Truck Driving Program in the Works at CSI

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TWIN FALLS • Down the road, those seeking a truck driving job may be able to receive training through the College of Southern Idaho.

Chief Academic Officer Jeff Fox said the college is exploring the possibility of working with the College of Western Idaho in Nampa to meet industry needs.

The discussion is "very preliminary," he said, and he didn't have more details.

CWI already offers a technical certificate in professional truck driving. The school has 15-week daytime and 23-week evening and weekend programs.

CSI President Jerry Beck said the college could contract with companies that want to train future truck drivers in order to hire them.

"We want the cost of instruction to lead to a job," he said. But he doesn't know whether CSI would offer a technical certificate.

Beck brought up the topic during the college's board of trustees meeting Monday. He expects it will come back for action next month.

Greg Christianson, owner of Top Gun Truck Driving Academy, said he doesn't think a future CSI program would have much of an effect on his business. But it depends on the types of programs the college offers.

The fire is out, but the damaging effects linger, causing farmers to worry about grazing.

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CASTLEFORD • When firefighters mopped up the final hot spot along the Kinyon Road Fire, Mike Henslee didn't give a sigh of relief.

For the Hagerman rancher, the 216,000-acre wildfire might have only been active for four days but its impact will linger for much longer.

"We're going to have to live with this for at least two years," he said. "We have to get a plan."

Henslee is one of 17 grazing permittees directly affected by the Kinyon Road Fire. The lightning-caused wildfire began spreading July 8, just southwest of Castleford. Winds carried the flames across 360 square miles up to the Saylor Creek Bombing Range operated by Mountain Home Air Force Base.

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management is currently reviewing grazing allotments burned by the fire. Wildlife officials will determine if grazing should be placed on hold until the allotments can fully recover, said Codie Martin, assistant Jarbidge Field Office manager for the BLM.

Henslee said the fire forced him to find new water sources and feed for his cattle. With so much at stake, he said it's frustrating not to be able to help put out the flames.

"This is our livelihood out there," he said. "Sometimes we're

the first ones on the scene but all we're allowed to do is watch the fire grow."

The BLM doesn't allow private citizens to fight wildfires on federal land. If someone was hurt while trying to put out the flames, the agency could be liable, spokeswoman Heather Tiel-Nelson said.

During this month's fire, the BLM issued a misdemeanor citation to Buhl rancher Scott Luby for attempting to put out the flames on federal land. A public hearing has been set for the citation, Tiel-Nelson said.

The agency doesn't normally have to issue citations. In other major fires, like the 2009 Long Butte Fire or the 2007 Murphy Complex Fire, BLM warnings were enough to convince ranchers not to help put out the growing flames.

"This particular gentleman didn't stop after we warned him," Tiel-Nelson said.

The BLM is still finishing its rehabilitation plan for the Kinyon

Road Fire, Martin said. A key priority will be recovering critical sage grouse habitat.

Federal officials determined certain areas throughout southern Idaho are habitat vital to sustain healthy sage grouse populations. The bird currently faces a potential listing as an endangered species, which would greatly affect land use across much of southern Idaho. Officials believe protecting these critical areas could help keep the bird from being listed.

Close to 23 percent of the Kinyon Road Fire consumed critical sage grouse habitat. Almost half the fire burned sage grouse habitat viewed as less of a priority, Martin said.

The BLM will seek to reseed the priority areas with perennial

plants. However, Idaho recovery efforts could compete with others across the country.

"There are a lot of wildfires across the nation, so there's a lot of competition for perennial seed," Martin said. "I'm not sure how much we'll get."

Twin Falls County Commissioner Terry Kramer said wildlife officials got somewhat lucky that the fire didn't burn more of the crucially important sage grouse habitat.

It's the farmers who will need some time before they fully recover, said Kramer, who's from Castleford.

"What happens out here is personal to me because I know the people out there grazing," he said. "We're not done yet but it could have been worse."

Jerome: \$35M for Water Treatment Improvement

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JEROME • The city of Jerome could go to voters this fall with a request to issue \$35 million in revenue bonds to make improvements to its wastewater treatment plant.

The measure — which hasn't been finalized — could appear on the November ballot. An exact amount also hasn't been decided.

Mayor John Shine told the *Times-News* the measure shouldn't affect residents' property tax rates.

On Tuesday night, councilors approved a \$24,500 contract with Stephanie Bonney of Moore, Smith, Buxton and Turcke. She'll provide legal services to the city for the project.

Councilman Chris Barber wasn't at the meeting.

Shine told councilors it might be premature to award the contract for legal services.

He said the estimated project costs are still preliminary. A project engineer is about halfway through a master planning process for the wastewater system.

The cost of legal services also could change if the bond amount changes.

The city's wastewater system

woman who accused Jason Jay Ward of raping her in May 2011 took the stand Tuesday during the first day of Ward's trial in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

The woman, who is now 20, described the hours leading up to the alleged attack and then the attack

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Paving Project to Close I-84 Off-ramp Thursday

HANSEN • A short-term paving project will briefly close a westbound Interstate 84 off-ramp at the Idaho 50 interchange between Hansen and Eden, the Idaho Transportation Department announced. The project will close Exit 182 on the westbound side from 9 a.m.-1 p.m. Thursday. The project

includes layering the Idaho 50 overpass with new pavement. The paving will replace asphalt that deteriorated and cracked along the road. The ITD is asking drivers to find an alternative exit from I-84 during the project's duration. Nearest exits are at Valley Road at Exit 188 and U.S. 93 at Exit 173.

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RUPERT • Determined not to spend the weekend alone, a curious moose decided to visit Kathy Preuit's garden.

The Rupert resident said she noticed the animal wandered into her backyard Thursday night.

"It was really weird," Preuit said. "I saw something poking out of my garden and I thought, 'Gosh darn it, is that a horse?'"

Convinced it was going to leave immediately, she quickly grabbed her camera.

The moose stayed three nights, meandering throughout her property. It munched on rose bushes, ripped up grass with its giant hooves and made friends with the cats, Preuit said.

"It didn't seem mean," she said. "My grandkids loved it"

An officer from the Idaho Department of Fish and Game tried to herd the moose out of her yard but was unsuccessful, said Kelton Hatch, conservation educator at the agency's regional office.

Moose sightings are on the rise across Idaho now that the population is growing, he said.

A few years ago, Hatch said, a moose slipped into the Rupert skate park but couldn't get out since ice surrounded the rink. Wildlife officials tranquilized the animal to get it out, Hatch said.

Anyone with a moose in their backyard can call their regional Fish and Game office for help, he said.

"It's more common to have moose sightings in Sun Valley or Idaho Falls where it's closer to the mountains," Hatch said. "Unless the moose or people are in danger, we don't nor-

mally tranquilize it." Preuit said she didn't mind having the unusual visitor stay over the weekend. With an open backyard, she wasn't surprised the

CSI Ponders Use for Donated Land

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TWIN FALLS • After receiving land near Hagerman years ago, College of Southern Idaho administrators are wondering how to use it.

Jeff Fox, executive vice president and chief academic officer, said the property came to the college as a gift from a donor.

Some CSI classes — mainly in the science and art de-

partments — use the site, but President Jerry Beck said he'd like to expand opportunities for students.

"Our long-term dream would be to have some sort of station there that we could actually go and have students spend time at," he said.

Beck said he'd like to have an exchange program where CSI students can go to other locations and students from other schools can use the

Hagerman site. There's a lot of standing water on the property, he said, which makes it the ideal site for research.

He brought up the topic Monday during the college's Board of Trustees meeting. It will come back to trustees next month for possible action.

The college received two pieces of property in the Hagerman area from a donor and sold one of them. The remaining property is be-

tween 20 and 30 acres. Beck said the college hasn't invested any money into the property, except for maintenance. Future work will be kept to a bare minimum, he said.

The planning phase for how to use the land could last between six months and one year. Beck said he'd like to try to allocate money during the next fiscal year to make improvements to the property.

Wastewater Work Debate Continues

WENDELL • A debate over whether Wendell properly awarded a nearly \$1 million contract for wastewater work is now in the hands of its City Council and city attorney.

On Monday, the council heard an appeal from Boise-based Western Construction regarding the city's recent award of a \$961,500 contract to Summit Excavation of Twin Falls for the second phase of Wendell's wastewater overhaul.

Attorney Jeff Sykes, with Boise-based firm Meuleman Mollerup, told the council Western Construction is appealing the decision because it wants the job — but more

importantly, so state law surrounding the competitive bidding process is upheld.

The issue, Sykes argued, is that Summit failed to list a licensed plumbing contractor to perform work on a pumphouse. He said the city should either award the project to the next lowest bidder (Western Construction) "or re-bid the job."

Some discussion surrounded whether the city adequately informed contractors prior to receiving bids.

Sykes said pre-bid information sent to contractors failed to note that effluent coming into the pumphouse would be disconnected during phase one. With effluent seemingly still coming into the pumphouse at the time of

bidding, the job is part of a liquid plumbing system and under Idaho law requires a certified plumber to do the work.

Summit Excavation attorney David Gadd, of Twin Falls, said that had Western Construction attended the pre-bid conference, held to "get everyone on the same page," the company would have been aware the pipe in question needed to be disconnected from the effluent system and a plumbing contractor was not necessary.

Sykes replied that the pre-bid conference wasn't mandatory. Additionally, he said that under state law all verbal information provided is not binding. He also noted that all contractors involved in the bidding process were supposed to receive a written

notice following the conference of important issues.

Scott Keyes, a safety manager with the Idaho Division of Building Safety, told the council he stood by the agency's original assessment that the work in question does not require a licensed plumber. He didn't hear anything during oral arguments to persuade him that pumphouse work falls within the division's jurisdiction, he said.

No action was taken at the hearing. Mayor Brad Christopherson said the council would update the two companies pending advice from Wendell's attorney.

itself, often shaking and crying while she spoke.

Ward, now 37, was charged with rape after the woman told police he raped her early in the morning of May 22, 2011. He pleaded guilty to the charge in December 2011, but withdrew that plea this March after saying he received improper advice from his attorney.

On Tuesday, Ward's alleged victim gave her version of the events that May. She testified she was at Ward's house near 2500 East and 3400 North with her ex-boyfriend. Ward and some other friends were having a few drinks. At one point, the woman and her boyfriend had an argument and he left. According to her testimony, she didn't know her exact location but she began to walk home, or at least find a place that she recognized, at around 2 a.m. on May 22.

At that point, the woman said, Ward asked her if he could drive her home, but wanted \$10 in gas money. The woman said she declined.

"I didn't feel comfortable with him to begin with," she said.

After walking for about 20 minutes, the woman testified, Ward pulled up in his truck. She said Ward was wearing a blue polo shirt, but no pants or underwear. According to her testimony, Ward pulled her into the truck by her ponytail and told her to drink three cups of alcohol. When she spilled one, she said, Ward hit her in the face. After driving about two blocks, the woman testified, Ward parked and then climbed on top of her.

"I asked him to get off of me and he'd just push against me more," she said.

After trying, and failing, to remove her pants, the woman said, Ward opened the passenger door and

pulled on her wrist, telling her to get out of the car.

"He sounded infuriated," she said.

After a struggle the woman said she ended up on the ground, with Ward on top of her. The woman said she continued to try to push Ward off her, but he pulled her pants down and held his hand on her throat until she felt like she couldn't breathe. After the alleged attack was over, the woman said she didn't try to run.

"I didn't know where I was," she said. "I thought if I left he'd hurt me more."

Instead, she said she smoked two cigarettes and surveyed the dark fields around her, looking for any way to escape. Before she found one, the woman said, Ward walked over to her and said, "We're doing it again."

"At that point I had given up," she said. "I was tired."

After the second alleged sexual assault, the woman said, Ward drove her to an area near some railroad tracks near Grandview Drive in Twin Falls County and told her to get out of the truck. Once out, the woman testified, she waited in a ditch until she couldn't see Ward's tail lights before she called her family and police.

At first, the woman testified, she did not tell deputies or nurses at the St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center emergency room who attacked her and gave a description that didn't match Ward.

"I was scared," she said. "Jason Ward told me not to tell anybody."

After her description of the events, the woman's clothing was admitted as exhibits in the trial and the jury was allowed to leave for the day just before 5 p.m.

The trial will reconvene at 8:30 a.m. with the cross-examination of the alleged victim. Read the *Times-News* and visit magicvalley.com for continuing updates.

Top Gun Driving School — a family-owned business located on U.S. Highway 30 between Twin Falls and Filer — offers accelerated, short-term programs to train future truck drivers.

"Within three or four weeks, they'll be out searching for a job and probably getting into a job in five weeks," Christianson said.

There were more truck driving schools in the area when his business first opened, he said, but they have closed their doors since then.

The Top Gun Driving School, which is eight years old, averages about 10 students per month.

Jan Roeser, regional economist for the Idaho Department of Labor, said there's a need for truck drivers due to the region's commodity-based economy.

"It's a tough industry because a lot of employers want experience," she said.

Roeser said truck driving jobs require a wider variety of skills than in the past, such as computer knowledge.

How many people are looking for trucking jobs?

Here's the number of registered job seekers through the Idaho Department of Labor seeking a heavy truck or tractor-trailer driving job in south-central Idaho. Some numbers may be duplicated if job seekers are willing to work in multiple counties.

- Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln and Twin Falls counties: 187
- Cassia and Minidoka counties: 154
- Blaine and Camas counties: 136

"It's gotten to be an interesting job, too, because a lot of the old-time truck drivers didn't have to have computer skills," she said.

Last year, there were an estimated 2,270 heavy truck and tractor-trailer drivers in south-central Idaho, according to the Department of Labor's Occupational Employment and Wage Survey.

And in 2011, there were more than 700 job listings for full-time, permanent truck driving positions through the Department of Labor.

Beck said there are quite a few truck drivers seeking employment, but companies are talking to college administrators about additional needs.

Suffering Was Part of Life in World War II


I just wanted to comment on your Sunday column on the Coffey letter.

Overgrown Weeds Aren't Something We Can Brush off

Children play with fireworks in Buhl, and a house goes up in flames.

A permitted burn gets out of control near Kimberly and threatens homes.

A woman fleeing the Colorado Springs fires crashes her car near Mountain Home, sparking another fire.

Safe to say, it's dry out there.

Not all fires are preventable, but more can be done by property owners to reduce the risk of damage to people's homes. We've all traveled past empty lots overgrown with dry weeds and brush. A hot sun and windy conditions can easily stoke a fire from that kindling.

In Twin Falls, the code

enforcement department reports that overgrown weeds and brush account for half of all code violations in the city. Enforcement Officer Sean Standley says he receives an average of 30 calls per day.

That's too many, considering the recent string of fires here in southern Idaho. Property owners — especially those with empty development lots or abandoned homes — need to take responsibility and keep their properties up to code.

"The code isn't just for aesthetics," Standley said in a recent press release. "It also helps protect homes from fire hazards during these hot and dry summers. I see places with dry

weeds growing up to my waist."

Standley says he tries to work with property owners to come into compliance before resorting to fines — a commendable practice. Homeowners can face fines of up to \$600 a season for not maintaining their properties. Looking around the city, maybe that dollar amount isn't high enough. It's well below the cost of actually landscaping a property and keeping it up to code. And the city could certainly do more when it comes to enforcement.

The cost of not doing so is lost or damaged property. With average home values in Twin Falls hovering above \$140,000, it would

take 234 maximum fines to cover the loss of a single house. Standley estimates he issues 30-70 fines a year.

A well-maintained yard can help save homes. That was the case for Shelley Williams, whose home was threatened by the fire south of Kimberly. A recent *Times-News* article reported that healthy grass around her home acted as a natural fire suppressor when flames came within 100 yards of it.

Encouraging owners — through fines and other means — to take care of their properties is a cost-effective, aesthetically pleasing way to battle fires before they begin. By keeping our lots up to code, we all breathe a little easier.

BLM Chief Grateful for Help during Kinyon Road Fire

As I look back at the events of the last week and the Kinyon Road Fire, I can examine the statistics like acres lost, cost and duration. But I would rather focus on the human side of the equation — the many men and women who provided the outstanding local community assistance in containing a dangerous wildfire that in the matter of a couple of days grew to be Idaho's largest wildfire for 2012 and the number one priority wildfire in the nation. The support of the town of Castleford, their volunteer fire department and emergency medical services were invaluable to us throughout the last week. The sheriffs' departments of Elmore, Owyhee and Twin Falls counties were integral in securing the fire perimeter and preventing the public from



placing themselves in harm's way or interfering with suppression activities. There is no price we can place on the value of this support. On behalf of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), please accept my sincere thanks.

As with all incidents, the BLM's most important concern is the health and safety of the public and our employees. During the Kinyon Road Fire, we had no major safety incidents, for which I am very thankful. However, the impact to our land resources is another story. What took less than a week to burn will take years to stabilize and restore.

On Sunday, July 8, our BLM Twin Falls District ecologist immediately mobilized staff to begin addressing the impacts to the area; planning the stabilization and restoration effort; and exploring long-term solutions to enhance the protection of the public land resources we manage. The fire burned into many valued land resource areas, including grazing allotments, preliminary priority and general sage grouse habitat, a wild horse herd management area (HMA) and the Saylor Creek Training Range. Fortunately, our wild horse herd was found unharmed in an undamaged portion of the HMA, and we did not have any reports of fatalities to livestock.

I know the economic and ecological impacts will be felt for some time. In the meantime, the BLM will be

making every effort to mitigate the severity of the Kinyon Road Fire aftermath. As I look out my office window and see a slight rain drizzle, I am thankful for the welcome relief from nature, but I also know we must never become complacent to the danger of wildfire.

Although Kinyon Road was naturally caused, many of the wildfires in southern Idaho are human caused. So please be careful with open flames, fireworks and parking off of improved roads or trails. With the increased fire restrictions, I also remind you not to smoke outside your vehicle, and never throw your cigarette butts outside as you are driving.

Enjoy your public lands and be safe this summer.

N. Idaho Woman Pleads Not Guilty in 2011 Wolf Escape

SANDPOINT (AP) • A northern Idaho woman pleaded not guilty to failing to alert state wildlife officials when a white wolf escaped from her sanctuary last year.

Nancy Jean Taylor, 67, entered the plea to the misdemeanor charge in Idaho's 1st District Court, according to court records.

The wolf named Cryco escaped from Taylor's wolf-viewing business along Highway 95 near Cocolalla in Bonner County sometime last June, authorities said.

The 14-year-old arctic wolf is still missing, according to the Wolf People website.

The escape was never reported to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, as required by state law, the *Bonner County*

Daily Bee reported Tuesday.

Taylor previously told the newspaper she didn't report the escape because she believed the wolf wouldn't survive in the wild. It was raised in captivity and had renal failure, she said.

"He's very sweet and loves people. That's probably going to be his downfall," Taylor told the newspaper in October.

There were multiple sightings of the animal following its escape, and some neighbors said they were upset with Wolf People, which has existed for more than two decades in the Cocolalla area.

The business, which raises and breeds wolves, was formed in 1993 to educate the public.

A trial for Taylor is scheduled for Sept. 9.

Otter Sports Shiner after Tree Mishap

BOISE (AP) • Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter had some explaining to do after returning to work this week with a shiner.

The governor told the *Spokesman-Review* that his eye was blackened over the weekend while he was cleaning up after a windstorm that swept through southwestern Idaho, destroying several trees at Otter's ranch in Star.

Otter said he was cutting the branch of a cottonwood tree when it snapped back and smacked him right in the eye. His only regret? That he didn't have a better story to tell when he showed up Tuesday for a meeting at the Idaho Capitol sporting his new shiner.

Otter said: "I should've spent some time making up a more romantic story!"

Idaho Man Dies When Tractor Overtakes While Mowing Ditch

SAGLE (AP) • Officials in Bonner County say a northern Idaho man died after his tractor overturned while he was mowing grass on an embankment on the side of the road near Sagle.

Sagle Fire District Chief Robert Webber told the *Bonner County Daily Bee* the tractor overturned at about 10:40 a.m. Monday.

Webber said the man, who is said to be in his 60s, was pulling a lawnmower

attachment with his tractor when the machine tumbled over, pinning him.

Bonner County Emergency Medical Services spokesman Bob Abbott said officials are investigating whether a medical problem might have caused the man to lose control of the tractor. Abbott said the man was dead when paramedics arrived.

The man's name hasn't been released.

Officials: Horse Attacked by Cougar in North-central Idaho

LEWISTON (AP) • Officials with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game say a horse was attacked by a cougar just outside the north-central Idaho town of Lewiston.

Conservation officer Mark Hill said the department issued a kill permit for the cougar and a hunter is trying to track the big cat.

The 8-year-old bay mare named Dyna was

pastured just outside the city limits when it was attacked Sunday. The animal, which is owned by Lewiston resident Bret Christensen, sustained a severe shoulder injury and is being treated at a local veterinary clinic.

Christensen says children frequently play in the same pasture, and he fears that if a cougar will attack a horse, it won't hesitate to attack a child.

Authorities Face Challenges in White Collar Crimes

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • In his last days as Bonneville County prosecutor, Dane Watkins Jr. had a loose end to tie up.

The federal government was working its way through a criminal case against Ponzi-scheme architect Daren Palmer but had filed no charges. Watkins kept an eye on the feds' progress. He had not pursued bad check charges on behalf of the state, preferring to dedicate his office's resources to the rest of his caseload.

But the check cases were nearing their statute-of-limitations expiration date. In a meeting with prosecutor-to-be Bruce Pickett, Watkins warned that if the feds didn't file charges soon, Pickett would have to prosecute Palmer.

Otherwise, a possible nightmare scenario existed: Palmer walking away a free

man after orchestrating the largest Idaho-based investment fraud in history.

Between 2000 and 2008, Palmer took in some \$75 million from dozens of investors, many of whom belonged to eastern Idaho's wealthiest and most influential families. He promised that they would receive returns of 20 percent to 30 percent regardless of market performance, though he was never licensed as an investment trader.

Six months after Watkins left the prosecutor's office to become a district judge, the U.S. Attorney's Office in Pocatello charged Palmer with money laundering and wire fraud. Palmer pleaded guilty and is serving an eight-year sentence in federal prison.

Pickett could rest easy, knowing that Palmer would pay for his crimes.

The federal charges also freed Pickett's office from the enormous strain of a Ponzi investigation and prosecu-

tion.

Any case can turn complicated and drain resources, but few cases consume as much time and manpower as white-collar crimes.

"Give me a robbery or a murder to solve any day over a white-collar crime," Idaho Falls Police Sgt. Phil Grimes told *The Post-Register*. "They are very difficult to understand."

Part of the difficulty in unraveling them is the time it takes for all-purpose investigators to become familiar with concepts that are basic understanding for specialists, said investigator Jim Burns, who helped probe Palmer's investment scheme for the state of Idaho.

Time detectives spend digging into financial records is time they can't spend on rapes, murders and other crimes.

"Number one, it's an issue of resources. The local folks have lots of pressure on them to get to all sorts of crime," Burns said.

West Nile Virus Found in Canyon County Mosquitoes

NAMPA (AP) • Health officials in Canyon County say some mosquitoes trapped in recent days have tested positive for the West Nile virus.

The positive results are the first for Canyon County since 2009.

The results also mean county workers intend to step up spraying and abatement programs, specifically at the Deer Flat National Wildlife Refuge where the mosquitoes carrying the virus were trapped.

Canyon now joins Ada as two Idaho counties that have tested positive for the virus this summer. So far, health officials say they have no reports of human cases of West Nile.

Idaho led the nation in West Nile cases in 2006, with about 1,000 infections reported and 23 deaths. Last year, there were just three reported cases in humans, and no deaths.

ly asked where they were going and began choking Whitmore and hitting him with the heavy ashtray.

Miller called 911 to report Whitmore tried to kidnap his girlfriend. Responding officers said Miller seemed to be under the influence of drugs and had blood on his shirt.

Police: Boise Cyclist Ran Traffic Light, Hit Car

BOISE (AP) • Police say a 49-year-old cyclist in Boise was ticketed for riding through red traffic light and hitting a car.

The *Idaho Statesman* reported Michael Porter was cited for failure to obey a traffic light early Tuesday. That was after witnesses told

KANDAHAR'S GOVERNANCE GAP

The area struggles to provide basic services, despite years of effort and billions of dollars spent to improve delivery

KARZ, Afghanistan — In this mud-brick village, the United Nations put up the rock retaining wall along the riverbed to keep the road from washing out in floods. The United States paid to fertilize the wheat fields. Hashmat Karzai, a cousin of the president, paid about \$70,000 from his own pocket to string up power lines.

As for the Afghan government, it remains all but invisible, even though Karz is the ancestral home of President Hamid Karzai. “The government itself has not done anything,” said Abdul Ali, a village elder.

The United States and its allies have devoted years of effort and billions of dollars to improve the

delivery of basic services in rural Afghanistan. If Afghan leadership were to have taken hold anywhere, it might well have been in Karz, a farming area on the outskirts of Kandahar city still populated by relatives and tribesmen of the man who has ruled Afghanistan through a decade of war.

Instead, what is emerging in ever starker relief is a governance vacuum as U.S. forces begin to draw down. As the Americans leave, taking with them a main source of economic stimulus, U.S. officials and residents say what worries them most is the weakness of the local and provincial governments being left behind, which command virtually no resources and almost no authority.

That lack of government progress is apparent every day in

Karz with the line of villagers beating a path to Hashmat Karzai's door.

Karzai holds no official post; his prominence in the village stems from his status as a prosperous and powerful tribal elder and his relationship with the president. He is the former owner of a private security company, Asia Security Group, which sent men to guard U.S. bases, and he currently rents land for a hotel near NATO's Kandahar Airfield.

And yet each day the villagers of Karz file into Karzai's courtyard with a fresh list of problems they say they can find no audience for in the offices of government.

One by one they plead for electricity for their irrigation pumps, a clinic for their sick children, or information on the whereabouts of a relative detained by American troops.

“Where should he go? Which

door should he knock?” Hashmat Karzai said as he motioned to one of his supplicants. “This is what's killing the people of Kandahar. You go try to see the governor, it's impossible to see him. The police chief? The mayor? It would take a month to see them.”

“There's a distance between locals and the government. There's a big gap,” Karzai said. “How are you going to cover that gap? I haven't figured it out yet.”

By September, the number of U.S. troops in Kandahar and other, nearby provinces will drop to 13,500, down from a high in April of nearly 20,000. The bloody battles with the Taliban of the past few years — in Kandahar city and the nearby Arghandab Valley — have shifted farther west, into the rural minefields of Zhari and Panjwai districts.

While the locus of violence has changed, the overall strength of the

insurgency has stayed about the same, according to Maj. Gen. James L. Huggins Jr., the top American commander in Kandahar province. He says he is confident that the Afghan soldiers and police can prevail in a fight with the Taliban.

But Huggins said he is less sanguine about the ability of the government to satisfy the people — a responsibility he says must be fulfilled in order for Afghanistan to ultimately keep the insurgency at bay.

In a recent meeting with Kandahar Gov. Torkyalai Wesa, Huggins said, he delivered the message that Afghans urgently need their government's help. “It's the people who are not supportive of the Afghan government. And I told him, ‘Why aren't they supportive? ... You're not delivering the services. You've got to hear the voices. You've got to bring some level of governance.’”

Boy Scouts Restate Ban on Gay Members

NEW YORK • After a confidential two-year review, the Boy Scouts of America on Tuesday emphatically reaffirmed its policy of excluding gays, angering critics who hoped that relentless protest campaigns might lead to change.

The Scouts cited support from parents as a key reason for keeping the policy and expressed hope that the prolonged debate over it might now subside. Bitter reactions from gay-rights activists suggested that result was unlikely.

The Scouts' national spokesman, Deron Smith, told The Associated Press that an 11-member special committee, formed discreetly by top Scout leaders in 2010, came to the conclusion that the exclusion policy “is absolutely the best policy” for the 112-year-old organization.

Smith said the committee — professional scout executives and adult volunteers — was unanimous in its conclusion: preserving a long-standing policy.

As a result, the Scouts' national executive board will take no action

on a resolution submitted at its recent national conference asking for reconsideration.

The Scouts' chief executive, Bob Mazzuca, contended that most Scout families support the policy, which applies to both adult leaders and Scouts.

“The vast majority of the parents of youth we serve value their right to address issues of same-sex orientation within their family, with spiritual advisers and at the appropriate time and in the right setting,” Mazzuca said. “We fully understand that no single policy will accommodate the many diverse views among our membership or society.”

The president of the largest U.S. gay-rights group, Chad Griffin of the Human Rights Campaign, depicted the Scouts' decision as “a missed opportunity of colossal proportions.”

“With the country moving toward inclusion, the leaders of the Boy Scouts of America have instead sent a message to young people that only some of them are valued,” he said. “They've chosen to teach division and intolerance.”

Bus Driver Catches Girl Who Fell Three Stories

NEW YORK • A New York City bus driver was being hailed as a hero for saving a 7-year-old girl who fell three stories from an air conditioning unit outside a Brooklyn building.

“I just prayed that I'd catch her,” Stephen St. Bernard recalled after rescuing the child on Monday.

“Please let me catch her, please let me catch her. That's all I could say,” he added.

St. Bernard said he was walking home from work when he observed a commotion happening outside the Coney Island housing complex.

He saw the girl standing on the air conditioning unit, seemingly unafraid and moving about.

It wasn't clear how she got there, but witnesses told the Daily News that she crawled out by pulling aside the unit's accordion-like plastic partitions that keep the air conditioner secured in the window.

An amateur video shows St. Bernard yelling up to the girl, telling her to go back inside when she suddenly falls and he catches her in his arms.

“I picked her up and carried her. ... She kept looking around. She never closed her eyes. She never lost consciousness,” he said.

The girl was taken to a Coney Island hospital with minor injuries. St. Bernard, a father of four, suffered a torn tendon in his shoulder.

Neighbors said the girl was a special needs child.

Police said no charges were filed against the parents.

Desert Locust Threat Growing for Niger, Mali

Farmers and livestock herders in Mali and Niger face a growing threat from desert locusts after swarms of insects arrived from Algeria and Libya last month, risking food security in some of the world's poorest countries.

Heavy rains in northern Mali and Niger in the past three weeks created good breeding conditions for the crop-devouring insects, and adult locusts there are now laying eggs that will boost num-

bers further, the United Nations' Food & Agriculture Organization said Tuesday.

Locust-control operations are not possible in northern Mali because of political conflict there, the Rome-based FAO said. The country ranks among the 25 poorest in the world, with per-capita gross domestic production of \$1,300, less than 3 percent of U.S. GDP per capita, according to the CIA World Factbook.

“Large numbers of locusts could arise at the end of the sum-

mer,” Keith Cressman, senior locust-forecasting officer at the FAO, was cited as saying in the statement. “At that time, swarms could move to Mauritania, Algeria, Libya and even southern Morocco as well as threaten crops during the harvest period in the Sahel of West Africa.”

The migratory pest poses a threat to pastures and cropland, the FAO wrote. An adult desert locust can consume its own weight in fresh food a day, and a small part of an average locust

swarm eats as much food in a day as about 2,500 people or 10 elephants, according to the UN agency.

Locust infestations were first reported in southwest Libya and southeast Algeria in January, and continued rain and plant growth led to swarm formation by mid-May, the FAO said. Insecurity along the countries' borders hampered survey and control operations, and swarms that could not be controlled migrated across the Sahara to Mali and Niger.

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

Conservation Reserve Program Expands

Habitat buffers will be created for quail, pheasants and gray partridge.

TWIN FALLS • A federal program that pays farmers to set aside marginal cropland now includes an upland bird emphasis.

The Conservation Reserve Program has been expanded to include an initiative focused on habitat buffers for upland birds. The so-called CP33 practice is a continuous sign-up practice, but the Farm Service Agency has a target of enrolling 1,000 acres statewide by Sept. 30, 2012.

The habitat buffer program is intended to create safety corridors that can help pheasants, quail and gray partridge better survive winters. Wildlife biologists are finding pheasants in Idaho have a life expectancy of

one year. What's killing them? Not necessarily a lack of food or nesting cover. Even healthy birds with fat can't outrun a predator who can easily follow them down a corrugate or fence row.

Upland birds need irregular patches of habitat so they can evade predators. The new CP33 initiative is designed to set aside field edges that average at least 30 feet wide, using them as buffers connecting pivot corners or other patches of habitat. The strips cannot be wider than 120 feet.

The more irregular the patches, the better, explained Lance Phillips, FSA county executive director in Twin Falls County. "It's a pretty neat program and we still appear to have acreage

available."

Unlike CRP, the habitat buffer program is noncompetitive. Eligible acres will be accepted until a cap is reached. Participants will receive a signing bonus of \$150 per acre and a 50-50 cost share. A 40 percent practice incentive program is also available, bringing the total cost share to 90 percent.

Participants in Twin Falls County will receive an annual payment of \$70-\$90 for a 10-year period.

They can also look at enrolling the last few rows under an end gun - rows that usually don't yield as well as the rest of the field - into the program. The FSA is encouraging participants to plant a mix of forbs, native grasses and introduced grasses in the buffer to provide permanent cover.

Of course, there are restrictions on what land can

be enrolled. Only land that was cropped at least four years between 2002 and 2007 is eligible. Crops such as corn, small grain, beans and sugarbeets count, but not alfalfa or pasture.

Another unique feature of CP33 is that the Idaho Department of Fish and Game is partnering with the FSA to evaluate the initiative's effectiveness. However, participants will not have to offer hunting access to the enrolled land.

"It's your land," Phillips said. "You can hunt it or use it as a preserve."

Another advantage: After watching all the dust blowing this spring, Phillips said the habitat buffer program could create living fences that could help trap blowing snow or dust.

Bernanke: Recession Likely if Congress Doesn't Act

WASHINGTON (AP) • Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke painted a dark picture of where the U.S. economy is headed if Congress fails to reach agreement soon to avert a budget crisis.

"It would probably knock the recovery back into a recession and cost a lot of jobs, and would greatly delay the recovery that we're hoping to facilitate," said Bernanke at the end of two hours of testimony Tuesday before the Senate Banking Committee.

But Bernanke said lawmakers must go beyond the year-end issues and come up with a plan to shrink the budget deficit. Otherwise, the United States could suffer a financial crisis marked by rising interest rates.

"We might face ... a financial crisis where interest rates would rise, as we're seeing now in Europe, and that would feed through to other interest rates like mortgages and other kinds of rates. And it would be very costly to our economy," he said.

48 Charged in Massive Medicaid Fraud Case

NEW YORK (AP) • A nationwide prescription drug ring bought mountains of HIV medications and other drugs from down-and-out Medicaid recipients in New York City, then marketed the pills to pharmacies that dispensed them to unsuspecting consumers, authorities said Tuesday.

Federal prosecutors in Manhattan detailed the scheme at a news conference announcing charges against 48 defendants.

Arrests were made in New York, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Florida and Texas. The FBI also seized more than 250,000 pills

worth \$16 million.

The defendants "ran a black market in prescription pills involving a double-dip fraud of gigantic proportions," said U.S. Attorney Preet Bharara.

Unlike cases involving prescription painkillers and other addictive narcotics, the ring specialized in expensive medications - some worth more than \$1,000 a bottle - for serious illnesses like HIV, schizophrenia and asthma. Authorities estimated Medicaid lost at least \$500 million in reimbursements over at least five years on pills diverted into the secondhand market.

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French Holocaust Records Exhibited

PARIS • They are among France's darkest days: Police dragged over 13,000 Jews from their homes, confined them in a Paris cycling stadium with little food or water, and then deported them to their deaths in the concentration camp at Auschwitz. But even in France, one of the most brazen collaborations between authorities and the Nazis during World War II is unknown to many in the younger generation.

Police are hoping to change that, opening up their archives on France's biggest single deportation of French Jews for the first time to the public on Thursday.

The often chilling records are being exhibited in the Paris Jewish district's city hall to coincide with the 70th anniversary of the two-day "Vel d'Hiv" roundup, named for the Velodrome d'Hiver, or Winter Velodrome. Many thousands were rounded up on July 16 and 17, 1942, then hauled in miserable conditions in the stadium, just a stone's throw from the Eiffel Tower, before being bused to the French camp at Drancy and then taken by train to Auschwitz.

Tallies list the daily count of men, women and children detained, alongside stark black and white photographs of deportees. A registry of those forced to wear the yellow star and a Jewish census show how police knew who to take. Meticulous handwritten lists detail personal possessions handed over to police. Others list the value of property, such as jewelry, confiscated — often forcibly — during the deportation.

France struggled for years to come to terms with the extent of its wartime collaboration with the Nazis, but over the decades officials have been showing greater willingness to acknowledge the shameful period in its history.

The administrative indifference of the documents is striking.

On July 17, Mrs. I. Rosenbaum signed that she had given up over 1,450 francs worth of possessions before being deported. But there is a further hand annotation: She tried to conceal 50 British pounds that were confiscated.

One page records the pre-dawn start of the roundup, but in one of the archives' only rays of hope it reveals that not everything went according to police plan: "The operation against the Jews began this morning at 4 a.m. (But) it has been slowed down. ... Many men left their homes yesterday." Though experts say the original plan was to deport 27,000 Jews from Paris, some 14,000 managed to avoid roundup or escape.

"Even some police helped them get away," said Charles Tremil, president of the History and Memory Association, a group that raises awareness about Jewish children deported from Paris' 3rd district.

One particularly chilling document, disturbing in its matter-of-fact tone, is dated July 22, the day when the last of the deportees were taken from the velodrome, noting that the site will soon be operational again for use.

"The Jews interned at the Vel d'Hiv were directed this morning ... to the camps," it reads. "In around one hour, the Winter Velodrome will be available."

The exhibit is one of a handful of ways the country is remembering the deportation.

A service for Feasel is scheduled Friday at Legacy Church of Christ in North Richland Hills, Texas. Church officials said he died Sunday, though the cause of death hasn't been revealed.

After being drafted in the sixth round in 1983 by Baltimore, he played 11 games as a rookie for the Colts. He played for Minnesota and Indianapolis in 1984, then didn't play another NFL game until his six seasons with the Seahawks (1987-92), when the center started every game in 1989 and 1990, and all 15 games he played in 1991.

N.C. DEMOCRATIC STATE REP. WAINWRIGHT DIES AT AGE 64

NEW BERN, N.C. (AP) • A North Carolina state House member who served for four years as the No. 2 leader of the chamber has died.

A caretaker for state Rep. William Wainwright of Craven County said he died just before 6 p.m. Tuesday at Carolina East Medical Center in New Bern. Sheila Godette says Wainwright had medical issues arise in the past two or three months, including heart problems.

The 64-year-old Wainwright first joined the Legislature in 1991 and was elected House speaker pro tempore in 2007. He served in the post for four years and was known as a close ally of Democratic Gov. Beverly Perdue, who is also from Craven County.

Rose Webb picked up a broken-handled shovel and pushed its blade into the dry earth.

A few seconds later she held a garlic bulb.

"See how much bigger this one is without the scape?" she said, demonstrating why she pulls off the garlic's immature flowers.

Webb's garlic farm, which she operates with her husband, Philip, and father, Richard Looney, is called My

Dad's Garlic, named after Looney who started growing the herb years ago after he retired.

"I needed something to keep me busy," he said. "There's a bit of science to it."

The family grows eight va-

rieties of garlic, from mild tasting like the Chesnok to extreme like the Korean red.

"That one is hot, hot, hot," Rose said. "Like, pour-me-a-glass-of-water hot."

Warm Spring, Hot Summer Mean Fruitful Season

BUHL • July is for cherries.

Dark red globes hang in bunches from treetops at Akland Orchard in Buhl. On around 3,000 trees on the property, branches hang heavy with cherries — Bing, Lambert and a few pie cherries — or firm-fleshed peaches in a gradient of yellow-green and orange-red, or apples that are still green, basking in the warm sun until they are ruby red.

Yes, this will be a good season for Magic Valley tree fruit. We checked in with three local orchards that allow you to bring a bucket and pick your own.

Peaches are usually ready in mid-August and pears in early September. But it looks like this year both might peak at about the same time, either in late August or early September. It's a little too early to tell with apples, which are usually ready in late September.

Kent Reinke, new owner of Akland Orchard, said the cherry crop was ready a little early this year — June 25 instead of early July — and credited a warm spring and hot summer. Still, a large number of people had their buckets ready, Reinke said, and though some of the trees were picked clean by July 12 plenty of trees are still bearing cherries.

Akland Orchard

Roger Akland owned Akland Orchard for 35 years before selling to his nephew the family business that his parents, Art and Ella Akland, once owned.

"I was raised in this area. I grew up helping pick and eat cherries," Reinke said.

Cooking with a Woodsy Flair

Superior Planks' wooden boards of red oak, sugar maple and cedar are harvested and processed on Madeline Island, one of the Apostle Islands in Lake Superior.

In as green a way as possible, the logs are cut and hauled by simple horsepower — two Belgian shire horses — before they are dried and finished for use on the outdoor grill or in the kitchen oven, where they impart a fragrant woodsy flavor into your food. The oak and maple are good for five or more uses; the softer cedar will last for about three meals.

The planks must be soaked for at least an hour in a liquid. The traditional method would be water, but cooks can experiment with

other choices, such as diluted red wine, bourbon, Scotch whisky, cider, beer or fruit juices. Planks as a cooking technique likely originated in the Pacific North-

west, mainly for cooking fish, though many other foods work well with it, including other seafood, steak and vegetables. For recipes, go to superiorplanks.com.

Rose is a first-grade teacher at Rupert Elementary School. In the summer, she spends much of her days on the four-acre garlic patch amid the family's additional 86 acres.

Theirs is among only 12 state-licensed seed garlic farms in Idaho, said Pam Juker, spokeswoman for the Idaho State Department of Agriculture. The farm is inspected every season to make sure it is free of disease, Rose said.

The garlic is hand-planted, root end down, in September. To make planting easier, Philip developed a machine that digs holes about two or three inches apart.

"What's the old saying, invention is the mother of necessity?" he said.

Afterward, friends and neighbors help plant the cloves.

Near the end of its growing season, each garlic stem produces a flower, called a scape; pulling it off encourages larger bulbs.

Garlic bulbs are sensitive and bruise easily, Rose said, so mid-July harvesting also must be done by hand to avoid damage. Friends and neighbors returned this week to help.

Last week the family was making final touches to a shed they rebuilt to house the garlic while it dries. Garlic should dry for a couple of weeks before being cleaned or used, Rose said.

She and Philip have come to know a lot about garlic, but the farm is Looney's brainchild.

"At 76, he's out most mornings walking in the garlic fields," Rose said. "He keeps an eye on things and tells us when it's time to do certain things."

Using garlic in meals? Cloves should always be firm, he said.

And there's so much you can do with garlic, Philip added. It's used with

spaghetti, pizza, breads, soups — you name it. "You probably eat more garlic than you realize."

What are the family's favorite varieties? "Chesnok," Rose said. "It's easy to cook with and has a fabulous aroma."

Philip, who likes his food spicy, prefers the Korean variety.

And Looney, well, he likes it all and developed his own garlic soup, which, Rose said, helps keep the flu bug away in winter.

Garlic has long been believed in alternative health circles to have medicinal value. You can buy garlic pills at health-food stores, she said, but eating it fresh is best.

Rose said she's been experimenting with the philosophy, noting that she usually gets sick during winter. Last winter, however, she ate plenty of garlic and didn't become ill once. That says something when you work around a lot of first-graders with runny noses, she said.

Good luck or garlic? She

credits the garlic.

Health benefits aside, growing garlic has become a hobby, a business and a way of life for the Webbs and Looney. The family sells seed stock to nurseries throughout Idaho, to Treasure Valley farmers markets and to home gardeners who want a strong brand of garlic, as well as selling garlic for culinary use. They also sell plenty of garlic on eBay.

Rose is developing a garlic sauce that she hopes to market soon.

People sometimes contact the farm directly for garlic starters or culinary purposes.

"No matter what kind of garlic you want," Rose said, "we probably have it."

My Dad's Garlic Soup

Recipe courtesy of Richard Looney of Rupert.

- 1 medium yellow onion, sliced
- 15 to 20 cloves of garlic, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 to 2 tablespoons fresh parsley, chopped (or use dried)
- 4 cups chicken stock
- 1 large white potato, peeled and cut into small cubes

- 1/2 teaspoon thyme
- Fresh ground black pepper, to taste

Saute onion and garlic in butter and oil until the onion is soft and transparent. Do not brown.

In a soup pot add sauteed onion and garlic, parsley, chicken stock, potato, thyme and pepper. Simmer, covered, for about 20 minutes or until the potatoes are tender.

Rosie's Garlic Mashed Potatoes

Recipe courtesy of Rose Webb of Rupert.

- 4-6 Idaho potatoes, washed, peeled and chunked
- 4-6 cloves garlic, sliced in half
- 4 ounces cream cheese
- 1/4 cup butter
- 2 teaspoons dried oregano
- Dash of salt

Boil potatoes and garlic in lightly salted water for 20 minutes or until you can easily pierce potatoes with a fork. Drain well.

Use an electric mixer to whip potatoes and garlic. Add cream cheese, butter and oregano. Add salt to taste. Transfer to a serving bowl and dot with a pat of butter.

Unwrap one of these Chocolate Tamales, and the heady scent of cinnamon and chocolate wafts out. Pick up the filling with your fingers, or drizzle it with a little chocolate sauce and eat with a fork. For a retro taste, add miniature marshmallows to the filling to create s'mores tamales.

Serve warm, accompanied by Mexican vanilla ice cream, if desired.

The tamales can be assembled two weeks in advance, wrapped tightly in several layers of plastic wrap and frozen. Defrost them overnight in the refrigerator, then proceed with the steaming instructions.

The tamales can also be steamed, cooled, wrapped tightly in several layers of plastic wrap and frozen. To reheat, defrost completely, arrange them in a single layer on a baking sheet, cover tightly with foil and bake at 350 degrees for 10 to 15 minutes or until warmed through.

Chocolate Tamales

Makes 15 to 18 dessert tamales.

21 dried corn husks
2 cups masa harina
1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
2 cups whole milk
8 tablespoons (1 stick) unsalted butter, at room temperature
3/4 cup packed light brown sugar
2 cups bittersweet chocolate chips or disks

Place the corn husks in a large bowl and cover them with boiling water. Weigh the husks down with a heavy plate or bowl to ensure that they are submerged; soak for 15 minutes or until the husks are pliable. Trans-

fer to a colander to drain.

Use a spoon to combine the masa harina, cinnamon, salt, vanilla extract and milk in a medium bowl.

Combine the butter and brown sugar in the bowl of a stand mixer at medium-high speed until the mixture is light and fluffy, 2 to 3 minutes. Add the masa mixture and mix until fully incorporated.

To wrap the tamales, tear about 3 of the corn husks lengthwise into thin strips; you will use these to tie the tamales closed. Pat a corn husk dry and lay it on a work surface with the tapered end pointing toward you. Spoon about 1/4 cup of the masa filling onto the center of the husk and spread or pat it evenly into a rectangle about 4 inches across and 3 inches top to bottom.

Arrange a tablespoon of chocolate chips in a vertical line down the center of the filling. With your fingers, bring together the two long sides of the corn husk and press the two edges of filling together to surround the chocolate chips. Roll the corn husk around the filling until the tamal is closed and no filling shows. Use two of the corn husk strips to firmly tie the ends of the tamal closed. (The strips are stronger than you think.) Repeat with the remaining corn husks and filling.

Have ready a large pot with a steamer basket attached. (Or use a roasting pan with an elevated wire rack.) Pour 1/2 inch to 1 inch of water into the pot. Layer the tamales in the basket and transfer to the pot, making sure the water level is lower than the bottom of the basket, so it doesn't touch the tamales. Cover the tamales with any remaining soaked corn husks, then cover with the pot lid. Steam over medium-low heat for about 90 minutes or until the corn husks can easily be pulled away from the masa filling. Serve warm.

Heading Back to School Calls for Healthy Start

When the kids are heading back to school, one of the best things you can do is start them off with a healthy breakfast.

But we know that sometimes the chaos of trying to get them out the door in the morning makes this a challenge. So we created this breakfast with that in mind.

Assembled entirely the night before, this warm and satisfying breakfast casserole has all the makings of a great start to the day — whole grains, lean protein, even some fruit. All you have to do in the morning is turn on the oven and pop the casserole in for a few minutes. And consider saving a piece for yourself to rewarm for lunch with a salad.

Whole-Grain Apple and Ham Breakfast Casserole

Start to finish: 10 minutes active, overnight refrigeration, 35 minutes baking. Servings: 8.

4 ounces deli-sliced ham, chopped
3 apples, peeled, cored and diced
6 slices whole-grain bread, cubed
1/2 cup low-fat shredded cheddar cheese
8 egg whites
3/4 cup fat-free half-and-half
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

The night before, in a medium casserole dish toss together the ham, apples, bread cubes and cheese. Set aside.

In a medium bowl, beat together the egg whites and fat-free half-and-half. Pour the egg mixture over the bread and meat. Use a fork to gently press the bread to help it absorb the liquid. Sprinkle the Parmesan cheese over the casserole. Cover the dish with foil and refrigerate until morning.

When ready to bake, heat the oven to 375 degrees.

Bake the casserole, covered, for 20 minutes, then uncover and bake for another 10 to 15 minutes, or until puffed and golden brown. **Per serving:** 160 calories; 30 calories from fat (19 per-



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cent of total calories); 3 g fat (1.5 g saturated); 0 g trans fats); 10 mg chole-

sterol; 21 g carbohydrate; 12 g protein; 2 g fiber; 440 mg sodium.

Spicy Kebabs Taste Great Hot or Cold

Get out the food processor or your favorite quick-chop implement: These kebabs are hand-shaped mixtures of minced chicken, onion, green chili pepper and cilantro bound with a bit of breadcrumbs and egg. Either red or sweet onion may be used; the red will lend more of a sharp bite. The kebabs taste great hot or cold; leftovers make great sandwiches or frittata fixings.

The original recipe calls for grinding the spices, but we found that toasting already-ground spices works fine here, and it saves a bit of time.

Serve on bamboo skewers, with a mint-cooking farro and a mint or tamarind chutney mixed into plain yogurt.

Shami (Spicy Chicken) Kebabs

Makes twelve 3-inch kebabs (4 to 6 servings).

1 black cardamom pod (may substitute green cardamom pod)
1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
1 teaspoon cumin seed
1 small red or yellow onion (2 or 3 ounces)

Leaves from 6 to 8 stems cilantro
1-inch piece fresh ginger root
1 medium clove garlic
1 small green chili pepper
1 3/4 to 2 pounds boneless, skinless chicken (preferably a mixture of light and dark meat)
Generous pinch kosher salt
1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
1 large egg
1/4 cup plain dried bread crumbs (may substitute 1/3 cup packed fresh breadcrumbs)

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees. Use nonstick olive oil cooking spray to grease a rimmed baking sheet.

Crush the cardamom pod to release its seeds; transfer them to the baking sheet, along with the cinnamon, cloves and cumin seed.

Remove and discard all visible fat from the chicken. Cut the meat into small, equal-size chunks, then transfer to the food processor. Pulse until evenly chopped, stopping short of a mushy consistency. Transfer to the mixing bowl, along with the salt, black pepper, egg, bread crumbs and toasted spices. Use your clean hands to combine and incorporate the ingredients.

Scoop a small handful into your palm, shaping the mixture to a log that's 3 inches long and 1 inch wide. Place on the baking sheet. Repeat to form 11 more logs, using all of the mixture and spacing the logs at least 1 inch apart. Roll and spray them lightly with the nonstick olive oil cooking spray. Bake for 8 to 10 minutes, then turn them over and bake for 6 to 8 minutes or until evenly browned.

Divide among individual plates, skewering them if desired for easy handling. **Per kebab:** 90 calories, 16 g protein, 3 g carbohydrates, 2 g fat, 0 g saturated fat, 55 mg cholesterol, 85 mg sodium, 0 g dietary fiber, 0 g sugar.

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Crab Spring Rolls Are a Hit

At the Robert Morris Inn in Oxford, Md., “people come from all over to eat these,” says chef-owner Mark Salter. The dressing can be made a day in advance, covered and refrigerated. Bring it to room temperature before using.

Crab Spring Rolls With Grapefruit and Avocado

Makes 4 egg rolls
(4 servings).

For the dressing:

3/4 teaspoon sugar
3/4 cup pink grapefruit juice, preferably freshly squeezed
1/2 teaspoon honey, preferably clover honey
Freshly squeezed juice of 1/2 large lime (at least 2 teaspoons)

6 tablespoons grapeseed oil
Salt
Freshly ground black pepper

For the spring rolls:

7 ounces bok choy (about 1/2 head)
Salt
1/2 bunch scallions, white and light-green parts, cut crosswise into thin slices (about 3/4 cup)
4 ounces jumbo lump crabmeat, picked over to remove shells and cartilage
2 slices pickled ginger, finely chopped (about 1 teaspoon)
1 teaspoon chopped cilantro

Freshly squeezed juice of 1/2 large lime (at least 2 teaspoons)

Freshly ground black pepper
Vegetable oil, for frying
4 egg roll wrappers

For assembly:
1 pink grapefruit, sectioned (see notes)
1 ripe avocado
2 ounces sliced almonds, toasted (see notes)
2 ounces mesclun greens

For the dressing: Heat the sugar in a small stainless-steel saucepan over low heat until the sugar melts. Add the grapefruit juice, stir to combine and in-

crease the heat to medium-high. When the mixture begins to boil, reduce the heat to maintain a steady, low boil and cook until the liquid has reduced to 1/4 cup. Remove the saucepan from the heat, whisk in the honey, lime juice and grapeseed oil, and season lightly with salt and pepper. The yield about 1/2 cup.

For the spring rolls: Use a sharp knife to slice the bok choy into thin shreds. Bring an inch of water to a boil over medium heat in a medium saucepan with a lid; add a pinch of salt and set a steamer basket into the saucepan. Transfer the

bok choy to the basket, cover the saucepan and steam for 2 to 3 minutes, until the bok choy is tender. Remove the steamer basket from the pan and transfer the bok choy to a large mixing bowl.

Add a cup or so of water to the saucepan and bring it to a boil. Add the scallions and cook for 30 seconds, then pour them into a colander to drain. When they are cool enough to handle, squeeze out most of the water and add them to the bowl with the bok choy.

Add the crabmeat, ginger, cilantro and lime juice to the bowl. Season with salt

and pepper to taste. Toss gently to combine.

Pour the oil into a medium pot with tall sides, to a depth of about 3 inches, and heat over medium-high heat. You're looking to reach an oil temperature of 350 degrees, so adjust the heat as needed. Line a large plate with several layers of paper towels.

Place an egg roll wrapper on a work surface. Use one-quarter of the crab mixture and follow the manufacturer's directions to fill and roll the wrapper, using the beaten egg yolk to seal it. Repeat to fill the remaining three wrappers.

When the oil is ready, use

tongs to lower 1 or 2 egg rolls at a time into the oil. Fry for 3 to 4 minutes, using the tongs to turn the rolls to fry them to a uniform golden brown. Use the tongs to transfer the egg rolls to the paper towels to drain. Repeat with the remaining egg rolls.

For assembly: Peel and pit the avocado. Cut the flesh into 12 wedges. Arrange 3 avocado segments and 3 grapefruit segments on the edges of each plate and sprinkle with the toasted almonds. Toss the mesclun in a mixing bowl with enough of the dressing to lightly coat the leaves, then arrange the greens in a pile in the middle of each plate. **Cut each spring roll** in half on the diagonal and arrange on the greens. Drizzle each plate with more pink grapefruit dressing, and serve.

Notes: To section a grapefruit, use a large knife to slice off both ends of the fruit. Stand the fruit on end and slice downward along the curve of the fruit, cutting away both the peel and pith while leaving as much of the flesh as possible. Using a paring knife, cut between the sections to detach each section of fruit from its surrounding membrane.

To toast sliced almonds, cook them in a heavy dry skillet over medium-high heat, stirring constantly, for 2 to 3 minutes, until they are lightly browned and begin to smell toasty. Watch carefully; nuts can burn quickly. Transfer to a dish to cool.

DIY BERRY CREAMSICLE ICE CREAM SANDWICHES

Few treats say — or perhaps scream — summer quite the way ice cream does. And frankly, it's hard to improve on a giant, creamy, chilly bowlful.

But we figured we'd try, anyway, because sometimes you want a little more pizzazz.

So we came up with these ice cream sandwiches that are ridiculously easy to put together. We baked up some cookies (which you can do well in advance), then filled them with a blend of purchased sherbets, sorbets and vanilla ice cream. We liked orange sherbet and raspberry sorbet because they had a creamsicle effect when combined with vanilla, but you could use any flavors you prefer.

To jazz it up even more, we rolled the edges of the exposed ice cream in a variety of toppings. Try chopped nuts, shaved chocolate, candy sprinkles, toasted coconut, or whatever.

Summertime Ice Cream Sandwiches

Start to finish: 30 minutes, plus cooling the cookies.
Makes 12 sandwiches.

1 1/4 cups sugar, divided
1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, room temperature
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
2 tablespoons spiced rum or brandy
1 egg
2 cups all-purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking powder



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3/4 cup orange sherbet, raspberry sorbet or other fruity frozen dessert
3/4 cup vanilla ice cream

Heat the oven to 350 degrees. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper or lightly coat with cooking spray. Place 1/4 cup of the sugar in a shallow dish or pie pan.

In a large bowl, use an electric mixer to beat together the remaining 1 cup of sugar, the butter, vanilla, almond extract and rum until light and fluffy. Add the egg, scraping down the sides of the bowl and mixing until well incorporated. Stir in the flour, salt and baking powder.

Scoop the dough by the tablespoonful and form into balls. One at a time, place each ball of dough in the sugar in the shallow dish. Roll around until all sides are coated. Arrange the sugared balls of dough on the prepared baking sheet, leaving 2 inches between them to allow for spreading. Bake for 12 to 15 minutes, or un-

til the edges are just beginning to brown. Allow to cool on the baking sheet.

While the cookies cool, remove the sherbet or sorbet and ice cream from the freezer. One at a time, microwave for 10 to 15 seconds, or just long enough to soften. In a large bowl, combine the two flavors and use a rubber spatula to swirl them together. Do not overmix or completely blend them.

Overtun 1 cookie and place about 1 tablespoon of the ice cream mixture on it. Top with a second cookie and gently squeeze together. Return to the freezer until firm. If not serving right away, wrap tightly in plastic wrap and store in the freezer.

Butter, Maple Syrup Belong Together

Question: How can I beat butter and maple syrup together? When I try, the mixture separates. I tried putting the bowl in the refrigerator for 10 minutes, but that didn't help. I made sure the butter wasn't too soft and the maple syrup was room temperature.

Answer: To paraphrase “Cool Hand Luke,” what we've got here is failure to emulsify. When two substances are chemically different, they will repel each other, particularly when one of those substances is a fat.

But if you can bring oil and vinegar together for a vinaigrette, surely there's a way to bring butter and maple syrup together.

Since Canada certainly has experts on maple syrup, I looked on several Canadian food sites and found a trick: Heat the maple syrup first.

Put the syrup in a saucepan over low heat and bring to to 234 degrees, also known as the soft-ball stage. Then add the butter, which will melt.

Pour the syrup and butter mixture into a mixing bowl and beat with an electric mixture until it's fluffy. Keep it refrigerated and it should stay together long enough to end up on your pancakes.

THAT'S NO WEED, THAT'S SALAD

Before making this salad, taste a dandelion leaf to make sure it's not too bitter for your taste; if it is too sharp, try soaking it for a few hours in a couple of changes of cold, salted water.

In cooler months, you can use Catalogna chicory or puntarelle in place of the dandelion. From Washington food writer Emily Horton.

Dandelion Salad With Almond-Lemon Dressing

4 servings.

2 medium cloves garlic
1/2 teaspoon sea salt
12 raw almonds (about 1/2 ounce)
4 teaspoons freshly squeezed lemon juice
1/4 cup olive oil

1/4 teaspoon freshly cracked black pepper, or to taste
1 pound dandelion leaves, thick stems trimmed off and discarded, cut into 1-inch lengths; see headnote

Pound the garlic and a pinch of the salt with a mortar and pestle, forming a coarse paste. Finely chop the almonds, then add them to the garlic and crush them lightly. Add the lemon juice, olive oil, the remaining salt and the pepper, and whisk until emulsified.

Pour the dressing over the dandelion greens and massage it into the leaves. Serve immediately.

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Fresh Ginger: What It Is and How to Use It

People have been eating it for thousands of years, yet still no one can tell me why it should be peeled. So I don't, and neither should you.

"It" being fresh ginger, the gnarly brown root that lives amongst the grocer's Asian produce. And the flavor is so much better than dried, you must get to know it.

Most of us think of ginger as the powder in the spice cabinet and use it mostly for baking. In Asia, where ginger originated, it's more a savory ingredient. That's because fresh ginger packs tons of warm, pungent, peppery flavor that works so well with meats and vegetables.

Though they can be used interchangeably, the flavor of fresh ginger is more pronounced than dried, sporting heavy citrus, even acidic notes. In Asia, fresh ginger is an essential part of numerous classic dishes, including stir-fries, soups, sauces and marinades, as well as Indian curries.

When cooking with fresh ginger, keep in mind a couple things.

First, cooking mellows the flavor. So if you want to really taste it, add some ginger at the beginning of cooking, and a bit more at the end.

Second, the strength of the ginger can vary widely by the piece. So if you're looking for a serious hit of ginger, taste it before you add it.

Now, about that peeling. Watch cooking shows and read recipes, and you'll be told again and again to peel your ginger before chopping, slicing or grating it. I have no idea why. The skin is entirely edible and doesn't change the flavor. So save yourself the time and effort, and just use your ginger as is.

And the best tool for the job is a wand-style grater, such as a Microplane. These graters quickly reduce ginger root to fine shavings or pulp ideal for cooking.

When shopping for fresh ginger, look for firm, tan roots with no signs of mold or shriveling. It can be stored in the refrigerator for several

weeks. But I prefer to freeze my fresh ginger. Frozen ginger lasts for months and is easier to grate than fresh.

Ginger-Orange Chicken Cutlets

Start to finish: 1 hour (20 minutes active). Servings: 4.

1 cup orange juice

2-inch chunk fresh ginger
1 clove garlic
1 teaspoon salt
2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts
1/2 cup all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon garlic powder
1 egg
1 1/4 cups panko bread-crumbs
1/4 cup heavy cream

In a blender, combine the orange juice, ginger, garlic and salt. Puree until smooth, then set aside. Carefully slice each chick-

en breast in half horizontally to create 2 thin halves. Place the chicken in a zip-close plastic bag, then add the orange juice mixture. Refrigerate the chicken for at least 30 minutes.

When ready to cook, heat the oven to 400 degrees. Coat a baking sheet with cooking spray.

In a wide, shallow bowl, mix together the flour and garlic powder. Beat the egg in a second bowl, and pour the panko into a third.

One at a time, remove the chicken pieces from the marinade, reserving the marinade. Dredge each piece of chicken first through the flour, then the

egg, then the panko. Arrange them on the prepared baking sheet.

Spritz the tops of the chicken with cooking spray, then bake for 25 minutes.

Meanwhile, transfer the marinade to a small saucepan over medium-high heat. Bring to a boil and cook for 3 minutes. Stir in the cream. Serve the chicken with the sauce. Per serving: 340 calories; 70 calories from fat (21 percent of total calories); 8 g fat (4 g saturated; 0 g trans fats); 100 mg cholesterol; 46 g carbohydrate; 21 g protein; 1 g fiber; 620 mg sodium.

want to taste: Maybe you want to add a couple whites to your portfolio. Perhaps a couple roses, which are great summer wines. Maybe you want to experiment with a syrah from Washington.

"It's like shopping in a store. You usually go knowing what kinds of clothes you want," Ashenbrener said.

Take time to listen to the vintners and find out what they're excited about, trust-

ing that they're not just trying to sell you something, Ashenbrener added.

Once you've picked a wine to try, put all your senses to the test. Examine it in the glass against a white background, judging the depth of the wine by the pigment. Heavy wines will be deeper in color. Sweeter wines will leave thick streaks, called legs, down the inside of the glass when swirled.

Sniff before you swirl with a little sniff like a hunting dog might take. Then swirl it

and sniff again, checking out the more potent smell caused by the wine's exposure to oxygen, suggested Ashenbrener, who periodically offers wine tasting classes at his store. A sniff can reveal a wine's faults, such as oxidation due to age.

Then taste the wine, holding it in your mouth for a few seconds to saturate the taste buds. Allow the wine to move around your tongue, across the back of your palate and up your nose while you purse your lips to breathe. The slower the wine passes through your mouth the fuller the gustatory profile.

"This is the fun part — it should bring all the flavors out, including the greenness of the earth, the sweet, salty and bitter, the fruitiness," Ashenbrener said.

Buhl winery owner Claudia Snyder said her Snyder Winery has always gotten positive responses at the Sun Valley wine tasting.

"It's a fun event — people should go," she said. "It's filled with people who know wines, and participants should take advantage of that. Ask: What grapes is the wine made of? What varietal? How is the wine processed?"

This year's Wine Auction Weekend will include a new Wine and Chocolate Tasting on July 20 at the Ketchum Grill, along with the traditional and popular Wine Picnic and Concert at Warm Springs Ranch on July 21.

The picnic will feature the music of Portland March-Fourth Marching Band, which performed at last year's Wine Auction Gala,

said Kristine Bretall, spokeswoman for the Sun Valley Center for the Arts. The 12-piece band is a kaleidoscope of musical and visual energy with marching band-themed costumes and funky electric bass. Expect a wide variety such as eastern European gypsy music and Louisiana swamp music.

Meanwhile, Atkinsons' Markets will again offer its popular wine lot for the July 20 Gala Wine Auction under the big tent at Dollar Mountain Lodge. This year's lot — with hand-painted labels designed by Sharon Pyle, Atkinsons' specialties manager, and penned by Ketchum artist Karen McCall — will feature a balloon over a panorama of Sun Valley that includes Bald Mountain.

The lot has raised nearly a

half-million dollars to support the arts in the Wood River Valley over the past 17 years, Tom Pyle said.

The gala auction — which organizers say is ranked among the nation's top 10 charity wine auctions — comes with a big ticket price and deep-pocketed bidders.

"Although proceeds from the Wine Auction account for 40 percent of the operating budget of the nonprofit Sun Valley Center for the Arts, that fact is often overshadowed by the degree to which the event has become a three-day celebration of gourmet food and fine wine," a center press release said. "Attendees number in thousands, with over a hundred community volunteers pitching in to serve food, pour wine and help out in numerous other ways."

Crew Chief Change for Slumping Edwards

CHARLOTTE, N.C. • Carl Edwards' crew chief stepped down Tuesday, 19 races removed from a disheartening defeat in last year's championship race.

Bob Osborne cited undisclosed health concerns in his decision to relinquish the No. 99 Ford, which has been stuck in a slump since Edwards ended last season tied with Tony Stewart in the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship. The title went to Stewart on a tie-breaker.

"I have had the pleasure of working with Carl Edwards for the past nine years and, during that time, my focus has been building a championship-caliber program," Osborne said in a statement.

"At this time in my life, however, concerns with my health have necessitated that I change my role within the organization."

Osborne, who guided Edwards to 18 wins and two runner-up finishes in the points, will move to a senior management position with Roush Fenway Racing. He'll be replaced as crew chief by Chad Norris, who has been with Roush since 2005 as a crew chief in the Nationwide and Truck Series.

"This transition is not an easy one, but I'm thankful to have the full support of Jack (Roush), Carl and the entire organization. I also have every confidence in Chad Norris, and I look forward to working with him as we continue to pursue a championship in 2012," said Osborne, who

asked for privacy from the NASCAR community.

Osborne had run the No. 99 team since 2004, and Edwards took over that ride for the final 13 races of that season.

But Edwards is stuck in a 52-race losing streak dating back to Las Vegas last season, and at 11th in the point standings he's in danger of missing the Chase this season. Edwards has only worked with Osborne at the Cup level.

"I cannot say enough good things about Bob Osborne," Edwards said. "I'm so thankful for what he's done for me as a driver, and he is without a doubt one of the smartest guys in the sport. I'm also appreciative of the fact that he'll continue to be a resource for me and our team as we focus on these final races."

Norris since last season has led Roush Fenway's testing program, and has been crew chief for Ricky Stenhouse, Jr.'s limited Sprint Cup Series schedule and Trevor Bayne's partial Nationwide Series schedule.

Norris led Bayne to his inaugural Nationwide Series win at Texas Motor Speedway in November 2011.

"We're very fortunate to have Chad Norris as part of our organization to take over for the No. 99," Edwards said. "I've known Chad for a long time and he is a fierce competitor. We've got our work cut out for us over the next seven races, and I've got every confidence Chad can lead our team to where we need to be."

Signing Is Lin-Lin Situation for Rockets

HOUSTON • Jeremy Lin is leaving New York and taking Linsanity to Houston.

The New York Knicks announced Tuesday night that they will not match the Houston Rockets' three-year, \$25 million offer for Lin, a restricted free-agent.

New York officially had until 11:59 EDT to decide whether to re-sign Lin, who became an international phenomenon in the media glare of the Big Apple.

The Rockets made it tough for the Knicks to sign off on keeping him by backloading their offer sheet with a \$15 million salary in the third season. If the Knicks agreed to that deal, they would've faced a hefty luxury tax in 2014-15 because of other big contracts on their books — between \$30-40 million.

Lin now returns to Houston, where he spent about two weeks in December during training camp. The Rockets liked what they saw in the undrafted point guard, but had to waive him because they had Kyle Lowry and Goran Dragic on the roster.

The New York Times initially reported the Knicks' decision, citing an unidentified person briefed on the situation.

One sports consultant said the adjustment to the offer sheet was a stroke of genius by Rockets general manager Daryl Morey.

"The Rockets deserve a lot of credit for the way they've gone about this," said Marc Ganis, president of Chicago-based SportsCorp. "It was extremely intelligent — with an assassin's touch."

The Knicks, though, gave Lin his first

shot, picking him up after the Rockets waived him. He was briefly demoted to the developmental league, recalled and finally got his chance when coach Mike D'Antoni put him in with the Knicks floundering at 8-15. Lin scored a career-high 25 points in a 99-92 win over New Jersey Nets and "Linsanity" was born.

Lin had slept on teammate Landry Fields' couch the night before, still refusing to get his own place as he headed into that week, knowing the Knicks would have to decide whether to cut him or guarantee his contract for the rest of the season.

But Lin proved more than just an

overnight sensation — he had 28 and 23 points in his first two NBA starts, and then scored a career-high 38 in a 92-85 victory over Kobe Bryant and the Los Angeles Lakers.

The stock price for Madison Square Garden Inc. surged on the production and popularity of the team's international star. Lin also made the Sports Illustrated cover in consecutive weeks, only the 12th athlete to hold that distinction since 1990. On Tuesday, Lin had more than 829,000 followers on Twitter.

The more opponents saw Lin, though, the more they seemed to figure him out as the season wore on. He went 1 for 11 with eight turnovers in a humbling, nationally televised loss in Miami and the Knicks dropped their first six games in March.

D'Antoni resigned in mid-March and Lin hurt his left knee less than two weeks later. The Knicks revealed on April 1 that Lin needed surgery to repair a meniscus tear and would miss six weeks.

The Knicks made the playoffs behind surging Carmelo Anthony, but bowed out to Miami in the first round. The Rockets, meanwhile, missed the post-season for the third straight year and have spent the offseason completely rebuilding their roster.

Houston has been trying to put together a package of assets and draft picks to offer Orlando in exchange for disgruntled All-Star center Dwight Howard. In the process, the Rockets lost the unrestricted free agent Dragic to Phoenix, then traded Lowry to Toronto in exchange for a future first-round pick with lottery protection.

Time, History Not on Westwood's Side

This is not Lee Westwood's last chance to win a major. It might not even be his best chance.

History won't be on his side much longer, however, and time isn't too far behind.

Westwood's best friend, Darren Clarke, was 42 when he finally captured his first major last year at the British Open. That put him in an elite group, though nowhere near the prestigious group of names on the claret jug. Clarke is one of only six players in 160 years of championship golf to capture his first major in his 40s.

The list starts with Old Tom Morris, who really wasn't that old (40) when he won the second Open Championship in 1861 at Prestwick. It took nearly 100 years for another player in his 40s to win his first major when Tommy Bolt won the 1958 U.S. Open at age 42. The others were Jerry Barber (45 in the 1961 PGA Championship), Roberto De Vincenzo (44 in the 1967 British Open), Tom Kite (42 in the 1992 U.S. Open) and Mark O'Meara (40 in the 1998 Masters).

Westwood is 39.

The more meaningful number for Westwood is "3" and it can be interpreted a couple of ways. He is No. 3 in the world, and that's no accident. One reason for such a high ranking is his performance in the majors. When he tied for third in the

Masters this year, it was his seventh top-3 finish in a major. That's the most of any player who has never won a major dating to the creation of the Masters in 1934, and Westwood compiled this record since the U.S. Open in 2008 at Torrey Pines.

It would seem he's getting close.

There is even more attention on Westwood at this British Open because of where he's from and where it is being played. The answer to both is England, and the last English player to win an Open on English soil was Tony Jacklin in 1969 — at Royal Lytham & St. Annes.

Luke Donald is No. 1 in the world, also without a major. The money would be on

Westwood getting their first, simply because of his performance in the majors. He has come close three times, while Donald has never come up the 18th at a major looking like he had a chance to win.

Based on his worldwide wins (38) and number of serious chances in a major (three), Westwood wins every argument as the best player to have never won a major from his generation. And it didn't take long for him to be reminded of that Tuesday in his news conference.

The moderator mentioned that Jacklin had spoken to the press only the day before, and what would it mean to follow in his footsteps as an English winner of the claret

jug on a links course in England?

Westwood doesn't quite understand how that makes it even more important to win, so he looked at a reporter, smiled and said, "You know what I'm thinking?" Then, he turned more serious, but only momentarily.

"This is the biggest championship in the world for me," he said. "It would obviously mean a lot, not just because Tony was the last Englishman named Tony to win the Open championship, but because it's the championship."

He grinned to see if the moderator picked up on the additional "Tony," then broke out laughing when it was clear he didn't.





Penn State to Respond Quickly to NCAA Demand

Penn State said it will respond within days to the NCAA's demand for information as the governing body decides whether the university should face penalties — including a possible shutdown of its storied football program — in the wake of the Jerry Sandusky child sex abuse scandal.

Penn State President Rodney Erickson said Tuesday he doesn't want to "jump to conclusions" about possible sanctions after the head of the NCAA declared the so-called death penalty has not been ruled out.

The NCAA is investigating whether Penn State lost "institutional control" over its athletic program and violated ethics rules. The probe had been on hold for eight months while former FBI Director Louis Freeh conducted an investigation on behalf of the school's board of trustees. Freeh's 267-page report, released last week, asserted that late football coach Joe Paterno and three top officials buried allegations against Sandusky, the retired defensive coordinator, more than a decade ago to protect the university's image.

Sandusky was convicted last month of sexually abusing 10 boys over a 15-year period. He awaits sentencing.

Penn State, with the results of its own investigation in hand, can turn its attention to the NCAA, Erickson said.

"The NCAA has indicated that they'd like me to respond ... as quickly as possible now that we have the Freeh report," he said. "So we've already started the process of starting to compose that response. We'll do so over the course of the next few days and get that response back as soon as possible, and we'll then engage in discussions with the NCAA."

In a PBS interview Monday night, NCAA President Mark Emmert said he's "never seen anything as egregious as this in terms of just overall conduct and behavior inside a university." He said he doesn't want to take "anything off the table" if there's a finding that Penn State violated NCAA rules.

Games' Organizers Insist Early Woes Are Minor

London Games officials dismissed concerns Tuesday over a lost bus driver, a scramble for more security guards and some rain-soaked venues — embarrassments that had one tabloid newspaper headline using the Olympic rings to spell out the word "OOPS!"

Organizers said some of the complaints were exaggerated and tried to put the best face on the unfolding security debacle, as well as other concerns about the games, which start in 10 days.

"Let's put this in proportion," London Olympics head Sebastian Coe told reporters. "This has not, nor will it, impact on the safety and security of these games. That, of course, is our No. 1 priority."

His efforts were undercut in Parliament, where the chief executive of the G4S security group, Nick Buckles, acknowledged that his company's failure to recruit enough Olympic staff had embarrassed the entire nation. Some 3,500 British troops — including some just back from Afghanistan — had to be called in on short notice to fill the gap. Thousands more military personnel had already been assigned to the games.

Buckles gave a groveling mea culpa on live TV as he was being questioned by angry lawmakers.

"It's a humiliating shambles for the country, isn't it?" asked Labour lawmaker David Winnick.

"I cannot disagree with you," Buckles said.

He was hard-pressed to explain why his company had failed to tell officials until only two weeks before the start of the games that its recruitment efforts had failed.

Some U.S. security and law enforcement officials had privately expressed concerns as early as last year that there might not be enough personnel for the London Games.

The FBI is sending about two dozen agents to London to work on Olympic security, according to two U.S. government officials. They spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to talk publicly about the plans.

G4S will pay for its mistake, saying it expects to lose between 35 million pounds and 50 million pounds (\$54 million to \$78 million) on the contract, which is about 12 percent of its annual profit.

Olympics minister Hugh Robertson said the deployment of soldiers at Olympic Park would give people "enormous reassurance."

As the world's athletes flew into London on Monday — the first big day of Olympic arrivals — a few buses carrying them from Heathrow Airport took a wrong turn and got lost.

"OOPS!" headlined The Sun tabloid, using two of the interlocked Olympic rings in the word.

"First day. First arrivals. It's going to happen," said Jayne Pearce, head of press operations.

Still, the lost buses — one carrying Americans, the other Australians — touched a nerve. From the very start, London organizers have feared repeating the transportation woes of the 1996 Atlanta Olympics, where one of the biggest problems was hiring bus drivers from outside the city who didn't know their way around.

Coe urged optimism, despite a Twitter storm that erupted when U.S. hurdler Kerron Clement took to the social networking site to express frustration with what he said was a four-hour bus ride from Heathrow to the athletes village.

Coe said Clement's bus journey actually took 2 1/2 hours and most athletes experienced no problems in reaching the village.

"Apart from a misturning and a couple of tweets, we're in pretty good shape," Coe quipped. "The majority of athletes got in in good shape and on time. When they were met by our village mayor and chief executive, they were busily tweeting, saying how much they were enjoying village life. Ninety-eight percent of these journeys went without a hitch!"

No Decision Yet on DUI Charges Vs. Lynch

Seattle Seahawks running back Marshawn Lynch was seen weaving from lane to lane on Interstate 880 in the Oakland, Calif., area on Saturday morning, leading to his arrest for investigation of DUI.

An incident report released by the California Highway Patrol on Tuesday described Lynch driving a Ford Econoline van and having two near collisions with two other vehicles driving in adjacent lanes.

Authorities say Lynch was pulled over around 3:20 a.m. PDT Saturday in Emeryville and showed signs of intoxication. After multiple field sobriety tests, Lynch was arrested and booked into jail, where he was cited and later released.

Lynch took a chemical test. Teresa Drenick, director of communications for the Alameda County district attorney's office, said Lynch was scheduled for an Aug. 14 preliminary court appearance and that any decision on charging Lynch will be made by then.

Drenick said the office has yet to receive the police report from the CHP.

The Seahawks said in a statement late Monday that the team is "aware of the situation with Marshawn and still gathering information."

Lynch's agent didn't immediately respond to calls from The Associated Press seeking comment.

Lynch signed a four-year contract in March that will keep him in a Seattle uniform for the prime of his NFL career.





DEAR ALMOST READY: Kids grow up fast all over these days — not just in your neighborhood. "The talk" with your niece should have started long ago as part of an ongoing discussion because young people are maturing earlier than they did years ago, for a variety of reasons.

Because it hasn't already started happening, your niece should be told that there will be changes in her body and that they are normal. She should also be assured they are nothing to fear. You heard correctly that I publish a booklet about what teens should know about sex (and drugs) that covers a variety of important topics. Adults and parents sometimes find the subject difficult to discuss. My booklet was written to help "break the ice" and begin the discussion more easily. It can be ordered by sending your name and address, plus check or money order for \$7 (U.S. funds) to Dear Abby Teen Booklet, P.O. Box 447, Mount Morris, IL, 61054-0447. Shipping and handling are included in the price. It could be very helpful to you if you review it before starting the discussion with your niece so you can prepare beforehand to answer her questions or guide the conversations.

Important topics that are included are "How old must a girl be before she can get pregnant?" "How old must a boy be before he can father a child?" "What time of the month is a girl 100 percent safe?" and "Can a girl get pregnant the first time she has sex?" In addition, there is a section on various sexually transmitted diseases and what to do if you think you may have one. It is extremely important that they be treated right away, because not doing so can have lifelong consequences.

Knowledge is power, and the more information your niece has, the better she can be prepared for making the decisions that lie ahead of her. But most of all your niece needs to know that becoming a woman is a cause for celebration — and I hope you will present that to her and make it clear.

Sometimes I don't hear them, so then they'll start pounding with a lot of force until they can get my attention. They never resort to using the doorbell. Why are people so stubborn?

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

One of my regular correspondents is Sally Brock from England, who has been a regular on the national women's team for 30 years or so. (She started playing international bridge in her 20s.) She has now formed a solid partnership with Nicola Smith, and they spearheaded the women's team that finished fourth in the recent World Championships, then went on to win second place in the Mind Sports Games in China.

Today, Sally was declarer in three no-trump on a diamond lead to the jack and king. Back came a diamond to dummy's ace, East pitching a middle spade. Brock took the heart finesse next, as the 10 appeared from East. The heart was won by West for a club switch. East won this with king, Sally following with her small card instinctively, then realizing she had forgotten to unblock her 10 — which would have made her task of endplaying East to lead another club much easier.

Declarer still managed to recover by playing East for both high spades. She cashed all of her red-suit winners, discarding a club from dummy. If East came down to two spades and three clubs, South would build a heart trick. If she came down to two clubs and three spades, Brock would take her two club winners ending in dummy and lead a spade toward her jack, collecting one more trick one way or another.

ANSWER: Once you bid one no-trump to show 6-10 points, denying a major, your partner won't play you for the earth whatever you do. Here you should double. This is NOT penalties — how could it be? It shows a maximum hand and suitability for defense.
