## **Albion Family** Alertas Wildfire Burns Near Home

ALBION • One Albion family remained on alert Wednesday as winds shifted and the Hot Well fire reignited in spots near their home.

Delbert and Shauna Bennett and their children were told by authorities Tuesday to prepare for possible evacuation as the fire crept closer to their home.

Shauna Bennett sat in her deck chair Wednesday afternoon watching the flames directly behind her house with binoculars.

"Sometimes you don't even need the binoculars," she said.

Albion City Council President Lynda Anderson said the fire is burning about 15 miles northeast of the city of Albion and people in the city were carrying on with their daily activities on Wednesday.

**OAKLEY** • The Cave Canyon Fire northwest of Oakley kept residents at the Mullen ranch on edge Wednesday as they watched and waited to see if they would need to evacuate.

Virginia Mullen has lived on the ranch, five miles west of Oakley, for nearly 65 years. Her three sons also have homes on the ranch, which consists of 2,000 Bureau of Land Management grazing acres and 300 acres where the homes are located.

"I can see black smoke right now from my house," Mullen said. "I've been coughing all morning but I was outside a lot yesterday. I think I'll probably stay in the house today."

## Scout Camp Threatened by Halstead Fire

TWIN FALLS • In early August, Camp Bradley should be filled with Boy Scouts from across the northwest, going on hikes and earning merit badges. "It's my understanding that (the fire) is within a mile of camp."

Instead, it's deserted, with only fire crews working to save structures from the Halstead Fire, burning north

of Stanley. The fire, now at 34,021 acres, is close to the scout camp, forcing evacuations of staff and summer campers and threatening the compound structures.

On July 27, lightning sparked a fire north of Stanley in the Salmon Challis National Forest. By July 29th, the fire neared Camp Bradley forced an evacuation. The notice came as new campers began to arrive, said Gloria McCuistion, office manager for the Twin Falls-based

Snake River Council.

"I had to call every unit and tell them not to come," McCuistion said, adding that more than 300 boys were expected to arrive. Some had already started the journey — a troop of Oregon scouts had to turn back home.

"They got there just as they closing the Gloria McCuistion, office manager for the Twin Falls-based road," Mc-Cuistion said.

> Fire crews gave staff three hours to retrieve the food before they evacuated the camp and cut the

Snake River Council.

Still at the camp: Two vehicles, two sailboats, multiple canoes and row boats, tents, craft supplies and more.

The council refunded all the scouts' registration fees and donated unused perishable food. Now, there's nothing to do but wait for news.

## Crash Victims' **Names** Released

KIMAMA • Rose Pope, 72, of Richfield, and Josh Burgoyne, 20, a Minidoka County resident, were the two drivers who died in Tuesday's fatal Lincoln County crash, according to Idaho State Police.

Pope and Burgoyne collided on Idaho Highway 24 about three miles west of the Lincoln-Minidoka county line. Police investigated the crash starting at about 2:45 p.m., according to an ISP release Wednesday.

According to ISP, Pope was westbound in a 1999 Ford F350 pulling a horse trailer holding two horses. Burgoyne, a resident of the Rupert/Paul area, was eastbound in a Ford F250 pulling an empty tanker. The two vehicles collided at milepost 35, according to ISP.

Both vehicles went off the southbound side of the road and became fully engulfed in flames, ISP's release states. Both drivers were pronounced dead at the scene. The horses also died in the crash.

# Bergdahl Swap Talks Continue

U.S. Army Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl was taken captive by the Taliban in east ern Afghanistan June 30, 2009, after reportedly disappearing from his base. The only

Afghanistan, his release has played a central role in reported talks between the United States and the former rulers of Afghanistan. The prisoner swap would trade

Bergdahl for five detainees held by the United States in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

Citing anonymous sources, the Reuters news agency reported Tuesday that the United States has offered to let all five detainees travel to Qatar before requiring the Taliban to release Bergdahl. Previously, U.S. officials proposed only moving some of the five first, with the release of the rest contingent on Bergdahl's release.

## The Steam-engine Tractor in the Snake River

#### SNAKE RIVER CANYON • If you float the Snake River

when the water is low, you might get a glimpse of a steam-engine tractor lying on its side in the river east of the Perrine Memorial Bridge.

But the details of how the tractor came to rest in the canyon have been as murky as the river itself - until

Some say the steam engine was used to build the first rim-to-rim bridge, and was pushed off the bridge when the work was completed in 1927. Others say it was driven over the canyon rim when the state of Idaho purchased the bridge in 1940, to celebrate the end of the toll to cross the bridge.

As it turns out, the steam engine's dive into the river had nothing to do with the bridge at all.

"I remember it as clear as day," said George Paxton,

whose father drove the machine to the edge of the canyon before it took the plunge. The event, Paxton said, was a publicity stunt to mark the end of the steam engine era.

Steam-engine tractors, which revolutionized farming in the late 19th Century, operated much like the steam-engine locomotives of the day. Coal or wood was shoveled into a firebox under a boiler, heating water to create steam to power the machine's engine.

The tractors were finicky, difficult to maneuver and dangerous to operate. So when the internal combustion engine began to replace the steam engine, manufacturers of farm equipment were quick to embrace the new technology.

In the early 1900s, small tractors that ran on fuel oil were developed for use on the farm. By World War II, steam-engine tractors were all but obsolete.

Paxton, 84, was about 10 years old when his father,

John Paxton, and farmequipment dealer Harley Williams, made plans to drive a steam engine over the canyon rim.

Williams, owner of Williams Tractor, had taken the steam-engine tractor in on trade for a new Case tractor. Williams and the elder

Paxton were good friends. Paxton was an expert operator of the steam-engine tractor - and Williams needed someone who could drive the tractor to the canyon rim, without going over the rim with it.

The year, to the best of the younger Paxton's recollection, was about 1938. A large group of partiers gathered on the north side of the canyon, upstream from the bridge.

"It was a big promotion for the (Williams) dealership," Paxton said. There was a barbecue and a band played. Finally, the steam engine was fired up and readied for its last job.

The elder Paxton tied down the steam whistle, and let 'er go. The tractor drove over the edge and its boiler exploded in midair. The tractor bounced off the canyon wall, then sank silently into the river.

"What would the environmentalists say if that were done today?" Paxton mused.

Wednesday," she said. During a burnout, crews purposefully burn unused fuel between the fire and

structures, Pollock said. The process will be used next on the fire's south and

Pollock said closures in the fire areas remain in effect and will likely be expanded.

Mullen said Cassia County sheriff's deputies told her family Tuesday to gather their important documents and be prepared

to leave. "My sons moved some of their vehicles from the ranch and we have our photos and important papers ready to go," Mullen said. "Of course we won't be able to take any of our furniture

or anything." She said she spent a lot of time in Cave Canyon as a child and many areas were

really overgrown. "Some of it needed to be

burnt out," she said. The BLM and a neighbor used bulldozers to clear a firewall around the property as wide as the length of a football field, Mullen said.

Fire crews patrolled the fire line Wednesday watching for problem areas.

Mullen said her family was far from the only one affected. Rancher Eugene Matthews moved his cattle herd out of harm's way on Tuesday, she said.

Jared and Shauna Mitton and their three children evacuated their home at 1

a.m. on Tuesday. Shauna Mitton said the family had been up watching the fire and only been asleep about an hour when someone "pounded on the door" and told them they

The family owns 160

acres where they raise 450 head of goats near the Big Cottonwood Wildlife Management Area.

Mitton said they moved the goats last week after the creek dried up from the drought.

"Our house is OK right now, it's just too smoky to stay in," she said.

The Mittons are staying with family in Oakley.

"We saw one of the lightning strikes that started the fires from our backyard," Mitton said. "Right now there's nothing left to burn out there."

Mitton said they will likely need to call in a restoration crew to take care of the smoke damage before they can move back into their home.

Right now, that news is troubling.

The Halstead Fire is flourishing among the forest's dead trees, victims of beetle-kill. With difficult terrain and hot conditions, officials estimate the fire won't be contained until October.

"It's my understanding that (the fire) is within a mile of camp," McCuistion said.

That's hard for Darren Olsen to hear. The Jerome former scout master for the Snake River Council spent ten summers working at the camp, and his 13-yearold son, Rory, earned 20 merit badges there.

"It's probably one of the better facilities, honestly, in the Northwest for scouting and camping," he said.



## A Golden State Train Wreck

tate Sen. Joe Simitian's district office near Stanford's campus is nestled among shops sporting excruciatingly cute names ("A Street Bike Named Desire," "Mom's the Word" maternity wear) intended to make the progressive gentry comfortable with upscale consumption by presenting it as whimsical. This community surely has its share of advanced thinkers who believe trains are wonderful because they are not cars (rampant individualism; people going wherever and whenever they want, unsupervised).

Nevertheless, Simitian was one of just four Democratic state senators who recently voted - in vain to derail plans that eventually may involve spending more than \$100 billion on a 500-mile bullet train from San Francisco to Los Angeles. Simitian makes the obligatory genuflection: He favors high-speed rail "done right." But having passed sixth grade arithmetic, he has doubts. At one point, an estimate of 44 million riders a year - subsequently revised downward, substantially - assumed gasoline costing \$40 a gallon.

Democracy, said H.L. Mencken, is the theory that people know what they want and deserve to get it good and hard. In 2008, Californians passed an initiative authorizing \$9.95 billion in bonds to build what they were told would be a \$33 billion high-speed rail system. California, constantly lurching from one budget crisis to a worse one, could not nearly afford even that, and soon the price was re-estimated at around \$100 billion. Not to worry, said Gov. Jerry Brown, the real price will be only \$68.5 billion. Why? Partly because it will be less than bullet-like, not requiring extra expensive roadbed.

Note Brown's hilarious ".5." Such is his precision, in May his projection of a \$15.7 billion state budget deficit was 70 percent higher than his January estimate.

Eager to hook states on higher spending, especially for high-speed rail, the Obama administration wants California to quickly spend \$3.3 billion of federal funding (much of it borrowed from China, one source of Barack Obama's train envy). Simitian notes that the 130 miles would not be high-speed rail and would not be electrified, and that there are no commitments for more federal funds, or for any dedicated funding source, or for private funding. And the 2008 ballot measure that launched this folly forbids tax money for operating

subsidies. California's voters evi-



dently understand that Washington's \$3.3 billion is spending for the purpose of committing Sacramento to much greater spending: Polls show that 59 percent would now reject the project they authorized. But Democrats will not allow reconsideration. They like direct democracy but love spending.

Wisconsin's Republican Gov. Scott Walker rejected \$810 million in federal money for a 78-mile highspeed rail project paralleling Interstate 94 between Milwaukee and Madison. Ohio's Republican Gov. John Kasich rejected \$400 million for a high-speed (well, about automobile speed) train paralleling Interstate 71 between Cleveland and Cincinnati. Florida's Republican Gov. Rick Scott rejected \$2.4 billion for 90 miles of high-speed rail paralleling Interstate 4 between Tampa and Orlando. In faith-based transportation policy, rail worshipers believe people will park their cars in Tampa and then rent cars in Orlando.

Brown's reverence for his rail bauble is fanaticism. Or perhaps filial piety: His father, governor from 1959 to 1967, built much of the freeway and water infrastructure for postwar California. When the son was first elected governor 38 years ago, he seemed exotic; now he embodies progressivism's banality. Then he wanted a California space program; now he is fixated on railroads, a 19thcentury technology. His prescription for California's ailments is higher taxes and expensive trains. Fortunately, the latter obsession may stymie the former.

Come November, Californians will vote on Brown's recipe for reviving this slow-growth, high-tax state: Raise income taxes "temporarily" on the rich, and on everybody with a "temporary" sales tax increase. But with public services being slashed some communities have lopped a week off the school year, with other contractions perhaps still to come – voters may reject more revenues for Sacramento while it is showering many scores of billions on trains.

The 21st century may end before Brown's sortof-high-speed rail service begins. Coagulated California is so clotted with environmental regulations and lawyers that turning a spade of earth — Spare that endangered toad! — invites decades of litigation. Regarding high-speed rail, this is the good news.

## **INFECTION AT FIRST BITE**

A Jerome man says he had a brush with West Nile virus, but state records won't reflect his claim.

TWIN FALLS • A little more than a week ago, state health officials announced the first case of West Nile virus had been confirmed in Idaho contracted by a Twin Falls County woman.

James Allinen respectably

Just days before the woman tested positive for the disease, the Jerome resident's doctors told him he contracted the virus, according to his medical records.

It was a competition he never wanted to enter, let alone win, Allinen said.

"I just want people to be aware," he said. "I didn't know what to do when I got sick. I didn't know the symptoms. I just wanted to die."

Allinen said he started feelingill after spending the weekend jet skiing at Thousand Springs Resort in Hagerman. By that Sunday evening, he was hit with a wave of headaches, weakness and abdominal pain that increased in intensity throughout the night. When he woke up that Monday, he decided to take off work and head straight to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical

According to medical records, Allinen tested negative for West Nile on July 24. He was released a few hours after he reached the hospital.

#### West Nile Reported Cases

But once the morphine wore off, Allinen said he was in even worse pain. He went to the ER the following two days and went through multiple spinal taps, blood patches and tests,

"It was the worst feeling in my life," he said. "I'm not used to calling in sick to work or not being able to take care of myself. It was terrible. And it was scary not knowing what was wrong for so long."

Doctors tested him again for West Nile on July 27. This time, Allinen tested positive for IgG, an antibody that shows that Allinen was at one point exposed to the disease, according to his medical records. However, he tested negatively for IgM, an antibody that is produced early on in infection.

Medical records show that Dr. Adam Bowman told Allinen that it was "unclear" if his exposure was acute or chronic, but that Allinen should remain well-hydrated and follow up with his primary care physician.

West Nile is a disease that must be reported to public health officials if confirmed by lab results, said Tom Shanahan, spokesman for the Idaho Department of Health and

Allinen's lab results were sent to Health and Welfare but officials didn't conclude that the state should issue an alert or report the case, Shanahan

The last time a mosquito captured near Thousand Springs tested positive for West Nile was two years ago, said Kirk Tubbs, manager of the Twin Falls County Pest Abatement District.

"West Nile is endemic to Idaho," Tubbs said. "We know it's present in the state, just don't know where it's going to show up."

Allinen says the worst of his symptoms are finally over, but he still feels weak more often than he would like.

He also has a new appreciation for DEET-based insect repellent.

"I never used to fear anything," he said. "Now I won't leave my house without plenty of insect repellent."

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## Mechanic Allegedly Steals, Crashes Car

TWIN FALLS • Police say an Oregon man allegedly stole an SUV from the Twin Falls auto shop where he worked to get something to eat after work, but crashed the vehicle in the process.

Shawn Tracy Adlard, 41, of Madras, Ore., was arraigned Friday on charges of operating a motor vehicle without the owner's consent, leaving the scene of an accident, driving without privileges and possession of a controlled sub-

On July 29 at about 10:30 p.m., Twin Falls Police were dispatched to the 400 block of Blue Lakes Boulevard North about a hit and run crash.

A silver 2002 Chevrolet Suburban was headed southbound in the inside lane on Blue Lakes when it made an abrupt right turn into the side of a white and green 1997 Chevrolet Rexhall Aerbus RV which was traveling next to the Suburban, in the outside lane, a police report states.

The RV was forced off the road and about \$5,000 in damage was done to the front passenger side of the Suburban, the report states.

According to the report,

the Suburban sped away, driving behind the Les Schwab at 421 Blue Lakes Boulevard North. Several witnesses told police they saw a man, who was later identified as Adlard, get out of the SUV and start running southbound, away from the scene, the report states.

When police arrived, officers ran a check on the car and contacted the owner who said he believed his vehicle was at Mechanical Solutions, located at 128 Blue Lakes Boulevard where it was being serviced, and was unaware his vehicle was involved in a crash.

On Aug. 2 a friend of Adlard's took police to his house where police interviewed him.

"Mr. Adlard immediately confessed to the hit and run crash," the report states.

According to the report, Adlard told officers he was attempting to go to Sonic after work in the Suburban, when he crashed into the RV.

Officers found Adlard's driver's license was revoked and he was allegedly carrying marijuana with him.

Adlard was held on a total of \$55,000 bond and is scheduled for a preliminary hearing Friday.

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### No Decision Yet on Jerome Bond Amount

**JEROME** • The city of Jerome still hasn't decided on a bond amount to take to voters for an expansion of the wastewater treatment plant. But \$43 million is the maximum under the city's tentative budget.

If voters approve a ballot measure, the city estimates residents would see a 49 percent increase in sewer

During a Wednesday night meeting, city council members voted 3-1 to approve the tentative budget. Councilman Dale Ross voted no.

Mayor John Shine said an election date and bond amount haven't been set.

"I think we still have a lot to discuss," he said.

Ross said \$43 million has always been the bond amount written in the tentative budget - not the \$35 million figure circulating.

It's important, he said, to make sure information is being presented upfront and clearly to citizens.

Shine said he's continuing to look at less expensive alternatives for wastewater improvements.

The dollar amount will depend what's decided in the wastewater treatment plan and discussions with regulatory agencies, he said.

The city is currently heading toward a ballot measure for the November election, but Shine said that could get pushed back.

Shine told the Times-News last month that the city is looking to expand the wastewater treatment plant to add capacity.

It's needed in order to at-

tract new businesses, he said.

Shine said last month that improving wastewater capacity is also closely linked to sewage overflow issues that occurred in winter 2011.

#### Tentative budget

During Wednesday's meeting, city council members heard a presentation on the tentative budget.

It includes an average 3 percent salary increase for employees. Whether an employee earns a raise - and how much - will depend on job performance.

The tentative budget also includes funding for three new positions: a detective, wastewater lab technician and wastewater pretreatment coordinator.


Under the Capital Im-

provement Plan, projects funded during the coming year could include upgrades to underground pipes, rebuilding the road on a portion of Third Avenue West near the Head Start/Early Head Start Building under construction, adding more traffic lights and funding more significant economic development efforts.

"We've got a lot going on this year and next year," Shine said.

Before voting no on the budget, Ross said he's concerned about where things are going with economic development.

He described the council as a "dream team" with a variety of knowledge that could accomplish a lot in helping bring businesses to the area if they pulled together.



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## Students Raise Animals Long Before Show Day

**JEROME** • For 4-H and FFA students, preparing to show an animal starts hours before entering the show ring.

There's a delicate balance between making sure an animal is ready to go and tiring it

Stephanie Kimsey, 14, set a two-hour limit for washing and cleaning her lamb Wednesday for the sheep show at the Jerome County

"I don't want to overdo it or underdo it," she said.

The strategy worked. The Clever Cloves 4-H member won the overall showmanship award in the senior division.

Kimsey was among 23 children competing in the 4-H and FFA sheep show.

A few dozen family members and friends - some holding up cameras — filled two small bleachers and the surrounding area.

Even after months of raising a lamb, students are still sometimes at the animal's mercy on show day.

As five teenage girls in the senior division stood in the show ring, their lambs didn't always obey.

Some jumped up or flailed their heads as the students tried to turn them. The "baah" noise from the lambs filled the hot, dusty indoor arena.

After the show, Kimsey had advice about what to do when a lamb starts acting up.

"Hold on and put yourself in front of them so they can't bolt

off," she said.

superintendent Sheep LeAnne Taylor – who has been involved with 4-H and FFA fair shows for nine years said some lambs don't cooperate with students.

Market classes followed later that day, where students were judged on the quality of their animal.

## Man Convicted of Molesting Girls Dies Before Sentencing

TWIN FALLS • A man who was convicted in May of sexually abusing multiple girls has died a week before he was scheduled to be sentenced.

According to a death notice, Steven Virgil Anderson, 59, of Twin Falls, died Monday at his home.

Anderson was convicted by a jury of five counts of lewd conduct with a minor under 16, one count of sexual abuse of a minor under 16 and two counts of intimidating a witness. Two counts of lewd conduct and one count of sex abuse were dismissed.

He was released in a court compliance program and under oversight of a GPS monitoring system until his sentencing, a decision that upset family members of at least one of the victims.

On May 23, after Anderson was convicted, prosecutors sought to have Anderson's \$100,000 bond revoked and have him taken into custody on a \$250,000

Anderson's defense attorney, George Essma, said Anderson was arrested and posted bond twice. He described Anderson's conduct on court compliance as "exemplary." Essma also said Anderson was placed in solitary confinement at the Twin Falls County Jail for some time after a family member expressed concern for his wellbeing.

Fifth District Judge Randy Stoker denied the prosecu-

program Anderson until

his sentencing hearing. That sentencing was scheduled for Aug. 13.

"The record I have before me is that this defendant has in fact appeared at all court appearances as required," Stoker said at the May 23 hearing. "I recognize that there is certainly a change of circumstances because we do have, in fact, a guilty verdict, which can certainly lead to an argument, as the state made, of increased flight risk."

Stoker told Anderson he must appear at all pre-sentence interviews or his bond would be immediately revoked.

Stoker said Wednesday he had heard Anderson died, and reiterated that he denied the state's motion because Anderson appeared at all his previous hearings.

In May, Mike Peacock, a relative of a victim, told the Times-News he was "flabbergasted" that Anderson was allowed to walk out of the courtroom after being convicted.

"It's like having an open wound," he said.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loebs said Wednesday that Anderson's death means the conclusion of the case.

"There's nothing left to do," he said.

## Gunman at Sikh Temple Shot Himself

MILWAUKEE • Wade Michael Page, the gunman believed to be responsible for killing a half-dozen people at a Sikh temple outside Milwaukee

on Sunday, died after shooting himself in the head, officials said at a Wednesday briefing.

"We still have not identified anyone else in this shooting except

him. We also have not identified a motive," said Teresa Carlson, FBI special agent in charge of the Milwaukee division, during the briefing at FBI offices.

She said a police officer responding to reports of a shooting at the temple in Oak Creek, Wis., shot Page in the stomach, "neutralizing the subject." Page then shot himself in the head and died, she said.

Steven Conley, the Milwaukee FBI's assistant special agent in charge for national security, said of the shot by the officer: "It was a long shot. It was a very good, precise shot. Some very good training by this officer."

Officers approaching the shooting scene initially re-

ceived reports of one to four shooters with about 40 hostages barricaded inside, he said.

Also Wednesday, the Milwaukee County medical examiner's office released

autopsy reports of the shooting victims-but not Page's report-to the Los Angeles Times. It noted that the Milwaukee Police Department had "placed a non-disclosure on the report" and

that Page's family "has made arrangements for the final disposition of Page's remains."

According to investigators' reports, Page did not appear to target people as he made his way through the temple, nor did he speak as he was shooting, Conley said.

Carlson said investigators believe that Page, 40, drove himself to the temple that day.

The FBI interviewed Page's former girlfriend, Misty Cook, at her South Milwaukee home Sunday, and "she was cooperative," Carlson said. Agents spotted a firearm at the home and arrested Cook on suspicion of being a felon in possession of a firearm.

### Russian Muslim Sect that Lived Underground Charged with Abuse

Some of their children rarely saw the sun before authorities raided the compound.

**MOSCOW (AP)** • A self-proclaimed prophet had a vision from God: He would build an Islamic caliphate under the earth. The digging began about a decade ago and 70 followers soon moved into an eight-level subterranean honeycomb of cramped cells with no light, heat or ventilation.

Children were born. They, too, lived in the cold underground cells for many years — until authorities raided the compound last week and freed the 27 sons and daughters of the sect.

Ages 1 to 17, the children rarely saw the light of day and had never left the property, attended school or been seen by a doctor, officials said Wednesday. Their parents — sect members who call themselves "muammin," from the Arabic for "believers" — were charged with child abuse.

The sect's 83-year-old founder, Faizrakhman Satarov, who declared himself a prophet in contradiction to the principles of Islam, was charged with negligence, said Irina Petrova, deputy prosecutor in the provincial capital of Kazan.

The children were discovered when police searched the sect grounds as part of an investigation into the recent killing of a top Tatarstan Muslim cleric, an attack local officials blame on radical Islamist groups that have Please see UNDERGROUND, N3

## Welfare Works Way into Debate


About 2 million families remain on Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program.

**WASHINGTON (AP)** • Welfare is causing a ruckus in the presidential campaign. But the program is a shadow of its old self from the 1970s, when Ronald Reagan used the image of "welfare queens" to assail government poverty programs promoted by liberals.

Nowadays government cash assistance to the poor is mainly conditioned on work. And the Obama administration waivers excoriated by Mitt Romney as gutting welfare reform are unlikely to reverse that basic policy, as even some architects of work requirements acknowledge.

"If Washington were different and ... people could sit down and reason together, it's not impossible to think that Republicans and Democrats would come to an agreement on waivers similar to what the administration is proposing," said Ron Haskins, co-director of the Brookings Center on Children and Families. As a senior House GOP aide in the 1990s, Haskins helped write the original welfare-to-work legislation.

The Obama administration says it

does not want to waive work requirements, but instead primarily federal administrative rules, including some that tie up state caseworkers who could be serving clients.

The 1996 welfare reform law, a pillar of social policy for conservatives, replaced a federal entitlement with grants to the states, while putting a time limit on how long families can get aid and requiring recipients to eventually go to work.

Welfare caseloads declined for years before the recession, and there are only about 2 million families on what's now called Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, or TANF for short. It's dwarfed by the Earned Income Tax Credit, the government's main antipoverty program, which supplements the earnings of low-income families through the tax system and helps nearly 27 million households.

## Troops Launch Assault on Aleppo

Syria's state-controlled media call it 'the mother of all battles' as government forces try to uproot rebel positions.

**TEL RIFAT, Syria** • Syria launched a ground assault Wednesday on rebelheld areas of the besieged city of Aleppo, the center of battles between government forces and opposition fighters for more than two weeks.

It was not immediately clear if the offensive was "the mother of all battles" that Syria's state-controlled media vowed last month would take place for control of Aleppo. In recent weeks, the regime's blistering attacks on rebel

positions seem to have slowly chipped away at the opposition's grip on its strongholds in the country's largest

The official SANA news agency said regime forces have fully regained control of the Salaheddine neighborhood, the main rebel area in Aleppo. It claimed the "fall" of hundreds of "armed terrorists," the government's catchall term for its opponents, without specifying what that meant.

Rami Abdul-Rahman, the director of the Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, said troops met resistance in the offensive.

About 25 miles (40 kilometers) north of Aleppo, Syrian fighter jets carried out airstrikes early Wednesday on the village of Tel Rifat, hitting a home and a high school and killing six people

from the same family, residents said.

Resident Mohammed Zakkour, 35, said the sound of the jets and blasts jolted him awake and he left his house to see a huge cloud of dust and smoke rising above the village.

Hours later, all that remained of a small home in the village was a tangled pile of rubble and iron bars. A bouquet of plastic red flowers poked out of the rubble, and clothes still hung from one

The leak started as a drip at about 4:15 p.m. Monday, officials said. Chevron did not consider it an immediate danger to residents nearby.

The company's engineers began stripping away insulation on the leaky pipe to investigate the source, which released a vapor of a flammable sub-

stance similar to diesel.

About two and a half hours later, a conflagration had officials scrambling to warm regidents to stay incide.

emergency warning system, said

The refinery has been the target of complaints and lawsuits by residents of the mostly low-income community. The area is home to five major oil refineries.

## **Egypt Launches** Air Strikes in Sinai

The strikes are in response to Islamists killing 16 soldiers.

**CAIRO** • Deploying its air force for the first time in nearly 40 years, the Egyptian military launched an air offensive in the unruly Peninsula Wednesday, three days after Islamists killed 16 Egyptian soldiers in an attack that threatened both the Egyptian-Israeli border and the political standing of Egypt's new president.

Hours after the air force reportedly struck Islamic extremists near the border with Israel, the Egyptian government announced that three high-ranking officials had been dismissed for their handling of the Sunday attack, the deadliest against Egyptian soldiers since the 1979 Camp David peace agreement with Israel.

Egyptian President Mohammed Morsi said that he had forced his director of general intelligence services, Murad Muwafi, into retirement and dismissed the governor of North Sinai, Abdel-Wahab Mabrouk, in an apparent bid to assert his authority over the increasingly volatile situation. Since Morsi has no say constitutionally over military matters, the head of the military council that shares power with Morsi, Field Marshal Mohammed Tantawi, fired Hamdy Badeen, the head of Egypt's

The day's events suggested the Egyptian military was taking the attack and the threat of domestic extremists seriously after a series of skirmishes over the last year. The air force last launched attacks over the Sinai during the 1973 war with Israel.

At the same time, Morsi sought to reassert his role as president with the firings after a tepid initial response to the attacks and limited say constitutionally over security matters. Morsi did not attend the soldiers' funerals Monday and made only a 25-minute appearance at the attack site earlier this week, amid security concerns.

Tantawi was the most senior figure at the funeral; Morsi's prime minister, Hesham Kandil, was attacked by angry spectators as he approached the funeral and did not attend.

The firings "are Morsi's way of looking authoritative even though he has very limited influence over the Sinai and the security situation more generally," said Eric Trager, a fellow at the Washington Institute for Near East Policy, a Washington-based think tank.

Since taking office in June, Morsi stressed domestic issues over international affairs. He's vowed to abide by the 1979 peace agreement with Israel and left the defense and finance ministries in the hands of holdovers from the administration of deposed President Hosni Mubarak.

## Judge Rules Against Hawaii Gay Marriage

Two women were seeking to get married, rather than simply enter into a civil union.

**HONOLULU (AP)** • A federal judge has ruled against two Hawaii women who want to get married and not simply enter into a civil union.

The ruling Wednesday

handed a victory to opponents of gay marriage. It sided with Hawaii's health director and Hawaii Family Forum, a Christian group.

The ruling says lawmakers and the people should decide whether to allow same-sex marriage.

The lawsuit by Natasha Jackson and Janin Kleid argues they need to be married in order to get certain federal benefits. Co-plaintiff Gary Bradley wants to marry his foreign national partner to help him change his immigration status. Their lawyer plans to appeal.

The case put Gov. Neil Abercrombie in the unusual position of both being a defendant in the lawsuit and supporting the women's claims. The governor says a same-sex marriage ban is unconstitutional.

WASHINGTON (AP) • Our family tree may have sprouted some long-lost branches going back nearly 2 million years. A famous paleontology family found fossils they think confirm their

ditional pre-human species besides the one that eventually led to modern humans. A team led by Meave Leakey, daughter-in-law of scientist Louis Leakey, found facial bones from one creature and jaw-

bones from two others in Kenya. That led the researchers to conclude that humans' early ancestor had plenty of human-like company from other species. These wouldn't be Homo

erectus, believed to be our

direct ancestor. They would

be more like very distant

cousins, who when you go back even longer in time, shared an ancient common ancestor, one scientist said.

But other experts in human evolution aren't convinced by what they say is a leap to large conclusions based on limited evidence. It's the continuation of a long-running squabble in anthropology about the earliest members of our own genus, or class, called Homo -an increasingly messy family history. And much of it stems from a controversial discovery that the Leakeys made 40 years ago.

In their new findings, the Leakey team says that none of their newest fossil discoveries match erectus, so they had to be from another flatfaced relatively large species with big teeth.

The new specimens have "a really distinct profile" and thus they are "something very different," said Meave Leakey, describing the study published online Wednesday

What these new bones did match was an old fossil that Meave and her husband Richard helped find in 1972 that was baffling. That skull, called 1470, just didn't fit with Homo erectus, the Leakevs contended. They said it was too flat-faced with a non-jutting jaw.

They initially said it was well more than 2.5 million years old in a dating mistake that was later seized upon by creationists as evidence against evolution because it indicated how scientists can make dating mistakes. It turned out to be 2 million

years old.

For the past 40 years, the scientific question has been whether 1470 was a freak mutation of erectus or something new. For many years, the Leakeys have maintained that the male skull known as 1470 showed that there were more than one species of ancient hominids, but other scientists said it wasn't enough proof.

The Leakeys' new discoveries are more evidence that this earlier "enigmatic face" was a separate species, said study co-author Fred Spoor of the Max Planck Institute in Germany.

The new bones were found between 2007 and 2009 about six miles away from the old site near the fossil-rich Lake Turkana region, Leakey said.

burger chain. The last time the global sales figure dipped for Mc-Donald's was in April of 2003. The figure had grown every month since then, even through the recession.

"McDonald's may be underperforming the industry, which is not typical for them," said Sara Senatore, a Bernstein analyst. She noted that Taco Bell is showing strength as a result of its popular new Doritos-flavored tacos, with revenue at restaurants open at least a year registering double-digit growth in the second quarter.

Burger King Worldwide Inc. and Wendy's Co. are also revamping their menus and stepping up their marketing

campaigns. In the U.S., McDonald's

said its promotions failed to drive growth in July, and revenue at restaurants open at least 13 months dipped 0.1 percent. The Oak Brook, Ill.based company also says it

## US Starts Agent Orange Cleanup

DANANG, Vietnam (AP) •

Vo Duoc fights back tears while sharing the news that broke his heart: A few days ago he received test results confirming he and 11 family members have elevated levels of dioxin lingering in their blood.

The family lives in a twostory house near a former U.S. military base in Danang where the defoliant Agent Orange was stored during the Vietnam War, which ended nearly four decades ago. Duoc, 58, sells steel for a living and has diabetes, while his wife battles breast cancer and their daughter has remained childless after suffering repeated miscarriages. For years, Duoc thought the ailments were unrelated, but after seeing the blood tests he now suspects his family unwittingly ingested dioxin from Agent Orange-contaminated fish, vegetables and well water. Dioxin, a chemical linked

to cancer, birth defects and other disabilities, has seeped into Vietnam's soils and watersheds, creating a lasting war legacy that remains a thorny issue between the former foes. Washington has been slow to respond, but on

The children were examined at hospitals and will temporarily live in an orphanage, pediatrician Tatyana Moroz said. "They looked nourished but dirty, so we had to wash them," she said in televised re-

Their parents expressed concern about the children's medical treatment.

Doctors "can do anything to them," Fana Sayanova, a woman wearing a long white dress with her face veiled, told local television.

The decrepit house on a 7,530-square-foot plot of land was built illegally and will be demolished, Tatarstan police said.

"They will come with bulldozers and guns, but they will have to demolish this house over our dead bodies!" sect member Gumer Ganiyev said on the Vesti television channel. The ailing Satarov appointed Ganiyev as his deputy prophet, according to local media.

Satarov had followers in several other cities in Tatarstan and other Volga River provinces, local media reported.

In a 2008 interview with the Komsomolskaya Pravda daily, Satarov said that he fell out with other clerics and authorities in the Communist era, when he said the KGB sent him to

ries about religious freedom in the officially atheist Soviet Union.

Government-approved Orthodox Christian, Muslim and Jewish clerics routinely traveled abroad on Soviet publicity trips.

"That's how I became Satan's servant, a traitor," the white-bearded and turbaned man was quoted as saying. "When I under-stood that, I repented and started preaching."

Muslim leaders in Tatarstan said Satarov's views contradict Islamic

"Islam postulates that there are no other prophets after Mohammad," Kazanbased theologian Rais Suleimanov told the Gazeta.ru online publication Tuesday.

Police raided Satarov's house last Friday as part of an investigation into the killing of Valiulla Yakupov, Tatarstan's deputy chief mufti, who was gunned down in mid-July as he left his house in Kazan. Minutes later, chief mufti Ildus Faizov was wounded in the legs when a bomb blast ripped through his car in Kazan.

Both clerics were known as critics of radical Islamist groups that advocate a strict and puritanical version of Islam known as Salafism.

Prosecutors have named two suspects in Yakupov's killing who remain at large and arrested five others in the case.

## VP Contenders Stay Active on Campaign Trail

Could Mitt Romney's vicepresidential announcement come before the end of the week?

With Romney's Friday schedule yet to be announced, some campaign watchers were speculating that the presumptive Republican nominee could declare his choice just ahead of this weekend's start of a four-day bus tour.

That would appear to be the earliest date for a decision.

A vice-presidential announcement in the lead-up to Romney's swing-state bus tour could make for some awkward optics, however. Romney will be joined at points along the trip by several top Republicans thought to be on his shortlist, including Sen. Rob Portman of Ohio; Sen. Marco Rubio of Florida; and Virginia Gov. Robert F. Mc-Donnell, who will be in his own state teaming up with Romney on Saturday.

Romney has sought as much leeway as possible. He told Fox News that the selection of certain people for speaking roles at the Republican National Convention in Tampa doesn't necessarily rule them out of the vicepresidential race. And about the timing of the announce-

ment, he has said only that it will come before the third night of the Aug 27-30 convention, the spot traditionally reserved for the vicepresidential nominee's speech.

On Wednesday, several of the Republicans thought to be on Romney's shortlist were busy proving their mettle on the campaign trail.

Portman headlined a fivestop bus tour that is shadowing President Barack Obama in Colorado, spending a nearly 12-hour day on the trail in a key battle-

ground state. "Guess what's going to welcome President Obama to Colorado today?" Portman asked a crowd of about 50 supporters at his first campaign stop of the day in Johnston, Colo., according to ABC News. "Some new polls that show Romney up. They've outspent us, but they can't outwork us because of people like you."

Louisiana Gov. Bobby Jindal will be in Colorado stumping for Romney on Thursday. Former Minnesota governor Tim Pawlenty (R), meanwhile, headlined two events for Romney in Michigan on Wednesday.

The campaign stops marked the beginning of a busy few days for the rumored vice-presidential shortlisters.

## Census Changes How it Measures Race

**WASHINGTON** • To keep pace with rapidly changing notions of race, the Census Bureau wants to make broad changes to its surveys that would treat "Hispanic" as a distinct category regardless of race, end use of the term "Negro" and offer new ways to identify Middle Easterners.

The recommendations released Wednesday stem from new government research on the best ways to count the nation's demographic groups. Still it could face stiff resistance from some racial and ethnic groups who worry that any kind of wording change in the high-stakes

government count could yield a lower tally for them.

"This is a hot-button issue," said Angelo Falcon, president of the National Institute for Latino Policy in New York City and a community adviser to the census. "The burden will be on the Census Bureau to come up with evidence that wording changes will not undermine the Latino numbers."

Arab-Americans said they strongly support the Census Bureau's efforts. "The Census Bureau's current method for determining Arab ancestry yields a significant under-count of the actual size of the community, and we're optimistic that the new form should be significantly

better at capturing ancestry data," the Arab American Institute said in a statement.

The research is based on an experiment conducted during the 2010 census in which nearly 500,000 households were given forms with the race and ethnicity questions worded differently. The findings show that many people who filled out the traditional form did not feel they fit within the five government-defined categories of race: white, black, Asian, Pacific Islander and American Indian/Alaska Native; when questions were altered to address this concern, response rates and accuracy improved notably.

For instance, because

Hispanic is currently defined as an ethnicity and not a race, some 18 million Latinos — or roughly 37 percent - used the "some other race" category on their census forms to establish a Hispanic racial identity. Under one proposed change to the census forms, a new question would simply ask a person's race or origin, allowing them to check a single box next to choices including black, white, or Hispanic.

The other changes would drop use of "Negro," leaving a choice of "black" or African-American, as well as add write-in categories that would allow Middle Easterners and Arabs to specifically identify them-

## Mars Crater Where Rover Landed Looks 'Earth-like'

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) • The ancient Martian crater where the Curiosity rover landed looks strikingly similar to the Mojave Desert in California with its looming mountains and hanging haze, scientists said Wednesday.

"The first impression that you get is how Earth-like this seems looking at that landscape," said chief scientist John Grotzinger of the California Institute of Technology.

Overnight, the car-size rover poked its head out for the first time since settling in Gale Crater, peered around and returned a flood of black-and-white pictures that will be stitched into a panorama.

It provided the best view so far of its destination since touching down Sunday night after nailing an intricate choreography. During the last few seconds, a rocket-powered spacecraft hovered as cables lowered Curiosity to the ground.

In the latest photos, Curiosity looked out toward the northern horizon. Nearby were scour marks in the surface blasted by thrusters, which kicked up a swirl of dust. There were concerns that Curiosity got dusty, but scientists said that was not the case.

"We do see a thin coating of dust, but nothing too bad," said Justin Maki, imaging scientist at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, which manages the \$2.5 billion mission.

Scientists were giddy about the scour marks because they exposed bedrock below – information that should help scientists better understand the landing site.

Since landing, Curiosity has zipped home a stream of low-resolution pictures taken by tiny cameras under the chassis and a camera at the end of its robotic arm, which remained stowed. It also sent back a low-quality video glimpsing the last 21/2 minutes of its descent.

The rover successfully raised its mast packed with high-resolution and navigation cameras.

With the mast up, it can begin its shutterbug days in force including taking a 360degree color view of its surroundings as early as Thurs-

Grotzinger said he was struck by the Martian landscape, which appeared diverse. There seemed to be harder material underneath the gravelly surface, he said.

"It kind of makes you feel at home," he said. "We're looking at a place that feels really comfortable."



## Massacre Rocks State Park

AMERICAN FALLS • As a University of Idaho student, Kevin Lynott interned at Massacre Rocks State Park. That was back in 1977, and Massacre Rocks has been his top state

park ever since. "It's always been my favorite," said Lynott, park manager since 2005.

Perhaps others feel the same, for the park welcomes between 65,000 and 75,000 visitors annually, he said. They come for any number of outdoor recreational opportunities, to learn a bit of history or to catch up on rest and relaxation.

Its location just off Interstate 86 entices people to stop and find out what the park is all

just right at high speed, but Justin said the track is also user-friendly for beginners.

The new track allows local riders the opportunity to hone their skills without traveling hundreds of miles in- and out-of-state.

The four Sunday track practices so far have each had an attendance of 35 to 45 riders. Riders pay a fee of \$15 and can use the track from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Spectators get infree, and because the track is in a field there are several areas where people can watch riders and sit on grass.

"It is a really awesome family activity," Justin said.

Riders from Buhl, Burley, Twin Falls and Challis have started to flock to this field five miles northeast of Carey. The Idaho Mountain Dirt Riders Association posts practice times on its Facebook page.

Tyson Payne, 18, of Carey has been riding for eight years, usually traveling to Hagerman or Boise to ride his dirt bike.

"Usually we have to go on a long drive," Payne said. "But with it right here you just drive up the road."

He said he also likes how the new track fosters the next generation of riders. "It's a lot better for the littler kids. They have a place to work on improving their skills."

This is only the second track that Carey 19-year-old Caleb Cenarrusa has ridden on. His favorite features are its whoops — little humps spaced apart.

"It's a good challenge and a lot of fun," Cenarrusa said.

On one of the Carey track's bigger jumps, a rider can launch 30 feet into the air and touch down 85 feet away. But Cenarusa said the jumps do not have big gaps, so if you come up short you won't hurt yourself.

"It has one of the biggest jumps I have ever hit," Cenarrusa said.

Justin's family lives in Utah, but his father grew up in Carey. Todd said the track will bring another form of outdoor entertainment for southern Idaho families.

"Our goal was to have a place for people to ride that's safe and a challenge and a good boost for the area," Todd said.

Todd said future endeavors include installing a better irrigation system to keep the track

watered and reduce dust, and providing an area for riders and families to camp overnight. He also anticipates gathering feedback from riders about what the family could add or improve on the track.

"It's an awesome addition to our community," said Carey's city clerk, Tess Cenarrusa.

As local riders and those from neighboring towns flock to the track, the buzz of motors and a thin veil of dust will be more prominent in the field northeast of Carey.

## How Did the Park Get its Name?

The neat thing about visiting Massacre Rocks is that you can do it in warm weather or cold, though the best time to visit is in summer when recreation opportunities abound. Bring sunscreen, because this is desert country — about 1,000 acres of it.

The pioneers who knew the area, however, had to worry about more than sunburns and blisters.

In the mid-1800s, emigrants on America's overland route passed through southcentral Idaho on their way to Oregon and other points west. Their long journey, which for many began in Missouri, required many stops to rest themselves and their animals. One stopping point along the Oregon Trail was the place now known as Massacre Rocks State Park.

According to a marker at the site, many pioneers died from cholera, in weather-related accidents, during river crossing and by Indian attacks. The latter is how Massacre Rocks received its name. A skirmish with local Indians in 1862 left 10 pioneers dead.

Before that the pioneers called it "Gate of Death" or "Devil's Gate" because of the narrow break in the rocks through which they passed. The rocks were formed millions of years ago by a now-extinct volcano. The Bonneville Flood helped shape the landscape, "rolling and polishing the huge boulders found throughout the park," the marker says.

A number of kiosk signs outside the visitor center and elsewhere in the park tell about its history, geological and otherwise.

#### Any Rocks I Should Pay Attention To?

Yes, definitely. While in the area you should stop to see Register Rock — about two miles south of the park — which is home to a large boulder with signatures of pioneers who traveled the Oregon Trail.

"That's a must-see," said visitor center staffer Alberta Zimmerman.

Register Rock today has a picnic area with shade trees, lawn, horseshoe pits, restrooms, fire pits and barbecue grills.

#### Is This a Good Place to See Birds?

When planning a visit, don't forget to pack your binoculars. Massacre Rocks is an excellent place to view birds. Over the years, more than 200 species have been sighted at the park including bald eagles, blue herons, Canada geese, grebes and pelicans.

geese, grebes and pelicans.
"We have lots and lots of birds," Zimmerman said.
"It's a great place for birding."

"We have some of the only river access for boating in this part of the Snake. We get a lot of waterskiers, because we're the only show in town."

## What Other Critters Will I See?

While walking along the park's dirt trails, don't be surprised if you see a rodent or other small animal dart in front of you. It's a frequent occurrence, depending on the time of year. The park is home to a variety of small mammals, such as beaver, cottontail and jack rabbit, coyote and muskrat, who like the desert environment. Signs in the park warn visitors to watch out for rattlesnakes.

"It is their area," Zimmerman said. "That's why we ask people to stay on the trails. They don't rattle their tails unless they feel threatened. We don't usually have any problems with rattlesnakes. They don't like people any more than people like them."

You might also see other slithery types such as gopher snakes and snake lizards.

"There are plenty of those," Zimmerman said. "And lots of rabbits."

The desert landscape, which resembles something out of an Old West movie, also produces about 300 species of plants in the park. The most common are sagebrush, Utah juniper and rabbit brush.

## What's the Hiking Like?

If hiking is your bag, you've come to the right place. More than eight miles of dirt trails wind through the park, offering an opportunity to experience a bit of history and see the area's wildlife and desert habitat.

"You can hike or ride bicycles," Zimmerman said, "but nothing motorized is allowed on the trails."

One of the things visitors like best, she said, is walking the Oregon Trail where you can still see wagon ruts from

the 1800s.

Along the way, stop to read the many signs that tell about the trail's history. And don't forget to pick up a map inside the visitor center. While there, look at the exhibits that tell about the area's geological history — how this impressive park was made — or buy a souvenir in the gift shop.

#### What about Fishing and Water Sports?

Fishing on the banks of the Snake River, or by motorized boat, is a favorite pastime for those who come to Massacre Rocks, Zimmerman said. Young and old cast their lines here in hopes of catch-

ing a trout or bass. The park has fishing docks perfect for young anglers and their parents, she said.

Want a little more water activity? No problem: You also can ride canoes and kayaks in the river. You can rent them from the visitor center, but only after watching a 15-minute video on safety. Staffers will equip you with life jackets and let you go only if they feel you're ready, Zimmerman said. Prices range from \$5 to \$8 an hour, \$15 to \$20 for four hours, or \$25 to \$30 for eight hours.

One thing you can't do here: swim. The water is too dangerous for that, she said. But you can waterski at the park.

"We have some of the only river access for boating in this part of the Snake," Lynott said. "We get a lot of waterskiers, because we're the only show in town."

#### Can I Stay Overnight?

Yes, you can pitch a tent, bring your RV or camper, or rent one of the park's four cabins. Each of the 42 campsites includes electricity and water, but you have to share the central showers and rest-

rooms. Cabins sleep five and have electricity, heating and air conditioning, and lockable windows and doors.

Serviced campsites cost \$22 a night, a "companion" serviced site (with room for two RVs) is \$38 a night, and cabins are \$50 a night.

And the best thing: The park is open for camping all year long, Lynott said. For details, call 888-922-6743.

#### Does the Park Have Disc Golf?

Disc golf is one of the more popular things at the park, which built its 18-hole course about two years ago, Lynott said. Enthusiasts have a blast here because it's different than other courses nearby, he said. Its theme: "This Ain't Your Mama's Disc Golf Course."

"You're playing the lay of the land," he said — throwing over desert landscape and small valleys and cliffs.

#### What Can My Children Do?

Disc golf isn't just for grownups. Near the visitor center is a nine-hole course for

## Mars Overtakes Saturn in Virgo Next Week

know exactly what the ancients were thinking when they named the naked-eye planets. But the attributes ascribed to the planet-gods are clear to anyone who has spent much time watching them.

Mercury zips around the sun in just 88 days, so it's the winged messenger god. Venus, brilliantly bright, is the goddess of beauty and love. Red Mars rules over war and bloodshed. Jupiter is bright, but slow, circling the heavens every 12 years king of the gods, moving at a regal pace. Saturn, dimmer than Jupiter and slowest of the naked-eve planets, is the king's elderly father, diminished by age.

Hoary Saturn crossed in-



to Virgo around Labor Day of 2009 and has been inching its way eastward across the second largest constellation ever since. Circumnavigating the zodiac in just under 30 years, it won't leave Virgo for Libra until September 2013.

Mars, on the other hand, traverses all 12 zodiac constellations every 22.5 months. Since Saturn entered Virgo the two have met only once, in early August of 2010, when they lay near the constellation's western end. Now, they're about to meet again, this

time near the Maiden's middle, marked by her brightest star, Spica.

The conjunction occurs on Tuesday, when Saturn, Mars and Spica will form a nearvertical line (with Saturn uppermost), low in the westsouthwest around 9:45 p.m. A week later, on Aug. 21, Mars will have moved farther east and the thin crescent moon will join the scene.

By mid-September, with the sun setting earlier and the days getting shorter, Saturn and Spica will sink into twilight. Mars won't slip into the solar glare until mid-January.

The next Mars-Saturn conjunction won't be until August 2014, when they meet among the faint stars of Libra.

## Drought Curbs Tourism in Colorado, Other States

**DENVER** • Matt Nicotra held his metal measuring stick aloft as he waded into Colorado's Bear Creek, high in the Rockies, to chart how a rainstorm affected this South Platte River tributary, which for most of the spring and summer ran six times below its historical median.

"This is actually, with the rain we had, normal flow," said Nicotra, a hydrologic technician with the U.S. Geological Survey. "We were running between five and eight cubic feet per second. Now we're running at 50 cubic feet per second."

A week later, water flow fell to 25 cubic feet per second, half of the median daily volume, according to the USGS. More major rivers start in Colorado's Rocky Mountains than in any other state, feeding a \$155 million commercial rafting business. Yet many tributaries that rely on meltwater from snow-

pack — measured in June at 2 percent of average — are running dry, reducing some rafting companies to half their typical tourist offerings.

Beyond Colorado, the economic impact of the country's most widespread drought in 56 years is trickling down to businesses that rely on fishermen in Montana, boaters in Texas and paddlewheel riverboat enthusiasts on the Mississippi, and threatening the lucrative hunting season in South Dakota and Kansas that starts as early as next month for certain species.

Record temperatures in Colorado fueled last month's Waldo Canyon blaze – the most destructive wildfire in state history — shutting down Manitou Springs, a 142-yearold resort town at the base of Pikes Peak, for a day and causing restaurants and businesses to lose \$2.3 million because of the perception the town was closed longer.

Hotel occupancy rates plunged to 30 percent in July and tourists canceled reservations into September. Eleven companies may not survive the winter, said Roger Miller, chief operating officer of iManitou, a collaboration of the Manitou Chamber of Commerce, Visitors Bureau and Office of Economic Development.

"We lost the top two weeks of the year as far as revenue generation," Miller said. "People now are coming in on day trips and not making the high-level retail purchases long-term vacationers do. A number of our larger businesses had to lay people off."

In Texas, restaurants and outfitters on the northwest side of Lake Travis watched profits dry up as the water receded, leaving docks standing on dry ground. For businesses that reap \$112 million a year from the 65-milelong (105-kilometer) lake, revenue drops when the water level falls below 660 feet, a 2011 report found. The lake level Monday was 639 feet.

mand for hay will deprive birds of a place to weather the winter, and reduce cover for hunters, putting at risk the \$300 million South Dakota collects each year through hunting licenses, hotel reservations and sales receipts from sporting goods stores.

Wetlands in the state's southeast that are frequented by dozens of species of waterfowl are "bone dry," according to the Nature Conservancy. Enthusiasts warn that thousands of birders and hunters who flock to the Cheyenne Bottoms Wildlife Area may stay away because there won't be anything to see or shoot.



## Robert Hughes, Art Critic and Author, Dies at 74

Robert Hughes, a sometimes lacerating reviewer who may have commanded a larger audience than any other art critic in history, reaching the masses through 31 years as chief art critic for Time magazine and in a series of multi-part television documentaries for the BBC and PBS, has died. He was 74.

Hughes, who also authored "The Fatal Shore," an acclaimed history of his native Australia's founding as a British penal colony, died Monday at Calvary Hospital in New York City after a long, unspecified illness, according to a statement issued by his wife, painter Doris Downes Hughes.

The critic rose to star status by introducing television audiences to the development of 20th century modernism in "The Shock of the New: A Personal View," an eight-hour series that ran in Britain in 1980 and the United States in 1981. Hughes became known for blasting new art-world luminaries such as Jean-Michel Basquiat, Julian Schnabel and Jeff Koons, artists he felt exemplified the triumph of the marketplace and celebrity over the modernist creative standards he cherished.

"What we are seeing, in the last years of the 20th century, is a kind of environmental breakdown in the art world," Hughes wrote in "Nothing If Not Critical," a 1990 collection of his essays for Time, the New Republic and the New York Review of Books.

After Basquiat, who helped spearhead the entrance of graffiti-influenced painting into the museum world, died in 1988 of a heroin overdose, Hughes' critique ran in the New Republic under the headline, "Requiem for a Featherweight" Basquiat, he wrote, was "a

small, untrained talent caught in the buzz saw of artworld promotion, absurdly overrated by dealers, collectors, and no doubt to their future embarrassment, by critics."

"You can't blow bad art out of the skies, but you can punch a small leak," Hughes told the *Los Angeles Times* in 1987. "All you can do is argue the coherence of your reaction and hope for the same for your reader."

He went on to note in the interview that art critics of his generation no longer could aspire to be discoverers of great artists - as Clement Greenberg and Harold Rosenberg had been decades before. "Now you have entrepreneurs beating the cultural bushes. The critic is given the menu. You don't have that apostolic function anymore?"

If not himself an apostle, Hughes had fervent adherents: In 1987, when he lectured at UCLA's Royce Hall, 1,400 listeners greeted his broadsides against the commodification of art "with hoots and hollers and stompings of the feet, all of which grew in fervor and intensity as the preachment pressed on," according to a 1990 account in the Times.

Robert Studley Forrest Hughes was born in Sydney on July 28, 1938, the grandson of a former mayor of the city, and the youngest of four children of a lawyer who, he later wrote, was a "righteous and inflexible man ... a war hero who shot down 11 German planes in the First World War, a fiercely orthodox Catholic, and an intense patriot?"

Although his father died when he was 12, Hughes saw his adult life as a form of rebellion: "I became an expatriate, a political skeptic, an atheist, a liberal, a voluptuary, and, in most ways, a disappointment to the ethos he lived by?

## Nick Williams Jr., Former L.A. Times Foreign Correspondent, Dies at 75

Although Nick B. Williams Jr. would carve out a distin-

guished career as an editor and foreign correspondent at the Los Angeles Times, he first had to overcome the "junior" at the end of his

He joined the newspaper in the late 1960s when his father, Nick B. Williams Sr., was editor of *The Times*, and a highly regarded one at that.

"When Nick junior was added to the staff, a number of people - cynics mainly said, 'He's the editor's son. What the hell is he going to do?' Turns out, if they had waited 20 minutes, they would have found out he was a terrific editor and a terrific reporter," George Cotliar, a former managing editor of *The Times*, said Wednesday.

Williams, who was a Times foreign correspondent in Southeast Asia and the Middle East in the 1980s and 1990s, died Wednesday at a Gainesville, Texas, nursing home of complications from Alzheimer's disease, said his daughter Nan. He was 75.

After starting out on the Metro copy desk at The *Times*, Williams became an editor on the national and foreign desks in the 1970s and 1980s.

"He was just a marvelous and popular editor," said Robert Gibson, the *Times* editor foreign when Williams joined the department. "He was very valuable in his dealings with foreign correspondents, who felt that he had a sympathetic ear and handled their copy with 'respect?'"

After years on the Foreign desk, Williams "wanted his chance in the field," said Alvin Shuster, the former Times foreign editor who gave it to him. "He was a first-class desk editor, and I knew he would be a firstclass correspondent. Some said it was a gamble, including Nick, but it clearly was not."

Between 1985 and 1992 Williams reported on Asia while based in Bangkok and the Middle East from Nicosia, Cyprus. He once estimated he spent 60 percent of his time on the road.





### Felix a Golden Girl at Last

**LONDON** • No more heartbreak for Allyson Felix. No more silver, either.

Denied twice on the world's biggest stage, Felix won the Olympic gold medal she's been yearning for, taking the 200 meters Wednesday night to fill the last, and biggest, hole in her otherwise stellar resume.

Felix won the race in 21.88 seconds, topping Jamaica's Shelly-Ann Fraser-Pryce, who won the 100 four nights earlier, by .21 seconds. American Carmelita Jeter added bronze to go with her silver in the 100 meters.

One more spot back was Jamaica's Veronica Campbell-Brown, who defeated Felix in the Athens and Beijing Games and was trying to become the first woman to win the same individual track and field event in three consecutive Olympics.

Instead, the Americans were the ones celebrating three straight, their own 15 minutes of fame: Felix, followed quickly by Aries Merritt in the 110 hurdles

## Olympics has its Share of Losers

to celebrate back home, though Rene Herrera of the Philippines did manage to set a personal best in a men's 5,000-meter heat Wednesday at the Olympic stadium.

That he finished dead last, 43 seconds behind the next finisher hardly mattered. He was an Olympian, even if the Olympics offer a most uneven playing field for most countries.

There are 204 of them in London - 11 more than in the United Nations – and most will go home "losers." While the U.S. and China dominate the medal tables, 128 countries have yet to win one – and probably won't. That includes the Philippines, which hasn't won a medal since boxer Mansueto Velasco got a silver in 1996 in Atlanta.

The list of "losers" at this Olympics is long, indeed, but it goes far beyond the medals table:

DOWN, DOWN UNDER: If there's anything that makes the British as happy as seeing their country hauling in Olympic medals, it's making fun of Australia for its dismal performance in London. Australia which averaged 16 golds the last three games - had only five gold medals through Wednesday, prompting the country's sports minister to concede a medals bet with her British counterpart with five days left for the games. The joke down under is that there's a new malady called Australian Thumb, caused by people having to scroll too far down on their



#### FRENCH WHEELS:

There's no loser like a sore loser. The French were having a hard enough time digesting Britain's dominance when they fell for a line from British cycling chief Dave Brailsford that the country had "specially round wheels" on its bikes. French cycling officials were so suspicious of the fast British times, they called for a close look at the British bikes and their magic wheels. Of course, the two countries were already at odds over London sweeping in to win the right to host games when Paris had been considered the

leading contender. **U.S. BOXERS:** Miserable in Beijing, horrible in London. They used to steal medals from U.S. boxers, but now they're so bad there's no need. There were nine U.S. men competing in Olympic boxing — the most of any country - and they couldn't bring home a single medal for the first time in history. USA Boxing is so dysfunctional the team had no coach just a few weeks before the Olympics, and rejected an offer by noted trainer Freddie Roach to work with its young charges. Thank goodness for the U.S. women punching their way to wins in Olympic boxing's newest event. While the men won no medals at all, two of the three women will head home with a medal, and 17year-old middleweight

throws a left hook like the late Joe Frazier — has a chance to do what Frazier did in 1964 and win gold. WOMEN BOXERS:

While men compete in nine different weight classes, women are consigned to just three, meaning some must gain or lose considerable weight to fit into a category. That's largely because the IOC doesn't want to add more athletes to the games, but the same organization has approved a full field for golf, of all things, at the 2016 Rio Games. LOLO JONES: Her Olympic disappointment in Beijing – where she was leading before hitting a hurdle late — would have been enough for any athlete. But London was especially cruel, even though she had a season-best time in finishing fourth in the 100-meter hurdles. Jones wasn't unhappy with her race, but she broke down during an appearance on NBC's "Today" show when asked about published reports suggesting she was a shameless marketer of herself, more image than substance. "They should be supporting our U.S. Olympic athletes and instead they just ripped me to shreds," Jones said tearfully. **BIGGEST DOPES:** Alex Schwazer, the 2008 Olympic race walk champion from Italy, was in tears

from his wife, figure skater Carolina Kostner, and his parents in a box of vitamins in a refrigerator. He said he injected it every day, hoping it would help him win another gold. ## U.S., Bryant Overwhelm Aussies

ASSOCIATED PRESS

**LONDON** • Kobe Bryant felt the game getting close, then put it away from long range.

Bryant made six straight 3-pointers in the second half, LeBron James finished with a triple-double, and the U.S. men's Olympic basketball team advanced to the semifinals with a 119-86 victory over Australia on Wednesday night.

Bryant scored 20 points, flashing three fingers in the air after his third consecutive 3-pointer in the fourth quarter had pushed the game well out of reach and proved that yes, he would deliver the kind of game that's expected of him in London.

James finished with 11 points, 14 rebounds and 11 assists for the Americans, who advanced to their third straight Olympic semifinal meeting with Argentina, which beat Brazil earlier Wednesday. Carmelo Anthony added 17 points and Kevin Durant had 14.

The Americans beat the Argentines 126-97 on Monday in the final game of pool play, yet another night they didn't need much from Bryant, who came in averaging just 9.4 points as both he and his teammates kept assuring people there was

nothing wrong with the five-time NBA champion.

This time was different, and he delivered.

Australia scored the first 11 points of the second half, cutting the Americans' lead to three after back-to-back 3-pointers by Joe Ingles. The U.S. lead was only six before Bryant, who has never gotten in an offensive rhythm in London and just minutes earlier had committed another puzzling offensive foul, finally broke out.

He made a 3-pointer, then batted away a pass, chased it down along the left sideline, and pulled up for another 3pointer that made it 70-58. James followed with a basket that pushed it to 14, and the Americans never let the Australians get much closer.

Not the way Bryant shot, anyway.

He was 0 for 3 in the first half, then made six in a row. He hit three straight in the fourth quarter to blow it open, the crowd chanting "Kobe! Kobe!" before he finally missed on a ridiculously long attempt before calling it a night.

Patty Mills scored 26 points and Ingles had 19 for Australia, which had the misfortune of running into the U.S. in the quarterfinals for the second straight Olympics.

The decathlon finishes up today with the 110 meter hurdles, discus, pole vault, javelin — Felix's strongest event - and 1,500 meters.

The United States holds the top two spots with world record holder Ashton Eaton with 4,661 points and 2011 world champion Trey Hardee with 4,441 points.

U.S. trials earlier this summer that hovered over Felix's run-up to these Olympics – forcing her to defend herself off the track for the first time in an otherwise-pristine career.

Her tie with Jeneba Tarmoh for the third and final spot in the 100 forced USA Track and Field officials to scramble for a solution. One possibility was a coin flip; instead, they settled on a run-off. But Tarmoh begged off. Felix, never a serious medal contender for the 100, had to defend her decision not to give up the spot, and she went on to finish fifth.

The three heats in the Olympic 100, she said, were the perfect tuneup for the race she really wanted to win.

"Everyone just expected me to give up this spot, because I think lots of people ... know me and they know that I'm seen as this very nice girl," Felix said with a chuckle a few days before the start of track and field in

London. "But it's not just about me." On this night, though, it

was. Twice before, Felix came into the Olympics on even footing, or even a slight favorite, against Campbell-Brown. Both times, the American ended up disappointed – and the last time in Beijing, choking back tears, she called it "deja vu,

and not in a good way." This time, there would be no regrets.

On a calm, cloudless evening in London, Felix broke out of Lane 7, hugged the line on the curve and found herself slightly behind Fraser-Pryce as they rounded into the straightaway with about 60 meters to go. That, however, is when Felix — not the 100-meter champion — kicked it into another gear, drawing even and then pulling away.

She adds this gold to the two individual silvers and one 4x400 relay gold from the 2008 Olympics. She's a sixtime national champion at 200, a three-time world champion and - in a sport that has nearly buried itself in the United States under the weight of doping scandals and performances that seem too good to be true - she's the athlete who has consistently stood out as a smiling, trustworthy exception.

She put at least a brief stop to Jamaica's relentlessness in these Olympic sprints. Before the Felix victory, Jamaica had won seven of the last eight Olympic sprints, including relays.

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



## THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

**Bobby Wolff** 

"I claim not to have controlled events, but confess plainly that events have controlled me." — Abraham Lincoln

When declarer has only seven or eight trumps between his hand and dummy, he often needs to resort to special efforts to retain control. Today's deal is just such an example — declarer has only a combined holding of seven trumps, AND they break poorly.

Against four hearts, the lead was the spade king, then the queen, and the spade jack was overtaken by the ace. If declarer blithely ruffs in and draws trumps he must go down; East has longer trumps than South and can play on spades every time he regains the lead.

To retain control, South must discard a club at trick three. Now, on a nonspade continuation, declarer romps home. But what happens if East plays a fourth spade? South must discard a club and ruff in dummy with the heart 10. After taking the heart jack, he plays a diamond to the king and takes the heart ace. Again, if trumps had split, declarer would be home. As it is, South notes the bad break and next plays the club ace and king. If East ruffs, South can overruff, draw trumps and claim. If East discards, South discards a diamond. Now the club queen offers East the same choice. When he discards again, South pitches his diamond king and leads a plain card to score all his trumps whatever East does.

In the end, declarer makes five trumps in hand, the heart 10 on table and four minor-suit tricks.

ANSWER: Whenever a responder has game-forcing values, he should consider at his second turn using the fourth suit. Here, a call of two diamonds sets up a game-force and helps South find out more about his partner's shape and stoppers. Since partner could have six clubs and a void in hearts, it is time to explore whether clubs, hearts or no-trump is the best strain to play.

On Aug. 9, 1974, President Richard Nixon and his family left the White House as his resignation took effect. Vice President Gerald R. Ford became the nation's 38th chief executive.

## TODAY IN HISTORY

#### On this date:

In 1842, the United States and Canada resolved a border dispute by signing the Webster-Ashburton Treaty.

In 1854, Henry David Thoreau's "Walden," which described Thoreau's experiences while living near Walden Pond in Massachusetts, was first published.

In 1862, during the Civil War, Confederate forces drove back Union troops in the Battle of Cedar Mountain in Culpeper County, Va.

In 1902, Edward VII was crowned king of Britain following the death of his mother, Queen Victoria.

In 1936, Jesse Owens won his fourth gold medal at the Berlin Olympics as the United States took first place in the 400-meter relay.

In 1942, Britain arrested Indian nationalist Mohandas K. Gandhi; he was released in

In 1944, 258 African-American sailors based at Port Chicago, Calif., refused to load a munitions ship following an explosion on another ship that killed 320 men, many of them black. (Fifty of the sailors were convicted of mutiny, fined and imprisoned.)

In 1945, three days after the atomic bombing of Hiroshima, Japan, the United States exploded a nuclear device over Nagasaki, killing an estimated 74,000 people.

In 1962, German-born Swiss poet and author Hermann Hesse, 85, died in Montagnola, Switzerland.

In 1969, actress Sharon Tate and four other people were found brutally slain at Tate's Los Angeles home; cult leader Charles Manson and a group of his followers were later convicted of the crime.

In 1982, a federal judge in Washington ordered John W. Hinckley Jr., who'd been acquitted of shooting President Ronald Reagan and three others by reason of insanity, committed to a mental hospi-

In 1997, Haitian immigrant Abner Louima was brutalized house by officer Justin Volpe, who raped him with a broken broomstick. (Volpe was later sentenced to 30 years in prison.)

Ten years ago: Oscar-winning actor and National Rifle Association president Charlton Heston, 78, revealed that doctors had told him he had symptoms consistent with Alzheimer's disease (Heston died in April 2008). Barry Bonds of the San Francisco Giants hit his 600th homer. becoming the fourth major

leaguer to reach the mark. Five years ago: President George W. Bush held a news conference in which he publicly prodded Pakistani President Pervez Musharraf, his embattled war-on-terror partner, to hold free presidential elections, share intelligence and take "swift action" against terrorist leaders pinpointed in his country. China banned exports by two toy manufacturers whose products were subject to major recalls in the United States. David Beckham made his long-awaited Major League Soccer debut, entering in the 72nd minute of the Los Angeles Galaxy's 1-0 loss

to D.C. United. One year ago: President Barack Obama announced new fuel efficiency standards for work trucks, buses and other heavy duty vehicles. 

My suggestion to "End" would be to talk to a respite facility about giving her a "vacation" from her husband. I do this with my father twice a year. His appreciation for the care I give him increases greatly after being in a "home." He goes for only one week at a time, but it's long enough for me to miss him and for him to realize I'm not so bad after all.

"End" is overwhelmed and angry right now because her husband expects so much from her. This isn't his fault. It is normal for someone with brain cancer. If no one else is stepping up to give her the breaks she so desperately needs, then she must consider her own well-being. She must do what her heart tells her. She has my sympathy and respect for what she has done so far.

#### - BEEN THERE, STILL DOING THAT DEAR BEEN THERE: Thank you for writing. Many

readers responded, offering suggestions gained from personal experience. **Their com**ments:

DEAR ABBY: You gave "End of My Rope" helpful information about hospice care for her husband in their home, but more services are available from most hospices. In addition to doctors, nurses, home health aides and volunteers, services are provided by chaplains and social workers who offer essential emotional and spiritual support to dying patients and their families. The hospice that employs me as chaplain also provides bereavement counseling to families by professional grief counselors — at no charge for a year after the patient's passing.

#### HONORED TO BE A HOSPICE CHAPLAIN **DEAR ABBY:** I suggest

"End" call all of her husband's friends and family. Many people offer help in times like this, but they don't know how. Schedule assignments for sitting with her husband, preparing meals, running errands, assisting with getting him in and out of the car on appointment days, or any tasks that need to be done.

Loved ones will appreciate being asked to help in tangible ways. I urge her to take a drive or go out to lunch and leave the caretaking to a trusted friend for an hour or two. Her husband does not realize the enormous burden she carries. When she's at her lowest, I also recommend a simple prayer asking for strength.

#### -LOUISE IN BRADENTON, FLA. **DEAR ABBY:** Our dad was

ill for a number of years with Alzheimer's. We are a large family of siblings, but most lived away from our hometown. Though we were fortunate to have in-home care, the day-to-day management fell to me and one of my sisters.

As the oldest, I took it upon myself to write a straightforward letter to my siblings regarding Dad's condition and the progression of his illness. Then I assigned consecutive weekends to each one, telling them this was their weekend to come, spend time with Dad and help with his care. I said they were free to trade weekends among themselves, but the expectation was that Dad would have his family with him every weekend until he passed.

It worked pretty well, with most siblings taking the responsibility seriously and as a chance to express their love and gratitude to Dad in his last - DANIELIN








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
