TWIN FALLS • A man who is presumed to have drowned after falling into the Snake River near Pillar Falls Saturday has been identified.

Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office spokeswoman Lori Stewart said 42year-old Justice Kramer of Graham, Wash., was hiking at about 9:30 p.m. Saturday with his daughter and her son when he slipped on the rocks and went into the water.

Crews were searching until 12:30 a.m. Sunday and again from daybreak until dark Sunday without finding him and are out again this morning, Stewart said.

"Hopefully we get him today," she said.

Pillar Falls is about a half mile east of the Perrine Bridge.

Foregone Balances Gives Towns Another Funding Option

TWIN FALLS • Each fiscal year, Idaho taxing districts are allowed to raise their tax rates a maximum of 3 percent.

But a handful of those districts have the option of going above that limit. Idaho tax law allows districts that have not raised taxes by 3 percent to collect the amounts they passed up. As officials are putting together their budgets for next year, not

Panel Discusses Health Care Reform Impacts for Idaho

BOISE • Weeks after the U.S. Supreme Court decided to uphold contested elements of the health care reform law, Idaho lawmakers are now facing the difficult task of how to move forward.

On Monday, a 14-member panel met in Boise to hear more about the questions Idaho must answer in the upcoming months. States have until Nov. 16 to submit their exchange plans.

The critical components of the Affordable Care Act require states to decide if they will expand Medicaid's eligibility requirements and if they should implement some sort of insurance exchange.

For Idaho, these decisions force lawmakers to work with a law they have adamantly opposed since it passed in 2010. Highlights of Idaho's rocky relationship with the law include Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter suing the federal government for passing the law and legislators refusing to accept the \$20 million offered from the feds to help fund the exchange.

"We're looking for ways to keep the federal government out of people's decision when it comes to health care," said Sen. Dean Cameron, co-chair of the Senate-House health care task force, during a meeting Monday in Boise.

In just a few months, Idaho must submit a proposal on how it will go about setting up an exchange. The online marketplace would allow individuals to shop and compare health insurance coverage, an option currently unavailable for consumers.

States have three options when it comes to setting up an exchange. 1) Create and manage a state-run exchange; 2) Let the federal government develop and control the exchange; 3) Come up with some sort of partnership that splits the responsibilities of the exchange with the federal government.

all take advantage of that option, however.

A foregone balance is the difference between what taxing districts are allowed to levy and what they actually levy, explained Gary Houde, senior research analyst with the Idaho State Tax Commission.

If officials decide not to collect the maximum tax rate, the difference — the foregone balance — is set aside.

Don't think of it as savings or reserve money, as the taxpayers haven't yet paid it.

But if a county, city or other taxing entity wants to take advantage of its foregone balance in a coming fiscal year, it can raise taxes past the maximum 3 percent, collecting some or all of that set-aside amount.

Currently, 29 Idaho counties and 98 cities have foregone balances, Houde said. Those range from substantial amounts – \$16.8 million in Ada County – to negligible figures as small as one or two bucks, like in Elmore and Jerome counties.

Putting Away the Keys

TWIN FALLS • Giving up her car was one of the hardest thing Sadie Thornton had to do. When her eyesight deteriorated due to complications from diabetes, Thornton had more than 25 laser eye surgeries to try to fix the damage, but eventually retired early at age 63. After that, she decided to stop driving and gave up her driver's license in 2004.

Driving, which she once enjoyed, had become scary. "I'd drive downtown and be a nervous wreck," she said.

When she lived in Virginia, Thorton would regularly get up at 3 a.m. and drive to Maine for visits with her daughter. With the loss of her sight, she was suddenly faced with relying on friends for simple trips to the grocery store or the doctor.

"I didn't know what I was going to do," she said. "Thank goodness for lots of friends."

According to Jeff Stratten, manager of the Office of Communications at the Idaho Transportation Department, 784 people voluntarily gave up their driver's licenses from January to June this year for medical reasons. Not all of them are seniors, he said.

"They could be younger people with diabetes or some other issue," he said.

On Monday, Thorton rode a Trans IV bus to a doctor's appointment at St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center. She's getting another ride today for a visual impairment support group and she has another appointment on Thursday, she said. Though this is a busy week, Thornton said she sometimes goes several weeks without needing the bus service.



NEW YORK (AP) • A two-day rally that sent stocks soaring last week fizzled out Monday. European leaders vowed Thursday and Friday to keep the continent's monetary union intact, and investors sent stock markets shooting higher. 


near the reservoir when his Dodge pickup veered off the left side of the road.

Twin Falls City Code Has Limits on Pets

Q. One dog lover asks: Why does Twin Falls have a limit on the number of dogs people can own, but not cats?

A. Well, they do.

According to the city code: "No person shall harbor or possess more than four dogs and four cats within residential zones within the city of Twin Falls.

Josh Palmer, public information officer for Twin Falls City, says the law predates current staff, but surmised that it was set in place due to noise nuisance. No one knows why the limit was

four.

A better question, as delved by one city worker, is why not pigs?

The code specifically rules out swine residency, stating it is unlawful for any person to keep or maintain any pigs or hogs within the city limits.

Other farm animals are allowed only with a permit – horses, mules,

A. "The parks are open from 6 a.m. to 11 p.m.," said Twin Falls Parks and Recreation Director Dennis Bowyer, "with the exception of Shoshone Falls and Dierkes Lake."

"We close them up at 10 p.m. because you can't see past about then anyway," Bowyer said. "If you're down there when it's dark, you're more than likely up to no good."

Winter hours bring earlier closures of 10 p.m. for regular parks and 9 p.m. for Dierkes Lake and Shoshone Falls.

Trans IV works to provide services to the elderly and disabled. It provides flexible routes in Twin Falls and Jerome and door-to-door rides in Twin Falls. Driver Debbie Woodard said she gets to know her daily riders pretty well, and the vast majority are grateful for the service.

The Office on Aging for the area gets some funds that are distributed to a few different programs to help seniors who don't drive, said Public Information and Contracts Manager Shawna Wasko.

The goal of the Office on Aging is to help people stay in their own homes for as long and as safely as they can, Wasko said. Having a way to get to doctor, grocery store or the Senior Center to socialize helps, she said.

"Losing your independence, it just scares me," Wasko said. "We don't live in a big area with a bus on every corner.

You have to come up with innovative ideas."

Along with helping older people with transportation, Wasko said, the office helps children of seniors with how to talk to their parents about when to stop driving. If a parent doesn't want to stop driving, she recommends talking to a doctor or nurse who can give an expert opinion instead. Wasko said many people will be more open to advice from a doctor than from a child.

"I feel for them," she said. "That's a fear a lot of us have - not being able to drive, feeling like a burden and being dependent."

Higher Tax Rate Means Paying Less for Residents

TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls' property tax rate may be going up but that doesn't necessarily mean people will pay more.

During Monday's Twin Falls City Council special meeting, city officials discussed how it would react to an unexpected decrease in its projected revenue for the upcoming fiscal year.

Twin Falls County surprised the city when it decided to change how it assesses property values. City officials use estimated property tax values in their budget planning to determine how much revenue they will collect each year.

Instead of assessing 20 percent of the county's properties, the county assessed everything, said Travis Rothweiler, city manager. After collecting the data, the county reduced property values across the board by 10 percent.

Scrambling to make up for the loss in revenue, Rothweiler explained that increasing the property tax rate will even out the deficit. The new proposal would require paying \$7.66 per \$1,000 of taxable value.

However, don't let the higher number fool you.

Tax payers won't see an increase in how much they pay. Instead, it's likely they'll pay even less next year, Rothweiler said.

For example, a home valued at \$96,000 during fiscal year 2011-2012 is now valued at a little over \$85,601. If you qualify for the homeowners' exemption, you'll pay \$5.07 less in taxes per year.

"The values are decreasing faster than the tax rate is going up," Rothweiler said.

Unfortunately for commercial properties, the higher tax rate will probably result in a slightly higher amount they'll pay to the city. But that will be determined by how much the property was improved.

"We could see a three to five percent increase for commercial but we don't know for sure at this time," Rothweiler said.

Council members were receptive to the new budget strategy but because Monday was a special meeting, no decision was made.

"I still feel comfortable with this budget," said Councilwoman Rebecca Mills-Sojka.




FIREFIGHTERS PULLED BACK FROM CENTRAL IDAHO BLAZE

Newest Bible Translation Has Screenplay Format

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) • A new Bible translation tackles the challenge of turning ancient Greek and Hebrew texts into modern American English and then adds a twist: It's written like a screenplay.

Take the passage from Genesis in which God gets angry at Adam for eating the forbidden fruit from the tree of knowledge of good and evil:

"Adam (pointing at the woman): It was she! The woman You gave me as a companion put the fruit in my hands, and I ate it.

"God (to the woman): What have you done?

"Eve: It was the serpent! He tricked me, and I ate." Later, Eve bears her first son, Cain.

"Eve (excited): Look, I have created a new human, a male child, with the help of the Eternal."

Even people who have never read the Bible could probably guess that other translations don't say Adam pointed his finger at Eve when he blamed her for his disobedience. Neither do other Bibles describe Eve as "excited" about her newborn son. That's pure Hollywood, but the team behind "The Voice" says it isn't a gimmick. They hope this new version will help readers understand the meaning behind the sometimes archaic language of the Bible and enjoy the story enough to stick with it.

The idea was a longtime dream of Chris Seay, pastor of Houston's Ecclesia Church. Seay had had success in helping church members relate to the Bible by dividing out the parts of the various speakers and assigning roles to church members who read them aloud.



Post Office Nears Historic Default

WASHINGTON (AP) • The U.S. Postal Service is bracing for a first-ever default on billions in payments due to the Treasury, adding to widening uncertainty about the mail agency's solvency as first-class letters plummet and Congress deadlocks on ways to stem the red ink.

With cash running perilously low, two legally required payments for future postal retirees' health benefits — \$5.5 billion due Wednesday, and another \$5.6 billion due in September — will be left unpaid, the mail agency said Monday. Postal officials said they also are studying whether they may need to delay other obligations. In the coming months, a \$1.5 billion payment is due to the Labor Department for workers compensation, which for now it expects to make, as well as millions in interest payments to the Treasury. The defaults won't stir any kind of catastrophe in day-to-day mail service. Post offices will stay open, mail trucks will run, employees will get paid and current retirees will get health benefits.

But a growing chorus of analysts, labor unions and business customers are troubled by continuing losses that point to deeper, longer-term financial damage, as the mail agency finds it increasingly preoccupied with staving off immediate bankruptcy while Congress delays on a postal overhaul bill.

Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe described a "crisis of confidence" amid the mounting red ink that could lead even once-loyal customers to abandon use of the mail.

"I think for my generation it was a great asset — if you had a letter or package and you needed it to get up to the North Pole, you knew it would be delivered," said Jim Husa, 87, of Lawrence, Mich., after stopping to mail letters recently at his local post office. Noting the mail agency's financial woes, he added: "Times have changed, and we old-timers know that. FedEx and UPS and the Internet seem to be making the Postal Service obsolete."

Banks are promoting electronic payments, citing in part the growing uncertainty of postal mail.

The federal government will stop mailing paper checks starting next year for millions of people who receive Social Security and other benefits, paying via direct deposit or debit cards instead.

First-class mail volume, which has fallen 25 percent since 2006, is projected to drop another 30 percent by 2016.

Tens of Thousands Flee Syria's Aleppo

BUKULMEZ, Turkey (AP) • Smoking a cigarette outside a Turkish hospital near the Syrian border, a man in a gray gown and flip-flops held his sleeping 2-year-old daughter, Aya. On Aya's right eye was a bandage. In her left hand was a chocolate bar.

Aya lost her eye when she was struck by shrapnel from a shell that also killed her 8-month-old brother, Mohammad, and their mother. The father and daughter were among some 200,000 people who the U.N. said late Sunday have fled Syria's largest city, Aleppo, during days of clashes between rebels and the military.

Aleppo residents, some severely wounded, are packing up belongings and loading them onto cars, trucks and even motorcycles to seek temporary shelter in rural villages and schools outside the city and dusty tents across the border in Turkey.

In interviews with The Associated Press, refugees described a city besieged by government troops and beset by incessant shelling. Food supplies and gasoline are running low and black market prices for everyday staples are soaring.

As the violence intensified, the country's most senior diplomat in London defected. Khaled al-Ayoubi is the latest in a string of high-profile diplomats to abandon Bashar Assad's regime over a crackdown that, according to rights activists, killed more than 19,000 people since March 2011.

The battle for Aleppo, a city of 3 million that was once a bastion of support for Assad, is critical for both the regime and the opposition. Its fall would give the opposition a major strategic victory with a stronghold in the north. Activists said regime forces were shelling rebel-held districts of the city and a cluster of surrounding villages relentlessly on Monday, sending entire families and panicked residents fleeing.

CENTENNIAL, Colo. • Prosecutors on Monday filed 142 charges including 24 for first-degree murder against James Holmes, the former graduate student who is accused of killing 12 people and injuring 58 during a shooting spree at an Aurora, Colo., movie theater July 20.

In addition to first-degree murder, Holmes was charged with 116 counts of attempted murder, one count of using a deadly weapon in commission of a violent crime and one count of possession of explosive devices. The murder charges carry a minimum penalty of life in prison and a maximum of death.

For each of the 12 people killed, Holmes faces two charges of first-degree murder, one for acting after deliberation and with intent, the other for acting with malice and having "an extreme indifference to the value of human life." Holmes was charged with two counts of attempted first-degree murder for each of the 58 injured.

The charging document also lists, for the first time, the names of all the victims of the attack.

Holmes, 24, has been in police custody for 10 days, but prosecutors had delayed charging him as investigators and police continued their probe. Police have described the shooting rampage, which occurred during a midnight showing of the new Batman film "The Dark Knight Rises," as a methodical attack that took months of planning, during which Holmes purchased weapons and stockpiled other materials.

Conservatives Target Moderate Republicans

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP) • Frustrated by their inability to achieve some policy goals, conservatives in Republican states are turning against moderates in their own party, trying to drive them out of state legislatures.

Political groups are helping finance the efforts by supporting primary election challenges targeting several dozen moderate Republicans in the Midwest and South, especially prominent lawmakers who run key state committees.

Two years after Republicans swept into power, the challengers say it's time to adopt more conservative policies.

"If you don't believe in that playbook, then why are you on the team?" declared Greg Smith, a Kansas state representative who's running for the state Senate. The push is most intense in Kansas, where conservatives are attempting to replace a dozen moderate Republican senators who bucked new Gov. Sam Brownback's move to slash state income taxes.

The Club for Growth, a major conservative interest group, is spending about \$500,000 in Missouri this year. That's double the amount it invested two years ago. The anti-tax group Americans for Prosperity opened new chapters in Iowa, Minnesota and New Mexico. The conservative business group Texans for Lawsuit Reform spent \$3.5 million on legislative candidates in the first half of 2012, more than double its total during the same period two years ago.

Levinsohn Leaving Yahoo after Second CEO Snub

LOS ANGELES (AP) • Ross Levinsohn, the interim CEO who was snubbed in the search for a permanent leader at Yahoo, is leaving the Internet portal.

Yahoo announced the departure in a securities filing on Monday. With much fanfare, Yahoo appointed 37-year-old Marissa Mayer as CEO two weeks ago. Retaining Levinsohn, who had been interim CEO since May, would have been one of her first big triumphs.

Levinsohn's exit is not unexpected. Yahoo's stock barely moved in after-hours trading. Following the announcement, it rose 2 cents to \$16. The stock closed Monday's regular session down 13 cents, or less than 1 percent, at \$15.98. In the last year, Yahoo's stock has traded between \$11.09 and \$16.79.

Study: Older Workers **Take Longer** to Find Jobs

TWIN FALLS • Every unsuccessful job-seeker wants to know why they were passed over when someone else gets the position.

Older Idahoans usually have a hunch what happened: Their gray hair could have been a factor.

A recent survey by a Boise research firm found that older workers take significantly longer than younger people to find a job. Once they are unemployed, those 50 and older average 55 weeks without work, compared to 35 weeks for younger applicants.

That was one of the findings in a nationwide survey conducted by GS Strategy Group at the request of AARP.

"If Idahoans 50 and older are anything like their counterparts across the nation, we know age discrimination is likely something going through their minds when they receive a rejection letter to their job application," said David Irwin, director of communications for AARP in Idaho.

Jack Gilson of Twin Falls is among those who believe age is preventing them from getting jobs they're convinced they could perform. Gilson, 60, gets temporary work through Personnel Plus but can't land a fulltime position.

"I put in applications and pass all the tests, but they never get back to you," he said. "I've worked all my life and never had trouble holding down a job."

He wants to be a permanent main-

Twin Falls Home Construction, Sales Soar

The number of single family homes, and their value, is up significantly from 2011.

TWIN FALLS • The revival of new home construction in Twin Falls continued in June, according to figures from the city of Twin Falls Building Department.

Not only were more single family home construction permits issued compared with the same month a year earlier, but the values of those homes was slightly higher than in 2011. Overall, the value of new homes being built this year is significantly up from 2011, Building Department statistics show.

Eleven single family building permits were issued in June compared to seven the same month in 2011. It brought the total number of single family building permits allocated this year to 103. A total of 78 were issued through June 2011.

The total value of new homes under construction through June 2012 is \$14.1 million compared with \$11.7 million during the same period in 2011.

The brisk construction pace coincides with what one Twin Falls real estate sales agent calls a "crazy busy" period for single family home sales.

"Holy cow," said Kilah Wilkinson, buyer's agent for Magic Valley Realty, "I am busier now than during the boom" of 2005 to 2007.

Record low interest rates are partly responsible, she said, but another factor is that buyers tend to be better qualified than in past years. More have been pre-approved for loans and there aren't as many people simply looking.

rious about buying," Wilkinson said.

Her mix of clients includes people coming to town to take new jobs as well as those relocating here for retirement. They've come from Utah, Montana, Colorado, Connecticut and North Carolina.

"Some just want out of a hectic environment," Wilkinson said.

Meanwhile, residential additions and remodeling saw a big jump in June from the year-earlier period. Twentyfive permits were issued in June this year compared with nine in the same month last year - with the estimated value up from \$62,000 to \$400,000.

Four building permits were issued in June for new commercial projects while three were issued in June 2011. The estimated value of the 2012 permits is \$11.3 million compared with just \$81,603 in June 2011.

iPhone Appeal Dims as Samsung Shines

NEW YORK (AP) • The once-sexy iPhone is starting to look small and chubby.

That's become a problem for Apple, which revealed last week that iPhone sales have slowed. Part of the problem is that the competition has found a formula that works: thinner phones with bigger screens.

For a dose of smartphone envy, iPhone owners need to look no further than Samsung Electronics Co., the number-one maker of smartphones in the world. Its newest flagship phone, the Galaxy S III, is sleek and wafer-thin. It can run on the fastest networks and act as a "smart wallet," too – two things the Apple's iconic phone can't do.

Says Ramon Llamas, an analyst with research firm IDC: The iPhone "is getting a bit long in the tooth."

Apple has become the world's most valuable company on the back of the iPhone, which makes up nearly half of its revenue. The iPhone certainly has room to grow: Only one in six smartphones sold globally in the second quarter had an Apple logo on its back.

When Apple reported financial results for its latest quarter last week, a new phenomenon was revealed: Buyers started pulling back on iPhone purchases just six months after the launch of the latest iPhone model.

Apple executives blamed the tepid sales on "rumors and speculation" that may have caused some consumers to wait for the next iPhone, which is due in the fall. But in the past, iPhone sales have stayed strong nine months after the new model is launched, then dipped as people began holding off, waiting for the new model.



Coming Soon: The Big Trade-off

hen you talk to Chinese officials lately, it doesn't take long before they express concern about America's "rebalancing" of forces –



the prospect that we'll shift more troops from the Middle East, where they are containing instability, to Asia, where they would contain China. My standard reply is that China is worrying about the wrong thing. It is not that we'll shift our Marines from the Middle East to Asia; it's that we are going to shift them from the Middle East to San Diego — because we can't afford to be the world's policeman much longer, and China will have to fill some of the void.

Good luck, world! It's been fun hanging with you, but we can't pay for it anymore — not with all of us baby boomers about to retire with no savings. We have a new strategic doctrine coming: "U.S. foreign policy in the age of Alzheimer's." We'll do what we can afford and forget the rest.

Why do I say that? In part it's because I spent time this week with the Washington staff of The Jewish Federations of North America, or JFNA, which represents the 155 Jewish community federations across America. They may seem like an unlikely interlocutor for a foreign affairs columnist, but they're not. Like their counterparts, Catholic Charities and Lutheran Services, these Jewish federations operate nursing homes, hospitals, elder-care programs, meals on wheels, job-training, hospices and family social services in cities across America.

And the financial challenges they're all facing today are profound — as the baby boomers are aging — and so too are the trade-offs we'll have to make between nursing homes in America and nursery schools in Afghanistan. Unless we get some sustained economic growth, Afghanistan is going to lose.

William Daroff, the director of JFNA's Washington office, starts with this fact: Since the 2008 economic crisis, annual donations to Jewish federations have been flat, while there has been a sharp increase in demand for services and significant cuts in Medicaid and block grants that help pay for them.


"We have people who were donors to our programs five years ago, now knocking on the door to use those same programs" — from people in need of job-training to those in need of help to cover a mortgage payment, said Daroff. And we haven't seen anything yet, explains Barbara Bedney, the director of public policy for JFNA.

"We will see a doubling of the number of older adults – people over the age of 65 – by 2030, as the baby boomers age," she explained, and one of the fastest growing groups will be the "old-old" – those who are 85 and older, who are living longer but requiring even more expensive care.

And wait until the baby boomer cohort reaches their 80s. Alzheimer's Disease Research reports that roughly 5.4 million Americans of all ages had Alzheimer's disease in 2012, and, by 2050, more than 15 million Americans could be living with the disease — a key reason nursing home residents are predicted to double over the next 30 years.

And many baby boomers, says Steven Woolf, the senior tax policy counsel for JFNA, "are nowhere near prepared in terms of retirement savings" for the kinds of costs they are going to incur after they stop working - in an age in which they will be living longer, the government will have less to offer, they each will have fewer kids to care for them and social service agencies will be swamped with demands.Indeed, a 2011 survey by the Employee Benefit Research Institute found that a "sizable percentage of workers report they have virtually no savings or investments." Among those workers polled in its retirement confidence survey, "29 percent say they have less than \$1,000. In total, more than half of workers (56 percent) report that the total value of their household's savings and investments, excluding the value of their primary home and any defined benefit plans, is less than \$25,000." That could pay for one hospital stay and recuperation in a nursing home, or dealing with just one parent with Alzheimer's. And all that's before the next president and Congress agree on a long-term fiscal rebalancing plan that will surely reduce Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security benefits. Fortunately, two-thirds of baby boomer households are expected to receive some kind of inheritance over their lifetime to cushion the blow. Also, baby boomers as a generation have been very volunteer-oriented, and we're going to need a lot of family volunteers to work with the elderly.





Twin Falls Co. Woman Tests Positive for West Nile Virus

TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls County woman in her 40s has tested positive for West Nile virus. She is the first human case of West Nile fever reported in Idaho for 2012. The woman traveled to Valley County shortly before her onset of illness, and it is unknown in which county she contracted the virus. The woman has recovered from her illness.

Since mid-July, three Idaho counties in southwest Idaho – Ada, Canyon and Payette - have reported West Nile virus activity in local mosquitoes.

"The positive mosquito pools and the state's first human infection are good warnings for people to 'fight the bite' of mosquitoes no matter where you live," says Dr. Leslie Tengelsen, Deputy State Epidemiologist. "It is very important that we all prevent mosquito bites and take protective measures, such as wearing repellent and reducing mosquito breeding habitat around our homes."

West Nile virus is usually contracted from the bite of an infected mosquito; it is not spread from person-toperson through casual contact. Symptoms of infection often include fever, headache, body aches, nausea, vomiting, and sometimes swollen lymph glands or a skin rash on the chest, stomach and back. In some cases the virus can cause severe illness, especially in people over the age of 50.

Last year, three Idahoans were reported with WNV infections. In 2006, Idaho led the nation with almost 1,000 infections, which contributed to 23 deaths.

To reduce the likelihood of infection, people are advised to avoid mosquitoes, particularly between dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active. In addition, you should:

• Apply DEET or other EPA-approved insect repellent to exposed skin and clothing. Carefully follow instructions on the product label, especially for children;

• Cover up exposed skin when outdoors;

• Insect-proof your home by repairing or replacing screens; and

• Reduce standing water on your property. Check and drain toys, trays or pots that may hold water. Change the water in bird baths and static decorative ponds weekly as they may provide a suitable mosquito breeding habitat.

West Nile virus does not usually affect domestic animals, but can cause severe illness in horses and certain species of birds. Although there is no vaccine available for people, there are several vaccines available for horses. People are advised to vaccinate their horses annually.

Paul Man Dies in Minidoka Crash

Rupert, was headed northbound on 400 West in a 2008 Dodge pickup while Stevenson was westbound on 1100 North in a Polaris Ranger RZR. According to the ISP report, Stevenson proceeded forward into the intersection as Newton also entered the intersection, despite a yield sign.

The report states Newton, who was not wearing a seatbelt, braked and swerved in an attempt to avoid the collision but was unsuccessful.

He was transported to Cassia Regional Medical Center by a private vehicle, treated and released. According to the report, it was unknown if Stevenson had on a seat belt.

Alcohol is not believed to be a factor in the crash, and it is still under investigation by ISP.

U of I Professor Helps Aid Parathletes

MOSCOW • One leg, two legs or no legs, it's all about living a normal life. Unless you're South Africa's Oscar Pistorius, a double amputee who will be the first ever amputee to compete in the Olympics on the track thanks in part to a team of researchers, including University of Idaho's Craig Mc-Gowan.

Born without fibulas or the small bones in the calf, Pistorius is looking for more than an ordinary life – he wants an extraordinary life. Despite a storm of controversy and several hurdles, he will compete for South Africa in the 400 meters and the 4 x 400 meter relay in the London Olympics.

"I've never seen anything like him. Oscar is a one-ina-million athlete, he has extraordinary ability," said Mc-Gowan, who watched Pistorius run during testing. "He is amazing. I definitely will be rooting for him."

The biological sciences assistant professor joined in the research of Pistorius' gait, energy consumption and running mechanics,

collecting data to present to the International Association of Athletics Federations to rule whether Pistorius' carbon fiber running blades had an advantage over flesh and bone. It was an intense three days of running and collecting and analyzing data.

Freed from 'Prison'

MURTAUGH • The shocked look on the kids' faces was priceless.

On his first day teaching at Murtaugh High last year, Clete Edmunson introduced himself to the class and then jokingly added that he'd been in prison the past 10 years.

Had he told them the truth, most wouldn't have believed him, anyway.

Edmunson will enter his second year this fall as Murtaugh's athletic director, varsity boys basketball coach and middle school football coach. When it comes to teaching his government, social studies and history classes, Edmunson's qualifications are more unique than your average teacher. He didn't come from prison; rather, Edmunson spent three years working as a special assistant to Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter, advising Idaho's top office on education and transportation. Prior to that, he was elected to three terms in the Idaho State Legislature as a member of the House of Representatives. Edmunson's path into politics was as straightforward as his path out of them. "I didn't get into politics to be a lifer," Edmunson said. "I went in there to make a difference, help the constituents and then let the next guy take over." Edmunson grew up in Council, where he excelled in 8-man football, basketball and track. He went to Idaho State on a football scholarship and played linebacker for the Bengals from 1984-88. After graduating from college with a business degree, he went back and earned an education degree and began teaching and coaching at New Plymouth, where he spent 12 years. During that time, Edmunson ran for the House and won.

"When you teach and coach, every hour you're with those kids, you can see that you're making a difference. That's what I love about it. It's so rewarding, and I missed that when I was in politics."

"I didn't even own a suit," Edmunson laughed.

For the duration of his three terms, Edmunson taught and coached football in the fall, and then took a leave of absence when the legislative sessions began in January.

"I'm the kind of teacher who really

Now he's back where he started — in the classroom, and on the court and field — but with a different perspective.

"In government vou make differences, but they're infinitesimal. Sometimes you feel like you can't make any headway at all because you have to go through the process... He's completed his master's thesis on the early mining history in Idaho, which he's currently working on turning into a book. When you teach and coach, every hour you're with those kids, you can see that you're making a difference. That's what I love about it. It's so rewarding, and I missed that when I was in politics. I missed being around young kids."

Swimmers Stepping Up

Franklin, Grevers, Soni picking up pace that Phelps, Lochte have failed to establish.

LONDON • Michael Phelps has yet to win a gold medal, and Ryan Lochte's star is fading. So along comes Missy Franklin, yet to start her senior year in high school, to restore American swim hopes at the Olympics.

Coming back less than 14 minutes after swimming a semifinal heat, the Colorado teenager won the first gold medal of what figures to be a dazzling career, rallying to win the 100-meter backstroke Monday.

"Indescribable," the 17year-old Franklin said. "I still can't believe that happened. I don't even know what to think. I saw my parents' reaction on the screen and I just started bawling. I can't even think right now."

Matt Grevers kept the gold medals coming in rata-tat fashion, following up Franklin's win with one of his own in the men's 100 back. For good measure, Nick Thoman made it a 1-2 finish for the red, white and blue by taking the silver.

Rebecca Soni nearly pulled out a third U.S. gold, rallying furiously on the return leg of the 100 breaststroke. But she couldn't quite catch blazing Lithuanian Ruta Meilutyte, a gold medalist at the tender age of 15.

Good thing for the U.S. that Franklin and the other Americans are coming through.

Phelps missed the podium in his 2012 Olympic debut, and Lochte has turned two straight disappointing performances after opening the games with a dominant win in the 400 individual medley. He finished fourth and off the podium Monday night in the 200 freestyle, which France's Yannick Agnel won by a full body length against a field with *Please see* **SWIMMING, S2** pushes my students to get involved," said Edmunson. an advantage," said Mc-Gowan. "We don't understand enough, and based on what we don't know, we can't exclude him without evidence. He has earned his right to compete."

In the tests, where Pistorius had to both jog for extended periods of time and run full out for several short periods, McGowan said he burned just as much oxygen and didn't generate the same force against the ground as an intact runner. While his blades' elasticity is different than muscles, he was still using as much energy to run. It's the "mechanically different" label that continues the debate.

"We ran him into the ground," said McGowan, who was up late each night to analyze data and determine what needed to be collected the next day. "We pushed him hard, but he was determined."

It's especially poignant for Pistorius. Five years ago, the IAAF ruled prosthetic blades gave an advantage for runners, and they shouldn't be allowed to compete with intact athletes.

That decision, according to McGowan and his group of researchers, had scientific flaws. Pistorius searched for a second opinion and McGowan was brought into the research process for his expertise on musculoskeletal relation-

ships and how they interact to create movement in humans and other animals.

His research has now expanded to include the study of prosthetics and the mechanical and neurological adaptation of how the neuromuscular system uses these devices.

Beyond the Olympics, McGowan's research has a wider impact. Continuing research with professional athletes who use prosthetics, McGowan's work aims to provide for a better, more natural prosthetic that could help amputees function on a level playing field. Using bilateral and unilateral amputees, Mc-Gowan can better understand the mechanics of muscle versus prosthetics.

"There is a very distinct difference between unilateral and bilateral amputee function. We can use that data to better understand how the prosthetics work," said McGowan. "We know what works, but not why."

With a growing population of amputees in the military, these advances could help people return back to duty after an amputation. McGowan has applied for a grant from the military to turn his research toward building better prosthetics that would offer more natural movement.

"It's opening doors, showing people there are no limits, they are no different" said McGowan. "Whatever you choose to do, you can return to healthy, active living."

In 1875, the 17th president of the United States, Andrew Johnson, died in Carter County, Tenn., at age 66.

In 1912, Nobel Prize-winning American economist Milton Friedman was born in Brooklyn, N.Y.

In 1919, Germany's Weimar Constitution was adopted by the republic's National Assembly.

In 1930, the radio character "The Shadow" made his debut as narrator of the "Detective Story Hour" on CBS Radio.

In 1957, the Distant Early Warning Line, a system of radar stations designed to detect Soviet bombers approaching North America, went into operation.

In 1964, the American space probe Ranger 7 reached the moon, transmitting pictures back to Earth before crashing onto the lunar surface.

In 1971, Apollo 15 crew members David Scott and James Irwin became the first astronauts to use a lunar rover on the surface of the moon.

Ten years ago: A bomb exploded inside a cafeteria at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, killing nine people, including five Americans. Pope John Paul II canonized Juan Diego, the first Indian saint in the Americas, in a Mexico City ceremony.

Five years ago: The Army censured retired three-star Lt. Gen. Philip Kensinger for a "perfect storm of mistakes, misjudgments and a failure of leadership" after the 2004 friendly-fire death in Afghanistan of Army Ranger Pat Tillman. The U.N. Security Council unanimously approved a 26,000-strong peacekeeping force for Sudan's Darfur region.

One year ago: Ending a perilous stalemate, President Barack Obama and congressional leaders announced a historic agreement on emergency legislation to avert the nation's first-ever financial default. Syrian security forces launched a ferocious assault on defiant cities and towns, killing at least 70 people and possibly many more. Yani Tseng won the Women's British Open for the second straight year, beating Brittany Lang by four strokes. Florida handed the Atlanta Braves their 10,000th loss in franchise history; with the 3-1 loss, the Braves became the second team in big league history with 10,000 losses (the Phillies reached that mark in 2007).
