ELBA WILDFIRE:

Structures Threatened, Causes Evacuation Concerns for Howell Canyon

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ELBA • Elba resident Clair Teeter stood on his property Wednesday, his eyes scanning the mountain where a wildfire raged.

Pieces of his farm equipment lay smoldering in the blackened prairie grasses, periodically bursting back into flames.

Farther down the lane the small Durfee family cemetery had escaped the fire's fury. Nearby, a half dozen horses, nostrils flaring and wide eyes glued to the fire, nervously paced around a corral.

Teeter's home, miraculously, was still standing.

Fires Threaten Homes Statewide

TWIN FALLS • Idaho's wildfires continue to grow throughout the state, forcing more residents out of their homes as flames threaten to consume structures.

Residents along Highway 93 near the Mustang Complex fire were ordered to evacuate by the Lemhi County Sheriff's office on Wednesday. The fire has burned more than 181,000 acres in the Salmon-Challis National Forest.

Fire crews are reporting that flames remain very active on the fire and are unsure when residents will be able to return to their homes.

The Trinity Ridge Fire has also forced Featherville

Gooding County Jail Redesign Has 184 Beds

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WENDELL • The size of a proposed Gooding County jail has been increased from 150 to 184 beds during the latest design changes for the facility backers say is needed to meet current incarceration standards and reduce security risks.

Investors who would finance construction of the jail have been lined up, although final details haven't been worked out, said Walt Femling of Rocky Mountain Corrections. Gooding County would lease the jail year-to-year or for a set number of years.

Gooding County Commissioner Terrell Williams said the jail, to be located in Wendell, is needed to replace the current aging jail and a jail annex that houses less serious offenders in a dormitory setting.

She said the main jail lacks space and has a host of infrastructure problems, as well as safety and security concerns.

"It's an old jail," Williams said. "It doesn't meet the standards set since it was built."

She and other commissioners met with potential investors from New York and Colorado on July 31.

"They wanted assurances of our intentions and our need," Williams said.

Femling, who is lining up funding, said several groups are interested in being part of the jail project. They include Idaho people and those from out of state. Financing might come from one group or a combination.

"There are certainly people out there that want the deal to themselves," Femling said, "but we are not turning anyone away. We are evaluating all those groups. Nothing has been signed."

Among recent design tweaks, the jail's layout has gone from having 90 beds in each of two dormitory pods to a series of smaller cells.

"We no longer have dormitories because that's much harder to manage."

After hearing about the U.S. Marine Corps Mounted Color Guard, he called the group.

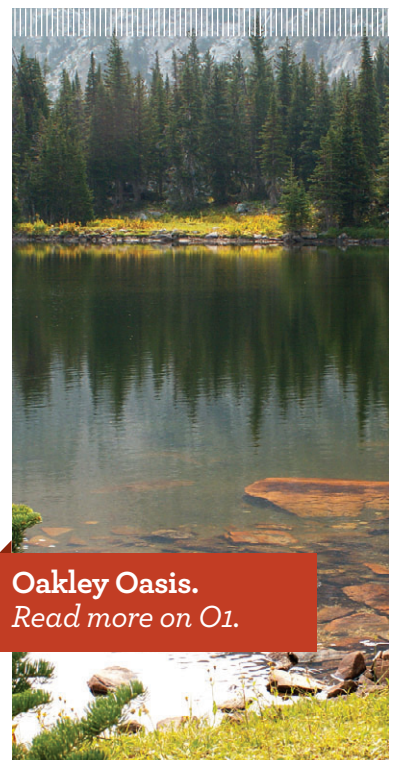
"It just kind of came together," Carter said.

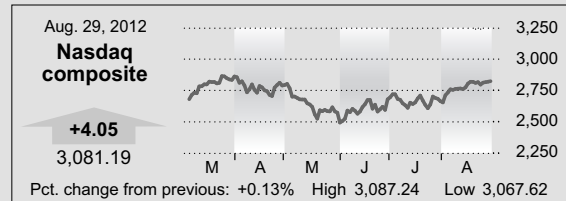
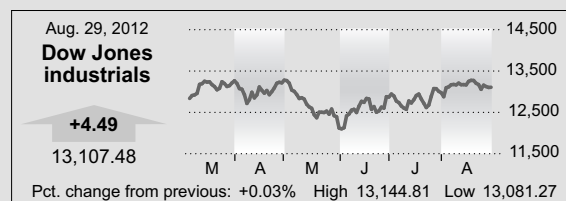

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LABOR DAY WEATHER FORECAST

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TWIN FALLS • The Labor Day weekend forecast looks mostly dry for the Twin Falls and Mini-Cassia areas, according to Boise National Weather Service forecasters.

The only chance of storms for the coming weekend is Saturday afternoon, said forecaster Josh Smith.

Saturday brings a slight chance of thunderstorms, but

there could be more lightning than rain, he said.

"The chance of precipitation is less than 20 percent," he said.

On Saturday, the high for Twin Falls is 85 with a low of 56. In the Burley area, Saturday's high is 82 with a low of 52.

Sunday and Monday will be similar with high temperatures in both areas in the mid to high 80s and lows in the mid to low 50s.

Along with smoke from Idaho's fires, Smith said upper flows from the southwest are bringing in additional smoke from fires in northern California and Nevada.

"I would suspect if people go camping in the mountains it's going to be pretty smoky, especially in the central part of the state," he said.

Satellites show smoke from the Trinity and Halstead fires filling mountain valleys throughout Idaho, and will re-

main that way for quite some time, he said. Smith said people will continue to notice a haze from the smoke.

Air quality in Twin Falls and Paul was listed as moderate Wednesday evening according to the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality. No air quality information was available for the Sawtooth National Recreation Area, but air quality near Salmon was listed as unhealthy, as smoke from wildfires thickens.

Hidden History: Mike's Cabin

WHISKY SPRINGS • Eighty years ago, Mike built a cabin.

A few weeks ago, Mike's Cabin burned down.

To the Bureau of Land Management, Mike's Cabin was an unfortunate casualty of the recent Cave Canyon Fire — an irreplaceable cultural resource that had yet to be recognized.

"I don't know why Mike's Cabin had never been recorded," said Suzann Henrikson, archaeologist with the Bureau of Land Management in Burley. Henrikson had recently begun the process to list the property on the National Register of Historic Places. Her survey crew was geared up to inspect the property this sum-

mer, until fire swept through the area.

Mike's Cabin represented a long-gone era in southern Idaho's history. Henrikson said Mike gained title to the land sometime around 1930, possibly through the Desert Land Act. The land is now part of BLM ground in the hills south of Murtaugh, just outside the National Forest Service in western Cassia County.

Although Mike's Cabin was a well-known landmark for decades, few people today know who Mike was.

"That Mike was quite a character," said Stanley Barks, Mike's great-great nephew.

"His name was Orielandell," Barks explained. "But everyone knew him as Mike. I don't know where the name 'Mike' came from."

Barkes was saddened to hear that the Cave Canyon Fire consumed Mike's Cabin. Mike built the cabin with timber from his property using an ax and a crosscut saw, when he was just 25. He used the cabin as a base camp for grazing livestock. Whisky Springs, the site of a Prohibition-era moonshine still, is just a couple miles away.

Mike's Cabin wasn't just Mike's cabin, Barks said. It was everybody's cabin. Over the decades, countless names and initials of cabin visitors were carved in its logs. Mike's Cabin had become a safe respite for cattlemen, sheepherders, hunters and hikers alike.

After Mike sold the property, the cabin eventually fell into a state of disrepair, Barks said. The sod roof fell in and the

walls were falling down. An outhouse and barn are long gone. Now, the B.L.M. will rely on building footprints and aerial photographs to document Mike's Cabin's existence for future generations.

"The fire took everything," said Henrikson, who visited the site last week. "Everything but a metal bed frame."

Trial Begins for Man Accused of Rape

TWIN FALLS • A trial started Tuesday afternoon for a man accused of drugging a Twin Falls woman, taking pictures of her and raping her while she was unconscious.

The alleged victim was the first witness to take the stand at the trial and described how she knows her alleged attacker, Rojelio Rosales, 53.

Rosales was indicted by a Twin Falls County grand jury on Feb. 22 on charges of rape, felonious administering of drugs and video voyeurism.

The woman, who was known to Rosales, said Rosales was making dinner at her house the evening of Sept. 30, 2010, the night of the alleged attack.

According to her testimony, the woman said Rosales repeatedly filled up her wine glass in the kitchen while she couldn't see him. The woman testified she had a few glasses of wine, but didn't feel it was

enough to be drunk.

Eventually, the woman said, she felt sick and told Rosales she was going to go to bed. Each time she got up out of bed, the alleged victim said she felt more sick than the last time and vomited throughout the night.

As the night went on, the alleged victim said when she would try to get up to go to the bathroom, the room was spinning and she found it difficult to walk.

"I never felt like that before," she testified.

One of the times she woke up, the woman said, she realized Rosales was in the room. She said she felt him touch her, and later he began taking pictures of her. During the alleged attack, the woman said she felt like she could not move or speak.

It wasn't until 8 a.m. the next morning, the woman testified, she finally felt like she could stand without losing her balance and took a shower before confronting Rosales who was sleeping in another room in the house.

The alleged victim testified she was extremely upset and asked Rosales if he had sex with her and he said he did. When questioned by prosecutors, the woman said she and Rosales never discussed having sex and she did not want to.

The woman said she went into her room and waited for Rosales to leave at about 1 p.m. and then looked at the pictures on Rosales' camera.

"I couldn't believe what I was seeing," she said. "They were disgusting and horrible."

The alleged victim said she called Rosales and asked him again if he had sex with her, and he allegedly once again replied he had.

"I said, 'You had sex with me while I was unconscious, do you know what they call that?'" the woman testified.

Then, the woman said Rosales replied that he did not rape her.

The trial continued Wednesday and is expected to last until Friday.

"When I first drove up it looked like the house was gone and there was fire streaking across the road," Teeter said.

Firefighters from the Malta Fire Department and Teeter with a garden hose were able to save the home where he and his wife, Judy, live west of Connor Creek Junction.

"The most important thing is the house is still here and everyone is safe," Teeter said.

The fire started around noon Wednesday, burning about two miles east of Elba, according to the Twin Falls District Bureau of Land Management. About 910 acres were scorched by evening.

Cassia County Sheriff Randy Kidd said after a visit to Howell Canyon, officials determined that evacuation of the canyon was not needed.

Fire officials estimate containment of the fire at 7 p.m. Thursday. No control time has been set.

The fire burned private land as well as BLM and a portion of the Sawtooth National Forest near Connor.

Due to erratic wind shifts the fire was considered to be running, burning mostly grass, brush and juniper.

The cause of the fire was not known but fire investigators were at the scene.

"I was in Albion when I heard about it and it took me about seven minutes to get here driving as fast as my Duramax would go," Teeter said.

Malta Fire Commis-

sioner Rick Neff, who was helping fight the wildfire, said when the fire truck came down the lane to the Teeter home the flames fanned across the road 12-foot high.

"We had to turn around and come in another way," Neff said.

Teeter knew a pasture on the west side of his home was well-grazed and would not burn, so he drove through the fire to the pasture and grabbed a hose.

"I drove through it at about 40 mph," Teeter said.

Teeter was able to move some of his vehicles and equipment to the safety of the pasture, but one trailer was left behind in the turmoil. It was consumed by flames.

Malta Fire Department and ACE (Albion, Connor Creek and Elba) Fire Department battled the blaze along with other fire crews.

According to BLM, there were eight engines, one water tender, two dozers, 4 SEATs, five heavy air tankers, one helicopter, a lead plane, air attack and other various overhead personnel.

Teeter's neighbor, Ken Knight, worked to smother smoldering wooden rails circling the graves in the little cemetery.

"I came over to get some water on the graveyard," he said.

Teeter's neighbor, Brent Sainsbury, dropped off his dozer to help dig fire lines.

"It got pretty frantic here a little while ago," said Sainsbury, wiping his brow. "Neighbors have got to help neighbors."

"It's easier to manage the people that way," Femling said. "We have two-, four- and eight-person cells. We no longer have dormitories because that's much harder to manage."

The estimated cost to build the jail is between \$10 million and \$10.5 million, including the cost of acquiring land, site work and architectural fees, Femling said.

The city of Wendell is now in the process of annexing land for the jail between a frontage road and Interstate 84, according to

Wendell Mayor Brad Christopherson.

Gooding County Sheriff Shaun Gough said the new jail would save his office about \$500,000 a year. That's because beds for offenders from other counties would be rented for \$20 each, resulting in revenue for the county and a partial solution to lack of jail space throughout the region. Gooding averages about 25 prisoners of its own each day, Femling noted.

Gough said the facility would be about 25,000 square feet. It's possible the county could get a 20-year lease, then renegotiate a further lease, he said. Gough added that

purchasing the jail may be an option at some point, although there's no talk of that now.

"We are trying to get the best bang for our buck," he said of leasing options.

Supporters of the project say leasing from private investors is a good plan because there's no need to pass a bond or

raise taxes.

The jail would be on the northwest corner of I-84 exit 157 at Wendell. There's no estimated date for breaking ground, although Femling believes work could begin this winter or in March, depending on weather. Construction will take about a year, he said.

and Pine residents out of their homes. The Elmore County Sheriff's Office ordered the evacuation on Aug. 16.

The fire grew rapidly to more than 138,000 acres in the Boise National Forest. Fire crews contained 10 percent of the fire and expect to fully contain the fire by Oct. 1.

Just north of Stanley, the Halstead fire grew to close to 111,000 acres. While no structures are threatened at this time, sporadic wind activity helped the fire grow.

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MUSTARD TREE CLINIC FINDS A NEW HOME

TWIN FALLS • This fall, the Mustard Tree Wellness Clinic will have a new home.

The clinic is moving into the emergency room at the former St. Luke's Magic Valley Hospital on Addison Avenue West. The move is the result of a partnership between Mustard Tree and Twin Falls County, which is currently transforming the former hospital into a facility called County West.

Moving the clinic into the county's new building made sense, said Twin Falls County Commissioner Terry Kramer. The Mustard Tree — which serves adults without Medicaid, Medicare or insurance — is currently located at a county-owned building on Shoup Avenue. The property is one the county wants to sell, Kramer said.

The old emergency room provides the clinic with extra storage space and two more exam rooms, said Jonie Benson, administrator for the Mustard Tree Clinic.

Along with the move, the clinic is also offering dental

assessments for the first time. Patients who need further treatment will receive referrals to the College of Southern Idaho dental program, Benson said.

Through the agreement, the county will provide major maintenance, landscaping and snow removal, and will take care of the utilities. The clinic is responsible for minor maintenance, like changing light bulbs and fixing leaky pipes. Before moving in, the clinic will also renovate the space.

The county will charge the clinic \$300 per month to occupy the space, Kramer said.

"We're absorbing the rest kind of as our contribution to the community," he said.

Recently, the clinic received a \$45,000 grant from Glanbia, Benson said. She hopes to use the money for patient care, though if they can't find low-cost ways to update the space, some of the money may go to renovations.

Benson said she hopes the move will be completed by the end of October.

Though the space is bigger, the clinic still needs more volunteer physicians to increase the number of patients it cares for, Benson said. But Benson is excited about the partnership with the county.

"That's the key," she said. "It's a community clinic and the community helps take care of us."

Voters, Are You Bluffing?

Now begins the final phase of this cognitive dissonance campaign. America's 57th presidential election is the first devoted to calling the nation's bluff. When Mitt Romney selected Paul Ryan, Republicans undertook the perilous but commendable project of forcing voters to face the fact that they fervently hold flatly incompatible beliefs.

Twice as many Americans identify themselves as conservative as opposed to liberal. Nov. 6 we will know if they mean it. If they are ideologically conservative but operationally liberal. If they talk like Jeffersonians but want to be governed by Hamiltonians. If their commitment to limited government is rhetorical or actual. If it is, as Daniel Patrick Moynihan suspected, a "civic religion, avowed but not constraining."

This is the problem for uneasy Republicans. The Democrats' problem is worse because they are not uneasy about their dissonance, being blissfully unaware of it.

In "Spoiled Rotten: How the Politics of Patronage Corrupted the Once Noble Democratic Party and Now Threatens the American Republic" — a book more measured and scholarly than its overwrought title — Jay Cost of *The Weekly Standard* says the party has succumbed to "clientelism," the process of pur-

chasing cohorts of voters with federal favors. This has turned the party into the servant of the strong.

Before Franklin Roosevelt, "liberal" described policies emphasizing liberty and individual rights. He, however, pioneered the politics of collective rights — of group entitlements. And his liberalism systematically developed policies not just to buy the allegiance of existing groups but to create groups that henceforth would be dependent on government. Under FDR, liberalism became the politics of creating an electoral majority from a mosaic of client groups. Labor unions got special legal standing, farmers got crop supports, business people got tariff protection and other subsidies, the elderly got pensions, and so on and on.

Government no longer existed to protect natural rights but to confer special rights on favored cohorts. As Irving Kristol said, the New Deal preached not equal rights for all but equal privileges for all — for all, that is, who banded together to become wards of the government.

In the 1960s, public-employee unions were expanded to feast from quantitative liberalism (favors

measured in quantities of money). And qualitative liberalism was born as environmentalists, feminists and others got government to regulate behavior in the service of social "diversity," "meaningful" work, etc. Cost notes that with the 1982 amendments to the Voting Rights Act, a few government-approved minorities were given an entitlement to public offices: About 40 "majority-minority" congressional districts would henceforth be guaranteed to elect minority members.

Walter Mondale, conceding to Ronald Reagan after the 1984 election, listed the groups he thought government should assist: "the poor, the unemployed, the elderly, the handicapped, the helpless and the sad." Yes, the sad.

Republicans also practice clientelism, but with a (sometimes) uneasy conscience. Both parties have narrowed their appeals as they have broadened their search for clients to cosset. Today's Democratic Party does not understand what one of its saints understood — that big government is generally a patron of the privileged, a partner of rent-seekers.

When vetoing the 1832 bill to recharter the Second Bank of the United States, Andrew Jackson said, "It is to be regretted that the rich and powerful too often bend the acts of govern-

ment to their selfish purposes." When government goes beyond equal protection by law and undertakes to allocate wealth and opportunity, "the humble members of society — the farmers, mechanics and laborers — who have neither the time nor the means of securing like favors to themselves, have a right to complain of the injustice of their government." As Cost rightly says, "With the exception of the tea party, there is no real faction out there making the Jacksonian case for an end to special privilege."

Human beings, said one of the wisest of them — Aristotle — are political animals and language-using animals. Americans, as you do not need to be Aristotle to know, are complaining animals. They use language to complain about politics. Mitt Romney should remind them that one function of elections is to force most voters — the winning majorities — to forfeit the fun of complaining. For example, if the swing state of Nevada, which has the nation's highest unemployment rate (12 percent), votes for four more years of current policies, it must henceforth suffer in silence. Actually, all those who vote to continue Barack Obama's distinctive brand of clientelism — crony capitalism — must, if he wins, become political Trappists, taking a vow to keep quiet.

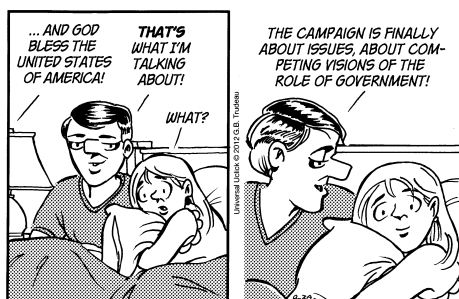

Kimberly OKs \$3.7M Budget With Cutbacks, Rate Increases

KIMBERLY • The Kimberly City Council on Tuesday approved a budget of \$3.7 million for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1.

With projected expenditures of \$3,770,881, the new budget will be \$590,852 less than the current one.

Not all departments will see cutbacks, however. The new sanitation budget includes landfill fees that were paid out of the general fund the previous four years. Monthly garbage fees are likely headed higher as a result.

In 2008, the city approved a contract with Western Waste Services without realizing it only covered garbage collection, not landfill fees. It's a situation that resulted in an annual revenue shortfall.

Rate Increases

The city hiked garbage fees 4.99 percent (the maximum allowable without a public hearing) each of the past four years, but still spend more for sanitation services than it collects.

Another 4.99 percent increase this year would reduce the current shortfall of \$31,155 to \$25,628, city officials said.

The council held a public hearing on a proposal to hike garbage fees by more than 4.99 percent.

"At 4.99 percent, it could take up to five more years to make up that shortfall," said Nick Camberlango, city administrator and treasurer.

Nancy Duncan, the only resident to testify, said the city should go ahead with a larger increase to bring sanitation revenue and ex-

penditures into balance.

"I think it's a smart move to bite the bullet and get even and go from there," she said.

The city currently charges residential customers \$8.95 per month for garbage service, but its actual costs are \$11.15. So residents are looking at the possibility of a monthly increase next year of \$2.20.

Kimberly residents could also face increases in their water bills.

The city's water fund has been running in the red since a new metered system was launched last fall.

Households are billed for actual monthly water usage — currently at a rate of \$2 per 1,000 gallons — rather than a flat rate.

The water fund deficit for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30 is projected to be about \$5,000. The situation would have been much worse without late fees and an unexpected increase in the number of new hookups, officials said.

City officials are scheduled to meet this week with representatives of the Idaho Rural Water Association. The information gleaned could guide the council as it considers a new water rate structure.

"I know there is a lot of concern about the water right now," Mayor Tracy Armstrong said at the conclusion of Tuesday's meeting. "I'm excited and anxious at the same time to find out what (IRWA) has to say. I'm anxious to get their ideas and feedback."

New Health Clinic

The council also got an update on a new health clinic that will soon be under construction in Kimberly.

Patty Kleinkopf, chief operating officer for Family Health Services, said bids will go out to contractors on Sept. 5 and a bid opening is scheduled for Sept. 25.

"We are making good progress," she said. "We are hopeful that we will have construction beginning very, very quickly in October."

The project was made possible through a \$500,000 Community Development Block Grant.

Family Health Services will lease the new clinic from the city for \$10,000 per year for 10 years, at which time the ownership of the building will be transferred to Family Health Services.

4-H project for the Twin Falls County Fair, which began Wednesday. But it was a large time commitment.

4-H beef superintendent Rick Rodgers said children spend six or seven months raising their steers after buying them in January or February.

"There's quite a bit of work that goes into it," he said.

Rodgers — a Castleford farmer and school bus driver — volunteers his time working with 4-H children.

After 4-Hers have their steers for a couple months,

the animals are weighed in at the end of March. In total, the animals are on feed for about 160 days.

Raising a steer requires much more work than just feeding it. Children also have to "tame them down," Rodgers said.

Some children go to different shows throughout the summer to gain some experience showing animals before fair week.

Before entering the show ring Wednesday, children stood outside and took wet rags out of buckets of water to clean their animals.

"They have to bring the animal wet and brushed down so the judge can see exactly what they look like," Rodgers said.

Colton Shafer, 16, said judges want to see mature animals that are ready to sell.

"I think they look for an animal that's mostly finished," the Filer resident said.

Shafer isn't a stranger to showing animals during fair week. He has been involved with 4-H for eight years.

And this year, he raised two steers — one for 4-H and one for FFA.

Hymas and Shafer were among 63 4-Hers who showed their steers Wednesday. All the animals were born and raised in Twin Falls County.

In the show ring, children brought poles to reposition the steers' feet. Some

of the 4-Hers weren't much taller than their animals.

On Wednesday afternoon, more 4-Hers gathered outside the rabbit barn. Standing behind tables, they placed their rabbits on carpet squares for judging.

Stacks of ribbons and rows of trophies were ready to go for awards.

Across the fairgrounds, Klea Nelson and her daughter looked at the animals at the petting zoo. It was the first time the Utah resident had been to the Twin Falls County Fair.

Nearby, the carnival area was quiet, except for the sound of hammering as workers put together rides.

SHORAGE OF EDUCATED WORKERS BOOSTS U.S. UNEMPLOYMENT

WASHINGTON • Mismatches in supply and demand for educated workers boost U.S. unemployment and add as much as 2 percentage points to the jobless rates for some cities, according to the Brookings Institution.

Cities with larger gaps in education levels between workers and available positions have lower rates of job creation and new openings, the institution's Jonathan Rothwell said in a report published Wednesday. San Francisco, Washington and San Jose, Calif., have the most demand for college graduates, according to the report.

"It's harder for employers to fill open positions if

they're in metro areas with a low-educated workforce," Rothwell said. "There are very few job openings available for workers with less education. We need to create more openings for middle-to-lower educated workers."

Jobs in the 100 largest metropolitan areas require more education than the work force can provide, according to the analysis of online employment postings, occupations and educational attainment from January 2006 to February 2012. A bachelor's degree or more is required for 43 percent of jobs, while 32 percent of adults ages 25 and older have attained that education level, according to Rothwell, a senior research associate at Washington-based Brookings.

Isaac Prompts Big One-day Spike in Gas Prices

NEW YORK (AP) • Drivers are being hit with the biggest one-day jump in gasoline prices in 18 months just as the last heavy driving weekend of the summer approaches.

As Hurricane Isaac swamps the nation's oil and gas hub along the Gulf Coast, it's delivering sharply higher pump prices to storm-battered residents of Louisiana and Mississippi — and also to unsuspecting drivers up north in Illinois, Indiana and Ohio.

The national average price of a gallon of gas jumped almost 5 cents Wednesday to \$3.80, the highest ever for this date. Prices are expected to continue to climb through Labor Day weekend, the end of the summer driving season.

"The national average will keep ticking higher, and it's going to be noticeable," said Patrick DeHaan, senior petroleum analyst at Gas-buddy.com

The wide storm shut down several refineries along the Gulf Coast and others are operating at reduced rates. In all, about 1.3 million barrels per day of refining capacity is affected. So, it's no surprise that drivers in Louisiana, Alabama, Mississippi and Florida saw

gas prices rise by a dime or more in the past week.

But some states in the Midwest are suffering even more dramatic spikes. Ohio prices jumped 14 cents, Indiana prices soared 13 cents and Illinois prices jumped 10 cents on Wednesday alone according to the Oil Price Information Service. Days before Isaac is expected to douse those states with rain, the storm forced the shutdown of a pipeline that serves a number of Midwest refineries.

Drivers in the region were angry and confused. "I saw gas in my neighborhood for \$3.56 a gallon just Tuesday morning, and now I'm paying \$3.95. It's terrible," said Mary Allen of Cincinnati as she paid \$20 for just over five gallons of gas. She wondered how Isaac could drive up gas prices in Ohio — and then resigned herself to a holiday weekend without travel.

The price surge is happening at the wrong time and the wrong place for Dickson Stewart, a 56-year-old electronics consultant. He stopped at a BP station in downtown Chicago Tuesday — home to some of the highest retail prices in the country — and paid \$4.49 a gallon to fill up.

Republicans Split on When to Stop Spending

Some call President Obama 'miserly' in his response to Hurricane Isaac.

WASHINGTON (AP) • One by one, Republican leaders lined up at their national convention to push for less government and accuse President Barack Obama of profligate spending. About 500 miles away, under threat from a hurricane, they welcomed federal government aid. One GOP governor even accused Obama of being miserly with the help.

The chance occurrence of a political convention and a Gulf State emergency unfolding in split-screen real time is creating a clash between the rhetoric and reality of federal spending. The calls for fiscal discipline echoing the convention hall in Tampa, Fla., aren't reverberating in drenched and wind-whipped Louisiana or Mississippi, a

contrast illustrating one the sharpest conundrums facing a nation of giant budget deficits: Reducing the size of government sounds good until someone feels the pinch.

Obama issued disaster declarations this week for Louisiana and Mississippi ahead of the now downgraded Tropical Storm Isaac, guaranteeing federal emergency aid in designated counties. And the federal government has deployed manpower and equipment, such as Air Force Reserve "Hurricane Hunters" to conduct aerial reconnaissance on the storm and Federal Emergency Management Agency teams to help with logistics and provide other assistance.

Officials had no estimate of how much had already been spent on the effort. Altogether, the government's federal disaster fund has about \$1.5 billion available.

In Tampa, the threat posed by Isaac was certainly not lost on conventioners gathered to nominate Mitt Romney for president. The Republican Party delayed the meeting for a day because of the storm and from the dais speakers offered prayers for those in Isaac's path and wished them God-speed. But the government's response to the storm and its expenditure of taxpayer dollars played out in sharp juxtaposition to the persistent calls for smaller government and criticism of Obama for presiding over an increase in the national debt.

"With \$5 trillion in debt added over the last four years, we have no other option but to make the hard choices, cut federal spending and fundamentally reduce the size of government," New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie said.

No Republican suggested that the

New Orleans Avoids Direct Hit

NEW ORLEANS (AP) • Hurricane Isaac sidestepped New Orleans on Wednesday, sending the worst of its howling wind and heavy rain into a cluster of rural fishing villages that had few defenses against the slow-moving storm that could bring days of unending rain.

Isaac arrived exactly seven years after Hurricane Katrina and passed slightly to the west of New Orleans, where the city's fortified levee system easily handled the assault.

The city's biggest problems seemed to be downed power lines, scattered tree limbs and minor flooding. Just one person was reported killed, compared with 1,800 deaths from Katrina in Louisiana and Mississippi. And police reported few problems with looting. Mayor Mitch Landrieu or-

dered a dusk-to-dawn curfew just to be sure.

But in Plaquemines Parish, a sparsely populated area south of the city that is outside the federal levee sys-

tem, dozens of people were stranded in flooded coastal areas.

The storm pushed water over an 18-mile levee and put so much pressure on it

that authorities were considering intentionally puncturing the floodwall to relieve the strain.

"I'm getting text messages from all over asking for help," said Joshua Brockhaus, an electrician who was rescuing neighbors in his boat. "I'm dropping my dogs off, and I'm going back out there."

By midafternoon, Isaac was downgraded to a tropical storm. Even at its strongest, it was far weaker than the 2005 hurricane that crippled the city.

Because its coiled bands of rain and wind were moving at only 5 mph — about the pace of a brisk walk — the threat of storm surges and flooding was expected to last into a second night as the immense comma-shaped system crawled across Louisiana.

ARAFAT MURDER PROBE DEEPENS

JERUSALEM (AP) • A French murder probe into the death of Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat prompted an Israeli denial of responsibility on Wednesday and renewed doubts that Palestinians would stick to a halfhearted pledge to exhume Arafat's body.

Arafat's death eight years ago in a French hospital has remained a long-running mystery for many, driven by murky but persistent conspiracy theories that he had cancer, AIDS or was poisoned.

His successor, Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas, reluctantly agreed to exhume the former leader's remains for an autopsy this summer after new evidence prompted Arafat's widow to seek a criminal investigation. Any finding of wrongdoing would be an embarrassment to Palestinians,

Ukraine Court Upholds Former PM's Conviction

KIEV, Ukraine (AP) • Ukraine's highest court on Wednesday upheld the conviction of former Prime Minister Yulia Tymoshenko for abuse of office, a case that has strained the former Soviet state's ties with the West.

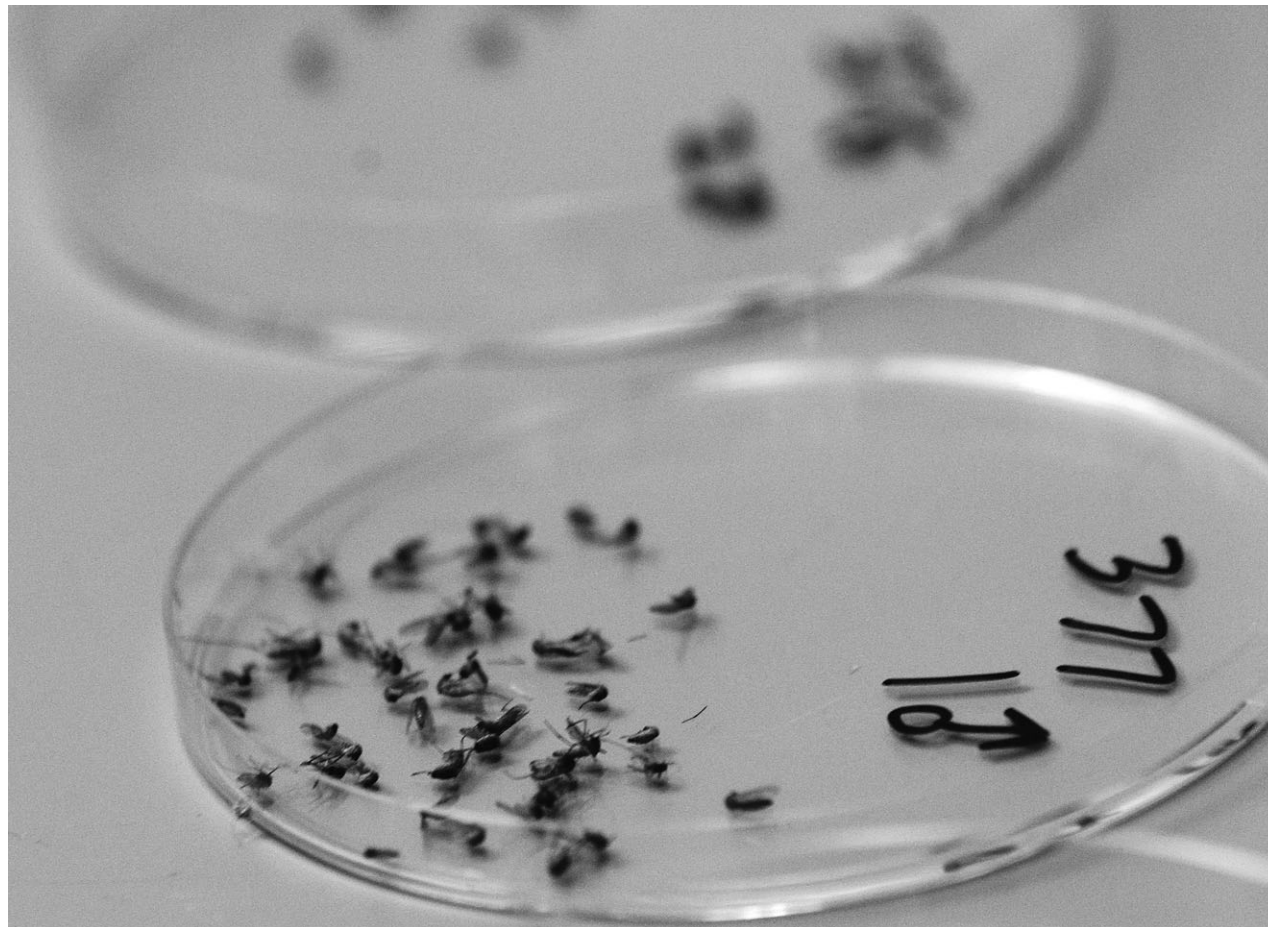
Tymoshenko was an architect of Ukraine's 2004 Orange Revolution that promoted democracy and unsuccessfully ran for president in 2010. She was sentenced to seven years in prison in October 2011, when she was found guilty of exceeding her powers while negotiating a gas contract with Russia while she was prime minister.

The contract significantly increased the price Ukraine pays for Russian gas imports that are critical to the country.

Her supporters say the trial is a politically motivated attempt by her rival, President Viktor Yanukovich, to keep her out of October elections. The government denies the accusations.

Russian President Vladimir Putin, Tymoshenko's counterpart in signing the gas deal, has said there was nothing illegal in her actions.

Judge Oleksandr Elfimov said the court had "found no grounds to uphold (Tymoshenko's) appeal" of the verdict, and that the prison term is "adequate to the gravity of the crime."

West Nile Cases Rise 40 Percent

West Nile virus cases are up 40 percent since last week and may rival the record years of 2002 and 2003, federal health officials said Wednesday.

So far this year, 1,590 cases of the mosquito-borne disease have been reported to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and 66 deaths.

About half of the cases are serious illnesses, and the CDC considers those the best indicator of West Nile activity because many mild cases do not get reported and their symptoms

may not even be recognized.

Typical symptoms are fever, headache and body aches, and most people get better on their own in a few days. Less than 1 percent develops neurological symptoms such as stiff necks and even coma and paralysis.

Based on reports of West Nile so far this year, "we think the numbers may come close" to those of 2002 and 2003, when nearly 3,000 severe illnesses and more than 260 deaths occurred each year, said the CDC's top expert on the disease, Dr. Lyle Petersen.

Health officials think that West Nile activity will

peak in mid-to-late August, but likely will continue through October. Because symptoms can take two weeks to appear, reporting cases lags behind when people became infected.

The disease first appeared in the United States in 1999. Officials say this year's early spring and hot summer may have contributed to the current boom in cases. Mosquitoes get the virus from feeding on infected birds and then spread the virus to people they bite.

All states except Alaska and Hawaii have found West Nile virus in people, birds or mosquitoes this

year. Texas has been the hardest hit, accounting for half of the cases reported to the CDC so far.

"I'm not convinced that we have peaked. We may have plateaued," said Dr. David Lakey, commissioner of the Texas Department of State Health Services.

The CDC also says it does not expect Hurricane Isaac to have much of an impact on cases in Southern states. Heavy storms can wash out mosquito breeding grounds, although standing water can aid breeding, Petersen said. Many other factors, such as the population of infected birds, influence the severity of West Nile outbreaks, he said.

Australia-EU Link Could Make Carbon-Market Theory Real

The proposed linking of the European Union and Australian greenhouse-gas-reduction programs will demonstrate to policymakers worldwide that carbon markets can help address climate change, said Andrei Marcu.

"Those who say there is no urgency are being contradicted on the ground," Marcu, head of the Centre for European Policy Studies' Carbon Market Forum in Brussels, said Wednesday in an interview from United Nations climate talks in Bangkok. "This is a very good signal. This is not theory anymore."

Australia said Tuesday it will allow its emitters to use international credits including EU permits and United Nations Certified Emission Reductions for as much as half of their compliance needs, tightening the specific limit on UN offsets to 12.5 percent from 50 percent.

The nation would scrap a floor price of \$15.57 a metric ton set to take effect in 2015.

The two regions will start a partial link of their carbon markets by July 2015, allowing Australian companies to purchase European allowances immediately for future compliance, hedging the risk that carbon permits will rise, Martijn Wilder, a partner at the law firm Baker & McKenzie LLP in Sydney, said.

"The timing of the government's announcement is particularly opportunistic," given low EU carbon prices and the high Australian dollar, Wilder said.

EU allowances for December have dropped 43 percent in the past year on surging supply and muted demand. They declined 0.9 percent Wednesday to \$9.92 a metric ton on the ICE Futures Europe exchange in London as of 12:23 p.m.

Australia may link with carbon programs in China, South Korea and New Zealand, which could also provide the nation with supply, Wilder said.

federal government had no role in helping states in an emergency. Indeed, GOP budget hawks often single out national security and public safety as essential government functions. And as Obama declared emergencies in Louisiana and Mississippi and federal agencies mobilized in the face of Isaac's landfall, Gulf Coast states and their Republican officials welcomed government assistance. That's in addition to billions spent by the federal government upgrading the levee system in New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina.

"It's important and it's money well spent, not just for us locally but for national assets like the ports and oil and gas production," Republican Sen. David Vitter of Louisiana told the *Los Angeles Times*.

Such aid might have been harder to come by had Romney's running mate, Rep.

Paul Ryan, had his way. Ryan, the chairman of the House budget committee, earlier this year tried to eliminate \$10 billion a year in disaster spending. Instead, Ryan proposed that when emergencies arise, Congress pay for the disaster costs by cutting from elsewhere in the budget. Ryan lost after his own party leaders balked. But he had support from many tea party backed Republicans.

"The rhetoric would make you believe that a major portion of the government is designed to take care of Democratic constituencies and Democratic priorities," said Scott Lilly, former Democratic staff director of the House Appropriations Committee. "The truth is that most of government is made up of programs that we all depend on and many of us depend very heavily on, and the Republicans turn out to be even more dependent in many instances than Democrats. The states that are targets for hurricanes are generally not blue states."

Vitter aide Luke Bolar said

federal spending on natural disasters isn't an example of fiscal indiscipline. "People who object haven't lived through a hurricane and what the local and municipal governments have to go through," Bolar said. "It's not like a bridge to nowhere."

Louisiana's Republican governor, Bobby Jindal, wanted even more from the federal government.

After Obama signed an emergency declaration for the state, Jindal said it fell short of the help he was requesting. Jindal said he wanted more Louisiana parishes covered and urged Obama to have the federal government reimburse state and local government agencies for storm preparation efforts.

FEMA Administrator Craig Fugate said such requests would be addressed after the storm.

But Jindal stood by his demand.

"We learned from past experiences, you can't just wait," he said. "You've got to push the federal bureaucracy."

hold while authorities seek Suha Arafat's approval.

Arafat, who was 75, died at a French military hospital in November 2004, two weeks after he was rushed there from his West Bank headquarters with a mysterious illness.

He died of a stroke, but the underlying reasons for his condition have been constantly debated.

The theory that he was poisoned by Israelis — a charge the Israelis vociferously deny — has been popular in the Arab world. The idea gained steam in July after a Swiss lab found traces of Polonium-210, a rare and lethal radioactive isotope, on Arafat's clothing.

"Israel did not have any hand in this," Dov Weisglass, a senior Israeli official at the time of Arafat's death, said in a radio interview Wednesday, even while calling Arafat "one of Israel's worst enemies."

Suha Arafat, who is a French citizen, asked for an investigation after the new findings; a French court announced the probe this week. She declined to comment on details of the case when reached Wednesday at her home in Malta, saying only "It's in the hands of the judiciary."

The office of her lawyer, Pierre Olivier Sur, said Suha Arafat wants the probe to be completely independent, though it said it did not see how any inquiry could proceed without an exhumation and autopsy.

The lab that discovered the polonium and which is expected to conduct the autopsy, the Institute of Radiation Physics, confirmed that the autopsy plans are now on hold.

"We are ready to move and can therefore respond quickly to the confirmed invitation of the Palestinian National Authority," said spokesman Darcy Christen. "Mrs. Arafat wishes, however, that any act of inves-

tigation is done in collaboration with the French courts. However, the French procedure has just begun."

The Swiss lab said the traces of Polonium-210 it discovered were not conclusive proof that Arafat was poisoned.

And experts are divided over whether the isotope could even be detected in a sample that old: Polonium-210, which is found in small concentrations in the Earth's crust and is produced artificially in nuclear reactors, breaks down quickly.

Tawfik Tirawi, the head of the official Palestinian investigation committee into Arafat's death, welcomed the new French involvement and said Palestinians were determined to get to the bottom of the case. But he questioned Suha Arafat's position.

"Suha Arafat agreed to have the Swiss lab come here, and I'm surprised that she has now put it off. She holds responsibility for that," Tirawi said.

Hackers Find Flaw in Oracle's Java Software

Hackers have found a flaw in Oracle's Java software that allows them to break into users' computers and install nasty malware, security experts report. The attack, first spotted on Sunday by researchers at the security firm FireEye, is what security types call a "zero-day" threat, exploiting a previously un-

known vulnerability for which there is currently no fix available.

The loophole appears to affect Java Version 7 on all browsers. So far the attacks have been against PCs, but Mac users are vulnerable as well. Businesses should be especially concerned about targeted attacks.

Paul Ryan Takes Center Stage

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) • Seizing the Republican National Convention spotlight, vice presidential candidate Paul Ryan welcomed “the calling of my generation” to help lead the country in tough times Wednesday night and pledged that Mitt Romney will not duck the difficult decisions needed to repair the economy if he gains the White House this fall.

“After four years of getting the runaround, America needs a turnaround, and the man for the job is Governor Mitt Romney,” the 42-year-old Wisconsin lawmaker declared. He spoke at a convention dogged by Tropical Storm Isaac, downgraded

from a hurricane but still inflicting misery on millions along the nearby northern Gulf Coast.

“We will not duck the tough issues; we will lead,” Ryan said.

In a secondary role if only for a moment, Romney accused Democrat President Barack Obama of backing “reckless defense cuts” amounting to \$1 trillion. Addressing the American Legion in Indianapolis, he said, “There are plenty of places to cut in a federal budget that now totals over \$3 trillion. But defense is not one of them.”

In Tampa, the Romney team scripted an economy- and-veterans-themed pro-

gram and kept a wary eye on Isaac. The storm remained a threat to levees in the New Orleans area almost exactly seven years after the calamitous Hurricane Katrina.

Inside the convention hall, delegates cheered a parade of party leaders past, present and — possibly — future.

The presidents Bush, George H.W., elected in 1988, and his son, George W., winner in 2000 and 2004, were featured in an evocative video. Arizona Sen. John McCain, the party’s 2008 nominee, spoke on his 76th birthday and said he wished he’d been there under different circumstances. Former Secretary of State

Condoleezza praised the Republican ticket in a speech that made no overt mention of Obama. “Mitt Romney and Paul Ryan will rebuild us at home and inspire us to lead abroad. They will provide an answer to the question, ‘Where does America stand?’”

Ryan said he was accepting “the calling of my generation to give our children the America that was given to us.”

He added, “The present administration has made its choices. And Mitt Romney and I have made ours: Before the math and the momentum overwhelm us all, we are going to solve this nation’s economic problems.

Yachts, Face Time: Top GOP Donors Get Perks

TAMPA, Fla. • As members of the Wisconsin delegation lined up for a luncheon and straggling Mississippi delegates looked for their group down the hall, the money delegation — clad in the state uniform of business suits and designer dresses — walked into the Buccaneer Suites on the second floor of the Hyatt for an off-the-record political analysis session from Karl Rove.

Just outside, aides to billionaire hedge fund manager Paul E. Singer, who organized the event, made plans for another donor fest in the evening. “I need 25 linens, I need an SUV,” said one. “I got a ‘no’ from the florist so we have four hours to get flowers!”

“Hotel to the jet center?” said another. “How many minutes?”

Away from the populist-tinged events of the regular Republican convention is a far more exclusive set of gatherings tailored especially to the billionaires and other well-heeled donors who have become a defining presence in the 2012 elections.

Thousands of donors have flown to Tampa for special access to Mitt Romney and other GOP leaders, from billionaire oilman David Koch — seen chatting with Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.) — to casino magnate Sheldon Adelson, who has been holding court in a nearby Cuban restaurant and will be hobnobbing with Romney and his aides.

But it’s not just favorable policies and access: Many mega-donors, it seems, just want to feel special.

Thus an elite group of top donors gathered at a St. Petersburg marina Wednesday for a reception aboard the Cracker Bay, a 147-foot yacht owned by Florida developer H. Gary Morse. The ship was flying the merchant flag of the Cayman Islands, the tax haven where Romney has investment holdings, according to ABC News, which first reported on the event.

The floating soiree featured a speech by Virginia Gov. Robert F. McDonnell (R) and was attended by shopping center magnate Mel Sembler, energy billionaire Wilbur Ross and several dozen others who have raised more than \$1 million each for Romney’s presidential effort.

The donors are part of Romney’s elite “Victory Council,” above and beyond the “Stripes” bundlers who raised \$500,000 and “Stars” who brought in \$250,000.

Many are ensconced at the Vinoy Renaissance resort in St. Petersburg, amounting to a shadow convention of sorts, where access depends on how much you bring in.

The most senior bundlers — none of whom have been officially identified by the Romney campaign — will get a two-hour private luncheon on Thursday with Romney and Rep. Paul Ryan (R-Wis.), his running mate, according to an event schedule.

The Oddest Items in the GOP Platform

“In any restructuring of federal taxation, to guard against hypertaxation of the American people, any value added tax or national sales tax must be tied to the simultaneous repeal of the Sixteenth Amendment, which established the federal income tax.

- Police the universities for liberal bias.

“Ideological bias is deeply entrenched within the current university system. Whatever the solution in private institutions may be, in State institutions the trustees have a responsibility to the public to ensure that their enormous investment is not abused for political indoctrination. We call on State officials to ensure that our public colleges and universities be places of learning and the exchange of ideas, not zones of intellectual intolerance favoring the Left.”

- Defend the Electoral College at all costs.

“We oppose the National Popular Vote Interstate Compact or any other scheme to abolish or distort the procedures of the Electoral College.”

- End our dependence on foreign . . . fertilizer?

“Our dependence on foreign imports of fertiliz-

er could threaten our food supply, and we support the development of domestic production of fertilizer.”

- Affirmative action for Republican officials inside the District of Columbia.

“D.C.’s Republicans have been in the forefront of exposing and combating the chronic corruption among the city’s top Democratic officials. We join their call for a non-partisan elected Attorney General to clean up the city’s political culture and for congressional action to enforce the spirit of the Home Rule Act assuring minority representation on the City Council. “I think we have more talent. I think we have more women than they have, which is a little strange, since they seem to talk about a war on women,” Giuliani said in the convention hall.

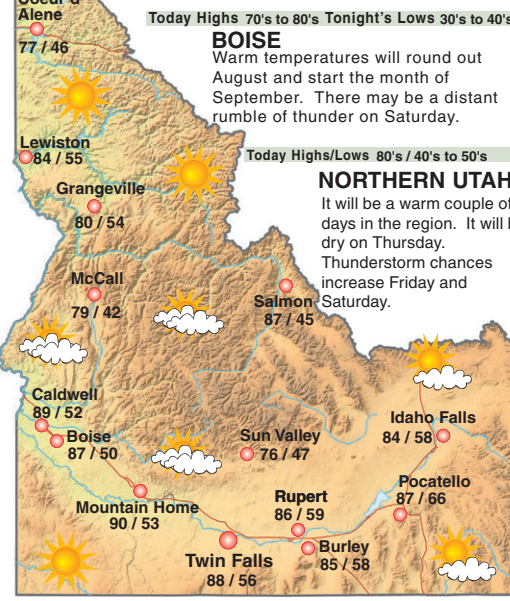

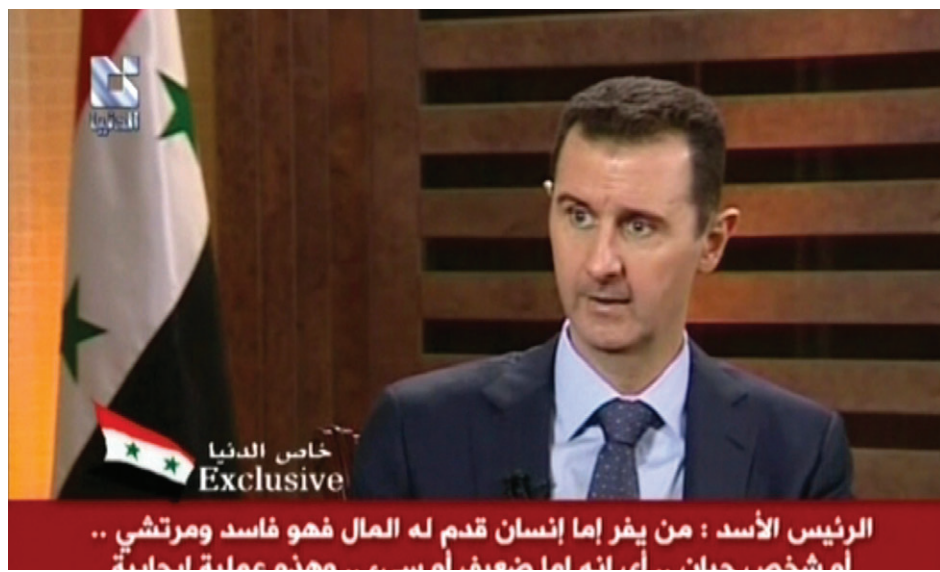

Assad Admits Struggles on TV

BEIRUT (AP) • In a striking admission, President Bashar Assad said in an interview broadcast Wednesday that his armed forces will need time to defeat the rebels and addressed the string of defections from his authoritarian regime. The comments amounted to an acknowledgment that even though the opposition lacks the government's tanks and airplanes, their tenacity and tactical creativity — combined with the military's struggle to fight on multiple fronts — have yielded a stalemate that could prolong the civil war with many more dead. Over the past few months,

Syria's military has increasingly been stretched thin fighting on multiple fronts against rebels seeking to oust Assad. His forces have been unable to quell the rebellion as it spread to the capital, Damascus, with significant clashes that began in July and to Syria's largest city, Aleppo, a few weeks later. At the same time, the military is fighting smaller scale battles in a string of other cities and towns around the country. With neither side making significant advances, the conflict is looking more like a war of attrition that could be very drawn out. "We are fighting a regional and global war, so time is needed to win it," Assad said in

an interview with the pro-regime private TV station Dunya. "We are moving forward. The situation is practically better but it has not been decided yet. That takes time," he told the station, which is majority owned by Rami Makhoul, a cousin of Assad and one of Syria's wealthiest men. "If the armed forces wanted to use the entire range of its firepower, it can wipe out many areas. But this will be unacceptable," said Assad. Assad also appeared to make light of the significant number of defections, some of them senior military and political officials, including the prime minister.

Wolf Season Opens Today

JEROME • Idaho hunters have another animal to add to their late summer and fall hunting list: wolf.

The 2012-13 wolf hunting season opens today in the Gem State.

The season runs through March 31, except in the Beaverhead and Island Park zones, which close Jan. 31; and in the Lolo and Selway zone, which close June 30.

The 2012-13 wolf hunting season opened July 1 on private land only in the Panhandle Zone, but no wolves have been reported harvested to date.

In the Panhandle, Palouse-Hells Canyon, Lolo, Dworshak-Elk City, Selway and Middle Fork zones,

wolf hunters may use five tags. There is no overall harvest limit.

An individual may buy up

to five wolf hunting tags per calendar year, but hunters may use only two wolf hunting tags in the rest of the

state. Wolf tags are available for \$11.50 for Idaho residents and \$31.75 for nonresidents and are valid for the calendar year.

Harvest limits have been set in five zones: 40 in the Salmon Zone, 60 in the Sawtooth Zone, 40 in the Southern Mountains, 10 in the Beaverhead and 30 in the Island Park Zone.

Wolf trapping season opens Nov. 15 in six wolf zones.

Wolf hunting and trapping seasons and rules are posted on the Fish and Game website, fishandgame.idaho.gov and available on pages 66-69 in the 2012-13 Big Game Seasons and Rules brochure.

Oakley's Oasis

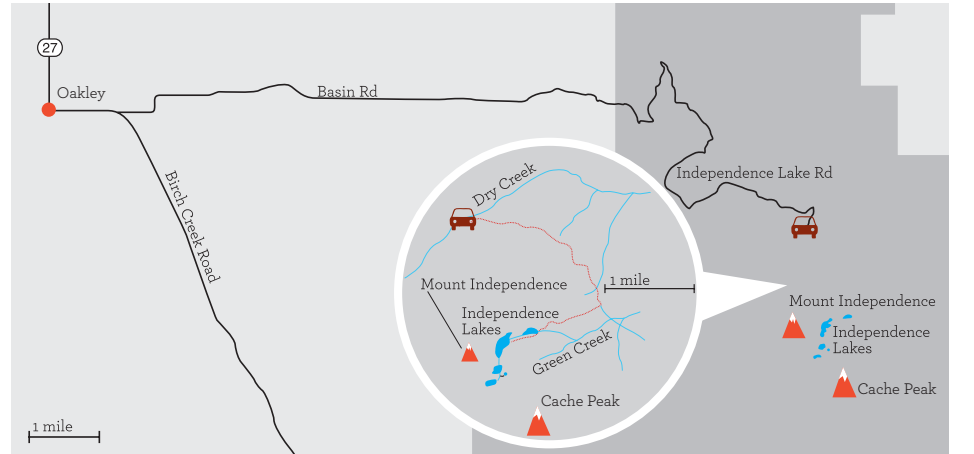
Independence Lakes offer a high-elevation getaway for hikers and horsemen.

OAKLEY • Independence Lakes figured large in Dustin James' childhood. At those four pools high on Mount Independence, he hiked, fished, rode horses, spent a week with fellow Boy Scouts, made shelters out of false hellebore, snowmobiled, swam.

"We've built rafts out of rotten logs, got bit by ants," James said, pausing at the lakes' trailhead Aug. 18 during a dirt bike outing on backcountry roads.

Those Independence Lakes east of Oakley offer a high-elevation destination for Idaho backpackers, day



hikers and horsemen that's unmatched south of the Snake River.

"It's my favorite camping spot. I love it up here," said Lee Barfuss of Rupert, rest-

ing near the first lake as he led his two boys and a nephew on an overnight hike. One way or another, he comes every year.

And don't be alarmed by

Prepare to Take Aim

Magic Valley hunters share their views about what to expect in this year's late summer and fall big game and turkey hunts.

TWIN FALLS • Smoky plumes still cast a daunting haze over much of Idaho, but fires won't keep migratory birds from making their annual trip south or bull elk from growing antlers and going into rut.

Which means hunters won't stay home, either.

With fall hunting upon us, here's what people in the know expect for the season:

Mule deer: Archery Opening, Today; Any Weapon, Oct. 10

A mosaic burn pattern in the South Hills, opposed to a solid scorch of land,

means mule deer herds lost some critical feeding grounds but there is still plenty of area to hunt.

Kelton Hatch, regional conservation educator with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, said the Cave Canyon Fire in the South Hills may actually improve summer habitat as greenery returns and restoration work begins.

"Once we get green up there deer and animals will be attracted to the edge of the burn areas, where the new tender growth is," Hatch said.

This season, there still are places to look for deer in the Hills.

Jeff Frost, owner of Intermountain Taxidermy and Worldwide Adventures in Twin Falls, reported that northern Nevada's sportsman are reporting solid numbers and healthy "trophy qual-

ity animals" from their end in the field; their season begins earlier than Idaho but they hunt essentially the same game herds, Frost said.

"Archery season opens Thursday, so we'll wait and see, but we're

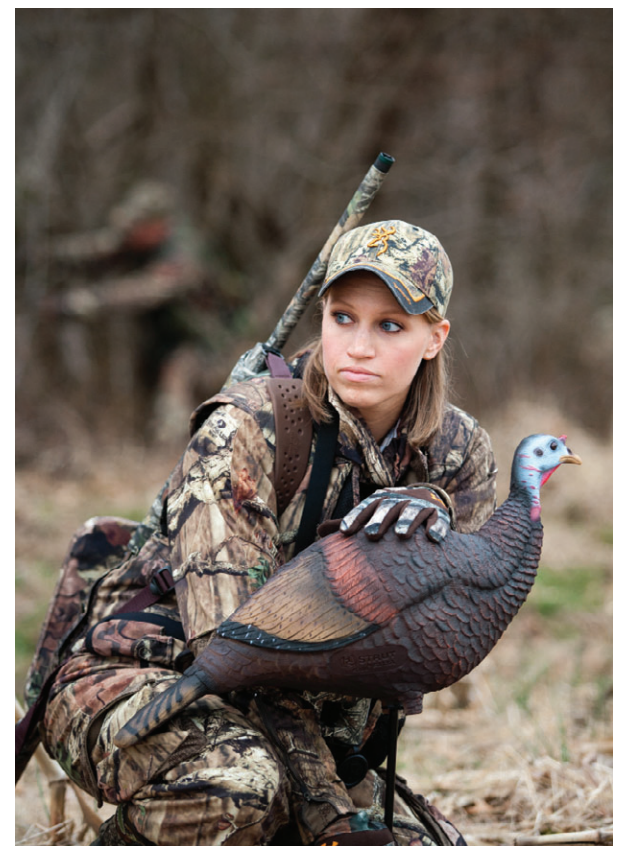

rafts for fishing in one of the lakes, and as the saturated logs began to sink, ants and termites emerged and crawled all over the anglers.

That's nothing to deter the James family.

"It seems like every year we go up there," said dad Dennis James of Elba.

My husband and I do, too. We're among the many callers who ask the Sawtooth National Forest each spring about snow levels on the Independence Lakes trail.

"There's a lot of local interest in that trail," said Scott Nannenga, district ranger for the forest's Minidoka District.

Its usage is light compared with lake hikes in the better known and more spectacular Sawtooth National Recreation Area to the north — but heavy compared with other trails in the Minidoka District.

No wonder. The mountain beauty here is just one step shy of those SNRA lakes, and the solitude is more certain.

The Basics

For that lakeside solitude, you can thank a trail that's closed to all motorized use except over-the-snow travel. That means snowmobiles, hikers and horses are allowed, as well as mountain bikes — "it would be a tough ride, but they're OK," Nannenga said.

The moderately difficult trail climbs about 1,300 vertical feet during the 3 1/2 miles from the trailhead to the second lake. The string of four lakes sits in a rocky cirque below the 9,950-foot Mount Independence and the 10,339-foot Cache Peak, Idaho's highest mountain south of the Snake River.

"That last little part was kind of strenuous," said hiker Kelli Hepworth of Rupert, a first-time visitor to the lakes.

The Journey

At the trailhead campground, the trail crosses Dry Creek on a footbridge then starts off wide and easy through frequent shade. You'll emerge into open stretches of trail as your climb reveals a magnificent view of the valley below and mountains beyond.

At a marked fork in the trail, a ranger trail diverges to the left; you'll take the right and begin to climb more steeply.

Sometime later, you'll encounter a recently developed cutoff to the right that can eliminate some distance. If you take it, expect a steep, unshaded slog through hot brush and the clicks of grasshoppers.

Either way, the last por-

Finding the Trailhead

To reach the Independence Lakes trailhead, drive directly east from Oakley on 2000 South (which is called East Main in town but Basin Road farther east) toward Mount Independence. Where the pavement ends 5.7 miles from the center of Oakley, a sign assures you that you're on the way to Independence Lakes.

Beyond that point is a rough and rutted road of dirt and gravel. Any vehicle should be fine in the drier late summer, but take four-wheel drive in the early summer or whenever the weather suggests you might encounter mud. The narrow road climbs steeply, switchbacking up to Elba Pass. After 5.1 miles on the gravel, you'll reach a fork at the top of the pass; take the right fork, which is marked with an Independence Lakes sign. You'll drive through some pretty aspen stands, then into mixed forest.

The trailhead is another 4.5 miles beyond that fork. You'll reach a livestock transfer station first; if you're traveling without horses, just keep driving. Shortly after is a large parking area with an outhouse, a picnic area and a campground — a nice place to stage a hike to the lakes if you don't want to carry your tent.

tion of your climb will be a series of rocky switchbacks up the forested north face of Mount Independence, as the long-distance views gradually disappear.

The Drawbacks

Since my introduction to this trail 14 years ago, I've relished that perspective on the distant valley and ridges. But the Independence Lakes trail does lack any creeks or pretty waterfalls to reward hikers along the way. More importantly, you must carry all the water you'll need until you reach the first lake (and enough for the return trip, of course, if you're not carrying a filter).

Another drawback here is the trail's dry, loose dirt. It's a particularly dusty hike for anyone who's following a companion. For years I've silently blamed the churning of horses' hooves, but Nannenga told me the loose dirt isn't their fault: "It's a lot of decomposed granite material."

And because the trail and lake area are open to grazing, you're likely to encounter cows and certain to find cow pies. On Aug. 17, I crossed the path of an enormous,

black bull, but he didn't seem to notice.

The Camping

Early in the season, the large, shallow first lake is pretty enough to consider your destination, and the most used camping site there has space for multiple tents. But by late summer, the water recedes enough to leave the shoreline marshy and muddy. So keep walking.

The second lake appears the largest on most maps (including ours), but by late summer it may not be. Here, however, the water is deep, the trout are big and the exposed shoreline is a rocky bowl — a nice platform for anglers, and a better place for backpackers to dip their buckets. The trees nearby provide plenty of tent options, though you'll be hard pressed to find a campsite free of horse manure.

The clear, maintained trail ends at the second lake.

But if you want to feel like you have a private piece of the world, scramble parallel to the cirque's impressive west wall to find the third lake. Here the shore has a cleaner edge, the water is clear and the trees shelter lovely tent sites right by the lake.

The Next Morning

It's not ideal for a tent, but the fourth lake is a lovely stop for the next day's hike. Sitting at the base of the steep cirque wall, this lake is small and clear — a wishing pond lined with rocks like giant, sunlit pennies. A big boulder near the shore is one of my favorite lunch spots, and it looks like a place to start a cold swim.

Another option: In 2011, the Forest Service built a new piece of trail leading directly west from the third lake, then switchbacking up the wall to the saddle be-

tween Mount Independence and Cache Peak. That ridge offers a particularly strange sight: the City of Rocks National Reserve — from this height and distance, a tiny and complicated metropolis.

And, if you're inclined, spend some time fishing the first two lakes for rainbow and cutthroat trout.

Eli Paris of Pocatello checked out the second lake's fishing potential Aug. 18 before he and his back-

packing companions set up their tents.

"It looked like grayling," he said, "which is kind of a surprise."

Indeed. "It's not even close to being native to this area. Sometime in the distant past Idaho Fish and Game planted Arctic grayling in one or two of those lakes," Nannenga said later. "It's ... a little bit of a draw to that area, because you can catch something unusual."

anticipating a great year. Down south of us, in Unit 54 and 46, they are seeing some really great things," Frost said.

Elk: Archery Opening, Today; Any Weapon, Oct. 15.

Although elk populations continue to lag in about a third of management areas in the state, Hatch said mild winters

and plenty of summer forage mean hunters this fall will encounter healthy elk.

"We've had good fawn and calf survival and good antler growth," Hatch said.

Antler growth is spurred along by excess calcium in elk's bodies, Hatch explained; if elk aren't expending all their nutrients during harsh winters they have extra for things like body tone, a shiny coat and antlers.

"They haven't really suffered this year. Mild winters help a ton," he said.

Fires have disrupted some herds, including those

around Featherville, Pine and Stanley, to name a few.

Hatch said hunters should check with the U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management to see if certain areas are closed before planning their hunt.

Turkey: Opening, Sept. 15

Within Cassia County's Unit 54 is a sliver of land in the Goose Creek Drainage that is set aside for a fall controlled turkey hunt.

Turkey's breed in spring, so calling them during the

fall hunt doesn't do much good, said John Howard of the South Hills Strutters, the local chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation.

"In northern Idaho you can hunt whitetail deer or fish and turkey hunt — they call it 'Cast and Blast' — but Goose Creek,

it takes a lot of time, a lot of work, and your chances of getting something are really slim," Howard said. "A lot of the guys I know didn't even put in for the hunt. We'll spend our time hunting elsewhere."

In Idaho, the general turkey hunts are available from the

Clearwater Region north to the border. Controlled hunts are held in the southeast, Upper Snake River and southwest regions.

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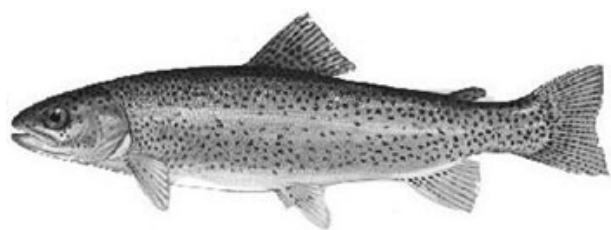
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Three Rivers to Open for Steelhead

JEROME • Just when you thought it was time to put away your fishing gear, another season opens.

Fall steelhead harvest season opens Saturday on the Snake, Salmon and Little Salmon rivers.

The limits on these waters are three per day and nine in possession.

The harvest season already is open on a two-mile stretch of the lower Clearwater River from its mouth to the U.S. Highway 12 Memorial Bridge near Lewiston.

The limits on the Clearwater River are two per day and six in possession.

The rest of Clearwater main stem and the Middle Fork, North Fork and South Fork Clearwater rivers are

open for catch-and-release only until Oct. 15.

The fall steelhead harvest season opens Oct. 15 on the main stem of the Clearwater River above the Memorial Bridge, the South Fork Clearwater River, the North Fork Clearwater River below Dworshak Dam, and the Middle Fork Clearwater River below Clear Creek.

Anglers may keep 20 steelhead for the fall season, which ends Dec. 31. Only steelhead with a clipped adipose fin, evidenced by a healed scar, may be kept. Any steelhead that has an intact adipose fin must be released unharmed.

River Flows Below Hells Canyon Dam May Decline

IDAHO COUNTY • Potential reductions to Snake River flows below Hells Canyon Dam could impact river users over the next two weeks.

Public boat ramps are expected to be available within Brownlee Reservoir through Labor Day weekend. As of Monday, Brownlee's elevation was 2,057 feet above sea level — 20 feet below full, but high enough to ensure all the public boat ramps are usable, with the exception of Holcomb Park.

Brownlee inflows are expected to decrease over the next two weeks due to a critically dry summer with little to no precipitation throughout the state and the completion of fish augmentation releases from the Upper Snake, Payette and Boise basins. In addition, flows from the Salmon River have been and continue to steadily decline. Both factors will be watched closely over the next two weeks.

Fees in Place for Overnight Camping at C.J. Strike Reservoir

owner of Idaho River Journeys based in Salmon. "There are some terrific fishing opportunities on the Middle Fork in September, and some outfitters still have seats available."

"We are fully open for our trailrides, and there are no fires burning in the Sawtooths," adds Deb Bitton, co-owner of Mystic Saddle Ranch. "I was at our corrals in the upper Wood River Valley yesterday, and it was a glorious day with no smoke in the air. There's still a lot of good fishing to be had in the high mountain lakes."

Cooler weather with a little rain has slowed wildfire activity in some areas, according to the U.S. Forest Service. And here's a dose of good news for Salmon River boaters: The Corn Creek launch site for trips departing on the Salmon River — River of No Return section is reopening today. The road also is open for people just finishing Middle Fork trips.

This Archer's Aim is True

Kurt Baumgartner has hunted with a bow for more than 30 years.

In the question-and-answer interview below, Baumgartner discusses how the evolution of modern bows and other archery equipment allows archers using off-the-shelf gear to hit targets at 100 yards.

Question: Hunting bows have become so accurate that 100-yards shots — at least at targets, as opposed to deer and other game — are now possible.

Answer: Archery equipment has evolved dramatically in recent years. As few

as 10 years ago, shooting 100 yards with a hunting bow wasn't a very good idea. But as the technology has gotten better, it's now possible.

Q: What has been the most important recent development in archery?

A: The speed with which they shoot arrows. Also, today's bows have less vibration. And arrow manufacturing has changed dramatically. It used to be that everyone shot aluminum arrows. Now it's carbon. Additionally, the way fletchings are made nowadays — they're smaller, with considerable less wind drag. Yet they're capable of producing accurate flight at long distances.

Q: Archery competi-

tion has gained higher visibility with the Olympics in London. But most tournaments aren't with shots as long as 100 yards.

A: That's right. In fact, a lot of actual target shooting is done at 20 yards. But those competitors use target bows and are looking for pinpoint accuracy, whereas in our contest, accuracy will be determined by those who pop a balloon at 100 yards.

Q: How fast are the fastest hunting bows today?

A: Some of the higher-end ones are in the 350-foot-per-second range. Realistically, in the field, that translates to about 290, which is still extremely fast.

The best news is you don't have to pull a 70-pound bow anymore to get those speeds. I pull 60 pounds and still get plenty of speed. It all depends how you've got your bow set up.

Q: What importance is speed to a hunter, as opposed to a target shooter?

A: It comes down to distance. When you're shooting slower bows, you have to be a very accurate judge of distance. I'm not advocating that hunters with fast bows don't have to judge distances accurately — all archers should know what they're shooting at and how far away it is. Carrying a good range finder helps do this.

Setting Up an Effective Deer Blind

Setting up right cover to stay out of sight from deer takes a deft touch.

DALLAS • Here are 10 tips for setting up a new blind. They were gleaned from 40 years of hunting and interviewing some of Texas' most successful deer hunters:

Where

Put your blind in a good movement area — where you've seen game in the past. If you're new to a hunting lease, assume that you'll get stuck with the worst blind location on the place. You can change the odds with an active feeding program to attract deer and hold them near the blind.

Consider where the sun will rise and set in the fall and think about prevailing wind directions before locating the blind. It's best to primarily look north and south, so you're never

blinded by the sun.

Set up with an approach to the blind so you can get there either in the morning or afternoon without spooking game from nearby bedding areas.

Three Basic Blind Types

Texas hunters favor tower blinds that improve visibility while putting their scent above the game. Unless you build your own, tower blinds are expensive and it takes a lot of manpower or special equipment to get them high enough to qualify as a tower. A staircase makes for much safer access than a vertical ladder.

If you like to get above the ground but you don't want to spend a lot of money, a tripod is a good alternative. It offers the added benefit of being easily moved. A tripod with a frame that circles the seat offers a stable

rifle rest. I'd opt for a camouflage cover around the frame. It helps hide your movements. Caution is the rule when climbing any elevated blind, as more hunters are injured in falls than they are hurt by guns or arrows.

The ground blinds developed for archery hunting make excellent rifle blinds as well. Of course, you can wear camo and just sit on the ground, but ground blinds offer more concealment and weather protection. They're lightweight and easy to move. Some models cost less than \$100.

Check the Details

Whatever deer blind you're putting up, use natural cover for disguise. Back a tripod up against a sturdy tree and tie it to the tree for stability. Leave strategic limbs to help you hide, clip others for shooting lanes. Back a ground blind under overhanging limbs. Put up a tower as early as possible so game becomes accustomed to it.

Hunting from a tower or ground blind requires a stool or chair. Comfortable is better. You will have to sit still awhile. Make sure your seating is the right height for shooting from that particular blind. If the seat swivels, grease it to keep it quiet. If you plan on bringing kids, make sure the chair is high enough for them. A chair with a back can be turned sideways, and the back serves as an elbow rest when shooting.

Take an unloaded rifle to your blind and make certain you can achieve a solid rifle rest in the direction you expect to get a shot. If you're building your own blind, make a window shelf either inside or outside to accommodate sandbags. Place gear hooks so you can hang a daypack or binoculars to keep them out of the way, yet handy.

Mount some form of curtains in place to disguise your silhouette. It doesn't take much — feed sacks will work, though they may prove noisy if you have to move them for a shot.

Utah Officials Open Talks with Outdoor Trade Group

SALT LAKE CITY • State officials said Wednesday they have opened discussions with an outdoor-recreation trade group that represents companies such as Patagonia and The North Face, after the organization threatened to pull lucrative biannual trade shows from Salt Lake City in a dispute over the fate of public lands.

Gov. Gary Herbert had faced a Wednesday deadline from the Outdoor Industry Association to "share his vision" for preserving outdoor recreation on public lands. But the association, satisfied the Republican governor will deliver, said it moved the deadline to January, when it holds its next Outdoor Retailer show in Salt Lake City.

Leaders of the 4,000-member-strong trade group are upset with Herbert's plans to sue the federal government for control of public lands. The Legislature has authorized lawsuits, with Utah officials looking to open more federal lands to motor vehicles and energy development.

Three of the governor's top aides paid a visit last

week to the Boulder, Colo.-based Outdoor Industry Association, marking the start of what both sides are calling an open dialogue.

The discussions covered the "timing and process for the governor to deliver his vision for outdoor recreation in Utah," association spokeswoman Avery Stonich said Wednesday.

The delegation was made up of Herbert's chief of staff, Derek Miller; Spencer Eccles, executive director of his economic development office; and his environmental adviser, Alan Matheson.

"It was a very productive and cordial meeting," Matheson said. "We went to follow up on a commitment to develop an outdoor recreation vision — a statement of how and why outdoor recreation is important to the state."

The Outdoor Industry Association showed its resolve Aug. 1, just before the start of its summer trade show. It gave Herbert an ultimatum: Drop the threat to take over federal lands or risk losing the shows that draw thousands of visitors and inject more than \$40 million yearly into the state economy.

At issue is legislation

signed by Herbert in March that demands the federal government relinquish control of public lands in Utah by 2014, which sets up a potential legal battle over nearly 4,700 square miles. The Legislature was warned by its own attorneys that the push likely will be found unconstitutional.

It isn't the first time the association has threatened to take its business out of Utah, which attracts visitors from around the world for its mountains, canyons, untouched desert wilderness and ancient dwellings.

In 2003, the group threatened to pull its shows unless then-Gov. Mike Leavitt curbed an effort to seize control of dirt paths for vehicles across national parks, national monuments and wilderness areas. Leavitt conceded, and the shows stayed.

The group has had more cordial relationships with previous governors than with Herbert, a staunch supporter of mining, oil and gas development, said Tim Chambliss, a University of Utah political science professor.

Herbert has said Utah would not seek to take over national parks, monuments

and wilderness areas, reserving its fight for less spectacular federal lands in the state.

The Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance, however, said other lawsuits authorized by legislators — for control of dirt roads — target Canyonlands and Capitol Reef national parks, the Dinosaur and Grand Staircase-Escalante national monuments and the Glen Canyon and Flamingo Gorge national recreation areas.

Idaho's Blackman Making Up for Lost Time, Loved Ones

MOSCOW • They were all buddies back in Los Angeles. Dominique Blackman, Brandon Wimberly and Ken McRoyal — three gifted athletes bonded by football and family.

Now just two of them remain, and Blackman — Idaho's new starting quarter-

back near — knows it could easily just be him.

One friend's life was narrowly saved; the other didn't make it.

Three months ago, Blackman and Wimberly — former teammates at L.A.'s Gardena High — were reunited to mourn the death of McRoyal, the Idaho receiver who was shot outside a Los Angeles party on May 13.

Blackman and McRoyal were second cousins and best friends. Wimberly, a receiver at Nevada, was also close to McRoyal — and he nearly died from a gunshot 11 months earlier.

Wimberly took a bullet in the abdomen in June 2011 in Reno, Nev. He spent two weeks in a hospital and missed all of last season recuperating.

Blackman, 21, smiles widely as he relates the details of Wimberly's recovery and return to football. But as the hulking, charismatic QB enters his first game with the Vandals — and maybe his first collegiate start since 2009 — he's still shrouded by loss and grief.

"I lost so many people this summer," he said. "It's just

Soldier Who Lost Leg Works as U.S. Open Ballperson

NEW YORK • The red, white and blue sticker that U.S. Open ballperson Ryan McIntosh wears on his carbon-fiber prosthetic right leg packs a meaningful message: “Freedom is not free, but it’s worth fighting for.”

Yet if the time he spends chasing tennis balls and handing water and towels to the world’s best players goes the way he hopes, hardly anyone will notice it.

An Army specialist who lost his leg when he stepped on a land mine in Afghanistan two years ago, McIntosh is spending the

end of his summer working for \$7.75 an hour at Flushing Meadows. His goal: Trying to be helpful and invisible at the same time, an inspiration to people like himself but not a distraction to those he’s working for.

“I’m just a ballperson when I’m here,” McIntosh, a 23-year-old from San Antonio, said Wednesday. “It’s the same when I’m in the Army. I’m just a specialist. I’m not anything special. I don’t consider myself a wounded warrior. When I have my uniform on, you cannot tell. And that’s kind of my biggest goal here, too.”

That the Paralympic

Games opened in London on Wednesday was not lost on McIntosh, who paid little attention to Oscar Pistorius before his injury but is now more in touch with the “Blade Runner” and his role in inspiring amputees to compete in both able-bodied and paralympic sports.

Pistorius, who made his London Olympic debut in the 400 meters, was born without fibulas and his legs were amputated below the knee before he was a year old. McIntosh was walking single file through a river valley near Kandahar with his platoon in December 2010 when he stepped on a

pressure-plate land mine. It detonated and catapulted him 10 feet in the air. About a half-hour later, he was in surgery. His leg was amputated mid-shin.

Working a match on Court 4, McIntosh hustled to every ball, anticipated when the players would need their towels and tossed with a nice, low ball flight that one of his teammates on the crew, Jerry Loughran, said “would work perfect” in Arthur Ashe Stadium.

“They asked me, ‘Can you throw a tennis ball?’” McIntosh said. “I said, ‘I’ve thrown grenades, so I think I can handle a tennis ball.’”

the guys 40 years later? I don’t know?”

That’s the task Kramer is faced with as the Bengals prepare for their season opener at noon Saturday on the road against the Falcons.

He hasn’t had to coach against the triple-option in nearly 30 years. Tlast time he saw it was when he assisted Montana State

against Arkansas State in the 1984 NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.

“Obviously we’ve reached back into the archives, and we think we have a good handle on what we want to do,” he said. “But you can never simulate a team like Air Force.”

It’s especially tough to mimic a ground-and-pound team when your own is anything but. Idaho State loves to pass the ball at every opportunity.

The Bengals passed (565 attempts) more than twice as frequently as they ran (253) in 2011, and they accounted for more than 10 times as many yards in the air (3,321) as they did on the ground (309).

With a receiver like pre-season all-American Rodrick Rumble, though, it stands to reason. Rumble caught 112 passes for 1,348 yards and nine touchdowns last season.

Idaho State has adapted its game to use the sideline as an asset rather than as a

12th defender, Kramer said Monday, adding that the Bengals need to be better on the handful of plays they will run the ball.

Akey played and coached at Weber State, and he said the difference between FBS and FCS starters is often minimal. In fact, the Idaho coaching staff evaluated many of Eastern’s current players through the recruiting process.

But Idaho’s familiarity with EWU extends further than that. Idaho cornerbacks coach and recruiting coordinator Torey Hunter joined the Vandals just before the start of last year after coaching the secondary

at Eastern.

Hunter has no doubt educated his new colleagues on talented Eagles cornerback T.J. Lee and veteran safeties Jeff Minnerly and Allen Brown, both of whom Eastern coach Beau Baldwin referred to as quarterbacks in the defensive backfield.

Because of the veteran leadership of Minnerly and Brown, Baldwin said the Eagles secondary won’t easily be surprised by what Idaho presents tonight — even with the Vandals’ reworked offense.

After a 2-10 season, Idaho replaced 64-year-old offensive coordinator Steve Axman with Jason Gesser, in

just his second year of collegiate coaching. Surrounding Gesser are three experienced newcomers — receivers coach Mike Levenseller, offensive line coach Gordy Shaw and running backs coach Wayne Moses.

The Vandals will also break in new starters tonight at quarterback, tailback, receiver and three offensive line spots. Junior Dominique Blackman was named the starting QB near the end of fall camp, but the Argonaut, Idaho’s student newspaper, reported Tuesday that Blackman won’t start for undisclosed reasons.

Akey wouldn’t comment

on his quarterback situation, but if Blackman doesn’t go, former walk-on Logan Bushnell is likely to get his first career start.

On the other side is Eastern’s 6-foot-4 QB Kyle Padron, a transfer from SMU who started 21 games with the Mustangs from 2009 to 2011. Padron will try to mirror the production of the departed Bo Levi Mitchell, another SMU transfer who led the No. 1 FCS passing offense last year.

been so much motivation, man. And that’s kind of why I come out here on the practice field and kind of use it as my sanctuary.”

Fred Matua, Blackman’s cousin and a former USC offensive lineman, died Aug. 5 from a heart-related issue. And Calvin Johnson, whom Blackman described as another one of his best friends in high school, was also shot and killed.

Raised in foster care in south central L.A., Blackman is used to violence and heartbreak. When he was 5, his father died in prison. His mother, a drug addict, was never part of his life.

From the age of 2, Blackman lived with his aunt, Pauline Moses. He still refers to Moses as his mother and to her daughters as sisters, even though they’re his cousins.

To Blackman, the family he’s had has always been important, which is why McRoyal’s death stung so much. He and other members of the Idaho program wear wristbands with McRoyal’s name to remember their former teammate, and Blackman plans on getting his cousin’s face tattooed on his leg.

“That’s my family,” he said. “That’s my cousin. We’re cut from the same tree. I think about it everyday.”

Summer workouts in Moscow and near-daily practices the last month have helped ease Blackman’s pain. The 6-foot-5, 251-pound junior won the Vandals’ starting QB job in the second week of fall camp. Well before then, he and roommate Tracy Carter determined they would ratchet up their intensity after what happened with McRoyal.

“Football, football, football. That’s all we talk about,” said Carter, a junior cornerback. “He really wants to step up and grind and get this team to a bowl game.”

Blackman has lost around 30 pounds since coming to Idaho as a transfer in the spring of 2011. He redshirted at Old Dominion in 2010 before having to sit out at Idaho last season. In 2009, he played at Los Angeles Harbor College after originally signing with Washington out of high school.

Since his last game at L.A. Harbor, a bowl loss to Cerros College that he remembers well, he’s poured all of his energy into scout games and scrimmages. They’ve been his only avenues.

How will that translate into live action after two full seasons off? Idaho offensive coordinator Jason Gesser is happy with Blackman’s preparation, but he said it’s still a major unknown.

“I’ve seen guys who can play very well in practice, but now there’s people watching and they don’t know what to do,” Gesser said. “So we’re all going to find how that comes forward.”

Blackman has absorbed the offense and shown an ability to make rapid-fire decisions, Gesser noted, all while showcasing a quick release.

But the Vandals’ new offensive coordinator has had to work with his gregarious QB on managing the different personalities on offense — including Blackman’s.

“He’s a very charismatic guy,” Gesser said. “He understands things and gets out there. But he needs to understand how to approach certain areas when he’s talking to the line, when he’s talking to receivers, when he’s talking to other guys.”

Blackman didn’t start football until his freshman year of high school, instead focusing on basketball. He played on a Nike Elite team with Russell Westbrook and Brandon Jennings, two NBA guards who are “my homies,” he said.

During Blackman’s first year at Gardena High, he made the football team as a tight end. Given his size, agility and hoops background, it seemed to be his ideal position. But it wasn’t meant to be.

Wimberly, a quarterback at the time, broke his ankle in Blackman’s first year of organized football. That set the stage for Blackman to move to QB, a change that proved to be permanent.

He transferred after his sophomore year to Carson High, where he played with McRoyal. The two eventually reconnected at Idaho, but they never got to play together as Vandals.

“We’ve been on the same team forever,” Blackman said. “It just don’t feel right taking that field without him.”

'Bama-Michigan Highlights Season-opening Buffet

The opening weekend of the college football season is sort of like an all-you-can eat buffet. Usually, most of what's laid out doesn't look particularly appealing, but there is a lot of it.

You'll walk away full if not totally satisfied, and there's always a chance to find a few really tasty dishes — such as No. 9 South Carolina on the road against feisty Vanderbilt tonight, No. 24 Boise State visiting No. 13 Michigan State on Friday night, and Georgia Tech at No. 16 Virginia Tech on Monday night.

The chef's special comes Saturday night, when the center of the college football world will be Arlington, Texas. No. 8 Michigan plays No. 2 and defending national champion Alabama at Dallas Cowboys Stadium. No hyperbole necessary, and you certainly won't get any from Nick Saban.

"I think first games are always really exciting for everyone. We are really looking forward to the opportunity that we have to play against a really good, well coached Michigan team," the Crimson Tide coach said. "It's always exciting to have, for us at least, to have a challenging game in the opener. I think that really excites the players throughout the year and not just this week, so we are looking forward to the opportunity and the challenge that we have."

Yes, Saban allows for excitement. Cold, calculated

and brutally efficient excitement.

The Wolverines and the Tide have only played only three times and never before in the regular season, so there is plenty of reason to get pumped for the opener, even though Michigan is nearly a two-touchdown underdog.

The Wolverines hold a 2-1 advantage in the series, including the 2000 Orange Bowl, a 35-34 Michigan overtime victory in what is now best known as Tom Brady's last college game. He did OK.

The current Michigan quarterback is OK, too. Denard Robinson is speedy and unpredictable. The Alabama defense has been revamped after losing about half the key players from last year's top-ranked unit. But most of the new starters were four- and five-star recruits, so no need to worry about the Tide.

Leach Ready for Alma Mater BYU in First Game Back

PROVO, Utah • Before he has even coached a game, Mike Leach has already rejuvenated Washington State's football program and produced some restless nights for opponents.

"Yeah, I was losing a little sleep over it," Brigham Young outside linebackers coach Kelly Poppinga said of preparing for Leach's Air Raid attack in Thursday night's opener in Provo. "Then I came in here, watched the film ... and re-affirmed it's not as bad as I thought."

He can only hope. BYU coach Bronco Mendenhall knows what's coming: He was New Mexico's defensive coordinator when the Lobos faced Leach's Texas Tech teams in 2000, 2001 and 2002. The Red Raiders won 24-3, 42-30 and 49-0, respectively.

The nationally televised game Thursday is full of subplots. Leach is coaching his first game since being fired by Texas Tech in 2009 amid allegations he mistreated a player with a concussion. The game is on ESPN, who Leach is suing. And it's against his alma mater, where Leach headed at 17 not to suit up for football but to play club rugby and meet people from all over the world.

Leach, who graduated from BYU with honors in 1983, insists he won't get sentimental, though it's clear his roots go deep — right to the man for whom BYU's stadium is named. "It's hard to imagine what BYU ... and also football in America, what it would be like without LaVell Edwards," Leach said of BYU's coach from 1972-2000. "I'm not the only person that LaVell Edwards influenced on throwing the football, and I think the argument could certainly be made that offensively we may look more like BYU than BYU does, if you reflect on the LaVell Edwards days."

There's no question Leach like to throw the ball, though the quirky coach declined to reveal Tuesday whether veteran Jeff Tuel or sophomore Connor Halliday would start at quarterback against BYU.

Mendenhall said there's a chance he'll rotate his centers, but the group facing the biggest test figures to be BYU's second-

ary, which lost two starters from last season. That means a player whose last start was as a high school quarterback could end up facing Washington State wide receiver Marquess Wilson, who in 2011 caught 82 passes for 1,388 yards and 12 touchdowns.

BYU cornerback Jordan Johnson, who made the switch to defense after arriving at BYU in 2010, insists he's ready. Never mind that he's six inches shorter than Wilson, who had a 223-yard performance against Arizona State last year.

"I can't wait," said the 5-foot-10 Johnson, who as a backup last season had two interceptions. "We watched a ton of film and read the scouting report. We'll be well-pre-

pared for the Air Raid." BYU quarterback Riley Nelson, more of a free spirit like Leach, has confidence in his defense. He also takes solace knowing it's the opener.

"We're lucky it's their first game in a new system," Nelson said. "There are always kinks to be worked out. But, yeah, we expect them to throw the ball down the field and put up points."

Three previous meetings between the teams have all been shootouts, with Ty Detmer tossing five TDs in a 50-36 BYU win in 1990 and Steve Broussard's four-touchdown effort lifting Washington State 46-41 in 1989. In the first meeting, BYU won a 38-36 game in the 1981 Holiday Bowl.

EAST LANSING, Mich. • Michigan State lost defensive lineman Jerel Worthy to the NFL, and there was a time when a departure like that would have left the Spartans reeling the following season. Not anymore.

"Our linebacking corps is so much better, our DBs are so much better," linebacker Denicos Allen said. "Even though we lost guys, the guys that we had last year have gotten a lot better."

Worthy left school early and was drafted by the Green

Bay Packers in the second round, but the Spartans return eight starters on defense after allowing only 18 points per game last season. That's the main reason expectations are so high in East Lansing despite the loss of quarterback Kirk Cousins and some talented receivers.

No. 13 Michigan State opens the season Friday night against No. 24 Boise State, and that defense will again have a chance to be among the nation's elite.

"We expect to be good. We know what we're doing," coach Mark Dantonio said.

"We've not had any attrition really within our football team itself, other than we had Jerel leave I guess earlier than we would have thought. So we continually try to get better. We critique what we do — not satisfied where we're at. That's just the M.O. that's been built."

Michigan State finished sixth in the nation in total defense last season. The Spartans had nine sacks in a win at Ohio State then chased Denard Robinson all over the field in a victory over rival Michigan.

Replacement Officials On Tap for NFL's Week 1

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO, AMENDING TWIN FALLS CITY CODE §3-4-3, TO REQUIRE MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS FOR APPLICANTS AND EMPLOYEES, AND AMENDING TWIN FALLS CITY CODE §3-4-5(C), TO REQUIRE "LeadsOnline.com" REPORTING OF PROPERTY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO:

Section 1: That Twin Falls City Code §3-4-3 is amended as follows:

"3-4-3: QUALIFICATIONS FOR LICENSE:

Every applicant and every employee of an applicant shall meet the city clerk shall issue a pawnbroker's license if the applicant meets the following minimum qualifications:

(A) ~~Must be The applicant or other person principally in charge of the operation of the business~~ is over the age of eighteen (18) years.

(B) ~~Must The applicant or other person principally in charge of the operation of the business has not have had a city pawnbroker's business license or similar permit or license revoked or suspended by the city or any other state or local agency within three (3) years prior to the date of the application.~~

1. Any felony or crime that would be deemed a felony according to the laws of the state.

(E) ~~(D)~~ The police department shall investigate the aforementioned qualifications of applicants or other persons principally in charge of the operation of the business for licenses pursuant to this Chapter and shall report to the City Clerk its recommendations. 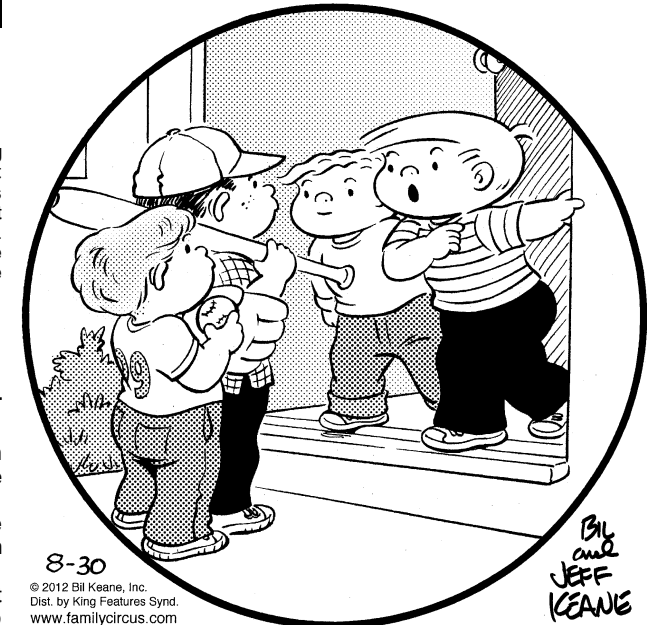

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1797, Mary Wollstonecraft Shelley, creator of "Frankenstein," was born in London.

In 1861, Union Gen. John C. Fremont instituted martial law in Missouri and declared slaves there to be free. (However, Fremont's emancipation order was countermanded by President Abraham Lincoln.)

In 1905, Ty Cobb made his major-league debut as a player for the Detroit Tigers, hitting a double in his first at-bat in a game against the New York Highlanders. (The Tigers won, 5-3.)

In 1941, during World War II, German forces approaching Leningrad cut off the remaining rail line out of the city.

In 1963, the "Hot Line" communications link between Washington and Moscow went into operation.

In 1967, the Senate confirmed the appointment of Thurgood Marshall as the first black justice on the U.S. Supreme Court.

In 1983, Guion S. Bluford Jr. became the first black American astronaut to travel in space as he blasted off aboard the Challenger.

In 1986, Soviet authorities arrested Nicholas Daniloff, a correspondent for U.S. News and World Report, as a spy a week after American officials arrested Gennadiy Zakharov, a Soviet employee of the United Nations, on espionage charges in New York. (Both men were later released.)

In 1987, a redesigned space shuttle booster, created in the wake of the Challenger disaster, roared into life in its first full-scale test-firing near Brigham City, Utah.

In 1991, Azerbaijan declared its independence, joining the stampede of republics seeking to secede from the Soviet Union.

In 1992, the television series "Northern Exposure" won six Emmy Awards, including best drama series, while "Murphy Brown" received three Emmys, including best comedy series, in a ceremony marked by satirical jabs directed at Vice President Dan Quayle.

In 1997, Americans received word of the car crash in Paris that claimed the lives of Princess Diana, Dodi Fayed and their driver, Henri Paul. (Because of the time difference, it was Aug. 31 where the crash occurred.)

Ten years ago: With just hours to spare, baseball averted a strike; it was the first time since 1970 that players and owners had agreed to a new collective bargaining agreement without a work stoppage. Movie director J. Lee Thompson ("The Guns of Navarone") died in Sooke, British Columbia, Canada at age 88.

Five years ago: In a serious breach of nuclear security, a B-52 bomber armed with six nuclear warheads flew cross-country unnoticed; the Air Force later punished 70 people. Taliban militants in Afghanistan released the last seven of its South Korean hostages.

One year ago: National Guard helicopters rushed food and water to a dozen cut-off Vermont towns after the rainy remnants of Hurricane Irene washed out roads and bridges in a deluge that had taken many people in the landlocked New England state by surprise. Libyan rebels said they were closing in on Moammar Gadhafi and issued an ultimatum to loyalists in his hometown of Sirte (surt); his main remaining bastion: Surrender, or face an attack.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

"By the work one knows the workman."

At the 2011 Lederer, Artur Malinowski, declarer in today's deal, won the award for best-played hand. The play was simple, but his reasoning was excellent. After the normal start to the auction, Janet de Botton made a responsive double with the North hand, and East competed further to four hearts. When this came back to de Botton, she tried again with four no-trump. (In a similar position, another North had tried an intellectual bid of four spades, but declarer was forced to go one off on the club lead, either sustaining a ruff or losing control.)

Against Malinowski's contract of five clubs, Tony Friday led the heart king and switched to a spade, which cleared up any doubts in that suit. Declarer won East's king with the ace, then played the club king and finessed the jack for plus 400. Why did he do this? There were two reasons: The first was that if East had been dealt a doubleton club, he would have been less inclined to go on to four hearts and, equally, West might have led or switched to a club with a doubleton rather than playing a dangerous spade. With queen-third of clubs he was never leading one.

The odds might favor playing the bidder for the missing high cards, but here the inferences pointed in the other direction: East appeared to have extra shape, and thus West was more likely to have long clubs.

ANSWER: Though partner has not acted here, there are reasons to assume that he has a few values (e.g., the opponents' attempts to stay low). To involve him here, double three clubs for takeout. This suggests your precise hand pattern, though it may be a slight overbid. If you are worried that this sounds like penalty, remember the opponents have bid and raised the suit three times, so you can't hold a trump stack.
