BURLEY • For the past several weeks wildfire smoke has filled the air in the Magic Valley, causing itchy eyes, sore throats and forcing many people with chronic health issues to stay

"Unless we are blessed by some real true rain rather than the lightning storms we've been getting we may be in for a long fall," said Dr. Greg Wickern.

With a medical practice with Asthma & Allergy of Idaho, Wickern travels among offices in Hailey, Twin Falls, Burley and Elko, Nev.

He said people throughout the region have experienced health issues associated with smoke from the wildfires.

In the Wood River Valley, the Idaho Department of Environmental Ouality has issued air quality advisories in recent days due to wildfire smoke - rating the area as various stages of unhealthy.

DEQ's Twin Falls measuring station — the only other in the region has generally fared better. But the Magic Valley has still dealt with smoke and haze.

Anita Mitchell, 74, of Oakley, said the smoke from the Cave Canyon Fire — west of Oakley in the South Hills – pretty much went up and

Council Approves Temporary Dog Park

TWIN FALLS • Good news for dog owners in Twin Falls: On Monday, the Twin Falls City Council approved a temporary dog park, located at a baseball field in Harmon Park.

Earlier this year, the council approved a permanent dog park, called Baxter's Park, but the location on the corner of Blake St. N. and Shoupe Ave. W. won't be ready until at least summer 2013.

Last year, the council approved a temporary off-leash enclosure at Frontier Park near the College of Southern Idaho. Parks and Recreation Director Dennis Bowyer said Harmon Park was chosen because the grass is in better condition.

The temporary enclosure will be open



Alleged Craigslist Rape Solicitor Released

TWIN FALLS • A man accused of soliciting men via Craigslist to rape a Twin Falls woman has been ordered to be released from jail.

Justin Matthew Crawford, 32, appeared in court Monday for a preliminary hearing. He was known to his alleged victim.

Crawford waived the hearing and his attorney, Lynn Dunlap, asked the court for Crawford to be released on his own recognizance.

prosecutors State agreed to the release on the condition that Crawford follow court compliance instructions and that he seek treatment for post-traumatic stress disorder.

The reason for Crawford needing treatment was not specified in court Monday or in court documents.

One Dead in Evening Car Crash

FILER • One person is dead and another in the hospital following a vehicle crash Monday evening west of Filer.

The collision at 4200 N. 1900 E. in Twin Falls County was called in to dispatchers at about 5:30 p.m., said Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office spokeswoman Lori Stewart. The identities of the people involved were not released.

A male driver was traveling west on 4200 N. in a Chevy Cavalier when he collided with a female driver heading south on 1900 E. The male was pronounced dead at the scene. The female was transported with serious injuries.

The reason for the crash remains unknown. Deputies diverted traffic around the area, which drivers were asked to avoid.


The sheriff's office, the Filer Fire Department, Magic Valley Paramedics, the Filer Quick Response Unit and Buhl police all responded to the crash.

T.F. County Officials Deny Alleged Discrimination

TWIN FALLS • The Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office is rejecting charges of sexual harassment and discrimina-

July, former chief deputy Gerlyn "Sam" Walker filed a lawsuit against the county, alleging she was subject to repeated sexual harassment and discrimination from coworkers.

In the complaint, Walker's attorney gave examples of the sexual harassment, including derogatory remarks from male coworkers and SWAT team members allegedly telling her she should lead dangerous entries into structures because "she has no kids, she's old and no one will miss her," according to the lawsuit.

The lawsuit also claims Walker was unfairly demoted from her position as chief deputy because of her complaints to Sheriff Tom

I live in an area (of Twin Falls) where the houses all have yards right next to each other and the properties are kind of staggered. One neighbor has an old boat she never uses that is filled with wasp nests. Another neighbor's 2-year-old daughter has been stung twice and it's impossible to work in our yards. Is there anything neighbors can do to handle this problem with the city's help?

he first thing to do would be to talk to the neighbor, suggests Sean Standley, code enforcement coordinator for Twin Falls city.

The nuisance of bug infestation can drive a person crazy, especially since it's generally a pest issue rather than a pet issue. Unfortunately, the only code on harboring the critters is if it is a business venture on residential property.

Other than that, there's not much enforcement the city can provide.

One newcomer to the valley asks: Why is it so windy here?

A variety of factors affect the pesky gusts that cause us to reduce the speed of our stroll, make loose-leaf papers come alive as we chase them down the street and ruin perfectly good hairdos.

Valerie Mills, meteorologist for the National Weather Service in Boise, says wind comes from the difference between cool air in the arctic and warm air in the tropics, due to the difference in sun energy

"The result is a general west wind aloft over Idaho that brings weather systems through the region," Mills said. "West winds align with the Magic Valley's Snake River Plain and are channeled between the mountains of central Idaho and the highlands of southern Twin Falls County. Salvation Army Offers Help at Trinity Ridge

The group is preparing to serve meals for 100 firefigethers over a three-day period.

TWIN FALLS • With crews battling the Trinity Ridge Fire, a fourmember team from the Salvation Army headed out Monday to help with another need.

The Twin Falls chapter will prepare and serve meals to about 100 firefighters for three days at Pine's senior center.

"Our main focus is feeding firefighters," said Nicki Kroese, the organization's business manager.

But the team will also feed any evacuees who may be at the American Red Cross' shelter.

On Monday morning, the team headed to Costco to buy food for the firefighters before leaving Twin Falls.

Kroese said the organization is spending about \$6,300 on emergency response efforts for the Trinity Ridge

"Donations would certainly help defray that cost," she said.

It's not the first time a team from The Salvation Army has helped out at a fire or other emergency.

Kroese said they help out "whenever there's a big need." And she noted the organization isn't the only one around the state that's helping out with emergency response for fires.

Preparing for the Fire

Crews battling the Trinity Ridge Fire continue to build a handline Monday in the northwest and southeast areas of the fire.

The 90,664-acre fire was 5 percent contained as of Monday evening.

The fire was active to the south on Sunday, moving into the area of Big Trinity Camp-ground and Green Creek.

The Elmore County sheriff has ordered an evacuation from Featherville to the Paradise area due to thick smoke and reduced visibility from the fire.

The American Red Cross set up an evacuation center at Pine's senior center and Pines Resort. And a community meeting was held Monday morning at the senior center.

The road through Pine and Featherville remains closed, except for fire and emergency traffic.

The fire - which started earlier this month — has an Oct. 15 expected containment date.

Bench Fire: The fire is now 100 percent contained and its closure area was lifted Sunday. Idaho Highway 21 remains open.



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

Report: Twin Falls Bar, Wood River **Businesses among Top Liquor Purchasers**

TWIN FALLS • When it came to purchases from the Idaho State Liquor Dispensary, The Pressbox Sports Bar and Grill topped the bracket among Magic Valley businesses last year.

The popular venue on Kimberly Road bought \$114,057 worth of liquor during fiscal year 2012 that ended June 30, according to figures from the state agency. That amounted to 7,564 bottles of booze.

Owner Jerod Bosh isn't surprised by the ranking.

"I think we've been on top the last couple of years," he said. "It's about volume. All in all, it results from more customers."

Statewide, a total of 1,221 establishments spent a little more than \$30 million on liquor last year. Some 2,090,371 bottles were purchased.

Runner-up in the valley's liquor-acquiring sweepwent stakes to

Woody's/Blue Room/Cucina Gemelli with expenses of \$78,579 for 3,676 bottles.

Following among Magic Valley vendors were the Log Tavern, \$71,463; Klover Klub Lounge, \$59,400; and the Anchor Bistro and Bar,

Mir-A-Mar in Gooding was the most prolific buyer among Magic Valley establishments outside of Twin Falls with 3,818 bottles at a

Even The Pressbox paled compared to the business that bought the most liquor in the state: The Coeur d'Alene Resort, with \$336,851

in expenses for 21,834 bottles. The Sun Valley Lodge was No. 2 in the state with \$306,940 and 17,534.

Just north of the Magic Valley, Ketchum weighed in with five establishments among the state's top purchasers. They were the Casino Club, \$163,586; Whiskey Jacques, \$163,209; Pioneer Saloon, \$110,833; Cornerstone Bar and Grill, \$81,238; and The Cellar Pub, \$81,238.

TWIN FALLS • Within the next year, travelers might have another flight to consider when leaving Twin Falls by

Joslin Field, Magic Valley Airport has received a \$500,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation to add a fourth daily flight to Salt Lake City or increase the size of planes now making the trip three times a day.

Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Shawn Barigar said it's uncertain which option will be pursued. That will be decided after talks with SkyWest Airlines officials and local business leaders.

The goal is to create more capacity for morning departures, Barigar said, adding that the earliest flight is always

"If you can't get in the system early in the day it makes for a long travel day," he said. "That's where the bottleneck is. This is really good news for business and leisure travelers."

Barigar noted a total of \$565,000 will be used to market the added flight or expanded capacity.

Besides the federal grant, \$10,000 has been committed by the airport and another \$55,000 had been pledged by the chamber, Business Plus and the Southern Idaho Economic Development Organization. Just less than \$20,000 of in-kind contributions, including staff time by chamber members, will sweeten the deal.

The infusion of advertising, including a formal marketing plan, is the incentive for SkyWest to bolster its presence here, Barigar said. "They are very positive about the Twin Falls market."

Passengers currently fill about 74 percent of the 630 seats in planes leaving Twin Falls for Salt Lake City, said city spokesman Josh Palmer. That compares to SkyWest's regional average of 63 percent from other cities serving Salt Lake City.

Palmer emphasized that the early morning flights from Twin Falls have even higher ridership - an average of 86 percent of seats are filled then.

He said the city doesn't have a preference whether SkyWest adds another flight or brings in larger planes for existing trips. "As long as they increase capacity," he said.

Pocatello's airport filed for a similar grant and the airline brought in a larger jet, Palmer said.

Barigar estimated the marketing effort might begin next spring, just before travelers begin flocking to airports for summer trips. The marketing push will start two months before SkyWest upgrades its service and will last for 14 months.

"The goal is to get expanded capacity, but then as a community we need to step up and use it," Barigar said.

Twin Falls Mayor Greg Lanting said in a news release that local air service has helped attract some of the region's largest employers. That attraction took a hit in fall 2011 when SkyWest reduced daily flights from four to three.

"The airport has played a critical role in attracting businesses like Chobani to our community, and it helps retain many important businesses in our area that need air service to operate efficiently," Lanting said.

Apple Sets Record for Company Value at \$624B

NEW YORK • Apple is Wall Street's all-time MVP that's Most Valuable Proper-

On Monday, Apple's surging stock propelled the company's value to \$624 billion, the world's highest, ever. It beat the record for market capitalization set by Microsoft Corp. in the heady days of the Internet boom.

After a four-month dip, Apple's stock has hit new highs recently because of optimism around what is believed to be the impending launch of the iPhone 5, and possibly a smaller, cheaper

Apple Inc. has been the world's most valuable company since the end of last year. It's now worth 54 percent more than No. 2 Exxon Mobil Corp.

Apple's stock closed at \$665.15. That was an alltime high, up \$17.04, or 2.6 percent, from Friday's close.

Microsoft's 1999 peak was \$620.58 billion, according to Standard & Poor's.

The comparison to Microsoft does not take inflation into account. In inflation-adjusted dollars, the software giant was worth about \$850 billion on Dec. 30, 1999. Microsoft is now worth \$257 billion.

Analysts believe Apple's stock has room to grow. The average price target of 38 an-

alysts polled by FactSet is \$745.80.

Despite the surge, Apple's stock is not particularly expensive compared to its earnings for the last twelve months. The company's "price-to-earnings ratio" is 15.6, compared with 16.1 for the S&P 500 overall. That suggests investors, unlike analysts, don't believe the company can grow its profits

much from current levels. Microsoft had a price-toearnings ratio of 83 at the 1999 peak. The stock was caught up in the Internet price. mania of the time and in-

Scott Sutherland at Wedbush Morgan noted that some investors sold Apple shares last summer, when iPhone sales slowed down as consumers started holding off for the new model. Those investors missed out on a 50 percent jump in the stock

"This time around, in-

vestors are a little bit smarter across the board ... they don't want to be caught not involved in the stock on this launch," iPhone Sutherland said.

Analysts also speculate that a "mini iPad;" could expand the number of people who can afford one of Apple's tablets. The cheapest iPad cost \$399, compared to \$199 for the latest Google and Amazon tablets.

Analysts are speculating – based on rumors - that Apple plans to make a TV set to complete its suite of consumer electronics products.



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Lowe's 2Q Results Miss Expectations, Cuts Outlook

NEW YORK • For Lowe's, the improving housing market is still a bust.

The nation's second largest improvement retailer cut its full-year-earnings and revenue forecasts Monday after posting a 10 percent drop in second-quarter net income. Revenue at stores opened at least a year, a key yardstick for measuring the health of the retailer, declined 0.4 percent.

Lowe's results were hurt in part by a timing shift in how the retailer reported the quarter and a charge tied to job cuts. But the latest performance also shows the company's efforts to revamp its merchandise and prices aren't working while its rival Home Depot is getting a boost from the improving but still weak housing mar-

In particular, Lowe's return last summer to offering permanent low prices in many items across the store, instead of offering fleeting discounts, hasn't yet resonated with shoppers who have been accustomed to seeing big sales signs. In fact, Lowe's said Monday that it

will take until the middle of next year to reap the benefits of the strategy. Earlier, Lowe's said it would happen by the end of 2012. The company said it is taking apart its pricing plan to have a better balance between temporary promotions and permanent discounts based on what it's learned from shoppers.

"We knew it would take time to see the full benefits of our actions," Lowe's chairman, president and CEO Bob Niblock told investors during a call Monday

following the release. "The team is making progress on these initiatives, but frankly, the benefits are accruing at a slower rate than I had expected?

Lowe's performance is in contrast to last week's upbeat report from Home Depot Inc. The nation's largest home-improvement retailer boosted its full-year outlook, citing its performance so far this year. And said that strong cost controls and healthy sales of paint, bathaccessories

kitchen installations helped lift its net income by 12 percent during the period. Revenue at stores opened at least a year rose 2.1 percent.

In a conference call last week with investors, Chairman and CEO Frank Blake noted that some of the strongest growth in the latest quarter came from the markets that were hit hardest in the downturn, such as California and Florida.

"These are encouraging signs of stabilization in the housing market," Blake said.

Summertime Blues for Drivers: Gas at August Record

You may pay more than ever for a late-summer drive.

U.S. drivers paid an average of \$3.72 per gallon on Monday. That's the highest price ever on this date, according to auto club AAA, a shade above the \$3.717 average on Aug. 20, 2008. A year ago, the average was \$3.578.

More daily records are likely over the next few weeks. The national average could increase to \$3.75 per gallon by Labor Day, said Tom Kloza, chief oil analyst at Oil Price Information Service. By comparison, gas prices stayed below \$3.70 in late August and early September in both 2008

Retail gasoline prices have gone up about 39 cents per gallon, or 12 percent, since hitting a low of \$3.326 on July 2, according to AAA, OPIS and Wright Express. Kloza estimates that U.S. drivers are paying \$149 million more each day for gas than in early July. That isn't what the sluggish economy needs, since any extra money that goes to fill gas tanks doesn't get spent at movie theaters or restaurants.

The price at the pump in the U.S. fell more than 60 cents per gallon during the spring when oil fell as the global economy slowed and turmoil in the Mid-

dle East seemed to subside. But oil has risen to \$96 per barrel from \$78 in late June. Investors have been worried about disruption to oil supplies in the Middle East and North Sea. In the U.S., there were problems with refineries and pipelines in the West Coast and Midwest, including a fire in California. Seasonal factors are also at play: Summer blends of gas cost more and demand goes up as families go on vacation.

Analysts expect prices to drop after Labor Day, so at least drivers shouldn't have to worry about a return to the April high of \$3.94 per gallon, barring a hurricane or other unforeseen event.

Still, commuters and vacationers are frustrated, said Michael Green, spokesman for AAA. It's tougher to budget a summer trip and discouraging to see a larger chunk of one's pay check going toward gas costs. As for a post-Labor Day drop, he said in an emailed statement that, "It would take a significant decline in the price of gasoline for most Americans to feel comfortable with what they pay at the pump."

Still, that frustration shouldn't stop people from hitting the road said Brooke Ferencsik, director of communications at TripAdvisor. He said a majority of travelers recently surveyed by the travel advice site indicated they'll stick to fall travel plans even if they pay more for gas.

Whether pump prices impact the presidential election remains to be seen. But the Obama administration appears to be concerned. A senior administration official told The Associated Press Friday that the U.S. is considering a release of oil from the country's strategic reserves. It will monitor gas prices to see whether they fall before making a decision.

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

NEW YORK • Some of the most promising talent in show business was on the bill one day and night in 1955 at San Francisco's Pur-

ple Onion: Eartha Kitt and Alice Ghostley; Paul Lynde and Robert Clary; a singer and dancer with the stage name Maya Angelou, and an eccentric former housewife, a few years older than her fellow performers, with the married name Phyllis Diller.

Angelou's family, including two small children (Clyde and Joyce), were seated in the front row. Years later, she would remember watching Diller and wondering how her guests would respond to her friend's "aura of madness."

"Black people rarely forgave whites for being ragged, unkempt and uncaring. There was a saying which explained the disapproval, 'You been white all

your life. Ain't got no further along than this? What ails you?" Angelou wrote in "Singin' and Swingin' and Getting Merry Like Christmas," a memoir published in 1976.

"When Phyllis came on stage Clyde almost fell off the chair and Joyce nearly knocked over her Shirley Temple. The comedienne, dressed outrageously and guffawing like a hiccoughing horse and a bell clapper, chose to play to the two children. They were charmed and so convulsed they gasped for breath."

The housewife soon became a star.

Diller, the cackling template for Joan Rivers, Sarah Silverman and so many others, died Monday morning in her Los Angeles home at age 95. She faced the end, fittingly, "with a smile on her face," said longtime manager Milton Suchin.

some of his own hunting brothers, stripped of his president's post on the California Game and Fish Commission. His is a tale of an out-of-state hunting trip, a mountain lion, some trophy pictures, an eco-outcry, political backlash, California social weirdness and staggering hypocrisy.

Richards is 60 and runs a real estate brokerage in Upland, which is between Los Angeles and San Bernadino. His brother, Mark, lives in Austin, he says. I caught up with Dan on the phone last week, saying I wanted to talk

"Get in line," he joked. But he's not joking about his situation nor is he wallowing in self-doubt after months of controversy.

"There is evil in their subterfuge," Richards says from his office. "They are chipping away at the sporting community's rights, and I'm not afraid to challenge them on "This isn't about the mountain lion," he says. "It's

about me taking on the enviro-terrorists. They want to take over this department, and it's anything they can do to (achieve that)." Let's talk about the mountain lion. The lion lived in

Idaho. In February, Richards went hunting there and killed the lion. It's legal to do that in Idaho. It's not legal in California except in public safety situations. Richards posted pictures posing with the lion. Someone alerted the Humane Society of the United States.

Critics surfaced, aghast. And a campaign began to boot him from the California commission. California Lt. Gov. Gavin Newsom at one point called for Richards' resignation, saying that his "actions do not reflect the values of the people of California." Richards can't conceal contempt for Newsom and doesn't try. He points out that the values of the people of California don't allow casino gambling but that many people still go

to Las Vegas for their blackjack fix. And therein lies the problem. Legalities versus values. And whose values? "I went on a legal hunt, in a state where lion hunting is

legal," Richards says. Of course, it's not that simple. Critics focused on the difference between California and Idaho values, not just the difference in the laws. They said the photos of Richards holding the very large and very dead cat showed he does not share the values that he is supposed to support in his public role on the California

Which some folks say is hypocritical. I say it's beyond hypocritical, bordering on absurd.

commission.

"This entire department is made up of hunters and fishers," says Adrianna Shea, deputy director of California Fish and Game. Many of those staff members travel to other states to hunt, when they can't hunt in their home state, she says, and they aren't sanctioned for it. Richards has been a lightning rod for anti-hunters, Shea says, be-

"They have a very clear agenda (to change hunting and fishing laws in the state), and they saw this as an opportunity," she says.

cause of his in-your-face approach to dealing with them.

Some of Richards' fellow commissioners didn't like what they saw and even a few hunters were dismayed by the photos of Richards with the lion because they fear public demands for even more controls over hunting than exist now in California. Richards' fellow commissioners have gone on to remove him as president of the group, although he remains a member until his six-year term expires next year.

If there is a cautionary footnote to this story, it might be this: Being legal isn't always enough to avoid controversy and criticism. And being out there on the Internet with photos and commentary can be just asking for



Less Religious States Give Less to Charities

BOSTON (AP) • States with the least religious residents are also the stingiest about giving money to charity, a new study on the generosity of Americans suggests.

The study, released Monday by the Chronicle of Philanthropy, found that residents in states where religious participation is higher than the rest of the nation, particularly in the South, gave the greatest percentage of their discretionary income to charity.

The Northeast, with lower religious participation, was the least generous to charities, with the six New England states filling the last six slots among the 50 states. Churches are among the organizations counted as charities by the study, and some states in the Northeast rank in the top 10 when religious giving is not counted.

The most generous state was Utah, where residents gave 10.6 percent of their discretionary income to charity. Next were Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee and South Carolina. The least generous was New Hampshire, at 2.5 percent, followed by Maine, Vermont, Massachusetts and Rhode Island.

In Mormon teachings, for instance, Latter Day Saints are required to pay a 10 percent tithe to remain church members in good standing, which helps explain the high giving rate in heavily-Mormon Utah.

"Any LDS member who is faithful does that," said Valerie Mason, 70, of Mesa, Ariz., during an interview in Salt Lake City. "Some struggle with it. Some leave the church because of it. But we believe in the blessing.... Tithing does bring the blessing of God's

Judge Refuses to Toss 'Shovel Brigade' Deal

LAS VEGAS • A federal judge on Monday refused to grant a request by environmentalists to throw out a settlement agreement between the federal government and local officials in Elko County that would legitimize the existence of a controversial road in northern Nevada.

The decision by U.S. District Judge Roger L. Hunt means the 13-year-old case is likely to grind on for some time unless those involved reach a new agreement. Hunt encouraged all sides to

He called the settlement being contested by two environmental groups "a good effort" and questioned whether closing the road which the groups contend is the ideal option to protect a population of threatened bull trout — would be all that helpful for the fish.

"I think it ought to be settled," Hunt said of the lawsuit.

An attorney for two environmental groups that have joined the case, The Wilderness Society and Great Old Broads for Wilderness, pointed out that while Hunt didn't toss out the settlement on Monday, the deal has yet to take effect.

"We'll live to fight another day," Michael Freeman said after the hearing in Las Vegas.

Elko County Commissioner Demar Dahl said the decision sounded good.

The case involves an unpaved road along the Jarbidge River in Elko County near Idaho that washed out in 1995. The U.S. Forest Service decided not to rebuild the road, citing fears the road would encourage erosion and wash silt into the water, harming the river's bull trout.

Protesters known as the "Shovel Brigade" worked to rebuild the road themselves. Their work took place outside of the usual approval process required by federal environmental laws, prompting the federal government to sue local officials.

The two sides agreed to settle the lawsuit but an appeals court has allowed the two environmental groups to try to block the deal. The groups are seeking to either have the road closed or scaled back to a trail open only to non-motorized use.

A lingering issue is the basis for the settlement. The road crosses about a mile and a half of Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest and Elko County would like for the road to be legally justified as a right-of-way that predates the national forest, which was established in 1909.

Such a right of way would give county officials more control over the road than if it were justified under a later federal law such as the 1976 Federal Land Management Policy Act, which would enable the Forest Service to retain control.

Council Approves Budget

TWIN FALLS • After months of work, the city of Twin Falls has a budget for

On Monday evening, the Twin Falls City Council approved a \$49.25 million budget for the next fiscal year. The approval came after a public hearing, in which city residents encouraged the council to remain conservative in its spending.

The main talking point: A 3 percent bump in the property tax rate, the maximum hike allowed under Idaho statute. Though the tax rate is rising, most Twin Falls homeowners will actually pay less in taxes because of decreasing property values, said City Manager Travis Rothweiler.

Along with the tax rate increase comes increases in the water, sewer and sanitation

The budget also includes appropriations using cash reserves for one-time projects, such as a bookmobile and shelving for the Twin Falls Public Library, improvements at city parks, firearms for narcotics detectives and a dualpurpose canine.

The public hearing drew

only four members of the public out to testify, all of whom encouraged the council to remain conscious of the taxpayers when considering raising taxes.

"Our groceries are going up. Our gas prices are going up. I'm constantly having to cut back on activities for my children," said Marilyn Tarkalson of Twin Falls. "I feel like we're always having to pay more and more (as) a property taxpayer."

Steve Maschek said while he didn't want to pay more than necessary, he did appreciate the city's planning.

"I'm happy to pay an extra five bucks today so we're not paying 50 bucks tomorrow," Maschek said.

Members of the council thanked the small group for their testimony. Vice Mayor Don Hall acknowledged that

there are increases in the budget, but emphasized he felt confident that the money would be well-invested.

"If we don't have the resources to serve our community, then we're not doing our job," Hall said.

Councilman Chris Talkington said that while there is a tax increase, he did believe the budget was fiscally responsible. Talkington pointed out that the city has passed up previous opportunities to raise taxes, then defended budgeted raises for city employees.

In an emergency, Talkington said, "I want to have an experienced officer who has decided to stay in Twin Falls and knows the beat and stays calm under duress."

After a short discussion, the council unanimously approved the budget.

The smoke can cause both upper and lower respiratory symptoms that include coughing, shortness of breath, pain during breathing, a sore throat, and nasal and sinus congestion.

"Coughing is definitely the number one symptom," Wickern said.

He said the best advice for anyone who is susceptible to respiratory irritation is to stay indoors where there is some type of air filtration, and run the air conditioner to moderate the tempera-

Wickern said anyone who has coughing or has any degree of shortness of breath



should see their primary physician. People should also make sure they are taking any medications as prescribed by their doctors.

Turnovers Will Form Identity of Bronco Defense

BOISE • Boise State's new defensive backs coach, Jimmy Lake, has a simple focus for his group.

"I tell this whole group, all the time, we're going to be defined by how many times we get the ball back for the offense," he said.

Certainly creating turnovers is the focus for any defense, but it has been a point of emphasis all fall with Lake, whose two most recent coaching stops were in the NFL with Detroit and Tampa Bay.

"More emphasis getting our hands on the ball ... it's definitely installed in our head to get turnovers," senior cornerback Jamar Taylor said. "At the right time, if you see it, we're not going to just try to bat down the

Boise State intercepted 15 passes last season, nine by defensive backs and seven were by players returning in 2012. The Broncos created 26 turnovers last season coach Chris Petersen said if the team can create 30 or more, it would be an elite defense.

If not for a rash of injuries last season, that number may have been reached.

Cornerback Jerrell Gavins had three interceptions in three games before a season-ending ACL injury, while Taylor missed four games with a stress fracture. Gavins was sidelined, while Taylor was only able to play about a quarter in the Broncos' lone loss last season, when TCU threw for 473 yards.

"Just there on the sideline, wanting to help my teammates when I couldn't, that was the biggest thing, especially the TCU game," said Gavins, back for his senior year. "Certainly the games when I knew I recognized something and the ball was thrown and I knew I'd definitely be able to pick

Junior Ebo Makinde and sophomore Bryan Douglas both return. Each made starts with Gavins and Taylor out. Junior college transfer Deon'tae Florence has also impressed, and Petersen considered him his MVP in the team's first scrimmage.

"Especially with what happened last year, you always need depth," safety Lee Hightower said. "... I think we've done well. We've clicked and got on the same page."

Hightower, who started four games at cornerback last season because of the injuries, is slated to start at safety, his more natural position. Fellow sophomore Jeremy Ioane has begun to scratch his potential, but is currently battling senior Hazen Moss at the other safety spot.

"I think there's talent there, I think we've got a very good coach back there - and that's a pretty good combination," Petersen said. "The one thing we don't have in the safety position is a lot of experience. There's no substitute for that, that's going to take some time."

Though the front end of the secondary has much more experience than the back end, the Broncos are certainly intrigued by the potential of the safeties, and there is a heightened sense of awareness for the need to fill key spots.

"It's time to step up," Ioane said.

If this fall's scrimmages have been any indication, the whole group has stepped up - Petersen praised the defensive backs in particular after the first scrimmage, then they picked off four passes in Saturday's final scrimmage.

"That's the focus of every practice, every day, every meeting, so it's good to come out here in front of the fans and actually get it done," Hightower said.

The commissioner of the Western Athletic Conference said Monday that it has become apparent the league won't have enough football members to compete after this season, and his focus now is on trying to keep the conference together for other sports.

The 50-year-old WAC would be the first Division I conference to give up on football since the Southwest Conference dissolved in 1995, and it might go the way of the SWC, too, and cease to exist altogether.

"It doesn't mean we've given up on the idea of football for the future, but it's apparent we don't have enough members in 2013 to play football," Jeff Hurd told

Conference Beyond 2012 The Associated Press.

WAC Won't Be Football







THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"It had been easy fighting in some plain,

Where Victory might hang in equal choice.

But all resistance against her is Who has th' advantage both of

Today's deal comes from an Internet game where South did not take full advantage of his extra chance.

After South's one-no-trump rebid, a jump to three diamonds by North would have been merely invitational, so North jumped in the fourth suit to hear more about South's hand. When all he could do was reiterate his heart strength, North was happy to settle for three no-trump.

The defense was accurate. West started with three rounds of clubs, East pitching a small heart. West then switched to a spade. Declarer won and cleared diamonds, giving West a chance to discard a small heart to deny interest there too. On winning his diamond jack, East astutely played back a spade rather than a heart, hoping his partner would have a spade stopper. And so it proved: Locked in dummy, declarer had to concede the fifth trick to West.

It looks as if declarer needed either spades or diamonds to break, and with neither suit cooperating, he was destined to fail. However, there was an extra chance. When declarer finds that diamonds don't break, he should cash a second top spade before giving East his diamond trick. Now, when East wins this trick, he has no more spades to play. He must therefore lead a heart, allowing declarer access to the winners in his own hand as well as to those in dummy, since South still has a spade left to reach all of dummy's winners.

ANSWER: With no fit and no great spade stopper, there is a case for going low and bidding just one no-trump, which normally has an upper limit of 10 HCP. The alternative is to bid two clubs and hope you can get to game if partner produces a spade honor. The first route looks simpler and more realistic to me.

On this date:

In 1609, Galileo Galilei demonstrated his new telescope to a group of officials atop the Campanile in Venice.

In 1831, Nat Turner led a violent slave rebellion in Virginia resulting in the deaths of at least 55 white people. (He was later executed.)

In 1858, the first of seven debates between Illinois senatorial contenders Abraham Lincoln and Stephen Douglas took place.

In 1878, the American Bar Association was founded in Saratoga, N.Y.

In 1911, Leonardo da Vinci's "Mona Lisa" was stolen from the Louvre Museum in Paris. (The painting was recovered two years later in Italy.)

In 1940, exiled Communist revolutionary Leon Trotsky died in a Mexican hospital from wounds inflicted by an assassin the day before.

In 1959, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed an executive order making Hawaii the 50th state.

In 1961, country singer Patsy Cline recorded the Willie Nelson song "Crazy" in Nashville for Decca Records. (The recording was released in October 1961.)

In 1972, the Republican National Convention opened in Miami Beach.

In 1987, Sgt. Clayton Lonetree, the first Marine court-martialed for spying, was convicted in Quantico, Va., of passing secrets to the KGB. (Lonetree ended up serving eight years in a military prison.)

In 1991, the hard-line coup against Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev collapsed in the face of a popular uprising led by Russian federation President Boris N. Yeltsin.

In 1992. an 11-day siege began at the cabin of white separatist Randy Weaver in Ruby Ridge, Idaho, as government agents tried to arrest Weaver for failing to appear in court on charges of selling two illegal sawed-off shotguns; in the resulting shootout, Weaver's teenage son, Samuel, and Deputy U.S. Marshal William Degan were killed.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush told reporters at his Texas ranch that ousting Iraq's Saddam Hussein was "in the interests of the world" but indicated the United States was in no hurry. Canadian Prime Minister Jean Chretien announced he would not seek a fourth straight term, and would step down in 2004. A jury in San Diego convicted David Westerfield of kidnapping 7-year-old Danielle van Dam from her home and killing her. (Westerfield was later sentenced to death.)

Five years ago: Hurricane Dean struck Mexico's coast as a Category 5 storm. The postwar Iraqi tribunal trying former Saddam Hussein aides opened its third proceeding, putting former Defense Minister Ali Hassan al-Majid, known as "Chemical Ali," and 14 other men on trial. Space shuttle Endeavour, with teacher-astronaut Barbara Morgan aboard, safely returned to Cape Canaveral,

One year ago: Euphoric Libyan rebels raced into Tripoli and took control of the center with little resistance as Moammar Gadhafi's defenses collapsed and his four-decade regime appeared to be crumbling. In a statement from Martha's Vineyard, where he was vacationing with his family, President Barack Obama called on Gadhafi to acknowledge reality and step
