Fireworks Complaints Skyrocket

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TWIN FALLS • Your Fourth of July may get quieter next year.

On Monday, the Twin Falls City Council discussed potential changes to the city's fireworks code.

During a presentation to the council Twin Falls Police Captain Anthony Barnhart said that calls on illegal fireworks have gone up since last year, with police fielding 52 complaints on July 4 and 5.

Not only are more illegal fireworks coming into Idaho, Barnhart said, but those fireworks are larger than in years past.

Part of that has to do with a loophole in Idaho's fireworks laws. Though any firework that shoots into the air is against the law, it is legal to sell and store them for export in the

Fugitive Shot, Arrested in Twin Falls

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TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls fugitive is in custody after being shot early Saturday morning in Twin Falls.

Daniel D. Thomas, 35, is accused of shooting John Valenciano Jr., 19, in the neck shortly before 4 a.m.

Thomas was arraigned on a charge of aggravated battery on Monday. After medical treatment, Valenciano was taken into custody on a warrant related to an ongoing aggravated assault case.

The stories of the two men differ greatly concerning the shooting, according to interviews with police filed in 5th District Court.

According to court records, Valenciano told an officer that Saturday morning, he heard a male say "Hey loco." When Valenciano turned around, Thomas shot him, he said.

Cave Canyon Fire Close to Containment

Also Burning

MINIDOKACOMPLEX FIRES

Cave Canyon: Measuring nearly 89,000 acres, fire crews had this blaze in the South Hills 60 percent contained Monday. Meanwhile, residents of Rock Creek Road moved belongings back into their homes after they were given permission to return Sunday.

Deer Hollow: This fire near the Utah border in Cassia County is 35 percent contained. Its 5,440 acres burned remained unchanged. Additional crews will be joining the effort against this fire from the Cave Canyon Fire.

Hot Well: Near Declo and Albion, it continues to burn 3,056 acres and is about 45 percent contained as fire crews continue to extinguish hot spots along the edge of the fire line. A few engines were released Monday to be available for local initial attack on other fires as needed.

OTHER FIRES

Flat Top 2: The 141,000-acre fire 8 miles northeast of Kimama is fully extinguished.

Halstead: A new fire was detected west of the fire. Helicopters dropped water on it and firefighters will continue to check on that. The Halstead fire continues to burn actively in the Vanity Lakes, and Trail Creek areas.

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HANSEN • Under hazy skies, John Turner lifted a cardboard box full of framed family photos out of his truck and carried it into his house.

After being evacuated for a few days during the Cave Canyon Fire, he and wife Lori settled back into their Rock Creek Road home Monday.

Since John Turner's parents live in Twin Falls, the couple didn't have to stay in a hotel.

"We were really lucky that way," Lori Turner said.

The fire uprooted residents from 49 homes early Friday as flames bounded west through the South Hills, said Lori Stewart, spokeswoman for the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office.

The evacuees were given the go-ahead on Sunday to return home.

There haven't been any reports of homes damaged, except for a few livestock shelters that were destroyed Thursday night.

For the Turners, a lot was riding on the survival of their home.

In addition to their personal possessions, the couple also has supplies for a business they run out of their home — American Leathers.

When it came time to evacuate, the Turners packed client files and the supplies used to make archery gloves. But they left some larger equipment behind.

Campgrounds First, then Homes

The Cave Canyon Fire measured 88,909

acres Monday evening and was 60 percent contained.

Rock Creek Canyon is still closed around the forest boundary, as were Murtaugh Lake and Goose Creek Reservoir.

Control lines surround the fire perimeter, and crews finished burning out along the lines Monday to secure the fire's west side.

How was the sheriff's office involved?

Last week, the office put in about 200 to 250 hours of work in response to the Cave Canyon Fire.

Chief Deputy Don Newman said there were eight to 12 deputies in the area at any given time, particularly at road intersections that were blocked off.

But to achieve that level of staffing, it meant calling deputies in to work overtime.

On Thursday night, deputies evacuated people at campgrounds before visiting homes. They collected information about the number of residents in each home and their phone numbers.

"We made sure they specifically went to speak with everyone," Stewart said.

After receiving a voluntary evacuation notice early Friday morning, the Turners packed up some of their belongings and loaded them into their trucks from about 1:30-3 a.m.

When the fire got close to structures, deputies told residents to evacuate.

"People were really cooperative and we didn't have any issues whatsoever," Newman said.

At 5:30 a.m., the Turners received a phone

COUNCIL DITCHES RECYCLEBANK

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TWIN FALLS • The Twin Falls City Council has taken Recyclebank to the curb.

In a 5-2 vote on Monday night, the council passed a resolution that will raise rates while ending recycle incentive program. While the move doesn't prevent a proposed increase, it does make rates lower for Twin Falls customers.

Recyclebank rewarded recyclers with points that can be exchanged for coupons and free magazines.

Council members said while the recycle program proved successful, only 975 Twin Falls residents redeemed Recyclebank points in the last year.

Of the monthly sanitation rates, 83 cents went directly to Recyclebank.

"That just doesn't seem like a good use of the public's money," said Councilman Jim Munn.

What about my Recyclebank Points?

Don't worry. If you're a Twin Falls resident and you've already enrolled in Recyclebank, your accumulated points aren't going anywhere. Just be sure to maintain some account activity once every 12 months, and you can use up your remaining balance.

Not everyone agreed with the decision. Councilman Shawn Barigar and Mayor Greg Lanting voted to keep the program, saying they saw value in the system.

The city will still offer one-bin street-side recycling to its residents.

The resolution that did away with Recyclebank also raised water rates by 3 percent, sewer rates

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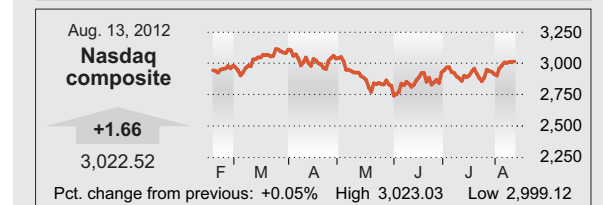
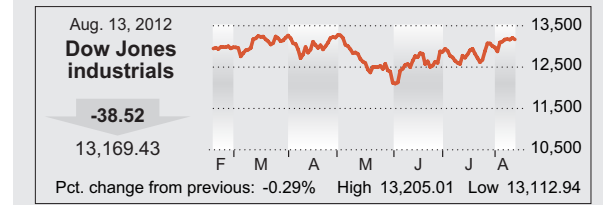

TWIN FALLS • The Jerome Police Department is investigating a shooting. According to Police Chief Dan Hall, police responded to a report of shots fired at the Windwood Apartments, located at 921 S. Davis St. in Jerome. Witnesses reported that an SUV-type vehicle had fled the scene shortly after the incident. There were no reported injuries. Later that night, police located a vehicle in Wendell with bullet holes in it. After interviewing the occupants, police determined the vehicle had been shot in Jerome. There were no reported injuries. Hall declined to release more details, including names, citing the ongoing investigation, but did say it may be connected to recent events in the area. Curious Mind Road Construction Close to Completion

Can you give me an update on Twin Falls road construction?
With numerous projects in the works, city engineer Jackie Fields says road construction workers are working as hard as they can to get the roads back to full use.



Work at the intersection of Falls and Eastland is planned to end in late August. The Addison/Eastland work should end late September. "The contractors are trying to get things done before school gets into full swing and harvest season starts," Fields said. While those are the last of the bigger projects the city planned for the year, chip sealing and slurry coats are nearing the end of completion as well. A full listing of the roads being chip sealed and slurry coated can be found on the city's website at tfid.org.

What are the current Twin Falls water restrictions and why are there restrictions?
"So not everyone is drawing water out of the same pipe at the same time," said Mitch Humble, community development director.

Essentially, when everyone on a street runs water at the same time, it trickles out and there is less water available as it flows through a pipe. To resolve the issue, the city staggers availability of watering days depending on the ending number of the address.

Those with pressurized irrigation and whose addresses are even numbers get water on even number calendar days. Those with addresses ending in odd numbers get odd days. Water can be used at any time with this system. Homes with metered, city water whose addresses end with even numbers are even able to use it on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Odd numbers get Wednesday, Friday and Sunday. Water is to be used before 10 a.m. and after 5 p.m. The idea behind the time restriction is to conserve water that may evaporate during the heat of the day.

call from a sheriff's deputy with a mandatory evacuation notice. They left with their four dogs and one cat. Not everyone has complemented the process. But John Turner said the sheriff's office did a good job with the evacuation, especially in light of the quickly moving fire.

"For being a bad deal, the whole thing was smooth," he said.

Most Find Shelter

For evacuees who needed help finding a place to stay,

the American Red Cross provided hotel vouchers. Roger Hinton, preparedness and response specialist for south-central Idaho, said quite a few evacuees called to get information. But while some had questions about where to shelter their animals, not many needed a place to stay. "I only had three families take us up on our lodging offers," Hinton said.

Water Resources

The Twin Falls Canal Co. is letting fire crews use water from Murtaugh Lake, which the company owns. Manager Brian Olmstead said he's allowing crews to

take all the water they need to fight the fire — particularly, to fill up planes — and the company isn't asking to be paid. "For any public emergencies, we wouldn't have any qualms about donating water from Murtaugh Lake," he said. Olmstead said it's a bit of a liability issue to allow fire crews to use the water, though. The company plans to talk with Twin Falls County officials about the topic. He said fire crews are using a "pretty insignificant amount" of water compared to the quantities the company diverts. And he said farmers won't notice a difference.

by 2 percent and sanitation rates by 1.16 percent. During budget discussions, the council decided not to spend the city's accumulated foregone balance, or the amount by which the city has declined to raise taxes in previous years. Valenciano's mother told police that while she drove her son to the hospital, Valenciano pointed to a rifle on the ground and said it was thrown from a van driven by Thomas. When officers later searched a van at Thomas' house, a detective found a bullet casing between the two front seats, court records state. In an interview with police, Thomas claimed while he and Valenciano were driving to Jerome early Saturday to pick up guns, Valenciano requested to stop in Twin Falls and pick up another gun at a house located in the 700 block of Washington Street South. According to Thomas, Va-

lenciano spoke to someone at the residence. After a few minutes, Thomas said he heard a gunshot and said Valenciano continued to stand there, not reacting in any way. Thomas told the officer he then returned home without Valenciano. In addition to the other charges, both Thomas and Valenciano are charged with possession of a controlled substance. Both were arraigned on those charges Monday. Both Valenciano and Thomas have lengthy criminal records. Valenciano had at least one warrant out for his arrest in connection with an aggravated assault charge, including for violating his terms of release. The assault charge stems from a December home invasion incident in Filer.

In January, Thomas pleaded guilty to possession of an unlawful weapon in connection with the November 2011 abduction of a 4-year-old boy from his father's Twin Falls home. He is scheduled to be sentenced for that charge in September. Upcoming court appearances for both include the following: Valenciano: A status hearing for the aggravated assault charge is planned for Aug. 20. He is being held with no bond in that case. A preliminary hearing for the possession charge is set for Aug. 24; bond was set at \$5,000 there. Thomas: Preliminary hearings for both the aggravated battery and possession charges are set for Aug. 24. Combined, bond has been set at \$125,000 for Thomas.

state. Those fireworks are available for sale locally in the weeks before July 4, and customers must sign a waiver indicating they won't detonate them in-state. "Which obviously is not happening," Barnhart said. Enforcement is also a problem, as officers must see a person actually setting off the firework to is-

sue a citation. The council discussed ways to educate the public on which fireworks are illegal, but Councilman Jim Munn said the public already knows. "I think people are really very aware of what's legal and what's illegal," Munn said. The bigger problem, he said, is "they don't care." The council didn't take any action, but asked Barnhart to return to council with potential code change proposals.

F-Bomb Drops into Dictionary

The word is one of about 100 added by Merriam Webster's Collegiate Dictionary.

NEW YORK (AP) • The term "F-bomb" first surfaced in newspapers more than 20 years ago but will land Tuesday for the first time in the mainstream Merriam-Webster's Collegiate Dictionary, along with sexting, flexitarian, obesogenic, energy drink and life coach.

In all, the company picks about 100 additions for the 114-year-old dictionary's annual update, gathering evidence of usage over several years in everything from media to the labels of beer bottles and boxes of frozen food.

So who's responsible for lobbing F-bomb far and wide? Kory Stamper, an associate editor for Merriam-Webster, said she and her fellow word spies at the Massachusetts company traced it back to 1988, in a Newsday story that had the now-dead Mets catcher Gary Carter talking about how he had given them up, along with other profanities.

Merriam-Webster's Collegiate gets a cover-to-cover overhaul every decade or so in addition to yearly upgrades. The Springfield, Mass.-based company also picks a defining word of each year closer to Thanksgiving. Among the company's other additions this year, including online at Merriam-Webster.com, and various apps:

The Oprah-inspired "aha moment," the Stephen King-popularized earworm, as in that truly torturous tune you can't get out of your head, and man cave, brain cramp and bucket list.

Rebel Video Claims to Show Captured Pilot

BEIRUT (AP) • Syrian rebels circulated dramatic video Monday of what they claimed was the downing of a warplane and armed men later holding the captured pilot who ejected as the MiG fighter was engulfed by flames. Syria acknowledged a pilot bailed out of a disabled plane but blamed the crash on a technical malfunction.

The authenticity of the images or the claims could not be independently verified. If the rebels did bring down their first aircraft, that could signal a significant jump in their firepower and give opposition forces their most high-profile military captive.

But wider questions remain even if the rebel reports are confirmed, including whether this could be just a one-time blow against expanding air offensives by the forces of Bashar Assad's regime. Just days ago, protesters across Syria pleaded for the rebels' main backers — including Turkey and Gulf states — to send anti-aircraft weapons for outgunned fighters.

110-year-old widow gets WWI benefits boost. A 110-year-old Pennsylvania widow is getting a benefits boost because of her husband's World War I service.

Family members say Alda Collins is now getting about \$1,000 a month to assist with her stay at a nursing home near Ebensburg. She had been getting \$36 a month.

Her son told the Daily American of Somerset that Collins lived by herself in a trailer until she was 106. She can use a walker, feeds herself and knows the Pirates are in second place.

Flaws in Norway massacre response uncovered. A year after a far-right militant's bomb and gun attacks exposed flaws in Norway's terror preparedness, police are being criticized for failing to improve their ability to stop a gunman.

In contrast to the 1999 Columbine High School massacre in Colorado, which led to sweeping changes in police tactics and training in the U.S., the massacre of 77 people in July last year hasn't had a tangible impact on Norway's police force, critics say.

"There are hardly been any visible changes from July 22 and until today. That is what our members tell me," said Arne Johannessen.

Dems Say Romney Supports Ryan's Budget

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa (AP) • Led by President Barack Obama, Democrats claimed on Monday that Republican challenger Mitt Romney privately backs controversial plans to overhaul Medicare and cut trillions from social programs that his new vice presidential running mate has publicly proposed.

Rep. Paul Ryan "has given definition to the vague commitments that Romney has been making," Vice President Joe Biden said as the Democrats welcomed the Wisconsin lawmaker to the race with a barrage of criticism. "There is no distinction" between the two, he said.

Romney lauded his running mate's work as he resumed his own four-day bus trip through campaign battleground states.

Ryan has "come up with ideas that are very different than the president's," Romney said in Florida, the state with the highest percentage of residents age 65 and over. "The president's idea for Medicare was to cut it by \$700 billion. That's not the right answer. We want to make sure that we preserve and protect Medicare."

The former Massachusetts governor did not say so, but the tax-and-spending plans Ryan produced in the past two years as chairman of the House Budget Committee call for the repeal of Obama's health care plan but also would retain the \$700 billion in Medicare cuts that were part of it.

Aides said during the day that Romney has long disagreed with that specific element of the House Republican plan, and they said while he wants to repeal the health care law he also wants

to restore the funds to Medicare.

The day marked a first in the race for the White House, with both major party tickets campaigning at full strength and a little more than 80 days remaining in a campaign dominated by a weak economic recovery and a national jobless rate of 8.3 percent.

Three Killed in Texas Shooting

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) • A deadly shootout erupted Monday near the Texas A&M University campus when a man being brought an eviction notice opened fire on a Texas law enforcement officer, leaving three people dead, including the officer and the gunman.

Police say Thomas Alton Caffall, 35, opened fire on Brazos County Constable Brian Bachmann just after noon as the lawman brought an eviction notice. Both men were later pronounced dead at a hospital.

Police identified Chris Northcliff, 43, as the third person killed in the shootings at an off-campus home not far from the university's football stadium. Three other law enforcement officers and a 55-year-old woman were wounded, College Station Assistant Police Chief Scott McCollum said.

Caffall's sister said Monday night the family was "shocked" by the violence.

"Our hearts and prayers go out to the families and this is just a senseless tragedy," said Courtney Clark, Caffall's

sister, reached Monday evening at her mother's home in Navasota, about 20 miles to the south. "We are just distraught by the havoc that he has caused."

She declined additional comment. Officers responding Monday afternoon to reports of an officer down saw Bachmann wounded on the ground in the front yard, then got into what McCollum described as an extended shootout with Caffall, who eventually was shot.

Police spokeswoman Rhonda Seaton said Northcliff was outside the home when he was shot, as was the wounded woman, whose name had not been released by Monday evening.

The woman was hospitalized in serious condition following surgery. One of the injured officers, Justin Oehlke, was treated for a gunshot wound in the calf and was in stable condition, Seaton said. Two other officers — Brad Smith and Phil Dorsett, were treated for "shrapnel injuries" and released, Seaton said.

Police declined to speculate on a motive for the gunfire.

The shootings prompted Texas A&M to issue an emergency alert warning students and residents to stay away from the area. Most of the university's 50,000 students were not on the campus about 90 miles northwest of Houston because the fall semester doesn't start until Aug. 27, university spokeswoman Sherylon Carroll said.

Diana Harbourt, 27, who lives about a block from where the shootings happened, said she heard five loud popping sounds from a back room of her home looking out her front door to see an officer park his vehicle on the street and crouch in front of another vehicle.

"We heard him exchanging some words with the person and then shots being fired," Harbourt said. "And then we heard more sirens and more officers and fire trucks came and they were keeping their distance, kind of slowly moving in. More officers showed up and told us to stay inside."

Evangelist Billy Graham Improving at NC Hospital

ASHEVILLE, N.C. (AP) • Evangelist Billy Graham remains in stable condition after a restful night at the North Carolina hospital where he's being treated for bronchitis.

Nurses said Graham had breakfast Monday morning at Mission Hospital in Asheville and was doing well. Pulmonologist David Pucci said Graham's infection was responding well to treatment.

The 93-year-old Graham was admitted to Mission Hospital overnight Saturday for treatment of the lung infection. Graham spokesman A. Larry Ross said Graham watched the closing ceremony of the London Olympics

from his hospital bed Sunday evening.

Earlier Sunday, he had watched grandson Will Graham on television as he preached at First Baptist Church of Spartanburg, S.C. His daughter, Gigi, and another grandchild ate lunch with him that afternoon.

No date has been set for his discharge, but physicians hope Graham's rapid recovery will continue and he'll be able to return home soon.

Graham was hospitalized for pneumonia last November. His staff says the evangelist's health has been good since his release, though he had remained at his home in Montreat. He's working on an upcoming book.

Airport Breached by Man Who Swam Ashore

NEW YORK (AP) • In an era when airline passengers can't get past a checkpoint with a bottle of shampoo, security experts were shocked Monday by the case of a man who swam ashore, scaled a fence and walked dripping wet into Kennedy Airport despite a \$100 million system of surveillance cameras and motion detectors.

"Thank God it wasn't a terrorist, but we have to look at it as if we had another attack," said Isaac Yeffet, former chief of security for Israeli airline El Al.

The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, which oversees JFK, quickly added police patrols to the airport perimeter and said it is investigating the security breach.

New Pawnshop Pins Hopes on Presentation

TWIN FALLS • A pawnshop featuring a small musical stage and a focus on presentation will become the newest business at one of Twin Falls' most busy intersections.

Pawn 1 is set to open Aug. 22 on the southeast corner of North Five Points, the intersection of Blue Lakes Boulevard, Addison Avenue and Shoshone Street.

Owner Mark Lax said the pawnshop, formerly the site of a car stereo business, will have an upbeat, airy feel.

"We want to offer the brightest store we can," he said. "We want people to feel comfortable when they come in."

The goal in designing the store, Lax said, is to achieve "beautiful layout and presentation."

It will be the Spokane, Wash., resident's 10th store in Idaho, including five that operated for years in Boise. The staff of 10 is already in place with five local residents hired as sales personnel, and five people transferring from other Pawn 1 stores to take management roles.

Lax, who likes to promote from within the company, said employment could jump to 15 if business is good. Pawn 1 employs 200 people in all of its locations. "I started this in 1978," he

said of the chain. "It's not an overnight deal. It's been a lifelong ambition."

Workers were busy Monday remodeling to meet the deadline for opening. When completed, the shop will have a music corner with a small stage. Jewelry also will have a specially defined spot.

"Music and jewelry have gone together forever, and we hope to take it to a new level," Lax said.

Electronics will be a large part of the inventory, with many items transported from other Pawn 1 stores. Lax said there will be "a great selection" of popular items such as iPods, iPads and flat-screen TVs.

Despite tough economic times, he said, Pawn 1 hasn't seen a run of people pawning items to get quick cash. "Today I think people are more willing to hang onto their stuff," he said.

People are willing to sell gold and silver with the recent spike in prices for those metals, Lax added.

Lax found success with his other stores, and said the company has shown steady growth during the past seven years.

"We know we have a nice location and hope people respond to what we have to offer," he said. "We want to give them what they want — low prices and a good selection."

California Fire Could Boost Idaho Gas Prices

TWIN FALLS • The price of a gallon of regular gasoline has remained steady in Twin Falls, averaging \$3.62 on Monday.

That's down a penny from a month ago and three cents less than a year ago, according to figures from AAA Idaho.

The stability may not last long.

Dave Carlson of AAA Idaho said a major fire at a Chevron refinery in California could have a ripple effect on local drivers.

"That closed down the refinery," he said, "which helped push up wholesale prices in the region by 30 cents overnight. It will have a major influence on gas prices on the West Coast, and that means the limited supply here might be pushed into markets west of Idaho, particularly Washington."

Whether Idahoans see a spike in prices, and how much, depends on the extent of the California refinery fire and how quickly that facility resumes production, Carlson said.

Meanwhile, Twin Falls' current price is eight cents below the national average of \$3.70 per gallon. But it's still above the Idaho average of \$3.57.

Move the Feet, Still the Mind

Boxing coach teaches his athletes that fighting is not about the fists.

TWIN FALLS • The Headhunter Boxing Club has concrete floors and brick walls. Boxing bags hang like meat from bare rafters.

"When you see pictures of the old boxing gyms in Philadelphia the walls are brick. There's no air flow. They're in the basement," said gym owner Manuel Flores, 35. "That's what we wanted for this place. There are no luxuries. You are going to work your butt off and then go home."

"We don't have treadmills. I want them running out on the road."

There are no distractions. The only things in this gym are the fighter and the training for the fight ahead.

On a recent Monday night, a 9-year-old named J.J. was punching the bag. Flores stood behind him.

"Go. Go. Go," Flores said.

J.J. punched faster.

"Let's move. Come on. Keeping moving. Harder than that. Too soft?"

J.J.'s face was turning red. He was sweating. He started to slow down.

"Let's go," Flores said. "Don't stop. Earn it."

J.J. punched faster. He punched harder, and as he punched, Flores was a steady voice behind him.

"Come on. Push. Keep pushing. You have more than that. Move. Move. Hands up!"

Just when it looked like J.J. couldn't throw another punch, Flores patted him on the back and told him to get in the ring.

"Smile," Flores said.

In all this, J.J. didn't argue or complain. And when Flores told him to, he pulled the ropes apart and stepped in the ring.

"Every round, start out like you're losing. It will make you work hard," Flores told him.

Flores said he knows how hard to push his fighters. Everyone has a different threshold, and he's learned how to tell where that is by making mistakes, pushing people too far and watching them give up — never to pick up a pair of boxing gloves again.

"Boxing is 80 percent mental, and to be a good coach, you have to get into their mind," he said. "People want to do what's easiest, what's most comfortable."

"But that's not always what's best." He walked through the row of bags to a woman, Jenna Harder, who had just taken her position to start bag work.

She was punching, then pulling her hands up in front of her face. Then punching again. Technically perfect punches, Flores said later.

"Move," he said to her. Her feet slid a few steps and she threw a couple more punches.

"Move," he said again. And this time he used his forearm to push her ribs. Every time her feet stopped moving, he pushed again.

After he pushed her in a complete circle around the bag, something changed in her face. It looked like a combination of anger and determination. Flores saw it and stepped away. She started punching the bag — hard and fast — and moving her feet. Flores didn't push her again.

People stopped to watch.

"I push her until I see that in her and then I stop," Flores said.

The woman moved into the ring to practice her footwork.

"Jenna," he said. "We're not going to be in the ring with you during a fight. You have to push yourself."

This was the first year women's boxing was included as an Olympic sport. It turned out to be more than historic. It was exciting.

The world was introduced to Claressa

Shields, a 17-year-old from the United States who brought home a gold medal, beating 33-year-old Russian Nadezda Torlopova.

In her blog "Girlboxer," Malissa Smith wrote: "In speaking about Claressa, AP sportswriter Greg Beacham wrote: 'And just like Cassius Clay, Joe Frazier and Oscar De La Hoya before her, Claressa Shields is about to fight for a gold medal.'"

"Claressa has that effect. She's infectious and has the same kind of star quality that makes putting her in the company of boxing greats seem like the most natural thing in the world."

It's possible the introduction of a dynamic female boxer could start a ripple effect of popularity among women in the sport, but for now Harder is the only woman training at Headhunter. She walked through the doors in January and said, "I want to be a fighter."

And they didn't laugh, she said. "They took me seriously."

"All women should try boxing," she said. "Women are expected to be a certain way. Boxing allows you to explore a side of yourself you didn't know was there."

"I came here because I wanted a chance to be myself. I have an aggressive, competitive nature and that was starting to leak out. It's not an accepted way to be; it's not very feminine. And I needed a place it would be a positive thing."

What does it feel like to take a punch? Harder doesn't know. Yet.

"I don't know how I'll take it," she said.

It's a long road from walking through the door to the first punch. She must build up her stamina — to be able to move her feet for round after round without getting tired and to prepare her mind and her body for the blows.

"They drop a medicine ball on your stomach over and over so you get used to it," she said.

But more than preparing her body, to be a boxer she must prepare her mind. She must learn to clear it of thoughts and focus on the moment.

There's a quote from boxer Jack Dempsey: "All the time he's boxing, he's thinking. All the time he was thinking, I was hitting him."

Clearing the mind is something Harder learned as a yoga instructor. She and close friend Christina Gonzales have owned Shimi Shakti Yoga and Belly Dance Studio in downtown Twin Falls for nine years.

But there's something missing for Harder in the quiet of yoga.

"I came here because I wanted a chance to be myself," the 33-year-old said. "I have an aggressive, competitive nature and that was starting to leak out."

"It's not an accepted way to be; it's not very feminine. And I needed a place it would be a positive thing."

Flores said the reason Harder hasn't taken a punch or started sparring is that even though yoga taught her to clear her mind during meditation it didn't teach her to stop thinking when a fist was flying at her.

res said. "From what I see, she's going to take a hit, then stop and think. That's a problem. If you get hit and you think, you'll get hit again."

Flores said women take longer than men to get to the point where they are ready to fight, but they get there.

"I've probably trained 15 women," he said. "They pay more attention. They take more time. They think a lot."

"You show a girl a stance and she will work on it until its perfect. They are beautiful to watch. Perfectionists. Elbows are in. Fists up. Feet move."

In the Headhunter gym, a bell rings every three minutes, and when it rings all the athletes know to change what they are doing. Jump rope. Hanging bag. Footwork. Back to jump rope. Flores walks among the athletes to push and encourage them.

"You don't need to jump so high," he tells a boy on the jump rope. "You'll wear yourself out."

Since she started boxing, Harder's body has changed. She's lost weight. The muscles in her legs and upper body are more defined.

Her diet has changed. "They talked to me about diet right away," she said. "Carbs before you work out to give you a burst of energy and protein after you work out to help your muscles heal."

And her mind has changed. "I feel better about myself. I can be aggressive and not be ashamed."

She hit someone for the first time a few weeks ago.

"I thought I was such a bad a**," she said. "But when it came to throw that punch, I was uncertain. I was hesitant. I held back because I didn't want to hurt him."

"I think that's pretty common." Boxing, she said, isn't about violence.

It's not about the punch as much as it's about outsmarting your opponent, she said. "It's about studying them and their emotions and their habits."

Flores started Headhunter Boxing Club 11 years ago in a room in his brother's house. Since then the brothers — Miguel, Manuel and Matt — moved into the gym at 136 Second Ave. N. in downtown Twin Falls, and the place has become something of an outreach center for area youth.

"I have never turned anyone away because they could not pay," Flores said.

Youth who want to learn to box can sweep floors or do work about the gym to pay their dues.

Of those who come to the gym, only eight or nine can afford to pay, he said. "We are all in the hole with this gym. But we love boxing. We took from the community for so many years and this is our way to give back."

"We have a set of values here," he said. "If you get in trouble out of the gym, you're in trouble here."

"Your grades have to stay the same or get better. Otherwise, you spend the same amount of time in the gym, but you'll spend it doing homework."

As he talked, a boy walked into the gym with his mom. He was carrying a liability waiver and staring at the ring, wide-eyed.

"Today's his first day," Flores said. He told the boy to pull a jump rope off the wall and start jumping.

The boy jumped a few times and then stopped.

"When can I do something else?" he asked. "When I say you can," Flores said.

Pocatello is the place to buy gas in the state, with a current price of \$3.49. That's followed by \$3.56 in Boise and \$3.58 in Coeur d'Alene.

The situation is better than spring and early summer when prices stalled in the range of \$3.70, Carlson noted.

"There was consterna-

tion among drivers, and AAA was raising questions about what was going on in the marketplace," he said. "The oil used by refineries in Utah and Wyoming, where we get our gas, has been noticeably cheaper this year. But whether by purpose, design or happenstance we had higher prices."

Carlson said the normal scenario is for prices to stabilize at the end of summer. However, he cau-

tioned that might not be the case this year because of the California refinery fire.

Drivers in Midwest states have been particularly hard-hit during the past month. Prices in Illinois shot up 49 cents a gallon and those in Ohio increased 38 cents.

Those changes also result from production issues in refineries in Whiting, Ind., and Lemont, Ill., according to AAA Idaho.

Average Is Over

A big mismatch exists today between how U.S. CEOs look at the world and how many American politicians and parents look at the world – and it may be preventing us from taking our education challenge as seriously as we must.



For many politicians, “outsourcing” is a four-letter word because it involves jobs leaving “here” and going “there.” But for many CEOs, outsourcing is over. In today’s seamlessly connected world, there is no “out” and no “in” anymore. There is only the “good,” “better” and “best” places to get work done, and if they don’t tap into the best, most cost-efficient venue wherever that is, their competition will.

For politicians, it’s all about “made in America,” but, for CEOs, it is increasingly about “made in the world” – a world where more and more products are now imagined everywhere, designed everywhere, manufactured everywhere in global supply chains and sold everywhere. American politicians are still citizens of our states and cities, while CEOs are increasingly citizens of the world, with mixed loyalties. For politicians, all their customers are here; for CEOs, 90 percent of their new customers are abroad. The credo of the politician today is: “Why are you not hiring more people here?” The credo of the CEO today is: “You only hire someone – anywhere – if you absolutely have to,” if a smarter machine, robot or computer program is not available.

Yes, this is a simplification, but the trend is accurate. The trend is that for more and more jobs, average is over. Thanks to the merger of, and advances in, globalization and the information technology revolution, every boss now has cheaper, easier access to more above-average software, automation, robotics, cheap labor and cheap genius than ever before. So just doing a job in an average way will not return an average lifestyle any longer. Yes, I know, that’s what they said about the Japanese “threat” in the 1980s. But Japan, alas, challenged just two American industries – cars and consumer electronics – and just one American town, Detroit.

Globalization and the Internet/telecom/computing revolution together challenge every town, worker and job. There is no good job today that does not require more and better education to get it, hold it or advance in it.

Which is why it is disturbing when more studies show that American K-12 schools continue to lag behind other major industrialized countries on the international education tests. Like politicians, too many parents think if their kid’s school is doing better than the one next door, they’re fine.

Well, a dose of reality is on the way thanks to Andreas Schleicher and his team at the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, which coordinates the Program for International Student Assessment, known as the PISA test. Every three years, the OECD has been giving the PISA test to a sample of 15-year-olds, now in 70 countries, to evaluate reading, math and science skills. The U.S. does not stand out. It’s just average, but many parents are sure their kid is above average. With help from several foundations in the U.S., Schleicher has just finished a pilot study of 100 American schools to enable principals, teachers and parents to see not just how America stacks up against China, but how their own school stacks up against similar schools in the best-educated countries, like Finland and Singapore.

“The entry ticket to the middle class today is a postsecondary education of some kind,” but too many kids are not coming out of K-12 prepared for that, and too many parents don’t get it, says Jon Schnur, the chairman of America Achieves, which is partnering with the OECD on this project as part of an effort to help every American understand the connection between educational attainment at their school – for all age groups – and what will be required to perform the jobs of the future.

“Imagine, in a few years, you could sign onto a website and see this is how my school compares with a similar school anywhere in the world,” says Schleicher. “And then you take this information to your local superintendent and ask: ‘Why are we not doing as well as schools in China or Finland?’”

Schleicher’s team is assessing all their test results – and socioeconomic profiles of each school – to make sure they have a proper data set for making global comparisons. They hope to have the comparison platform available early next year. Says Schleicher: “If parents do not know, they will not demand, as consumers, a high quality of educational service. They will just say the school my kids are going to is as good as the school I went to.” If this comparison platform can be built at this micro scale, he says, it could “lead to empowerment at the really decisive level” of parents, principals and teachers demanding something better.

“This is not about threatening schools,” he adds. It is about giving each of them “the levers to effect change” and a window into the pace of change that is possible when every stakeholder in a school has the data and can say: Look at those who have made dramatic improvements around the world. Why can’t we?

Editor’s Note: This editorial appeared in Monday’s Washington Post:

The Manhattan Project – the U.S. government’s wartime push to develop an atomic bomb – ranks among the most significant chapters in the history of the American Century. In the 1940s, the government invested billions of dollars and employed hundreds of thousands of people in laboratories at Los Alamos, N.M.; Hanford, Wash.; and Oak Ridge, Tenn., to create a weapon that changed the course of warfare forever.

Now, some 70 years later, a bipartisan initiative seeks to designate these three sites as a National Park. That’s a fine

idea. Such a move would expand access to these crucial historical sites as well as provide funding and staffing to preserve them. Given their importance in the histories of the United States, the Cold War and the 20th century, Congress should pass the park designation bill by Sen. Jeff Bingaman, D-N.M., and companion legislation by Rep. Doc Hastings, R-Wash.

Should the bill pass, the National Park Service (NPS) will be charged with interpreting the Manhattan Project and its legacy for visitors. It will be a daunting task. The bill acknowledges that the project’s legacy is “significant, far-reaching and complex.”

The Manhattan Project

harnessed American scientific, engineering and industrial prowess in an effort that many saw as essential to the survival of the free world in its fight against fascism. But many of its participants wrestled within themselves then and afterward over their part in creating such a frightful tool of death.

The decision to use the weapon, to destroy the Japanese cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, remains, and will always remain, a question of keen historical debate.

The explosions brought to a swift end a war that might otherwise have dragged on for a long time, at a cost of hundreds of thousands more lives, both American and Japanese. But they killed hundreds of thousands of

Japanese civilians, both in August 1945 and subsequently from radiation poisoning. A successful exhibit will present the choice that President Harry S. Truman faced in all its complexity without seeking to decide the issues for visitors.

The National Park Service, which manages hundreds of locations across the country, has significant experience in dealing with fraught histories at sites such as the Japanese Internment Camps at Manzanar and Little Rock Central High School. The Manhattan Project will be no less of a challenge. But it encompasses a seminal moment in world history, one that surely warrants the wider audience this legislative push would bring.

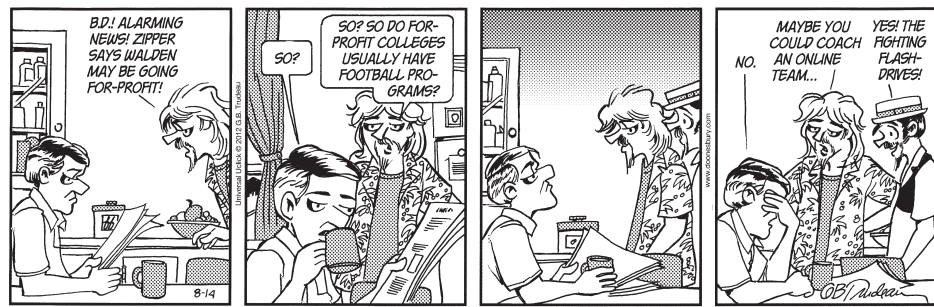

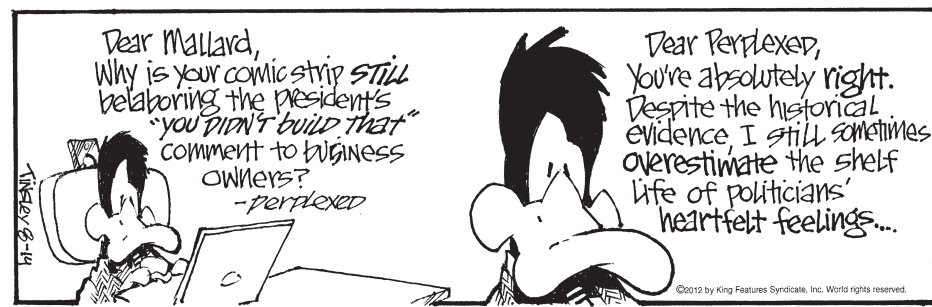

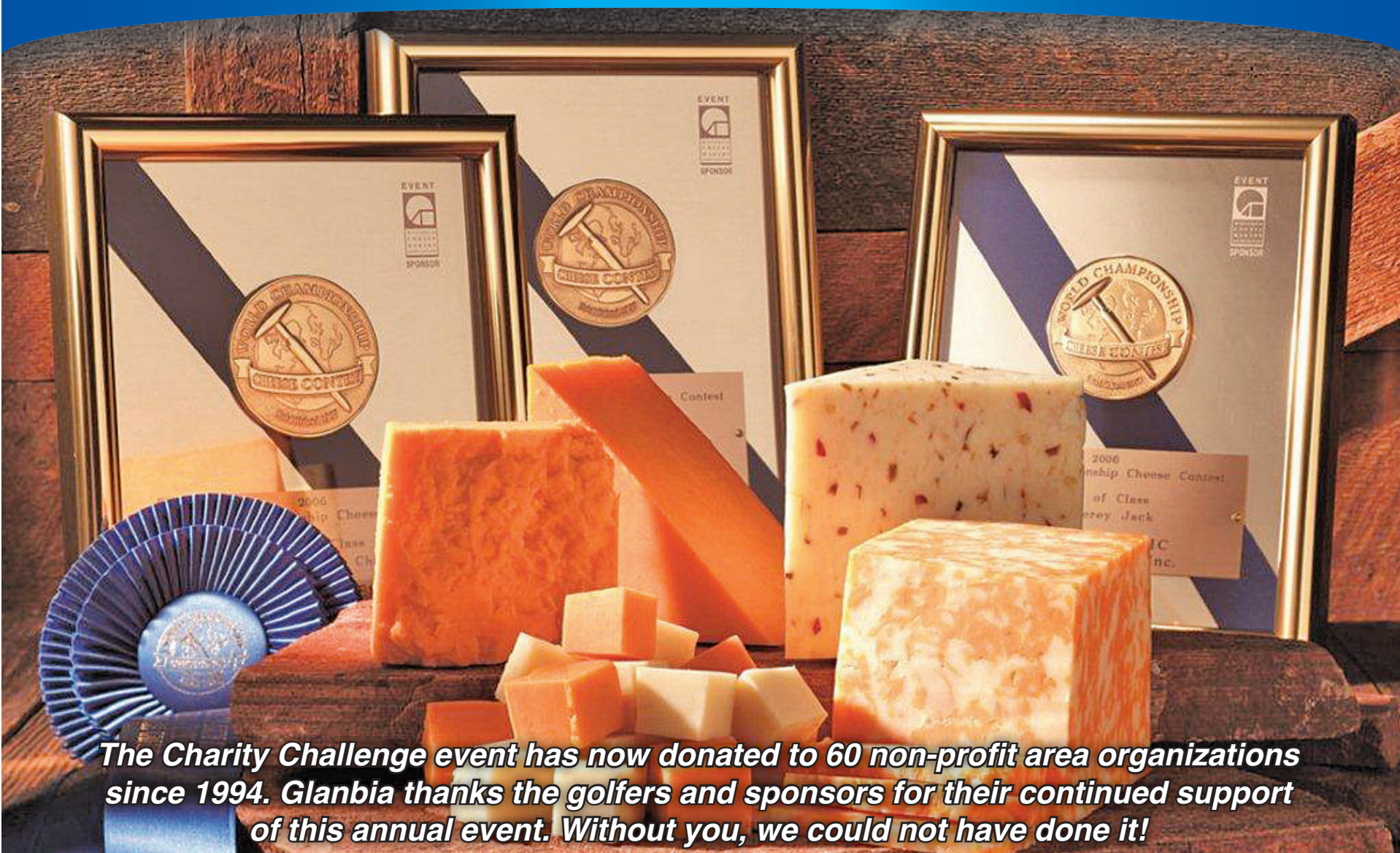

That trio carded the top three scores on the tournament's opening day.

Alec Meyerhoeffer began his day at 9:54 a.m. and missed most of the heat that golfers with later tee times had to deal with, but it was an eagle on the 500-yard par-5 No. 3 hole that was most refreshing.

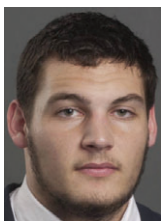

Renaud Is Broncos' Present, Future at LB

Old-school linebacker challenging for heavy snap load in just his second year.

The middle linebacker played last season as a true freshman, picking up 10 tackles and forcing a fumble, mainly on special teams. Now, with Byron Hout graduated, he's competing with Tommy Smith to earn the starting nod.

"I don't think anyone comes here just to play on special teams, but it's a great way to get on the field, learn the ropes," Renaud said. "I think I have a lot bigger weight to carry — it's not just running down the field and hitting somebody. I've got to do what I came here for."

Rated as the No. 20 middle linebacker in the nation in the 2011 signing class, Renaud turned down BCS programs in Minnesota and Oregon State. A standout for California powerhouse De La Salle, he was already big enough to play early when he arrived on campus.

Now 6-foot-2 and 239 pounds, he fits the bill in the middle.

"Blake is an old-school linebacker," Boise State coach Chris Petersen said Wednesday. "The first couple days we've been running around without full pads, and he's been fine. When you see Blake's true value is when 'OK, it's football time."

"He brings a good presence and a good toughness to our defense."

Renaud is ready to compete at middle linebacker after serving as the Broncos' fifth linebacker last fall, learning behind Hout and Smith.

He feels having his feet wet with last fall camp, last season, this spring and summer behind him, his grasp on the defense is far and away better than it was a year ago.

"I remember last year thinking 'What am I doing?'" Renaud said. "The guys ahead of me, Byron and Tommy especially, did a great job of helping me out — it makes a lot more sense this fall."

When asked last fall camp about Renaud's abilities, linebackers coach Bob Gregory joked that "we won't be seeing him in any dime packages soon," referring to his prowess stopping the run, but deficiencies in the pass game.

What a difference time makes — Renaud made big strides against the pass in the spring, showing fans what he could do with an interception in the spring game.

"This spring was huge for him," Gregory said. "One of the things I think it did was give him confidence — he was able to make plays in the pass game, which was great, and I think it's carried over into the fall."

Now Renaud will seek to continue to become a more complete player as he pushes Smith and likely prepares to be the front-runner to take over next season. He hopes to add that physical mentality with the athleticism that will allow him to be a playmaker, no matter the down.

"I know my coverages a lot better, know how to make my drops," Renaud said. "I know how to hit people — but I won't see the field much if that's all I know how to do."

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HANSEN • TeeJay Berry doesn't sound like a coach bringing back a team that won all of one game in 2011.

But when your team boasts a potential college scholarship player, a solid showing at a regional summer camp and a roster consisting mostly of players who aren't learning a new system on the fly, it's all grounds for renewed enthusiasm surrounding the Husky program.

"I'm pretty excited, honestly, for this year," Berry said.

The Huskies appear to have a little bit of everything needed to be a threat in the Snake River Conference. It has a bulldozer of a guard in Cecil Thomas, who has been offered priority walk-on status by the coaches at Idaho State, and the 6-3, 315-pounder has shed over 20 pounds in his efforts to motivate Bengal brass into giving him a full ride.

Leading up to last season, the Huskies spent most of their time learning a new offense, one that spread the field and relied more on the passing game. That took away from the time Berry could lead his players in conditioning, which showed at times last year.

This year, the Huskies plan on bringing their

Finally, there is a talented junior class that is fed up with losing. One of those players, Seth Williams, has been moved from quarterback to wide receiver, which Berry says is his natural position anyway. Another big target, Devon Fitzsimmons (6-3, 190), will line up opposite Williams.

Defensively, team speed is also a plus. Berry envisions not having to cheat a defensive back into the box to stop the run, allowing the Huskies to clean up better against the pass.

"It's a different year," Thomas said. "Last year we had a whole new offense. This year we have a lot of guys coming back and that means they know all of the plays. Some things have changed ... but I think we'll do a lot better."

West leads the spade queen against six hearts. After winning the spade ace, you cash the ace and king of trumps. If both defenders follow, cash the club ace and continue with the club queen. If clubs are 3-2, life is easy; if they are not, you may have to cross to dummy with the trump 10 and take the diamond finesse.

When one defender discards on the second round of trumps, what should you do next? Obviously, you could cross to dummy with the trump 10 and take the diamond finesse. However, it is far better to develop dummy's club suit.

One way is to draw the last trump and continue with the ace and queen of clubs. But East will hold up the king until the third round. You do no better by playing the club ace and queen while you still have the trump 10 as an entry to dummy. On this layout, East will win the second round of clubs and give his partner a club ruff.

Far better is to lead the club queen from hand first! If East takes the king, you will win his return, draw the last trump, and enjoy the club suit. If instead East ducks, you will continue with ace and another club. Then, after winning East's return, you will cross to the dummy with the trump 10 and run the clubs.

This plan will succeed around two-thirds of the time, making it far more attractive than the diamond finesse.

ANSWER: Your partner's decision to reopen with a call of two clubs and not a takeout double suggests extra shape and perhaps unsuitability for defending (since he wasn't prepared to give you the option to defend). If that is so, you certainly don't want to double now — that would show much better trumps. The choice is to raise to three clubs or pass, and with the singleton in partner's long suit, I'd opt for defense.
