TWIN FALLS • Thousands of dollars of donations intended to be sold before Christmas went up in smoke Wednesday night when a fire burned outside the Salvation Army Thrift Store in Twin Falls, according to Salvation Army Capt. Marcos Marquez.

Marquez said he got a call at about 7:45 p.m. Wednesday about the fire. According to Marquez, it looked like something ignited some mattresses that were

by a shed next to the store.

Two sheds worth about \$4,000 were badly damaged along with Christmas merchandise that was donated at the end of the last holiday season, Marquez said.

Marquez said Walmart donated the new items with a retail value of about \$11,000, and they were going to be sold in November and December this year.

"Christmas sales make up about 60 to 70 percent of our income in November and December," Marquez said. "It would have been those items."

The loss of the items will be a blow to the store this winter, Marquez said, but

'Spice' Felony Charges Dropped

TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls County prosecutors dropped three felony charges against Daniel Churchman Thursday more than a week after a raid on his business looking for synthetic marijuana known as "spice." FIRE NEAR STANLEY GROWING

BOISE (AP) • Fire officials say a wildfire burning in the Frank Church River of No Return Wilderness has now scorched nearly 29 square miles and is being battled by more than 200 firefighters.

The Halstead Fire is burning in the wilderness 18 miles northwest of Stanley and plumes of smoke are visible from the small resort town.

Government officials are holding a public meeting in Stanley Friday night to address concerns about the blaze, which ignited a week ago from a lightning strike.

Officials say crews have been successful in holding fire lines along the southwest perimeter, though so far the fire is zero percent contained.

1,000 Tons of Hay on Fire Near Wendell

WENDELL • More than 1,000 tons of hay are on still on fire at a dairy northwest of Wendell after burning for more than 25 hours, said City of Wendell Fire Chief Bob Bailey.

Bailey said firefighters from departments in Wendell, Gooding and Hagerman were still working to put out the blaze at Frank Veenstra's dairy, 1300 East 2675 South, Friday and would most likely be fighting the fire around the clock for the next five or six days.

"We were out there all night last night and it looks like we'll be out there all night tonight," he said.

The fire started Thursday night at about 5 p.m. because of internal combustion, Bailey said.

Internal combustion happens when the hay is stacked too high and too deep, he said.

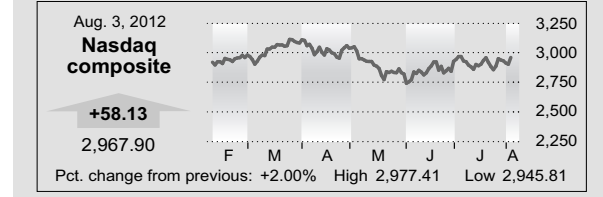
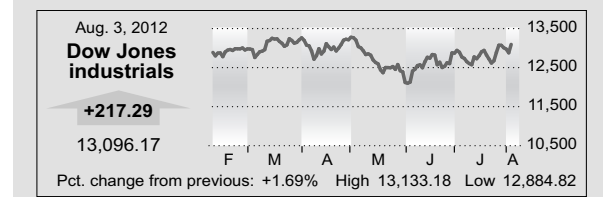

Stocks Soar on Surprisingly Strong July Job Report

NEW YORK (AP) • Stocks are finishing sharply higher on Wall Street, breaking a four-day losing streak, after the government reported a big pickup in hiring by U.S. employers in July. The Dow Jones industrial average closed up 217 points at 13,096 on Friday. The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 26 points to 1,391. The Nasdaq surged 58 points, ending the day at 2,968. Markets had been slumping all week after central banks in the U.S and Europe took no new action to shore up the economy, as many investors had hoped.

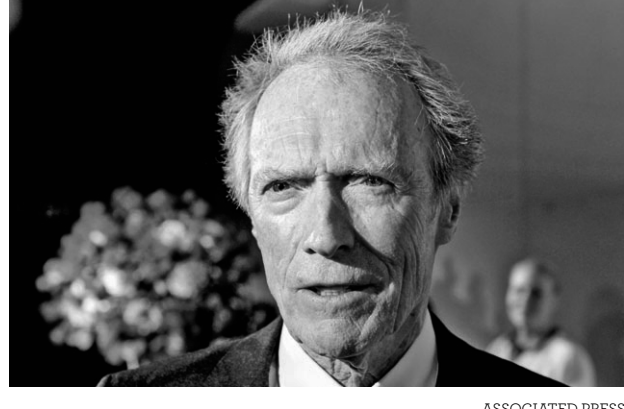

Clint Eastwood Endorses Romney's Presidential Bid

SUN VALLEY • Clint Eastwood just made Mitt Romney's day. The "Dirty Harry" star and Oscar-winning director of "Unforgiven" and "Million Dollar Baby" endorsed the Republican presidential candidate Friday night during a Sun Valley fundraiser. "I think the country needs a boost," Eastwood told The Associated Press as he joined other Romney supporters for the private campaign event. In February, Eastwood told Fox News that he wasn't supporting any politician at that time. Some

saw the "halftime in America" ad he made for the Super Bowl as a nod toward President Barack Obama. Eastwood responded then by saying he was not "politically affiliated" with the president. "Now more than ever do we need Gov. Romney. I'm going to be voting for him," Eastwood told Romney supporters Friday night. "He just made my day," Romney said. "What a guy?" Standing at Romney's side, Eastwood said he was filming "Mystic River" in Massachusetts almost a decade ago when he first saw political advertisements featuring Romney,

who was running for governor at the time. "I said, God, this guy, he's too handsome to be governor, but he does look like he could be president," Eastwood joked. "As the years have gone by I began to think even more so about that." Eastwood, 82, said he hoped Romney would restore "a decent tax system that we need badly ... so that there's a fairness and people are not pitted against one another as who's paying taxes and who isn't." The actor and director instantly became Romney highest-profile celebrity supporter. Romney has also earned the endorsement of Oscar-winning actor Jon Voight and rock star Kid Rock. A campaign spokesman could not immediately say whether Eastwood would play an active role in the campaign. About 325 people paid as much as \$25,000 apiece to attend the event. Eastwood is a part-time resident of Sun Valley.

Varicose Veins Can Cause Pain, Ulcers

I'm 43 and have had varicose veins for many years. What exactly are they and what can I do about them? They are becoming painful.

Answered by Dr. Bruce McComas, M.D., FACS, St. Luke's Clinic, General Surgery:

Veins return blood to the heart. They are a large network of blood vessels that have one way valves that help blood go uphill in the legs to the heart. When those veins aren't working properly, the blood pushes backwards. Branches of superficial veins can't stand the pressure and over the years they get stretched and dilate. Varicose veins have pain sensors which makes them hurt. Not only do they cause pain and look bad, but years of varicose veins can make the skin become diseased, with discoloration, swelling and potentially ulcers.

There are two major causes of varicose veins. You can be born with poor valve function of veins, which is called primary venous insufficiency. This can be hereditary and occurs in about 10% of cases, (mostly men). About 90% of cases are women who have secondary venous insufficiency, mostly due to pregnancy.

There are also different types or grades of veins. The small "spider" veins, close to the skin are a cosmetic issue only and will not cause pain or discomfort. We treat these with sclerotherapy and laser.

The bigger, varicose veins cause pain and swelling, which is a medical problem as well as a cosmetic issue. Left untreated, major varicose veins will increase and become more painful. With time, varicose veins can lead to chronic pain and ulcerations. This can cause the skin to become very thick and permanently discolored. An ulcer in the skin may develop, increase in size and could take months to heal.

The treatments for vari-

cose veins have been revolutionized in the past twenty years. Procedures are now done in an office setting with a local anesthetic and take less than an hour. Vein stripping is a thing of the past. The newest technique is called VNUS closure and uses a high-tech radio frequency catheter that is inserted into the varicose vein via ultrasound. The catheter creates heat and shrink-wraps the vein closed permanently. It is 95% successful. With minimal discomfort at the time of surgery and no pain afterward, patients can return to normal activity the next day.

Other techniques, called sclerotherapy, can be used to close smaller branches of veins; which are smaller and not painful. A painless chemical is injected into the leg which makes the small branches clot off. These are not dangerous clots, and with time, will go away. Laser therapy can also be used to remove these smaller branches of veins.

Symptomatic varicose veins are a significant medical problem and evaluation and treatment are covered by insurance and Medicare. A vein care specialist will help you determine the significance and management of your varicose veins.

Number of Pot Plants Seized in Raids Drops Nationwide

One of the most dramatic shifts came from Idaho, which saw its eradication results shrink by more than 98 percent.

SEATTLE • Federal data shows the number of live marijuana plants eradicated in outdoor and indoor grow operations dropped in most states over the past three

years, while the amount of bulk processed marijuana seized doubled.

And authorities can't pinpoint exact reasons.

One thing is known: California, which provides the lion's share of the millions of plants eradicated every year

in the United States, saw a 46.5 percent drop in plants eradicated between 2010 and 2011, bringing down the nation's overall numbers.

"You can't attribute it to one factor," said Casey Rettig, spokeswoman for Drug Enforcement Administration in San Francisco.

Shifts in tactics from growers, weather patterns and budget cuts to local and

state enforcement agencies have played roles in the significant decrease in eradication, DEA and local officials said.

In 2010, authorities seized 10.32 million marijuana plants from outdoor and indoor growing operations, according to DEA data. By 2011, that number had dropped to 6.7 million plants — a 35 percent decrease.

Forest Wants Huckleberry Cutting to Stop

LEWISTON (AP) • Pickers possibly trying to avoid doing their work in the sun are illegally cutting truckloads of huckleberry brush in northern Idaho forests and hauling it away, law enforcement officers said.

Officials with Nez Perce-Clearwater national forests received reports from concerned berry pickers who play by the rules, but spokeswoman Laura Smith said authorities often don't get enough information to make a case.

Some offenders claim not

to know the practice is illegal or damaging to the plants, Smith told the Lewiston Tribune.

Huckleberries, which can range from the size of a pea to a large marble, are coveted for their sweet taste and can bring premium prices. The dark purple berries have a devoted following in the region and pickers often return to the same patches year after year.

But removing huckleberry bushes from national forests lands is illegal, and violators can face up to six months in

jail and fines totaling up to \$5,000. The violation occurs on a yearly basis in the Nez Perce-Clearwater forests but appear to be rare in neighboring forests.

Officials in the Nez Perce-Clearwater forests said catching violators can be difficult.

"It is on a rare occasion

that (Forest Service) law enforcement officers are actually in the right spot at the right time or have a reporting party that gives a license plate or enough information that can be followed up," said patrol captain Jill Forth.

Some culprits, however, have been more obvious in their illegal activity.

Body Found of Man Drowned at Pillar Falls

TWIN FALLS • Search and rescue teams from Twin Falls County and Jerome recovered the body of a Washington man near Pillar Falls Thursday afternoon. He had been missing since Saturday.

Justice Kramer, 42, was hiking near Pillar Falls with his daughter and her friend on July 28 when he fell into the Snake River.

About 25 deputies and search and rescue members were involved in the search efforts that began Saturday night after reports of the drowning. A dive team and underwater cameras were used during the search, which took a total of 35 hours, before it was scaled back on Wednesday, according to a statement released by the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office.

Kramer's family released the following statement Friday through the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office:

"Forty-two-year-old SSGT Justice N. Kramer, of Graham, Wash. was found yesterday. Kramer served his country through three deployments, was a devoted father, brother, uncle, son, nephew and friend who was loved by many. His family wishes to thank all of those who have given of their time searching and praying in order to give his family closure."

Minidoka County Fair's Cream of the Crop

RUPERT • Many competitors emerged as winners during Minidoka County Fair week taking home rosette ribbons for their perfect pickles, bragging rights as top showman or a trophy for the fastest lawn-mower. But, a group of 4-H teens rose to the top like cream — taking away the satisfaction of a week's worth of hard work and the knowledge they provided a good model for those who'll follow in their footsteps.

"We couldn't put on the fair without the teen association," said Donna Gillespie, extension agent for Minidoka County.

The Minidoka County 4-H Teen Association's 25 members range in age from 13-18 years old and are required to complete at least one 4-H project in order to be a member. As part of the association they are required to attend regular meetings and help out as needed during fair week.

"They pitch in where ever we need them," said Jeni Bywater, 4-H coordinator for Minidoka County. "I love those kids; they are the cream of the crop. They always put extra effort in."

Bywater said a special river float trip and picnic has been planned after the fair for the teen members who donate so much of their time to the fair.

Justin Borden, 16, teen association member, said along with showing his 4-H beef project this week he helped set up booths, decorate the 4-H building and work shifts in the 4-H food booth. The members also judge the Cloverbud's workbooks and organize their stick horse events.

It's not uncommon, Bywater said, to have former teen members, who have graduated from 4-H, return during the fair for years to help out. Former members, Jared Studer and Bret Muecke, helped keep order in the swine show ring this year by operating the separation boards that are

used to keep the hog from escaping from the ring or from biting each other.

"They just come in and ask if there is anything they can do to help out this year," Bywater said. "And they do it all for a cinnamon roll and a drink."

Other former members help tag dairy cows or weigh the swine, Bywater said. Some former members, like Ashley Vargas, return as judges. Staci Branaum, 18, attended col-

lege last year but returned to the Minidoka County Fair to help out the 4-H program this week.

"After being in 4-H for nine years I guess it's just habit," said Branaum, who was on hand to help out Friday at the beef show.

Debbie Branaum, Staci's mother said it's a fun group with a focus on cooperation and community involvement.

"It teaches them to think beyond

themselves and do what they can to help others and their community," Debbie Branaum said.

Gillespie said as soon as pre-teens hit 13 years old they are sent a birthday card with an invitation to join the association.

"We have kids who are too young trying to come to the meetings and we've had a couple try to fudge their age," Gillespie said.

Minidoka County 4-H Teen Association President Kolbee Tibbets, 16, said she's been in 4-H for 11 years and joined the association when she turned 13.

"As a little kid growing up I saw all the teens helping out at the fair and I wanted to do that to," said Tibbets. "When I was little I was always looking for someone to look up to."

Tibbets also works part-time for Bywater.

"In a lot of counties they deal with a lot of teens dropping out of 4-H, but not in Minidoka County," Gillespie said. "We don't lose our teens."

Churchman, 54, the owner of Churchman Jewelry and Idaho Artistry, was arrested the morning of July 25 after a federal search warrant was executed at the store, located at 153 Main Ave. W.

The warrant was issued because an illegal form of synthetic marijuana known as "spice" was allegedly being sold out of the business, a police report states.

The dismissed charges include controlled substance possession with intent to manufacture or deliver, possession of a controlled substance and theft by receiving, possessing or disposing of stolen property.

Churchman still faces a misdemeanor charge of possession of a controlled substance.

According to a police report, officers allegedly found about an ounce of marijuana along with some on a digital scale and grinder, 1.5 grams of cocaine and about 1.5 pounds of spice in Churchman's store. A loaded .22-caliber handgun was also reportedly found in a safe behind the cash register, the report states. The report states Churchman also allegedly had two hydrocodone pills but it was unclear whether he had a prescription.

Shooting Suspect Alarmed Psychiatrist

DENVER (AP) • In the wake of the Virginia Tech tragedy five years ago, the University of Colorado and other schools across the U.S. created “threat assessment teams” to identify and take action against students who might turn violent. Now, in the aftermath of the movie theater rampage in Aurora, some are wondering whether the system broke down.

A Denver TV station reported this week that a university psychiatrist was so alarmed by graduate student James E. Holmes’ behavior that she tried to bring him to the attention of the school’s threat assessment team more than a month before the attack, but the group never met to talk about him because he had already taken steps to drop out.

Holmes, 24, is charged with murdering 12 people and wounding 58 in the July 20 rampage a few miles from the Aurora campus after methodically stockpiling guns and ammunition for months.

University Chancellor Don Elliman has repeatedly said the school did all it could with regard to Holmes. He and other university officials have refused to discuss any specifics, citing privacy laws and a judge’s gag order. The university would not say whether staff members had any concerns about Holmes or whether police were ever alerted to him. KMGH-TV and the *Denver Post*, citing sources they did not identify, said police were never contacted.

It’s not clear what alarmed the psychiatrist, Dr. Lynne Fenton, or whether she even treated him. Virginia passed a law in 2008 requiring its four-year public colleges to set up threat assessment teams to investigate students after a mentally unstable Seung-Hui Cho shot 32 people.

US Breaks Out of Hiring Slump

National unemployment rate ticks up to 8.3 percent.

WASHINGTON • Employers added 163,000 jobs in July, more than double the average of the prior three months. But as welcomed as that acceleration was, analysts still considered the pace of job growth just middling.

And it did little for the nation’s unemployment rate, which ticked up a notch last month to 8.3 percent, the Bureau of Labor Statistics said Friday.

The split picture in the report of more jobs but higher unemployment reflects the two different surveys the

agency uses for its monthly snapshot of the job market.

And it gave President Barack Obama and the presumptive Republican challenger, Mitt Romney, each something to seize.

Analysts said the July jobs report may complicate but probably won’t sway the Federal Reserve’s thinking on whether to provide more stimulus for the economy. The Fed this week signaled a stronger willingness to take action, possibly at its next meeting in September.

Economists remained cautious about the hiring outlook, saying

monthly job growth wasn’t likely to get any better than July’s over the rest of the year.

The U.S. economy is expanding at a sluggish pace because of softening consumer spending and government cutbacks. Employers also are weighed down by uncertainties over the debt crisis in Europe, a slowing global economy, and the political and fiscal situation in the U.S.

“The most basic problem is we just don’t have strong enough (economic) growth to see job prospects improve,” said Keith Hall, former commissioner at the Bureau of Labor Statistics and now senior research fellow at George Mason University.

More than Gay Marriage Driving Chick-Fil-A Flap

ATLANTA • When President Barack Obama said same-sex couples should have the right to marry, it was national news for a few days before the presidential campaign and the country went back to business as usual.

Yet weeks after a fast-food executive doubled down on his opposition to gay marriage, debate rages on about equality, religious values and free speech. “Chick-fil-A Appreciation Day” on Wednesday, with supporters flooding the chain’s franchises around the country, was countered with “kiss-ins” by same-sex couples at assorted locations Friday, long after Chick-fil-A president Dan Cathy’s initial comments to a religious publication touched off the clash.

That’s an unusual amount of staying power for what looked like just another skirmish over a hot-button question.

Coursing throughout the conversations on social media, in letters to the editor and in long lines to buy chicken sandwiches is the sense among proud Southerners that the outcry over Cathy’s comments smacks of regional stereotyping. When public officials in Boston, Philadelphia and Chicago tell a Southern icon such as Chick-fil-A that it’s no longer welcome, and that Cathy should keep his opinions to himself, many in the Atlanta-based chain’s home region hear more than a little northern condescension.

“Maybe the reaction is just because we’re Southerners,” said Rose Mason, who was lunching Friday at a Chick-fil-A in suburban Atlanta.

Mason, who described herself as Christian, said she grew up in New York City. Now, she said, “I deal with my sis-

ter telling me we’re a little backward. People have this idea that we’re just behind on everything. So they view anything we say through that (perception).”

Cathy, a devout Southern Baptist whose family has always been outspoken about its faith, sparked the controversy by telling the Baptist Press that he and his family-owned restaurant chain are “guilty as charged” for openly — and financially — supporting groups that advocate for “the biblical definition of a family unit.” He later added that the United States is “inviting God’s judgment on our nation when we shake our fist at him and say, ‘We know better than

you as to what constitutes a marriage.”

For Marci Alt, organizer of a protest Friday at a Chick-fil-A in the relatively liberal Atlanta suburb of Decatur, it’s Cathy’s financial backing of conservative groups such as the Family Research Council that takes the conversation beyond merely what he said.

“Dan Cathy has the same First Amendment rights that I do. If he doesn’t want to agree with same-sex marriage, I understand that,” she said.

“But when he puts a pen to paper and writes a check to an organization that is about to squash my equal rights, I have a problem with that.”

UN General Assembly Denounces Syrian Crackdown

UNITED NATIONS (AP) • The U.N. General Assembly overwhelmingly denounced Syria’s crackdown on dissent Friday in a symbolic effort meant to push the deadlocked Security Council and the world at large into action on stopping the country’s civil war.

Before the vote, Secretary-General Ban Ki-Moon reminded the Assembly of the fresh violence in the city of Aleppo and drew comparisons between the failure to act in Syria with the international community’s failure to protect people from past genocide in Srebrenica and Rwanda.

“The conflict in Syria is a test of everything this organization stands for,” Ban said. “I do not want today’s United Nations to fail that test.”

The vote came after the more powerful Security Council was stopped by a series of Russian and Chinese vetoes on resolutions that would have opened the door to sanctions on Syria.

The General Assembly vote was 133 in support of the resolution and 12 against, with 31 abstaining. Syria’s ambassador angrily called the vote “a piece of theater.”

Though General Assembly resolutions are unenforceable, a strong vote can carry moral weight.

Even so, the resolution’s Arab sponsors this week weakened two key provisions — a demand that President Bashar Assad resign and a call for other nations to place sanctions on Syria. Russia and China objected to those provisions. Both voted “no” Friday. The revised resolution takes a swipe at Russia and China by “deploring the Security Council failure” to act. Frustration over the lack of action was clear. Former U.N. chief Kofi Annan resigned Thursday as the joint U.N.-Arab League envoy to Syria.

House Passes Livestock Relief Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) • The House on Thursday extended disaster assistance to livestock producers reeling from rising feed prices caused by the drought that has scorched much of the nation.

The 223-197 vote to revive expired disaster relief programs for cattle and sheep producers was one of the House’s last actions before lawmakers left for their five-week August recess.

The Senate was not acting on the bill as it wrapped up its pre-recess work, and Democratic opponents characterized the legislation as cover for Republicans wanting to explain to rural constituents why they put off action on a comprehensive five-year farm policy bill.

While many crop farmers have insurance, livestock producers are vulnerable to sharp increases in feed prices

resulting from the dry weather. Some have had to liquidate stocks early because of the high maintenance costs.

The bill would restore four disaster aid programs, mostly for livestock producers and tree farmers, that expired last year. The estimated cost, \$383 million, would be paid for by shaving some \$630 million from two conservation programs.

Not only did the club buy Griffis a library card, they are planning to develop a program to help many Jerome County children afford a library card.

Griffis, who is an incoming seventh grader at North Valley Academy in Gooding, felt so great about the help from the Rotary Club, he held a fundraiser and tried to repay the club with the \$75 he raised.

Seems to us like we have a budding community leader growing up in Jerome County.

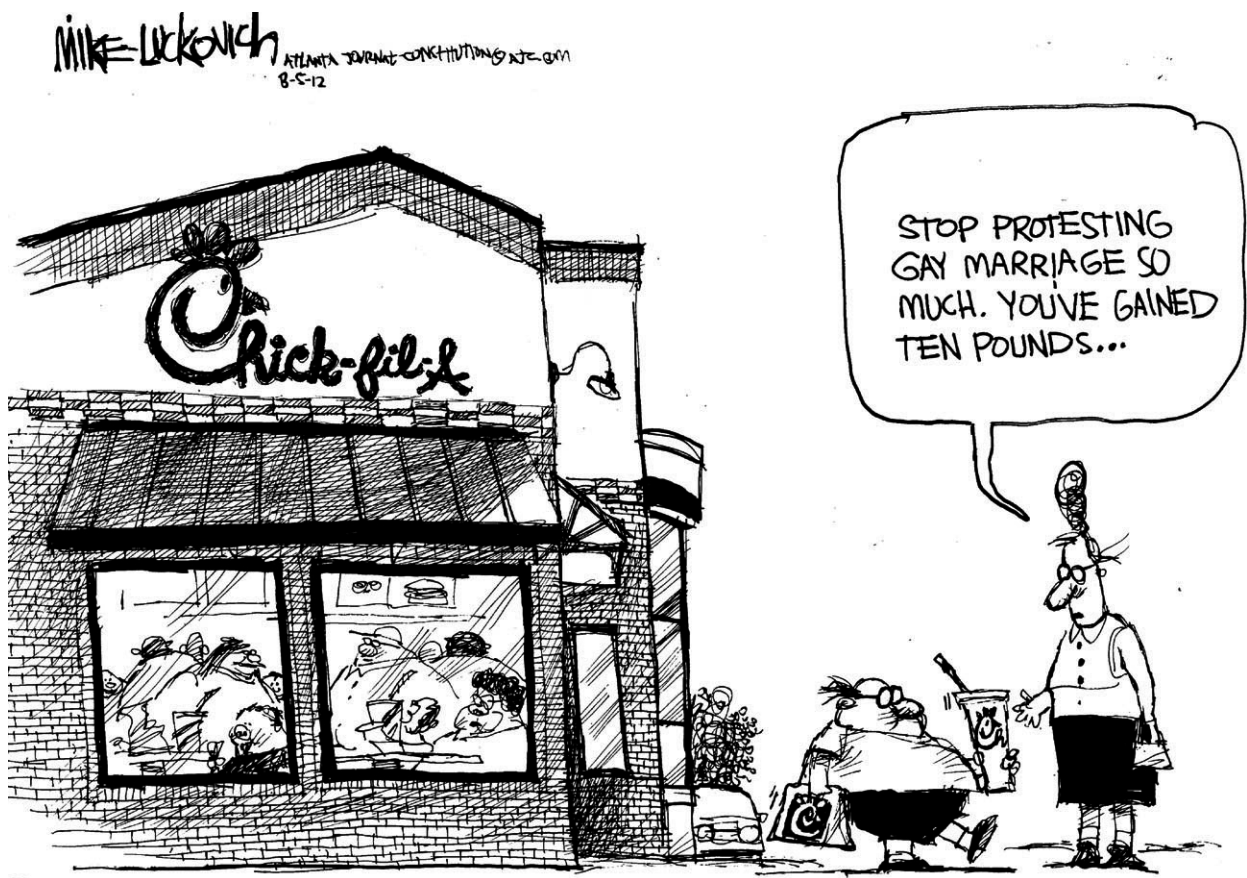

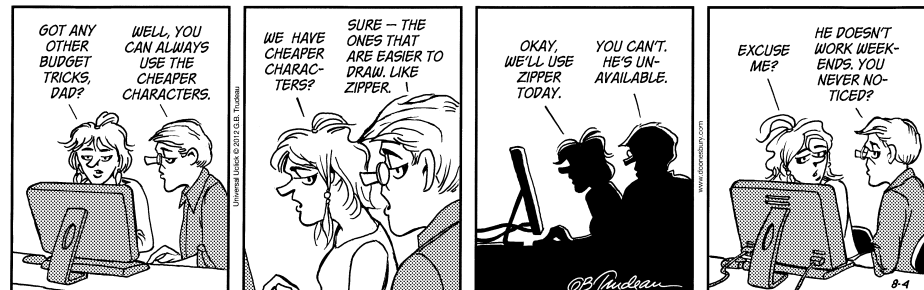

"After research and multiple test(s) conducted of local fuel sources, our final decision is that on Saturday, July 28, 2012, testing of fuel samples from car numbers 61 and 3 in the Super Stocks class are valid and the fuel was found to be an unapproved fuel per Magic Valley Speedway rule #3.29.1," the statement reads.

The rule states, "Only 91 octane gasoline (is) allowed and shall not be blended with anything. No icing or cooling of fuel system, fuel tank, fuel or intake is permitted in garage, pit, or racing areas. Drivers may be required to run track fuel."

The statement went on to say, "The No. 61 team, having already been on probation, will forfeit any points and purse money earned for qualifying and the second main event on the night of July 28, 2012. Also, the No. 61 team will be fined \$500, due and payable before their next race entry at Magic Valley Speedway."

Boldewijn Ruled Out Four Games

BOISE • Boise State wide receiver Gerardo Boldewijn will again miss the first four games of the Broncos' regular season, the school announced Friday.

The school said Boldewijn violated the NCAA's extra benefits rule by accepting assistance from his host family to fly home to the Netherlands following Boise State's Las Vegas Bowl victory over Arizona State last December. Boldewijn has repaid the family in full but must sit out the first four games of the season.

Boldewijn also missed the first four games of the 2011 season after receiving impermissible benefits regarding the use of a 1990 Toyota Camry and driver's insurance.

He can practice during his suspension and is currently eligible to return for Boise State's game Oct. 6 at Southern Mississippi.

The school said that the violation is a secondary one and will not affect the football program's probation, which was previously handed down for major NCAA violations.

Injury Ends Yriarte's BSU Career

BOISE • Boise State football coach Chris Petersen announced Friday that center Cory Yriarte's career with the Broncos is over.

The school said in a release that Yriarte suffered a knee injury in summer conditioning that will prevent him from playing this season.

Yriarte suffered season-ending knee injuries in 2009 and 2010. He had been granted a sixth year of eligibility from the NCAA following last season.

Vandal Football Hires Moses

MOSCOW • Idaho football coach Robb Akey announced the hiring of Wayne Moses as the team's new running backs coach late Thursday.

Moses spent the last four seasons as the running backs coach at UCLA.

Moses has coached for 34 years, almost exclusively as a running backs coach. All of that time was spent in the college game except for a two-year stint with the St. Louis Rams in 2006-07.

The position became available when Jason Gesser was promoted to offensive coordinator.

Idaho Men's Hoops Makes Assistant Changes

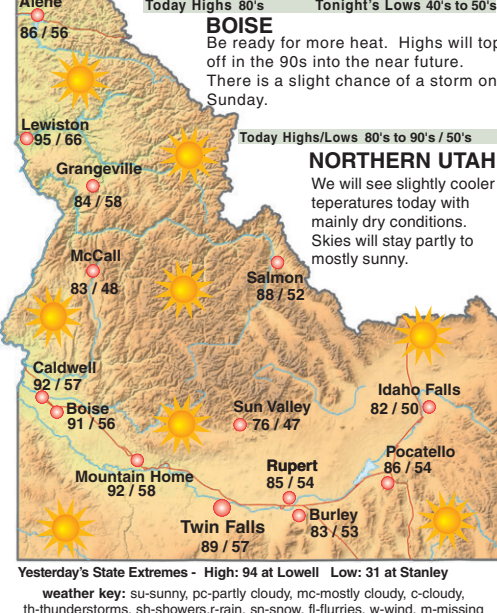

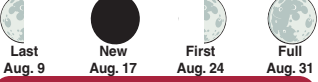

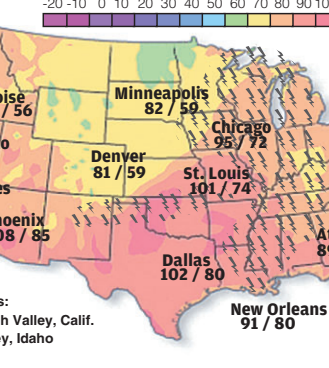

Linemen Become the Stars on Hall of Fame Weekend

CANTON, Ohio • They blocked and tackled and got lost in those scrums at the line of scrimmage, overshadowed by the guys who handled the ball and soaked in the moments of glory.

It all changes in Canton this weekend, when a group of linemen become the stars of the NFL's most prestigious event.

Four linemen will be among the six players inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame tonight — Chris Doleman, Cortez Kennedy, Willie Roaf and Dermontti Dawson.

In several ways, it's fitting that the ones who protected the quarterbacks and tried to get them to the ground are the ones getting top billing.

"Any coach will tell you the backbone of your team is the offensive line and the defensive line, and it is appropriate that these guys go in together," former Pittsburgh Steelers coach Bill Cowher said.

For this group, it's about time.

"These guys like Willie Roaf and Jack Butler and Cortez Kennedy and Dermontti Dawson, how often do you hear their names called unless they're doing something that they shouldn't be doing?" said Doleman, who had 150 1/2 sacks.

The six inductees are the centerpiece of a special weekend in the northern Ohio city, which had to do without one of its main events last year. The Hall of Fame game was called off because of the NFL lockout, costing the hall and the city a lot of money.

The game returns on Sunday night, with more than a little intrigue of its own. The New Orleans Saints, hit hard by their bounty scandal in the offseason, will open the preseason against the Arizona Cardinals.

It'll overshadow the preseason, at least for the first game.

"I know there'll be a lot of attention based on what happened with their off-season," Cardinals coach Ken Whisenhunt said.

The weekend started with a big moment for the hall itself. A 10,000-square-foot center named for Bills founder Ralph Wilson, Jr., was dedicated, a major expansion that will provide more space for documents, photographs and artifacts.

Then, those big guys were ready to get the big moments, the ones usually saved for someone else.

"Every quarterback who wins the Super Bowl, he goes into the Hall of Fame," Doleman said. "It's like, 'Come on!' That position probably deserves more scrutiny than any other position on the field because you can have an average quarterback with a great offensive line, and he gets all the glory. They're enabling him to throw the ball and do what he needs to do."

Today some of those Hall of Fame passers will be in the audience applauding a group of players known for their years of excellence at the game's basics — blocking and tackling.

"A very down-to-earth class, not a lot of egos involved," Roaf said. "We all are happy about what we achieved, but (they're) good guys and good players to go in with."

Making it even more special is the fact that the linemen haven't had much chance experience in those confetti-spray celebrations on Super Bowl Sundays.

"The fact we have four linemen going in is real special," Roaf said. "Also, none of us have rings. We all had real good careers, but none of us played in the Super Bowl other than Dermontti."

The only "skill position" player going into the hall this weekend is Martin, who finished as the fourth-leading rusher in NFL history. He has chosen former coach Bill Parcells — who has been nominated but not elected to the hall — to present him for induction.

"My career wouldn't have been half of what it was if it wasn't for Bill Parcells," Martin said. "He helped me be a better running back, but also to be a better professional and be a better man. He is still a huge part of my life."

PHELPS GOES OUT IN STYLE WITH 100 FLY WIN

LONDON • Michael Phelps is turning his final Olympics into quite a victory lap, and don't fret about American swimming after he's gone.

Led by a pair of high schoolers, the post-Phelps era will be in very good hands.

In what amounted to a symbolic changing of the guard Friday, Phelps claimed the 17th gold medal of a career that has just 24 hours to go — on the same night one teenager, Missy Franklin, broke a world record in the backstroke and another, Katie Ledecky, took down a hallowed American mark that was set nearly eight years before she was born.

"This has sort of turned into the youth Olympics," Franklin said. "There's so many members of the team that are coming up this year that are going to carry on this incredible generation."

Incredible, indeed. His long arms whirling through the water, Phelps was seventh at the turn in 100-meter butterfly — it always takes him a while to get up to speed — but he brought it home like a champion. That, in a sense, sums up his Olympics farewell. He got off to a sluggish start but has three victories in the past four days, and it's almost

certain he'll take home one more gold today.

That's a relay. This was the final race he'll do alone.

"I'm just happy that the last one was a win," said Phelps, who will likely fade into retirement with twice as many golds as anyone else. "That's all I really wanted coming into the night."

He'll finish up swimming the butterfly leg of 4x100 medley relay, an event the U.S. men have never lost. That streak should carry right on with the Americans sending out an imposing quartet that includes three gold medalists (Phelps, freestyler Nathan Adrian and backstroker Matt Grevers), plus a guy who won bronze (breaststroker Brendan Hansen).

It's unfathomable to think the Phelps era could end with anything less than a performance that puts him atop the podium one last time, gold medal No. 18 around his neck.

"I don't think Michael is going to let anything go wrong in that race," said Eric Shanteau, who swam the relay for the U.S. in the prelims.

Just minutes before Phelps took center stage at the Olympic Aquatics Centre, Franklin set a world record in the 200 backstroke, the 17-

Ketchum Rider Out After First Round

LONDON • Ketchum's Adrienne Lyle scored a solid 69.468 in her Grand Prix dressage event Friday at the Olympics' equestrian competition, but fell short of earning a second ride next week as she finished 35th out of 49 riders.

Seventy points is generally considered an excellent performance, but the 27-year-old's steady ride on Wizard wasn't enough to crack the top three American finishers, who advanced to the Grand Prix Special. Lyle's ride was 0.775 behind the final qualifying American, Jan Ebeling.

The U.S. finished fifth as a team in the qualifying round, and will take three riders in to the Grand Prix special. The top seven teams, and anyone in the top 11 from countries that didn't qualify a team, advanced.

year-old's third gold in London. Another American teen, 19-year-old Elizabeth Beisel, claimed the bronze in that race.

"I can't believe what just happened," said Franklin, who had dedicated her Olympics to victims of the theater shooting not far from her Colorado home. "In that last 25, I knew I was giving it everything I had because I couldn't feel my arms and legs and I was just trying to get my hand to the wall as fast I could."

Right after Phelps was done, Ledecky — the youngest member of the U.S. team at 15 — nearly broke the world record to win gold in the 800 freestyle, denying Britain's Rebecca Adlington a repeat before her home fans. Adlington settled for

bronze in a race Ledecky dominated from start to finish, falling off record pace only in the last 15 meters.

But no one has dominated like Phelps, who increased his career overall medal total to 21.

Even though Phelps didn't go as fast in the final as he did in the semifinals, he actually won by a relatively comfortable margin compared to his two previous Olympic wins in the 100 fly: four-hundredths of a second over Ian Crocker in 2004, then one-hundredth of a second — the closest race possible — against Cavic at the Beijing Games four years ago.

That was the victory that kept Phelps on course to win a historic eight gold medals in China.

Renowned Romanian Pianist Ursuleasa Dead at 33

BERLIN (AP) • Internationally renowned Romanian pianist Mihaela Ursuleasa has been found dead in her apartment in the Austrian capital. She was 33.

The musician's agent, Andreea Butucariu, said in a statement from Berlin Friday that Ursuleasa died on Thursday from the effects of a cerebral hemorrhage and asked for her family's privacy to be respected. Police in Vienna confirmed the cause of death.

Butucariu told Romanian media that Ursuleasa recently canceled two concerts in the Romanian capital, Bucharest, on unspecified health grounds.

Ursuleasa began playing the piano at 5 years old under the guidance of her Gypsy jazz musician father in then communist Roma-

nia. She obtained a grant to study in Vienna at 12, a year after communism collapsed.

She went on to play at New York's Carnegie Hall, with the Rundfunk-Sinfonieorchester in Berlin, with Orchestre National de France and also with the London Philharmonic Orchestra.

Romanian soprano Felicia Filip on Friday reminisced about Ursuleasa's debut. "In my mind's eye I see the child lost in the immensity of the piano," she told Romanian news agency Mediasfax, referring to one of the pianist's first public performances. "I recall a child who couldn't reach the piano pedals," she said.

Ursuleasa is survived by a 5-year-old daughter. In a statement on the pianist's

website, Butucariu asked that promoters "that had invited Mihaela for the next months" contribute towards an account for her daughter.

He said her funeral would be held next week, but provided no details where she would be buried.

"Artists like Mihaela are those who give us hope, help us feel and make us understand that music, and also art, prevails above everything else; that it makes us advance as human beings," Butucariu said in the statement.

"They make us realize that we are on the right path when we open not our eyes and ears but our hearts to listen, expecting music making to move us and take us someplace else. This is what Mihaela's music did."

Sidney Leiken, Businessman and Legislator, Dies at 95

ROSEBURG, Ore. (AP) • Former Oregon legislator Sidney Leiken has died at age 95.

The *News-Review* of Roseburg reports Leiken died July 26 in Rancho Mirage, Calif.

Leiken came to Oregon during the Depression as a member of the Civilian Conservation Corps.

He was president of the Sutherlin-based L&H Lumber Company in the 1940s and '50s.

He served four terms in the Oregon House in the 1960s, and chaired the board of Douglas National Bank from 1959 to 1987.

Leiken said obtaining the money to start Umpqua Community College was his

greatest legislative achievement.

His office manager for 44 years, Minnie Aday of Winston, said Leiken was honest and charitable, and nobody could have asked for a better boss.

Among Leiken's survivors is his grandson Sid Leiken, a Lane County commissioner.

William H. 'Bill' Mensing, Maker of Water-drop Tanks, Dies at 88

LOS ANGELES • William H. "Bill" Mensing, the owner of an aircraft sheet-metal business whose improved water-drop tanks made for Los Angeles County Fire Department helicopters in the early 1970s became widely used, has died. He was 88.

Mensing died July 26 at his home in Santa Paula, Calif., after a brief illness, said his family.

A World War II veteran, Mensing opened a precision sheet-metal business called Sheetcraft in Los Angeles in the early 1960s and became known for his skill in making new parts for damaged helicopters and airplanes.

In 1970, he was offered a different kind of job by the Los Angeles County Fire Department, which in 1957 pioneered the use of water-drop tanks on the bellies of

helicopters for firefighting. Aircraft Rebuilders, the company that had been making the tanks for the fire department, was no longer in business and the department wanted Mensing to replicate the company's most recent tank.

Working with Doug Mathews, the fire department's chief of helicopter maintenance, Mensing made a number of innovative changes to the 360-gallon tanks he began manufacturing for the department.

"When Mensing got it, we kept improving it," the now-retired Mathews recalled on Thursday. "He came up with a lot of ideas, plus we came up with some ideas."

Mensing not only made the tank lighter by making internal changes, but he changed it from a single-drop tank to a split-drop tank: Instead of the pilot having to drop the entire load of water, he could

dump half a load at a time.

"It's commonly known as the Sheetcraft tank or the L.A. tank," said Mathews, adding that the U.S. Forest Service, the state of California, the Los Angeles City Fire Department and the Ventura County (Calif.) Fire Department are among those that later began using Mensing's tanks.

"He was a pioneer in helicopter water-drop tank manufacturing and did an extremely good job improving it," Mathews said.

Over the next 30 years, the product came to dominate Mensing's Sheetcraft business, with his tanks being used in such far-flung locales as Sardinia, Italy; China and South Korea.

Mensing, who moved his operation from Whiteman Airport in the Pacoima section of Los Angeles to Santa Paula Airport in 1975, retired a few years ago.

British Military Historian Keegan Dies at 78

LONDON • British academic John Keegan, whose studies of men at war are counted among the classic works of military history, has died, *The Daily Telegraph* said Friday. He was 78.

A scholar of battle who never served in the military, Keegan's interests ranged from the American Civil War to the Iraq War by way of Agincourt, Waterloo and both world wars. His 1976 work "The Face of Battle," which provided a soldier's-eye view of the blood and terror of combat, remains one of his most popular works. Yet in his introduction he denied possessing any special insight into the trappings of warfare.

"I have read about battles, of course, have talked about battles, have been

lectured about battles and, in the last four or five years, have watched battles in progress, or apparently in progress, on the television screen," he wrote. "But I have never been in a battle. And I grow increasingly convinced that I have very little idea of what a battle can be like."

Born in London on May 15, 1934, Keegan followed the progress of World War II from rural England, where his father had been charged with looking after children evacuated from the cities to escape German bombing.

His interest in war grew into a specialization in military history at Balliol College, Oxford. In 1957 he received a scholarship for travel to American Civil War battlefields. He then worked at the U.S. Embassy in London, and he would remain a strong supporter of the alliance between

Britain and the United States.

From 1960 to 1985 he taught at the Royal Military Academy at Sandhurst — Britain's equivalent of West Point — before joining the *Telegraph* as defense correspondent in 1986.

"I thought to myself: If I don't do it now, I'll be an academic all of my life," he later told *The New York Times*. "So I left Sandhurst and I've been enjoying myself ever since as a journalist."

Con Coughlin, the *Telegraph's* executive foreign editor, said in an email that Keegan died Thursday of natural causes at his home in Kilmington, western England, surrounded by his family.

Keegan is survived by his wife, their two daughters and two sons. Coughlin said the date of the funeral has yet to be announced.

GIVING from the HEART

Though times are tough, Magic Valley churches have maintained a steady flow of tithes and offerings.

TWIN FALLS • During a time when there is so little, congregations throughout the valley have pulled together to give so much.

The recent economic setback had few churches seeing a minimal decrease in tithes and monetary offerings and an increase in members giving back to the community in forms of time and food.

"It was an interesting dynamic," said the Rev. Brian Vriesman, pastor of Twin Falls Reformed Church. "People had less disposable income, but it kept people from leaving the area. We

saw a slight decrease in offerings, but nothing substantial."

Most churches encourage the traditional 10 percent tithe, but don't require it. The passing of the plate has members digging through their pocketbooks in an attempt to give something.

Senior Pastor Jeff Cooper of First Baptist Church said the church received a dedicated prayer room because of members giving what they could.

"Because members pulled together, the room was possible," he said.

Immanuel Lutheran Church also saw a slight decrease in offerings during the recession. The Rev. Roger Sedlmayr said

they don't require an amount, but offerings have increased in the past year.

"They had been decreasing for a while," he said. "But members have been very supportive of the school and the center, especially in the tough economy."

The economy hit Lighthouse Christian Fellowship somewhat significantly as their food bank dwindled.

"At one time food donations went down really low," Pastor Morris Allen said. "We were wondering what we were going to do. But I was surprised how quickly it went back up."

Allen said the church encourages people to give

whatever they can. The church has a second building that houses the food bank. The provisions feed people locally and members pull together to give what they can.

"We just make it," he said.

While tithes and offerings go into the community, the church still has a business to run. Budgets have dwindled and churches have been faced with cutbacks in staff and activities.

"We meet the needs as a church, but we're mindful of staff," said the Rev. Nate Dreesmann of First Presbyterian Church in Jerome. "We are keeping donations more

local as much as possible."

The majority of his members donate something; they just automatically give on Sundays. Others give of their time and talent, he said.

"We encourage people to give in whatever way they can," he continued. "A large part of our congregation is professional and we have a large talent pool of people who know how to get things done. We have an incredible mix of people who work together."

Working together helps keep congregations together. The idea of giving is instilled in most from the beginning.

Dwayne Kluchesky, "Pastor K" at Twin Falls

Seventh-day Adventist Church, said his church encourages the 10 percent voluntary tithe to everyone in the congregation, from children to adults.

Once the money is collected it goes to the conference office in Boise that disperses money to missions, organizations and salaries. Church maintenance services are paid for by an offerings collection that goes to the local church budget.

Despite the economic setbacks faced by those members, Pastor Klechesky said people really gave, at least at the local level.

"The state had 5 percent cutbacks and not all have been reinstated," he said. "But things are improving. Over the last five years we've seen a real turnaround."

"They felt the tough times, but it was nothing they couldn't weather," he said.

Giving for tithes and free-will offerings has still been good beside the economic downturn. If people couldn't give financially they sacrificed in other ways, especially by providing for missionaries, he said.

"We have refused to give into the economic downturn."

One thing that may have helped people through the rough recession in the past five years is not so much the receiving as it was the giving.

Community Christian Church Minister Jason Carr said the congregation does

Cardinal Burke Returns to Mark Shrine's Fourth Anniversary

LA CROSSE, WIS. • The four-year anniversary of the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe was marked Tuesday with a visit by Raymond Leo Cardinal Burke, the driving force behind the shrine's foundation and a man who has since been elevated to the highest levels of the Catholic Church.

Burke, who declined an interview, was bishop of La Crosse when he proposed the shrine in 2000.

The concept created a deep schism in the regional Catholic community, where some argued the \$25 million proposed to build the shrine would be better spent on the poor.

Four years after the groundbreaking, church leaders say the controversy has faded as the shrine continues to welcome visitors from all over the world.

"The controversy has died down drastically," shrine spokesman Jack Socha said. "The shrine is a spiritual and economic boon to the community. Whatever money was spent, this is something that will last."

Already this year, 65,000 people have visited, said Socha, who has given tours to people from "virtually every state." Staffed by only nine people, the shrine relies heavily on volunteers to

maintain the extensive grounds.

"People are very surprised that something this large and beautiful is hidden away in the south of La Crosse," Socha said.

The 103-acre complex on Justin Road includes a Pilgrim Center, the Votive Candle Chapel, an outdoor Stations of the Cross, the Rosary Walk and other sites that dot a meditation trail leading up to the Shrine Church.

"A shrine is for pilgrimage," Burke said when the shrine was dedicated in 2008. "Through pilgrimage, God reveals to us his love. He lets us see again the extraordinary nature of our ordinary daily life."

The goal of the project was to create "a place where families can come in times of great celebration and

great need," Socha said.

He called Burke's return "bittersweet."

Known as a conservative hardliner and an expert on canon law, Burke was appointed as the archbishop of St. Louis in 2003 and elevated to the College of Cardinals by Pope Benedict XVI in 2010.

"We've missed him," Socha said.

The cardinal studied in La Crosse and taught at Aquinas.

On Tuesday, he celebrated a Mass at the shrine to mark the anniversary.

Burke serves as head of the Apostolic Signatura, which is the highest judicial authority in the Catholic Church. His position at the Vatican is one of "great responsibility," Socha said.

How can people of faith come to different conclusions on social issues?

SELF-INTEREST CAN BE A PROBLEM

No matter what the issue or where it is occurring, there is always a percentage of the people plotted solidly in the ground of self-interest who come to every conclusion based on what is best for them individually.

They think they are always right; they believe their religion is the only true representation of God; they pound their fists on the table to emphasize their political views; they campaign vigorously to hold back rights from others that they themselves enjoy; and they do not worry about the consequences that will befall others as a result of what they want.

Although it may seem like I am criticizing this type of person, I am not. All people are a wonderful part of the great diversity in which we reside and are worthy of respect. I am simply pointing out these people do exist and I believe their me-me-me thoughts of self-interest have bloated to the point of decreasing the oxygen in their minds and smothering out good reasoning.

In dealing with any issue, the primary question on every person's mind should be, "What is the very best thing for all?" If the people

engaged in the issue hold that as foremost in importance, progress will be made and the answer will be discovered. Our differences in opinion need not divide us.

GOOD PEOPLE HAVE DIFFERENT IDEAS

Catholic social justice teaching largely developed during the 20th century as the church came to view its mission not only as a teacher to its own members, but as a servant of the world community as well.

As that world servant, the church began to analyze social conditions brought about by developments such as industrialization, national governance and global economics and to reflect on these social conditions in the light of the Gospel.

The church advocated for the reform of social institutions to better promote the rights and dignity of each human person and it called upon every Christian to work on behalf of the common good.

Church social teaching generally addresses very complex global issues and is necessarily general and somewhat abstract. It becomes then the task of the local churches and individual Christians to analyze the situations of their locale, reflect on those situations in light of the Gospel and church teaching and develop

their own conclusions and directions for action.

Sometimes people come to different conclusions regarding social issues because self-interest clouds their vision. But good and prayerful people may also reach different conclusions because their respective analysis of their local social situations differs. In those instances, they can reasonably argue for different applications of these general teachings.

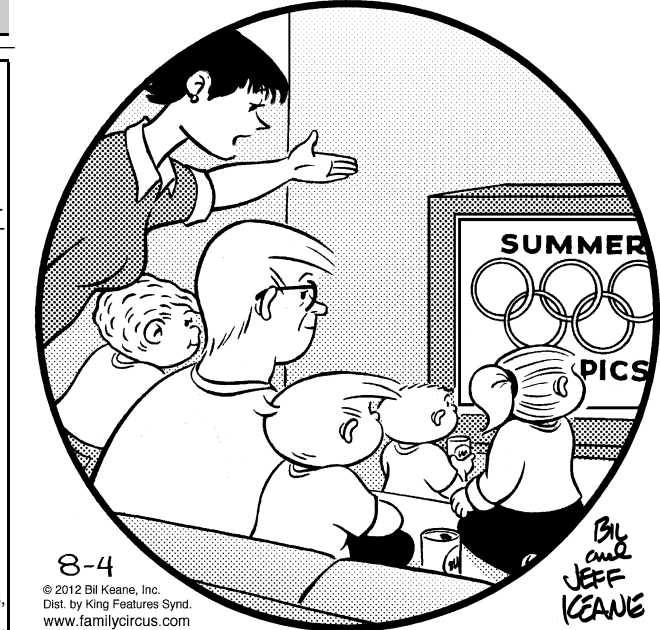

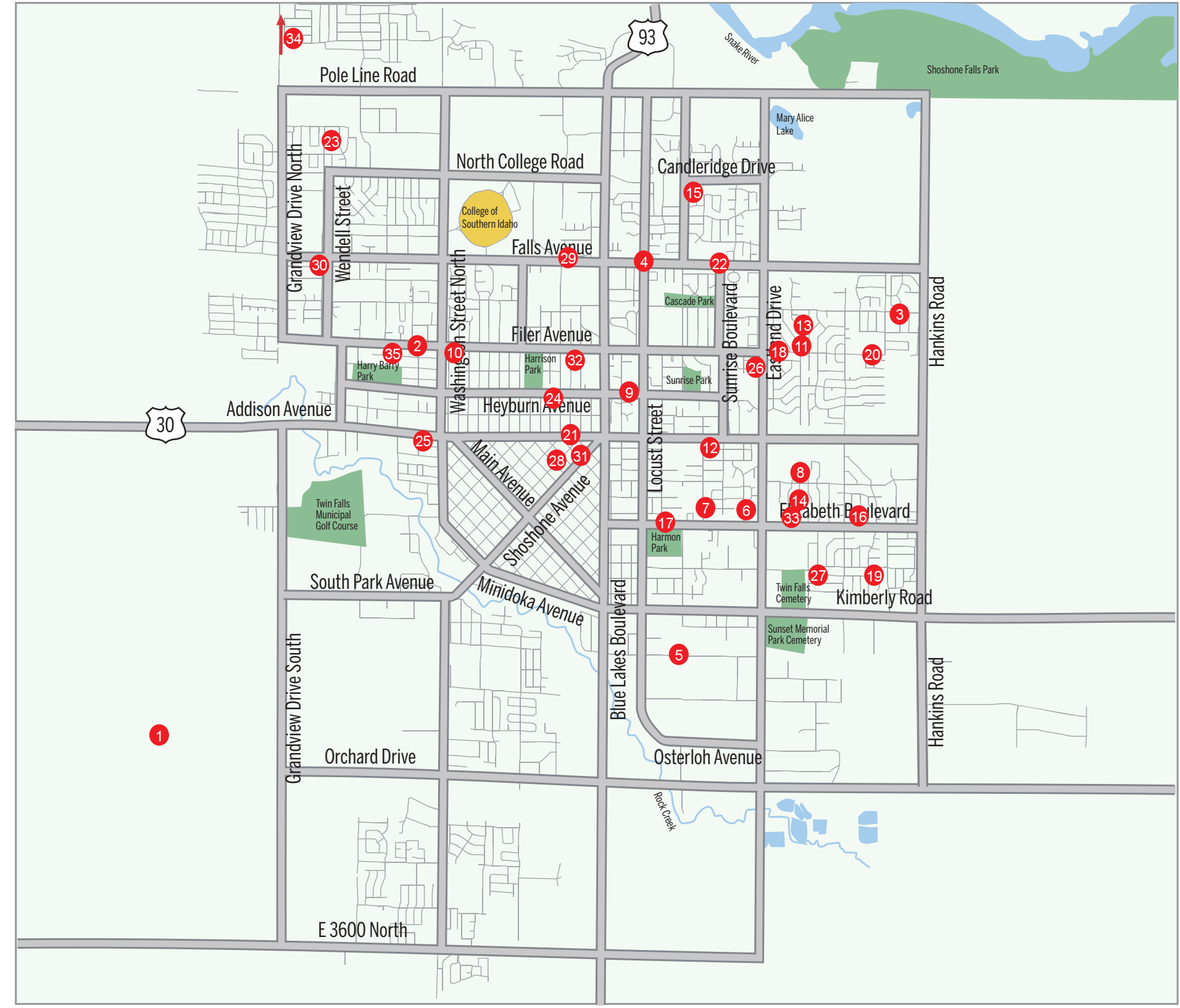

Today's deal comes from the bulletins of a recent U.S. Nationals. (If you are interested in reading such reports, go to www.acbl.org/play/nabc3.php.)

Both Souths reached four spades doubled, with the minority of high cards, after each of the North and South players had taken aggressive positions in the auction. After the lead of the heart king, both Souths took an immediate spade finesse. The unsuccessful declarer drew three rounds of trump and ducked a club to East. But now two rounds of diamonds prevented declarer from establishing the club suit.

The successful, more fortunate declarer played a second trump to hand and ducked a club to East, who exited with the third trump. Now declarer simply ducked a club and claimed. But the defense here could also have prevailed by playing two rounds of diamonds. Declarer then ruffs a heart to hand, but when he leads a club toward dummy, West can defeat the contract by rising with the club king! This maneuver is often referred to as a crocodile coup since you open your jaws and swallow your partner's honor. If declarer ducks this, the defense takes a club ruff, and if declarer wins the trick, he no longer has an entry to the clubs.

Declarer could perhaps have done better by winning the second trump in dummy at trick three and playing a low club from the table. If East hops up with the queen, he beats the contract. But if he ducks, the crocodile no longer works for the defense.

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Fire Near Stanley Growing

BOISE (AP) • Fire officials say a wildfire burning in the Frank Church River of No Return Wilderness has now scorched nearly 29 square miles and is being battled by more than 200 firefighters.

The Halstead Fire is burning in the wilderness 18 miles northwest of Stanley and plumes of smoke are visible from the small resort town.

Government officials are holding a public meeting in Stanley Friday night to address concerns about the blaze, which ignited a week ago from a lightning strike.

Officials say crews have been successful in holding fire lines along the southwest perimeter, though so far the fire is zero percent contained.

Forest officials say several campgrounds and access roads remain closed because of the fire.

Body Found of Man Drowned at Pillar Falls

TWIN FALLS • Search and rescue teams from Twin Falls County and Jerome recovered the body of a Washington man near Pillar Falls Thursday afternoon. He had been missing since Saturday.

Justice Kramer, 42, was hiking near Pillar Falls with his daughter and her friend on July 28 when he fell into the Snake River.

About 25 deputies and search and rescue members were involved in the search efforts that began Saturday night after reports of the drowning. A dive team and underwater cameras were used during the search, which took a total of 35 hours, before it was scaled back on Wednesday, according to a statement released by the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office.

Kramer's family released the following statement Friday through the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office:

"Forty-two-year-old SSGT Justice N. Kramer, of Graham, Wash. was found yesterday. Kramer served his country through three deployments, was a devoted father, brother, uncle, son, nephew and friend who was loved by many. His family wishes to thank all of those who have given of their time searching and praying in order to give his family closure."

to the store this winter, Marquez said, but he's thankful the fire didn't touch the store's main building.

"We'll feel it in November and December, but the fire department was able to put it out before it got too out of control," he said.

Marquez said the cause of the fire seems suspicious and believes someone may have climbed over the store's fence.

A Night Out with T.F.'s First Responders

TWIN FALLS • Emergency responders will be on-hand at City Park on Tuesday to show off what they do best as part of the National Night Out event.

This year will be the second annual event for Twin Falls, said Officer Dan Heil with the Twin Falls Police Department.

"It's an event for everyone to come together to see who first responders are and what we do," Heil said.

Twin Falls police are hosting the event Tuesday evening with a little help from other agencies, including the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office K-9 unit and the Twin Falls Fire Department along with an ambulance service, Heil said.

Investigators, lab technicians, SWAT members and bomb squad members will all be at the park with some of the tools they regularly use on the job.

Deputy Charles Hoop with the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office said deputies and their K-9 partners will demonstrate how the dogs are used. Twin Falls County has dual purpose dogs that can both find
