TWIN FALLS • The man whom police say shot 27-year-old Joseph Cossette early Monday says he did so

in self-defense. Twin Falls police detectives will wrap up their investigation of a shooting on Hoops Street early Monday morning, Capt. Matt Hicks

Hicks said self-defense may be considered as a factor in the case. The detectives will soon approach city and county prosecutors to discuss whether charges are appropriate, he said.

Joseph Cossette was injured after being shot with a shotgun slug while outside a home in the 1000 block of Hoops Street. It wasn't clear Friday evening if Cossette was still hospitalized; a St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center spokeswoman could not be reached for comment and hospital staff would not speak otherwise.

Price said Christians can be angry and upset about what happened, but "we are to continue to live our faith as people who trust in peace that Jesus shows us."

At Amazing Grace Fellowship in Twin Falls, associate pastor Rex Barker said the Colorado incident will be remembered through a time of prayer during Sunday services.

Where Best to Recharge the Aquifer?

The southern stretch of Idaho's largest aquifer, including the Magic Valley, may be the best place for recharge, one official says.

CSI shows interest in Pristine Springs

BURLEY • Pristine Springs' unique geothermal resource has captured the attention of the College of Southern Ida-

The fish farm operation north of Twin Falls — known in recent years for its key role in a game-changing water rights sale - has a geothermal well with a water flow of 4.5 cubic feet per second. It's an artesian well, meaning pressure pushes the water up from underground through porous rock and doesn't require the use of a pump.

With several programs focused on power generation, CSI is interested in exploring if it should expand to a facility with such a rare well, said college President Jerry Beck.

"Pristine Springs is of interest to us," Beck said, while speaking in front of the Idaho Water Resource Board on Friday in Burley. "It has very good opportunities for an education program. We would like to explore those options."

Currently, the water board owns the facility. The board took over the facility in 2008 as part of a \$26 million deal with the city of Twin Falls and the North Snake and Magic Valley ground water districts. The purchase was designed to address a series of water conflicts between the region's users of spring water and groundwater, as well as to ensure Twin Falls had a large enough supply of fresh water

for future growth. SeaPac of Idaho leases the property but has expressed interest in renegotiating its rental agreement, said Jeff Raybould, a water board member. The board received close to \$300,000 in rental income since taking over Pristine Springs.

Beck didn't mention if CSI's interest requires the college to purchase part of the facility or develop some sort of partnership with the water board. However, both the board and Beck agreed they wanted to pursue the issue.

"Our campus is heated by almost all geothermal," Beck said. "So we're interested in pursuing this conversation with the board."

Theaters took the precautions after a gunman wearing a gas mask opened fire at a midnight showing of "The Dark Knight Rises" in Aurora, Colo., killing at least 12 people.

In Washington, the Homeland Security Department held a conference call with officials from the commercial, entertainment and shopping mall industries to discuss what security measures they could take to prevent something like this from happening again.

The National Association of Theater Owners said it was working closely with law enforcement authorities and reviewing security procedures, but gave no details of any precautions taken.

AMC Theatres, the nation's second-largest theater chain, with more than 300 movie houses, said it will not allow people to wear costumes or face-covering masks into its theaters.

Authorities did not release a motive. The FBI said there was no indication of ties to any terrorist groups.

Q: WHO IS THE SUS-

A: Holmes was studying neuroscience in a Ph.D. program at the University of Colorado-Denver but was about to drop out. He enrolled in June 2011 but left a year later, though it wasn't immediately clear why.

Q: WHAT IS GOING ON HOLMES' ΑT APARTMENT?

A: Police said the thirdfloor apartment was booby trapped, so they've evacuated five surrounding buildings and bomb technicians were determining how to disarm flammable or explosive material.

The apartment is about four miles from the theater.

A: Yes, though theaters and police increased security and AMC Theaters, the nation's second-largest chain, barred customers from wearing masks or costumes.

Some fans were nervous about going to see the film, but many were undeterred.

Two police officers were stationed outside the AMC theater in New York's Times Square, which had showings beginning every 20 minutes Friday.

In a Monday interview, Lt. Craig Stotts said dispatchers were originally called about a male subject at the door who was refusing to leave. Police were soon told the man had been shot, Stotts said.

A man identifying himself as the shooter contacted the Times-News Thursday to explain his side of the story. The Times-News is not using his name because the man has not been charged with a crime and he requested anonymity for fear he and his family are in danger of retaliation.

The man said he was called to Filer Avenue East and Ash Street late Sunday night to check on Serena Cossette, Joseph's wife. When he and his fiancee arrived, the man claimed another man who was with Joseph Cossette hit him with a brick.

While Serena and Joseph Cossette later became involved, the original police call was not about them as earlier reported.

Police were dispatched at 11:56 p.m. Sunday to the area for a call about a battery from the man who later said he shot Joseph, Hicks said. According to Hicks, officers arrived at about 12:08 a.m. Monday.

A woman identifying herself as Serena Cossette wrote an email to the *Times-News* on Tuesday saying the call was not about her and her husband.

"That was 2 male people and neighbor called cops about noise," she wrote. The woman also wrote that she went to her friend's house to avoid other issues until the men cooled off.

Repeated attempts to reach Serena and Joseph Cossette for further comment were unsuccessful.

According to the man who identified himself as the shooter, after he left the scene at Filer Avenue, police called him to ask him to pick up Serena and her children and take them to his home for the night.

Hicks said there were no notations in the reports he had indicating police asked for Serena and the children to be taken to the home, but said he didn't doubt that it happened.

The man said he has known Serena for about four vears, his fiancee had known her for about 15 and she's "like family" to them.

At about 3 a.m., the man said Joseph called asking to speak to Serena. He said he told Joseph to calm down, get some rest and he could talk to Serena tomorrow.

Joseph allegedly then told the man he was going to come to his house.

When Joseph later arrived, the man said he tried to diffuse the situation without letting Joseph in the house. Eventually, the man claimed Joseph began banging on the door and started trying to break it down.

"He was volatile," the man

The man said at one point his brother fired a warning shot into the wall to try to scare Joseph away.

Over the past three years, water users stepped up the amount of water they dump into the ground to let it seep into the aquifer. However, in order to build up the aquifer's water supply, state officials should prioritize funding projects in southern areas of the aquifer, said Mathew Weavers, senior water resource engineer for the Idaho Department of Water Resources.

"I recommend only recharging areas in the lower valley," he told members of the Idaho Water Resource Board during a Friday meeting in Burley. "It'll have the largest long-term benefits to the overall aquifer."

Water used for recharge above American Falls tends to drain into the Snake River before it can reach the aquifer, Weavers said. And over time, it doesn't expand to other areas of the aquifer. Instead, it just reaches the river faster, essentially putting the water to waste, he

The water board determines the amount of money that can be allotted for ESPA recharge efforts. Last fall, it approved \$132,700 to fund 44,245 acre-feet of recharge. But even with a commitment to improving the aquifer's water supply, the board remained hesi-

tant to agree Friday with Weaver's recommendations.

"If we stop recharging in the upper area, what do we lose?" asked board vice chairman Roger Chase of Pocatello. "If we have the money for recharge, then I would hate to not give it to someone in the northern valley."

Board member Jeff Raybould, of St. Anthony, agreed.

"I'm reluctant to exclude anyone right now," he said. Between 2007 and 2011,

almost 80 percent of the 168,000 acre-feet of water designated for recharge made it back to the aquifer, said Mike McVay, hydrologist with IDWR. In the northern half, close to 40 percent of 220,000 acrefeet of water returned to the ESPA. An acre-foot is enough water to cover one acre, one foot deep.

Based on the current ID-WR water budget model, the northern valley's recharge return rate will drop to less than 30 percent by 2017 if the same amount of water is released back into the aguifer over the next five years.

'Continuous recharge is important but it comes at a cost," McVay said. "There are lots of reasons to recharge and none of this is bad, it's just surprising."

Idaho Power Touts Positive Results from Cloud Seeding

BURLEY • After spending almost a decade researching if they can manipulate the weather, Idaho Power officials are coming back with positive results.

By using a method called "cloud seeding," meteorologists and researchers are seeing an increase in snowfall in the Payette River Basin.

How do they do it? Generators shoot silver iodide into the sky in a gas form. The silver iodide then latches onto water particles and crystallizes them before they evaporate when approaching high elevation.

Besides increasing snowpack, cloud seeding is also used by airports to help clear heavy fog and by farmers hoping to reduce the amount of hail damage on crops.

"Over a longer period of time, we're seeing a positive effect in the Payette Basin," said Derek

Blestrud, meteorologist with Idaho Power, during Friday's Idaho Water Resource Board meeting. The utility company currently has 10 generators in the Payette area.

"We're in the 5-15 percent increase in snowfall right now from when we first began," he said.

Critics of cloud seeding say it diverts precious precipitation from other parts of the state. Blestrud said that can happen but only if the project is poorly executed.

"When done correctly, the downwind effects are either neutral or positive," Blestrud said.

Idaho Power also has 16 cloud-seeding generators in the Upper Snake River Basin. However, they've only applied the weather method since 2009 and don't have as much data to compare for concrete results.

"This is something we would love to expand to other areas of the state."



Understanding Ultrasounds

I've heard a lot about endoscopic ultrasounds. What are they and can they assist in cancer detection or treatment?

- Lori, Gooding

Answered by Dr. Judith Csanky, M.D., DPM, St. Luke's Clinic, Gastroenterology:

ndoscopic ultrasound combines endoscopy and ultrasound to obtain images and information about the digestive tract, (which includes the esophagus, stomach, small and large intestines and rectum) and the surrounding tissues and organs.

Endoscopy refers to the procedure of inserting a long flexible tube through the mouth or the rectum to visualize the digestive tract. The ultrasound uses highfrequency sound waves to produce images of the organs and structures inside the body such as ovaries, uterus, liver, gall bladder, pancreas and aorta.

Endoscopic ultrasound is a new technique where the endoscope is equipped with an ultrasound probe that

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enables the gastroenterologist to see through the wall of the digestive tract to other organs - up to two inches outside of the digestive tract. With the ultrasound view, the biggest advantage is the ability to take tissue samples from outside of the digestive tract to determine if there is cancerous growth in that area. This is a safe outpatient procedure and a much less invasive procedure for detection of cancer than surgery or an outside biopsy done through the skin by a radiologist.

With this new technique, it is much easier to detect cancer and to sample suspicious growth close to the gastrointestinal tract at an earlier stage, thereby increasing the probability of a cure. While the main purpose of endoscopic ultrasound is to detect cancer and to determine the stage of cancer, it is also used to study bile duct abnormalities, including stones. It can also evaluate chronic pancreatic issues.


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Attack on Israeli Tourists Prompts Fears of Shadow War

The suicide bombing of a Bulgarian bus packed with Israeli tourists has stoked fears of a deadly new phase in the long-running "shadow war" between Iran and Israel, with ordinary civilians now apparently replacing diplomats as primary targets.

U.S. and Israeli officials on Thursday pointed to similarities between the Bulgarian attack and three recently foiled plots also aimed at civilians, including a nearly identical plan to kill vacationing Israelis in Cyprus. While the identity of the bomber in Wednesday's attack remained unclear, the earlier attempts have been tied to Iran or Hezbollah, the Lebanon-based militia movement closely aligned with the Islamic republic.

Even before the blast in Bulgaria, intelligence officials were seeing signs of an escalation in what had until recently been a campaign of covert, titfor-tat strikes targeting diplomats and inside Iran nuclear scientists.

Earlier this month, Kenyan authorities arrested two Iranian men in connection with a plot to bomb several Western and Israeli businesses in that East African country. The suspects, identified by Kenya as members of an elite Iranian military unit, brought with them more than 220 pounds of RDX, a powerful military explosive strong enough to destroy a large hotel.

As far back as January, the Israeli government has sounded warnings about a growing terrorist threat in Bulgaria, a country whose Black Sea beaches have become a popular destination for thousands of Israelis each year.

After Wednesday's attack, Israeli officials were quick to blame Iran, but Israel did not release evidence linking Iran or Hezbollah to the incident. U.S. intelligence officials said they have not seen proof, though they did not dispute the link.

A series of Iran-linked plots in the fall and winter had mostly targeted diplomats and embassies. Iranian nationals and Hezbollah operatives had been implicated in attempted assassinations of Israeli, U.S. and Saudi figures in five countries. In one incident, Iranian operatives allegedly sought to hire Mexican gang members in a foiled plan to kill Saudi Arabia's ambassador to Washington.

ACLU: Emails Show Bias in **Immigration Law**

PHOENIX (AP) • Opponents of Arizona's hardline immigration enforcement law contend that emails sent, received and forwarded by a former legislator who championed the law support allegations it was racially motivated.

Dozens of emails are cited in a new legal effort by the American Civil Liberties Union and other civil rights groups to block police from enforcing the Arizona law's so-called show me your papers provision recently upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court.

The groups said the emails and other material reveal that ex-Sen. Russell Pearce and other supporters embraced discriminatory views and bent the truth about immigration-related matters, setting the stage for enactment of a law that the groups contend will lead to racial profiling if enforced.

The use of the emails in the court filing later Tuesday was reported Friday by The Arizona Republic.

Pearce on Friday denied discriminatory intent in championing the law, telling The Associated Press the civil rights groups falsely portray him as a racist and that the law includes pro-

tections against profiling. "Nobody wants to talk about that," he said. "I've been attacked for years. I don't expect it to stop?

Iowa Missing Considered Abuduction

EVANSDALE, Iowa (AP) • Law enforcement officials in Iowa reclassified the disappearance of two missing cousins as an abduction Friday after an FBI dive team failed to find their bodies

Ten-year-old Lyric Cook-Morrissey and 8-year-old Elizabeth Collins disappeared a week ago while riding bikes near Meyers Lake in Evansdale. Their bikes were later found on a path near

A special 10-member FBI dive team used sonar equipment on a boat for hours Friday to search the 26-acre lake. Divers waded through the water looking for evidence but did not appear to go beneath the surface. By mid-afternoon, an FBI truck and many other police of-

ficers had left and little search activity was going on.

Black Hawk County Chief Deputy Rick Abben told reporters later Friday the divers were confident the girls' bodies were not in the lake. He also said investigators do not believe the girls got lost because they would have been found by now.

Abben said some evidence in the case has been sent to a state crime lab for analysis, but he would not elaborate on that.

The reclassification came as Iowa authorities took steps to keep a closer watch on Lyric's father, a man with a lengthy criminal history who stopped



cooperating with police in the week-old investigation.

Court records showed Friday that a judge ordered Daniel Morrissey, 36, placed in a pretrial supervision program of the Iowa Department of Corrections while he faces September trials in two separate drug cases. The change means Morrissey, who has been free on bond, will be supervised by parole officers who will make sure he shows up in court and does not violate the terms of his release.

Obama, Romney Remain Silent on Gun Control After Colorado Shooting

CHICAGO • President Barack Obama and Republican challenger Mitt Romney have spoken little about gun control in their campaigns for the White House and showed no sign of shifting course after one of the deadliest mass shootings in recent U.S. history.

"It's not one of the issues that either candidate has shown much inclination to discuss," said Don Kettl, dean of the school of public policy at the University of Maryland. "There are more downside risks than upside gains in talking about it."

At least 12 people were killed and dozens were injured when a gunman in a gas mask opened fire Friday in a movie theater near Denver.

In remarks Friday in Fort Myers, Fla., Obama made no mention of gun control as he called for a moment of silence for the shooting's victims. The president canceled later campaign events and returned to Washington. Romney also sidestepped the gun issue in a speech in Bow, N.H., calling the killings a "hateful act."

Obama called on Americans to choose compassion over conflict following a January 2011 shooting rampage in Arizona that killed six people, including a 9-yearold girl, and critically wounded Rep. Gabrielle Giffords, who later stepped down from her House seat. He didn't push for any additional gun measures in the wake of that shooting.

Gun-control advocates have expressed disappointment in Obama's administration and said they hope he will be more aggressive on the issue, should he win reelection. New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg Friday called on both Obama and Romney to tell Americans "specifically what are they going to do about guns?"

Andrea Saul, a Romney spokeswoman, said in a statement that the campaign planned to pull all ads in Colorado, a battleground state, "until further notice." Jen Psaki, a spokeswoman for Obama's re-election campaign, told reporters the president's operationwon't run ads in Colorado that contrast the president with Romney.

In an April speech, Romnev said he didn't want to see any new gun laws.

"We need a president who will enforce current laws, not create new ones that only serve to burden lawful gun owners," the Republican nominee said.

LOS ANGELES (AP) • Viacom and DirecTV fought a bruising fight over fees to a draw Friday and agreed to a long-term deal that ended a 10-day channel blackout.

Their new deal restored MTV, Comedy Central, Nickelodeon and other channels to 20 million DirecTV customers and ensured those channels will be available to subscribers on computers and mobile devices in the coming months.

Fans on Twitter expressed relief. According to terms shared by both sides on Friday, DirecTV Group Inc. will pay about 20 percent more to carry Viacom Inc. channels on satellite TV lineups.

That works out to about \$600 million in the first year of a seven-year

DirecTV was able to save itself about \$500 million over the entire term by not taking the premium pay TV channel Epix.

Judge Slaps \$2M Fine on Mining Company

BOISE (AP) • A federal judge has ordered a Canadian mining company to pay a hefty \$2 million penalty for its chronic failure to follow clean water laws and not doing enough to staunch the flow of arsenic and iron into a tributary of the Boise River system.

The order and penalty is the latest setback for Atlanta Gold Corp., which has been exploring gold deposits in the mountains around the historic mining town of Atlanta for more than 25

Earlier this year, U.S. Magistrate Judge Mikel H. Williams ruled the company is legally responsible for high concentrations of pollutants flowing from an old mine shaft.

order, given His Thursday, wraps up the penalty phase of a lawsuit brought by two environmental groups.

The Idaho Conservation League and the National Environmental Defense Center sued the Toronto-based company last year, accusing the company of violating its federal discharge permit and failing to reduce the levels of pollutants flowing daily into Montezuma Creek, a tributary of the Middle Fork of the Boise

"We are hopeful that this strong ruling will cause Atlanta Gold to come into compliance with the permit and allow for the restoration of Montezuma Creek and the Boise River," said Kristin Ruether, an attorney for Advocates of the West and the plaintiffs.

STUDY CHALLENGES VIEWS ABOUT WESTERN FOREST FIRES

RENO, Nev. • Scientists using field notes from survevs first conducted by the government before the Civil War believe they've gained a better understanding of how Western wildfires behaved historically.

Researchers at the University of Wyoming studied historical fire patterns across millions of acres of dry Western forests. Their findings challenge the current operating protocol of the U.S. Forest Service and other agencies that today's fires are burning hotter and more frequently than in the

Combing through 13,000 firsthand descriptions of forests and retracing steps covering more than 250 miles in three states, where teams of government land surveyors first set out in the mid-1800s to map the nation's wild lands, the researchers said they found evidence forests then were much denser than previously believed.

"More highly intense fire is not occurring now than historically in dry forests," said William Baker, who teaches fire ecology and landscape ecology Laramie, Wyo., where he's been doing research more than 20 years. "These forests were much more diverse and experienced a much wider mixture of fire than we thought in the past, substantial including amounts of high-severity

If he's right, he and others say it means fuel-reduction programs aimed at removing trees and shrubs in the name of easing fire threats are creating artificial conditions that likely make dry forests less resilient.

"It means we need to rethink our management of Western dry forests," said Baker, a member of a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service working group that is developing plans to help bolster northern spotted owl populations in dry forests.

Baker's conclusions have drawn sharp criticism from other longtime researchers who believe that decades of fire suppression have led to more densely tangled forests and more intense fires, the position advanced by the Forest Service.

"I have yet to hear any knowledgeable forest or fire ecologist or forest manager

say they are convinced by the main interpretations in that (Wyoming) paper," said Thomas Swetnam, a professor of dendrochronology and director of the Laboratory of Tree Ring Research at the University of Arizona. "I doubt it will gain much traction in the scientific or management communities."

The Forest Service did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

The studies conducted by Baker and others over the past two years focused on parts of Colorado, Oregon and Arizona, but were indicative of dry forest types stretching from the Rockies to the Sierra Nevada previously thought to be "open and park-like" and typically enduring only cycles of frequent, low-severity fire.

Goat Man Spotted in Utah Moutains

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • A man spotted dressed in a goat suit among a herd of wild goats in the mountains of northern Utah has wildlife officials worried he could be in danger as hunting season approaches.

Phil Douglass of the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources said Friday the person is doing nothing illegal, but he worries the so-called "goat man" is unaware of the dangers.

"My very first concern is the person doesn't understand the risks," Douglass said. "Who's to say what could happen."

Douglass said a man hiking Sunday along Ben Lomond peak in the mountains above Ogden spotted the person dressed like a goat among a herd of real goats. The person provided some blurry photographs to Douglass, who said they did not appear to have been altered.

Wildlife officials now just want to talk to the man so he is aware of the dangers. There's no telling what his intentions are, Douglass said, but it is believed he could be a wildlife enthusiast.

"People do some pretty out there things in the name of enjoying wildlife. But I've never had a report like this," Douglass said. "There's a saying we have among biol-

ogists: You don't go far enough, you don't get the data. You go too far, you don't go home. The same is true with some wildlife enthusiasts."

Douglass said 60 permits will be issued for goat hunting season in that area, which begins in September. He worries the goat man might be accidentally shot or could be attacked by a real goat.

"They may get agitated.

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They're territorial. They are, after all, wild animals," he said. "This person puts on a goat suit, he changes the game. But as long as he accepts responsibility, it's not illegal."

Douglass said wildlife of-

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"agitated man" after the sighting was reported in local media. The caller simply said, "Leave goat man alone. He's done nothing wrong."

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EPA Reviews Power Plant Rules

WASHINGTON (AP) • The Environmental Protection Agency is reviewing part of a controversial rule that sets the first federal standards to reduce toxic air pollution from power plants.

The rule, issued in December, is aimed at curbing mercury and other toxic pollutants from coaland oil-fired power plants. The Obama administration calls the rule a sensible step to reduce pollution, but Republicans have denounced it as a part of a "war on coal." The rule could force hundreds of the nation's oldest and dirtiest power plants to clean up or shut down.

EPA officials called the review a routine step that will have no impact on standards already set for existing power plants. Those rules will protect millions of families from air pollution, the agency said.

A spokesman for the American Lung Association, which pushed for the power plant rule, called the review "narrowly crafted." While the group is not happy with the change, "it is not a significant deal," said spokesman Paul Billings.

Ken Anderson, executive vice president of Coloradobased Tri-State Generation and Transmission Association, said the EPA should re-

engineering." Tri-State has proposed a coal-fired power plant in Kansas.

Power plants are the largest remaining source of

manmade mercury in the environment. Mercury is a toxic metal that's known to impair brain development in children.

Ed Center Backtracks on Idaho Online Class Report

BOISE (AP) • An education research center is backtracking on how it characterized Idaho in a report about the nation's largest for-profit online education provider.

The Associated Press reported Thursday the study found K12 Inc. students in Idaho and four other states were falling behind in math and reading. But the National Education Policy Center at the University of Colorado issued a correction Friday, saying the student achievement findings

were based on national evidence and not specific to any state.

Further, researchers examined federal data on Idaho but their information on the state's K12 students was incomplete compared to what they had for Arizona, Arkansas, Ohio and Pennsylvania. Specifically, researchers lacked Idaho's state math and reading assessment results.

Researchers maintain their overall conclusion that K12 Inc. students are lagging in math and reading.

Crews Battle West Idaho Fire

• Authorities say U.S. Highway 95 has been reduced to one lane near Midvale as crews battle a 600-acre

wildfire in western Idaho. The fire started early Friday and the cause has not yet been determined. Denise Cobb with the Payette National Forest said the fire is burning on a mix of private, state and federal land within the forest's protection zone. Officials reported blaze had crossed Sage Creek and was heading northwest.

Report Blames Mining Death on Safety Lapse

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • A worker fatally injured at a northern Idaho mine last year was wearing an inadequate safety harness, federal officials said.

Brandon Gray, 26, was buried in rubble after trying to dislodge a jammed rock bin Nov. 17 at the Lucky Friday Mine.

A report released Thursday by the federal Mine Safety and Health Adminis-

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tration found the accident happened because managers failed to ensure miners were provided with the right kind of protective equipment.

Gray was employed by Utah-based Cementation USA Inc., which had been contracted by Hecla Mining Co. to do work on a shaft inside the mine. Company leaders at Cementation USA were still working on a response to the MSHA report,

said president Mike Nadon.


The accident was among three in 2011 that prompted the federal agency to order the Lucky Friday Mine closed.

Gray was injured when he was working on top of a pile of broken rock and it gave way, burying the two men.

"The accident occurred due to management's failure to ensure miners were provided with the proper per-

sonal protective equipment when required to remove blocked material in the bin," according to the report.

The two men were wearing harnesses attached to "self-retracting lifelines" that were designed for an unobstructed fall. When the material underneath the men gave way, they didn't fall rapidly enough to trigger the lifelines to lock before the miners became buried in the rubble.

Raeli Prescott of Kimberly is in position to make tonight's championship go, as she's 14th in girls cow cutting as of Friday night, with just this morning's final performance left. But another area cowgirl, Minico's Jaylee Stimpson, just missed her spot in the top 20 - she was 22nd as of Friday evening.

LYTHAM ST. ANNES, **England** • Amid plenty of wayward swings, Brandt Snedeker and Adam Scott were steady as can be at the British Open.

And look who's lurking right behind them: a fistpumping Tiger Woods.

Snedeker, a 31-year-old Tennessean who had never even made the cut in golf's oldest major, surged to the lead with another bogey-free round Friday, shooting a 6-under 64 that left him tied with Nick Faldo for the lowest

36-hole score in Open history.

Faldo posted a 130 total at Muirfield in 1992 — the lowest halfway score in any major, for that matter — on the way to the last of his three Open titles. Snedeker matched him with a 10-under showing over the first two days, and can only hope that come Sunday he'll be in the same position Faldo was two decades ago.

Holding the claret jug.

"I'm sure everybody in this room is in about as much shock as I am right now," Snedeker said after coming to the media center. "My mantra all week has been to get the ball on the greens as fast as possible. Once I'm on there, I have a pretty good hand on the speed of the greens. I'm just going to try and keep doing that over the weekend."

Scott and Woods may have something to say about that at Royal Lytham & St. Anne, where the weather hasn't been much of a factor but some devilish pin placements began to spread out the field.

U.S. Women's Team Looking for Respect

ISTANBUL • Diana Taurasi and the U.S. women's basketball team feel a little over-

They've been on one of the most dominant runs in Olympic history, winning four straight gold medals the most in a traditional women's team sport — and 33 consecutive games. They are favored to win their fifth consecutive gold at the London Games.

Yet they feel unappreciated instead of celebrated.

"I think it's funny," Taurasi said. "We're a team that's won four gold medals in a row and yet we're still fighting for respect in our own country. I think it's a little sad. That's a heck of a motivator for all of us in the gym. Our level is so high, it becomes normal and even to the public 'it's they should win the gold medal. If they don't it's a terrible year."

Taurasi joked that they should get shirts made up with "road to respect" as the slogan modifying the 2008 men's teams "road to redemption" motto.

One of coach Geno Auriemma's goals in London is to get the women's team the attention they feel they de-

"If we win another gold medal it's not going to be a huge story," he said. "I want

to make it a huge story because the respect that Dee's talking about that these kids deserve for having done what they've done and been able to do it the way they do it should be appreciated. Greatness should be appreciated and not taken for granted.

"People take us for granted." Their opponents don't. Only one team has come

within single digits of the U.S. since the unprecedented run started in 1996. They've won by an average of 29 points a game. The Americans have only lost once in major international competitions since 1996 with the lone blemish coming against Russia in the semifinals of the 2006 world

championship.

"We're doing something that no one has ever done," said Sue Bird, who will be playing in her third straight Olympics. "You don't hear much about it and people take it for granted that we're

going to win, assume it's going to happen. To go for a fifth gold medal in a row, that's unbelievable."

Despite the Olympic team not getting the respect that the players feel they've earned, women's basketball has made great strides in the U.S. since 1996. The WNBA began a year later and is celebrating its 16th season. Three of the teams in the league have turned profits and attendance is up for the fifth straight season.

While there is definitely still room for improvement, the fact that the WNBA is still around is a positive sign two women's pro soccer leagues have folded despite Olympic success by US

American women's softball teams had a resume almost as impressive as the basketball squad, winning three of four gold medals before seeing their sport removed from the Olympics after the 2008 Beijing Games.

Even with the U.S. dominance in basketball there is no fear of the sport being eliminated. FIBA - the international governing body is trying to add 3-on-3 eventually to the Olympics. Officials say it would give more countries the opportunity to compete in the global sport since only four players would be needed for a roster.

U.S. MEN ARE RETRACING THEIR DREAM TEAM STEPS

BARCELONA, Spain • Forever in the Dream Team's shadow, the U.S. Olympic basketball team is now walking in its footsteps.

The Americans are back in Barcelona, site of their greatest glory, the scene of the best basketball ever played, as they finish their preparations for London.

Twenty years after their predecessors stormed their way to gold here, the Americans will see one of the Dream Team's lasting legacies: the strength of international programs that rose in part because of the inter-

est it created. The U.S. will play exhibition games against Argentina and Spain, teams with veterans old enough to remember seeing Magic and Bird play. The Americans beat both en route to the gold medal four years ago, holding off the Spaniards in

a gold-medal game thriller. Both countries have enjoyed lengthy stays near the top of international basketball, each winning a major title in the past decade, and should provide quality tests for a U.S. team that still has

some improving to do. "It seems like each game the competition progresses a little bit more," U.S. guard Chris Paul said. "We've had three great games so far, but we have to keep getting better because we know when we get there and play against Argentina and Spain, they're

going to be great games? The Americans had an easy one Thursday, beating Britain 118-78 in Manchester, England. The U.S. carved up a defenseless opponent, shooting 60 percent, collecting 39 assists on 47 baskets, and leading by as much as 47 points.

But the British are just getting going in basketball, where the sport is largely ignored. The Americans know to expect better in their upcoming games at Palau Sant Jordi.

Pau Gasol's first contact with the NBA game came as a 12-year-old boy watching the Dream Team on TV in his Northern Spain home. He's gone on to become one of the NBA's best big men and was the MVP of the 2006 world basketball championship, when Spain won the gold medal.

Manu Ginobili and Luis Scola both starred in Eu-

rope and became international stalwarts before taking their pro careers to the NBA, and were the driving forces behind an Argentina squad that won the 2004 Olympic gold medal and the silver in the 2002 world championships

The U.S. will play Argentina on Sunday and Spain on Tuesday. Those games should more resemble the Americans' 80-69 victory over Brazil than the romps over the Dominican Republic and Britain.

"Yeah, well we had a big test against Brazil, a team that has big guys. Argentina will definitely be another test for us," U.S. forward Carmelo Anthony said. "Then of course everybody wants to see the Spain matchup, so we're getting prepared for that."

Anthony scored 19 points Thursday, coming off the bench along with Paul for the first time in a sign that coach Mike Krzyzewski still is doing tinkering at a time when his 2008 team was already set.

The Americans essentially had the same starting lineup from the start of the 2007 Olympic qualifying tournament right through the end of the Olympics: LeBron James, Anthony, Dwight Howard, Jason Kidd and Kobe Bryant. Kidd retired from international play, Howard is injured, and Kevin Durant has become an international force worthy of being a starter.

James and Bryant retain their spots and Tyson Chandler has become the starting center. Krzyzewski could bounce between Anthony and Durant at one forward spot, and Paul and Deron Williams, who also scored 19 on Thursday, at point guard.

"I don't necessarily think there is any permanence to starting lineup," Krzyzewski said. "You basically have a group, a core group, of veterans, mostly from the Beijing Olympics that I think do need to be the core of this team because they're older, they've been through the Olympics. Durant, talent-wise, is right there with any of them. So, some combination of the six or seven of those guys will start.

"We've talked about it. They're fine with it. It has to start there. I'm not sure who will start against Argentina. I don't think it really makes a difference. Like this morning, I just talked to them, 'What if we did this' and they said, 'Fine. Whatever you want to do? It will be within that realm of seven players with Tyson at the center spot."

The game against Spain is the more anticipated one and should provide the U.S. with the bigger challenge. The Americans edged the Spanish in an exhibition game in Madrid before the 2010 worlds, but both teams played that summer without key players from the Americans' 118-107 victory on the last day of the Beijing Games.

"They are a great team," James said. "They've been together for a long time. They have a great chemistry, and they have great inside-outside depth and we look forward to playing

against them." With Pau Gasol and younger brother Marc, and NBA All-Star this season, and nationalized Spanish player Serge Ibaka of the Oklahoma City Thunder, Spain is powerful inside. The Americans don't have much size and don't seem interested in using what they do have, Krzyzewski using some lineups in which the 6-foot-9 Durant is his tallest player.

If the size factor really is a threat to their hopes, the Americans will know it by the time they leave here a day before the opening ceremonies next week.

"I mean, we definitely have weaknesses that teams can take advantage of, and I think this trip to Barcelona is going to be very big for us because you are playing Argentina and Spain," Bryant said. "So, we'll get a good look at that.

Rory McIlroy went tumbling off the leaderboard. Phil Mickelson went home, missing the cut for only the fourth time in 19 Open appearances.

Scott, who has Woods' former caddie on his bag, teed off in the afternoon after tying the course record with a 64 on Thursday, a mark that Snedeker quickly matched again 24 hours later. Even though the firstround lead was gone by the time he stepped on the course, the Aussie didn't wilt after seeing a new name atop the scoreboard. Instead, he turned it up on the back side, making three birdies capped by a 10-footer at the tough finishing hole, leaving him at 67 for the day and 131 overall.

"It's kind of a culmination of everything I've done over the last couple of years," Scott said. "I feel like this is the path I've been going down and just happens to have happened here that I've put myself in good position after two days at a major."

Woods, whose ex-caddie Steve Williams now works for Scott, had the crowd roaring late in the day, holing out from the bunker behind the 18th green for a closing birdie. He pumped his right fist and let out a yell just like old times, before injuries and personal problems sidetracked his quest to beat Jack Nicklaus' record of 18 major titles.

"I'm very pleased where I'm at," Woods said. "We're at the halfway point and I'm right there in the mix."

Woods has been stuck on 14 major championships for more than four years, but he got himself in position to break the drought with a 67 Friday that pushed his total to 134, just four strokes off the lead.

Snedeker kept up his assault on the fairways, the key to navigating the claustrophobic layout in northwestern England. He rapped in four birdies on the front side, rolled in a 25-footer at the par-5 11th, then put his tee shot in the middle of the green on the par-3 12th and calmly sank another birdie

He's made 10 of those over the first two days. Just as important, Snedeker has yet to post a bogey.

"No bogeys around here is getting some good breaks and playing some pretty good golf," he said.

Woods rolled in a couple of early birdies before some misadventures in the rough at the par-511th cost him his only bogey of the round. He bounced back to sink an 18footer at the 16th before stealing another stroke at the end. Having his ex-caddie Steve Williams on the bag for Scott only adds to the potential drama on the weekend.





NCAA investigators spent several days in Miami earlier this month as part of the continued inquiry into the Hurricanes' athletic compliance practices, said two people familiar with the situation.

It's unknown when the investigation will end, both people told The Associated Press Friday on condition of anonymity because information about the probe has not been publicly released. When the probe is over, Miami would first receive a notice of allegations and then have the chance to appear before the NCAA's infractions committee.

Typically, when investigators visit a campus, they are either conducting interviews with athletic department personnel, reviewing documents, or both. The NCAA generally does not provide status updates during their investigations, and university officials only have said they are continuing to cooperate with the terms of the inquiry.

Earlier this week, safety Ray-Ray Armstrong was dismissed for undisclosed rules violations. Armstrong was suspended for four games last year after acknowledging he took money from former booster Nevin Shapiro and then missed another game while the school checked to see if he broke other rules after he interacted with a person who works with professional athletes.

So nearly a year after the Hurricanes became wrapped up in an extrabenefits scandal - and with training camp fast approaching, along with Atlantic Coast Conference media days starting this weekend - Miami still has plenty of questions and very few answers.

"Who doesn't want a clean slate? We get a fresh opportunity to do something new," running back Mike James said earlier this summer when asked if the Hurricanes were eager to put the troubles of 2011 behind them. "Hey, I'm happy to see last year go. It's gone. Let it go?

Hurricanes coach Al Golden, whose first season in Miami was marred even before it started by the Shapiro accusations, is expected to address reporters about the state of the team and expectations for 2012 in Greensboro, N.C. on Monday at the ACC preseason kickoff event.

Miami could still face heavy sanctions from the NCAA over the scandal sparked by the claims Shapiro – the convicted and now imprisoned architect of a \$930 million Ponzi scheme – aired in an article published by Yahoo Sports last August. Eight Miami players missed at least one game as part of sanctions the NCAA imposed over Shapiro's claims, and four others had to make small restitution payments.

Seattle's Lynch Apologizes for Recent Bad Actions

SEATTLE • Seattle Seahawks running back Marshawn Lynch apologized Friday for drawing negative attention following his arrest last weekend on charges of driving under the influence in Northern California.

"I want to apologize to my family, the Seattle Seahawks, the NFL and the 12th Man for the negative attention resulting from my recent actions," Lynch said in a statement released by the team. "This is not the type of community leader I have been over the last two years or the one I'm striving to become. I want to assure everyone that I will work to be better and look forward to a very exciting, and very successful season with the Seattle Seahawks."

According to his attorney, Ivan Golde, Lynch blew a .08 during a preliminary screening at the scene shortly after he was pulled over and registered slightly higher when tested at the jail on a calibrated breathalyzer machine. Golde said he believes Lynch was actually under .08 when he was pulled over and had a rising blood-alcohol level.

Titans

Tennessee has agreed to terms on a one-year contract with safety Aaron Francisco.

A six-year NFL veteran from Brigham Young, Francisco has played in 75 games with 23 starts. He has 131 tackles and four interceptions during his career with Arizona (2005-08) and Indianapolis (2009-10). The Cardinals and Colts both made the Super Bowl during seasons in which Francisco

scheduled to have a hearing on Thursday. But the NFL wants the case dismissed because the collective bargaining agreement reached last August to end the lockout gives Commissioner Roger Goodell the authority to punish players for "conduct detrimental" to the NFL.

Vilma and Saints coach Sean Payton have been suspended for the 2012 season for their roles in the bounty program the NFL says went on for three seasons.

Dielman suffered a grand mal seizure on the flight home. The team plane was met by an ambulance and he was hospitalized overnight.

Cowboys

The Dallas Cowboys have been dropped from a lawsuit over lack of seating for some ticketholders at the 2011 Super Bowl in Texas.

The Dallas Morning News reports the judge ruled the tickets were a contract between the buyers and the NFL.

A Cowboys spokesman declined comment. An NFL statement notes the judge dismissed most of the lawsuit's claims.

Report: Golden's Staff Broke **Recruiting Rules**

Miami coach Al Golden's second season at the school is beginning much like his first one, with new accusations of rule breaking, the looming threat of serious NCAA sanctions and no apparent end in sight for the long probe into the Hurricanes' compliance practices.

Citing unidentified sources, Yahoo Sports reported Friday that former Miami football employee Sean Allen — who has been linked to one-time booster and now convicted Ponzi scheme architect Nevin Shapiro through the improper-benefits scandal that broke last year — assisted members of Golden's coaching staff with recruiting.

If true, that could be a major NCAA violation by the troubled program, despite Golden's repeated insistence that he wants to "get it fixed."

Horse Trainer Frank Martin Dead at 86

GARDEN CITY, N.Y. (AP) • Hall of Fame trainer Frank "Pancho" Martin, who oversaw 1973 Kentucky Derby and Preakness runner-up Sham, has died. He was 86.

He died at his home in Garden City, N.Y., on Wednesday night after a brief illness, according to the New York Racing Associa-

Martin won 3,240 career races and had purse earnings of \$47,586,039, according to Equibase. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1981.

Sham was the most famous horse Martin trained. The colt won the 1973 Santa Anita Derby, and then lost to Secretariat in the Kentucky Derby and Preakness. They hooked up again in the Belmont Stakes, and Sham dueled with Secretariat around the first turn and into the backstretch before fading. Secretariat won by a record 31 lengths to become horse racing's ninth Triple Crown winner. Sham finished last, beaten 45 ½ lengths, and never raced again.

"His favorite horse was Sham," Martin's son, Greg,

said. "He always loved

After stints in New England and Florida, Martin moved to New York in 1951 and led that circuit in victories 11 times, including from 1973-82. He led the nation in purse earnings with \$2,408,419 in 1974. He won training titles at Aqueduct six times, Belmont four times and, and Saratoga twice.

"Frank was sharp," said retired jockey Angel Cordero Jr., who rode for Martin. "He was one of the best we ever

Although not as active in recent years, Martin saddled 77 starters this year, finishing second five times and third twice.

Martin was born in Cuba on Dec. 3, 1925, and grew up in Havana two blocks from Oriental Park Racetrack, where he began his career cooling out horses after their morning workouts.

"The only things to do were to go to work on the track or play baseball," he said. "I was a lousy ball-

Ex-Maine Shipyard CEO, Reagan Navy Boss Dies at 99

FALMOUTH, Maine (AP) • A former president of Maine shipyard Bath Iron Works and under secretary of the U.S. Navy under President Ronald Reagan has died. James Franklin Goodrich

His wife, Helen Goodrich, says he died Monday at their condominium in Falmouth, 30 miles southwest of the shipyard in Bath.

Goodrich was president and CEO of Bath Iron Works from 1965 to 1975 before serving as chairman until his retirement in 1978.

Three years later, Reagan chose him as under secretary to rebuild a 600-ship Navy.

Before joining Bath Iron Works, Goodrich worked for Todd-Pacific Shipyards in Tacoma, Wash. He also was a co-founder of a commercial fishing company involved in the Alaska king crab industry after World War II.

Goodrich is survived by his wife of 72 years and three children.

Egypt: Former Vice President Dies in U.S.

CAIRO (AP) • Egypt's former spy chief Omar Suleiman, deposed president Hosni Mubarak's top lieutenant and keeper of secrets, died Thursday, the country's official news agency reported. He was 76.

Suleiman, who said little but had a finger in virtually every vital security issue confronting Egypt, was dubbed by the media as the "the black box." Like Mubarak, he was a fierce enemy of Islamists in Egypt and throughout the region, and a friend to the United States and Israel.

The official Middle East News Agency said Suleiman suffered from lung and heart problems for months and that his health condition had sharply deteriorated over the past three weeks. He was treated at a hospital in Cleveland and died early Thursday. His three daughters will accompany the body to be buried in Egypt, according to MENA.

Suleiman was appointed vice president on Jan. 29, 2011, at the peak of last year's revolution, a last-gasp attempt by Mubarak to save his political life as hundreds of thousands of Egyptians took to the streets demanding his ouster. But this and other desperate measures, including talks between Suleiman and the formerly outlawed Muslim Brotherhood, were unable to stave off Mubarak's overthrow.

It was Suleiman who grimly appeared on telelvision on Feb. 11, 2011, to announce that Egypt's leader of nearly three decades was stepping down and handing power to a military council.

This marked the end of the 18-day uprising but opened a new chapter of tumultuous transition under the rule of the generals.

After the revolution, Suleiman disappeared from public view only to return earlier this year as a presidential candidate, sparking fears of a Mubarak regime comeback. However, the election commission in a surprise move disqualified him along with two Islamist front-runners.

His sudden emergence and disqualification at a time two heavyweight Islamists were also running and disqualified raised suspicions that his candidacy was orchestrated by the military generals to get rid of Islamists.

In April, Suleiman said he decided to run to prevent the Muslim Brotherhood from coming to power. "If the Brotherhood's candidate wins the presidential election, Egypt will be turned into a religious state. All state institutions will be controlled by the Brotherhood," he said in April.

Mohammed Morsi, a member of the Brotherhood, won the presidency last month.

Suleiman, a tall man who frequently photographed wearing dark sunglass, rarely spoke to the media. He served as intelligence chief for nearly two decades.

For most of that time he played a behind-the-scenes role as the top official in charge of some of the most important issues facing the Egyptian state, including relations with the U.S., Israel and talks with the Palestinians.

He was widely believed to be the military leadership's preferred successor to Mubarak. This created silent tension between Suleiman and the president's younger son, Gamal, who was seen as being groomed by his father as a rival successor.



Honoring Marriage (Part 2): Staying Committed

n looking at our short series on marriage, we come to a subject that I think has very little thought or conviction in today's marriage union,



and that is seeing your marriage as a covenant between you and your spouse until

death do you part. I believe there is a serious crisis on the status of what a true Biblical marriage is all about. What was the norm is

now an oddity. It now seems odd to see a married couple remain married for over 35 years, let alone 50 years or so. What has changed? Why do so many discard their

marriage vows? Whatever happened to "IDO" or "until death do us part?" Whatever happen to the words committed, love and loyalty? It is not hard to look at today's marriages and not be to-

tally discouraged. Is this what God intended marriage to be like? Absolutely not. And not for one second can any of us blame God for this outcome. No, He is not the deserter. We are! We are the ones who turn our backs on our spouse and on God's truth.

God said this to the sinful Israelites who treaded on God's covenant of marriage when He said in Malachi 2:16, "FOR I HATE DIVORCE." In that same passage God links the marriage between a man and woman as being a covenant between the two and should not be broken when He rebukes their sin by saying, "... Because the LORD has been a witness between you and the wife of your youth, against whom you have dealt treacherously, though she is your companion and your wife by covenant" (Malachi 2:14).

Beloved, marriage is a very serious issue with God. He designed it. He supports it. He blesses it. So much so He creates marriage and gives it the extra umph to cement it in our hearts by making marriage a covenant of companionship. A covenant where now man is fully complete and complemented by his spouse. Full and complete in every area of life. A covenant that is not to be discarded for another relationship.

When you said "I Do," it sealed this covenant for a lifetime.

So what does this covenant mean?

A "covenant" is made up of conditions (terms of agreement) that each party has agreed to uphold, otherwise, there is no covenant. Covenants are legal documents or verbal agreements whereby oaths of faithfulness are expressed between two or more parties.

When it comes to the marriage covenant, our culture symbolizes this covenant has been cut and made by the giving of rings. And these rings tell the world that we belong to our spouse, that "we are off the market" and that we are committed to our spouse for life.

We see throughout Scripture where God makes covenants with man, (i.e. Abraham, Noah, etc.), and where men make covenants with each other (i.e. marriage, Ephraim and Assyria, etc.). Covenants are sealed with terms of the agreement and with the "yes" of those who agree. To break such covenants is a serious offense, and consequences follow.

Keeping such covenants points to the character and faithfulness of the parties involved. In essence, there is a voking that takes place. And in the case of marriage, God shows us this yoking by proclaiming "they shall become one flesh" (Genesis 1:24). It is a uniting of two hearts into one.


So beloved, remember your marriage vows. Do they mean as much now as they did then? Stay committed to each other. Love each other. Serve each other.



BURLEY • After Maricela Rios graduated with a degree in business administration in 2005 she started working as a legal assistant for an immigration attorney in Boise. She also worked part time as a Hispanic ministry coordinator at a local church. With a good job, a car and a condo she had everything a young adult would want early in life.

Dedication of Boise Temple

LDS Church Plans Open House,

BOISE • After more than a year of renovation, the Boise LDS Temple is getting ready for an open house and dedication services. The First Presidency of The Church

of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints has planned the dates and invites the public to visit the temple during an open house from Oct. 13 through Nov. 10, excluding Sundays. Free reservations for the open house can be made through ww.boisemormontemple.org in the coming weeks. The temple will formally be dedi-

cated on Nov. 18 in three sessions. In conjunction with the dedication, there also will be a cultural celebration featuring music and dance on Nov. 17.

The temple closed in July 2011 for extensive renovation of the grounds and interior. The variegated marble that characterized the temple's exterior has been replaced with white granite. A new gold-leafed statue of the angel Moroni sits atop the temple's tallest spire. Inside, the temple interior is fully renovated with new finishes and furnishings.

While the church's 18,000-plus meetinghouses are open to all people who wish to attend religious services there, temples are open only to faithful Latter-day Saints once the tem-

ples are dedicated.

Latter-day Saint temples differ from the meetinghouses or chapels where members meet for Sunday worship services. Temples are considered "houses of the Lord" where Christ's teachings are reaffirmed through marriage, baptism, and other ordinances that unite families for eternity. Inside, members learn more about the purpose of life and make covenants to serve Jesus Christ and their fellowman.

The Boise temple is the 27th operating temple of the church; in all it has 138 temples worldwide. It is one of four operating temples in Idaho. A fifth temple in Meridian is currently in the planning and approval phase.

Initiatives for Catholic Extension, and the main organizer of the Emerging Catholic Leaders experience.

Christian Retailers Use Fair-trade Items to Balance Values, Capitalism

ORLANDO, Fla. • Ralph Lauren - with his made-in-China U.S. Olympic uniforms - is learning what Christian retailers heard at their annual trade show last week in Orlando, Fla.: Where and how items are made make a difference in the global economy.

Just because it's cheaper to make American Olympic uniforms in China doesn't make it right.

At the International Christian Retail Show, store owners learned how fairtrade products reflect their religious beliefs.

"What good is your Christian retail without considering where all this stuff is made and what system am I continuing to propagate?" Christine Caine, founder of the A21Campaign.org, an anti-sex-trafficking ministry.

It requires thinking about and caring about - the working conditions of men, women, boys and girls who produce those inexpensive Jesus Loves Me T-shirts, religious trinkets and Nativity

"I don't believe we value people. We value making my dollar go as far as it can at someone else's expense," said Caine, 46, an Australian author and minister. "Just so you can buy something really cheap, are you going to allow somebody else on the other side of the world to go through pain and even torture?"

The fair-trade items don't exactly fit the traditional merchandise mix of Christian bookstores and gift shops. They don't come emblazoned with Scripture or crucifixes or images of Jesus. What they do come with is a back story of an orphaned child, a widowed woman, a girl rescued from prostitution, a boy freed from sweatshop servitude.

"Fair trade is providing a fair and living wage, good working conditions and no child or slave labor," said Cynthia Glensgard, owner of Global Handmade Hope in Park Ridge, Ill.

Five fair-trade businesses represent only a tiny fraction of the 350 businesses at the International Christian Retailers Show at the Orange County, Fla., Convention Center, but they belong to an emerging trend within the big business of Christian retail.

Beginning this year, Family Christian Stores started selling fair-trade items online and in 26 of its 282 stores nationwide. Less than 5 percent of the company's sales are fair-trade items, but that number is growing, said company Vice President Steve Biondo.

Family Christian Stores became interested in fairtrade products through the company's work with orphans and widows. By working directly with the artisans, the retail chain is able to lift families out of poverty and forced labor while providing customers with unique gifts, greeting cards and clothing.

"The bottom line is the products provide a way for people to make a viable living and give them choices they haven't had in the past," Biondo said. "There are girls trafficked for their sex who now have a jewelry operation. Having a steady income prevents them from being taken advantage of."

Bishops Say Church Leader Who Resigned Failed to Remove Priest Accused of Rape

CHICAGO • More than a week after a Chicago native resigned from the helm of the Orthodox Church in America, the bishops who requested the resignation now say he failed to remove a priest accused of rape.

In a resignation letter addressed to bishops earlier this month, Metropolitan Jonah "begged forgiveness for however I have offended you, and for whatever difficulties have arisen from my own inadequacies and mistakes in judgment."

When asked at the time whether rumors of a mishandled rape allegation were true, Archpriest Eric George Tosi, secretary for the Orthodox Church in America, referred all inquiries to the news release posted on the church's website. But this week, the church issued a revised statement.

"We have hesitated to release further details surrounding the resignation of Metropolitan Jonah as Primate of our church, this in a

desire to preserve his dignity and to prevent further harm to an innocent party," the statement said.

"We also harbored some hope that Metropolitan Jonah would show a willingness to accept responsibility for his actions and failures to act," the statement added.

Elected in late 2008 to lead one of several branches of Orthodox Christianity in the United States, parishioners looked to Metropolitan Jonah for reforms after his predecessor retired amid allegations that millions of church

dollars were used to cover personal expenses.

He insisted on amplifying the church's voice in the public square, speaking up against abortion rights and same-sex marriage.

In the most recent statement, the church's bishops claimed any suggestions that the resignation had to do with a political or cultural shift inside the church were untrue. Instead, they pointed to the Metropolitan's alleged mishandling of a priest accused of raping a woman in 2010.



THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

At the 13th European Maccabi Games in Vienna, Heinrich Berger made a nice play to bring home his spade game. Berger, for decades one of Europe's leading bridge players, is representing the host country, Austria, but nowadays lives in Berlin.

Today's deal was played in a match between Austria and Hungary. In theory, four hearts by North is the only makable game: On a black-suit lead declarer cashes his three top spades and West has to surrender.

However, Berger played in four spades. The defense started with two rounds of diamonds and continued the suit. Berger ruffed in his hand, cashed a top spade, then played a heart. West flew up with the ace and returned the spade jack. Declarer won, played three rounds of clubs, then cashed the heart king and jack.

When the jack was cashed, East and South pitched a diamond and a club respectively. When, at the penultimate trick, North led a heart, East's 9-7 of trumps were swallowed up by declarer's Q-8. So in fact Berger had executed a Grand Coup for his contract, and since the hand was played in Vienna, one could jokingly describe the play as a special version of the Vienna Coup.

Note that there was a defense to the game. After cashing two rounds of diamonds, the defense prevails by switching to a club. On coming in with the heart ace, West destroys declarer's communications for the coup by playing another round of clubs.

TODAY IN **HISTORY**

On this date:

In 1773, Pope Clement XIV issued an order suppressing the Society of Jesus, or Jesuits. (The Society was restored by Pope Pius VII in 1814.)

In 1796, Scottish poet Robert Burns died in Dumfries at age 37.

In 1861, during the Civil War, the first Battle of Bull Run was fought at Manassas, Va., resulting in a Confederate victory.

In 1930, President Herbert Hoover signed an executive order establishing the Veterans Administration (later the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs).

In 1944, American forces landed on Guam during World War II.

In 1949, the U.S. Senate ratified the North Atlantic Treaty.

In 1952, the Democratic National Convention, which would nominate Adlai Stevenson for president, opened in Chicago.

In 1959, the NS Savannah, the first nuclear-powered merchant ship, was christened by first lady Mamie Eisenhower at Camden, N.J.

In 1961, Capt. Virgil "Gus" Grissom became the second American to rocket into a sub-orbital pattern around the Earth, flying aboard the Liberty Bell 7.

In 1969, Apollo 11 astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin blasted off from the moon aboard the ascent stage of the lunar module for docking with the command module.

In 1972, the Irish Republican Army carried out 22 bombings in Belfast, Northern Ireland, killing nine people and injuring 130 in what became known as "Bloody Friday."

In 1980, draft registration began in the United States for 19- and 20-year-old

Ten years ago: Telecommunications giant World-Com Inc. filed for bankrupt cy protection about a month after disclosing it had inflated profits by nearly \$4 billion through deceptive accounting. Ernie Els won the British Open in the first suddendeath finish in the 142-year

history of the tournament. Five years ago: Doctors removed five small growths from President George W. Bush's colon after he temporarily transferred the powers of his office to Vice President Dick Cheney under the rarely invoked 25th Amendment. Ruediger Diedrich, one of two Germans kidnapped in southern Afghanistan on July 18, was found dead. David Beckham made his debut with the Los Angeles Galaxy in front of a sellout crowd of 27,000. (Beckham got into the exhibition game in the 78th minute of Chelsea's 1-0 victory.) "Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows," the final volume of the wizard series by J.K. Rowling, went on sale.

One year ago: The 30year-old space shuttle program ended as Atlantis landed at Cape Canaveral, Fla., after the 135th shuttle flight. Eurozone leaders agreed to a sweeping deal that would grant Greece a massive new bailout and radically reshape the currency union's rescue fund. The NFL canceled its Hall of Fame game between St. Louis and Chicago despite owners voting in favor of a tentative deal to end a lockout.

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
