SAVING THE SAWTOOTH

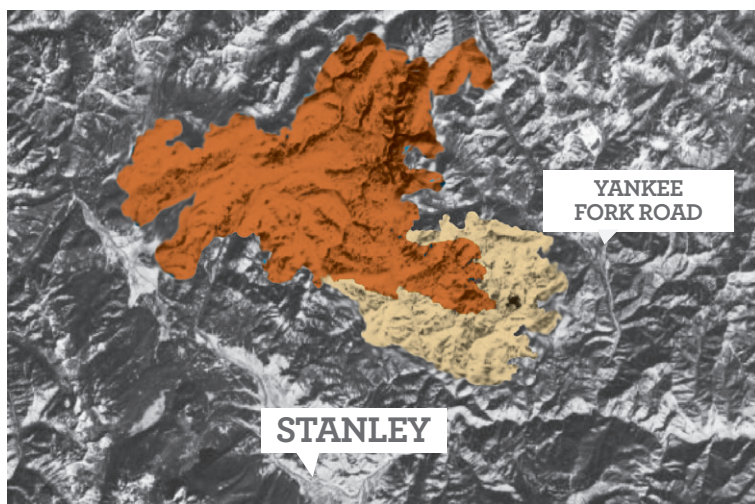
As the Halstead Fire swells, forces evacuations; Stanley businesses try to carry on as usual.

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STANLEY • Tourists from across the country flock to Stanley for the jagged mountain tops that give the Sawtooth Forest its name. But lately, those views have been shrouded in haze, with smoke from the Halstead Fire dulling the stunning scenery.

While Stanley is still open for business, visitors and residents are keeping a wary eye on the smoke rising from the hills as crews work to save outlying homes.

But east toward Challis, life isn't continuing as usual. On Thursday, the fire loomed north of Stanley, but was spreading southeast, away from the town directly toward Sunbeam. Camps along Highway 75, normally busy in late summer, are closed for the season.

Earlier in the week, residents along the highway received a 48-hour evacuation notice. Though they didn't have to leave immedi-

ately, officials told them to be prepared to flee.

Late Thursday, the Custer County Sheriff's Office issued an evacuation notice for the 21 households in the area along Yankee Fork, including Custer and Sunbeam. Some of those are seasonal cabins, said public information officer Bruce Palmer, while others are permanent residences.

The biggest priorities for fire crews are saving structures, keeping Highway 75 open and preventing power outages, said Tara Ross, public information officer for the Halstead Fire.

The fire is in steep terrain, so instead of putting crews directly on the fire line, workers are focused on preventative measures near structures southeast of the fire: digging trenches, doing back-burns, doing whatever they can to

get rid of fuel near cabins and homes.

For now, they're waiting for the fire to come to them.

Boy Scout Camp Spared

While residents along Highway 75 were holding their breath, Magic Valley Boy Scouts are sighing with relief.

When lightning sparked the fire on July 27, the popular scout camp had to close for the summer and send campers home.

At one point, the fire came within a mile of the site, managed by the Twin Falls-based Snake River Council. Camp employees had three hours to remove food before fire crews cut power to the camp, but had to leave vehicles, canoes, and

HEYBURN BOY RECOVERING AFTER DOG ATTACK

HEYBURN • Ten-year-old Quinten Haertle was recovering at home Friday after receiving a serious dog bite to the face the day before.

"The doctors did a wonderful job stitching up his face. There are so many stitches I can't count them," said Quinten's father, Steve Haertle.

Quinten was chased and bitten by a Great Dane, owned by Ruth Elisa Rockwell, in the 1800 block of L Street at about 2:45 p.m. Thursday, according to a Heyburn police report.

The dog has been quarantined for 10 days at the Minidoka County animal shelter so it can be tested for rabies.

"We would like to have the dog destroyed," Steve Haertle said.

According to a witness, the dog jumped through a fence and attacked the boy, leaving the child laying in a fetal position, covering his face and screaming.

Quinten was taken by ambulance to Minidoka Memorial Hospital.

"He's in a lot of pain right now," Steve Haertle said.

his own home, when the attack occurred.

When the dog escaped from the fence, his father said, Quinten took off running and the dog jumped on him.

Quinten did nothing to antagonize or provoke the dog, Steve Haertle said.

Quinten suffered injuries to the lower portion of his jaw on the right side of his face, up to his ear.

"He's pretty bruised up," Steve Haertle said.

According to the police report, Quinten also sustained puncture wounds to the back of his head and had a small laceration on his left knee.

The report said Rockwell captured the dog and put it in a kennel inside her home. She was cooperative with police and brought the dog out to animal control on a leash.

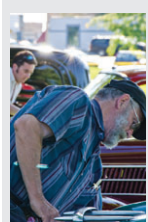
"Ruth was also very concerned about the boy who had been injured," the report reads.

Rockwell showed police where the dog had knocked over the fence and where the family was in the process of building a new wooden fence.

The dog was friendly toward police and showed no signs of aggression, the report said.

According to the report, no charges are being filed at this time.

Buhl Levy Vote Nears

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BUHL • With a new school year on the horizon, the Buhl School District's supplemental levy election is also just weeks away.

The school district is seeking a new two-year, \$400,000 annual levy during the Aug. 28 election.

Superintendent Byron Stutzman said the funding would cover school district operating expenses, as well as balance the budget.

"We need the levy in order

for us to quit deficit-spending," he said, noting that it's the wrong direction for the district.

Stutzman said the school district's budget this year includes about \$454,000 more in expenses than revenue.

Residents within the Buhl School District's boundaries are eligible to vote in the election this month.

"I hope that everyone in this community would step up and support us," Stutzman said.

Healthy Snacks Your Child Will Like

My kids, ages 8 and 10, go back to school in a couple of weeks. They are very active in sports after school. Do you have any suggestions on healthy eating and healthy snacks once we get back into our fall routine?

Answered by Alisa Rawson, MS, RD, LD, Clinical Nutrition Services/MSTI, Dietitian:

One of the best ways to promote healthy eating is to include your children in the planning and making of the meals and snacks when possible. If they have input, they are more likely to eat what is prepared. Make sure that you touch on all of the food groups, including snack time, for a well-rounded, healthy diet. Being active promotes a healthy appetite and is an important component of the daily routine.

Choose whole grains at least half of the time, like whole wheat bread, pitas or crackers instead of refined, white flour products. Calcium is also important for

growing children. In addition to milk, yogurt is a good choice as well. Flavored varieties of dairy products, such as chocolate or strawberry milk, do contribute additional sugar but can still be used to contribute toward calcium and vitamin D intake. Try half flavored and half regular for a more balanced approach!

Choose fruits and vegetables that are in season. Fresh is best! Try not to rely only on juices as they may contain high sugar content. Juices that contain 100 percent juice are best, but don't confuse this with juices that say they contain 100 percent Vitamin C. They could contain more sugar than you might expect. If you have a difficult time getting your child to eat vegetables, choose one of the vegetable juices or other juices that combine both fruits and vegetables.

Cutting vegetables and fruits in interesting shapes or sticks, which can be dipped in healthy foods like yogurt, low-fat ranch dressing, hummus, salsa, peanut butter or applesauce, can help your child with mid-afternoon snack cravings and

provide energy for those sports activities.

A few other ideas for healthy snacking: Peel a banana and dip it in yogurt, roll in crushed cereal and freeze. Dip pita chips in hummus. Spread peanut butter on apple slices or celery. Fill a waffle cone with cut-up fruit and low-fat vanilla yogurt. Make snack kabobs - put cubes of low-fat cheese and grapes on pretzel sticks. Toast a whole-grain waffle and top with low-fat yogurt and sliced peaches.

Protein is also important for growing kids. Choose lean meats when possible and prepare without added fat.

If you are on the go, prepare some items beforehand and keep them in the refrigerator. Individual bags of carrots and celery, easy-to-carry fruit like apples, cheese sticks, granola bars, and 100 percent juice drinks are easily transported and can give your kids the energy they need to play sports.

Hydration is always important to remember, especially in the fall when temperatures are still very warm. Each child can have their own water bottle which is economical, too!

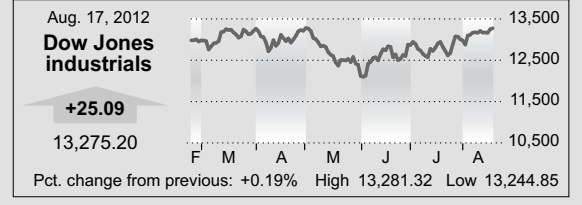

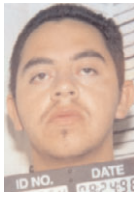

Campbell, Cannon Chosen as T.F. and Cassia Judges

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TWIN FALLS • Two new magistrate judges were selected Friday for courtrooms in Twin Falls and Cassia counties.

Blaine Cannon, a Cassia County deputy prosecutor, will become Cassia County's newest judge — replacing former Cassia County Magistrate Judge Rick Bollar, who himself just moved to perform the same role in a Minidoka County courtroom.

Current Gooding County Prosecutor Calvin Campbell will change roles to take the bench in Twin Falls. He replaces Nicole Cannon, who stepped down earlier this year about two months after she was cited for driving under the influence in Boise. A jury trial has been scheduled for her in Ada County on Aug. 28.

The announcement comes after eight judges were interviewed Friday by the 5th District Magistrates Commission for the two vacancies.

Campbell, 46, has served as Gooding County's prosecutor since 2005 and as the Camas County prosecutor since 1997 — for Camas, he's appointed in lieu of a candidate for elected office in that county. He was a deputy prosecuting

attorney in the Twin Falls County Prosecutor's Office from 1996 to 1998.

He has also served as a city attorney for Wendell, Fairfield, Gooding, Hagerman and Boise. From 1998 to 2001, Campbell was an associate attorney with the Greg Fuller Law Office. He then practiced solo in Jerome until 2005.

He received his bachelor's in political science from Boise State University and his law degree from the University of Idaho.

Blaine Cannon, 43, has been a deputy prosecutor in Cassia County since 2001. He is the ex-husband of Nicole Cannon.

Before becoming a Cassia County prosecutor, he worked with the Minidoka County Public Defender's Office as well as the firm of Byington, Holloway, Whipple and Jones. Cannon was also a law clerk from 1997 to 1998. He received a bachelor's in economics from Brigham Young University and his law degree from the J. Reuben Clark (BYU) Law School in Utah.

After their appointment, magistrate judges serve an 18-month probation period. After that period each judge stands for an election in their county, and if retained serves a four-year term.

West Nile Confirmed in Twin Falls County

TWIN FALLS • The first West Nile virus-infected mosquito of the season has been found in Twin Falls County, officials announced Friday.

The Twin Falls County Pest Abatement District found the infected mosquito to trap during a routine surveillance just west of Buhl. Twin Falls County now joins seven other Idaho counties that have tested positive for West Nile this year.

“Personally I’m surprised we haven’t gotten it sooner,” said Kirk Tubbs, manager of TFCPAD. “Given how warm it is, given what we’re seeing across the state, it was kind of expected.”

The infected trap was found near a site that tested positive for West Nile in 2009. The area is lightly populated but horse owners should be on alert since horses can contract the disease from mosquitoes, Tubbs said.

TFCPAD surveyors plan

on trapping and testing again for West Nile on Monday to monitor if the amount of mosquitoes is increasing, Tubbs said.

“As a control district, we’re going to study that area more to find out what about that area is attractive to West Nile mosquitoes,” he said. “It’s definitely going to get more attention.”

TFCPAD urges Twin Falls County residents to remain on alert against infected mosquitoes. Here are a few tips to help avoid getting bit:

- Use EPA-approved insect repellents like DEET.
- Wear long pants and long-sleeved shirts between sunset and sunrise hours when mosquitoes are most active.

• Remove all standing water from lawns and fields. Mosquitoes use these areas to lay eggs.

• Clean water troughs once a week to reduce mosquito larvae.

the only district in south-central Idaho seeking a supplemental levy during this month’s election.

So far this year, voters have passed levies for 12 area school districts.

It will be the Buhl district’s third levy attempt in recent years. Two past ballot measures — the latest was in May 2011 — failed by narrow margins.

If the school district’s ballot measure passes during this month’s election, homeowners’ tax rates would increase by an estimated 82 cents per \$1,000 in assessed property value.

Stutzman said he’s not a fan of property tax increases, but placed the larger issue on state legislators — wishing they would step up to fix disparities he sees in the state’s school funding system.

But for residents with a \$100,000 home, he said the tax increase would be the equivalent of one Happy Meal per month.

If a levy doesn’t pass, the school district will have to make cuts. Stutzman said there isn’t a specific plan of what would be eliminated.

“We will have to cut things if we do not have a supplemental levy in place,” he said. “It’s just a matter of what.”

Jerome Schools Participate in STEM Research Project

JEROME • The Jerome School District is one of 12 districts statewide participating in the University of Idaho/Micron STEM Education Research Initiative.

The initiative focuses on science, technology, engineering and math education in Idaho.

The five-year project — funded by a \$1.2 million Micron Foundation gift — looks at the factors involved in students’ academic pursuits and

particularly, in STEM areas.

Community focus groups and a statewide survey of adults were completed during the first two years of the project.

This year, researchers will survey students and their parents in the fourth, seventh and 10th grades. Students and parents in randomly selected classes will be invited to participate through their schools.

A statewide teacher survey also will be implemented this winter.

Afghan Officer Kills Two U.S. Soldiers

KABUL (AP) • A member of the Afghan security forces killed two U.S. troops Friday morning — the most recent in a string of insider attacks that threaten to undermine U.S.-Afghan military relations. An officer in the Afghan Local Police shot and killed two Americans in the western province of Farah during a training exercise on an Afghan base, according to Abdul Rahman, a spokesman for the provincial governor. U.S. military officials confirmed the two deaths. The assassin was shot and killed, according to a statement. The attack occurred hours after Taliban leader Mohammad Omar issued a statement boasting of insurgents' ability to infiltrate the Afghan security forces — a tactic that he said limits the number of civilian casualties. "Mujaheddin have clev-

erly infiltrated in the ranks of the enemy according to the plan given to them last year," he said in the message to the Afghan people marking this weekend's Eid al-Fitr festival. "They are able to [safely] enter bases, offices and intelligence centers of the enemy. Then, they easily carry out decisive and coordinated attacks." Later Friday, an Afghan soldier turned his weapon against foreign troops in Kandahar province in southern Afghanistan, according to military officials. That attack left three NATO troops wounded. The so-called "insider attacks" have occurred sporadically in Afghanistan for years, but they have risen sharply in the past six months — and particularly in the past 10 days. Eight U.S. service members have been killed by employees of the Afghan security forces since last Thursday.

Romney, Obama Turn Attentions to Medicare

SOUTHAMPTON, N.Y. (AP) • The jobs-and-economy election suddenly seems all about Medicare — for now, at least. Republican Mitt Romney is embracing a topic his party usually approaches gingerly. He is taking a calculated risk that voters' worries about federal deficits and the Democrats' health care overhaul have opened the door for a robust debate on the solvency of Medicare, the insurance program for retirees. President Barack Obama is welcoming the conversation, which has temporarily taken attention from the weak economic recovery. One party may regret its position on Nov. 6. Retirees in politically prized states such as Florida often resist changes in Medicare, one of the government's most popular but costliest programs. But GOP strategists say today's voters realize Medicare spending must be constrained, and Romney is banking on disenchantment with Obama's 2010 health care law to pave the way for his own proposals. Romney, who spent

more than a year running almost entirely on the economy and jobs, put Medicare at the campaign's center when he chose his running mate. Rep. Paul Ryan is Congress' chief advocate of significantly re-straining the program. Ryan did not address his Medicare plan at a campaign stop in Glen Allen, Va., on Friday, a break from the previous day's events in Ohio, where the issue figured prominently in his remarks. But the Wisconsin congressman is expected to revisit Medicare in some depth in Florida on Saturday. "We will not duck the tough issues; we will lead," Ryan told the Virginia crowd. Romney's willingness to tackle the issue was underscored Thursday when he used a marker and classroom-type whiteboard to summarize his thoughts on Medicare, with hardly a word about the unemployment rate. He said his plans would keep Medicare solvent while Obama's would not, a claim Democrats call absurd.

July Marked Worst Month for Army Suicides

WASHINGTON POST WASHINGTON • Thirty-eight soldiers killed themselves in July, the worst month for suicides since the Army began releasing figures in 2009, according to Pentagon officials. If soldiers continue to take their lives at the current rate, the Army will lose about 200 active-duty troops this year, a number that is higher than any year in the past decade. "Suicide is the toughest enemy I have faced in my 37

years in the Army," Gen. Lloyd Austin said in a written statement. "That said, I do believe suicide is preventable." In July there were 26 active-duty suicides and 12 suicides among National Guardsmen and reservists who were not serving in uniform at the time of their deaths. The combined 38 Army suicides is twice the number of troops killed in Afghanistan this month. The Marine Corps had eight suicides in July, the highest monthly number so far this year.

Taking Heat for Fighting Fires

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) • If lightning strikes in the New Mexico wilderness and starts a fire, the blaze would normally be little more than a blip on the radar of land managers who have earned a reputation for letting flames burn to keep forested lands from growing into a tangled mess. This season is different. Now firefighters are trekking deep into the Gila National Forest with trains of equipment-carrying horses and one overriding goal: snuffing out all fires. The U.S. Forest Service's decision is temporary. The agency's about-face has drawn criticism from watchdog groups, some scientists fear the agency might be setting the stage for a more destructive season next year. "At a time of both drought in the interior West and overall increases in average global temperatures, we will be seeing more fire on the landscape and not less. Yet this policy attempts to put our hands over our eyes and deny that reality," said Andy Stahl, executive director of Forest Service Employees for Environmental Ethics. "Rather than making our landscapes more fire resilient, we're going to return to the mid-20th century approach and earlier of trying to stamp out every fire,

which we can't do," he added. Forest Service officials acknowledge that decades of fire suppression have combined with drought, a changing climate and invasive insects to turn much of the West into a tinder box. The deci-

sion was purely financial. "We don't want to do this long-term," said Forest Service Deputy Chief Jim Hubbard. "We know being able to use fire makes good sense, and we know some forests are very good at it."

Punk Band Gets Prison, World Protests in Response

MOSCOW (AP) • Three punk rock-style activists who briefly took over a cathedral in a prayer for deliverance from Vladimir Putin were sentenced to two years in prison for hooliganism on Friday, a decision that drew protests around the world as it highlighted the Russian president's intensifying crackdown on dissent. Protesters from Moscow

to New York and musicians including Madonna and Paul McCartney condemned the prosecution of the three women, members of a band called Pussy Riot. Several countries, including the U.S. and even some Kremlin loyalists, decried the verdict. Nadezhda Tolokonnikova, 22, Maria Alekhina, 24, and Yekaterina Samutsevich, 30, were arrested in March after

performing a "punk prayer" in Christ the Savior Cathedral, dancing and high-kicking as they called on the Virgin Mary to save Russia from Putin, who was elected to a third term as Russia's president two weeks later. Judge Marina Syrova ruled Friday that the band members had "committed hooliganism driven by religious hatred."

More Prying Eyes on Federal Computers

THE WASHINGTON POST WASHINGTON • When the Food and Drug Administration started spying on a group of agency scientists, it installed monitoring software on their laptops to capture their communications. The software could do more than vacuum up the scientists' emails as they complained to lawmakers and others about medical devices they thought were dangerous. It could be programmed to intercept a tweet or Facebook post. Prompted by the WikiLeaks scandals, the government is secretly capturing a far richer, more granular picture of their communications. Federal workers' personal computers are also increasingly seen as fair game, experts said. Agencies outside the field of intelligence spent \$5.6 billion in fiscal 2011 to safeguard their classified information.

Letting Good Teachers Get Away

Editor's note: The following editorial appeared in Friday's Washington Post:

A comprehensive study three years ago by the New Teacher Project showed how U.S. schools generally fail to recognize teacher quality, instead treating all teachers the same. Now comes an even more devastating finding from the group: Even when schools know the difference between good and bad teachers, they make no special effort to retain the good ones. Just as the previous report spurred improvements in teacher evaluation systems, this study should prompt changes in how teachers are treated.

The aptly named report, "The Irreplaceables," concludes that the real teacher retention crisis in urban schools is not about the number of teachers who are leaving but the loss of really good ones. The two-year study identified the top 20 percent of teachers whose students consistently make the most progress on state exams. Not only do these teachers on average help students learn two to three additional months' worth of math and reading compared to the average teacher (and five to six months more compared to low-performing teachers), but they also get high marks from students.

Yet the researchers found

little effort by districts to hold on to these top performers.

Only 47 percent of these high-performing teachers said they ever got praised for their work, and only 26 percent were encouraged to take leadership roles. Particularly shocking was the finding that two-thirds of the best teachers were never asked to stay when they told principals of their plans to depart.

"Our findings suggest that Irreplaceables usually leave for reasons that their school could have controlled," the report says.

The study identifies some simple, low-cost strategies that could help boost teacher retention, such as giving positive feedback. Other reforms will be harder to accomplish. Paramount is doing away with lockstep compensation systems that prevent top teachers from being properly paid, particularly early in their careers, when they are most likely to move on; layoff policies that are blind to quality; and onerous dismissal rules that make it difficult to fire a tenured teacher for performance. That being the best doesn't earn you more money or protect your job helps explain why the teaching profession lacks the respect it deserves. Identifying these problems is a critical step, so it was encouraging that a representative from the National Education Association, the largest teachers union, was onstage for the report's release.

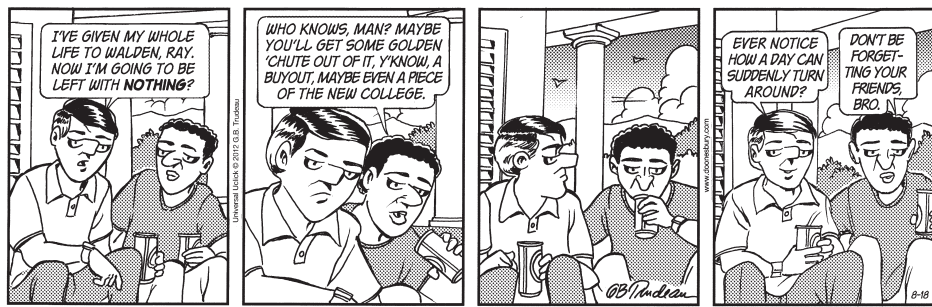

Fire Crews Prepare to Defend Featherville

FEATHERVILLE • Firefighters battling the Trinity Ridge Fire Friday found their work complicated by the hot, dry weather and increased winds of the previous day.

The fire is about five miles from Featherville and Atlanta and about 15 miles from Pine. Firefighters continued to focus on protecting structures in Featherville and Pine Friday and crews did a fire simulation exercise Thursday in the Featherville area to familiarize themselves with the community in case they

are needed.

Crews also prepared for a possible backburn on the north side of Pine at North Pine-Featherville Road toward the ridge running west to Dog Mountain, though Pine is not currently threatened by the fire.

Today, the American Red Cross of Greater Idaho will provide water and food for evacuees from the fire at the Pine Senior Center. Meals will be served at noon and 6 p.m. and water and snacks will be available throughout the day.

The Red Cross is also opening an overnight shelter at the Pine Resort for evac-

uees and caseworkers will be on hand.

Members of the Idaho National Guard will arrive as early as Sunday to assist with road closures. Details are currently being worked out, but the incident commander requested 80 Idaho National Guard members to staff 20 checkpoints, 24 hours a day.

Ketchum Fire Shrinks

A fire west of Ketchum on Red Warrior Creek Ridge is smaller than fire officials thought Thursday night, but crews are determined to get

the fire out soon, Sawtooth National Forest spokeswoman Julie Thomas said.

The Enclosure Fire now measures 250 acres, Thomas said.

“Our intention is to put this fire out,” she said. “With all the other fires in the state resources are so thin.”

Two Hot Shot crews and a Type 1 helicopter were due to join the effort Friday, she said.

Thomas said crews have used retardant on the fire. It has torched some timber, but is mainly in grassy areas.

The fire is expected to be fully contained by 8 p.m. today.

“Control will come a day or two after that,” Thomas said.

Trails in the Greenhorn Gulch area and trails south of Warm Springs are closed due to the fire.

BLM Squashes Small Starts

A 2,500-acre fire burned U.S. Bureau of Land Management land in the Murphy Hot Springs area.

The Diamond Ranch Fire was reported at about 6:30 p.m. Thursday. The lightning-caused fire was contained at 1 p.m. Friday and control was expected by 8

p.m. that night.

South of Shoshone, the Notch Butte Fire was reported Thursday evening and controlled at 6 p.m. Friday at 1,894 acres. The fire was originally estimated at 900 acres, but better maps revealed its larger size, BLM spokeswoman Kyli Gough said.

The fire was human-caused but Gough said investigators aren't sure what exactly started the fire.

Another 60-acre fire four miles east of Shoshone was reported at 8 p.m. Thursday and was fully extinguished by midnight. It was also human-caused, Gough said.

sailboats, tents and supplies behind.

But crews worked aggressively to save the camp, and as of Thursday afternoon, the affected area near Bradley was contained. From the center of the camp, most of the fire's destruction isn't visible. A few hot spots continued to smoke in the hills, and burnt treetops peaked through the forest, but otherwise, the camp looks the same as it did.

Walk three minutes from the camp to see just how devastating the fire could have been.

To get rid of fuel, fire crews did a backburn and cut down trees. The area where they worked is blackened and lifeless, offering a reminder of a grim fate Camp Bradley avoided.

Pine Beetle Effect

The Halstead Fire is burning hot and fast, spreading through rugged mountains. As of Friday afternoon, it claimed more than 83,000 acres and was expected to grow. Officials don't expect it to be contained until mid-October.

Part of the reason the fire is thriving is the abundance of fuel from trees decimated by mountain pine beetles.

The beetle infestation, which started in the late 1990s, killed large swaths of trees throughout Idaho, especially in areas near Stanley. The withered, gray trees killed by beetles provide prime nourishment for the flames.

“That's been one of the biggest problems with this fire,” Ross said. The flames jump from treetop to treetop, flaring up to huge heights within the patches of dead wood.

Though the fire is moving away from Stanley, it could still have big implications for the town.

If flames take down power lines on Highway 75, it could cut electricity to residents and businesses in the Stanley Basin.

Firefighters From Across the Country

A crew from Florida, which arrived only two days before, spent Thursday afternoon

clearing brush and grass near power poles along the highway near Lower Stanley.

The group was one of several from across the country who came to Idaho to work on the fire. Tom Coletti, senior forest ranger for the Florida Forest Service, said his crew is made up of full-time firefighters. He showed off a dried alligator foot attached to his helmet.

But Idaho fires offer new challenges compared to those in the Everglades.

“It's a whole different ball game out here,” Coletti said.

Tourist Season

On Thursday, the inversion lifted by mid-afternoon, but a dramatic smoke column rose above the hills northeast of the town. East on Highway 75, the sky darkened with shades of orange and purple. Drivers stopped along the highway to snap photos of the apocalyptic scene.

The smoke wasn't stopping visitors from enjoying Elkhorn Hot Springs, east of Lower Stanley.

Ivan and Sharon Bloxham had driven up to springs from their campsite at nearby Redfish Lake. The Pocatello residents said the fire didn't affect their trip, and while the air quality was bad when they drove through Challis, the camp's air was “great,” Ivan said.

But other tourists have chosen to stay away, to the frustration of Stanley businesses.

Riverwear employee Kathy Rogerson blamed the rumor mill for a decline in business.

“I'm hoping there's not going to be any issue,” Helfrich said. Though the access points have been tricky, Helfrich said the Forest Service had been great about working with outfitters to keep them operating safely during the fire, she said.

So far, Helfrich River Outfitters haven't had to cancel any trips. But if they did, it wouldn't be the first time fire forced rafting companies to alter plans, said Helfrich, whose business has been operating since 1925.

“These things come up periodically. You just kind of have to roll with the punches,” she said. “With Mother Nature, you can't do much about her.”

Yosemite Tourist Dies from Hantavirus

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) • A popular lodging area in Yosemite National Park could be linked to a rare rodent-borne disease that has killed a California tourist who stayed there this summer, officials said.

A man who stayed at Curry Village in June died after contracting hantavirus pulmonary syndrome. A woman who also stayed in a canvas tent cabin about 100 feet from him on overlapping days has become seriously ill, park officials said.

The virus was found in the feces of deer mice in the family friendly lodging area of cabins, according to tests by the Centers for Disease Control and state health officials.

"There's no way to tell for sure, but state health officials feel they may have contracted it here in Curry Village," park spokesman Scott Gediman said.

The man, who was from Alameda County in the San Francisco Bay area, would be the first person to die from the disease contracted in the park, though two others were stricken in a more remote area in 2000 and 2010, officials said.

Hantavirus develops from breathing in dust contami-

nated with rodent droppings, urine or saliva. Early symptoms include fever and muscle aches, chills, headaches, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain and coughing.

State health spokesman Ralph Montano said officials were advising anyone with those symptoms to seek medical attention and let doctors know if they were camping in Yosemite. He said thousands of people visit the park every month, so it would be impossible to track everyone who had set foot in Curry Village.

No other cases have been reported, but symptoms can show up one to six weeks after exposure. There is no specific treatment for the virus, and about one-third of people who contract it will die. The sick woman, who is from Southern California, was expected to survive.

Curry Village is the most popular and economical lodging area in the park, a picturesque assemblage of rustic cabins at the base of the 3,000-foot promontory Glacier Point. Earlier this summer, park officials made some of the area off-limits when a geologist's report revealed potential rock fall dangers.

Park concessionaire officials are telling visitors when they call to make reservations that an outbreak has occurred, said spokeswoman Lisa Cesaro.

On Friday, thousands of dollars were raised for future scholarships. That's totaled through the tournament entry fees, hole sponsorships of \$100 or more, and other odds and ends like food revenue and carnival-style mini-games like card games and putting contests.

WEMA also watches gates at the Twin Falls County Fair, which raises a little more money, but the golf tournament is the dominant fundraising force. For this school year, the organization awarded \$13,000 worth of scholarships to 21 students.

"There was a group of guys that really wanted to see money spent here in local things, and help the local Buhl-Castleford deal," said Buhl McClain, WEMA member and tournament organizer. "We really want to look at the youth thing, Girls State, Boys State, maybe something musical, along

with scholarships?"

In order to be considered for a scholarship, applicants must be from a family that lives in the West End — they need not necessarily attend school in Castleford or Buhl, however — and they must enroll in an Idaho college, university or trade school. Students of all undergraduate levels are considered, not just incoming freshmen.

"Sophomore, junior, senior years in school is just as expensive as freshman year, and there are a lot of things available for freshmen," said McClain. "It gets a little thinner for the sophomores, juniors, seniors."

Students pursuing agriculture-related studies are given priority consideration, Hamilton said, but all course paths are eligible for an award. Awards typically range between \$500-\$1,000. Fund totals raised from the tournament weren't immediately available, but McClain estimated the golf revenue would roughly equal last year's.

Edmunds, the state board president, said via teleconference to the Boise meeting.

Five of six members of the Idaho education board present at the Friday afternoon meeting voted in favor of the successful motion, which also authorizes University of Idaho President Duane Nellis to "negotiate the final terms and determine whether to accept an invitation," to Idaho join the Big Sky in non-football sports.

Idaho is unaffiliated with any conference for football scheduling beyond the upcoming season, according to state board background information.

Idaho expects to exit the Western Athletic Conference, which "is currently unable to support intercollegiate football after the end of the 2012-13 athletic season, with only two of the four current members (University of Idaho and New Mexico State) running football programs," according to the state board information.

The motion that passed Friday afternoon during a special meeting of the state board would allow the Vandals to go to the Big Sky in football if the potential scheduling of football games as an independent failed to work out, according to Kent Nelson, UI's legal counsel, who drafted the successful motion.

"It does not allow us to go to any other conference than the Big Sky," Nelson said.

Nellis said the UI wants to "explore" the possibility of membership in the Big Sky in the Olympic, non-football sports — "such as basketball, volley, soccer, et cetera."

Said Nellis: "This strategy would provide the same access to the NCAA championships that we currently have with the WAC while also making significant geographic sense, reestablishing some historic rivalries, and it would be helpful to our fans, and also reduce our travel costs."

The UI wants flexibility in its football scheduling, university officials said.

"We truly believe that this

is not at an end; that this is a continuing process that will evolve over the next year to two years," Nellis said via teleconference to Boise.

Nellis added: "We believe that playing as an independent in football is the best solution for our university, for our student athletes, and for our program. Playing as an independent in football allows us to develop an attractive football schedule for our fans while maintaining our FBS (Football Bowl Subdivision) status. This strategy also offers several positives related to game guarantees and potential BCS (Bowl Championship Series) revenue which allow us to continue to survey the college landscape."

False Ideas People Have About God

Maybe the most asked questions by people of all generations are these: "Is there a God?" or "What is God like?"

When asked, how would you respond to the questions?

- "A vague spirit that is everywhere?"
- "A ball of fire who loves you?"
- "He's kind of like Zeus, an old man in a toga?"
- "The old man upstairs?"

These are actual responses given by people concerning God. There are many false ideas about who God is.

An obvious falsity is that there is no God at all. It may be true that most Americans believe in a "higher being" of some sort, yet the belief that there is no God at all is proclaimed by a loud minority. The truth about God is known to us instinctively: God has put this awareness in our very being.

Since earliest times men have seen the earth and sky and all that God has made and have known of his existence and great eternal power. We have not excuse (Romans 1:19-20.) The fool has said in his heart, "There is no God" (Psalm 14:1-3.)

A second false idea about God is the belief that God may exist but can never be known. Jesus often dealt with crowds of people who had no desire to know God. He said, "You will keep on hearing, but will not understand; and you will keep on seeing, but will not perceive; for the heart of this people has become dull (Matthew 13:14-15.)

A third false idea about God is the idea that he is permissive or weak. God is neither. He sees all and knows all. Even what is done in secret, Christ will judge according to the plumb-line of the law and the grace

granted at the cross to all who believe (Romans 2:16.)

A fourth false idea, and likely the most popular, is that God is an angry "cosmic killjoy" determined to make life miserable for all.

Maybe you have even questioned whether God really has our best interest in mind.

In spite of our sinful nature, our craving to disobey God and his standard, God really has great interest in you and all of humanity. Knowing that all have sinned (Romans 3:23), he still holds a standard or righteousness that is required of all who would seek him. Because we don't meet that standard, he provided a "scapegoat." He is no "cosmic killjoy," he is not permissive or weak, he does exist and can be known and found by those who "earnestly seek for him" (Jeremiah 29:13)

Do you wonder about God? Are you sure that the god you know is Almighty God? God introduced himself to Moses as "I AM" and Jesus said "I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life. No one comes to the Father except through me."

Stop making a god for yourself, repent of your sinful nature and look unto Christ Jesus to declare you righteous. Bless him because he has set a standard of righteousness, and rejoice in him because he has made a way to the Father.

TWIN FALLS • Whenever the sun was up for the past month, Bakhriddin Yusupov has refrained from eating.

Only when night fell did he reach for food to fill his hungry body.

During the time of fasting, however, he received a different type of nourishment — spiritual.

Yusupov, the imam or leader at the Islamic Center of Twin Falls, and other Muslims in the Magic Valley and across the globe will end their month-long fast on Sunday, the conclusion of the holy period of Ramadan.

Ramadan, a term which literally means "scorching" in Arabic, is the ninth month of the Islamic calendar. During this period, Muslims refrain from food, drink and sexual activities from sunup to sundown — or from about 4:30 a.m. to 9 p.m., Yusupov said. They can eat and drink after sunset, except for pork and alcohol, which they are not supposed to consume anyway.

Ramadan was established as a Holy Month for Muslims after the Quran was revealed to the Prophet Muhammad in 610 AD on the occasion known as Laylat al-Qadr, frequently translated as "the Night of Power." Observance of Ramadan is mandated in the Quran.

Because the cycle of the lunar calendar does not match the solar calendar, the dates of Ramadan shift by about 11 days each year. In 2011, Ramadan began on Aug. 1. This year it began on July 20 and ends on Sunday.

Muslims fast during Ramadan in an effort to cleanse the body and

enlighten the mind by focusing on more spiritual aspects of their lives.

"We have 12 months, and we eat and eat and eat," Yusupov said. "But one month we don't eat."

Going without food or drink for such long stretches of the day might be difficult for some people, but Yusupov said it is not difficult for him.

For starters he works most days, which keeps his mind focused on other things. And by observing Ramadan over the years, he's learned to discipline himself to the point that fasting has become easier. He also knows he's doing what is required by the Quran; that alone is powerful, he said.

"There is not really the feeling of thirst or hunger," said Imad Eujayl. "There's a feeling of compliance."

Eujayl said disciplining oneself increases his or her

spiritual power.

Children are exempt from the fast, as are women who are nursing or on their menstrual periods and elderly folks who might not be able to go without food or drink for such long periods of time. People who are ill, or for medical reasons cannot fast, also are refrained from doing so; as are those who have physically demanding jobs or who travel long distances. They are, however, expected to make up the fast days missed when they are able, Eujayl said.

Children are taught in their early teen years to fast, perhaps starting with just a day or two during Ramadan.

Eujayl, 50, has been doing it for 36 years, he said — one of the reasons it might not be as difficult for him as it is for younger Muslims.

The ending of Ramadan is marked by the holiday of Eid ul-Fitr, which takes place either 29 or 30 days after the beginning of the month.

Eid ul-Fitr this year is on

Sunday, which begins locally with morning prayers at the Islamic Center, followed by feasting and celebration among family and friends.

Muslim families who attend the Islamic Center of Twin Falls — there are more than 100, Yusupov said — will, after prayer, visit each other in their homes, eating and socializing as friends.

Greeting and fellowship are the most important things on this holy day, he

said.

Ramadan also is marked by reading of the Quran, nightly one-hour prayers, and charity to others. Going without food, for instance, helps them better empathize with those who are less fortunate.

"It helps remove yourself from natural desires and instincts, to transform your body to a higher level," Eujayl said, noting that for him it helps build a more personal connection to God.

Noted Duke Ellington Archivist Kuebler Dies in N.J.

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) • A jazz archivist known for her work on the Smithsonian's Duke Ellington papers has died in New Jersey. Ann Byrnes Kuebler was 61.

Her former supervisor at the Institute of Jazz Studies at Rutgers University, Vincent Pelote, says she died of a brain aneurysm Monday at a hospital in Atlantic City.

Kuebler helped make 200,000 pages of music and documents in the Smithsonian Institution's Ellington collection public and be-

came a noted Ellington scholar.

She went to Rutgers in 2001 and was the lead archivist on its Mary Lou Williams collection. She also helped the university acquire the collection of pianist and composer James P. Johnson.

Kuebler was from Baltimore. She started her career as a volunteer at the Archives Center of the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History in Washington, D.C.

Former Miami Goalie Austen Everett, 25, Dies

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) • Austen Everett, who was diagnosed with non-Hodgkins lymphoma while she was a member of Miami's women's soccer team in 2008, has died, her family said. She was 25.

Everett died Tuesday at a hospice facility in Colorado. She was on the Hurricanes' roster as a goalkeeper from 2007 through 2009.

Within a year of her diagnosis, she was back on the

Hurricanes' practice field and founded the Austen Everett Foundation, which would have athletes spend time with children with cancer and other terminal diseases. Her family intends to keep the foundation going.

Miami plans a candlelight vigil in the coming days, along with other tributes. A memorial service is scheduled for Thursday at St. Joseph Catholic Church in Seattle, Everett's hometown.

Dan Daniels, Washington, D.C., Sportscaster, Dies at 90

Dan Daniels, a Washington radio and television sportscaster for 22 years whose commentary and play-by-play coverage included Redskins football, Senators baseball and college contests at the University of Maryland and the U.S. Naval Academy, died Aug. 13 at Suburban Hospital in Bethesda, Md. He was 90.

He had complications from a fall at his home in Bethesda, said his son Tim Daniel.

Mr. Daniels came to Washington in 1956 to join the radio and television broadcasting team at WTOP. (WTOP-TV — is now called WUSA.)

From 1961 to 1968, Mr. Daniels was the broadcast voice of the Washington Senators, an expansion team that replaced the original Senators, which had decamped to Minnesota.

He switched to WRC-TV in 1969, reporting sports on the evening news shows. In January 1973, he covered the Redskins' first Super Bowl appearance. They lost to the Miami Dolphins, 14-7.

"I come from the old Red Barber school of broadcasting — describe it but don't overpower it," he once told *The Washington Post*.

Mr. Daniels remained with WRC through 1979, by which time his on-air appearances had become sporadic. He was spending more

of his time running a printing business, Dan Daniels Printing, with his wife.

They purchased a small print shop in Bethesda in 1973. The operation had grown to 30 employees from four and to two locations by the time they sold the business in 1990. It included a copying center and facilities for printing letterheads, newsletters and small newspapers.

Clarence Drane Daniel was born July 20, 1922, in Americus, Ga., and grew up in Jacksonville, Fla., after his father's death.

He added the letter "s" to his surname after entering the sports broadcasting business to avoid confusion with the celebrated New York sportswriter Dan Daniel. He never changed his name legally and his wife and three sons used Daniel as their surname.

Daniels attended the University of Florida and began his broadcasting career in 1941 on the university's radio station. He served in the Coast Guard during World War II, then became a sportswriter and broadcaster at a Jacksonville radio station, where he met his future wife, Virginia "Jinx" Stephens, a copywriter. They married in 1950.

Jinx Daniel died in May. Survivors include three sons, Robert Daniel of Irvine, Calif., Timothy Daniel of Bethesda and Paul Daniel of Santa Barbara, Calif.; five grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren.

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Jones Can't Be Swayed, Despite Fabulous Farewell

ATLANTA • Chipper Jones still has those glorious moments, the kind that every ballplayer cherishes, from a Little Leaguer just starting out to a 40-year-old on the way out.

When the Atlanta Braves third baseman was in the midst of his first two-homer game in more than three years, he went back to the clubhouse for a sip of water. He wound up spilling the glass all over himself.

"I was shaking so bad coming down off that adrenaline high," Jones said. "It took me an inning or so to shake it off."

He loves that feeling. Treasures it.

The hits keep on coming, too. Jones homered again on the first pitch he saw Friday against the Los Angeles Dodgers, his third in two nights. He was leading the team with a .317 average.

But nothing will change Jones' mind about retirement. This will be his final season, no doubt about it.

"I made my decision, I made promises to my kids. I can't go back on that," Jones said. "When I have nights like (his two-homer performance on Thursday), it's really cool. I'll never forget 'em. But I'm ready to do

something else."

This has turned out to be quite a farewell season for a player who has spent his entire career with the Braves. In just his 77th game, he had 13 homers and 54 RBIs, far exceeding what manager Fredi Gonzalez was expecting — especially when Jones, in what has become a frustrating ritual late in his career, underwent arthroscopic knee surgery in spring training and started the year on the disabled list.

Jones had one other stint on the DL, after getting hit on the leg with a line drive, but he's been relatively healthy since early June. Oh, sure, he never wakes up without something hurting, and the Braves have to give him regular off days in hopes of getting him through his final season without any major issues. But this isn't Mickey Mantle in his final year, barely able to walk, or Willie Mays, a sad shadow of himself late in his career.

This guy can still play. "If I tell you, yes, this is what we expected, I would be lying to you," Gonzalez said. "This year, he's exceeded our expectations. He's stayed healthy. He's done a good job, and we've done a good job of giving

him an off day every once in while just to keep him fresh. We communicate constantly about that. It's been good. We need to ride him again

deep into, what is it now, November?"

Opponents say not much is different in the player who has been beating up on them

for close to 20 years, all of them spent in that familiar uniform with a tomahawk across the front.

"He's just got that sweet

stroke, real easy, everything looks smooth," Dodgers manager Don Mattingly said. "He seems to come up big all the time."

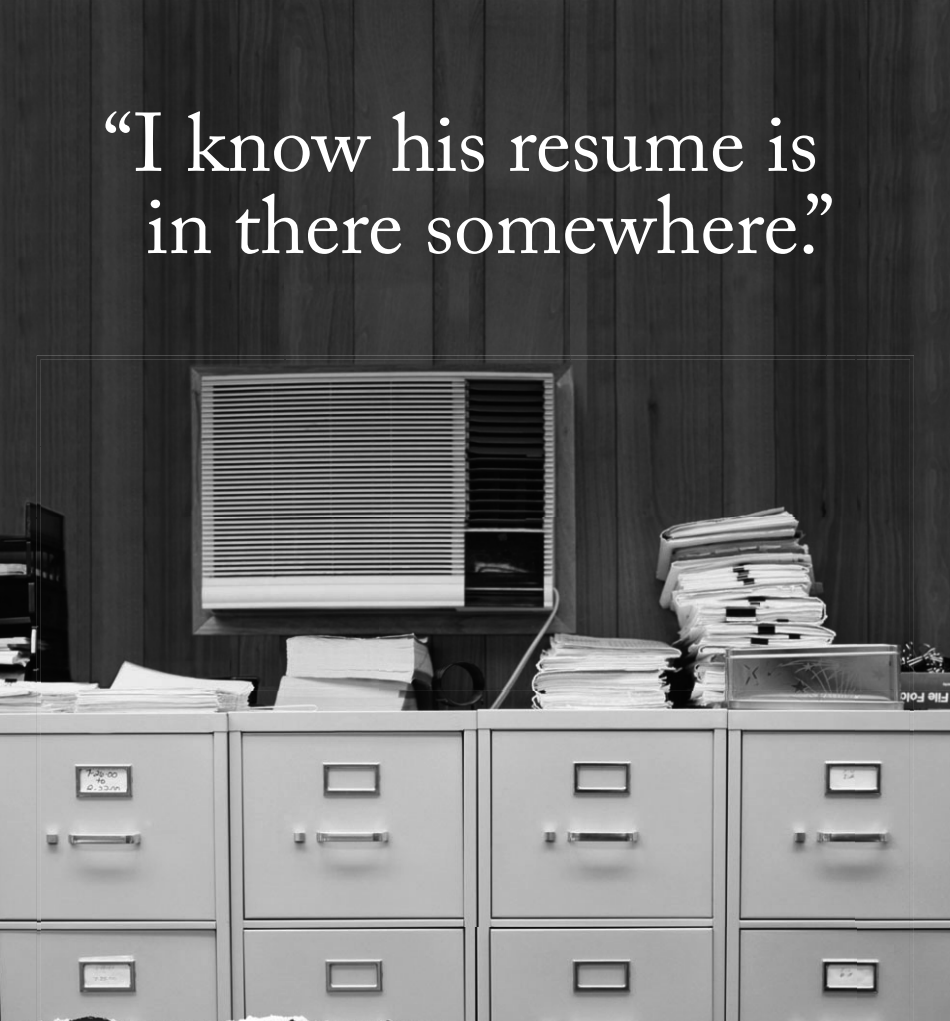

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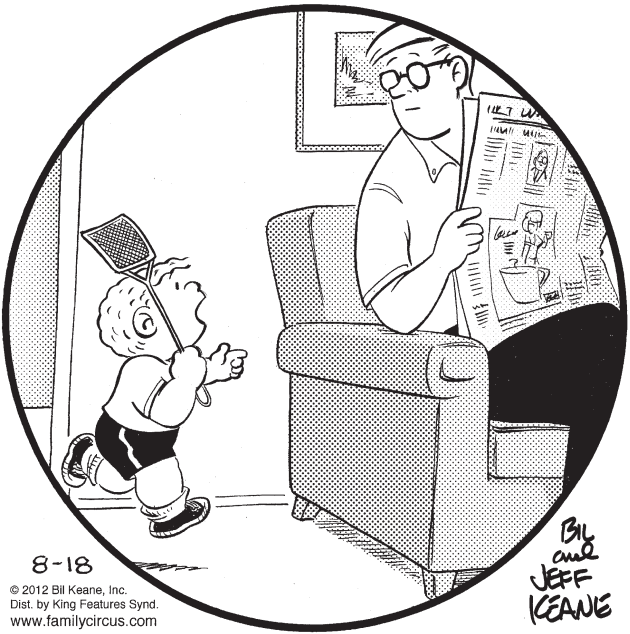

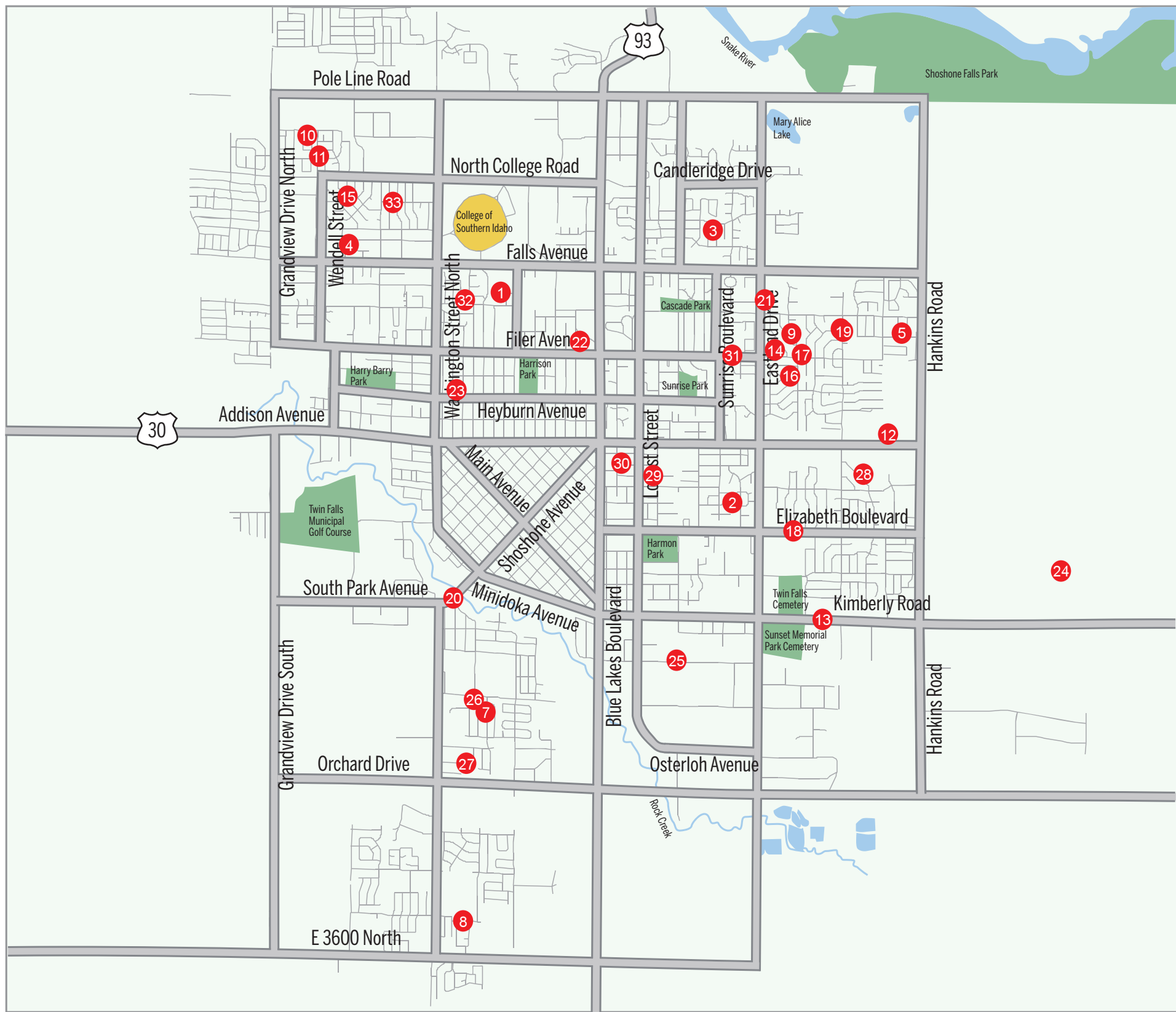

Today's Highlight:

On Aug. 18, 1920, the 19th Amendment to the Constitution, which guaranteed the right of all American women to vote, was ratified as Tennessee became the 36th state to approve it.

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

In 1587, Virginia Dare became the first child of English parents to be born on American soil, on what is now Roanoke Island in North Carolina. (However, the Roanoke colony ended up mysteriously disappearing.)

In 1838, the first marine expedition sponsored by the U.S. government set sail from Hampton Roads, Va.; the crews traveled the southern Pacific Ocean, gathering scientific information.

In 1846, U.S. forces led by General Stephen W. Kearny captured Santa Fe, N.M.

In 1862, Dakota Indians began an uprising in Minnesota (the revolt was crushed by U.S. forces some six weeks later).

In 1938, President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Canadian Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King dedicated the Thousand Islands Bridge connecting the United States and Canada.

In 1958, the novel "Lolita" by Vladimir Nabokov was first published in New York by G.P. Putnam's Sons, almost three years after it was originally published in Paris.

In 1961, federal appeals court Judge Learned Hand, 89, died in New York.

In 1963, James Meredith became the first black student to graduate from the University of Mississippi.

In 1969, the Woodstock Music and Art Fair in Bethel, N.Y., wound to a close after three nights with a mid-morning set by Jimi Hendrix.

In 1976, two U.S. Army officers were killed in Korea's demilitarized zone as a group of North Korean soldiers wielding axes and metal pikes attacked U.S. and South Korean soldiers.

In 1983, Hurricane Alicia slammed into the Texas coast, leaving 21 dead and causing more than a billion dollars' worth of damage.

In 1987, American journalist Charles Glass escaped his kidnappers in Beirut after 62 days in captivity. (Glass had been abducted June 17 with two Lebanese who were released after a week.)

Ten years ago: In a tearful farewell Mass in his beloved Krakow, Pope John Paul II told more than 2 million Poles that he would like to return one day – but that "this is entirely in God's hands." Rich Beem beat Tiger Woods to capture the PGA Championship.

Five years ago: Alarmed tourists jammed Caribbean airports for flights out of Hurricane Dean's path as the monster storm began sweeping past the Dominican Republic and Haiti. NASA, meanwhile, ordered space shuttle Endeavour back to Earth a day early out of fear Dean might disrupt flight operations. A seven-alarm fire ripped through an abandoned skyscraper next to ground zero in Lower Manhattan, killing two firefighters who'd responded to the blaze. Michael K. Deaver, a close adviser to President Ronald Reagan, died in Bethesda, Md., at age 69.

One year ago: President Barack Obama and European leaders demanded that Syrian President Bashar Assad resign, saying his brutal suppression of his people made him unfit to lead. Vice President Joe Biden met with Chinese Vice President Xi Jinping in Beijing. A storm swept through a popular open-air music festival in Hasselt, Belgium, killing five people.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE Bobby Wolff

"We are none of us infallible — not even the youngest of us." — William Thompson

How will you play six spades on a top diamond lead? You win it in dummy, ditching a club. You have five side-suit winners and will make the slam if you can add seven trump tricks. Since your main objective is to single in your small trumps, you ruff a diamond at trick two and cash the spade ace, hoping for a 2-2 trump break. It looks disastrous when West discards a diamond, but you simply continue to score your low trumps. You take the heart ace, ruff a diamond, then cross to the heart king to ruff a heart. Now comes the club ace and a heart ruff. Next you cross to dummy with the club king and lead dummy's diamond 10.

You have taken the first 10 tricks (six tricks in aces and kings and four ruffs in hand) and are down to the K-10 of spades and one losing club. Meanwhile, East has the Q-J-9 of spades left, but he cannot prevent you from scoring your trump 10. If he ruffs with the spade queen or jack, you will discard the club 10 and finesse on East's forced trump return; if he ruffs low, you can overruff with the 10.

The pitfall to be avoided was that if you take a third diamond ruff too early, East would discard the second of his three clubs. Then you would lose one of your club winners. However, by ruffing the two hearts before the final diamond, you prevented East from making a damaging discard.

ANSWER: It is very tempting to drive for slam here. Your controls are excellent, but you have at most a combined 32 HCP and no great fit. Nonetheless, your great controls argue for taking an aggressive position. (Imagine partner with five decent clubs and an ace and two kings on the side.) Bidding four no-trump as quantitative, not Blackwood, is reasonable, and might get you to six clubs when it is right.
