Marines, Rodeo-goers Pay Tribute

TWIN FALLS • As the tune of “Amazing Grace” filled the rodeo arena, hundreds of people stood in honor of Idaho’s fallen troops.

The names of 62 fallen armed service members since Sept. 11, 2001, came up on a large screen.

The tribute ceremony started halfway through the PRCA rodeo’s Friday military night.

The U.S. Marine Corps Mounted Color Guard entered the arena as a video played with veterans talking about their service. “Ladies and gentlemen, they are indeed our heroes,” an announcer said, and the crowd clapped.

American flags blew in the wind as the crowd had a moment of silence to remember the state’s fallen.

At the end of the tribute, a riderless horse entered the arena as a symbol of respect for members of the armed forces who made the ultimate sacrifice.

After they posted the colors at the start of the rodeo, the mounted color guard headed back to the parking lot.

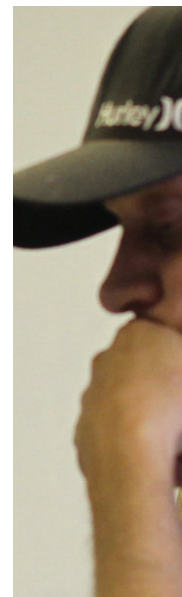
Between two Marine Corps trailers, several mounted guard members took the chance to sit down for a couple minutes with their horses secured nearby.

The group — formed in 1967 — is the last mounted color guard in the Marine Corps.

“We don’t want people to forget that there is somebody still out there who did this to our brother,” said Cheryl Morgan, Taft’s half sister, who traveled to Burley from Washington with her sister Sharon Taft. “And please don’t forget about our brother.”

Conner Creek Fire Near Elba Contained

TWIN FALLS • Fire crews have contained the 2,000 acre Conner Creek fire burning just east of Elba.

The fire first ignited Wednesday afternoon and quickly grew overnight. However, by Friday, fire crews contained the flames and now expect the fire will be controlled on Sept. 2, according to a Bureau of Land Management news release.

As of Friday, eight engines, one water tender, two dozers and two hand crews were responding to the fire. Fire crews will continue to mop up the fire until there are no more hot spots.

Officials are still investigating the cause of the fire, according to the BLM.

However, as one flame dies, some show no sign of stopping. Idaho’s larger wildfires continue to blaze,

decreasing air quality in Blaine and Camas County, according to Idaho Department of Environmental Quality officials.

Halstead Fire

The 116,800 acre Halstead fire is burning just north of Stanley. The fire has forced officials to close parts of Highway 75 between Lower Stanley at

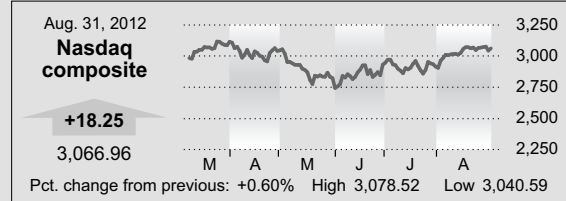
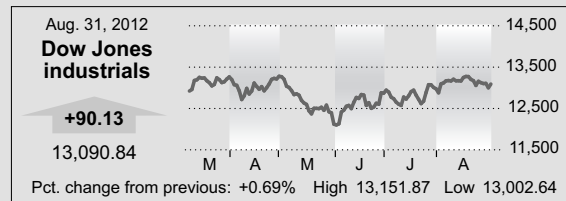

NEW YORK • It took a while, but investors eventually decided they liked what they heard from Ben Bernanke, and stock indexes rose enough on Friday to put them into positive territory for August. Stocks gyrated after the Federal Reserve chairman spoke on Friday morning. The Dow Jones industrial average ended the day up 90.13 points at 13,090.84. The Standard & Poor's 500 index closed up by 7.10 points at 1,406.58. The Nasdaq rose 18.25 points to close at 3,066.96.

Is It Carpal Tunnel Syndrome?

Q. My wrist hurts a lot and I often have numbness in my fingers. Over the past few weeks, I have starting waking up at night, because my wrist really hurts. Could it be carpal-tunnel syndrome?
- Bob, Filer

Answered by David Jensen, D.O., St. Luke's Clinic, Physical Medicine and Rehab

Typical symptoms of carpal tunnel syndrome are numbness of the wrist, thumb, middle and sometimes the ring finger. Sometimes your whole hand is numb or you might just have pain in the wrist. You may also lose grip strength. It can also shoot pain up your wrist, and possible up your arm and shoulder. People get carpal tunnel syndrome for

all sorts of reasons, but basically it is a repetitive use of the wrist. A couple of examples would be bailing hay, crocheting, or repetitive use of computer keyboard.

Another common problem with carpal tunnel syndrome is waking up at night in pain. You may be laying on that wrist or arm when you are sleeping, which put pressure on your wrist and can elevate the pain. You may feel the need to get up and "shake-out" your wrist to relieve some of the pain.

What exactly is carpal tunnel syndrome? Simply put, it is pressure on the nerve in your wrist, which is called the median nerve. The wrist is a tunnel and is made up of the bones of your wrist on the bottom, then the tendon that moves your fingers and a ligament that goes over the top of the nerve. Repetitive motions

and certain postures and positions of the wrist put more pressure on your nerve, which bend your wrist forward or backward. The nerve gets inflamed, swollen and starts to hurt. Before treatment, it is important to get a proper diagnosis. Carpal tunnel syndrome is one potential cause of wrist and hand pain and numbness. It could also be a pinched nerve in the neck or possibly arthritis. An evaluation of your wrist and/or arm with a nerve test can assist with proper diagnosis.

Treatment can be the use of a wrist splint, which keeps your wrist in a safe, neutral position. Wearing a splint at night can help protect your wrist. Anti-inflammatory pain medication, a steroid injection, or possibly surgery are all potential treatments.

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TWO DEAD IN BLISS CRASH

BLISS • Multiple people were injured and two people died in a crash on Interstate 84 Thursday afternoon near Bliss in Gooding County.

Idaho State Police responded to the crash at about 3:46 p.m. Thursday and said multiple people

were transported by air and ground ambulance to hospitals while two people succumbed to their injuries at the scene of the crash.

According to an ISP report, a maroon Mazda Protégé was stopped on the median side, partially in the lane of travel. A red Ford Focus was traveling east when it rear ended

the stopped Protégé, causing it to travel down into the median while the Ford rolled and landed on its side.

Interstate 84 was blocked on the eastbound side for about 2.5 hours.

The crash is still under investigation and the names of those involved have not yet been released.

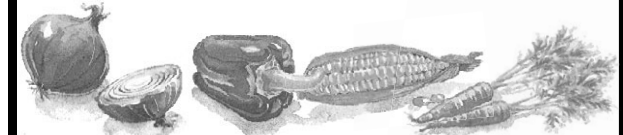

Under the law, about 60 percent of Idaho schools met adequate yearly progress during the 2011-2012 academic year. The results are about the same as the previous year, when 62 percent of public schools met the targets and mirrored the previous year.

The percentage remains stagnant even after Idaho Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna decided last year the state would no longer boost proficiency targets under No Child Left Behind, as foreseen by the law, nor would it punish the schools that don't meet these higher testing goals.

Luna argued the education program, which has been widely panned by critics who say it brands schools as failures even as they make progress, was setting unrealistic benchmarks for schools while failing to measure academic growth from year to year.

Under Luna's proposed new system, which does measure stu-

dent academic growth, 301 of Idaho's 648 schools were ranked as four-star schools while another 78 earned the scale's highest ranking, a five star, officials with the state Department of Education said.

"Today, we are finally able to begin moving to the Five-Star Rating System, which is a better and more accurate way to evaluate how Idaho schools are performing academically," Luna said in a statement issued Friday.

The results of the two scales can be confusing when compared side by side because a school deemed failing under No Child Left Behind could be ranked as a four-star or five-star school under Idaho's proposed new system.

That's what happened in Challis, where the town's junior-senior high school didn't make adequate yearly progress, or AYP, under No Child Left Behind but was ranked as a four-star school under the new scale, the results show.

A Riggins elementary school in central Idaho had similarly mismatching results.

How Did Local School Districts Perform?

Here's information about whether area school districts made "adequate yearly progress" (AYP) overall under the federal No Child Left Behind Act.

In order to make AYP, a school must meet the student achievement goals set by the Idaho State Board of Education as an entire school and in 40 additional target areas.

Those areas include students with disabilities, students with limited English proficiency and students who are economically disadvantaged.

The targets for the 2011-2012 school year were 85.6 percent in reading and 83 percent in math — the same as the previous school year.

The state's accountability system factors in multiple measures into rankings, including student academic growth, graduation rates and indicators of success in college and the work force.

Four-star and five-star schools will be publicly recognized and serve as an example to other schools, according to the Idaho State Department of Education.

Three-star schools will be recognized, but will also be required to develop an improvement plan for certain

areas.
One and two-star schools are schools in which the state has identified areas of improvement. The ISDE will focus time and resources to raise academic achievement and close achievement gaps.

Rape Trial Ends with Hung Jury

TWIN FALLS • A jury acquitted an Oregon man on a charge of drugging a woman, but was hung on a count of rape and a count of video voyeurism in a trial that began Tuesday.

Rojelio Rosales, 53, was indicted by a Twin Falls County grand jury on Feb. 22 on charges of rape, felonious administering of drugs and video voyeurism.

In closing arguments, Suzanne Craig, Twin Falls County chief criminal deputy prosecutor told jurors not to decide the case based on feeling

sorry for the alleged victim, or because Rosales looked like a nice person.

Craig pointed out that a vaginal swab showed sex between the two happened at some point, even though Rosales denied it. She also discussed the pictures Rosales allegedly took of the woman while she was asleep.

"She's obviously sick, she's not participating," Craig said. "They were obviously taken for a sexual purpose."

In his closing argument, Rosales' defense attorney, Charles Crafts said he would look at each point in the prose-

cution's case and test each link in their chain.

Crafts said in his statement, the two were having a consensual sexual relationship and had taken pictures before, calling these points "breaks in the chain."

Rosales did not have a motive to drug and rape the alleged victim, but the woman had a motive to lie about the alleged rape, Crafts told the jurors.

Thursday morning, the jury left to begin deliberating at 10:17 a.m. and returned at 6:58 p.m. on the case against Rosales. Prosecutors must decide to refile by Sept. 7.

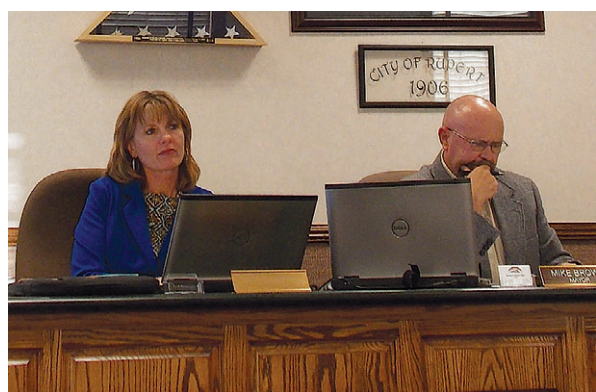

The Cassia County Sheriff's office continues to look for James Duane Ambrose in connection with the death of Taft, who owned the motel.

Ambrose, 53, was charged with first degree murder and a weapon enhancement charge in connection with the murder, and a no-bond warrant was issued for his arrest. He also has a current Cassia County warrant for grand theft and multiple warrants in Las Vegas for kidnapping, robbery, burglary, battery and grand larceny.

Taft was found on May 18, 2012. An autopsy concluded that he died from blunt force trauma to the head and a stab wound to the heart.

Morgan said the family was estranged from Taft for about 20 years and found out about his murder after a family member found an article about it on the Internet.

"We came here because we didn't understand everything that had happened to our brother," Morgan said. "And we also wanted to let the authorities know that there are family members interested in this case moving along."

Cassia County Sheriff Randy Kidd said he spoke with Taft's sisters on Thursday.

Morgan said they also visited the motel and even looked at the crawl space

where his body was found.

"I was determined to go there, it was sort of a healing process," Morgan said. "Everyone at the motel seemed to like him and said he was a good person and always eager to help people."

Morgan said staff members gave them a plaque that had belonged to Taft as well as a photo as mementos.

Morgan said they learned that Taft and Ambrose had allegedly argued the day before Taft was killed about Taft's suspicions that Ambrose was involved with drugs.

Ambrose, Morgan said, worked for Taft for five years as a maintenance man.

Morgan said Ambrose could now be working in a similar occupation and still has family in the area.

"My brother's clientele at the motel were often people who were down and out," Morgan said, adding that Taft dealt with his own addiction problems and sometimes counseled others.

They also visited Taft's gravesite where they placed flowers.

"We sat and talked to him and told him we didn't always like the tricks he played on us when we were young. And we told him we forgave him — and we cried," Morgan said.

Morgan said it was a good week and people were helpful and forthcoming with information as well as compassionate.

"The bottom line is no one deserves what my brother got, he was a good guy," she said.

3,000 POT PLANTS SEIZED

First Since '52, No Talk of War from Candidate

WASHINGTON (AP) • With America embroiled in its longest armed conflict, Mitt Romney became the first Republican since 1952 to accept his party's nomination without mentioning war.

Three election cycles after the 2001 terrorist attacks, neither Romney nor his running mate, Rep. Paul Ryan, had anything to say about terrorism or war while on their party's biggest stage. The only one who did Thursday was actor Clint Eastwood, who won cheers for suggesting invading Afghanistan was a mistake and calling for an immediate withdrawal of troops — a line that might have earned boos and catcalls four years ago.

The Romney strategy reflects the weak public support for the Afghanistan war, fatigue over a decade of terrorism fears and the central role of the economy in the campaign. But it was still a remarkable shift in tone for a party that, even in times of peace, has used the specter of war to call for greater military spending and tough foreign policy.

Candidates Barry Goldwater and Richard Nixon criticized the handling of the Vietnam War. Bob Dole said the way to prevent conflict is to prepare for more, greater wars than a country will need to fight. Ronald Reagan warned that a weak nation would tempt the Soviet Union.

"Four times in my lifetime America has gone to war, bleeding the lives of its young men into the sands of beachheads, the fields of Europe and the jungles and rice paddies of Asia," Reagan said in 1980. "We know only too well that war comes not when the forces of freedom are strong, but when they are weak."

Even President Gerald Ford, who in 1976, declared that, "not a single American is at war anywhere on the face of this Earth tonight," went on to say, "A strong military posture is always the best insurance for peace."

Things are different now, 11 years after President George W. Bush pledged to "starve terrorists of funding, turn them one against another, drive them from place to place, until there is no refuge or rest."

Osama bin Laden is dead. The Iraq war is over. Al-Qaida is weakened. The color coded alerts that for years warned of a constant, unseen danger have faded away. None of the presidential or vice presidential candidates for either party has ever served in the military, a first in 80 years.

And although 79,000 troops remain in Afghanistan, public support has eroded for the decade-long campaign there. An AP-GfK poll found in May that 66 percent of voters believe the country should not be involved in Afghanistan anymore. That same poll found that only 37 percent of Republicans backed the war.

Republican strategist Tony Fratto said it was odd, personally, to hear a major Republican speech with no mention of the issue that has so dominated the past decade. Fratto served as a White House spokesman and aide to the younger Bush, whose presidency was consumed by the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

But with 8.3 percent unemployment nationwide, Republicans see the economy as the driving issue this year. And Fratto said Romney's primary goal Thursday night was to connect with voters on a personal level and redraw the caricature of him as wooden and out of touch.

"If you're going to leave some things out, you're going to leave out things that aren't highest on the list of concerns of voters," Fratto said. "It's more reflective of what Americans are interested in hearing from their candidates right now."

Morsi Has Harsh Words for Syria.

Egyptian President Mohammed Morsi's international debut made its biggest splash at home. After he publicly denounced Syria's regime while being hosted by Damascus' top ally Iran, Egyptian supporters and even some critics are lauding him as a new Arab leader that speaks truth to power. That may have been precisely the point. The drama of his Tehran speech boosts Morsi, an Islamist from the Muslim Brotherhood who became his country's first freely elected president, as he works to entrench his authority in Egypt.

Bernanke: Fed can do more.

Chairman Ben Bernanke sent a clear message Friday that the Federal Reserve will do more to help the still-struggling U.S. economy. His remarks left two questions: What exactly will the Fed do? And when? Bernanke described the U.S. economy's health as "far from satisfactory" and noted that the unemployment rate, now 8.3 percent, hasn't declined since January. He stopped short of committing the Fed to any specific move. But in his speech to an annual Fed conference in Jackson Hole, Wyo., Bernanke said that even with low interest rates, the Fed can do more.

When the Stars Don't Align

NEW YORK (AP) • In the aftermath of Clint Eastwood's perplexing and ridiculed "invisible Obama" monologue at the Republican National Convention, conservative blogger Moe Lane summed up what many on both sides of the political divide are thinking.

"The term 'surfing on the edge of the catastrophe curve' comes to mind," Lane wrote at RedState, concluding the bit that had the 82-year-old Hollywood icon talking to an empty chair did work but, "I would not recommend that the GOP make it a habit."

The crowd Thursday night at the Tampa Bay Times Forum, just ahead of Romney's "speech of a lifetime," greeted the Eastwood Moment with hearty laughter and applause, a welcome break of levity on the last day of a tightly choreographed convention.

But behind the scenes, Romney's campaign staff

didn't find it so humorous. Asked about it immediately after the convention concluded, a half-dozen staffers said little. The campaign quickly went into damage control.

Unlike every other convention speaker, the teleprompter in the hall was-

n't used during Eastwood's speech, which had him lampooning President Barack Obama as if he were there. The routine from the Oscar-winning director of "Unforgiven" and "Million Dollar Baby" lasted twice as long as scheduled, cutting into the hour of prime time coverage

for Republicans.

It also sucked up Friday morning coverage of Romney's speech that had him accepting the Republican nomination for president.

On "CBS This Morning," Ann Romney cast about for words. Asked whether his contribution was a distraction or a mistake, she responded: "He's a unique guy and he did a unique thing last night."

In this world of oversharing, when the like-minded or contrary are only a tweet away, social media blew up over Eastwood's confusing convention appearance, along with political-pundit quarterbacking on both ends of the spectrum.

"It ... was odd. Not consistently terrible as some argued," observed National Review's Jim Geraghty. "I have no doubt some folks loved it. It may very well have actually moved some votes. But boy, did it get weird at times."

Syrian Rebels Launch Offensive

BEIRUT (AP) • A rebel unit of army defectors launched a major offensive against security facilities in Syria's largest city of Aleppo, and anti-regime forces targeted air bases to try to reduce the military threat from the skies, activists said Friday.

The coordinated attacks by the Brigade of Free Syrians pointed to a higher-than-usual degree of planning by the rebels, suggesting that President Bashar Assad's opponents are becoming more brazen as the civil war deepens.

The Local Coordination Committees, an activist

group that monitors violence and rights abuses in Syria, said rebels shot down a helicopter in the town of Sarameen, in the northeastern province of Idlib.

An activist in the area also reported a helicopter was downed.

The reports could not be independently verified, but if confirmed, it would be the second such aircraft to be downed by rebels this week. One helicopter was downed in Damascus on Monday.

Nearly 18 months into the uprising against Assad that has become a civil war with more than 20,000 people

estimated to have been killed, the International Red Cross painted a grim picture of life in Syria. It said the humanitarian needs of civilians were rising and medical care was becoming more and more scarce.

"People fear for their lives every minute of the day," said Marianne Gasser, the head of the ICRC delegation in Syria, in a report released in Geneva.

"Every day, dozens of people are killed in the fighting, and increasing numbers of people succumb to their wounds, unable to obtain medical care because of the

fighting and the lack of medical supplies, or simply because medical care is not available in their areas," she said.

The three coordinated attacks in the northern city of Aleppo began before midnight Thursday and ended Friday morning — two days after Assad conceded that his forces have been unable to quell the rebellion.

Weeks of intense bombardment by the Syrian military, including airstrikes and artillery shelling, have failed to dislodge the rebels. Instead, it seems to have emboldened them.

Berkshire Changes as Buffet Ages

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) • Warren Buffett's birthday this week was good news for Berkshire Hathaway investors who could celebrate another year of the Oracle of Omaha's leadership. But the milestone also reminded shareholders they need to think about who will run the evolving company after Buffett is gone.

The more than 80 businesses that Buffett has assembled at Berkshire are mostly humming along well, posting a profit of more than \$3 billion in the most-recent quarter. Its Class A stock closed at \$127,183 on Thursday — less than \$3 away from its 52-week high set in early August.

So there's plenty for shareholders to celebrate.

But Buffett's advancing age — he turned 82 on

Thursday — coupled with his radiation treatment for prostate cancer this summer, keeps his mortality on the minds of many Berkshire in-

vestors. Buffett said the cancer isn't life-threatening, and he is feeling good.

Buffett has outlined Berkshire's succession plan and re-

assured investors that his board has chosen a successor and two backup candidates, although he won't say who the company's next CEO will be. Buffett is both chairman and CEO.

Whoever takes over Berkshire after Buffett will inherit a sprawling conglomerate that is evolving with each new acquisition. The Omaha-based company now relies less on the insurance companies and investments it has long been known for and more on its railroad, utility and manufacturing companies.

"The insurance is increasingly more of an engine that runs in the background instead of the driver of the business," said Jeff Matthews, an investor who wrote "Secrets in Plain Sight: Business & Investing Secrets of Warren Buffett."

After speaking with DOT officials, he learned the department could help put up a historical sign if they could prove the camp really existed and get approval from the land owner to erect the sign.

They did and on Thursday a sign was erected for future generations to remember what was almost forgotten.

CHEERS to Twin Falls County for helping the Mustard Tree Wellness Clinic find a new home in the former St. Luke's Magic Valley Hospital on Addison Avenue West.

The Mustard Tree — which serves adults without Medicaid, Medicare or insurance — is currently located at a county-owned building on Shoup Avenue that the county wants to sell.

Simply ending their lease would have put a good program in danger. The move to County West is a good solution.

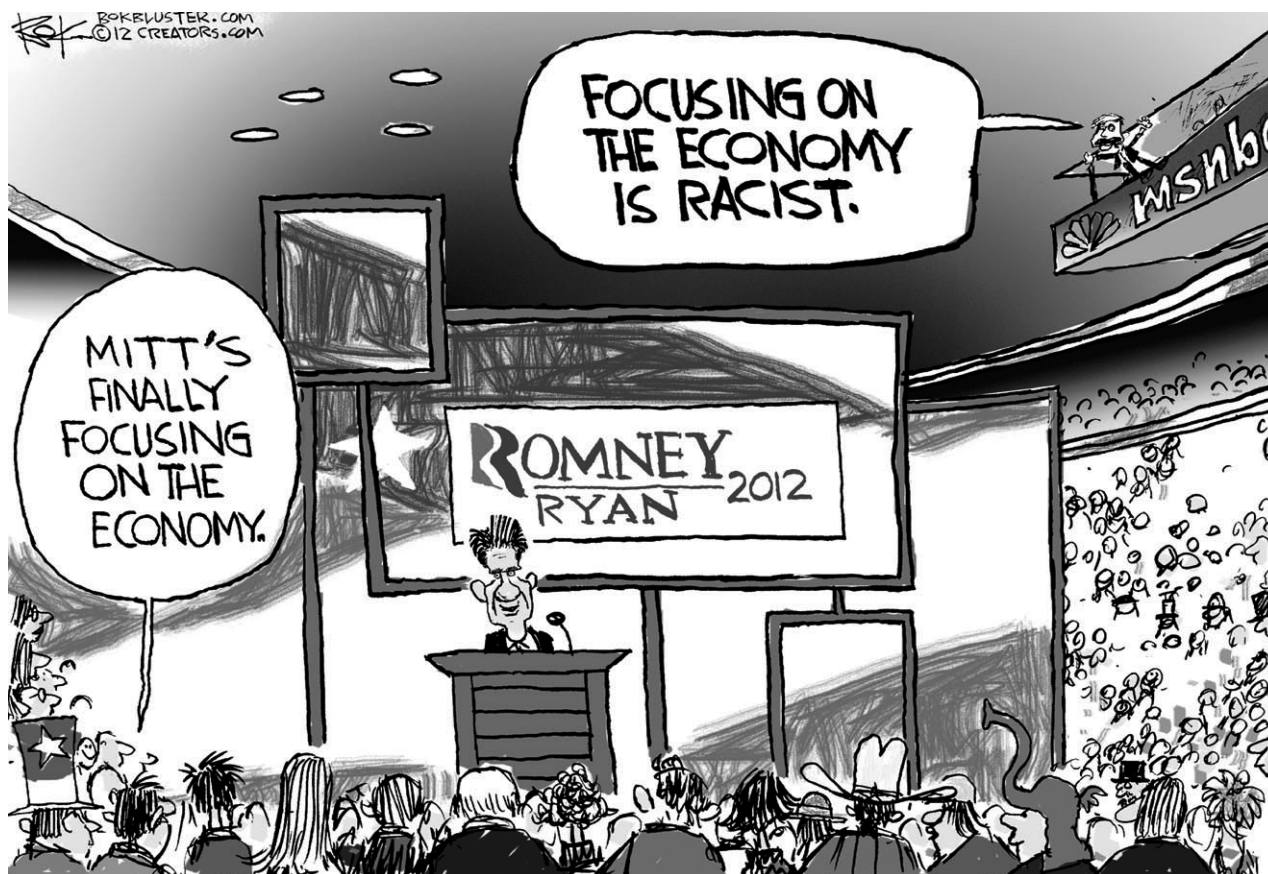

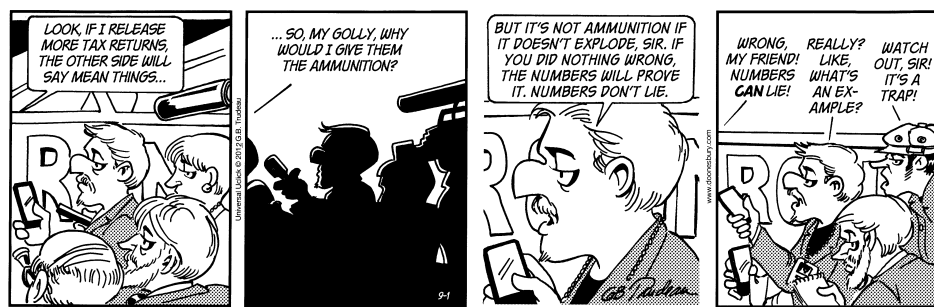

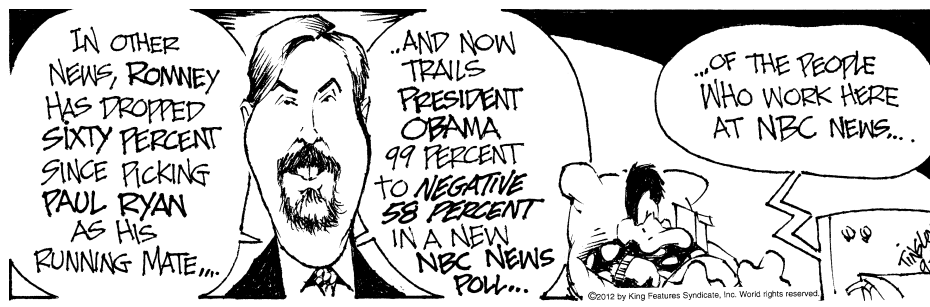

Kidnapping, Robbery Charges for Buhl Home Invasion Suspect

BUHL • The fourth and final suspect in a Buhl home invasion was arraigned in Twin Falls County 5th District Court Friday.

John Valenciano Jr., 19, was charged with two counts of second degree kidnapping and a count of robbery.

He is being held on \$500,000 bond in the Twin Falls County Jail.

Valenciano is accused along with Dylan Edward Contreras, 19, Luis Sotelo and a 16-year-old boy of robbing the home of Leo and Judy Ray, who own Fish Processors of Idaho.

According to an affidavit by sheriff's deputies, Sotelo said Valenciano was mad Leo Ray refused to give him a job.

The four are also allegedly connected to a home invasion in Jerome County and a drive-by shooting in Twin Falls.

On Aug. 11, Valenciano, who was a fugitive at the time, was shot in the neck, allegedly by Daniel D. Thomas.

Sotelo is being held on a \$100,000 bond on charges of robbery and conspiracy to commit robbery while Contreras and the 16-year-old boy are each being held on a \$250,000 bond. All four have Sept. 7 preliminary hearings.

Feds End Wyo. Wolf Protections

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) • The federal government will end its protections for wolves in Wyoming, where the species was introduced two decades ago to revive it from near extinction in the United States.

The announcement Friday by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service entrusts the state with managing wolf num-

bers and endorses a plan that allows for them to be shot on sight in most of the state, while keeping them permanently protected in designated areas like Yellowstone National Park. Wyoming will take over management of the wolves at the end of September.

The decision of the announcement quickly

sparked promises of legal challenges from environmental groups that argue wolves still need protection to maintain their successful recovery. Dan Ashe, the agency's director, acknowledged the "emotional reaction to wolf hunting" but said it would not be "detrimental to long-term conservation of wolves."

"Quite the contrary, it will support long-term conservation of wolves as it has other predators like mountain lion and grizzly bear and black bear," Ashe said.

Wyoming has been chaffing under federal wolf protections for years, with ranchers and hunters complaining that wolves kill other wildlife and many cattle.

Man Files \$10M Tort Claim over Rape Case

SANDPOINT (AP) • A former northern Idaho man is seeking at least \$10 million in damages from Bonner County authorities after a district judge dismissed statutory rape alle-

gations against him.

Gary Dean Blankenship Jr. claims his constitutional rights were violated and his reputation was harmed during the case, according to a tort claim filed last week.

ISU Track Coach Electrocuted in Ditch

BLACKFOOT (AP) • An assistant track and field coach at Idaho State University was one of three people who were electrocuted in an irrigation ditch — the coach after apparently trying to rescue a dog and two others who went into the water in an attempt to rescue her.

Bingham County officials found the bodies Thursday about three miles northwest of Blackfoot.

Jacquelyn R. Paulson, 31, of Blackfoot, was reported missing at about 9:30 p.m. when she didn't return from a search for the family dog, sheriff's Capt. Mark Crowley said.

Two Blackfoot men — Michael Lance Hicks, 41, and Preston Keith Tarpley, 49 — apparently went in the water to rescue Paulson and also were electrocuted.

An irrigation pump in the area had shorted out and was sending a current through the water, Crowley said.

Idaho Power Co. shut off the power in the area so rescuers could recover the bodies.

Paulson was going into her ninth season as assistant track and field coach at Idaho State. She was a two-time NCAA All-American in the heptathlon at ISU and competed in the event in the 2004 and 2008 Olympic Trials, finishing eighth in 2008. She also competed internationally.

"She was the pride of our program," said ISU head track and field coach Dave Nielsen. "She was like a daughter to me. This is so untimely and tragic that I just don't know what else to say."

Yellowstone Snowmobile Rules Could Be Extended

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) • The National Park Service plans to extend the existing rules on snowmobile and snowcoach use in Yellowstone National Park for another winter.

The proposal announced Friday would continue the rules that have been in place for the past three winters. It would allow up to 318 commercially guided snowmobiles and up to 78 guided snowcoaches in the park each day.

The Park Service also will reopen the comment period on the proposed long-term winter plan.

In June, the agency proposed increasing traffic to a maximum of 480 snowmobiles plus 60 snowcoaches per day.

The number of snowcoaches could double in the future if they meet noise and pollution standards under the long-term plan.

"As we look to the 2012-2013 winter season, we want to provide a safe and positive experience for our

visitors," superintendent Dan Wenk said in a statement. "Today's approach ensures that there will not be interruptions to access this winter, and also responds to public requests for additional review and comment on the long-term plan."

Honoring Marriage, Part 3: Your Commitment

As we finish up our short series on honoring marriage, I want to impress upon you the importance of what it means when you said "I do" to your spouse.

The Lord is very serious when you said those words to your spouse and in front of all those witnesses, let alone in front of Him. And I am sure you were serious when you said those words then, but what about now?

shares one last name. They appear as one under the covenant of marriage. They are in a partnership as well as a relationship under the Lord.

In a Biblical marriage there is a covenant cut between a man and woman that brings a lifelong commitment to each other. And beloved, may we see it that way; a lifelong commitment!

A third element in the marriage covenant is the participation of witnesses to testify that the covenant was made. In the Old Testament, the cutting of the covenant was often witnessed by setting up a memorial or sign. For example, when Jacob cut a covenant with his father-in-law Laban, the latter responded, "So now come, let us make a covenant, you and I, and let it be a witness between you and me."

And as we have seen in previous articles, God showed us that a covenant is made up of conditions (terms of agreement) that each party has committed to uphold; without these, there is no covenant.

Then Jacob took a stone and set it up as a pillar. Jacob said to his kinsmen, "Gather stones." So they took stones and made a heap, and they ate there by the heap.

We noted that covenants are legal documents or verbal agreements whereby oaths of faithfulness are expressed between two or more parties. So in this last article I want to encourage you to hang onto your covenant keeping words when you said "I do," to finish strong and not give up on your spouse, and to remind you of some of these marriage covenant particulars.

Now Laban called it Jegarshadutha, but Jacob called it Galeed. Laban said, "This heap is a witness between you and me this day." Therefore it was named Galeed, and Mizpah, for he said, "May the LORD watch between you and me when we are absent one from the other. "If you mistreat my daughters, or if you take wives besides my daughters, although no man is with us, see, God is witness between you and me."

The first particular the covenant supplies in marriage is that two people become one. We call this oneness or unity. In the marriage covenant, you become identified with the other individual and there is a supernatural combining of the two lives. The Lord sees you and your spouse as one, just as He sees all of His redeemed in Christ as one.

Behold this heap and behold the pillar which I have set between you and me. This heap is a witness, and the pillar is a witness, that I will not pass by this heap to you for harm, and you will not pass by this heap and this pillar to me, for harm. The God of Abraham and the god of Nahor, the God of their father, judge between us." So Jacob swore by the fear of his father Isaac. Then Jacob offered a sacrifice on the mountain, and called his kinsmen to the meal; and they ate the meal and spent the night on the mountain. (Genesis 31:44-54)

Everything merges and comes together. Your bills, your money, your possessions, everything is now seen as being one.

The heap of stones served as a witness that neither party would break their binding covenant, and God was called as their Witness. Similarly, when a man and a woman enter into the binding covenant of marriage, guests are invited as witnesses, the highest of which is God Himself.

The Lord desires a married couple to be "one" unto death. "For this reason a man shall leave his father and his mother, and be joined to his wife; and they shall become one flesh" (Genesis 2:24).

More can be said concerning the covenant relationship that man and a woman have with one another in marriage (such as the sign of the ring that binds the two and the meal that is shared after entering the covenant). Yet, beloved, what I want you

A second noteworthy act within this marriage covenant is that there is a change in the name. In Genesis 17:5 and 15, where God reaffirmed His covenant with Abram, God said, "No longer shall your name be called Abram, but your name shall be Abraham; For I have made you the father of a multitude of nations." "As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her name Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name."

When the wife takes her husband's name, this change symbolizes the supernatural identity and oneness God intends for those who have entered the marriage covenant. They are seen as a couple who

go," he said. But a steady stream of donations is what it needs.

TWIN FALLS • For 38 years he lived in darkness. And then Ron Riebold saw the light.

Magic Valley Fellowship Hall, which opened in 1987, recently raised \$25,000 for a new roof that will be installed this month.

The light, for him, came through Magic Valley Fellowship Hall and its 12-step program for recovering addicts and alcoholics.

"But that doesn't mean we still don't need donations," Amen said. "We still need the community's support."

Riebold has been sober for three years, he said, and recently accepted Jesus Christ into his life.

The Hall, which is supported by community foundation grants and donations and is visited by about 1,500 people a month, is not affiliated with any churches, and there is no proselytizing. But faith, hope and God often are talked about in its meetings. Someone might mention how they've gotten in touch with their spiritual side as they learned to rely on a higher power.

"I was baptized last week," the 53-year-old Twin Falls man said, noting that before he came to the fellowship hall he was "a full-blown junkie."

For some recovering addicts that higher power might be the group itself, Riebold said. For him, it is God.

Many others, too, who visit the nonprofit center have learned to replace the bad things in their lives with things that are positive.

The meetings helped lead Aime Marrs to develop a personal relationship with her maker and better relationships with those closest to her.

For Riebold those positives have been a gradual belief in God and, because of it, a growing confidence in himself.

"I used to be very hateful, angry," the 36-year-old Twin Falls woman said. "I used to think everything centered on me, me, me. But today it's not about me. It's about me being the kind of wife I should be to my husband, the kind of mother I

"I'm not the same person I used to be," he said.

should be to my kids. ... Only God can give you that kind of healing."

Things that have helped: a sponsor, which every addict needs; and, as the facility's name suggests, the fellowship of others.

Marrs does not call herself religious but considers herself spiritual. Her growing

The outlook always looks better when God is involved, she said.

Like spiritual stirrings, the facility itself does quiet work, but with huge underlying impact, Amen said.

“We’re helping to keep the streets and community safe by offering education through the 12-step program,” he said. “It’s bad enough out there as it is. We make a huge impact on changing people’s lives.”

The 12-step program is based primarily on one developed by Alcoholics Anonymous, Amen said, and modified to the addiction, whether it be crystal meth, cocaine or marijuana.

Amen knows firsthand the ill effects of drug abuse and spent time in prison.

After he was released, he found new life at the Hall.

During an AA meeting on Thursday, Amen told the group: “I’m not the same person I used to be. I can now meet life on life’s terms, without drugs and alcohol.”

He said those who come to the facility might not notice the change in themselves as much as other people notice it. But don’t give up on yourself, he said; change happens daily.


The Hall is open 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. seven days a week and holds meetings every day. Thirteen people attended an AA meeting on Thursday, each taking turns sharing their stories. Some talked about challenges, others about change. A few, in the course of their talks, mentioned how God had pricked their hearts.

Whether you’ve connected with your spiritual side or not — faith is a by-product of the program, not necessarily its main thrust — change is what the facility is all about, Amen said.

“I’ve changed,” he said. “I don’t ever want to again be the (expletive) I used to be.”

The Alcoholics Anonymous members named here agreed to be identified and photographed for this story. However, AA has a tradition of anonymity that it says can overcome the fears of people who may be reluctant to seek its help.

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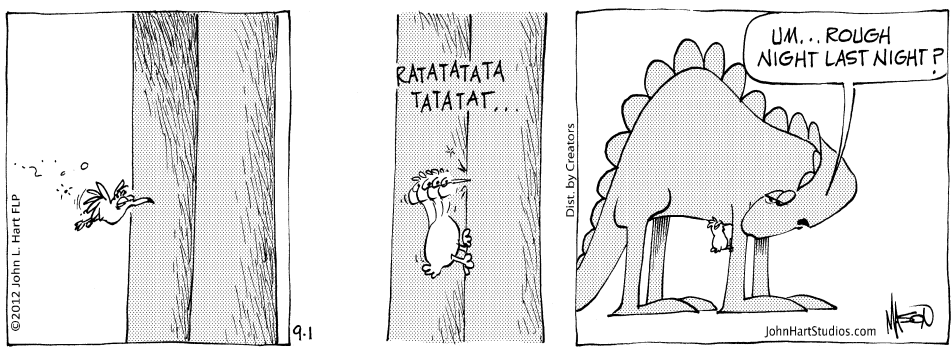
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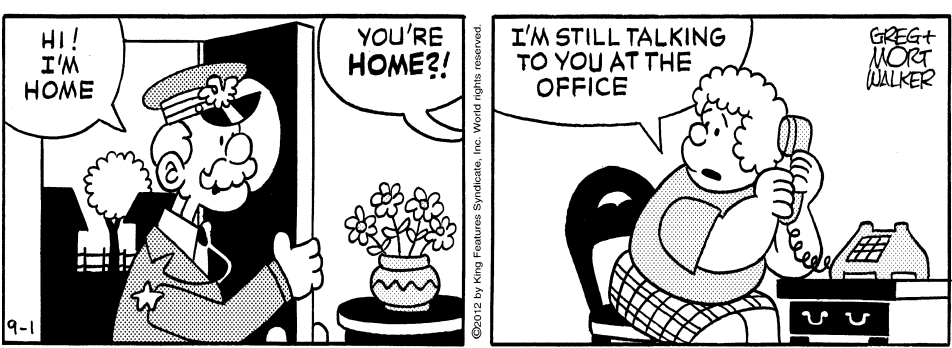
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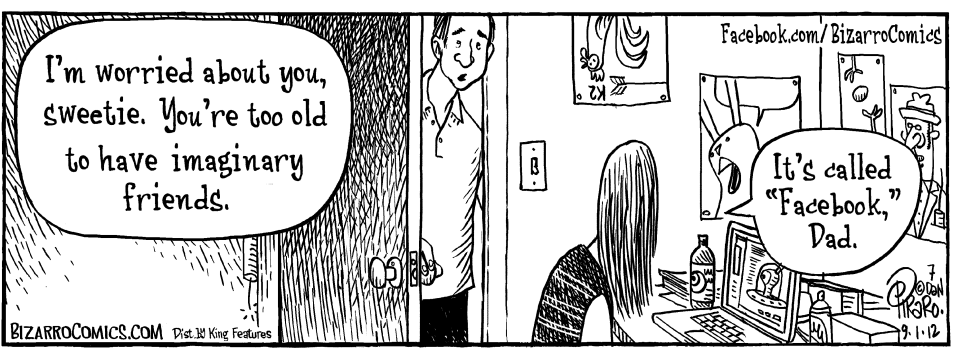
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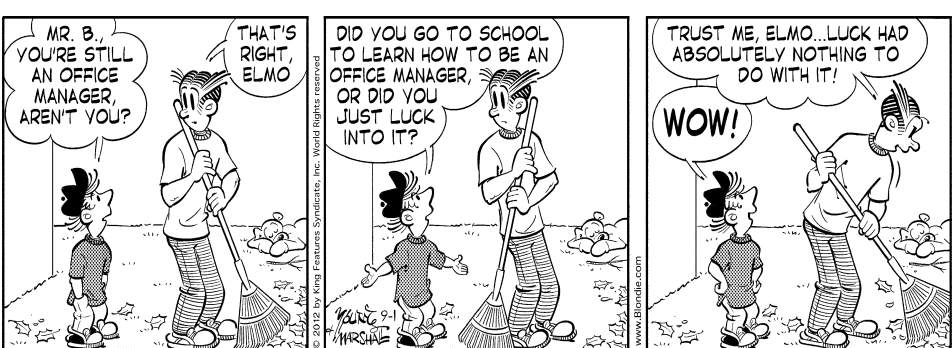
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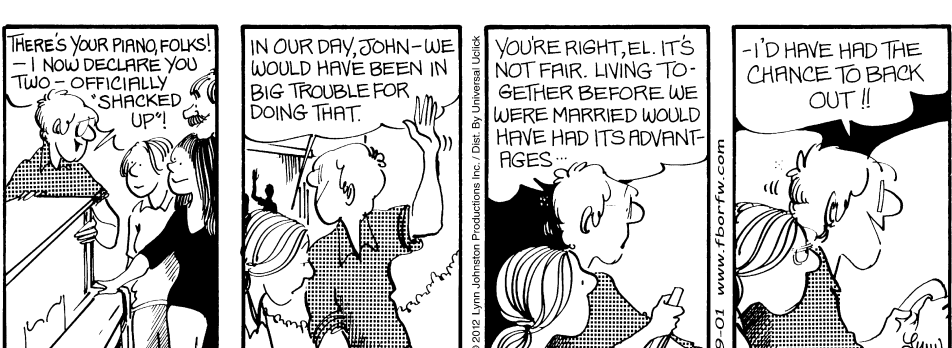
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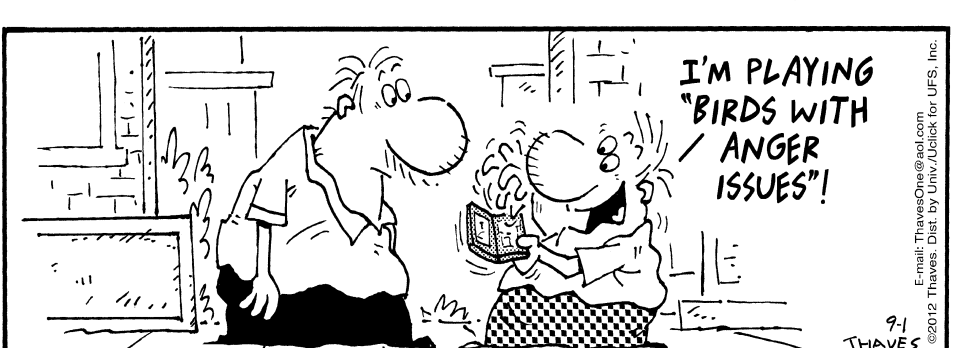
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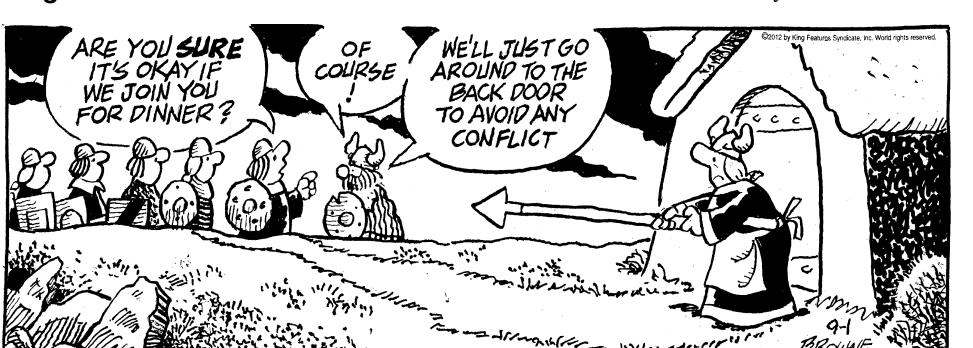
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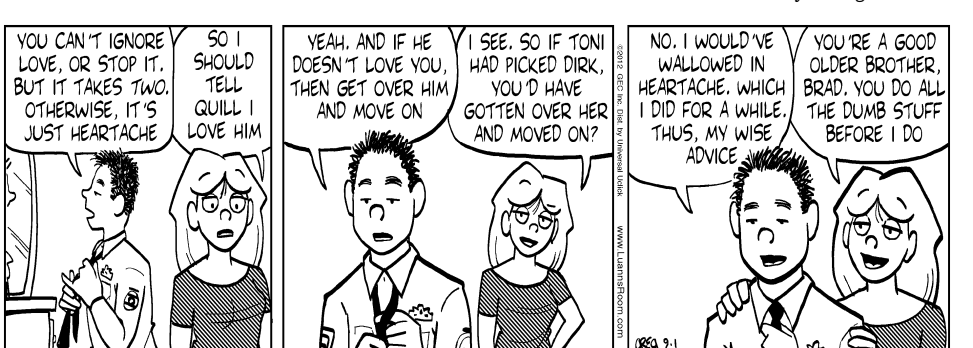
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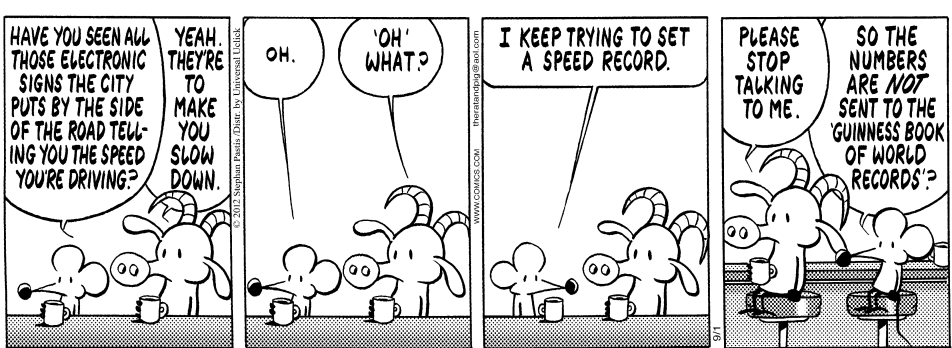
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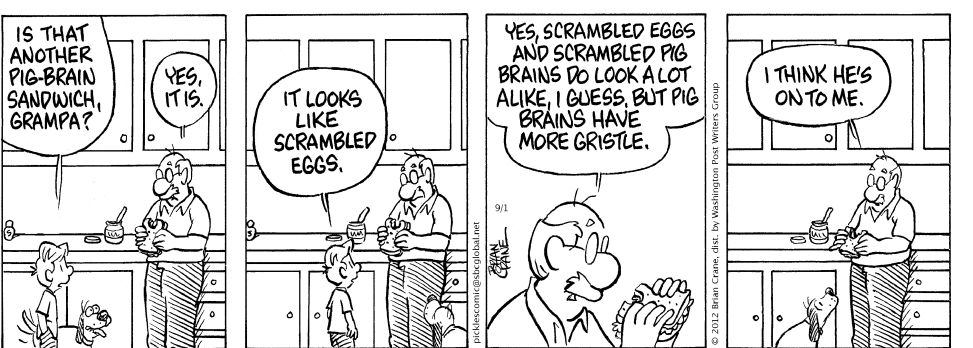
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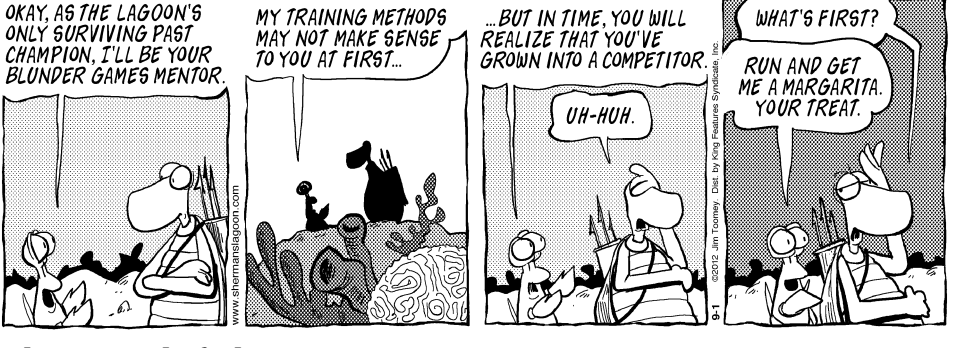
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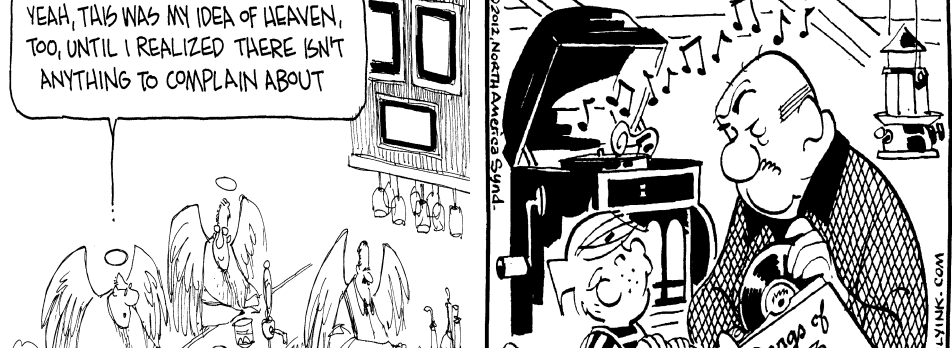
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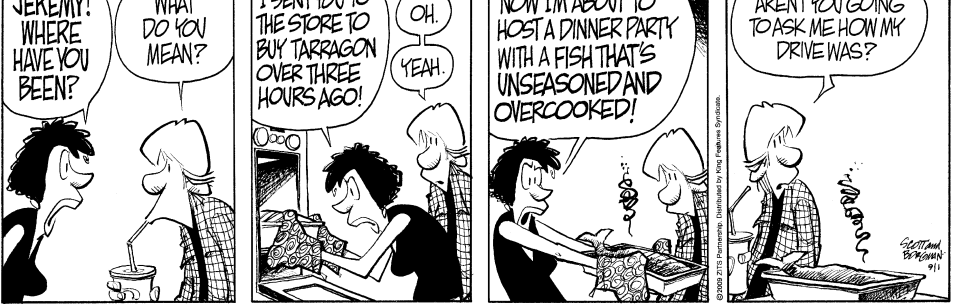

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Mother of GMA Co-host Robin Roberts Dies

NEW YORK • Lucimarian Roberts, the mother of "Good Morning America" co-host Robin Roberts, has died a day after the anchor announced she was taking a medical leave for a bone marrow transplant.

The 88-year-old Roberts died in Gulfport, Miss., on Thursday night, Jeffrey W. Schneider, senior vice president of ABC News, said Friday.

The announcement of the death also was made on "GMA" on Friday morning.

"Robin arrived home with her sister, Sally-Ann, forging through flooded and blocked roads to be with her beloved mother in time to see her," GMA Senior Executive Tom Cibrowski said in an email to the entire news division Thursday evening.

The Mississippi area was dealing with flooding from the effects of Hurricane Isaac.

Over the years, Lucimarian Roberts made numerous appearances on "GMA."

She was a Gulf Coast icon for more than four decades. She often was the first black woman to work with organizations and state and local agencies, and she became known for her ability to get things done.

She was the first black to serve as chairman of the

Mississippi State Board of Education in the 1980s.

She also had a great passion for poetry and music.

Lucimarian Roberts collaborated with her daughter on a book titled, "My Story, My Song — Mother-Daughter Reflections on Life and Faith."

"I sing because the music of the church speaks my soul language," she wrote. "I sing because these songs are tightly woven in to the texture of who I am."

"She even recorded a CD of hymns for her family as a gift last year," said Cibrowski.

The family was gathered in Pass Christian, Miss., and planned a small private service, he said.

The death came on the same day Roberts said goodbye to her co-workers and audience before starting her medical leave. Sally-Ann, a morning anchor at WWL-

TV in New Orleans, is donating the marrow to her sister.

Robin Roberts' departure had been set for Friday. But in a last-minute change of plans, she told her viewers she was leaving a day early to visit her ailing mother.

In a statement on her Facebook page, Robin Roberts said she and Sally-Ann arrived in Gulfport in time to visit with their mother before she died.

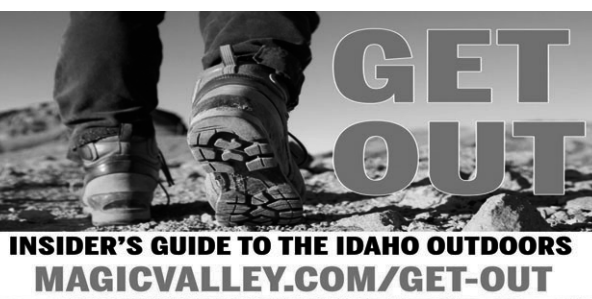

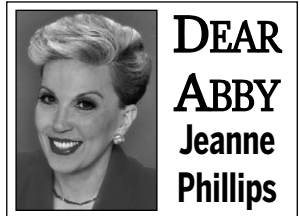

THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

"An event has happened, upon which it is difficult to speak, and impossible to be silent."
— Edmund Burke

The world championships have just finished in Lille, so to mark that, this week's deals come from the last event, four years ago, in Beijing.

Our first deal features a double game-swing in the match between China and Hungary. Would you open one spade as East or make a one-spade overcall as West? When the Hungarians were East-West, both passed at their first opportunity. North responded one no-trump to the one-diamond opening, East cuebid two diamonds to show the majors, and Laszlo Harangozo now jumped to four spades over South's three-diamond call to end the auction. He was not taxed to come to 10 tricks since, after the one-no-trump response, he could not misguess the spade suit.

In the other room the auction was as shown. It takes a heart lead and a heart ruff (or a heart switch after the unlikely lead of the club ace) to defeat five diamonds. Even after West led a spade, however, Peter Trenka had to play well to land the doubled contract.

He ruffed the opening lead, pulled trump, then led a club to his king and West's ace. He ruffed the spade return, discarded a heart on the fourth round of clubs, and called for a low heart. With a count on the West hand, declarer knew his only chance was to find him with a singleton heart queen. There were no more entries to dummy, so it would not have helped to find East with both missing heart honors. Declarer therefore put up the heart king and was rewarded when the queen fell. He lost just two tricks for plus 750.

ANSWER: Your partner has shown a strong hand with both minors and implicitly short hearts, so your cards appear to be working overtime. The choice is to give preference to three diamonds (which sounds like three-card support since you did not raise at your previous turn) or to raise to four clubs. I prefer the first option.

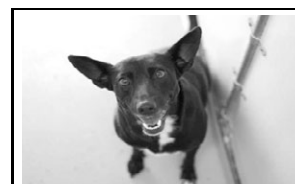

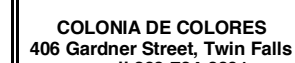

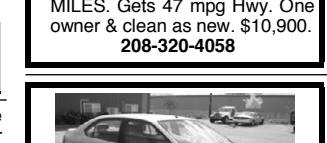

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1715, following a reign of 72 years, King Louis XIV of France died four days before his 77th birthday.

In 1807, former Vice President Aaron Burr was found not guilty of treason. (Burr was then tried on a misdemeanor charge, but was again acquitted.)

In 1902, the Georges Melies short film "Le Voyage dans la lune" (A Trip to the Moon) opened in France.

In 1912, British composer Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, known as the "Black Mahler" (and not to be confused with the poet Samuel Taylor Coleridge), died at age 37.

In 1923, the Japanese cities of Tokyo and Yokohama were devastated by an earthquake that claimed some 140,000 lives.

In 1932, New York City Mayor James J. "Gentleman Jimmy" Walker resigned following charges of graft and corruption in his administration.

In 1942, U.S. District Court Judge Martin I. Welsh, ruling from Sacramento, Calif., on a lawsuit brought by the American Civil Liberties Union on behalf of Fred Korematsu, upheld the wartime detention of Japanese-Americans as well as Japanese nationals.

In 1951, the United States, Australia and New Zealand signed a mutual defense pact, the ANZUS treaty.

In 1961, the Soviet Union ended a moratorium on atomic testing with an above-ground nuclear explosion in central Asia. A TWA Lockheed Constellation crashed shortly after takeoff from Chicago's Midway Airport, killing all 78 people on board.

In 1972, American Bobby Fischer won the international chess crown in Reykjavik, Iceland, as Boris Spassky of the Soviet Union resigned before the resumption of Game 21. An arson fire at the Blue Bird Cafe in Montreal, Canada, claimed 37 lives.

In 1983, 269 people were killed when a Korean Air Lines Boeing 747 was shot down by a Soviet jet fighter after the airliner entered Soviet airspace.

In 1987, peace demonstrator S. Brian Willson lost his legs when he was hit by a train at the Concord Naval Weapons Station in California while protesting weapons shipments to Central America.

Ten years ago: The California Legislature approved a \$99 billion budget, ending a 2-month-old standoff. Typhoon Rusa, the worst typhoon to hit South Korea in 40 years, left at least 119 people dead.

Five years ago: Idaho Sen. Larry Craig announced his resignation, saying he would leave office on Sept. 30, 2007, in the wake of fallout over his arrest and guilty plea in a Minnesota airport gay sex sting. (However, Craig later reversed his decision, saying he would serve out the rest of his term.) Clay Buchholz threw a no-hitter in his second major league start, just hours after being called up by the Boston Red Sox. Buchholz struck out nine, walked three and hit one batter to give the Red Sox a 10-0 victory over Baltimore.

One year ago: In a fiery broadcast from hiding, Libya's Moammar Gadhafi warned that loyalist tribes in his main strongholds were armed and preparing for battle. No. 13 Michigan St. Beats No. 24 Boise St. 17-13

EAST LANSING, Mich. • Le'Veon Bell ran for a career-high 210 yards and two touchdowns, including the game-winner with 8:12 remaining in No. 13 Michigan State's 17-13 victory over No. 24 Boise State on Friday night.

In a sloppy season opener, the Spartans turned the ball over four times and trailed 13-10 before Bell scored from 5 yards out midway through the fourth quarter. The Broncos drove to the Michigan State 42, but Joe Southwick's pass on fourth-and-2 was broken up.

Bell and the Spartans (1-0) then ran off the final 6:32.

Boise State (0-1) was sluggish in its first game after losing standouts Kellen Moore and Doug Martin from last season's explosive offense. The Broncos' only touchdown came on Jeremy Ioane's 43-yard interception return in the second quarter.

Bell became Michigan State's undisputed top running back when Edwin Baker left to enter the NFL draft after last season. His workload certainly increased Friday. His 44 carries more than doubled his previous career high of 20, and the junior also set career marks with six receptions for 55 yards.

The Spartans outgained Boise State 461 yards to 206.

Michigan leaned on Bell, especially after new starting quarterback Andrew Maxwell threw three first-half interceptions. Maxwell finished 22 of 38 for 248 yards.

Joe Southwick, replacing Moore at quarterback for Boise State, went 15 of 31 for 169 yards with an interception.

Bell started Michigan State's go-ahead drive with a 7-yard run and later caught a pass for 11 yards. He even blocked a pass rusher to allow Maxwell to find Dion Sims for an 18-yard pass on third down that put the ball at the Boise State 7.

Two plays later, the Spartans had the lead.

On fourth-and-2 in Michigan State territory, Boise State's D.J. Harper appeared to have an easy first down on a pitchout, but officials blew the play dead for a Michigan State timeout.

Southwick then attempted a pass that was deflected well by Darqueze Dennard.

Boise State looked overmatched at the start. After a quick three-and-out, the Broncos punted and let Michigan State drive 60 yards in 12 plays for a 7-0 lead on Bell's 1-yard touchdown run.

The Spartans never really took control, though. Maxwell completed his first four passes, but his slant attempt was dropped by Tony Lippett right into the arms of Boise State's Jamar Taylor. The interception led to a field goal, which the Spartans answered when Dan Conroy made a 50-yarder to give Michigan State a 10-3 lead.

In the second quarter, the Broncos went to a couple of their tricks — a flea-flicker for 23 yards and then a wide

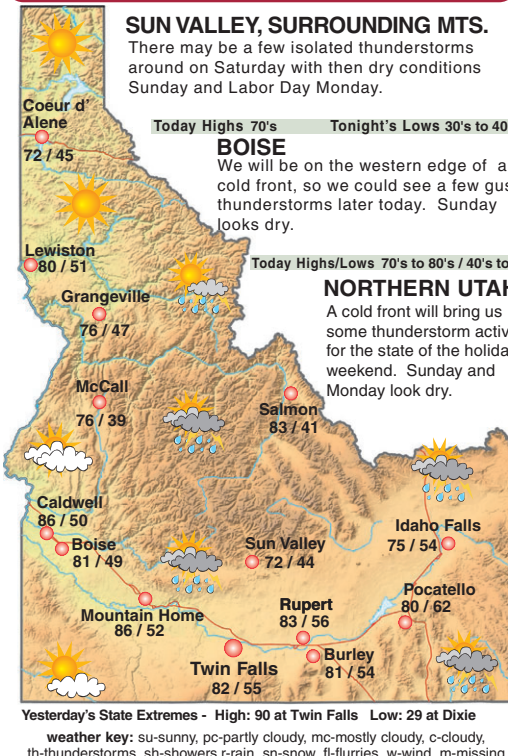

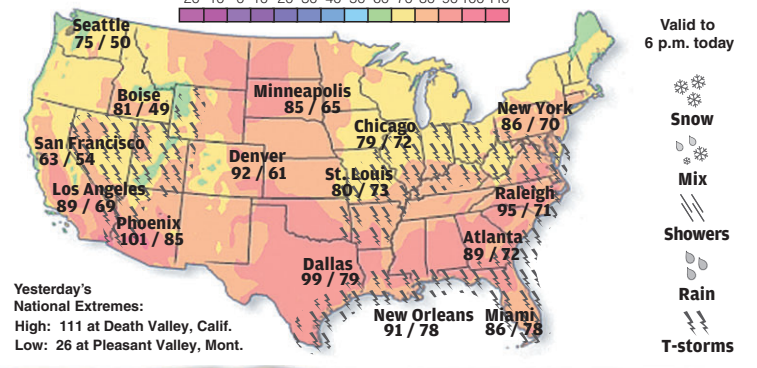
