Woman Found Sleep Swimming

Idahoan hypothermic after being found in Snake River early Tuesday.

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BURLEY • A Burley woman who went missing in the early morning hours Tuesday was found

safe after apparently swimming in the Snake River while asleep.

According to a Cassia County Sheriff's report, the 31-year-old wife and mother has a history of sleep walking. The report says deputies

located her one other time disoriented and soaking wet in the city of Burley after apparently swimming in the river. This was the third incident in the past five weeks, the report says.

After the Tuesday incident, a Cassia County judge issued an order to have the woman's

Road to Buhl Gets Slower

BUHL • The 45-mph speed zone on U.S. Highway 30 east of Buhl will be extended farther east, the Idaho Transportation Department announced.

Currently the speed zone changes from 45 to 60 mph close to the 1600 East Road intersection. Once new signs are posted, drivers must drive 45 mph almost half a mile east of that intersection. New signs with the updated speed limits are expected to be posted later this week.

ITD decided to extend the zone after studying the road's crash history, topography and traffic speed variations, according to a news release. According to ITD, average daily traffic for that road section is almost 7,400 vehicles.

A speed study showed that average traffic speed was about 53 mph, but a high number of turning vehicles varied the speed greatly.

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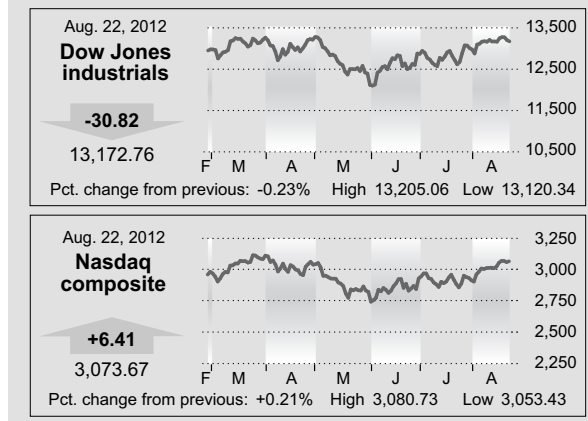

Stocks Climb from Lows After Fed Signals Help

NEW YORK (AP) • Investors drew some comfort Wednesday from signals that the Federal Reserve is worried about the slow pace of the U.S. economic recovery feels more urgency about providing help.

Stocks climbed back from lows after minutes from the last major Fed meeting were released. The Standard & Poor's 500 index, down most of the day, eked out a gain of 0.32 point to 1,413.49.

The Dow Jones industrial average closed down 30.82 at 13,172.76. It was down as much as 83 points earlier. The Nasdaq composite index added 6.41 points to 3,073.67.

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Three Charged with Arson over July 4th Fire

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TWIN FALLS • A fireworks mishap has led to three young men facing felony arson charges.

The charges stem from a July 4 fireworks accident that burned down a Buhl home. The *Times-News* is

not identifying the suspects because at least two were juveniles at the time. They are being charged as adults.

According to police documents, police responded to a call of a house fire at about 5:30 a.m. on July 4. When police arrived, the three juveniles were attempting to put out the fire with towels.

During questioning, the boys admitted they set off mortars that morning. One mortar exploded 10 feet off the ground, setting the surrounding grass on fire. The juveniles told police the flames quickly spread to the house.

The fire burned down one suspect's home. No one was

injured in the blaze, which also threatened a neighbor's home.

Though it's illegal to light mortars in Idaho, the fireworks are available for purchase. Customers buying illegal fireworks like mortars and bottle rockets must sign a waiver stating they won't set them off in the state.

Hidden History

The Robert M. McCollum House Mix-up

TWIN FALLS • A funny thing happened on the way to film a television program.

"Diggers," a history show on the National Geographic channel, was in town recently to document some metal-detector archeology at local historic sites. One of the sites is a property once owned by Twin Falls pioneer Robert M. McCollum, and is now listed on the Nation Register of Historic Places.

Local historian Jim Gentry was asked by "Diggers" producers to be at the McCollum house during the shoot, in case he was needed to identify anything that was found during the dig.

Gentry said he went to the property commonly known as the McCollum house - now the site of Ann's Eyewear Boutique, at the corner of Shoshone Street North and 7th Avenue North.

"I waited and waited, and no one showed up," Gentry said. Then he noticed a film crew working kitty corner from the McCollum house, at a Craftsman bungalow now owned by Twin Falls County.

"I walked up to the crew and asked them if they were looking for the McCollum house," Gentry said. "It's

over there; I told them, and I pointed to Ann's Eyewear."

"Diggers" producers told Gentry that they had the correct location, and showed him the address listed on the National Register. That address belongs to the Craftsman bungalow at 708 E. Shoshone St., not Ann's Eyewear.

Gentry assumed it must be a mistake. Everyone knows that the McCollum home was the first home in Twin Falls - and that is Ann's Eyewear, he said. A historical marker at the business identifies the building as the first framed, permanent residence built in Twin Falls.

The mistake, as it turns out, is the notion that there

is only one McCollum home in Twin Falls.

The first home of Bob and Alice McCollum was indeed the first house in Twin Falls, built on the corner of Shoshone Avenue North and 7th Avenue North. Although Ann's Eyewear Boutique faces Shoshone Avenue on that corner today, the original home faced 7th Avenue North when it was built in 1904.

While the McCollums lived in what is known as a "stick-built" home, other residents - mostly young, single men - lived in tents in the newly-formed village.

Alice McCollum took pity on these young "homeless," yet prominent men, and in-

vited them to join the McCollum family for dinner and socializing.

The group was known as the "Homeless Twenty," well after its membership tripled in number. The Homeless Twenty eventually became the Twin Falls Commercial Club, and later evolved into the local Chamber of Commerce.

Bob McCollum was a trustee of the village until Twin Falls became a town with a mayor-and-council government in 1907. He built his second home - the Craftsman bungalow at 708 E. Shoshone St. - in 1910. It is McCollum's second house that is listed on the National Register.

The first McCollum house has gone through significant changes over the past century, and is nearly unrecognizable now, but the original front gables are still visible from 7th Avenue.

to all three of the Gooding School District's schools — was bustling with activity Wednesday morning.

Parents found places to park before walking their children into school buildings, while school buses pulled out of parking lots.

In Colette Born's kindergarten classroom, students sat on a colorful rug on the floor.

Using a computerized SMART Board, Horn energetically went through the things kindergartners need to remember about coming to school. Those include bringing a backpack and following the rules.

And it's the students' job to go home and tell their parents what they learn every day, she said.

Less than one hour into the school day, Born taught her students a song to help them remember the days of the week.

Then, she pointed to each letter of the alphabet on a poster on the classroom wall. She asked students to raise their hand if their name started with a certain letter.

Students giggled when Born pulled out a lion puppet named Leo. His job, she said, is to help students learn all their letters this year and the sounds they make.

Elsewhere in Gooding, students at North Valley Academy were at school Wednesday for an orientation and activity day. The first day of school is Sept. 4.

At the Idaho School for the Deaf and the Blind, the first day is Monday.

What Changes can Students, School Employees Expect?

Nearly all of the statewide education changes this year that will affect employees and students are tied to Students Come First.

But the three education reform laws will be put to a referendum vote during the November election.

Melissa McGrath, spokeswoman for the Idaho State Department of Education, said if a law is repealed, "everything would have to be addressed by the legislature during the next session."

Funding that was appropriated would most likely go into the public educational stabilization fund.

Here's a summary of what's coming this year in Idaho schools:

New Graduation Requirements for Class of 2013

High school seniors will be the first group of students required to meet new state graduation requirements.

Those include taking three years of math, three years of science, completing a senior project and

taking a college entrance exam.

State legislators approved the more rigorous requirements in 2007, but they're just now taking effect. The requirements aren't tied to Students Come First.

Online Class Requirement

This year's incoming freshmen — the class of 2016 — will be the first required to take two online classes in order to graduate.

Some options include blended classes, those taught via the Idaho Education Network and Idaho Digital Learning Academy.

"Blending learning" means a combination of in-person instruction with online tools.

More Emphasis on Program for Early Completers

It's the second year high school juniors and seniors can take advantage of a state program to get a jump start on earning college credits.

McGrath said money was available for the program last year, but expects it will be a more popular option this year.

The Dual Credit for Early Completers program allows juniors and seniors to earn up to 36 dual high school and college credits at no cost. But that's only if they meet state graduation requirements early.

Merit Pay for School Employees

Last school year, teachers and school administrators were eligible to earn a pay-for-performance bonus for the first time.

A total of \$38 million in bonuses has been appropriated by the state and is scheduled to go out Nov. 15.

But that will only happen if the law that includes merit pay remains in place after the November Students Come First referendum vote.

If the law is repealed, McGrath said the ISDE won't have the authority to distribute the money.

Laptops for High School Teachers

High school teachers will receive a laptop device this fall and training on how to use it.

McGrath said the state's purchasing division is still in negotiations with potential vendors.

Once a contract is signed, a timeline for distributing the devices will be finalized. McGrath said teachers will most likely receive the technology in October or November.

Changes to Evaluations

For the first time, student achievement growth will account for at least half of teacher and administrator performance evaluations.

Evaluations will also include input from parents.

Paul Palooza Expected to Draw Hundreds

PAUL • Up to 700 people are expected to turn out Saturday for the Paul Palooza at the new Paul Community Park.

This will be the second year the event has been held at the park, which is still under construction.

"Any money left over after the Palooza bills are paid go into the park fund," said Rich Rau, public works director for the city of Paul.

The city purchased 11.5 acres for the park about five years ago and has been working on the master plan, which includes a sprinkler water park for children, restrooms with changing areas, soccer fields, sledding hill, five covered shelters, regulation-sized horseshoe pit, walking trails along with dozens of trees and hundreds of bushes.

The original estimate for the park

was \$2.5 million, but the project will likely come in well under budget due to the amount of grants, donations and price discounts the project has received.

"This park belongs to the community and the community has really

bought into the park," Rau said.

The city received a \$150,000 grant, which required a \$150,000 match from the city and will cover the costs of the restrooms and splash park, both which are expected to be operational by spring.

The next big project will be acquiring playground equipment.

"I feel some pride in this park," said city employee James Crosland. "We've all put a lot of time and effort into this."

The Paul American Legion will perform the opening ceremony at the Palooza and there will be entertainment, games, prizes and a freewill-offering potato bar. There will also be other goodies for sale.

"Having the Paul Palooza at the park allows people to come out here and see what's going on," Rau said.

Paul City Councilman Bruce Hossfeld said the park has required an investment of time and money.

Burley Proposed Budget Draws No Public Comment

BURLEY • Not even a mouse stirred Tuesday when Burley officials asked for public comment on the city's proposed \$31.7 million FY2013 budget.

The proposed budget allots nearly

\$5.8 million for the general fund, including administration, swimming pool and golf funds.

The proposed general fund requests an increase of \$115,842 over the current year's budget.

After receiving no comment from the public the council took no action. Approval of the budget will be placed

on the agenda of an upcoming city business meeting.

According to the budget, slightly more than \$1.5 million will be levied in property taxes for the general fund, \$346,915 for the general obligation bond fund and \$154,284 for the library. A \$210,000 override levy will also be added to the library fund.

Why Government Needs a Diet

Because the possibility of effectively supervising government varies inversely with government's size, so does government's lawfulness. This iron law of Leviathan is illustrated by a dispiriting story that begins with the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, aka the stimulus, that supposedly temporary response to an economic emergency.

Because nothing is as immortal as a temporary government program, the Communities Putting Prevention to Work (CPPW), a creature of the stimulus, was folded into the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010, aka Obamacare. And the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), working through CPPW, disbursed money to 25 states to fight, among other things, the scourge of soda pop.

In Cook County, Ill., according to an official report, recipients using some of a \$16 million CDC grant "educated policymakers on link between SSBs [sugar sweetened beverages] and obesity, economic impact of an SSB tax, and importance of investing revenue into prevention." According to a Philadelphia city website, a \$15 million CDC grant funded efforts to "campaign" for a "two-cent per ounce excise tax" on SSBs. In California, an official report says a \$2.2 million CDC grant for obesity prevention funded "training for grantees on media advocacy" against SSBs. A New York report says a \$3 million grant was used to "educate leaders and decision-makers about, and promote the effective implementation of ... a tax to substantially increase the price of beverages containing caloric sweetener." The Rhode Island Department of Health used a \$3 million grant for "educating key decision-makers to serve as champions of specific ... pricing and procurement strategies to reduce consumption of" SSBs. In government-speak, "educating" is synonymous with "lobbying."

Clearly some of the \$230 million in CDC/CPPW anti-obesity grants was spent in violation of the law, which prohibits the use of federal funds "to influence in any manner ... an official of any government, to favor, adopt, or oppose, by vote or otherwise, any legislation, law, ratification, policy, or appropriation." But leaving legality aside, is such "nutrition activism" effective?

Not according to Michael L. Marlow, economics professor at California Polytechnic State University, and Sherzod Abdulkadirov of the Mercatus Center at George Mason University. Writing in Regulation quarterly ("Can Behavioral Economics Combat Obesity?"), a publication of the libertarian Cato Institute, they powerfully question the assumptions underlying paternalistic policies such as using taxes to nudge

individuals to make consumption choices that serve their real but unrecognized interests — e.g., drinking fewer SSBs.

Paternalists wield two weapons, mandating the provision of more information (e.g., calorie counts for restaurant menu items) and increasing the cost of bad decisions, meaning those the paternalists disapprove. Marlow and Abdulkadirov respond:

"Most obese individuals know they are heavy, and that many of the foods they eat are high-calorie. They also face the stigma often linked to obesity. They hardly need the government to give them additional incentives to lose weight. People aware of their mistakes also have strong incentives to correct them."

Research indicates that overweight individuals have "reasonably close" to accurate estimates of the increased health risks and decreased life expectancy associated with obesity. Hence the weakness of mandated information as a modifier of behavior. A study conducted after New York City mandated posting calorie counts in restaurant chains concluded that while 28 percent of patrons said the information influenced their choices, researchers could not detect a change in calories purchased after the law.

Other research findings include: A study of nearly 20,000 students from kindergarten through eighth grade found that among those with easy access to high-calorie snacks in schools, 35.5 percent were overweight — compared with 34.8 percent of children in schools without such snacks. Nutrition policy is replicating a familiar pattern: Increased taxes on alcohol and tobacco mostly decrease consumption by light users, not the heavy users who are the social problem, and whose demand is relatively inelastic.

The robust market in diet books, weight loss centers, exercise equipment, athletic clubs, health foods — between 1987 and 2004, 35,272 new food products were labeled "no fat" or "low fat" — refutes the theory that there is some "market failure" government must correct. But as long as there are bureaucrats who consider themselves completely rational and informed, there will be policies to substitute government supervision of individuals for individuals' personal responsibility.

As the soft paternalism of incentives fails, there will be increasing resort to the hard paternalism of mandates and proscriptions. Hence the increasing need to supervise our supervisors, the government.

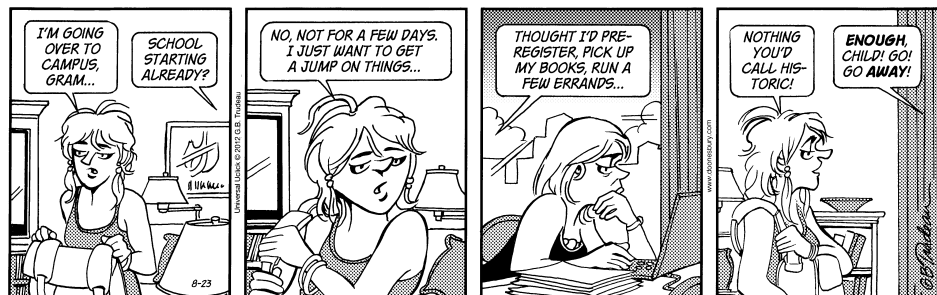

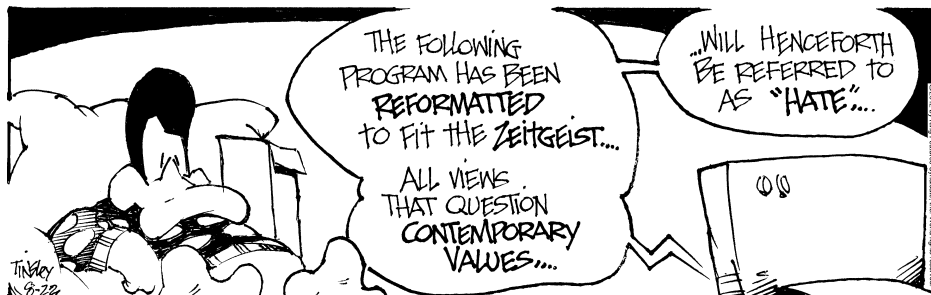

Idaho Power Begins Work on New Plan

TWIN FALLS • After releasing its newest growth plan just little more than a year ago, Idaho Power Co. is already preparing to roll out another edition.

The Integrated Resource Plan lays out the utility's business plan, growth predictions and future projects. Idaho Power updates the plan every two years, with the next plan scheduled to be released sometime in 2013.

Idaho Power started work on the new plan last week on Aug. 16. A 20-member customer representative group will meet for the next four months to discuss what the plan should include.

During the first meeting, committee members discussed the all-time system peak in energy demand that occurred earlier this year.

This year, Idaho Power chose not to select a member from the Snake River Alliance for the advisory committee after publicly disagreeing on coal energy.

"(...) like any member of the public it is free to attend the IRP meetings and constructively offer its views during the process," said Dan Minor, executive vice president and chief operating officer for Idaho Power, in a letter addressing SRA on a company website. "It is through the IRP process that SRA can most productively express its views."

The meetings are open to the public and are held in Boise. The next meeting is scheduled for Sept. 6.

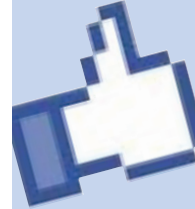

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Rainfall Helps Suppress Wildfires

TWIN FALLS • Tuesday's rainfall slowed the 93,720 acre Halstead forest fire's growth despite heavy flame activity in several locations, according to fire officials.

Fire officials continue to focus on burnout activities in Kelly Creek. Dozers were sent to build a fire line on the ridgeline above Upper Harden Creek on Wednesday.

Campgrounds remain closed, but fire officials lifted the evacuation order for Yankee Fork residents. State highways 21 and 75 remain open, but fire officials are encouraging people to check for closures before traveling near the Halstead Fire area.

Because of the fire's smoke, air quality remains moderate throughout Blaine County, according to the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality.

A burn ban is in place and those who are sensi-

tive to the smoke should limit prolonged outside exertion.

Also Burning:

Trinity Ridge: The 97,000 acre forest fire continues to actively burn near Featherville. The Elmore County sheriff ordered an evacuation from Featherville to the Paradise area because of thick smoke and poor visibility.

A Type I Incident Management Team was scheduled to take over the northwest portion of the fire Wednesday evening.

Fire crews will attempt to do a burnout in the Pine-Featherville corridor once weather conditions allow. Currently, fire crews are improving fire structure protection and waiting for the right time to offensively suppress the fire.

Minidoka Complex Fire: Although all four of the wildfires in the Minidoka Complex are contained, fire crews continue to monitor remaining hot spots.

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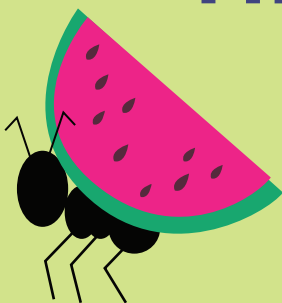
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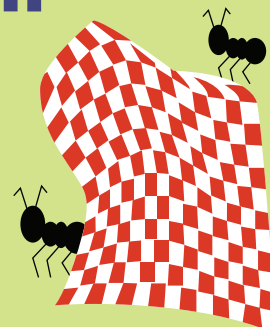

Middle Class' Share of Income Shrinking

WASHINGTON (AP) • The middle class is receiving less of America's total income, declining to its smallest share in decades as median wages stagnate in the economic doldrums and wealth concentrates at the top.

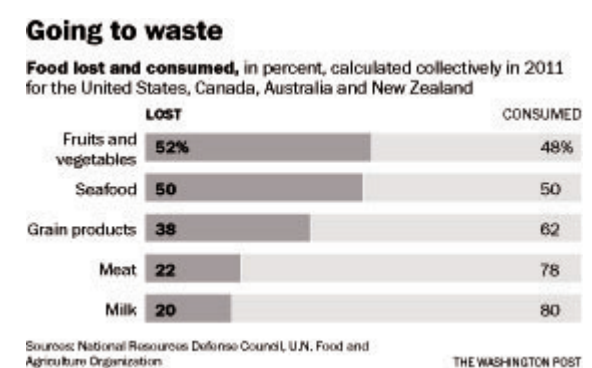
A study released Wednesday by the Pew Research Center highlights diminished hopes for the roughly 50 percent of adults defined as middle class, with household incomes ranging from \$39,000 to \$118,000. The report describes this mid-tier group as suffering its "worst decade in modern history," having fallen in income for the first time since the end of World War II.

Three years after the recession technically ended, middle class Americans are still feeling the economic pinch, with most saying they

were forced to reduce spending in the past year. And fewer now believe hard work will allow them to get ahead in life. Families are now more likely to say their children's economic future will be the same or worse than their own.

In all, 85 percent of middle class Americans say it is more difficult now than a decade ago to maintain their standard of living. Some 62 percent say a lot of the blame lies with Congress. A slight majority say a lot lies with banks and other financial institutions.

"The job market is changing, our living standards are falling in the middle, and middle-income parents are now afraid that their children will be worse off than they are," says Timothy Smeeding, a University of Wisconsin-Madison economics professor.



From Farm to Fork, Food is Wasted in U.S.

Americans throw away up to 40 percent of their food every year, cramming landfills with at least \$165 billion worth of produce and meats at a time when hundreds of millions of people suffer from chronic hunger globally, according to an analysis released Tuesday by the Natural Resources Defense Council.

The analysis, a compilation of various studies and statistics, found that waste exists from farm to fork even as an ongoing drought threatens to boost food prices. But the resources that the government has devoted to identifying where the inefficiencies exist and how to combat them pale in comparison to efforts underway in Europe, particularly in the United Kingdom, the report concluded.

For now, the relatively low U.S. prices make it easy to toss food, which may explain why the average American family of four ends up trashing the equivalent of up to \$2,275 worth of food each year, the report said. These wasteful tendencies have worsened over time, with the average American dumping 10 times as much food as a consumer in Southeast Asia, up 50 percent from the 1970s.

Against that backdrop, it's no wonder that food makes up the largest component of solid waste in landfills, said Dana Gunders, the NRDC scientist who authored the study. The frustration for environmentalists is that natural resources — water, land and energy — are used to produce all that uneaten food, which is why the NRDC is weighing in on the topic, Gunders said.

"We're essentially tossing every other piece of food that crosses our path," she said in a statement. "That's money and precious resources down the drain."

The analysis cites weak spots along every step of the food production chain. On the farm, growers sometimes do not harvest foods because of poor market prices that make it difficult for them to recoup their labor and transportation costs, the report said.

The market also forces growers to cull the crops they do harvest, removing foods (produce in particular) with blemishes or other cosmetic defects. The report cites a farmer who estimates that 75 percent of the cucumbers he culls are edible and a tomato-packing house that says it can fill a dump truck with 22,000 pounds of discarded tomatoes every 40 minutes in mid-season.

NEW AIDS-LIKE DISEASE DISCOVERED

Researchers have identified a mysterious new disease that has left scores of people in Asia and some in the United States with AIDS-like symptoms even though they are not infected with HIV.

The patients' immune systems become damaged, leaving them unable to fend off germs as healthy people do. What triggers this isn't known, but the disease does not seem to be contagious.

This is another kind of acquired immune deficiency that is not inherited and occurs in adults, but doesn't spread the way AIDS does through a virus, said Dr. Sarah Browne, a scientist at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases.

She helped lead the study with researchers in Thailand and Taiwan where most of the cases have been found since 2004. Their report is in Thursday's New England Journal of Medicine.

"This is absolutely fascinating. I've seen probably at least three patients in the last 10 years or so" who might have had this, said Dr. Dennis Maki, an infectious disease specialist at the University of Wisconsin in Madison.

It's still possible that an infection of some sort could trigger the disease, even though the disease itself doesn't seem to spread person-to-person, he said.

The disease develops around age 50 on average but does not run in families, which makes it unlikely that a single gene is responsible, Browne said. Some patients have died of overwhelming infections, including some Asians now

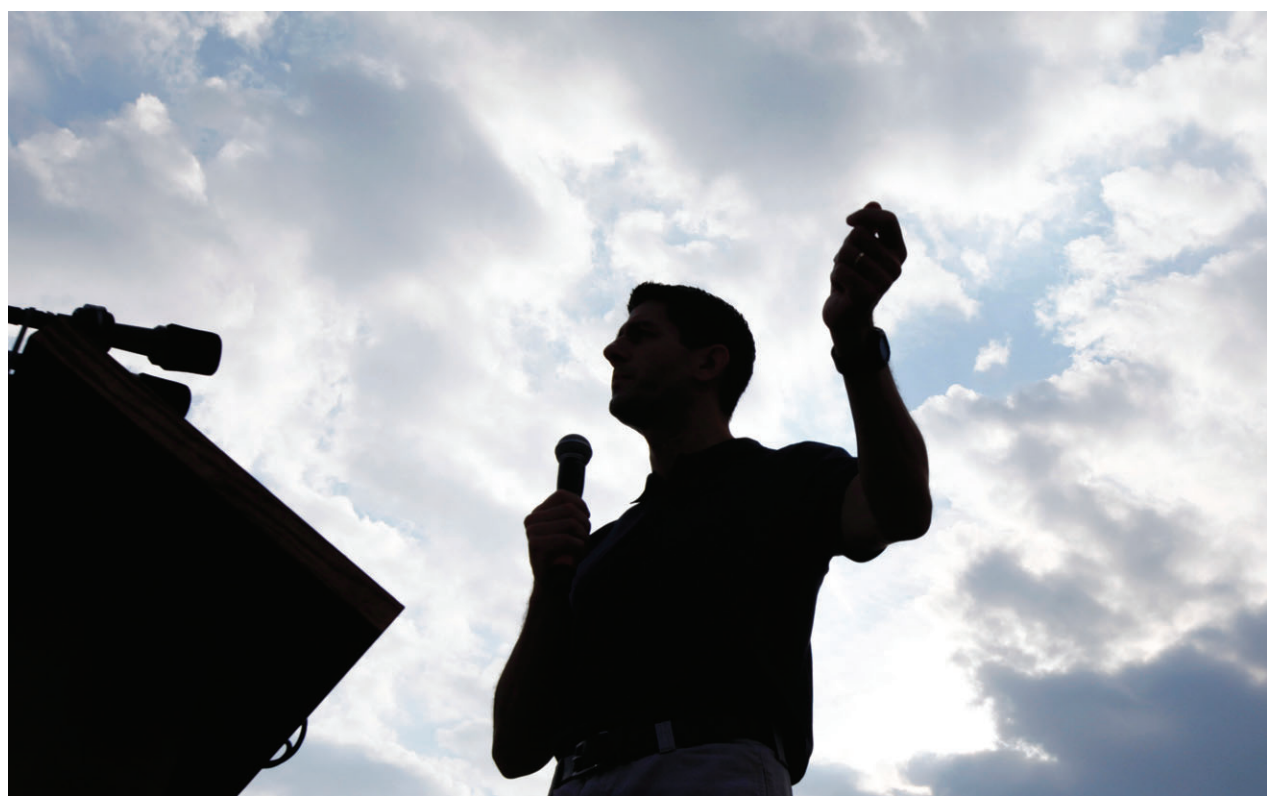
living in the U.S., although Browne could not estimate how many.

Kim Nguyen, 62, a seamstress from Vietnam who has lived in Tennessee since 1975, was gravely ill when she sought help for a persistent fever, infections throughout her bones and other bizarre symptoms in 2009. She was sick off and on for several years and

visited Vietnam in 1995 and again in early 2009.

"She was wasting away from this systemic infection" that at first seemed like tuberculosis but wasn't, said Dr. Carlton Hays Jr., a family physician at the Jackson Clinic in Jackson, Tenn. "She's a small woman to begin with,"

GOP Upheaval Mars Convention

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) • This is the convention prelude of the Republicans' dreams — their nightmares, that is.

Mitt Romney wanted to preside over a made-for-TV gathering showcasing his economic credentials and GOP unity. Instead, he's heading to Tampa with the national debate focused on rape and abortion and with the divisions within his party — and with running mate Paul Ryan — on full display.

"It's a huge distraction," Saul Anuzis, a RNC member from Michigan and a top Romney backer, said of the emo-

tional quarreling touched off by embattled Missouri Rep. Todd Akin earlier this week. "We should be talking about the economy and here we are consumed by these side issues."

Even the weather is threatening to spoil Romney's party. As Wednesday's rain pounded the arena and hotel complex where the convention is scheduled for next week, Anuzis lamented the tropical storm churning toward Florida, saying that "it could cause havoc; it could be a chaotic situation from a transportation and security standpoint."

All this as a new Associated Press-GfK poll showed a neck-and-neck race between Romney and President Barack Obama just over two months before the election. Some 47 percent of registered voters say they plan to vote for Obama, while 46 percent favor Romney. That's virtually the same as last month — and evidence that Romney didn't get a bounce of support by choosing Ryan as his vice presidential nominee.

Romney and Ryan sought to gain ground Wednesday with fresh

Civil War Shakes Damascus-Beirut Ties

BEIRUT (AP) • The Syrian civil war has spilled over into Lebanon, bringing with it sectarian street clashes, mob violence and general government paralysis in Beirut.

But it was the dramatic arrest earlier this month of a former Lebanese government minister and prominent supporter of Syria's embattled president that has suggested the conflict may be causing Lebanon to slip further away from Damascus' long domination.

The bloodshed in Syria has drawn Lebanon deeper into the unrest — a troubling sign for a country that has gone through its own 15-year civil war and has an explosive sectarian mix as well as deep divisions between pro- and anti-Syrian factions, many of which are armed.

The chaos could give Sunni Muslim fighters in

northern Lebanon more leeway to establish supply lines to the rebels inside Syria in their battle to oust President Bashar Assad.

pro- and anti-Assad groups that killed at least six people and wounded more than 70.

Britons Shrug Off Naked Prince

LONDON (AP) • Britain's Prince Harry has been caught on camera doing something embarrassing — again.

Celebrity gossip website TMZ on Tuesday posted photos of the 27-year-old royal cavorting nude with an unidentified woman in a VIP suite in Las Vegas. It's hardly the first time the prince —

who allegedly disrobed as part of a game of strip pool — has been filmed in a compromising situation. The third-in-line to the throne was famously photographed wearing a Nazi uniform for a costume party, and in another photo gaffe he was seen cupping the breast of a female TV presenter.

If the reaction of Britons to

Harry's Las Vegas adventure was anything to go by, the nude photos will do little to tarnish his generally positive, party-prince image.

Jim Conlon, a 60-year-old construction worker: "The answer to that is categorically no." Conlon, who was unloading bags of material from a car, seemed genuinely offended by the very question.

"I'd be proud of him if he were my son," he said.

Conlon's opinion was typical of a country where thousands of streets and pubs are named for the royal family. Polls showed support for the monarchy at an all-time high, perhaps buoyed by the celebrations surrounding Queen Elizabeth II's Diamond Jubilee celebrations.

Democrats Won't Disclose Donors Until after Event

Democrat Party officials say they will not release the names of donors to next month's political convention before the event, despite an earlier pledge that they would regularly disclose the contributors.

In its marketing materials, the party promises that the "people's convention,"

set to begin Sept. 3 in Charlotte, N.C., will be the "most open and accessible ever." But the names of donors, some of whom are giving up to \$100,000, will remain secret until federal disclosure documents are filed Oct. 15, six weeks after the parties have ended and public attention shifts.

Curiosity Rover Goes for a Test Drive

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) • Curiosity took its first test drive around the gravel-strewn Martian terrain Wednesday, preparation for the ultimate road trip to find out if life could have existed on the red planet.

The six-wheel NASA rover did not stray far from the spot where it landed more than two weeks ago. It

rolled forward about 15 feet, rotated to a right angle and reversed a short distance, leaving track marks on the ancient soil.

Mission managers were ecstatic that the maiden voyage of the \$2.5 billion mission was glitch-free.

"It couldn't be more important," said project manager Peter Theisinger at the

NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory. "We built a rover. So unless the rover roves, we really haven't accomplished anything. It's a big moment."

The short spin came a day after Curiosity successfully wiggled its wheels to test its steering capabilities.

Curiosity landed in Gale Crater near the Martian

equator Aug. 5 to explore whether the environment once supported microbial life. The touchdown site has been named Bradbury Landing in honor of the late "The Martian Chronicles" author Ray Bradbury, who would have turned 92 on Wednesday.

The rover's ultimate destination is Mount Sharp, a

towering mountain that looms from the ancient crater floor. Signs of past water have been spotted at the base, which provides a starting point to hunt for the chemical building blocks of life.

Before Curiosity treks toward the mountain, it will take a detour to an intriguing spot 1,300 feet away

where it will drill into bedrock. With the test drive out of the way, Curiosity was expected to stay at its new position for several days before making its first big drive — a trip that will take as long as a month and a half.

Curiosity won't head to Mount Sharp until the end of the year.

but when I first saw her, her weight was 91 pounds, and she lost down to 69 pounds."

Nguyen (pronounced "when") was referred to specialists at the National Institutes of Health who had been tracking similar cases. She spent nearly a year at an NIH hospital in Bethesda, Md., and is there now for monitoring and further treatment.

"I feel great now," she said Wednesday. But when she was sick, "I felt dizzy, headaches, almost fell down," she said. "I could not eat anything."

AIDS is a specific disease, and it stands for acquired immune deficiency syndrome. That means the immune system becomes impaired during someone's lifetime, rather than from inherited gene defects like the "bubble babies" who are born unable to fight off germs.

The virus that causes AIDS — HIV — destroys T-cells, key soldiers of the immune system that fight germs. The new disease doesn't affect those cells, but causes a different kind of damage. Browne's study of more than 200 people in Taiwan and Thailand found that most of those with the disease make substances called autoantibodies that block interferon-gamma, a chemical signal that helps the body clear infections.

Blocking that signal leaves people — like those with AIDS — vulnerable to viruses, fungal infections and parasites, but especially micobacteria, a group of germs similar to tuberculosis that can cause severe lung damage.

U.S. Home Sales Continue to Rise

WASHINGTON (AP) • The recovery of the U.S. housing market is looking steadier and more sustainable, a trend that will likely add to economic growth in 2012 for the first time in seven years.

Purchases, construction and prices are gradually but consistently increasing, though they remain far below levels seen in a healthy economy.

Sales of previously occupied homes rose 2.3 percent in July from June to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 4.47 million, the National Association of Realtors said Wednesday. Over the past 12 months, sales have jumped more than 10 percent.

New-home sales have been strengthening, too. Toll Brothers, a builder of high-end homes, said Wednesday that it's enjoying its most sustained demand in more than five years.

The "evidence that the housing market is recovering ... is fairly clear across a wide

range of reports," said John Ryding, an economist at RDQ Economics, a forecasting firm. Housing "is now becoming a small positive for the economic outlook."

That's a big change for an industry that has been a major drag on the economy since the housing bubble burst more than five years ago. Michelle Meyer, an economist at Bank of America Merrill Lynch, forecasts that home construction will add 0.2 percentage points to growth this year. That would make 2012 the first full calendar year in which housing has added to growth since 2005.

Other recent reports add to the picture of an improving housing market, though one that's recovering at a painfully slow and uneven pace.

Home prices are rising nationwide. They increased 2.2 percent from April to May, according to one leading index. That was the second straight increase after seven months of flat or declining

prices.

The median U.S. home price rose 9.4 percent in July compared with a year earlier to \$187,300, the Realtors' group said. That was the biggest annual gain in 6½ years. One reason for the increase is that foreclosed homes, which usually sell at steep discounts, are making up a smaller proportion of sales than they did a year ago.

Builders, meanwhile, are growing more confident because they're seeing more traffic from potential buyers. An index of builder confidence rose to its highest level in five years in August.

Builders responded by applying for the largest number of building permits in nearly four years last month. They broke ground on slightly fewer new homes in July than in June. But that was after the number of housing starts had reached a 3½-year high in June.

than Lebanon and four times more populous, Syria has long had powerful allies here, including the Iran-backed militant Hezbollah group that now dominates the government. For much of the past 30 years, Lebanese have lived under Syrian military and political domination.

That grip began to slip in 2005, when former Prime Minister Rafik Hariri was assassinated in Beirut. Widely accused of involvement — something it has always denied — Syria was forced to withdraw its troops. But the killings of anti-Syrian figures continued and opponents of

Assad's regime say he has maintained his influence through allies who now control the government.

All this made the Aug. 9 arrest of former Information Minister Michel Samaha all the more shocking.

Samaha, one of Syria's most loyal allies in Lebanon who has long acted as an unofficial media adviser to Assad, was plucked from his bed at dawn by special police forces who burst into his summer mountain home. Within hours, various leaks began emerging that Samaha had confessed to having personally transported explosives in his car from Syria to Lebanon with the purpose of killing Lebanese personalities at the behest of Syria.

criticism of Obama on health care in separate rallies and with a new TV ad. But Republican troubles persisted, just as the party had seemed to be moving past deep divisions between its establishment and conservative wings in the name of rallying behind its presidential nominee and beating Obama.

Instead, the ticket found itself still overshadowed by the uproar over Akin's refusal to drop out of his Senate race after causing a stir by saying that women's bodies have ways of preventing pregnancies in cases of "legitimate rape." He has apologized repeatedly and has said he misspoke, but he also has bucked calls from top Republicans — including Romney and Ryan — to abandon his bid.

"It's bad timing. Akin happening now sort of amplifies the whole thing,"

Charlie Black, a veteran GOP presidential campaign strategist and informal Romney adviser, said, referring to distractions from the campaign's economic message.

Romney spokesman Kevin Madden tried putting the matter to rest during a campaign stop in Arkansas, telling reporters he did not expect the presumptive nominee to address Akin's comments further.

"We said what we needed to say," Madden told reporters.

As final preparations were being made for the four-day convention, there were fears rippling through the national party that fallout from the Akin situation demonstrated weakness by the GOP leaders who are uniting behind Romney. But Black and others predicted that the national conversation will shift back to the economy — and an unemployment rate above 8 percent — by the time Romney accepts the nomination Aug. 30.

Gene Sleuths Stop Superbug

WASHINGTON (AP) • Over six frightening months, a deadly germ untreatable by most antibiotics spread in the nation's leading research hospital. Pretty soon, a patient a week was catching the bug. Scientists at the National Institutes of Health locked down patients, cleaned with bleach, even ripped out plumbing — and still the germ persisted.

By the end, 18 people harbored the dangerous germ, and six died of bloodstream infections from it. Another five made it through the outbreak only to die from the diseases that brought them to NIH's world-famous campus in the first place.

It took gene detectives teasing apart the bacteria's DNA to solve the germ's wily spread, a saga with lessons for hospitals everywhere as they struggle to contain the growing threat of superbugs.

It all stemmed from a single patient carrying a fairly new superbug known as KPC — *Klebsiella pneumoniae* that resists treatment by one of the last lines of defense, antibiotics called carbapenems.

"We never want this to happen again," said Dr. Tara Palmore, deputy hospital epidemiologist at the NIH Clinical Center.

Infections at health care facilities are one of the nation's leading causes of preventable death, claiming an estimated 99,000 lives a year. They're something of a silent killer, as hospitals fearful of lawsuits don't like to publicly reveal when they

outfox infection control — yet no hospital is immune.

Wednesday, government researchers published an unusually candid account of last year's outbreak, with some advice: Fast sequencing of a germ's genome, its full DNA, may be essential. It can reveal how drug-resistant bacteria are spreading so that doctors can protect other patients.

"This is not an easy story to

tell," said Dr. Julie Segre, a senior investigator at NIH's National Human Genome Research Institute. She led the genetic sleuthing that found the bug hiding in sink drains and, most chilling, even in a ventilator that had been cleaned with bleach.

Infection-control specialists at other hospitals called this detailed anatomy of an outbreak, published in the

journal *Science Translational Medicine*, important to share.

"They were able to demonstrate that this sneaky little bug was able to stay alive and get transmitted in ways they hadn't quite predicted before they had the detailed genetic information," said Dr. Sara Cosgrove, associate hospital epidemiologist at Johns Hopkins University.

ATF Official also Has Private-sector Job

In an unusual arrangement, a senior official of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives involved in the controversial gun operation Fast and Furious is receiving his government salary while working full time for the investment bank J.P. Morgan, according to two Republican lawmakers.

In a letter Tuesday to B. Todd Jones, the acting ATF director, Rep. Darrell Issa (R-Calif.) and Sen. Charles E. Grassley (R-Iowa) said that Deputy Assistant ATF Director William McMahon, who oversaw the agency's Western region during the Fast and Furious operation, has been receiving two salaries simultaneously.

The lawmakers said the ATF apparently approved allowing McMahon to remain on paid leave for four or five months while working for the investment

bank in order to reach retirement eligibility.

"ATF has essentially facilitated McMahon's early retirement and ability to double dip for nearly half a year by receiving two full-time paychecks — one from the taxpayer and one from the private sector," Issa and Grassley wrote.

ATF spokesman Mike Campbell said the agency is reviewing the letter. "Due to privacy act considerations, all we can confirm is that Bill McMahon is still currently employed by ATF," Campbell said.

The letter was provided to The Washington Post late in the day Tuesday and attempts to reach McMahon and the investment bank were unsuccessful.

McMahon is receiving a six-figure salary as an official in the ATF Office of Professional Responsibility and is serving as executive director of global security and investigations for J.P. Morgan in the Philippines, according to Issa and Grassley.

Succession Battle May Test Ethiopia's Stability

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (AP) • Ethiopian Prime Minister Meles Zenawi's death may result in a succession battle that could test the stability of one of Africa's fastest-growing economies and a key ally in the U.S.'s war against al-Qaida.

The 57-year-old premier died Aug. 20 from an infection while recuperating from an unspecified illness, according to the government. Meles died in Brussels, European Commission spokesman Olivier Bailly told reporters in the Belgian capital Tuesday. Deputy Prime Minister Hailemariam Desalegn is serving as acting prime minister.

Competition to succeed Meles may fracture the unity of the ruling Ethiopian Peoples' Revolutionary Democratic Front and embolden opposition groups frustrated by years of government suppression, said analysts including Jennifer Cooke, director of the Africa Program at the Washington-based Center for Strategic and International Studies. That may

jeopardize a state-driven program that generated average economic growth of 11 percent over the past seven years, while placing at risk Ethiopia's role as a peacekeeper in the Horn of Africa region.

"Meles has played such an outsized role in the country's leadership that there's no obvious successor or power broker within the EPRDF who will now take firm charge," Cooke said in an emailed response to questions.

Meles' administration mixed government spending on infrastructure like roads and hydropower plants with investment by companies including Amsterdam-based Heineken, the world's third-biggest brewer, and those owned by Saudi billionaire Mohamed al-Amoudi to spur the economy. Growth in Africa's biggest coffee-producing nation may slow to 6.5 percent in 2013 from 7 percent this year amid the global economic slowdown, according to the International Monetary Fund.

Norway Vows Humane Conditions for Killer

OSLO, Norway (AP) • Those expecting Anders Behring Breivik to spend the rest of his days alone in a cramped cell will be disappointed when the far-right fanatic receives his sentence Friday for killing 77 people in a bomb and gun rampage last year.

If declared insane, the confessed killer will be the sole patient of a psychiatric ward that Norway built just for him, with 17 people on staff to treat him.

If found mentally fit, he will remain isolated, for now, in the high-security prison where he uses three 86-square-foot cells: a bedroom, an exercise room and a study.

Officials at Oslo's Ila Prison say the ambition would be to eventually transfer Breivik to a section with other prisoners, who have access to a school that

teaches from primary grades through university-level courses, a library, a gym, work in the prison's various shops and other leisure activities.

It's all about a philosophy of humane prison treatment and rehabilitation that forms the bedrock of the Scandinavian penal system. "I like to put it this way: He's a human being. He has human rights. This is about creating a humane prison regime," said Ellen Bjercke, a spokeswoman for Ila Prison.

Dealing with an unrepentant killer responsible for Norway's worst massacre since World War II puts the system to, perhaps, its most challenging test yet.

During his trial, Breivik, 33, coolly described how he set off a car bomb that killed eight people and injured scores in Oslo's government

district on July 22 last year. Then he unleashed a shooting rampage that left 69 people dead, mostly teenagers, at the summer camp of the governing Labor Party's youth wing. The youngest victim was 14.

In testimony that was deeply disturbing to the bereaved, the self-styled anti-Muslim militant said he was acting in defense of Norway by targeting the left-wing political party he accused of betraying the country with liberal immigration policies.

Since Breivik's guilt is not in question, the key decision for the Oslo district court Friday is whether to declare him insane after two

psychiatric teams reached opposite conclusions on his mental health.

Its ruling will be read in a courtroom custom-built for Breivik's trial at a cost of \$6.8 million. A glass partition separates Breivik from relatives of victims attending the hearing. Remote-controlled cameras capture the proceedings, and a video feed is distributed to court rooms around Norway, where other relatives can watch it live.

USDA, McDonald's Suspend Slaughterhouse Purchases

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) • The federal government and McDonald's Corp. suspended purchases of meat Wednesday from a California slaughterhouse under investigation for animal cruelty and possible health issues.

The fast-food chain joined the U.S. Department of Agriculture in severing ties with Central Valley Meat Co.

The suspensions occurred after an animal welfare group's covert video showed cows that appeared to be sick or lame being beaten, kicked, shot and shocked in an attempt to get them to walk to slaughter.

"There are behaviors in the video which appear to be unacceptable and would not adhere to the standards we demand of our suppliers," McDonald's said in a release.

Federal officials say nothing they have seen so far in the video shows meat from cows that may have been sick made it into the food supply, but interviews with employees were ongoing.

The video was shot in June and July by an undercover

operative for the group Compassion Over Killing who worked at the plant and also gave a written statement to the USDA about events not on tape.

"We do know that workers were trying to make non-ambulatory cows not eligible for slaughter go to slaughter," said Erica Meier, executive director of the animal welfare organization. "We believe red flags are raised for sure with our video, but it's up to the USDA to decide."

It's against the law to slaughter a non-ambulatory animal for food out of concern that it could be infected with bovine spongiform encephalopathy, also known as mad cow disease.

The Hanford slaughterhouse is in the same city where a dairy cow at a rendering plant was discovered in April to have mad cow disease. The USDA said earlier this month it was an isolated case and didn't pose a threat to the food supply.

Central Valley Meat Co. primarily slaughters dairy

cows that have lost their value as milk producers.

The USDA bought 21 million pounds of beef from the company in 2011 for the national school lunch and other federal food programs.

Records show the government made five large-scale purchases of ground and chunk beef, spending more than \$50 million of the total \$135 allocated by the government for such acquisitions that year.

USDA spokesman Justin DeJong said he did not know to which government food programs the beef was allocated. The meat generally goes to the national school lunch program and food distribution on Indian reservations, and is available for discount purchases by community food banks.

"The department works to ensure that product purchased for the federal feeding programs meets stringent food safety standards and that processors comply with humane handling regulations," the USDA said in a statement.

ALMO • As you drive along a dirt road toward the City of Rocks National Reserve, granite spires emerge, shooting from the horizon and piercing the blue sky. Further up the road, the landscape twists and bulges as rolling hills of sagebrush give way to a strange jumble of rocks. The scene that rises before you is the same one emigrants saw as they made their way across the California Trail to a new world in the West. They thought this area resembled a dismantled city of rocks, and the name stuck. In 1852, about 52,000 people traveled through City of Rocks on their way to California goldfields. But before these early visitors passed through in wagons, Shoshone-Bannocks roamed this land hunting and gathering

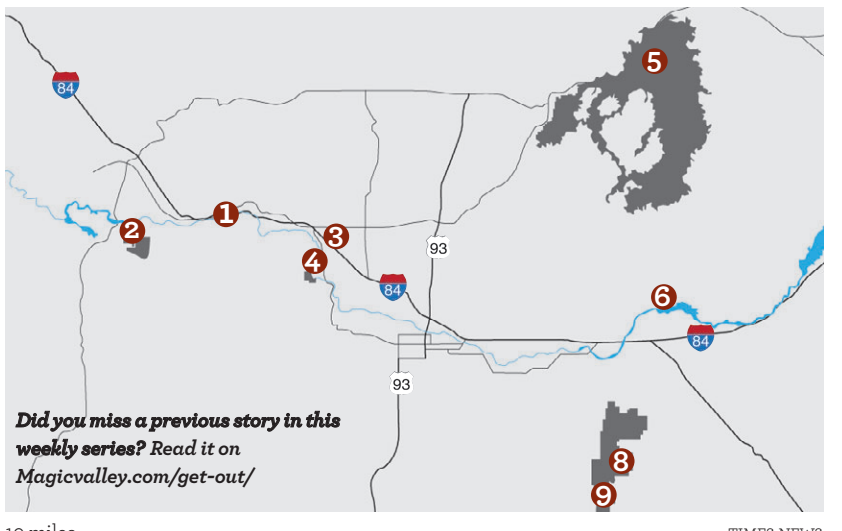
nuts from the largest pinyon pine tree forest in Idaho. The reserve has some of the tallest pinyon pines in Idaho at more than 55 feet. Today the reserve attracts 100,000 visitors a year who come to hike, bike and climb. And for two-thirds of those people, City of Rocks is the destination of their travels — not a stop on their way to elsewhere. What's the big attraction? World-class rock climbing on granite faces. **Which Rocks Can I Climb?** Favorite climbing locations include Rabbit Rock, Morning Glory Spire and Bread Loaves. You are not allowed to climb the rocks along the California Trail such as Camp, Treasure and Register. The reserve features about 700 developed routes. A

permit to climb is not required, but managers recommend that you stop at the visitor center for information, regulations and maps. If you want to put in a new climbing route you will need a permit. Routes are a mixture of moderate to difficult, so climbing experience is required. "Most rock climbers have been here or heard of us," said Wallace Keck, City of Rocks superintendent. If you are new to rock climbing, consider enrolling in the *Please see ROCKS, O2*

Become a Participant in Wildlife Management

One of the great things about living in Idaho, at least for me, is its many opportunities for outdoor recreation. You don't have to travel far to get in touch with nature. On a recent family trip to visit a friend who lives near the South Hills — before the Cave Canyon Fire — my family and I saw a deer prance across a field. It was a pretty sight, and I'm glad my son was there to see it. We enjoyed seeing the deer healthy and alive in its natural habitat, though I'm sure if an avid hunter saw the deer he would have thought, "If only it were hunting season..." Be patient, hunters. Deer season is just around the corner. Here's something for you to chew on until then: the three-day Idaho Wildlife Summit, which begins Friday.



Don't worry, you don't have to travel to Boise to be a part of it. For Magic Valley residents, a satellite location will be at Canyon Crest Dining Event Center, 330 Canyon Crest Drive, Twin Falls. You can even participate online. The event, which includes speakers and discussion, begins at 3 p.m. Friday and at 8 a.m. Saturday and Sunday. The event allows residents to participate and to interact in real time. The purpose of the summit is to involve as many people as possible in helping to set the direction for how wildlife is managed in Idaho, to find common ground, and ultimately to build a broader base of support for wildlife conservation. According to Fish and Game, more than 800 hunters and anglers are signed up to participate in the statewide event. But the department would like to see even more get involved. "Your participation in the summit will be vital as we lay the groundwork that will help chart a future for fish and wildlife that benefits today's Idahoans as well as generations to follow," said regional conservation officer Gary Hompland. "State management of fish and wildlife is at a crossroads. The Idaho landscape today is quite different from 1938 when a citizens' initiative led by hunters and anglers created the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. "The state's population has tripled. Guided by Law

A licensed Magic Valley river guide is concerned about illegal operations on the Snake.

HAGERMAN • Steve Meckler has been a licensed outfitter and river guide for about 20 years. He's met a lot of people in that time, often taking them on dinner cruises and river trips on the Snake River as part of his family-owned Thousand Springs Tours. In order for him to do the work — and receive compensation for doing it — he has to be licensed with the Idaho Outfitter and Guides Association, pay for county permits and be insured and bonded. It costs money. But no biggie, he said, because he's an honest man. What chaps his hide is those who act outside the law. They might provide boat trips or river tours and receive compensation for their time, he said, but are not properly licensed. This season is the first time Meckler

believes he's encountered any illegal outfitters in his neck of the woods. He's seen unfamiliar faces on the Snake River this summer, taking people fishing or boating. Because he also noticed unlicensed guides advertising their services on Craigslist.com, he said, he suspects those people he saw acting as guides on the river aren't licensed. "This is the first time we've ever had any problems around here," Meckler said. "It just seems like they're coming out of the walls this year." That's wrong, Meckler said. Not only do illegal guides escape licensing and permit fees, sometimes reaching more than \$1,000, but they take business from licensed professionals. In some cases, he said, someone without a guide's license might think he or she is bypassing the law by not charging fees but asking for donations instead. But that's still wrong and punishable by law, said Randy Wadley, enforcement chief for Idaho Outfitter and Guides Association. Anyone posing as an outfitter or guide, he said, may face fines, suspension or revocation of their *Please see GUIDE, O2*

Climbing Experience Program, designed to introduce participants to techniques and equipment; make reservations by calling 208-824-5901.

What Can I Do Besides Rock Climb?

If you look closely you can spot a silhouette gliding across puffy white clouds. If you don't lose it in the sun, you might see it dart back to its nest high atop Treasure Rock.

The rocks and trees in City of Rocks National Reserve shelter winged inhabitants such as the golden eagle, gray flycatcher, pinyon jay, juniper titmouse, canyon wren and Virginia's warbler. Even the state bird — the mountain bluebird — frequents this metropolis of stone.

Be sure to pick up a bird checklist at the visitor center. It has 142 species that have a confirmed or highly expected presence at the reserve. The checklist also includes birds you might spot on your drive home.

It will help you keep track of your sightings as well as let you know what birds to look for. New or rare bird sightings are important to reserve employees, so if you spot one not on the list, let them know.

The reserve also has elk, mule deer, mountain lions, gophers, rattlesnakes, coyotes and more.

Why Is It Called Treasure Rock?

The legend, Keck said, is that a Kelton stage was robbed around 1878 on its way to a U.S. military camp in Boise. One of the robbers buried the money at the base of what we now call Treasure Rock.

Fact or fiction? We may never know.

Why? Because you can't dig in a national park, Keck said.

Why Should I Visit Camp Rock?

If you enter the reserve from the Almo entrance — by the visitor center — you'll be on City of Rocks Road, which

leads through the reserve. One of the first things you might see is a massive dome of white and gray rock on the left. Follow the trail to the east side of Camp Rock where you can still see names of emigrants written in axle grease. The names look like travelers wrote them yesterday. Look for Ida Fullinwider's name in capital letters. Fullinwider was from Kansas and passed through this area with her parents and siblings when she was 16.

Register Rock at the intersection of City of Rocks Road and Twin Sisters Road also features signature of emigrants.

You might consider downloading the automobile tour from the reserve's website to help you map out your journey. For this guide, visit <http://www.nps.gov/ciro/ciroyourvisit/automobile-tour.htm>.

Available at the visitor center for \$2.83 is the Geological Interpretive Trail guide that explains how the rocks in the reserve formed.

Can I Explore the Backcountry?

Overnight backpacking in Indian Grove is free with a permit.

Indian Grove Trail is 1.6 miles long. You can park your car in the Emery Pass picnic area. Once you hike in, you get a view of the highest point in the reserve, Graham Peak, at 8,867 feet.

It has been said that the Shoshones and Bannocks used to observe California Trail emigrants from this grove.

How Many Trails Are There to Hike?

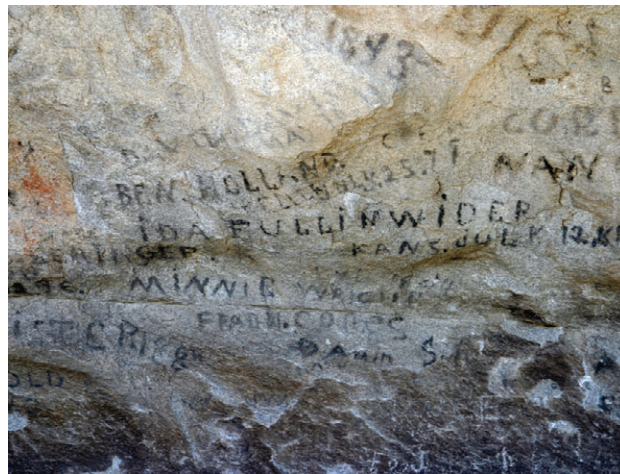
The reserve has 13 designated trails ranging from easy to strenuous. Looking for a trail to take your family on? Consider Window Arch Trail, a short 300-foot walk to an arch spanning 20 feet. Here you can see how erosion plays a part in the reserve's unique landscape.

Looking for something a little tougher? Try out North Fork Circle Creek Trail, a little more than three miles long. Here you can connect to Indian Grove Trail by walking an additional two miles if you really seek solitude inside this already silent city of rocks.

Reserve Basics

There is no entrance fee at City of Rocks National Reserve, and the reserve is open year-round.

Camping: The nightly fee for one of the 64 camping sites is \$12.72, including one vehicle.

A maximum of two vehicles, eight people and two tents are allowed at a single site. An extra \$8.48 is charged for each additional vehicle. To reserve a camping site in advance there is a fee of \$10.60.

When reserving group sites you'll pay \$26.50, plus \$3.18 per person. The

Juniper and Twin Sisters group sites each can accommodate 12 to 35 people. The Bread Loaves group site can accommodate 12 to 25.

Vault toilets and water stations are located near campsites, and most sites include a tent pad, picnic table and fire grill.

To use the showers at nearby Castle Rocks State Park's Smoky Mountain Campground is \$3 per person.

Hours: The Castle Rocks and City of Rocks visitor center is open 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday and is closed on weekends and holidays.

Visit the center first to pick up maps, receive information about the reserve and watch a 10-minute video.

Get there: From Twin Falls take Interstate 84 to exit 245 and head west toward Malta. Turn left (south) onto Idaho Highway 81 for 0.2 miles to Idaho Highway 77, then right (west). At Connor Creek Junction, turn southwest on the Elba-Almo road to the visitor center in Almo. The entrance to the reserve is about a mile south of the visitor center.

Summer is Northern Lights Season

Many celestial events are seasonal. The teapot shape of Sagittarius, for example, returns to the southern sky each year when earth reaches the position in its orbit corresponding to summer. Meteor showers return predictably, as we plow through debris left by comets whose orbits cross our own at particular locations that the earth traverses annually.

The northern lights (or aurora borealis) are seasonal as well. The sun emits a continuous stream of ionized atoms (mostly protons and electrons, the components of dissected hydrogen atoms) flying through space at hundreds of miles per second. When this solar wind approaches earth, our magnetic field deflects the charged particles toward the poles. When it reaches the upper atmosphere, it energizes or ionizes nitrogen and oxygen atoms.

Eventually, these atoms' excited electrons return to their lowest energy state,

emitting red, blue or green light, which we see as the aurora borealis (or, if you live in the southern hemisphere, the aurora australis).

Aurorae can occur at any time of the year, but they are more commonly seen in the summer, for two reasons: In summer, the North Pole is tilted toward the sun, so the incoming solar wind has a shorter path to traverse before impacting the atmosphere; and more people are outside in summer at night to see the display. So, summer is "aurora season."

The sun has seasons as well. Every 10.7 years, on average, our star undergoes a cycle of activity, as its magnetic field strength and sunspots wax and wane. At the peak, the solar wind is stronger, and aurorae are more common. As it happens, the maximum of the current solar cycle is due to arrive next spring, making the summers of 2012 and 2013 the best aurora watching seasons for the next decade.

Idahoans now live in cities, and wildlife management responsibilities are more wide-ranging than ever. The department is challenged with balancing the agency's wildlife conser-

vation and management responsibilities with available revenue sources."

If you care about Idaho's outdoors, its hunting and fishing opportunities and its wildlife, Hompland said, you should plan to attend the summit.

This is something I support, so we can continue to

see deer prance across open fields. I hope you plan to attend the summit. It's one way you, as an outdoors user, can be involved in wildlife management.

boating license, and/or be put on probation.

It's all written in black and white, Wadley said.

Idaho Code Title 36 states that a guide is someone who provides "services for the conduct of outdoor recreational activities." An outfitter "advertises or otherwise holds himself out to the public for hire" and "maintains, leases, or otherwise uses equipment or accommodations for compensation for the conduct of outdoor recreational activities..."

It is a misdemeanor to engage in outfitting or guiding without first securing a license. Idaho code takes it a step further: Those who knowingly provide compensation for someone who is acting illegally may also be

charged with a misdemeanor.

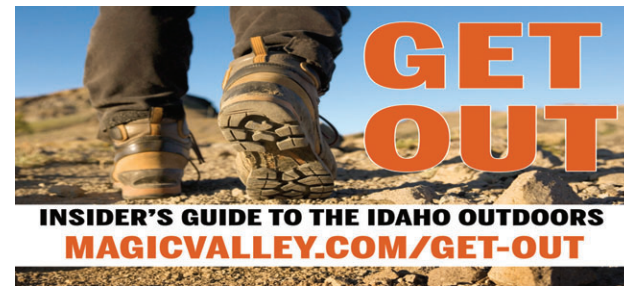
Those caught will be prosecuted before a county magistrate, Wadley said.

Lt. Darren Brown of the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office said he doesn't know with certainty of anyone in the county violating the law — "we've had reports of concerns," he said — but said there should be better communication between the outfitters board and sheriff's office. If suspicious activity occurs on the river or elsewhere in the county, he said, it should be reported immediately.

It is not illegal, however, for anyone to take people on boat rides if they do not accept compensation.

"There's nothing illegal about that," Wadley said.

The Gooding County Sheriff's Office has had a few complaints this summer about people working on the river without licenses, said Chief Deputy Jerry Pierce. The department investigated, but Pierce wouldn't reveal its findings. This is the first year he's heard any complaints in the area, he said.

Fish and Game Announces Super Hunt Winners

Chapman on Verge of Being Crowned Angler of the Year

KANSAS CITY, Mo. • Brent Chapman was getting tired of being nearly invisible on the B.A.S.S. professional tour.

Oh, he had established himself as one of the top fishermen on the circuit, qualifying 11 times for the Bassmaster Classic, the Super Bowl of fishing. And he was making a comfortable living on the tour, cashing checks consistently in national events.

But when it came to the spotlight, he was toiling in the shadows.

"It was frustrating, knowing I was doing well but still not getting much recognition," said Chapman, who lives at Lake Quivira, Mo. "In this game, you become known either by winning big tournaments or by being flashy. And the flashy part, that's just not me."

So, Chapman continued

to grind away, knowing his time would come.

And it has. Big time.

Today, Chapman has stepped front and center into the spotlight in the midst of his best season ever on the national circuit. Helicopters with television crews follow him when he goes fishing at national tournaments. Fans line up to get autographs. News conferences center on Chapman and his winning strategies. And he is being featured on the national "Bassmaster" television show that he has watched since he was a child.

That's what winning will do.

"This has been a dream season," Chapman said.

He started out by winning a divisional tournament, a Bassmaster Central Open at Lewisville Lake in Texas, in March. That gave him an automatic berth in the 2013 Bassmaster Classic.

From there, things got better. He won his first Bassmaster Elite tournament — the events reserved for top pros — with an impressive performance June 7-10 on Toledo Bend Lake on the Louisiana-Texas state line.

Now he is preparing for the biggest tournament of his life. He goes into this week's Bassmaster Elite Series finale in the lead for the Angler of the Year race, one of the most prestigious honors in pro bass fishing. If he does well at the event on Lake Oneida in New York, he will take yet another step toward becoming one of the sport's superstars.

The Angler of the Year award would pay him \$100,000. But Chapman says it's about much more than the money.

"Winning the Angler of the Year award is the toughest accomplishment in our sport," Chapman said. "It's always been a goal of mine to

be holding that trophy at the end of the year.

"In professional bass fishing, it's like taking a gold medal at the Olympics."

Chapman is a family man. He loves to spend time with his wife, Bobbi; his son, Mason; and his daughter, Makayla. His parents, Ron and Pat, are two his biggest supporters.

It was with that family background that Chapman got started in the sport. He was brought up on Lake Quivira, where he fished often with his dad. From there, Brent caught the bug. He would read Bassmaster magazine religiously and then use the lake as his laboratory.

"I would read about a lure or a technique, then I'd go out to Lake Quivira to try it," he said. "While other kids were involved with sports like football or baseball, I was fishing."

If you've never seen an actual airline ticket (no, that's not the same as a boarding pass), never mailed a first-class letter for less than 30 cents and never known Los Angeles to have a pro football team, then you might be an incoming college freshman.

So says the latest Beloit College Mindset List, which attempts to summarize what members of the Class of 2016 know and what they don't by referencing the cultural touchstones that have come and gone in their lifetime.

The list is a collection of references to pop culture (Justin Bieber and Dakota Fanning are their age), politics (a woman has run the U.S. State Department for much of their lives) and technology (their world has always existed in cyberspace).

To members of the Class of 2016, many of whom were born in 1994, "The Graduate" protagonist Benjamin Braddock could be their grandfather.

Other points on the list show not just the passage of time, but also the evolution of behavior. This year's

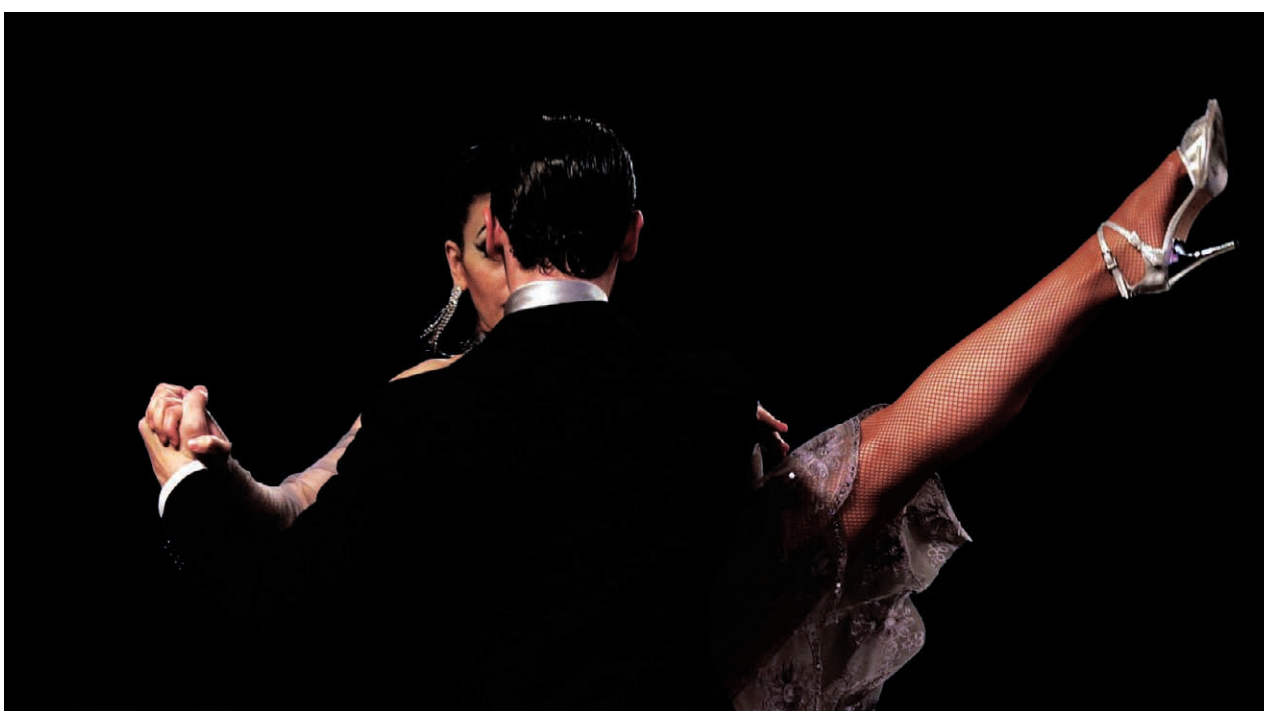
college freshman would likely think it strange for White House security to greet a group of gay elected officials by wearing rubber gloves, as happened during President Bill Clinton's first term. (A Clinton spokesman later apologized.)

Beloit College English and humanities professor Tom McBride and former college Public Affairs Director Ron Nief have compiled the list annually since 1998. As for larger trends among this year's college freshmen, McBride said one is clear.

"They've come into their teenage years at a time when there are real doubts about America's future, about whether America will continue to be a No. 1 power, about crushing debt, about recovery from the economic recession," McBride said in an interview.

"This is a generation for whom D-E-B-T is going to be a four-letter word. They're aware it was excess debt that caused the recession. They've seen older siblings graduate college and come back home without any prospects for a job. They've heard the word 'underwater' and they know it isn't referring to a swimming pool."

Book about Bin Laden Raid Due Out Sept. 11

WASHINGTON (AP) • A member of the U.S. Navy SEAL team that killed Osama bin Laden has written a firsthand account of the operation, triggering more questions about the possible public release of classified information involving the historic assault

of the terror leader's compound in Pakistan.

U.S. military officials say they do not believe the book has been read or cleared by the Defense Department, which reviews publications by military members to make sure that no classified material is revealed.

The book, titled "No Easy Day" and scheduled to be re-

leased Sept. 11, comes amid a heated debate over whether members of the military — both active duty and retired — should engage in political battles.

"I haven't read the book and am unaware that anyone in the Department has reviewed it," said Pentagon press secretary George Little. White House and CIA officials also said the

book had not been reviewed by their agencies.

The book announcement comes just as a group of retired special operations and CIA officers have launched a campaign accusing President Barack Obama of revealing classified details of the mission and turning the killing of bin Laden into a campaign centerpiece.

Colon Banned 50 Games for Testosterone

OAKLAND, Calif. • Make it two 50-game suspensions in exactly one week — both starters for contending teams from the Bay Area, both for testosterone.

Former Cy Young Award winner Bartolo Colon of the Oakland Athletics was suspended for 50 games

Wednesday after a positive test, joining San Francisco Giants outfielder Melky Cabrera on the suspended list for the rest of the regular season.

Major League Baseball made the announcement of Colon's penalty a week after All-Star game MVP Cabrera received his 50-game suspension.

"I apologize to the fans, to

He will miss the final 40 games of the regular season and the first 10 games of the postseason if Oakland ad-

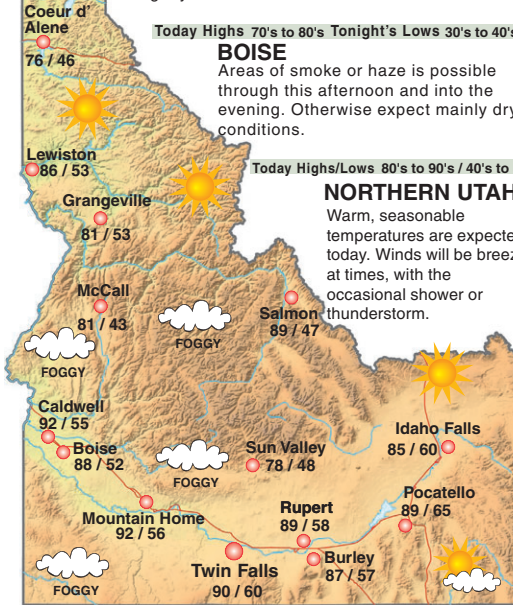

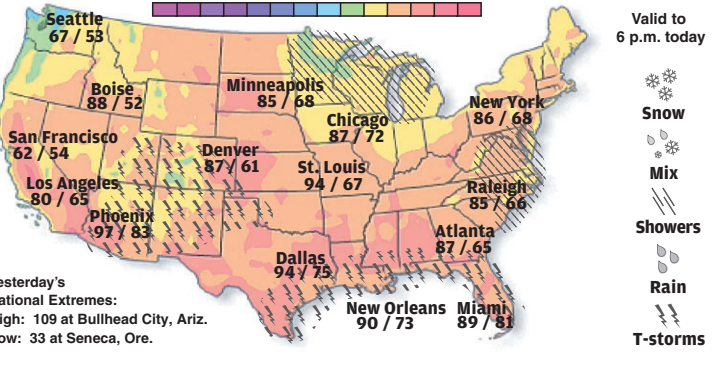

Schmitt Goes Back to School After London

ATHENS, Ga. • From Olympic star to just another college student.

For Allison Schmitt, there was hardly any time to savor her breakout performance at the London Games, where she won a total of five medals in swimming. She had to get back to Georgia for the start of her senior year.

"This is just a part of life," Schmitt said Wednesday. "In London, we felt like we were in our own little world. But once you come back, it's back to real life."

While many athletes were able to cash in on their triumphs, Schmitt retained her amateur status so she could swim one more year for the Bulldogs. She's actually looking forward to competing in dual meets, the Southeastern Conference championships and the NCAAAs, even though some might view that as a bit of a comedown from the Olympics.

"I love swimming for whatever is on my cap," she said. "I'm honored to come back to Georgia for my last year swimming with a 'G' on my cap. I'm excited to get back in the water for this team. I think we have some great things going for us this year. I'm proud to be a Bulldog."

While overshadowed a bit by U.S. teammates such as Michael Phelps, Ryan Lochte and Missy Franklin, Schmitt was right in their class when it came to the results. She won three golds, a silver and a bronze — just as many medals as Lochte and Franklin. The only London athlete, in any sport, to win more was Phelps, who claimed four golds and two silvers in his farewell Olympics.

It's all still a bit overwhelming to Schmitt, especially the part about fellow students recognizing her as she walks around campus.

"Someone stopped me as

I was walking to the bus and said, 'Are you Allison Schmitt?' And I was like, 'Yeah, that's me,'" she said, chucking. "Somebody came up to me in class and asked for a picture. It's kind of weird when people recognize me. You don't really realize that they might have been watching the Olympics this summer. It's kind of cool, too. It's definitely something I never thought would happen, but I'll take it."

Schmitt took a year off from school to prepare for the Olympics, moving to Baltimore to work with Phelps and his longtime coach, Bob Bowman.

It certainly paid off. "I wanted to concentrate without the distraction of classes and a college schedule," she said. "I knew I had to focus solely on swimming. Going to Baltimore gave me an opportunity to travel to different places when my college team would have been doing dual meets or the SECs or the NCAAAs. It was a tough decision to leave, but it was a lot easier knowing I would come back for my senior year."

She never wavered on finishing up her college eligibility, even though she could've been in line for lucrative endorsements after her starring role in London.

"Schmitt is the consummate team player," said her Georgia coach, Jack Bauerle. "I was always asked if she would come back, and there was never even a doubt about it. She loves Georgia. She's the kind of kid you want to have on your team. She's great for everybody, not just herself."

The Bulldogs have long been a college swimming powerhouse, and this year should be no exception. The Bulldogs have another gold medalist, junior Shannon Vreeland, who joined Schmitt on the winning 800-meter freestyle relay

team in London. On the men's side, they have Andrew Gemmel, who competed in the 1,500 free at the Olympics.

But Schmitt is the biggest star, an athlete of enormous talent but perhaps even more impressive when it comes to her mental outlook. Phelps and Bowman talked numerous times this summer about her perpetually cheery outlook on life, her goofy antics, and her fondness for corny jokes. She'll burst into laughter, the only one in on the punch line, while everyone around her just shakes their heads and says, "That's Schmitt."

During the Olympic trials in Omaha, she was persuaded to tell an especially bad joke on the pool deck in front of more than 10,000 spectators.

"What do a coach and a dentist have in common?" she asked. "They both use drills."

Rim shot, please. On Wednesday, she was asked if she had any new material.

"Well, my favorite joke of all time is this one," Schmitt replied.

"Knock, knock?"
 "Who's there?" the reporter dutifully replied.
 "Interrupting cow!"
 "Interrupt ..."

"Moooo!" Schmitt blurted out, breaking into a huge grin. "I just love that joke."

Her carefree attitude has carried her to great heights, and she's not done yet. Schmitt has every intention of returning for the 2016 Rio Games.

"She has a very unique approach to sports that's just inherently built in," Bauerle said. "Her mom and dad don't know where it came from. I don't know where it came from. But I'm glad it did."

"Even when she has disappointments — and anyone who's at this level has had

some pretty grand disappointments, too — she's always smiling. Sometimes it's with tears in her eyes, but she's still smiling. Like I said, we don't know where it came from, but I wish a few more of my swimmers had it. One of her greatest gifts is she actually seems to have more fun the more important it is. That's a pretty neat thing."

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

When deciding which opponent to play for length in a particular suit, you need to consider how you might recover from a wrong guess beyond simply playing the probabilities.

Against today's three-no-trump contract, one West led ace and another spade, ducked by East. Declarer played a club to East, who continued with the king and a fourth spade. Declarer discarded two hearts from dummy and now had to guess diamonds for his contract. He started by playing the king (on which East carefully played the eight), and when he followed with the ace, he had to go one down.

In the other room, where the contract was doubled, the defense started with three rounds of spades (dummy discarding a heart). Declarer won and played a club, which East again won to clear the spades, dummy discarding a club. On the spades, West had discarded two clubs.

Declarer could assume from the double that West held hearts guarded. So it was possible that he had his actual shape, though he might have fewer clubs and four diamonds.

However, declarer could see that if he played East for four diamonds, it wouldn't matter if he was wrong. He cashed the heart ace, then played the diamond ace and a diamond to the queen. When West showed out, it was simple to pick up East's jack. But suppose East had shown out. Declarer would simply have played his top hearts and exited with a heart. West would now have to return a diamond, giving declarer his trick back.

ANSWER: You do not want to jump to four hearts here; your hand has plenty of slam potential. The best way to show that is to cuebid two diamonds, then bid your hearts. If your partner bypasses hearts, you will show five when you bid the suit at your next turn.

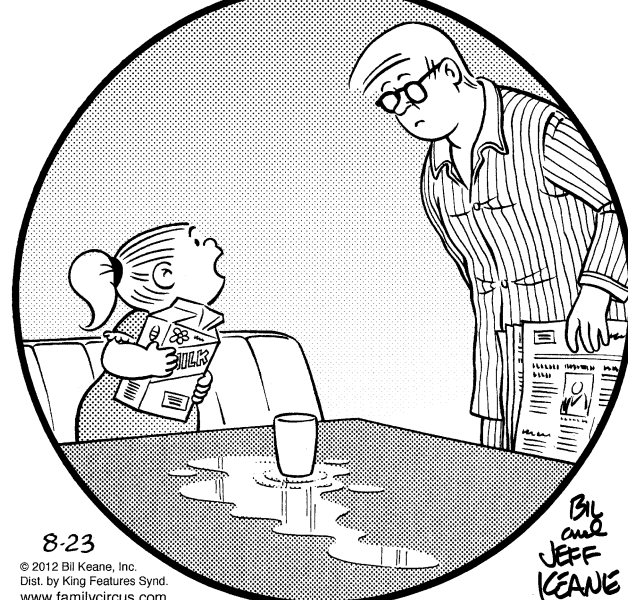

On this date:
In 1305, Scottish rebel leader Sir William Wallace was executed by the English for treason.

In 1775, Britain's King George III proclaimed the American colonies to be in a state of "open and avowed rebellion."

In 1858, "Ten Nights in a Bar-room," a play by Timothy Shay Arthur about the perils of alcohol, opened in New York.

In 1914, Japan declared war against Germany in World War I.

In 1926, silent film star Rudolph Valentino died in New York at age 31.

In 1927, amid protests, Italian-born anarchists Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti were executed in Boston for the murders of two men during a 1920 robbery.

In 1939, Nazi Germany and the Soviet Union agreed to a non-aggression treaty, the Molotov-Ribbentrop Pact, in Moscow.

In 1944, Romanian prime minister Ion Antonescu was dismissed by King Michael, paving the way for Romania to abandon the Axis in favor of the Allies.

In 1962, John Lennon married his first wife, Cynthia Powell, in Liverpool, England. (The marriage lasted until 1968.)

In 1972, the Republican National Convention, meeting in Miami Beach, nominated Vice President Spiro T. Agnew for a second term.

In 1973, a bank robbery-turned-hostage-taking began in Stockholm, Sweden; the four hostages ended up empathizing with their captors, a psychological condition now referred to as "Stockholm Syndrome."

In 1982, Lebanon's parliament elected Christian militia leader Bashir Gemayel president. (However, Gemayel was assassinated some three weeks later.)

Ten years ago: North Korean leader Kim Jong Il made his second visit to Russia in a year, meeting with President Vladimir Putin outside Vladivostok. New York publicist Lizzie Grubman pleaded guilty in a hit-and-run crash that injured 16 people outside a Hamptons nightclub. (Grubman ended up serving 37 days of a 60-day sentence at the Suffolk County, N.Y., jail, with time off for good behavior.)

Five years ago: A report by top U.S. spy analysts concluded the Iraqi government was strained by rampant violence, deep sectarian differences among its political parties and stymied leadership. Reality TV star Nicole Richie spent 82 minutes in a Los Angeles County jail to complete a four-day sentence for driving under the influence of drugs.

One year ago: A pair of judges in New York put an end to the sensational sexual assault case against Dominique Strauss-Kahn, setting him free after prosecutors questioned the credibility of the hotel housekeeper who'd accused the French diplomat. A magnitude 5.8 earthquake centered near Mineral, Va., the strongest on the East Coast since 1944, caused cracks in the Washington Monument and damaged Washington National Cathedral.
