POLICE SEARCH BUSINESSES IN SPICE INVESTIGATION

TWIN FALLS • Several law enforcement agencies searched businesses throughout the area early Wednesday morning as part of an investigation into synthetic marijuana, also known as spice.

"We, along with other local, state, county and federal agencies, in a joint effort, served some search warrants today," Twin Falls Police Lt. Craig Stotts said Wednesday. "It has to do with a problem we've been having with spice in our community."

Stotts said he and other city officials were asked to refer all questions to the U.S. Attorney's Office

Pamela Bearg, public information officer for the attorney's office, said the search was part of a larger nationwide operation. She

said she could not release details Wednesday because of the ongoing investigation, but more information will be released today.

A man who identified himself as the general manager at Boo Boo's Skate Shop, near Gooding Street West and Fourth Avenue West in Twin Falls, would not give his name but said police arrived at the shop at about 5:30 a.m. and checked all the items in the store. Police seized "various items" during the four hours they were there, but the man said he was told the Please see SPICE, A2

Fishy Labor Benefits T.F. County

TWIN FALLS • In the damp, murky corners of Twin Falls County, there are hundreds of workers who never get paid for working weekends.

Sound a little fishy? That's because it is.

The Twin Falls County Pest Abatement District relies on the free labor of bluegill to help reduce

the area's mosquito population. "They work nights, weekends and we never have to worry about

holiday pay," said Kirk Tubbs, TFCPAD manager. "It's kind of an ideal situation."

On Wednesday, TFCPAD workers and volunteers met at Dierkes Lake to net bluegill into large holding tanks. This is the third year the county captured bluegill with the intention of releasing them into ponds.

It's an effective method to control mosquitoes and black flies without using expensive chemicals, Tubbs said.

who want to start it or grow the amount of local foods they purchase," said Heidi Martin, ISDE child nutrition coordinator.

In Minidoka County, food service supervisor Phyllis Bean said she wants the school district to get hooked into the program this year.

She said she'd like to see if there's an organization that can start up a garden and then sell back produce to the school district's food service department.

Bean already goes up to an orchard each August to get nectarines and pears to serve with school meals.

The Shoshone School District also plans to launch a Farm to School program this year.

About 77 percent of Idaho schools serve locally grown food at least on a seasonal basis. And the Farm to School program has been operating around the state for about eight years. "The goal is to get fresh, healthy

foods to our schools," Martin said. The Farm to School program also

includes training for teachers to incorporate nutrition lessons into their classrooms. Martin said schools sometimes find that locally and regionally grown

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Kimberly to Revise **Downtown Proposal**

KIMBERLY • The city of Kimberly will revise plans for a downtown revitalization project and reduce its request for state funds accordingly.

The city had been seeking \$500,000 in state block grant funds to spruce up downtown and comply with federal disabilities act requirements.

City officials made a presentation before the Governor's Economic Advisory Council earlier this month in Pocatello. The presentation reportedly went well, but the panel subsequently asked the city to revise its grant application to reflect a smaller project.

The city will go back to the drawing board and resubmit a grant application for about \$350,000 - a 30percent reduction from the original amount.

"So we have some work to do," Mayor Tracy Armstrong told people attending Tuesday's City Council

The city's grant application will be re-submitted to the advisory council for review in October.

"Hopefully at that time they will make a final decision," Armstrong said. "I'm thankful that we're still in the process and they just haven't told us 'no.'"

Kimberly is competing against several other cities in Idaho for limited block grant funds, he said.

The original downtown revitalization plan called for the construction of handicapped parking spaces and wheelchairfriendly ramps, replacement of aging sidewalks and streets, upgraded storm drainage, improved pedestrian safety, new streetlights and landscap-

The city will work with J-U-B Engineers and Region IV Development to identify areas that can be scaled back.

In other action:

• The council unanimously approved \$275,183 bid from Stutzman Inc. to build an RV dump near the city park. The only bid for the project, it came in about 10 percent higher than expected, said Ivan Mc-Cracken, project manager with J-U-B Engineers.

The city has requested that the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation cover the \$27,000 in additional costs. That request is looking favorable, Mc-Cracken said; if IDPR doesn't chip in, the city will work with Stutzman to find cost savings.

• The council approved a proposal from Barrett Business Solutions Inc. to conduct a survey of salaries and other compensation to see how Kimberly stacks up with Twin Falls, Jerome and Idaho cities of comparable size.

It's intended to help the council – with three new members this year - make informed decisions as it establishes a new budget, Armstrong said in an interview after the meeting.

BBSI has indicated that it could complete the survey in about two weeks and has offered to provide the information to the city at no

The city has also received three other proposals for more in-depth compensation studies, said City Administrator Nick Camberlango. Officials may consider one of those offers if they feel the need to in the new fiscal year, he

 The council renewed an annual contract for the Kimberly Police Department to provide patrol services to the city of Hansen. The \$47,000 contract is a 5 percent increase from the previous year.

The next Kimberly council meeting will be held Aug. 14, at which time a tentative budget for the new fiscal year will be un-

What \$7 M Means to a Community

Hospital opens newly remodeled emergency room to the public.

RUPERT • Nearly a year after breaking ground, the doors to Minidoka Memorial Hospital's newly remodeled emergency department opened to the public Wednesday during an open house.

"This remodel gives our patients increased privacy and dignity," said Carl Hanson, administrator at MMH, which opened in 1960. "And our second intention was upgrading the facility."

The remodeling project will finish a total upgrade to the

Hanson said the \$7 million phased project will not be complete for at least another year. The work now proceeds to revamping the medicalsurgical inpatient rooms, remodeling the nurses' station and front exit, and improving the radiology department.

"I am just amazed," said Jackie Larson as she toured the new trauma bays. "It's been a long time coming. I think it will help keep people in our community."

Starting in 2009, hospital administrators worked for more than a year to change its governance structure to work around Idaho laws that limited how much the publicly owned facility could incur long-term debt to pay for projects. The effort was rendered moot in November 2010

when voters opted to amend the state constitution to provide more funding options for projects like the hospital's renovation.

After the constitutional change, hospital officials opted to remain one of only a few county-owned hospitals left in the state.

Hospital Chief Financial Officer Jason Gibbons said some of the changes that increase patient privacy include the computed tomography department being included in the emergency room so patients do not have to be taken through a public hallway for

"I'm really excited about

how this turned out," Gibbons said. "The rooms are no longer separated by curtains, and patients can't hear the police

Other upgrades include a drive-through ambulance bay with doors that close on either side for increased patient privacy, two trauma beds, a cardiac room, three treatment

rooms and a new large lab area. The current 17-bed facility is licensed for 25 beds total.

"We have room to grow," Gibbons said.

Mike Haskin, member of the board of trustees for MMH, said departments had to be shifted during the construction in order to maintain

... five," he said, falling into a rhythm of measuring each bluegill, then dumping it into a five-gallon bucket.

The county began spraying against mosquitoes and black flies earlier this spring. Tubbs isn't expecting this year's pest populations to be unusually high, but warm temperatures have increased the chances of mosquitoes carrying West Nile virus.

"Obviously, this won't kill all of the mosquitoes but it's another tool we can use that's cheap and not a huge burden to the county," Tubbs said.

Twin Falls URA May again **Extend Loan Deadline**

TWIN FALLS • The Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency called a special meeting to consider extending the ma-

turity date on a line of credit from Chobani. If approved, this marks the second time the deadline to pay off the loan was extended. The agency met in May to extend the first

maturity date, initially

scheduled for June 1. The second maturity date is July 31, but there are still details that need to be worked out with potential investors, said URA director Melinda Anderson. She is asking the URA Board to approve pushing the date back to Aug. 29.

The URA borrowed \$17.3 million from Chobani at a 3 percent interest rate, then bumped up that credit line to \$23 million in May. The money paid for infrastructure improvements needed for Chobani to open its new

Property taxes paid by Chobani will take care of the debt, Anderson said, adding she's confident the bonds will sell by the end of August.

The URAY Board meets today at 11 a.m. at the Twin Falls City Council Chambers, 305 3rd Avenue East.

Through food service distributors, the company sells several trout products to school districts throughout

Vice president of marketing Alan Kahn presented during the conference in Boise. Schools want to buy local foods, he said, while producers want to sell locally.

The Farm to School program came to Gooding in 2006, and the district now works with several local farmers. The district has also received national awards for healthy food and exercise initiatives.

But the program had humble beginnings.

"When we started our Farm to School program, I just knew a farmer who was

growing things in his field," food service director Anji Baumann said.

For some school districts, it's hard to buy locally due to the need for large quantities of food.

Food service workers in the Twin Falls School District – which has about 8,000 students - don't work directly with farmers. They do buy some Idaho-grown foods, such as potatoes and apples.

In Blaine County, the 3,400-student school district works through its food services provider Chartwells to get locally and regionally grown food from Grasmick Produce.

spokeswoman District Heather Crocker said it's a challenge to get enough local produce to meet the needs of all students, particularly with the area's high elevation and short growing season.

TWIN FALLS • A man who was an inmate in the Twin Falls County Jail in January 2011 filed a lawsuit in federal court Friday alleging five jailers attacked him, causing serious, permanent injuries.

In the suit, former inmate Kody Gambrel names jail deputies Andrew Heikkila, Terry, Stacey Bradley Thomas, John Hubbard and Jimmy Adams as participating in the alleged Jan. 29, 2011, incident.

Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office spokeswoman Lori Stewart said the sheriff's office will not comment on an ongoing lawsuit.

Gambrel, 25, was charged with three counts of battery on deputies in the same incident. He was acquitted on two of the counts in a jury trial. The jury was hung on the third charge, which prosecutors then dropped.

A special prosecutor handled that trial, due to the Twin Falls County Prosecutor's Office's past relationship with Gambrel's father, former Twin Falls police detective Curtis Gambrel.

Heikkila, in an sworn affidavit recorded Jan. 31, 2011, said Gambrel fought with them while he was serving a 185-day sentence for a misdemeanor driving under the influence charge.

According to the lawsuit filed last week, prior to the alleged attack, Gambrel underwent a strip search during which Thomas told Gambrel he had a "nice body" and should consider a career in homosexual pornography. According to the suit, Gambrel felt threatened and reported the comments to jail officials.

On the day of the alleged attack, Gambrel was being housed in "annex one" in the jail, which is a dormitory-style area for nonviolent inmates.

According to both an affidavit given by Heikkila in 2011 relating to the original battery case against Gambrel and the suit filed last week by Gambrel, Gambrel told deputies he felt threatened by other inmates in annex one who said they were going to sexually assault

Both Gambrel's suit and the records from the 2011 battery case state that Gambrel told Heikkila he needed to speak to him away from other inmates.

Once alone with Heikkila in the jail's recreation room, Gambrel expressed fear that he would be sexually assaulted by other inmates in the annex, according to the 2011 affidavit by Heikkila.

According to the suit, Heikkila told Gambrel to go toward the booking area. As he walked toward the area, Heikkila "suddenly grabbed Kody from behind," the suit states.

The suit states the deputy grasped the collar of Gambrel's jumpsuit, jerked him backward and tackled him to the ground as Gambrel's head struck the floor.

The other deputies in the suit then allegedly rushed to the area, according to the suit, and Gambrel was taken to the ground a second time after he tried to stand up.

According to the suit, "Kody was flat on his back, barefooted, disoriented, un-

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able to see without his glasses, and shocked and frightened by these senseless attacks."

In the 2011 affidavit from Heikkila, the deputy writes he grabbed Gambrel's collar after he refused an order and began walking in another direction. After the deputy grabbed Gambrel's collar, Gambrel tried to free the deputy's grip and began resisting commands, the affidavit states.

While the affidavit states Gambrel was continuously resisting the deputies, the lawsuit states he complied with them to the extent possible under the circumstances

As they continued to struggle, the suit states, Gambrel's head hit the floor a second time, his arms were twisted upward "inflicting extreme pain," he was hit in the face several times and deputies hit him in several pressure-point areas.

"These blows caused intense pain, loss of motor control, and may have caused permanent damage to nerves and surrounding areas," the suit states.

In a transcript of the preliminary hearing in the battery on officers case against Gambrel, Thomas and Terry described several of the "pain-compliance" techniques used on Gambrel, including a "gooseneck" which is bending the wrist back, and the "paroneal strikes" which were knee strikes to Gambrel's thigh. Terry also testified Gambrel bit his pinky finger while he was applying pressure to Gambrel's "infraorbital nerve," which is near the cheekbone area. In the transcript, Terry testified deputies use pain-compliance techniques to prevent injury to themselves or keep an inmate from hurting himself.

nored while he was in jail and he was not allowed to see a doctor.

The suit also alleges the deputies destroyed or recklessly failed to preserve video and audio recordings of the incident. Gambrel is demanding a jury trial and payment for his injuries and the violation of his constitutional rights.

Micro-seal Starts Monday

HAILEY • Work crews will perform the last step of a paving project between Hailey and Ketchum next week, according to the Idaho Transportation Department.

The project along Idaho Highway 75 began last year when the roadway was repaved. Now, the stretch of highway between both towns will receive a micro-seal to protect its new surface. A micro-seal is similar to a seal coat, but the materials are premixed and placed on the roadway as slurry. It cures more quickly and is often used in high-traffic areas.

The only part of Idaho 75 that will not receive microseal is a stretch between East Fork Road and the Big Wood River Bridge that is scheduled for reconstruction in 2013.

Work is expected to last two weeks and will generally take place from 9 a.m. - 8 p.m. daily, depending on weather. Drivers should watch for lane restrictions, flaggers and delays throughout the project zone. Detours may be used onto McKercher Boulevard and Buttercup Road north of Hailey and between Serenade Lane and River Street.

Knife River Corp. of Boise is the contractor for the entire \$5.4 million paving project.

Research has firmly established a casual relationship between feline vaccination and sarcoma development and tumors have been consistently identified at sites of previous vaccination.

Please ask your vet about all side effects of a vaccination and be informed as to any possible dangers to your cat. By law, they must tell you the side effects or risk involved if asked for this information.




The sarcoma development can take weeks to years. Wish I'd known about this before getting my cat vaccinated; I would never have done it!



Splitting Hairs in a Texas Race

he average high temperature in Texas on July 31 is 94 degrees, which might matter in the selection of this state's next U.S. senator. Or perhaps the crucial fact will be a residue of Reconstruction.

With Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison having decided not to seek a fourth full term, a May 29 primary winnowed a field of nine competitors for the Republican nomination - and, effectively, for the seat from this crimson state - to two men who are very near to each other in all their convictions and theories of

David Dewhurst, 66, got rich in the oil and gas business, which is neither a nest of liberals nor resented by Texans, and for nine years he has been lieutenant governor, which in Texas is an approximation of Caesar. He says that during Reconstruction the federal government imposed carpetbagger governors, so in 1876 Texans wrote a constitution that made their governor the nation's weakest and made a muscular lieutenant governor. He appoints all chairmen and members of the state Senate committees, who serve at his pleasure; he schedules all

speak without his recogni-

The Ted Cruz campaign says dependency explains why 18 of 19 state Senate Republicans recently signed a letter in support of Dewhurst, who must worry that tea partyers and other conservatives look askance at persons who play too well with others. Cruz has degrees from Princeton and Harvard Law School. Dewhurst, who played basketball for the University of Arizona, is in the Texas Rodeo Cowboy Hall of Fame. Advantage Dewhurst.

Each candidate has endorsements from national conservative luminaries. Cruz, however, has the cachet of someone fluent in the vocabulary of intellectual and constitutional conservatism, and has none of the ideological impurities that result from leading legislative coalitions. Advantage Cruz.

On 99 percent of U.S. Senate business, Cruz and Dewhurst probably would vote alike. Yet the ultimate Republican epithet, the Mword – "moderate" – has been bandied. Cruz supporters say Dewhurst is one, which is nonsense. Dewhurst rides roping horses that can go from a standing start to 40 miles per hour in two strides, which is about how fast he recites this catechism: Texas is the "the most conservative, most pro-growth, most pro-jobs, most pro-life state in the country" and would not tolerate a moderate lieutenant governor. He says he has presided over 51 tax cuts and has slashed \$14 billion from the state budget while Congress has been unable to cut \$23 billion from a budget 41 times bigger.

Dewhurst counters the Mword accusation by going nuclear. He notes darkly that Cruz is an eloquent speaker and a Harvard lawyer just like you know who. Dewhurst's long legislative career presents Cruz - as Mitt Romney's business career presents Barack Obama - with opportunities for histrionic (and synthetic) indignation about this or that vote or compromise. But, then, Cruz's record as a lawyer has left him vulnerable to similar rhetoric from Dewhurst's campaign about some Cruz clients who were unsavory (a

"judge-bribing felon") or impolitic (a Chinese tire company).

If Dewhurst wins, Capitol Hill gets a veteran conservative legislator. If Cruz wins, congressional conservatism's small but valuable Doesn't-Play-Well-With-Others Caucus adds a member.

If Dewhurst had won five and a half points more in the primary, he would have had 50 percent and the nomination. The primary should have been in March, but judicial wrangling about redistricting disrupted the political calendar, and Texas has no experience with an important election, such as this runoff, in late July. There might be as much as a 50 percent decline from the 1.4 million who voted May 29.

The Cruz campaign believes, plausibly, that the high-octane ideology that fuels his tea-party and other supporters, including many of Texan Ron Paul's, will power them to the polls come Hell or high temperatures. It is unclear whether it speaks well of them that they, like Noël Coward's mad dogs and Englishmen, will go out in the midday sun, even to vote in what resembles a dispute about a saint or a surplice.

Best Fix for Postal Service Is to Take It Private

hose who believe in the usefulness of government must be vigilant about making sure all its activities are vital ones, since the unnecessary ones undermine public confidence. With this in mind, Congress should now privatize the U.S. Postal Service.

Further evidence for why this should happen came last week, when the Postal Service announced that it would be unable to meet billions of dollars in payments that are coming due in August and September for future retiree health benefits. Privatization is not always the best way to

improve efficiency, but the problems facing the Postal Service will be difficult to address if it remains within the government, and there is no longer any sound reason for it not to go private.

The agency has been struggling to meet these challenges by becoming more productive and has been more successful than many people may realize. As the Cato Institute (hardly a bastion of support for government operations)

has noted, a decade ago sorting 35,000 letters an hour required 70 employees. Today, it takes only two. Over the past six years, the number of career Postal Service workers has declined by more than 20 percent.

Unfortunately, this new efficiency has been outmatched by a deepening of the Postal Service's predicament. Over the past five years alone, mail volume has fallen more than 20 percent, and revenue has declined 12 percent. The post office now has less than \$1 billion in cash, a dangerously small amount for a service with weekly operating expenses

of almost \$1.5 billion. Of the roughly 32,000 local post offices across the country, fewer than 7,000 generate enough revenue to cover their costs.

The Postal Service has many assets that could be managed more efficiently, if Congress got out of the way. In addition to its 32,000 post offices, it has 461 processing facilities, monopoly access to residential mailboxes and an overfunded pension plan. These assets would attract bidders.

The U.S. Postal Service has a long and storied history. Yet it is now struggling because the world has changed and because congressional sclerosis has prevented it from adapting to the new realities. The best way to modernize it now is to move it out of the government.

UI Eyes Lottery Funds for Law Center

LEWISTON (AP) • The University of Idaho hopes lottery funds headed into a state building fund will provide the last piece of financing for its Boise law school.

State lottery officials turned over \$41.5 million to accounts benefiting public schools during an announcement Tuesday at the historic Ada County Courthouse, which is being renovated to hold the university's Boise law program and the state law library.

UI College of Law Dean Donald Burnett said the setting of the announcement

signals that state officials are optimistic about using a \$2.5 million portion of the lottery money going into Idaho's Permanent Building Fund to finish the \$6 million courthouse renovation.

"The fact that they chose to hold the announcement in front of the old Ada County Courthouse suggests that they are hopeful that the distribution to the Permanent Building Fund will advance the renovation," Burnett told the Lewiston Tribune.

The lottery dividend — the biggest since the lottery started in 1989 — is being split among three accounts, with \$17 million going into the state building fund. The fund's advisory council is expected to recommend \$2.5 million go toward the courthouse renovation, Burnett said.

The distribution would still need lawmaker approval in 2013.

The University of Idaho, based in Moscow, is now offering third-year law courses at the school's primary Boise

The university plans to ask the state Board of Education next month for permission to expand the Boise law program to include second-year classes.

With the money from the building fund, Burnett said the university's Boise law program could potentially move into its new digs in two

The state Department of Administration is completing the renovation of the courthouse and preliminary work is already under way using \$3.5 million lawmakers have previously appropriated from the Permanent Building Fund over the past few years.

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Israelis Fear Syria's Chemical Arsenal

JERUSALEM (AP) • Israelis rushed to get government-issue gas masks Wednesday, the latest sign of mounting fears that Syria's chemical weapons stockpiles could be used against them as the crisis there deepens.

Until a few days ago, the possibility of getting dragged into Syria's civil war was not a major issue in Israel, whose leaders have had a laser-like focus on the potential threat posed by Iran's suspect nuclear program. That changed when Syrian President Bashar Assad's grip on his country turned more doubtful last week, following startling military gains by rebels and a bomb attack that killed four top officials.

Syria on Monday threatened to unleash chemical and biological weapons if the country faces a foreign attack; Syria is believed to have nerve agents as well as mustard gas.

Israeli officials are more worried about the possibility that the weapons could fall into the hands of Islamic militants from Lebanon's Hezbollah or other groups should the regime fall.

"For us, that's a casus belli, or red line," Israeli Foreign Minister Avigdor Lieberman said Wednesday. He told Israel Radio that the government would act immediately to prevent that from happening as tensions rise along Israel's northern border.

The fighting also hit too close for comfort with the thud of exploding mortar shells on Syrian territory near the Israeli-annexed Golan Heights, captured from Syria in 1967. That has drawn Israelis with binoculars to a strategic plateau, seeking a glimpse of the battle and expressing concern for their nearby homes.

Syria and Israel fought two wars, in 1967 and 1973, and have failed to reach a peace deal because of disagreements over the fate of the Golan Heights. However, Assad and his late father Hafez kept Syria's frontier with Israel quiet.

The Golan holds tremendous strategic importance for Israel, both as a territorial buffer that protects northern Israel, including the Sea of Galilee, and as a key water source.

Some Israeli officials fear that a power vacuum in Damascus could turn the Golan into a haven for militant groups, much as Egypt's lawless Sinai Peninsula has attracted a variety of anti-Israel radicals since the fall of longtime Egyptian leader Hosni Mubarak.

Israeli Defense Minister Ehud Barak disclosed over the weekend that he had asked the military to prepare for a possible attack on targets in Syria to secure strategic weapons in the event the Assad regime collapses. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu followed suit with a similar

Israel has a history of high-stakes military attacks on foreign soil.

In 1981, Israeli warplanes destroyed a nuclear reactor being built in Saddam Hussein's Iraq. In 2007, Israeli warplanes destroyed a site in Syria that the U.N. nuclear watchdog deemed to be a secretly built nuclear

Amid the flurry of threats and warnings this week, Israel's army chief, Lt. Gen. Benny Gantz, had a word of caution, telling a parliamentary committee that attacking Syrian weapons arsenals could have unforeseen consequences and drag Israel "into a broader offensive than

There is concern that Hezbollah might launch a counterstrike if Israel were to attack a convoy transporting weapons from Syria to Hezbollah's base in neighboring Lebanon, an Israeli security official said.

It's seen as less likely Iran would join the fray and risk a major confrontation with Israel just to help out an ally, the official said

Voter ID Law Heads to Court

Plaintiffs allege they don't have the required documents to obtain valid ID.

HARRISBURG, Pa. • The first legal test for Pennsylvania's tough new voter law requiring photo identification began Wednesday, with state lawyers calling the measure a completely rational step, while opponents attacked it as an unnecessary, unjustified and partisan scheme that will deprive countless people of their right to vote.

The law is the subject of a furious debate over voting rights as Pennsylvania is poised to play a key role in de-

ciding the Nov. 6 presidential election. Republicans say if GOP candidate Mitt Romney wins Pennsylvania, then President Barack Obama, a Democrat, will lose the national election.

Commonwealth Court Judge Robert Simpson must decide whether to block the law from taking effect in this year's election as part of a wider challenge to its constitutionality.

The original rationale in Pennsylvania's Republican-controlled Legislature for the law - to prevent election fraud — will play little role in the legal case since the state's lawyers have decided not to make that argument and acknowledged that they are "not aware of any incidents of in person voter fraud." Instead, they are trying to show that

lawmakers properly exercised their latitude to make election-related laws.

David Gersch, a lawyer for the plaintiffs, told Simpson the law could make it difficult for more than a million people to exercise their right to vote. The real purpose is for partisan advantage, Gersch said.

The first three plaintiffs to testify Wednesday were all older women, minorities and Philadelphia residents who said they vote regularly.

But they have no valid identification under the new law, and they apparently don't have the required documents - a birth certificate, a Social Security card and two proofs of residency - necessary to get the most common kind, a state photo ID.

Suspect Mailed Package

Package mailed to University of Colorado, Denver medical campus turned into authorities for investigation.

DENVER (AP) • The university once attended by a man accused of killing 12 people in a Colorado movie theater confirmed on Wednesday that it received a suspicious package two days earlier that was turned over to authorities, but it wouldn't confirm its contents or sender.

The University of Colorado, Denver said the U.S. Postal Service delivered the package to its medical campus Monday, and it was immediately investigated and turned over to authorities within hours.

Fox News' website reported former neuroscience graduate student James Holmes sent a notebook to the university containing scribblings of stick figures being shot and a written description of an upcoming attack. The package containing it was addressed to a psychiatrist at the school, the website

reported. It was unclear if Holmes, 24, had had any previous contact with the person. The neuroscience program that he withdrew from on June 10 included professors of psychiatry.

He is accused of opening fire on a theater showing the new Batman movie, killing 12 people and injuring 58.

NBC News, citing unnamed sources, reported that Holmes told investigators to look for the package and that it described killing people.

Sally Ride Comes Out in Obit

NEW YORK (AP) • Pioneering astronaut Sally Ride, who relished privacy as much as she did adventure, chose an appropriately discreet manner of coming out.

At the end of an obituary that she co-wrote with her partner, Tam O'Shaughnessy, they disclosed to the world their relationship of 27 years.

As details trickled out after Ride's death on Monday, it became clear that a circle of family, friends and co-workers had long known of the same-sex relationship and embraced it. For many millions of others, who admired Ride as the first American woman in space, it was a revelation – and it sparked a spirited discussion about privacy vs. public candor in regard to sexual orientation.

Some commentators, such as prominent gay blogger Andrew Sullivan of the Daily Beast, second-guessed Ride's decision to opt for privacy.

"She had a chance to expand people's horizons and young lesbians' hope and self-esteem, and she chose not to," he wrote. "She was the absent heroine."

Others were supportive of Ride's

Episcopal Bishop Gene Robinson of New Hampshire, who in 2003 became the first openly gay bishop in the Anglican world, noted that both he and Ride were baby boomers who grew up "in a time when coming out was almost unthinkable."

Robinson is 65. Ride was 61 when she died of pancreatic cancer.

Sister Wives Challenges Utah's Bigamy Law

The polygamous stars of the TLC show "Sister Wives" have sued Utah and the county they fled from, hoping to persuade a federal judge to overturn the state's bigamy law

as unconstitutional. The judge heard arguments Wednesday on a motion to dismiss

the case. He will rule later.

The case could potentially decriminalize a way of life for tens of thousands of Mormon fundamentalists, most of whom live in Utah.

Bigamy is a third-degree felony in the state, with punisments that can include up to five years in prison.

New Tonto, Familiar Feelings

SEATTLE (AP) • Gyasi Ross grew up decades after the "Lone Ranger" aired on TV, but his friends would still call him "Tonto" when they teased him.

"Everybody understands who Tonto is, even if we hadn't seen the show, and we understood it wasn't a good thing," said Ross, a member of the Blackfeet Nation in Montana who lives and has family in the Suquamish Tribe, outside Seattle. "Why else would you tease someone with that?

The making of a new "Lone Ranger" Disney movie, and the announcement that Johnny Depp is playing sidekick Tonto, have reawakened feelings about a character that has drawn much criticism over the years as being a Hollywood creation guilty of spreading stereotypes.

The film is still in produc-

tion, but Native American groups have been abuzz about it for months, with many sharing opinions online and in a national Native publication running an occasional series on the topic.

Some Native Americans welcome the new movie, slated for release next summer. Parts were filmed on the Navajo Nation with the tribe's support, and an Oklahoma tribe recently made Depp an honorary member.

But for others, the "Lone Ranger" represents a lingering sore spot - one that goesback to the 1950s television version of Tonto, who spoke in broken English, wore buckskin and lacked any real cultural traits.

Depp's role attracted particular attention in April when producer Jerry Bruckheimer tweeted a picture of the actor in his Tonto costume. He had on black and white face paint, an intense gaze, a black bird attached to his head and plenty of decorative feathers.

"The moment it hit my Facebook newsfeed, the updates from my friends went nutso," wrote Natanya Ann Pulley, a doctorate student at University of Utah, in an essay for the online magazine McSweeney's.

For Pulley and her friends, the portrayal of Native Americans in Western movies is getting old.

"I'm worried about the Tonto figure becoming a parody or a commercialized figure that doesn't have any dimension or depth, or consideration for contemporary context of Native Americans," she said.

But Native Americans are far from a monolithic group, and many are opening their arms to the new movie. Some are just excited to see Depp take the role.

In New Mexico, where

some of the movie was filmed, the Navajo presented Depp, his co-star Armie Hammer, director Gore Verbinski and Bruckheimer with Pendleton blankets to welcome them to their land. Elsewhere, the Comanche people of Oklahoma made Depp, one of Hollywood's most bankable stars, an honorary member.

"In my niece's mind, I met Jack Sparrow," said Emerald Dahozy, spokeswoman for Navajo President Ben Shelly and a member of the Navajo group who met with Depp. "My personal view, I like him playing in a character which he can embody well."

Dahozy said the "Lone Ranger" production brought something more palpable to the reservation: money. The actors and the large crew lived on Navajo land, eating at local restaurants and staying in towns that rely heavily on tourism.

Sanctions to Shut Indian-**Iranian Shipping Company**

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates (AP) • An Iranianled shipping venture that predates the 1979 Islamic Revolution is now unraveling as one of the most high-profile blows from international sanctions and U.S.-driven efforts to drive wedges between Tehran and its key trading partners.

The impending collapse of the Irano Hind Shipping Co. — created in 1974 with India's state-run maritime firm - is likely to be noted in Washington and among allies as evidence of the deepening wounds from the diplomatic and economic onslaught over Iran's nuclear program.

But in another sense, it illustrates the growing strains in Asian capitals over the economic squeeze on Tehran.

Leaders in India and elsewhere must now balance crucial needs for Iran's energy exports with mounting demands from their American allies to freeze out the Islamic Republic.

The top executive of the Indian side of Irano Hind said Wednesday it had become too difficult to operate the fleet's seven vessels under sanctions - imposed by the U.S. in 2008 and U.N. two years later for the company's connections to the state-owned Iranian shipping line.

"The fleet will be split between the two partners," Sabyasachi Hajara, chairman and managing director of Shipping Corp. of India, told The Associated Press. "Irano Hind will cease operation."

He said the decision to dissolve the company was made last week at an Irano Hind board meeting and must be approved by the two governments and the United Nations.

India is one of the main targets of U.S. attempts to chip away at Iran's critical commercial lifelines across Asia. In May, U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Clinton visited New Delhi to urge leaders to cut oil imports from Iran - still about 9 percent of India's fast-rising energy demand and turn more to other suppliers such as Saudi

agencies refused to confirm the reports to The Associated Press.

U.S. Postal Service spokesman David Rupert said the agency's inspectors have no direct knowledge of the package reportedly containing the notebook.

He said no one has contacted the Postal Service for assistance in the investigation.

Citing unnamed law enforcement sources, Fox News' website reported that Holmes sent the notebook in a package that had sat unopened since July 12.

The university said the report that the package sat uninvestigated that long is inaccurate.

A spokeswoman declined to comment further, citing a gag order issued by a judge in the case.

Before the gag order was issued, police said Holmes received more than 50 packages at the school and his home that apparently contained ammunition, combat gear and explosive materials that he used in the attack and to booby-trap his Aurora apartment.

The building was evacuat ed for days while authorities rendered the apartment safe and collected evidence.

Residents were allowed to return Wednesday evening.

Holmes' defense team also briefly visited the apartment building Wednesday and left without answering reporters' questions.

He filed paperwork to leave the program three days later and did not provide a reason, the university said.

DENVER (AP) • Three hospitals taking care of people wounded in the Colorado theater shooting said Wednesday they will limit or completely wipe out medical bills for the

Some victims, many of them young, are uninsured and face mounting hospital

Children's Hospital Colorado announced it would use donations and a charity care fund to cover the medical expenses of the uninsured. For those who do have insurance, the hospital says it will waive all co-pays for shooting victims it is treating.

"We are committed to supporting these families as they heal," said a statement from the hospitals.

HealthOne, which owns the Medical Center of Aurora and Swedish Medical Center, also says it will limit or eliminate charges based on the individual circumstances of the patients. Those hospitals have treated 22 shooting victims.

There was no immediate word on what the other two hospitals would to do.

The victims, however, still face a long recovery ahead and the associated medical costs - without health insurance. And HealthOne cautioned that its policy may not apply to all doctors work-

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Protests Reflect Divisions in Anaheim

ANAHEIM, Calif. • In a city best known for Disneyland, the Angels and the Ducks, the fatal police shootings of two Latino men over the weekend have uncorked days of furious, sometimes violent protests.

The unrest has exposed long-simmering divisions in Anaheim between the glitz of Disney and professional sports and the struggles in some of the less prosperous Latino neighborhoods in Orange County's largest city.

Of the city's estimated 340,000 residents, 53 percent are Latino, and the protests have occurred in the city's flatlands, where many of those residents live. Most City Council members hail from the more affluent Anaheim Hills neighborhood to the east. The American Civil Liberties Union recently filed suit claiming the current atlarge system of electing the council leaves Latinos poorly represented. The suit said Anaheim has only three Latino council members in its history.

The extent of the ethnic discord is hard to assess, as are accusations from some protesters that the Anaheim Police Department mistreats nonwhite residents. City leaders asked federal and state officials to conduct

independent examinations of the shootings and deny that police harass Latino residents.

Rusty Kennedy, executive director of Orange County Human Relations, said anger over the weekend shootings reflects wider woes in Anaheim's poorest communities, which suffer from unemployment, overcrowding and gang activity.

"It's a hot summer, school's out and frustrations from the economy are certainly being felt," Kennedy said. "There are really good families in these neighborhoods that are just strug-

gling to survive. They have fears their child will get in between the gang members and police."

The recent troubles started Saturday afternoon, after police fatally shot an unarmed man, Manuel Angel Diaz, 25, whose nickname was Stomper. The police union alleges he was seen reaching for something in his waistband.

As Diaz lay near death on an apartment lawn, anger swept through the streets. Soon protesters were hurling bottles at police, while officers fired bean bags. A police dog broke free and attacked protesters. A day later, police killed another man, Joel Acevedo, 21, who they say fired at officers during a foot chase. Police released a photo of a handgun lying between his legs.

Protests erupted downtown Tuesday night, with crowds that police estimated in excess of 1,000 people. Police Chief John Welter said police declared it an unlawful assembly after it grew dangerous. He said 50 to 100 protesters continued roaming the streets, throwing rocks and bottles, and damaging more than 20 businesses, mostly breaking windows

Senate Passes Bill to Keep Tax Cuts for Middle Class

WASHINGTON • The Senate on Wednesday narrowly approved a plan to preserve tax cuts for the middle class while letting them expire for the wealthy, a powerful if largely symbolic victory for Democrats who have been pushing to raise taxes on the rich for more than a decade.

The measure is dead on arrival in the Republican-controlled House, where leaders are preparing to vote next week on their own plan to extend the George W. Bush-era tax cuts for households at every income level through 2013.

But Democratic lawmakers said the Senate's 51-48 vote is a political breakthrough that strengthens their election-year argument that Republicans are holding tax cuts for the middle class hostage in order to maintain breaks worth \$160,000 a year to the average millionaire.

"If House Republicans insist on blocking our middleclass tax cuts, that is a debate we are willing to have. That is a debate we welcome," Sen. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., said in a speech on the Senate floor. For more than a decade, Republicans "have conflated tax cuts for the middle class and tax cuts for the very wealthy. This bill breaks that vice."

Vice President Joe Biden presided over the late-after-noon vote, though with only 99 senators present, there was never much chance he would be called upon to break a tie. His appearance highlighted the importance of the issue for President Barack Obama, who has made tax "fairness" a centerpiece of his reelection campaign against GOP challenger Mitt Romney.

Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., accused Democrats of playing politics with the nation's tax code. Noting Biden's presence, McConnell recalled that the last time the Bush tax cuts were set to expire, Biden asked McConnell to help the White House extend all of them, even breaks on income over \$250,000 a year, to avoid harming a fragile economy.

"Today, the economy is growing slower than it was in December 2010," McConnell said. "This is more about the election than it is the economy. And I'm sure a few arms have been twisted in order to get a result."

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BATTLES ABOUND IN SYRIAN CITY OF ALEPPO

BEIRUT • Syrian authorities were sending reinforcements to strife-torn Aleppo, opposition activists said Wednesday, as outgunned rebels in the northern city tried to deliver a potentially decisive blow to the government of President Bashar Assad.

Street battles were ongoing in several neighborhoods, including districts close to the gates of the old city, with government forces shelling rebel-occupied quarters with artillery and helicopter gunships, the activists said. Many residents had fled or remained indoors in the city of 2 million, they said.

Parts of Aleppo are "a ghost city," said one opposition activist in Aleppo reached via Skype. "The people are scared of going out in the streets," noted the activist, who said he had visited Salahuddin, said to be under the control of rebels.

"There are destroyed buildings there and injuries and deaths," said the activist, who asked not to be named for security reasons.

Residents reportedly have shuttered shops, and gasoline and bread are in

short supply. But neighborhoods away from the fighting in the sprawling city still retain some semblance of normalcy, though many people have left.

Video by a BBC crew in Aleppo shows rebels setting up sniper positions in battered buildings, firing on helicopters with a machine gun mounted on a captured tank, and rounding up men, presumably suspected regime collaborators.

The Syrian government said its forces in Aleppo had killed scores of "terrorists," the official term for the armed opposition. The state news service accused insurgents of assaulting citizens and attacking property in the al-Sakhour

neighborhood, which also was reportedly under rebel control.

There was no definitive word on casualties. Rebel medics were treating wounded in makeshift clinics, which have sprung up in battle zones across Syria during the uprising.

Insurgents called the attack on Aleppo an all-out offensive that has galvanized dozens of rebel brigades from throughout northern Syria. The fighters are seeking to wrest control of the city and use it as a base to expand their power in the north, where they already have effective control of large swaths of territory.

"Aleppo now is the cen-

ter of the revolution," said another opposition activist reached on the outskirts of the city. "The liberation of Aleppo means the fall of the regime."


Losing Aleppo would be a major blow to the Assad government, and there was widespread expectation of a concerted government counterattack with fresh reinforcements from northern garrisons.

On Tuesday, U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton predicted that rebel territorial gains could result in an insurgent "safe haven" inside Syria, presumably in the northern regions. She urged the opposition to start thinking about how to govern.

Neighboring Turkey, fearing a spillover in violence, said Wednesday that it had closed its borders with Syria, at least to commercial traffic.

The once-bustling truck traffic and movement of goods between the two nations has largely ceased because of the raging conflict. Syrian rebels have seized several border posts.

Turkey, once a close ally of Assad, has sided openly with the rebels trying to overthrow him and has provided a refuge for the opposition just across the border.

ARCO • In only a few places in the United States can you walk over what was once lava and explore an underground lava tube

crafted by molten rock. Instead of flying more than five hours to Hawaii, drive less than two hours north of Twin Falls to Craters of the Moon National Monument and Preserve

near Arco. Here you'll find an otherworldly landscape, an example of what the ground beneath your feet is capable of produc-

Can I See Flowing Lava?

Although no bright orange lava flows here now, the gnarled and crusty terrain frozen in time traces the tale of rivers of lava that gushed from fissures across the Snake River Plain called the Great Rift. In 1923 geologist Harold Stearns described Craters of the Moon as the nation's most recent fissure eruption outside of Hawaii. The most recent eruption at Craters was just 2,000 years ago.

Can I Eat the Snow

Cone? If you can't spend half the day

exploring all that the monument and preserve has to offer, there are two things you must see, said Lennie Ramacher, interpretive park ranger and volunteer coordinator: the spatter cones and the caves.

The spatter cones are especially interesting, he said, because they are formed during the final gasps of an eruption as

lava plops out in gigantic globs. You can take the short but steep walk up to the top of one of these cones. There is also a handicapped-accessible trail that is easier to climb to the top of Snow Cone, which is about 300 feet deep and always has

snow in the bottom. Visiting any of the cones is a chance to get a close look at the intricate designs molded by moving stone and to view land marked by volcanic craters and cones.

impressive," Maryann Lucero of Omaha, Neb. "I had no idea this was here."

Lucero was visiting the monument for the first time with her daughter Jackie Lucero of Challis, and the two were making the trek to the top of a spatter cone.

Jackie, who had visited before with her father, said her favorite part of Craters of the Moon is the lava tubes.

So, What's a Lava Tube?

Basically, an underground tunnel formed when the surface of flowing lava cools faster than the lava beneath. Later, when part of a tube collapses, it creates an opening to the natural cave.

One of the more popular lava tubes to explore is Indian Tunnel — the perfect cave for families with young children who want to venture below ground together but don't want to walk through complete darkness.

"It's the largest cave and the easiest one to navigate, and it's also very impressive," Ramacher said.

You can reach Indian Tunnel and three other caves — Dewdrop, Boy Scout and Beauty – by way of a halfmile paved trail across a field of lava. Boy Scout is harder than Indian Tunnel to hike through.

"Getting into that one is a crouch; it's like crawling under a table," Ramacher said.

Buffalo is the fifth cave open for visitors to explore. But Ramacher said there are hundreds in the monument.

Every day a ranger leads guided cave walks; meet at the caves area trailhead at 9 a.m. Friday through Sunday and at 1p.m. and 4p.m. daily.

In four of the caves (not Indian Tunnel), you must carry flashlights with extra batteries. Ramacher also suggests bringing a light jacket, because even now it's quite cool inside. The shortest lava tube is Dewdrop Cave, which takes about four minutes to walk through. The others each take about 10 to 15 minutes.

On a hot day the short trail to these caves can seem like a lifetime as you are baked on land resembling an uneven cookie sheet. The payoff is the cool air that greets you as you descend the first step into Indian Tunnel.

The trail is a little hard to read after the cave's entrance, and tennis shoes or hiking boots are a must, as is water. In the shade of walls formed by liquid rock, you can look through a couple of natural skylights and feel the rough, jagged ground poking into your shoe soles. Listen quietly to hear the tiny squeaks of bats in the crevices above you.

Why Do I Need a **Cave Permit?**

Before you venture into any of the caves at Craters of Moon you must get a cave permit. Implemented this year, screening is required before entering any cave on National Park Service lands.

This helps prevent the spread of white-nose syndrome, a fungal disease that has killed more than 5 million bats in the U.S. since

Get your permit at the entrance station, the visitor center or on ranger-guided walks. You will be asked questions: Have you visited a cave or mine since 2005? Do you have any items with you (such as clothing, shoes, flashlights, cameras, watches or phones) that entered

the caves or mines you previously visited?

"The bats have no natural defense," Ramacher said.

What Other Animals Might I Spot?

Probably pronghorns, mule deer, foxes, coyotes, chipmunks and squirrels. Ramacher said he is often asked whether there are rattlesnakes. Yes, he said, but not as many as people think.

In the coming weeks monument staff will comb the lava flows around the loop road looking for a cute little creature that resembles a mouse with huge ears but is actually related to a rabbit. Researchers are interested in the pika because of its sensitivity to climate changes. According to the National Park Service, pikas' exposure to temperatures of only 78 degrees can be fatal.

You may be able to spot some of these animals yourself if you listen for their trademark "Eeep" call and look inside rock crevices for piles of hay and flowers they like to collect.

Should I Venture into Devil's Orchard?

If you prefer the light of day rather than darkened caves, you might like one of the many hiking trails here. The Devil's Orchard half-mile trail features trees growing from some of the oldest lava in Craters.

"It's a peaceful little nature walk," Ramacher said.

This trail is handicapped accessible, as is the trail leading to Snow Cone. Pets are not allowed on the trails or in the caves.

The 3.5-mile North Crater Trail shows off crater fragments carried by lava flows. The Tree Molds Trail, two miles long, features lava with the imprints of trees burned

into its surface. The seven-mile Loop Road connects all the attractions at Craters, and everything is well marked. Be sure to visit the

Monument **Basics**

The fee is \$8 a vehicle to get into Craters of the Moon National Monument and Preserve. The monument is open daily yearround — except for federal holidays during the winter. Hours: During summer, the Robert Limbert Visitor Center is open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily. But the monument itself is always open around the clock, even during federal holi-

days. Visiting after hours? There is an honor system — a self-pay post near the entrance kiosk.

Get there: From the intersection of U.S. Highway 20 and U.S. Highway 93, head east on Highway 20 and go 25 miles past the town of Carey to Craters of the Moon's entrance.

monument map, see films and exhibits and visit the gift shop.

More adventurous hikers can explore the Craters of the Moon Wilderness Trail and do some backcountry camping, free with a permit.


Can I Camp on the Moon?

Camping by your car instead of carrying a tent? There are 51 developed campsites in Lava Flow Campground across from the visitor center. The cost to camp is \$10. There are no RV hookups, but there are flush toilets, water, barbecue pits and picnic tables, and the campground is handicapped accessible.

Campsites are filled first come, first serve. Generally there are open spots, Ramacher said, but during summer and on the nights of star parties, the campground can get busy.

A group campsite for up to 30 people can be reserved; it is tucked back on the north side of U.S. Highway 93.

Nightly junior ranger pro-







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Rope-like lava — called pahoehoe, formed from very fluid flowing lava — covers the area around the monument's North Crater Flow Trail.

p.m. An evening nature walk stroll with a ranger is also nightly, at 7 p.m.

Each night, evening programs begin at 9:30 p.m. at the amphitheater, where rangers explain volcanoes, local history or other topics.

Starting in early August will be night hikes with only the full moon to light the way past craters and rocks. On nights when the moon isn't out, you can find some of the darkest skies in Idaho to view the stars.

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Like Your Gold Jewelry? Thank the Stars

cause it's rare. But why is it rare? The answer lies in the

A geologist would say most of Earth's gold sunk to its interior eons ago, when the planet was still molten (leaving lighter stuff, like silicon, to comprise the crust). What we dig out of the ground are the mere traces left behind by this gravitational sorting

But the geologist's answer is still short of the mark, because gold is rare not just on the Earth's surface but throughout the universe.

In 1957, astronomers Geoff and Margaret Burbidge, Willy Fowler, and Fred Hoyle published a paper in "Reviews of Modern Physics" (now simply known by the authors' initials: B2FH) that explained gold's (and other heavy elements') rarity.

Sun-like stars generate energy by smashing hydrogen nuclei together in the high temperatures and pressures of their cores, making helium.

Hotter stellar cores can fuse helium into carbon, nitrogen and oxygen.

The hotter the star's center, the heavier the nuclei it can utilize as fuel.

It all ends with iron, however, because fusing iron absorbs energy rather than releasing it. Elements heavier than iron are only produced when the most massive stars die in violent supernova explosions. In the ensuing maelstrom, fusion products from the shattered stellar core are showered with neutrons, which they

absorb, transforming them into still heavier elements, including gold. B2FH's triumph was in explaining the neutron capture process, and showing the close correspondence between the predicted relative abundance of the heaviest elements and the amounts observed in the universe.

Our planet thus owes its existence to generations of stars that lived and died billions of years ago, scattering their heavy nuclei across space. Eventually, this stellar detritus condensed to form the Earth and everything on it, including us (and our precious metals).

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

Citigroup's Ex-CEO Does an About-face on Big Banks

NEW YORK (AP) • Sandy Weill is having a change of heart. Weill, the aggressive dealmaker who built Citigroup on the idea that in banking, bigger is better, said Wednesday that he believes big banks should be broken up.

Speaking on CNBC's "Squawk Box," the 79-year-old Weill appeared to shock the show's anchors when he said that consumer banking units should be split from riskier investment banking units. That would mean dismembering Citigroup as well as other big U.S. banks.

It's an idea that's traditionally more in line with the banking industry's harshest critics, not its founding fathers. It's an ironic twist coming from an empire-builder who nursed Citigroup into a behemoth.

THE DIGIT

Ford's net income fell 57% in the April-June period • It largely because of a \$404 million loss in Europe. Car sales there have tumbled to 20-year lows because consumers lack confidence in the economy. Ford expects to lose more than \$1 billion in Europe in 2012, double its estimate from the beginning of the year. The company wouldn't give details about its turnaround plans on Wednesday, but analysts say layoffs and plant closures are inevitable. Europe is vital to Ford. A quarter of its sales and profits come from the region, which is Ford's largest market after North America. Four straight quarters of losses in Europe are taking a toll.

USDA Says Drought will Push up Food Prices in 2013

MINNEAPOLIS • The drought gripping more than half the country is a major reason why consumers can expect to pay 3 percent to 4 percent more for groceries next year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture said Wednesday.

Milk, eggs, beef, poultry and pork prices will all be affected because the drought has pushed up prices for feed, and that will eventually translate into higher prices for steaks, hamburger, pork chops and chicken. The good news for cost-conscious consumers is that prices for fruits and vegetables, as well as processed foods, aren't affected as much by the drought.

Exactly how much more people might pay for a pound of hamburger, for example, isn't known because those prices are affected by lots of factors, including how much of the increase a given supermarket might pass along to the consumer. But beef prices as a whole are expected to see the biggest jump at 4 percent to 5 percent, according to the USDA.

Dairy product prices are forecast to climb 3.5 percent to 4.5 percent; poultry and egg prices are projected to rise 3 percent to 4 percent; and pork prices are expected to rise 2.5 percent to 3.5 percent in 2013, the agency said.

"In 2013 as a result of this drought we are looking at above-normal food price inflation. ... Consumers are certainly going to feel it," USDA economist Richard Volpe said.

Normal grocery price inflation is about 2.8 percent a year, Volpe said, so even a 3 percent increase is slightly higher than usual. The USDA kept its projected food price increase for 2012 steady at 2.5 percent to 3.5 percent, saying average retail food prices were flat for the first half of 2012 thanks to unusually low fruit and vegetable prices as well as lower prices for milk and pork.

The new forecasts are the agency's first food price projections to factor in the drought, though experts have been warning for a few weeks that prices will rise. As fields dry out and crops wither across much of the country's midsection, prices for corn, soybeans and other commodities have soared in anticipation of tight supplies. That means farmers and ranchers will have to pay more to feed their livestock, and those costs eventually get passed on to consumers. Food prices typically climb about 1 percent for every 50 percent increase in average corn prices, according to agricultural economists.

Processed foods aren't affected as much because feed costs don't account for as much of their price tag. And fruits and vegetables aren't expected to be any more costly because they are irrigated even in normal weather. The USDA is projecting an overall 2 percent to 3 percent increase for all fruits and vegetables next year, the same as it expects this year.

USDA economists were aware of the drought a month ago when they did their last projections but didn't know how bad it would get, Volpe said.

"This drought was a surprise for everybody," Volpe said. "The USDA was forecasting a record year for the corn crop until this drought materialized. Now we're not going to get that."

The drought now covers around 60 percent of the continental United States, the largest area since the epic droughts of the 1930s and 1950s.

Walmart **Foundation** Donates \$50K to Food Programs

Cooking Matters is a free, sixweek class that teaches parents and children how to shop for and prepare healthy, inexpensive meals. Walmart is a national sponsor of the course, and the Foodbank hopes to provide 14-15 of the classes throughout Idaho in 2012.

American CEO Bashes U.S. Airways; Calls it Desperate

BOSTON • American Airlines CEO Tom Horton wants to set the record straight: It was he who approached US Airways CEO Doug Parker about the possibility of combining the two airlines, not the other way

Horton has never made that fact public before, but he's doing so now to send a message. If American is going to combine with US Airways or any other airline, the decision will be Horton's.

Since American's parent AMR Corp. filed for bankruptcy last November, Parker has been aggressively promoting a combination of the two airlines as the only way to save American. Parker has championed the idea on Wall Street, in the media and lined up support from the three labor unions at American. Investors have treated the possibility as a near inevitability, pushing up shares of US Airways Group Inc. 150 percent over the past seven

months.

But in an interview with The Associated Press Horton was emphatic that there's more financial pressure on US Airways than American to find a partner. And he cited Parker's repeated overtures as a sign of desperation.

Perhaps the biggest problem on the horizon for US Airways is that its labor costs are going to rise, Horton said. Unions there haven't had a new contract in more than seven years. Horton said Parker is in "a race against the clock" to somehow increase revenue before he has to pay higher salaries in a new contract. A combination with American would help do that because American flies many more international routes, which bring in higher fares per passenger.

"It would be tremendously unwise for us to pursue a combination with a company because they are seeking to solve their own problems," Horton said.

Elise Eberwein, US Airways executive vice president for communications, said in response: "Nothing could be further from the truth. We've got a very sustainable model."





THIS SPUD Sandy Baker's Handmade Trophies Have Become Part of the Spudman Tradition.

BURLEY • No two Spudmen are alike.


That's because each ceramic trophy is hand-made by Sandy Baker, who spends about eight months mixing plaster, pouring molds, coloring, firing in the kiln, glazing, firing again, and painting every Spudman — down to

each individual eyelash. "It's neat and I do enjoy it," said Baker, who makes the trophies in the basement of her Burley home. "I don't

think people realize how long it takes." Trophies are annually awarded to the top three placers in each gender and age division at the Burley Lions Club Spudman Triathlon, which means Baker must create about 180 trophies. She begins in November and works daily to ensure the trophies are ready before race day, the last Saturday in July.

Each is a potato with arms, legs and a face, wearing pants, shoes and a hat - trophies perhaps as quirky as the

triathletes who covet them. "For a lot of people it's well sought after," said B.J. Christenson, winner of the past three Spudman Triathlons.

PSU President: Four-year Ban **Was Floated**

Penn State faced the threat of a four-year ban on playing football before the NCAA imposed sanctions this week over the school's handling of the Jerry Sandusky child molestation scandal, a university spokesman said Wednesday.

David La Torre said the potential for the multiyear "death penalty" floated during discussions between Penn State President Rodney Erickson and NCAA officials before Penn State was hit Monday with a \$60 million fine, a four-year bowl game ban, reduced football scholarships and the forfeiture of 112 wins.

The school trustees met on the subject at a State College hotel Wednesday, and afterward issued a statement calling the NCAA punishment "unfortunate" but better than the alternative - the socalled "death penalty." Reporters were barred from the conference room where they met, and trustees avoided them after the meeting broke up.

The potential for a fouryear ban, first reported by ESPN, showed how high the stakes were as college sports' governing body considered how to respond to an internal school investigation by former FBI Director Louis Freeh that found former coach Joe Paterno and three other top college officials helped conceal reports that Sandusky was abusing children.

NCAA president Mark Emmert said this week that if a total football ban had been imposed, other penalties would have accompanied it.

"If the death penalty were to be imposed, I'm quite sure that the executive committee and I ... would not have agreed to just the death penalty. It would have included other penalties as well," Emmert said as the sanctions were unveiled.

An NCAA spokeswoman declined further comment Wednesday on negotiations with Penn State.

Many alumni and some trustees were incensed over the unprecedented NCAA penalty - which will cost Penn State tens of millions of dollars and likely cripple its football team for years to come and Penn State's quick acceptance of it.

A person with knowledge of the meeting said earlier Wednesday that trustees were to discuss whether Erickson had the authority to agree to the sanctions without first getting the board's approval. The person was not authorized to discuss the meeting and spoke on condition of anonymity.

Some trustees had expressed concern that Erickson may have violated a board rule that says the board must authorize the signing of "contracts, legal documents, and other obligations."

The board statement made no reference to the proprietary of what Erickson had done, saying trustees held a discussion but did not take any votes.

"The board finds the punitive sanctions difficult and the process with the NCAA unfortunate," the statement said. "But as we understand it, the alternatives were worse as confirmed by NCAA President Mark Emmert's recent statement that Penn State was likely facing a multi-year death sentence."

La Torre said Wednesday that Erickson had authority to act without the approval of the full board.

U.S. Women Open by Defeating France

GLASGOW, Scotland • An early start to the Olympics turned into an early hole for the U.S. women's soccer team, which gave up two quick goals before unleashing an attack the rest of the world will find hard to stop.

Abby Wambach used her size and strength to put in a header, Alex Morgan applied her speed to chip one over the goalkeeper and Carli Lloyd broke the tie with a 25-yard rocket. All of which sent the two-time defending goal medalists to a 4-2 victory over France on Wednesday as they opened their London Games far from London.

Morgan added an insurance goal — created by a nice run from Tobin Heath — for the Americans, which began play two days before the opening ceremony and 400-plus miles from the British capital. Soccer starts its Olympics early so it has time to play a full tournament of games.

The Americans allowed more goals in the first handful of minutes than they had allowed in any game since the World Cup final loss to Japan last year. Gaetane Thiney (12th minute) and Marie-Laure Delie (14th) found holes in a supposedly impenetrable de-

fense — a potential cause for U.S. concern as the grueling tournament progresses.

But Wambach scored in the 19th, Morgan in the 32nd, Lloyd in the 56th and Morgan again in the 66th. Wambach now has 139 international goals in her pursuit of Mia Hamm's record of 158, and 23vear-old "Baby Horse" Morgan — the second-youngest player on the team — has a remarkable 19 this year alone.

While the Americans are favored to win gold again — and even though the U.S. is now 13-0-1 all-time against France - it was hardly a surprise to see the French make it a game. The teams were tied late in the second half in last year's World Cup semifinals before the Americans finished off a 3-1 win, and France entered these Olympics on a 17-game winning streak.

The United States plays Colombia in its second group game on Saturday. France will face North Korea.

The French took the lead on a deflected long ball that ended up at the foot of Thiney, who had plenty of time and space to unleash a 22-yard shot into the upper right corner of the net, grazing the fingertips of leaping goalkeeper Hope Solo.

Two minutes later, the Americans played a dangerous game of pinball deep in their own end, failing in five separate chances to clear a corner kick. Inevitably, the ball bounced to a French player, Delie, who put the easy shot past Solo, again off the goalie's outstretched left hand, to make it 2-0.

But the Americans are arguably stronger, deeper and more diverse than they've ever been, and they have the firepower to overcome such a deficit – and quickly. Wambach, who has the best header in women's soccer, started the comeback by nodding in Megan Rapinoe's corner kick.

The goal awakened some of a crowd that so far had behaved as if watching a BBC documentary. Chants of "U-S-A!" began to echo in sections of Hampden Park, the 109-year-old landmark that serves as Scotland's national stadium.

The 52,000-seat stadium was perhaps one-third full at kickoff, but the game needed to draw only a couple of thousand to surpass the all-time Scottish record for attendance at a women's game. Organizers gave away some 30,000 tickets to schools and local clubs to keep the stands from being embarrassingly empty in a region where soccer is overwhelmingly a man's game.

IAAF Announces Nine New Doping Cases

MONACO • Nine track athletes were suspended ahead of the London Olympics for doping, including three who were caught in retests of samples from last year's world championships, the IAAF said Wednesday.

The governing body said six were caught in biological passport tests, which measure changes in an athlete's blood profile. The others were sanctioned after retroactive testing of blood and urine samples from the worlds in Daegu, South Korea.

Eight of the athletes received twoyear suspensions, while one was handed a four-year ban.

The IAAF said the athletes — eight women and one man - were involved in "sophisticated doping," including one case of human growth hormone and two of synthetic testosterone.

Among those suspended was Ukraine's Nataliya Tobias, who won a bronze medal in the 1,500 meters at the 2008 Beijing Olympics. She tested positive for testosterone in further analysis of urine samples from Daegu, where she finished ninth in the 1,500.

Another Ukrainian athlete, 400meter runner Antonina Yefremova, also was later caught for using testosterone in Daegu. She was eliminated in the semifinals.

The IAAF said the two Ukrainians were caught after suspicious blood samples taken at the worlds led to further checks on the urine samples they provided at their team training camp in Korea.

The IAAF said Bulgarian sprinter Inna Eftimova, who was eliminated in the 100-meter heats in Daegu, tested positive for synthetic growth hormone.

"This is the second finding of growth hormone in athletics and one of only a very few to date in sport as a whole," the IAAF said.

Eftimova, Tobias and Yefremova all received two-year bans after admitting to doping and waiving their right to having their backup "B" sample tested.

In the six biological passport cases, the highest-profile athlete is Moroccan marathon runner Abderrahim Goumri, who has been a runner-up at the Chicago, London and New York marathons and won the Seoul International Marathon in

Goumri was banned for four years by the Moroccan Athletic Federation until March 2016, but the IAAF said the penalty is "not final under IAAF rules" and can still be appealed by the athlete.

The five other athletes are Greek steeplechaser Irini Kokkinariou, Turkish distance runner Meryem Erdogan and Russian long-distance runners Svetlana Klyuka, Nailiya Yulamanova and Yevgenina Zinurova.

All six athletes had been flagged as suspicious and regularly targeted by the IAAF since 2009.

The Ethiopian-born Erdogan and the three Russians admitted doping and received two-year bans, the IAAF said.

Kokkinariou was suspended for two years by the Greek Athletics Federation. The IAAF has appealed to the Court of Arbitration for Sport seeking a four-year ban on the grounds of aggravating circumstances.





WHEREAS, the City of Jerome has an ordinance prohibiting the placement of any trailer on any city street for a period of more than seventy-two (72) consecutive hours, and

WHEREAS, said ordinance does not contain an exception allowing law enforcement to place a "speed trailer, reader boards, display boards" or other public safety device on any city street for a period of more than seventy-two (72) consecutive hours: and

WHEREAS, the placement of such "speed trailers, reader boards, display boards" or other public safety device for a period exceeding seventy-two (72) consecutive hours helps to preserve, promote, and protect the safety of city streets.

BE IT THEREFORE ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS: Section 12.20.020 of the Jerome Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

12.20.020 B. "Trailer" means:

(9). Speed Trailer, Reader Board, Display Board or other public safety device: A "utility trailer", cart, or other public safety device owned and/or used by law enforcement or a public agency which is equipped with a device capable of measuring and displaying in large digits the speed of oncoming traffic. Reader Boards or Display Boards are owned by a public agency to make public service announcements.

12.20.020 B. 1. d.

Exception: Any "Speed Trailer", "Reader Board", "Display Board" or public safety device used for law enforcement or prevention purposes is excepted from the prohibited conduct set forth

This Ordinance shall become effective upon its passage and publication as provided by law.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF JEROME, IDAHO, AMENDING THE AGE LIMIT OF INDIVIDUALS WHO MAY BE LICENSED TO SELL ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES, THE AGE LIMIT OF PERSONS TO WHOM VENDORS MAY SELL BEER, AND THE AGE LIMIT OF PERSONS TO WHOM BEER MAY BE SOLD, FURNISHED, DELIVERED OR GIVEN AWAY FROM NINETEEN (19) YEARS TO TWENTY-ONE (21) YEARS; ADOPTING THE IDAHO CODE DEFINITIONS OF "LIQUOR" AND "BEER" AS THE DEFINITIONS OF THE SAME FOR THE CITY; ESTABLISHING PENALTIES; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the City of Jerome presently allows persons nineteen years of age or older to apply for a license to sell, purchase, or receive beer, and

WHEREAS, to conform to state law, comity requires that City of Jerome to amend the age of persons allowed to apply for a license to sell, purchase or receive beer to twenty-one years of age; and

SECTION 3. It shall be unlawful for a licensed seller of alcohol to sell beer to any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years pursuant to the provisions of Jerome Municipal Code 5.20.110. SECTION 4. It shall be unlawful for any person within the City of

Jerome to sell, furnish, deliver or give away beer to any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years, pursuant to Jerome Municipal Code 5.20.120. SECTION 5. A violation of this Ordinance shall be deemed a



"They (the voters) have learned that mystery and concealment in the management of their affairs cover tricks and betrayal." — Grover Cleveland

A neat elimination play saw South home in today's deal. But declarer had to play her cards in an order that disguised her intentions, so that her plan was less likely to be foiled.

Against four hearts, West led the spade six, top of nothing, to the four, nine and king. Declarer immediately returned the suit. East won and was reluctant to open up diamonds, so played another spade, ruffed in dummy. There appear to be four losers, but South's plan was to cash her minor-suit winners and, if trumps broke 2-2, hope that the player who won the second heart trick did not have the third club, so would be forced to give her a ruff and discard.

Had she set about her minorsuit elimination early, the defense might well have divined her plan and arranged for West, the player with the third club, to win the second heart.

To disguise her intentions, after ruffing the spade, she called for dummy's heart jack, giving the appearance of finessing for the queen. An unsuspecting East played low, and on winning with the king, West equally unsuspectingly returned a diamond. Winning in dummy, declarer cashed the club ace, and when no honor appeared from East, continued with the king, then a diamond to her ace. The scene was set, and now a heart to East's ace brought about the desired result. Whatever that player led, declarer would pitch her club loser and ruff in dummy.
