\$2.2M of Pot Found in Jerome

During a flight, 1,100 marijuana plants were found in Jerome County Wednesday morning. Land owners remain cooperative.

TWIN FALLS • Jerome County Sheriff's deputies and Idaho State Police investigators uprooted about 1,100 marijuana plants in a corn field southwest of Jerome Wednesday morning, according to Jerome County Sheriff Doug

A deputy and a detective who are both certified aerial spotters, Mc-Fall and a pilot were doing a flight in a fixed-wing aircraft searching for marijuana grows when they spotted a plot at about 9 a.m. Wednesday.

"These just stuck out like a sore thumb," McFall said.

Within an hour, McFall said the group spotted 11 more plots in four pivots in the field within about a two-mile radius of each other.

Once spotted from the air, ground units were sent to the location of the plots.

Jerome County Detective Rick Cowen said each plant has a street value of \$2,000 for a total street value of \$2.2 million for all of the plants.

According to Cowen, none of the land owners were aware of the marijuana plants growing on their property and were very cooperative

in the removal of the plants.

"Basically what they'll do is take the plants and let the farmer water them and do all that stuff. Then they go back a month later and get them," Cowen said.

Video Offers Police Leads in TV Store Burglary

TWIN FALLS • Police are making progress in the theft of several bigscreen televisions from Quale's Electronics on Kimberly Road in Twin

Lt. Craig Stotts said investigators are following up on leads in the case. At about 11 p.m. Sunday officers

were dispatched to the store for a call about a burglary, Stotts said.

The store provided police with a clear and well-lit surveillance video that shows a two-tone 1970s or early 1980s Ford single cab pickup with running boards and Idaho license plates, Stotts said.

In the video, two males exit the vehicle with their faces covered before one throws a cinderblock through one of the store's windows and the other carries a piece of lumber out of the camera's frame.

"They start grabbing TVs, pulling them from the stands with the cords still attached," Stotts said.

The men re-enter the store several times and load the televisions into the back of the pickup.

Stotts said the truck was last seen going through the Pressbox Sports Bar parking lot heading west with three males inside.

Police cleared the scene just after midnight and a Quale's employee was there to keep the store secured, Stotts said.

PUBLIC FIRES RELY ON RIVATE CONTRA

TWIN FALLS • Cast a quick glance at

an active wildfire and it's not unusual to see the yellow and green uniforms of fire crews spread across the fire lines.

Fire crews may be required to wear the same colored protection gear, but not everyone is employed by the Bureau of Land Management. Many resources and crews needed to suppress flames on public lands come from private contractors.

Whether it's a dozer, a water tender or a set of fire engines, privately contracted crews are an essential part of wildfire suppression across the Magic Valley, said Sheryl Firth, one of the purchasing agents and contracting officers for the BLM.

"We have a preferred dispatch priority list that lists our (BLM) resources and the private contractors," she said. "We pull off that list. If we run out of resources, we put in an order and it's

whoever is available and closest that gets selected."

Due to the seasonal nature of wildfires, it's cheaper to contract work instead of paying staff to be employed year round, Firth explained.

Some of south-central Idaho's bigger wildfires have already required public agencies to call for help from private companies. Shoshone's Owinza wildfire relied on six engines, two dozers and three food vendors from the


How the Major Stock Indexes Fared on Wednesday

the floor, and transported it to the gym using a hand truck, police said in a statement.


Once inside the gym, the suspect opened the janitor's closet and pried the ATM open, the statement said.

Mosler Safe at the Twin Falls County Courthouse

TWIN FALLS • Just inside the Fourth Avenue entrance of the Twin Falls County Courthouse sits a Mosler "cannonball" safe, made in the early 1900s. True to its obligations, the only secret the safe reveals is that it once belonged to the Bank of Hansen.

How the safe was moved to the courthouse - and better yet, why the safe was moved to the courthouse – remains a mystery.

The Bank of Hansen was opened in 1910 by Lawrence Hansen, a prominent farmer and justice of the peace, for whom - along with his brother John – the town of Hansen was named. The bank building was located on the northwest corner of Main and Overland in Hansen, and is now

the Hansen City Hall. The bank closed its doors in 1922, during an agricultural depression that hit this valley hard after the first World War. By court order, depositors at the Bank of Hansen were paid a 15 percent dividend when the bank defaulted. Hansen had sold his interest in the bank a year and a half before the bank closed.

After the bank closed, Joe Froehlich, Sr., of Hansen, purchased the building in a Sheriff's sale. The building then became the Hansen post office.

In 1975, Gary Kaufman was a young deputy working under Twin Falls County Sheriff Paul Corder. Kaufman, who recently retired from the Idaho State Police, said that he and other deputies were cleaning out a storage room on the main floor of the courthouse when they came across a large two-story vault hidden behind a storage cabinet.

"We moved the cabinet away from the wall, and found the vault door," Kaufman said. "Luckily, the vault door opened."

Inside the vault was the Mosler safe from the Hansen bank.

Kaufman said he was told by his boss that the safe had been taken during a bank robbery, and was later dumped by the thieves. It was hauled to the courthouse as evidence, where it has remained ever since.

No robbery of the Bank of Hansen showed up in a recent search of local newspaper archives, however.

The safe was brought out of hiding when the main floor of the courthouse was remodeled in the 1990s. As far as anyone knows, the safe has not been opened in 85 years.

The Twin Falls County Commissioners have joked about donating the safe to the county museum, but "I don't know how we'd get it out there," said Commissioner George Urie.

"I'd like to know how they got it to the courthouse in the first place," Urie said.

The safe, which stands only four feet tall and weighs no less than one ton, will probably remain where it stands for some time to come.

Fourth T.F. Spice Suspect to Be Released

POCATELLO • Prosecutors for the federal government withdrew their motion to detain Joshua Cserepes in jail Wednesday until trial for a charge of conspiracy to distribute a controlled substance analogue.

Cserepes, 26, will be released after electronic monitoring is in place, according to minutes from a hearing in Pocatello.

Cserepes' co-defendants in the case, Allen, Stephanie and Gary Nagel, were released following the arraignment of all four suspects Friday.

While the Nagels all have fairly clear criminal histories, prosecutors said Cserepes had several felonies on his record and was also sentenced recently to one year of probation and 90 days' suspended jail time after pleading guilty to misdemeanor using or possessing drug paraphernalia.

A federal indictment filed July 24 accuses the four along with an Oregon man of conspiring to distribute synthetic forms of marijuana, known as "spice" and other names.

As a condition of their release, Stephanie and Allen Nagel were ordered not to discuss the prosecution against them and were ordered not to sell any tobacco or smoking-related items of any kind - including for storage or cigarette cases.

The judge ordered Gary Nagel can have contact with Stephanie and Allen if it is pre-approved by pretrial services, solely for the purpose of a family gathering. All co-defendants pleaded not

guilty and their trial is now set for Sept. 17 in Pocatello with Chief U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill presiding. If convicted, the defendants face

up to 20 years in prison, a \$100,000 fine and a minimum three years of supervised release.

Blaine County Judge Dismisses School District Racketeering Claim

HAILEY • Earlier this week, a Blaine County 5th District Court judge dismissed a school district

claim against an energy service company. During a Monday hearing, Judge Robert Elgee dismissed the Blaine County School District's claim that Seattle-based

company McKinstry Essention Inc. engaged in racketeering. But the legal dispute between the district and the

company continues. The Blaine County School District's two other claims against McKinstry Essention - alleged fraud and violation of the Idaho Consumer Protection Act remain in litigation.

Heather Crocker, spokeswoman for the Blaine County School District, said she doesn't have a timetable for when the issues will be resolved.

In May, the school district and energy service company filed civil complaints against each other.

The dispute is over the amount McKinstry Essention will be paid for a multimillion-dollar project to update heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems in eight school district buildings.

Paul Zasada, Inland Northwest regional director for McKinstry Essention, wrote in a statement that the dispute hasn't slowed the company's work on the project in any way that could affect students or school employees.

Blaine County school trustees awarded a contract to the company in 2010 for school energy projects. The majority of the work is done.

In addition to upgrading HVAC systems, the project also included drilling new wells at a few schools and installing ground-source heat pumps. Some school boilers that were about 40 years old were also replaced.

Crocker said the contract for the long-term project includes a guaranteed maximum price of \$15.1 million.

About \$5 million of the funding comes from a federal energy grant. The rest is from a 10-year, \$58.9 million plant facilities levy voters approved in October

Other competitors many given red ribbons were told never to stand between the judge and their hog or to make better eye contact with the judge next time.

"I tend to be pretty blunt in my reasons for placement," DeWinkle said to the crowd during judging. "They won't get any better if I'm not honest with them."

DeWinkle said he's been judging swine since 2001 and showed hogs as a young man.

At many fairs, showmanship has taken a back seat in importance, he said, but it's an important aspect of showing a livestock project.

How well a participant shows an animal can really tell the judge what they've learned, DeWinkle said. DeWinkle pulled many aside asking questions to test their depth of swine knowledge.

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T.F. Animal Shelter Overwhelmed with Cats Needing Good Homes

TWIN FALLS • Debbie Blackwood is looking for a few good parents. For cats, that is.

The Twin Falls Animal Shelter director was hit by a double whammy this summer: Fewer people than usual are adopting felines while a larger than normal number of cats are being brought to the shelter.

"It's killing us;" said Blackwood, who estimates they get 30 to 60 cats every week.

Things got so bad last week that she sent eight cats and eight dogs to a Colorado shelter run by a friend because of inadequate space. Those animals left Friday and the Twin Falls shelter

was filled again by Monday morning.

To encourage people to adopt cats, Blackwood is offering a cut-rate price of \$20 plus tax for cats 1 year of age and older. The normal adult cat adoption fee is \$50 plus tax.

"We're doing this because of the unusual lull in finding homes," she said.

Every cat that is adopted has been spayed or neutered, and has had vaccinations for upper respiratory disease and worms.

Although the facility at 420 Victory Ave. occasionally must euthanize some animals, its adoption rate has soared in recent years. From a 2 percent success rate in the late '80s, the shelter now places 75 to 85 percent of the animals it receives. More than 4,000 animals come

through the doors each year, Blackwood said.

Fundraising is a constant activity to pay for pet advertising along with medical services for homeless dogs and cats that arrive with ear mites, colds, injured paws or other problems. The shelter spends about \$80,000 annually on medical care.

Blackwood said they receive some funding from the city of Twin Falls and Twin Falls County, but that amount hasn't increased in recent years as the area's population - and therefore its animal population - has grown. Staying afloat financially is a continual concern.

"It's always on the back of my mind," Blackwood said. "When we're not doing what we do, I'm worried about

Meanwhile, spaying and neutering is the long-term solution to the overpopulation of dogs and cats, the shelter director emphasized. She said one pair of cats can be responsible for starting a chain that will produce 13 million cats in nine years.

"That's the lowball figure," Blackwood said.



In the Company of Madison

ed Cruz's victory in Tuesday's Texas Republican runoff for the U.S. Senate nomination is the most impressive triumph yet for the still-strengthening tea party impulse. And Cruz's victory coincides with something conservatives should celebrate, the centennial of the 20th century's most important intra-party struggle. By preventing former President Theodore Roosevelt from capturing the 1912 Republican presidential nomination from President William Howard Taft, the GOP deliberately doomed its chances for holding the presidency but kept its commitment to the Constitution.

Before Cruz, now 41, earned a Harvard law degree magna cum laude, he wrote his Princeton senior thesis on the Constitution's Ninth and 10th Amendments, which if taken seriously would revitalize two bulwarks of liberty — the ideas that the federal government's powers are limited because they are enumerated, and that the enumeration of certain rights does not "deny or disparage others retained by the people." Both ideas are repudiated by today's progressives, as they were by TR, whose Bull Moose Party, the result of his bolt from the GOP, convened in Chicago 100 years ago Sunday Aug. 5, 1912.

After leaving the presidency in 1909, TR went haywire. He had always chafed under constitutional restraints, but he had remained a Hamiltonian, construing the Constitution expansively but respectfully. By 1912, however, he had become what the Democratic nominee, Woodrow Wilson, was - an anti-Madisonian. Both thought the Constitution - the enumeration and separation of powers - intolerably crippled government.

Espousing unconstrained majoritarianism, TR disdained Madison's belief that the ultimate danger is wherever ultimate power resides, which in a democracy is with the majority. He endorsed the recall of state judicial decisions and by September 1912 favored the power to recall all public officials, including the presi-

dent. TR's anti-constitutional excesses moved two political heroes to subordinate personal affection to the public interest. New York Sen. Elihu Root had served TR as secretary of war and secretary of state, and was Roosevelt's first choice to succeed him in 1908. Massachusetts Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge had long been one of TR's closest friends. Both sided with Taft.

As the Hudson Institute's William Schambra says (in "The Saviors of the Constitution," National Affairs, Winter 2012, and elsewhere), by their "lonely, principled" stand, Root and Lodge, along with Taft, "denied TR the powerful electoral machinery of the Republican Party, which would almost surely have elected him, and then been turned to securing sweeping alterations" of the Constitution. Wilson won with 41.8 percent of the vote (to TR's 27.4 percent). Taft won 23.2 percent, carrying only Vermont and Utah, but achieved something far grander than a second term - the preservation of the GOP as an intellectual counterbalance to the Democrats' thorough embrace of progressivism and the "living" - actually, disap-

Today, many of the tea party's academic despisers portray it as anti-democratic and anti-intellectual. Actually, it stands, as the forgotten heroes of 1912 did, with Madison, the most intellectually formidable Founder. He created, and the tea party defends, a constitutional architecture that does not thwart democracy but refines it, on the fact that in a republic which is defined by the principle of representation, the people do not directly decide issues, they decide who will decide. And the things representatives are permitted to decide are strictly circumscribed by constitutional limits on federal power.

pearing — Constitution.

TR sought to make these limits few — and as flimsy as cobwebs when the people chose to amend them by plebiscitary methods. The New Republic, then a voice of progressivism, ridiculed Root for being "committed to the theory of government, based upon natural rights" - the Declaration of Independence's theory of pre-political rights. Schambra, however, argues that for Root and Lodge, as for today's tea party, the rights proclaimed in the Declaration and the restrictions the Constitution imposes on government are inseparably linked, as Root said, to "the end that individual liberty might be preserved."

The GOP's defeat in 1912

— like that in 1964 under Barry Goldwater, whose spirit infuses the tea party was profoundly constructive. By rejecting TR, it preserved the Constitution from capricious majorities. When Cruz comes to the Senate, he and like-minded Republicans - Utah's Mike Lee, Kentucky's Rand Paul, South Carolina's Jim DeMint, Wisconsin's Ron Johnson, Pennsylvania's Pat Toomey, Florida's Marco Rubio, and, if they win, Indiana's Richard Mourdock, Arizona's Jeff Flake and perhaps some others — can honor two exemplary senatorial predecessors by forming the small but distinguished Root-Lodge Caucus.

My purpose and passion give me the vision to keep from getting lost. I have to know what I want before I can go after it. My reason for being lights up my pathway for life.



West Nile Mosquitoes Found in More **Counties**

BOISE (AP) • Gem County in southwestern Idaho is the latest place in the state to report mosquitoes that tested positive for carrying the West Nile virus.

Tuesday's announcement from public health department officials follows a report that a Twin Falls woman contracted the potentially dangerous

That woman, in her 40s, has recovered. She was the first human case reported this year.

Officials aren't sure where she contracted the

with Gem Along County, West Nile-carrying mosquitoes have been documented in Ada, Canyon and Payette counties this year.

Idaho led the nation in West Nile cases in 2006, with 1,000 infections reported and 23 deaths. Last year, there were three reported cases in humans, and no deaths.

The illness is of particular concern to older people or those with weakened immune systems.

No Charges against Owyhee County Sheriff

BOISE (AP) • The Idaho Attorney General's Office says there isn't enough evidence to bring any charges against an embattled southern Idaho

Boise television station KTVB reports that a nearly 700-page report from the Attorney General's office details the agency's investigation into Owyhee County Sher-Daryl Crandall. Owyhee County Prosecutor Doug Emery asked the state agency to investigate complaints against the sheriff in 2011.

The report details more than a dozen allegations, including claims that Crandall created a hostile workplace and retaliated against employees.

But the state investigators found there was insufficient evidence to support criminal charges against Crandall or anyone else in the sheriff's

Crandall didn't immediately return a phone call from The Associated Press requesting comment.

Crandall's years in office were tumultuous. Since being elected in 2008, he's faced a failed recall attempt, county commissioners called for his resignation, and former employees filed lawsuits alleging they were wrongfully fired. Some of those lawsuits were dismissed; others have reached settlements.

County officials told KTVB that a roughly \$10,000 settlement was negotiated in May with a former deputy claiming unpaid wages.

Tribe Debates Tourism Developments

WOUNDED KNEE, S.D. •

The Oglala Sioux Tribe occupies a seemingly prime piece of South Dakota – a vast, scenic reservation that stands near a crossroads for tourists visiting Mount Rushmore, the Badlands, the historic Old West town of Deadwood and other popular sites.

But don't look for museums, hotels, restaurants or even many bathrooms here on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, because the Lakota make little effort to attract visitors or tourism dollars, despite the fact that they are one of the nation's poorest tribes.

A generation after many other American Indians sought to harness their history for profit, the Oglala Sioux are still debating how much culture they are willing to share.

"When you take a community of people where at one point our language was outlawed and parts of our culture were outlawed, it's hard for us to, I guess, open up to the idea of sharing that in a way to make money off of it," said Nick Tilsen, executive director of Thunder Valley, a nonprofit on Pine Ridge set up to keep traditional Lakota culture alive among young people.

Tourism is big business for some of the country's best-known Indian tribes, which reap a fortune from casinos and other business ventures.

The Navajo Nation in the Southwest welcomed some 600,000 visitors who spent \$113 million last year. In Oklahoma, nearly 45,000 people visited the Cherokee Nation's Heritage Center

But the Oglala Sioux stand apart in southwestern South Dakota. They have just one tribally run casino-and-hotel complex, the Prairie Wind, on the western side of the reservation and recently opened a smaller casino in Martin, a town near the reservation's eastern edge.

The tribe, Tilsen said, is not "totally against" development. "I think we're at the stage of, 'What parts do we want to protect and what parts are we willing to share and what does that look like?""

Arizona's **Luke Air** Force Base Gets F-35 Mission

GLENDALE, Ariz. (AP) • The Department of Defense chose Luke Air Force Base in Glendale for the new pilot training center for the F-35 fighter jets, city officials announced Wednesday.

The 71-year-old base in Glendale was competing with bases in Tucson, New Mexico and Idaho for the F-35 mission.

"This is a great day for Luke," said Brig. Gen. JD Harris, 56th Fighter Wing commander at Luke. "Our selection for F-35 training ensures the long-term viability of our mission of training the world's greatest fighter pilots, which we've been doing at Luke for seven

Air Force officials said in a statement that Luke was chosen because of facility and ramp capacity, range access, weather, as well as capacity for future growth.

The Air Force spent much of the past two years studying the F-35's potential impact on the surrounding communities, from noise to pollution.

Arizona leaders lobbied for the F-35s to ensure Luke's economic vitality with a strong mission as the F-16s used for training have been drawn

Glendale officials said the Air Force will station 72 F-35s at Luke for the training of both U.S. and foreign pilots.

Interesting Finds Highlight New Basque Block Dig

BOISE (AP) • The Cyrus Jacobs/Uberuaga House has revealed many treasures through the years: marbles, silverware, shoes, tobacco

A new excavation began at the site Tuesday and promises to reveal even more about domestic life in Boise's earliest days. A University of Idaho archaeological team will spend the next two weeks digging out an old well found at the east side of the house.

What's remarkable about the dig is that no one knew the well was there until May, said Patty Miller, executive director at the Basque Museum and Cultural Center.

The museum staffers, historians and others were so excited about the discovery that they pulled together an excavation in less than two months, Miller said. Archaeological crews will

remove dirt from around the well, hoping to uncover items lost or thrown away by people nearly 150 years ago. The house and well were built in 1864. For context, that's one year after the city of Boise was platted and one year before the Civil War ended. Only a couple of hours into

the dig on Tuesday - just "skimming the surface" of the area in the most literal sense - the excavators had found two shell buttons, a rust-red tin of Prince Albert Tobacco, a shard of porcelain with a dainty pink flower design, canning lids with white glass tops intact, assorted bones and bottle caps, a porcelain doll head and more.

One of the key things about this type of domestic dig, Mark Warner said, is that it tells the story of everyday life through items that are often lost because no one considers them notable at the time.

sors at the University of Idaho, are leading the work.

"You might write in a diary, keeping track of

thoughts and emotions, but you don't write about getting up and eating peanut butter and jelly or that you bought a good bottle of wine," Warner said.

But those empty jars, bottles and other "trash" reveal much about everyday life – what people ate, drank, collected and smoked. Broken medicine bottles reveal their ailments. Shards of expensive wallpaper reveal their aspirations.

"Archaeologists have done work at hundreds of African-American sites and hundreds of Chinese-American sites," said Warner. "But as far as we can tell, there's been little archaeological work done in the Basque-occupied areas in the U.S."

The project will give the public the chance to see urban archaeology in action. The site will be open during the dig, with an observation area. About a dozen people visited Tuesday morning.





Federal Appeals Court Blocks Arizona's 20-week Abortion Ban

PHOENIX (AP) • A federal appeals court on Wednesday temporarily prohibited Arizona from enforcing its new ban on most abortions starting at 20 weeks of pregnancy.

A three-judge panel of the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals issued its order two days after a trial judge ruled that the ban could take effect

the ban on hold until a pending appeal is decided, which will take at least several months. It said in a brief order that it will hold a hearing as soon as possible this fall after receiving legal briefs due in September and October.

Abortion-rights groups appealed U.S. District Judge James Teilborg's ruling that the ban is constitutional, partly because of concerns to survive outside the womb. That's generally considered to be about 24 weeks. Normal pregnancies run about 40 weeks.

Arizona currently bans abortions at viability.

Teilborg ruled that Arizona's law is only a permitted regulation, not an actual

Budget-and-tax Impasse Threatens Troops, Economy

WASHINGTON • With the government heading toward a year-end "fiscal cliff," House Republicans approved a full plate of Bush-era tax cuts Wednesday that they said could help shore up a still-frail national economy. At the same time, the Obama administration warned that threatened budget cuts could send some of America's troops into battle with less training.

For all the action and talk, however, both taxes and spending were deeply enmeshed in campaign politics, with no resolution expected until after the elections.

Democrats are demanding that any compromise to avoid the \$110 billion in budget cuts scheduled to kick in Jan. 2 include a tax increase on high-income earners. Republicans reject the idea of raising rates on anyone as the economy struggles to recover fully from recession.

"There are five months remaining for Congress to act," acting White House Budget Director Jeff Zients told the House Armed Services Committee. "What is holding us up right now is the Republican refusal to have the top 2 percent pay their

Deputy Defense Secretary Ashton Carter told the committee that if Congress fails to come up with a compromise, nearly all elements of the military

will be affected by cuts mandated by last year's deficit deal. Training would be scaled back and flying hours for Air Force pilots would be reduced. The Navy would buy fewer ships and the Air Force fewer aircraft.

"Some later-deploying units (including some deploying to Afghanistan) could receive less training, especially in the Army and Marine Corps," Carter said. "Under some circumstances, this reduced training could impact their ability to respond to a new contingency, should one occur." Military personnel would be exempt from job cuts, but furloughs might be issued and commissary hours reduced, he said.

TEDDY BEARS DROP IN

... And Two Belarus Generals Drop Out

MINSK, Belarus • It's probably the first time in history that teddy bears have defeated

Belarus' authoritarian President Alexander Lukashenko has sacked two of the nation's top defense officials after two Swedish advertising agency employees piloted a light plane into the country's heavily guarded airspace, dropping 879 teddy bears decked out in parachutes and slogans supporting human rights.

Officials in the ex-Soviet state denied the July 4 incident until Lukashenko called a meeting last week to scold authorities for allowing such a "provocation."

The Belarusian ruler nicknamed "Europe's last dictator" on Tuesday fired the nation's air defense chief and the head of the Border Guards service and reprimanded several other top security officials, his office said

Thomas Mazetti and Hannah Frey, the two Swedes behind the stunt, said they wanted to show support for Belarusian human rights activists and embarrass the country's military, a pillar of Lukashenko's power.

"Hopefully, we've made people more aware in the world and that there will be more people supporting Belarusian people," Frey said.

The Swedes' yearlong preparations involved learning how to pilot the three-seater Jodel aircraft and purchasing the plane. They financed the \$184,500 cost of the stunt with their work in a small advertising agency.

The pair said they were inspired by similar protests staged by Belarusian activists, who have at times arranged plush toys in such a way that they appeared to be protesting the

"Our campaign was a campaign in support of that. An airlift in support of the teddy bears, from teddy bears around the world," Mazetti said.

The flight began and ended at the Pociunai airfield in southern Lithuania. Thunderstorms that day may have made it harder for Belarus to scramble aircraft to intercept their plane, said Mazetti, though he acknowledged they risked being shot down.

"We flew an airplane at 50 meters, that's 150 feet, for one and a half hours inside Belarus. Of course we were aware of the risks. But it was a calculated risk and we thought we needed to take that risk ourselves — we couldn't hire anyone," he told The Associated Press during

NRA Enabled Bullets-by-Mail Used by Suspect

The man accused of the Colorado movie-theater shooting amassed his ammunition stockpile with help from a 26-year-old law the National Rifle Association hailed at the time as its "greatest legislative milestone."

The 1986 measure made two dozen changes to gun regulations, including lifting a ban on interstate sales of ammunition to consumers, allowing mail-order purchases and, eventually, Internet sales. The law, called the Firearms Owners' Protection Act, also allowed dealers to sell weapons at gun shows and made it easier to cross state lines with firearms.

Passage of the act, and the failure of gun-control advocates to repeal it in the decades since, illustrates the power of the NRA-led gun-rights movement over national firearms policy. The Colorado mass shooting, in which police say the suspect purchased 6,000 rounds of ammunition on the Internet, has prompted calls for legislation to limit mail-order sales.

"It's time to stop, take stock, hold hearings and expose the issues," said former Rep. James Oberstar, D-Minn., who backed the gun legislation in 1986 and now says allowing mail-order sales may have been a mistake. "Internet sales should at least be subject to the same background checks and scrutiny that is given to gun purchases."

Supporters and opponents of gun control are debating whether restrictions on Internet sales could have prevented the July 20 shooting in Aurora, Colo., in which James Holmes, 24, is accused of opening fire during the new Batman movie. Twelve people died and at least 58 were injured in the attack.

Limits on Internet ammunition sales could have bought time for someone to raise suspicion over Holmes's purchases, Oberstar said.

Former Sen. Bill Armstrong, R-Colo., who said he voted for final passage of the 1986 legislation, called suggestions that restrictions on ammunition could have prevented the shooting "shoveling a lot of smoke."

"What happened in Aurora is shocking, it's just terrible," said Armstrong, now president of Colorado Christian University. "But that doesn't mean we ought to ban guns or ban movie theaters or ban all Internet sales."

Aging U.S. Power Grid on Overload

They began to bend in the roaring wind, then their steel girders snapped like twigs, the towers toppled and the lights went out.

Minutes before the windstorm arrived to pummel the Washington area on June 29, it swept east through West Virginia, crushing three electrical transmission towers that are a tiny part of an intricate power grid that's supposed to keep the lights on in America.

The term "grid" suggests a certain uniformity to the power system's structure, but the network more closely resembles a patchwork quilt

Rising income inequality

has led to an increasing number of Americans clustering in neighborhoods in which most residents are like them, either similarly affluent or similarly lowincome, according to a new study detailing the rising isolation of the richest and the poorest.

report released Wednesday by the Pew Research Center said the percentage of upper-income households situated in affluent neighborhoods doubled between 1980 and 2010, rising to 18 percent. In the same time frame, the share of lower-income households located in mostly poorer neighborhoods rose from 18 percent to 23 percent. Neighborhoods that are predominantly middle class or home to a wider mix of income levels shrank. "The country has in-

creasingly sorted itself into areas where people are surrounded by more of their own kind, if you will," said Paul Taylor, the Pew Center director and co-author of the report, adding that the majority of neighborhoods in the country are still mostly middle class or mixed.

Indian Businesses Weather Blackouts

GHAZIABAD, India • Work making potato chip display racks at Jayraj Kumar's factory barely paused when much of

India's power grid collapsed. The backup generators kicked in automatically and the electric saws, presses and welding machines kept running, just like they do during the five-hour power cuts the factory in suburban Delhi suffers nearly every day.

India's unreliable power system has forced businesses to create a workaround electricity system of noisy, dirty diesel generators that prepared them well when the world's worst blackout hit the country Tuesday.

But the trouble has also vastly increased businesses's expenses, dragged down their productivity and hampered economic growth in the country.

"Running a factory is very tough here," Kumar said.

Power Minister Veerappa Moily said Wednesday the government would not allow a recurrence of the massive power outages. On Monday, 370 million people lost power for hours when the northern

grid collapsed. On Tuesday, 620 million had no electricity after the grid collapsed again, dragging down two neighboring grids.

Moily said an investigation had begun and while he said he didn't want to cast blame yet, he cautioned states not to take more than their allotted

"If they overdraw, this is the result. They can see for themselves. The entire grid will go black," he said.

The government needed to investigate ways to resolve the disparity between supply and demand, perhaps with congestion pricing, plugging leaks in the distribution system and bringing more power plants on line, he said.

Hundreds of millions of Indians have no access to electricity anyway. Many who do were insulated from the blackouts' effect by the coping systems they use to handle the smaller power cuts that are routine across the country.

The private Max Hospital in New Delhi said its generators were set up to fully power the facility. "The electrical system is so designed that patients do not feel even a flicker of power disruption at any point of time," the hospital said in a statement.

Microtek, an Indian company that specializes in selling power backup inverters, claims to have 100 million "satisfied customers."

"Every year in the summer months demand peaks and there are power failures, so most middle-class families purchase an inverter. That's why we're in business," said Manoj Jain, vice president at Microtek.

According to World Bank statistics, India lost 6.6 percent of sales due to power outages in 2006, the last year statistics were available. By contrast China's losses were 1.3 percent in 2003, the latest data available.

Kumar, 56, started his business turning metal wire into display racks 23 years ago with just three employees.

Now his company, The Rhino, runs a factory of 200 workers that churns out 1,500 red racks a day for clients from PepsiCo to Nestle that are ubiquitous in markets across India.

When the company opened its new factory in this Delhi suburb three years ago, "we knew that power would be a problem," he said.

India's blackout was a power generation problem: It is saddled with aging coal power plants and facing resistance to new nuclear plants. This week, several plants closed suddenly and the lights went out. Although the United States will need more power plants to meet the demands of a growing population, the most immediate threat is that the delivery system will continue to fail.

The huge steel towers whose power cables crisscross the country - and thetransmission stations they feed — are the pipes of that system. It's not easy to store electricity for very long, and most of it is used within a second of being produced. At the push of a button, the grid routes power where it's needed, from state to state or region to region. It is supposed to sidestep bottlenecks or hiccups that might slow the flow.

Towers are designed to withstand winds stronger than the almost 70 mph blasts that struck Ritchie County, W.Va. But three towers in a row running parallel to Route 50 north of Ellenboro collapsed, early victims of a storm that would devastate power delivery throughout the Mid-Atlantic.

"A fourth tower didn't come down but had to be removed because it was pulled off kilter," said Todd Meyers, spokesman for FirstEnergy, a power company that supplies electricity to five states, including Maryland. "I don't remember a time when this many came down. This is an unusual occurrence."

Authorities in Belarus have also arrested a journalism student who posted teddy bear photos on his personal website and a real estate agent who offered an apartment to the Swedes. The two men were accused of assisting border violators and face up to seven years in prison if convicted.

Lukashenko has ruled Belarus, a nation of 10 million, since 1994, stifling dissent and independent media. He also has boasted about the capabilities of a joint air defense system that Belarus has formed with Russia, saying it provides a reliable shield against purported threats from NATO.

Valery Karbalevich, an independent Minsk-based political analyst, said purging the generals might be a way to save face in front of Moscow. The Kremlin may use the incident to try to put a Russian general in charge of the joint air defense system, he

"It looks like Moscow is cranking up pressure and demanding an answer as to why the much-acclaimed air defense system is riddled with holes," Karbalevich said.

Anatoly Lebedko, the head of Belarus' opposition United Civil Party, warned that Lukashenko may use the incident to crack down on dissidents in the run-up to a parliamentary election next month.

In May 1987, another amateur pilot, Matthias Rust from Germany, made a similarly dashing flight into the closelyguarded Soviet airspace, landing his light Cessna plane next to the Kremlin. Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev responded by firing the defense minister and many other representatives of the top military brass.

Later, Republicans moved to renew the Bush tax cuts for every working American. The cuts will otherwise expire Dec. 31, part of a combination of effects along with major spending cuts that have been characterized as a "fiscal cliff" for the economy. The bill passed by a 256-171 vote. Nineteen Democrats joined with Republicans; retiring Rep. Timothy Johnson of Illinois was the sole Republican to break with his

President Barack Obama, in a written statement late Wednesday, said House Republicans voted to "shower millionaires and billionaires with a \$1 trillion tax cut that will inevitably be paid for by gutting investments in critical programs needed to create jobs and strengthen the economy."

There is no expectation that the Democratic-led Senate will even consider the House measure, at least before the elections.

Democrats in the House countered with a plan backed by Obama to extend the tax cuts for all but the highest-earning Americans. Their plan would raise the



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marginal top tax rate on incomes over \$200,000 for individuals and \$250,000 for couples from 35 percent to 39.6 percent. It failed, 257-170, with 19 Democrats breaking with Obama.

The dueling votes were more about political messaging three months before the election than a genuine attempt to resolve longstanding differences that threaten to sock every taxpayer in the country with a

tax increase if the deadlock isn't broken in a postelection lame duck session. Democrats said Republicans were holding the middle class hostage by insisting on renewing tax cuts for that go to

the top 2 percent of earners. "Let's extend these tax cuts we agree on and then debate what we don't agree on," said No. 2 House Democrat Steny Hoyer of Maryland.

The Bush tax cuts were re-

newed in their entirety with the support of Obama and many Democrats two years ago as part of a bargain in which Obama also won a Social Security payroll tax cut and an extension of unemployment benefits.

Now, the White House promises Obama will veto the extension if it includes the highest earners. Obama instead supports a plan that passed the Democratic-controlled Senate last week.

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Cancer Debate: **Are Tumors Fueled** by Stem Cells?

NEW YORK • How can a cancer come back after it's apparently been eradicated? Three new studies are bolstering a long-debated idea: that tumors contain their own pool of stem cells that can multiply and keep fueling the cancer, seeding regrowth.

If that's true, scientists will need to find a way to kill those cells, apart from how they attack the rest of the tumor.

Stem cells in healthy tissues are known for their ability to produce any kind of cell. The new research deals with a different kind, cancer stem cells. Some researchers, but not all, believe they lurk as a persisting feature in tumors.

Over the past decade, studies have found evidence for them in tumors like breast and colon cancers. But this research has largely depended on transplanting human cancer cells into mice that don't have immune systems, an artificial environment that raises questions about the relevance of the results.

Now, three studies reported online Wednesday in the journals Nature and Science present evidence for cancer stem cells within the original tumors. Again, the research relies on mice. That and other factors mean the new findings still won't convince everyone that cancer stem cells are key to finding more powerful treatments.

But researcher Luis Parada, of the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas, believes his team is onto something. He says

that for the type of brain tumor his team studied, "we've identified the true enemy."

If his finding applies to other cancers, he said, then even if chemotherapy drastically shrinks a tumor but doesn't affect its supply of cancer stem cells, "very little progress has actually been made!"

The three studies used labeling techniques to trace the ancestry of cells within mouse tumors.

Collectively, they give "very strong support" to the cancer stem cell theory, said Jeffrey M. Rosen, a professor of molecular and cellular biology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. He did not participate in the work but supports the theory, which he said is widely accepted.

Another scientist who's skeptical about the theory, and said he has plenty of company, said the new papers did not change his mind.

Parada's team worked with mice genetically primed to develop a certain type of brain tumor. The scientists genetically labeled particular cells in the tumor and then attacked the cancer with the same drug given to human patients. It kills growing tumor cells and temporarily stops the cancer's growth.

After treatment, when the tumor started growing again in the mice, the researchers showed that the vast majority, if not all, of its new cells had descended from the labeled cells. Apparently these were the tumor's cancer stem cells, they concluded.

Fed: U.S. Growth Slows

WASHINGTON • The Federal Reserve said Wednesday the U.S. economy is losing strength and repeated a pledge to try to boost growth if hiring remains weak.

The Fed took no new action after a two-day policy meeting. But it appeared to signal in a statement released after the meeting a growing inclination to take further steps to lift the economy out of its funk. The Fed noted growth had slowed over the first half of the year, with job creation slackening and consumer spending tapering off.

The Fed reiterated its plan to hold its benchmark shortterm interest rate at a record low near zero until at least

late 2014. Market reaction to the Fed's announcement was muted. Stocks fluctuated slightly after the statement was released and ended the day lower.

The statement was slightly different than the one issued after the Fed's last meeting, June 19 and 20.

In addition to noting that the economy had "decelerated," the Fed's policymaking committee said it would "closely monitor incoming information" and "will provide additional accommodation as needed" to stimulate the economy and job creation. In the June statement the central bank said "the

economy has been expanding moderately" and that it "is prepared to take further action as appropriate."

Many economists believe the Fed could launch another program of buying government bonds and mortgagebacked securities at its September meeting if the economy doesn't show improvement. The goal of the program, known as quantitative easing, would be to drive long-term rates, which are already at record lows, even

lower. The Fed's next move could depend on whether the European Central Bank, which meets today, takes any action to stimulate growth among the 17 countries that use the euro.

The next big signal on the U.S. economy's health comes Friday, when the U.S. Labor Department reports on July hiring and unemployment trends.

Economists forecast that U.S. employers added 100,000 jobs in July. That would be slightly better than the 75,000 a month average from April through June but still below the healthy 226,000 average in the first three months of the year. The unemployment rate is expected to stay at 8.2 percent.

Economists will also be watching Fed Chairman Ben Bernanke's words closely when he speaks on Aug. 31 at an annual economic conference in Jackson Hole, Wyo.

Deaths Spur French Gov't to Pay for Shark Hunt

PARIS • French fishermen will be on the hunt for a vulnerable shark species off the coast of the French Indian Ocean island of Reunion soon — and will pocket government cash for their kills after a dramatic rise in deadly attacks pushed Paris to take unprecedented

Financial incentives will come into force as early as next week - and it's provoked an outcry from animal rights groups, who call it a legalized "extermination."

measures.

The sharks to be targeted are bull sharks, a large and aggressive species common in the Indian Ocean which is widely believed to be behind several recent attacks on people.

The International Union for Conservation of Nature, a leading conservation group that produces the world's main list of endangered species, the so-called Red List, designates the bull shark as "near threatened," meaning it could face the threat of extinction in the near future.

From 2000 to 2010, there were no shark attacks off Reunion and no calls for culling, but the past two years have seen several deadly attacks, the most recent coming last week when a 22vear-old surfer died after a shark bit off his leg. It was the seventh attack — and the third fatality - since the start of last year.

The attacks have frightened many local residents into staying on dry land.

"A couple of weeks ago, I allowed my son to go swimming," said 49-year-old Philippe Nanpon, who by telephone spoke Wednesday from Saint-Paul, a district that has seen fatalities. "But now I won't let him in. Until it's over, it's not safe?

It's not yet clear how much a fisherman can earn from killing sharks, and the Paris government says it will give leeway to local authorities and fishermen in setting prices.

Thierry Robert, a lawmaker from and the mayor of Saint-Leu, a district where an alarming number of bull sharks have been spotted in recent months, initially offered fishermen \$2.46 per 2.2 pounds of dead shark. But a spokesman for the French Overseas Ministry, Olivier Nicolas, said this sum was too little.

"It's not enough as an incentive for the catching, so the state will contribute and remunerate the catchers," Nicolas said.

Although shark fishing is legal in most areas to the west of the island, bull sharks have typically not been hunted because their flesh contains a toxin and

"The government is in favor of an extermination, pure and simple," said Christophe Marie, spokesman for the Brigitte Bardot Foundation. "The sea belongs first to marine life. We can't condemn sharks to death just to please surfers. It's ridiculous."

Adviser to Puerto Rico Under Fire for Obama Tweet

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico • An adviser to Puerto Rico's most powerful female lawmaker faced calls to resign on Tuesday after she sent a tweet to President Barack Obama urging him to buy the first lady a double-banana sundae and take her

Heidi Wys sent the tweet last week shortly after Obama tweeted that Michelle Obama's birthday was coming up.

"Who cares?" Wys wrote in response. "Take her to Burger King, buy her a sundae with double banana, take her to your homeland, Kenya!"

That tweet and several other tweets Wys sent earlier about Obama were still publicly visible on her Twitter account Wednesday afternoon.

Wys is the main adviser to House of Representatives President Jenniffer Gonzaand has earned \$630,000 since 2008 for her services as an administrative consultant, according to records with the Comptroller's Office.

Several legislators are demanding Wys step down or that Gonzalez ask for her resignation.

"How is it that Puerto Rico'does it better' if the government pays an employee who is discriminating against the president of the United States?" said Senator Juan Eugenio Hernandez, alluding to Puerto Rico's tourism slogan.

"It is a racist comment from a person who must have great hatred within," he said. "This is placing the name of Puerto Ricans across the world in a very precarious situation."

Overall, Obama is popular in Puerto Rico, where he traveled to last year in a rare visit by a U.S. president. Residents of the U.S. territory cannot participate in the general presidential elections but they can vote in the primaries. Puerto Rico has a representative in the House, called a resident commissioner, who has limited voting power. The island has no representation in the Senate.

Gonzalez's spokeswoman, Marieli Padro, said neither Wys nor Gonzalez were available for interviews. Padro declined to say whether Wys would keep her position.

Gonzalez sought to distance herself from Wys in a statement, saying it is impossible for her to monitor the social media accounts of all those who work for the House of Representatives.

"The expressions disseminated are not acceptable, do not represent my sentiments and are the exclusive responsibility of those who wrote them," Gonzalez said. She also urged all employees to be more cognizant of what they write and to respect the rights

It is not the first time Wys has sent tweets about Obama.

In response to a July 30 tweet by a Puerto Rico online newspaper, Wys urged reporters to follow an investigation to probe the authenticity of Obama's birth certificate.

Wys, who is white, also said in another tweet she is not racist and that her favorite nieces are black, but added she does not support

Man Who Called Himself 'Joker' Charged

UPPER MARLBORO, Md. • A man accused of referring to himself as "a joker" and threatening to shoot up his workplace has been charged with misdemeanor tele-

phone misuse, prosecutors

announced Wednesday.

Neal E. Prescott, 28, of Crofton, was taken into custody Friday after police said they found ammunition and a cache of about two dozen weapons, including semiautomatic rifles and pistols, in his apartment.

He has been undergoing an emergency psychiatric evaluation at a hospital since then. The charge is punishable by up to three years in prison and Prescott would lose the right to get his guns back if convicted, Prince George's County State's Attorney Angela Alsobrooks said.

The "joker" comment prompted concern because of a mass shooting a week earlier at a Colorado movie theater screening the latest Batman movie.

Authorities said Prescott had either been fired or was in the process of being fired from his job when he allegedly said Monday: "I'm a joker and I'm gonna load my guns and blow everybody up." Police also said Prescott was wearing a T-shirt that said "Guns don't kill people. I do" when officers made an initial visit to his apartment. Police initially said the comment was made to a supervisor, but the state's attorney said it was to a coworker.

Also, brooks said the misdemeanor was "insufficient" to deal with the alleged threat and she would have preferred to charge Prescott with a felony. But she said there was no statute in Maryland making it a felony to make a generalized threat over the telephone.

Prescott had been working for a subcontractor of software and mailroom supplier Pitney Bowes at a branch in Prince George's County, just outside Washington.

After he was taken into custody, friends described Prescott as a "gentle giant" - court records list him as 6 feet, 7 inches who was interested in computers, electronics and who collected guns as a hobby and liked to shoot at a target range.

Phone messages left with his parents have not been returned. It wasn't immediately clear whether Prescott has a lawyer. Online Maryland court records list his only past offense as a speeding ticket in 2007.

Chile Bans Marketing of Toys in Kid's Meals

SANTIAGO, Chile • McDonald's, Burger King, KFC and other fast-food companies are being accused in Chile of violating the country's new law against including toys with children's meals.

These and other companies are knowingly endangering the health of children by marketing kids' meals with toys more than a month after the law took effect on June 7, Sen. Giudo Gerardi said as he filed a formal complaint Wednesday seeking a health ministry investigation.

Gerardi said he's also targeting the makers of cereal, popsicles and other products that are sold with toys, crayons or stickers as a way to attract children, as well as the markets where these foods are sold.

If Chile's health ministry upholds his allegations, the companies could be forced to remove the products or face nominal fines.

"These businesses know that these foods damage the health of children and they know the law is in effect. They're using fraudulent and abusive methods. Burger King

puts toys in its 'happy meals' and this is illegal; so is the unhappy little box of McDon-

ald's," Gerardi said. The Associated Press left messages seeking reaction with spokesmen for McDonald's Corp., Burger King Worldwide Inc. and KFC's owner, Yum Brands Inc.

The Washington-based Center for Science in the Public Interest sued McDonalds over using toys to market its food to children in 2010, but the claim was dismissed in April. San Francisco banned restaurants last year from providing toys along with meals

high in fat, salt and sugar, but

McDonalds has continued providing toys there by charging consumers a small fee for the goodies. A similar measure was defeated in New York.


The experience of both U.S. cities helped Gerardi craft his "junk food law," his spokeswoman, Carol Bortnick, said.

Gerardi said he wrote the law because nearly a quarter of Chile's 6-year-olds suffer from childhood obesity.

Sara Deon, an activist with Corporate Accountability International, campaigned for the measures in San Francisco and New York, and praised Chile for passing its law. But she said "Chilean public servants should have no illusions" about implementing it.

"Judging from McDonald's response to similar health laws in the U.S. we'd expect the corporation to respond as it long has: it will fight tooth and nail to continue marketing to children," she said. "It will take every opportunity to blame parents for today's health epidemic. Marketing to kids is core to McDonald's brand and to its bottom line."





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

Chinook Season to Close on Upper Salmon River

STANLEY • Don't put away your fishing poles just yet. While one season closes, another is soon to open.

Two reaches of the upper Salmon River — the Ellis and Stanley areas — will close to chinook salmon harvest at the end of fishing on Sunday.

The Clearwater River main stem, the North Fork, Middle Fork and South Fork Clearwater and the Snake River downstream of Hells Canyon Dam also will close to chinook fishing at the end of the day Sunday.

The South Fork Salmon

River closed July 19, while the Lower Salmon and Little Salmon rivers closed July 15. That means all spring and summer chinook seasons will be closed after Sunday.

But don't fret. The 2012 fall chinook salmon harvest season opens Sept. 1 in the Snake River below Hells Canyon Dam and the lower Clearwater River downstream of the U.S. Highway 12 Memorial Bridge in Lewiston.

The tough part: Deciding what you want to do when you get here.

What's the History of the Park?

Lake Walcott and Minidoka National Wildlife Refuge have an interesting history.

The lake - really a manmade reservoir - was created in 1904 with construction of the Minidoka Dam and power plant on the Snake River. Once completed, the lake and surrounding wetlands began to attract a variety of wildlife.

In 1909, U.S. President Theodore Roosevelt, by an executive order, created several refuges as "preserves and breeding grounds for native birds." The area in and around

Lake Walcott was on the list.

In the late 1930s, Chinese emigrants helped construct many buildings at the lake that no longer exist, including a number of homes.

"People used to live here," Richardson said, and the body of a young child is buried here.

How Big Is the Park?


Bigger than it looks. Lake Walcott State Park comprises 69 acres; the Minidoka Wildlife Refuge includes about 80 miles of shoreline around Lake Walcott, from Minidoka Dam upstream about 25 miles.

The lake is 10 miles long and two miles at its widest point, Richardson said. It holds more than 92,000 acre-feet of water.

Climbing High

OAKLEY • Startled by the clatter of unseen rocks below me, I scrambled over to the cliff's ledge in order to pinpoint the source of the commotion. My heart jumped again after I spotted a bighorn sheep only a hundred yards away, then raced full throttle as I viewed the

ram through binoculars. Aided by the evening sun, his eyes reflected bright amber in a penetrating stare, compelling me to very slowly lower the binoculars and slip off my daypack. Surprisingly, he allowed me to remove my camera, change lenses, and shoot a couple of exposures before

rocketing around the next hillside.

While hearing that the Jim Sage Mountains held wild sheep, I'd held little hope of seeing them. What chance would there be to find this spectacular species just 30 miles from Burley? Wouldn't that more likely require a lengthy trip to a remote canyon in Owyhee County?

The encounter with the ram - a "desert" bighorn as opposed to the "mountain" bighorn subspecies found north of Interstate 84 — marked just one surprise out of many

that this obscure mountain range offered me. Thirty minutes earlier I'd spied four elk slowly emerging from a mountain mahogany grove, including a couple bulls sporting velvet headpieces. Even had I found the Jim Sage

country empty of any wildlife, the landscape still would have captivated me.

The range's crucial measurements leave little to boast about by Idaho standards: its length spans only 15 miles and the highest peak barely reaches 8,000 feet in elevation. Adjacent rangeland containing an occasional ranch and more distant pockets of farmland surround the Jim Sage Mountains, making them seem deceivably approachable.

No motorized access penetrates them fully, however, allowing the landscape's rugged core to remain wild.

Early Elk Seasons **Opened Wednesday**

BOISE • It's August, which means some early elk hunts already have opened in the Gem State, most of them antlerless "green-field" hunts.

The early "green-field" that started Wednesday in seven elk management zones Palouse, Weiser, Lemhi, Beaverhead, Pioneer, Snake River and Owyhee-South Hills zones - are meant to help landowners reduce crop damage.

Early archery hunts also started Wednesday in the Snake River elk zone, and controlled green-field hunts also open in the Dworshak and Hells Canyon zones.

The green-field hunts are open only outside the National Forest Boundary and within one mile of cultivated fields. They help reduce depredation problems and control populations causing crop damage by harvesting or discouraging animals in specific areas or portions of units.

August hunts, however, bring concerns about waste. Hunters have an ethical and legal obligation to salvage the edible portions of their kill. But meat spoilage is an important concern during typical hot August weather.

The key to preserving meat is starting the cooling process quickly. Game animals should be skinned immediately and quartered in most cases and transported quickly to cold storage facilities. Early season hunters may consider using large ice chests to keep game meat cool and clean. Removing meat from the bones also helps speed cooling.

When cutting up the elk carcass, hunters must be sure to preserve the evidence of sex. If the head or antlers are removed, evidence of sex in the form of testicles, penis, scrotum, udder or vulva must remain naturally attached to the carcass or parts thereof until it reaches the final place of storage or personal consumption, or a commercial meat processing facility. Antlers or horns removed from the head must be left naturally attached to the skull plate where size, point or browtine restrictions apply, and they must accompany the carcass or parts thereof.

Hunters must have a valid 2012 Idaho hunting license and tag in their possession, and should review the 2012 Big Game rules available at all license vendors and at fishandgame.idaho.gov.

Introductory lesson over, it was time for me to loose my first arrow.

The solid thunk of the arrow into the backstop suggested I might have done everything right. The rapidly swelling purplish-blue welt growing on my forearm told me otherwise. It was that tipping of the hand and moving the forearm out of the way that I had forgotten. Rest assured, it will be a lesson I won't be repeating anytime soon.

Simpson Ty is a young but experienced bow shop professional

I recently met during my first visit to White Tip Archery, a fully equipped shop that he and proprietor, Kevin Ellett, keep in Chubbuck. That visit was a confirmation to me of the importance, as a novice bow shooter, of visiting with an experienced friend or bow shop professional as you begin to navigate your way through the complex and intimidating world of archery.

For a very nominal fee, Ty carefully inspected the components and then carefully tuned my Hoyt bow to my personal requirements. I had the privilege of going back into the work area to snap some pictures as he

moved through and described in detail each phase of the tuning process.

The alignment portion consisted of securing my bow into a vise and, by means of a nifty laser pointer and several level bubbles, setting the arrow rest precisely. This put the arrow in perfect perpendicular alignment to the string.

Next, he removed the string-damaging brass nock and in its place tied on a fiber string nock. Then he replaced the metal string release tab with a "D" loop he fashioned from heavy string stock. Incredibly, the draw length and draw (pull) weight were spot on as set at the factory.

With my newly adjusted bow in hand, we moved to the shooting lane inside the work room.

After receiving the introductory shooting instructions, I sent a few arrows downrange. Afterwards,

with a gentle reminder about forearm placement, Ty pronounced that I was "good to go."

Another advantage that pro shops have over the big box stores is that since they specialize in archery, they carry a much more extensive line of quality bows, arrows and accessories. At Ty's suggestion (and due to the good natured chuckling of several Native American gents I talked hunting with), I bought a new compact Tru-Fire strap release to replace my antiquated handheld relic.

With archery season about just a month away, now is the time to visit local bow shop professionals for surety that both you and your equipment are in top shape for the best of all hunts.

Charter Fishing Making a Comeback

HOUMA, La. • Charter fishing has proven to be a tough industry to sink in Terrebonne and Lafourche parishes.

Many charter boat captains saw fewer and fewer customers as a result of the 2010 BP oil spill, but now they are starting to recover and reel in more anglers.

"I would classify this as a comeback year," said Daryl Carpenter, president of the Louisiana Charter Boat Association that represents more than 140 charter boat captains along Louisiana's coast.

Terrebonne and Lafourche parishes received more than \$2 million each from BP as a result of the oil spill with much of the money going to tourism advertising.

Pat Gordon, Planning and Zoning director for Terrebonne, said the parish isn't advertising for specific charter boat operations but for the industry as a whole.

'We're advertising for people to come and fish in Terrebonne," Gordon said. "We've run ads in Cabela's Outfitter Journal and are running an ad in the Louisiana Fishing Regulation Brochure. There's a fishing show that runs on HTV, and some ads are being played on that channel. One thing we have done for the local captains is get as many of them listed on the Convention and Visitors Bureau website as possible."

Gordon said in addition to using the money to advertise fishing, local festivals and the new parish branding received a monetary boost from the BP money. But it won't last forever.

"We got the money two years ago," Gordon said, "and it will all be spent by the end of the third year."

Michel Claudet, Terrebonne Parish president, said he thought the advertising campaigns, which focused on promoting Terrebonne as the Salt Water Fishing Capital of

the World, were paying off. "I think it has worked out," Claudet said. "Some captains have said they are really busy. I think these guys certainly want more, but business is good. It's like everything else, you make an investment and hope to see a return on it. We are doing things to show that we are the Salt Water Fishing Capital of the World."

Steelhead Harvest Opens on Snake, Clearwater Rivers

LEWISTON • The fall steelhead harvest season opened Wednesday on a two-mile stretch of the lower Clearwater River from its mouth to the U.S. Highway 12 Memorial Bridge near Lewiston.

The limits on these waters are two per day and six in possession.

Rest of Clearwater and the Middle Fork, North Fork and South Fork rivers are open for catch and release only until Oct. 15.

The fall steelhead harvest season opens Oct. 15 on the main stem of the Clearwater River above the Memorial Bridge, the South Fork Clearwater River, the North Fork Clearwater River below Dworshak Dam, and the Middle Fork Clearwater River below Clear Creek.

Catch and release for steelhead also opened Wednesday on the Snake, Salmon and Little Salmon rivers. The harvest season opens Sept. 1. The limits on these waters are three per day and nine in possession.

Anglers may keep 20 steelhead for the fall season, which ends Dec. 31. Only steelhead with a clipped adipose fin, evidenced by a healed scar, may be kept. Any steelhead that has an intact adipose fin must be released unharmed.

Arizona Condors Raising Three Chicks

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • Biologists say nesting pairs of California condors have produced three chicks on the Arizona strip.

The Peregrine Fund says it made visual confirmation.

The conservation group says separate nesting pairs have each produced a chick inside the Grand Canyon

National Park. Another pair is raising a chick in Vermilion Cliffs National Monument just south of the Utah border.

The Peregrine Fund says there are now 77 condors in a flock that roams the Arizona/Utah border.

The chicks aren't expected to take their first flight until late fall, and will rely on their parents for food for the first 18 months.

Warm Water Closes Yellowstone Rivers to Fishing

YELLOWSTONE NA-TIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) • Parts of three rivers in Yellowstone National Park are closed to fishing because of unusually warm water temperatures.

Starting Wednesday, park officials are prohibiting fishing on the Gibbon River below Gibbon Falls, Firehole River below Keppler Cascades, and the Madison River.

Park officials say temperatures in the Gibbon River have been above 73 degrees for much of the past two weeks. The Firehole River has been above 78 degrees.

Such warm water can be stressful or even fatal for trout.

Yellowstone officials additional areas could also be closed to fishing if warm weather and low stream flows continue.

apple, apricot, cherry and peach. Animals enjoy them and, once in a while, so do the park's human visitors, he said. "People love it here because of all the trees."

What Boats Can I Use on the Water?

Even if you're not a boater, it's fun to watch others enjoy this pastime on the lake - especially if they're in sailboats.

Both sailboats and motorboats are allowed on the water from April 1 to Sept. 30, Richardson said. Most users have motorboats.

Morning wind caused choppy waves on July 19, said boater Bobby Leoby. It was his first time at the lake, and he enjoyed the experience more once the wind died down. By early afternoon the wind had calmed, and smaller waves rippled across the water.

No sailboats were on the lake that day, but Richardson said most sailors come on weekends.

Can I Fish at the Lake?

Fishing at Lake Walcott can be a bit discouraging if it's your first time there. But once you become familiar with it, the lake might be one of your favorite places to drop anchor.

Indeed, fishing is one of the main reasons people come here, Richardson said. Many people fish from boats, but there also are many good places to cast a line from shore. The lake is home to trout, bass and sturgeon.

Leoby caught one small bass and said he probably would have caught more if not for the wind, which plays havoc with fishing lines.

The Archibalds tried their luck fishing, too, but had a poorer catch than Leoby: not even one fish, Karma Archibald said.

Lake Walcott isn't an easy fish, Richardson said. Angler success often comes from knowing the right holes to drop a line.

"If you know how to fish the lake, you usually have pretty good luck," he said.

Don't try to be a fish yourself; no swimming is allowed at the lake.

What's Else Is Popular Here?

Besides boating and fishing, disc golf is the third of Lake Walcott's main attractions.

That's easy to see, especially on weekends when the park is busiest, Richardson said.

The 21-hole disc golf course is switchable, meaning you can play a different route by alternating some of its holes.

"We have an A and B course," he

A drawback to disc golf: Sometimes the wind kicks up quick and heavy at the park, Richardson said.

Yet it has remained a popular place for the sport. On Aug. 18-19 the park will host disc golf's Idaho state championship, he said, which

What Are All Those Birds?

When you visit Lake Walcott, keep an eye out for the eight families of Canada geese that live and roam here. On July 19, some walked a paved pathway to the lake.

They aren't the only fowl you'll see here, for the park has been a bird lover's paradise since the 1950s. Since that time, 239 bird species have been observed at the park, causing the National Audubon Society and Birdlife International to name the site an Important Bird Area.

The birds are too many to name here, but a pamphlet that lists them is available at the visitor center or at places around the park.

You're likely to notice various butterflies that flit across the parkway, too. At least 20 species have been listed at the park.

Next year, plan to visit Lake Walcott on or near July 4 for its annual Butterfly Count. For exact dates, call the refuge office: 208-436-

What Other Wildlife Will I See?

According to a Minidoka Wildlife Refuge pamphlet, "about half of the refuge's 20,699 acres is open water and wetlands. The rest of the refuge is low, rolling uplands covered by sagebrush, grasses and isolated juniper patches amongst scattered outcrops of basalt."

The combined habitat draws a variety of wildlife, including beavers, coyotes, raccoons, pronghorns, burrowing owls, birds of prey including bald eagles and redtailed hawks, otters, porcupines and rattlesnakes.

What you're most likely to see at the park, however, are waterfowl, songbirds, squirrels and butterflies.

And insects — there are plenty of insects at the park. But none are of the biting variety, Richardson said.

Can I Hike Here?

Lake Walcott has more than 3.5 miles of paved pathway, so walking it is more like taking a stroll than going on a hike. The paths take you in and around the grassy park, beneath its shade trees and into the more arid scenery of dry brush and open sky.

It's an easy walk without many inclines — though at the east end of

the park the path turns to gravel and there are plenty of stops at drinking fountains and restrooms.

Keep an eye out, as children sometimes tear along the paved pathway on bicycles and skateboards.

What About Camping?

A couple hugged each other outside their RV on July 19, while a few yards away young people walked the pathway and a butterfly flitted across the trail. Such is the setting for camping at Lake Walcott.

Camping with tent and RV is allowed in designated areas, or you can rent one of the park's cabins.

Standard tent camping is \$12 per

night, first come first served. RV camping is \$22 a night. Cabins, for \$50 a night, sleep five and include electricity, air conditioning, heater and lockable doors and windows. Community restrooms and showers are available in the campground.

said that ATV routes climb no higher than 6,600 feet in elevation. In addition, hiking boots beyond those points will encounter no formal trails, creating an area that Courtney terms as "relatively undiscovered." He also notes that the Jim

Sage range contains a good diversity of habitat, offering native bunchgrasses and sagebrush interspersed with everything from greasewood at the lowest levels to junipers, mountain mahogany, and even fir on the mountains' upper reaches. That combination of

high-quality vegetation, limited access, and the Jim Sage ridgeline that's often marked by steep, rocky cliffs also results in prime habitat for bighorn sheep.

While the range historically supported the species, no animals were present there for nearly the entire 20th century. A translocation of 30 bighorns from Oregon in 2000 began filling that void, along with more releases the following year.

Randy Smith, regional wildlife manager for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, refers to the wild sheep's territory on the Jim Sage Mountains as "postage stamp habitat," especially when compared to the expansive Jarbidge and Bruneau canyons frequented by the species.

"But at this point, 12 years

later, the sheep on the Jim Sage are persisting quite well," Smith said. "We've got anywhere from 50 to 100 animals and allow one ram to be harvested each fall?

The release of those first bighorns didn't happen overnight, however.

"It took a lot of people working together," said Joyce Ward. She and her late husband Roscoe exchanged a portion of their domestic sheep grazing rights — the only such permits in the Jim Sage area — for cattle permits elsewhere and allowed the Foundation of North American Wild Sheep to purchase the balance. The Wards also collaborated with neighboring ranchers, Idaho Fish and Game, and federal agencies such as the Bureau of Land Management and Forest Service. The end result produced a deal that ultimately removed domestic sheep from the mountains in order to allow the bighorns to arrive and prosper.

"At the time, we were happy to add to the area — to bring diversity to the county," Ward remembers. "And it was a decision that we never regretted."

Fate even rewarded the couple when a small herd took up permanent residence near their ranch headquarters. Roscoe enjoyed having the animals nearby and Joyce confesses that she still holds a strong attachment to the wild sheep, especially taking delight in keeping tabs on the newborn lambs that arrive

venture isn't necessarily defined by the sight of a cute lamb, majestic ram, or encounter with other wildlife. The scramble to the top and a trek along the crest will result in a memorable experience and inspiring scenery.

Other mountain ranges rise in the distance with valleys sandwiched between, harboring small towns such as Almo, Elba or Malta. The immediate landscape offers open windswept slopes that rise evenly from the west, often breaking off sharply at the highlands' crown to expose rhyolite cliffs, talus slopes, and forested pockets.

From such a lofty perspective, visitors are presented with the welcome dilemma concerning what to focus on the remote panoramic views surrounding the Jim Sage country or the intriguing mountains themselves.

Waterfowl Should Be Plentiful Nationally This Fall

SEATTLE • Waterfowl hunters can expect to have success this fall and

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service released its preliminary report on North American breeding ducks and habitat, and the population is about 48.6 million $compared to \, 45.6 \, million \, last \, year.$

That figure is also 43 percent above the 1955 to 2010 long-term average.

This year's estimate is a record high, and only the sixth time in the survey's history that the total duck population exceeded 40 million, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

In Washington state, waterfowl numbers are going to be ideal, judging by early surveys in northern breeding grounds.

"It looks like another good year for waterfowl, and last year was a record," said Don Kraege, a state Fish and Wildlife waterfowl manager. "We have higher numbers again this year, so it could be another record year."

Waterfowl counts in Alaska and northern Alberta both had big increases as well as southern Alberta, which is another important area to our flyway. Last year, production in those places was down in the 20 to 30 percent range, but has bounced back.

The big unknown is the snow geese population.

"Unfortunately for snow geese there have been some changes (or lack of information) in surveys conducted by Russian biologists on Wrangell," Kraege said.

"For local breeding, Canada geese are looking good, and we plan to possibly have a hunt reinstated this fall," Kraege said. "Alaska also has a good number of geese, which contribute

to our area." Kraege says brant breeding areas were in good shape, and that should help hunting success.

By the Numbers

Want to Hunt Canada Geese? Go to North Dakota

GRAND FORKS, N.D. • In mid-August, hunters in North Dakota will take the field in pursuit of Canada

This year, they'll be able to get after the birds in an especially big way. For the first time ever, the North Dakota Game and Fish Department is recommending a daily bag limit of 15 and a possession limit of 30 for the early season that begins Aug. 15 and continues through mid-September.

That's up from limits of eight and 16 during last year's early season.

Any way you slice it, that's a pile of goose jerky. The reason for the liberal bag is simple, wildlife managers say:

There's too many Canada geese out there — way too many, in some cases.

"Canada geese are definitely emerging as one of the Central Flyway's top priorities up and down the flyway," said Mike Szymanski, a migratory game bird biologist for the North Dakota Game and Fish Department in Bismarck. "It's not just the Dakotas having issues; they're superabundant, and prairie Canada has a ton of Canada geese, too."

According to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the federal agency charged with regulating migratory bird seasons, North Dakota's estimated Canada goose population this spring stood at a whopping 415,000 birds. That's more than twice the

162,000 Canada geese tallied in the spring of 2000 and five times higher than the state Game and Fish Department's management goal of 80,000 birds.

"I guess in biology terms, you could call it geometric growth," Szymanski said. "If you look at the trend over time, they've increased substantially."

Victim of Success

In many ways, the explosion of Canada geese is a story of success taken to extremes. The birds targeted during the early season are resident giant Canada geese, a subspecies thought to be nearly extinct until the 1960s, when a remnant population discovered Rochester, Minn.

"They thought the Great Plains birds were pretty much gone," Szymanski said. "They found them around Rochester and began breeding programs back in the '60s, trying to bring them back. It was pretty slow going.

"A lot of people were saying it would never succeed, achieving a population of 10,000 pairs in North

Then came the early '90s, and a series of wet years in North Dakota and neighboring states. Giant Canada geese responded, and with less stringent habitat requirements than ducks, the birds began to thrive in places they weren't necessarily wanted, such as farm-



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ers' fields or, in more urban areas, soccer fields and golf

courses. "Pretty much anywhere where they've got short, green vegetation to eat and water to provide an escape route, they're going to be there, and they're going to do well," Szymanski said.

For farmers, that means problems with the geese raiding small grain and soybean crops. In more urban settings, the geese are despised for the copious quantities of waste they produce.

"I don't think anyone really envisioned the problems they'd cause," said Steve Cordts, waterfowl staff specialist for the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources in Bemidji.

Hunting's role

Hunting remains the most socially acceptable option for controlling the birds. According to Szymanski, wildlife managers in North Dakota and South Dakota were able to get federal approval for the 15-bird early bag after banner reproduction this spring.

Approval wasn't needed for the August portion of the hunt, which is considered a "management take" outside of traditional early season guidelines, but the maximum limit for the September part of the early season previously was eight.

"They're a very successful bird, and that's part of the reason we acted pretty swiftly this year on bag limits," Szymanski said. "Both Dakotas were seeing lots of Canada geese nesting, lots of Canada geese hatching.

We wanted to try to use harvest to a more full extent to knock the birds back."

North Dakota offered its first statewide September Canada goose season in 2000, expanding the hunt to mid-August in 2008. Last year, Szymanski said, Game and Fish raised the early season bag from five to eight, and hunters killed more than 55,000 Canada geese during the early season, based on Game and Fish estimates. North Dakota hunters killed another 90,000 Canada geese during the regular season, according to federal harvest



The term College Savings Plan is the catch phrase that refers to the IRS recognized 529 and Coverdell Plans Recause of their tax efficiency these plans are often the first choice of many parents. Problems could arise if the student needs the money for college while the stock market is in decline. The parent may be placed in the unfortunate situation of choosing between two bad options; selling assets in the plan at a loss today or removing the money in future years when the market has recovered. Delaying this sale can result in taxes and penalties if the liquidation occurs in a tax year that does not have tuition expenses.

Fortunately, there are alternatives to this approach. Money saved in a Roth IRA can offer options to minimize the aforementioned challenges. The principal in the Roth IRA is available for any purpose without income tax or IRS penalties. Furthermore, the principal in this tax favored account is distributed first when liquidating. Thus, it is possible for a parent to access this money for college tuition before the account owner reaches 59 $rac{1}{2}$. Please note that interest or gains distributed from a Roth prior to age 59 $\frac{1}{2}$ are subject to taxes and penalties. So, for this approach to have maximum tax efficiency, all earnings above the principal should be retained in the Roth until after that age.

I also prefer funding the Roth prior to college savings plans, since it offers greater flexibility to deal with uncertainties. While we may wish our children would all aspire to higher education, the child may choose another other path. The parent that ends up paying for a wedding instead of college, can access the Roth's principal for the nuptials. By contrast, removing funds from a 529 Plan for this purpose would create tax liabilities.

There are other benefits and limitations to this approach that cannot be covered in this brief space. Tax issues are best discussed with a licensed tax advisor. Cowboys' AA team defies odds, poor regular season to qualify again for American Legion state tournament.

For the longest time it looked like the Twin Falls Cowboys would miss out on the American Legion Class AA state tournament for the first time in a decade.

HAMPTON COURT, England • Boise's Kristin Armstrong won her second straight gold medal in the Olympic cycling time trial Wednesday, beating Judith Arndt of Germany by more than 15 seconds.

Armstrong covered the 18-mile course south of London in 37 minutes, 34.82 seconds. Arndt finished in 37:50.29 for the silver, while Olga Zabelinskaya of Russia posted a time of 37:57.35 to add a bronze to the one she captured in Sunday's road race.

The 38-year-old Armstrong briefly retired after her triumph at the 2008 Beijing Olympics to start a family, but she hopped back on her bike after delivering a son, Lucas, in 2010.

On Wednesday, she looked as if she'd never been away.

A Different Kind of Arena

Long accustomed to the political variety, Romneys seek medal in dressage aboard their horse, Rafalca.

LONDON • Rarely has an Olympic dressage horse received as much attention as Rafalca.

The 15-year-old, German-bred mare is part-owned by Mitt Romney's wife and has been the source of political jokes questioning how the Republican presidential candidate can claim to know the problems of ordinary Americans when he inhabits the rarified world of dressage.

The sport, which is better known in Europe than the U.S., is the equine equivalent of ballet. Horse and rider (wearing top hat and tails) go through a series of steps that look like the horse is dancing: twirling pirouettes, prancing trots and the crowd-pleasing "flying change," which looks like the horse is skipping.

Ann Romney is expected to attend Rafalca's Olympic debut, which gets under way today with the Grand Prix dressage test at Greenwich Park, home of all Olympic equestrian events.

She returned to London after her husband unleashed a torrent of criticism in the British press when, shortly after arriving for the Olympics' opening ceremony, he said

What to Know: Dressage

A typical dressage horse requires up to a decade of training to compete at Olympic levels. Horse and rider work very much as a team, with the rider giving the horse invisible cues through subtle leg, hand and seat shifts. The horse is judged from 0-10 on executing a standard test of 33 movements:

standard test of 33 movements: **Passage:** a prancing, high-striding step

Piaffe: a passage done in place Half-pass: where the horse moves forward and sideways at the same time by crossing over its legs Pirouette: where the horse com-

pletes a full circle in place while cantering

Flying change: where the horse changes the sequence of its steps

Penn State's Loss Is USC's, Cal's Gain

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. • Penn State's loss could turn into a big gain for Southern California.

Star tailback Silas Redd bolted Happy Valley for Los Angeles in a season of great expectations for the Trojans. A 1,200-yard rusher, Redd will join heralded quarterback Matt Barkley on a team already favored to win the Pac-12 and return to the Rose Bowl.

It's a perk that Redd wouldn't have enjoyed at Penn State with the program burdened by harsh NCAA sanctions because of the Jerry Sandusky child sex abuse scandal. Among the penalties was a four-year postseason ban, as well as a scholarship reduction.

Another Pac-12 school also took in a Nittany Lion on Wednesday as top reserve linebacker Khairi Fortt said he was transferring to California. Fortt, like Redd, is from Connecticut, and both players will have two years of eligibility left.

Fortt said in a statement issued through his father, Guy Fortt, that he reached a point in his life in which he "was ready for a change," and that he had also seriously considered Cal in high school. The Stamford Advocate first reported Fortt's de-

"He will miss Penn State," Guy Fortt said.

In light of the sanctions, the NCAA is allowing Nittany Lion players to seek new schools and play immediately, so long as they leave by the start of Penn State training camp next Monday.

Since the sanctions were imposed last week, Nittany Lions coach Bill O'Brien has been trying to keep the team intact by stressing academics, family and the prospect of playing seven home games a year in front of a crowd of 108,000 strong at Beaver Stadium.

For the most part, it seems to have worked even though Redd's departure will be a serious blow to an offense being reconfigured by O'Brien, the former coordinator of the New England Patriots' highpowered attack.

Four players have now left Penn State since the NCAA imposed its landmark penalties on July 23. A fifth player, third-string quarterback Rob Bolden, was removed from the roster this week but had been granted permission to talk to other schools before the sanctions.

ing over her bike. She rested just enough to catch her breath before heading to the victory stand and her second consecutive Olympic gold.

"When she stopped, she was on top. You don't lose what you've got," said Armstrong's teammate Amber Neben, who finished seventh. "You don't lose the fact that you're a great bike racer."

The mostly flat course that Armstrong turned into her own personal playground began at Hampton Court Palace, the 16th century court that was once favored by Henry VIII.

The race meandered through countryside, twice crossing the River Thames, before finishing back at the palace. Riders who were in position to medal were ushered onto so-called hot seats - three gilded thrones - to wait out the rest of the riders.

Zabelinskaya spent much of the afternoon in the lead. The Russian time trial champion was the 10th of 24 riders to leave the start tent, and posted a time that was more than two minutes better than the next-fastest had crossed the line.

All the big names were still on the course, though.

Linda Villumsen of New Zealand turned heads when she crossed the first checkpoint about a second slower than Armstrong, and the world silver medalist was still the second-fastest on the course when she reached the



option for playing college basketball, Rogers saw that CSI was defending national champion and arrived at Christmas last year, paid his way into school and practiced with the team last year.


"He wanted to go to the best junior college program in the country and he reached out and made contact with us," Gosar said.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEYBURN, IDAHO, AMENDING HEYBURN CODE SECTIONS 4-2-4, 4-2-6, 4-2-9 AND 4-3-10 TO CHANGE THE DATE OF EXPIRATION OF BEER AND WINE LICENSES FROM DECEMBER 31 OF EACH YEAR TO AUGUST 1; AND MODIFYING APPLICATION DATES ACCORDINGLY; AND PROVIDING FOR ADOPTION WITH ONLY ONE READING; AND PROVIDING FOR EFFECTIVE DATE.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Heyburn, Minidoka County, Idaho as follows:

Section 1: Heyburn Code Section 4-2-4 is hereby amended as follows:

-2-4: FORM OF LICENSE; LICENSE NONTRANSFERABLE: The license shall be upon a form to be provided by the city and shall be for a particular room or place. It shall not be transferable and shall expire on January August 1, at one o'clock (1:00) A.M., of the year after the year of its issue

Section 2: Heyburn Code Section 4-2-6 is hereby amended as

4-2-6: ISSUANCE OF LICENSE: The application of any person or entity not now holding an unexpired license from the city to sell beer shall be presented to the city council by the clerk at the council's next succeeding meeting and after consideration by the council shall be granted or refused or tabled for further inquiry. In the event that the license is granted, the clerk shall issue to the applicant the license applied for. In the event that the application is denied, the money deposited by the applicant with the city clerk shall be returned to the applicant. The person or entity holding an unexpired license shall apply for a renewal of the annual license not later than December July 5 of the year the license expires. The clerk shall inform the mayor, city council and chief of police of such application and provide to them a copy of the application. If the mayor, any member of the council or chief of police do not register to the clerk any written objection by December July 20, then the clerk is authorized to issue an automatic renewal upon receipt of the license fee. If objection is received, then the matter shall be referred to the council in the manner above described. This automatic renewal procedure shall not be used if there is any change of ownership, such as addition of a partner or incorporation of the business.

Section 3: Heyburn Code Section 4-2-9 is hereby amended as follows:

4-2-9 B: FEES: APPLICATION. RENEWAL AND EXPIRATION: B. All licenses shall be granted by the mayor and council for a period of one year beginning January August 1, and ending December August 1. A full year's license fee shall be collected after January August 1. The city council shall grant or deny the application within thirty (30) days of the time it is filed with the city clerk. Prior to any revocation or suspension, the licensee shall be afforded a hearing according to section 23-1016, Idaho Code. Whenever the mayor and city council denies an application, they shall specify in writing:

1. The statutes, ordinances and standards used in evaluating the application;

2. The reason for the denial; and

3. The actions, if any, that the applicant could take to obtain the license, transfer or renewal thereof.

Section 4: Heyburn Code Section 4-3-10 is hereby amended as 4-3-10: ISSUANCE OF LICENSE: The application of any person

or entity not now holding an unexpired license from the city to sell wine shall be presented to the city council by the clerk at the council's next succeeding meeting and after consideration by the council shall be granted or refused or tabled for further inquiry. In the event that the license is granted, the clerk shall issue to the applicant the license applied for. In the event that the application is denied, the money deposited by the applicant with the city clerk shall be returned to the applicant. The person or entity holding an unexpired license shall apply for a renewal of the annual license not later than December 10 July 5 of the year the license expires. The clerk shall inform the mayor, city council and chief of police of such application and provide to them a copy of the application. If the mayor, any member of the council or chief of police does not register to the clerk any written objection by December 28 July 20, then the clerk is authorized to issue an automatic renewal upon receipt of the license fee. If objection is received, then the matter shall be referred to the council in the manner above described. This automatic renewal procedure shall not be used if there is any change of ownership, such as addition of a partner or incorporation of the business.

Section 5: Effective Date. The City Council having by authorizing motion and vote waived the rule of requiring three separate readings of this Ordinance, by title and in full, therefore this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its first and only reading, passage, approval and publication.

Today's Highlight:

On Aug. 2, 1862, the Ambulance Corps for the Army of the Potomac was created at the order of Maj. Gen. George McClellan during the Civil War.

TODAY IN **HISTORY**

On this date:

In 216 B.C., during the Second Punic War, Carthaginian forces led by Hannibal defeated the Roman army in the Battle of Cannae.

In 1776, members of the Continental Congress began attaching their signatures to the Declaration of Independence.

In 1876, frontiersman "Wild Bill" Hickok was shot and killed while playing poker at a saloon in Deadwood, Dakota Territory, by Jack McCall, who was later hanged.

In 1909, the original Lincoln "wheat" penny first went into circulation, replacing the "Indian Head" cent.

In 1922, Alexander Graham Bell, generally regarded as the inventor of the telephone, died in Nova Scotia. Canada, at age 75. In 1923, the 29th president

of the United States, Warren G. Harding, died in San Francisco; Vice President Calvin Coolidge became president.

In 1934, German President Paul von Hindenburg died, paving the way for Adolf Hitler's complete takeover.

In 1943, during World War II, Navy boat PT-109, commanded by Lt. John F. Kennedy, sank after being rammed by the Japanese destroyer Amagiri off the Solomon Islands.

In 1964, the destroyer USS Maddox suffered light damage from North Vietnamese patrol torpedo boats in the Gulf of Tonkin.

In 1974, former White House counsel John W. Dean III was sentenced to one to four years in prison for obstruction of justice in the Watergate coverup. (Dean months.)

In 1985, 135 people were killed when a Delta Air Lines jetliner crashed while attempting to land at Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport.

In 1990, Iraq invaded Kuwait, seizing control of the oil-rich emirate. (The Iraqis were later driven out in Operation Desert Storm.)

Ten years ago: A federal judge ruled the U.S. government had to reveal the names of people detained in the investigation of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks (an appeals court later sided with federal authorities). Pope Iohn Paul II returned to Rome after ending an 11-day pilgrimage to Canada, Guatemala and Mexico.

Five years ago: Mattel apologized to customers as it recalled nearly a million Chinese-made toys from its Fisher-Price division that were found to have excessive amounts of lead. A Marine Corps squad leader was convicted at Camp Pendleton, Calif., of murdering an Iraqi man during a frustrated search for an insurgent. (Sgt. Lawrence G. Hutchins III was sentenced to 15 years in prison; he spent four years behind bars before his conviction was overturned on grounds he hadn't received a fair trial.) Two small Russian submarines completed a voyage below the North Pole where they planted the country's flag on the Arctic Ocean floor.

One year ago: The Senate passed, and President Barack Obama signed, legislation to avoid an unprecedented national default. New York Yankees first baseman Mark Teixeira set a major league record when he homered from both sides of the plate for the 12th time in his career during a 6-0 win over the Chicago White Sox.


