Defense Questions Testimony in Rape Case

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Editor's note: The following story contains graphic information that may offend some readers.

TWIN FALLS • Defense attorney David Smethers worked to pick apart the testimony of an alleged rape victim Wednesday as several other witnesses with law enforcement, medical and scientific backgrounds testified in regards to her case.

Twin Falls County resident Jason Jay Ward, 37, is accused of raping the woman twice in one night in May 2011.

Ward's alleged victim told the jury her story Tuesday. Prosecutors rested their case against him Wednesday on the second day of trial.

Fifth District Judge Randy Stoker stopped one of Smethers' lines of questioning Wednesday after Smethers asked the woman to demonstrate pulling her jeans off in the same way Ward allegedly did the night of the reported attack.

The woman, who was 19 at the time of the alleged rape, described Tuesday how Ward allegedly pulled her jeans off by the pant legs while she was lying on the ground. When the woman agreed that the jeans could be described as "hip-huggers," Smethers questioned how they could be pulled off if they were tight around her hips.

"The more I wear them the more they stretch out," she said, as she held

Car Commercial Raises Ramp on Canyon Rim

Bandito Brothers is filming an Audi commercial on the canyon's north rim across from Evil Knievel's historic jump site. The project is due to come out as a Web campaign.

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TWIN FALLS • A new ramp is set up on the canyon rim, but no dare-devils will be jumping off of it.

California media production company Bandito Brothers is filming a commercial on the canyon's north rim for the car-maker Audi. The 70-foot-long ramp will not be used, but the production includes a small car jump far from the canyon's edge, said Idaho Department of Lands spokeswoman Emily Anderson.

"They're just going to pretend like they're jumping the canyon," Anderson said.

Executive producer Adam Pincus said the Audi project will come out as a Web campaign in the coming months, but he would

not reveal more details. He said the team chose the location directly across the canyon from Evil Knievel's historic ramp because of the iconic 1970s atmosphere.

The company purchased a five-day, \$5,000 permit from IDL for 24 acres of Jerome County land that ends today, according to the permit. Anderson said the money will go into the agency's public schools fund. She said the permit requires security and emergency



services to be present during the production, partly to prevent fires. The production also is required to have a 500-gallon water truck at the site as fire protection.

The permit allows the company to "improve, smooth and re-

align" a dirt road and allows the crew to block off Shoshone Falls Road east of U.S. Highway 93. Before it leaves, the crew is required to place boulders at the end of the ramp road and to plant wheatgrass over disturbed areas.

From China to Frontier Field

For a fourth year, Chinese exchange students are learning about the U.S. through a Magic Valley lens.

TWIN FALLS • As the intense summer sun beat down on Frontier Field, teenagers from China practiced throwing baseballs and swinging bats.

Some got the hang of it quickly. Others kept trying unsuccessfully to hit the balls during the Wednesday activity near the College of Southern Idaho campus in Twin Falls.

"Most of them have never held a bat or mitt," local exchange coordinator Melanie Hunsaker said.

The baseball practice was just one of many lessons for 24 teenagers from southern China, in Twin Falls as part of an exchange program. The students — who range in age from 15 to 17 — arrived in the Magic Valley last week.

Exchange student Lei Sheng Cun, 16, found out he's good at the sport and

Employee Salaries a Priority in Jerome

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JEROME • With budget talks in progress for the city of Jerome, one proposal is an average 3 percent pay increase for employees.

Whether an employee earns a raise — and how much — would depend on job performance.

The topic came up during a workshop Wednesday night about the 2012-13 budget.

The city is looking at about a \$14 million proposed budget, not including potential bonds for wastewater treatment plant improvements.

Mayor John Shine said that leaves a \$2 million challenge — the amount that needs to be trimmed to have a balanced budget.

No decisions were made, but city councilors agreed employee salaries are a priority.

Shine said he'd also like to adjust the city's salary grid — the first time in six years.

"We don't have a single employee out there who is a drain on resources," Shine said, adding that all are solid contributors.

During the workshop, city council members also saw preliminary numbers for each of the city's funds, which factor in department requests.

Shine said the presentation isn't a balanced budget and the workshop was a chance to discuss options. Numbers show there's

not enough funding to fulfill all department requests, he said, and he's planning to make the first round of cuts.

The deadline for the city to set a preliminary budget is Aug. 7.

During the meeting, Jerome City Council members also:

- Heard a request for a \$40,000 contribution to the Jerome 20-20 organization to help fund an economic development administrator for the Jerome County area.

Former Jerome County Commissioner Joe Davidson, Jerome County Commissioner Roger Morley and Crossroads Point owner Arlen Crouch pitched the proposal.

Davidson said the Jerome 20-20 organization held several meetings over the past six to eight months to figure out a way to help the city and county.

"Our sole objective is to try to find a business or businesses that would be interested in coming to Jerome County," he said.

Crouch said the goal is for the city, county and business group to each contribute \$40,000 — a total of \$120,000 — to pay for the economic development position.

Morley said the goal is to better the county by making sure there are good paying jobs available for the next generation of Jerome residents so they don't have to leave the area.

Students Get Quick Course in Water Quality

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TWIN FALLS • Apparently, the secret to getting young people interested in science involves water.

Close to 50 children with the Boys and Girls Clubs of Magic Valley visited Twin Falls' Centennial Waterfront Park Wednesday to conduct tests on the Snake River's water quality. The event is part of the World Water Monitoring Challenge that encourages children across the globe to learn more about the quality of their local water sources.

Instead of a lab, the park provided plenty of space for the children to test samples of the water's temperature, pH levels, dissolved oxygen and cloudiness.

They clustered around picnic tables as supervisors explained why the tests were important.

"There will always be some things in the water but we want it to be clear, it helps show how clean the water is," said Susie Buck, lab director for CH2M Hill, the company that operates Twin Falls' wastewater treatment

plant. The company has sponsored the water monitoring event for the Magic Valley since 2003.

"Sometimes we go to the schools but we like it when we can get them closer to the water," said Shawn Moffitt, the event's project manager and also with CH2M Hill. "This is a good opportunity for them."

The global water challenge stemmed from a United Nations program that used to encourage people to monitor water quality on an official day. The challenge runs this year from March 22 until Dec. 31.

At the park, the young scientists showed their enthusiasm for the project as they squealed out their answers and ran around the tables. However, the event isn't just about having fun, Moffitt said.

"Water is so vital," he said. "If we don't take care of it, then we won't be able to use it. If we can get little kids interested in water now, then they'll be ready to make the right decisions later on in life."

The water data will be collected by CH2M Hill employees who will transfer it

into a database, Buck said. Once it's posted online, anyone can access the informa-

tion and compare the location to other sites around the world.

Trial Delayed for Man Charged with Robbery, Burglaries

JEROME • The trial for a man accused in a string of burglaries and the robbery of the Jerome Wendy's restaurant was delayed until September.

A trial for Branden Galbreath, 20, was scheduled for July 25 and has been rescheduled for September 12.

Galbreath, along with Nikolas Maria, Jorge Banuelos and two juveniles, face 50 criminal charges between them related to a string of burglaries in southwest

Jerome County between October 2011 and February 2012.

Galbreath, Maria and Banuelos along with two others also face a host of charges for allegedly robbing Wendy's in Jerome in January.

In that case Galbreath was accused of aiding and abetting in the crime and charged with grand theft, burglary, robbery, battery, second-degree kidnapping, aggravated assault and conspiracy to commit robbery.

The trials for the burglaries and robbery will be held simultaneously.

can hit a ball nearly every time.

Cun said he's enjoying his time in the U.S. — particularly, spending time with his host family.

"I like the culture," he said. "It's quite different from China."

It's the fourth year students from China have come to the area as part of the Portland-based Northwest International Student Exchange.

Students spend two and a half to three weeks in Twin Falls taking English classes and partaking in popular American activities.

The teenagers are living with 21 local host families. That means students are exposed to a different family lifestyle than in China, Hunsaker said.

"It's just a great way to share our culture," she said. And it's a chance for local families to learn about Chinese culture without ever leaving Twin Falls, she added.

So far, exchange students have participated in activities such as a trip to Roaring Springs Waterpark in Boise, a barbecue at CSI, and games from baseball to a water balloon fight. Later in their stay, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game will host a fishing day and provide equipment for students to use.

Xie Pengju, 16, said he's practicing his English language skills during the trip. He said he's also enjoying other activities, such as playing games, watching movies and listening to American music.

"We have fun," he said. Pengju's host family cooked him a Thanksgiving-style dinner a few days ago and he's trying many new foods. He also prepared food from China for his host family.

Host parent Joelle Quinton said she canceled a family vacation this summer so her family could host an exchange student for the third year in a row.

"My kids beg me every year," she said.

On Wednesday morning, local children from some of

the host families joined the exchange students for their baseball game.

Garret Quinton, 15, said he's teaching the exchange students different American activities, such as water games and slack-lining.

"It's just something they don't do where they're from," he said.

Caleb McKee, 15, said some people think hosting a student from another country is a burden. But he said he'd like people to know that it's a rewarding experience.

"You learn a lot about different cultures," he said.

Mckenzie Hunsaker, 15, said she keeps in touch with former exchange students and they've become "lifelong friends."

The exchange students are spending their six-week summer break in the United States. They started their trip with one week visiting Washington, D.C., Boston and New York City.

After a few weeks in Twin Falls, the students will continue on to California for a few days.

the jeans she wore that night up for the jury. "They don't fit as snugly."

At that point, Smethers asked the woman if she could demonstrate pulling another pair of jeans she wore to the trial off by the legs in the same area Ward allegedly pulled her jeans from. Prosecutors swiftly objected.

"I think it's outrageous to ask this witness to essentially undress in front of the jury," Deputy Twin Falls County Prosecutor Rosemary Emory said.

Emory also said the request was an invasion of the woman's privacy and pointed out the woman never tes-

tified the jeans she was currently wearing fit the same as the jeans she had on during the alleged assault.

Stoker said the invasion of the alleged victim's privacy was not a legal reason to object, but he said the demonstration would not be appropriate for the courtroom.

Smethers also quizzed the woman about her injuries, the use of her cellphone the night of the alleged rape, her being on felony probation and her blood-alcohol level being .08 when it was tested at the hospital.

Several witnesses testified to the alleged victim's emotional state while they were in contact with her, including Twin Falls Police Officer Jamie Harper, who was the first to arrive on the scene.

"She was crying and almost completely incoherent," Harper testified. "She was very distraught."

The alleged victim's clothing was torn and weeds and debris were in her hair, Harper said. She testified that although she could smell alcohol on the woman, she did not seem to be overly intoxicated.

A paramedic who responded and the 911 operator who took the woman's call also testified she was sobbing and distraught while they spoke with her.

Smethers extensively questioned Stacy Guess, a forensic scientist with the Idaho State Police Forensic Department, about her tests on DNA samples from the alleged victim and Ward, until Stoker noted his ques-

tions were largely covered by a prior court stipulation regarding the sample. Guess testified the DNA sample taken from a swab on the alleged victim matched Ward.

Jurors watched a short clip of a police interview with Ward in which he said he and the victim did not have sex. They also listened to the entire 911 call from the alleged victim following the incident.

The trial will resume at 8:30 this morning with the defense calling witnesses. Stoker said the jury could expect to have the case handed over to them today.

Buhl to Ask for \$400K Schools Levy

BUHL • Buhl is the only south-central Idaho school district that plans to put a funding proposal before voters during the August election.

School districts had a Friday deadline to submit a resolution to their county clerk. So far this year, residents of 12 area districts have approved levies for their schools.

The Buhl School District will seek a new two-year, \$400,000 annual levy dur-

ing the Aug. 28 election. In past years, there have been three unsuccessful attempts at passing a levy.

Superintendent Byron Stutzman said the district needs a levy in order to pay for operating expenses.

"The current budget is just over a \$400,000 deficit, and we need to fill that void," he said.

If the levy doesn't pass, Stutzman said the district will have to deficit spend for one more year.

"We need the support of our patrons in order to best educate our students," he said.

The district has a meeting scheduled for 7 p.m. July 26 to begin the planning process for the election.

In Buhl, the district last went to voters with a levy request in May 2011 and the ballot measure failed by a narrow margin. But that hasn't always been the case.

Buhl residents approved a few new plant facilities levies — used for school building and maintenance projects — in the 1990s. And voters passed a \$9.65 million facilities bond in 2003 to build a new high school facility.


Court records show he will be arraigned next Tuesday in Idaho's 4th District Court on felony burglary and petit theft charges.

How Summer Makes Kids Dumber and Fatter

It’s July, and for many of us, that brings back fond childhood memories of family vacations, summer camp or long, happy days spent playing with friends. But this quaint notion of summers as a kids’ paradise is dangerously misleading, evidence from social research suggests.

After spending the summer away from the classroom, children return to school one month or more, on average, behind where they were when the previous year ended. Kids also tend to put on weight in the summer two to three times faster than they do during the school year.

To put it unkindly, the average child becomes dumber and fatter during the vacation. And although there’s no need to declare war on summer, there’s plenty we could do to combat the seasonal learning loss and weight gain.

Consider, first, the evidence for the summer fade effect. Taken together, a variety of studies indicate that students’ academic skills atrophy during the summer months by an amount equivalent to what they learn in a third of a school year, according to a review by Harris Cooper, a professor of education at Duke University, and several co-authors.

This deterioration, furthermore, varies substantially by income and race, and its impact persists even past childhood. Barbara Heyns, a sociologist at New York University who studied Atlanta schoolchildren in the late 1970s, found that although academic gains during the school year were not substantially correlated with income, summer decline was.

Subsequent studies have replicated the finding. Karl Alexander, Doris Entwisle and Linda Olson of Johns Hopkins University, for example, found that the summer fade can largely explain why the gap in skills between children on either side of the socioeconomic divide widens as students progress through elementary school. Children from all backgrounds learn at similar rates during the school year, but each summer students of high socioeconomic status continue to learn while those of low socioeconomic status fall behind.

The impact is felt even years later. The learning differences that begin in grade school “substantially account” for differences by socioeconomic status in high-school graduation rates and in four-year college attendance, Alexander and his co-authors report.


The summer increase in children’s body-mass index has also been measured. In one study, Paul T. von Hippel, a sociologist then at Ohio State University, and his co-authors found that the average monthly gain in BMI for students moving from kindergarten to first grade was two to three times as fast during the summer as during either of the adjoining academic years. And the children most prone to obesity were most likely to put on additional weight during the summer.

So what can we do to fight summer learning loss and weight gain and restore the season’s halcyon reputation?

Let’s start with the most ambitious option: lengthening the school year. I have written previously about the benefit of extending the hours of the school day. A similar argument applies to extending the academic year: More time at task helps children learn, and it would be worth the extra expense involved.

The second option is an idea proposed several years ago by Alan Krueger, now the chairman of President Barack Obama’s Council of Economic Advisers, and Molly Fifer, then a graduate student in economics at Princeton University: Offer students in kindergarten through fifth grade who qualify for free meals through the National School Lunch Program the opportunity to participate in a six-week summer enrichment program that would be focused on small-group instruction. Krueger and Fifer estimated that such a program would cost less than \$2,000 per student. If the federal government paid half, the cost to taxpayers would be about \$2 billion a year, and the benefits would be worth much more.

The third and least ambitious option is to provide voluntary summer reading programs for students of low socioeconomic status. A randomized experiment conducted by James Kim of Harvard University and Thomas White of the University of Virginia showed that students developed better reading skills when they were provided with books during the summer and encouragement from teachers before the break began.

Unless you are the CFO of one of those “too big to fail” financial institutions claiming to have a kind of clue as to the true “complexity of the monetary problem” is not going to be a convincing argument - either way - in my book.”

With the money we are paying another state, we can build another prison. Hire more guards and keep our money we worked so



Invasive Insect Calls Idaho Home

The elm seed bugs don't pose a threat to trees but enter homes and buildings in swarms

BOISE • An invasive insect commonly found in south-central Europe has been detected in southwestern Idaho, marking the first time the elm seed bug has been spotted in the U.S.

A USDA specialist confirmed the discovery of the pests that despite their name don't pose a threat to trees — but do tend to enter houses and buildings in huge swarms.

The Idaho Department of Agriculture issued a statement Wednesday warning that the bugs recently found in Ada and Canyon counties can prove to be a

“significant nuisance” for homeowners. Elm seed bugs invade homes during the summer to escape heat and then stick around through the winter, the department said.

The pests that feed on elm tree seeds do not pose a public health risk, officials said.

Federal authorities will take the lead role in investigating how the pest got to the U.S. and how it might spread.

“I would imagine they will be able to give us some indication of the possibilities,” said Pamela Juker, a spokeswoman for the Idaho Department of Agriculture.

The USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service expects to develop recommendations about management of the pests.

Meanwhile, state officials are asking residents outside of southwestern Idaho who come across the pests, which resemble small, brown cockroaches with triangular back markings, to collect a handful of the insects in a plastic sandwich bag and mail them to the Idaho Department of Agriculture's plant division in Boise.

The agency is also encouraging homeowners who encounter elm seed bugs to contact their local university extension office for information on how to deal with the insects.

Pam Lowe Legal Bill Tops \$540,000

BOISE • State officials spent more than a half-million dollars in court defending the firing of the first and only woman to lead the Idaho Transportation Department, public records show.

Idaho's legal bill so far totals \$540,479 in the discrimination and wrongful termination lawsuit filed by Pam Lowe, according to public records requested by the *Spokesman-Review*. Both sides confirmed Monday

they reached a settlement, but neither would divulge the terms.


Idaho's tab could increase, as final papers still need to be filed in court.

The Idaho Attorney General's Office said it lacked the resources to handle the case when hiring Holland & Hart to defend the state against Lowe's claims.

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



Rebels Bomb Syrian Leaders

BEIRUT (AP) • Rebels penetrated the heart of Syria's power elite Wednesday, detonating a bomb inside a high-level crisis meeting in Damascus that killed three leaders of the regime, including President Bashar Assad's brother-in-law and the defense minister.

The unprecedented blow to the ruling dynasty could mark a turning point in the civil war, suggesting that those once close to Assad are turning against him. The bombing follows some of the worst bloodshed in Damascus of the 16-month uprising, a growing list of high-ranking defections and mounting frustration by world leaders over their inability to find a diplomatic solution.

The White House said the bombing showed Assad was "losing control" of Syria.

Rebels claimed responsibility for the attack, saying they had been planning it for two months and finally decided to plant the bomb in the room where the top government security officials in charge of crushing the revolt were holding a crisis meeting.

"God willing, this is the beginning of the end of the regime," said Riad al-Asaad, a commander of the disparate rebel forces who operate across the

country. Al-Asaad, who is not related to the president, spoke to The Associated Press by telephone from Turkey, where he is based.

What Does 'Middle Class' Mean Today?

The "middle class" is an amorphous concept, and the presidential candidates are giving it their own definitions to fit their political purposes. Here are some ways to define it, political, economic and otherwise:

Politics

In pushing for tax benefits for "middle class" Americans, President Barack Obama defines them as families making less than \$250,000 — which is 98 percent of U.S. households. He also described them as having aspirations of owning a home, having affordable health care and being able to pay for their children's college educations. Republican challenger Mitt Romney defined middle class as families making less than \$200,000. He casts them as hard-working Americans who have been "kicked in the gut" in the weak economy.

Economists

The Census Bureau divides household income into quintiles, or groups of 20 percent. Some economists narrowly define the middle class as those in the middle 20 percent of the distribution, earning between \$38,000 and \$61,000. Others define it more broadly to include the middle 60 percent, between \$20,000 and \$100,000. The government's poverty line is based on the minimum income needed to have a basic standard of living, currently \$22,314 for a family of four.

Sociologists

The middle class to them is based on occupation: an "upper middle class" of white-collar specialists

(lawyers, engineers, professors, economists and architects); and a "middle class" of lower-level white-collar workers (teachers, nurses, insurance sales and real estate agents). Together, they make up about 45 percent of households and sit near the upper end of the income distribution, just behind the top 1 percent.

Polls

Americans often view "middle class" as something more than specific income levels, which can be affected by family size, expenses and local costs of living. At least two-thirds of adults say being middle class means owning a home, being able to save for the future and afford things like vacation travel, the occasional new car and various other little luxuries, according to an ABC News poll in 2010.

White House Council of Economic Advisers

In a January speech noting the middle class has shrunk to 42 percent of households, Alan Krueger, who chairs the council, defined them as making annual earnings within 50 percent of the U.S. median income. The current median income is \$49,445, putting middle-class earnings in a range from about \$25,000 to \$75,000.

As a whole, roughly 95 percent of adults say they are middle class (50 percent), upper middle class (13 percent) or working class (32 percent), according to a separate *Washington Post*-ABC News poll in May. Just 2 percent described themselves as "better off" than upper middle class.

MIGRANT KIDS LOSE RIGHTS

Children of deported parents are struggling to find access to basic services in Mexico.

MALINALCO, Mexico • As a cold drizzle washed over this town of narrow cobblestone streets in the forested highlands of central Mexico, mothers waiting outside the colonial-era cultural center wrapped wool blankets around the infants snuggled in their arms. Other parents tightened plastic bags around folders filled with U.S. passports and birth certificates from California, Ohio and Texas.

One by one, the parents filed inside, sat down before a Mexican government worker and told stories of lives that had crossed the U.S.-Mexico border twice. First, they crossed illegally into the United States for work, found jobs, and had children. Then, they were caught and deported, or left on their own as the work dried up with the U.S. economic slump. Now they are back in Mexico with children who are American citizens by virtue of being born on U.S. soil.

Because of the Byzantine rules of Mexican and U.S. bureaucracies, tens of thousands of those children without Mexican citizenship now find themselves without access to basic services in Mexico — unable to officially register in school or sign up for health care at public hospitals and clinics that give free check-ups and medicines.

At issue is a Mexican government requirement that any official document

from another country be certified inside that country with a seal known as an "apostille," then be translated by a certified, and often expensive, translator in Mexico.

It's a growing problem in Mexico as hundreds of thousands return home because of the sluggish U.S. job market and a record number of deportations. Illegal migration of Mexicans to the U.S. is at its lowest level in decades, with more Mexicans now leaving the United States than entering it each year.

More than 300,000 U.S.-born children have been brought to Mexico since 2005, out of a total of 1.4 million people who moved back from the U.S. during that period, according to the Washington-based Pew Hispanic Center.

The number of U.S.-citizen children

living in Mexico with at least one Mexican parent reached 500,000 in 2011, according to one demographic study.

Many of the Mexican parents of U.S. children were not aware of Mexico's paperwork requirement before they came back, so now tens of thousands are struggling to get their children's documents to the United States to be certified, and then returned to Mexico to be officially translated.

They get little help from the Mexican government, but a lucky few get aid from groups like the Corner Project, a nonprofit organization for migrant families in Malinalco.

It arranged for state government workers to travel to the town recently to meet with families and then send packages of documents to different U.S. offices.

New Welfare Restrictions Target Booze, Tattoos

BOSTON (AP) • Taking aim at what they call an abuse of the taxpayers' money, a growing number of states are blocking welfare recipients from spending their benefits on booze, cigarettes, lottery tickets, casino gambling, tattoos and strippers.

"If you're not abusing the program, then you should really have no problem with these reforms," said state Rep.

Shaunna O'Connell, a Republican in Massachusetts.

While the crackdown has strong populist appeal in Democratic and GOP states alike, advocates for the poor argue the restrictions are based on stereotypes about people on welfare, and they say the notion of any widespread abuse is a myth. Most people on public assistance, they contend, are

single mothers struggling to get by.

The movement was spurred in part by Congress. Under legislation signed by President Barack Obama in February to extend a payroll tax cut and unemployment benefits, welfare recipients are barred from using their cash assistance in strip clubs, casinos and liquor stores. States must change their own laws to conform by 2014.

Republicans Call on Romney to Release His Tax Returns

PITTSBURGH • Mitt Romney, facing heightened attacks by President Barack Obama's campaign for refusing to disclose more of his tax returns, confronts escalating calls from within his own party to put the issue to rest by providing additional filings.

Obama used a new television ad to suggest the presumed Republican presidential nominee — who has estimated his personal wealth to be as much as \$250 million — is hiding some-

thing about his finances by withholding to provide information.

"Tax havens, offshore accounts, carried interest," the narrator of the ad says. "Mitt Romney has used every trick in the book." The commercial ends with: "Makes you wonder if some years he paid any taxes at all?"

Romney released his 2010 tax return and promised to make his 2011 documents public when they are ready, saying that amount of disclosure should be sufficient. He reiterated that position in an interview with the National Review magazine Tuesday.

He said "the opposition research of the Obama campaign is looking for anything they can use to distract from the failure of the president to reignite our economy. And I'm simply not enthusiastic about giving them hundreds or thousands of more pages to pick through, distort and lie about."

As prominent Republicans lend their voices to the Democratic calls for Romney to provide more details of his finances, the former private equity executive is trying to stay focused on his central campaign theme of blaming Obama for persistent joblessness.

Campaigning in the swing state of Pennsylvania Tuesday, Romney accused Obama of believing the government — not business people or workers — deserves credit for American private-sector achievement.

"President Obama attacks success, and therefore under President Obama, we have less success," Romney told several hundred people packed into a warehouse at Horizontal Wireline Services, an oil and gas services company in Irwin.

"He wants Americans to be ashamed of success; I want Americans to welcome it, to celebrate it."

Adopted Kids' Ranch Denied License

HELENA, Mont. (AP) • The Russian government isn't alone in raising questions about a Montana ranch that cares for troubled children adopted from foreign countries.

Montana regulators are actively involved in a legal battle to shut down the Ranch For Kids near the Canadian border, according to documents obtained by The Associated Press through a public informa-

tion request.

Those records show the ranch in Eureka has been operating without a license since 2010. The state board that oversees private alternative adolescent residential and outdoor programs ordered it last year to stop operating until it obtains a proper license.

Ranch owner Joyce Sterkel is appealing that order in court, saying the ranch has become part of a church

mission and is no longer under the board's authority. Sterkel did not immediately return a call on Wednesday.

Last month, Russian children rights ombudsman Pavel Astakhov and human rights envoy Konstantin Dolgov showed up at the Ranch For Kids' gates, demanding entry to check on the adopted children from Russia in Sterkel's care. They questioned whether the children were receiving nec-

essary care or treatment at the remote ranch.

Ten of the 25 children there are from Russia, with others from China, Ukraine, Kazakhstan, Haiti, Ethiopia and other countries. Their ages vary, and their troubles range from fetal alcohol spectrum disorder to the aftereffects of spending their early lives in difficult conditions in orphanages.

ID Laws Create Barriers, Study Finds

New laws in 10 states requiring voters to show IDs could present challenges to voters without financial resources and transportation, according to a new report released Wednesday.

The study by the Brennan Center for Justice at the New

York University School of Law found obstacles that could keep voters from being able to cast ballots.

"The advocates of these laws kept saying we're going to provide these IDs for free and that's going to eliminate all of the problems," said Keesha Gaskins, co-author of the report.

"We found the ability to get documents isn't that simple. The documents are costly for many, many voters, and there are serious transportation barriers for many voters."

State attorneys general defending the laws said they prevent fraud and make the voting system more secure.

Path for Iranian Nuclear Talks Choked by Tensions

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates • In the span of just a few hours, announcements bouncing between Tehran and Washington showed the direction of their showdown: New issues are piling up even as Western envoys try to find a path to move nuclear talks forward.

In quick succession last week: Iran said it seeks to build a nuclear-powered submarine, the U.S. unveiled more sanctions and a senior Iranian military official ramped up denunciations of Middle East nations trying to topple the Tehran-allied regime in Syria.

The developments taken individually reflect significant trends, including Iran's split personality between portraying itself as a rising military power while growing insecure about losing critical regional influence if President Bashar Assad falls in Damascus.

"There is a lot of background noise with the nuclear

talks," said Sami al-Faraj, director of the Kuwait Center for Strategic Studies. "It seems to be getting louder."

For the moment, there is no date to resume talks between Iran and world powers

following the last month's session in Moscow. That could depend on the outcome of discussions next Tuesday between Iran's negotiator and the top deputy for the European Union.

Ketchum Author Launches Campaign for New Outdoors Book

KETCHUM • The name might sound familiar.

You've perhaps read his books or seen his byline in the *Times-News*. Now he's at it again.

Matt Leidecker, a local author and photographer, recently launched a fundraising campaign on Kickstarter. He is attempting to raise money through the popular web-based funding platform to help cover the printing costs of his newest guidebook to the Sawtooth Mountains: "Exploring the Sawtooths — A Comprehensive Guide."

According to the Kickstarter website, Leidecker's will be the first attempt in the Sun Valley area to use Kickstarter to raise funds for a project.

Kickstarter is a funding platform for creative projects. Leidecker is offering a variety of rewards to those who want

to support his project, including a three-day, four-night photography expedition into the mountains through Sawtooth Mountain Guides.

He and his family spent four months during the summer 2011 researching the trails and peaks for this guidebook. He traveled and lived with his wife Christine and two children Sarah, 4, and Max, 2, in a 1987 Jayco Motorhome. As they camped around the perimeter of the Sawtooths, both parents would take turns hiking the trails and taking copious notes linked to GPS waypoints. Between June and October, the pair hiked a total of 55 days, covering 721 miles of trail and climbing more than 150,000 vertical feet in the process.

Leidecker organized the information and wrote the book between October 2011 and June 2012. In addition to detailed maps and route information, the

book includes sections on the history and geology of the Sawtooths, information on technical climbing in the range, and a mini field guide to more than 60 of the most common wildflower species.

The book contains 30 full-color topographic maps, and more than 100 stunning photographs. It will be printed on synthetic YUPO waterproof and tearproof paper.

The book will be released at the end of July, but the Kickstarter campaign allows supporters to pre-order copies signed by the author.

Leidecker is a former *Times-News* correspondent and the author of several books on the outdoors.

THE TRAIL for Any HIKER

HAILEY • Invest even a little in the Hyndman Creek Trail, and you'll earn scenic payoff right away.

No trudging through ugly stretches to reach the good stuff. No sweating through steep stretches if you're just out for a short walk.

But it keeps getting better, too. This trail in the Pioneer Mountains is a something-for-everyone experience.

For casual hikers: a trail that starts out easy for more than two miles, climbing gently through as-

pen groves and flower-filled meadows with views of mountain slopes.

For backpackers: delightful creekside spots for tents, with your choice of peaks for the next morning's hike.

For ambitious dayhikers: challenging climbs through varied scenery, and a chance to reach the summit of Idaho's ninth-highest peak in one day without climbing gear.

"Don't sell yourself short. The higher you go up, the better the view gets," said backpacker Sadie Grossbaum of Ketchum, on her

way down from Hyndman Peak. "Just don't miss this place."

The Trail's Rewards

A few feet from the trailhead, Hyndman Creek Trail crosses a fork of the creek on a narrow but sturdy footbridge, a pretty place to linger. Then it sets off through trees and meadows, remaining within the sound — and occasionally the sight — of Hyndman Creek.

On June 23, an English setter devouring the trail announced the approach of Marcia and Greg

Hines, residents of the East Fork area north of Hailey. They hike the trail's easy first miles a couple of times a year.

"It's nice because it has water for the dogs," Marcia said. "There's a lot of solitude and quiet."

The southwest face of massive, 11,650-foot Cobb Peak towers over this stretch of trail — an impressive sight.

And when the trail meets a Hyndman Creek tributary that tumbles down a steep canyon, you're about to head for the heights. Hailey backpackers Brian and Karina For-

Find the Trailhead

North of Hailey, turn east off of Idaho Highway 75 onto East Fork Road. Drive 6.8 miles on East Fork (on pavement, then gravel) before turning left onto the unsigned Hyndman Creek Road. After 3.4 miles, the road forks at Johnstone Creek Trailhead; take the left fork. Drive another 1.3 miles — on a narrow road beside a steep dropoff — to reach the Hyndman Creek Trailhead.


Any car should be fine on these roads.

musa dropped their packs there for a brief stop at the creek.

Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument

HAGERMAN • You don't need a time travel machine to see what portions of southern Idaho looked like 12,000 or even 5 million years ago. The Hagerman Valley tells this history in the bluffs arching above the Snake River and in the brown soil below your feet.

So when you make it to the top of the Oregon Trail Overlook at the Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument, close your eyes and feel the wind graze your face as the landscape whispers to you its past.

Before any wagon wheels turned through this soil, this area was home to Native American tribes such as the Shoshone-Bannock and Shoshone-Paiute. This landscape tells their story as well.

They lived off the land by catching salmon, steelhead and trout from the river, digging camas

lily and hunting small and large game.

going to the water — that's where the surprises are," said Brian, who has spotted old sheep camps in this area, and shepherds' aspen carvings from as long ago as the 1920s. "The jewels on this trail are getting to a ridge, and just exploring."

Buckling on their packs, the Formusas faced the trail's first tough climb. As "Hiking Idaho" author Ralph Maughan puts it: "In 0.3 mile, the trail climbs 600 feet as steeply as a trail can climb." A plodding pace is understandable here, backpack or no, and relief from the sun is scarce.

Where the grade begins to level off, three dayhikers rewarded themselves — and their dogs — with snacks and a rest beneath a tree.

"This is a good spot for pizza," said Paula Shaffer of Ketchum, pulling out a foil-wrapped slice.

Hiking companion Sarah Studeman of Ketchum checked their distance and elevation gain on her GPS unit, finally getting some vindication. "It was telling me we hadn't gone up any elevation, and I was disagreeing with it."

Studeman is making her way through the hikes in a Wood River Valley dayhiking book, and Hyndman Creek was the first "difficult" rating she tackled. June 23 was the first Hyndman visit for the two Ketchum women and Hollie Hatch of Hailey.

"It's been gorgeous — really loving the waterfalls," Studeman said. Shaffer added: "It's pretty challenging, but pretty rewarding ... beautiful things around every corner."

A short distance later, a pond and meadow announce you've arrived at a backcountry yurt and an outfitter's camp, where shade and water are plentiful and the view is glorious. Andrea and Tyler Wheeler of Rupert rested there on their way down from the upper slopes of Hyndman Peak.

"It's a really, really pretty trail. The whole thing is," Andrea said as Tyler pulled 15-month-old Talon from the carrier on his back. The couple had spent the night in a tent lower on the trail — their first overnight backpacking with a baby — before venturing into the peaks.

The outfitter's camp is a fine destination if you're ready to stop. But make an easy creek crossing and you'll find the trail begins another steep ascent — 900 feet in half a

mile, according to Maughan. On this climb you'll parallel a branch of the creek that's one long waterfall.

"It just cascades down the mountain, and it's so, so pretty," Andrea Wheeler said.

Particularly if the day is overcast, strange colors underfoot here might catch your eye. This mountain range is a complicated mixture of rock types, and you might feel tempted to add a little weight to your pockets.

"It's uplifted in a way that exposes all these types of rock and all these colors," Brian Formusa said earlier in the day.

The trail ends in an upper basin where the creek — augmented by numerous springs — winds lazily through a meadow. Here you're among the giants: 12,009-foot Hyndman Peak is in the center, with Old Hyndman Peak behind it at 2 o'clock. "The great north wall of Cobb Peak is to your right, and the many summits of Duncan Ridge, ending in Duncan Peak, between 8 o'clock and 11 o'clock," Maughan writes.

That's the sight Tyler Wheeler relishes.

The Airy Heights

To ascend Hyndman Peak's treeless upper slopes, you'll have to pick your own trail through scree — kind of a mind game, as Ketchum's Madison Hendrix described it.

"Lots of rocks that are loose. It was a hard hike," said Grossbaum, who with Hendrix spent the night at Hyndman's base before their June 23 summit.

But it's a non-technical climb. And with an early start, it's possible to leave Twin Falls at 5 a.m. or so, make the drive to the trailhead, reach the summit and get home in the same day. That's what a couple of Boy Scouts from troop 159 and their leaders did June 23.

On their descent from Hyndman Peak, Scout leader David Coleman of Twin Falls paused at the basin's upper end to check his GPS numbers: moving for four hours and 39 minutes, stopped for four hours and 26 minutes, "overall av-

erage of one mile per hour," he said.

From the trailhead, at an elevation of about 7,100 feet, Coleman hiked 6.5 miles to the top of Hyndman — and about seven miles on the return trip, he figured later. "I may have had up to a half-mile more distance coming back because I had to zigzag coming down the steep parts to lessen the impact on my knees," he said.

What if you're a dayhiker who didn't start before dawn or hike at the pace of teenage boys?

Beyond the basin and just above the tree line, a lichen-covered rock outcropping overlooks a small lake. It's an excellent place to appreciate magnificent views of the peaks above and the valley below, with hazy blue ridgelines in the distance.

Then push your imagination a little more and visualize the Hagerman Horse roaming a lush and damp valley along with mastodons, saber-toothed cats, camels and ground sloths. These animals, though now extinct, are still residents of the beautiful Hagerman Valley.

In fossil form, of course.

Why Is This Place Special?

Hagerman is home to the world-renowned Hagerman Horse, the state fossil. Though the fossil has been found in other parts of the U.S., the Hagerman Fossil Beds is one of the most fossil-rich areas where this species is found. The skeleton of the Hagerman Horse, which is an ancestor of the horse but more closely resembles a zebra, has been displayed in museums around the world.

Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument also houses a variety of other fossils from the Pliocene era. In the 1930s the Smithsonian Institute's National Museum of Natural History excavated 120 horse skulls and 20 complete skeletons from the area known as the Horse Quarry.

But fossils aren't the only remnants of Idaho's past that you can experience. You can drive and walk the Oregon Trail. You can also view the breathtaking Hagerman Valley from two overlooks.

Can I Excavate Fossils?

No, visitors are not allowed to go onto the Hagerman Fossil Beds. But you can see fossils behind the glass cases in the visitor center in Hagerman. The displays were revamped this spring and showcase new cases and fossils.

In the past 20 years a number of landslides in the area have made the beds unsafe for visitors and fossils. In the past there were horse quarry tours, but currently no work is occurring on the site. (There have been no excavations since the 1980s.) But paleontologists are watching for fossils that have been exposed due to erosion.

Carol Ash, chief of interpretation and education, said monument managers would like someday to have a center with windows for visitors to watch paleontologists at work.

If you happen to find something on an overlook trail, do not take it home.

"In the park you can't take anything; it's all part of the ecology, science, and for the next visitor," Ash said.

Can I Walk the Original Oregon Trail?

Be sure to pick up an Emigrant Trail guide at the visitor center before you drive to

the monument's two overlooks. The brochure is meant to be read as you travel along the trail to give you directions and information. Emigrant Trail is not handicapped accessible, but both overlooks are.

On portions of the trail, a three-mile hike between the two overlooks, you can still see the ruts left by wagons heading west on the Oregon

Trail. Visible sections of the trail are indicated on the ground by white stakes.

You can start at either the Snake River Overlook or Oregon Trail Overlook; if you don't want to walk the six-mile round trip, be sure to have a car waiting on the other end. Horses are allowed on the trail, but you can't bicycle. Pets need to be on leashes, but you're not

encouraged to bring them along. Bring plenty of water, as there is no shade on this trail and it gets hot. There are also snakes and ticks.

If you start from the Snake River and hike to the Oregon Trail Overlook, the last part is steep, Ash said.

The original Oregon Trail is underneath the paved road to the two overlooks, so walking the Emigrant Trail is the closest and safest way to follow in the pioneers' footsteps.

Will the Children Be Bored Here?

No, Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument has something for young visitors.

Children ages 6-12 can become Hagerman Fossil Beds Junior Rangers. To earn a Junior Ranger badge, they choose from a variety of activities like taking a short hike or exploring the visitor center to answer questions. Junior Ranger booklets are free, and the activities take an hour or two to complete.

There is a corner in the visitor center for children to dig and explore fossils. Here they can pick up sheets to color, play with puppets and examine fossils and bones. Another fossil digging area is outside the center.

Brenda Spencer and her children Charisse, 12, and Gregory, 4, from Richland, Wash., found plenty to keep them occupied during their visit. Gregory picked out a picture of a frog to color on his family's journey to Paris, Idaho, to visit family. Charisse had just finished her booklet to earn a Junior Ranger badge.

Park Basics

Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument's visitor center — which also serves as the remote visitor center for the Minidoka National Historic Site — is along U.S. Highway 30 in the town of Hagerman, across from the town's high school. Admission is free, and you can view fossils, ask questions, buy books about fossils, pick up maps and information and watch a video about the park.

Hours: During summer the park is open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. seven days a week. Getting around: To find the monument's two overlooks, from Hagerman drive south on Highway 30 and turn right just past the Gridley Island Bridge.

Amenities: The visitor center has restrooms. The Oregon Trail Overlook has restrooms and two picnic tables, but the Snake River Overlook has neither. Camping is not allowed anywhere in the park.

Tours: Every Saturday and Sunday morning, a park ranger is available at the two overlooks to provide information from 9 a.m. to noon. Arrange special tours at 208-933-4100.

Coming soon: At the end of July will be Living History tours and reenactments at the Oregon Trail Overlook. Check the park website for updates on those and other upcoming events: nps.gov/hafo/index.htm

At this time in the late '60s, the "it" guns of the skeet and trap ranges throughout New England were Remington's 1100 series and Browning's classic recoil-operated Auto-5's. Those of you familiar

with these models know that they are so wonderfully balanced that even mere novices, like Jerry and I, could smoothly swing those big white beads past the clays and smoke them with shocking regularity.

After those enchanting evening smashing clays, I knew that my mortal sojourn would never be complete unless I possessed an 1100 or an A5 of my very own.

The problem was the financial demands of funding an education, pursuing a career, and raising a family, kept those precious 1100s and A5 just out of my financial grasp.

That is until I made the chance discovery of a lifetime: I uncovered a veritable treasure trove of once loved, but neglected firearms — at the local pawn shops and dark musty recesses of my neighborhood gun shops. As a result of perusing these businesses, as well as local newspaper classified ads, I am now the proud owner of both a minty 1100 and a slick Browning A5 that I purchased for much less than either model would have cost new in the box.

Economically challenging times demand innovative thinking. Interested in purchasing more guns for yourself, your spouse, or children at a pittance of their original cost? Simply page through your local classified ads and pay your local gun shops a visit. You'll discover, as I have, a veritable treasure trove of quality firearms just around the corner.

Jump in Housing Starts, Earnings Send Stocks Up



NEW YORK (AP) • A new sign of recovery in the housing market and strong corporate earnings sent stocks higher for a second day.

A big gain by Intel after it posted a strong earnings report drove up technology stocks, especially other chip makers. Those companies, plus industrials, were responsible for much of the market's gains.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 103.16 points, or 0.8 percent, to 12,908.70.

P&G Board Affirms Support for CEO Robert McDonald

NEW YORK (AP) • Procter & Gamble Co. said Wednesday that its board supports CEO Robert McDonald, nearly a week after activist investor William Ackman took a stake in the company.

"The board is overseeing a plan to return P&G results to levels that produce the best long term value for shareholders; unanimously supports the plan and chief executive officer, Bob McDonald, as he leads its implementation; and is monitoring its effectiveness," P&G said in the filing.

Officials Track Down Assets of Disgraced Iowa CEO

WATERLOO, Iowa • Investigators are moving quickly to seize the wide-ranging personal assets of the disgraced founder of an Iowa brokerage so they can try to reimburse thousands of customers and workers affected by his alleged \$200 million fraud.

Former workers at Peregrine Financial Group Inc. and other companies controlled by Russ Wasendorf Sr. said they were stunned by the dramatic downfall of the prominent businessman and were trying to rebuild their lives after losing their jobs. About 75 of the estimated 250 Iowa workers affected attended a meeting Wednesday at a community college in Waterloo, where they learned about unemployment, job training and other benefits.

Wasendorf's business empire collapsed last week after he was found unresponsive in his car outside Pere-

grine's headquarters in Cedar Falls following a suicide attempt. He left a note in which investigators say he detailed how he embezzled customer funds for nearly 20 years and falsified bank records to fool regulators. Federal regulators shut down his firm, which was missing more than \$200 million in customer accounts that it claimed to have, and it filed for bankruptcy.

Underscoring the diverse assets that investigators are trying to untangle, Wednesday's meeting drew workers from the brokerage, an upscale Italian restaurant that Wasendorf opened in Cedar Falls, the company's charitable arm and Wasendorf's publishing company.

"It was shocking abruptness. You just don't see something like that coming," said Nick Kollasch, 25, who moved to Cedar Falls four months ago to take a job as a cook at myVerona, the restaurant. He said he's proud the restaurant raised the bar for fine dining in Cedar

Falls, a town of 40,000 people, but he knows he will have difficulty earning the same salary elsewhere.

Wasendorf was arrested Friday at an Iowa hospital and charged with lying to regulators. Federal prosecutors say they will seek additional charges that could land Wasendorf, 64, in prison for the rest of his life. He hasn't yet entered a plea.

In portions of his note that have not been made public by the FBI, Wasendorf said he spent most of the missing money to prop up PFG and to pay its business losses and fines and fees charged by regulators, according to the *Wall Street Journal*, which received the statement from a "person familiar with the situation." Wasendorf wrote that a portion went to build its \$24 million, state-of-the-art headquarters in Cedar Falls, the paper reported. Attempts by The Associated Press to obtain the same material were not successful.

Capital One to Pay \$210M Over Marketing Tactics

WASHINGTON • The Obama administration's consumer watchdog agency flexed its enforcement muscles for the first time Wednesday and ordered Capital One Bank to repay millions of credit card customers allegedly tricked into buying costly add-on services.

Capital One will pay \$210 million in refunds and regulatory fines. Most of the money will go directly to customers.

The bank's phone-sales operators told customers that services like payment protection and credit monitoring were free or mandatory or offered more benefits than they did, federal officials said. The hard selling targeted people with poor credit, they said.

The order against Capital One is the first enforcement action by the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, set up a year ago to protect consumers from excessive or hidden fees and other financial threats.

Capital One will pay up to \$150 million to 2.5 million customers, \$25 million to the CFPB and \$35 million to the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency, a separate federal agency that oversees its banking operations.

"Consumers deserve to be treated fairly by their credit card issuer," CFPB director Richard Cordray told reporters. He said the problems are not isolated at Capital One and said he expects announcements about other companies.

CFPB officials observed heavy-handed sales tactics by workers at Capital One call centers as they monitored the bank's operations, the agency said in its order.

Agency officials reviewed records and phone scripts, interviewed managers and listened to taped calls with customers, the agency said. The CFPB can oversee the biggest banks and certain other companies by stationing employees at their offices.

Customers were transferred to the call centers when they phoned to activate their credit cards, the order said. For most customers, that meant a two-minute process without any ads for extra products. But people with sub-prime cards or lower credit limits endured eight-minute pitches by live operators while waiting for the card to be activated.

Call center operators often ignored scripts and instructions provided by Capital One, the CFPB's order said. Capital One is being held responsible because of "ineffective oversight," it said.

Revered Ultra-Orthodox Israeli Rabbi Dies at 102

JERUSALEM • Rabbi Yosef Shalom Elyashiv, revered by Jews worldwide as the top rabbinic authority of this generation for his scholarship and rulings on complex elements of Jewish law, died Wednesday, hospital officials said. He was 102.

Elyashiv devoted his life to Torah study and credited his longevity to never getting angry. He rejected worldly possessions and chose instead to live modestly in a tiny Jerusalem apartment, where people lined up, seeking advice, blessings and rulings on religious issues.

The Shaare Zedek hospital in Jerusalem said Elyashiv died there after a long illness.

Elyashiv was the leader of the Lithuanian sect of ultra-Orthodox Ashkenazi Jews that adhere to a strict religious lifestyle and ideology renowned for its analytic form of studying complex Jewish holy texts.

He also served as the spiritual leader of a small ultra-Orthodox party in the Israeli parliament, Degel Hatorah, which later merged into the influential United Torah Judaism that consists of vari-

ous small religious parties.

Party members conferred with Elyashiv on all matters — political, religious and personal — and a few words uttered by the elderly rabbi could sway Israeli policy or affect daily life for devout Jews.

For his hundreds of thousands of followers around the world, Elyashiv was considered a sage and a respected arbitrator of the intricacies of Jewish religious law and practices.

Tributes began pouring in shortly after news of his death was reported on Israeli TV and radio stations.

"In his rulings, Rabbi Elyashiv left a deep mark on the ultra-Orthodox world and on the entire people of Israel," Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said in a statement. "The rabbi's way was that of love of the Torah and love of man, humility and the protection of the sanctity of life."

Israeli President Shimon Peres, the mayor of Jerusalem, the country's chief rabbi and many others also offered condolences.

Menachem Friedman, a professor emeritus of Bar Ilan University and an expert on ultra-Orthodox Judaism, called Elyashiv "an extraordinary scholar."

When it comes to sports and animals of the four-legged variety, the first sport that comes to mind in these parts is rodeo, with its cowboy hats, boots, belt buckles and bodacious bovines.

On the other end of the spectrum are your elegant equines found in equestrian, with its nattily attired riders dressed in their gloves, breeches and riding coats.

The latter is where Ketchum's Adrienne Lyle fits in.

Equestrian is also taking her to a venue where rodeo isn't to be found, namely, the Summer Olympics in London.

"It took a while to sink in and it seemed all surreal at first with the excitement and commotion," Lyle said from Hadleigh, about two hours north of London, where she arrived on July 13 and will be competing in dressage. "Then there was a little bit of a lull ... but now that we're over here with the whole dressage team, it's starting to build excitement."

Like any other sport, equestrian has its Olympic trials and Lyle, riding

Wizard, a 13-year Oldenberg gelding, qualified June 16 in Gladsboro, N.J., along with dressage team members Steffen Peters, Tina Konyot and Jan Ebeling.

The latter will carry some interest to fans of the political arena as Ebeling will be riding Rafalca, who is owned by Ann Romney, wife of presidential candidate Mitt Romney.

Dressage is one of three disciplines within equestrian, the others being eventing and jumping. Along with sailing, it is the only Olympic sport in which men and women compete directly against each other, although

tennis and badminton have mixed doubles events.

Lyle is "trying to get a little bit of sight-seeing in when we can" before the Games officially begin with the opening ceremonies on July 27.

"That's one of the things I'm most excited about," Lyle said. "That's going to be amazing."

And while a swimmer needs to maintain one's endurance, or a basketball team needs to establish chemistry, preparation in equestrian is fundamentally different than any other sport.

"The thing about our sport is we

have a live animal we're caring for," Lyle said. "That has to be attended to around the clock, so that kind of keeps your attention where it needs to be."

Lyle's day begins with a short bike ride to the barn every morning at about 7:30, with meetings and training designed to get the riders and horses ready for their tests — the equestrian term for a game in team sports.

After breaking for lunch, the riders will go over video of the morning sessions and take the horses out to

BURLEY • The baseball days are just getting better for the Kunz family.

Burley's undefeated in Area C West Division play in the current American Legion Baseball season, and a key cog in that machine just sealed his future as a NCAA Division I baseball player.

Jackson Kunz gave an oral commitment Wednesday to Utah Valley University after making an unofficial visit. The incoming senior plans to sign a National Letter of Intent during the early signing period, which runs Nov. 14-21.

"They were my top choice

and they were interested, so why go somewhere else?" said Kunz. "It's a big relief not having to worry about it going into my senior season, and to just know that I'm set."

Kunz was a first-team all-Great Basin Conference selection as a shortstop as a junior for Burley. He figures to retain that position, as well as pitch a little, while trying to lead Burley to the state playoffs as a senior.

House Weighs Military Sports Sponsorships

WASHINGTON • Congress is waving a warning flag over the military spending millions of dollars to sponsor NASCAR cars and other sports to attract recruits.

Challenging lawmakers' resolve to cut federal spending, Republican Rep. Jack Kingston and Democratic Rep. Betty McCollum pleaded with their colleagues Wednesday to back a measure that would trim \$72.3 million from a \$608 billion defense spending bill. The amendment would target money that the National Guard spends to sponsor Dale Earnhardt Jr. in NASCAR, the Marine Corps spends on Ultimate Fighting Championship and other military sponsorships from fishing to hot rod racing.

The House debated the far-reaching defense legislation that provides money for war, troops and weapons next year. Yet talk of Earnhardt's No. 88, bass fishing and NASCAR dominated the discussion in what shaped up as a fierce fight.

A vote was scheduled for Wednesday evening on the military sponsorships.

Kingston, a Georgian who says he hails from NASCAR and military country, insisted that the sponsorship money was ineffective, attracting few recruits, and made no sense as the Army shrinks from a peak of 570,000 to 490,000 and the Marine Corps drops by 20,000, to 182,000. The end of the Iraq war, the draw-down in Afghanistan and the nation's fiscal woes have reshaped the defense budget, which has nearly doubled in the last 10 years.

"If someone is going to sign away five or six years of their life, it's going to take more than an ad on an auto-

mobile," Kingston told reporters at a Capitol Hill news conference prior to the floor debate.

He said the money should be spent on hiring more recruiters not military sponsorships.

"We're in a fiscal crisis here," McCollum said. "Bass fishing is not national security."

But the two faced strong opposition from members of North Carolina's congressional delegation as well as lawmakers from Mississippi and Florida. North Carolina is home to the speedway in Rockingham and the Richard Petty Museum.

Republican Rep. Sue Myrick dismissed the amendment as micro-managing the military's recruiting for the all-volunteer force. Democratic Rep. Larry Kissell said the relationship between the military and NASCAR was important.

Rep. Steven Palazzo, R-Miss., said there was "no reason Congress should be telling the Department of Defense where and how to spend money." In fact, Congress repeatedly instructs the Pentagon on how to spend the money it appropriates.

Various sports leagues weighed in this week, sending a letter to Republican and Democratic leaders urging them to oppose the amendment.

"Sports marketing has long been an important element in the U.S. Armed Forces' efforts to reach young adults and active duty personnel regarding the military's missions and objectives that serve our country," said the letter to House Republican and Democratic leaders from NASCAR, IZOD IndyCar series, Major League Baseball, the National Football League and the National Basketball Association.

walk or graze in the afternoon. After dinner, the team will go back to the barn for a last check on their horses before calling it a day.

Lyle's mentor in the sport is Debbie McDonald, who won bronze at the 2004 Games in Athens in team dressage. Now living in Hailey, McDonald was selected in 2010 as the U.S. Equestrian Federation's Developing Dressage coach, a role in which she identifies and develops emerging talent in the sport.

Although she has been on the road for about the last nine months chasing her spot in the world rankings and a spot on the Olympic team, Lyle typically spends about nine months out of the year training in Hailey, under McDonald's watch at River Grove Farm. The farm is owned by Parry Thomas of Las Vegas banking fame — college basketball fans recognize him as the Thomas in UNLV's Thomas and Mack Center — and his wife Peggy owns Wizard.

"She's invaluable," Lyle said of McDonald. "Not only in the training of the horse, but with everything else that goes along with the Olympics. She's been a wealth of information."

Can Lyle come back home with a medal? Individual dressage has been dominated in recent Olympiads by Germany and the Netherlands, with the last American to medal coming in 1932. Although the U.S. is second all-time to Germany in equestrian medals, most of those have come in eventing and jumping.

At 27, yet competing in a sport where it is not uncommon to find participants twice her age, Lyle is the young pup on the U.S. team and future Olympic trips could be in the cards. But for her first Games, Lyle's goals are modest.

"My personal goal is to qualify for the second round and ride twice at the Olympics," Lyle said.

That would mean being qualifying for the Grand Prix special event, held Aug. 7, which is when team medals will be earned. Lyle is guaranteed to ride once, on either Aug. 2 or 3, along with her U.S. team members, but she is riding in effect as an individual and is not listed on the three-deep team to earn medals.

The top seven teams, and any individuals in the top 11 not attached to a qualifying team, advance to the special. The top 18 scores in the special advance to the freestyle round on Aug. 9, which is where individual medals are earned.

Kunz. "It's just nice to know somebody where you're going."

British Open at Lytham Requires a Good Start

LYTHAM ST. ANNES, England • It's rare to see Tiger Woods hit iron off the tee on a par 5, except in links golf, and especially at Royal Lytham & St. Annes.

With a stiff breeze in his face on the 598-yard 11th hole, he most likely could not reach the green in two. The idea was to be able to get there in three shots, which meant staying out of trouble off the tee. His low bullet of a shot stopped 10 paces short of feeding into a pot bunker. If the shot had gone much longer, Woods might have had to blast out sideways, and still had some 300 yards left to the green.

The key to this British Open is to get off to a good start — not just today, but on every hole.

"At most PGA Tour events, the shorter the shot, the more important it is," Geoff Ogilvy said. "This one, the longer the shot the more important it is."

The tired adage of "drive for show, putt for dough" doesn't necessarily apply at Lytham.

"The easy part is around the greens," Ben Curtis said. "The hard part is off the tee."

Royal Lytham is the shortest course on the Open rotation over the last decade, and it's on the smallest piece of property, tucked a mile or so away from the Irish Sea and surrounded by homes and a railway. The challenge comes from 206 bunkers, and thick grass from a wet spring that should keep the spotters busy looking for balls.

The powerful hitters can hit over the bunkers, as long as they avoid the next set of traps. But it's not so simple to think that players can hit well short of the bunkers for a longer shot into the green, because they might not be able to reach the green.

"It's a tee-shot golf course," Graeme McDowell said, who grew up on Royal Portrush and knows a thing or two about links golf. "The second shots are not particularly taxing. There's not a lot of trouble around the greens. There are bunkers, but not a lot of heavy rough. You've got to position yourself off the tee to give yourself a chance. You've got to keep it out of the bunkers. It's a good test. I don't think you can hide on this golf course."

Spending Drops 11 Percent in MLB Draft

NEW YORK • Spending by teams in baseball's amateur draft dropped by 11 percent in the first year of restrictions imposed by the new labor contract.

Teams allocated \$207.8 million to draft picks, down from \$233.6 million last year though still the second-highest annual total, according to figures compiled by Major League Baseball. The decline in the first round was even more pronounced, a 17 percent fall from \$89.5 million to \$74.3 million this year.

Just 10 teams exceeded their signing bonus pool, incurring a total luxury tax of \$1.6 million. But no team reached the second level of the tax, which would cause a club to forfeit its next first-round draft pick.

Under the latest labor deal, two aims were to slow spending on prospects through the draft and to get picks to sign sooner.

"We think that the system performed well in its initial year," said Rob Manfred, MLB's executive vice president of economics and league affairs. "It accomplished the goal, in our view, which was to allow the weakest teams with the best opportunities to get the best talent."

Teams pick in the reverse order of their record the previous year. Baseball's new labor deal assigned each club a bonus pool — the sum of the recommended draft bonuses for a team's selections in the first 10 rounds, plus any money above \$100,000 given to a player taken in rounds 11-40.

Twin Falls High School graduate Zeb Sneed, for instance, was an 11th round pick of the Kansas City Royals and signed for \$110,000, meaning \$10,000 of that was applied toward the Royals' bonus pool total.

The decline in spending was the first since

a fall from \$158.9 million in 2006 to \$154.5 million the following year.

"It is hard to draw conclusions about these new provisions based on only one year's experience," union head Michael Weiner said. "Is that a function of the players available in this year's draft? Is that a function of something else? I think with one year, it's hard to say."

Going into the draft, many club scouts said the top talent available was not as good as it was in 2011.

"The general perception was we would be down this year because of the perception in the quality of the draft," Manfred said.

Showing how teams managed their money, the Chicago White Sox and Detroit each spent the exact amount of their respective bonus pools. Toronto spent exactly 5 percent more than its pool — a total of \$9.27 million that led to a tax of \$330,900. Under the escalating penalties, if the Blue Jays had spent one additional dollar, they would have lost their next first-round pick.

Will any team spend into the second level of penalties?

"That's an example of needing more than one year's experience," Weiner said.

Stanford pitcher Mark Appel was the chief casualty. Projected by some to be the top pick, he was taken by Pittsburgh with the eighth selection and declined a \$4.8 million offer. Appel will stay at Stanford for his senior year and be eligible for next year's draft.

"Clubs that wanted to pick the players they wanted couldn't," said Appel's adviser, Scott Boras, a frequent critic of the new rules. "Because of the system, they could not spend what was needed to sign the best player. They had to make alternate choices. That's not what the draft was designed to do."





With U.S. in Town, British Basketball Gets Attention

MANCHESTER, England • The question would be almost unimaginable in the United States.

"Who's No. 6?" a reporter asked a U.S. official.

Yes, even LeBron James isn't recognized everywhere in Britain, where soccer is king and basketball is hardly an afterthought.

That will change at least briefly today, with James and the U.S. Olympic team bringing it some rare attention with a game against Britain.

It's only an exhibition, so the result doesn't matter. But the event does, to those who want to see basketball gain a place in Britain's sports culture.

"This is a massive opportunity for British basketball to get some oxygen, to breathe life into the sport in this country," said Chris Mitchell, who calls Britain's

games for BBC Radio. "Team USA being here is arguably the biggest-ever game this country has hosted. It's arguably bigger than any game they'll play at the Olympics, because they'll only face USA if they get through their group and perhaps meet them in the quarterfinals. So this, this week, it's almost the climax to the history of British basketball. It's huge."

Manchester Arena is expected to be full, many fans familiar with Kobe Bryant but with no clue how to pronounce the name of U.S. coach Mike Krzyzewski. It probably won't be very competitive, but it will give the Americans the opportunity to play in front of the opponent's fans for the first time during their preparations for the London Olympics.

"They will represent their country, they will cheer on their team and hopefully we can just play well in front of them," James said.

The Americans met the media Wednesday before practicing at the arena, getting occasional questions about the Xs and Os of basketball and the people who play it: James asked about injured teammates Dwyane Wade and Chris Bosh; Carmelo Anthony and Tyson Chandler about departed one Jeremy Lin.

And this being soccer country, of course there was that. Bryant is the most popular NBA player outside the U.S., but far from the most famous athlete in Los Angeles for the British.

So what about David Beckham not making the host's Olympic soccer roster, Kobe?

"I would love to have seen him have some type role on the team," said Bryant, a soccer fan who lived outside the U.S. as a child. "Just his leadership and his intelligence could have helped the team out."

Pistorius Set for Long-awaited Olympic Debut

GEMONA, Italy • Even when he's looking at photos of his bleeding and blistered leg stumps, Oscar Pistorius smiles.

And with his Olympic debut approaching, it's easy to understand why.

Pistorius, whose legs were amputated below the knee when he was a baby, is set to make history by running — yes, running — in the London Olympics. He will be the first double-amputee athlete to compete at the Olympics, and his journey has been long and rife with hurdles.

When he finally got word earlier this month that he had a place on South Africa's team — his was the last name of 125 penciled in — his first reaction was relief. Then came utter joy.

"I think I woke up the next morning with cramps in my cheeks. I was smiling in my sleep," Pistorius said during a recent interview at his training base in northeastern Italy. "You also realize very quickly ... it's the London Olympics and I need to perform. Very stressful."

"You've made the entrance to write the test, but now the test is in front of you," he said.

The test comes Aug. 4, the opening day of the 400-meter heats.

The "Blade Runner," as he is known, runs with carbon-fiber blades that often cause blisters and rub his stumps raw. Pistorius was born without fibula bones due to a congenital defect, and lost his legs at 11 months. It never stopped him from playing sports — even rugby — with prosthetics.

But his running prosthetics led to years of

controversy. Already a Paralympic gold medalist, Pistorius was initially banned from competing against able-bodied peers because many argued that his blades gave him an unfair advantage.

In 2008, however, the Court of Arbitration for Sport cleared him to compete. Last year, he ran on South Africa's 4x400 relay team at the 2011 world championships, and though he sat out the final, he won a silver medal because he competed in the heats.

Section 12: Establishes the "City of Murtaugh Water and Sewer Revenue Bond Fund" and provides for deposits and payments into the Bond Fund from water system revenues.
Section 13: Establishes a Reserve Fund and provides for deposits into the Reserve Fund.
Section 14: Provides for the disposition of surplus funds.
Section 15: Establishes the conditions of and limitations on the issuance of additional bonds or other obligations.
Section 16: Provides for the investment of surplus funds.
Section 17: Provides certain general covenants of the City with the Registered Owner of the Bond.
Section 18: Provides certain special covenants of the City.
Section 19: Provides for the sale of the Bond to the State of Idaho, Department of Environmental Quality.
Section 20: Provides for method of amending the Ordinance and adopting supplemental ordinances.
Section 21: Recites that the Bond is issued pursuant to the Idaho Revenue Bond Act.
Section 22: Provides for remedies of the Registered Owner of the Bond.
Section 23: States that the Ordinance constitutes a contract with the Registered Owner of the Bond.
Section 24: Provides for severability.
Section 25: Repeals prior inconsistent ordinances, to the extent of any inconsistency.
Section 26: Authorizes the Mayor, City Clerk, and City Treasurer to execute any additional documents necessary to sell and deliver the Bond.
Section 27: Provides for the publication of the Ordinance or a summary thereof and the effective date of the Ordinance.

In 1979, the Nicaraguan capital of Managua fell to Sandinista guerrillas, two days after President Anastasio Somoza fled the country.

In 1980, the Moscow Summer Olympics began, minus dozens of nations that were boycotting the games because of the Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan.

In 1989, 111 people were killed when a United Air Lines DC-10 crashed while making an emergency landing at Sioux City, Iowa; 185 other people survived.

In 1990, President George H.W. Bush joined former presidents Ronald Reagan, Gerald R. Ford and Richard M. Nixon at ceremonies dedicating the Nixon Library and Birthplace (since redesignated the Richard Nixon Presidential Library and Museum) in Yorba Linda, Calif.

In 1992, anti-Mafia prosecutor Paolo Borsellino was killed along with five members of his security escort in a car bombing in Palermo, Sicily.

Ten years ago: The Dow Jones industrials dipped below their post-terrorist attack lows in a 390-point selloff. ConAgra Beef Co. of Colorado asked Americans to destroy 19 million pounds of hamburger meat because of E. coli concerns. Alejandro Avila was arrested in the slaying of 5-year-old Samantha Rynnion of Stanton, Calif. (Avila was later convicted and sentenced to death.) Celebrated musicologist Alan Lomax died in Safety Harbor, Fla., at age 87.

Five years ago: A federal judge dismissed a lawsuit brought by former CIA operative Valerie Plame, who was demanding money from Bush administration officials she blamed for leaking her agency identity. Taliban gunmen abducted 23 South Koreans who worked at an aid organization in Kandahar, Afghanistan. (Two hostages were fatally shot; the rest were later freed.)

One year ago: Summoned by British lawmakers to answer for a phone hacking and bribery scandal at one of his tabloids, media mogul Rupert Murdoch said he was humbled and ashamed, but accepted no responsibility for wrongdoing.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE Bobby Wolff

"Anybody can be good in the country." — Oscar Wilde

Before we look at the contract of six hearts, a word on the auction. If you play two-over-one game-forcing (meaning that a two-level response in an uncontested auction sets up a sequence that cannot die below game), then North's jump to three hearts shows good trump support and slam interest.

South has minimum trump support but excellent side-suit controls. When he shows his spade and diamond cards, North takes control and uses Blackwood to bid six hearts.

When the spade jack is led, South should see at once that he has no losers in the side suits and should therefore focus his attention on holding his trump losers to one. The natural thing to do is to win the spade lead in hand and play a heart to dummy's queen. If it loses, South will regain the lead and then play the heart ace — ready to finesse against East if he turns up with four trumps, and losing only to a singleton king with East.

What if the trump finesse holds? It would be easy (but fatal today) to cash the heart ace next. Instead, declarer must make the somewhat unnatural move of coming back to hand with a club to lead the heart nine. If West follows with a small trump, declarer must duck in dummy. This will sometimes lose a trick unnecessarily if East has the 10, but giving up on an overtrick to secure the slam is a price worth paying.

ANSWER: However risky your initial response to one heart was, your partner has set up a game-force. Passing now would be a breach of discipline, even though it might work. Your best chance to put the brakes on is to bid three no-trump. You may not make it, but at least you won't tempt partner to flights of fancy. Raising clubs might see him reaching for the sky.
