8 Lightning-Caused Wildfires Burning

Firefighters battling 7,000-acre fire near Burley, 5,000-acre fire near Oakley.

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OAKLEY • Mike Broecker with

the Bureau of Land Management wiped sweat from his blackened face Monday as he kept an eye on a crackling fire burning along a ridge at Cave Canyon. A short distance up the road, a fawn rested in the fire's ashes taking advantage of a small spot of shade.

By 4 p.m., the lightning-caused fire had burnt a mosaic of charred patches in the canyon west of Big Cottonwood Wildlife

Management Area. The fire started at 8:47 p.m. on Sunday.

Ninety percent of the estimated 5,000 burned acres are on the Minidoka Ranger District of the Sawtooth National Forest and about 10 percent are on Bureau of Land Management ground, said Matt Grinder with the Forest

Officials say it's perception not reality that there's more road construction this year than usual. The projects are just located in higher traffic areas.

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TWIN FALLS • Outside Purity Spa Salon Boutique, a message is displayed on an outdoor sign in all caps: "Honk if U Hate Road Work."

The business — located near the intersection of Eastland Drive and Addison Avenue — is also advertising discounts to attract customers to the location surrounded by orange cones and construction equip-

Manager Ellen Tatton said employees don't like the road construction. Business has slowed down since road work started in mid-June, she said.

At Lighthouse Christian Fellowship, school principal Kevin Newbry said he doesn't think construction has affected activities too much.

In addition to church happenings, Lighthouse is the site of a refugee student summer program and sports practices. Newbry said road work has to be done and there's never a

perfect time. "It's just one of those neces-

sary evils," he said. The \$1.3 million road project at Addison Avenue and Eastland Drive is one of the largest this summer. It's scheduled for completion at the end of September.

The road work will likely still be in progress after school starts. There are a few schools in the area, including Lighthouse Christian School, Bridge Academy and Vera C. O'Leary Middle School.

Twin Falls city engineer Jackie Fields said the contractor is motivated to finish earlier than the scheduled date.

"We recognize that it's difficult to take down the intersection of Addison and Eastland," she said.

Other Area Projects

City of Twin Falls:

At the intersection of Falls Avenue and Eastland Drive, there will be more changes to traffic control as road work progresses.

Twin Falls city engineer Jackie Fields said there are limited closure times and the goal is to keep as much access as possible. She estimates construction will wrap up in three or four weeks.

Work is nearly done at the Filer Avenue and Eastland Drive intersection. Idaho Department of Transportation:

Crews started a seal coating project Monday on the Perrine Coulee Bridge on U.S. Highway 93/Pole Line Road. Traffic is reduced to one lane in each direction between Canyon Crest Drive and Harrison Street. Work is scheduled to wrap up by the end of the week.

Other ITD projects this summer include asphalt reconstruction on Highway 93 in southern Twin Falls County near Rogerson and road reconstruction on Highway 75 north of Shoshone.

What's Coming Next Year?

City of Twin Falls:

A road reconstruction project is planned for Eastland Drive between

Kimberly Road and Orchard Drive. Idaho Department of Transportation:

One of the largest projects will be resurfacing the Perrine Bridge. The project was delayed, but Jerke said a start date hasn't been set. Also, a road reconstruction project is planned for about 3.25 miles of road between Ketchum and Hailey.

When the city introduced one-bin recycling in 2011, it subsidized the cost from reserve funds, and have steadily increased rates while weaning off that subsidy, said Financial Officer Lorie Race.

U.S. Stocks Rise; Knight Capital **Gets Lifeline**

NEW YORK (AP) • U.S. stocks edged higher on a day marked by uncharacteristic quiet following a turbulent week.

In the absence of major economic news, stocks were riding a tailwind of optimism from the most recent U.S. job numbers released last week and hope for more action by European authorities to address that region's debt crisis.

On Monday, beleaguered stock trading company Knight Capital Group said it has lined up \$400 million in financing that will allow the firm to continue to operate. Knight was fighting for survival after a disastrous software glitch in its systems sent the trading of dozens of stocks into chaos last week.

Best Buy's stock soared after its founder offered to buy the company.

The Dow Jones industrial average closed up 21.34 points at 13,117.51. The broader Standard & Poor's 500 index added 3.24 points to 1,394.23. The index came within half a point of 1,400, where it hasn't traded since May 3.

The Nasdaq index rose 22.01 points to 2,989.91. Markets fell the first four days of last week after investors were disappointed by the lack of specific action from central banks in Europe and the U.S. to support the economy. The Dow lost 197 points from Monday through Thursday.

are about the same number of road projects around Twin Falls as past summers. Some are located in areas with more traffic.

But when it comes to seal coating and slurry sealing, the city is covering more than 413,000 square feet — about a 25 percent increase over last year, according to a press release last month.

Nathan Jerke, Idaho Transportation Department District 4 spokesman, said the number of highway projects this summer is similar to past vears

But the scope of the proj-

ects has changed.

Instead of season-long projects, the department has shorter projects in southcentral Idaho – usually, one month or less.

"We're doing more maintenance projects, but not a lot of reconstruction," Jerke said. Road projects are a norm

during the summer months. Fields said that's because of the ideal weather conditions. Frozen ground doesn't

compact well, she said, which makes road projects difficult during cold weather months. Also, concrete needs to be protected so it doesn't freeze.

At the Addison and Eastland intersection, Fields said there are traffic capacity problems and ruts in the road.

The project includes putting in concrete at the intersection. Pedestrian ramps will better accommodate those in wheelchairs or who are visu-

ally impaired, Fields said. Crews are also doing some water line work and updating traffic light signal heads.

Bonnie Bratvold, store manager at Kmart, said the road construction hasn't impacted the business, but more cars are using the parking lot.

"My biggest concern that I want to get out there is safety in the parking lot," she said.

Bratvold said she doesn't mind people driving through, but they need to slow down and be safe.

Deborah Silver — who works at Hayes & Silver CPAs — said

employees at the business are using neighboring businesses' parking lots. And customers are parking near Kmart.

"We are having quite the time with the construction," she wrote in an email to the Times-News. "The jackhammering was difficult to work through. A couple of things fell off the wall and there are pictures askew throughout the building."

Silver said there have been some complaints, but people realize the road work must be done.

"The city contacted us early about the project and they have done a great job of keeping us in the loop," she said. "We are looking forward to the finished project."

Why the Differing School Speed Zone Signs?

Q. Why is there a difference in school speed

A. It's easy to recognize a school zone. Signs pop up in the blocks surrounding school buildings. One sign might say the speed limit is 7 a.m. to 4 p.m., one is from dawn to dusk, and the other is just a flat rate no matter what the time it is.

The difference depends on budget, citizen request and interest.

"Almost all the signs have a speed limit of 20," said Josh Palmer, Twin Falls public information officer. "Unfortunately, some of the state highways cut through the school zone."

That raises the speed limits to 25.

Not too long ago speed limits were all 25 in school zones. As times changed so did traffic and therefore the limit was lowered to 20 in most areas.

The street department has restrictions to follow state and federal policies. However, requests do come in for blinking lights and signs designating certain requirements.

If there's room in the budget, the city will try to adapt what they can to meet the school's needs.

Q. What are curfews in the city of Twin Falls?

A. It depends on how old you are and what day it is. Adults, 18 and older, can stay out as late as they want. On Friday and Saturday nights, teenagers around 16 and 17 have to be in by 11:59 p.m. until 5 a.m. the next day. Sunday through Thursday

nights, the curfew changes to 10:59 p.m. to 5 a.m. Younger than 16 pushes the times back an hour, with curfew being 10:59 p.m. to 5 a.m. Friday and Saturdays and 9:59 p.m. to 5 a.m. Sunday through Thurs-

"The Code reads that way to show that kids are OK to be out the whole ten o'clock hour (10:00 to 10:59) but as soon as it turns 11 p.m. they must be off public walkways and roadways," explains Crime Prevention Officer Dan Heil.

However, there are exceptions and officers can, and do, use discretion. Heil said that while they do respond to noise disturbances, if a teen is heading to or from work, for example, they won't give them a hard time as long as it's feasible and they may ask for their employer's information.

Same goes with a teenager that is with their parent or legal guardian. An older brother is not OK, Heil warns.

the zones are areas of possible future growth.

Roemer told the Times-News last month she voted against the emergency moratorium because she doesn't think it meets the test of "imminent peril" to the healthy, safety and welfare of citizens.

During Monday's meeting, Brown said he's concerned with one point in the narrative from the city about Jerome's area of impact proposal.

The proposal — which hasn't been approved — states development of properties in "Tier I" would be handled under city of Jerome regulations. But the land is currently outside city limits.

Brown said the county can't essentially turn over jurisdiction to the city. But he saidit's something that can be addressed through different language.

"It's nothing we can't overcome with proper wording," Roemer said.

If approved, Tier I would include properties contiguous to the city limits and within

one mile away. It would also include properties further than one mile from city limits along parts of Interstate 84 and U.S. Highway 93, as well as properties that have City of Jerome infrastructure or access to water or sewer services.

The city is looking to annex land in this category "within a short to medium term planning horizon due to typical residential and commercial growth," according to the city's proposal.

Properties could also be classified as Tier II - for possible annexation in the long term - if they're located between or immediately contiguous to Tier I properties. The proposal is that devel-

opment would continue to be managed under Jerome County regulations. Even though Jerome's area

of impact proposal is moving forward quickly, there's still work left to do in Eden and Hazelton. Brown said he has met with

city representatives in the two towns to put together a "very rough draft" of impact zone maps. Commissioner Roger Mor-

ley said he wants to make sure the towns — which are part of his district — are involved in the process.



Man Arrested in Quale's Burglary

TWIN FALLS • After an electronics store owner posted video surveillance on Facebook of his store being burglarized, he got information that led to the arrest of one of the suspects.

Mel Quale's Electronics on Kimberly Road in Twin Falls was burglarized late July 29. The video surveillance shows two men exit a brown pickup, and then smash a store window using a cinderblock. The men then begin grabbing bigscreen TVs and loading them into the bed of the pickup.

According to a police re-

port, someone told the store owner who the truck might belong to after watching the video. Later, police interviewed the truck owner who said he loaned it to his nephew, Joe Hernandez, 25.

When police later arrived at Hernandez' house, in the 400 block of Fifth Avenue West, the truck suspected to have been used in the burglary was parked outside the house, the report states.

In an interview at the Twin Falls Police station, Hernandez allegedly admitted there were two flatscreen TVs in his house that he claimed he found in the back of his pickup on the morning of July 30, the report states.

According to the report, Hernandez named two other men who were involved in the burglary and admitted to choosing Quale's because it was "an easy getaway."

According to the report, the TVs in Hernandez' home matched two of the TVs missing from Quale's.

At the house of one of the men named by Hernandez, police found two more TVs that matched those allegedly stolen, but could not locate the suspects.

Hernandez was charged with burglary, conspiracy to commit burglary and grand theft. He was held on a \$50,000 bond and a preliminary hearing is scheduled for Aug. 20.

Aide: Syrian PM's Break Months in Planning

BEIRUT • Syria's prime minister began planning his break from the regime two months ago when Bashar Assad offered him the post and an ultimatum: Take the job or die.

The full scope of Riad Hijab's carefully executed flight to the rebel side — described by an aide who escaped with him to Jordan — reverberated Monday through Syria's leadership. Hijab became the highest-ranking government official to defect, emboldening the opposition and raising fresh questions about the regime's ability to survive the civil war.

Although Assad has been hit by a string of embarrassing defections of military and political figures, they have yet to cause visible changes in the regime's abilities on the battlefield. The loss of high-profile government officials, however, suggests fissures are reaching deep-

er into the ruling system and could force Assad to retreat further behind a cadre of loyalists as fighting flares on several fronts.

"Every defection is another door closed for Assad and another one open for the rebels," said Mustafa Alani, an analyst at the Gulf Research Center based in Geneva. "It may not be the tipping point for the regime, but each breakaway is another crack."


Hijab and an entourage of family members were expected to head next to the Gulf state of Qatar, a key backer of the Syrian rebels, in a further sign of the regional brinksmanship and gambits over Assad's fate. Gulf states and Turkey have strongly backed the rebel forces while Assad has counted on support from a dwindling list of allies such as Iran and Russia

Ahmad Kassim, a senior official with the rebel Free Syrian Army, initially said Hijab defected along with three other ministers, then later said two other ministers had left. However, Hijab's spokesman, Mohammad Otari, said he fled the country alone.

Hijab's defection is a humiliating blow for Assad after a string of generals and ambassadors has peeled away. Like nearly all prominent defectors so far, Hijab is a member of Syria's majority Sunnis — the Muslim sect which forms the bedrock of the more than 17-month uprising.

His break suggests that elements of the Sunni elite — long a pillar of Assad's rule — could be growing uneasy with the relentless bloodshed and the hardline policies of Assad's minority Alawite community, which dominates the regime's inner circle. The Alawite sect is an offshoot of Shiite Islam.

In Washington, White House Press Secretary Jay Carney said "the Assad regime is crumbling from within" and predicted "Assad's days are numbered." Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton is expected to arrive in Turkey later this week for meetings on Syria.

NASA Cheers Mars Landing, Welcomes New Photos

PASADENA, Calif. • NASA celebrated the precision landing of a rover on Mars and marveled over the mission's first photographs Monday — grainy, blackand-white images of Martian gravel, a mountain at sunset and, most exciting of all, the spacecraft's white-knuckle plunge through the red planet's atmos-

Curiosity, a roving laboratory the size of a compact car, landed right on target late Sunday night after an eightmonth, 352-million-mile journey.

Cheers and applause echoed through NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, and engineers hugged, high-fived and thrust their fists in the air after signals from space indicated the vehicle had survived the harrowing descent through Mars' pinkish atmosphere.

JPL Director Charles Elachi likened the team to Olympic athletes: "This team came back with the gold."

"Everybody in the morning should be sticking their chests out and saying, "That's my rover on Mars;" NASA Administrator Charles Bolden said on NASA TV.

Extraordinary efforts were needed for the landing because the rover weighs one ton, and the thin Martian atmosphere offers little friction to slow a spacecraft down. Curiosity had to go from 13,000 mph to zero in seven minutes, unfurling a parachute, then firing rockets to brake. In a Hollywood-style finish, cables delicately lowered it to the ground at 2 mph.

At the end of what NASA called "seven minutes of terror," the vehicle settled into place almost perfectly flat in the crater it was aiming for.

"We have ended one phase of the mission much to our enjoyment," mission manager Mike Watkins said. "But another part has just begun."

The nuclear-powered Curiosity will dig into the Martian surface to analyze what's there and hunt for some of the molecular building blocks of life, including carbon.

It won't start moving for a couple of weeks, because all the systems on the \$2.5 billion rover have to be checked out. Color photos, panoramas and video will start coming in the next few days.

But first NASA had to use tiny cameras designed to spot hazards in front of Curiosity's wheels. So early images of gravel and shadows abounded. The pictures were fuzzy, but scientists were delighted.

Gunman in Sikh Temple Attack Was White Supremacist

OAK CREEK, Wis. • Before he strode into a Sikh temple with a 9mm handgun and multiple magazines of ammunition, Wade Michael Page played in white supremacist heavy metal bands with names such as Definite Hate and End Apathy.

The bald, heavily tattooed bassist was a 40-year-old Army veteran who trained in psychological warfare before he was demoted and discharged more than a decade ago.

A day after he killed six worshippers at the suburban Milwaukee temple, fragments of Page's life emerged in public records and interviews. But his motive was still largely a mystery. So far, no hate-filled manifesto has emerged, nor any angry blog or ranting Facebook entries to explain the attack.

Oak Creek Police Chief John Edwards sug-

gested Monday that investigators might never know for certain why the lone attacker targeted a temple full of strangers.

geted a temple full of strangers.

"We have a lot of information to decipher, to put it all together before we can positively tell you what that motive is — if we can determine that." Edwards said.

Page, who was shot to death by police, joined the Army in 1992 and was discharged in 1998. He was described Monday by the Southern Poverty Law Center as a "frustrated neo-Nazi" who had long been active in the obscure underworld of white supremacist music.

Page wrote frequently on white supremacist websites, describing himself as a member of the "Hammerskins Nation," a skinhead group rooted in Texas that has offshoots in Australia and Canada, according to the SITE Monitoring Service, a Maryland-based private intelligence firm that searches the Internet for terrorist and other extremist activity.

In online forums, Page promoted his music while interacting with other skinheads. He posted 250 messages on one site between March 2010 and the middle of this year, and appeared eager to recruit others. In March 2011, he advertised for a "family friendly" barbeque in North Carolina, extolling those online to attend.

"If you are wanting to meet people, get involved and become active, then you really need to attend," he wrote, according to SITE. "Stop hiding behind the computer or making excuses."

In November, Page challenged a poster who indicated he would leave the U.S. if Herman Cain were elected president, writing in reply, "Stand and fight, don't run."

In an April message, Page said: "Passive submission is indirect support to the oppressors. Stand up for yourself and live the 14 words," a reference to a common white supremacists mantra.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. • Sarah Palin is mounting an aggressive campaign in Missouri — in television and radio ads, in automated telephone calls, even serving barbecued pork sandwiches at a rural political picnic. She's urging residents to vote for Sarah — Sarah Steelman, one of three Republicans in a prickly U.S. Senate primary.

Fresh off a resounding Republican runoff victory by Ted Cruz in Texas, Palin and the tea party movement now are trying to capitalize in primaries this month in Missouri, Wisconsin and Arizona. But they may pose a more difficult test than

in Texas, where the charismatic Cruz waged an outsider's campaign against the Republican establishment's pick of Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst.

In Tuesday's primary in Missouri, conservative loyalties are fractured among a trio of candidates

all preaching a smaller-government message while splitting the endorsements of conservative celebrities. In Wisconsin, the would-be tea party beneficiaries are up against a political icon — former four-term Gov. Tommy Thompson. Pfizer, J&J End Development of Alzheimer's Drug

NEW YORK (AP) • Pfizer Inc. and Johnson & Johnson said Monday they are ending development of a once-promising drug designed to treat Alzheimer's disease after the treatment failed in two late-stage clinical trials.

The companies hoped their drug bapineuzumab would slow the decline in physical and mental function for patients with Alzheimer's. However the drug did not work better than a placebo in two late-stage trials in patients who had mild to moderate Alzheimer's disease. Johnson & Johnson made a big bet on bapineuzumab in 2009, agreeing to invest up to \$1.5 billion initially.

The drug is designed to prevent the buildup of plaque in the brain. Current treatments for Alzheimer's can only temporarily ease symptoms of the disease, which include increasing memory loss, confusion, wandering and aggression.

Best Buy Founder Offers to Buy Company, Take It Private

NEW YORK • Best Buy's co-founder is looking to make a buy of his own, offering to take the electronics seller private only months after leaving as the company's chairman.

Best Buy Co. said it would consider the offer but called it "highly conditional." And analysts are skeptical that former Chairman Richard Schulze's opening offer of \$24 to \$26 per share would get a deal done and that it could be tricky to line up investment firms to help pay for it.

It's the latest twist in the Minneapolis company's struggles to stay relevant as more people buy electronics online. Over the past year, it has announced a major restructuring plan and fired CEO Brian Dunn amid allegations that he had an inappropriate relationship with a female emplovee.

Best Buy is trying to avoid the fate of its rival Circuit City, which went bankrupt in 2009, partly because of changing shopper habits.

The offer values the company at as much as \$8.84 billion. Schulze already has 20.1 percent of the stock in the company, so paying for the rest of $% \left\{ 1\right\} =\left\{ 1\right\} =\left\{$ shares would mean coming up with about \$6.9 billion.

Schulze resigned as chairman in May, after Dunn's departure. A company investigation found that Schulze knew about the inappropriate relationship and failed to alert the board or human resources.

Schulze had been expected to stay on the board until the company's annual shareholder meeting in June, but he resigned unexpectedly before the meeting and said he was exploring options for his hefty stake in the company. Analysts had been expecting a possible bid since that announcement.

"Immediate and substantial changes are needed for the company to return to its market-leading ways," Schulze said in a statement. "It is my strong belief that Best Buy's best chance for renewed success is to implement with urgency the necessary changes as a private company."

Schulze's offer would represent a 36 percent to 47 percent premium over the company's Friday closing stock price.

Schulze said he would have preferred to pursue a deal privately but went public with the offer for the sake of speed.

"I am deeply concerned that further delay and indecision will cause additional loss of both value and talented leaders who are now uncertain of the company's future," Schulze said in a statement.

TWIN FALLS • Ryan Horsley admits he knew Red's Trading Post General Manager Ryan nothing about firearms when he became general manager of a Twin Falls gun shop in 1998.

But he knew enough about marketing to boost annual sales from \$200,000 to more than \$4 million since taking over.

With that kind of success, Horsley can joke about those early days. He recalls asking an employee whether a .30-06 was a handgun or

"You gotta start somewhere," he said with a laugh Monday.

Horsley will share his marketing knowledge Thursday noon at the Shiloh Inn during an address to the Magic Valley Advertising Federation. Part of his advice will be to embrace online sales, which now account for 70 percent of his company's revenue.

Red's Trading Post has a rich history. It was established in 1936 by Horsley's great-grandfather and is the oldest gun shop in Idaho. The 10,000-square foot store at 203 Fifth Ave. S. has changed with the times.

"We had a lot of guns here that were dogs oddball calibers," Horsley said of the inventory when he came aboard.

He began catering to local customers wanting traditional hunting guns while also bol-

stering the online presence.

"We have a great reputation online and we want to build on that," said Horsley, who runs the 10,000-square-foot store with his mother, Terry, and 12 employees.

The company maintains a website at redstradingpost.com but that's not where most Internet sales are made. Horsley has found GunBroker.com and eBay more lucrative because they have wider audiences.

"You can't generate that kind of traffic" on a company website, he said.

Red's offers a perpetual online auction and posts 20 photos of each gun. Horsley said they buy used guns and take others on consignment, with used weapons selling much faster than new ones.

On the other extreme, the store features high-end guns not offered elsewhere. Horsley said he sees a niche there because "other dealers are playing it safe" with run-of-the-mill inventories.

One model that is sold exclusively by Red's is the Super SASS, a discontinued semi-automatic sniper model that Horsley acquired through negotiations with the manufacturer. It costs \$3,000 but isn't the most expensive gun on display.

That honor goes to the Armalite AR-50Al with a \$3,999 price tag. It's a single-shot, .50caliber weapon.

Red's also has an \$8,000 consignment model listed online, but it's not kept out for customers to touch.

Horsley studies successful marketing strategies used by other companies, and not just those in the firearms industry. He adopts tactics used by companies in other industries if they work.

"We continually ask what we can do better as far as product," Horsley said. "We ask what's new and what's exciting."

There's another trait common to all profitable businesses, he added.

"It's having a great staff," Horsley said. "We have a bunch of people who make me look



Are You Happy? Ben Bernanke Wants to Know

WASHINGTON • Ben Bernanke wants to know if

you are happy. The Federal Reserve chairman said Monday that gauging happiness can be as important for measuring economic progress as determining whether inflation is low or unemployment high. Economics isn't just about money and material benefits, Bernanke said. It is also about understanding and promoting "the enhancement of well-being."

Bernanke and Fed policymakers rely on reports on hiring, consumer spending and other economic data when making high-stakes decisions about the \$15 trillion U.S. economy. The Fed's dual mandate is to maintain low inflation and full employment.

"We should seek better and more-direct measurements of economic well-being," Bernanke said Monday in a video-taped speech shown to a conference of economists and statisticians in Cambridge, Mass. After all, promoting well-being is "the ultimate objective of our policy decisions."

Bernanke acknowledged that many people aren't too happy right now. Unemployment rose in July to 8.3 percent, and economic growth has slowed sharply from the start of the year. He called the recovery "frustratingly slow" when he testified to Congress on July 17.

Aggregate statistics can mask important information about how individual Americans are faring, Bernanke says.

His speech Monday was the latest foray into a relatively new specialty in economics known as "happiness studies." Bernanke attracted widespread notice when he spoke about the economics of happiness in a May 2010 commencement address at the University of South Carolina.

In that speech, he said research has found that once basic material needs are met, more wealth doesn't necessarily make people happier.

ways said, money doesn't buy happiness," Bernanke said then. "Well, an economist might reply, at least not by itself."

In his remarks Monday, Bernanke turned to the more practical - and difficult task of measuring a subjective emotion. So far, most efforts have involved surveys in which people are asked about whether they are happy and what contributes to their happiness.

Those surveys have found some consistent answers: physical and mental health, the strength of family and community ties, a sense of control over one's life, and opportunities for leisure activity.

The Kingdom of Bhutan has been tracking happiness for four decades. The tiny Himalayan nation stopped tracking gross national product in 1972 and instead switched to measuring Gross National Happiness.

Bernanke on Monday sketched out a few other questions he would like to know: How secure do Americans feel in their jobs? How confident are Americans in their future job prospects? How prepared are families for financial shocks?

These indicators "could be useful in measuring economic progress or setbacks as well as in explaining economic decision-making," Bernanke said.

It's safe to say that Bernanke wouldn't expect a great deal of optimism if those questions were asked now.

The Fed has said it plans to keep its key short-term interest rate near zero until late 2014, an indication that it expects the economy to stay weak for another two and a half years. And Fed policymakers appeared to signal after its two-day meeting last week a growing inclination to take further steps to lift the economy out of its slump.

Bernanke's own definition of happiness might baffle some. He called it a "short-term state of awareness that depends on a person's perceptions of one's immediate reality, as well as on immediate external circumstances and outcomes?

Get It Right On Gas

e are in the midst of a natural gas revolution in

America that is a potential game changer for the economy, environment



and our national security – if we do it right.

The enormous stores of natural gas that have been locked away in shale deposits across America that we've now been able to tap into, thanks to breakthroughs in seismic imaging, horizontal drilling and hydraulic fracturing, or "fracking," are enabling us to replace much dirtier coal with cleaner gas as the largest source of electricity generation in America.

And natural gas may soon be powering cars, trucks and ships as well. This is helping to lower our carbon emissions faster than expected and make us more energy secure. And, if prices stay low, it may enable America to bring back manufacturing that migrated overseas. But, as the energy and climate expert Hal Harvey puts it, there is just one big, hugely important question to be asked about this natural gas bounty: "Will it be a transition to a clean energy future, or does it defer a clean energy future?"

That is the question – because natural gas is still a fossil fuel. The good news: It emits only half as much greenhouse gas as coal when combusted and, therefore, contributes only half as much to global warming. The better news: The recent glut has made it inexpensive to deploy. But there is a hidden, long-term, cost: A sustained gas glut could undermine new investments in wind, solar, nuclear and energy efficiency systems – which have zero emissions – and thus keep us addicted to fossil fuels for decades.

That would be reckless. This year's global extremes of droughts and floods are totally consistent with models of disruptive, nonlinear climate change. After record warm temperatures in the first half of this year, it was no surprise to find last week that the Department of Agriculture has now designated more than half of all U.S. counties – 1,584 in 32 states – as primary disaster areas where crops and grazing areas have been ravaged by drought.

That is why on May 29 the British newspaper The Guardian quoted Fatih Birol, the chief economist for the International Energy Agency, as saying that "a golden age for gas is not necessarily a golden age for the climate" – if natural gas ends up sinking renewables. Maria van der Hoeven, executive director of the IEA, urged governments to keep in place subsidies and regulations to encourage investments in wind, solar and other renewables "for years to come" so they remain competitive.

Moreover, while natural gas is cleaner than coal, extracting it can be very dirty. We have to do this right. For instance, the carbon advantage can be undermined by leakage of uncombusted natural gas from wellheads and pipelines because methane – the primary component of natural gas – is an extremely powerful greenhouse gas, more powerful than carbon dioxide. The big oil companies can easily maintain high drilling standards, but a lot of fracking is done by mom-and-pop drillers that do not. The standards that can make fracking environmentally OK are not expensive, but the big drillers want to make sure that the little guys have to apply them, too, so everyone has the same cost basis.

On July 19, Forbes interviewed George Phydias Mitchell, who, in the 1990s, pioneered the use of fracking to break natural gas free from impermeable shale. According to Forbes, Mitchell argued that fracking needs to be regulated by the Department of Energy, not just states: "Because if they don't do it right, there could be trouble," he says. There's no excuse not to get it right. "There are good techniques to make it safe that should be followed properly," he says. But, the smaller, independent drillers, "are wild." "It's tough to control these independents. If they do something wrong and dangerous, they should punish them."


Adds Fred Krupp, the president of the Environmental Defense Fund who has been working with the government and companies on drilling standards: "The economic and national security advantages of natural gas are obvious, but if you tour some of these areas of intensive development the environmental impacts are equally obvious." We need nationally accepted standards for controlling methane leakage, for controlling water used in fracking – where you get it, how you treat the polluted water that comes out from the fracking process and how you protect aquifers – and for ensuring that communities have the right to say no to drilling. "The key message," Krupp said, "is you gotta get the rules right. States need real inspector capacity and compliance schemes where companies certify they have done it right and there are severe penalties if they perjure."

Energy companies who want to keep regulations lax need to understand that a series of mishaps around natural gas will – justifiably – trigger an environmental backlash to stop it.

Mr. McKeon's claim that President Obama and Democrats are endangering national security and harming the individuals who serve in the armed forces by not taking action to avoid sequestration is disingenuous and the equivalent of a magician's slight of hand. By attempting to distract attention away from the needed and appropriate defense cuts, Mr. McKeon thinks he can get away with protecting his privileged position as chairman of the Armed Services Committee and the vast amount of campaign contributions he receives from the numerous defense industry firms.

It is not surprising that someone representing a district heavily populated with defense industry firms and

who receives more than 50 percent of his campaign contributions (more than a quarter of a million dollars), from defense industry related firms and individuals, would be attempting to protect the currently excessive defense budget component.

Some basic facts are Congress, in-

cluding Mr. McKeon, agreed to and passed the sequestration alternative to kick in if agreement on a budget could not be reached. Eliminating the Pentagon from sequestration by trading off cuts in other areas will put the Pentagon on track for a 16 percent spending increase. (Given our financial health as a nation, how can anyone endorse a 16 percent increase in any area?) America's military expenditure is 41 percent of the total military expenditure in the world — 41 percent of the world spend!

America spends more than \$600 billion on defense annually, more than the next 17 countries combined. That includes China and Russia in those 17 countries. China spends 17 cents for every \$1 that America spends. It is likely that sequestration is the only way that defense spending will ever begin to be reigned in and cut to appropriate levels, because rational defense cuts and budgeting have always been torpedoed by senators and representatives, like Mr. McKeon, with heavy defense

spending in their districts and states and heavy defense campaign contributions in their pockets.



Currently, Twin Falls residents pay \$16.34 for sanitation, which includes garbage collection, recycling and street sweeping. Depending on if the council wanted to continue using reserve funds to subsidize the cost, that rate would increase by as much as \$2 per month in fiscal year 2013.

Much of the increased cost is to pay for the Recycle Bank incentive program, which rewards recyclers with points that they can exchange for gift certificates, coupons or magazine subscriptions.

But that incentive might

not be necessary.

While more than 80 percent of Twin Falls residents recycle at least once a month, less than 1,000 actively use the Recycle Bank program, said Councilwoman Rebecca Mills Sojka

The council didn't make a decision on whether to raise the rates, but will revisit the discussion before approving the 2013 budget on Aug. 20.

City Budget

The council also approved the maximum spending amount of \$50.2 million for the upcoming fiscal year.

The amount accounts for new construction revenue and a 3 percent maximum

statutory increase in property taxes, as well as adding \$1 million of the city's foregone balance to those taxes.

The maximum spending limit doesn't mean the city will spend the full amount, explained city manager Travis Rothweiler. It only means the city cannot spend more than that amount in the coming fiscal year.

Though the tax rate is increasing, the actual dollar amount that most homeowners will pay will go down due to lower property values, Rothweiler said. Commercial taxpayers will likely see a bigger difference, with some paying about 10 percent more to the city, Rothweiler said.

The council's approval of

spending part of the city's \$1.5 million in foregone balance diverted from the city's original budget proposal, which left the amount untouched.

Idaho tax law allows taxing districts that have not raised taxes by 3 percent to collect the amounts they passed up in future budgets.

Councilman Jim Munn moved to include the additional \$1 million in the maximum spending limit and discuss potential ways to spend it.

The council will hold a public hearing on the proposed budget on Aug. 20.

Air Show Update

Twin Falls airport manager

Bill Carberry gave an unofficial update on the Magic Valley Air Show, reporting that revenues are outpacing expenditures.

The 2008 air show had a deficit of more than \$49,649, picked up by city and county taxpayers. That total doesn't include about \$40,000 in security that the city provided.

The council approved a total of \$65,000 in advance funding to organizers for the 2012 show on the condition it be paid back. On Monday, Carberry said he's confident that will happen.

"It was just a tremendous success," Carberry said. "People had a great time out there."

of containment for the blaze is still unknown.

He said there were initially two fires that merged.

"They are basically working the north end of the fire to keep it from spreading," said Grinder.

Crews battled the blaze with three single-engine air tankers, one air attack plane, a lead plane, one engine, one dozer and three hand crews along with Sawtooth Hot Shots and Oakley Rural Fire Department.

Forest Service Ranger Scott Nannenga, with the Minidoka Ranger District, said the fire was mainly burning juniper and native brush and grasses, although some aspen stands have burnt.

Burning off some of the juniper is usually good for the forest, said Nannenga.

"We don't need to put out all the fires," Nannenga said.

One-hundred years ago, before every fire was suppressed — fire would have kept the juniper thinned

"Losing some of the juniper is sometimes good," Nannenga said. "Losing the soil from erosion is the worst problem."

Animals found in the area include big horn sheep, sage grouse, mule deer, wild turkey, mountain lions, coyotes and migratory birds along with other birds, rabbits and squirrels.

The area is a popular recreational destination for motorized off-road vehicles as well as hiking, mountain biking and hunting.

Nannenga said the fire season started early this year due to a low snow pack that left little moisture for the plants.

"Normally, the fire season starts about mid-August," Nannenga said.

Eleven Wildfires Burning in Northern Nevada

ELKO • Eleven major fires were burning in north and central Nevada, mostly in the Winnemucca and Battle Mountain areas, as of Monday.

The largest of the blazes, 7,000 acres, is 20 miles southeast of Alamo, Nev., according to the National Interagency Fire Center. It is 0 percent contained.

A fire 25 miles north of Battle Mountain has burned 5,000 acres and is 70 percent contained. A 3,000-acre fire in the same area is threatening structures and is 0 percent contained.

Another 3,000-acre blaze was burning 25 miles east of Denio, Nev.

Closer to Elko, the Lutz fire has burned an estimated 1,200

acres 25 miles south of Wells. Structures are threatened and road closures are in effect.

Smaller fires are burning 31 miles northwest of Winnemucca, 20 miles northwest of Battle Mountain, 22 miles southeast of Winnemucca, 5 miles southeast of Winnemucca, 25 miles southwest of Winnemucca, 55 miles northwest of Winnemucca and 65 miles northwest of Winnemucca.

The fires were started Sunday afternoon by lightning.

The same storm system started dozens of small fires in the Elko, Nev. area, many of which were doused by rain.

the Raft River Rural Fire Department.

• Kyli Gough with the BLM Twin Falls District said two fires merged into one 7,000-acre blaze Monday near Kamima, which is about 20 miles north of Burley, just north of the Minidoka County Line. The Shale Butte fire was about 2,500 acres while the Flat Top Two fire ballooned from four to 2,000 acres Monday. The two, about eight miles northeast of Kamima, are now referred to as the Flat Top Two Fire. The fire is estimated to be contained at 8 p.m. Wednesday and under control at 8 p.m. Friday.

Now, nine engines, two water tenders, three dozers, two single engine air tankers and one helicopter are battling the fire with help from the West End Rural Fire Department. A group was been sent out to establish a base camp for the fire, Gough said.

• IA 15: An engine responded Monday morning to another fire, seven miles east of Hollister to determine what resources were needed to respond. The fire ended being a tree that caught on fire and was quickly put out, Gough said.






"We've got a target on us," senior receiver/defensive back Eli Berndt said.

pep talk from co-captain Abby Wambach. "I know I've said this before," she said she told her teammates during extra time. "But it really does just take one moment and one chance, one moment of brilliance for somebody to do something individually spectac-

The moment came beyond the 90 minutes of regular time, beyond the scheduled 30 minutes of extra time. In the third and final minute of injury time, with goalkeeper Hope Solo already preparing for a penalty kick shootout, Alex Morgan looped in a 6-yard header on a long cross from Heather O'Reilly, giving the U.S. a 4-3 win over Canada in the Olympic semifinals at Old Trafford.

"I don't have much to say because I need to wrap my head around what just happened," Solo said. "And that's the truth of the matter. We tend to keep things interesting."

Next comes the game the U.S. players have been eyeing for more than a year, a rematch with Japan on Thursday at Wembley Stadium with gold on the line. The top-ranked Americans lost to Japan on penalty kicks in

and Wambach in the 80th for the U.S., leaving Sinclair and Wambach tied at No. 2 with 143 international goals apiece, both chasing

Mia Hamm's world record of 158. It was the sequence that led to Wambach's tying goal that left the Canadians fuming. It started when goalkeeper Erin McLeod was whistled for holding the ball more than six seconds, a call even U.S. coach Pia Sundhage said she had never seen before.

That gave the Americans an indirect free kick inside the area. Rapinoe took the kick and rammed it into the Canadian wall, the ball glancing off the arm of Marie-Eve Nault. Referee Christiana Pedersen of Norway then awarded the U.S. a penalty kick, which Wambach converted off the left post.

McLeod said she did not receive the usual warning from the referee about holding the ball too long, although she said the linesman had told her at the start of the second half not to slow down play.

"I think the referee was very one-sided," McLeod said. "It was an interesting sequence of events. I think we outplayed the Americans the entire game. I think it's unfortunate the calls went the way that they did. Of course, the Americans are a great soccer team, and today we were better, and the luck went their way."

Canada coach John Herdman said he felt the referee also missed a hand ball in front of the U.S. goal.



Against four spades, West led the diamond two, an obvious singleton, which was taken by dummy's ace. Declarer cashed the two top hearts to shed a diamond. What would you expect him to do

The doctor was surprised to see his friend trump a small heart with the spade eight in hand. Clubs were now led, East winning the king and cashing the diamond queen, on which West discarded a heart. East continued with a third round of diamonds, which South was forced to ruff with the 10.

East won the next club with the ace and played a fourth round of diamonds. Declarer again ruffed high, this time with the jack. He now trumped a club in dummy, played off the ace and queen of spades, and was left with the spade king for the final trick.

The doctor promptly asked about the strange play in hearts at the fourth trick. "Why, it was necessary to make the contract," replied his friend. "Had I not ruffed that heart early in the play, West would have discarded his remaining hearts on the diamonds. On the 12th trick, dummy would be forced to lead a heart. West's spade nine would become a winner en passant."

On this date:

In 1782, Gen. George Washington created the Order of the Purple Heart, a decoration to recognize merit in enlisted men and

non-commissioned officers. In 1882, the famous feud between the Hatfields of West Virginia and the Mc-Coys of Kentucky erupted into full-scale violence.

In 1912, Theodore Roosevelt was nominated for president by the Progressive Party (also known as the Bull Moose Party) in Chicago. New Jersey Gov. Woodrow Wilson accepted the Democratic presidential nomination at his summer home in Sea Girt. Sergei Prokofiev premiered his Piano Concerto No. 1 in D-flat major in

Moscow. In 1927, the already opened Peace Bridge connecting Buffalo, N.Y., and Fort Erie, Ontario, Canada,

was officially dedicated. In 1947, the balsa wood raft Kon-Tiki, which had carried a six-man crew 4,300 miles across the Pacific Ocean, crashed into a reef in a Polynesian archipelago; all six crew members reached land safely.

In 1959, the United States launched the Explorer 6 satellite, which sent back images of Earth. In 1961, Yale psychology

professor Stanley Milgram began conducting his controversial human behavior experiments concerning obedience toward authority **In 1962,** President John F.

Kennedy awarded FDA offi-

cial Dr. Frances O. Kelsey the Distinguished Federal Civilian Service Medal for her diligence in blocking approval of thalidomide, a sedative found to cause severe birth defects. In 1964, Congress passed the Gulf of Tonkin resolu-

tion, giving President Lyndon B. Johnson broad powers in dealing with reported North Vietnamese attacks on U.S. forces. **In 1971,** the Apollo 15

moon mission ended suc-

cessfully as its command module splashed down in the Pacific Ocean. In 1989, a plane carrying U.S. Rep. Mickey Leland, D-Texas, and 14 others disappeared over Ethiopia. (The wreckage of the plane was

found six days later; there were no survivors.) In 1998, terrorist bombs at U.S. embassies in Kenya and Tanzania killed 224 people,

including 12 Americans. Ten years ago: Former ImClone Systems chief executive Samuel Waksal was indicted in New York on charges of obstruction of justice and bank fraud in addition to previous securities fraud and perjury charges. (Waksal later pleaded guilty and was sentenced to more than seven years in prison; he was released in February 2009.) Alvaro Uribe (oo-REE'-bay) was sworn in as president of Colombia as guerrillas launched a mortar attack in the capital, killing 21 people.

Five years ago: San Francisco's Barry Bonds hit home run No. 756 to break Hank Aaron's storied record with one out in the fifth inning of a game against the Washington Nationals, who ended up winning, 8-6. One year ago: The Trea-

sury Department announced that Secretary Timothy Geithner had told President Barack Obama that he would remain on the job, ending speculation he would leave the administration. Four adults and three children were killed by a gunman in Copley Township, Ohio; the shooter died in a gunfight with police. Former New York Gov. Hugh Carey, 92, died on Shelter Island, N.Y.

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
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






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
