From piggy banks to timers, parking meter owners find interesting ways to keep them useful.

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TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls residents celebrated when they learned they wouldn't have to spend 25 cents to park downtown.

Now some are spending hundreds of dollars to buy the retired meters.

When the Twin Falls City Council decided to get rid of metered parking downtown, the city ended up with the nearly 150 leftover parking meters.

Almost immediately, people asked how they could buy them. After three auctions and steady sales at the Twin Falls Parks and Recreation Department, the city has gotten rid of about half. So far, the city has collected \$5,420 in parking meter sales.

So what the heck are people doing with them? We talked to a few buyers to find out.

Piggy banks: Joanne Anderson of Twin Falls bought three meters to act as piggy banks for her grandchildren. Their father is a locksmith, she said, and would be able to fit them with a new lock. (The new locks are necessary, as there are only a couple master keys for the existing lock boxes on the meters.)

Yard art: David Patrick and his father, Rep. Jim Patrick, R-Twin Falls, bought eight meters. Some will sit outside their houses, and one will function as a piggy bank for David's 9-year-old son.

David spent Monday putting one of the meters on a pole for his grandmother for her birthday.

"It's part of Twin Falls history that we wanted to have a bit of," he said.

Decoration: Twin Falls Mayor Greg Lanting bought a meter at an Aug. 18 auction, and said he would put it in his apartment as decoration. Councilman Shawn Barigar, CEO and president of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce, had the same idea. He's displaying one in his office.

Timer: Twin Falls Parks and Recreation Director Dennis Bowyer spoke to one homebrewer who hoped to use the parking meter as a

Buhl's School Levy Heads Back to Voters

The county will test new ballot counting machines during today's election.

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BUHL • Voters will decide today whether to approve a new supplemental levy for the Buhl School District.

Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. for residents who live within the school district's boundaries.

The district is seeking a new two-year, \$400,000 annual supplemental levy. It's the only measure on the ballot during today's election.

Twin Falls County Clerk Kristina Glascock said unofficial election results are expected to come in sooner after the polls close tonight, thanks to new ballot counting machines.

"We will use them on smaller elections so that we can have results when the polls close instead of waiting for ballots to be transported to the courthouse," she said.

The Twin Falls County Clerk's Office hosted a public demonstration of the ballot counting machines Monday at the courthouse.

Glascock said she received the equipment from Ada County, which only used them once at a county fair for an advisory question.

For the Buhl election, there will be one counting machine at each precinct location. Voters will put their completed ballot into the machine.

Glascock said the screen doesn't display anything about how the person voted. It just accepts the ballot and displays if a voter left the ballot blank or marked too many choices.

Once polls close tonight, results will be called in from each precinct location. Unofficial results will then be posted on the Twin Falls County Clerk's website and at Magicvalley.com.

Ballots must still be transported to the courthouse for a second check of the results.

Absentee voting started earlier this month and wrapped up Friday.

Glascock said only about 20 people voted absentee — which could be indicative of a low voter turnout for today's election.

If passed by voters, the Buhl School District will use the supplemental levy funding to cover operating expenses and balance the budget.

"We need the levy in order for us to quit deficit-spending," superin-

Missing Paraglider Found in Blaine County

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HAILEY • The Blaine County Sheriff's Office announced Monday afternoon a lost paraglider pilot who was missing since Saturday was located. He was transported by helicopter to Friedman Memorial Airport in Hailey where he was met by an ambulance and transported to St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center for an assessment.

The pilot, Guy Anderson, 49, was located at Fish Creek at Bradsfield Canyon by an Army National Guard helicopter crew based out of Gowen Field.

Monday evening his medical

condition was unknown, but Anderson was evaluated for injuries to his left arm, ribs, spine and possible internal injuries, according to a release from the sheriff's office.

Anderson is a British citizen who was participating in the week-long Paragliding World Cup event in Sun Valley and was last heard from at about 1:20 p.m. Saturday, 7.2 air miles northeast of Hailey, above Quigley Canyon.

A tracking device reported his elevation at 10,647 feet.



Anderson planned to fly from Bald Mountain in Ketchum to Arco, about 60 miles.

On a Quiet Day, Apple Rules the Stock Market

NEW YORK (AP) • The biggest story in the stock market Monday was Apple, but that wasn't saying much. Stocks barely moved. Trading was light, even by the slumberous standards of August. Investors — those who weren't on vacation — killed time waiting for a speech by Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke later this week. The stock shot to an all-time high of \$680.87 and finished at \$675.68, up \$12.46, or 1.9 percent. Late Friday, a jury found that Samsung copied some of the features of the iPhone and iPad, and Samsung could be forced to take products off the shelves. Apple's move wasn't the biggest on the stock market Monday. Best Buy, Hertz, Dollar Thrifty and other companies all moved by bigger percentages. Apple makes up more than 13 percent of the Nasdaq composite, and helped the index grasp a slight gain, rising 3.4 points to 3,073.19. It makes up 5 percent of the Standard & Poor's 500 index, which finished down 0.69 point to 1,410.44. The Dow Jones industrial average, which does not include Apple, fell 33.30 points to 13,124.67.

Declo High School measured in with an impressive A-2 status for the second year running.


A total of six high schools won the award in the state of Idaho.

The Screen Needs to be Cleaned

Q. Why haven't they cleaned the screen at the Grandview Drive In, Twin Falls?

A. It's not just dirt that's causing problems for the theater. Windy days dusting the screen with dirt and soot from local fires have taken their toll, but the real problem is the bullet and golf ball holes that have punctured the quarter-inch thick particle board.

"We need a real good rain to wash off the screen," Managing Director Larry Roper said.

But patching the holes in the 65-year-old screen is a bit more of an endeavor — one that will have to wait until next spring when the board of directors decides whether to convert the rest of the Interstate Amusement theaters to digital.

"It's a \$50-65,000 investment," Roper explained. "If the drive-ins go digital we'll repaint the screen. If not, they'll probably close down the drive-ins."

The decision could potentially affect the Orpheum and Jerome theaters as well.

Q. When is the overpass on 850 West road going to be fixed? It adds on three extra miles to my commute to work.

A. The 850 West Road overpass west of Burley was damaged last December when an excavator hit two of the three girders at

the overpass.

The contract was finally awarded two weeks ago to Cannon Builders Inc. of Blackfoot, said Nathan Jerke, public information specialist at Idaho Department of Transportation.

"The contract begins on Monday, but there's a 28-day cure period for the concrete girders," he said.

The cure period tests the girder's strength. Once that phase is complete the actual roadwork construction can begin.

The anticipated completion date is early November.

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Housing Development Funds Get Approved

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TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls may soon have more housing options for low-income residents.

On Monday, the Twin Falls City Council approved a funding agreement with The Housing Company for a proposed housing complex.

The development would have 60 housing units, a garden and a playground. The

housing would be available to people who make less than 60 percent of the area median income for Twin Falls.

The pass-through agreement won't cost the city of Twin Falls any money, explained city manager Travis Rothweiler. Instead, the city will receive money for the project from the current property owner, then transfer the money directly to The Housing Company.

The funding approval

doesn't mean the council must approve any further requests on the development. It does allow the developers to pursue tax incentives. The council will consider the planned unit development agreement at a future meeting.

According to Kathryn Almborg, housing development officer for The Housing Company, a preliminary marketing study showed the need for about 150 low income

housing units in Twin Falls.

The council also approved a code change that requires all pawn shop employees to be fingerprinted. The new code prohibits pawn shop owners and employees who have theft, lewd conduct or any felony convictions within the past five years. Another change requires pawn shop employees to enter all merchandise in an online clearinghouse that checks for stolen items.

Hargraves reported two pilots missing at about 8:20 p.m. Saturday. At 7:30 a.m. Sunday, Blaine County Search and Rescue Command was put in place and a formal search began. Civil Air Patrol planes were dispatched to conduct a grid search, while about 50 people involved in the Paragliding World Cup searched on the ground.

The first pilot, Juan Becerra, from Venezuela was

found at about 12:45 a.m. Monday. No medical assistance was needed.

Becerra reported an emergency at about 4:20 p.m. near Flat Top Ranch, north of Carey.

On Monday, 70 people helped search for Anderson, including many pilots from the competition and search and rescue volunteers.

In the statement, Blaine County Sheriff Gene Ramsey thanked everyone who was involved in the successful search including the Idaho Army National Guard.

Storm Ignites New Wildfires in Magic Valley

TWIN FALLS • Sunday's storm threw 8,000 lightning strikes across south-central Idaho, which resulted in multiple false alarm fire starts and a handful of confirmed wildfires in the Magic Valley.

Fire crews responded to three wildfires on Sunday, according to the Bureau of Land Management. However, the storm's rainfall helped in firefighter's attempts to suppress the flames.

The largest of the fires was the Horse Butte fire just east of Clover Crossing near the BLM Jarbidge field office. The lightning-caused fire burned 745 acres with nine engines and air support re-

sponding to the fire. As of Monday, fire crews expected to control the fire by Monday evening.

The 4100 Road fire just west of Buhl burned one acre on both public and private land and has been controlled, according to the BLM.

The Red Bridge fire burned 15 acres northeast of Jerome. Jerome Rural Fire Department and five BLM engines responded to the fire and have contained and controlled the flames.

Some BLM crews were sent on Monday to check on fire reports they were unable to locate on Sunday due to stormy conditions. Fire crews contained and controlled a two-acre fire near mile

marker 180, near Devil's Corral along with a two-acre fire near Soldier Fire, north-east of the Saylor Creek Training Range.

Also Burning:

Trinity Ridge: The fire is now up to 128,000 acres northwest of Featherville. An evacuation order set by the Elmore County Sheriff's Office remains in effect.

Halstead: Burning just north of Stanley, the fire has grown to more than 104,000 acres. Air quality in Blaine County remains unhealthy for people with sensitive systems due to increased smoke from both the Halstead and Trinity Ridge fires.

If the ballot measure passes, homeowners' tax rate would increase by an estimated 82 cents per \$1,000 in assessed prop-

It will be the Buhl dis-

FDA OKs 4-in-1 HIV Combination Pill

WASHINGTON (AP) • The Food and Drug Administration on Monday approved a new anti-HIV pill that combines four medicines to combat the virus that causes AIDS.

The agency approved Gilead Sciences' Stribild as a once-a-day treatment to control HIV in adults who have not previously been treated for infection.

The pill contains two previously approved antiviral drugs, emtricitabine and tenofovir disoproxil fumarate, currently sold as the combination pill Truvada. Those drugs are combined with two new drugs: elvitegravir and cobicistat.

Elvitegravir interferes with one of the enzymes that HIV needs to multiply. Cobicistat helps prolong the effect of elvitegravir.

Company studies showed that 88 to 90 percent of patients taking Stribild had an undetectable level of HIV in their blood after 48 weeks, compared with 87 percent for patients taking Atripla, another HIV drug that contains Truvada and one other drug.

An estimated 1.2 million Americans have HIV, which develops into AIDS unless treated with antiviral drugs. AIDS causes the body's immune system to break down, leading to infections

which are eventually fatal.

Patients can live relatively healthy, normal lives when treated with antiviral cocktails.

Like most other HIV drugs, Stribild will carry a boxed warning about potentially dangerous side effects, including severe liver problems and the buildup of lactic acid. More common side effects include nausea and diarrhea.

Earlier this year, Gilead received FDA approval to market Truvada as the first preventive medicine for healthy people who are at high risk of acquiring HIV. Truvada was first approved in 2004 for patients already infected with the virus.

Twin Falls tourism up 6 percent compared to 2011.

TWIN FALLS • It's been a good summer to own an outdoor recreation company in Twin Falls.

From rafting to golfing to kayaking, local outfitters say they enjoyed a busy four months with tourism up 6 percent over last year, according to a Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce spokeswoman.

"This has been our best season yet," said Tim Pryor, owner of Pryor Paddle Rentals at Centennial Park. "It has surpassed what we anticipated."

The company, in its third year of operation, tripled its sales this summer compared with 2010 and hopes to cap it off with a big Labor Day weekend.

"We've had a lot of repeat customers, but also lots of people who haven't been out before," Pryor said.

Paddleboarding, popular for years in other states, is starting to take its place in Twin Falls next to the traditional canoeing and kayaking. Pryor said some people began trying the stand-up paddling sport last summer but "this year we rented them out quite a bit more."

Idaho Guide Service also had a lucrative summer on the water with trips on the Snake and Salmon rivers.

"We are on an upward swing," said co-owner Shelley Gardner. "It was slower three or four years ago with the economy. We had a little bit of a slump there, but things are looking really well. We've had a good water year."

A high percentage of Idaho Guide Service's clients are from out of state. Gardner said the company's marketing push is to people traveling to or from Jackson, Wyo., and Yellowstone National Park.

"They often want something to break up the

long drive," she said. "We are still in the midst of everything. We go into October now that the weather in September is better than June."

Canyon Springs Golf Course assistant golf professional Michael Ericson said they haven't set records, but experienced a modest increase in business this year. He's received many more phone calls from out of state people inquiring about prices than in the past.

"We started the season a little up and we've maintained that," Ericson said. "Things have been going pretty well. We can't expect to boost things a ton, given the economy. We can't complain."

At the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce, visitor center coordinator Judy Harr

called it "a great year" with tourism up 6 percent compared with 2011. She said the number of European visitors was down in the spring, probably due to concern over the euro. However, when things stabilized a bit, people again flocked to Twin Falls.

"We started getting our German and French people," Harr said. "It's remarkable how many Europeans we get. Most of them are on their way to Yellowstone. We are the gateway to Yellowstone from the coast, Salt Lake and even Boise."

"They go down to the falls and just fall in love with the area. We had a guy from Israel the other day and he'd been all over the West. He said this is the most beautiful place he's seen."

have joined - a total of 325 workers.

Those numbers have increased as the work performed by Amalgamated has gone up, he said.

Magic Valley unions are "healthier than most people know," Wiesmore said.

Varney said Stephen C. Cooke, a retired agricultural economist from the Univer-

sity of Idaho, did a study that found Idaho workers make \$11,000 per capita less than other workers in the nation.

Varney said unions fight for health care, seniority rights, protection of child labor laws, pensions, and against discrimination based on age, race or gender.

"Everybody has the ability to form a union," he said.

It starts with employees contacting a union and telling a representative they want to form a union. After discus-

sion between workers and the union rep, the employer is informed that workers want to unionize. Thirty percent of the employees must vote to be represented to bring a formal vote through the National Labor Relations Board, Varney said.

If 50 percent plus one vote for union membership, they are certified and have one year to bargain with the employer, he said. Varney said unions have set standards that have benefitted all

U.S. workers.

"Weekends off, paid overtime, the eight-hour workday, minimum wage are things unions have done for everybody," he said.

Varney characterizes Magic Valley unions as strong but unorganized. That's why the coalition was formed, he said.

"We're all the same," he said. "There's strength in numbers, and we want to support businesses that are union businesses."

Post-Pinch, What's Next for Digital Age?

WASHINGTON • If the swipe is the essential gesture of the smartphone revolution, the pinch is a close second. Many of the coolest things that can be done on today's mobile devices - from finding an out-of-the-way bar to determining whether a thunderstorm is going to ruin your party - are made easier by placing fingers on the screen and sliding them.

Friday's \$1 billion court ruling for Apple, which upheld patents for what manufacturers call "pinch to zoom," among other popular features, has clouded the future of the gesture for anyone inclined to buy mobile devices from other companies. Apple made clear its determination to press its advantage Monday, announcing plans to seek preliminary injunctions on eight phones made by Samsung, the loser in the case.

The ruling has sparked searches for possible alternatives to the pinch - some have suggested finger taps, circles, wiggles - while also highlighting questions about whether a company should be able to patent how humans interact with their machines once those interactions become standardized.

"I don't know what you do about 'pinch and zoom,'" said Tim Wu, a Columbia University law professor critical of the ruling. "That's the cost of this decision. All the phones have to use less-efficient tools."

Several legal steps remain. The trial judge will hear the request for an injunction banning some Samsung products on Sept. 20, though a hearing on a preliminary injunction could come sooner. Apple probably will ask the judge to triple the damages, to

more than \$3 billion, as permitted when patent infringements are found to be "willful," though the damages could be lowered as well.

An appeal is almost certain. There are related legal fights in several other countries, including Japan, one of the world's leading buyers of consumer electronics.

"On appeal, that will be the big question: Are these patents valid?" said American University law professor Jorge Contreras. "These are kind of intuitive, everyday gestures."

The roiling legal action makes the future of "pinch and zoom" unclear. The court cases do not generally cover the latest generation of mobile devices, which were introduced after the suits were filed, but analysts expect manufacturers in the future to avoid features that might infringe on Apple patents.

Microsoft already pays license fees to Apple for several of the technologies in its smartphones, meaning the impact of the court fights is most serious for devices running Google's rival Android operating system. Apple could charge licensing fees to companies that make Android phones and want to use the pinch feature, or it could block use altogether.

Neither Apple nor Samsung replied to requests for comment for this article. Samsung on Friday portrayed its loss as a defeat for American consumers. Apple chief executive Tim Cook wrote to employees over the weekend: "For us this lawsuit has always been about something much more important than patents or money. It's about values. We value originality and innovation and pour our lives into making the best products on earth."

Gas Prices Rise as Refineries Shut for Isaac

NEW YORK • Pump prices are heading higher as Tropical Storm Isaac forces several major refineries along the Gulf Coast to halt production in preparation for high winds and heavy rains.

Fear of reduced gasoline supplies sent wholesale gasoline prices up 7.7 cents, or 2.4 percent, to \$3.155 per gallon Monday. The average retail price for a gallon of gasoline in the U.S. rose to \$3.75 on Monday, and it could pass \$3.80 by Labor Day weekend, says Tom Kloza, chief oil analyst at the Oil Price Information Service.

Oil fell Monday because Gulf Coast refineries won't be using as much in the next few days and damage to key oil and gas operations in the Gulf of Mexico seemed less likely as the storm's winds aren't expected to be as strong as some had feared.

Refineries should also escape damage. But refinery owners often shut down operations in advance of a storm. These facilities consume enormous amounts of electric power and generate steam to cook crude oil into gasoline, diesel, jet fuel and heating oil. If a refinery loses power suddenly, operators can't properly clear the partially cooked oil out of pipes, and re-starting the refinery can take several days or even weeks.

Apple Lists 8 Samsung Products It Wants Banned

SAN FRANCISCO • Apple Inc. on Monday gave a federal judge a list of eight Samsung Electronics Co. products it wants pulled from shelves and banned from the U.S. market, including popular Galaxy model smartphones.

U.S. District Judge Lucy Koh asked for the list after a jury in San Jose last week slammed Samsung with a \$1.05 billion verdict, finding that the South Korean technology giant had "willfully" copied Apple's iPhone and iPad in creating and marketing the products. Samsung plans an appeal.

The products Apple wants out are all smartphones: Galaxy S 4G, Galaxy S2 AT&T, Galaxy S2, Galaxy S2 T-Mobile, Galaxy S2 Epic 4G,

Galaxy S Showcase, Droid Charge and Galaxy Prevail.

Koh on June 26 banned the Galaxy Tab 10.1 from the U.S. market after finding it likely violated a "design patent." Samsung is now asking for that ban to be lifted after the jury found the computer tablet didn't infringe that particular patent, but it did find it infringed three Apple's software patents that cover the popular "bounce-back" and pinch-to-zoom features.

The judge has scheduled a Sept. 20 hearing to discuss Apple's demands for the sales bans. She asked Apple on Friday to submit the list of products it wants removed from U.S. stores after Samsung complained that it doesn't have enough time to prepare for the scheduled hearing.

The judge is deciding whether to reschedule the

hearing to give Samsung more time to prepare. Samsung plans to ask the judge to toss out the jury's verdict as unsupported by the evidence. Failing that, the company says it will appeal the verdict to higher courts, including the U.S. Supreme Court.

In addition to the sales bans, Apple also plans to ask the judge to triple the damages to \$3.15 billion because of

the jury's finding that Samsung "willfully" copied Apple.

Apple filed its lawsuit in April of last year alleging that 28 Samsung smartphones and computer tablets had "slavishly copied" the iPhones and iPads. Samsung countered with its own claims that Apple used its wireless technology without proper compensation.

BOISE • Leaders of a private canal company seeking to build a \$27 million dam along the Bear River in southeastern Idaho are asking the state's water chief to reverse a July ruling that dealt a potentially fatal blow to the project.

The Twin Lakes Canal Co. has filed an administrative appeal with the Idaho Department of Water Resources over the agency's initial denial of a winter water right permit — one of a handful of permits and licenses the company needs to build and operate the dam.

In July, an agency administrator ruled the dam along the Oneida Narrows section of the river near Preston would conflict with multi-state water compact and potentially the rights of irrigators as far downstream as Utah. Program Manager James Cefalo also concluded the public benefits of building the dam don't outweigh the benefits of leaving that stretch of the river free flowing and untouched.

Canal company officials say Cefalo's decision contained factual errors, analytically flawed and in some places gave too much weight for considering the public interest at stake in the project.

"Our appeal points out a lot of discrepancies in that decision, especially with the public interest section," Clare Bosen, president of the canal company, told The Associated Press Monday. "We're confident that this is something that meets public interest goals for clean water, renewable energy and improving the economy."

The decision on the water right application now rests with Gary Spackman, director of IDWR. Spackman said he expects to issue his decision in late October.

In the meantime, the canal company is moving forward with other aspects

of the project. Bosen said project consultants are filing final reports on water quality and other issues to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

The proposal envisions a 108-foot high dam capable of generating 10 megawatts of power and a reservoir capable of storing water that can extend the growing season for 230 canal company stockholders. Bosen said changes in climate and other factors are enabling farmers to get an earlier start in the spring and run later in the fall, but the lack of storage water is hurting the ability to take advantage of the opportunities.

"This year we're out of water already. There was a lot of land that wasn't planted and a lot right now that is not getting irrigated," he said.

The dam is proposed along a stretch more than four miles downstream of a hydroelectric dam operated by PacifiCorp Energy and more than 25 miles upstream of the Cutler Dam in Utah's Cache Valley. The utility initially threw its support behind the proposed dam, but has since backed off after determining a new dam would conflict with its existing hydroelectric license.

The project also has its earned share of foes from the conservation world.

The river, which drains an area of 6,900 square miles in Wyoming, Utah and Idaho and ultimately empties into the Great Salt Lake, is a highly used trout fishery and many of the animal species in the region rely on the water and riparian areas for food, cover and nesting.

The river is home to the Bonneville cutthroat trout, one of 14 cutthroat species in the West. The fish isn't listed as a threatened or endangered species, but in 2006 the Idaho Department of Fish and Game put in place more restrictive fishing regulations to help protect it in the Bear River.

Tropical Storm Isaac Targets New Orleans

KEY WEST, Fla. • Tropical Storm Isaac targeted a broad swath of the Gulf Coast on Monday and had New Orleans in its crosshairs, bearing down just ahead of the seventh anniversary of Hurricane Katrina. The potential for a landfall as a Category 1 hurricane as soon as Tuesday prompted evacuations along a wide area of the Gulf Coast and

sent people out to stock up on staples. "I gassed up — truck and generator", John Corll, 59, a carpenter, said as he left a New Orleans coffee shop Monday morning. He went through Katrina in 2005 and was expecting a weaker storm this time, adding that he thinks the levee system is in better shape to handle a storm surge than when Katrina hit. "I think the state and local governments are much bet-

ter prepared for the storm surge and emergencies," Corll said. Isaac blew past the Florida Keys and was rolling northwestward over the open Gulf of Mexico on Monday. The National Hurricane Center predicted it would grow to a hurricane with winds of between 74 and 95 mph over the warm water and possibly hit sometime Tuesday somewhere along a roughly 300-mile stretch from the bayous

southwest of New Orleans to the edge of the Florida Panhandle. That would be one day shy of seven years after Katrina struck catastrophically in 2005, although Katrina was a much stronger Category 5 storm with winds over 157 miles per hour. Isaac is expected to have top winds of around 90 mph when it hits land. At 11 a.m. EDT on Monday, Isaac remained a tropical storm with top sustained

winds of 65 mph. Its center was about 310 miles southeast of the mouth of the Mississippi River, and it was moving northwest at 14 mph. The size of the warning area and the storm's wide bands of rain and wind prompted emergency declarations in four states, and hurricane-tested residents were boarding up homes, sticking up on food and water or getting ready to evacuate. On the Alabama coast,

Billy Cannon, 72, was preparing to evacuate with several cars packed with family and four Chihuahuas from a home on a peninsula in Gulf Shores. Canon, who has lived on the coast for 30 years, said he thinks the order to evacuate Monday was premature. "If it comes in, it's just going to be a big rain storm. I think they overreacted but I understand where they're coming from. It's safety," he said.

American Taliban Seeks Group Prayer in Prison

INDIANAPOLIS • An American-born Taliban fighter is heading to trial in Indianapolis in a lawsuit over prison prayer that will examine how far officials can go to ensure security in an age of terrorism. Thirty-one-year-old John Walker Lindh is expected to testify in federal court Monday in the lawsuit that challenges limits placed on group prayer among Muslims housed in a closely

monitored unit at the federal prison in Terre Haute, Ind. Inmates in the unit are allowed to have group prayers once a week. Lindh says that violates his religion's requirement that they pray together daily. Attorneys for the government say allowing daily group prayers would be a security risk. Lindh is serving 20 years for supplying services to the now-defunct Taliban government of Afghanistan and carrying explosives for them.

INSURGENTS BEHEAD 17 CIVILIANS

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) • Insurgents beheaded 17 people at a party in a Taliban-controlled area, and an Afghan soldier killed two U.S. troops, bringing the two-day death toll Monday to about 30. Near-daily attacks by militants and increasingly frequent deadly violence against NATO troops by their Afghan allies highlight an embarrassing failure of Western policy: After nearly 12 years of military interven-

tion, the country is not pacified. Once the United States and other countries pull out their troops, chaos seems almost certain to return and Taliban domination in large parts of the country is hardly implausible. The beheadings occurred in southern Helmand, the same province where more than 100 insurgents attacked an Afghan army checkpoint and killed 10 soldiers. Helmand was the centerpiece of President Barack

Obama's surge, when he ordered 33,000 additional U.S. troops to Afghanistan to help the military with a counterinsurgency plan. That plan hoped to turn the tide in Helmand and neighboring Kandahar and establish the governmental institutions that would allow the Afghan government to take control of the Taliban heartland. Two years later, however, Helmand is still so lawless that Afghan government officials couldn't even go to the

Taliban-controlled town where the beheadings were reported. Many Afghans in the south, the Taliban's birthplace and the home of the country's Pashtun speaking population, are leery of a government that many consider to be corrupt and ineffective. The problem is compounded by a rapid reduction in American and international aid, which fueled most of the growth in the south in recent years.

Teen Pot Use Linked to Later Declines in IQ

NEW YORK (AP) • A new study suggests that teenagers who routinely smoke marijuana may end up with a long-term drop in their IQ. The researchers didn't find that trend in people who became frequent users after 18. That implies marijuana is especially harmful to the developing brain, an idea that fits in with earlier research. The study looked at how IQ scores changed between ages 13 and 38 in partici-

pants from New Zealand. Experts said the findings aren't definitive, but that the study's methods get around criticisms aimed at some earlier research. Pot smoking is relatively common in American teens. The government reported in June that 23 percent of high school students said they'd recently smoked marijuana, making it more popular than cigarettes.

Trim Tab Failure Caused 2011 Reno Air Crash

RENO, Nev. (AP) • The World War II-era P-51 Mustang hurtled over the race course in Nevada at more than 500 mph, its skin wrinkling and canopy separating from the sheer force of the flight. A crucial tail control fluttered, its screws loosening. At the stick was 74-year-

old pilot Jimmy Leeward who had listed his age as 59 on a race entry form and made changes to his plane to make it fly faster than it ever had before. It did for several seconds before taking a deadly plunge into spectators. Nearly a year later, and just weeks before organizers

stage the race again on Sept. 12, federal investigators on Monday blamed Leeward and his aircraft modifications for the crash. National Transportation Safety Board member Robert Sumwalt, speaking at a board hearing in Washington, compared Leeward's

decisions to putting a loaded gun to a person's head. "If you want to go out and fly fast, try to win, that's one thing," he said. "If you're modifying an aircraft without fully understanding how the modifications can affect the aerodynamics, you're playing Russian roulette."

I Made the Robot Do It

When you hear the insane notion of "legitimate rape"

being aired by a Republican congressman — a member of the House science committee no less — it makes you wonder some days how we became the world's richest, most powerful country, and, more important, how we're going to stay there. The short answer is that, thank God, there's still a bunch of people across America — innovators and entrepreneurs — who just didn't get the word. They didn't get the word that Germany will eat our breakfast or that China will eat our lunch. They didn't get the word that we're in a recession and heading for a fiscal cliff. They're not interested in politics at all. Instead, they just go out and invent stuff and fix stuff and collaborate on stuff. They are our saving grace, and whenever I need a pick-me-up, I drop in on one of them.

I did just that last week, visiting the design workshop of Rethink Robotics, near Boston's airport, where I did something I've never done before: I programmed a robot to perform the simple task of moving widgets from one place to another. Yup, I trained the robot's arms using a very friendly screen interface and memory built into its mechanical limbs.

And therein lie the seeds of a potential revolution. Rethink's goal is simple: that its cheap, easy-to-use, safe robot will be to industrial robots what the personal computer was to the mainframe computer, or the iPhone was to the traditional phone. That is, it will bring robots to the small business and even home and enable people to write apps for them the way they do with PCs and iPhones — to make your robot conduct an orchestra, clean the house or, most important, do multiple tasks for small manufacturers, who could not afford big traditional robots, thus speeding innovation and enabling more manufacturing in America.

"If you see pictures of robots welding or painting" in a factory, "you will not see humans nearby because it is not safe" being around swinging robot arms, explains Rethink's founder, Rodney Brooks, the Australian-born former director of the MIT Computer Science and Artificial Intelligence Laboratory and the co-founder of iRobot, which invented the Roomba vacuum-cleaning robot. Traditional industrial robots are fixed and not flexible, and they take a long time — and a skilled engineer — to program them to do one repeatable task.

"Our robot is low-cost, easily programmable, not fixed and not dangerous," says Brooks. "We were in a small plastics company the other day, and the owner said he is using the robot for two hours to do one task and then rolling it over to do another. With our robots, you teach them about the specific task you want done, and when you are done with that, you program another one." And if your hand gets in the way, the robot just stops.

The Rethink design team includes Bruce Blumberg, the product manager of the Apple LaserWriter — as well as 75 other experts from Russia, Georgia, Venezuela, Egypt, Australia, India, Israel, Portugal, Britain, Sri Lanka, the United States and China.

"It is all made in America," says Brooks, but by "the best talent" gathered "from around the world."

This is the company of the future. Forget about "outsourcing." In today's hyperconnected world, there is no "in" and no "out." There's only "good, better and best," and if you don't assemble the best team you can from everywhere, your competitor will.

The Rethink robot will be unveiled in weeks. I was just given a sneak peek — on the condition that I did not mention its "disruptive" price point and some other unique features.


"Just as the PC did not replace workers but empowered them to do many new things," argues Brooks, the same will happen with the Rethink robot. "Companies will become even more competitive, and we will be able to keep more jobs here. ... The minute you say 'robots' people say: 'It's going to take away jobs. But that is not true. It doesn't take away jobs. It will change how you do them,' the way the PC did not get rid of secretaries but changed what they did.

Actually, the robots will eliminate jobs, just as the PC did, but they will be lower-skilled ones. And the robots will also create new jobs or enlarge existing ones, but they will be jobs that require more skills. I watched a Rethink robot being tested at the Nypro plastics factory in Clinton, Mass. A single worker was operating a big molding machine that occasionally spewed out too many widgets, which forced the system to overload. The robot was brought in to handle overflow, while the same single worker still operated the machine. "We want the robot to be the extension of the worker, not the replacement of the worker," said Michael McGee, Nypro's director of technology.

This is the march of progress. It eliminates bad jobs, empowers good jobs, but always demands more skill and creativity and always enables fewer people to do more things. We went through the same megashift when our agricultural economy was replaced by the industrial economy in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Therefore, what this election should be about is how we spawn thousands of Rethinks that create new industries, new jobs and productivity tools. Alas, it isn't. So I'm just grateful these folks here in Boston didn't get the word.

my swing." She is dedicated.




I respectfully ask you not to discriminate against any of our children by rewriting rules to suit — really — no one. The boys will help her game and, who knows, she just might encourage them to be better.

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

Broncos' Winning Ways Hinge on Young Players

BOISE • When Boise State coach Chris Petersen pauses during practice and takes a private moment to look closely at the 2012 version of his football team, he sees young, fresh and inexperienced faces all around.



Gone are familiar and reliable names like Kellen Moore, Doug Martin and Shea McClellin, the kind of savvy veterans who were not only instrumental in Boise State's rise to national prominence but known commodities in big games and leaders on and off the field.

This year, the youth movement for No. 24 Boise State will be evident in every phase of the game.

There are just seven starters returning on offense and defense from a team that finished 12-1 a year ago. Three weeks into fall camp, Petersen has yet to anoint a successor for Moore, who during his career won more games than any other quarterback in the history of college football.

For the second straight year, Petersen and his staff are adjusting to a new offensive coordinator.

"We have so many guys playing, or competing to play, that we've never seen play in game situations before," said Petersen, who signed a new five-year, \$11.7 million contract during the offseason and brings a 73-6 record into his seventh season at Boise State.

"In the past, we've gone through fall camp, and guys you know might not look great one day, but you've seen them play for extended periods in the past and you don't really worry about much with them," he said. "Now there are so many new guys you worry about how they are practicing every single day. And really, you don't know what anything is going to look like until you go for real."

The first big test for the Broncos comes Friday in the season opener against No. 12 Michigan State in East Lansing, Mich. After that, Boise State plays at home against Miami (Ohio) and BYU before traveling to New Mexico State and Southern Mississippi before league play kicks in.

Even with the questions at quarterback and uncertainty in other key areas, Boise State is favored to win the Mountain West Conference in the school's final year in the league. Next year, Boise State will begin playing the Big East Conference, one of several newcomers league officials hope will reinforce a league struggling to deal with defections of schools like Pitt, Syracuse and West Virginia.

"I think we've got a pretty hard schedule, and it's going to be a tough test for this team all season long," Petersen said. "Michigan State, even at No. 12, I think is totally underrated. And we've got some tough places to play away from home."

Much of the team's success this season undoubtedly depends on the new quarterback.

Redshirt junior Joe Southwick got all the first-team snaps at the team's final scrimmage more than week ago, and Petersen announced him as the starter on Sunday, saying his experience and knowledge of the offense appears gives him the edge heading into this week's opener.

Southwick, a 6-foot-1, 187-pounder from Danville, Calif., was Moore's backup a year ago, mostly seeing action in fourth-quarter mop-up duty. In eight games, he was 23-of-30 for 198 yards and one TD and one interception.

BOISE • It was the third mud pit I had been flung into that day and I was no longer smiling.

Instead, heavy waves of laughter consumed my body and I struggled to stand up. But before I could catch my breath, my two teammates latched onto me and together we fell down once more into the mud. We squealed, wiggled and rolled as we attempted to make our way out of the pit.

This wasn't your typical mud pie making weekend activity. I was in the middle of the Dirty Dash, a mud run designed to get you completely filthy rather than clock your speed.

The Dirty Dash is held in multiple locations across the country and quickly gaining popularity. Boise's race was a two-day event where thousands of people gathered to run or walk a 10K loop that included obstacles like hay bale jumping, mud pits, tunnels and an extended water slide to the finish line.



Today's deal from the 2011 Lederer requires no skill in the play, since I am confident every reader of my column would find a way to take 13 tricks. But bidding to the grand slam is another matter. Let's take a look at the sole pair who not only managed it, but found their way to seven no-trump.

There is a myth that Zia Mahmood is a law unto himself in auctions, but he showed that he could bid constructively in this deal. However, it was David Gold's judgment that made it all possible. The opening no-trump showed 15-17, but the aces and kings, coupled with the two four-card suits and the builders in the long suits mean that this was an accurate assessment of the hand's true worth.

When Mahmood transferred to spades, Gold re-evaluated his hand, breaking the transfer with a jump to three spades. He did have another sequence to show a suitable hand for spades with a maximum in high cards, so he was limited by failing to do that.

After two cue-bids, Mahmood bid Roman Key-Card Blackwood for spades, finding the two missing aces, then asked for specific kings that had not been previously cued. East (who had already showed the diamond king) now showed the heart king, and Mahmood thought he could count six spades, three hearts, two diamonds and two clubs, and indeed was able to claim the grand slam when spades broke 2-1. This won the pair the award for the best-bid hand.

ANSWER: There is no need to commit the hand to four spades yet. Three no-trump, or even a part-score, may be the highest-scoring spot. Start with a two-diamond cue-bid to show a spade raise. You can always bid game later when you have found out more about the deal.

On this date:

Jordan of failing to control U.S. soldiers who'd abused detainees at Abu Ghraib prison in Iraq, but found him guilty of disobeying an order not to discuss the investigation. (However, that conviction was later thrown out.)

One year ago: A suicide bomber blew himself up inside Baghdad's largest Sunni mosque, killing 29 people during prayers. Katy Perry won three MTV Video Music Awards, including video of the year for the inspirational clip "Firework"; during the broadcast, Beyonce announced she was pregnant with her first child (Blue Ivy Carter was born in January 2012).


