and is an important component of the daily routine. Choose whole grains at least half of the time, like whole wheat bread, pitas or crackers instead of refined, white flour products. Calc

The aptly namedreport, "The Irreplaceables", conretention crisis in urban schools is not about the number of teachers who are leaving but the loss of really good ones. The two-year study identified the top 20 percent of teachers whose
students consistently make themost progress on state exams. Not only do these teachers on average help students learn two to three additional months' worth of math and reading compared to the averageteacher
(and five to sixmonths more compared tolow-performing teachers), but they also get high marks from students.

ittle effortby districtstohold ontothesetopperformers.
Only 47 percent ofthese high-performingteachers saidt they ever got praisedfor their work, and only 26 percent were encouraged totake leadershiproles. Particularly shocking wasthe finding that two-thirds of the best teachers werenever askedto

TWIN FALLS • Whenever the sun was up for the past month, Bakhritdin Yusupov has refrained from eating. he reach for food to fill his hungry body.
During the time of fasting, however, he received a different type of nourishment spiritual.
Yusupov, the imam or leader at the Islamic Center of Twin Falls, and other
Muslims in the Magic Valley and across the globe will end their month-long fast on Sunday, the conclusion of the holy period of Ramadan. Ramadan, a term which
literally means "scorchins" in Arabic, is the ninthmonth of the Islamic calendar.During this period, Muslims refrain from food, drink and sexual activities from sunup to sundown - or from about 4:30 a.m. to 9 p.m., Yusupov said. They can eat and drink
after sunset anter alcohol, which they are not supposed to consume anyway.
Ramadan was established as a Holy Month for Muslims after the Quran was revealed to the Prophet Muhammad
in 610 AD on the occasion in 610 AD on the occasion frequently translated as "the Night of Power:" Observance of Ramadan is mandated in the Quran.

## "We are none of us infallible

How will you play six spades on a top diamond lead? You win it in dummy, ditching a club. You have five side-suit winners and will make the slam if you can add seven trump tricks. Since your main objective is to single in your small trumps, you ruff a diamond small trumps, you ruff a diamond at trick two and cash the spade ace, hoping for a 2-2 trump break. It looks disastrous when West
discards a diamond, but you simply continue to score your low trumps. You take the heart ace, ruff a diamond, then cross to the heart king to ruff a heart. Now comes the club ace and a heart ruff. Next you cross to dummy with the club king and lead dummy's diamond 10 .

You have taken the first 10 tricks (six tricks in aces and kings and four ruffs in hand) and are down to the K-10 of spades and one losing club. Meanwhile, East has the Q-J-9 of spades left, but he cannot prevent you from scoring your trump 10. If he ruffs with the spade queen or jack, you will discard the club 10 and finesse on East's forced trump return; if he ruffs low, you can overruff with the 10 .

The pitfall to be avoided was that if you take a third diamond ruff too early, East would discard the second of his three clubs. Then you would lose one of your club winners. However, by ruffing the two hearts before the final diamond, you prevented East from making a damaging discard.
