TWIN FALLS • A Rupert couple wakes up to gunfire in their home. A protective friend shoots an alleged abuser in Wendell. A drive-by peppers a vehicle in Jerome with bullets. What is going on in the Magic Valley? In the past two weeks, five reported gun-related incidents have crossed Magic Valley police blotters. Does summer play a factor in crime rates? Southern Idaho law enforcement agencies disagree.

The Idaho State Police publishes crime statistics on an annual basis, but doesn't keep track of whether there is an increase during summer months.

'IT'S NOT A QUESTION OF IF, BUT WHEN'

TWIN FALLS • As good news continued Wednesday regarding wildfires in Cassia County, residents near a fire in northern Elmore County packed up their belongings.

The "significant growth" of the Trinity Ridge Fire near Featherville and Pine led fire officials to ask residents to prepare for evacuation Wednesday morning, and many have already left the area. In the evening, the road through Pine and Featherville was closed to all vehicles except those fighting the fire.

"It's not a question of if, but when," Boise National Forest spokesman Dave Olson told the Associated Press when asked about the fire reaching the outskirts of Featherville.

On Wednesday afternoon, Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter issued a state disaster declaration for Elmore County, allowing the Idaho Department

of Lands to seek help from the Idaho National Guard. Elmore County officials also asked the state Bureau of Homeland Security to seek aid from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to protect threatened communities near the fire, according to a press release.

The Pine/Featherville area has 450 homes, according to an AP tally. About half are inhabited year-round, while the others are summer homes and weekend retreats.

The Halstead Fire northwest of Stanley continued to flare in areas; a community meeting in Stanley was planned for 7 p.m. Wednesday.

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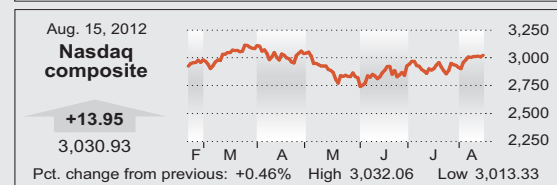
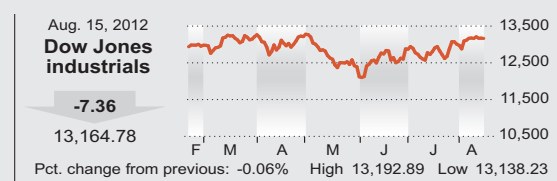

Hidden History The Perrine Monuments at Bryan Point

BLUE LAKES • On the Snake River Canyon rim overlooking Blue Lakes Country Club, stand the remnants of once-towering rock monuments built by three-time United States presidential candidate William Jennings Bryan.

The monuments were built in 1907, 10 years after Bryan befriended Magic Valley business magnate Ira Burton Perrine.

Two of the monuments were built in honor of Perrine and his wife, Hortense, said Randy Perrine, great-grandson of the couple. The third monument was for Bryan himself.

But an undated photograph taken by Clarence Bisbee shows — not three — but six rock monuments towering above the canyon, puzzling Randy Perrine and historians alike.

Perrine, who grew up in the canyon and owns some 40 acres of the original Perrine Ranch, says he probably owns Bryan Point where the remains of the monuments stand. Perrine is having his property surveyed to locate the boundaries, so he can install plaques to commemorate his great-grandparents' relationship with Bryan.

Bryan first came to Idaho in 1897, the year after he lost his initial run at the presidency. During a post-election campaign stop at Shoshone, Bryan found himself on a stage coach headed to the Perrine Ranch, the site of the first farming activity in the area. The ranch was located in the canyon west of today's Perrine Memorial Bridge.

Bryan and Perrine became close friends, as did Hortense Perrine and Bryan's wife Mary. Bryan spent the next decade on the campaign trail, running for office in 1900 and again in 1908. The Bryan fam-

ily made numerous visits to Twin Falls during those years.

A lawyer by profession, Bryan opposed Clarence Darrow in the famous "Scopes Monkey Trial" in Tennessee in 1925, and died shortly afterward. Bryan is buried in Arlington National Cemetery. I.B. Perrine died in 1943 and is buried on his ranch in the Snake River canyon.

Over time, the rock monuments all but disappeared, as vandals tossed rock after rock into the canyon below. By the time Randy Perrine was in his mid twenties, only three of the six monuments in the Bisbee photo were left standing.

In 1984, locals celebrated the 100-year anniversary of I.B. Perrine and his ranch — and as part of the celebration, Randy Perrine and the Jerome County Historical Society took steps to prevent further damage to the remaining monuments.

The monuments were secured with rebar and cement-

ed in place. A fourth monument was erected, in honor of 100 years of farming in the Magic Valley, Perrine said.

Despite the efforts to save the monuments, the rock towers have continued to disappear, bit by bit.

Just when the other three rock monuments in the Bisbee photograph were built remains a mystery to the Perrine family today.

"Who built the other three, and what did they represent?" Perrine remarked Monday. "That's my big question."

BUTTE, Mont. • North-Western Energy officials have told multiple federal agencies to stop their work on a controversial power line, halting progress on the project for the time being.

The company has been frustrated by a process that has come no closer to completion after four years and \$14 million in government studies for the Mountain States Transmission Intertie, or MSTI. The 430-mile transmission line was proposed to run from southwest Montana to a substation near Jerome, Idaho.

"We've called a time-out," said Claudia Rapkoch, NorthWestern Energy spokeswoman in Butte, Mont. "It's really because of a lack of cooperation with multiple federal agencies. We've been going along for years, encountering delay after delay and getting no closer. The goal posts are a moving target."

Rapkoch said the latest wrench in the plans came when the U.S. Bureau of Land Management in Idaho ordered NorthWestern to propose three alterna-

tives through southeast Idaho that avoid core sage grouse habitat.

That requirement could add another 160 miles to the line and NorthWestern said it could delay the project another nine months, she said.

However, Heather Feeney, a spokeswoman for Idaho BLM, said the organization did not know how long it would take to study newly proposed routes.

Those unknowns caused NorthWestern to stop paying for the planning and analysis work being done by the BLM in both Idaho and Montana, as well as the Montana Department of Environmental Quality.

"We are funding these agencies and we're not getting a real sense of when this might get completed," said Rapkoch. "So we've called a timeout, told them to stop until such time as we can sit down, get a plan together and get a reasonable assurance of a timeframe. (These studies) just can't continue in perpetuity."

NorthWestern has entered into a cost reimbursement program, wherein it repays the government agencies for the

time its employees spend studying a large private project. It is common practice to enter into such programs to help defray the cost to taxpayers.

Feeney said she sympathized with NorthWestern's concerns and said BLM is trying to get its work done in a timely manner. But she said the odds are high that its decision will be appealed in court and if the BLM did not do its due diligence beforehand, its case might not hold up.

"We are well aware and understanding of the frustration they are feeling," said Feeney. "It's a complex proposal and we have a serious of needles to thread."

And while the Idaho side of the line has thrown up the latest roadblock, work will stop at DEQ headquarters in Helena and Montana/Dakota BLM headquarters in Billings as well.

Montana DEQ director Richard Opper said that department's employees "have done a lot of analysis, a lot of work" and "are a long way down the road," but he understands NorthWestern's decision to pull back at this time.

Opper said the DEQ's statutory timelines are superseded by the federal agencies, which don't have to meet deadlines on projects of this scope.

"That's always going to be an issue," he said, "because there are always going to be federal partners in the West."

NorthWestern officials initially thought the line would be built and operational by now. However, the latest timeframe has pushed construction back to 2018 at the earliest, according to Rapkoch. This latest stoppage will push that back even farther if it is built at all.

But Rapkoch was quick to caution that this "time-out" isn't a death knell for the \$1 billion transmission line.

Last month, NorthWestern noted that the project's future was in doubt because of market uncertainty and environmental concerns. CEO Robert Rowe said the company was "currently evaluating our efforts to continue pursuing MSTI."

Until NorthWestern says otherwise, that effort will not include any work from federal agencies.

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Filer Proposes \$7.8M City Budget

FILER • The Filer City Council proposed a tentative \$7.8 million budget for the 2012-13 fiscal year, set to begin in October.

"I think everybody should be able to work with these figures," said Filer Mayor Bob Templeman. "After being advertised for two weeks, it can formally be adopted with a public hearing during next month's first council meeting on Sept. 4."

Monday evening's budget workshop resulted in a general budget increase from \$1.1 million to \$1.2 million. Under the proposal, city employees would get a 4 percent cost-of-living increase.

The water budget was set at \$1.3 million and sewer came in at \$3.6 million. The city's capital improvements budget of \$300,000 and \$25,000 building maintenance budget are both expected to remain steady.

"We didn't spend anything on capital improvements this year, so that figure can carry over to the next," said Filer City Clerk Shari Hart. "We set

aside \$70,000 in capital improvement funds for a future expansion to the Filer Public Library."

In other action, long-time Councilman Bob Parent stepped down from his position for personal reasons. During his tenure, council members secured funding and completed projects improving the city water system and construction of a \$15 million sewer treatment facility.

"I've served for 14 years and this is as good time as any to submit my resignation," Parent said. "I think the best thing I helped accomplish here is getting funding for the city rec department."

The council will be looking for someone to fill the vacancy over the next year. That individual will then have the option to run for election to a full term. Potential candidates for the vacancy must be city residents and submit a letter stating their interest to the Filer city office at 300 Main St.

Kimberly Council Eyes Fee Hikes

KIMBERLY • Kimberly residents could soon see a hefty increase in their monthly garbage and water bills.

Garbage fees could jump 30 percent to \$11.15 per household, officials said Tuesday during a City Council meeting.

The current rate of \$8.60 per month is enough to cover garbage collection and hauling expenses, but not landfill fees, city officials said.

The council voted to hold a public hearing on a proposed \$2.55-per-month sanitation fee hike. The hearing will likely take place sometime in September.

The council could have approved a rate increase of up to 4.99 percent without conducting a public hearing, but that would still leave a shortfall of about \$31,000 in the city's FY 2012 sanitation budget, said Ruth Pierce, a certified public accountant who is working with Kimberly on budget matters.

At the same time, the city is looking at a projected water budget shortfall of about \$5,000 for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, Pierce said.

It could have been worse. The shortfall would be

closer to \$40,000 without late fees and an unexpected increase in the number of new hookups this year, Pierce said.

The city can't count on that additional revenue every year, so it will have to look at increasing rates, officials said.

"We can't plan on having those extra hookups and late fees year to year," Councilman Jim Eisenhower said. "We have to look at what our budget is in relation to how much we collect on metered water."

Kimberly switched to a new metered system last fall. Households are billed for actual monthly water usage — currently at a rate of \$2 per 1,000 gallons — rather than a flat rate.

"People have conserved a lot more than expected," City Clerk Jennifer Rowe said in a separate interview.

Mayor Tracy Armstrong said the city will confer with the Idaho Rural Water Association before decid-

ing on a new water rate structure.

"We want something to fit our budget and our pocketbooks," he said.

In other action, the council approved a recycling agreement with Western Waste Services after rejecting similar proposals from the company twice before.

The council was swayed this time because the city will likely lose a single-stream recycling bin provided at no charge by Twin Falls County.

County commissioners complained that the service is too costly, Armstrong said.

Western Waste will provide two roll-off recycle bins — one for cardboard and one for everything else, excluding glass.

Western Waste representative Dave Abrahamson promised the company would empty the bins as often as necessary without charging a haul-

ing fee.

The company still plans to make money on the deal by keeping 75 percent of all commodity cardboard sales. The city will get the remaining 25 percent.

The council also approved a contract for legal services and appointed Tim Stover as city attorney.

The city will pay Stover's firm, Worst, Fitzgerald & Stover, a flat rate of \$3,300 per month for up to 25 hours of legal services. Anything beyond that will be billed at \$185 per hour. The council has the option to renew the contract after six months.

Stover replaces William Hollifield, who resigned last month after 33 years.

The council also approved a tentative city budget of about \$3.8 million for the new fiscal year that begins Oct. 1. A public hearing to finalize the budget will be held at 6 p.m. Aug. 28 at City Hall.

Victim Charged with Aggravated Battery

TWIN FALLS • A man who was shot last Thursday in Wendell is out of the hospital and in custody after being charged with aggravated battery for an unrelated incident.

Mozes Jimenez, 22, faces charges stemming from a July 1 incident in Twin Falls.

According to an affidavit, Jimenez hit a man in the head with a metal rod, causing the man to lose consciousness. The victim said the fight was gang-related.

When police went to the halfway house where Jimenez was living, his roommates said he hadn't been back. His probation officer also couldn't reach him, and a warrant was issued for his arrest.

On Aug. 10, Jimenez was shot in Wendell after allegedly breaking down the door to a woman's home and attacking her. According to police affidavits, the woman's friend, Mark Anthony Perez Jr, reportedly shot Jimenez after the woman fled the apartment.

Perez, 22, currently faces charges of felony aggravated battery with a deadly weapon. Perez's preliminary hearing is today.

For the Twin Falls Jimenez has a preliminary hearing scheduled for Aug. 24. He's being held on \$100,000 bond.

Becoming Presidential

When, in his speech accepting the 1964 Republican presidential nomination, Barry Goldwater said “extremism in the defense of liberty is no vice” and “moderation in the pursuit of justice is no virtue,” a media wit at the convention supposedly exclaimed, “Good God, Goldwater is going to run as Goldwater.” When Mitt Romney decided to run with Paul Ryan, many conservatives may have thought, “Thank God, Romney is not going to run as Romney.”

Not, that is, as the Romney who 12 months ago, warily eyeing Iowa, refused to say a discouraging word about the ethanol debacle. Rather, he is going to run as the Romney who, less than two weeks before announcing Ryan, told the states — Iowa prominent among them — that he opposes extending the wind energy production tax credit, which expires soon.

This may seem a minor matter, as well as an obvious and easy decision for a conservative. The wind tax credit is, after all, industrial policy, the government picking winners and losers in defiance of market signals — industrial policy always is a refusal to heed the market’s rejection of that which the government singles out for favoritism. But ethanol subsidies also are industrial policy. And just a few days after Romney got the wind subsidy right, more than half of the 11 Republican senators on the Finance Committee got it wrong, voting to extend it. So even before choosing Ryan, Romney was siding with what might, with a nod to Howard Dean, be called the Republican wing of the Republican Party. For Romney, conservatism is a second language, but he speaks it with increasing frequency and fluency.

Romney embraced Ryan after the sociopathic — indifferent to the truth — ad for Barack Obama that is meretricious about every important particular of the death from cancer of the wife of steelworker Joe Sopic. Obama’s desperate flailing about to justify four more years has sunk into such unhinged smarminess that Romney may have concluded: There is nothing Obama won’t say about me, because he has nothing to say for himself, so I will chose a running mate whose seriousness about large problems and ideas underscores what the president has become — silly and small.

He on whose behalf the Sopic ad was made used to dispense bromides deploring “the smallness of our

politics” and “our preference for scoring cheap political points.” Obama’s campaign of avoidance — say anything to avoid the subject of the country’s condition — must now reckon with Ryan’s mastery of Obama’s enormous addiction to decades of governmental malpractice. Obama is, by now, nothing if not predictable, so prepare for pieties deploring Ryan’s brand of “extremism” that has supplanted responsible conservatism. Goldwater, quoted above, infuriated the sort of people who, regardless of what flavor of conservatism is in fashion, invariably purse their lips and sorrowfully say: “We think conservatism is a valuable thread in our national fabric, etc., but not this kind of conservatism.” Goldwater’s despisers did not recognize his echo of words by Martin Luther King Jr. 15 months earlier.

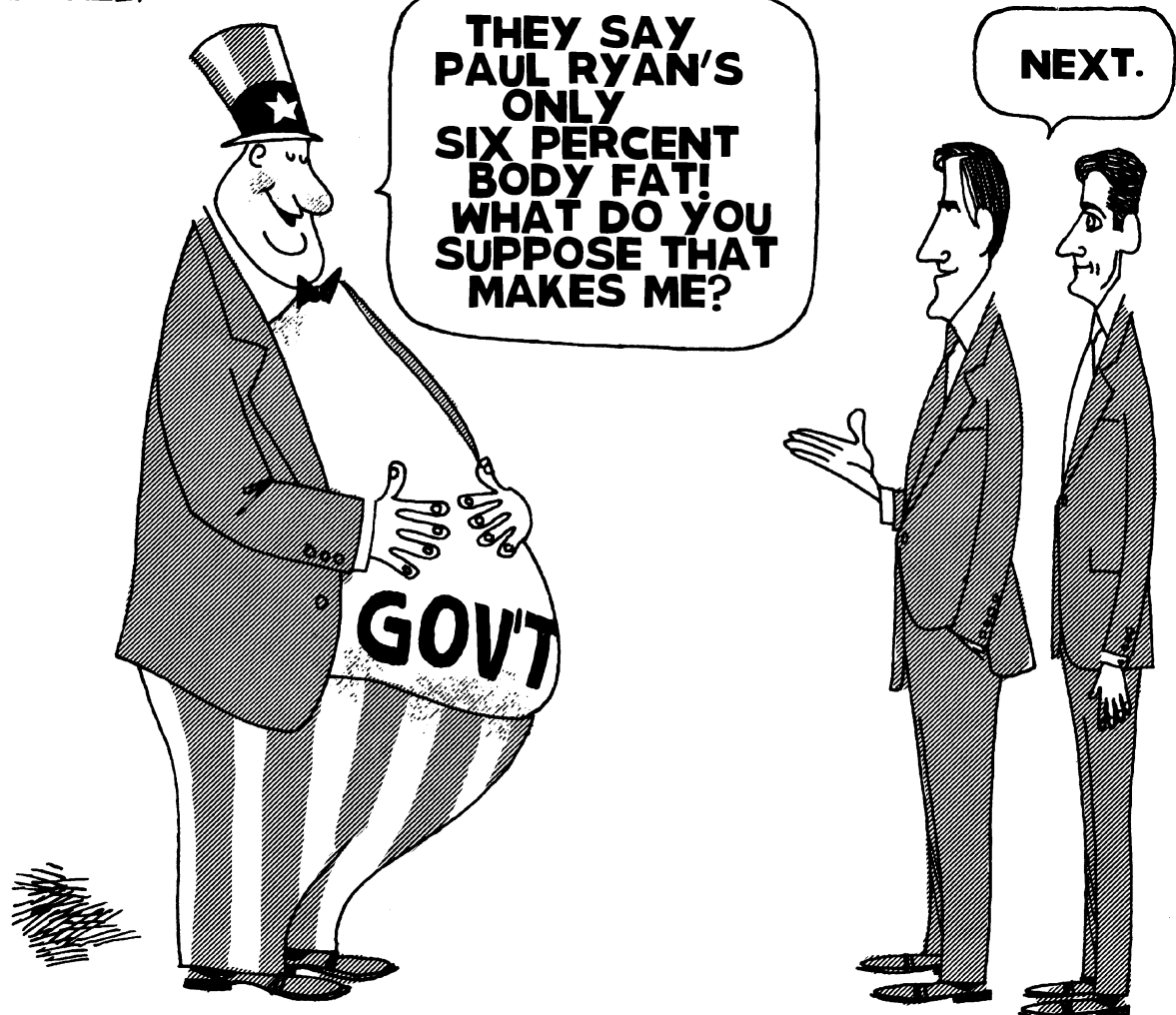
In his “Letter from Birmingham Jail,” King wrote, “You speak of our activity in Birmingham as extreme. ... But though I was initially disappointed at being categorized as an extremist, as I continued to think about the matter I gradually gained a measure of satisfaction from the label. Was not Jesus an extremist for love. ... Was not Amos an extremist for justice. ... Was not Paul an extremist for the Christian gospel. ... Perhaps the South, the nation and the world are in dire need of creative extremists?”

Remember this episode when you hear, ad nauseam, that Ryan is directly, and Romney now is derivatively, an extremist for believing an extremist for ending Medicare as we know it” will be done by arithmetic if it is not done by creative reforms of the sort Ryan proposes, and (b) that the entitlement state’s crisis cannot be cured, as Obama suggests, by adding 4.6 points to the tax rate paid by less than 3 percent of Americans.

When Ryan said in Norfolk, “We won’t replace our Founding principles, we will reapply them,” he effectively challenged Obama to say what Obama believes, which is: Madison was an extremist in enunciating the principles of limited government — the enumeration and separation of powers.

Romney’s selection of a running mate was, in method and outcome, presidential. It underscores how little in the last four years merits that adjective.

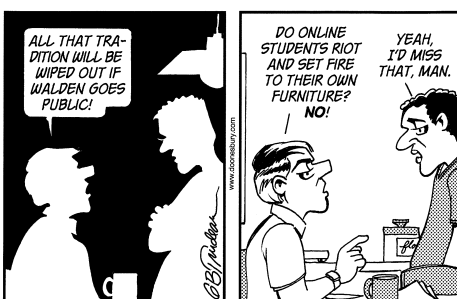

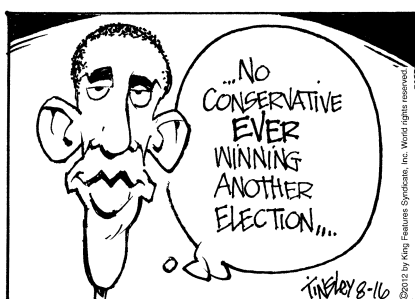
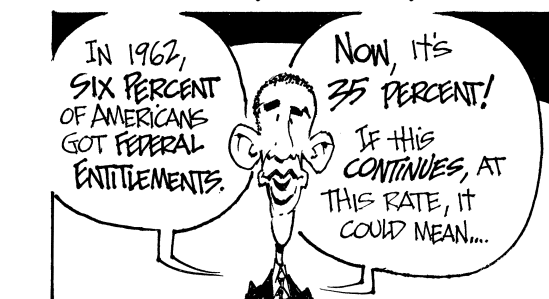

Minidoka County Undersheriff Vic Watson said he does notice a spike in violent crime during summer months, especially domestic violence.

Much of that, Watson said, has to do with increased alcohol consumption.

"There tends to be more gatherings that involve alcohol (in the summer)," Watson said.

Cassia County Sheriff Randy Kidd said his department sees an increase in domestic violence, though not much in other types of violent crime.

According to a 2010 study published by the American Meteorological Society, aggressive crimes tend to increase with the temperature. The study, which examined crime rates over a five year

period in Cleveland, showed the biggest bump in domestic violence and non-aggravated assaults.

But not all Magic Valley law enforcement sees the same increases.

Sgt. Rick Cowen of the Jerome County Sheriff's Office said the office is busier in summer months with alcohol- and drug-related calls, but there isn't necessarily a bump in violent crime.

Capt. Tim Miller of the Twin Falls Sheriff's Office said he sees the opposite. In his 29 years of experience, domestic violence calls go up during the winter, when people are cooped up together, he said.

So what's with the recent shootings?

Some, like the three gun-related incidents in Wendell and Jerome last week, are likely gang-related, according to affidavits written by responding police officers.

But don't assume that indicates a trend, Watson said.

"Idaho's still rural enough and low enough in population that it doesn't necessarily lead to an increase in firearm-related crime," Watson said.

Though some officers expect an increase in domestic violence calls during sweltering summer months, the Cassia County Sheriff's Office doesn't have the resources to do preventative community outreach and education.

"We're so short-staffed, we are lucky to answer the calls timely that come in," Kidd said.

But the message is simple, he said.

"If you're hot and irritable, don't mix alcohol with it, because you're going to create a problem," Kidd said.

In Cassia County, fire crews declared the Hot Well Fire that at one point threatened

Albion to be fully contained. Efforts continued against two other active fires, the Cave Canyon Fire and Deer Hollow Fire.

Murtaugh Lake and Goose Creek Reservoir, sources of water for fire crews in recent days, both reopened Wednesday.

MINIDOKA COMPLEX FIRES

Cave Canyon: At 88,909 acres in the South Hills west of Oakley. Containment was at 78 percent Wednesday, and crews worked to improve and hold control lines around the fire. CL-215 "Scooper" aircraft assigned to the fire were released. Fire crews stayed wary of possible winds predicted to pass through that would test fire lines.

Hot Well: Fire officials announced Wednesday morning this fire was fully contained, with no chance to grow again. Its final size was measured at 3,056 acres.

Deer Hollow: At 5,440 acres near the Utah border, it was 61 percent contained Wednesday with activity on its east side. Heavy timber and steep terrain continued to complicate this fire. Engine and hand crews are being aided by a helicopter.

OTHER FIRES

Halstead: At 58,269 acres and 3 percent contained, 18 miles northwest of Stanley. The fire had stalled on its east side, but was active in the Vandy Lakes area. The nearby Bench Fire remained at 271 acres and 40 percent contained, while no smoke or heat was detected at the Bench II Fire about a half-mile away. The line around the Camp Bradley Boy Scout camp is holding. Full containment is still estimated for Oct. 16.

Trinity Ridge: Though no evacuations were ordered for Pine or Featherville, the road through both towns was closed to residents Wednesday evening after they were allowed to gather valuables. Firefighters changed strategy from perimeter control to structure protection. The fire was measured at 63,608 acres and 5 percent contained. Full containment is estimated for Oct. 1.

SW Idaho School District Facing \$2.8M Shortfall

NAMPA (AP) • A school district in southwestern Idaho says budgeting errors spanning over the past two years have resulted in a \$2.8 million shortfall.

Nampa School District officials disclosed the budget gap Tuesday, less than a week before the next academic year starts.

Deputy Superintendent Joshua Jensen says significant budgeting errors — including the counting of some revenue twice — led the district to spend more money than it had. Jensen says the mistakes weren't caught because administrative staffers have been handling more duties due to previous budget cuts.

The district says no one's getting fired or laid off, but they will have to leave about 39 vacant positions unfilled, reallocate some federal funds and reduce money available for the hiring of substitute teachers, transportation and supplies. Officials have also hired an accountant to prevent future problems.

Jensen said the budget snafu was because of "plain old human error."

"We're dealing with cuts that we should have made before ... I don't think it was malicious, I don't think there was intent. It just happened," he said.

Nampa Education Association President Mandy Simpson said most of the district's teachers don't know about the shortfall yet. Some of them may not learn until they return to the classroom on Wednesday to prepare for the new school year. Some teachers may face extra duties and, for those who will try to augment supplies out of their own pockets, extra expenses, she said.

"No one will lose their jobs, but is it going to affect everyone's job? Definitely," Simpson said.

The budgeting mistakes were discovered last week. They happened when one-time money from the state was erroneously included in the budget for a second year, when double the correct amount of money from another source was budgeted, and when salary revenue was significantly miscalculated. The shortfall represents about 4.2 percent of

the district's \$66.8 million budget for the 2012-13 school year.

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Doctor's Waterboarding Possibly an Experiment

DOVER, Del. • A Delaware pediatrician who achieved national recognition for his research into near-death experiences involving children may have been experimenting on his 11-year-old stepdaughter by waterboarding her, police said in court documents.

The possible link between Dr. Melvin Morse's research and the waterboarding allegations was revealed in an affidavit for a search warrant for Morse's computers. The document was obtained Tuesday by The Associated Press.

According to the affidavit, Dr. Melvin Morse brought the girl "to a possible near death state from the simulation of drowning."

"This 'waterboarding' that he has performed ... would fall into the area of study he practices," police said in the affidavit. "It is logical that he has therefore written about and/or researched the topic of 'waterboarding'."

Joe Hurley, an attorney for Morse, said the idea that Morse was experimenting on his own daughter is "the sheerest of speculation."

Morse, who faces a preliminary hearing Thursday on felony child endangerment and conspiracy charges, has authored several books and articles on paranormal science and near-death experiences.

He has appeared on "Larry King Live" and the "The Oprah Winfrey Show" to discuss his research on out-of-body experiences. His Web site, <http://spiritualscientific.com>, is strewn with commentary about God, love, family and death.

Morse told AP in a telephone interview Monday the charges against him are an overreaction from authorities who were criticized in the wake of a child sex abuse scandal involving another pediatrician.

Morse said he is the victim of "post-Bradley hysteria," a reference to pediatrician Earl Bradley, who was convicted a year ago and is serving 14 life sentences for sexually abusing scores of his young patients over more than a decade.

Following Bradley's arrest in December 2009, state officials ordered investigations into how he was allowed to continue practicing medicine for years despite suspicions that he was molesting his patients.

Lawmakers passed several new laws toughening requirements for police, health care workers and others to report suspected child abuse.

The allegations of waterboarding came after Morse was accused of grabbing his 11-year-old stepdaughter by the ankle in July and, as her 6-year-old sister watched, dragging her across a gravel driveway. He was arrested July 13 on misdemeanor endangerment and assault charges and released on bail.

When the older girl was interviewed last week, she told investigators her father disciplined her by holding her face under a running faucet at least four times since 2009, a punishment she said her father called "waterboarding."

Waterboarding simulates drowning and it has been used in the past by U.S. interrogators on terrorism suspects. Many critics call it torture.

State police said the girl's mother, Pauline Morse, witnessed some of the waterboarding but did not stop it. She is also out on bail.

Melvin and Pauline Morse were both charged with felony child endangerment and conspiracy.

"All of these things are very absurd, except that Delaware has really had the trauma (of Bradley)," Morse told the AP.

Morse, 58, ended the interview before he could be asked directly about the waterboarding allegations.

Hepatitis C Outbreak Could Boost Regulation bill.
The case of a medical technologist suspected of infecting patients with Hepatitis C could boost momentum for federal legislation requiring medical imaging and radiation therapy workers to meet standards before their employers receive Medicare reimbursements. David Kwiatkowski is accused of stealing drugs and contaminating syringes used on patients at Exeter Hospital in New Hampshire, where 32 people have been diagnosed with the same strain of hepatitis C he carries. He previously worked at 18 hospitals in seven other states, moving from hospital to hospital despite allegations of drug use and theft.

Blue Iguanas on the Rebound.
The blue iguana has lived on the rocky shores of Grand Cayman for at least a couple of million years, but was driven to near-extinction by dogs, cats and cars. Now, a breeding program some see as a global model has worked better than expected. Roughly 700 blazing blue iguanas breed and roam free in protected woodlands on the eastern side of Grand Cayman, a 22-mile-long speck in the western Caribbean.

Judge Approves Voter ID Law

Opponents contend the law will keep hundreds of thousands from voting in Pennsylvania this November.

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) • A tough new voter identification law championed by Republicans can take effect in Pennsylvania for November's presidential election, a judge ruled Wednesday, despite a torrent of criticism that it will suppress votes among President Barack Obama's supporters and make it harder for the elderly, disabled, poor and young adults to vote.

Commonwealth Court Judge Robert Simpson said he would not grant an injunction that would have halted the law, which requires each voter to show

a valid photo ID. Opponents are expected to file an appeal within a day or two to the state Supreme Court as the Nov. 6 election looms.

"We're not done, it's not over," said Witold J. Walczak, an American Civil Liberties Union lawyer who helped argue the case for the plaintiffs. "It's why they make appeals courts."

The Republican-penned law — which passed over the objections of Democrats — has ignited a furious debate over voting rights as Pennsylvania is poised to play a key role in de-

terminating the presidential contest. Plaintiffs, including a 93-year-old woman who recalled marching with Martin Luther King Jr. in 1960, asked Simpson during a six-day hearing earlier this summer to block the law from taking effect in this year's election as part of a wider challenge to its constitutionality.

Republicans, who defend the law as necessary to protect the integrity of the election, praised Simpson's decision, while it was decried by Democrats who say the law will make it harder, if not impossible, for hundreds of thousands of people who lack ID for valid reasons to vote.

DREAM ACT COMES TRUE

The Obama administration will begin one of the most sweeping changes in immigration policy in decades Wednesday, allowing an estimated 1.7 million young undocumented immigrants to apply for the temporary right to live and work openly in the United States without fear of deportation.

Immigrants have waited for final details of the plan in the two months since President Obama pledged to brush aside years of congressional stalemate over the Dream Act and grant de facto residency to qualified immigrants who were brought to the country as children.

On Tuesday, officials surprised advocacy groups by posting the application forms online one day early. Advocates across the country held workshops Wednesday for hundreds of immigrants eager to learn who will qualify and how to apply.

Families have been scrambling to assemble school records, utility bills and other documents that may be needed, they said.

"People are very, very anxious to file, so we've been telling them to over-prepare," said Emid Gonzalez, manager of legal services at CASA de Maryland. The group has scheduled an afternoon workshop Wednesday at which she expects to see family documents by the armload. "The phone has been ringing

off the hook."

The program is open to immigrants ages 15 to 31 who came to the country before they were 16 and have lived here continuously for at least the past five years. Among other restrictions, they must be free of serious criminal convictions, be enrolled in or completed high school or have served in the U.S. military. On Tuesday, officials con-

firmed those enrolled in GED programs and certain training programs will also qualify, broadening its potential reach. U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service also provided a list of documents it will accept as proof of continuous residency, including tax receipts, bank records, and church confirmation and other religious records.

Too Much Evidence Dooms Case

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) • A fugitive doctor charged in the nation's largest prosecution of Internet pharmacies is getting off in part because there's just too much evidence in his case: more than 400,000 documents and two terabytes of electronic data federal authorities say is expensive to maintain.

Armando Angulo was indicted in 2007 in a multimillion dollar scheme that involved selling prescription drugs to patients who were never examined or even interviewed by a physician. A federal judge in Iowa dismissed the charge last week at the request of prosecutors, who want to throw out the many records collected over their nine-year investigation to free up more space.

The Miami doctor fled to his native Panama after coming under

Veterans Conference Spending Investigated

WASHINGTON • The Department of Veterans Affairs spent \$5 million — and set aside \$4 million more — last year for two training conferences, and now the organizers of them are under investigation over whether they broke ethics rules by improperly accepting gifts, lawmakers and government sources said.

The agency's inspector general is investigating whether event planners and other organizers of the training for human resources employees took alcohol, concert tickets and spa treatments from vendors. Also under scrutiny are tens of thousands of dollars in promotional items the conference organizers gave attendees, government sources said.

About 1,800 VA employees attended the four-day event, held in July and August 2011 at the Marriott World Center in Orlando, officials said.

The probe comes four months after the General Services Administration became engulfed in scandal over a Las Vegas conference for that agency's West Coast employees that cost \$823,000. The cost of the four-day event, which was billed as a training exercise but was little more than an entertainment junket, was revealed in a scathing report by the GSA inspector general. GSA's top leaders were fired or forced out as a result.

The VA conferences, by contrast, "were for legitimate training purposes," the office of Inspector General George J. Opfer said in a statement Monday. But investigators "have uncovered questionable activities" after a preliminary review that started in late April.

"We are reviewing conference expenditures for compliance with government laws and regulations, the reasonableness and oversight of these expenditures, and whether actions taken by VA staff were in compliance with government ethics and rules of behavior," the inspector general's office said.

Republican lawmakers said the department authorized \$9 million for the conferences. VA officials said \$5 million was spent.

The allegations of wrongdoing came from whistleblowers who came forward after the GSA scandal became public, the inspector general's office said.

VA officials called the alleged misconduct "unacceptable" and said the agency already has made changes to address possible misspending.

Recovery Weakest Since WWII

WASHINGTON (AP) • The recession that ended three years ago this summer has been followed by the feeblest economic recovery since the Great Depression.

Since World War II, 10 U.S. recessions have been followed by a recovery that lasted at least three years. An Associated Press analysis shows that by just about any measure, the one that began in June 2009 is the weakest.

The ugliness goes well beyond unemployment, which at 8.3 percent is the highest this long after a recession ended.

Economic growth has never been weaker in a postwar recovery. Consumer spending has never been so slack. Only once has job growth been slower.

More than in any other post-World War II recovery, people who have jobs are hurting: Their paychecks have fallen behind inflation.

Credit, the fuel that powers economies, evaporated after Lehman Brothers collapsed in September 2008. And a 30 percent drop in housing prices erased trillions in home equity.

"A housing collapse is very different from a stock market bubble and crash," says Nobel Prize-winning economist Peter Diamond of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. "It affects so many people. It only corrects very slowly."

Feeble Growth

America's gross domestic product — the broadest measure of economic output — grew 6.8 percent from the April-June quarter of 2009 through the same quarter this year, the slowest in the first three years of a postwar recovery. GDP grew an average of 15.5 percent in the first three years of the eight other comebacks analyzed.

The engines that usually drive recoveries aren't firing this time.

Investment in housing, which grew an average of

nearly 34 percent this far into previous postwar recoveries, is up just 8 percent since the April-June quarter of 2009.

Exhausted Consumers

Consumer spending has grown just 6.5 percent since the recession ended, feeblest in a postwar recovery. In the first three years of previous recoveries, spending rose an average of nearly 14 percent.

It's no mystery why consumers are being frugal. Many have lost access to credit, which fueled their spending in the 2000s. Home equity evaporated and credit cards have been canceled. Others are spending less because they're paying down debt or saving more. Household debt peaked at 126 percent of after-tax income in mid-2007 and has fallen to 107 percent, according to Haver Analytics.

The Jobs Hole

The economy shed a staggering 8.8 million jobs during and shortly after the recession. Since employment hit bottom, the economy has created just over 4 million jobs. Gregory Mann, 58, lost his job as a real estate appraiser three years ago. "Basically, I am looking for anything," he says. He has applied to McDonald's, Target and Nordstrom's.

"Nothing, not even a rejection letter," he says.

His wife, a registered nurse, lost two jobs in the interim — and just received an offer to work reviewing medical records near Atlanta.

"We are broke and nearly homeless," he says. "If this job for my wife hadn't come through, we would be out on the street come Sept. 1 or would have had to move in with relatives."

Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke has called long-term unemployment a "national crisis." The longer people remain unemployed,

the harder it is to find work, Bernanke has said. Skills erode, and people lose contact with former colleagues who could help with the job search.

Shrinking Paychecks

Usually, workers' pay rises as the economy picks up momentum after a recession. Not this time. Employers don't have to be generous in a weak job market because most workers don't have anywhere to go.

As a result, pay raises haven't kept up with even modest levels of inflation. Earnings for production and nonsupervisory workers — a category that covers about 80 percent of the private, nonfarm workforce — have risen over 6.2 percent since June 2009. Consumer prices have risen nearly 7.2 percent. Adjusted for inflation, wages have fallen 0.8 percent. In the previous five recoveries — the records go back only to 1964 — real wages had gone up an average 1.5 percent at this point.

Falling wages haven't hurt everyone. Lower labor costs helped push corporate profits to a record 10.6 percent of U.S. GDP in the first three months of 2012, according to the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis. And those surging profits helped lift the Dow Jones industrials 54 percent from the end of June 2009 to the end of last month. Only after the recessions of 1948-49 and 1953-54 did stocks rise more.

In the meantime, it's difficult for consumers to summon the confidence to spend and businesses the confidence to hire and expand. Never in the postwar period has there been so much uncertainty about what policymakers will do, says Steven Davis, an economist at the University of Chicago Booth School of Business: "No one is sure what will actually happen."

As weak as this recovery

is, it's nothing like what the U.S. went through in the 1930s. The period known as the Great Depression actually included two severe recessions separated by a recovery that lasted from March 1933 until May 1937.

It's tough to compare the current recovery with the 1933-37 version. Economic figures comparable to today's go back only to the late 1940s. But calculations by economist Robert Coen, professor emeritus at Northwestern University, suggest that things were far bleaker during the recovery three-quarters of a century ago: Coen found that unemployment remained well above 10 percent — and usually above 15 percent — throughout the 1930s.

Only the approach and outbreak of World War II — the ultimate government stimulus program — restored the economy and the job market to full health.

investigation in 2004, and Panamanian authorities say they do not extradite their own citizens. Given the unlikelihood of capturing Angulo and the inconvenience of maintaining so much evidence, prosecutors gave up the long pursuit.

"Continued storage of these materials is difficult and expensive," wrote Stephanie Rose, the U.S. attorney for northern Iowa. She called the task "an economic and practical hardship" for the Drug Enforcement Administration.

The case started in 2003 with a raid of a small Iowa drugstore and eventually secured the conviction of 26 defendants, including 19 doctors. The investigation dismantled two Internet pharmacies that illegally sold 30 million pills to customers. Investigators also recovered \$7 million, most of which went to Iowa police agencies that helped with the case.

When a major drug suspect flees the country, federal authorities often leave the charges pending in case the fugitive tries to sneak back into the U.S. or a country with a friendly extradition process. But in Angulo's case, the volume of evidence posed a bigger burden.

The evidence took up 5 percent of the DEA's worldwide electronic storage. Agents had also kept several hundred boxes of paper containing 440,000 documents, plus dozens of computers, servers and other bulky items.

Two terabytes is enough to store the text of 2 million novels, or roughly 625,000 copies of "War and Peace."

Two-terabyte memory drives are widely available for \$100, but the DEA's data server must be relatively small and may need replacement, a costly and risky proposition for an agency that must maintain the integrity of documents.

On Antonio Aleman's dining table in a double-wide trailer in Suitland, the pile of birth certificates and school transcripts has grown to nearly a foot tall as he prepares to sign up his two children, 15 and 21. With his wife Ruth slapping fresh tortillas in the kitchen, Aleman sorts through his daughter Beatrice's academic bona fides, including a certificate of achievement from Surrattsville High School in Clinton, Md.

"I think they will qualify. They are good students, we've been working hard, paying our taxes," said Aleman, 43, a bakery truck driver from El Salvador who illegally crossed the border with his family nine years ago. He already bought two money orders for \$465 each to cover the application fee. "It's

been difficult to wait. What else do we need? Do we have everything?"

The protected status has to be renewed every two years. And the program's name, Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals, may lack the aspirational heft of the "Dream Act." But immigration advocates are treating Wednesday's launch as a great victory.

"This is single largest opportunity we've had since the amnesty program of 1986 to bring people out of the shadows and into documented status," said Rep. Luis V. Gutierrez (D-Ill.), who led efforts to pass the Dream Act in the House only to see it fail in the Senate in 2010. "We've got to take advantage of it. Our goal should be to sign them up, sign them up, sign them up!"

Activists plan to hold regular events during the next several months to draw eligible immigrants into the program, many of whom will be averse to revealing their names and

addresses to federal authorities.

But more than 5,000 have registered for an information session Gutierrez is planning Wednesday at Chicago's Navy Pier. Mayor Rahm Emanuel and Sen. Richard J. Durbin (D-Ill.) plan to attend, basking in an election-year initiative that Democrats hope will please Latino voters after years of record deportations. "This is such a contrast to the years of deportation," Gutierrez said. "The rewards are going to be huge."

Critics said politics explains everything about a program they characterize as amnesty for lawbreakers at a time of soaring joblessness. "With unemployment at 8.3 percent, it's unconscionable that the Obama administration's amnesty program actually requires illegal immigrants to apply for work authorization in the U.S.," said Rep. Lamar Smith (R-Tex.), chairman of the Judiciary

Committee, in a statement. "This undercuts the 23 million unemployed or underemployed Americans."

Opponents also complain about the costs. Homeland Security officials will rule case-by-case on applicants, presenting huge personnel demands. Officials say they hope to pay for case workers with the application fee.

Opponents and supporters alike agree that the two-year protections are likely to be renewed indefinitely, as has been the case with Haitian refugees and others who have gotten such status. While future administrations may stop granting the protections, they are unlikely to move to deport those already enrolled.

"There's no way Romney is going to reverse this, at least not for those who already have it," said Mark Krikorian, head of Washington's Center for Immigration Studies.

Ryan Called Stimulus Wasteful, Sought Funds

WASHINGTON (AP) • Republican vice presidential candidate Paul Ryan has been one of the harshest critics of President Barack Obama's economic stimulus plan. But months after Congress approved the nearly \$800 billion package, the Wisconsin lawmaker was trying to steer money under the program to companies in his home state.

Rep. Ryan wrote letters in 2009 to Energy Secretary Steven Chu and Labor Secretary Hilda Solis seeking stimulus grant money for two Wisconsin energy conservation companies. One of them, the nonprofit Wisconsin Energy Conservation Corp., later received \$20.3 million from the Energy Department to help homes and businesses improve energy efficiency, according to federal records.

In a letter to Chu in December 2009, Ryan said the stimulus money would help his state create thousands of new jobs, save en-

ergy and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. That contrasted with his public statements denigrating the stimulus program as a "wasteful spending spree." It also conflicts with his larger federal budget proposal, which would slash Energy Department programs aimed at creating green jobs.

Ryan's office says his budget plan "calls for getting Washington out of the business of picking winners and losers in the economy — and that includes our energy sector."

Ryan's actions in Congress and as chairman of the House Budget Committee have been drawing fresh scrutiny since he was named last weekend as Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney's running mate.

A Ryan spokesman, Brendan Buck, noted the congressman's office's previous explanations that he was "providing a legitimate constituent service."

Test Flight of Hypersonic X-51A Aircraft Ends in Failure

LOS ANGELES • A closely watched test flight of an experimental aircraft designed to travel up to 3,600 mph ended in disappointment when a part failed, causing it to plummet into the Pacific Ocean, the Air Force revealed.

The unmanned X-51A WaveRider was launched Tuesday over the Pacific Ocean from above the Point Mugu Naval Air Test Range in a key test to fine-tune its hypersonic scramjet engine.

The aircraft was designed to hit mach 6, or six times the speed of sound, and fly for five minutes. But that didn't happen. The engine never even lit.

About 15 seconds into the flight, a fault was identified in one of the WaveRider's control fins, and the aircraft was not able to maintain control and was lost.

"It is unfortunate that a problem with this subsystem caused a termination before we could light the scramjet engine," Charlie

Brink, program manager for the Air Force Research Laboratory, said in a statement. "All our data showed we had created the right conditions for engine ignition and we were very hopeful to meet our test objectives."

This is the third time a WaveRider has flown. Not one flight has gone the distance.

Engineers thought they were on the right track with the WaveRider program in May 2010 when the high-speed aircraft made its first flight. In that test, the WaveRider sped westward for about 143 seconds at 3,500 mph before plunging into the ocean, as planned.

But in another WaveRider flight in June 2011, a lapse in airflow to the jet engine caused a premature shutdown.

In the test that took place Tuesday, a B-52 took off from Edwards Air Force Base and flew to 50,000 feet near Point Mugu. Once there, the B-52 dropped the aircraft and it fell like a bomb for about four seconds before its booster rocket engine ignited and

propelled the aircraft.

It was then supposed to separate from the rocket and speed across the sky, powered by the air-breathing hypersonic engine, but the control fin issue caused it to fail.

The Air Force said "program officials will now begin the process of working through a rigorous evaluation to determine the exact cause of all factors at play."

The WaveRider program is estimated to cost \$140 million, according to GlobalSecurity.org, a website for military policy research. One of the four WaveRider aircraft remains. But officials have not decided when, or if, that vehicle will fly.

Aerospace engineers say harnessing technology capable of sustaining hypersonic speeds — going five times the speed of sound or more — is crucial to the next generation of missiles, military aircraft, spacecraft and even passenger planes.

But engineers have been trying to sustain hypersonic flight since the 1960s, and have turned out few positive results.

Son of Fake Drowning Suspect Says He Was Coerced

MINEOLA, N.Y. (AP) • A New York man charged with falsely reporting his father had drowned in an alleged insurance scam was abused, manipulated and coerced into participating in the scheme, his attorney said Tuesday.

Jonathan Roth, 22, pleaded not guilty to charges including conspiracy to commit insurance fraud after reporting that his father, Raymond Roth, drowned last month at Jones Beach in New York. The elder Roth was later reported to be in Florida.

He is receiving psychiatric treatment at an undisclosed hospital on New York's Long Island, his lawyer said, but is expected to be released Wednesday.

Raymond Roth, 47, expects to then be immediately arrested on similar charges to those facing his son, said attorney Brian Davis.

Jonathan Roth, who was freed Monday on \$10,000 bond, had a brief court appearance Tuesday; the case was postponed until Sept. 19. Attorney Joey Jackson did not allow his client to speak with reporters, but alleged he had a strained relationship with his father and was not a willing participant in the ruse.

"This case in and of itself is about three things in my mind: It's about coercion, it's about the abuse we talked about, and it's about manipulation."

Jackson made allusions to a prior case involving an unnamed Child Protective Services agency but did not elaborate.

"When the facts come out as to how this thing ultimately came about, in addition to the past history that his father, just the things his father's done to him over the course of time, it's going to be obvious why this thing happened," Jackson said.

PERDIDO KEY, Fla. (AP) • On a balmy Sunday morning at the Flora-Bama Lounge, Package and Oyster Bar, barkeeps set up their stations as churchgoers filtered in under a Jack Daniels banner.

The iconic bar, which sits on the Florida and Alabama state line, is famous for its annual mullet-tossing contest — patrons gather on the beach and throw dead fish from Alabama into Florida.

Bikini contests, bar brawls and drink specials are the day-to-day business of the beach bar that calls itself "America's last roadhouse."

But for one hour every Sunday, the Flora-Bama is home to about 450 regular congregants of Worship at the Water, an outreach service of the Perdido Bay United Methodist Church. More than 1,100 filled the place on Easter Sunday.

Bible study is in the upstairs bar.

If Jesus returned to Earth, he'd probably kick back at the Flora-Bama, said Jack de Jarnette, a founding pastor of the church.

"It's the sort of place he often went and hung out with people," he said. "When you cannot get people to come to church, the alternative is to bring the church to them."

A band in tie-dyed T-shirts played Curtis Mayfield's "People Get Ready,"

as parishioners gathered underneath an awning adorned with rows of Land Shark beer flags on a recent Sunday. Most wore flip-flops and shorts, but some wore swimsuits.

"If you look closely, you might see a few of the churchgoers having a Bloody Mary or a bushwhacker," longtime bar employee Blitz Poston said. "It's really a wonderful thing that brings together people from all walks of life."

Offerings are collected in neon tackle boxes placed throughout the bar.

Pastor Jeremy Mount wears Mardi Gras beads, shorts, sandals and T-shirt that is fringed around the sleeves.

"There are seven places to drink and no place to worship God on this key," he said. "We feel like God has called us here to be a ministry. Where would there ever be a better place than the world-renowned Flora-Bama?"

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SEPT. 11 MEMORIAL DEFENDS DISPLAY OF A STEEL CROSS

NEW YORK (AP) • A judge should toss out a lawsuit by a national atheists group seeking to stop the display of a cross-shaped steel beam found among the wreckage of the World Trade Center, lawyers for the operators of the Sept. 11 memorial at ground zero say.

The lawyers said in papers filed in U.S. District Court in Manhattan on Monday that the 17-foot-tall beam will be displayed as a historical object because it tells part of the story of the rescue and recovery effort after the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist

attacks, which destroyed the twin towers and killed thousands of people.

They said the display of the cross among 1,000 artifacts, photos, oral histories and videos is no different from the showing of hundreds of religious paintings routinely displayed at government-supported art museums.

The nonprofit group American Atheists sued the National September 11 Memorial & Museum's operators last year, saying the beam's display would be unconstitutional. A message left with a lawyer for the group

was not immediately returned Wednesday.

Lawyers for the memorial operators said in their papers that the steel beam, found by rescue workers two days after the terror attacks, was an inspiration. They said workers "took solace in its symbolism as they searched for survivors and found mostly victims."

The lawyers noted the museum is an independent nonprofit and decisions by its curators about what to display are not state actions subject to constitutional protection.

Man Criticized Group before DC Shooting

WASHINGTON (AP) • A man suspected of shooting and wounding a security guard at the headquarters of a Christian lobbying group on Wednesday made a negative reference about the organization's work before opening fire, a law enforcement official said.

Police said the man entered the front lobby of the Family Research Council in Washington around 10:45 a.m. Wednesday, began arguing with a security guard and then shot him in the arm. The gunman was subdued by the wounded guard and others and taken into custody but had not been charged as of Wednesday evening.

Another law enforcement official identified the suspect as Floyd Corkins II, and authorities were interviewing Corkins' neighbors in Herndon, Va., near Washington. Both officials spoke on the condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to discuss an ongoing investigation.

TV news footage shows the suspect, a large man with a shaved head and an unbuttoned striped shirt, being led to a car with his hands restrained.

Though authorities did not publicly reveal a motive, advocacy groups across the ideological spectrum condemned the violence, with some casting it as a hate crime. President Barack Obama was concerned about the wellbeing of the guard, a White House spokesman said, and Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney also said he was appalled.

"Today's attack is the clearest sign we've seen that labeling pro-marriage groups as 'hateful' must end," Brian Brown, the president of the National Organization for Marriage, said in a statement.

The Family Research Council strongly opposes gay marriage and abortion and says it advocates "faith, family and freedom in public policy and public opinion." The conservative group maintains a powerful lobbying presence on those causes, testifying before Congress and reviewing legislation.

Corkins, 28, who volunteered recently at a community center for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people, made a negative comment about the organization's activity before the shooting, but the reference was not specific, one of the

law enforcement officials said. Two law enforcement officials said Corkins was carrying sandwiches from Chick-fil-A, a fast-food chain embroiled in a national debate over same-sex marriage.

"We don't know enough about him ... or mentally what he's thinking," said James McJunkin, assistant director in charge of the FBI's Washington field office.

The guard, Leo Johnson, was conscious and breathing after the shooting and was being interviewed and treated at a hospital. Authorities credited him for thwarting a shooting they said could have been much worse.

"The security guard here is a hero, as far as I'm concerned," said D.C. Police Chief Cathy Lanier.

Corkins had been volunteering for about the past six months at The DC Center for the LGBT Community, said David Mariner, executive director of the community center, which is in Northwest Washington.

He usually staffed the center's front desk on Saturdays, and his most recent shift was about two weeks ago.

"He always struck me as a kind, gentle and unassuming young man. I'm very surprised that he could be involved in something like this," Mariner said.

Authorities seized Corkins' car at a northern Virginia Metro station, and were going door-to-door interviewing neighbors, several of whom spoke highly of the family.

"They were always so sweet and so nice," said Stephanie Meyer, who lives a few doors down. "They are awesome people. We never had any issues."

According to a U.S. Defense Department official, Corkins is not a member of the Air Force, but he may have lived at Andrews Air Force base in some other capacity in the past, possibly as a dependent or family member.

Amy Biondi and her husband Steve were visiting Washington from Long Island with their daughter and a friend and tried to ask officers for help with a parking meter when they were told there was a situation they had to deal with. Transformed by Trails

Proposed trails could be boon for Ketchum and Hailey communities, outdoor buffs say.

GALENA LODGE • Sixty miles of biking and hiking trails would be charted around Galena Lodge under a proposal unveiled this week.

The trails — proposed by the Blaine County Recreation District — would transform an area that currently has few recreational opportunities for its increasing number of summer visitors.

“Galena has some of the best Nordic trails in the West. This would give it world-class summer trails,” said Hailey resident Steve Haims.

Sawtooth National Recreation Area Ranger Joby Timm and Ed Cannady introduced the proposals at two open houses this week in Ketchum and Hailey. They will tweak the proposals based on public feedback and visual inspection of the areas. Then they’ll present a formal proposal for public input this fall.

Once an environmental analysis is done, work could start next summer, Cannady said.

The proposal includes 12 miles of beginner loops near the lodge between two and three feet wide with no more than a 5 percent grade.

“We have 750 miles of trails in the SNRA but the majority are for advanced bike riders. We don’t have a lot of beginner or intermediate trails,” said Timm.

The proposed system features 30 miles of intermediate trails two feet

wide with a grade of up to 10 percent. There would be 18 miles of expert trails.

A small skills area near the lodge would feature log pyramids, rock obstacles, ladder bridges and other challenges designed to appeal to the increasing number of summer camps and mountain bike clinics at Galena.

Interpretive signs reflecting the area’s mining history, botany, mountains and wildlife would be placed along some of the trails.

BCRD would fund the construction. But since the recreation district uses no tax dollars for the Galena lodge area, the Forest Service would likely help secure some grants, said Timm.

Timm said the public has been gung-ho about the proposal but has expressed concerns that logging roads in the area would be closed. Some also wondered how the proposal would

Castle Rocks State Park

ALMO • Looking to escape city life for a week or a weekend? Castle Rocks State Park offers the perfect blend of outdoor exploration mixed with the comforts of home.

You may have heard of the better-known City of Rocks National Reserve, which sits adjacent, but Castle Rocks offers unique housing accommodations and recreation that can’t be found anywhere else.

Castle Rocks sits at the base of the 10,339-foot Cache Peak. It offers rock climbing, horseback riding and hiking in a unique geological setting made up of quartz-monzonite pinnacles and monoliths towering 60 stories high. The 1,240-acre ranch that makes up a large portion of Castle Rocks was privately owned until 1999. In 2007, another 200 acres was added to Castle Rocks, including a 120-acre conservation easement to provide recreation access.

The Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation, the Bureau of Land Management and the U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service manage the Castle Rocks area in partnership.

Castle Rocks may not be as famous as neighboring City of Rocks — a rock climbing hot spot for national and international visitors. But Wallace Keck, superintendent of City of Rocks and park manager for Castle Rocks, said Castle Rocks also offers premiere rock climbing opportunities.

“Come for the reserve, stay for the state park,” Keck said.

So visit Castle Rocks State Park whether you feel like hiking over rocks or clinging to them.

What if I Don’t Know how to Rock Climb?

You are in luck. Idaho Parks and Recreation now offers beginners the opportunity to try out rock climbing in a safe and easy-to-learn setting. The Climbing Experience Program exposes visitors to concepts, techniques and equipment they need to get started in this sport. This program is available between Memorial Day and Labor Day, but Keck suggests calling ahead and making a reservation.

Gated Entry

Offroad clubs say riders need to better respect ranchers by closing the gates they open.

TWIN FALLS • Whenever Stan Mai heads outdoors on his all-terrain vehicle, it’s a time for him to relax from a busy week and breathe the fresh air.

But a little of the stress returns when he finds gates to

ranchers’ properties left open. It might not always be fellow offroaders at fault, he said, but if they are he has a message for them: Close the gates.

“It’s an important issue, really,” said Mai, president of Magic Valley ATV Riders. “It causes ranchers to lose trust in us. It’s an issue that keeps

popping back up.” The problem persists near many public lands, he said.

“The owners are letting us access their land to ride the trails. Most ranchers really are very good about it,” he said. But there are two or three reasons open gates are a problem. “Number one is

yurts — called Pinyon and Sage — for rent at Smoky Mountain Campground. Inside you will find a spacious dome able to accommodate up to six occupants. It is cozy with two bunk beds — a twin over a full — a table, six stools, a storage hutch and a wood-burning stove. The transparent dome with ceiling fan allows for views of the night sky as you lie in bed. All the yurts have electricity and wireless internet. Showers and flush toilets are only a short walk away. At night you can sit around a fire pit and smell sagebrush, juniper and pinyon pine.

If you have an RV you can find a spot in one of the 38 sites at Smoky Mountain Campground. Two sites are ADA accessible, and six are designated for campers with horses. These sites are pet-friendly, but pets are not allowed in the yurts. An RV dump station and recycling stations are near the shower house. If you have any concerns while staying there, you'll find a camp host at site 32.

Don't take the chance and just show up expecting to find an open site. Keck recommends reservations.

But in case you do happen to show up and find a spot, the self-pay fee station is on the right at the campground entrance.

Can I Play my Favorite PlayStation Games?

Perhaps you prefer the charm of sleeping in a brick house built in 1912 but with the comforts of 2012. The Lodge at Castle Rock Ranch was completely remodeled in 2011 and is furnished with linens, towels, toiletries, flat-screen televisions, wire-

less Internet and even PlayStation. The lodge is open year-round, and reservations are recommended. Keck said this is a great location for family reunions.

Can I Bring My Horse?

Horses are allowed to go anywhere mountain bikes allowed. The basic guidelines for using trails at Castle Rocks: Bikers yield to horses and hikers; horses have the right-of-way; pets must be on a leash six feet or shorter; hike only on designated trails; and leave gates as you find them. There is grazing livestock in the area, and if a gate is closed you may be able to open it and enter, but close it behind you.

While camping at Smoky Mountain Campground with horses, do not tie the horse directly to a tree. A 12-by-12-foot corral is provided at each site and holds two horses. Also, a community corral holds two horses. Feed your horses weed-free hay or pellets, and remove manure and excess hay when vacating the site. A storage bin is provided for disposal.

Horses may not be ridden through the main camping loop.

What Can I See on My Hike, Horse or Bike?

Castle Rocks State Park has some of the best hikes in southern Idaho, according to Keck. But you might not know this unless you stop by the visitor center and pick up the ranch unit trails map. A

number of trails accessible by foot, horse or bike near the Stines Creek Picnic Area feature great opportunities for bird watching, spotting wildlife, taking pictures and learning about history. A short hike north of the Castle Rock you will find Tiny Town, which features pictographs and hunting blinds. Also discovered in this area were stone tools, obsidian

flakes and fire pits.

"It's superb scenery, and it's well marked," Keck said.

Twelve special events a year highlight the park's trails. A fall trail horseback ride Sept. 22, guided by a ranger, will take participants along trails in Castle Rocks and City of Rocks. The Castle Rock Trail Run slated for Oct. 6 is an opportunity to see gorgeous views by foot.

Castle Rocks State Park's day-use vehicle entrance fee is \$5. There is a self-pay booth on the left side of the road before you reach the The Lodge at Castle Rock Ranch. **Hours:** The Castle Rocks and City of Rocks visitor center is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday, and is closed on weekends and holidays. Visit the

center first to pick up maps and receive information on the park. Castle Rocks State Park is open from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. for guests not staying overnight. **Get there:** From Twin Falls take Interstate 84 to exit 245 and head west toward Malta. Turn left (south) onto Idaho Highway 81 for 0.2 miles to Idaho Highway 77, then right (west). At Connor Creek Junction, turn left

(west) onto the Elba-Almo Highway for 1.4 miles to the park entrance.

Overnight: Camping at the Smoky Mountain Campground is \$23.32 per night, which includes Idaho sales Tax. Yurt rental for one to six people is \$53 and includes full access to all units of Castle Rocks State Park. Campsite charges cover one vehicle. Each other vehicle will be

the cows; they're not where they're supposed to be."

Leaving gates open allows ranchers' cattle to get out of their confined space, separate from the herd and cause unneeded concern for their owners.

"It's an ongoing problem," said rancher Bert Brackett, who owns property near the Three Creek area near the South Hills. It's not constant but happens more frequently than he'd like.

"A lot of them can be in remote places that we don't check on every day," Brackett said. "Fences and gates are there for a reason; it's part of the system of our managing grazing. If gates are left open to where cattle can escape, it defeats the purpose. ... What's really frustrating is when we find fences that have been cut."

Anyone might leave a gate open, Mai said, but most of the traffic on remote or back-country trails is offroaders.

Mel Quale, a charter member of the Magic Valley Trail Machine Association and lifelong motorcycle rider, said he doesn't know how

big the problem is but that offroaders should be responsible enough to close a gate if they open it.

"Basically, we tell people to leave gates the way they found them," he said. "If they find a gate open, leave it open. But if they open it, they should close it."

He said some gates might not be intentionally left open. Someone might be able to open a gate, he said, but then find they don't have the strength to close it properly. A cow could then brush against the gate, causing it to swing open.

He suggests two solutions:

Ranchers can install levers that make it easier to open and close gates, or they can install cattle guards.

The latter is perhaps the best solution, Mai said, but it's an added expense many ranchers and land agencies don't want to incur.

Brackett said guards often are installed in more heavily trafficked areas, but usually not in the remoter reaches.

But, Mai said, guards do little to solve another problem: Sometimes locked gates have been found with broken posts, as if the user deliberately forced entry onto a rancher's property.

Others perhaps don't see cows in the vicinity at the time and think no harm will come if they leave the gate open.

Either way, he said, ranchers lose trust. If the problem persists, ranchers might close their own gates — permanently — to offroaders. "It hurts us all," said Mai,

who usually is defensive of offroaders. "Leaving trash on their property, cutting fences, leaving gates open — those things really upset ranchers. I don't blame them. I don't understand how you can be so lazy, how you can stop to open a gate but won't stop to close it. It's a lack of respect for

others."

Part of the solution is educating riders, Brackett said. "A lot of times the assumption is that open country is all public land, and that's not the case. I really appreciate Stan and his efforts to educate his group about responsible use of the land."

affect Galena Lodge.

Timm said the Forest Service didn't have plans to close roads in the area, although it may take advantage of the opportunity to remedy a few problem stretches of road.

There are no plans to change the lodge, other than perhaps reconfiguring parking or adding restrooms.

Ketchum bicyclist Marc Driver told Timm and Cannady he wished they could have the trails done this summer.

"It's a terrific idea that will revitalize Galena in the summer," he said. "And for some of us old codgers the trails around here are a bit of a struggle, so it's nice to have trails that won't be so difficult."

Rich Bingham of Ketchum agreed. "This is awesome," he said. "I think this will be a great asset."

One thing was immediately apparent to the novice hunters: the arrow had hit too far back in the buck's chest cavity to guarantee a quick and humane kill. The first hunt was over; the second was about to begin.

"The second hunt," bow education instructor Bob Tiekens explained, "is generally called trailing, tracking or following the spoor and requires that the hunter carefully look for and then patiently follow any evidences (blood, tissue, hair, hoofprints) left behind by the stricken animal."

With the withering sun directly overhead, my four companions and I took up the trail and began to hound-dog the splotches of dark venous blood, disturbed grasses, and played hoofprints pressed into the firm river bottom sand. A half-hour later we stumbled upon our "dead" 3-D mule deer buck laid out in the willows; our second hunt had come to a tiring, but

successful and satisfying end.

The hunts described above were part of a veritable smorgasbord of real-world bowhunting scenarios that constitute the field day segment of the Bowhunter Education class I recently completed.

For several hours, we snaked our way through Blackfoot's Rose Pond 3-D archery range, stopping at each target set to practice game identification, range estimation, and to judge if the animals in front of us could be legally and ethically fired upon.

Our shots were taken while perched uncertainly in tree stands, hunkered down in shrouding ground blinds, kneeling awkwardly behind improved natural ground cover, and standing up on our wobbly hind legs.

While all hunters born on or after Jan. 1, 1975 are required to complete Idaho's Hunter Education Class to obtain their general hunting license, only hunters interested in participating in the state's archery-only hunts are required to complete the class before they can purchase their archery permit.

There are two options for fulfilling this requirement: participate in the five-day instructor-led class, which I chose, or complete the self-pace online course. Both options require that you participate in the field day. (Check out the Game and Fish website for complete details, www.fishandgame.idaho.gov).

The instructor-led sequence consists of four consecutive three-hour evening classroom sessions, a final multiple choice exam, as well as the field day activities. The class curriculum handbook spans eight chapters focusing on bow hunting history, equipment, hunter ethics, shot placement and game recovery techniques, tree stand safety, first aid, outdoor navigation and survival procedures, and the all-important state game regulations.

I've been a public school teacher for 31 years and know how difficult it is to hold anyone's attention for more than an hour on any subject. I was amazed and thoroughly impressed with the way that our four volunteer instructors (Jerry Belnap, Ed Anderson, Bob Tiekens, and F&G biologist Jack Connelly) kept us not only entertained, but actually learning during those lengthy evening sessions.

"Hunter education and bowhunter education classes are not just for youth and not just for hunters," reads the Fish and Game website. "These programs are for anyone who enjoys the outdoors and has an interest in conservation." Amen to that.

GOODING • One of the premier and longest-running rodeos in the region dusts off its boots and saddles up its horse tonight.

The Gooding Pro Rodeo, which is run concurrently with the county fair, runs its 87th edition today through Saturday. Last year, the rodeo was honored as the Wilderness Circuit's Large Rodeo of the Year honor by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association.

Consider that in 2004, the rodeo won Small Rodeo of the Year honors from the same group, and it's no wonder it has grown in popularity.

"It's one of the favorite rodeos for most of the top cowboys in the country," said Gooding County Fair and Rodeo Manager Don Gill. "Where other rodeos have a tough time getting contestants, we get over 400."

Almost half of those participants, Gill said, are current or past National Finals Rodeo qualifiers.

And that's just those who occupy the saddle. Under-

All Hail the King: Felix Perfect vs. Rays

SEATTLE • King Felix now has a crowning achievement. Felix Hernandez pitched the Seattle Mariners' first perfect game and the 23rd in baseball history, overpowering the Tampa Bay Rays in a brilliant 1-0 victory Wednesday.

The 2010 AL Cy Young Award winner has long talked of his desire to achieve pitching perfection. He finally accomplished it against the Rays, striking out the side twice and finishing with 12 strikeouts.

It was the third perfect game in baseball this season — a first — joining gems by Chicago's Philip Humber against the Mariners in April and San Francisco's Matt Cain versus Houston in June. More than half of all perfectos — 12 — have come in the last 25 seasons.

This also was the sixth no-hitter in the majors this season, three of them at Safeco Field. Humber threw his gem in Seattle, then six Mariners pitchers combined to hold the Los Angeles Dodgers hitless at the park on June 8.

For the Rays, it was an all-too-familiar feeling. This was the third time in four seasons they had a perfect game pitched against them, following efforts by Dallas Braden in 2010 and Mark Buehrle in 2009.

"I don't have any words to explain this," Hernandez said to the crowd, speaking on the field after the final out. "I've

New Big East Boss: League is 'United'

NEW YORK • New Big East Commissioner Mike Aresco wants to create a conference that gives its members no reason to leave.

Aresco held his first news conference Wednesday since being hired by the Big East. He was joined at the New York Athletic Club by University of Cincinnati President Greg Williams, the head of the league's search committee.

The Big East was gutted during the last round of conference realignment,

losing three longtime members (Syracuse, West Virginia and Pittsburgh) and a member-to-be (TCU). It has reconstructed itself as a national football conference that will span four time zones starting next season.

"I think you approach realignment with the idea that you strengthen your conference," said Aresco, who is leaving his job as executive vice president with CBS Sports to take over the Big East in early September. "You make it a place people want to be. You make it a place where people who

have left would rather have been back there. You make sure that there is a consensus among the schools."

Aresco said he believes the rebuilding league is stable.

"I would not have taken this job if I did not feel that this was a cohesive conference that was committed to each other," Aresco said. "What I want to do is make sure I'm a good communicator. I think it's very, very important to make everyone feel welcome. To understand everyone's concerns. You have a disparate group of schools but they share a

common goal. They want to make this work."

The Big East also has an expansive basketball league that includes eight members that don't participate in the football conference, including Notre Dame.

Balancing the desires of the football schools with the football schools has always been tricky for the Big East and now it's bringing in schools such as Boise State and San Diego State for football only with no regional ties to the current members.

Orozco Fiscal Earns U.S. First Win in Mexico

MEXICO CITY • The United States ended 75 years of frustration in Mexico, winning at its southern neighbor and regional revival for the first time Wednesday night when Michael Orozco Fiscal's goal in the 80th minute and Tim Howard's late sprawling saves provided a 1-0 victory.

Dominated for most of the night, the Americans went ahead on a move created by a trio of second-half substitutes.

Brek Shea, who entered two minutes earlier, went down the left flank and around Severo Meza. Shea, back with the national team after being dropped for six months, crossed to Terrence Boyd. He made a quick back-heel pass to Orozco Fiscal, who had entered in the 77th.

Orozco Fiscal, who plays

in Mexico for San Luis, kicked the ball past goalkeeper Guillermo Ochoa for his first international goal.

Howard preserved the lead, changing directions to stop a deflected shot by Javier Hernandez in the 85th, then pawing away a 4-yard downward header by Hernandez in the 89th.

"I think it's huge. It's huge for I think all American fans, it's huge for the team, and it's historic," U.S. coach Jurgen Klinsmann said. "We were very well aware that we've never won here at the Azteca Stadium. This is an amazing experience for the all the players. We told them before the game: This moment is for you, go and grab it. We are all aware that it was a lot, a lot of work."

The U.S. had been 0-23-1 against El Tri in 75 years of games at Mexico, including

0-19-1 in the thin air at altitude in Mexico City — where they had been outscored 81-14.

"Tim Howard kept us in the game I don't know how many times," said Klinsmann, who has been trying to change the defensive mindset the American had at times under Bob Bradley. "It's a mental aspect of it. Eventually, you need a little bit of luck, too, and I think in some instances we were lucky tonight."

It was the second big win for the Americans this year, following their first-ever victory over Italy in a friendly at Genoa in February.

With the European clubs seasons getting under way, the U.S. used a half-strength roster and a makeshift central defense.

Mexico, also below strength following the Olympics, dominated pos-

session but failed to connect on several open shots as the Americans paired Maurice Edu and Geoff Cameron in the center of their back line.

The game marked the start of the Americans' second year under Klinsmann, who replaced Bradley last summer after Mexico overcame a two-goal deficit to win the CONCACAF Gold Cup final 4-2.

Cameron got his head on a cross from Elias Hernandez in the 56th minute, preventing Hernandez from an open shot in front. A minute later, Jesus Zavala put an open header over the crossbar.

Andres Guardado hooked a free kick just wide to Howard's right post in the 65th after Cameron fouled Hernandez just outside the penalty area. Hernandez then sent an open header wide in the 76th off a cross from Hernandez.

Giants OF Cabrera Suspended for Positive Drug Test

SAN FRANCISCO • All-Star game MVP Melky Cabrera was suspended for 50 games without pay Wednesday after the San Francisco Giants outfielder tested positive for testosterone.

The Major League Baseball said Cabrera tested positive for the banned performance-enhancing substance in violation of the drug agreement between owners and the players' association.

"My positive test was the result of my use of a sub-

stance I should not have used," Cabrera said in a statement released by the union. "I accept my suspension under the Joint Drug Program and I will try to move on with my life. I am deeply sorry for my mistake and I apologize to my teammates, to the San Francisco Giants organization and to the fans for letting them down."

Cabrera is batting .346 with 11 home runs and 60 RBIs in his first season with San Francisco and, flashing bright orange spikes, singled and hit a two-run homer last month in the Na-

tional League's 8-0 All-Star win, which secured homefield advantage for the World Series.

He will miss the final 45 games of the regular season and serve the remainder of the suspension at the start of next season or during the postseason, depending on whether the Giants make the playoffs and how far they advance.

"We were extremely disappointed," the Giants said. "We fully support Major League Baseball's policy and its efforts to eliminate performance enhancing drugs from

our game."

Cabrera became the second Giants player to receive a drug suspension this season. Reliever Guillermo Mota was penalized for 100 games in May, becoming just the third major league player penalized twice for positive drug tests.

There have been four suspensions in the major league drug program this year, with Philadelphia infielder Freddy Galvis and free agent outfielder Marlon Byrd also suspended 50 games apiece. There have been 70 suspensions under the minor league drug program.

The headlines rarely have belonged to the Giants (No. 3 in the AP Pro32) almost since March. They enjoyed the spoils of winners, are trying not to be spoiled by winning, and

have flown so far under the radar this summer that it doesn't seem like they left the ground.

While their co-owners of the two-year-old stadium can be found hourly, if not more often, on ESPN — some folks joke about an upcoming new channel, TSPN (T for Tim Tebow, of course) — as well as all over the tabloids, the Giants quietly go about business. They're more concerned about avoiding any Super Bowl hangover than about being cast in the next sequel to "The Hangover."

If the Jets (No. 17 in the AP Pro32) are the NFL's version of Hollywood, the Giants are, well, Big Blue-collar New Jersey, far more Springsteen than Snooki.

"After we won (in 2007), we were playing better the next season than the team that won the Super Bowl," general manager Jerry Reese said. "But it didn't work out at the end of the season, so I don't think you can say that (was a Super Bowl hangover). We just didn't play well in the first round of the playoffs after winning our division."

"We had veterans on that team who now have won two Super Bowls. They know what it takes to avoid a 'Super Bowl hangover' that some say is a championship team gets when it wins. But for us, it's keep your head down and plow forward. We do the things we've always done."

One thing these teams have almost always done is face off in a preseason game. For this year's commentary more on the media, isn't it?

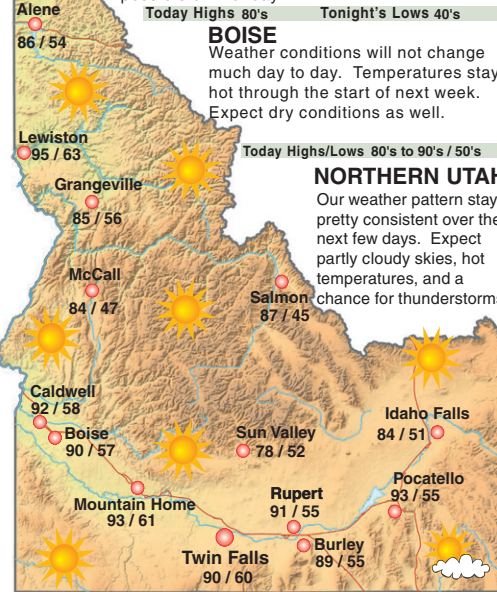

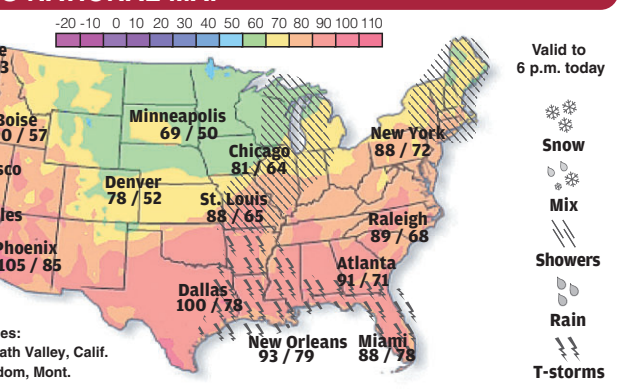

Michael vs. LeBron? It's a Match Made for Video

CHICAGO • Michael and Magic versus Kobe and LeBron?

Sounds like a dream matchup, and it could be coming to a video game console near you.

With USA Basketball and 2K Sports forming a partnership, fans can see what happens when the amazing 1992 Dream Team goes up against this year's Olympic gold medal winner once NBA 2K13 hits the shelves this fall.

Never mind that it's not quite the real thing, more fuel is about to be added to the debate. Not that there really is a debate in Michael Jordan's mind.

"We'll never know, but let's talk about it," Jordan said on a conference call. "I know Kobe (Bryant) said some things early on and I responded to those. The '92 Dream Team, I felt, was a more well-rounded basketball team."

It's hard to argue, considering the 1992 Dream Team had Jordan, Magic Johnson and Larry Bird leading a group that is widely considered the greatest collection of talent ever assembled. That team included 11 future Hall of Famers, won its six Olympic games by an average of more than 43 points en route to the gold medal and never was challenged the way this year's team was by Spain in the gold medal game, with the Americans squeezing out a 107-100 victory.

Then again, that's a testament to the global growth of the sport that the 1992 team spurred, leading to an influx of foreign talent in the NBA.

The '92 team boasted arguably the greatest player of all time in Jordan and greatest point guard in Magic Johnson, not to mention Larry Bird and dominant centers in Patrick Ewing and David Robinson. If the most recent group had a weakness, it was in the middle, with Dwight Howard, Chris Bosh and Blake Griffin sitting out with injuries. Throw in the fact that Dwyane Wade and Derrick Rose missed the games, too, and the Americans weren't quite fully loaded.

Still, they brought plenty of ammunition to London, with LeBron James, Kevin Durant and Bryant leading the way. And even with some stars missing, there still was talk that this year's team could be as good as the one that stormed through Barcelona two decades earlier. Bryant fueled the debate when he told reporters during training in Las Vegas they could take a game from the 1992 team if they met in their primes.

Even though Bryant didn't say the current stars would win a series, the comment drew sharp replies from members of the 1992 team. Jordan told The Associated Press back then that he "absolutely laughed" and said there's "no comparison" which team is better.

This time, he wasn't quite as blunt. "I just felt like we had enough size that we could contend with the 2012 team," Jordan said. "I think one of the things the 2012 team lacked was size. We probably would have attacked them from inside and outside, and our defense would have been pretty much solidified with the shot-blockers as well

as perimeter defensive players.

"I think those guys were much more athletic than maybe we were at that particular point, but I would like to think we were a little bit smarter and well-groomed about playing at that level of basketball. Honestly, I don't think we would have had problems with them as much as they probably would have had (with us). I think our team would have been a lot better in terms of all-around basketball."

There's no way to know for sure, of course. There's no time machine that can transport the 1992 team to today or the 2012 team back 20 years, so the video game might be the next best thing. If nothing else, it'll give the debate another platform once the game's released on Oct. 2.

The idea of seeing Jordan going against Kobe or James should intrigue fans, even if they're the ones at the controls and the players are in graphic form. Right?

The numbers indicate they would. Jason Argent, 2K Sports' vice president of marketing, said he didn't have the online statistics but the company sold

about 5.5 million units of the 2K11 game, and another 4 million units for the 2K12 game, which was impacted by last season's NBA lockout.

Even so, the company wasn't planning to include the 1992 and 2012 U.S. teams. He said Jay-Z provided the push.

The rapper and part-owner of the Brooklyn Nets is serving as the game's executive producer, and he insisted in a meeting that those Olympic teams be included. He also helped get Charles Barkley to sign on and be included.

"He put in a call to Charles, himself, and helped us work an agreement to use him in the game," Argent said.

One player who won't be represented in the game is Scottie Pippen. Argent said they simply couldn't reach an agreement.

As for which team was better — 1992 or 2012? Jordan thinks it's just beginning. "The only way it can end is to lace them back up and play against them in 2012, but I don't think that's going to happen," Jordan said, laughing. "Just let the debate begin."

Nadal Withdraws From U.S. Open

NEW YORK • Rafael Nadal's Grand Slam count will stay stuck at 11 for now, sidetracked by another knee problem.

The third-ranked Spaniard withdrew from the U.S. Open on Wednesday. Tendinitis has kept him out of action since his stunning loss at Wimbledon in late June.

The injury already forced him out of the London Olympics, where he was supposed to defend his title and carry Spain's flag in the opening ceremony.

"I am very sad to announce that I am not ready to play the US Open in NY. Thanks to my fans for their support and specially, the new yorkers," Nadal wrote on his Twitter account.

Nadal is still only 26, but the withdrawals raise questions about the future of a player who has had re-

curring knee problems in the past.

His 11 Grand Slam titles include a record seven on the red clay of the French Open, yet his hard-charging, hard-hitting style of play takes a toll on his body, particularly his knees.

 ORDINANCE NO. 1101**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO, AMENDING CHAPTER 8.04.050 SUBSECTION D REQUIRING ALL BILLS FOR GARBAGE COLLECTION SHALL BE DIRECTED TO THE OWNER OF REAL PROPERTY WHO BEARS ALL RESPONSIBILITY FOR PAYMENT OF SAME AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the city's utilities are uniformly being established to be for the real property owner to be ultimately responsible for payment of same; and

WHEREAS, garbage collection, as a city service, also needs to uniformly address billings to the owners of real property to be consistent with existing utility service charges; and

WHEREAS, the City of Jerome wishes for sanitation and garbage collection charges to be consistent with same.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS:

A. The city, its duly authorized agents, contractors, employees, or licensees shall have the exclusive right to collect and gather garbage and rubbish within the city, and it is unlawful for any person, except as otherwise provided in this chapter, to collect or gather garbage or rubbish within the city.

B. Every household, head of a family, tenant, proprietor, or operator of any residence or place of business, within the city, who is in possession thereof or in charge of any premises within the city upon which rubbish or garbage accumulates or may accumulate, must use the city's collection service whether the system is operated by the city, its agents, employees, contractors or licensees.

C. The current set of fees and charges for collection shall be retained in the office of the city clerk, and shall be subject to inspection by any citizen of the city during regular office hours.

D. Except as to commercial and industrial establishments, the fees and charges, whether for operation of the system by the city, or its contractor or licensee, shall be billed and collected monthly together with charges for the use of the city's municipal water and sewer systems. All bills are to be directed to the owner of the real property, who bears all responsibility for payment of same. Failure to pay such fees and charges within forty (40) days of the date of billing shall result in discontinuance of the garbage collection service. (Ord. 627 (RR), 1980: prior code §9-5)

This ordinance shall be effective following passage and publication as required by law.

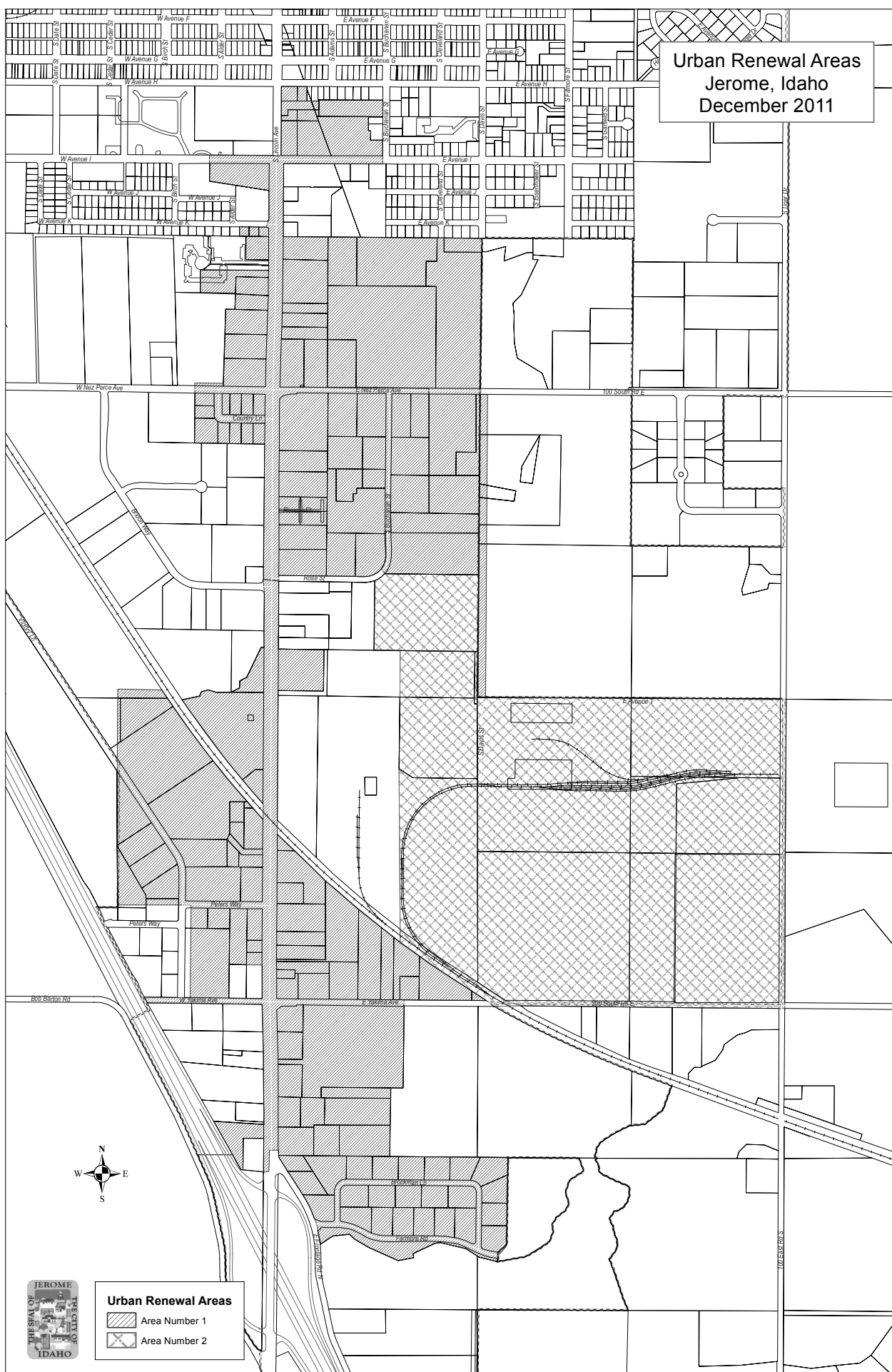

WHEREAS, owners of real property being provided domestic water service by the City have had ultimate responsibility for all deposits, fees and charges for such services; and

WHEREAS, in order to be more consistent in terms of the ultimate responsibility for water service, between consumers and owners of real property, it would better serve the interests of city residents that all owners of real property being provided domestic water service be the sole entity making application for domestic water services; and

WHEREAS, for purposes of consistency and continuity of rates being properly paid, the City has determined that it would be in the best interests of all city residents that real property owners maintain sole responsibility, from the outset of the provision of domestic water services, to be regularly billed for domestic water services supplied to real property within the Jerome City municipal limits.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS:

13.28.050: RULE 4; OWNER HAS RESPONSIBILITY FOR WATER SERVICE CHARGES:

Owners of real property being provided domestic water service by the City shall be ultimately responsible for all deposits, fees and charges for such services, irrespective of whether the owner is the occupant of the real property or is otherwise a consumer as referenced in this chapter. All applications for domestic water service must be made by the owner of the real property to be provided the services. Monthly bills shall be sent to the owner who has made the application for domestic water service. If the account has become delinquent, the owner of the real property to which the services have been provided shall be mailed a notice of termination of services at least ten (10) days prior to actual termination, which notice must also set forth the amount of all delinquent charges and fees. All fees and charges not paid by the date of termination shall be the responsibility of the owner of the real property. (Ord. 1076, 2010)

13.28.190: RULE 18; ABANDONMENT OF SERVICE:

When the owner, at any time after the first year of service, entirely suspends operations, with the intention to permanently abandon them, he may procure cancellation of the contract upon written application to the City, made not less than sixty (60) days before the effective date of such proposed cancellation. (Prior code 27-6)

13.28.200: RULE 19; ENLARGEMENT OF TAP AND SERVICE PIPE:

Where the owner desires the enlargement of his tap and service pipe because of inadequacy and was not restricted in size by the City at the time of installation, such enlargement will be made only at the owner's cost and expense. (Prior code 27-6)

13.28.230: RULE 22; EXTRATERRITORIAL SERVICE EXTENSION

In all territory located outside of the corporate limits of the City, where the City has a sufficient source of water and sufficient capacity in its mains running parallel with the property for which service is desired, the City may permit a connection thereto in the manner herein prescribed for property within its corporate boundaries. An owner will be required to effect a satisfactory conveyance of the fee title or an appropriate right of way as easement to any not owned by the owner on which any connection is situated free of all liens and encumbrances. All connections to and users of the water system outside the corporate boundaries of the City are subject to the prior right of the City and its inhabitants to the complete and full use of the system to the exclusion of all present or future connectors or users. Water shall be used outside the corporate limits only when it is above that necessary for the City's present needs, and determination of the needs and requirements of the City and its inhabitants with respect to water from its system is a fact to be determined by the City Council in its own sound discretion to be exercised from time to time as occasion may require. While it is the purpose of the City to maintain a water supply adequate to meet the needs of both the City and owners outside its corporate limits and within the metropolitan area, there are many elements which make it uncertain whether the supply can always be adequate for all, and therefore in times of shortage, water service outside the city will be curtailed on an equitable basis to be determined by the City Council. (Prior code 27-6)

13.28.400: RULE 39; CASH DEPOSIT; REQUIRED:

Upon signing the application for service, all owners of every kind and description, excepting federal, state, county, municipal, religious and charitable institutions, shall make a cash deposit securing the credit and the payment for the service rendered by the City. The owners above exempt from making said cash deposit shall be considered to have already established their credit, but such owners are not exempted from the requirements of the other rules of the City pertaining to an owner's credit, its establishment and continuation. (Prior code 27-6)

13.28.410: RULE 40; CASH DEPOSIT; RATES:

This City shall require deposit from all owners, except those referred to in section 13.28.400, "Rule 39; Cash Deposit; required," of this chapter, to secure the payment of all bills as they mature. Such required deposit for owners shall be a sum as fixed from time to time by resolution of the council. Deposits shall not exceed the amount of an estimated ninety (90) days' bill of the owner. Upon a user ceasing to be serviced by the system, any balance remaining of the deposit shall be returned to the user upon proof of payment of all charges and fees through the date of final use. The deposit shall also be returned to the user upon timely payment in full of all user charges for a twelve (12) consecutive month period. In the event the water service to an account is shut off for reason of nonpayment and the deposit has already been returned, a new deposit shall be required at the time services are restored. (Ord. 1077, 2010)

13.28.420: RULE 41; CASH DEPOSIT; APPLICATION TO AMOUNTS DUE:

The City shall have the right to apply such deposit to the payment of all amounts due and owing from the owner, and if the owner shall fail to restore any such deposit, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, delivered personally or by mail, the time of notice to be computed from the date of personal delivery or date of mailing, the City, without further notice, may discontinue service until the deposit is restored. (Prior code 27-6)

13.28.430: RULE 42; BILLS; BILLING INTERVALS:

Bills are due on the date of bill, which, normally, will be rendered as nearly as practicable at monthly intervals for all water service furnished during the preceding month, as herein defined; but the City, at its option, may render bills to regular owners at other, but in the case of residence owners, not shorter, intervals; provided, that any owner may be billed at termination of service. Temporary owners of any class may be billed at any time at the option of the City. (Prior code 27-6)

13.28.450: RULE 44; BILLS; DISPUTED AMOUNTS:

A dispute as to the amount of a bill, or the credits to be allowed against the same, shall not justify the owner in refusing to pay the bill when due, but if the owner shall give written notice at the City's office, at the time of payment (which must be before the delinquent date) that the bill is disputed, stating the amount and reasons of the dispute, the City will forthwith investigate such complaint and if such investigation shall disclose that the owner's objections are well founded, the City will refund the amount of overpayment, or credit it upon the next monthly bill of the owner. (Prior code 27-6)

13.28.470: RULE 46; BILLS; VIOLATION OF REGULATIONS DEEMED DELINQUENCY:

If a violation has resulted in the user or owner securing water without paying for it, as provided for in these schedules, rates, rules and regulations, the City shall estimate the amount of water so used and the service of such owner shall be considered delinquent, and is not to be reconnected or continued until after this estimated bill has been adjusted. (Prior code 27-6)

13.28.500: RULE 49; BILLS; EXCESS WATER CHARGE ADJUSTMENT:

Where there has been a substantial registration of water as shown by the meter reading over the normal average of the owner affected, and such excess has been caused by defect or defects on the premises occupied by such owner, and which are repaired immediately upon discovery, the city will make settlement of the charge of the excess water over the normal average as is fair and just under all the facts and circumstances as shall be found to exist. No adjustment whatever will be made unless due diligence is used on the part of the owner in taking care of plumbing and repairing defects immediately upon discovery or advice by the City that leaks are apparent. (Prior code 27-6)

13.28.510: RULE 50; BILLS; CREDIT FOR INTERRUPTION OF SERVICE:

For any failure or interruption of service, such interruption being continuous for twelve (12) hours or longer due to causes not the fault of the owner, the City will credit the owner with the proportions of the service charge which would otherwise accrue to the City during the period of failure or interruption, but such credit will be made only when claim therefore is made in writing at the City's office within forty-eight (48) hours after any such interruptions occur. (Prior code 27-6)

13.28.560: RULE 55; STOP AND WASTE VALVE INSTALLATION:

A. Stop and waste valves must be installed at the owner's expense, on all taps in a place always accessible and so located so as to permit shutting off the water for the entire premises with the least possible delay, and all persons on the premises should become familiar with its location and use. Such stop and waste valves shall be in addition to any which may be installed by the City.

B. It is not intended by this rule to require stop and waste valves to be installed immediately upon all services heretofore installed, but that said stop and waste valves shall be installed from time to time as services are installed, repaired or replaced. (Prior code 27-6)

13.28.580: RULE 57; SERVICE APPLICATION TO CONSTITUTE CONTRACT:

All applications for service, when accepted by the City, together with the schedules, rates, rules and regulations and all amendments thereof or supplemental thereto, shall constitute the entire contract between the City and owner unless provided for by separate agreement; such agreement to be approved as to contents and form by the City Council. (Prior code 27-6)

This ordinance shall be effective following passage and publication as required by law.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO, AMENDING CHAPTER 13.20 SEWER CHARGES AND FEES; 13.20.020: MONTHLY CHARGES; SCHEDULE 13.20.060: REVIEW AND ADJUSTMENT OF CHARGES; OF THE JEROME MUNICIPAL CODE AND THAT ALL APPLICATIONS FOR DOMESTIC WASTEWATER SERVICE MUST BE MADE BY THE OWNER OF REAL PROPERTY TO BE PROVIDED SERVICES AND THAT THE OWNER OF REAL PROPERTY MAINTAINS ALL RESPONSIBILITY FOR WASTEWATER SERVICES PROVIDED; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, owners of real property being provided domestic wastewater service by the City has ultimate responsibility for all deposits, fees, and charges for such service; and

WHEREAS, in order to be more consistent in terms of the ultimate responsibility for water service, between customers and owners of real property, it would better serve the interests of city residents that all owners of real property being provided domestic wastewater service be the sole entity making application for domestic water services; and

WHEREAS, for purposes of consistency and continuity of rates being properly paid, the City has determined that it would be in the best interests of all city residents that real property owners maintain sole responsibility, from the outset of the provision of domestic wastewater services, to be regularly billed for domestic wastewater services supplied to real property within the Jerome City municipal limits.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO AS FOLLOWS:

13.20.020: MONTHLY CHARGES; SCHEDULE:

The monthly wastewater collection and treatment service charges for each property owner, domestic, commercial, or industrial in nature, shall be determined by the cubic feet of water used plus a fixed administrative fee. Monthly bills shall be sent to the property owner. The owner of real property to which wastewater treatment and collection services are provided shall be responsible for the payment of all deposits, charges and fees required by this chapter which are not paid in full at the time water or wastewater treatment services are terminated to that real property. Each owner of real property to which wastewater treatment and collection services is provided shall receive written notice of termination of water service to such real property at least ten (10) days prior to the termination of such services, which notice shall also contain the amount of all delinquent charges and fees. The following rate schedule shall determine service charges and fees:

A. The city administrator, or his designee as it is presently set out in this section, shall classify all residential, commercial, and industrial users into appropriate user classes according to the user's wastewater strength. Service charges for residential and commercial users shall be derived from the rate schedule stated in this section: SERVICE CHARGES AND FEES RATE SCHEDULE

User Class	Wastewater Strength Classification (Biochemical Oxygen Demand Plus Total Suspended Solids)	Unit Water Charge Per 100 Cubic Feet
I	0	400 mg/1
II	400	600 mg/1
III	600	800 mg/1
IV	800	1,000 mg/1
V	1,000	1,500 mg/1

A. Capital reserve base rate of four dollars eighty three cents (\$4.83) per equivalent residential user shall be charged on a monthly basis.

B. The monthly wastewater collection and treatment service charge for each property owner or user, domestic, commercial, or industrial in nature, whose water consumption is not metered shall be fixed by the city council based upon the rate established in the rate schedule above and the cubic feet of water discharged into the collection system as determined by the city administrator; provided, however, that in the case of single-family residential dwellings, with unmetered or unavailable water discharge data, cubic feet discharge shall be deemed to be four hundred (400) cubic feet per month for dwellings with less than three (3) permanent residents, and eight hundred (800) cubic feet per month for dwellings with three (3) or more residents.

C. Each nonresidential property owner not serviced by a public water supplier with water, but having a private well or water supply, shall install and maintain at his or its own expense a water meter capable of measuring the total gallons per day of water being used. The meter shall:

1. Be approved by the city administrator prior to installation;
2. Be installed within sixty (60) days of the receipt of approval for installation;
3. Be situated on property accessible to the city, its agents or employees daily between the hours of eight o'clock (8:00) A.M. and six o'clock (6:00) P.M.

D. Industrial user fees shall be computed on a monthly basis using the average monthly flow from a city meter if all water used by such facility goes through the city meter and the average monthly BOD developed by Jerome wastewater treatment sampling schedule (minimum 3 composite samples per week), to establish classification.

1. In the event that all water used is not metered, then the monthly average flow based on the required continuous flow monitoring system at outfall of user and monthly average BOD will be used. (Ord. 1084, 2011: Ord. 1076, 2010)

13.20.060: REVIEW AND ADJUSTMENT OF CHARGES:

The city shall annually review the user charges for wastewater collection and treatment. Adjustments shall be made by resolution as needed to ensure that adequate revenue will be acquired to balance expenditures for wastewater collection and treatment and to maintain an equitable system of user charges. (Ord. 622 §4, 1979: prior code §23-41(F))

This ordinance shall be effective following passage and publication as required by law.

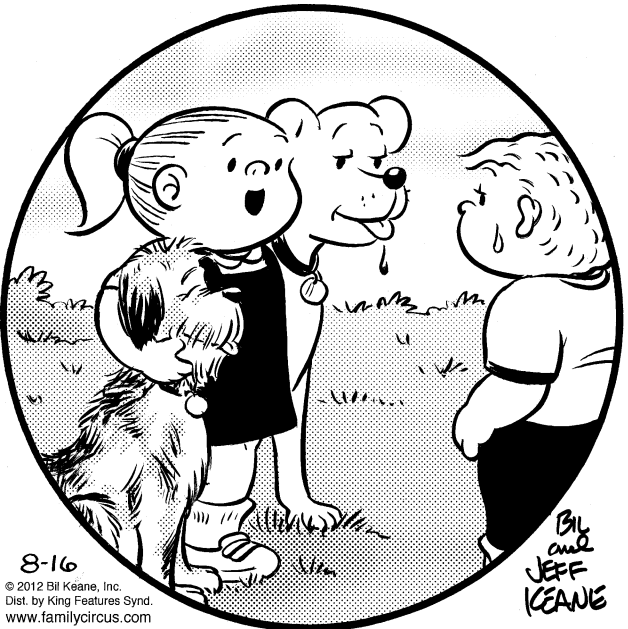

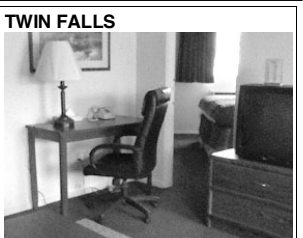

In 1812, Detroit fell to British and Indian forces in the War of 1812.

In 1861, President Abraham Lincoln issued Proclamation 86, which prohibited the states of the Union from engaging in commercial trade with states in rebellion — i.e., the Confederacy.

In 1858, a telegraphed message from Britain's Queen Victoria to President James Buchanan was transmitted over the recently laid trans-Atlantic cable.

In 1920, Ray Chapman of the Cleveland Indians was struck in the head by a pitch thrown by Carl Mays of the New York Yankees; Chapman died the following morning.

In 1937, the American Federation of Radio Artists was chartered.

In 1948, baseball legend Babe Ruth died in New York at age 53.

In 1954, Sports Illustrated was first published by Time Inc.

In 1956, Adlai E. Stevenson was nominated for president at the Democratic national convention in Chicago.

In 1977, Elvis Presley died at his Graceland estate in Memphis, Tenn., at age 42.

In 1987, 156 people were killed when Northwest Airlines Flight 255 crashed while trying to take off from Detroit; the sole survivor was 4-year-old Cecelia Cichan (SHEE'-an). People worldwide began a two-day celebration of the "harmonic convergence," which heralded what believers called the start of a new, purer age of humankind.

In 1991, Pope John Paul II began the first-ever papal visit to Hungary.

Ten years ago: Major League Baseball players set a strike deadline of Aug. 30. (Both sides finally reached an agreement with just six hours to spare.) Terrorist mastermind Abu Nidal reportedly was found shot to death in Baghdad, Iraq; he was 65. Former United Auto Workers president Stephen P. Yokich died in Detroit at age 66.

Five years ago: Jose Padilla (hoh-ZAY' puh-DEE'-uh), a U.S. citizen held for 3½ years as an enemy combatant, was convicted in Miami of helping Islamic extremists and plotting overseas attacks. (Padilla, once accused of plotting with al-Qaida to detonate a radioactive "dirty bomb," was later sentenced to 17 years and four months in prison on the unrelated terror support charges.) A cave-in killed three rescuers in the Crandall Canyon Mine in Utah; the search for six trapped miners was later abandoned.

One year ago: Chancellor Angela Merkel of Germany and French President Nicolas Sarkozy, meeting in Paris, called for greater economic discipline and unity among European nations but declined to take immediate financial measures.


