the movies in the wake of the shooting rampage, many others were undeterred by the tragedy and eager to see "The Dark Knight Rises." "I just felt bad for the people that had to be traumatized by this entire event," he said. But "I didn't feel like it had any kind of effect on me. ... I'm just here to enjoy a

In a Monday interview, Lt. Craig Stotts said dispatchers
were originally called about a male subject at the door who male subject at the door who
was refusing to leave. Police were soon told the man had been shot, Stotts said. A man identifying himself as the shooter contacted the
Times-News Thursday to Times-News Thursday to
explain his side of the story The Times-News is not using his name because the man has not been charged with a crime and he requested anonymity for fear he and his family are in danger of retaliation.
The man said he was called
to Filer Avenue East and Ash Street late Sunday night to check on Serena Cossette, Joseph's wife. When he and his fiancee arrived, the man claimed another man who has with a brick.
While Serena and Joseph Cossette later became involved, the original police call was not about them as earlier reported.
Police were dispatched at 11:56 p.m. Sunday to the area for a call about a battery from
the man who later said he shot Joseph, Hicks said. According to Hicks, officers arrived at about 12:08 a.m. Monday.
A woman identifying herself as Serena Cossette wrote an email to the Times-News
on Tuesday saying the call on Tuesday saying the call
was not about her and her husband.
"That was 2 male people and neighbor called cops about noise", she wrote. The woman also wrote that she went to her friend's house to men cooled off.

ment were unsuccessful. According to the man who identified himself as the shooter, after he left the
scene at Filer Avenue, police called him to ask him to pick up Serena and her children and take them to his home for the night.

happened.

ndoscopic ultrasound combines
endoscopy and ulendoscopy and ulimages and information about the digestive tract, (which includes the esoph agus, stomach, small and large intestines and rectum) and the surrounding tissues and organs. Endoscopy refers to the procedure of inserting a long flexible tube through the mouth or the rectum to visualize the digestive tract. The ultrasound uses highfrequency sound waves to
produce images of the orproduce images of the or gans and structures inside
the body such as ovaries, uterus, liver, gall bladder, pancreas and aorta. Endoscopic ultrasound is a new technique where the anultrasound probe that an ultrasound probe that

civilians now apparently replacing diplomats as primary targets. U.S. and Israeli officials on Thurs day pointed to similarities between the Bulgarian attack and three recent y foiled plots also aimed at civilians, ncluding a nearly identical plan to kill vacationing Israelis in Cyprus. While day identity of the bomber in Wednes day's attack remained unclear, the or Hezbollah, the Lebanon-based militia movement closely aligned with the Islamic republic.
Even before the blast in Bulgaria, intelligence officials were seeing sign of an escalation in what had until re-for-tat strikes targeting diplomats and inside Iran nuclear scientists. Earlier this month, Kenyan author ities arrested two Iranian men in con nection with a plot to bomb several Western and Israeli businesses in that East African country. The suspects, identified by Kenya as members of an
elite Iranian military unit, brought with them more than 220 pounds of RDX, a powerful military explosive strong enough to destroy a large hotel. Asfar back as January, the Israeli government has sounded warnings abouta growing terrorist threat in Bulgaria, a country whose Black Seabeaches have sands of Israelis each year
After Wednesday's attack, Israeli officials were quick to blame Iran, but Israel did not release evidence linking Iran or Hezbollah to the incident. U.S. intelligence officials said they have not seen proof, though they did not A series of Iran

## STUDY CHALLENGES VIEWS AbOUT WESTERN FOREST FIRES

by SCOTT SONNER
RENO, Nev. - Scientists using field notes from surveys first conducted by the government before the Civ-
i1 War believe they've gained believe they've gained a better understand-
ing of how Western wildfires behaved historically. Researchers at the University of Wyoming studied historical fire patterns across millions of acres of dry Western forests. Their
findings challenge the curfindings challenge the cur-
rent operating protocol of rent operating protocol of
the U.S. Forest Service and other agencies that today's fires are burning hotter and more frequently than in the past. Combing through 13,000 firsthand descriptions of covering more than 250
miles in three states, where programs aimed at removteams of government land
surveyors first set out in the surveyors first set out in the
mid-1800s to map the nation's wild lands, the re-
searchers said they found searchers said they found evidence forests then were much denser
ly believed.
"More high
is not occugly intense fire is not occurring now than historically in dry forests,"
said William Baker, who teaches fire ecology and landscape ecology ind Laramie, Wyo., where he's
been doing research more been doing research more
than 20 years. "These forests were much more diverse and experienced a much wider mixture of fire than we thought in the past, including substantial amoun
fire."
If fire."
If he's right, he and others say it means fuel-reduction
programs aimed at remov-
ing trees and shrubs in the name of easing fire threats are creating artificial conditions that likely make dry forests less resilient. "It means we need to rethink our management of Western dry forests", said
Baker, a member of a U.S Fish and Wildlife Service working group that is developing plans to help bolster northern spotted owl populations in dry forests. Baker's conclusions have drawn sharp criticism from
other longtime researchers who believe that decades of fire suppression have led to more densely tangled forests and more intense fires, the position advanced by the Forest Service. "I have yet to hear any ecologist or forest manager
say they are convinced by the main interpretations in that (Wyoming) paper," said fessor of dendrochronolog and director of the Laboraory of Tree Ring Research the University of Arizona. I doubt it will gain much
traction in the scientific or management communimanag
ties."

The Forest Service did not immediately respond to Thequest for comment. The studies conducted by past two years focused on parts of Colorado, Oregon and Arizona, but were indicative of dry forest types stretching from the Rockies to the Sierra Nevada previously thought to be "open and park-like" and typically quent, low-severity fire.

However, Berger played in our spades. The defense started with two rounds of diamonds and in his hand the suit. Berger ruffed in his hand, cashed a top spade, then played a heart. West flew up with the ace and returned the spade jack. Declarer won, played three rounds of clubs, then cashed the heart king and jack.
When the jack was cashed, East and South pitched a diamond and a club respectively. When, at the penultimate trick, North led a heart, East's 9-7 of trumps were swallowed up by declarer's Q-8. So in fact Berger had executed a Grand Coup for his contract, and since the hand was played in Vienna, one could jokingly describe the play as a special version of the Vienna Coup. Note that there was a defense to the game. After cashing two rounds of diamonds, the defense prevails by switching to a club. On coming in with the heart ace, West destroys declarer's communications for the coup by playing another round of clubs.
