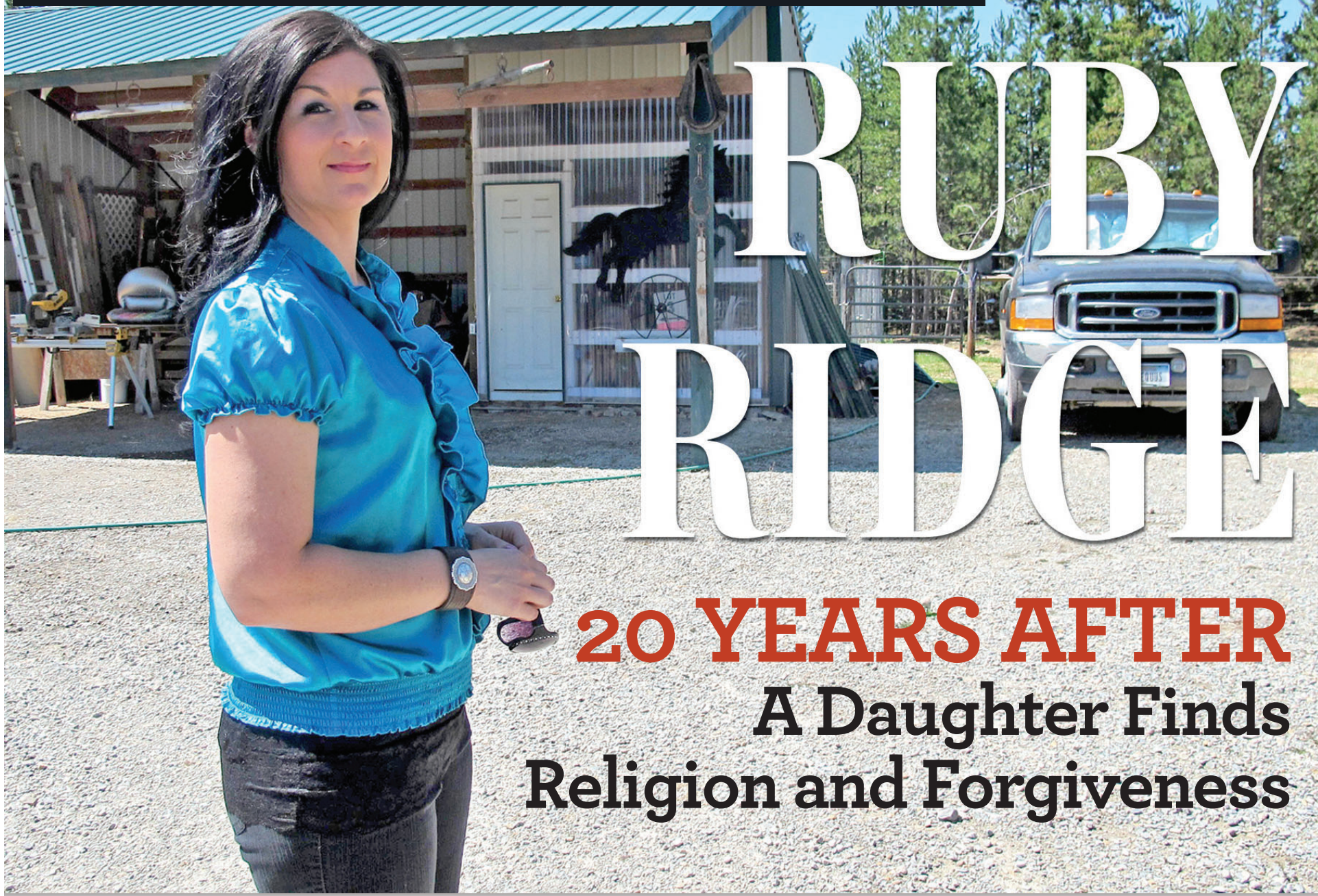

# RUBY RIDGE

## 20 YEARS AFTER A Daughter Finds Religion and Forgiveness

**KALISPELL, Mont.** • When Sara Weaver saw her father, Randy, struck in the shoulder by a government sniper's bullet in the Idaho wilderness in August 1992, she began to sprint back to the family's cabin on a mountaintop called Ruby Ridge.

As the 16-year-old closed in, her mother, Vicki, opened the cabin door and stood behind it, holding Sara Weaver's 10-month-old sister in her arms. Just then, a sniper's bullet struck her mother in the head, killing her.

For the next nine days, the surviving Weavers holed up in the

cabin while hundreds of federal agents laid siege in a standoff that helped spark an anti-government patriot movement that grew to include the Oklahoma City

bombing. Today, 20 years later, Sara Weaver has left the anger behind, finding religion — and forgiveness.

"I went 10 years without understanding how to heal" until becoming a born-again Christian, she said. "All bitterness and anger had to go," she said. "I forgave

those that pulled the trigger." These days, the Weavers live near Kalispell, Mont., a city in the northwestern part of the state that is the gateway to Glacier National Park and more than 100 miles east of Ruby Ridge.

## Idaho Jobless Rate Hits 3-year Low

**TWIN FALLS** • Idaho's unemployment rate dropped to 7.5 percent in July, the state's lowest in three years. That seasonally adjusted rate was two-tenths of a point lower than in June. It made Idaho and Rhode Island the only states with decreased unemployment during July.

Twin Falls County's unemployment rate also fell, going from 7 percent in June to 6.7 percent in July. The county had an 8.2 unemployment rate in July 2011.

Jerome, Blaine, Gooding, Shoshone and Cassia counties also reported lower unemployment rates from June to July. Minidoka County remained the same and Lincoln County increased slightly.

Part of the state's success in July results from private employers maintaining summer payrolls slightly

## Fire Flares Sunday NW of Paul

**TWIN FALLS** • An apparently human-caused fire sparked about 1:30 p.m. Sunday northwest of Paul and burned 150 acres by early evening.

Containment was anticipated by 9 p.m. Sunday, said U.S. Bureau of Land spokeswoman Kylie Gough. No structures were being threatened.

Thirty firefighters from the BLM and West End Rural Fire Department attacked the blaze, she said. Equipment on the scene included four engines, a water tender, one air attack craft, two single engine air tankers to drop fire retardant, and one helicopter.

Gough said it was not known Sunday night exactly how the fire began, although authorities believe a human or humans were responsible. "We have cause investigators and they have a whole process to look at where the fire

## The Cost of 'Back to School'

Some school principals say they've worked to trim lists of required supplies.

**TWIN FALLS** • Incoming seventh-grader Sylvia Cogen stopped in an aisle full of patterned and brightly colored notebooks, and looked at the different options.

At Target, her mom Caroline pushed a shopping cart and looked at Wood River Middle School's supply list.

Earlier this summer, they went through the supplies they already have at home in Ketchum.

But Caroline said picking out new supplies during the Thursday morning trip was a way to get her daughter excited and motivated for a new school year.

"We're really proponents for education," she said.

They held off on back-to-school shopping until a few weeks before the school year

starts. Then, Caroline said, the selection is better and they can "see everything at once."

### 'Not Cheap Anymore'

It's back-to-school shopping season and for parents, that can mean a hit to the wallet.

A few area principals esti-

mate that supplies generally cost between \$20 and \$40 per student in elementary and middle school.

"It's not cheap anymore," Lincoln Elementary School Principal Beth Olmstead said, though noting store sales can offer good deals.

## Public Hearing on Twin Falls Budget is Tonight

**TWIN FALLS** • Want a say in how the city of Twin Falls is spending its money? Tonight, you have that chance.

Today, the Twin Falls City Council will consider approving the budget for the new fiscal year, which starts Oct. 1.

Among the items in the budget: a raise for city employees, a 6.9 percent increase in the streets fund, and one-time capital improvement projects paid for from cash reserves.

The proposal includes a 3 percent property tax increase, but most homeowners won't pay more because of falling property values.

The council will also consider approving a temporary dog park at Harmon Park and a Sept. 15 swimming day for dogs at Dierkes Lake.

The city council meets at 5 p.m. today at the Twin Falls City Council Chambers, 305 Third Ave. E. in Twin Falls.

higher than average for the past five years, Janell Hyer of the Idaho Department of Labor said in a news release.

"That resulted in a decline in non-farm jobs from June to July of only about half the seasonal average of 3,200," she said.

Idaho's employment total dropped by 1,500 in July, breaking a string of 12 months of rising employment, according to the news release. The state registered a four-year high of 722,000 people with jobs in June.

Idaho's unemployment rate has been lower than the national average since September 2001. "It has fallen dramatically during the past year from a post-recession high of 8.9 percent in July 2011," Hyer said.

Despite total employment slipping slightly in July, there were still over 19,000 more Idahoans at work in July than a year earlier, she noted.

Hyer said another factor in Idaho's falling unemployment rate is fewer state and local education lay-

offs this summer than during the past five years.

"The only exception in the private sector was health care, where consolidation of medical providers appears to be increasing operating efficiency and reducing the need for some jobs," Hyer said.

Meanwhile, unemployment insurance benefit payments were 30 percent less across Idaho last month than during July 2011 and the number of claimants was down 31 percent, according to the news release.

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# Brokaw, Isaacson Headline Writers Conference

**SUN VALLEY** • The idea of legacy was paramount as Tom Brokaw and former Steve Jobs biographer Walter Isaacson took the stage this weekend at the Sun Valley Writers Conference.

Brokaw, longtime NBC news anchor, challenged what he called "the luckiest generation" to remember how America's always been at its best when it's had big ideas - from the G.I. Bill to the Civil Rights movement to John F. Kennedy launching America on the path toward the moon.

"Richard Nixon had a lot of bad small ideas, but he had a good big idea when he opened up things with China," he added.

Isaacson, former editor of "Time" magazine and former CEO at CNN, related how Steve Jobs' legacy was one of a passion for simplicity and a passion for the product that made him refuse to launch Apple's Macintosh computer until even the circuitry inside looked like a piece of art.

"He said others had a passion for profits. He believed if you cared about the product, the profits would follow. That's what separated him from others in his field," Isaacson said.

Both men spoke to sold-out audiences of more than 1,600 people at the Sun Valley Pavilion.

Brokaw, dressed in tan clogs, khakis and a white fly-fishing shirt, spoke with an easy repartee on Saturday night.

He paid tribute to colleagues who died in the past year, including Nora Ephron and Andy Rooney. Brokaw said Rooney helped inspire his book, "The Greatest Generation," as he watched the former "Stars and Stripes" reporter lead his grandkids on a tour of Normandy Beach, his pace getting faster and faster "as if he was trying to get ahead of his emotions."

Brokaw recalled how he quipped during last year's Allen and Company meeting in Sun Valley that everyone should turn off their cell phones "or give them to (former News International mogul) Rupert (Murdoch) for safekeeping" as news of hacking allegations began to break.

"Some of his supporters came up and said that was unfair. Rupert being Rupert punched me lightly in the chest and said, 'That's great, and walked away,'" he recounted.

Brokaw, 72, said he wrote his latest book, "The Time of Our Lives," as he began to think about what the legacy of his generation would be.

"I was just the doorman who opened the door and said, 'This way, please,'" he added about his book, "The Greatest Generation," which allowed those who went through the Great Depression and World War II to tell their stories.

"I tell these stories because that's who we are. It's a story of America - not from the top down but people who came from the ground up. And that's the continuing story of America. We're at our best from the ground up," he added.

Isaacson, who spoke Friday night, described how Jobs got a tech to shave 28 seconds off the boot-up time for his personal computer and how he got a Corning factory in Kentucky to manufacture its mothballed scratch-resistant Gorilla Glass for the iPhone.

As Jobs approached death,

he said, "Maybe I'll make it to the next lilly pad. Maybe I won't," Isaac recalled. "He said: 'I'd like to believe in God - half the time I do. Sometimes I'm

worried when you die it's like an on and off switch - Flip! You're gone! Then he got that smile, and said, 'Maybe that's why I didn't like to put off

switches on my devices.'" Isaacson said Jobs said he told Facebook's Mark Zuckerberg to focus and not make the mistake of being like Microsoft,

making so many products he didn't know what he was doing. He added that he hoped Zuckerberg would learn to collaborate better than he had done.

The next frontier for Jobs would have been creating something that would "blow

away the textbook industry," along with simple intuitive interfacing software that would allow people to watch what they want when they want it without juggling two remotes.

"I expect we will see something in a year or two," he added.

Especially for families with several school-aged children, she said school supplies can be a large expense all at once. Plus, the summer months are also a popular time to buy new clothes for the coming school year.

### Help from the Schools

At Wendell Middle School, Principal Luke Kelsey said school employees have worked hard to shorten the school supply list this year.

“As the economy has recessed, we’ve become more conscious of what we’re asking parents to buy,” he said.

Also, through money from fundraisers, the school’s parent group is covering the cost of tissues, notebook paper and dry erase markers. In the past, students brought those supplies to school.

At Lincoln Elementary, Olmstead said there’s a supply cupboard for families who need help.

Often, teachers also buy some supplies with their own money, she said, in case students don’t have something.

“Just bring your child to school,” Olmstead said. “We’ll make sure they’ll get

what they need.”

### What’s on Supply Lists?

Around south-central Idaho, elementary and middle schools put out supply lists. They can be found in area stores that sell school supplies.

At Jefferson Elementary School in Jerome, Principal Sherri Johns said supply lists don’t vary much between grades. But the school only has kindergarten through third-graders.

“We try to keep ours pretty consistent across all four grade levels,” she said.

While some lists include generic items such as “large binder” or “glue sticks,” others get specific.

The kindergarten list at Lincoln Elementary specifies that pencils should be No. 2 Sanford Eagle or Rose Art brands.

That’s because some brands of pencils “don’t sharpen very well,” Olmstead said.

### Bring Supplies to Share

Besides items like pencils and notebooks, many schools ask students to bring classroom supplies that aren’t included in school supply budgets.

Those include tissues, bandages, dry erase markers and disinfecting wipes.

### By the Numbers Sample School Supplies

Here’s one example of a school supply list for the first grade at Lincoln Elementary School in Twin Falls.

The prices represent some of the most economical options available Friday at Target. Some items aren’t packaged in the same quantities listed on supply lists.

**Two boxes of 24-count Crayola crayons:** 50 cents each, \$1 total

**One box of Crayola classic fat markers:** 99 cents

**24 No. 2 plain pencils:** 47 cents for eight, \$1.41 total

**Two Pink Pearl erasers:** \$1.84 for six Target brand erasers

**Eight glue sticks:** 25 cents for two, \$1 total

**One small bottle of Elmer’s school glue:** \$1.59

**Scissors (Fiskars brand):** \$1.50

**Two large boxes of Kleenex:** \$1.33 each, \$2.66 total

**Six dry erase markers of any color, except yellow:** \$6.84 for eight

**One large container of disinfecting wipes:** \$3.99

**One large bottle of hand sanitizer:** \$1.87

**Backpack:** \$9.99

**Four plain sturdy folders with pockets on the bottom, not the side:** 50 cents each, \$2 total

**One plastic closing school box:** \$2.99

**One box of quart- or gallon-size freezer bags:** \$2.49

**One box of Band-Aids:** \$1.39

**Total:** \$43.55

“If every student brings a box of tissues, that’s pretty close to what they go through in a classroom in a year,” Johns said.

### What about High School?

Don’t arrive at area stores expecting to see a supply list for high schools.

Brady Dickinson, principal at Canyon Ridge High

School in Twin Falls, said the school doesn’t put out a supply list because there are so many elective classes.

“We’d have to put out a 10-page list of supplies,” he said. Students find out what supplies they’ll need during each of their classes.

One of the largest costs for high school students is a calculator for math classes.

Dickinson said Canyon Ridge’s math department

### Nonprofits Offer Help

Through grants and donations, local nonprofit organizations are providing school supplies for families in need.

**South Central Community Action Partnership:** Community services director Leanne Trappen said families can come in after they’ve registered their children for school.

Families should bring documentation of what fees are due and what supplies are needed, as well as proof of income.

“We can assist with some fees and some school supplies, but we don’t provide everything,” she said.

Trappen said the organization helped more than 350 families about two years ago. But with less funding last year, they weren’t able to help as many families.

Families who qualify for free or reduced-price school meals generally qualify for assistance.

“We just want to make sure that if they have a need, they come in,” Trappen said.

**The Salvation Army:** Business manager Nicki Kroese said families can fill out an application to receive help getting school supplies.

Then, the organization gets supply lists from each child’s school.

“We give them everything we can on their list,” she said.

The Salvation Army helped provided school supplies for about 160 children last year.

The organization is collecting items through donation boxes at Shopko and Fred Meyer. School supplies can also be donated during The Bridge radio station’s “Parktacular” summer celebration from noon-6 p.m. Sunday at Twin Falls City Park.

has a list of accepted calculators and there’s an effort to keep options cost-effective.

There are also calculators that students can check out to use at school.

For elective classes, students sometimes have to pay for materials for projects they’ll take home. In pottery class, for example,

there’s a \$25 fee for clay.

For students who can’t pay the fees, Dickinson said the school will work with them. In some cases, the PTSA or booster club will cover the cost.

“We’ve never turned away a student because they couldn’t pay for the supplies,” he said.

Patriarch Randy Weaver, 63, is a dotting grandfather, his daughter said. Her two sisters, including the one who was in Vicki Weaver’s arms, are working.

For a time, it seemed doubtful that any family members would survive the siege.

Randy Weaver moved his family to northern Idaho in the 1980s to escape what he saw as a corrupt world. Over time, federal agents began investigating the Army veteran for possible ties to white supremacist and anti-government groups. Weaver was eventually suspected of selling a government informant two illegal sawed-off shotguns.

To avoid arrest, Weaver holed up on his land.

On Aug. 21, 1992, a team of U.S. marshals scouting the forest to find suitable places to ambush and arrest Weaver came across his friend, Kevin Harris, and Weaver’s 14-year-old son, Samuel, in the woods. A gunfight broke out. Samuel Weaver and Deputy U.S. Marshal William Degan were killed.

The next day, an FBI sniper shot and wounded Randy Weaver. As Weaver, Harris and Sara ran back toward the house, the sniper fired a second bullet, which passed through Vicki Weaver’s head and

wounded Harris in the chest.

During the siege, Sara Weaver crawled around her mother’s blanket-covered body to get food and water for the survivors, including the infant, until the family surrendered on Aug. 31, 1992.

Harris and Randy Weaver were arrested, and Weaver’s daughters went to live with their mother’s family in Iowa. Randy Weaver was acquitted of the most serious charges and Harris was acquitted of all charges.

The surviving members of the Weaver family filed a wrongful death lawsuit. The federal government awarded Randy Weaver a \$100,000 settlement and his three daughters \$1 million each in 1995.

“Ruby Ridge was the opening shot of a new era of anti-government hatred not seen since the Civil War,” said Mark Potok of the Southern Poverty Law Center, which keeps tabs on hate groups.

After Ruby Ridge, federal agents laid siege to the Branch Davidian compound in Waco, Texas. It ended violently after 51 days on April 19, 1993, when a fire destroyed the compound after an assault was launched, killing 76 people.

Timothy McVeigh cited both Ruby Ridge and Waco as motivators when he bombed the federal building in Oklahoma City in 1995. Ruby Ridge has been cited often by militia and patriot groups since.

“What Ruby Ridge did was energize the radical right in a way it had not been in years,” Potok said.

Sara Weaver said she is devastated each time someone commits a violent act in the name of Ruby Ridge. “It killed me inside,” she said of the Oklahoma City bombing. “I knew what it was like to lose a family member in violence. I wouldn’t wish that on anyone.”

In the years after Ruby Ridge, Sara Weaver, now 36, struggled with depression and post-traumatic stress disorder, as well as what she called a “toxic bondage” of bitterness and anger at the government.

“After losing mom and Sam, I almost felt guilty even thinking about being happy after they were gone,” she said. “But that’s a lie. Your family members don’t want you to grieve them. They want you to move on.”

After graduating from high school in Iowa, Sara Weaver moved to the Kalispell area in 1996. Her sisters and father followed shortly after. In 2003, a meeting with a childhood friend from Ruby Ridge helped her turn things around.

The friend mentioned her positive relationship with Jesus Christ, and something clicked for Sara Weaver. “I was shocked at that,” she said. “I had a fear-based relationship with God.”

“I decided I was broken and needed to be fixed,” she said.

Weaver began reading the Bible, where she learned that “Jesus commands us to forgive,” and embarked on a journey that, by 2011, found her speaking to religious groups across the nation. Her journey is described in her recently released book, “From Ruby Ridge to Freedom.”

Weaver has not spoken to any of the agents involved in the siege, and doesn’t plan to unless they want to meet her.

Not everything has been smooth sailing.

Weaver endured a painful divorce a few years ago, and is now married for a second time. She and her husband, Marc, operate a quarter horse breeding ranch just outside of Kalispell. She has an 11-year-old son from her first marriage.

Sara Weaver said Randy Weaver does not do interviews and would not release a statement on the anniversary.

She has been back to Ruby Ridge, to the land her family still owns. All that remains of the family’s modest home is the foundation, she said. She recalled with affection her unconventional childhood there, and her mother. “It’s hard to live without her to turn to,” she said. “I want to turn to my mother for advice.”

“We miss her terribly. It never goes away,” she said.

A report from Incident Commander Beth Lund indicated that a Type 4 management team would be in monitor status today.

**Trinity Ridge:** The fire grew Sunday to 88,467 acres and was 5 percent contained. The Elmore County Sheriff’s Office earlier ordered an evacuation from Featherville to the Paradise area. More than 1,000 personnel were working the human-caused fire as of Sunday and containment was estimated for Oct. 1.

## Federal Judge Won't Dismiss Suit against Utah Bigamy Law

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** • A federal judge has refused to dismiss a lawsuit filed by a polygamous family made famous by the reality TV show "Sister Wives."

U.S. District Judge Clark Waddoups made the ruling Friday in the case filed by Kody Brown and his four wives — Meri, Janelle, Christine and Robyn. They've argued that Utah's bigamy law should be overturned because it violates their right to privacy.

Utah officials sought to have the suit thrown out. They first argued that the Browns couldn't challenge the bigamy law because they hadn't been charged. State attorneys later argued for dismissal because a prosecutor had pledged not to prosecute them for bigamy.

But Waddoups wrote in his ruling that the promise from the Utah County Attorney's Office appeared to be a ploy to avoid the suit.

## Idaho's Water Management Could Be Put to the Test

Most of the United States – the lower 48 at least – is not only hot but in drought, has been for many weeks, and various kinds of disaster loom in many places.

Idaho is luckier than most of the country. In this year of water trouble in many places, it has two advantages.

One is the part Idahoans have no control over. The Northwest generally got lucky this year, with decent winter snowpack and adequate spring rain, coupled with mostly (and relatively) moderate temperatures this summer. Most of the country wasn't so fortunate.

The other part, which Idaho has been able to affect, is water management. And that may come into important play in the next few years if Idaho's summers start to match more closely with the nation's.

For all the rustic and rural feel of Idaho's water system (it doesn't seem especially high-tech), it is one of the most sophisticated water management systems in the country. It is thoroughly developed, both in close watch of the water supply and in overseeing how the water is used. Aquifers are not unusual underground water systems nationally, but Idaho's seem to be better managed than most; aquifer recharge, to make up for normal drawdowns, is a significant part of water management in the Gem State. None of this is to suggest that Idaho's system is perfect or that there aren't any legitimate criticisms, but an Idahoan familiar with his state's system would have some cause to look down on what many other states do.

The Snake River Basin Adjudication is a major part of that. The SRBA, now about 25 years old, may seem to many Idahoans an eternally running, never-ending court case that achieves little. And they would be wrong. Most western states have adjudications. And generally, they have been running far longer than the SRBA and are nowhere near as close to completion, and that includes adjudications far smaller than the Snake River's. (The SRBA is the largest water adjudication in the country.) Idaho probably stands as the nationwide leader in this area.

When the SRBA is done, water use for nearly all of Idaho will be codified, and people throughout the basin (which takes in 87 percent of the state) will know where they stand – how much water there is, and who gets to use how much and for what. That's powerful knowledge.

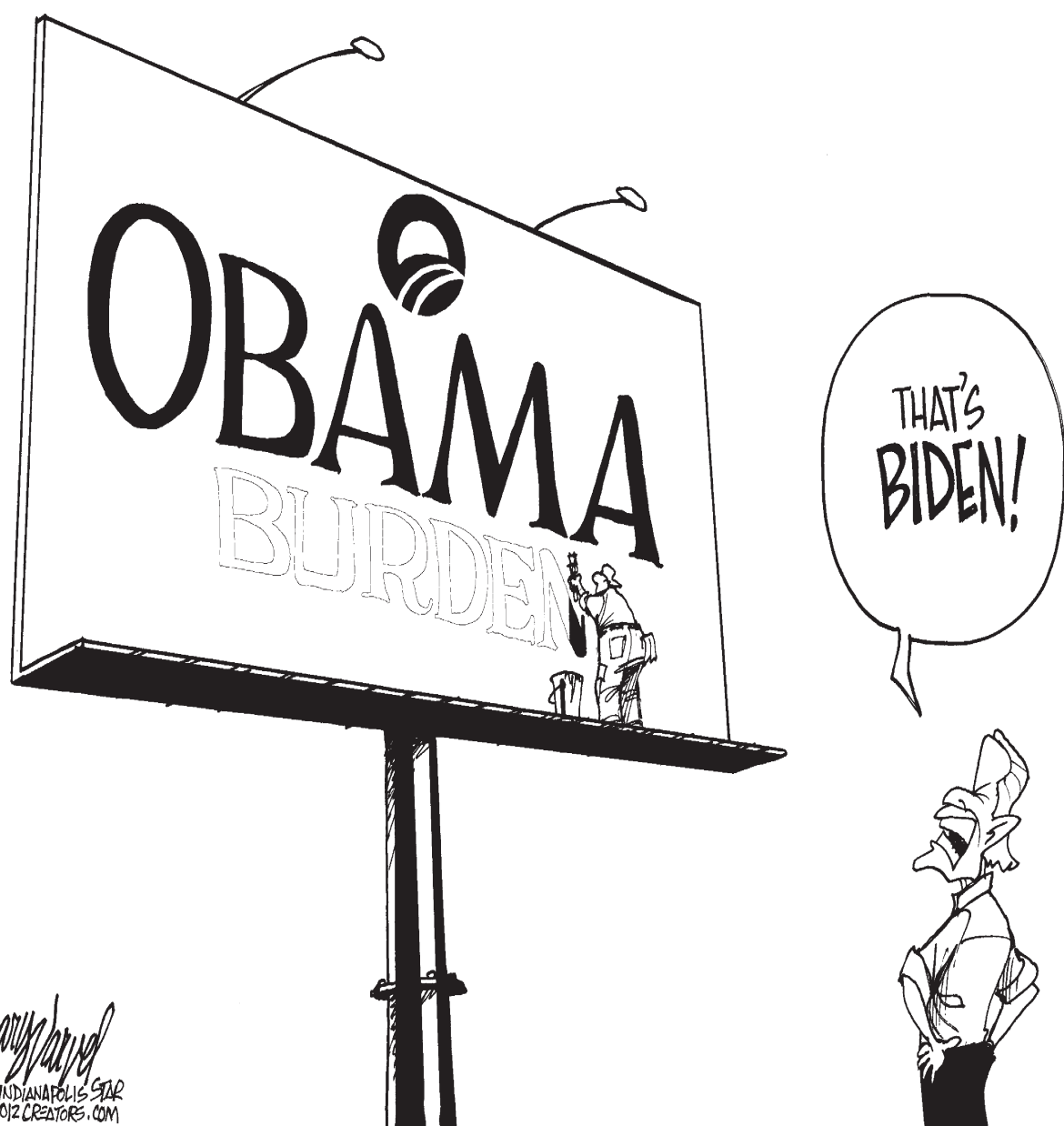
Just how powerful could easily turn up, before long, in Idaho politics.

Idaho is becoming increasingly urban and especially suburban. Most of the water used in the state is used by irrigators, to water sometimes water-intensive crops in a near-desert climate. Up to this point, there's been generally enough water to go around – mostly, and most of the time. But recent years have seen a series of water calls (insistence on delivery by senior water right holders) in agricultural areas. What happens when the water supply is stretched thinly enough that urban areas are told: Your junior water rights mean you may be cut off?

Things may not unfold quite that way. But a few more dry years and more urban population growth could put the long-running rural domination of much of Idaho politics to its most severe test.

Stories of privations abound, of the economic hardships suffered by those not in the camps while those in the camps had food.

Northern Burma is mostly virgin jungle. The troops were bogged down and did not have equipment and supplies they needed. We were making air drops of food and ammo. But they were having trouble advancing through the dense jungle. Machinery and vehicles were of little use.

Most of the troops on the ground had been parachuted there, but they needed a way to move men and equipment. A young lieutenant, a former cowboy from Texas, came up with the possibility of parachuting

some pack animals to the troops.

The brass decided we could try some drops but didn't want to know about it. We acquired six of the little horses, put pack saddles on them and attached large cargo parachutes to their backs. They had halters and lead ropes. They were blindfolded and a 50-static line was attached. When we pushed them out the door, the static line would open their parachutes and pull off their blindfolds. They would float to the ground and, hopefully, land in a clearing. They all landed safely with no injuries, and the troops were able to catch them.

The operation was a howling success, and we later dropped about a hundred horses and mules. One big problem as some of them drifted over and landed in the trees. What do you do when a horse is hung in a tree, maybe as high as 50 feet in the air? We could only rescue those that were close to the ground. We would have to shoot those that were too high. The natives would climb up the tree and cut them down and their village would have a big feast.

One of the most treasured commodities to the natives was salt. We would drop bags of salt near their villages, and they would help our crews that had crashed or had to bail out. They saved many of our crews. They were great friends, and a lot of men owed their lives to the Naga tribe.

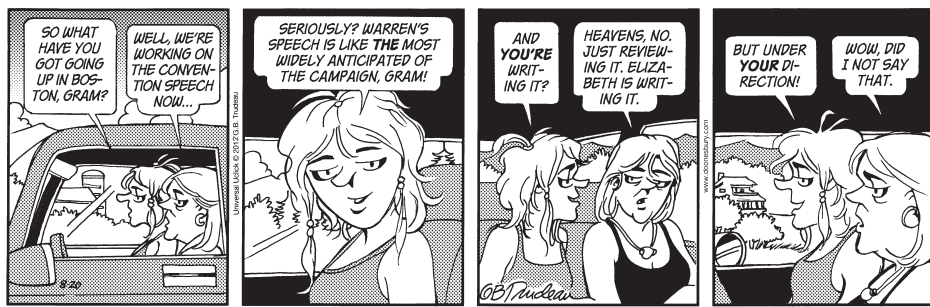

# DITCH THE 9-IRON, PICK UP A DRONE

At the beginning of this summer, I vowed to dedicate more time and effort — and, consequently, money — to become a better golfer.

I had it all wrong. Or at least partially wrong.

I had the wrong type of golf. What I should have been doing all along: disc golf.

I had heard about disc golf, but never checked it out until this past weekend when I visited Lake Walcott State Park for the Idaho State Disc Golf Championship. It was a two-day tournament with 120 golfers vying for cash and

prizes — \$600 for the pro division winner.

Disclaimer: This column is not intended to argue that disc golf is a sport. At best, it sits on the fringes somewhere between horseshoes and croquet.

Still, it's not as easy as it looks. Like anything else, it's a skill that can only be mastered through practice, practice, practice.

I can now say that I've witnessed Jim Furyk stick a 150-yard approach shot two

feet from the pin, and an elite disc golfer chuck a disc 400 feet and land it in an area the size of a picnic table. Both are equally awe-inspiring.

The sport has been around at least 50 years, but is still an "emerging underground sport," according to tournament director Travis Taylor.

"It's evolved. They started out throwing at stumps and trees. Now it's a very high-tech, low-tech sport," Taylor said.

I didn't immediately endeavor myself to the sport. To the first disc golfer I met, I asked, "How long have you been playing Frisbee golf?" Gasp.

"How dare you use the F word," he retorted.

Discs are smaller and heavier than Frisbees. Hardcore golfers cart around 20 or more discs, each shaped and weighted for specific types of throws, from drivers to midrange and putters. You wouldn't want to throw these discs at your dog.

"Unless you really don't like your dog," Taylor said.

How popular has the sport become? According to the Professional Disc Golf Association (PGDA),

## McKean, Williams Winners at MVS

# Luck Solid, Colts Fall to Steelers 26-24

**PITTSBURGH** • Andrew Luck shook off a pair of early interceptions to put together three second-quarter scoring drives, giving the Indianapolis Colts a halftime lead before the Pittsburgh Steelers rallied for a 26-24 preseason victory Sunday night.

The top overall pick completed 16 of 25 passes for 175 yards and added a 1-yard touchdown run for the Colts (1-1), who held their own against a perennial Super Bowl contender.

Ben Roethlisberger passed for 81 yards with a touchdown and an interception for the Steelers (1-1), who took an early 14-0 lead when Ike Taylor picked off Luck's pass and took it 50 yards for a score.

The pick hardly rattled Luck, who led the Colts to scores on three of their next four drives. By the time he left, Indianapolis (No. 32 in the AP Pro32) held a 17-14 at the break.

Rookie Danny Hrapmann kicked four second-half field goals for the Steelers, including the 22-yard winner with 23 seconds remaining.

Luck dazzled in his preseason debut last week against St. Louis, passing for a pair of touchdowns in a 38-3 romp. He expected a sterner test against the Steelers — who led the NFL in total defense for the fourth time in the last nine years in 2011 — and he got it.

Pittsburgh (No. 7) sent its first string defense — minus

injured stars James Harrison and Casey Hampton — after Luck from the start. The Colts managed just one first down on their first three possessions, the third one ending with Luck underthrowing Reggie Wayne on a sideline pattern that Taylor stepped in front of and took down the sideline for a touchdown.

"I turned around and the ball was right there," Taylor said. "I just had to make sure I caught it."

Things appeared to get worse for Luck on Indianapolis' next play, when he was sacked by LaMarr Woodley.

No biggie. Showing the

poise that made the Colts choose him to be the heir apparent to Peyton Manning, Luck led a 10-play, 80-yard drive that ended with Donald Brown's 1-yard plunge.

Luck had it going again on Indianapolis' next possession only to be undone but a bit of bad, well, luck. He hit rookie wide receiver T.Y. Hilton in stride down the middle only to have the wide-open Hilton throw the ball up in the air. Pittsburgh's Cortez Allen ran underneath it to thwart the drive, but it hardly slowed the Colts.

Indianapolis tied it at 14 when Luck deftly slid into the

end zone on fourth-and-goal from the 1, ending a drive in which Luck completed all five of his passes.

Luck got one more chance just before the half, and he made it count. Working exclusively out of the shotgun, Luck led the Colts 31 yards in five plays, giving Adam Vinatieri just enough time — and room — to sneak a 53-yard field goal between the uprights at the gun.

"It showed character and maturity of Andrew to come back, make plays, move the ball down the field and have two nice drives," Indianapolis coach Chuck Pagano said.

**BROOKLYN, Mich.** • Jimmie Johnson looked as if he had already finished the hardest work. After starting at the back of the pack, he had moved up quickly, and when he passed Brad Keselowski for the lead on lap 191 of 200, his No. 48 Chevrolet seemed to be the superior car.

Then Johnson's engine faltered with only six laps remaining. He lost the race — and the NASCAR Sprint Cup points lead — to Greg Biffle on Sunday.

"I got it turned around and was catching him, and then his engine failed," Biffle said. "It was going to be a great race, no matter what. I felt like I could catch him, but we'll never know. Passing him might have been a different story."

Biffle won the race at Michigan International Speedway, taking advantage when Johnson left the track because of engine trouble. Johnson started the race from the back because of an engine change, and he couldn't hold on at the end. He finished 27th.

After Johnson's mishap, there was a caution for oil on the track. Biffle held off Keselowski by 0.416 seconds in the green-white-checked finish.

Biffle took over the points lead, while Johnson dropped from first to fourth. Matt Kenseth moved up a spot to second despite a 17th-place showing.

"I know that a lot of people

don't expect us to win the championship, and don't expect us to compete for the title," Biffle said. "I don't care what they say or who they want to talk about, but we will be a factor when it comes down to Homestead. I promise you that!"

Kasey Kahne finished third in the 400-mile race, followed by Dale Earnhardt Jr. and Marcos Ambrose.

It was the 12th victory for Roush Fenway Racing at MIS, breaking a tie with the Wood Brothers for the most wins at the track.

Pole sitter Mark Martin was sailing along in the lead for most of the first 65 laps before his race ended in scary fashion. Bobby Labonte went into a spin while Martin was coming up from behind, and Martin went sliding off toward pit road. His car crashed frighteningly into the end of a short, narrow barrier on the interior side of pit road.

The side of Martin's car was essentially impaled by the end of the wall, just in front of the left rear tire and dangerously close to the driver's seat. But in the smoky scene that followed, Martin was able to get out and walk away.

"I really feel that was a freak accident. I'm not sure you can ever completely fix something like that," Martin said. "That was a pretty freak angle that I got it. I'm not sure what you can do. It could have been really bad if I would have got into that hole a little deeper where it would have caught me in the door instead of the crush area back there!"

the number of disc golf courses more than doubled in the last decade. For the Idaho State Championship, competitors came from as far away as Las Vegas, Portland, Seattle, California, and North Dakota. Organizers capped the entries at 120 and sold out in 18 days.

Plus, it had a waiting list. Disc golf is similar to real golf, though not nearly as frustrating or expensive. For example, to improve my golf game, I priced out a set of clubs (\$1,200), an annual pass at the golf course (\$500), lessons (\$40 per) and buckets of balls at the driving range (\$6 per).

After countless hours and a large dent in my wallet, I still stink.

For disc golf, you can get started for less than \$50. Each disc costs from \$8 to

\$25. Most courses are free. At Lake Walcott, you just have to pay the state park fee of \$5 per vehicle.

And disc golf doesn't discriminate. The field at the Idaho State Championship included people of all

shapes, sizes and backgrounds. There were old guys wearing khaki shorts, long dress socks and visors. There were young guys with tattoos drinking Monster Energy.

Kris Zahm of Boise owns

Strange Disc Sports, the company that promoted the Idaho State Championship. Even though the sport is becoming more mainstream, "Strange" seems like an appropriate name for a business that caters to the disc golf scene, even selling merchandise with the SDS logo marked on everything from T-shirts to hats and thongs. And we're not talking the flip-flop kind.

SDS had tables set up selling all kinds of discs. It took a 10-year-old named Ben from Pocatello to explain to me the difference between a Crush (driver), a Drone (mid-range) and a Magnet (putter).

Now I'm the proud owner of all three, and it cost me less than 18 holes of golf. I figure if I start practicing now, I might be ready for next year's Idaho State Championship.

I've already placed my name on the waiting list.

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

*"The only way to get rid of a temptation is to yield to it."*  
 — Oscar Wilde

Because the opening bid of two no-trump promised 20-21 points, North had an easy raise to the small slam in no-trump. How do you plan to make 12 tricks after West leads the club 10?

You have 11 immediate winners plus the possibility of a winning finesse in spades, hearts or diamonds. While those who never get a two-way finesse wrong will have no problem, the rest of us have to find a plan that avoids guessing which finesse to take.

The secret is to win the club ace and cash the three remaining club honors. Next, you should lead a spade from dummy, intending to cover East's card cheaply. Suppose he plays the four, then your spade eight will force West's queen and you will have 12 tricks immediately. Even if West were able to win the trick with the spade 10 or nine, he would then have to lead into one of your tenaces. Your 12th trick would then be in whichever suit he chose to return.

You may ask "What would happen if East played the spade 10 or nine?" Well, the spade jack would be taken by West's queen, and the A-K-8 would then be good for three tricks if West chooses to get off play in spades. As a red-suit return would also cost a trick, you would still be certain of making 12 tricks.

The consequence is that this simple plan of covering the spade that East plays on the first round of the suit guarantees 12 tricks no matter how the cards lie.

A club lead is perhaps the least likely to cost a trick, but I have a sneaking hankering for leading the ace of hearts, in the hope that at least I may know what I should have done after seeing dummy. But I'll settle for the club as less likely to arouse partner's ire if I'm wrong. Without the queens on the side, I might have yielded to temptation.
