The following story contains graphic information that may offend some readers.

TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls man was accused of setting up and planning the rape of a woman by another man.

Justin Matthew Crawford, 32, was arrested and charged with solicitation of rape and solicitation of burglary. He was arraigned on the charges in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on Monday.

Crawford is known to the victim. The *Times-News* does not identify victims of sexual assault.

According to a police report, Twin Falls police were dispatched to a house on Wiseman Avenue Friday morning just after midnight for a disturbance call.

Once at the house, police spoke to a woman who said she was alone at home when the doorbell rang, the report states. According to the report, a man she didn't know was at the door and asked her name.

When she responded, the man allegedly replied, "I'm here for you," and forced his way into the house, the report states.

According to the report, the man then chased the woman through the house. The woman ran into the bedroom and grabbed a 9 mm handgun, but the man grabbed the gun, the report states. A shot was fired dur-

ing the struggle, traveling through the bed and ricocheting off some stairs, the report states. The woman's hand was also cut during the alleged attack, it states.

At that time, the man turned and ran out the front door before driving away at a high rate of speed, the report states.

On Saturday at about 3:45 p.m., officers were called to the same house on Wiseman, again for a disturbance call.

Officers arrived to find the woman holding a man at gunpoint in the living room, the report states.

According to the report, the woman had fired a single round from the gun, but did not hit the man. The man was then taken into custody for forcing his way into the house.

No charges relating to this incident against the man were found in an online court records search.

In an interview with police, the man allegedly said he was responding to an ad on Craigslist in the "casual encounters" section.

"The person posting the ad told him she wanted to be forcibly raped as that was a fantasy of hers," the man told police, according to the report.

According to the report, several emails were exchanged between the man and the person who posted

the ad. The man was then given the address on Wiseman.

"He was told to force his way inside and rape the woman there and not stop no matter how much she resisted," the report states.

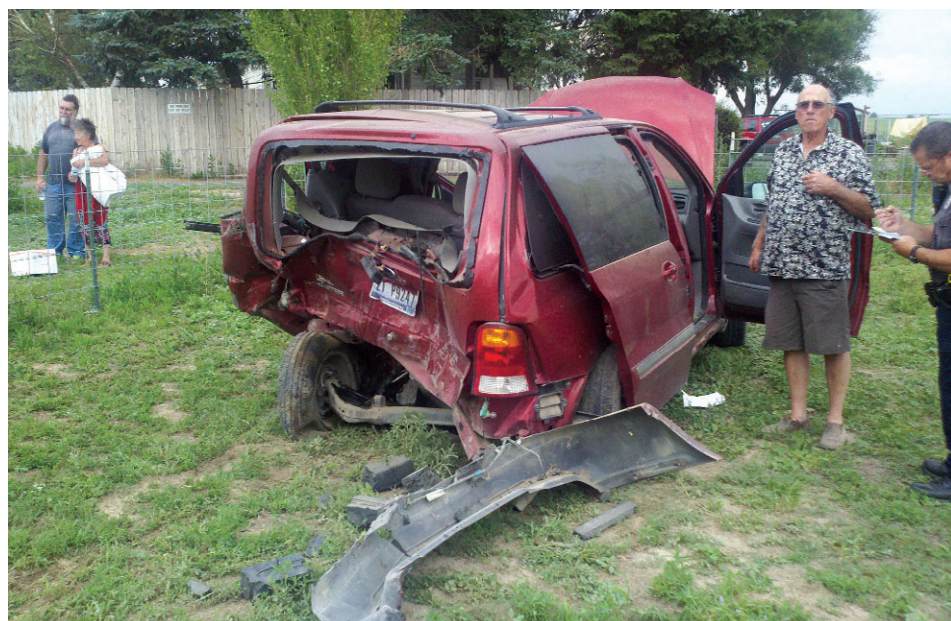
According to the report, the man allowed police to search his cellphone, including the email exchange regarding the ad.

Police discovered the emails purporting to be the woman actually originated from an email address belonging to Justin Crawford, the report states. The IP address for the computer the emails were sent from was located at the Army National Guard in Mountain Home, the report states. Crawford works for the National Guard, according to the report.

Police also searched phones in the Wiseman home and one belonging to Crawford. According to the report, Crawford eventually admitted to being involved in both of the entries into the house and the attempted rape of the woman.

He allegedly admitted to setting up the incidents using Craigslist and his email account, but declined to give specifics about the incidents.

Crawford was held at the Twin Falls County Jail Monday on \$100,000 bond. A preliminary hearing was scheduled for July 27.

At that time he allegedly fired several shots from a .22 rifle, from inside the closed garage.

"He didn't think the bullets would go through the garage door," Stotts said.

Stotts said Galbraith was cooperative with police.

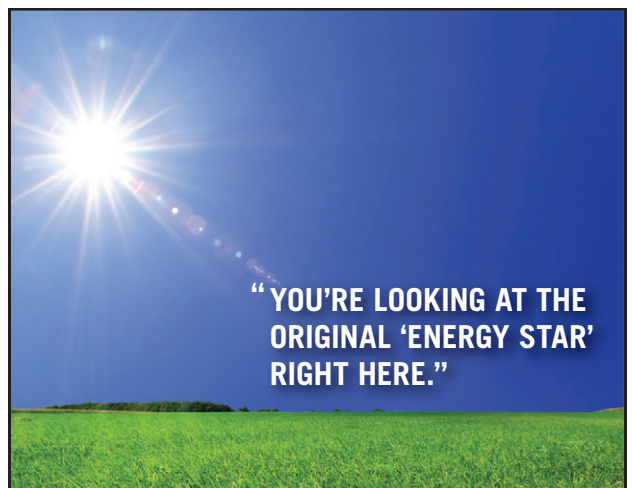

N. Idaho Farmers Deal with Flood

BONNERS FERRY (AP) • A group of farmers along the Kootenai River in Idaho's Panhandle blamed a rainy June for causing millions of dollars of damage and losses to their wheat, bluegrass, chickpea and barley crops.

Some growers also took aim at the management of Libby Dam in Montana, criticizing the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for caring more about managing flows to help threatened salmon and sturgeon than avoiding flooding the river valley downstream.

"There are some farmers who have taken a hell of a hit" Bob Olson, who farms 3,000 acres in the valley, told the *Coeur d'Alene Press*.

So far, Olson said, flooding and seepage from the river damaged about 50 acres of his crops. Other farmers in the area estimate the damage to cropland in the valley to be more than 5,000 acres, mostly in winter wheat crops valued at an estimated \$4 million.

"Every one of the farmers in the valley has some problems. Some are worse than others," Olson said, adding some growers may have trouble overcoming the financial loss.

"If some of them had crop insurance, they're probably going to be OK," he said. "Crop insurance is something we don't normally buy in this valley because you don't normally need it."

The valley — bounded by steep mountains to the east and west — provides ideal conditions for farming. Growers benefit from the soil, altitude, latitude, temperature and annual precipitation, and the valley has long been known for its hops farming and connection to beer giant Anheuser-Busch Co.

The Kootenai River flows out of the reservoir behind Libby Dam. The flows travel downstream to Bonners Ferry and north into Canada, eventually dumping into Kootenay Lake.

June brought record rainfall to the area.

Bonners Ferry recorded 5.24 inches of rain last month, topping the old

record of 3.96 inches.

Along with the wet month, dam managers were dealing with high inflows into the reservoir from heavy winter snows and spring rains. Inflows were the highest recorded since the dam was built in the mid-1970s, officials said.

"The real wild card that we saw this year was the intense precipitation we saw through the month of June" said Army Corps water manager Kevin Shaffer, at the Army Corps' Seattle district office.

Precipitation that month in the watershed was up to five times the average, making it a challenging year for the Army Corps to do forecasting, he said.

Stephen Covey, "7 Habits" Author, Dies

SALT LAKE CITY • Considered a pioneer in the self-help genre aimed at helping readers become more productive in their lives, author Stephen R. Covey had an enormous impact on both the corporate world and the personal lives of millions.

The well-known motivational speaker and author of the best-selling "The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People" which sold more than 20 million copies in 38 languages, died Monday at a hospital in Idaho Falls, Idaho, due to complications from a bicycle accident in April.

"In his final hours, he was surrounded by his loving wife and each one of his children and their spouses, just as he always wanted," the family said in a statement. He was 79.

Covey was hospitalized in April after being knocked unconscious in the bike crash on a steep road in the foothills of Provo, Utah, about 45 miles south of Salt Lake City.

"This was one of the first books in recent times that was really directed at prioritizing the way you worked, so you could be more effective as an individual," said Adrian Zackheim, president and publisher of Portfolio, a business imprint at Penguin Group (USA). "It wasn't about how to be a manager or how or to run a compa-

ny. It was about how to conduct yourself.

"Covey's influence was very pervasive," added Zackheim, a rival publisher. "It was a book that applied to everybody. You would hear about whole organizations where everybody in the company was expected to read the book."

Bookseller Barnes & Noble Inc. called Covey "an influence in both the business and self-help genres as he imparted a system and approach to life that worked in business and personal situations."

In "The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People," Covey writes about the need to be proactive, to "begin with the end in mind," habit No. 2, and "to seek first to understand, then be understood," habit No. 5.

"Remember, to learn and not to do is really not to learn. To know and not to do is really not to know," Covey wrote in the foreword.

"We are deeply saddened by the passing of Stephen R. Covey. His seminal work, "The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People," will forever be one of the most influential books in the field of self-improvement," Carolyn K. Reidy, president and CEO of Simon & Schuster, Inc., which published his book, said in a statement.

Covey also was the author of several other best sellers, including "First Things First," "Principle-Centered Leadership," "The 7 Habits of Highly Effective Families," and "The 8th Habit: From Effectiveness to Greatness."

Idaho Inmates Go Out of State

BOISE (AP) • Idaho prison officials are sending inmates out-of-state for the first time in nearly seven years.

The state Department of Correction confirmed Monday that a contract was finalized last week with one of the nation's largest private prison companies to house up to 800 inmates at a Colorado lockup, with the goal of preventing overcrowding at home. Idaho's already full prisons hold about 8,100 inmates.

Prison officials last sent inmates out-of-state in December 2005, but problems in Texas prompted their return.

The Department of Correction has since implemented additional procedures to better watch inmates being housed outside

Idaho, state prisons chief Brent Reinke said.

"I think we have our monitoring process down much tighter than we did before," Reinke said.

The last time Idaho sent inmates out-of-state, citing a lack of prison beds, they were all returned home by January 2009. The state now finds itself with a similar predicament, with an estimated 900 inmates being housed in county jails.

Reinke's department indicated earlier this year that officials may have to again start sending inmates out-of-state at the end of 2012, but the prison growth rate accelerated faster than officials expected.

In comparison, about 220 inmates were added to the state's prisons during the previous five years.

Under the contract final-

ized last Wednesday, Idaho is expected to pay Corrections Corporation of America more than \$4.8 million in the current fiscal year to house inmates at the Kit Carson Correctional Center in Burlington, Colo.

The move was a last resort, Reinke said.

"It's not an easy thing for the inmate population, it's difficult for the department from a monitoring standpoint, and these are dollars that we don't have that we're having to spend," he said.

"So, it's difficult from a budgetary standpoint as well."

Idaho already has a business relationship with CCA. The Tennessee-based company operates Idaho's biggest prison, The Idaho State Correctional Institution located outside of Boise.

Black Creek Blaze Likely Caused by Gunfire

BOISE (AP) • Authorities say target shooting is likely to blame for a small wildfire in southwestern Idaho.

The Bureau of Land Management says the fire near the Blacks Creek Reservoir, southeast of Boise, burned five acres Sunday before it was controlled.

The BLM is still investigating but says there is conclusive evidence gunfire

from target practice caused the blaze.

The Idaho Statesman reports the fire was spotted at 3 p.m. and five hours later, 20 firefighters were still at the scene mopping up hot spots and making sure flyaway embers didn't spark another blaze.

Idaho is among states where gunfire is a growing concern for those trying to

prevent wildfires. Officials believe target shooting or other firearms use sparked at least 21 wildfires in Utah and nearly a dozen in Idaho.

Democrats Risk Tax Hikes for All

WASHINGTON • Democrats are going all-in in a fiscal game of chicken, saying they'll let everyone's income taxes rise on Jan. 1 and slash defense spending amid 8-plus percent unemployment if Republicans continue to balk at raising taxes just on those making more than \$250,000 a year.

The brave face is being adopted as President Barack Obama and Congress come to grips with the possibility that gridlock and stalemate will result in the government careening off a fiscal cliff in January with automatic tax increases, spending cuts and an approaching exhaustion of borrowing ability.

"If we can't get a good deal, a balanced deal that calls on the wealthy to pay their fair share, then I will absolutely continue this debate into 2013 rather than lock in a long-term deal this year that throws middle-class families under the bus," Sen. Patty Murray, D-Wash., said in a speech Monday.

Murray's salvo was the latest in an almost daily back-and-forth between top Republicans and Democrats over the one-two punch facing the economy in January: expiration of the Bush tax cuts and the imposition of \$110 billion in automatic spending cuts, half coming from defense.

"They're ready and willing to go right off the fiscal cliff if they don't get their way," said Senate GOP Leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky. "Because they think it will make it likelier they'll get their way."

McConnell was an architect of the automatic spending cuts, which were designed to prod a deficit-reduction supercommittee to reach an agreement rather than actually take effect. The supercommittee failed and the idea of automatic cuts is now an unpopular one.

The gamesmanship also includes votes in the Republican-controlled House and Democratic-run Senate over the next two weeks on competing one-year extensions of former President George Bush's 2001 and 2003 tax cuts.

The GOP version extends the full range of the Bush tax cuts.

Radioactive Material Scan Still Not in Place

WASHINGTON • The Obama administration has failed to meet a legal deadline for scanning all shipping containers for radioactive material before they reach the United States, a requirement aimed at strengthening maritime security and preventing terrorists from smuggling a nuclear device into any of the nation's 300 sea and river ports.

The Department of Homeland Security was given until July 1 to ensure that all inbound shipping containers are screened at foreign ports.

But in a little-noticed action, the department's secretary, Janet Napolitano, informed Congress in May that she was invoking a two-year blanket exemption because the screening is proving too costly.

Syrian rebels push war to Damascus. Syrian rebels fired grenades at tanks and troops while regime armor shelled Damascus neighborhoods on Monday, sending terrified families fleeing the most sustained and widespread fighting in the capital since the start of the uprising 16 months ago. A ring of fierce clashes nearly encircled the heavily guarded capital as rebels seeking to overthrow President Bashar Assad pushed the civil war that has been building in Syria's impoverished provinces closer to the seat of power.

N. Korean army chief relieved of all posts. Kim Jong Un's top military official — a key mentor to North Korea's new young leader — has been removed from all posts because of illness, state media said Monday. At least one analyst speculated that a more likely reason for Ri Yong Ho's departure is Kim's desire to put his own mark on the government he inherited from his father late last year. The decision to relieve Ri of his duties was made at a Workers' Party meeting Sunday, according to the North's official Korean Central News Agency. It was not immediately clear who would take Ri's place, and the North Korean media dispatch did not elaborate on Ri's condition or future. Ri was vice marshal of the Korean People's Army.

Drought Grips Half the US

WALTONVILLE, Ill. • The nation's widest drought in decades is spreading, with more than half of the continental United States now in some stage of drought and most of the rest enduring abnormally dry conditions.

Only in the 1930s and the 1950s has a drought covered more land, according to federal figures released Monday. So far, there's little risk of a Dust Bowl-type catastrophe, but crop losses could mount if rain doesn't come soon.

In its monthly drought report, the National Climatic Data Center in Asheville, N.C., announced that 55 percent of the country was in a moderate to extreme drought at the end of June. The parched conditions expanded last month in the West, the Great Plains and the Midwest, fueled by the 14th warmest and 10th driest June on record, the report said.

Topsoil has turned dry while "crops, pastures and rangeland have deteriorated at a rate rarely seen in the last 18 years," the report said.

The percentage of affected land is the largest since December 1956, when 58 percent of the country was covered by drought, and it rivals even some years in the Dust Bowl era of the 1930s, though experts point out that this year's weather has been milder than that period, and farming practices have been vastly improved since then.

In southern Illinois, Kenny Brummer has lost 800 acres of corn that he grows to feed his 400 head of cattle and 30,000 hogs. Now he's scrambling to find hundreds of thousands of bushels of replacement feed.

Millions Spent on empty Katrina Lots

NEW ORLEANS • More than 3,000 lots flooded by Hurricane Katrina and bought with federal money in an emergency bailout sit idle across this city — a multimillion-dollar drain on federal, state and city coffers that lends itself to no easy solution.

An Associated Press examination of the properties sold to the government by homeowners abandoning New Orleans after the catastrophic 2005 flood has found that about \$86 million has been spent on 5,100 abandoned parcels. And there's no end in sight to maintenance costs for most of the 3,100 properties that remain unsold.

This portfolio of urban wasteland and blight represents part of the storm's difficult legacy that persists nearly seven years later.

And with federal funding for maintenance running out, there's concern the lots could fall into deeper neglect when this cash-strapped city is forced to pay for upkeep and that they could contribute to New Orleans's staggering blight. At last count the city found an estimated 43,000 blighted properties, according to a city-sponsored analysis of U.S. Postal Service data.

"Right now nobody on those 3,000-plus properties is contributing. It's costing the city and state government to maintain them. Police got to go out there, run kids out of there, drug-users," said Errol Williams, the tax assessor in New Orleans. "That's a cost to the city. If they sell one, it comes back on the tax rolls, I'm happy."

Until now, the properties have been managed by the Louisiana Land Trust, an agency set up using federal funds.

Jeffrey J. Thomas, a land-use lawyer on former Mayor Ray Nagin's rebuilding team, said the city needs to be creative. "Maybe they should make them into ponds to store water. Make them into parks or community gardens," he said.

Donald Vallee, a longtime New Orleans developer, complained that city officials had not acted fast enough.

"How many years does it take them to do something?" said Vallee, who also sits on the Louisiana Land Trust board.

He advocated selling the lots at auction. Sitting on the properties, he said, was a "pure waste of money."

Every month, LLT spends about \$88 to cut the grass at each location. Other expenses range from insurance to pest control.

Since 2007, when the first homes were bought, \$34 million has been spent on maintenance, \$4.5 million on security and \$9.1 million on overhead costs in New Orleans, according to LLT. In addition, some \$38 million has been spent on demolishing 3,607 homes beyond repair and tearing up 1,256 slabs.

Visits by a reporter to neighborhoods hit the hardest by the flood found these orphaned lots are contributing to blight and the checkerboard-like rebuilding still dragging on in parts of the city.

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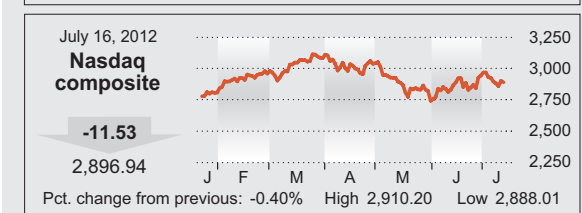
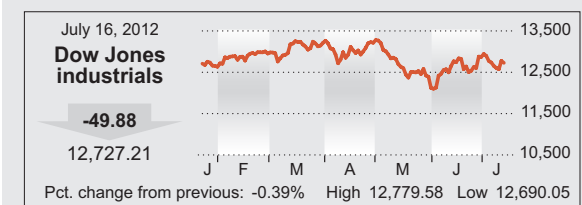

Livestock Producers Brace for Higher Corn Feed Costs

TWIN FALLS • An early start to the planting season and higher acreage had many livestock producers hoping for lower feed costs this year. But those hopes are evaporating as the Midwest corn crop shrivels.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture surprised traders and producers alike by lowering its estimate of the 2012 corn crop by 20 bushels per acre. Commodity traders in the Midwest who watched the crop tassel during extreme heat and dryness were expecting to see a 10 bushel per acre reduction.

The USDA is not known for making large changes to the corn crop projection in July, so it was the size of the cut more than the reduction itself that got the market's attention.

"This solidifies what the trade has been thinking," said Jim Bower, president of Bower Trading Co. in Lafayette, Ind. "This gives the market more certainty because USDA didn't wait until later in the season to cut yields."

Traders are also worried about the size of cuts yet to come, especially as harvest begins. Bower said he won't be surprised to see actual yields come in at less than 140 bushels per acre. "We're running out of time and water here," he said.

While the latest grain balance sheet may have given grain traders more confidence that USDA recognizes the crop is in trouble, many dairy producers in southern Idaho were caught unaware. Just last month, USDA forecasters pegged the average national corn yield at more than 166 bushels per acre and many expected corn prices to sag to around \$4 per bushel.

Instead, producers may see feed price increases top what they experienced in 2009. Skyrocketing feed costs combined with slack demand and falling milk prices put many dairies

deeply in debt, a situation some were just starting to recover from.

Although relatively little corn grain is grown in southern Idaho, corn is used to set the price of other feed ingredients such as hay and corn silage. Today's corn price (the September 2012 corn futures contract closed Friday at \$7.40 per bushel) means local dairies are paying \$325 per ton for corn delivered to their farm. Dairy-quality hay prices have jumped from \$180 to \$220 per ton since corn began moving higher, and corn silage will likely reach \$5 per ton higher this fall than it was a year ago.

That translates into an average break-even price of \$18 per hundred-weight (cwt.) for milk, said Rick Naerebout, a dairy business consultant in Twin Falls. Unfortunately, milk futures prices are around \$16 per cwt. and aren't expected to reach \$18 per cwt. until August. And it will take a lot of cheese sales to move prices that high, Naerebout added. USDA is forecasting an all-milk price of \$17.05 to \$17.35 per cwt. for 2012, a level that is well below escalating production costs.

Cattle feeders are also feeling the pinch of higher feed costs, but are somewhat better able to manage their risks. Cattle feeders price corn as they buy cattle, which allows them to adjust the price they pay for cattle based on corn prices. In general, for every 50 cents per bushel more in corn price, feeder cattle prices drop by \$2.50 per cwt.

"They're hedging and they're managing their risk," said John Nalivka, a beef marketing consultant based in Vale, Ore. "But it's not good."

Feedlots were losing, on average, \$200 per head even before USDA cut the corn crop projection. That's helping to push cattle prices down. Steers are selling for around \$115 per cwt. this week, down \$3 from last year.

"These corn prices are creating havoc with the industry," Nalivka said.

US Economic Outlook Dims as Retail Sales Continue Fall

Americans cut their spending at retail businesses for a third straight month, as a weak job market made consumers more cautious.

WASHINGTON • The outlook for the U.S. economy appeared dimmer Monday after a report that Americans spent less at retail businesses for a third straight month in June.

The report led some economists to downgrade their estimates for economic growth in the April-June quarter. Many now think the economy grew even less than in the first quarter of the year, when it expanded at a sluggish 1.9 percent annual rate.

Spending in June fell in nearly every major category — from autos, furniture and appliances to building, garden supplies and department stores. Overall, retail sales slid 0.5 percent from May to June, the Commerce Department said.

Retail sales hadn't fallen for three straight months since the fall of 2008, at the height of the financial crisis.

The weak U.S. spending figures were released on the same day that the International Monetary Fund slightly lowered its outlook for global growth over the next two years.

Stocks fell after the Commerce report was issued. The Dow Jones industrial average sank 74 points in early trading. Broader indexes also declined. Later in the day, stocks regained some of their losses.

"However hard you look, there's just no good news in this report," said Paul Ashworth, chief U.S. economist at Capital Economics.

Weakening retail spending could make the Federal Reserve more likely to act further to try to encourage more borrowing and spending by lowering long-term interest rates. The Fed's policy committee will meet at the end of this month.

Most economists don't expect new Fed action after that meeting. But some said Monday's Commerce report, coming after three straight months of tepid hiring, makes some Fed action more likely by year's end.

Fed Chairman Ben Bernanke will testify to Congress about the economy on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Despite the lackluster spending in April through June, retail sales were still 4.7 percent higher in the second quarter than in the same period in 2011.

IMF Predicts Slower Economic Growth for World, US

WASHINGTON • The global economy will grow more slowly over the next two years, according to the International Monetary Fund's latest forecast.

And Europe's financial crisis and a potential budget crisis in the United States could slow world growth even further, the international lending organization warned.

The world economy will likely expand 3.5 percent this year, the IMF said in a quarterly update to its World Economic Outlook. That's down slightly from its previous estimate of 3.6 percent in April.

The IMF also cut its forecast for global growth to 3.9 percent in 2013, from 4.1 per-

cent three months ago.

And it shaved its U.S. growth forecast to 2 percent this year from 2.1 percent in April. For 2013, it expects U.S.

growth of 2.3 percent, down from 2.4 percent.

The IMF warned that economic conditions could worsen if the United States

doesn't deal with a pending budget crisis soon.

Several large tax cuts are set to expire at the end of the year and big spending cuts are scheduled to kick in at the same time. If Congress doesn't take action, the U.S. could suffer another recession and the global economy could slow sharply.

Olivier Blanchard, the IMF's chief economist, said failure to deal with these issues could cut up to 4 percentage points off U.S. growth in 2013. It would also reduce growth in other advanced economies — principally Europe, Canada and Japan — by 1.5 percentage points.

"We are talking about, potentially, an enormous shock," Blanchard said. "If it were to happen, it would be a major, major event."

Paul 'Speedy' Greene

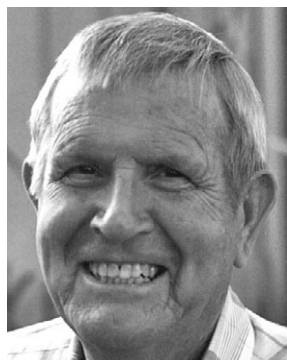
Feb. 5, 1925-July 13, 2012

Funk Brothers Bass Player Bob Babbitt Dies at 74

DETROIT (AP) • Prominent Motown studio musician and Funk Brothers member Bob Babbitt, whose bass playing pounded through the Temptations hit "Ball of Confusion" and Marvin Gaye's "Mercy Mercy Me (The Ecology)," has died. He was 74.

Babbitt died Monday of complications from brain cancer in Nashville, Tenn., where he had lived for many years, his manager David Spero said in a statement released by Universal Music, the label to which Babbitt contributed to numerous hit records.

Well-known for decades among musicians, Babbitt laid down bass lines on Stevie Wonder's "Signed, Sealed, Delivered," along with "The Tears of a Clown" by Smokey Robinson and the Miracles, "In-

ner City Blues" by Marvin Gaye, and Edwin Starr's "War."

"Bob was a teddy bear of a guy," former Motown engineer Ed Wolfrum told the *Detroit Free Press*. "And he was an extraordinary musician — a player's player."

After leaving Motown, he recorded with Bette Midler, Jim Croce, Bonnie Raitt and Frank Sinatra.

In all, he played on more than 200 top 40 hits, including "Midnight Train to Georgia," by Gladys Knight and the Pips and "Ready to Take a Chance Again" by Barry Manilow.

Babbitt gained wider public recognition through the 2002 film about the Funk Brothers, "Standing in the Shadows of Motown."

"He was one of the last of the breed of journeymen bass players who were total pros, could go in and crank

out a hit, go to the next session and crank out another one," Allan Slutsky, the film's writer and producer, told *The Detroit News*.

Babbitt was born Robert Kreinar on Nov. 26, 1937, in Pittsburgh. He got his first music work freelancing around Detroit in the mid-1960s and joined Stevie Wonder's touring band in 1966. The next year he became part of Motown's house band, known as the Funk Brothers.

Babbitt lived in Nashville for 26 years but he told *The Tennessean* in 2003 he toured so much that he got little work as a sessions player in the city's recording studios. "I couldn't get producers on the phone," he said.

Babbitt is survived by his wife, Ann Kreinar, and their children, Carolyn, Joseph and Karen.

Deep Purple's Jon Lord Dies at 71

LONDON (AP) • British rocker Jon Lord, the keyboardist whose powerful, driving tones helped turn Deep Purple and Whitesnake into two of the most popular hard rock acts in a generation, died Monday. He was 71.

A statement on Lord's official website says the Leicester, England-born musician suffered a fatal pulmonary embolism in London after a long battle with pancreatic cancer.

"Jon passed from Darkness to Light," the statement said.

Lord co-wrote some of

Deep Purple's most famous tunes, including "Smoke on the Water," and later had a successful solo career following his retirement from the band in 2002. The statement posted on Lord's website said he died "surrounded by his loving family."

Emily Freeman of The Agency Group, which represented Lord for all his live concert work, confirmed the news in an email.

Tributes to Lord flooded Twitter, with artists such as Rage Against the Machine's Tom Morello and Toto's Steve Lukather expressing

sadness over his death and praising his musical contributions.

Earlier this month, Lord canceled a performance of his Durham Concerto in Germany. At the time, his website assured fans that it was "not a matter for concern, but it is a continuation of his regular treatment that has just taken longer than anticipated."

Lord wrote to fans last year saying he was fighting cancer and would be taking a break from performing "while getting the treatment and cure."

A Farm Enrichment Policy

Editor's note: Thomas Friedman is on vacation. The following editorial appeared in Monday's Washington Post.

The United States has the richest, most productive agricultural sector, and the best-fed population, in the world - perhaps in the history of the world.

Boosted by \$136.3 billion in gross sales to other countries, U.S. net farm income hit a record \$98.1 billion in 2011. A new Economist Intelligence Unit report, commissioned by DuPont, ranks the United States as the most “food-secure” nation on Earth, based on the affordability and quality of its food supply. The United States provides the equivalent of 3,748 calories per day for each of its roughly 314 million people. That is nearly 1,500 calories more than the minimum necessary for a healthy and active life.

To be sure, this abundance is not equally distributed, and some families struggle to pay their grocery bills, especially in today's economy. But any notion that farming is a precarious, hardscabble business, or that the American diet is vulnerable to supply disruptions, is absurd. Even the drought currently raging across much of the heartland augurs little more than a blip at the checkout counter months from now.

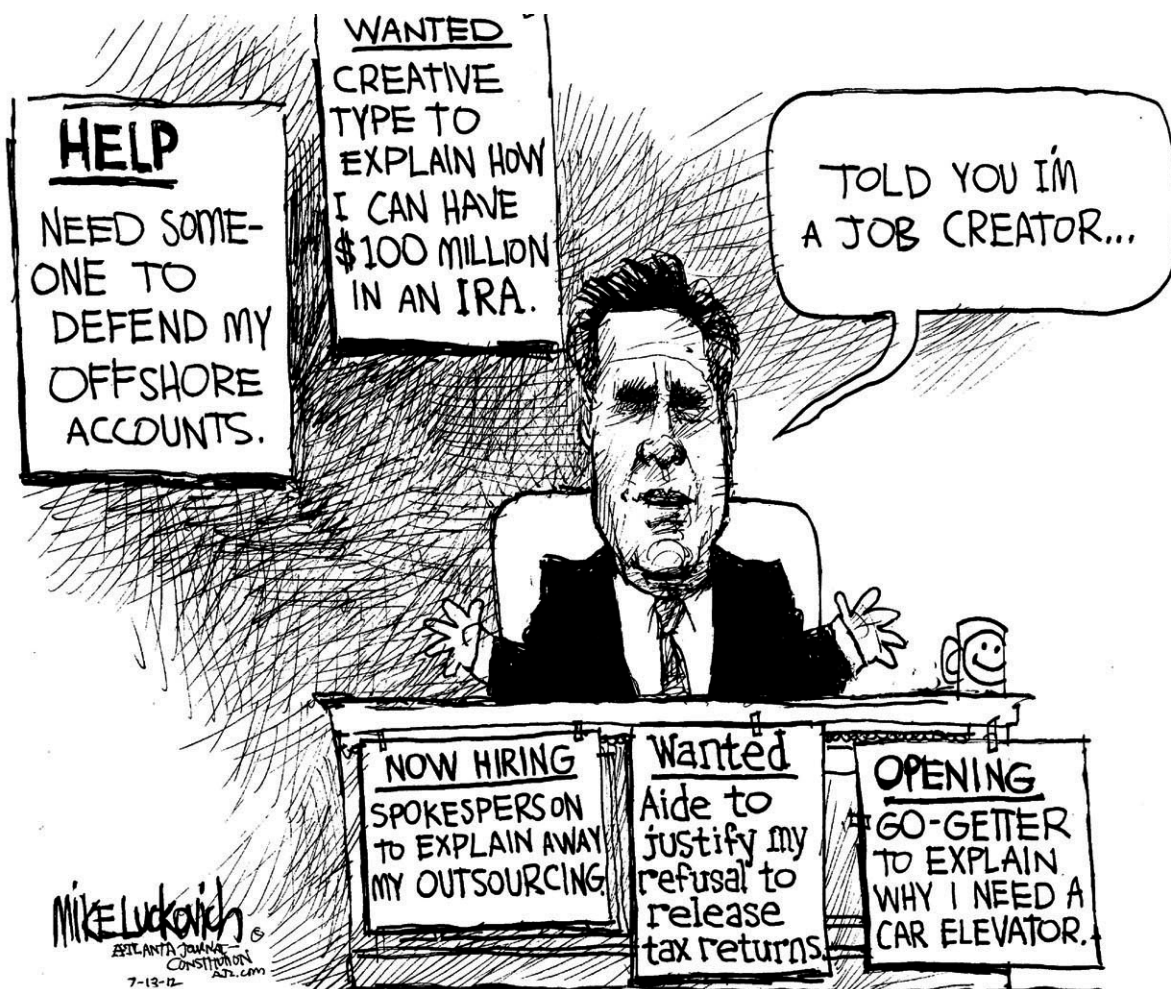
Yet those absurd notions still guide policy. Every five years, Congress drafts a farm bill as if U.S. agriculture were no more capable of surviving on its own than it was during the Great Depression - when most current farm programs began. The farm-state lawmakers, and the lobbyists who swarm around the farm bill like flies in a cow pasture, are at it again now. The Senate has already passed a measure priced at \$969 billion over the next decade. Senators congratulated themselves because this gargantuan figure reflects the elimination of some subsidies, which reduced projected spending by \$23 billion. However, the bill includes a lush new subsidy, enhanced crop insurance, that could offset some of the promised savings - and leaves commodity producers hooked on taxpayer largesse.

In the House, Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, is weighing the election-year political risks of proceeding with that chamber's own near-trillion-dollar measure - and we can understand his hesitation. The Agriculture Committee has approved a bill that would save \$35 billion over the next 10 years but also continues an array of ugly subsidies, price controls and production regulations. Among them is a “price loss coverage” program that would pay farmers if prices drop from their recent highs. The Congressional Budget Office says that could cost \$3 billion per year; economist Vincent Smith of the American Enterprise Institute says that the cost could spike to \$16.5 billion under less optimistic economic assumptions.

Of course, “farm bill” is something of a misnomer, since the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, commonly known as food stamps, accounts for about 80 percent of the measure's annual cost. While the Senate measure trims food stamps by about \$400 million per year, the House bill would cut four times as much, or roughly \$1.65 billion per year; this accounts for much of its savings edge over the Senate bill.

No doubt food stamp eligibility needs modernization, as some Republican critics of the program suggest. But to slash a couple of million recipients from the rolls - the CBO's estimate of the House bill's impact - under current economic conditions strikes us as draconian. To do so while extending billions of dollars in taxpayer funding to rural businesses that should have been weaned off the federal teat long ago is grotesque.

The Case for Online Sales Tax

Editor's note: The following editorial appeared in Monday's Washington Post:

An increasing number of states have passed laws that require customers to pay sales tax on Internet purchases.

Although a 1992 Supreme Court ruling - Quill v. North Dakota - holds that companies without a “substantial nexus” (read: physical presence) in a given state don’t have to pay taxes on purchases made there, that changes when corporations such as Amazon name local affiliates or set up physical distribution centers. Virginia voted this year to close the so-called “Amazon loophole,” which allows the online retailer to avoid paying the same local sales taxes that

brick-and-mortar establishments charge. California and Texas have taken steps to do the same.

The change is overdue. There’s no reason to favor e-commerce at the expense of other business, and it makes no sense to require some businesses to charge more for the same goods. To that end, a bipartisan bill under consideration in the Senate, the Marketplace Fairness Act, would grant states the authority to require “remote sellers” to collect sales tax in exactly the same way as local businesses are already made to do.

Of course, that’s much more difficult than it sounds, and critics are right to point out that two Supreme Court rulings have warned of the complications that will inevitably arise in any at-

tempt by retailers to collect sales tax from multiple states at once. To answer those concerns, the legislation requires that those states that choose to adopt online sales taxes must either implement a common set of guidelines for streamlining and simplifying tax collection or, if not, meet five basic simplification mandates stipulated in the bill. Whether these requirements are enough to streamline tax collection is not certain, but they are at least a step in the right direction.

Critics also allege that the revenue that states would receive under the bill wouldn’t add up to 1 percent of the total annual revenue derived from sales taxes. As The Post reported last week, however, up to \$23 billion in revenue

could be generated if online retailers were required to charge the same amount of sales tax as brick-and-mortar establishments. Had the act already been in effect this past year, Virginia could have gained an estimated \$432 million, Maryland \$376 million and the District of Columbia \$72 million. Given that Maryland and Virginia faced projected budget shortfalls of \$145 million and \$1.1 billion in advance of fiscal 2013, that’s money that could be well spent.

The Marketplace Fairness Act may be imperfect, but the price of maintaining the status quo is too high. For the sake of state coffers and local businesses, Congress should approve it - and states should adopt it in due course.

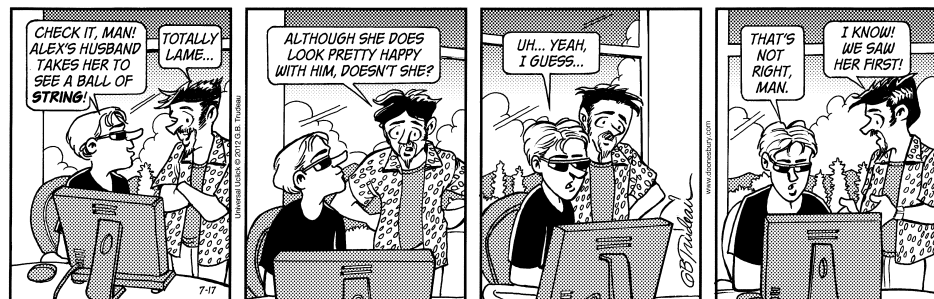

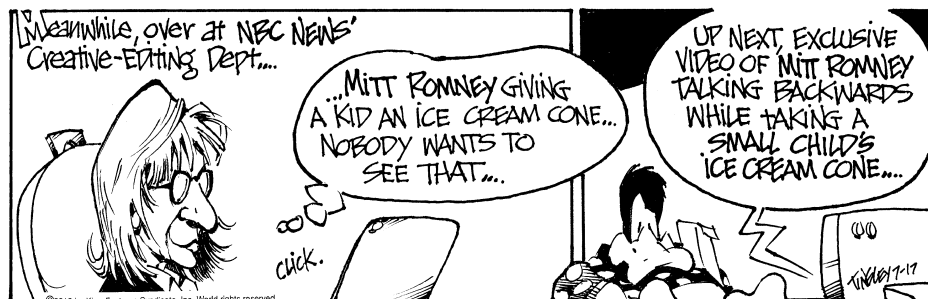

Investigators: Charlotte Fire Human Caused

POCATELLO (AP) • Authorities in eastern Idaho say a fire that destroyed 66 homes in Pocatello last month was likely human caused and accidental.

Bannock County Sheriff Lorin Nielsen released those conclusions Monday as authorities wrapped up their investigation into the Charlotte Fire.

Nielsen said investigators believe the fire was man made, but an exact cause has yet to be determined. He also says there is no evidence to suggest

criminal intent behind the blaze.

A team of 17 investigators from local, state and federal agencies collaborated to answer questions about the blaze that started June 28 and spread quickly through dry grass and brush.

More than 1,000 people were evacuated from nearby Pocatello neighborhoods.

Investigators have also ruled out fireworks as a cause, and for now are closing the case.

Mideast Peace Slips to Second Billing for U.S.

JERUSALEM • Mideast peace, America's defining issue for decades of dealings with Israel and its Arab neighbors, was just a postscript Monday as Hillary Rodham Clinton made perhaps her final visit to the region as secretary of state.

Three years after President Barack Obama declared the plight of the Palestinians "intolerable," his administration no longer sees the failing Arab-Israeli peace efforts with the same immediacy. U.S. interests are focused now on Iran and Syria, though the deep differences between Israel and the Palestinians are not ignored.

"Peace among Israel, the

Palestinian people and all of Israel's Arab neighbors is crucial for Israel's long-term progress and prosperity," Clinton said following discussions with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and the country's president, foreign minister and defense minister.

Clinton also met Palestinian Prime Minister Salam Fayyad, but she couldn't report any progress toward an accord that might secure an independent Palestine and an Israel at peace with its neighbors.

In a departure from the usual pattern for top U.S. diplomats, she did not travel to the Palestinian Authority's West Bank seat of government in Ramallah.

The Palestinians said a visit was unnecessary be-

cause Clinton had met with the Palestinian president, Mahmoud Abbas, just a few days earlier in Paris.

Israel has defied Obama's call to halt settlement construction in occupied lands, and the Palestinian leadership in the West Bank has refused to resume negotiations, leaving peace hopes in a tense status quo with no breakthrough in sight.

Both Israelis and Palestinians are frustrated with one another and with Obama's peace efforts so far.

Palestinian spokeswoman Hanan Ashrawi said Obama's Mideast policy has been a "disaster."

"The American standing and credibility have never been worse than now," she said. "A major power is being constantly humiliated by Israel, and they put up with

it and they take it."

Obama acknowledged frustrations in an interview Sunday, but in many ways the region's crises and Washington's priorities have moved on. Syria's civil war, Egypt's political instability and the Iranian nuclear program have all overshadowed the moribund peace process.

Asked what he believed he failed at in his first term, Obama cited Arab-Israeli peace efforts in an interview with WJLA-TV, a Washington, D.C., station.

"I have not been able to move the peace process forward in the Middle East the way I wanted," he said. "It's something we focused on very early. But the truth of the matter is that the parties, they've got to want it as well."

Utah Man Uses Obituary to Confess Indiscretions

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • A 59-year-old Utah man who wrote his own obituary before he died last week used the opportunity to come clean.

Friends and family of Val Patterson learned Sunday that the man they thought held a doctorate from the University of Utah received the degree thanks to a paperwork mistake and that he never even graduated.

Patterson died from throat cancer on July 10. KSL-TV reported he wrote his own death notice in the first person last fall.

The light-hearted obituary published in the *Salt Lake Tribune* also includes a confession to stealing a business' safe. He wrote: "As it turns out, I AM the guy who stole the safe from the Motor View Drive Inn back in June, 1971."

His widow, Mary Jane, told KSL-TV the confessions are true.

Two Americans Kidnapped in Egypt's Sinai Are Freed

EL-ARISH, Egypt • Two American tourists and their Egyptian guide who were abducted by a Bedouin in Egypt's Sinai Peninsula last week were released unharmed on Monday after negotiations with security officials and tribal leaders.

Rev. Michel Louis, 61, and 39-year-old Lissa Alphonse, both Boston-area residents, had been kidnapped from a bus on Friday along with their guide, Haytham Ragab, on a Sinai road by a Bedouin who was demanding the release of his uncle, who had been detained by Egyptian police on suspicion of drug possession.

The kidnapper, Jimmy Abu-Masuh, told the AP that he had handed the three over to security officials near the northern Sinai city of el-Arish on Monday after he was promised that authorities were working on his uncle's release.

"We are a people of mercy and they don't have anything to do with this," said Abu-Masuh, referring to the Americans. The three released captives later appeared at a police station in the northern Sinai city of el-Arish.

In Boston's Dorchester section, where Louis lives, about 10 family members and friends celebrated the news on the porch of his home, hugging and chanting "hallelujah."

"We are in joy after receiving such a message and we believe in God and let me tell you, He did not let us down," Louis' oldest son, the Rev. Jean Louis, said outside the house before breaking down in tears and being led back inside.

Later, Louis' children told reporters they were able to talk with their father on a satellite phone from Egypt.

"He just told us that he loved us, that he's safe, and he's coming home," said son Daniel Louis. "He sounds in

good spirits."

"We're just overwhelmingly happy to hear from my father," added daughter Debora Louis.

Several joyful parishioners gathered nearby at the Presbyterian church where the elder Louis is the pastor.

"We are all so happy and we give all the glory to God. Everyone has been so worried, but we had faith in Christ that God will deliver him," said parishioner Roseline Inozil-Camille. "We just missed him so much. He's a man of God."

The abduction illustrated a broader breakdown of security in the Sinai, a key destination in Egypt's vital tourism industry, where lawlessness has risen since last year's ouster of President Hosni Mubarak.

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Bomb Threat Leads to US-Canada Bridge Closing

DETROIT • A bomb threat led authorities to close one of the busiest bridges between the U.S. and Canada on Monday, just four days after a similar threat closed a nearby commuter tunnel that also connects Detroit to Windsor, Ontario.

Detroit police said a 911 call came in around 7:20 p.m. to authorities on the U.S. side of the Ambassador Bridge. The caller warned that a bomb would go off in 10 minutes along the busy freight crossing, police Inspector Don Johnson said during news conference Monday night.

The call prompted authorities in both cities to halt all truck and car traffic across the bridge, police spokeswoman Sgt. Eren Stephens said.

There were no immediate reports of authorities finding a bomb, though helicopters continued to fly overhead late Monday night. Police had set up several roadblocks near the bridge, where canine units were called in to search the bridge. The Coast Guard was patrolling the Detroit River beneath the bridge and blocked river traffic.

The closing led to major traffic backups on expressways and other major roads leading into downtown Detroit, Stephens said. Car and light truck traffic was being diverted to the Detroit Windsor Tunnel about 2 miles away, though large trucks cannot use the underwater commuter tunnel.

A similar threat was phoned in Thursday to Windsor authorities that led to a four-hour closing of the Detroit Windsor Tunnel, a busy border crossing beneath the river that also connects the two border cities. No explosives were found.

At the time, police said a man had called from a street pay phone and warned of a bomb on the Canadian side of the tunnel. Authorities have since said surveillance video from a coffee shop near the phone booth where the call was made might offer clues about the caller.

Stephens said Detroit police are leading the investigation into the bridge threat and working with state and federal law enforcement agencies. Johnson said the call came in from somewhere in Detroit, though other details weren't immediately released.

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Trans Fat Ban Made Fast Food a Bit Healthier in New York

WASHINGTON • Turns out it's possible to make a fast-food lunch a bit healthier even without skipping the fries.

New York City now has hard evidence that its ban on trans fat in restaurant food made a meaningful dent in people's consumption of the artery clogger and wasn't just replaced with another bad fat.

The findings being published Tuesday have implications beyond heart health, suggesting another strategy to curb the nation's obesity epidemic fueled by a high-calorie, super-sized environment.

Consider: Americans get more than a third of their daily calories from foods prepared outside the home. By year's end, the Food and Drug Administration hopes to finalize long-awaited rules that would make many restaurant chains post the calorie counts of their products right on the menu. Maybe the guilt would make you forego the french fries for a salad. Maybe not.

Now contrast New York's trans-fat ban — later copied by more than a dozen other state and local governments — which didn't put all the onus on the consumer to do the right thing.

"By making the default option the healthier choice," everyone benefits regardless

of their nutrition awareness or willpower, Alice Lichtenstein, a nutrition specialist at Tufts University, wrote in a commentary on the research. "The regulation may serve as a model for future successful public health initiatives."

There are good fats and bad fats. Trans fat is widely considered the worst kind for your heart, gram-for-gram more harmful than its better known cousin, saturated fat.

Small amounts occur naturally in some meat and dairy products. But much of the trans fat we eat is artificially produced, by hardening liquid oils so they can be used for baking or a longer shelf life.

In 2006, the federal government began requiring that packaged foods list the amount of trans fat contained per serving, a boon for grocery shoppers who could finally tell which processed foods were more or less heart-healthy.

But restaurant fare remained a mystery. So New York City issued a first-of-its-kind rule restricting artificial trans fat in restaurants, forcing them to alter recipes so that foods contained no more than 0.5 grams per serving. The change affected customers beyond New York as big chains like McDonald's wound up cutting the fat system-wide.

The latest study by the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene shows the effect. Researchers surveyed customers and collected receipts for nearly 15,000 lunchtime purchases at fast-food chains around the city in 2007 and 2009, before and after the ban was in place.

The amount of trans fat in each lunch sold dropped an average of 2.4 grams after the ban, researchers report in Tuesday's edition of *Annals of Internal Medicine*. The biggest drop, 3.8 grams, occurred in hamburger chains, followed by Mexican food and fried chicken chains.

Hunting Bill Stirs Up New Mexico Senate Race

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. • An environmental group that it part of a coalition behind a \$2 million dollar advertising blitz supporting U.S. Rep. Martin Heinrich's campaign for U.S. Senate has joined sportsmen groups in pushing his legislation to improve access to millions of acres of public land.

The measure introduced by Heinrich, D-N.M., calls for an inventory of all public parcels larger than a square mile where hunting, fishing and other recreation are allowed but where access is blocked. It also asks agencies to acquire easements and rights of way for improving access.

The National Wildlife Federation last week joined a number of sportsmen's groups from around the West in backing the bill, which is just the latest in a decade-long effort to overcome access issues created by a combination of population growth, changing demographics and the landownership checkerboard that defines the American West.

Heinrich is in a tight race against Republican Heather Wilson for the seat currently held by Sen. Jeff Bingaman, who is retiring.

Wilson's campaign said the endorsement was a political ploy by environmentalists cloaked as sportsmen to further their liberal agenda.

"This group is part of the same environmental extremists that are spending a million dollars to falsely attack Heather because she

doesn't share their job-killing agenda," Wilson campaign spokesman Chris Sanchez said.

John Gale, a regional representative for the National Wildlife Federation, denied the assertions, saying the public lands bill "strips out any pet projects and any personal interests" and is geared solely to securing access for hunters, anglers and other recreationists. He said access is the No. 1 issue for sportsmen.

"There are a lot of places with gates up on roads and things like that. We're looking to secure access to places for people to go and enjoy," he said. "We have this wonderful resource in public lands and it's there for all of us to enjoy, not the privileged few."

Other groups that have endorsed the legislation include the Backcountry Hunters and Anglers, Trout Unlimited, the Bull Moose Sportsmen's Alliance and the Theodore Roosevelt Conservation Partnership.

The access issue is of particular interest across the West, where New Mexico and many other states have large tracts of public land and where sportsmen and other outdoor recreationists represent large voting blocks.

Heinrich's bill is circulating just as election season ramps up. The political action committee of the National Wildlife Federation has joined the Sierra Club, the League of Conservation Voters and others in footing the bill for an advertising effort aimed at promoting Heinrich and criticizing Wilson.

Police: E. Idaho Man Likely 'Huffing' before Blast

REXBURG (AP) • Police believe an eastern Idaho man was "huffing" vapors from compressed-air cans inside his car when the inhalant vapors exploded and he was severely burned.

The *Rexburg Standard*

Journal reports 37-year-old Jared B. Jensen was taken to a Salt Lake City burn center late last week with third-degree burns on his face and arms. The newspaper reported Friday that a police investigation into the explo-

sion was ongoing.

Police Capt. Randy Lewis said authorities suspect Jensen was in his car huffing inhalants from air duster cans late Thursday and then lit a cigarette lighter, igniting the fumes. Police later found

cans of compressed air, a lighter and cigarettes in the vehicle.

Authorities say Jensen was released from jail earlier that day after serving time for a probation violation.

Big Sky Unveils New Logo; New Member Next?

PARK CITY, Utah • The Big Sky Conference unveiled its new logo Monday at the league's Summer Kickoff.

If media reports are to be believed, it's possible the logo isn't only new item the conference will roll out this year.

Fritz Neighbor, University of Montana football writer for the *Missoulian*, tweeted Monday that Commissioner Doug Fullerton confirmed the league is in talks with the University of Idaho about becoming the league's 14th football-playing member and 12th all-sports member.

Neighbor tweeted early Monday from the league's kickoff event, "Big Sky commish Fullerton on Idaho Vandals: We're in negotiations with them, there's no doubt about it."

That the Big Sky is interested in the Vandal athletic program itself is not news — Fullerton told the *Idaho Statesman* in May that he has long admired the school and hoped it would



see a greater benefit to having its football program at the Football Championship Series level rather than in the bowl subdivision.

"Playing at the top of the FCS is a better situation than playing at the bottom of the FBS," Fullerton said.

What is news is that Idaho appears to have picked up the phone when the Big Sky called.

The Western Athletic Conference, current home of Idaho athletics, is slated to have only two football-playing members for the 2013 season. Short of receiving an invitation to another conference or a near-magical influx of

teams willing to compete at the FBS level, Idaho's only option in filling out its schedule for next year would be to play as an independent, something Athletic Director Rob Spear expressed confidence in doing earlier this month.

On Monday, all the official unveilings surrounded the new logo.

"A dream finally came true with the rebranding of the Big Sky Conference," Fullerton said. "We have a fresh and exciting new logo, new colors and a new league mentality."

The logo is part of a rebranding campaign, one that will continue through the 2013-14 season when the league celebrates its 50th anniversary, and 25th sponsoring women's sports. SME, Inc., a strategic brand development firm which counts the Pac-12 Conference among its clients, is leading the efforts.

The logo change is the first for the league since the mid-1990s, and will be designed in all 13 school's official colors.

On Your Mark: Athletes Pour into Heathrow

LONDON • The opening ceremony is still 11 days away, but for athletes and Londoners, the Olympics started Monday.

Thousands of competitors descended upon the Athletes Village and training camps, Heathrow Airport experienced its busiest day ever, London drivers grappled with the city's first "Games Lane" for Olympic vehicles and preparations shifted into the highest gear.

Smart-looking sailors guarded the gates to Olympic Park, looking so cheerful that visitors would never guess they had been pulled off leave only a few days ago to fill a security gap when contractor G4S admitted it couldn't provide enough guards. As well as 3,500 extra troops, the Olympic security coordinator has dispatched police

officers to venues left open when G4S contractors failed to show up for work.

As the Olympic flame made its way to the seaside city of Brighton, organizers revealed dramatic plans for its arrival in London at the end of the week. Someone knows how to make an entrance: a Royal Marine will abseil the flame from a helicopter into the Tower of London, fusing the flame into the very walls of the London landmark.

The day's excitement all started at Heathrow.

Beneath giant Olympic rings, Americans, Australians, Italians — athletes from 50 nations — touched down in what is being described as Britain's biggest peacetime transport challenge (the 1940 evacuation from Dunkirk clearly being excluded from the calculation.) But it had a

feeling of Olympian enormity — the airport will handle some 236,955 passengers on Monday, breaking the previous record of 233,562 set on July 31, 2011.

Another big arrival day will be July 25, two days before the opening ceremony.

With the countdown on for the torch's arrival in London at the end of its 8,000-mile journey, Olympic planners let slip some details. High-profile torchbearers — like boxer Lennox Lewis and tennis player Tim Henman — are on tap and the torch won't miss top London's sites like Hampton Court, Trafalgar Square, Buckingham Palace.

And then Royal Marine Martyn Williams will drop the flame to the Tower in style.

Williams was wounded in a road mine attack during a deployment to Afghanistan in 2008. He recovered, overcoming huge odds.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"Come, Watson, come! The game is afoot."

Today's deal is from Jeff Rubens and Robert Ewen's new book, "It's All in the Game." As I mentioned last week, this book melds humorous and instructive deals. Today's is a real-life affair, in which a name from the past found a neat play to recover from his unfortunate opening lead.

A trump lead would defeat four spades by force. But when the club 10 was led, North's queen was played, and East had to duck. South cashed the heart ace and led a diamond to the queen and king. Now when South regained the lead and cashed the diamond ace, the fall of the J-10 allowed him to bang down the two top trumps: making four.

At another table, however, Peter Leventritt recovered from his opening lead by smoothly ducking the diamond queen. Then, when South cashed the diamond ace and East followed with the jack, South pictured his original holding as K-J-10. When declarer tried to ruff a low diamond in dummy, East overruffed and gave West a club ruff. West led another diamond, giving East another over-ruff of dummy. Finally, a further club from East promoted a trump winner for the fourth and setting defensive trick.

At IMPs, declarer could have ensured the contract (except against a 5-1 trump split) by abandoning diamonds temporarily when the jack dropped, and cashing two high spades. This play, however, could lose the contract if diamonds were 3-3 and spades 5-1. I've seen many deceptive ducks, but never one done in quite this way for quite this reason.

ANSWER: You can pass, playing partner for long hearts in a weak hand, which he has suggested he holds. Equally, you can bid two no-trump, two spades or even three diamonds, to improve the partscore. If one of your small clubs were a heart, it would be clear to pass. Even though passing seems to me to be the most trusting action, three diamonds may be your best chance to improve the contract.
